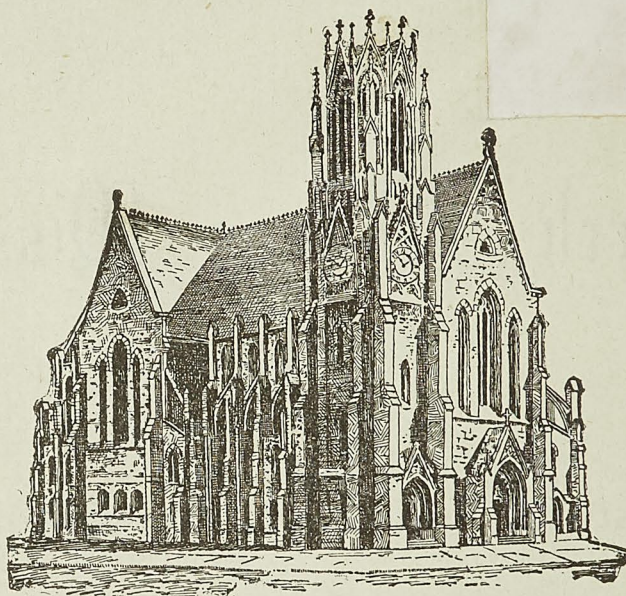

Rules of Order of Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:

- I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
- II. On Assessments.
- III. On Christian Education.
- IV. On Constitution and Canons.
- V. On Finance.
- VI. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
- VII. On Missions.
- VIII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- IX. On State of the Church.
- X. On Sunday-School Work.
- XI. On Unfinished Business.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

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Journal of the Sixty-Ninth Convention

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,
Tuesday, May 19, 1908.

By virtue of the power in him vested by Article III of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, and by reason of the fact that Ascension Day falls this year in Convention week, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese appointed the third Tuesday in May as the day for the meeting of this Diocesan Convention instead of the fourth Tuesday in May, the day named in said Article III.

In accordance with notice thereof, duly given, a number of the Clergy of the Diocese and of the Laity chosen as delegates from their respective Parishes, assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Diocesan Convention, for the purpose of holding the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Rt. Rev., the Bishop, and the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Cathedral singing the five hundred and nineteenth hymn.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. William Elmer, of St. Philip's Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. Charles F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Church, St. Louis.

The Convention Sermon was preached by the Rev. Benjamin E. Reed, of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis and the Rev. Messrs. William Elmer and William Allen Hatch.

The Convention reassembled in Schuyler Memorial House, immediately upon the close of the services, and the Rt. Rev. President called the Convention to order.

The Secretary proceeded, under direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-six Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, appointed at the last Convention, whereupon Rev. Mr. Dooris, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report of the Committee, containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in the Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats in the Convention and Delegates from twenty-seven Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced a quorum of both Orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the election of a Secretary was the first order of business.

Mr. E. H. Lycett nominated Mr. Henry H. Denison to be Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

There being no other nominations, Rev. J. A. Dooris moved that nominations close, and that Rev. Mr. Potter be instructed to cast the ballot for Mr. Denison.

This motion being duly seconded, and carried, the Rev. Mr. Potter thereupon cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Henry H.

Denison, and he was declared duly elected Secretary of the Convention and of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for divine worship at 9 o'clock in Bofinger Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 a. m. to 1 o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 o'clock p. m., and continue to 5 o'clock p. m.

The hour of recess having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that a recess was taken until 2:30 p. m.

After recess on Tuesday, May 19, 1908, the Convention reassembled at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting Clergy and candidates for Holy Orders be invited to seats in the Convention.

On motion of Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the courtesy of seats in the Convention be extended to the Lay Readers of the Diocese.

The following cards were laid on the Secretary's table:

On motion of Rev. Wm. Elmer, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the rules of order of the last Convention be adopted as the rules of order of this Convention.

On motion of Rev. Edmund Duckworth, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Delegates from St. Mark's Memorial Church, St. Louis, have not presented to the Secretary evidence that their Parish has paid in full the assessments standing against it; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such proof of payment of the assessments be dispensed with, and that the Delegates from St. Mark's Memorial Church, St. Louis, be accorded their seats in the Convention.

On motion of Rev. Wm. A. Hatch, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Delegates from St. Andrew's Church, St. Louis, have not presented to the Secretary evidence that their Parish has paid in full the assessments standing against it; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such proof of payment of the assessments be dispensed with, and that the Delegates from St. Andrew's Church, St. Louis, be accorded their seats in the Convention.

Rev. Mr. Duckworth gave notice that on the following day he would offer an amendment to the Canons, as follows:

Resolved, That in the Canons of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, the following amendments be made:

That Section 1 of Canon IX be amended by striking out, in the first line thereof, the word "six," between the words "Convention," and "Clergymen," and inserting in lieu thereof the word "three;" and by striking out the word "nine," in the first line of said section, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "three;" and by striking out the words "and the Deans of Convocation," so that the section shall read, "At each Annual Convention three Clergymen and three Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop of the Diocese, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries, and for Mission purposes in the Diocese."

Mr. Marshall S. Snow, Secretary of the Standing Committee, thereupon presented and read the report of the Standing Committee, as follows:

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri for the Conventional year 1907-8 are herewith respectfully submitted:

June 5, 1907—Organized by the election of the Very Reverend Carroll M. Davis as President, the Reverend Leslie Fenton Potter as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood the Reverend Jesse McVeigh Harrison, Deacon.

June 15, 1907—Granted the petition of St. John's Church, St. Louis, to change the location of the church from Hickory and Dolman Streets and erect a church on the south side of Arsenal Street, facing Tower Grove Park, midway between Grand and Spring Avenues.

Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Diaconate Mr. Clayton Earl Wheat, with such shortening of time as to allow his ordination to take place at the pleasure of the Bishop, between June 22 and 26, 1907.

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1907-1908:

October 31, 1907—Admitted Mr. Edward Douglas Johnston as a candidate for Holy Orders.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Reverend William Alexander Guerry as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of South Carolina.

December 23, 1907—Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood the Reverend George Arthur Symington, Deacon.

March 19, 1908—Gave consent to the consecration of the Reverend Frederick Focke Reese, D. D., as Bishop of Georgia.

April 11, 1908—Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood the Reverend Charles John Millar, Deacon.

Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood, the Reverend Clayton Earl Wheat, Deacon, with such shortening of time as to allow his ordination to take place at the convenience of the Bishop.

Recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Diaconate Mr. Edward Douglas Johnston, with such shortening of time as to allow his ordination to take place at the convenience of the Bishop.

April 27, 1908—Denied the request of Mr. F. A. Fanning that he be granted a dispensation from the Latin and Greek languages and other branches of learning not strictly ecclesiastical.

Granted the request of the Reverend Ross P. Cuddy, Deacon, that he be granted a dispensation from the study of Latin, but denied his petition for a dispensation from the study of Greek.

May 26, 1908—Approved the report of the official acts of the Standing Committee for the Conventional Year 1907-1908 prepared by the Secretary for submission to the next Diocesan Convention.

Authorized the President to certify to the proceedings of this meeting.

Mr. Marshall S. Snow, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund, presented and read the report of the Board of Trustees, as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund submit the following report of the official acts of the Board during the Conventional Year 1907-1908:

December 23, 1907—Organized by the election of the Very Reverend Carroll M. Davis as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

Gave consent to the sale by the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of certain property in Ferguson, Mo., on the west line of Clay Avenue, and authorized the officers of the Board to execute a proper deed.

April 11, 1908—A request, signed by the communicants of the Church members of Emmanuel Church, Shelbina, Mo., being all of the communicants of said Church, except one not now a resident of Shelbina, that Lot 6 in Block 32, in Shelbina, the title of which is held by the Parochial Trust of the Diocese of Missouri, be sold for the sum of \$550, and the money loaned for said Church, was laid before the Board. It was *voted*—that the deed be given as requested and that the parties interested be informed that such action has been taken, and that after the deed has been transferred, and the purchase money received by this Board, further action will be taken concerning the disposition of the proceeds of the sale in compliance with the wishes of the petitioners.

Denied the request of the Venerable, the Archdeacon of the Diocese, the Reverend W. M. Walton, that Lot No. 2 in Block No. 9 of the town of Eureka, Mo., be leased for the term of three years, and that the church building on said lot be sold for the sum of \$250.

April 20, 1908—Voted to rescind the action taken April 11th, concerning the church property in Eureka, and to postpone further consideration to a meeting to be held later.

May 4, 1908—Declined to grant the permission to lease the church lot in Eureka and to sell the church building thereon, requested by the Archdeacon of the Diocese.

There being no objection, the report was ordered filed and spread on the Minutes.

Mr. Charles S. Freeborn, Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, thereupon presented and read the Treasurer's Report.

On motion, this report was referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 1, page 101.)

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, then read his annual address, which, with the record of his Episcopal acts was laid on the Secretary's table.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop thereupon presented, as a matter of record in connection with the business of the Convention, a communication from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, concerning certain constitutional amendments that were adopted at the last General Convention in Richmond, Va. (See Appendix No. 14, page 130.)

On motion of Rev. G. D. B. Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the portion of the Bishop's Address relating to the University of the South be referred to a committee of three persons, who have been interested or connected in some way with the University, said committee to report to this Convention.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that he would appoint the several Standing Committees after the adjournment of this session of the Convention, and would announce them tomorrow morning.

The report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was presented and read by Rev. Henry W. Mizner. (See Appendix No. 12, page 126.)

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that he had appointed the following as the Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address relating to the University of the South:

Rev. D. Claiborne Garrett, Rev. Clayton E. Wheat, Mr. Edward C. Dameron.

On motion of Rev. G. D. B. Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to take suitable action on that part of the Bishop's Address referring to the death of the late Rev. George Henry Hunt.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop announced the appointment of the following as members of said Committee:

Rev. George D. B. Miller, Rev. William A. Hatch, Mr. Marshall S. Snow.

The Secretary thereupon read the following communication from the Secretary of the General Convention in regard to obtaining copies of the Journal of the last General Convention, in Richmond, Va.:

The Convention then adjourned, on motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, to meet at 10 o'clock on Wednesday, May 20th, after morning prayer at 9 o'clock in Bofinger Chapel.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Wednesday, May 20, 1908.

Pursuant to adjournment the Convention was opened at 9 o'clock a. m., with divine service in Bofinger Chapel, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order for business in Schuyler Memorial House at 10 o'clock a. m.

The roll was called by the Secretary.

The minutes of the first day's session were read by the Secretary, and on motion, were approved and adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced the appointment of the following Standing Committees:

The Rt. Rev. President then called for a supplementary report of the Committee on New Parishes and Lay Credentials, which was afterwards made and duly entered.

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented and read the report of the Treasurer, which, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 2, page 102.)

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, presented and read the report of the Treasurer, which was also referred, on motion, to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 3, page 105.)

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Theological Educational Fund, presented and read the report of the Treasurer, and this report, on motion, was also referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 4, page 109.)

The Rt. Rev. President announced the next order of business to be the election of the Standing Committee, consisting of three Clergymen and three Laymen, and nominations were declared to be in order.

The following Clergymen were nominated: Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Rev. D. Claiborne Garrett, Rev. Leslie F. Potter, Rev. Edmund Duckworth, Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Rev. Wm. Elmer.

The following Laymen were nominated: Messrs. Marshall S. Snow, Curtis M. Jennings, James L. Ford, Henry H. Denison and Thomas K. Skinker.

Mr. Henry H. Denison asked permission to withdraw his name, which was granted.

On motion, the nominations were closed.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon appointed the following tellers:

Rev. H. B. Smith and Mr. F. E. Murray, tellers for the Clergy.

Rev. E. D. Johnston and Mr. James Fetherstonh, tellers for the Laity.

A ballot was then taken for the election of the Standing Committee, and the tellers retired.

The report of the Registrar being called for, Rev. G. D. B. Miller, Registrar, presented and read his report, as follows:

The Registrar begs leave to report that he has fulfilled the requirements as defined by Canon, with the exception of preparing and causing to be printed forms for certificates of baptism, confirmation, marriage and letters commendatory for use in the Diocese.

The Bishop announced reports of Committees to be the next order of business.

Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis gave notice of a proposed amendment to Canon IX, as follows:

Amend Canon 9, Section 5, by adding the following words: "And it shall be the duty of the Board of Missions at its first meeting after the Annual Convention to appoint a Finance Committee to carry out the provisions of this section."

There being no objection, it was ordered that the proposed amendment be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Special Committee appointed at the last Convention to consider the subject of the Merger of the Disabled and Infirm Clergy Fund into the General Clergy Relief Fund.

Rev. J. Courtney Jones stated that he had a matter which he wished to have referred to this Committee, and asked that the report be deferred until after such reference.

The Rt. Rev. President ruled that the report of the Committee was in order, and Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy thereupon presented a majority report, signed by himself and Mr. F. J. McMaster, with the statement that Rev. B. E. Reed, the other member of the Committee, did not concur in the report as submitted, but that he would present a minority report.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon ordered that the report be not submitted to the Convention until further action should be taken when Rev. Mr. Reed could be present.

Rev. J. Courtney Jones thereupon read a communication relating to the same subject, from Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D. D., and moved that the matter be referred to the Special Committee in regard to the Merger of the Disabled and Infirm Clergy Fund into the General Clergy Relief Fund.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy thereupon moved, as a substitute for the motion of Rev. Mr. Jones, that a Special Committee be appointed to consider that matter, and that Rev. Mr. Jones should be the Chairman of that Committee; said Committee to report to this Convention.

The substitute was accepted by Rev. Mr. Jones, duly seconded and carried, and the Rt. Rev. President appointed the following Committee:

Mr. Felix Coste.

Rev. Mr. Davis asked leave to withdraw as a member of this Committee, which was granted, and Rev. Edmund Duckworth was appointed in his place; making the Committee consist of Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Rev. Edmund Duckworth and Mr. Felix Coste.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons on the resolution presented at the last Annual Convention, in regard to Canon X, as found on page 46 of the printed Journal of the last Annual Convention.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy announced that the Committee was not yet prepared to report.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons on the proposed amendment to Canon X, as found on page 51 of the printed Journal of the last Annual Convention.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy announced that the Committee was not yet prepared to report, but stated that the Committee on Constitution and Canons would meet during recess, and report on both resolutions as soon thereafter as possible.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that next in order was the report of the Special Committee on Sunday School Conditions and

Methods (page 48 of Journal of last Annual Convention). The Chairman, Rev. Mr. Mizner, announced not ready.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the term of office of the Chancellor of the Diocese expired at the present Convention, and that the Constitution provides that on the nomination of the Bishop the Convention must elect a Chancellor, to serve three years. The Bishop thereupon nominated Mr. Francis J. McMaster for Chancellor of the Diocese.

On motion of Rev. Wm. Elmer, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. McMaster for Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Secretary thereupon so cast the ballot of the Convention, and the Rt. Rev. President declared that Mr. Francis J. McMaster was duly elected Chancellor of the Diocese for the ensuing three years.

Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Chairman of the Committee on Apportionment for General Missions, then made a verbal report, in which he stated that up to the 15th of May there had been paid in the sum of \$2,982.60 on the apportionment of \$5,800.00.

Thereupon Mr. Ford stated that he had not been present during the nominations, or he would have withdrawn his name, and asked that his election be considered void, and another be chosen in his place as member of the Committee.

The Rt. Rev. President declared that the action of the Convention in the election of Mr. Ford would have to stand, and that if Mr. Ford insisted on withdrawing, his action would have to take the form of a resignation from the Committee.

There having been only two Clergymen elected, another ballot was ordered taken for the third Clerical member of the Standing Committee.

Thereupon a second ballot was taken, and the tellers retired.

The hour of twelve having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that the usual noonday services would be held. These were opened by the singing of the 261st hymn, and the service was conducted by Rev. A. A. V. Binnington.

The tellers appointed to take the ballot for the election of the third Clerical member of the Standing Committee having returned and made their report, the result was declared as follows:

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that the Rev. J. Courtney Jones had received a concurrent majority of the Clerical and Lay vote, and was elected the third Clerical member of the Standing Committee, and that the Standing Committee, elected for the ensuing year, is constituted as follows:

Thereupon the tellers were discharged.

Rev. Edmund Duckworth thereupon asked the unanimous consent of the Convention to put upon its passage the resolution to amend Canon IX, of which notice was given yesterday, as follows:

Resolved, That Section 1 of Canon IX be amended by striking out in the first line thereof the word "six," between the words "Convention" and "Clergymen," and inserting in lieu thereof the word "three;" and by striking out the word "nine," in the first line of said section, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "three;" and by striking out the words "and the Deans of Convocations," so that the section shall read: "At each Annual Convention three Clergymen and three Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop of the Diocese, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries and for Mission purposes in the Diocese."

There being no objection, the question was declared before the house, and was discussed by different members of the Convention.

Rev. L. B. Richards moved the following substitute for the resolution to amend offered by Rev. Mr. Duckworth:

That instead of making it to read three Clergymen and three Laymen, Section 1 of Canon IX shall read three Clergymen and five Laymen, and including the Deans of Convocations, making the section read as follows:

"SECTION 1. At each Annual Convention three Clergymen and five Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop and the Deans of Convocation of the Diocese, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of Missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries and for Mission purposes in the Diocese."

The substitute was duly seconded, and after discussion, was accepted by Rev. Mr. Duckworth, and unanimously adopted.

The hour of recess having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that a recess was taken until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

After recess, the Convention reassembled at 2:30 o'clock, and the following proceedings were had:

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the entire afternoon of the second day of the Convention is devoted to Missions; but that in this connection the reports of the financial condition of the Diocese would be in order.

The report of the Committee on Finance was presented and read by Mr. C. S. Freeborn.

In connection with this report, two resolutions were offered, as follows:

1. *Resolved*, That the delinquent assessment standing against St. Andrew's, St. Louis, for the past three years, amounting to \$121.94, be remitted, and the Treasurer of the Diocese be directed to strike it off his books.

On motion duly made and seconded, the resolution was adopted, and the Treasurer so instructed.

2. *Resolved*, That the Committee on Assessments be directed to make an equitable assessment on the several Parishes and Missions for \$6,000.

This resolution was also adopted, and the Committee on Assessments so directed. (See Appendix No. 5, page 110.)

Mr. Edward H. Lycett, the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board, presented and read the report of the Treasurer. (See Appendix No. 9, page 120.)

Mr. Edward H. Lycett, the Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, presented and read the report of the Treasurer. (See Appendix No. 10, page 124.)

Mr. Edward H. Lycett, the Treasurer of St. Stephen's Mission, presented and read the report of the Treasurer. (See Appendix No. 11, page 125.)

Mr. Francis J. McMaster, the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Board, presented and read the report of the Secretary. (See Appendix No. 6, page 113.)

Mr. Francis J. McMaster presented and read the report of Holy Cross Mission, signed by Deaconess Anne. (See Appendix No. 18, page 136.)

Rev. Geo. Lloyd announced that the delinquency reported against the Church of the Good Shepherd would be paid before the end of the month, and Mr. E. H. Lycett announced that he had already received on account of this delinquency the sum of \$9.00.

Rev. William Cochran, the City Missionary, presented and read his report of the five City Missions under his charge. (See Appendix No. 19, page 137.)

Mr. Francis J. McMaster presented the Balance Sheet of St. Stephen's Mission and St. Stephens-in-the-Hills, which was read by Rev. Clayton E. Wheat. (See Appendix No. 8, page 118.)

Rev. Arthur Brittain presented and read the report of Hospital Missions. (See Appendix No. 7, page 115.)

Rev. Leslie F. Potter, the Dean of the Southern Convocation, presented and read his report, as follows:

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri:

One new Mission has been organized during the past year, namely, St. Luke's, Dixon, and there is now in the hands of the Missionary Board a petition asking for the organization of another Mission in Fulton. The church at Sullivan has been completed since the meeting of the last Convention. The indebtedness at Jackson has been liquidated, and the debt on the church at Poplar Bluff has been reduced to \$650; while the Missions at Valley Park and Portland have been revived and several further points have been more fully occupied by the Archdeacon and his assistants.

The Missions of St. Charles and Cape Girardeau are without Pastors and the Rectories at those points have been rented; the one at Cape Girardeau having been leased for a period of three years. This action has been taken several times in other Missions and to the writer's mind is an unfortunate and deadly policy to pursue, and where the Rectory is free from debt is, it seems to me, a misappropriation of an endowment. It is an evil I hope the Missionary Board will correct speedily.

Archdeacon W. M. Walton presented and read his Annual Report. (See page 98.)

Mr. A. B. Ambler presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, In former years much good was accomplished for Missions by setting aside one Sunday in the year when the cause of Missions was presented by a Clergyman and a Layman; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Convention that we recommend to the Missionary Board that they set aside one Sunday during the ensuing year when one Clergyman and one Layman shall present the cause of Missions in each Church and Mission in the Diocese, as far as possible.

On motion of Mr. P. W. Fauntleroy, the foregoing resolution was amended by adding thereto the words, "with the consent of the Rector of the Parish."

The resolution, as amended, was thereupon submitted to the Convention, and was, by the Rt. Rev. President, declared to be duly adopted.

Rev. William Elmer presented and read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, as follows:

Your Committee on the State of the Church presents the following report:

1. Your Committee would state that there is in the Diocese a feeling of great hopefulness, and that the outlook for enlarged work is greater than for many years. The advent of an Archdeacon has put new life into the Missions and Parishes outside of the See city. This is evidenced by the following facts submitted by the Archdeacon: At Moberly, where the Church had been torn and distracted for a long time, \$400 has been raised as a stipend for the Minister and that Church put in charge of the Rector of Mexico. At Mexico the amount raised for the Rector was increased from \$400 to \$650, and at these two points the work is now in a prosperous con-

dition. At Hannibal the Parish subscription of \$1,300 has been raised to \$2,500, and a Rector called, who will soon be at his work. At Salem a new Mission has been organized, and a lot worth \$750 has been secured and practically paid for. At Bonne Terre a lot has been secured through a gift, worth \$1,200. Work has been started at Fulton. At Valley Park a lot and building worth \$1,800 has been secured. Thirty-one places have been visited and a general interest has been aroused. These facts, coupled with what the Bishop said in his Address, justifies the hopes of those who believed in the necessity of an Archdeacon. The result of his work this past year shows a financial gain of over \$7,000, and a revival of Church life in those places visited by him. Salem, Bonne Terre, Fulton and Dixon are all new points for Church work, and give promise of development.

2. Your Committee feels that the work in the educational centers of the State call for special mention in these centers where thousands of young men and women are gathered year after year, who, after finishing their university or school courses, go back to their homes in all parts of the State, thus affording splendid opportunities for the diffusion of Church principles. During the past year successful meetings for men have been held at Columbia, with a varying attendance of from 40 to 150. The attention of the Church is particularly called to this work. At Columbia about one hundred non-resident students are attached to the Church, and are ministered to in spiritual things by the Rev. Mr. Horton, Rector of Columbia.

About a year ago President Jesse, of the State University, spoke to a member of this Committee in most cordial terms of the attitude of the Episcopal Church toward the work of the University, and was most appreciative of the character and work of Mr. Horton.

At Rolla, Rev. Mr. Weddell ministers to a number of students at the School of Mines, and the outlook for increase in such work is promising.

3. In St. Louis the City Missionary still continues his faithful service, and the five stations now under his charge all report a healthy growth. St. Stephen's Mission has grown to the capacity of its buildings and equipment, and the growth of the work is stopped until larger buildings are provided. Holy Cross is in need of a Priest to carry on its work effectively. St. John's will soon be in its new church.

The Hospital Missionary is still pursuing his beneficent work among the sick and the unfortunate. This is not a work that can be put into statistics. The influence of his tender services and kind sympathy can not but do good to those who receive his sacred ministration.

So far as your Committee can see, there is every prospect of growth, if only the members of the Church will realize their duty to God by sup-

porting, by prayer and money, the efforts of the Bishop, the Archdeacon and the Missionary Board.

Thereupon the Rt. Rev. President called for pledges from the various Parishes and Missions, which were responded to, upon the calling of the roll by the Secretary.

Mr. Cornelius H. Fauntleroy then announced that he was authorized by Mr. Edward G. Lewis to say that he would make up any deficit to the amount of \$1,000.00 to apply on the salary of the Archdeacon. (See Appendix No. 13, page 129.)

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that the next order of business was the election of a Missionary Board, and declared that nominations for three Clergymen and five Laymen to serve upon the Missionary Board were in order.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Duckworth, the election of the Missionary Board was deferred until tomorrow morning, and was declared to be the order of business of the third day at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Duckworth, the Convention then adjourned to meet on Thursday morning, May 21st, at 10 o'clock a. m., after morning prayer at 9 o'clock in Bofinger Chapel.

THIRD DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Thursday, May 21, 1908.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Convention was opened at 9 o'clock a. m., with morning prayer, in Bofinger Chapel, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order for business in Schuyler Memorial House, at 10 o'clock a. m.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the calling of the roll was dispensed with.

The minutes of the preceding day were read by the Secretary, and on motion were approved and adopted.

Rev. B. E. Reed presented the Minority Report of the Committee on the Merging of the Disabled and Infirm Clergy Fund into the General Clergy Relief Fund, as follows:

The minority dissents from the report of the Committee, and offers as a substitute the following:

Resolved, First, That it is the sense of this Convention that the Fund for the Disabled and Infirm Clergy of the Diocese be transferred and merged into the General Clergy Relief Fund; *provided*, that any bequests made to the Disabled and Infirm Clergy Fund of the Diocese be not diverted from said fund.

Second, That the transfer be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons for such changes as may be necessary in making said transfer harmonize with the Constitution and Canons; said Committee to report at next Convention.

The hour of 10:30 having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President declared that the election of a Missionary Board was the order of business, and that action on the resolution introduced by Rev. Mr. Reed would have to be deferred until after such election.

Upon motion of Rev. Mr. Duckworth, duly seconded, the rules were suspended and the matter of the election of the Missionary Board was deferred, in order that the resolution might be acted upon.

The resolution was thereupon read to the Convention by the Rt. Rev. President, who announced that the question before the Convention was whether or not the resolution of the minority should be substituted for the report of the Committee on the Merging of the Disabled and Infirm Clergy Fund into the General Clergy Relief Fund.

Thereupon a discussion followed, after which it was moved by Rev. Mr. Garrett, and duly seconded, that the resolution offered by the minority be substituted for the report of the Committee.

The question was submitted, and carried.

The Rt. Rev. President then declared that the question before the Convention was upon the adoption of the resolution of the minority.

The question being submitted, a division was called for, and the roll being called, the Secretary announced the result to be sixty-seven affirmative and thirteen negative votes.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared that the resolution of the minority was duly adopted by the Convention.

The Secretary then called the roll of pledges made yesterday, and additional pledges were then made. (See Appendix No. 13, page 129.)

Mr. Cornelius H. Fauntleroy handed to the Rt. Rev. President a cashier's check for \$1,000.00, and stated that it was the joint contribution of Mr. and Mrs. Edward G. Lewis, who, knowing Archdeacon W. M. Walton, and appreciating his character and worth as a man and a Clergyman, and recognizing the value and importance of his work in the Diocese, desired this sum to be applied towards the salary of the Archdeacon. (See Appendix No. 13, page 129.)

On suggestion of the Rt. Rev. President, it was moved and carried that the additional pledges made today be incorporated into yesterday's proceedings, as *nunc pro tunc*.

St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, announced that it desired to undertake the complete care and expense of Holy Cross Mission, on condition that it should be conducted as a Mission of St. Peter's Church.

The Bishop stated that that was a matter which should be taken up by the Vestry of St. Peter's Church with the Missionary Board direct, but expressed his appreciation of the offer.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced the order of the day to be the election of the Missionary Board, nominations for which were made yesterday.

The following were also nominated:

The hour of twelve having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that the usual noonday services would be held. These were opened by the singing of the 252d hymn, the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Blaisdell.

Mr. E. J. Thomas presented and read the report of the Committee on Assessments. (See Appendix No. 15, page 132.)

On motion of Mr. A. B. Ambler, the report, as read, was adopted by the Convention.

Mr. A. B. Ambler presented and read the report of the Standing Committee on Sunday School Work. (See Appendix No. 17, page 135.)

On motion, duly made and seconded, the request of the Committee for the continuance of the work of the Sunday School Commission was unanimously approved.

It was thereupon ordered by the Rt. Rev. President that the report of the Committee be filed with the Secretary, and the Commission continued, to report at the next Convention.

Rev. Mr. Garrett introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention recommend that at the next Annual Convention, in place of the customary night Missionary service, a noonday rally for Missions be held on the second day of the Convention, from 12:00 to 12:45 p. m., with two addresses of fifteen minutes each on Missionary topics, stated in such a way as to appeal to the men of the Church.

Rev. Mr. Duckworth offered the following resolution as a substitute:

Resolved, That the matter of Missionary meeting be referred to a special committee of three, to make arrangements for next year.

The question was submitted as to whether or not the resolution offered by Rev. Mr. Duckworth should be substituted for Rev. Mr. Garrett's resolution, and a division being called for, the Secretary announced the result to be 52 Yeas and 22 Nays.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that the resolution offered by Rev. Mr. Duckworth, having been duly substituted, was before the Convention.

Upon motion, duly made and seconded, the resolution was adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon appointed the following as the Committee:

We therefore suggest the following resolutions:

1. That this Convention recommends and urges upon the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese that they make earnest effort in sending young men to this University, both for academic and theological training.

The raising of this amount means the removing of a great reproach from our Church, for surely those who for years have devoted their energies to the service of God in the sacred ministry of His Church deserve the sympathy and support of the Church in the time of their old age and infirmity.

We ought to remember that their infirmities have in many cases been caused or intensified by hard work, and by the privations to which they cheerfully submitted in days of health and vigor.

The United States Government expends hundreds of millions of dollars in pensioning its soldiers and their widows and orphans, and a movement has been started in England for pensioning all superannuated men who need assistance.

How fitting then that this great Church should make liberal provision for those who grow old in doing her work.

Resolved, therefore, that this Convention heartily indorses the work of the General Committee who are trying to raise \$5,000,000 for the relief and support of our old and disabled Clergy, and appeals to all our people for their hearty co-operation and for their liberal contributions to this fund.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared that Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Mr. James L. Ford, Mr. William Bagnell, Mr. Walker Hill and Mr. James A. Waterworth were elected as members of the Committee on Apportionment for General Missions.

Rev. Mr. Kemerer presented the report of the Committee on Missionaries' Traveling Expenses:

On motion of Rev. J. C. Jones, duly seconded, the report was adopted. (See Appendix No. 16, page 134.)

There being no further business before the Convention, a motion to adjourn was made by Rev. Mr. Duckworth, duly seconded and carried.

After a few words of appreciation and gratitude to the members of the Convention by the Rt. Rev. President, the Benediction was pronounced and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

ANNUAL ADDRESS
OF THE
BISHOP OF MISSOURI
TO THE
SIXTY-NINTH CONVENTION.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

God spares our lives. The duty of greeting you in the assembling of another Annual Convention is a great pleasure. While not allowing sentiment to overwhelm, we well know that by and by there shall come to us the last one of these annual greetings. God mercifully have us in His holy keeping and help us to stand steady and to keep true and to work hard until the last. Our coming together always seems to me a precious family gathering. Figures and facts and balances and accountings are quite necessary indeed. But their natural dullness and dryness change to life and refreshment under the warm impulse of brotherly hearts and associated interests. Am I wrong in thinking that it is greatly worth while for both clergy and laity to make it a duty and a pleasure and an unfailling habit to get together here for the three days of the Convention, not only for the information to the mind but also for the good to the heart to be gotten here? Our short life is not so full of brotherly things and pleasantly associated things that we can well afford to miss the grasp and appropriation of such as present themselves to our acceptance.

Our House of Bishops consists now of 102 members. Four have passed out from it to their rest during the last year.

Bishop Worthington was the second Bishop of Nebraska and served in his office for nearly twenty-three years. In his earlier manhood he was the much loved and successful Rector of St. John's, Detroit. His later years he was obliged to pass, for reasons of health, in the lower altitude of the Atlantic seaboard, giving over the active care of Nebraska to a Coadjutor. He had just accepted his appointment to be the Bishop in charge of the American Churches on the continent of Europe, when he died suddenly at Mentone in France.

Bishop Coleman of Delaware died quite suddenly also after a faithful service in the Episcopate of nearly twenty years. He was assiduous and efficient in discharging duty in the House of Bishops; and his leadership in matters of Temperance and Church Unity was highly valued. He was

known as ever kind and unselfish in extending help to his brother Bishops in times of emergency or need.

In the death of Bishop Satterlee of Washington the entire American Church has sustained a severe loss. Exercising his office at the nation's capital for nearly twelve years, his holiness of life, his devotion to duty, his grasp of statesmanship, his practical sense and his executive ability combined to make him a great leader. In touch with interests national and international he was a guide and director of inestimable value of the work of our Church in Mexico and in the Canal Zone. His death is indeed widely and deeply deplored.

While I am writing this address the announcement comes of the death of Bishop Capers of South Carolina. A soldier and leader in the Confederate Army and a soldier and leader in the Church Militant he was always and everywhere faithful. And he was one of the most lovable men in the House of Bishops. Bravely he bore himself in active duty wheresoever it led. Patiently he bore the inaction which disease forced upon him for the last two years. God's peace is his. Five of our Bishops were born in 1837—Hale, Dudley, Coleman, Capers and myself. I alone am left.

One of the Clergy of our own Diocese has passed to his rest, Rev. George H. Hunt, in his eightieth year. When I came to Missouri Mr. Hunt was Rector at St. Charles, and subsequently he had charge of St. James', St. Louis. Loyalty and fidelity to his work of priesthood characterized his active life; and a submissive patience waited upon the later years in which he was physically disabled for the discharge of the duties of his office.

Among the men and women of the Diocese Death has relentlessly shot his arrows. Some of them whom we greatly mourn are Mr. Fyfer, the pioneer Churchman, I think, of Columbia; Mr. Diggs of Moberly, Mr. Green of Monroe, Mr. T. Ewing White and Mr. Byron Nugent of St. Louis; and Mrs. Duckworth, Mrs. McMaster, Mrs. Shepley, Miss Ella Fetherstonk, Miss Catherine Tracy, and Mrs. Myers of Ironton. They rest from their labors. God grant us grace to go on with our labors till He give the rest that remaineth.

Looking around over the Diocese there are three things which seem disquieting.

1. The number of vacant pastorships. It appears to me that there were never so many as now: Macon, St. Charles, Cape Girardeau, Crystal City, Cuba, Kirksville, LaPlata, Portland, Shelbyna, Sullivan and Valley Park. Eleven in all. Even if we count out LaPlata, Portland, Shelbyna and Valley Park as places that perhaps we have not expected to fill just yet with resident Pastors, there remain seven towns where we have been accustomed to have regular Pastors, and where we ought to have such at work now. But the matter is not quite as bad as it looks. For Macon

and St. Charles are already, I think, on the lookout for suitable Clergymen to call. Cape Girardeau and Crystal City and Kirksville are also getting ready to move along that line. And Cuba and Sullivan are looked after by the Archdeacon.

2. The diminishing number of confirmations. They are only 585 this year compared with 686 last year. I am aware that in such a matter as confirmation, involving the free choice of human wills, one may not reasonably count on the exactness of uniformity and regularity. And I dare say the vacant pastorships may account somewhat for the diminution observed. But if the traditional statement of the proper 10 per cent of confirmees to communicants have a reasonable foundation, the Diocese of Missouri with its 7,925 communicants ought to have 792 confirmations this year. True, it is to be honestly maintained that confirmation should be the free choice of each human will coming to receive it. But are we Pastors earnest and faithful in searching out and urging all human wills, to which access is granted, to exercise this free choice in presenting themselves to receive the inestimable gifts of grace promised in that holy ordinance?

3. The record of the Diocese for the year ending September 1, 1907, in the matter of giving for General Missions was a disappointing one. We were asked for \$5800. A reasonable request, I think. We gave \$4127. So we fell short \$1673. I was very sorry. Ten of our Parishes have a blank opposite their names in the list, having given nothing. I can not understand how earnest Churchmen and Churchwomen can allow themselves to go a whole year through without taking pains each one to give his or her individual gift for the great outside work of General Missions. Nor can I understand how a Clergyman can think he is true to duty who neglects obedience to the plain requirement of Canon LII, that at least one offering every year in every Church must be taken for General Missions. It is a peculiar, personal grief to me to be obliged to recognize the Diocese as delinquent for two reasons. 1. I am an old Missionary Bishop and warmly and lovingly recall all that was generously done for me when I wandered over the Rocky Mountains, and my heart is grieved that my Diocese will not thoughtfully remember other workers and wanderers who have taken my place. 2. I am, under God's providence, now the President of the great Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church, and it is a real mortification to me that the President's own Diocese must be marked down on the delinquent list.

In Diocesan Missions I think our record has been good. The sum of \$9112.50 was pledged last year, and an honorable rule seems to obtain in the Diocese that pledges may be rated the same as cash. An Archdeacon was secured, and most assiduously and untiringly he has prosecuted his work. Vacant Parishes have been carefully looked after by him. Work in Portland and Sherman and Valley Park has been revived. New places

like Fulton and Salem and Bonne Terre are being opened up; and the hands of the Bishop have been upheld and strengthened efficiently in efforts to plant the Church and push the Church throughout the Diocese. But I am constrained to say that pledges to the amount of \$9520 will be needed to keep present work in a wholesome condition; and if some places, vacant at present, are to be reoccupied and the work pushed on, \$1525 more will be needed, making \$11,045 in all.

Returning to thoughts about General Missions the figures are not wholly bad.

The children of the Sunday-schools, bless the hearts of them all, gave nearly \$2000, and the Woman's Auxiliary over \$600. So in round numbers we sent out \$6750 for General Missions. Besides, the Woman's Auxiliary has given \$6600 for all sorts and kinds of Missions; and people have given, women generally, \$1500 for the Convalescent Home; and the Young Women's Club has given \$600 for the Holy Cross Mission, and the Brotherhood of St. Andrew has given \$600 for Hospital Missions, and the Sunday-school children have given \$1000 for the Missionary Host, and the men gave \$2647 for the Missionary Thank Offering. And these, too, besides gifts to St. Stephen's Mission and to the Orphans' Home and to St. Luke's Hospital, all of them splendid missionary works, and besides special gifts and helps extended here and there and everywhere by our faithful and generous people. For Missions in figures that we know of definitely we count up \$24,659 given this year. No, no! the record is not bad.

If we must honestly take some sorrow and shame for the failure to meet our apportionment for General Missions, yet no less honestly, I believe, and you, if you could go around with me and inspect, would believe with me too, that most wholesome and successful work in the city of St. Louis is going on along the four lines where we have set out to be active and aggressive for the Master's cause, viz., St. Stephen's Mission, Holy Cross Mission, Hospital Missions, and the five Mission Centers served by the City Missionary. God be thanked for it all. I warmly and lovingly thank the earnest and faithful men and women who are doing the precious work.

One Mission station has been abandoned this year and is removed from the list, St. Mary's, Shrewsbury. But another has been organized and added to the list, St. Luke's, Dixon. The missionary zeal and the wise guidance of the Rev. Mr. Weddell of Rolla have resulted in establishing this promising Mission in a town in South Missouri.

The admirable improvements in Emmanuel, Old Orchard, have been completed and are paid for, and I am sure the congratulations of us all go forth to the Rector and congregation. St. John's, St. Louis, has succeeded in selling to advantage its church on Hickory street, and is engaged in erecting a handsome new building fronting Tower Grove Park, although its

faithful Rector, on account of Mrs. Sherman's illness, has been obliged to be absent for a considerable time.

Our church lot at Shelbina, held since the days when Bishop Talbot was Rector at Macon, has been sold by the advice of our faithful Warden there, and the proceeds are to be invested for the use and benefit of a future Shelbina Church. The Sisters of the Good Shepherd have exchanged their property on Compton avenue on the south side and are to be housed in most suitable quarters for their excellent school on Washington avenue near Forty-second street.

I would not willingly leave unspoken a word in behalf of the University of the South. We have five young men of Missouri there now who are looking forward to Holy Orders. I shall be glad and grateful if the good people of our Diocese will be interested in the University and will give it help.

In London this year two remarkable gatherings are to assemble. The time has come for the Decennial Conference of Bishops at Lambeth. I think quite likely not less than two hundred will be there. In the great Ecumenical Council of A. D. 381, the Second of Constantinople, which placed the Nicene Creed in the form in which it now exists, only 150 Bishops were present.

Just before the Lambeth Conference the Pan-Anglican Congress is to meet in June in London. This is a world-wide representative gathering of the Anglican Communion in the interest of Missions. Five or six Delegates of our own Clergy and Laity from Missouri hope and mean to be there. At the close of the Congress, on June 24th, there is to be a great thanksgiving service in St. Paul's Cathedral, London. Thank offerings for Missions are to be given from the hundreds of Dioceses and Missionary jurisdictions all over the world. I do not mean to be empty handed there. I have asked that I might have \$500 at least to hand in. Already \$338 have been sent in to me towards the amount asked. It will make me glad and proud to be your representative in giving something for Missions among the givers there from all the world.

The General Convention of last October was a remarkable one. Remarkable for its Missionary earnestness and for its absolute freedom from anything like sectionalism. This freedom was wonderful, considering that the place of meeting was Richmond, at one time the seat of government of the Southern Confederacy and the city wherein a preceding General Convention of 1859 had been quite broken up during the last days of its session by the attack upon Harper's Ferry by John Brown. But sectional feeling last October never once lifted its head, even in the earnest and fervid debates upon what was known as the negro question; nor, we may well believe, could it really have had any living head to lift in the strong flow of kindly hospitality and loving good will extended by the people of Richmond and all Virginia.

Much has been said and thought, perhaps more has been said than has been really thought thoroughly out, about the shape that has been given to Canon 19 by that Convention.

It seems to me that in the adoption at Richmond of the amendment to Canon 19 no enactment whatever of positive law was made, but only a declaration was proclaimed of what existing law should not be construed to mean. The law, existing at least since 1865, prohibited the authorities of a Parish from permitting "any person to officiate therein, without sufficient evidence of his being duly licensed or ordained to minister in this Church." That was and is the law. But in finding what the law means it might be claimed by some that the phrase "licensed or ordained" is a sort of compound modifier in which "ordained" is explicative of "licensed" so as that no person can be "licensed" who is not "ordained." Others might maintain that "or" is rather disjunctive than copulative, and so a person may be "licensed" to "minister in this Church" who has not been "ordained." Evidently the mind of the Church as manifested in General Convention agrees with this latter view, because from the time the law was made this proviso was laid down, "provided that nothing herein shall be so construed as to forbid communicants of the Church to act as Lay Readers." The proviso is not an enactment of law empowering communicants of the Church to act as Lay Readers. The power so to act is given by implication in the prescribed law, and the proviso is added as a declaration that the assertion of the implication is not erroneous, as well as that persons who are not ordained may be licensed to minister to this Church. The amendment adopted at Richmond is an extension of the proviso in the following words, "or to prevent the Bishop of any Diocese or Missionary District from giving permission to Christian men, who are not Ministers of this Church, to make addresses in the Church, on special occasions."

This amendment is not positive legislation empowering a person who is not a Minister of this Church to officiate therein. Such power is given by authoritative implication in the prescribed law, if only the person be duly licensed. The amendment, if we apply the old maxim, *expressio unius exclusio alterius*, and it seems reasonable to apply it, is a declaration in the way of restrictive legislation. Instead of empowering, it restricts power in four ways.

1. There may be no "giving permission" by Parish authorities, but only by a Bishop.
2. The permission may not be given by a Bishop as a Bishop in the Church of God, but only by the Bishop, the ordinary of the Diocese or Missionary District concerned.
3. The permission may be given only to a Christian man.
4. The permission may be given only to deliver an address in the Church on a special occasion.

The mind of the Church, so far as represented by the Richmond Convention, seemed almost unanimously to agree to and to adopt these restrictions. I fail to understand how it can be reasonably concluded that the

legislation at Richmond established, what was hoped by some and is feared by others, an "open pulpit."

So much for the law as I see it and so far as I am able to explain it.

Dear Brethren all, I hope we shall be ready to obey the law faithfully and loyally, and may the spirit of our obedience be an offering acceptable to God our Father equally with the willingness of our obedience and the fact of our obedience.

On the one hand, be we scrupulously careful as Stewards and Trustees to protect inviolably the integrity of the trust committed into our hands. I mean the specific trust of the restricted validity and the historic continuity of Episcopal ordination. With the Preface to the Ordinal of the Book of Common Prayer before us and the entire history of the Catholic Church of Christ behind us, we may not account any man "to be a lawful Bishop, Priest or Deacon in this Church or suffered to execute any of the said functions except he * * * hath had Episcopal consecration or ordination." If from kindness of heart or from breadth of sympathy or from hope of benefit to the Master's cause we are tempted to play fast and loose with the strict requirements of this trust, let us stop and consider the grievous wrong which it is in our thought to do. It is not only that, by yielding to the temptation, fidelity to our stewardship and integrity of our trust are imperiled, but it is also that the precious things of apostolic authority and historic continuity given into our hands to hold for others as well as for ourselves are counted for naught and scattered to the winds. And we, who sometimes humbly had the hope that this Church might be the rallying point for unity in God's wise time between the 330,000,000 of Christian souls who are under the historic episcopate and the 110,000,000 of Christian souls who reject or neglect the historic episcopate, shall have shattered the hope by our thoughtless betrayal, and destroyed the precious aspiration.

But, on the other hand, in standing steady and true to the apostolic authority of the Ministry and to the tying of the validity of its transmission to the historic episcopate, we may not be forbidden to have a true and allowance-making love for all who profess and call themselves Christians, certainly for all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth. Side by side with our fidelity in preserving intact the historic authority and the valid Ministry of the Church we may be permitted, may we not, to receive enlightenment upon subjects of importance to the Christian Church and to humanity from Christian men, even if they be not Ministers of this Church?

Who are these Christian men? Baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost are they not members of Christ's holy Church? They love Him in their hearts, they serve Him in their lives, they obey the Holy Ghost in sweet holiness of walk and conversation. Is there nothing for us to learn from their scholarship and their

devotion and their unselfishness and their faithfulness and their zeal? And shall they be forbidden to tell us, what they may be able, to our help along these precious helpful lines? We may be preserving for them the sacred trust of the historic ministry. They may be preserving with us, and, I sometimes think, for us, a widespread and deep-founded personal love and loyalty to Jesus Christ our blessed Lord.

Shall we not be friends? Shall we not be brethren? Shall we turn our backs and refuse to hear when in wise ways and on lawful occasions they come with a wholesome message?

God keep us faithful, God help us to be humble, God sweeten and strengthen the truth in our hearts that there abideth these three, faith, hope, love; and that the greatest of these is love.

Archdeacons' Annual Reports.

ST. LOUIS, MO., May 19, 1908.

Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., S. T. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri:

MY DEAR BISHOP—Earnestly desirous that the Diocese should follow every detail of my labor (the very best way of securing confidence and co-operation), I am carefully publishing a monthly journal in *The Church News*. This is probably so familiar to you that a recapitulation is unnecessary, thus saving time and space. I will say, in general, that I have held services, casual or systematic, as the exigencies demanded, in thirty-two important points in the rural field, besides delivering numerous informal addresses in or near St. Louis. You can easily imagine that had these thirty-two points been handled by Missionaries in the usual way, the cost would have considerably exceeded the appropriation made for an Archdeacon's salary?

Besides the visits above mentioned, a tour of investigation has been made to points where services have not been held. In many of the thirty-two points the Archdeacon has officiated personally at least once a month, until a Missionary has been secured. In default thereof and during the interim the members of the Brotherhood of Lay Readers, acting as the Archdeacon's deputies, have read a service and a sermon at least once on every Lord's Day. At the Tuesday night assemblies at Schuyler Hall, it has been my custom to render and receive reports, either verbally or in writing, from all Missions served from St. Louis and make and publish appointments for the entire field a month in advance. It is a gratifying fact that notwithstanding the heavy traveling expenses entailed by the constant use of the railway trains on the part of five or six men, the offerings received by the Lay Readers have almost balanced the account. The Diocese can not too highly appreciate the unselfish and tireless service of Messrs. Von Renthall, Fauntleroy, Sleeper, Green, Edwards, Prosser, Lyman and others (notably the St. Andrew's Brotherhood of Kirkwood) who have faithfully co-operated from time to time.

During the coming year we shall need about twenty such men in active and continuous service if we prosecute the work of Church extension as planned by the Archdeacon.

My general policy you have probably already in mind. At unorganized or weak points, as will be later seen in chart, I arranged the Missions in groups, the points at each group being easily accessible to each other. Usually in each group there are one or more points where buildings should be erected. Dividing time, as the service may demand, I then proceed to nurse the weak nucleus into life, strength and activity or to

develop a nucleus, if possible, where it does not previously exist. I have discovered that it will not do to multiply services at a single visit. One service, well attended, is enough. This illustrates the Church. To attempt to multiply public assemblies is to split your congregations. Observing closely the people who attend, the inclination of individuals becomes gradually revealed. The rest of your work must be personal in order to be permanently effective.

Again, when established points become vacant, they are attached to the See City; services when desired are regularly sustained by the Archdeacon or his deputies, finances prepared for the call of a new Missionary and local material organized and assimilated ready for use.

The demand on time and strength and brain for this comprehensive work is great. One day of rest and quiet at home—the Divine law, but often necessarily broken by me—one day touching by mail and with the help of a stenographer, the springs of the entire field (a most imperative and important detail), and then five days, the remainder of the week, in motion either near or far, describes the unenviable routine of an active Archdeacon's life.

It should be remembered, however, that the Archdeacon's constant aim is to group points as rapidly as possible, and then obtain a resident Clergyman who will look more closely after spiritual and material details.

We should strive to impress upon the Diocese, individually and collectively, the necessity for adherence to a fixed policy for a reasonable time. Every effort should also be made to stimulate and sustain the influence of our Board of Missions and our public officials. To be careless in what we do or say in this regard is a fatal mistake if we desire success in Church extension.

May I ask that you will remember me constantly in your prayers; that I may be given the wisdom, the strength and the grace proportioned to my need in this your great work.

As directed by Canon XVIII, we have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, Theological Education Fund, Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, and Trust Funds in the hands of the Bishop of the Diocese. We found the accounts correct and the securities and cash balances as stated in the several reports.

Appended is a summary of the reports, which have been printed and placed in the hands of the Delegates.

The following Missions are reported vacant: St. Charles, Cape Girardeau, Crystal City, Cuba, Kirksville, La Plata, Portland, St. James, Shelbyville, Sullivan and Valley Park.

The Board appointed a committee of its members, consisting of Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. C. F. Blaisdell and Maj. A. M. Davis, whose duty it should be to supervise the work of the City Missionary and his assistants, the Hospital Missionary and his assistants, and the workers at Holy Cross Mission, to be a Council of Advice to them between meetings of the Board, and also to secure from them reports of their work to be submitted to the Board.

On April 15, 1908, the Board gave its consent, on petition signed by the requisite number of persons, to associate themselves together as a Mission to be known as St. Luke's Church at Dixon, Pulaski County, Mo.

In order to keep the Missionary work going at the places now being served, the Board will need the sum of \$9,920, and for the many vacant places it will need the additional sum of \$1,525, making a total of \$11,445 to carry on the work of the Diocese.

The Board herewith submits the reports from St. Stephen's and Holy Cross, and also the reports of the City and Hospital Missionaries.

APPENDIX No. 7.

Hospital Missions.

REPORT FOR 1907-08.

The workers in this branch of the Church's work in St. Louis have pleasure in presenting to the Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese and the Missionary Board, through the head of the staff, some account of their labors during the Convention year just ended. As the practical expression of the Church's corporate charity and benevolence the Mission serves to show the recognition of the duties entailed upon it as living exponents of the faith.

The staff has continued during the year as it was at the commencement. Four workers have been engaged under the Diocesan Missionary Board, the salary of one of them being provided for the greater part of the year by certain members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. Mr. Fanning has continued his work in the Jail and Workhouse, with a certain amount of visiting in the City Hospital in connection therewith. Mrs. Holmes has visited in the City and Female Hospitals. Miss Hofman also in the City and Female Hospitals, and in the Jail and Workhouse and Poor House, and the head of the staff was in all the institutions. The Industrial School has been taken into the work of the Missions as a city institution, so that they are all now covered by our workers. The Rev. Loaring Clark, of St. Paul's, has continued his care of the Sunday service at the Workhouse, and the Rev. E. D. Johnston has represented the Cathedral body at the City Hospital service since he joined the staff in November.

The voluntary workers now giving assistance to us number forty-six. We have lost the co-operation of several during the year from removal and other causes, and are still lacking some from the usual number of men helpers. Our most grateful recognition of the very valuable assistance given by these workers is very gladly made. The Church, as a whole, owes them much for all they do, with the many attendant sacrifices necessitated thereby. Several of the city Parishes are not represented amongst the workers, and we wish it were otherwise, so that the interest and the blessings might be still more widely known and enjoyed.

A very sincere word of appreciation is called for in recognition of the friendliness and courtesy invariably shown by the officials of all the institutions. The city is at least to be congratulated upon those now in its service for their management, however much there may be that is lacking in other phases of the institutions themselves. We are entirely mindful of the many privileges we enjoy and the opportunities of personal work and influence accorded us, and we hope that the happy relations now existing may always continue.

The head of the staff, in addition to his regular work, has visited the following Churches, either to preach on behalf of the Mission or to help on request: The Cathedral, St. George's Chapel, St. Mark's, Holy Communion, Mt. Calvary, Good Shepherd, St. John's, St. James', St. Paul's, Holy Innocents', St. Alban's and Holy Cross Missions; Emmanuel, Old Orchard, and Grace, Kirkwood.

It is all but impossible to tabulate the number of visits, inside and outside of the institutions, made by all the workers. On every day of the week they are in one or other of them, and much outside work is entailed upon them also. Eight regular services are held every week, five and sometimes six of which are taken by the head of the staff; the Holy Communion is celebrated regularly in the Poor House and Insane Asylum, and as frequently as may be required in the City and Female Hospitals.

The head of the staff was invited last November to take charge for spiritual matters of the Church Home for Convalescent Women, and the connection has proved very pleasant and helpful. A weekly service is given to the inmates there and a useful opportunity is afforded for the continuance of guidance in the case of many women sent there from the hospitals.

The Charity Fund, with which Table No. 3 is concerned, has called for much attention, being almost dependent upon the efforts of the head. The chief items are for surgical appliances, including crutches, etc., comforts and delicacies for the sick, meals, lodgings, clothes, financial assistance (temporary when possible) for the friendless on returning to the duties of life, and the car fares for the regular workers.

Special appeals are made when funeral expenses or transportation charges have to be met for particular cases, as it is not deemed right to defray such from the ordinary charitable donations.

We rejoice greatly in being privileged to represent the Church in this service of ministering to the city's charges; we delight in alleviating to some degree the sadness and misery in which they find themselves, and we trust that we may realize more and more fully the duty of comforting and succoring those who are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness or any other adversity, and that the Divine blessing may be always with those who work in the Mission and with those who make it possible for them to do so.

Report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

*To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D. D., S. T. D., LL.D., Bishop of Missouri, and
Members of the Convention:*

The General Convention Year is always a reckoning point in Auxiliary work. The great United Offering of the Women of the Church for the support of Women Workers far exceeded our most sanguine expectations. Of the \$225,000 given that day on God's Altar in Richmond, \$1,530 was from Missouri.

Of the \$100,000 which the Board asks from us for general work, and which is known as the Auxiliary apportionment, we have this year as heretofore given the sum asked for. It is only \$600 of the \$8,000 Missouri has given this year, but it is to our credit that we never fail to pay it in full. It is made up from our gifts to the general treasury and designated offerings made at our meetings.

St. John's Church, Blackwell's Hollow, Va., has been finished and consecrated and is proving its usefulness. It marks twenty-five years of the Secretary's Auxiliary work, and also by its name is a link with this Convention for long and diligent work of another Secretary.

To our other regular pledges we have added a Scholarship at St. Mary's in the Mountain at Sewanee, to be known as the Harriet M. Tuttle Scholarship, to keep yearly in our minds the example of our beloved late President.

A number of Parishes have held study classes, and Miss Lindley of New York at the request of the Diocesan Branch, gave a most helpful ten days' course of Bible study. This work is now becoming a part of the Auxiliary, recognizing that for the spread of the Gospel we must ourselves grow in knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

APPENDIX No. 14.

Notice of Amendments of General Convention.

To the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese (or Missionary District) of Missouri:

In compliance with the requirement of Canon XLVI., Section 1 (iv.), I hereby give notice that the following alterations of the Constitution of the Church are proposed, to wit: Those comprised in the resolutions printed herewith, said resolutions having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention held in the city of Richmond, in October, A. D. 1907.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Prefix to the Constitution the following

PREAMBLE:

This American Church first planted in Virginia, in the year of our Lord 1607, by representatives of the ancient Church of England; acknowledging the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, the record of God's Revelation of Himself in His Son, and to contain all things necessary to salvation; holding the Catholic Creeds, to-wit, the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed, to be a sufficient statement of the Christian Faith; maintaining the Orders of the Sacred Ministry in such form as from the Apostles' time they have been continued; reverently conserving the Sacraments ordained by Christ Himself; and accounting to be members of the flock of Christ all who have been duly baptized in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, has set forth

and established, for the furtherance of the work to which it has been called of God, the following

CONSTITUTION:

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Strike out Section 3 of Article I., and insert in place of it the following:

SEC. 3. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, the General Convention shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops having jurisdiction within the United States to be such Presiding Bishop, by the vote of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies by vote of a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders.

The Presiding Bishop shall discharge such duties as may be prescribed by the Constitution and the Canons of the General Convention.

The Presiding Bishop so elected shall hold office for six years, unless meanwhile he shall have reached the seventieth year of his age, when his tenure of office shall end in any case, or shall have resigned his Episcopal Jurisdiction, or, with the consent of the General Convention, his office as Presiding Bishop, or, unless, for infirmity or other sufficient cause, he may have been relieved of such office by the General Convention by the concurrent vote, first of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and then of a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders.

The salary of the Presiding Bishop as such shall be fixed and paid by the General Convention, as may be provided by Canon of such Convention.

When, for any reason, a vacancy in the office shall occur, or if, by reason of infirmity, the Presiding Bishop shall become disabled, the House of Bishops shall elect one of its number to act as Presiding Bishop until the next meeting of the General Convention.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Insert in Article II. as Section 4 the following, and renumber the present Section 4:

It shall be lawful for a Diocese, with the consent of the Bishop of that Diocese, to elect one or more Suffragan Bishops, without right of succession, and with seat and without vote in the House of Bishops. A Suffragan Bishop shall be consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. He shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of a Diocese, or as a Suffragan in another Diocese, or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Missionary Bishop.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Add to the second paragraph of Article IX. of the Constitution the following sentence, namely:

The General Convention may also provide by Canon for the trial of a Presbyter or Deacon in the Diocese or Missionary District in which an offense is alleged to have been committed by him.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Add to Article X., at the end thereof, the following proviso:

And provided further, that in editions of the Book of Common Prayer in foreign languages, such verbal alterations as may be necessary to adapt the same to local conditions may be made by the authority of the Bishop of the Diocese or Missionary District in which it is used, subject to the approval of the Presiding Bishop.

APPENDIX No. 17.

*Standing Committee on Sunday-school Work.**To the Diocesan Convention of 1908:*

Your Committee on Sunday-school work have pleasure in presenting such a report as the materials before them allow. The appointment of the Special Committee asked for by the Sunday-school Commission in last year's Convention, with the clear definition of their duties and work renders unnecessary any lengthy report for this Standing Committee. The report of the Commission then presented was so full and practical that the continuance of its work by the Special Committee is looked for with much interest by us.

We have studied the later figures given concerning the Sunday-schools of the Dioceses, and we are forced to the conclusion that however satisfactory and useful the work in them may be, in numbers they speak but very poorly of the Church's influence among the young. Such schools are called for more and more definitely now than at any other time, owing to the conditions that prevail so widely in ordinary homes, and the principles governing the public schools of the country. Judging by the figures before us, we are doing but little to meet the needs. We notice also, as a striking feature, the great differences in the proportion of scholars to the communicants in the various congregations. We draw the conclusion that the larger Churches are weaker in this direction than the smaller ones. The published figures show this. As a rule, the smaller Churches show the proportion of from one-half to two-thirds of the total communicants by the scholars, while the proportion decreases as the numbers go higher. There is seen to be an inequality in the efforts in the direction of the Sunday-school. We are moved by the fact that in no single Church in St. Louis do the scholars approach the number of the communicants. The armies of the youthful that are in the public schools and on the streets seem to be outside of the Sunday-schools. The natural course, as we might have hoped, according to which the young are gathered in to reinforce and enlarge and expand the ever-growing congregations seems likely to be changed altogether.

We conclude with the hope that the continuance of the work of the Sunday-school Commission may result in a more worthy appreciation of the needs of the situation and the duties thereby placed upon us.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Holy Cross Mission.

HOLY CROSS HOUSE, May 11, 1908.

To the Missionary Board of the Diocese of Missouri:

The following report is submitted:

Holy Cross Mission is a little more than two years old. It was first opened for services and Sunday-school October 8, 1905. We have had at least one service and Sunday-school each Sunday since then. The Holy Communion has been celebrated on Sunday whenever a Clergyman could be obtained.

In two years sixty-nine have been baptized; twenty-four confirmed. The present number of communicants is twenty-six. The daily Kindergarten, under one teacher, numbers thirty children; it is supported by The Churchwoman's Club.

The Dispensary speaks for itself. There have been 5342 treatments from May 1, 1907, to May 1, 1908. With an average of fifty visits each month made by the physician in the homes and as many visits by Miss Skinker, making, with those of the Deaconess, nearly two thousand visits in the homes round about us the last year. We owe our grateful thanks to Dr. Hild and Miss Skinker for their untiring services, given without one penny of recompense, and more often than not without even "thank you" from the people they are serving.

The lantern slides have attracted the children. Each week the assembly room is filled with eager children ready for the pictures and the story.

Other weekly organizations are the Sewing School and Cooking Classes, St. Agnes' Guild for Young Communicants, The Mothers' Guild (which is doing excellent work), The Children's Choir, The Children of the Republic (a patriotic society for boys), and a library for the children.

Five hundred baths were taken by the children in three months. During the summer the playground is open every morning and evening for the children of the neighborhood.

In the "store" we have sold nearly five thousand articles the past year, the receipts being six hundred dollars (\$600). The proceeds have helped to support the Mission; in fact, have been indispensable to its life.

Over eight hundred people came to the Mission each week for various purposes in the winter months.

Recently I was asked by a Clergyman: "Do you think that the work at Holy Cross is going to stand?" There is no reason why it should not, with as good a beginning as it has, if we are only supported as we should be. Sometimes we have felt forgotten, and wondered whether after all the

Church wanted us as her child. In the summer months we are left without even the Holy Communion; for four months we had no celebration. The Mission people do their part generously. They have given \$46 for Missions and \$27 for the dispensary work. We ask that some Priest will come to us at least once a month for the Holy Communion in the coming months.

I could not close this report without expressing my gratefulness to the friends who have helped us by their means, their prayers, their sympathies and their time. Expressing a hope that more aid and interest will be aroused for Holy Cross in the future, this is

APPENDIX No. 20.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

ARTICLE I—NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

ARTICLE II—OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine Parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the Parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each Parish of the Diocese. Each Parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its Parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

SECTION 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject or Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of "The General Clergy Relief Fund" for the Pension and Relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
