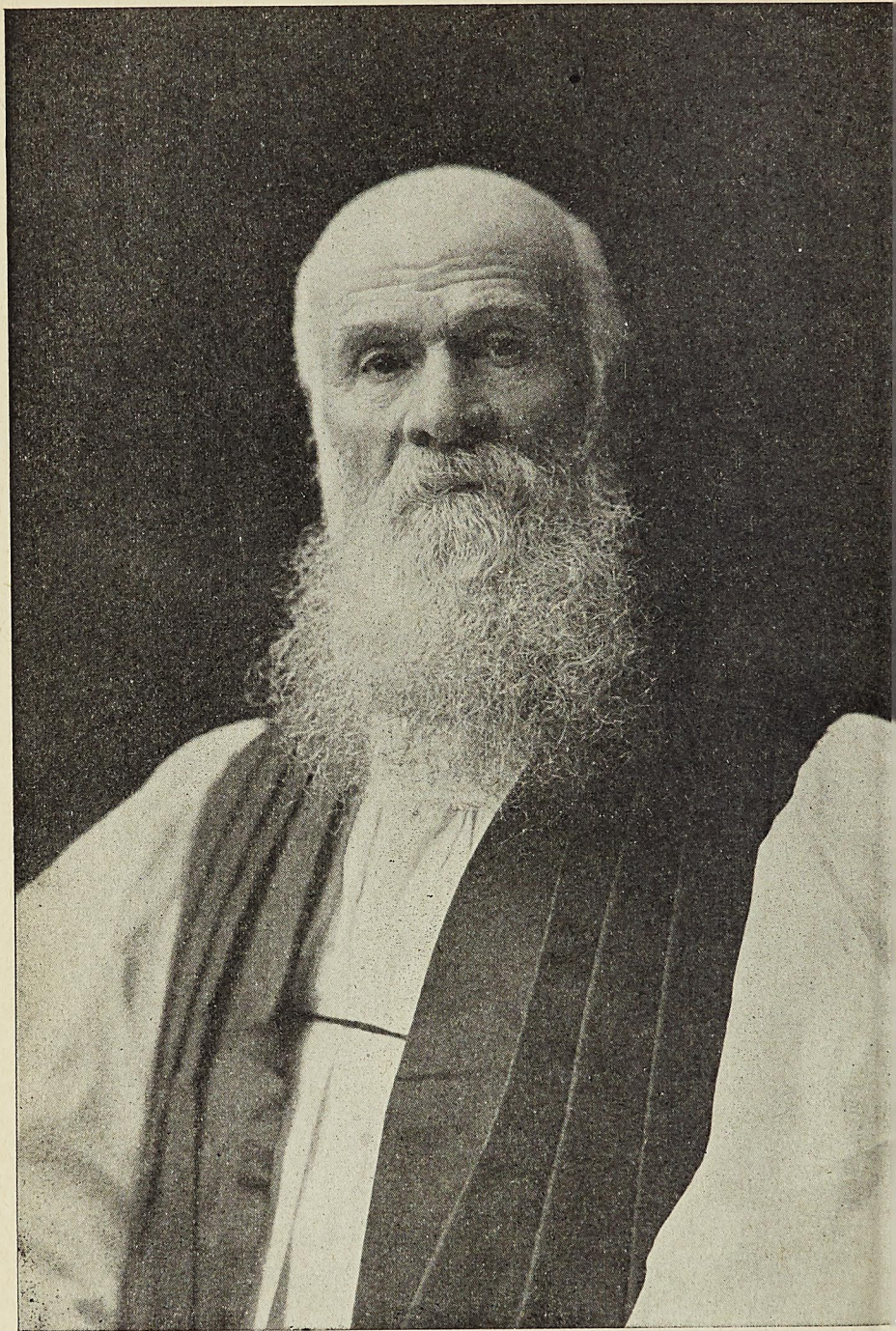

Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Assessments.
 - III. On Christian Education.
 - IV. On Constitution and Canons.
 - V. On Finance.
 - VI. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - VII. On Missions.
 - VIII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IX. On State of the Church.
 - X. On Sunday School Work.
 - XI. Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the services of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, in division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

Journal of the Seventy-Seventh Convention

OF THE

Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,
Tuesday, May 23, 1916.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Seventy-Seventh Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on May 23d, 1916, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. C. M. C. Mason read the Epistle, and the Rev. B. E. Reed read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the Schuyler Memorial House, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Thirty-two who were entitled to vote were present.

The Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, presented his report. (See page 16.)

Report accepted by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of Lay Delegates to the Convention.

Delegates from nineteen parishes and missions, entitled to vote in the Convention, were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

On motion the Rev. Mr. Mizner cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

On motion the delegate from the parish of Christ Church, Rolla, was given a seat and vote in the Convention.

On motion of Mr. Waterworth it was ordered by a rising vote that the following telegram be sent to Prof. Marshall S. Snow:

The Bishops, Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled send loving greetings to their dear brother, Marshall S. Snow. They recall with deep appreciation his long and faithful service in the councils of the Diocese, his sound and sober judgment and genial fellowship, and they remember him in their prayers.

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented the following report:

We, the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, hereby recommend that the Mission of St. Michael and All Angels, in Clayton, Missouri, be admitted as a parish in union with the Diocese of Missouri, said Mission having complied with the provisions of the Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Brittain introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9:30 o'clock in the Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 p.m. and continue to 5:00 p.m.

Resolution adopted.

On motion that part of the Bishop's Address referring to Article III of the Constitution of the Diocese was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented the following supplementary report:

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials reports that J. D. Livingston has been duly appointed a delegate to represent St. Peter's, St. Louis, instead of John G. Lonsdale, resigned; and that Clifford Day has been duly appointed a delegate to represent St. Stephen's, Ferguson, instead of J. A. Lodwick, resigned.

H. W. MIZNER, Chairman.

Report accepted, and the names of Messrs. Day and Livingston were called by the Secretary.

The Rev. Mr. Lever, Chairman of the Commission on Social Service, presented the following report:

The Chairman of the Social Service Committee of the Diocese of Missouri in lieu of what has not been done in this Diocese and for the purpose of contrast, desires to offer the following analysis of work accomplished by similar committees in other dioceses.

DIGEST OF DIOCESAN SOCIAL SERVICE ACTIVITIES.

A digest has been made by the Joint Commission on Social Service of the activities of diocesan social service commissions for the year 1915, which shows that the following commissions are interested in general labor questions: Bethlehem, Long Island, Western Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Southern Ohio, Western Colorado, Western Michigan, Newark, and New York.

The following are interested specifically in child and woman labor: Los Angeles, New Jersey, North Carolina, Pittsburgh, South Dakota, Western Colorado, Newark, and New York. Southern Ohio is interested in mining questions; Bethlehem and Los Angeles in the safety first movement; Arizona, Long Island, Ohio, Rhode Island, and Southern Ohio, in Sunday observance, which is associated with "one day's rest in seven" for industrial

workers; while Arizona, Kentucky, Los Angeles, Long Island, Western Massachusetts, Oregon, and Pennsylvania, are interested in unemployment.

A statement concerning "The Church and Labor," by the Rev. C. R. Stetson, showed the following facts as under date of about two years ago:

- (1) Twenty-one dioceses either have sent "fraternal delegates" to central labor unions or maintained close contact with organized labor.
- (2) Seventeen commissions have furthered labor legislation and put themselves publicly on record as favoring an eight hour day.
- (3) Twenty-five dioceses are on record as favoring bills, or agitating to secure labor legislation, for the elimination of child labor.
- (4) Nineteen dioceses report co-operation with the labor movement in obtaining better working and housing conditions.
- (5) Twelve commissions report that the Church, through its representatives, has been instrumental in settling strikes in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Ohio, Vermont, Michigan, Illinois, Maryland, etc.
- (6) Thirty-four out of fifty-four dioceses answering Mr. Stetson's questionnaire report that working people or wage earners are not indifferent to our own Church; that in some cases working people form the back bone of the Church.
- (7) Twenty-seven out of these fifty-six dioceses had studied industrial conditons or were preparing to do so.

Therefore, in view of the splendid work done by other diocesan social service committees, and because of the inactivity of this committee in this diocese, the chairman desires to offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Convention desires to put on record its hope that succeeding conventions may have the pleasure and profit of listening to adequate reports of constructive work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom along social and economic lines.

Report accepted, and resolution therein adopted.

On motion the Treasurer of the Diocese was authorized to pay the traveling expenses of the missionaries present at the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Harvey introduced the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Bishop of the Diocese in his Convention address spoke of the splendid work that is being done for the Church by the Bishop of Massachusetts as President of the Church Pension Fund;

Resolved, that the Secretary be directed to communicate the thanks of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri to the Bishop of Massachusetts, President of the Church Pension Fund.

Resolution referred to the Committee of the Church Pension Fund of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Arthur introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, that visiting clergymen from other dioceses, candidates for Holy Orders and lay readers be invited to seats upon the floor, and that they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Fauntleroy introduced the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Diocesan Church News of date March, 1916, has published the program of the Church Pageant to be given in St. Louis during the session of the General Convention of the Church in October of the current year; and whereas, the Pageant purports to give a true historic picture of our Holy Church, extending from the day of Pentecost to the present time; and whereas, the Pageant also purports to give a chronological representation of all the important events in the life of the Church of England down to the planting of her daughter in the western hemisphere at Jamestown, Virginia; and whereas, the Reformation was the most momentous event and purifying movement in the history of Christianity, as well as of civilization, since the crucifixion of Christ; and whereas, the Reformation settlement of the Church of England, permanently established in the reign of Elizabeth, was the most glorious epoch in the history of that Church; and whereas, the heroism shown in the reign of Bloody Queen Mary by the martyrs—Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury; Hugh Latimer, the greatest preacher of his day and Bishop of Worcester; Nicholas Ridley, Bishop of London; John Hooper, Bishop of Gloucester; Robert Ferrar, Bishop of St. David's, Wales, and by other clergymen and lay members of the Church of England—constitutes the noblest, most heroic and heart-appealing event in the history of that great Church; and whereas, the said program of the proposed Pageant omits all these heroic and world-reaching events; now therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Missouri in annual Convention assembled, that the delegates thereof suggest to the Executive Committee, that a proper representation of the aforesaid events and mighty epoch be given in the presentation of said Pageant.

Resolution referred to the Executive Committee in charge of preparation for the General Convention.

By request of Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson took the Chair.

Mr. McMaster introduced the following:

We do not always think how far quietness that turns not into weakness, and firmness that is never rudeness, go to make life useful and loveable.

Just such combined gentleness and firmness gave to Prof. Snow an influence over us all in St. Louis that has been to our good. Our heart cries out that we see him no more, and we want to send to him herewith in overflowing measure our thanks for what he has done for us and our love for what he has been to us, commending him to God's merciful care and protection for all his future earthly days.

The above was adopted by a rising vote, and it was ordered that a copy be sent to Prof. Snow.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, that a committee be appointed to prepare for the consideration of this convention a resolution defining a method by which the status of communicants may be definitely determined in making report to this Convention.

Resolution adopted.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. B. E. Reed, Mr. H. H. Denison, and Mr. E. J. Thomas, as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, and the Chairman declared them elected.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Mr. H. H. Denison, and Mr. W. P. Nelson, as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Chairman declared them elected.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. James Wise, the Rev. B. T. Kemerer, the Rev. Charles F. Blaisdell, the Rev. J. H. Harvey, Mr. B. F. Babbitt, Mr. H. L. Chase, Mr. A. J. Watling, Mr. George C. Mackay, and Mr. H. D. Condie, as members of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, and the Chairman declared them elected.

Mr. Curtice presented the report of the Committee on Finance. (Appendix 24.)

Mr. Lycett presented the report of the Committee on Assessments on the assessments for Diocesan expenses. (Appendix 25.)

Report accepted, and assessments therein adopted.

The Convention took a recess at 12:50.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p.m.

Report accepted and apportionments therein adopted.

Yesterday this Convention heard with special pleasure the report of the Woman's Auxiliary, and was made glad because of the gracious blessing that has attended their efforts during the past year. In the midst of the music of joy and thanksgiving, however, there was a note that created real sadness. It was the announcement that Mrs. E. C. Simmons, the faithful and efficient President of the Auxiliary, would be unable to serve any longer in that capacity on account of illness. Therefore, be it

Resolved, that this Convention hereby places on record its deep appreciation of her devoted labors and unstinted service, their sincerest sympathy in her illness, and their most earnest prayer that she may be speedily restored to her usual health and strength. And further, be it

Resolved, that the Secretary of this Convention forward a copy of this preamble and resolution to Mrs. Simmons.

Resolution adopted by a standing vote.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Seventy-seventh Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, remembering the strife and cruel suffering Armenia has endured at the hands of the insufferable Turk, records its sympathy for the Christians of Armenia in the time of their bitter persecution and dreadful slaughter, and trusts that the hour of their deliverance is at hand.

After the benediction, the Bishop Coadjutor, on motion, declared the Convention adjourned, *sine die*.

APPENDIX No. 1.

Annual Address of the Bishop of Missouri

TO THE

Seventy-Seventh Annual Convention.

Fifty years! I speak in round numbers. It is the count of the years of my life as bishop. Thirty years! It is the count of my years as Bishop of Missouri.

Fifty years! What wonders they have witnessed in discoveries and inventions and triumphs of applied science! The ocean cable, the telephone, the wireless, the X-ray, radium, anæsthetics, the elevator, the automobile, the aeroplane, the submarine! Research and skill and genius have produced wonders and the wonders have been so multiplied as to have become commonplaces. Wonderful advance indeed in what we may call handy ways and creative comforts and material betterments. We are glad and proud of our wonderful age. And we are thankful.

Yet, there is room for doubt whether in the shifting of the scales of value all that we get hold of is gain. In old fashioned days the old fashioned virtues were well in evidence. Simplicity, patience, endurance, the ideal, the poetic, the spiritual, loyalty, forbearance, unselfishness, faith and hope and love. But nowadays these are things pushed to the wall or crowded out by the self-confidence and energetic efficiency of the superman, who puts straightforth the comfortable concomitants and the satisfying sufficiencies of the actual and practical and prosaic and useful of life without foolishness of feeling or visions of the unreal.

Ah, if you take vision out from the life of man and eternity out from his thought and the ideal out from his imagination and feeling out from his heart and soul-hunger out from his inlook and his uplook, you will find you cannot make the void good with all the efficiencies of the material or the scientific world; and the banished sweetness and strength of human experience shall be replaced by a wide waste of arid sand.

Fifty years! Look back upon them. Strong faith, unshaken integrity, stalwart character, unbroken homes, family prayers, in-

spiring ideals, poetic visions shall be the things you see. You look and accord a tribute of gratitude and reverence for those past years.

Fifty years of a bishop's life! In the abstract, they have not been greatly different from other people's lives. Sunshine and cloud, hope and fear, joy and pain, work and rest, success and disappointment, sin and penitence and prayer for forgiveness for the Savior's sake have pervaded them all.

In the concrete, things not a few are noticeable.

On October 5, 1866, I was elected bishop. Then 41 bishops made up the House of Bishops. Now 122 bishops are in it. Our communicants numbered then about 250,000. Now they are a million. Our communicants then, relatively to the population, were 1 in 175. Now they are 1 in 99. So, speaking in the large, our Church in the United States in my bishop's life has, relatively to population, fairly doubled in strength. Since my election 204 bishops have been consecrated and 123 bishops have died. What a procession of my brethren gone or going on to hand in account of their stewardship! When I was elected we had only 34 Dioceses. Now we have the exact double of that, 68 Dioceses. When I was elected we had only 5 Domestic Missionary Districts,—Oregon, Arkansas, The Northwest, Nebraska and Colorado. Now we have 23. Then, we had 3 Foreign Missionary Districts,—Africa, China and Japan. Now we have 9.

Statistics are not everything. Often they are not illuminating. Sometimes they are not safe guides. Yet it is to the good, is it not, to be assured that in fifty years our Dioceses have been doubled in number, our bishops have been trebled and our communicants have been quadrupled.

Thirty years of my life as Bishop of Missouri! That is about a generation. The heart is touched to think how largely the lives of the fathers of that generation have closed up to earthly things. Yet, looking at the Journal of 1886, we find quite a cheery number of those listed that year still on deck. Not many among the clergy. Only Drs. Davis and Wilkins, and Messrs. Knox, Mason and Reed. More among the laity. In the city and the county of St. Louis—Burgess, Tiffany, Skinker, Judge Dyer, Dr. Saunders, Judge Reynolds, Judson, W. R. Donaldson, W. H. Thomson, John A. Harrison, Simmons, Bull, Churchill, Whittemore, McMaster, Waterworth, Lycett, D. S. Brown, besides those not on duty through infirmities—Prof. Snow, Geo. M. Wright and Hough. In the country, C. B. Rollins, Scovern, Kellogg, Dr. Alonzo White, H. C. Scheetz, A. M. Hough, F. T. Meriwether and John Harding.

The Journal of 1886 counted up 58 clergy for the Diocese of Missouri. This year will list 52. But, in 1890 the Diocese was

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divided; and one-half this year counts up almost equal to the whole State in 1886. In communicants the showing is better yet. In 1886 the undivided Diocese had 6,596. To-day our half has 8,749. So, recalling and recounting some of the days of the years of our own loved Diocese, we thank God and take courage.

This year two have been removed from our List of Clergy, Rev. E. J. Hall, who died on January 6, 1916, and Rev. E. D. Johnston, who was deposed January 3, for reasons not affecting his moral character.

Only three of the Bishops have departed this life.

Bishop Toll, Suffragan of Chicago, died at 72. Though 68 when consecrated, he was energetic and strong. He filled his short term of service to the full with diligent industry and loving devotion.

Bishop Biller, of South Dakota, and Bishop Codman, of Maine, were comparatively young, the former 41, the latter 56. In reality both were Missionary Bishops, because Maine is one large missionary field. Into it out from a Boston home of affluence and culture Bishop Codman threw himself with godly earnestness and unremitting zeal for more than fifteen years. Bishop Biller served only a little more than three years. I am now in charge of South Dakota and I find out every day how his kindness of heart and self-sacrificing life bound the people to him in bonds of esteem and affection.

The dreadful war in Europe presses heavily upon our hearts and stretches far its hand of violence. Charles Clark, son of Rev. Loaring Clark, once our Rector of St. Paul's, Carondelet, and now Rector of St. Paul's, Chattanooga,—a student in the University of the South and preparing for the Holy Ministry,—enlisted in the British Army, reached the rank of captain and was killed in action in France.

Death in their homes has come upon not a few of our people. Among them may be noted Brigham Rollins, of Columbia, Mr. Brewington and Dr. Ireland, of Hannibal; Major Towles, of Jefferson City; Mr. Chappell, of Louisiana; Mr. Kendrick, of Canton; J. W. Mackey, of Palmyra; Mrs. Gill and Miss Hough, of Kirkwood, and Mrs. Page, of Ferguson. In St. Louis—Geo. D. Barnard, Wallace Delafield, Kivas Tully, Julius Moulton and Mrs. Brookmire. These all and many another uncounted in our listed diptychs stood true and faithful in their generation. Peace, rest, love, HOME—sweet words—now are theirs. One of them, Wallace Delafield, was for over 30 years President of our Sunday School Missionary Host. He was proud of the Host. He loved the Host. He worked unceasingly for the Host. The Host is sad

for loss of him, but glad for the good fight he fought and the deep love he gave.

Our school for girls, Bishop Robertson Hall, closed its doors this year. For more than forty years Sister Catherine and her associates had sustained the beneficent activities of this school. But, without endowment, as it was, it was impracticable to continue its existence longer. A great blessing to the Diocese that school has been. Deep and far-reaching influences (to the help of Church teaching and Christian living) have been set in motion and sustained in the two score years of its history. Blessings from hearts, blessings from homes, blessings from the Diocese follow the faithful and much loved Sisterhood in their retirement from work. Sister Catherine and Sister Rutger are in quiet sojourn in a congenial home in Louisville, Sister Miriam is doing missionary work in North St. Louis, and Sister Martha is visitor in the Cathedral Parish.

Three institutions remain for us to look after—St. Luke's Hospital, the Orphans' Home, and the Home for Convalescent Women. I am glad to give assurance that all three are in good condition and are vigorously promoting their several unquestionably beneficent activities.

St. Andrew's Brotherhood also and the Church Club and the Church Women's Club, and the Girls' Friendly are inter-parochial associations very much alive and contributing of their life and strength to the life and welfare of the Church at large. For the same Church at large we strive to do our part for the University of the South and for the General Board of Religious Education.

The missionary work inside the Diocese is in right healthy condition. The clear eye of the Bishop Coadjutor oversees it and his strong hand is upon it for guidance. His Diocesan League of Lay Readers has nobly and efficiently stood by him in it all, and the whole Diocese in gifts and apportionments has stood by. Within the city limits the excellent combination of religious services and social service is much in evidence, especially in St. Stephen's House and Grace-Holy Cross House and Hospital Missions. The women by their quiet, steady gifts in the Woman's Auxiliary have for these many years sustained the permanent work of St. Stephen's. I doubt if better work is done anywhere for the sick and poor who are the Master's children, and for souls for whom He died, than is done by Mr. Mizner and his helpers and Mr. Taylor and his helpers and Mr. Lever and his helpers. No little of the same sort of blessed work is done by St. Alban's and the Epiphany and by St. Thomas' under Dr. Cloud and by St. Andrew's under the Lay Reader, Mr. Prosser, and by the Christ Child Mission under Sister Miriam and

by Christ Church Cathedral, and indeed by all the twenty-eight churches and congregations of St. Louis.

The Bishop Coadjutor will tell you of all these as the chief over them and the expert under them. In his kindness, besides having care of all the Mission Stations of the Diocese, he has consented to take charge of the Parishes of Cape Girardeau, De Soto, Mexico, Moberly and Monroe.

Looking outside our Diocese and at the work of General Missions two splendid things done (and well done) challenge attention. First, our Board of General Missions is out of debt, and its way of getting out is a fine story.

Yearly deficiencies for current expenses had been for some years rolling themselves up, one upon another, until they amounted to \$400,000. To go on spelled bankruptcy and ruin. A halt was called. The \$400,000 must be paid, was the word passed along the lines. An Emergency Fund to that amount must be raised. The happy thought was suggested and adopted of asking each one and every one all over the American Church to send in severally the amount of his or her one day's income or one day's salary or one day's wage to help specially the Emergency Fund, without stopping or interfering with other regular gifts and helps. Responses were generous and wide spread and \$430,000 were sent in. That I call a splendid thing done and well done.

The second splendid thing is to look and see what our Diocese did. It paid, I think for the first time in its history, its full apportionment. Yes, and overpaid by eleven hundred dollars. I use round numbers. We were apportioned \$13,000 and we paid over \$14,000. The Woman's Auxiliary paid \$2,300 of it. The Sunday Schools paid \$2,400 of it. And \$3,200 were sent in from our Diocese for the Emergency Fund. All that's a second splendid thing, and I am proud of it.

Only I hope it won't be a one dash or one spurt with a falling back and a falling away after. No, I hope for a sturdy stand and a steady pull. We have 2,700 missionaries,—clergymen, teachers, physicians, nurses, etc., upon our pay roll. Every one of them must be paid monthly. We must have a million and a half of money each year to pay them. Our share is \$14,000. Do we not see how much depends on the forthcoming of our share? And now that we have had one clean sheet of honorable dismissal in the reports shall we not determine to keep each year's sheet clean and clear? My understanding is that the present current missionary year does not close till October 1. So that we have till then to make up our \$14,000. Why not repeat for ourselves this year what we did last and send, each one of us, the one day's income or the one

day's salary or the one day's wage,—over and above all else of the regular that we are doing,—so as to help make it sure that Missouri's record will be all clean and clear and honorable for this year also?

It is not to be denied that Missouri is a missions loving and a missions sustaining Diocese. Look at the Sunday School children. Giving last year \$2,400 in their Lenten mite boxes, and \$1,300 in their Missionary Host! Look at the Woman's Auxiliary. Giving this year \$10,932.67, and the Junior Auxiliary giving \$1,448.70! Look at the Parishes giving for Diocesan Missions \$10,000. and all this besides special gifts to Hospital Missions and to St. Stephen's and to Grace-Holy Cross, and to many other specific places and things.

I am sure we are all very thankful. Unselfishness brings ever its own sweet reward.

The brave effort which the Bishop of Massachusetts and his associates are making to establish on a sound foundation a General Pension Fund for the Clergy is worth all approval and encouragement. If the plan be successfully carried out it will mean succor and relief and wise helpfulness in more lines of direction than one, to clergy and parishes alike. I hope that we of the clergy will help on the plan in every way we can; and that the laity, from whom the needed money to launch it must come, will see that the plan is calculated to promote vigor and efficiency in their pastors by quickening their energy and brightening their hope, and quite as much vigor and efficiency in their parishes by providing a wise and kind method whereby an aged incumbent may willingly retire to give place to the needed energy of a younger man.

Not a few people have spoken to me this year of the desirability of holding the session of our Annual Diocesan Convention two weeks earlier than we do, so as to avoid the excessive heat of an approaching June. I addressed a questionnaire to the clergy touching the matter and a majority of the replies favored the earlier date. I beg therefore to recommend that Article III, of the Constitution be amended by striking out "fourth" and inserting "second," so that the Convention shall be required to assemble on the second Tuesday in May. If such change be adopted in this Convention it would not take effect until confirmed by the succeeding Convention. But, if it seemed best, the Ecclesiastical Authority could under the present provisions of Article III make the change effective for next year also.

The General Convention comes to St. Louis in October. It is no small job we have in hand—to do our duty to it and by it and for it and in it. But I am greatly pleased with the cheerful and in-

telligent way in which Churchmen and Churchwomen have taken up the task of preparation. I have not the slightest doubt but that you will cordially do all that you will be called on to do in the way of hospitable welcoming. I have no fears. If we were pushed to the danger of being worsted all St. Louis would come to our help. The several committees have so thoroughly well begun their allotted tasks that I am quite sure "thoroughly well done" will be the acclaim when the tasks are finished and rest has come.

Come back early in October, dear friends, so that when Convention opens on October 11th your own homes shall be open and your arms open and your hearts open in affectionate greeting to the strange yet kindred Church folk who will pour in upon you. Again I say, I have no fears. My heart is simply full of loving thanks to you for all you are doing and all you have done and all you are going to do in view of the Great Convention.

We are now to address ourselves to the consideration of the interests of that portion of the Master's vineyard committed to our care; and to the promotion of those interests to the best in whatever way God shall provide for us to walk in.

The sounding out of Church Unity is still abroad in the land. Some disturbances rise up over the sounding of the call. And fears are entertained lest the outreach after a wider unity may lead to disruption of our own home unity. I do not share those fears. To live and let live and to help live is, I think, the real spirit pervading our Church. She accepts the truth of the maxim—*Quot homines tot sententiae*—and she does not desire to cramp and cripple spiritual aspiration and growth by Procrustean methods.

If her children will practice loyalty and cultivate love, all will be well. Loyalty, outward and in the concrete, by cordial obedience to the Prayer Book. Complete obedience strengthens and sweetens a fine sense of filial devotion. Even such a practice—in itself innocent and edifying—as singing the *Gratias Tibi* after the Gospel in the altar service is a bit of jarring discord to that filial devotion and is disallowed by it.

Then if love can come in and love can flow forth,—love for all those who accept the Lord Jesus Christ for their Savior and strive to serve Him,—love which makes allowances—love which thinketh no evil—love which is the summary of the ten commandments—love which is itself the eleventh commandment, "a new commandment I give unto you that ye love one another"—no differences over a Panama Conference shall disturb our home unity, and the out-reachings of a hearty good will to all Christian brethren shall be wonderfully promotive of the wider unity which God will smile upon and men be thankful for.

Annual Address
of the Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri.

For the year ended April 30, 1916.

*My dear Elder Brother Bishop; and dear Brethren of the Clergy
and Laity:*

It is the missionary work of that part of the Diocese which is committed to my care of which you desire that I should particularly speak.

A year ago we were able to say that no clergyman had "left the field of the Bishop Coadjutor in the past eighteen months." To-day we are able to say that since you and I began our labors together here four years ago last January, 10 presbyters and one deacon have been transferred from other dioceses to join my staff; of whom 10 continue with us, earnestly and efficiently busy at their work; one having travelled on, shortly after his arrival, to the diocese of Colorado. The first Sunday in May will add still another presbyter to our staff, from the Diocese of Bethlehem; the second Sunday in May we shall ordain a deacon and give him an assignment to a rural mission station; and we have the promise of another presbyter in the middle of June for the rural field.

Field of the Rev. J. J. Clopton.—At Illmo a chapel has been completed, in which our first service was held on the last Sunday in April. It is very small, of course, only 16x32, for our work there is in its first beginnings. The cost was a little over \$500, and is nearly paid. When I am advised that \$150 will take care of every outstanding bill, I am to give that amount which is sent to me by friends in New York.

Mr. Clopton's base is Cape Girardeau, where the people of Christ Church have added to the comfort of the rector and his family by putting a \$250 furnace in the rectory. Mr. Clopton has services every Sunday morning at Cape Girardeau, twice a month

with the faithful few at Jackson, once a month at Chaffee, once a month at Bloomfield, and once a month at Illmo.

Field of the Rev. A. E. Woodward.—In December of last year, the Frisco road moved its offices and operators and dispatchers from Thayer to Memphis. This took out of Thayer in one day five of the seven lay officers of Trinity mission and one-third of our communicants. The best solution of the difficult problem presented seemed to be to put Thayer in partnership with Poplar Bluff. Rev. Mr. Woodward, I am glad to say, has agreed to be the pastor of both congregations, with residence at Poplar Bluff, and both congregations are glad to have it so. Once a month services are also held at Doniphan.

Field of the Rev. V. O. Penley.—The interior of the church at De Soto has been vastly improved by removing the unsightly stove on the floor of the nave and substituting a fine new furnace in a basement at a cost of about \$400. Mr. Ward Cunningham, as a memorial to his dear mother, lately gone to her rest, has wainscotted the vestibule with marble, and built sidewalk and steps approaching the entrance to the church. I confidently hope that the next bit of parish improvement taken in hand may be the building of a modest and modern rectory for the kind and good and devoted rector and his family. And I hope that it may be undertaken soon. At *Fredericktown* Mr. Penley recently presented 2 for confirmation; the first confirmations since three years ago, when there was 1 candidate. At *Ironton* conditions have steadily improved under Mr. Penley's wise pastoral care.

Herculaneum.—Deaconess Sarah H. Sniffen. On November 21, I set apart Miss Sniffen as a deaconess and she has faithfully continued her good work here. During the year 30 children have been baptized and four confirmed. Books are eagerly drawn from our little library; a sewing school and a Sunday School are maintained; the League of Lay Readers has supplied Sunday services during a good part of the year. We have \$2,700 for a Deaconess House and a deed from the St. Joseph Lead Company of a lot well suited to our need. You will agree with me that it is a good sign that more than one-half of the \$2,700 for the new house comes from those who live in Herculaneum or who have investments in the smelter business there. The Deaconess' salary, \$600 per year, is also entirely provided by the people who profit spiritually, socially and physically by her ministrations.

Field of the Rev. H. L. Hoover.—St. Jude's, *Monroe City*, had the glad celebration of its Fiftieth Anniversary in October. Bishop Tuttle was present to increase the joy of the people and to bear my greetings, for I was absent in South Dakota under commission of the Presiding Bishop. One Sunday each month Mr. Hoover goes to *Canton*. The Sunday School teachers are wonderfully faithful here. One Sunday each month Mr. Hoover goes to *Shelbina*, where we have but half a dozen communicants and no church.

Overland Park.—The League of Lay Readers has supplied continuous service during the year, Rev. F. M. Weddell giving the Holy Communion each month. I am hoping to arrange that the Rev. A. P. Rein may take charge as deacon the first of June. The worship is always hearty and the Sunday School is excellent. During Lent the lads of Mr. A. N. Morton's class interested themselves in buying a most comfortable invalid chair and presenting it to the Sunshine Society as a memorial to the late Rev. John A. Dooris—a blessed charity and a memorial well worth while.

Field of the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom.—At *St. James*, Mr. Lindstrom and the people of Trinity Church delightfully cared for the meeting of the Southern Convocation in November. A circulating library, which was begun in a small way in the vestry room of the church over a year ago, supplies good books to an increasing number of patrons in *St. James*. Mr. Lindstrom has successfully introduced many attractive and helpful features into the Sunday School. During Lent an afternoon mid-week children's service secured an average attendance of 40. At *Sullivan* the congregations are increasing. In March I joined Mr. Lindstrom in a three days' mission there and confirmed 3 candidates, the first in four years. Once a month Mr. Lindstrom works east on the Frisco as far as *St. Clair*, where a few people have received him gladly.

Field of the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt.—Last year I reported that the biggest Lenten Sunday School offering from the rural field was from *Rolla*. This year *Rolla* leads the rural field in Bishop's Purse offerings, \$43.06. Thank you, *Rolla*! My missionary needs are constantly increasing. At *Cuba*, in Easter-week, I confirmed 4; the first persons I have confirmed there in four years.

Jennings.—The Rev. R. M. Hogarth has had charge here for just a year and the services are well maintained. The Sunday School, under the direction of Mr. E. W. Broemmelsiek, continues strong and steady.

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Special Missionary.—The Rev. F. M. Weddell has again rendered most helpful and efficient service to the Diocese in this work during the past year. Mr. Weddell has had in his care *Valley Park* (two Sunday services a month), *Fulton* (once a month), *Portland* (one Sunday service a month), *Sherman* (one Sunday service a month), *Overland Park* (one Sunday service a month), *Florissant* (one Sunday service a month), *Baden* (one Sunday service a month), *Bonne Terre*, *Crystal City*, and *Herculaneum*, occasionally. Beginning May 1, *Fulton* will pass into the care of the Rev. George E. Wharton, of Mexico. Beginning June 1, *Overland Park* will be the cure of the Rev. A. P. Rein. Beginning June 1, *Crystal City* and *Bonne Terre* will be the cure of the Rev. Horatio N. Tragitt, Jr. *Valley Park* was hard hit by the floods last summer, the water standing seven feet deep on the church floor. Friends helped Mr. Weddell to gather sufficient funds to repair the damage to church and furniture. Just now the glass factory is closed down and the church is suffering with the industrial depression of the town. It is difficult to prophesy what next.

Mr. Weddell has worked most untiringly and successfully. He has baptized 10 persons and presented 9 for confirmation. I feel that the spiritual results accomplished have more than emphasized the wisdom of his appointment. Mr. Weddell is greatly beloved and entirely believed in by all to whom he ministers. The Missionary Board appropriates \$900 toward his salary. The balance and the travelling expenses are paid by the places which he serves and the Bishop Coadjutor.

Moberly and Mexico.—These both are parishes and not missions. Until February of this year they were in the hands of Bishop Tuttle. In February Bishop Tuttle asked permission to transfer them to my care. The two parishes have entered into partnership and each has called as rector the Rev. George E. Wharton, rector of St. David's church, Scranton, Pa., who leaves a parish of over 300 communicants because we have urged him to come. Mr. Wharton is a graduate of Seabury Divinity School and has taken courses in the Theological Department of Yale University. Grateful to him for coming, we welcome Mr. Wharton to our staff May 1, and pray God's blessing on him and the congregations committed to his charge. The rectorship at Mexico has been vacant 15 months, that at Moberly, five years. I have assigned to Rev. Mr. Wharton also the charge of the mission at Fulton.

Kirksville.—Eight months ago the Rev. Rufus D. Putney came from Berkeley Divinity School to take charge of Kirksville, which had been without a pastor since July 1, 1910. When he came, I

gave him the names of 22 persons, all whom I could find who seemed to have any attachment to the Church. At the end of six months Mr. Putney reported that he had enrolled 41 communicants from the Osteopathic College and the Normal School; that he had enrolled 40 communicants from the city; that there were 36 supporters of the Church through the Duplex Envelope System; that sidewalk and paving bills amounting to more than \$700 had been tackled and \$200 paid on them; that \$20 of Diocesan assessments and apportionments would be paid before the meeting of this Convention; that the \$30 apportionment for General Missions would be met before September. Mr. Putney has baptized 6 persons and has presented 8 to me for confirmation. Mr. Putney writes: "In time, by careful work, the Church can be made strong in Kirksville, and the fact that we have 41 communicants in the two schools here shows the need for regular services." I feel that the Diocese owes a debt of gratitude to this man for taking hold of a proposition that would have staggered many a man, and handling it so well. And I cannot speak in too high praise of the good people of Kirksville for their willing co-operation with him who was sent to lead them in the things they hoped to do. They are *at* his back and not *on* his back. I have been there several times and I have seen. By the good blessing of God, I have every reason to hope that a new church will stand on our corner lot in Kirksville in another year. It is sorely needed.

Coming in from the rural field let me speak of some points in St. Louis.

Baden.—At two Conventions I have reported to you that Sister Miriam had a Sunday School away out at the northern terminus of the Broadway car line. During the past year, the little, unattractive, inaccessible upstairs flat where the venture began has been outgrown and we now have the exclusive use of a well-located and attractive chapel in the 8000 block on the Hall's Ferry Road. The chapel is given us rent free by a congregation of Presbyterians who no longer have need of it. Sister Miriam rents an humble flat in the midst of the people and daily passes in and out among them, doing good. Mrs. Scott, of St. George's, who plays the organ, and Mr. and Mrs. Lonsdale, of St. Mary's, have helped much in the work of the Sunday School. We have increased the curriculum by appointing the Rev. F. M. Weddell to have Evening Prayer two Sundays in a month. The first Sunday in May of this year I shall be asked to confirm 10 persons at Baden, the first class ever presented there, the God-given increase of a tiny seed cast in two years ago.

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St. Luke's, Harney Heights.—Almost at the northern terminus of the Union car line, the Rev. R. M. Hogarth and I spent two or three days prospecting in May of a year ago. Encouraged by finding a number of individuals fond of the Church and belonging to the Church, whose nearest church was more than 20 blocks away, Mr. Hogarth rented a small cottage in Harney Heights and held the first service in it last August. In less than eight months the necessity was apparent to enlarge the place of our tent. Mr. Hogarth and his men and women got busy; an excellent corner lot close by was bargained for; a three-year-old portable chapel which had cost new \$1,200 was bought on easy terms and moved; I have organized the congregation into St. Luke's Mission (it had been Grace Mission, unorganized) and on Palm Sunday we held our first service in the newly acquired chapel and I confirmed a class of 11. Splendidly successful has this venture been. Our lot and building represent an investment of \$1,350. \$250 was granted by the Missionary Board; \$600 was subscribed by the congregation and generous friends in St. Louis; and there is an unpaid balance of \$550 which the members of the mission will gradually whittle off. St. Luke's, as soon as the new chapel was occupied, voted to raise \$100 toward a minister's stipend, and I have appointed Rev. Mr. Hogarth to have charge in connection with *St. Timothy's*, St. Louis, and *Jennings*.

Epiphany.—The Rev. Wm. L. Essex in charge. On Palm Sunday night I confirmed here a class of 31, the biggest class I have yet confirmed in Missouri. It was evident that the class had been carefully and prayerfully prepared. Every seat in the chapel was filled and all standing room was occupied. Mr. Essex and I often express the hope that Epiphany may not lose the opportunities that are crowding thick about it for the want of a bigger building and a more adequate equipment.

In *St. Augustine's*, the Rev. J. H. Harvey in charge, this year has been the best year, I think, since I came to the Diocese. Two or three times during the year I have spoken to the congregation of the splendid help that a parish house would be. Expert laymen from the larger city parishes have also been over to St. Augustine's to talk parish house. I hope that the thing may soon be taken up and carried through. I am sure that with a little more good team work the way and the means thereto could be figured out. The land to build on is already ours, and there is a fund of about \$500 in bank.

St. Stephen's, the Rev. H. W. Mizner in charge, and *Grace-Holy Cross*, the Rev. G. F. Taylor in charge, continue to be generously assisted by friends in all parts of the city who are specially interested in the special kind of work that they are set to do. It is gratifying to see that each congregation is making steady progress in the matter of self-help. If I have accurately handled the figures for *St. Stephen's* "in the City" and "in the Hills", which were available last May, about 18 per cent. of the total budget (\$9,000)* was provided through gifts and collections and offerings of those who consider *St. Stephen's* their place of worship. The finances of *Grace-Holy Cross* are managed by a corporation through its officers, Messrs. F. C. Whittemore, E. S. Gatch, and J. E. Williams, 37 per cent. of the total amount raised for *Grace-Holy Cross* (\$5,300) for the year just ended, was provided through the gifts and collections and offerings of the people who worship at *Holy Cross Mission*. You will be interested to know that the corporation has taken a considerable forward step in the past two years in collecting funds and pledges toward the erection of a hospital to be maintained in connection with the work of *Grace-Holy Cross*.

The Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church.—At a recent meeting of the Committee, steps were taken looking toward the purchase of a suitable site for the building. Entirely by the efforts of the Rev. L. H. White, \$8,600 is now in bank and there are reliable pledges and assets of over \$14,000 besides. Mr. White is faithfully trying to do his duty by the congregation of *St. Mary's Mission* while he is also the recognized field agent for the *Commemorative Church*. I feel that the Diocese owes him thanks for the thing that he is undertaking to accomplish for the Diocese. I hope that Church folk here and everywhere will enable him to reach the \$50,000 mark, so that at least the ground may be staked out for the new church while the General Convention is assembled here to do honor to the Bishop of Missouri and Presiding Bishop.

League of Lay Readers.—I give grateful thanks for a total of 182 services rendered during the past year in my portion of the

field as contrasted with 92 of the year before. A pretty considerable gain! This has meant many busy, self-sacrificing Sundays for many members of the League, all of whom are busy business and professional men in the city of St. Louis. The efficient Director of these activities during the year has been Mr. Augustus P. Rein, who after the 1st of May will be on Missouri's clergy staff in Deacon's orders.

Missionary to City Institutions.—The year's work has been heavier than ever before and it has been splendidly done. The Rev. John Howard Lever, who will give you his report to-morrow, superintends the work. He has been a father to the fatherless and a refuge to the needy in his distress. I think he will tell you how the getting of moving picture machines in several of the institutions has practically turned out of doors methods of discipline which had formerly been considered indispensable. Mr. Lever and his associates, appointive and volunteer, are setting a high standard of excellence in a field which is limitless in opportunities of showing wisdom and mercy and loving kindness, and we thank them gratefully.

The Woman's Auxiliary.—I am thankful to the Travelling Secretary for visits that she has made to several of my congregations and for the new zeal in missionary work that has been stimulated by her presence. Through a member of the Auxiliary, I have received \$60 this year for my work, and I give my thanks.

Apportionment for General Missions.—Last year I earnestly begged that this obligation might be fully met. It was met and \$1,100 overpaid, and I give grateful thanks to all who helped. I hope that we may not be found a penny behind in our apportionment in this year of the General Convention here.

Last autumn the Laymen's Forward Movement crossed the map from ocean to ocean, and a strong team paused in St. Louis and held missionary meetings which stirred the souls of those of us who attended. In two or three of our parishes real results of the Movement have been conserved, for which I give thanks. But I must voice my regret that a most unusual opportunity of strengthening and developing the missionary output of the laity of our Church in St. Louis came so near to being wholly lost through the failure of Bishops and other clergy and laity to co-operate at just

the flood tide of the Movement. I do not censure anyone. But I do record my deep regret.

The following have been licensed as Lay Readers: Mr. George A. Randolph, Mr. C. L. von Renthel, Mr. Geo. Eschmann, Mr. Gerald Persens, Mr. Henry N. O'Connor, Mr. A. G. Lonsdale, Mr. E. W. Broemmelsiek, Mr. Wm. L. Duncan, Mr. Chas. Sparks.

I ordained deacon, June 6, 1915, Horatio N. Tragitt, Jr., who has spent the past year in theological studies at Sewanee, and will be in charge of Crystal City and Bonne Terre after the middle of June.

Confirmations by the Bishop Coadjutor for the year were 198. Of these 4 were for Bishop Tuttle. Bishop Tuttle confirmed 7 in my field. Total for my field this year, 201, as against 197 the year before.

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism I have administered to 14 infants and 3 adults.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper I have administered on 32 occasions.

I have officiated at 2 burials.

My offerings for Bishop's Purse are 25 per cent. bigger than they were a year ago, which I must interpret to mean an awakened interest among my congregations in the work of the Church in our own Diocese.

Money Raising Schemes.—There is no surer way to blight the spiritual life of a congregation and to postpone the day of generous, glad givings, each according to his ability, for church support, than short and easy popular schemes for getting money into the Church's treasury. We all know how manifold these short and easy schemes and methods are. Twice this year I have been consulted as to whether or not one or another of my congregations might "put on" a mock marriage to get quick money for the Church. As though the Church needed to do anything of that sort to put the family and the home in greater jeopardy than they already are! And I said: No, it can't be done with my consent. Ought we not, before we yield to the temptation to resort to this, that, or the other get-money-easy method of replenishing the treasury of the Church, ought we not to look away to Him who is the Church's one Foundation and her Chief Corner Stone, ought we not to look away to Him and to

"Count each sacred wound
In hands and feet and side,"

the sacrifice He made to give the Church to us! Ought we not to pause and to remind ourselves that

"From heaven He came and sought her
To be His holy bride,"

and that He depends on us to help Him to keep her without spot or wrinkle or any such thing!

Missionary Stipends.—The Convention dealt generously with the Missionary Board last year. I am anxious that again this year the Missionary Board may have a sufficient amount so that there may be no necessity of reducing the stipend of any man in the field. President Hyde of Bowdoin College has this to say about college instructors in a letter to the *New York Nation*, April 20: "The good college instructor should combine six qualities: sound health, high character, thorough scholarship, genial personality, artistic appreciation, and contagious enthusiasm. The experienced president is willing to hunt for six months or a year to find the man who combines in happy proportion the whole six, or at least four or five of these essentials." I long ago made up my mind that the Church's mission field will respond to the touch of the man for whom the bishop, like the college president, "is willing to hunt for six months or a year." And when our hunting is rewarded by our finding, the wisest thing that we can do with our good man is to keep him in our field and to do all that we can reasonably and rightly do to give him the benefit of his success.

You will have discovered from my address that I make mention of *two new chapels* built this year. These, added to that at Overland Park, make only three in four years. I am not headstrong for scattering churches and chapels all over rural Missouri. Not until the people of a town are ready to put their own selves into the work of building and furnishing, and into the joy of using, ought churches and chapels to be built, it seems to me. Some of us read in April in the *Saturday Evening Post* an editorial on Public Libraries to this effect:

"Mr. Carnegie has sprinkled our fair land with nice little buildings, well constructed, lighted, ventilated and arranged, each with a tablet over the door announcing that it is a public library, and a tablet within commemorating the donor. Nothing is lacking in these buildings except books and people reading them. . . . A handsome building, with nothing on its shelves but a dog-eared set of Mary J. Holmes' novels and some state horticultural reports, is

no more a library than a like building containing a heterogeneous collection of second-hand tin pans is a hardware shop." These words may well be a warning in the matter of building churches in rural fields. A building may look entirely like a church and yet not be a church at all. Let us first make sure that there are lively stones to be builded up along with the fabric, a spiritual temple acceptable unto the Lord!

With thanks to Bishop Tuttle, to the other clergy, and to the laity for many kindnesses during the year past, I go back to the work to which you called me.

APPENDIX No. 13.

Report of Committee on a Nation-Wide Preaching Mission.

Your committee to whom was given the responsibility of carrying out the plan of the Joint Commission on a Nation-Wide Preaching Mission, desires to report that they were unable to accomplish all that was in their hearts. They greatly desired to have a mission in every parish and mission in the Diocese, but many things were in the way. "A great and effectual door" was not opened to them; for either the expense was too heavy, or the time inopportune, or the missionary could not be obtained; but some things were accomplished.

Missions were held in the following churches: Holy Innocents, St. Paul's, St. John's, Holy Communion, Ascension, St. George's, St. Peter's, and the Redeemer.

Thousands of people heard the Gospel preached, preached with special fervor and effectiveness; hundred of people were gathered into praying bands, both in homes and churches; and at the Church of the Holy Communion, a children's mission of peculiar interest and power was conducted by Father Huntington and Brother Abishai, and the seed has been faithfully sown, and it shall bring forth in some thirty, in some sixty, and in some a hundred fold. "Paul may plant, and Apollos may water, but God giveth the increase."

But what of the future? This committee is of the opinion that the past skirmishing in mission work is but a preparation for some really effective missionary effort. The clergy of the city should now be in good condition to conduct missions in any part of the Diocese. A week given here and there in consecrated labor would prove a blessing to the missionary, and a benediction to many a struggling parish, or mission station. We must begin to realize that the Diocese is one, and we must work for the corporate well-being of the whole Church. Some definite plans ought to be laid and carried out for special work during the first two weeks of Advent, during the Epiphany season, and again next Lent, making a direct attack upon the powers of evil, and seeking to bring many into the kingdom of God. A "one to win one" campaign would enlarge in a wonderful measure our confirmation classes.

Look over your Convention Journal reports, and see what a lot of useless material we have under the name "non-active communicants." A Christian "non-active" is a contradiction in terms. St. Paul accomplished wonders even when he was "the prisoner of the Lord." We must enforce upon all the admonition of the Master, "Work while it is called day, the night cometh when no man can work." It is ours to lay upon the souls of men not only the privileges of those who belong to "the household of faith," but also the duties and obligations of such relation.

We therefore offer the following resolution:

That a Committee on Diocesan Mission Services be appointed by the chair and charged with the work of a Diocese-wide Preaching Mission.

In submitting this report, we desire to call attention to the progress made. At the beginning of the year we had a mailing list of 688, the present list of 787 shows a gain of 99, exclusive of the extra copies ordered by the Publicity Committee of the General Convention.

At the beginning of the year, we inherited a debt of \$196.50 from the preceding year, which has been paid. This showing is possible in no small degree by the generosity of our Editor, Rev. J. C. Jones, who relinquished his stipend of \$150.00 as a contribution to The Church News this year, and also to the activity of our late Business Manager, Mr. W. A. Blodgett. We regret exceedingly that Mr. Blodgett's business has made a change of address to New York City necessary, consequently he was compelled to resign as Business Manager.

Our best thanks are due to him and to our Editor, Rev. J. C. Jones, for their able work during the year. The Committee also desires to put on record its indebtedness to Mr. A. J. Barrett for keeping the books and in other ways assisting the Committee throughout the year.

At the beginning of the year, our advertising contracts had a value of "Nothing"—to-day, they are valued at over \$200.00.

For the coming year in which the General Convention is to be held in our city, we anticipate extraordinary expenses, and we think it wise at this time to bring to the attention of this Convention, the following data and recommendation:

1st—Based on an average of 24 pages, 800 copies each issue, the cost of 12 months will be a minimum of \$77.92.

Mailing, \$5.16, the average cost per issue \$83.08, subject to a further increase due to rise in paper value.

On a basis of 20 pages, 875 copies, the cost has been \$71.11; mailing \$5.80, average cost per issue \$76.91, 24 pages for 12 months will total \$996.96; cost of 12 issues, 20 pages, \$922.92.

The clerk hire has been \$100.00.

Half tone cuts will cost about \$50.00 additional.

The Editor's salary this year will be \$150.00.

Incidentals about \$10.00.

Total estimated cost will be \$1,306.96.

Our income, exclusive of Diocesan grant, will be about \$800.00, leaving a deficit of \$506.96.

The Publicity Committee of the Convention has agreed to pay for all extra copies printed for advertising purposes, but this is not an asset to us—as we furnish them at cost.

We would, therefore, respectfully recommend that any extra cost involved by the General Convention be made up either by the General Convention Publicity Committee, or by the Diocese of Missouri.

In conclusion, we desire to thank the Woman's Auxiliary particularly for the good work done in the matter of increasing our subscription list—the increase is mainly due to the activity of the women. Also thanks are due to the clergy of the Diocese for promptly sending in their lists of possible new subscribers.

We have to thank the Convention of the Diocese for its gift of \$525.00 of the past year, one-third of which was expended in wiping out a deficit of the year previous.

Our Committee realizes that much work must yet be done to put the paper on a self-supporting basis, but it is glad that it has been able to make some progress in the past year towards this desired goal.

APPENDIX No. 15.

Church School of Religious Instruction.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The sessions of the Church School of Religious Instruction for 1915-1916 began on Thursday evening, October 7th, in St. Peter's Parish House. This marked the inception of the third year's work. The attendance was encouraging, one hundred thirty-three persons being present. Seventeen regular sessions were held and the school had its Commencement service in St. Peter's Church on Thursday evening, February 24th. Addresses on Religious Education were made by our two Bishops and by the Rev. James Wise; and certificates were presented to those members of the school who had passed examinations in the various courses.

No one can doubt the importance and usefulness of the Church School in the life of the Diocese. It means better teachers in our Sunday Schools, more intelligent Churchmen among the laity, a fuller education for our children, and the contribution by the Church in Missouri of interest and thought and prayer to the problems of religious education which confront the whole American Church. The faculty, too, are benefitted by the study and teaching which they give to the school.

The following courses were given during the winter and they had the enrollments indicated:

"Old Testament"—The Rev. Dr. Phillips, Instructor. Enrollment. 44.

"Gospels and the Life of Christ"—The Rev. John S. Bunting, Instructor. Enrollment 25.

"Apostolic Church" (Seven sessions)—The Rev. Chas F. Blaisdell, Instructor. Enrollment 3.

"Church History"—The Rev. John H. Lever, Instructor. Enrollment 11.

"Prayer Book and the Christian Year"—The Rev. George F. Taylor, Instructor. Enrollment 19.

"Religious Pedagogy"—The Rev. James Wise, Instructor. Enrollment 30.

"Missions and Social Service"—The Rev. Henry W. Mizner, Instructor. Enrollment 17.

This gave an enrollment of one hundred forty-nine, and of these thirty-eight persons also attended the conferences given by the Rev. B. T. Kemerer for all the Sunday School teachers of the city in the primary grades and in classes taking the Christian Nurture courses. In all, fifty persons enrolled for the conferences. Therefore, the total enrollment of individuals for the school's activities was one hundred seventy-one, including the officers and teachers. The average weekly attendance was one hundred one.

An attempt was made during the autumn of 1915 to encourage the extension of the school throughout the Diocese. The Rev. B. T. Kemerer was appointed to do this, and by personal visits to Palmyra, Hannibal, and Macon, he succeeded in enlisting two dozen students in correspondence courses.

Following the close of the school the Rev. Mr. Lever gave an interesting stereopticon lecture on Church History on Thursday night, March 2d, at St. George's Chapel.

At a meeting of the faculty, held at St. Peter's Rectory on Wednesday, March 1st, it was decided to enlarge the teaching staff and to offer several new courses in 1916-1917. The present form of the new plan follows:

Principal, the Rev. Henry W. Mizner.

"Old Testament"—The Rev. George E. Norton.

"The Canon of the New Testament, and Studies in Early Christian Literature"—The Rev. Z. B. Phillips, D.D.

"The Prayer Book"—The Rev. J. Courtney Jones.

"Church History"—The Rev. John H. Lever.

"Religious Pedagogy"—The Rev. James Wise.

"Missions and Social Service"—The Rev. Arthur Brittain.

"The Ways and Teachings of the Church"—The Rev. George F. Taylor.

"Problems in Christian Leadership"—The Rev. Chas. F. Blaisdell.

"Sunday School Teachers' Conferences"—The Rev. B. T. Kemerer.

The school night was changed from Thursday to Friday, and St. Peter's Parish House was accepted as the place for the sessions.

The School of Religious Instruction should have the consecrated interest of three hundred or more of the laymen and laywomen of the city. Several cities have followed our lead in this work. If everyone who hears and reads this report will do his duty toward making education Christian and toward making Christians educated religiously we shall have next year the largest and best school in the land.

APPENDIX No. 16.

Report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

*To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.
Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:*

The following report is offered as a survey of the Sunday School work in this Diocese. The report deals solely with the Sunday School section of the general work of religious education. Your Committee endeavored to ascertain facts and figures showing actual conditions in the various Sunday Schools in the Diocese. As a rule reports are printed in the Diocesan Journal, but as there are always parishes which make inadequate reports and some who totally refrain from making any returns, it was necessary for your Committee to endeavor to obtain independent statistical returns.

The Committee regrets to report to this Convention that even in this special survey, it has found a deplorable lack of interest and want of appreciation on the part of some of the clergy as to the importance of this work. Responses to the inquiries have been inadequate. Out of sixty-five questionnaires sent out, thirty-seven replies have been received and twenty-nine of these answered the questions.

There are, at present, no means of determining accurately the following items, to-wit:

- (a) How many children between 1 and 20 years are on the parish lists.
- (b) Whether the enrollment figures represent actual recent attendance, or names carried during many months of absence, even sometimes from year to year.
- (c) What kind of teaching, or how much of it, the children, once gathered in Sunday School, receive.
- (d) The qualifications of teachers for their position.
- (e) What expenditure of money the Parish invests in the information training of its youth.

Such items as the above must be at hand before any adequate estimate can be made of the parochial conditions of religious education in any diocese.

The Method of Inquiry.

A questionnaire and a letter were sent to each rector explaining the survey and asking co-operation.

General Parish Statistics.

In the *Living Church Annual* of 1916 we find the following statistics:

Number of parishes and missions in this Diocese	65
Number of communicants	8749
Number of Sunday School pupils	4333
Number of Sunday School teachers	513

In the survey of the Province of the Mid-west it was discovered that the average number of children per home was 2.1. This would seem to dis-

close a very low birth rate among Church families. The proportion of pupils to communicants is 49.5 per cent. Hence, in making such comparison between the number of pupils and the number of communicants it is observed that either one of two things has happened in our Diocese:

- (a) The birth rate is alarmingly low, or
- (b) Church people are not doing their duty in sending their children to receive religious education.

I. The Table of School Support.

Two parishes report that they would change this method of support and secure funds through the parish budget.

Particular mention should be made of the reply sent in from St. Augustine's Mission. "The Sunday School is 'The Child' of the parish; therefore the business committee pays all the expenses of the Sunday School."

This last should be the method to be adopted in each Sunday School in the Diocese.

What would happen to our secular schools, if they were dependent for their program upon the pennies of the children?

Thirteen parishes do *not* know the amount spent for lesson material in 1913-1914.

The average expenditure for lesson material in the Province of the Mid-west is 51 cents per pupil. Comparing these two sets of figures we note that out of a total expense of \$1,902.87, \$545.10, or 93 cents per pupil, only 31 cents are used for lesson material, leaving the balance, 62 cents, used presumably for the pupil's entertainment, or at least for purposes not educational.

III. Table showing Disposal of Sunday School Offerings.

In reply to the question, "Who determines what use shall be made of the pupils' offerings?" one parish answers with a question mark.

Your Committee believes that the proper theory of training a child to give, involves its being allowed to make a choice, even if within limits, of how his offering shall be used. This table shows that in the great majority of instances the choice is made for him, and therefore his training is to that extent faulty.

IV. Table showing Length of Teaching Period.

The Committee are glad to note that the average teaching period is forty minutes. St. Paul's at Ironton stated, "Until we are finished."

V. Table showing Limitation of Teachers to Grades.

Efficiency in teaching demands that a teacher be limited to a certain field—the returns show that the days are numbered when any one teacher is allowed to advance with the class through all the grades in a school.

The discouraging feature about this table is the fewness of teachers who have had any special training for their work. The encouraging feature is the large fraction who have enjoyed more than a high school education.

This table shows that about one teacher out of every four has taught but one year (a very limited experience). It also shows, by the drop after the 3 and 4 years term, that many leave their work after that time has elapsed and that of those who stay longer the majority stay very much longer. One out of every four teachers is a "standby".

VIII. Table showing Sex of Teachers.

About 33 per cent. of the women teachers are teaching boys. The Committee would very strongly urge the number of men teachers be increased for the handling of boy pupils.

It is thus seen that over 50 per cent. of the teachers are over 30 years of age.

X. *Table showing Character of Gains and Losses.*

Your Committee had hoped that it would be possible to make a tabulation showing character of gains and losses among the pupils. Because of the absence of information received on these points this vital statistic cannot be furnished.

XI. *Table showing Confirmation Percentages.*

The Committee had hoped to be able to furnish a tabulation showing confirmation percentages; but they are unable to do so because in most cases the replies to the questionnaire do not show how many children of confirmation age are in the schools.

XII. *Table of Font Rolls.*

One city mission in reply to the question as to whether they had a Font or Cradle Roll replied, "Font Roll by all means. There is no room for any 'cradles' in the Church. The sleeping is done by the older members of the Church during the sermons."

The Font Roll is so effective a feeder to the Sunday School, that it is a pity so few schools have adopted this plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.

1. That the support of Sunday Schools by parish funds be urged with the understanding that pupils are trained to give, in part at least, to parish support. In this way both the parish and the school fulfill their respective educational responsibilities.
2. That 50 cents per pupil be considered a reasonable expenditure per annum for the buying of proper educational material.
3. That a greater amount of choice be given the Sunday School pupil in the objects for which he makes his offering at Sunday School.
4. That teachers in the Sunday School be limited at least to the grades of one department.
5. That a stronger effort be made to bring about the more adequate training of teachers.
6. That all Sunday Schools of the Diocese be urged to establish a Font Roll and also a point of graduation.
7. That no name of an absent pupil be kept on a Sunday School roll for more than six weeks unless for good and urgent reasons.
8. That a uniform system of records for keeping Sunday School data be prepared for the Diocese.

St. Luke's Mission at Harney Heights, which was granted permission by the Board to organize as a mission at its meeting of March 3, 1916, made application to the Board to appropriate the sum of \$250.00 toward paying for a lot upon which to place its building. The Board made this appropriation on condition that the Mission raise an additional sum of \$250.00 for the same purpose.

The mission has raised this sum purchased a lot and the appropriation of the Board has been paid toward the purchase price of the lot.

The following appropriations have been made, to take effect when the missionary appointed begins his work.

The Board will need the sum of \$10,645.00 for the purpose of maintaining the missionary work in the Diocese, as the work is now being done. But the Secretary has been requested to lay before the Convention the importance, in fact the necessity, of adding \$1,500.00 to this sum, \$1,200.00 of the latter to be used for the development of the Church's work in the City Institutions, and \$300.00 for the development of the work of St. Andrew's, this city.

Report of Missionary to City Institutions.

Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson, and Gentlemen of the Convention.

This report of the Mission to City Institutions covers the work done from May 1, 1915, to May 1, 1916.

Our work now is done in nine institutions instead of eight, namely, Sanitarium, Infirmary, City Hospital, Jail, Workhouse, Industrial School, Koch Tuberculosis Hospital, Convalescent Home and Bellefontaine Farm, making altogether a parish of about five thousand souls, men, women and children. The total number of visits made by the missionary and the three assistants to institutions and to individuals this year was two thousand six hundred and ninety-six, an increase over last year of nearly 100. It should also be remembered that we count a visit to an institution as one visit, although in the course of that one visit we may talk with anywhere from five to fifty people. The number of services held was five hundred and sixteen, also an increase of nearly one hundred over last year. There were sixteen baptisms, three confirmations, one marriage, two funerals and the missionary was interested in eighteen paroles. We have been very cautious this year about confirmations, because we have found that the lure of the loaves and fishes was very often the sole motive actuating those who desired to be confirmed.

Miss Hofman now visits the Sanitarium, Infirmary, Koch Hospital and the women in the Jail and Workhouse, and you may judge the quality of the work she does by the remark of one of the highest officials in the city government that he considered her one of the most intelligent women he had ever met. It is due to Miss Hofman that our Church has the recognition that it has at the Infirmary and Koch Hospital. Mr. Pomeroy has continued to bear the burden of the services at the Infirmary and every time the missionary takes those services himself he marvels at the patience and constancy and devotion of a layman who willingly gives up three Sunday afternoons a month to that exhausting work. Mr. Jones, of All Saints' parish, holds two services a month in the colored men's ward and they miss him if he doesn't come. At Koch during the past winter we have given entertainments about once a month in connection with the moving picture show, singers, instrumentalists, and readers being taken down to Koch in the missionary's automobile. Mr. Merrill, often at great personal inconvenience, has relieved the missionary once a month at the Sanitarium, and Mr. Rein has generously served at the Convalescent Home.

The average attendance at the Sunday services in the City Hospital has increased remarkably this year. Few services have had less than eighty, in spite of the fact that a patient leaves the hospital nearly as soon as he can walk. The climax was reached on Easter Day when one hundred and forty-two were present. The Rev. Mr. Cox and Mr. Freegard have contributed their time every month to these services. It can be said of Mrs. Holmes and her work that she never seems to tire of it and that apparently she is just as much interested in the latest case and just as enthusiastic as she was in the first one she ever undertook. Deaconess Brainerd, working in the mothers' and babies' ward of the hospital, has been called an angel of light, and that is no hyperbole. Her work has been truly remarkable and we should count ourselves fortunate in having her in that ward. Great as the opportunity is to make an impression upon thirty mothers and so indirectly upon their children every month, Deaconess Brainerd has not only met the opportunity but she has made it greater.

A feature of the services for the girls at the Industrial School has been the assistance of the Girls' Friendly Society of St. Philip's Church. Every Sunday two or three girls have gone down to help Deaconess Brainerd with the singing and in this way the Girls' Friendly has become interested in special cases. The members of that society also provided Christmas presents for all the girls in the school. Through the generosity of the Church of St. Michael and All Angels' every boy in the school was allowed to write on a slip of paper just what he wanted for Christmas and on Christmas Day each present was ready, all beautifully tied up and marked with the boy's name. It was a great joy to the missionary and to the rector and children of St. Michael's Church, as well as to the boys of the school, to distribute those gifts, but it was also pathetic to find that many of the boys had no more ambitious desire than to have a ball of twine out of which to make reins. This did not satisfy the children who gave the presents and in every case the boy who asked only for twine found something more in his package. The Sunday School of Emmanuel, Webster, helped toward the moving pictures and slides.

Our work now covers not only the institutions in the city and not only Koch Hospital, ten miles south of the city, but it also reaches twenty miles north of the city to the new Industrial School, or Bellefontaine Farm, where we hold services every week when the condition of the road is favorable. As the old Industrial School has long been a shame and an eyesore, so this new group of cottages, three at present, though the ultimate aim is ten, each costing \$25,000, is in every way a credit to the city. Do you realize the significance of the price of each cottage—\$25,000? That means hardwood floors, tiles, beautiful furnishings, open fireplaces, all that makes a home attractive. I have heard it said that it was a great mistake to build such costly cottages, as it only made the boys discontented when they returned to their individual homes. Yet so far as I can see there is nothing

in those cottages to which every human being on this earth is not entitled—sanitary plumbing, light and airy rooms, solid and beautiful though simple furniture, is there any one who would if the choice lay with him deny to anyone else those necessities of a clean and well-ordered life? And if those boys must come back some day to sordid and filthy surroundings, whose fault is it if not ours who permit such conditions to exist? Instead of an extravagance does not that beautiful school represent to us a challenge to raise the level of the ordinary home to meet that ideal?

Through an arrangement with the Church Federation the services other than Roman Catholic in the new City Jail have been given over entirely to our Church and we hold a weekly service beside the visits of the missionary and Miss Hofman. The exceedingly small number of men in the Jail this winter as compared with last year bears out the theory that if a man can get a good, steady, paying job there is mighty little chance of his getting into trouble.

You may recall that during the last few years our Church through Miss Hofman has been instrumental in securing two moving picture machines, one for the Infirmary and one for Koch. During this last year we have given a machine to the Workhouse, chiefly through the generosity of the Rector and Sunday School of St. Philip's Church. The rheostat was given by the Business Men's League. Not only this, but a regular show is provided every week by the Business Men's League and the manager of the Mutual Film Company. And this moving picture machine has worked a revolution in the methods of discipline at the Workhouse. Now when a man goes down he is given a red ticket which entitles him to all privileges, such as the movies, church services, library and recreation periods, and he holds that ticket as long as his conduct is good. When his conduct is not good he loses the ticket and remains in his cell. This does away with solitary confinement, bread and water, Oregon boot and all the other contrivances once thought so necessary in prison management. And the movie machine has made all this possible; for I regret to say that those men would much rather miss the church services than the movie shows. A night school has also been started for which we were instrumental in securing books from the Board of Education.

More parole officers have been appointed for the Circuit Courts this year, so that the missionary can now, as he ought to, concentrate on looking after men when they are released. I want, however, to say that the conviction has grown on me that with new institutions and new methods for the treatment of delinquents there must come longer and longer sentences to such institutions. Given a good institution like an industrial farm, which we shall have in this city before very long, it will be worse than useless for judges to give short sentences. The sentences must be longer than ever before, which will seem to be severity but is really only sensible. Long sentences, long-continued supervision, difficulty in securing paroles,

and absolute fairness in granting such paroles—this must be the program when we have an industrial farm.

Just a word about music at the services in the institutions. I wish I had the time to name all the singers and instrumentalists who have added so much to the services in all the institutions. Hardly a Sunday goes by that the missionary does not have with him a soloist or a duet or even a quartette, and these singers and violinists have been the very finest in this city. The climax was reached twice this year, Christmas and Easter, when a quartette sang in the institutions—on Christmas at all the institutions except Koch, and at Easter, through the generosity of the Rev. Dr. Phillips, at the Sanitarium, Workhouse and City Hospital, and their singing made a profound impression. At the Jail part of the choir of the Church of the Holy Communion sang one Saturday afternoon, which is an illustration of the ready help the missionary has received whenever he has asked for singers. It means added work for the automobile—for instance, on Easter Day the missionary was at home only one hour from seven-thirty in the morning to eight-thirty in the evening, but the pleasure and inspiration are worth all they cost in time and money. Miss O'Neill, Mrs. Kuhlman, Mr. Kettler, Mr. Rieder, Miss Hatch and a group from Holy Innocents' have been more than faithful throughout the year, in fact the Rev. Mr. Duckworth informs me that I have enjoyed the services of his assistant more than he has. But I see no reason why it should not generally be known that if one desires to hear a particularly beautiful solo or duet or quartette he must secure admission to the Insane Asylum or Workhouse or Jail.

Now all this work costs money, and we have received money this year most generously. The missionary has been invited to address all the congregations in and near St. Louis except St. Peter's, St. John's and St. Paul's, with the following result: Christ Church Cathedral, \$152.35; Grace Church, Kirkwood, \$104.40; Church of the Holy Communion, \$65.36; Church of St. Michael and All Angels, \$62.00; Church of St. Philip the Apostle, \$45.00; St. Agnes' Guild of St. George's, \$41.25; Church of the Ascension, \$35.18; Church of the Redeemer, \$34.31; Diocesan Junior Auxiliary, \$30; St. Mary's Guild and Sunday School of St. Peter's, \$29.50; Trinity Church, \$15.02; St. Timothy's, \$11.80; St. George's, \$11.45; Mt. Calvary, \$10.50; All Saints', \$9.00; Sunday School of Emmanuel Church, Webster, \$6.50; St. Thomas' Mission, \$5.00; St. Stephen's, Ferguson, \$3.45; St. Stephen's, \$2.75; Woman's Auxiliary of Holy Cross, \$2.00. Total, \$676.82. Received from individuals, not otherwise credited, \$645.57. Total received this year \$1,322.39. Balance May 1, 1915, \$139.04. Grand total, \$1,461.43. Expenditures: transportation, \$618.86; direct aid, \$435.04; miscellaneous expenses, \$356.81. Total, \$1,410.71. Balance May 1, 1916, \$50.72. That is we have received nearly \$100 more this year than last, but our balance is about \$100 less this year than last. That indicates that we are spending more money now than we were last year, and that is true. Why shouldn't we be spending more

money than we were when the work is ten per cent. greater than it was? But in the face of this ever-increasing work we have a system of finance which is unsatisfactory and which is breaking down under the strain. Can anyone think of any other parish in our Church numbering 5,000 souls which pretends to carry on its work for \$1,200.00 a year? In some parishes the sexton alone gets as much as that. And the assistants in this work regularly every month, take money out of their own pockets for the work expecting to be repaid at the end of the month. That expectation so far has been fulfilled, but it is absolutely unjust that we should make them use their own money for even one month. Deserving cases are neglected because we do not have the money when we need it. The expenses of the work are regular and definite, but the income is haphazard. Therefore I most earnestly hope that the \$1,200.00 that will be asked for through the Committee on Assessments will be granted. The extra burden will not be any heavier on any parish than it is now and only the stronger parishes will be asked to assume it. In this way a fairly regular income will be assured. The missionary will be available as now for each parish one Sunday morning in the year to present the work, but if that particular Sunday should be stormy it will not as it does now cost the missionary real money. Of course \$1,200.00 is not sufficient, but the missionary believes he can be responsible for whatever deficit there may be.

And there is another matter involving money. As you know, there used to be two men engaged in this work. Now, with nine institutions and with the work growing every week one man is expected to carry it on. But I assure you he doesn't do it. The missionary is rapidly become expert in the art of mental gymnastics, which consists in the ability to run away from work without any feeling of remorse. During the summer months, through the generosity of Bishop Tuttle and Bishop Johnson, a man assistant has been engaged, but that of course is only temporary and uses money which is needed elsewhere. Now what I want to do is this:: I want some small parish or mission in or near St. Louis to be placed in my charge. I would then engage a clergyman to help in this work, using the money paid by the parish for his salary. At the same time I would rent a farm and use it as the home of the assistant and also as a convalescent home for men. And if we succeed in this I am hopeful that our Convalescent Home for Women would be moved to that farm. I am confident that such a farm could easily be made self-supporting. You see we would kill a good many birds with one stone. There would be a man assistant, the parish would have a clergyman with much less expense than it could secure a man, and we would have a convalescent home for men.

These two plans then, the new system of finance and the man assistant, I consider immediately necessary. I am not fussy or disposed to be zealous for details and I shall cheerfully amend those plans if necessary. But there are two things I will not do. I shall not, because I cannot, carry

the work through another winter with a treasury around the zero mark simply because we haven't common sense enough to use the generosity of the people of the Diocese in a rational and scientific way. Nor can the work as it is at present be carried only by one man. The only alternative to a second man is the curtailment of the work, and I cannot agree to that. One institution demands of us just as much as another and we have no right to draw the line anywhere.

I have been frank because the need is great. I do not come to this Convention asking for more money than the people of this Diocese have given in the past, but I do come asking the clerical and lay delegates to go back to their parishes determined that this work shall be no longer strangled. Honestly, now, you wouldn't give a picayune for a man who simply told you pleasant things about this work, how it is growing, how the lives of men and women and children are being in all cases brightened and in some cases saved, how officials in and out of the institutions repeatedly express their admiration and respect for a Church, small as ours is compared with certain other Christian bodies, which has the generosity and the large-heartedness to send her missionaries not only to her own children but to all who ask her help—all that is true and we glory in it; but I hope you do not want your missionaries to be satisfied with things as they are, to be satisfied to do to-day exactly what was done yesterday and with no plans at all for to-morrow. The question is, Do you want an office boy or a representative? Do you want a man to help down the job or a man to make the job as big as he can possibly make it? I know what your answer will be because I have learned in two years the spirit of the bishops and clergy and people of this diocese, a spirit of generosity as to time and money, a spirit of untiring and glad devotion that even astonishes me sometimes. But the reward of work well done is more work to do, and it is just because the response of the Diocese to the needs of this work has been so splendid that I have the courage to appeal for a firmer basis for the work. I plead for those whom you perhaps will never see and the tragedy or the sordidness of whose lives you will never know—for the young man far from home who lies in a hospital bed hopelessly crippled, absolutely friendless if it were not for Mrs. Holmes; for the girls who until they met Deaconess Brainerd had never known anyone they could trust; for the men and women at Koch upon whom the doctors have set the time-limit of life and whose only bright spot is the visit of Miss Hofman, and for the boy at Boonville who knows only one man in all this world who cares whether that boy has a plaything or not—it is for them I plead and it is to them that you give money and time; and when I thank you, as I do, thank you, for time and money spent, for talents used, it is because I have seen eyes brighten and hearts cheered and the miracle of lives redeemed.

**The Thirty-Fifth Annual Report
of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.**

*To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S.T.D., Bishop of Missouri, and
Rt. Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor:*

We present the thirty-fifth annual report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary with great thankfulness, inasmuch as our figures have reached a higher mark than ever before. This is not because so much new zeal and interest have been aroused, but because two women have made exceptionally large gifts.

All our pledges have been paid; the United Offering to be presented next October is larger now than the gift we made three years ago, and the treasurer aims to increase it at least \$1,000 more during the summer months. This is for the support of our women workers under the Board. At present we support only 175. Our aim is to train, send out and support all the women missionaries and then to care for them when age and infirmity overtake them.

The two gifts that have so largely added to our report to-day, are a \$1,000 gift for St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan, and another of \$1,000 for the endowment of a Shuffling Coolie Bed in St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China, the gift of a woman who so completely hides her identity that even her parish is unknown. At our January meeting gifts and pledges were made to Dr. Jefferys amounting to \$600, which he will use towards the endowment of another bed which he has been pleased to honor us by calling the Diocese of Missouri Shuffling Coolie Bed. Never has the Auxiliary had such a spiritual uplift as in Dr. Jefferys' visit. In each poor starving out-cast at the hospital clinic we saw the Living Christ, and we brought our gifts and laid them at His Feet.

For the support of the work in our own Diocese we have given about \$2,500. Last year we undertook to supply the missionary boxes for the Diocese. Our reason was twofold. First a righteous pride, that we could not ask aid of the Board in a Diocese able to entertain the General Convention. The second was the hope of stimulating a personal interest between the donors and recipients of boxes; but no special results have been manifested so far. More boxes have been supplied than usual, and we have rejoiced, for it means that silent churches are being opened and new men are coming to the Diocese, and the boxes are our women's way of giving cheer to those who are reviving a love for the Church in the rural districts.

A word is never amiss regarding St. Stephen's Mission, which depends upon the Auxiliary for at least a part of its current expenses. The influence on the whole neighborhood is one for good. The missionary in charge besides large confirmation classes reports a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and three candidates for Orders, all products of the mission, and another to be ordained on Ascension, to become a member of the staff at the Cathedral. It is our privilege as well as it is our vital duty to give generously to what is proving a recruiting station for the soldiers of the Cross.

We have set before us the hope of establishing a branch of the Auxiliary in every parish and mission in the Diocese. Our Travelling Secretary is more than ready to visit and help, but she can only go by the invitation or consent of the rector. There is no need to fear that the Auxiliary will supplant home interests, it will only broaden them. To be even a small part of a big organization is better than isolation. To meet possibly during Lent for the purpose of outside work, with a little sewing for hands that are never idle, and listen to some adventure for God, presumably taken from the Spirit of Missions, a little blue mite box on the table for thankofferings for the United Offering and a prayer for the work, make a good beginning for a branch. And let it be in charge of the very best woman in the parish. There is one more request we make of the clergy. Will you see to it that one woman comes from every parish and mission for a few days at the General Convention? Many have friends in the city who will welcome them, and for those not so fortunate we will try to provide quarters. But see to it that the woman who comes takes back the inspiration to her parish. Dear brethren of the clergy, will you help us?

With sorrow we write that our beloved president, Mrs. Simmons, feels her strength unequal to the task of her office and asks to be relieved of it.

This is a synopsis of our year's work. There have been failures, which we can forget. Our joy is that our best year has been that of our beloved Bishop's Jubilee, and we beg that our loyal service may find a place in his book of Golden Deeds.

St. Louis, Mo., May 23rd, 1916.

To the Rt. Rev. Dr. Daniel S. Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri, the Rt. Rev. Frederick W. Johnson, Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri, and Gentlemen of the Convention.

There are four Senior Chapters, and two Junior Chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in the Diocese of Missouri, as follows:

Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, Senior Chapter.

St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis, Senior Chapter.

St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, Senior Chapter.

Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, Senior Chapter.

Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, Junior Chapter.

All Saints' Church, St. Louis, Junior Chapter.

These Chapters are united together in the St. Louis Local Assembly. The members of the Local Assembly being the Bishops and clergy of the Diocese, and all of the members of the Brotherhood of the Diocese.

The total membership of the Brotherhood in this Diocese, according to the latest reports, is 63, exclusive of the Bishops and clergy.

A new Chapter is now being formed in the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, and from the interest manifested in the work by Rector and the men of that Church there can be no doubt but that it will be one of the best Chapters in the Diocese.

Three or four other rectors are preparing to organize Chapters soon as the summer vacation is over.

The officers of the St. Louis Local Assembly are, Mr. Arthur J. Watling, President; Mr. C. L. von Renthel, First Vice-President; Mr. John G. Fleck, Second Vice-President; Dr. Ira C. Young, Secretary; Mr. W. P. Samuel, Treasurer, and the Rev. Charles F. Blaisdell, Chaplain.

The Local Assembly devotes itself chiefly to the management of the down-town noon-day Lenten Services which are now held in the Columbia Theatre, St. Louis. The gross attendance at those services during last Lent was 19,029, a net gain of 3,422 over the previous year.

Our special preachers from out of the city last Lent were the Rt. Rev. Dr. Thomas F. Gailor, Bishop of Tennessee; the Rev. Fr. J. O. S. Huntington, Superior Order of the Holy Cross; the Rev. Dr. James E. Freeman, Rector St. Mark's Church, Minneapolis; the Rev. Dr. Floyd W. Tomkins, Rector Church of the Holy Trinity, Philadelphia; and the Rev. Dr. Karl Reiland, Rector St. George's Church, New York City, and the Rt. Rev. Dr. Theodore Payne Thurston, Bishop of Eastern Oklahoma.

The following local clergymen participated in those services either as chaplains or preachers: The Rev. Messrs. Henry W. Mizner, J. Courtney Jones, Arthur Brittain, R. M. Hogarth, J. Boyd Cox, Geo. F. Taylor, James Wise, B. T. Kemmerer, W. L. Essex, J. H. Harvey, John S. Bunting, Edmund Duckworth, ZeB. T. Phillips, George Lloyd, and the Rt. Rev. Dr. Daniel S. Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri, and Presiding Bishop of the Church.

During last Lent, at the suggestion of the Brotherhood, the Bishops and clergy arranged for a series of preaching missions to be held by our noon-day preachers. The success of the missions exceeding our utmost expectations, as is evidenced by the fact that the gross attendance at those services was more than 20,000, and the interest was all that could have been wished for.

Believing that every member of the Church has some relative, or friend, or can find someone whom he, or she, can influence and lead into communion with the Church, during the Church year, the Brotherhood has suggested that we unite our energies in a one-to-win-one campaign during this year. Such a campaign would certainly be an appropriate and practical way to participate in celebrating the golden jubilee of our beloved Bishop.

We wish to express our deep appreciation of the wise counsel, and hearty co-operation of our Bishops and Clergy in all of our efforts. And we wish also to express our profound thanks to our out-of-town preachers for the splendid service they rendered the Church in their work here.

We also wish to thank Mrs. Underwood, Religious Editor of the *St. Louis Globe-Democrat*, and Mr. Bernard Gruenstein, Church Editor of the *St. Louis Republic*, for their kindness in keeping our services constantly before the people through the pages of their papers.

Night, with members of the League of Lay Readers and their friends at a most helpful meeting of the League in the parish house of Ascension Church. The Director and Secretary made encouraging reports of the past and presented an outline of proposed busy activities for the future. Rev. J. S. Bunting made an inspiring address. Appreciative remarks were made by Rev. F. M. Weddell and an address by the Bishop Coadjutor.

30.—St. Louis, conferences with committee members of two of the mission congregations of the Diocese. Met with members of the Committee for the Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church.

October 1.—St. Louis, night, meeting of Missionary Board at which various matters were discussed, but no quorum for business.

3.—Sunday, St. Louis, morning, assisted by Rev. D. J. Gallagher, celebrated Holy Communion at St. Alban's, and preached. The people, who have faithfully worked and worshiped in the incommodious old building, are delighted with their fine new chapel, as well they may be. We hope that God's blessing may rest upon all endeavors of pastor and congregation and that a dignified superstructure may rise upon the basement bye and bye. Meanwhile, the basement doesn't seem like a basement at all! Afternoon, held service and preached in Union Chapel at Florissant, where Rev. F. M. Weddell ministers one Sunday afternoon in each month. A reverent and appreciative congregation present and joining heartily in the service. Night, St. Louis, St. Timothy's, assisted Rev. Mr. Hogarth in Evening Prayer, confirmed 4, addressed the candidates and preached. A large congregation, and I think forty per cent. were men. The St. Timothy's corner, with its fence-enclosed lawn and flower beds, is one of the most beautiful open spaces in that part of the city. Two years ago nothing but rubbish and weeds were there.

7.—St. Louis, at 2419 N. Ninth Street, confirmed a sick girl and her mother and sister, presented by Rev. G. F. Taylor.

8.—Spent the day in Herculaneum, inspecting the work of Miss Sarah H. Sniffen, our woman worker, also calling among the people and meeting many interested in our work and planning for its continuance.

10.—Sunday, morning, at Christ Church, Rolla, with Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, assisted in the service and preached. In the afternoon with Mr. Tragitt held service at St. Andrew's Mission, Cuba. Was delighted to find so many gathered for the worship and to learn that the people are showing an increasing interest in it. At night, in Christ Church, Rolla, with Mr. Tragitt, assisted in the service and preached. After the service a goodly number of kind people came into the rectory for a little social chat.

11.—At night, in the hospitable rectory at St. James, Mr. and Mrs. Lindstrom invited in a number of delightful friends to meet us. The rectory at St. James is all our own now. The last of the debt upon it

has been paid. And it has been newly painted and the yard newly fenced. Our people and the pastor and his wife are working loyally together and with good result.

Oct. 14.—Night, at Illmo, in the Methodist Church which was kindly loaned to us, had service with Rev. J. J. Clopton and preached. The church was well filled. We have 15 communicants in this neighborhood. After service we talked a long while about possibilities of church building. A very modest chapel would seem to me to be sufficient for the present. It ought not to cost more than \$1,000. I will help to raise the money if the people are in earnest. It is up to them and Mr. Clopton to decide.

16.—St. Louis, with Rev. J. H. Lever at Work House.

17.—Sunday, in St. Louis, I took service in the morning and preached at St. Timothy's chapel for Rev. Mr. Hogarth, who was away. In the afternoon I met with the Sunday School of the new Grace Mission, Harney Heights, and later read Evening Prayer and preached. The mission room was filled with earnest worshippers. There is much enthusiasm here, which makes me glad. At night I took service for Rev. L. H. White at St. Mary's Mission and preached. A good congregation, as always, and hearty worship.

19.—St. Louis, afternoon, attended meeting of the Corporation of Holy Cross.

21.—St. Louis, participated in the dedication services of the new chapel of the Orphans' Home.

24.—Bowling Green. In the temporary absence of a pastor, the good people of the Presbyterian Church invited me to hold our service of Morning Prayer in their church. I was glad to do so. The congregation nearly filled the beautiful building. We have here only three or four communicants. At night I left Louisiana on the Burlington for South Dakota for the burial of Bishop Biller.

27.—In Calvary Cathedral, Sioux Falls, at 7:30 in the morning, assisted by Dean Brennan, Rev. William Holmes and Rev. John B. Clark, I celebrated the Holy Communion. At 10 o'clock in Calvary Cathedral I assisted in the service for the Burial of the Dead, and in Woodlawn cemetery said prayers at the grave as we laid the body of Bishop Biller down to rest.

28.—Was busy in Sioux Falls, as I bore a commission to act for the Presiding Bishop as provisional bishop of South Dakota.

30.—St. Louis, 10 a.m., St. Philip's Church, assisted Bishop Tuttle in the Corporate Communion for the Junior Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the women of the United Offering.

31.—Sunday, morning, in St. Peter's Church, Bonne Terre, met with the Sunday School and asked the children many questions and got from them quick and satisfactory answers. (Thanks to the three or four faithful women who gather this nice bunch of children together week by week in the absence of a pastor.) Later, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached. A reverent and attentive congregation. At night met Rev. R. M. Hogarth at Herculeum, and together we had service in one of the buildings of the Lead Co. (This building is kindly placed at our disposal every Sunday night and the League of Lay Readers are rendering most acceptable service. My thanks to them.) Mr. Hogarth baptized a babe. I confirmed four persons and received

one from the Roman communion and preached. Since February, 1914, 44 persons have been baptized in Herculanum. Rev. Mr. Hogarth is minister in charge, as he has been from the start. Miss Sarah H. Sniffen is ministering woman. We purpose, God willing, to set her apart to the work of a Deaconess on Sunday, November 21, in Grace Church, Crystal City.

November 1.—All Saints' Day, in the Deaconess room in Herculanum, assisted by Rev. Mr. Hogarth, administered the Holy Communion to nine persons and made an address. Spent the rest of the day in business matters connected with the Herculanum work. At night, in St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, attended enthusiastic meeting of League of Lay Readers.

2.—St. Louis, at night, attended with Mrs. Johnson a delightful reception given in our honor by Dean Davis and Miss Davis in their home in Vandeventer Place.

3.—St. Louis, morning, Christ Church Cathedral, assisted by Dean Davis, Rev. J. H. Lever and Rev. W. L. Essex, celebrated the Holy Communion at 10 o'clock at the opening of the autumn quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Attended the business session of the Auxiliary. Read noon-day prayers for missions. In the afternoon attended the Auxiliary session. Miss Sarah H. Sniffen, our woman worker at Herculanum, came to confer with me and spent the night in our home.

5.—St. Louis, attended meeting of Diocesan Missionary Board.

6.—Poplar Bluff, made calls among the people. Also had a pleasant call with Sister Eliza, who lives alone on a small farm three or four miles out of the city.

7.—Morning, Poplar Bluff, attended Sunday School and catechised the children. My warm thanks to the good women who are holding the Sunday School together while I am hunting a minister. The church was beautifully decorated with fruits and flowers and foliage and we had a Harvest Home service. I baptized a babe, preached and ministered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon went by auto 35 miles to Doniphan. Service at night in a Presbyterian Church to which I was kindly invited. Read Evening Prayer and preached. A large and reverent and responsive congregation.

8.—Doniphan, morning, in the cottage of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Gerlach, whose guest I was, celebrated the Holy Communion. All of our communicants in Doniphan, four women and three men, received. Visited the Ripley County poor farm near Doniphan.

9.—St. Louis, attended business meeting of the corporation of the Holy Cross House.

11.—St. Louis, appointed Alfred G. Lonsdale, a member of St. Mary's Mission, to assist Sister Miriam in the Sunday School work at the mission of the Christ Child, Baden. One o'clock, Mercantile Club, attended meeting of Executive Committee of General Convention. Three o'clock, addressed the Woman's Auxiliary of St. John's Church. Night, attended meeting of the Church Federation and pronounced the benediction at the close.

12.—St. Louis, Hosmer Hall, addressed the students on the habits and customs of the Sioux Indians.

Nov. 13.—Kirksville, at night, attended a delightful social at the pro-rectory given by Rev. and Mrs. R. D. L. Putney and the good people of Trinity Mission. Sixty-three were present. It was a good getting together. Residents of the town and teachers and students of the schools were well represented

14.—Kirksville, assisted by Rev. R. D. L. Putney, had service in Trinity Church. We counted 83 persons in church. I baptized three babes, confirmed four adults and preached. Forty persons received the Holy Communion. Mr. Putney began his work here in August of this year. He is the first pastor that Trinity Mission has had since January, 1910. The people are loyally co-operating with him in his efforts to restore to this community the worship of the Church. My heart is very glad indeed. And I thank them all! And I thank God!

15.—St. Louis, attended regular meeting of the clericus.

16, 17, 18.—Meeting of Southern Convocation at St. James. Every clerical member of the Convocation except Rev. Dr. Wilkins, who is ill in the hospital, was present and was in attendance at every session and every service. Every man whose name was on the printed program did the thing which had been asked of him. Deaconess Sniffen gave a most interesting account of the Church's work at Herculanum. A goodly number of laymen and women attended the sessions. Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Lindstrom and Mrs. Lindstrom's mother, Mrs. Clarke, and the good people of St. James, were most gracious and generous hosts. The Convocation was delightfully enjoyable and spiritually helpful and refreshing. The Bishop Coadjutor gave the address ad clerum on Wednesday and preached the closing sermon Thursday night.

21.—Morning, Crystal City, Grace Church, I set apart as a Deaconess Miss Sarah H. Sniffen, of Herculanum, whose labors of love in Herculanum the past 8 months have been beyond all praise. Miss Sniffen was presented by Rev. R. M. Hogarth, who also joined me in the setting apart service. I preached the sermon and, assisted by Mr. Hogarth, administered the Holy Communion. A good number of men and women and a lot of children came over in auto trucks from Herculanum for the service. We were delighted to find that the church building, long out of repair, had been thoroughly renovated, painted, newly carpeted, and new windows put in. There were evidences that the good women had been very busy making ready for the service. And Mr. Fred Butler, as always, was the dependable man on the spot. The day in the country was a beautiful one. I spent the afternoon in Herculanum conferring with many who are interested in our Deaconess' work. I appointed Deaconess Sniffen to continue in the work at Herculanum under the direction of Rev. R. M. Hogarth. Her salary is wholly and gladly provided by the people of Herculanum.

22.—Ferguson, made an address on Rural Missions at the monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Stephen's Church.

23.—St. Louis, at night, the Church Club of St. Louis very graciously gave a fine reception and dinner in honor of my wife and me at the Planters Hotel. My old college mate, Bishop Thurston, of Eastern Oklahoma, made the principal address, which was entertaining and at the same time spiritually strong, as his utterances always are. Mrs. Johnson and I gave grateful thanks to the many kind folks who so cordially and genuinely let us know that they are glad that we are here. City friends and suburban friends came in to greet us. And I

was glad to take by the hand laymen who traveled in from as far away as St. James and Rolla and De Soto and Macon and Palmyra. We had Bishop Thurston as our guest the night, and he and I sat up till 1 o'clock and talked things over.

Nov. 24.—St. Louis, noon, meeting of Executive Committee of General Convention. Afternoon, met Committee of the Mission at Illmo in the matter of the proposed chapel at that point.

25.—Thanksgiving Day, St. Louis, assisted by Rev. George F. Taylor, celebrated the Holy Communion at Grace-Holy Cross at 10 o'clock and preached. I was glad to exhort the people to be thankful not only for more bountifully filled boards to-day than yesterday, but also for men and women of large means whose hearts God had touched to make endowments for free hospitals; for men and women who were laboring lovingly and giving generously, not to pauperize any people in North St. Louis, but to help the people to better help themselves. For this we give thanks!

27.—St. Louis, licensed Mr. E. W. Broemmelsiek to serve as a Lay Reader (general) at the request of Rev. R. M. Hogarth, minister in charge of St. Luke's, Jennings.

28.—Sunday, St. Louis, morning, Ascension Church, confirmed four and preached; the candidates presented by Rev. John S. Bunting. Night, Mount Calvary Church, with the rector, Rev. S. E. Arthur, service of Evening Prayer and preached. Confirmed one presented by Rev. B. E. Reed, of St. Matthew's Mission.

29.—St. Louis, attended meeting of Clericus.

30.—St. Andrew's Day, St. Louis, morning, assisted Bishop Tuttle in the office of the Holy Communion at St. Peter's Church, the annual corporate communion of the Brotherhood. Breakfast followed in the parish house. At night, in St. Peter's parish house, took supper with the members of the Brotherhood.

December 1.—St. Louis, licensed Mr. Alfred G. Lonsdale, by request of Rev. L. H. White, to serve as Lay Reader in St. Mary's Mission, and to serve also in the Mission of the Christ Child, Baden, if requested so to do by the Minister in charge. Attended the sessions of the Laymen's Missionary Movement at the Third Baptist Church.

2.—Attended the sessions of the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

3.—Attended the sessions of the Laymen's Missionary Movement. Opened the afternoon session with the reading of a Scripture lesson and prayer and gave the benediction at the close. At noon attended luncheon at the City Club at which a committee was formed to arrange for a meeting of Church laymen shortly, to follow up the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

4.—We went to Poplar Bluff. In the afternoon had a meeting with the members of the Guild looking toward plans for the resuming of regular services at Holy Cross Church.

5.—Poplar Bluff, morning, met with the Sunday School. Read Morning Prayer and preached. Had a congregational meeting following the service. A liberal pledge was promised toward the stipend of a minister and I was asked to secure, if possible, a man whom I had recommended to the congregation; the expectation being that Poplar Bluff and Thayer will together form one cure.

I attempted to reach Bonne Terre for a service at night, but my train was two hours behind its schedule and I failed to connect with jitney for Bonne Terre.

Dec. 7.—St. Louis, attended meeting of Holy Cross Corporation. Appointed Mr. Irvin Davis to serve as a member of the Committee for Trinity Mission, Kirksville. Licensed Mr. William L. Duncan to serve as Lay Reader at Grace-Holy Cross. Night, took supper with Rev. and Mrs. D. J. Gallagher at St. Alban's Chapel and made an address to the Men's Club and their friends.

8.—Mrs. Johnson and I were at dinner and stayed the night in the Robinson home at Woodlawn, Kirkwood, and I had the pleasure of making an address to a goodly number of the Club members and their friends.

9.—St. Louis, Mercantile Club, attended meeting of the Executive Committee in preparation for the General Convention.

10.—St. Louis, St. George's Chapel, presided at a missionary meeting held for the purpose of devising a method of conserving the results of the recent great Laymen's Missionary Movement in this city. Appointed a Committee, Mr. James A. Waterworth, chairman, to propose a form of organization and an outline of work and to report January 7.

12.—Sunday, assisted Rev. Oscar Lindstrom morning and night in the services at Trinity, St. James. Confirmed 2 in the morning and preached at both services.

13.—St. James, called at the Soldiers' Home, where I have sometimes had services on a Sunday afternoon. Called also on Mr. Thomas Stimson, many years the faithful warden of the Mission at St. James, and was glad to find him recovering slowly from his very serious illness. On this trip to St. James I was glad to have assurances that the library which we opened in a small way in the vestry room of the church some months ago is increasingly patronized by the people of the town. We are now taking steps to obtain additional books from the State Library.

15.—Left St. Louis at night for Springfield, on my way to Thayer.

16.—Reached Thayer shortly after noon and spent the rest of the day in conference with Rev. Mr. Woodward. Had services at night with Mr. Woodward and his people, and a congregational meeting at which a good pledge was promised toward salary account. Sickness prevented the one candidate whom Mr. Woodward had prepared from coming for confirmation. Left Thayer at midnight, via Springfield, for Sullivan.

17.—I had promised to be with Rev. Oscar Lindstrom at Sullivan and to preach at night. But my train ran two hours late, and I had to give it up. Came on to St. Louis, reaching home at midnight.

19.—Sunday, St. Louis, morning, St. Augustine's, with Rev. Mr. Harvey, confirmed 2, celebrated the Holy Communion, and preached. Spoke also to the Sunday School. Night, with Rev. Mr. Essex, preached in a series of Advent services at Epiphany.

22.—St. Louis, night, went with Rev. J. H. Lever to the new Industrial School at Bellefontaine, 20 miles out of the city. Mr. Lever took his lantern and beautiful slides and gave the story of The Other Wise Man, by Van Dyke. I spoke a few moments to the children.

25.—Christmas Day.

" This the happy morn,
Wherein the Son of Heaven's Eternal King,
Of wedded maid and virgin mother born,
Our great redemption from above did bring."

I went out to Florissant in the early morning and celebrated the Holy Communion to the few people who were able to get through the

drifts left by the young blizzard of the night before. I was told by one of the women present that she had lived in Florissant for more than twenty years and that this was the first Protestant service ever held in the town on a Christmas Day. Our service was in the Union Chapel. In the afternoon, Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Harvey and Deaconess Brainerd of the City Hospital and her mother, came to take Christmas dinner with us and to make us glad. Appointed Rev. A. E. Woodward, Thayer, to have charge also of the Holy Cross Mission, Poplar Bluff, and of the unorganized mission at Doniphan.

Dec. 26.—Sunday, morning, Overland Park, had service of Morning Prayer and preached. Evening, Baden, Mission of the Christ Child, service of Evening Prayer and sermon. A large number of children present and more adults than I have seen at any service in Baden before. Sister Miriam is ministering faithfully among the people.

28.—Afternoon, had a wonderful time with lots of happy youngsters and all sorts of games and toys and dolls at a Christmas party at Mr. George Robinson's in Kirkwood. Night, had the usual midweek service at St. Luke's Hospital and made an address. Accepted resignation of Mr. Herbert Wornack as a member of the Committee of St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis.

1916.

January 1.—St. Louis, Bishop's House. Mrs. Johnson and I were with Bishop Tuttle for his customary New Year's Day reception.

2.—Morning, Kirkwood, Grace Church. I preached by invitation and celebrated the Holy Communion, the rector being ill. I took away with me generous contributions of the people of \$21.85 to help me in my missionary work in the Diocese. Night, St. Louis, preached and took the evening service at St. Timothy's for Rev. R. M. Hogarth, ill with the grip.

4.—St. Louis, afternoon, attended a burial. At night Mrs. Johnson and I had the pleasure of entertaining the League of Lay Readers at dinner. After dinner the business meeting was held and the work of the League was discussed. The members are answering generously to many calls for temporary help.

5.—Spent the day in Herculaneum, visiting in many homes among the sick and the whole and planning for further development of our interesting work at this point.

7.—St. Louis, night, at St. George's parish house, participated in a meeting called by the laymen for the purpose of following up the Laymen's Missionary Meeting.

8.—Appointed Mr. Oliver F. Cuddy a member of business committee for St. Timothy's Mission, St. Louis.

9.—Sunday, Fulton, morning, preached and celebrated the Holy Communion. Night, had service of Evening Prayer and preached.

10.—Fulton, visited the Missouri School for the Deaf. At the request of Rev. F. M. Weddell, appointed Mrs. Carl C. Shaw to be treasurer of Holy Cross Mission, Sherman. Rev. Horatio N. Tragitt, Jr., spent the night with me. I have this day appointed him to the charge of St. Peter's, Bonne Terre, and Grace, Crystal City, when he shall have finished his course at Sewanee the first of June.

- Jan. 11.—St. Louis. The good people of St. Peter's gave a delightful reception to Mrs. Johnson and me in the parish house. We have scarcely had a nastier, sloppier night this winter. We wondered that so many people would stir away from homes and fires for a reception anywhere!
- 12.—St. Louis, took supper with the Girls' Friendly Society of St. Philip's Church—a bunch of girls in dead earnest to be of some account where help is needed—and after supper made an address.
- 13.—St. Louis, met with the Executive Committee for the General Convention.
- 15.—I was to have left for Portland to-day, 120 miles up the Missouri on the Katy; but a telegram telling of a quarantine turned me back. We went on a midnight train to Mexico.
- 16.—Sunday, Mexico, in St. Paul's Church, administered the Holy Communion and preached, by special request, for this place is in the field of Bishop Tuttle. Sixteen persons received the Holy Communion—the first opportunity they had had in many months.
- 19.—At Bonne Terre officiated at the burial of Frances Parsons, sweet five-year-old daughter of Mrs. Roscoe R. S. Parsons. In the afternoon made an address at a children's meeting of the African M. E. congregation at Herculanum. Spent the night with friends at Herculanum. Deaconess Sniffen is back again in good shape and happy in her work.
- 20.—Appointed Miss Byrd E. Puhl to be secretary and treasurer for St. Peter's Mission, Canton.
- 23.—Sunday, morning, St. Louis, St. Mary's Church, assisted Rev. L. H. White in service and preached. Afternoon, preached to the students at Monticello Seminary, Godfrey, Ill. Night, St. Louis, St. Paul's Church, assisted Rev. George Lloyd in service and preached.
- 27.—St. Louis, meeting of Executive Committee for General Convention.
- 28.—Appointed Mr. J. E. Walser and Mr. W. H. Wyatt members of business committee for St. Augustine's, St. Louis.
- 30.—Sunday, preached in St. Peter's, Bonne Terre, and gave the people the Holy Communion. In the afternoon made many calls among the people. Found one new family of Church folk lately come to town. Was with the children in the session of the Sunday School and found them very attentive and prompt and intelligent in their responses.
- February 1.—St. Louis, meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. George's Chapel, assisted Bishop Tuttle in the celebration of the Holy Communion.
- 4.—St. Louis, evening, presided at meeting of the Missionary Board of the Diocese.
- 6.—Sunday, Kirksville, with Rev. R. D. L. Putney, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached in the morning. At night, at the pro-rectory, met with a splendid company of 75 men and women of the town and of the educational institutions; had a devotional service of song and prayer and made an address on the Church's work in civilizing and evangelizing the Indians of South Dakota.
- 7.—Kansas City, with other Bishops of the Province, met at the home of the Bishop of West Missouri for informal conference in the evening.
- 8.—Kansas City, St. Paul's Church, assisted in the celebration of the Holy Communion at the opening session of the Provincial Synod. Afternoon, made missionary address.

Feb. 9.—Sessions of the Synod.

10.—Synod. Presided at conference on Provincial Missions. At night attended mass meeting in Grace Church.

11.—At Bishop Tuttle's request, to-day assumed care of the two parishes of Moberly and Mexico.

12.—Night, Jackson, with Rev. J. J. Clopton held services and preached. A good congregation of devout and devoted people, as always, present in this little mission.

13.—Sunday, Jackson, celebrated the Holy Communion at the home of Mrs. Linus Sanford. 11 o'clock, Cape Girardeau, with Rev. J. J. Clopton, had Morning Prayer, preached and confirmed 2. Chaffee, night, with Rev. J. J. Clopton, held services in Methodist Church, confirmed 3 and preached.

14.—Bloomfield, night, with Rev. J. J. Clopton held services in Methodist Church and preached. A goodly number of people were up from Dexter to the services.

15.—Illmo, night, with Rev. J. J. Clopton held services in Methodist Church and preached.

17.—St. Louis, afternoon, Church of the Holy Communion, made address on Missouri rural work at meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

18.—St. Louis, afternoon, at the home of Mrs. Frank Wyman, attended meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Ascension parish and made short address.

20.—Sunday, morning, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached at Crystal City. Afternoon, Herculanum, in private home baptized a babe of seven days and another for a mother who could not come to a place of public worship. Later, at Herculanum, in an office building, had Evening Prayer, preached and baptized seven children.

21.—Spent the day with Deaconess Sniffen in the interests of our mission in Herculanum.

23.—St. Louis, night, with Rev. R. M. Hogarth, had congregational meeting with Grace Mission, Harney Heights. Listened to reports which were exceptionally good, covering the work of the mission and the Sunday School and the guild since the beginning of our work here seven months ago. Conferred with the people about the possibility of taking a forward step here this spring.

24.—St. Louis, night, St. Peter's Church, attended meeting at the close of the Church School of Religious Instruction and made an address.

27.—Sunday, St. Louis, 10:30, addressed the Sunday School at St. Philip's Church. 11, with Rev. C. F. Blaisdell, St. Philip's Church, assisted in service of Morning Prayer and preached. My very warm thanks to the many kind and helpful friends who gave me cordial greeting at the close of the service and who left in the palm of my hand contributions big and little amounting to \$18.50. That's a good sum toward helping on my missionary work. And I hadn't said anything at all about money or asked for money! 2 o'clock, at Workhouse, with Rev. J. H. Lever, assisted in the service and preached. 3:30, at City Hospital, with Rev. J. H. Lever, and volunteer workers, assisted in the service and preached. 6 o'clock, Industrial School, with Rev. J. H. Lever and Deaconess Brainerd, assisted in the service and made an address. How the youngsters at the Industrial School do love to sing. One hundred and twenty-five of them were gathered together for the service.

February 29.—Rolla, with Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, afternoon and night, had services and preached.

March 1.—Rolla, 9 a.m., address at High School. 10:30 a.m., address at State School of Mines. 3 p.m., brief service and address, Christ Church; 4:15 p.m., Children's service and address, Christ Church. 7:30 p.m., with Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, had Evening Service and preached, Christ Church.

2.—Christ Church, Rolla, 3, 4:15, and 7:30 p.m., services and addresses.

3.—St. Louis, night, meeting of Missionary Board.

4.—St. Louis, completed organization of St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights, St. Louis, Rev. R. M. Hogarth in charge. This congregation has heretofore been worshipping under the name of Grace Mission (unorganized).

5.—Sunday, St. Louis, morning, St. Timothy's, with Rev. R. M. Hogarth, confirmed 4, celebrated Holy Communion and preached. Night, Moberly, had Evening Prayer and preached and met the people of the parish informally for conference after service.

6.—Rev. V. O. Penley came from De Soto to confer with me and delighted us by being our guest for the night.

7.—Herculaneum, in conference with Deaconess Sniffen and visiting among the people.

8.—Ash Wednesday, St. Louis, morning, St. Mary's, Holy Communion and address. Night, St. Alban's, with Rev. D. J. Gallagher, Evening Prayer, confirmed 18, and preached. The new chapel was about as full as the seats would hold, and the hearty responses of the congregation made me glad.

9, 10, 11.—Sullivan, each night with Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, had services and preached. Two nights the church was full of people. This community is beginning to appreciate Mr. Lindstrom's faithful work, much to my joy. The little spark of life which was almost gone out a year ago is being fanned into a fervid flame. During the Mission we baptized three persons and confirmed three; the first confirmation recorded here in many years. The 11th, celebrated the Holy Communion.

12.—Sunday, met Rev. F. M. Weddell early in the morning at a flag station on the Frisco, put across the Meramec in a skiff, and made our way up through the woods to the little chapel, Holy Cross, Sherman, on the hillside. Confirmed one, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached. Was glad to welcome a new family lately moved out from the city and to find in one member of it an interested helper of the children in the Sunday School. Night, with Mr. Weddell, Evening Prayer and sermon at Valley Park and confirmed two. Reached St. Louis midnight.

13.—Started for Minneapolis.

14.—Noon, preached in Lenten theatre service, Minneapolis.

15.—Minneapolis, morning, preached in Gethsemane Church. Noon, Lenten theatre preaching.

16.—Minneapolis, noon, Lenten theatre preaching. Night, preached St. Paul's Church.

17.—Minneapolis, noon, Lenten theatre preaching. Night, preached All Saints' Church.

18.—Minneapolis, noon, Lenten theatre preaching.

March 21-26.—Christ Church, Rochester, N. Y., Nation-Wide Preaching Mission, sermons and addresses, 10; celebration of the Holy Communion, 4. On one occasion took luncheon with the clergy of the city and addressed them.

23.—Had conference with Rev. George E. Wharton, rector of St. David's Church, Scranton, Pa., and urged him to accept a call to Christ Church, Moberly, and St. Paul's Church, Mexico.

29.—Harvard University. Took dinner with members of St. Paul's Society and made an address on the call to the ministry.

30.—Received from Rev. George E. Wharton his acceptance of St. Paul's, Mexico, and Christ Church, Moberly.

31.—En route for Nation-Wide Preaching Mission at Winona, Minn.

April 2-6.—Winona, Minn., Nation-Wide Preaching Mission.

8.—Ironton, calling among the people. Made address at county meeting of W. C. T. U., taking as my topic, "To keep my body in temperance, soberness, and chastity."

9.—Sunday morning, Ironton, assisted by Rev. V. O. Penley, administered the Lord's Supper, confirmed 1 and preached. Addressed the Sunday School. Night, De Soto, read Evening Prayer and preached.

10.—Fredericktown, with Rev. V. O. Penley, had Evening Prayer, preached and confirmed 2.

12.—St. Louis, Grace-Holy Cross, with Rev. G. F. Taylor had Evening Prayer, preached and confirmed 17.

13.—Meeting of Executive Committee in preparation for the General Convention.

14.—Des Moines, Iowa, preached in Lenten course, St. Luke's Church, Rev. Leonard K. Smith, rector.

15.—Licensed as Lay Readers for Grace-Holy Cross, St. Louis, Albert Haase, Gerald Persen, George Eschmann, William L. Duncan.

16.—St. Louis, Sunday, morning, St. Mary's, assisted Rev. L. H. White in the service, confirmed 3 and preached. 3 p.m., St. Thomas's, assisted Rev. Dr. Cloud in the service, confirmed 5 and preached. 4:30 p.m., St. Luke's (Harney Heights), assisted Rev. R. M. Hogarth in the service, confirmed 11 and preached. The first service in our new chapel. Night, Epiphany, assisted Rev. W. L. Essex in the service, confirmed 31 and preached.

Personal Reports.

From June 10th, 1915, to November 12th, 1915, I was curate of St. George's Church, Kingston, Jamaica. On November 12th, 1915, I was gazetted to a lieutenancy in the Jamaica Reserve Regiment and obtained the permission of the Archbishop of the West Indies to terminate my connection with St. George's Church in order to take up my military duties. Later, to date from January 7th, 1916, I was granted a commission as captain in the regular forces of the Crown and received appointment to the Third Service Battalion of the British West Indies Regiment now serving in Egypt.

Since November 12th, in the absence of an official chaplain and so far as my military duties would permit, I have ministered to the sick and the dying, by land and by sea, buried the dead and officiated at the regular military parade services.

Whilst in England I officiated as chaplain at the request of the General commanding the district, but I regret to say that when I announced a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Recreation Hut the local clergyman objected because I was without the license of the Bishop of the Diocese. It seemed to me that as the Recreation Hut is not a consecrated building the vicar's objection was not well founded, but not being sure of my ground and having no means at hand of making sure I cancelled the celebration. The unfortunate result of it all was that scores of men, if not hundreds, were kept from the Sacrament, for it was impracticable for them to attend the local church because of the distance and the weather.

General Clergy Relief Fund,

Will Title, "The General Clergy Relief Fund."

The general and official society for the Pension and Relief of Clergy Widows and Orphans, covering the whole Church. Canon 53. The General Convention recommends an annual offering from every Church, and that a percentage of the Communion Alms be given to this fund.

Remit to Rev. Alfred J. P. McClure, Treasurer, The Church House, Twelfth and Walnut Street, Philadelphia.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of the Diocese, for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas-day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
