



Rules of Order of Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Unfinished business.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education.
 - VIII. On Sunday School Work.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
 - XI. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis, Tuesday, May 28, 1907.

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy of the Diocese and of the Laity chosen as delegates from their respective parishes, assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Diocesan Convention, for the purpose of holding the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Cathedral singing the three hundred and eighty-third hymn.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. C. M. C. Mason, of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Mathews' Church, St. Louis.

The Convention sermon was preached by the Rev. P. W. Faunt-leroy, of Mt. Calvary Church, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rev. Messrs. William Elmer and Edward P. Little, also assisting.

On reassembling in Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

Mr. Dooris, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report of the Committee, containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

And further, that the Fund of the Diocese for Disabled and Infirm Clergy be transferred into and merged with the General Clergy Relief Fund.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that miscellaneous business was in order.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer presented the report of Mr. Chas. Sparks, business manager of the *Church News*, for the past year. (See Appendix No. 7, page 119.)

On motion of Mr. James A. Waterworth, it was ordered that this report be referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions that they provide for the payment of the deficiency.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his Annual Address, which, with the record of his Episcopal Acts, was laid on the Secretary's table.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri:

In the Hannibal Convocation there are nine Parishes and three Missions. Six priests are ministering in eight of these. Three Parishes and one Mission have been vacant for some time, but a priest has lately taken charge of one of these Parishes and a Mission with it. The Rector of one other Parish leaves before many days. These are the places in which there are churches: Louisiana, Prairieville, Clarksville, Hannibal, Canton, Palmyra, Monroe, Macon, Kirksville, Moberly, Mexico and Montgomery.

The Clergy of the Convocation have held three sessions during the past year: at Canton, May 27; at Palmyra, October 23; at Monroe, April 8.

No systematic Mission work, as such, has yet been attempted by us outside of our Parishes and organized Missions. A_{γ} few special services from time to time have been held by the Bishop and by others in certain places. If we could get congregations on week-days, I suppose each one of us could easily give one or two nights a week to a Mission station;

but this is generally felt to be impossible. Perhaps, if tried, more might result than has been looked for.

For Paris, the seat of Monroe County, and Bowling Green, the seat of Pike County, I verily believe we ought to be making effort to begin work. They are important towns—small, but, I believe, of good material. I do not know that there are any members of the church in either town; but, I suppose, our work is to win men to the church, rather than to find them already in the fold. Edina is another place where there might be an opening if anyone could take it. We have two communicants there, one confirmed and admitted in Hannibal and one in Monroe. I know nothing about the town; however, our means are at a very, very low ebb. No one of our Parishes is beyond bare self-support, and outside of my own cure changes have been very frequent.

Our Convocation ought doubtless to do Mission work outside of its Parishes, but it has not yet been able to; yet in our sessions I know we have helped one another, and to a good degree.

- 2. That there are a number of large towns where church work should begin.
- 3. That the field under the care of Rev. Mr. Weddell should be divided so that Rolla, where is located the School of Mines, should have more frequent services.
- 4. That this involves greater financial expenditure on the part of the Missionary Board, and that in consequence the pledges in this Convention need to be proportionately large.

The prospects of sufficient funds in the treasury of the Board means going forward with enlarged views, higher ideals and progressive work, while lack of support will only bring discouragement and defeat.

Your committee, then, would urge that we raise at this Convention the amount of \$11,500.00 asked for by the Bishop and the Board of Missions of the Diocese, so that the good work already commenced may be carried on, and new fields prepared for the planting of the Church.

The Church throughout the Diocese is in a flourishing condition. A wave of spiritual refreshment has flowed upon our Churches and Missions, reviving the drooping spirits and giving strength for nobler efforts. Baptisms and confirmations have largely increased. Missions have been held in many places, and God's blessing has rested on priest and people.

For the evidence of this renewed spiritual life your committee would urge upon you the importance of reading carefully the Bishop's address and the reports of the Missionary Board and committees, who have carefully prepared reports of the good work done, and the needs of the Diocese to crown our missionary work under God's blessing with success. Especially would we urge upon the Diocese the importance of providing some plan whereby Churches and Rectories may be built where needed, and would call attention to the fourth recommendation made in the report of the Archdeacon.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Convention was opened at nine o'clock a. m., with divine service, in Bofinger Chapel, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order for business in Schuyler Memorial House, at ten o'clock a. m.

The minutes of the preceding day were read by the Secretary, and on motion were approved and adopted.

Rev. Mr. Blaisdell announced that he had a resolution to offer, to be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rt. Rev. President declared this out of order at present, as the order is Unfinished Business.

Your committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's address alluding to the deferred parochial payments on apportionment, having talked the matter over and conferred with others, finds that many of the Parishes defer payment of their apportionment for General Missions until the month of August, for example, as will be seen by the October, 1906, "Spirit of Mission," where receipts from this Diocese amount to about \$2,600.00.

This has been the usual custom, and it will be followed, no doubt, this year, it being a fact that some Parishes have already in sight the amount of their assessment ready to be paid.

But in view of the Bishop's solicitude it is suggested that a letter, urging the importance of quicker action, be sent to such Parishes as appear to be slow in making their returns, which letter might properly emanate from the Standing Committee for Apportionment on General Missions.

The Rev. Mr. Todd, canonically connected with this Diocese, was retired from active work several years ago, and died at Lansing, Michigan.

His career is an instance of a life devoted to Christ and His Church, unheralded in the world, but precious in the sight of God, and of helpful good to many souls who came under his ministration.

"At the end of the first section of Canon X add these words:

'That no Parish shall decide upon the permanent location of its property without the consent of the Bishop of the Diocese and the Standing Committee.'"

Which motion was duly seconded, and unanimously carried.

Rev. G. D. B. Miller moved that action upon the report presented by the Committee on Constitution and Canons, in regard to the change of name of the Diocese, be postponed until next year.

Upon this motion the ayes and noes were called for, which being taken resulted in Ayes 30, Noes 53.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that the motion to postpone had been lost, and the question before the Convention was the adoption of the recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons that the resolution to change the name of the Diocese be *not* adopted.

The question being submitted to the Convention, the Rt. Rev. President announced that the Convention had approved the recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, that the change of the name of the Diocese from "Missouri" to "St. Louis" be *not* adopted.

Prof. Marshall S. Snow presented the resolutions upon the death of the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham and the Rev. Russell Todd:

The Secretary read the report of the Librarian, as follows:

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

May 29, 1907.

Since the last report twenty-one volumes have been loaned. The books have also been used to a considerable extent in the library room, but no record has been kept of the number of books used in this way. The *Spirit of Missions* and the *Church News* have been bound up to date.

The Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis thereupon presented the report of the Special Committee on the University of the South, as follows:

Your committee appointed to consider that portion of the Bishop's address referring to the University of the South, respectfully report that they believe that this Convention should hail with joy the signs of increasing growth and development abundantly evidenced by the University of the South, which at this time celebrates the fiftieth anniversary of its foundation.

We respectfully suggest the following resolutions:

ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-EIGHTH CONVENTION.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

May I speak first of myself? It is one month more than forty years since I was made bishop. The House of Bishops then consisted of fortyfour members. It has now one hundred and one. The dioceses were then thirty-five. They are now sixty-three. The missionary districts were then seven. They are now twenty-six. My earthly eyes have been spared to see great growth in this Church in America. I was made bishop a little after our dreadful civil war closed. God's merciful Providence preserved this Church entirely from disruption, and almost from any disharmony arising out of the sad and sharp struggle at arms. Under the flag and in the field of civil organization this Church has always stood for union, She accentuates this fact by the scrupulous care taken to see to it that not a square rod of American soil be left unprovided with her own bishop, chosen and commissioned to exercise jurisdiction thereon. It is a hopeful dream to me-nay, it is a sure, deep faith with me-that under the same merciful Providence, in His own day and in His own way, this Church shall be made the rallying center for Christian unity which shall intensify, spiritualize, and perfect patriotic union. My earthly eyes shall not see the blessed sight. I permit myself to envy those who are to see it. Please God, my spirit shall rejoice with them with joy unspeakably great. God help us all, not only to be hopeful and outreachingly expectant, but helpful also, and loving and allowance-making, in view of the consummation devoutly to be wished.

During our convention year three bishops have been called away to their rest.

Bishop Schereschewsky could not and would not rest before. Stricken down by a paralyzing affection, but with brain and memory unimpaired, sitting in his invalid chair, he dictated, or, with one finger yet spared to strike upon the typewriter, wrote a valuable translation of the Holy Bible into one of the most important of the dialects of the Chinese language.

He was seventy-five years old and had been a bishop for twenty-nine years. His consuming zeal, his profound learning, and his indomitable determination to persist in active usefulness, made him a conspicuous hero in our missionary annals.

Bishop Nicholson's term of service was fifteen years. He brought for contribution to that service the experience and trained sagacity of a business man. He crowned all with a devotion of spirit, and a self-sacrificing industry which has helped to place Milwaukee, with its one hundred and three clergy, in a foremost rank of Western dioceses.

Bishop Seymour was for more than twenty-eight years a bishop of what is really a large missionary field in Southern Illinois. His earlier life and training had been all of the urban sort. Yet no man more than he grappled earnestly and assiduously with the difficulties and perplexities of rural life. An accomplished scholar, spite of the handicapping of imperfect vision, a skilled theologian, a brave champion of Church order and Church principles, a fearless, honest, unselfish, generous-hearted man, his seventy-seven years summed up a life of devoted service to the Master and His Militant Church. He preceded me by seven years in Columbia College, New York; and to us in college days was cited once and again by our Greek Professor, Anthon, the excellent scholarship of Seymour, who had graduated at the head of his class a few years before. In these later years he was my neighbor, and a kind, warm, helpful personal friend. His loss from my side plants a sorrow strong, but tender, in the heart.

Two of our clergy have been called away; both of them aged and retired from active service.

Rev. Dr. Ingraham was in his ninetieth year, and at his death the senior surviving graduate, I think, of Nashotah. He had been the faithful and loved pastor of St. John's Church, and of Grace Church of this city. His vigor, his cheeriness, his sympathy with the young and his pastoral fidelity kept him active and successful far into the afternoon of his earthly life.

Rev. Russell Todd died in his seventy-eighth year, at Lansing, Mich., whither he had gone with his family for a home. I knew him first when I was in deacon's orders, forty-five years ago. He began his ministry as an assistant in the very parish where I also began mine as an assistant, Zion Church, Morris, N. Y. In the old diocese of Missouri he served under me at Lebanon, and in the latter diocese faithfully at Cape Girardeau and Canton. It may be well understood how his death closes up another little chapter of associations of my earliest life.

One of our postulants has died, Pearl Lawrence Parsons, of Edina. He had completed part of his course of study at Sewanee, and his youthful enthusiasm and intelligence gave promise of great usefulness in the ministry. But it pleased God to summon him away to a higher service.

Captain Bofinger and Mrs. Trowbridge, of St. Louis, are among those of our Church people who have passed on from the Church Militant. Captain John N. Bofinger was an earnest and zealous member of the Cathedral Chapter, who, as a memorial of his lamented wife, had built the chapel of the cathedral bearing her name. Mrs. Sarah Trowbridge was for many years a devout communicant of St. George's, and a leader in benevolent and beneficent activity of all kinds. Mrs. O'Dell, who died more than a year ago, left to the bishop in trust \$2,000 for burying the poor of the cathedral, and \$500 each to All Saints' and St. Stephen's, St. Louis.

The changes and chances of this mortal life bring rest to some of us. They hold work and duty yet before others of us. God keep us faithful to the work! God, in His mercifulness through Christ, have us ready for the rest!

"Life's work well done, Life's race well run, Life's crown well won, Now comes rest."

In the diocese we need not shrink from scrutinizing examination.

It is true we have sold out property, and seemed to close up work in two places, Bevier and LaPlata; and have loaned without interest the proceeds of sale to the vestry of St. James', Macon. But good reasons commending the approval of our action by the trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund existed in both cases. Nor are we estopped from re-entering into either town to push Church work in the future. In fact, in LaPlata we continue our work now, preserving our organization of a mission there.

In all other places, I think, forward and upward are our watchwords.

There is an aroused life in Columbia. Mr. Duckworth helped it with a special week of mission work. And the rector's steady faithfulness there, among both people and students, is admirably successful. There are thousands of students in that town. It is not easy to estimate the far-reaching results of Church influence among them. May I not bespeak the cordial sympathy and good will of all of us for the important work which the rector and vestry there are charged with; and substantial help to them, too, if they ask for it.

There is another college town where students are counted by the thousand, viz., Kirksville. The new rector there grasps the situation, and he is warming the parish with the fire of a contagious zeal. He sadly needs a new church. These college towns seem to me to have reasonable ground for asking outside help.

At Louisiana a growing weakness in the church edifice was making it quite unsafe. The vigorous rector has succeeded in getting the building repaired and put into excellent shape, and without having much of a debt left behind. He has relinquished the charge of Clarksville, and Louisiana

has assumed a greater share in his support. Retaining Prairieville, he still seems to be a veritable bishop of Pike County.

In St. Charles a guild room, admirably convenient, has been added to the church, and paid for.

At Ferguson the people have put their pastor into a rectory where, by his paying rent for a time, he can have the privilege of helping them to sink the loan which was necessary to be made in erecting it.

In Old Orchard both church and rectory have been renovated and enlarged, and I think the prospect is good that all the improvements will be paid for at once.

In St. Louis, All Saints' has taken a long stride ahead in its sale of its former edifice, and its purchase of the church property, formerly Unitarian, on the corner of Locust street and Garrison avenue. No church in the city is now better equipped than All Saints', with its chapel and Sunday-school room and guild room.

The parish house of the Church of the Holy Communion is finished and occupied, and in good course to be paid for. Holy Innocents', with only a modest debt, has put up a comfortable rectory, in which the pastor and family are now happily at home. The Church of the Good Shepherd has reverently and gratefully placed upon its chancel wall an enduring tablet in memory of its late faithful and much-loved rector, Rev. B. F. Newton. St. Stephen's is a very hive of missionary activity and growth, and is accumulating a fund for enlargement, the need for which presses daily and hourly upon it. For the Church of the Advent the faithful city missionary, Rev. Mr. Cochran, has laid wise foundations in an excellent location, contenting himself at present to worship with his flock in the substructure, even though it be not dignified with the ancient and honorable appellation of the crypt. St. George's, after a parochial life of sixtytwo years, and pensioning its last pastor, the Rev. Dr. Holland, who during two separated terms was its faithful rector for twenty-eight years, has gathered itself into co-operation with the cathedral under the name of St. George's Chapel. The Orphans' Home, by a fortunate sale of downtown property, finds itself assured of a reasonable income to meet the needs of the little ones under its care.

These things enumerated are outward and visible signs. I feel convinced that in parishes and congregations, and in hearts and lives, all through the diocese, there is also growth in inward and spiritual grace, and I earnestly give God thanks, and cheerily give you greeting in our review thereof.

It is a comfort also to know that not many places now are without a pastor. Clarksville, De Soto, Moberly, Thayer, LaPlata, Portland, Shelbina, and Valley Park are all; and of these the last four can hardly be called vacancies. Archdeacon Walton, since he came, has the supervision of these, and by his excellent work in the diocese, and his quick grasp of

In the vital matter of missionary work the outlook is a cheery one. In the city the Hospital Missions have a wise and untiring head in the Rev. Mr. Brittain. The city missions of Advent and Epiphany and St. Barnabas' and St. Timothy's, under Rev. Mr. Cochran and his assistant, Rev. Mr. Cuddy, are prospering. Deaconess Anne and Miss Skinker and their helpers, make Holy Cross Mission to be a very center of light and succor; St. Stephen's needs only to be seen to be recognized as a personification of beneficence. It has lately added another feature of merciful goodness. It has secured eighty acres of land, on which it is to erect some buildings in the country to give fresh air in the hot summer months to the cooped-up children of our city. The Convalescent Home rescues and revives scores of the weary, and the wasted. In the diocese, with the archdeacon's help, nothing is left neglected to fall back into weakness and despair. And the money for sustaining all the good work was provided by the \$10,000 pledged for Diocesan Missions at the last convention, Missouri pledges being always, as we are proud to tell, as reliable for our needs as actual cash in hand. I feel obliged to make known that to keep all our diocesan missionary work in healthful continuance there is need this year of pledges for \$11,500.

Honest pride also uplifts the eyes in looking outside of the diocese. Missouri paid its full apportionment of \$5,500 last year for General Missions. Nineteen dioceses, out of the sixty-three, paid in full. Missouri was one of the nineteen. Eight Western dioceses only paid in full. Missouri was one of the eight. Besides, our Sunday-schools gave over two thousand dollars, and our Woman's Auxiliary over six hundred dollars. More than eighty-one hundred dollars in all. I was made very happy by the honorable record. But gladness and sadness are in our human life so likely to get near to each other and shake hands, that I am now wondering if we are to keep up to our good record in the present year, ending August 31. Up to April 1, the date of the last report, only \$1,860.44, of the \$5,800, have been sent in. That makes me a little sad.

I ask you to note what wonderful helpers the women and children are. The \$600 are but a small part of the gifts and pledges for missions of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Auxiliary. They have given in money this year \$6,611.53, over and above their supplies of boxes sent. And the Young Women's Club is a supporter of Holy Cross; and other women are helpers of St. Stephen's; and women sustain the Orphan's Home and the Convalescent Home. And the children give, besides their \$2,000 for outside missions, their \$1,000 also through the Missionary Host to their bishop for inside missions. Verily, in the hand shake, after all, triumphant gladness shakes and doubting sadness is shaken.

I must not neglect to make known that a new mission of the diocese, St. Paul's, Overland Park, has been organized.

Difficulties have beset Bishop Robertson Hall. It has been a burden upon the Sisters to pay interest on the mortgage of \$25,000, and to meet the cost of repairs, taxes, and insurance. After thoughtful consideration we have decided to sell the property. The good done by the faithful and devoted Sisters, not only to individual pupils, but to the Church tone, and the Church work, and the Church growth of the diocese is beyond calculation. Blessings have constantly flowed forth from their influence and their school. May blessings return and rest upon them and their future lives!

This is the Jubilee year of the University of the South. In 1857 it was founded under Bishops Otey and Polk and Elliott. I think it a well-planned, a well-managed, and a nobly efficient institution. I shall be glad and grateful for the diocese to be loyal to it, and to be generously helpful to its needs.

The General Clergy Relief Fund, from its office in Philadelphia, has been generous to our aged and infirm clergymen, having given us \$600 last year. Our offerings to the supply of its treasury were \$199.07, and only nine of our parishes contributed. I should be glad and grateful if on Quinquagesima Sunday, or some other Sunday of the year, each and every congregation should be asked to contribute to this fund.

There is a spirit abroad in the Church, I think, waking up the men. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew has been a help in begetting and promoting it. The Brotherhood, in our diocese, is awake and active. Witness its provision and guidance of the late daily Lenten services for business men. And also its placing a man of its own in the field to help Holy Cross Mission and the hospital missions. Then Church Clubs and Laymen's Forward Movements and Laymen's Conferences have arisen all over the land. And now, especially, the Men's Missionary Thankoffering is presented to our consideration. The plan of this thankoffering, it seems to me, is admirable. First, to get the register of the names of all the men over fifteen years of age of the American Church. Second, to have a brother man interview each and every one of these men to tell him of the great missionary work of the Church, and to ask him for an offering in grateful commemoration of three hundred years of English Christianity in America, which began at Jamestown, Va., in 1607. To get this done all over the United States should be a great enlargement of missionary interest, and a great uplift of missionary zeal. I honestly want to help all I can as bishop, and I earnestly ask the clergy to help all they can, and I no less earnestly beg all our laymen to lend a hand in accomplishing this end, viz., that every man among us shall hear something from fellowman about our missionary work, and shall give something in gratitude for our three hundred years of Anglo-Saxon Christian life. We clergymen are men. I hope the brother man will come to us, and that each of us will be represented. V

sented. Will not one man give \$1, and another \$5, and another \$50, and another \$100, and even more, that Missouri shall not be left behind and writ down least in the count? On Wednesday morning, October 9, at a service of the Holy Communion in Richmond, it is proposed to hand in the Thankoffering, and in a mass-meeting, in a large hall at night, to make it known. My heart is full of hope that our men will not let Missouri lag far in the rear in that count. It is proposed that Monday, June 17, be the closing day for the registering and the giving. May I not earnestly ask that those parish committees who have not acted, and those men who have not given, will in these two coming weeks do both these things? Also, on the third Sunday after Trinity, in 1607, Rev. Robert Hunt, at Jamestown, celebrated the first English service of the Holy Communion ever held in America; and I ask that the clergy on Sunday, June 16, being the third Sunday after Trinity, will, in their services and sermons, have special and grateful remembrance and reference to that early day.

In talking of men and trying to rouse men to active work, is it out of place for me to name two men among us who have stood up to and staid by such active Christian service for extended periods of time? Mr. James B. Gazzam has been continuously treasurer of Christ Church and Christ Church Cathedral for more than forty years. Mr. William H. Thomson, as Sunday-school teacher and superintendent, and vestryman and warden, has been in service in Trinity, St. Louis, for more than fifty years. And may I be permitted to name one man more who shows the zeal of a Christian and the wisdom of a statesman in the faithful work he does, viz., Mr. Charles Sparks in his care of the Union Sunday-school at Jennings.

The Director of the National Census is endeavoring to compile a correct and complete return in the religious department. I am helping him all I can. But he has sent cards and lists for information to each one of you of the clergy. We all want correctness and completeness to be secured in this matter. They can not be secured without our help. I ask that every clergyman will take pains to fill out the list and return to the office. If you have not done so already, and have lost the listed card, please write at once to Mr. S. N. D. Horth, Director of the Census, Washington, D. C., and ask him to furnish you a duplicate.

Two things suggest themselves to me to dwell upon before I close.

The first concerns St. Luke's Hospital. I know the blessed and blessing service which it renders. A few days since I received a letter from a clergyman whose wife had been cared for there, filled with expression of the warmest and deepest gratitude. By history and by charter it is a Church institution. Now hospitals, under modern demands for equipment and service and skill, are necessarily expensive institutions. Under the large expenses St. Luke's needs help. It needs gifts. It needs endowments. May not the clergy who, with their families are blessedly helped by it, help it in turn by calling attention to it. In the office of the Visita-

tion of the Sick in the Prayer Book, this following is enjoined upon the clergyman: "And if the sick person hath not before disposed of his goods, let him then be admonished to make his will, and to declare his debts, what he oweth and what is owing unto him, for the better discharging of his conscience, and the quietness of his executors. But men should often be put in remembrance to take order for the settling of their temporal estates, whilst they are in health."

The clergyman then has the authority of the Church to speak to men about their wills. God blesses the men of America—many among them—with prosperous conditions, and the possession of considerable fortunes. May not the clergyman, in a timely word to a steward of wealth, put into his thoughts the needs of the hospital, and how a bequest made to it in the will would be a sure way to do great and kindly good to his suffering fellowmen?

The second is suggested to me by the gratifying number of confirmations reported this year. They are 686, more than ever reported before in any year since the present diocese has existed. I am rejoiced at this, for I think confirmation to be an important and valuable part of the ways and means possessed by the Church for impressing her demands and her Master's commands upon the hearts and souls of men. But I am constrained to dissociate myself from sympathy with two utterances that sometimes come to my hearing.

One clergyman says: "It is not my habit to ask people to be confirmed, and still less to urge them. They know that the Church wants them, and that it is their duty to be confirmed, and that they ought to do their duty. It is for them to move and not for me. If they come I shall be glad and grateful, and accord them a cordial welcome."

My dear brother, I can not but esteem your view to be a mistaken one. You are the man of God among your parishoners. For a few years and till the evening comes, and the account of stewardship must be handed in, you are set to speak for God to the wandering souls of men. Can you think that God, with all His love in Christ for men, does not want men asked to close in with that love, and to place themselves in the inner circle of grace which he abundantly provides? And who is to be voice for Him to do the asking if not you, the man of God? God the Holy Spirit speaks to them, I grant, in their inner thought and conscience. But God wants an outward voice to speak to them too, to deepen and strengthen and enforce the inner message. And you, the man of God, ought to be that voice, speaking to fellow men, man to man, eye to eye, heart to heart, about their souls. Home, society, business, experience, moral standards, the very newspapers may teach them of duty to fellowmen and drill them in such duty. But duty to God, duty to confess gratefully the Lord Jesus Christ before men, and to be His sworn soldier in confirmation, who is to wake each soul to this, and to urge the doing of it, but you, the man of God? God? And, surely, surely, men will thank you for the speaking, and honor you for the speaking, and love you for the speaking, even if for some strong or strange reason they will not move for your speaking. The old meaning of prophet is one who speaks for God. O, my brother, if you speak not for God to men and women, urging them to come to confirmation, are you the true prophet that you ought to be?

Another clergyman says, "I want my class for confirmation to be well instructed. I would rather have five well-instructed ones to present to the bishop to be confirmed, that they may be true and steadfast churchmen afterward, than fifty uninstructed ones, loose in their attachment to the Church, untrained in, and it may be unloyal to her practices and requirements."

My dear brother, it is the ideal you are thinking of. So thinking, you are right. It is of the children who have been baptized, and who must be taught and instructed before coming to confirmation. The rubric before the catechism and the office for Infant Baptism bear you out in your view, and so you are quite right. But, if you think of the practical, will you forgive me if I say honestly that I esteem you quite wrong. If the two classes are lined up and I must choose between them, indeed I had rather have the fifty uninstructed ones to come to confirmation than the five well instructed. There would be ten times the number of souls come to Christ and to His Church, and to the influences these would draw forth around them. God's love in Christ wants souls, rather than well-instructed Church-The Blessed Saviour's yearning is for souls. He wants, as it were, to go out and compel them to come in. When the three thousand on the day of Pentecost were at once baptized, after Peter's sermon, are we to think they had any prolonged course of instruction? And, anyway, can you say the men and women about you, whom you want to plead with to come to confirmation, are not instructed? Homes have instructed them. Experience has moulded them. Business has taught them. Social duties have disciplined them. Life itself has educated and developed them. They know the right and the wrong. They know much of the false and the true. They discern between the good and the bad. Much instruction in these things they have had. You might have a confirmation class under faithful and valuable instruction for six months, and yet these men and women in the thick of the world's duties and the heat of the world's temptations, and the cloud of the world's sadnesses, shall know vastly more of these necessary things than your well-instructed class. Do not, I would urge, make your class and your instruction everything. Be not afraid to take in for confirmation those whom you may deem uninstructed, if only they be honest and earnest. The Church is not an ark for the perfectly instructed, the perfectly sane, the perfectly healthy, the perfectly sanctified to flee into. It's a workshop. It's a hospital. It's a school. It's a brotherhood lodge room. In it we are to be helped. And we are to help each

And if His Holy Spirit has already helped the uninstructed ones outside to be good, and to think true and to do right, how should we not be glad and grateful to welcome all such ones, even though uninstructed, to come to receive by the laying on of hands, into their wondering and humbled souls the covenanted gift, and the overflowing pledged and promised gift of God, the Holy Ghost.

Dear brethren of the clergy, the time is short. Are we speaking for God to the souls of men as we ought while the daylight lingers? The night cometh, and with it comes the call for the account of our stewardship. God mercifully have us ready for it for the loving Saviour's sake! Be not wanting or weary in urging men to be confirmed. Be not afraid to bring in uninstructed ones, if only they be honest and earnest. The Church in her Christian year, in her sacred worship, in her kindly brotherhood, in her holy sacraments, will instruct them; and you and they, please God in His mercy through Christ, shall be of that "great multitude which no man could number, of all nations and kindreds and people and tongues, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, and palms in their hands."

Archdeacon's Annual Report.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D.D., S.T.D., LL.D., Bishop of Missouri:

Elected to the office of Archdeacon of the Diocese as the Convention year was drawing to a close, this report must assume, necessarily, a somewhat general character. Under the personal direction of the Bishop the work, so far, has consisted of visits of inspection, a study of the population and location of rural towns and some special work of an incidental character. You will, therefore, perceive that no systematic attempt at church extension can as yet have been undertaken. This tour of inspection is now in progress and will not be completed for several months.

As the result of my investigation of the Diocese of Missouri I find about thirty counties and at least one hundred towns of appreciable size where the Church is practically unknown, and the churchman settling in rural districts must seek some large adjacent town if he desires our church ministration. It is, however, evident, both in the city of St. Louis and other localities that the Church has not lacked faithful and consecrated men conspicuous for missionary zeal and ability and whose work has been crowned with success. The sad destitution in the State at large is due, partially, to an insufficient force of these men and, partly, to the constant shifting of the missionary clergy consequent, often, upon salaries inadequate to their support. If the Bishop and Archdeacon could only reinforce the present corps by a few men of similar caliber and a strong effort were made to increase salaries all along the line, the future would be bright with hope and promise. Capital is being invested in our Diocese, industries are multiplying, the larger estates are being subdivided and sold to small farmers in certain localities. Our policy should be to preëmpt these districts in the interest of the Church, occupying strategic points susceptible of being worked in groups by one man. It has been too much our custom in our older Dioceses to follow rather than to precede and create the demand for the Church. As a business principle men of the world would unhesitatingly condemn this policy.

In conclusion, I will state briefly the policy of the Archdeacon in certain important details. This is always subject, of course, to the wise guidance and riper judgment of the Bishop of the Diocese. It is:

First, to develop towns, systematically in groups, creating (in Methodist parlance) a convenient circuit for the local missionary.

Second, being thoroughly convinced that any attempt at propagating church principles has larger promise of success when we possess a building of our own, to build at such places small but churchly chapels wherever I can find or create a sufficient basis for local co-operation.

Third, to organize, principally in St. Louis, a force of lay readers, to be utilized outside of the city in all the silent churches of the Diocese.

I would add to this third point that a slight prejudice existed at one time amongst quite a number of the clergy against the use of this class of church help—and, I believe, in exceptional cases, this prejudice still survives. But my own experience is that a lay brotherhood is of great practical utility when properly handled, and this opinion is reinforced by the verdict, I think, of the Church, both in this country and abroad.

As an illustration of the extent to which this factor is utilized, I quote from an article in the *Living Church* the 11th of May: "In response to an appeal of Archdeacon Lloyd, of Canada, the Colonial and Continental Church Society have just sent out seventy laymen from England to act as catechists and lay readers; each has been assigned from 300 to 400 square miles, principally along the Grand Trunk R. R. System of Canada; the Archdeacon supervises and directs the entire force." A broad observation, both at home and abroad, indicates that the lay reader is becoming, increasingly, each year, a working power of the Anglican and American Churches. I shall also endeavor,

Fourth, to systematize contributions by enrolling members of a certain society, the object of which will be to erect immediately and on demand buildings at given points by a co-operative offering. I shall endeavor also,

Fifth, to increase the salaries of all the missionary clergy. Men have their commercial value; we must get good men in the missionary field, and we must *keep them*. There is no other way of accomplishing this object. I pray the time may speedily come when our laymen and missionary boards will no longer figure out an income for the individual clergyman on which he may just decently exist. There are certain reasonable demands in the ministerial life which can only be supplied by an income at least a trifle in excess of absolute necessities.

Substantial results from these policies may not always be immediate, but we know that we have at least taken the *first step* correctly. The conditions of growth have been complied with initially—a logical basis for church development has been provided. The actual harvest in many instances may possibly be reached after our ministry is over. Let us labor wisely and patiently, in faith and hope, content if we obey the Master's command: "In the morning sow thy seed and in the evening withhold not thy hand for thou canst not tell whether shall prosper either this or that."

The last two appropriations were made from funds furnished the Board by the Woman's Auxiliary and the Young Women's Club.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew agreed to raise the sum of \$600.00 for the support of a layman to assist in the work of hospital and other missions for the period of one year from January 1, 1907, and the Bishop appointed Mr. F. A. Fanning to assist in such work. The Board appropriated this amount to be paid to Mr. Fanning in monthly installments, if the same was paid to the Treasurer of the Board.

The Bishop appointed Rev. Wm. M. Walton as Archdeacon of the Diocese, and the Board, at its regular meeting, held on the 23d day of

January, 1907, approved the appointment. He entered upon the duties of his office on the 15th day of February, 1907.

The Board appropriated the sum of \$2,000.00 per year as the salary of the Archdeacon, and the sum of \$500.00 per year for his traveling expenses, to commence at the time he began work.

The Board also adopted the following regulations governing the traveling expenses of the Archdeacon, and the moneys collected by him.

TRAVELING EXPENSES.

"The expenditure of the appropriation made by the Diocesan Missionary Board for traveling expenses of the Archdeacon, shall be paid upon vouchers prepared by him and presented to the Treasurer of the Missionary Board; said vouchers shall cover actual expenses incurred by the Archdeacon incident to travel in connection with his work, and shall not in any one year from September 1 to August 31 exceed the sum appropriated for this purpose, except by specific and prior approval of the Missionary Board."

MONEY.

"It shall be the duty of the Archdeacon to render quarterly an account of all moneys coming into his possession in the discharge of his work, except such fees for marriages or other personal services as he may render. All offerings made at stations served by him shall be credited to the General Missionary Fund of the Diocese, and shall be turned in by him to the Treasurer. The credit so established may be drawn on by the Archdeacon in the furtherance of his work, subject, however, to such limitations as the Missionary Board may, from time to time, impose."

The following resignations have been received and accepted: Rev. E. Phares, Christ, Moberly, February 1, 1907.

The following missions are reported vacant: Clarksville, De Soto, Moberly, LaPlata, Portland, Shelbina, Thayer and Valley Park.

The Board appointed a committee of its members, consisting of Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. C. F. Blaisdell, and Maj. A. M. Davis, whose duty it should be to oversee and supervise the Missionary work in the city, and be a counsel of advice to the City Missionary and his assistants, and the Hospital Missionary and his assistants, between the meetings of the Board, and also to secure reports from them of their work to be submitted to the Board.

On April 10, 1907, the Board gave its consent, on petition, to the requisite number of persons to associate themselves together as a Mission, to be known as St. Paul's Mission, of Overland Park.

The Convention, at its last session, adopted a report of its committee on merging the various funds for Missionary work, in which a schedule was adopted, showing the sums to be used out of the \$10,000.00 pledged for different purposes. In that schedule \$1,500.00 was set apart for church extension. The Board construed this to mean that it might, out of such sum, pay indebtedness for the erection of a Mission House, and also liens that might be established in the way of special taxes against mission property. Accordingly, the Board appropriated \$393.24 to pay the last installment of the indebtedness for building the Mission House for Advent Mission, and also \$84.50 for special taxes against Epiphany Mission.

These are all the funds that were used for church extension, except what was paid out for services rendered by those engaged in Missionary work. The Board submits its action in this respect to the Convention, with the hope that if it was not warranted in so doing, the Convention will be more specific in designating for what purposes it desires the Board to appropriate the money furnished it.

The Board earnestly recommends that the Convention raise by pledges the sum of \$11,500.00 based on the following needs:

Report of the Missouri Branch of the Moman's Auxiliany.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Convention:

We closed our twenty-five years of auxiliary work last year with one regret, that every Parish in the Diocese had not participated in it.

There has been little improvement in that regard this year, and yet we have accomplished great things. All the regular work in pledges has gone on and our quarterly meetings have had the usual appeals which have been readily and generously met. Besides all this we have made two unusual gifts. The largest gift so far, to the Bishop Tuttle Church House, Boise, has come from the Missouri Auxiliary. In gifts both great and small, \$1,000 has been gathered as a loving appreciation of our Bishop's great work in the far West, and at the same time is a small acknowledgment of his unfailing thought of us and our work.

The other unusual gift is a little church now building in the mountains of Virginia. The first church to be entirely built by our branch. In it there will be a tablet telling that the loving women of the Missouri Auxiliary have built it to commemorate the twenty-five years' of the Secretary's work. Her desire is that it shall bear the name of St. John.

To the clergy of the diocese we appeal not only for consent but for co-operation in establishing new branches. We can not enter into your borders without your invitation. We have proved that the Auxiliary never weakens any Parish work, but rather strengthens it by increasing missionary zeal and intelligence.

It is not money we ask for, that comes of itself when the need is presented if the heart be quickened to that appeal.

The foregoing shows that the total number of patients cared for during the year was 851, or a total of 18,654 days of hospital treatment, costing \$52,891.24, or an average rate of \$2.83 per patient per day. Of this number of patients, 164 were beneficiaries, receiving 3,837 days of free treatment. Therefore, about 20 per cent of the total number of days of hospital treatment was thus given gratuitously to those unable to pay for same.

A comparison of the results for the years ending April 30, 1906, and April 30, 1907, is here given:

This indicates an increase of 25 patients, or 215 days, and a decrease of expenditures of \$2,423.75 or 18 cents per day, in 1907, and a decrease of 7 per cent, or 948 days of free treatment for beneficiaries for the same period.

The report for last year invited attention to the apparent excessive cost, \$3.01, per day for hospital care, but for the present year this rate has been reduced to \$2.83 per day—a rate, however, that may still appear to be unreasonable, but, as explained in that report, it is due to the fact that only about 50 per cent of the rooms and wards has been utilized, with a necessarily fixed outlay for maintenance sufficient to cover the maximum capacity of the hospital.

There is much in connection with our school which it is impossible for me to speak of, as you can no doubt understand and appreciate.

I am sending you with this the issue of our *Parish Intelligence*, giving an account of the closing of the Normal Class, which may interest you; and also the February copy, in which you will find our annual report, and to which I would specially call your attention under the heading of "The Sunday School."

I am sorry I missed seeing you at the Conference of Church Clubs in Washington, and trust that we may meet at the General Convention in Richmond.

I think the report of the Joint Commission will be generally acceptable to the Church and the results most useful. It is to be published as a manual, and I feel sure will do good.

6. How do you secure teachers for your Sunday School, and what method of training or preparing them do you have?

For thirty-six years, a weekly class for lesson study, with certain elements for training teachers has been carried on, and during the past three years a normal class has been conducted for younger teachers and those intending to become such.

This latter has been most successful. The first year "Elements of Teaching" was studied. Second, Studies in the Bible and prayer book. Third, Church history. And the sessions will be continued another year when there will probably be a general review of the first year's work and a course of study on the subject of "Missions."

We have never had any difficulty in securing teachers as we have a supply on hand who act as substitutes when needed, and also take up the regular work when occasion arises.

7. Are teachers' meetings held, and of what kind?

The weekly teachers' meetings above referred to. Twice a year there is a special conference of all the officers and teachers of the Parish (embracing the Church and three Chapel Schools) preceding Advent and Lent. The business matters of the school are in care of a council composed of the Rector, Superintendent, Associate and Assistant Superintendents, Primary and Intermediate Superintendents, Choirmaster, one of the Librarians, one of the Secretaries, and two Teachers, elected by the Teachers' Association.

- 8. What subjects do you undertake to teach in your Sunday School?

 I hardly know how to reply to this question, as it is so closely related to No. 10; but while the Bible is studied, it is illustrated from the Prayer Book.
- 9. What is the average age of your teachers?

 I can not say. I should think about thirty years.
- 10. What lessons or lesson systems are you using?

 The Joint Diocesan Scheme, with alternate ones for the Primary and Intermediate Department.
- 11. Do you provide reference books for teachers? Each teacher is provided with the American Church S. S. Magazine, and there is a reference library which is quite complete and for use as may be desired.
- 12. How is your school graded?

In the Primary Department are the children from four to eight; Intermediate, from seven to eleven. In the main

school and Bible classes there is no grading, as here we depend upon the teacher's personal influence.

- 13. What proportion of your scholars attend the services of the Church?

 A very large number, as there are 909 of our scholars (out of a total of 1,510) who are communicants of the Church.
- 14. What do you find to be the best method of securing such attendance?

 The best method of securing attendance at the Church services is to make them interesting, and not talk about it all the time.
- 15. Do you have a special children's service?

We do not, except in the Babies' Branch.

16. How far does your Sunday School work result in bringing children to confirmation?

By an offering in the Church once a year, and the voluntary contributions of the officers, teachers and scholars one Sunday in the month, except during Advent and Lent, as we feel that the scholars should be interested in this matter, and should not feel that everything was done for them without their making any effort in behalf of it themselves. In this connection I would say that the school contributes once a month to the expenses of the Church.

20. What efforts do you make to interest parents in the work of the school, and what response do you find?

A great many parents are members of the Adult Bible Class, others connected with the Mothers' Meeting and the missionary organizations. We endeavor to interest them as much as possible, the children frequently take home invitations to their parents to attend the sessions, and we find a hearty co-operation therein.

21. How many homes represented in your Sunday School observe family devotions?

I can not answer this question.

22. Do you feel satisfied with the net result of your Sunday School, and if not, why not?

No one should be satisfied with the result of any work being done for the Church, or in behalf of our Blessed Lord, but when we have done our best we must leave the rest to Him. I have been superintendent of this Sunday School for thirty-nine years, and have found it essential to change my methods from time to time. I am always seeking such information as I can get to guide me, and the only suggestion I have to make is for one to be intensely interested in the work and stick at it.

23. What do you consider the principal need of the Sunday School today?

And in what direction do you look for assistance to this end?

I consider one of the principal needs of the Sunday School today more male teachers. The men of the Church are sadly neglecting this work. As a means to this end, I feel that the Brotherhood of St. Andrew has done a great deal. I think also the Missionary Thankoffering may have influence in this direction; but wherever we can do anything to suggest to men their duty in this particular, I think we ought to emphasize it.

I also think the principal need of the Sunday Schools is not more pedagogy, but more spirituality; the bringing of the Right Re

Right Rev. D. S. Tuttle, President Sixty-eighth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

That the members of your Commission share the anxiety of the Committee, to whose earnest report to the last Convention and its accompanying resolution this Commission owes its existence, and believe that the time has come to adopt and introduce some uniform simple and systematic course of religious instruction in the Sunday Schools of this Diocese, including the instruction and training of teachers as well as of scholars, and a regular order for the school sessions and as your Commission is one of investigation preliminary to the consideration of proper subjects and methods and order in the schools, it submits the following facts for your information:

Your Commission has reports from sixteen schools in this Diocese and from the Church of the Holy Apostles, Philadelphia, and from the Church of the Epiphany, Chicago.

Results of Sunday School Teaching in Church Attendance-

The reports from our own Rectors of Sunday School children attending regular services of the church run from "Few," "Very small," "One-sixth," up to "One-half." The Epiphany Church reports "A good proportion," and Holy Apostles "Very large, out of 1,510, 909 are communicants."

No definite account can be given of the effects of our Sunday School teaching in making our scholars regular attendants and consistent members of the church.

Special Services for Sunday School Children-

Two Rectors report special services for children.

Four report no special services.

Three report special services in Lent.

Two report monthly services.

One reports four services a year.

Two at Christmas, Easter and before Thanksgiving.

Two occasionally.

Holy Apostles' reports no special services.

Epiphany reports monthly corporate communion for all confirmed scholars.

There are many other questions relating to modes of obtaining teachers and scholars and enlisting parents in the work, but above will suffice to give an idea of the nature and extent of the religious instruction given in our Sunday Schools.

From the nature of the case the instruction in our Sunday Schools can only be meagre. It is the more necessary, therefore, that it should be well chosen, well taught, and as nearly as possible, uniform, so that its effects can be watched and improvements made. The actual religious influence of the Sunday School will probably have to be measured by considerations different from all the foregoing; by the effect of the regular assembling of the children for a religious purpose, by the atmosphere of reverence in the school, especially by the reverential treatment of religious names and doctrines and things by the Rector and teachers, by the feeling inculcated at all times that all are engaged in a religious service appointed by the Church and part of the Church's own service, to prepare the children of the Church specifically for their place in the Church. By the extent to which loyalty and devotion to the Church, her doctrines, her ministry, her sacraments, her holy seasons and her worship, influence the teachers and are instilled into the scholars at a period in life when the child is susceptible and enthusiastic and capable of taking a grasp of this side of the religious life which nothing can ever shake.

This involves the personality and especially the religious character of both Rector and teacher, and it is probable that here can be discovered the reason why an almost systemless, unclassified instruction, nevertheless gives fruit beyond all expectation in numberless additions to the Church through the door of the Sunday School.

Your Commission offers the following resolution:

Resolved, That the work begun by this Commission be continued by a special committee (of which the Archdeacon shall be a member) who shall by conference with the Rectors of Parishes endeavor to introduce a uniform system of text-books and methods of Sunday School instruction and systematic training of teachers, in this Diocese, and report to the next Convention.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

ARTICLE I-NAME.

SECTION. I. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S Cooperating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II-OBJECT.

SECTION I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERS.

SECTION I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS.

SECTION I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI-FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section i. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-MEETINGS OF.

SECTION I. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

We received from the sale of our old church, at Twenty-second and Washington Avenue, the sum of \$51,250.00. Out of this we paid commission on sale the sum of \$1,250. Deed of trust on old church and interest due on same, \$5,375.00. We bought our present church from the Messiah (Unitarian) Congregation, paying for the same \$35,000.00. The cost of repairing and remodeling the church was \$2,500.00. We purchased the eight (8) room house, 3309 Lucas Avenue, for a Rectory, paying for the same, including repairs, etc., \$4,400.00. The balance from the sale of our old church, amounting to the sum of \$2,725.00, was reserved as a nucleus for an endowment for our church, the Bishop of the Diocese, by action of the vestry of the church, being requested to act as trustee of the fund. The fund for the endowment, by the accruing of interest, by offerings of the congregation, and notably by a bequest of \$500.00, received from the estate of the late Mrs. Mary E. O'Dell, has been increased to about \$3,800.00. It is our purpose to endeavor to bring this up to at least \$10,000.00, that the interest from its investment may assist in providing the salary for an assistant to the Rector. The proposed extension of our work needs an additional minister.

Only about 20 resident communicants, the rest transitory, because students, and unable to do much financially. Very few children in church families. If work here is to be done to any extent, it must be as national rather than diocesan or parochial, as communicants come from every quarter of the country, Canada, etc., and parish can not bear burden of necessary work. Parish has almost disintegrated, and will take at least two years to get it into shape, but there are a large number of "inquirers" and persons leaning toward church. Strong evangelical sentiment prevails in community. Ought to have continued succession of educational Missions to work on continually changing population. Very few members bring letters of transfer and this matter ought to be urged on R. K. TUCKER. attention of all clergy.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

Sec. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
