

2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS, Tuesday, May 15, 1906.

By virtue of the power in him vested by Article III of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, and by reason of the fact that Ascension Day falls this year in Convention week, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese appointed the third Tuesday in May as the day for the meeting of this Diocesan Convention instead of the fourth Tuesday in May, the day named in said Article III.

Accordingly a number of the clergy of the Diocese and of the Laity chosen as delegates from their respective parishes, assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Diocesan Convention, for the purpose of holding the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Church singing the five hundred and sixteenth hymn.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. William A. Hatch, of Holy Innocents' Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. Cassius M. C. Mason, of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

The Convention sermon was preached by the Rev. Edward P. Little, of Trinity Church, Hannibal.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund was then presented and read by Mr. Marshall S. Snow, the Secretary of the Board, as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund submits the following report of the official acts of the Board during the Conventional Year 1905-1906:

June 21, 1905—Organized by the election of the following as officers of the Board: Vice-President, the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D.; Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. Marshall S. Snow.

November 14, 1905—Granted the request of St. George's Church, Bevier, Mo., to sell their church property for the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00), and authorized the President and Secretary to sign the deed of transfer. Authorized and instructed the Secretary to deposit said sum of four hundred dollars in some reputable trust company for one year, as a special trust fund for the benefit of St. George's Church, Bevier, and to renew the deposit at the expiration of one year, unless otherwise instructed by the Board.

December 8, 1905—Granted the request of the Bishop of Kansas City that a deed of the property known as St. Luke's Church at Rich Hill, in the Diocese of Kansas City, be given to certain parties named, who desired to purchase St. Luke's Church for the sum of five hundred and fifty (\$550.00) dollars; the President and Secretary were authorized to execute a deed to the intending purchasers, provided a certified written request should be received from those who remained as representatives of the congregation of St. Luke's Church.

January 17, 1906—Granted the request made by St. Philip's Church, St. Louis, for permission to borrow a sum not to exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the purchase of thirty feet additional land adjoining the present church property on the north, and to mortgage the whole property for the amount borrowed, and authorized the President and Secretary to sign the necessary papers.

Voted that the request from Mr. W. J. Biggs, from LaPlata, Mo., representing St. Mary's Mission, that permission be given to sell the church lots in LaPlata for the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350.00) be granted, and that the officers of the Board be authorized to sign the deed, provided that the money should be sent to this Board to be invested for future use at LaPlata.

The Secretary reported that a deed had been properly prepared and signed conveying the property at Bevier, Mo., as ordered December 8, 1905, and that the purchase money, four hundred dollars (\$400.00) had been received and would be invested as ordered.

The reports were unanimously adopted by a rising vote; and on motion of Mr. Christopher P. Ellerbe, it was ordered that they be spread on the journal, and a special page devoted to each.

Resolved, That Canon X be amended by adding to Section 2 thereof the following words: "If such location is less than 1,000 yards distant in a direct line from the place of worship of any other parish, the Bishop and Standing Committee may consent to same in manner provided in Section 3."

Upon motion, duly seconded and carried, the proposed amendment was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Rev. William Elmer read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, as follows:

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

From all parts of the Diocese there come words of encouragement. Nearly all the churches and missions are supplied with ministers. The number of baptisms and confirmations are largely in excess of last year, while the prompt payment of all assessments and pledges for the General and Diocesan Missions tell us that the people are willing to give to all good works. In St .Louis the Lenten Mission was a great uplift to many hundreds of people, and the downtown noonday services provided by the Brotherhood of St. Andrew was a source of spiritual help to many thousands of our people and members of other religious bodies. The ability of our Church to reach and help the poor is seen in the splendid work being done by St. Stephen's Mission and the Mission of the Holy Cross. The missionary to the city institutions is still pursuing his beneficent work, so that to hundreds of the unfortunate is brought the uplifting power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

This is as it should be; but your committee regret exceedingly that no new or aggressive work is being done. Missouri and her towns and cities are growing faster than ever before in her history. Thousands from the East as well as from the South and North, are pouring over her borders, and among these are undoubtedly a large number of our own people, and they settle in towns and in portions of her large cities where the voice of the Church is not heard. Away from the city of St. Louis in a hundred or more towns in over thirty counties no service of the Church is ever heard. What wonder then that being religious, these families should

seek their spiritual life elsewhere. Neglected by their spiritual mother they feel compelled in order to keep alive the divine love to join other religious bodies; so that, while the population of Missouri is increasing our Church is falling off in proportion to population. This is almost a unique position; for the tendency of the Church in other States is to increase faster than the population. What then is the cause? It may be summed up in one word—neglect; and this neglect is not individual, but the failure of the Diocese to provide means for aggressive work.

The need of the work may be seen in the significant action of the two Convocations. The Hannibal convocation passed a resolution asking the Missionary Board for the appointment of two Archdeacons for missionary work in the country districts. Moreover the Southern Convocation has reiterated its petition for an Archdeacon. These demands come from men in the field who know the needs of their respective Convocations. Of these you will doubtless hear further from the report of the Missionary Board.

In regard to St. Louis, two problems beset us: First, the need of an assistant at St. Stephen's, where the work has increased to such proportions as to be beyond the power of any one man to do it effectively, and secondly, the need of a more effective service in the many missions already established, and for the founding of still further missions in other parts of the city.

The Church is embarrassed by the richness of her opportunities. The door is wide open and it only remains for us to enter in and by earnest work win much people to the Church. In view of these facts your committee is of the opinion that the state of the Church in this Diocese demands, *at once*, very much larger offerings for Diocesan Missions, so that the needed assistance may be given the Bishop to carry on more effectively the missionary work of the Diocese, and to the end that this may be brought more immediately before us we offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Missionary Board be instructed by this Convention to proceed as soon as possible to raise the funds for the support of an Archdeacon and that the Bishop be requested thereupon to make appointment in accordance with Canon IX.

A year has passed since the last Convention, when I was asked to take charge of the *Church News*, as Business Manager, under a new plan of making no charge to the different churches for the paper, so that every communicant should be furnished the paper free, and the expense incurred for printing, etc., to be paid for by funds accruing from advertising. I was selected to *look after things*.

I found during the first month in my new position that were we to issue this paper on the plan adopted by the Convention, we could not use the United States mail at publishers' rates. We must make a charge for it. The Editor was away—the Bishop away—the Business Manager away (up in the air), and so we drifted along, securing a few advertisements. The Business Manager had no time to devote to this work, except he was willing to give his nights to it, but at night nothing could be done. Various schemes were suggested and tried. It can be made to go, but it will take time and hard work of some man who has the time to devote to it and knowledge of its requirements, which I am free to confess, I have not.

The above scheme took away all its income from subscriptions. There was no money to pay for the publication of the July issue. I paid for it. I then borrowed \$150.00 from the Mechanics-American National Bank, followed in August by another \$150.00. I never have been able to pay these notes.

We believe that if worthy results are to be attained, and if religious education is not to be obliterated from the lives of men, something must be done, not only to arouse parents, teachers and clergy to the sense of the terrible inadequacy of the present system, but also to improve such system.

Your Committee believes that much of the moral indefiniteness and the contempt and derision expressed toward religion and the church is due to poorly conducted Sunday schools and slipshod methods of teaching.

Our report does not mean that our own Sunday schools are at fault more than those of other bodies, but suggests the urgent need of Sunday school reform such as will improve our present system.

We, the Committee, offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That in order to forward and develop religious education a Sunday school commission be^{*}appointed to investigate diocesan and extra diocesan conditions and methods, to report at next convention.

Your Committee on that part of the Bishop's Address relating to the Missionary Thank Offering, begs leave to report:

By resolution of the General Convention sitting as the Board of Missions at Boston in 1904, the men of the Church are invited to signalize the three hundredth anniversary of the first settlement of the Church on American soil by some noteworthy expression of their thankfulness to Almighty God for the wonderful protection, guidance, growth and prosperity vouchsafed to this Church during the last three hundred years, and by some noteworthy offering of the great wealth that He has given to them to be laid on the altar at the General Convention at Richmond, Virginia, in 1907, almost within sight of the procreant cradle of the Church on this continent.

The appeal is a strong one. It comes from the General Convention to the individual churchman. It speaks directly from the great Council and heart of the American Church to the heart of the American churchman, calling upon him individually to own his personal obligation to thank God for the Church to which he belongs; to thank Him for her three hundred years of noble history on this continent and for her outlook on a future indefinitely fuller of promise than her past; and to show his thankfulness by an offering in some measure expressive of the blessings he acknowledges, in some measure commensurate with his desire for the extension and success of the Church's missionary work.

The blessings vouchsafed have indeed been signal in their profuseness and in their magnificence. From the solitary priest who gathered his little flock under the shade of the trees and held a precarious footing for Church and State on the banks of the James in 1607, the Church has grown into a great army, led by 102 bishops whose jurisdiction cover as with a network every foot of United States territory and great provinces in foreign lands, officered by five thousand five hundred clergy, numbering nearly a million communicants and nearly three million baptized members, of every

nation and kindred and tongue and people on the face of the earth; who out of their abundance contribute fifteen millions annually to the work of the Church, and who might without sense of deprivation, contribute fifty millions annually out of the overflowing wealth which God has given them.

Yet more; from the first day at Jamestown till now, three hundred years, the Church has been blest with God-given men; men who were foremost in emancipating the country from a foreign yoke and in giving it liberty; men who made and interpreted its laws in the interests of human freedom; men who during the whole three hundred years have inspired the country's patriotism and wrought national and civic rightequases and have been a crown of glory to the nation; men who in crucial times have known how to keep the faith, and please God will know how to keep it still; men who have hazarded their lives to carry the Gospel message to the ends of the earth; such men as these the Church has had in abundance in its membership.

Are not these things for the men of the Church to thank God for? Is not the continuance of these a thing for the men of the Church to pray for and to dedicate themselves to and labor for? And shall they offer thanks with empty hands? Shall they not rather respond to this call to thankfulness and gratitude and Christian liberality in the spirit of the Israelites who when summoned to build their tabernacle dedicated themselves and their free will offerings, and gave until the overseers "spake unto Moses saying the people bring much more than enough for the service of the work which the Lord commanded to make."

Is there a man in this Diocese whose heart does not beat responsive to this call of the Church, whose purse does not freely open to its demands, and who does not feel that it is an honor and a glory to enroll himself as a member of this great Church on her three hundredth anniversary, and in proof of his gratitude and thankfulness for three hundred years of mercies will not be moved to say "Of all that Thou givest me I will surely give a tenth to Thee."

Believing this to be the sentiment of the good people of this Diocese, we offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Convention recommends and urges that in addition to the General Committee, a committee be appointed in every parish of, the Diocese to further by all means in its power the Missionary Thank Offering of heart and effort and wealth by the men of this Diocese; so that the offering shall be such as was never known in the Diocese of Missouri since the day of its foundation; such as will make Missouri one of the princes among those who offer willingly unto the Lord at Richmond in 1907.

WHEREAS, The General Clergy Relief Fund has advantages that can not belong to a Diocesan Fund of like purpose; therefore, be it

Resolved, First, That to the Committee on Constitution and Canons be referred the altering of Canon XXII, titled, "Of the Fund for Disabled and Infirm Clergy," and to change other Canon or Canons affected by this action to harmonize with the change of said Canon XXII, so that all money or other property now held or hereafter acquired for this purpose, shall be transferred to and merged into the General Clergy Relief Fund. Provided, first, that such change does not jeopardize the money or other property now held by the Fund for Disabled and Infirm Clergymen. Provided, second, that the present beneficiaries of the Diocesan Fund suffer no detriment by the change.

Resolved, Second, That the Committee on Constitution and Canons be instructed to report on this resolution at the next Annual Convention.

I am about to read, and you to hear, my Twentieth Annual Address as the Bishop of Missouri. For nineteen years and four months I was a Bishop in the Rocky Mountains. For nineteen years and nine months I have been a Bishop here. God's merciful, supporting hand has been with me. I am humbly thankful. Since I was consecrated, one hundred and fifty other Bishops of the American Church have been consecrated and ninety have died. Our present number is one hundred and two, besides the Bishops of Hayti and Brazil, one hundred and four in all. With you I am now entering on the larger half of my Bishop's life on earth. God alone knoweth the future. We leave it in His wise and merciful and loving hands. Meanwhile for the present we want to try to do duty as He appoints, faithfully and steadily and cheerily.

The gathering of the clans together in Annual Convention is most useful, we know. The business machinery of the Diocese could not well go on without it. And we think there is honest comfort in it, too, with brotherliness and instruction and wholesome education. Reports give us information. Plans mapped out minister guidance. Motions and discussions under parliamentary procedure cultivate self-restraint and strengthen judgment by caution and promote allowance-making-the give and take of popular language-a necessary oil for the noisy, creaking machinery of human life, if it is to work at all smoothly. I am anxious that the Annual Convention should not be disesteemed or disregarded. Do not count it a dry cold thing. Throw heart into it. Kindle fires under it. Warm yourselves with the flame. Think, speak, pray, sing, urge, check, give, take, honestly and sturdily. Ye busy American laymen, make it a point to grant us some of your time, and as far as in you lies, throw into the Church's business the clear-headedness and quick-wittedness and strong-heartedness which you are wont to put into your daily businesses. The Church Militant is in the world. She is put there for a purpose and is expected

to stay there in her line of duty. Church business is then in the world, and, in a certain sense and a right sense, too, it is of the world. Surely, therefore, it should be conducted in as honest and honorable a way, in as prudent and thoughtful a way, in as careful and faithful a way as is the world's business when righteously carried on.

Death has called away two from the House of Bishops this year. Bishop Davies, of Michigan, I knew well. I was present at his consecration in old St. Peter's, Philadelphia, in 1889. He had been Rector of that Church for many years. He had also been Rector at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and Professor in Berkley Divinity School, Middletown, Connecticut. His scholarly accomplishments, his courteous manners and his grave simplicity of character made him a wise and trusted leader in whatever field he was called to act. He died at 74, after sixteen years of prudent and successful management of the important Diocese of Michigan.

Bishop Morris, of Oregon, was the oldest man in the House of Bishops when he died in his 87th year. I had visited with him in Portland and traveled with him in stage coaches in the Blue Mountains. I honored him greatly and loved him deeply. He was a Missionary Bishop for nearly twenty-one years and a Diocesan Bishop for seventeen. His Quaker blood and trained business habits enabled him to cope successfully with the perplexities which crowd the path of a Missionary Bishop. Then as Diocesan Bishop he shepherded Oregon well, the fourth largest in area of all our sixty-three Dioceses, only Montana, Colorado and Dallas being larger.

In our own Diocese two brethren in the ministry have fallen on sleep. The Rev. Mr. Newton came to the Diocese in 1883. For near twenty-three years he was Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Louis, and walked before and among his people, a faithful and loving pastor. Humility, gentleness, devotion, unselfishness were his characteristics. There was not wanting a vein of humor which was as a savor of salt. He was not robust and did much of his work in weakness of body and in pain. But he never flinched. Since Mr. Newton's death only seven clergymen are left who belonged to the Diocese when I came: Rev. Dr. Ingraham, Rev. Messrs. Mason and Hatch, Rev. Dr. Holland, Rev. Messrs. Reed and Hunt, and Rev. Dr. Davis.

Rev. Dr. Short came to us from the South in 1889. Under God's guidance and blessing his seventeen years of pastorship put the sturdiness of strength and vigor of healthful self-respect into St. Peter's, St. Louis. In large degree the Parish is a monument to his zeal and wisdom and assiduous care. And when in the last year of his life disease had laid him prostrate and active work was withdrawn and only trust and patience were left for him, his people showed their gratitude and appreciation of all he had been to them and done for them by a loving and generous ministration to him which is beyond all praise. The Diocese has lost not a few of its servants and helpers. Among them are Mr. J. A. Oatley, a vestryman of Rolla; Mr. Peter Daniels, a vestryman of St, John's, St. Louis; Mr. H. A. Hyatt, a vestryman of Kirkwood; Mr. John Burton, once warden of Crystal City; Mr. L. P. Munger, a former vestryman of Hannibal; Mr. John T. Hesser, a vestryman of Old Orchard; Mr. R. H. Clifford, a former vestryman of Ferguson; and Mr. Charles Parsons. Mr. Parsons was a staunch friend and supporter of the Cathedral and was for years one of its officers.

From among the women, Mrs. O'Dell and Mrs. Gray and Sister Josephine are gone. Mrs. O'Dell's faithful service in Christ Church Cathedral dates back for many years. Mrs. Gray, of Holy Innocents', St. Louis, rehearsed cheery lessons of faith and hope and love until sore sickness drove her into retirement. Not all of us know the quiet and steady and efficient work for the Church that is done by the Sisters in their school at Bishop Robertson Hall; and Sister Josephine with a zeal consuming her strength was at the front and in the thick of that diligent work.

The record of the dead is recited. God be thanked for their lives and good examples. Time passes swiftly as though upon the wings of the wind. Our names shall be in the rehearsal of the diptychs soon. God mercifully hold us in His holy keeping and have us ready, for the loving Savior's sake!

Honesty and straightforwardness are called for in making reports. Therefore, honestly, I must say the Diocese is not as snug and sound as it ought to be. Kirksville is vacant, as is also Poplar Bluff with Jackson. Three Church buildings are in these towns and only one of them is in debt. Two clerymen could fill the needs of these three stations well. The difficulty is to get the people in each of the three localities to rouse themselves and to unite in vigorous effort to secure a salary and call a pastor.

Some one may say: "It is the Bishop's prerogative to send men to be missionaries in such places. Why does he not do just that thing promptly along the line of wise and efficient generalship?" May I give answer? In the first place there are two war cries, conspicuously American, which may well make an American Bishop hesitate to adopt a practice that would seem to be a flying directly in their face. The one cry is "Local sovereignty." The other is "No taxation without representation." It seems to me that no American Diocese can be wisely administered where the Bishop forgets that these cries sound into the ears and spell out to the minds of American people the conviction that they have, and of right ought to have, something to say as to the minister who is to be summoned to be their pastor.

But, suppose we grant the Bishop's prerogative to send the man—for perhaps I may be permitted to believe that, on the whole, the Bishop is the best judge the Parish can get to determine the fitness and capacity of the man and his adaptability to the vacant cure—yet, in the second place there are consequences, and logical consequences may be quite like scor-

pion's tails, with stings in them. In this case, the logical consequence of the prerogative to send is, I take it, the permission and even the duty to follow up and stand by and support. That is, the Bishop's power to send a missionary carries with it his power to pay the missionary. It would be humorsome to call this his prerogative or privilege. His power to pay the missionary! Of what sort is that power? In seeking to answer that question probably you will not fail to see why the Bishop declines to send missionaries to vacant cures unless and until the local authorities are ready practically and healthfully to co-operate in the sending and the securing and the supporting.

St. George's, Bevier, at the request of the few church folk remaining there has been pronounced by the Bishop to be deorganized and terminated as a Mission, and the Church building has been sold to the Baptists. The proceeds of the sale, \$400.00, are in the hands of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund. St. Peter's, Oakside, has also been abandoned as a Mission.

The recital of these facts must be honestly made. But they set one a-thinking. Here are we on the one hand feeling and urging that we ought to go out and by storm or seige or capitulation or colonization lodge the Church and build it up in all the towns of the Diocese where it is now unknown. And here are the same we, on the other hand, selling a Church building and abolishing two Church Missions already established. What does all this mean? Explanations would seem to be in order.

Well, I can only say, at Bevier the Church building needed repairs, to cost one hunded dollars or more. The Church people there could not meet the cost. And it seemed hardly wise to call upon the giving Church people of St. Louis to provide such cost, when there was no congregation ready to step in for occupancy of the repaired church, and there seemed no assurance that other repairs would not be needed in the near future.

Oakside is a rural community, with very little, indeed, of force of cohesion or power of concentration.

Conditions and circumstances, therefore, seemed to make it wisdom to discontinue these two organizations.

Besides the three Parishes already cited, the following four Mission Stations are vacant: LaPlata, Portland, Shelbina and Valley Park. No one of these has hope of securing a resident pastor. There are plans for placing Portland under Rev. Mr. Chapman, of Jefferson City, and Valley Park under Rev. Mr. Potter, of Kirkwood. Faithful laymen in LaPlata and Shelbina keep the Diocesan assessments of these places paid every year.

"Advent," St. Louis, has been detached and terminated as a Parish Mission of Ascension Church, and "Epiphany" likewise as a Parish Mission of St. Mark's. Twenty of our clergy receive missionary stipends. Last year our pledges for Diocesan Missions amounted to \$3,830.00. For this year we need \$4,395.00 to keep our Diocesan Missionary work in steady and healthful condition.

I have enumerated some things which go to justify the statement that Diocesan affairs are not in as snug and sound condition as they ought to be. But I would not have you think that there is not a good deal to be said on the other side.

Listen. Two Parishes in St. Louis, St. John's and the Redeemer, after delays and distractions are now acceptably equipped with vigorous and faithful pastors. Ascension, St. Louis, though it has given up to Tennessee one of the most devoted of rectors and one of the most lovable of men, under the warmth bequeathed by his zeal and devotion goes right on without let or hindrance in its parish work and growth. Holy Communion, St. Louis, is providing a Parish House in order that it, in turn, may provide for the clamoring activities which press round about. Grace, St. Louis, has its Parish House built and occupied. St. Philip's, St. Louis, has extended its ownership to a contiguous lot, in view of the developments and enlargements of the future. All Saints', St. Louis, has sold its old Church favorably and has a goodly sum in hand for buying or building a new one. St. Paul's, St. Louis, has roused itself to brightness of life and new outreachings of activity. St. Stephen's, St. Louis, is a storm center of missionary work and zeal and a home center of peaceful progress and successful accomplishment. City Missions under Mr. Cochran, and Hospital Missions under Mr. Kemerer, and both largely under the wise and helpful guidance of Dean Davis and Mr. Duckworth, are doing much good in the waste places and to the worn and wandering souls of this great city.

In the country, Hannibal has a Rectory, the generous gift of one of its faithful parishioners. Ferguson has bought its lot and is about to let its contract for a Rectory. Old Orchard is moving for a much needed enlargement of its Church building. Monroe is preparing to perpetuate the memory of its founder and godly pastor, Rev. Mr. Scheetz, by adding a recess Chancel to its Church. Rolla has paid the last cent due on its Rectory and is now a Parish free from debt. Columbia is planning to buy the lot alongside of its church and to build a Rectory.

Here I want to add some special words about Columbia. It is the seat, as all know, of our University of Missouri. Our University is advancing steadily, year by year, in standards of excellence and in numbers of students. Obviously no better missionary work for the Diocese can be done than that of commending our Church to that large body of students. Our Parish at Columbia is self-respecting and self-supporting in doing its own parish work. That work it does well and is doing better year by year. But the Parish ought to be helped in meeting what I may call the great missionary work of dealing with the thousands of students. In building their Rectory the vestry wish to combine with it a sort of guild hall, at least some rooms that may furnish provision for the churchly care and guidance of the students. I have no hesitation in saying that I think it is a duty and I hope it will be esteemed a privilege for all the Church people of the State to help in building such a Rectory. I trust that the Rector

The Confirmations for the year have been 632, a number larger for us than in any other one of the sixteen years since the Diocese ceased to be coterminous with the State.

Are there not also other bright things? The Diocesan Missionary Board manages so wisely and well, and the Parishes pay their pledges so honorably and satisfactorily, that our missionaries are never obliged to wait one hour for their quarterly stipends when due, and this is no little thing to be thankful for. Certainty and promptness of income are of equal value —yes, I do not hesitate to say, of greater real value to the clergymen—than is largeness of income.

Take a look at our relations to the General Missions of the Church. In my first year as Bishop of Missouri, in 1886-87, this Diocese gave for General Missions \$1,208.35. Then the Diocese included the entire State of Missouri. Besides, the Board of Managers from New York City that year gave an appropriation of \$1,800.00 to our Diocese. Now, we have not and have not had for some years a penny of appropriation from the New York Board. Yet, last year we gave \$5,243.71. We were asked to give \$5,500, and we came within about \$250 of giving all we were asked. I call that a good report. I indulge the hope that as a Diocese we shall creep steadily up one more round of the ladder and wipe out anything like such figures as minus 250, and write in their stead, "Full apportionment paid."

I am much interested in the plan for a Missionary Thank Offering to be presented by the men in the General Convention at Richmond in October, 1907. The year 1607 was the beginning of English Christianity on this Continent. So next year will be the commemoration of exactly three hundred years of it. The plan is to get all the men of our Church throughout the United States to think their thanks as American Christians, and to say out their thanks for those three hundred years; and then to act out their thanks, each and every man in a thank-offering, be it great or small, as each may be able and willing, manifesting gratitude for the past and extending cheery help to the great missionary work of the future which our Church has on her hands; our lay delegates to take the gathered gift down to Richmond and to lay it with the other gifts from all over the country on God's altar. It seems to me a splendid plan; well calculated to touch the heart and set on fire the imagination. I earnestly hope and pray that American hearts will be touched. If they are, I have no fear over the pouring out and then the pouring in of the dollars.

The work of men, also, in the Brotherhood of St. Andrew deserves more than a passing notice. In loyalty to their watchwords of "Prayer" and "Service" the members of the Brotherhood are steadily engaged in deepening the sense of Christ's Kingship and spreading the sway of Christ's kingdom among men. Their local assembly of St. Louis has placed us all under obligations by the faithful and altogether successful way in which

they planned and promoted the downtown noonday meetings throughout Lent. The twenty-first Annual Convention of the Brotherhood is to be held at Memphis from the 18th to the 21st of October next. I hope a goodly representation will be present there from Missouri.

If you want to see brightness intensified, look at the children. Last year not a Sunday School in the entire Diocese failed to send its Lenten offering for missions. Not one. And the boys and girls of our Diocese gave, all told, \$1,866.39 of the \$122,000.00 given for missions by the children of the whole country. And this, besides the thousand dollars more or less and generally the more rather than the less—which they keep dropping into Mr. Wyman's hands for the Missionary Host.

The Woman's Auxiliary waxes and never wanes. This year it celebrates its Silver Anniversary, after twenty-five years in happy bonds of marriage to the missionary work. It gives \$1,200.00 per year to the support of St. Stephen's. Its united offering which it is getting ready for Richmond is at this time swelled to an amount beyond what it could count up three years ago. Its gifts for the year are: Cash, \$5,622.99; Boxes, \$979.77; The Junior Auxiliary has given cash, \$276.19; Boxes, 174.72; The Babies Branch, Cash, \$20.42; making a grand total of Auxiliary work for this year of \$7,074.09, against \$5,850.11 of last year.

And it is women who have faithfully directed and distributed the beneficences of the Orphans' Home and the Convalescent Home. In the former sixty or seventy children are constantly cared for under the kindly eye and efficient hand of Deaconess Leonora. In the latter one hundred and one women and forty-three babies and six other children have been mercifully tided over times of weakness and urgent emergency. And it is women—our society young women and our Woman's Auxiliary together who are standing by and pushing on the blessed operations at the Holy Cross Mission, where Miss Skinker and two Deaconesses are hard at work.

Of St. Luke's Hospital we have a right to be proud. Its Board of Directors and its Medical Staff and its Training School for Nurses are all that we could desire. But in these days of a stout and loud demand for completest equipment, hospitals are necessarily expensive institutions. St. Luke's asks our loyalty and love, and she needs good words from us and honest commendations that she may be more widely known and reach thepatronage and receive the income wherewith to meet her large expenses.

In 1903 we elected three representatives to serve in the Board of Trustees of the University of the South. By the Constitution of the University such Diocesan Trustees are to be elected once in three years. I ask, therefore, that in this Convention you will elect one clergyman and two laymen to serve on the said Board of Trustees. My opinion remains unchanged that the University of the South at Sewanee is doing excellent work for the youth of the land, intellectually, morally and religiously; and especially for the eighteen Southern Dioceses which are regularly affiliated with it.

Canon XV, of the General Canons of the Church, says: "At every visitation it shall be the duty of the Minister and of the Church Wardens or Vestrymen, or some other officer, to exhibit to the Bishop the Parish Register." There is laid upon the Bishop, I take it, the corresponding duty of inspecting the Register. May I ask, therefore, that hereafter at the time of the regular yearly visitation of the Bishop, the Parish Register may be brought to the Vestry Room and exhibited for his official inspection.

In a previous clause of the same Canon it is ordered that the Minister "Shall deliver to the Bishop a list of the names of those to be confirmed." If ministers will take pains to render prompt obedience to this Canon the Bishop will not in the future be obliged to write once or twice that he may be furnished with the list of the confirmees.

Dear brethren, the age we live in is a busy and exacting age. Material prosperities pile mountains high. Intellectual wonderings crowd persistently in. Yet man is an all around entity, a three-fold unity of body, mind and soul. It is not fair nor wholesome that two-thirds of him only should be fed and disciplined. The Church exists to care for and emphasize the spiritual. I grant that the *busy-ness* and the *exacting-ness* of the age must be met; and we must sturdily do our best of duty in the thick of it. And I grant that to meet and do such duty is to do no little in fulfiliment of the behests of true religion. But for the honor of the Master and for the true good of human souls we must not let the spiritual drop out of sight or be undervalued.

May I say two or three practical things?

1. Do not seek short cuts or mutilations in the worship part of your religion. Stand loyally and scrupulously true to the Prayer Book. Do not ask for one lesson of Holy Scripture only to be read when two by law are required. Do not clamor for the shortening of prayers or for the leaving out of prayers. I know the Prayer Book was provided in a less work-filled and duty-filled age than is ours. But I do from the heart believe that the loyal and loving use of the Prayer Book as it is brings happiest results. And such loyal and loving use, with a bar and a ban on unlawful abbreviations and substitution will prove the best spiritual nurture and discipline towards the needed all around wholesomeness.

2. Make much of Confirmation. Clergymen have said to me: "I do not urge people to be confirmed. I do not think it wise. I leave it to people to come to me and says they want to be confirmed." Ah! my brother, I must think you are wrong. Some of the best of men who are doing noble work of duty in the thick of the world's fight need to be painstakingly reminded that there is duty to God to be done, too. And they need you as their spiritual guide to come to their side and speak lovingly to them in the interests of their spiritual being and to urge them to be confirmed. You do wrong to stand aloof. Do you not neglect duty, as well as they, when you do not sturdily stand up and speak for and urge

"I do it to 1! my 10 are pains-1 they vingly to be ty, as 1 urge on the spiritual life? What a loyal thing it is, what a satisfying thing it ought to be, to confess Christ in confirmation, to become His enlisted, uniformed, equipped, regular soldier, dutifully obeying orders. And what a peace and joy to be confessed by Him before His Father in Heaven. Again I say to the Clergy—urge people to be confirmed. Persistently, though always lovingly, disturb their consciences, harass their minds, trouble their souls and give no peace until they shall arise and go to their Father and shall humbly bow themselves at the feet of their Savior in Confirmation.

3. Do not let the habits of Family Prayer and a blessing asked at meals fade into distance or sink clean out of sight. I know how busy the age is. And how exacting. You need not tell me. But Family Religion is the very best kind of religion and the truest. Shall it not be sweetened and strengthened and consecrated by Family Prayer? Telephones and trains and letters and office demands may not leave time for more than five verses of Holy Scripture and the Lord's Prayer and one Collect. Very well, confine yourselves, then, to these. They will bring a blessing to home and hearts and lives. I was in a clergyman's home not long ago and most hospitably entertained. But there was no family altar. I was grieved that there was no family prayer. Church prayers and Church services and Church sacraments should not supplant Family Prayer. I can not honestly rate them of as much value to human souls or even to the Church herself as is Family Prayer.

Veteran gladiators of old in termination of their career of glory received the sword of lath and with it honorable rest. We are yet in the arena of combat, in the center of conflict. God help us to wield valiantly the sword of the Spirit in battling for attack and drawing for defense for Christ and His Church. The honorable, restful blade of lath, through His merits and mercy, is not far off.



The Board appointed Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. C. M. Davis and Mr. Charles Freeborn, as a committee to take charge of and manage the Hospital Missions.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. Dr. James R. Winchester, Rev. C. M. Davis, Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. C. F. Blaisdell and Mr. George C. Hitchcock as a committee on Missionary work and Church Extension, which appointment was approved by the Board.

During the year the Board has received a communication from the Southern Convocation expressing the hope that the resolution appended to the report on the State of the Church, presented to and accepted by the last Diocesan Convention, instructing the Missionary Board to provide the funds for the support of an Archdeacon might be speedily brought into effect by Board.

Also a resolution of the Hannibal Convocation that the next Diocesan Convention be requested to secure \$1,200 for the support of two Archieacons or General Missionaries, one for each Convocation.

For the purpose of carrying out, as far as in its power, the resolution mentioned in the first communication, the Board sent a clergyman to each Parish and Mission within the City of St. Louis, and adjacent towns, with the request that he lay before the congregations the needs of an Archdeacon, and ask for subscriptions to pay his salary. The response to this request, as far as it has come to the knowledge of the Board, was, no funds for this purpose, except \$12.50.

Subsequent to this request and response, the Board informally requested the Bishop to send a circular letter to the Parishes and Missions, requesting them to send their delegates to this Convention with instructions to pledge a definite amount, according to their ability or willingness to give, towards securing an Archdeacon.

In view of the communications herein referred to the Board ventures to hope for some substantial results. As the clergy of the Convocations desire the services of an Archdeacon, or two Archdeacons, the Board assumes they will use their best endeavors to help raise the funds with which to pay them.

The Board has received a communication from Rev. Mr. Mizner asking that it will make an appropriation of \$500.00 toward paying the salary of an assistant at St. Stephen's, which has become necessary by reason of the work having grown beyond the possibilities of the present staff of workers. The Board has informed him that it will refer his communication to the new Board to be elected by this Convention.

The Board herewith presents the reports of the Committees on Church Extension and Hospital Missions, as well as the Missionaries under the charge of these committees, and also the report of current receipts and expenditures of St. Stephen's House, and asks that they be printed in the JOURNAL in connection with this report.

The Board will need \$4,395 the coming year, for the support of the Missionary work of the Diocese, in its existing operations, and in its opinion this sum should be increased to \$5,000 to provide for the further extension of the Diocesan Missionary work.

Work at St. Barnabas', St. Timothy's and the Holy Cross Mission has gone steadily on. Service is held once a month at Jennings, and the committee has taken charge of the Epiphany Mission, formerly under St. Mark's Parish, and the Advent Mission, formerly under the Church of the Ascension.

To the Committee on Hospital Missions:

The work of the Hospital Mission has continued without interruption throughout the past year. There have been some advances made in the extension of the work, one of which is carrying it into the City Jail. A weekly visit is made as in the other institutions. Services are now being held regularly each Monday night, with the assistance of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. Since the first of January services have also been held in the Tubercular Ward of the Female Hospital.

The improved conditions of our city institutions during the past year has made the work more effective than heretofore. The Missionary wishes to extend his hearty thanks to the superintendents of the institutions for their kind interest and co-operation, as well as to the employes whose assistance has been of the greatest value. Our acknowledgments are also due to the Convalescent Home for its ever ready help. The Salvation Army has, as ever, lent its assistance, and the Provident Association has aided us without stint. Also we wish to extend our thanks to the Cathedral clergy who have supplied the services without fail at the City Hospital.

Some cases of more than ordinary interest have been disposed of during the past year. One man was sent to Germany. Several others have been sent to their families, and three babies have been committed to the Episcopal Orphans' Home.

There seems to be a general interest in the work of the Hospital Missions, especially among the children of several Sunday Schools. The Ascension infant class made several gifts during the year. As formerly, the Mission has been kindly remembered in gifts of money and clothes by the people of the Church generally. In the name of those helpless and suffering ones, to whom we minister, we thank them, expressing the wish that their continued kindness and generosity may facilitate the work during the ensuing year.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Report of the Committee to Collate and Codify the Constitution and Canons.

In 1903, in accordance with a resolution of the Convention, the Bishop appointed a committee of three, consisting of Rev. William Short. D. D., and Messrs. Francis J. McMaster and Henry H. Denison, to collate and codify the Constitution and Canons.

In 1904, by like resolution, the Special Committee was instructed to defer the publication of the new edition of the Constitution and Canons until after the next (1905) Annual Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Short has since departed this life, and the two remaining members of the committee have performed the duty laid upon them by the resolution. They have codified and collated the Constitution and Canons, and, in accordance with resolution, turned same over to the Secretary of the Convention to have the same published. The resolution passed in 1903 limited the number to be printed to 500 copies, but the Secretary ascertained that an additional 500 copies would cost only about \$30.00, and as the present edition was exhausted, after consultation with the committee, it was decided to have 1,000 copies printed, which has been done, and the result is before this body. The committee respectfully asks that the action of the Secretary be ratified and approved by the Convention. The total cost of printing the 1,000 copies was \$134.00.

APPENDIX No. 19.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

ARTICLE I-NAMÉ.

SECTION. I. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

SECTION I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERS.

SECTION I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS.

SECTION I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

SECTION I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI-FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION I. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII-FUNDS-DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION I. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII-EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE-DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-MEETINGS OF.

SECTION I. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

SECTION I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

Since 1875 the Mission has been given a home by Christ Church Cathedral; a kindness that is fully appreciated.

As the minister is not supported by the church, he is obliged to give two hundred days of his time each year to teaching. In his capacity as the General Missionary in charge of the Western Church Mission to the Deaf, he has visited 15 Dioceses—7 of his own field—and officiated 118 times as follows: Missouri, 61; Kansas City, 18; Nebraska, 12; Iowa, 6; Springfield, 6; Kansas, 3; Central New York, 2; New York, 1; Maryland, 2; Pennsyl-vania, 1; Pittsburg, 1; West Virginia, 1; Chicago, 7; Asheville, 2; Quincy, 1; Baptisms, 9; Confirmations, 4; Marriages, 4. Visited and Addressed the Pupils at the State Schools for the Deaf at Jacksonville, Illinois; Council Bluffs, Iowa; Omaha, Nebraska, and Olathe, Kansas. Attended the Convention of Instructors of the Deaf at Morganton, North Carolina. The Reunion of the Alumni Association of the Illinois School for the Deaf; the Conference of Church Workers Among the Deaf at Elmira, New York; the Empire State Association Convention, and arranged for representation at the State Conventions of the Iowa and Nebraska Associations of the Deaf. Towards the expense of this general work \$85.40 was donated by individuals; \$60.95 by Churches and Missions. and \$55.75 was received as offerings at services; a total of \$202.10. Fully 2,500 deaf mutes were addressed during the year, which is about one-fourth the number in my missionary field.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
