Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Third: For the support of St. Luke's Hospital, which shall be made on St. Luke's Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.



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RULES OF ORDER OF THE CONVENTION.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Missions.
 - IV. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - V. On State of the Church.
 - VI. On Unfinished Business.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the services of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

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- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballot. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

JOURNAL OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH CONVENTION

OF THE

CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

FIRST DAY

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. LOUIS,

Tuesday, January 22, 1924.

The Clergy and lay delegates to the Eighty-fifth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, on January 22, 1924, at 10 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Rev. W. S. W. Raymond read the Gospel, and the Rev. Robt. H. Atchison read the Epistle, and the Rev. J. W. Higson, the Rev. Robt. J. McFetridge, and the Rev. Frederick B. Bartlett assisted in the ministration.

Instead of a Convention Sermon, the Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and lay delegates assembled in the Schuyler Memorial House with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the forty who were entitled to vote thirty were present.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 15.)

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the lay delegates to the Convention.

Fifty-five Parishes and Missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from nineteen were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

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By unanimous vote the Church of the Holy Innocents was, given representation in the Convention.

The Secretary's Assistant cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 1 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 1—

Resolved, that Section 22 of the Rules of Order be amended by striking out lines 11 and 12, and by inserting between lines 6 and 7 the following line:

"Report of the Diocesan Council."

Further, that the Order of Business for the Second Day, in said Section 22, be amended by striking out paragraph No. 8, and inserting in lieu thereof the following paragraph:

"8. The Missionary interests of the Church, and reports pertaining thereto, shall be the Order of the Day at the afternoon session of the Second Day."

Resolution No. 1 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 2 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 2—

'Resolved, that this Convention, each morning after divine service, shall assemble for business at 10 a.m., with a recess from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., and shall adjourn at 5 p.m., until the next day.

Resolution No. 2 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 3 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 3—

Resolved, that Section 22 of the Rules of Order be amended by inserting between lines 10 and 13, the following words:

"Introduction of resolutions pertaining to the Bishop's address"; and that the items in the order of business for the First Day be renumbered.

Resolution No. 3 was adopted.

By authority of the Convention the Bishop appointed a Nominating Committee as follows:

The Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. Arthur Garrison, and Mr. Victor H. Rhodes.

Mr. Curtice read his report as Secretary of the Standing Committee. The Convention stood during the reading of this report. (Appendix 2.)

Report received.

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It was ordered that that portion of the foregoing report pertaining to Bishop Tuttle should be given a separate page in the Journal.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

Mr. Waterworth introduced Resolution No. 4 as follows:

Resolved, that a committee be appointed by the Chair to prepare and submit resolutions on the death of Bishop Tuttle.

Resolution No. 4 was adopted.

Under above resolution the Bishop appointed as a committee Mr. James A. Waterworth and the Rev. Dr. Wilkins.

Mr. Curtice presented his report as Secretary of the Parochial Trust Fund. (Appendix 3.)

Report received.

Mr. Barroll presented his report as Secretary of the Diocesan Council. (Appendix 4.)

Report received.

It was ordered that the proposed budgets in the report of the Diocesan Council, together with the assessments and apportionments, be made the order of the day for Wednesday at 11 a. m.

It was ordered that Clergy who were not members of the Convention should have the privilege of the floor.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 5 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 5—

Resolved, that Section 2, of Canon 20, as numbered in the Edition of the Constitution and Canons of 1912, on page 28, be and is hereby repealed.

Resolution No. 5 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 6 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 6—

Resolved, that this Convention finally adopt a new section of Article VI of the Constitution, to be known as Section 3, as follows:

Section 3. The headquarters and offices of the Diocese and of the several Standing Committees and Boards of the Diocese shall be located in the Cathedral premises, 1210 Locust St., St. Louis.

Resolution No. 6 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

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The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 7 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 7—

Resolved, that Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution be amended by striking out of lines 8 and 9, paragraph 1 of Section 2, the words, "the members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese," so that said paragraph 1 of Section 2, as amended, shall read as follows:

Sec. 2. 1st. The Convention shall take order for the election of three members of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, in manner and form following:

On the Thursday of the Annual Convention, or immediately after the meeting of the Annual Convention, under the Presidency of the Bishop, of the President of the Standing Committee, or some other person duly chosen to preside, the following Board of Directors shall meet, viz.: the members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Deputies to the General Convention, of the Diocese, and shall proceed to the nomination of three Laymen, who shall be elected by the Chapter to be members thereof for the ensuing year.

Resolution No. 7 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 8 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 8—

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by striking out the word "Coadjutor" in the last paragraph.

Resolution No. 8 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 9 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 9—

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by adding to the end of Section 6 the following words:

Provided, however, that should there hereafter be a Bishop Coadjutor, the Bishop shall have power to delegate to him the authority to appoint missionaries in the Diocese.

Resolution No. 9 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 10 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 10—

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by adding after the word "department" in line 13, the following words:

Provided, however, that each department shall elect a Vice-Chairman who shall have power to call all meetings, general and special, and shall preside at all meetings and shall exercise the initiative usually exercised by the chairman of a committee, subject, however, to the right of the Bishop at any time to notify said Vice-Chairman, in writing, of his intention to suggest any action by said committee and to preside at any particular meeting of said committee, and to exercise the duties of chairman of any such meeting of the committee; saving and excepting when so notified

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by the Bishop, the Vice-Chairman shall exercise all the duties hereinabove specified to be exercised by the Vice-Chairman.

Resolution No. 10 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 11 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 11—

Resolved, that Canon 9 be amended by adding an additional section to be known as Section 11, as follows:

Section 11. The Secretary of the Diocese shall be ex-officio Recording Secretary of the Diocesan Council.

Resolution No. 11 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 12 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 12--

Resolved, that a new Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 28, as follows:

All Standing Committees shall be empowered to sit during recess, with instructions to report to the next Convention.

Resolution No. 12 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 13 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 13—

Resolved, that a new Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 29, as follows:

Whenever, by authority of the Convention, the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall generally revise the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, said Committee shall have power to change the numbers of any of the Articles of the Constitution, Canons, Sections, or Paragraphs; and such changes shall have the same force and effect of changes in numbers made by direct action of the Convention.

Resolution No. 13 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth introduced Resolution No. 14 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 14-

Be It Resolved, that the portion of the Bishop's address relating to the life and labors of our late Diocesan, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Tuttle, be placed on special pages of the Journal, and that a picture of the late Bishop be placed on a separate page.

Resolution No. 14 was adopted.

It was ordered that there be printed 1,000 copies of a pamphlet containing that portion of the Bishop's address and of the Report of the Standing Committee referring to Bishop Tuttle.

RESOLUTION No. 15-

Resolved, that that portion of the Bishop's address dealing with the life of Bishop Tuttle be printed and distributed to the Clergy of the Diocese with the suggestion that it be read to the several congregations on Sunday next (January 27), being the Sunday nearest the anniversary of the birth of our late Bishop.

Resolution No. 15 was adopted, with the provision that the author of it should superintend its printing and distribution.

The Rev. Mr. Bunting introduced Resolution No. 16 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 16-

RESOLUTION CONCERNING DIOCESAN APPORTIONMENTS FOR THE MISSIONARY BUDGET OF THE CHURCH'S PROGRAM.

Whereas, this convention regards the Diocesan Apportionment for the budget of the Church's Program as an obligation of first importance and one which the Church should make a supreme effort to discharge, and,

. Whereas, it is of the highest importance to the success of this movement that a spirit of good will, mutual trust and co-operation shall prevail among all concerned, the following resolution is offered:

Resolved: 1. That the apportionment made to this Diocese shall be considered as an obligation resting upon the Diocese as a whole and shall not be redistributed afterwards as apportionments to the several parishes and missions of the Diocese.

- 2. That immediately on learning of the amount of the Diocesan apportionment the Diocesan Council shall meet and devise adequate methods for raising this amount and co-operate with the Department of Missions and the Department of Publicity of the Council in order to adequately inform the minds of all the people as to the Missionary needs of the Church.
- 3. That the Diocesan Council be advised that it is the judgment of this Convention that the Department of Ways and Means should act as a Committee of Advice and that this Committee should confer with all Rectors and Vestries and Missionaries in charge of missions, and carefully explain to them the needs of the Field, the urgency of the Cause and learn from them how much of this total amount they can raise.
- 4. That this Convention furthermore requests the Diocesan Council to urge the Department of Missions to formulate some definite plan of Missionary Education to be applied in all parishes and missions in order to strengthen and sustain the sense of missionary responsibility and to appreciate the missionary struggles in the Church's fields of service, believing that adequate missionary knowledge is the secret of adequate missionary support.

It also urges this department to recommend the method of Parish Conferences, modifying its use in some way to suit local needs and as authorized by the National Department, for the larger missionary instruction of all the people and especially for the study of the "Program presented," and also "The story of the Program."

5. That care be taken to see that all parishes and missions be made to feel that they are being given the privilege and opportunity of co-operation in a great Cause, that their ability to pay is a matter to be decided by

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of a pamnd of the Luttle. themselves and that absolute faith in their desire to serve this Cause and in their loyalty to the same, shall replace the method hitherto used of percentage of overhead maintenance, and that apportionments assumed shall replace the method of apportionments imposed.

- 6. That after all parishes and missions have been heard from and the total amount thus promised has been learned, that the department shall make up a list of such persons in the Diocese, irrespective of parish connection, who in their judgment might contribute, and that such persons be personally seen and opportunity given them to subscribe to the Church's missionary work.
 - 7. That this resolution shall become effective January 1, 1925.

Resolution No. 16 was made the order of the day for Wednesday at the close of the order of the day for 11 o'clock.

The Rev. Mr. Atchison introduced Resolution No. 17 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 17-

Whereas, many of our text-books on English History read in our public schools are so worded that they give the impression to the student that Henry VIII founded the Church of England, and that he claimed to be its spiritual head, and

Whereas, many of the teachers in our public schools are known to teach this error, and

Whereas, this teaching is contrary to the facts of impartial history, and places the Church of England and her sister church, the Episcopal Church in America, in a false light before the world,

Be It Resolved, by this Convention that in order to combat this propaganda we enter our vigorous protest against this misrepresentation.

Be It Further Resolved, that we reiterate the statement of our belief that this Church is Apostolic in its origin and continuity.

Be It Further Resolved, that copies of this resolution be sent by the Secretary of this Convention to the members of the Boards of Education and to superintendents of public instruction, and to principals of high schools, and teachers of English history employed in our public schools, in the Diocese of Missouri.

Resolution No. 17 was adopted.

Mr. Witbeck read his report as Chairman of the Committee on the Church News. (Appendix 5.)

Report received and Resolution No. 18 contained therein was referred to the Department of Ways and Means of the Diocesan Council.

The Rev. Mr. White introduced Resolution No. 19 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 19—

Resolved, that the final paragraph of Section 6, of Canon 9, be repealed; and that Canon 8 be amended by adding to it, immediately following Section 1, the following section, to be known as Section 2: "The Bishop shall have the power of appointing missionaries in the Diocese"; and that the present Sections 2 and 3 be renumbered Sections 3 and 4, respectively.

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"Appropriations of funds by any Department of the Council shall be submitted to the entire Council for approval."

Resolution No. 19 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

On motion of Judge George C. Hitchcock, who voted in the affirmative, the vote by which Resolution No. 17 was adopted was reconsidered.

Mr. Houghton introduced Amendment No. 1 to Resolution No. 17 as follows:

Mr. Waterworth, for the Committee appointed under Resolution No. 4, presented the following report with appended Resolution No. 20 as follows:

REPORT ON THE DEATH OF BISHOP TUTTLE.

Your Committee appointed to present resolutions on the death of Right Rev. Daniel Sylvester Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri, presiding Bishop of the Church of the United States of America, begs leave to submit the following:

Since the last annual meeting of this Convention the Diocese of Missouri has been called upon to mourn the loss of its beloved Bishop, Daniel Sylvester Tuttle. After eighteen years' successful missionary labors in Montana, Idaho and Utah and thirty-seven years as Bishop of Missouri during twenty years of which he was Presiding Bishop of the American Church, Bishop Tuttle entered into rest, full of years, labors and honors on the morning of Tuesday, April seventeenth, nineteen hundred and twenty-three, and was borne to his grave in Bellefontaine Cemetery amid extraordinary demonstrations of public reverence and affection on the Friday following.

Bishop Tuttle by virtue of his office as Bishop in the Church Catholic belonged to the Holy Church throughout all the world, he belonged more

particularly to the Church in America as its Presiding Bishop, but he belonged in a more particular and special sense to this Diocese of Missouri of which he was Bishop, pastor, father and friend, honored and beloved by his people in all these endearing relations; and it is most fitting that this Convention over whose deliberations he presided for thirty-seven years with such ability and courtesy should place on record its testimony to the holy life, apostolic labors, loving fellowship and sweet humble-mindedness of its great and saintly and loving father in God, Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle.

Bishop Tuttle's life in its totality presents a vivid, consistent and beautiful picture of heroic devotion to the service of Almighty God and His Church and of his human brethren of every race, color and creed. His sense of responsibility and his pastoral care were not confined to his own household of faith but overflowed to human need wherever it made its appeal; and he had his reward in the human love and reverence which followed him through every field of his labor and in every office of his ministry.

Endowed by nature and the Holy Spirit with every quality fitting him to be God's Missionary in a new and rugged country to a forceful and uncontrolled people during the period of their earliest struggle to establish law and enforce order, he filled to the full the people's ideal of what a frontier Bishop and leader ought to be. A man of heroic mould, of large and robust frame and abundant courage, his massive voice commanding great spaces under all conditions, an orator of rich imagination and elegant diction yet understandable by all, both learned and ignorant, equipped in mind and body for leadership, he was uncompromisingly on the side of personal and civic righteousness and bold to compel recognition of Almighty God and His law in and by the community, yet of so genial and social nature and such sincere humbleness of mind that rich and poor, saint and sinner, citizen and outcast, could approach him with equal confidence and claim his help and spiritual direction and win his love. In one of the most unruly communities in the world he was looked up to as a leader of men, the champion of law and order, the friend and pastor of the whole people and an acknowledged factor in the civilizing of the western territories. After eighteen years' incessant labor he left his great missionary jurisdiction carrying with him the sincerer espect and love of the whole people, Mormon and Gentile; and loving them.

As Bishop of Missouri he adjusted himself to the routine of administering and directing the affairs of a long settled Diocese in an orderly community. There was no field here for romantic experiences or spectacular action but constant pressure of the every day duties of the Episcopal office enlivened only by the loving response of the people to the inspiration of his strong personality, his eloquent words and the holiness of his life. He was found to be as thoroughly equipped for the pastorate of an educated and cultured people in the Diocese of Missouri as of the rugged but manly pioneers of Montana. Men of all denominations and of no denomination vied with each other in testifying their respect and affection for a Bishop who was not only the learned orator of a great city pulpit, but pastor of the whole people and the friend of little children. Missouri followed Montana in taking Bishop Tuttle to its heart.

As Presiding Bishop of the American Church he bore for twenty years in addition to the cares of his own Diocese the burden of the "care of all the churches" without complaint. In this great office he was called upon to settle momentous questions of the Church's polity and to meet in council the highest dignitaries of church and state at home and abroad; whom he met as the peer of any. He won reverence and distinction by his personal dignity, his eloquence, his sound judgment, and his administrative ability. His missionary addresses were electrical in their effect in stimulating the missionary spirit of the Church and in launching great mission enterprises.

rch Catholic longed more In his twenty-year term of office as Presiding Bishop of the American Church the missionary force and equipment of the Church were more than doubled and its history became a missionary epic.

Bishop Tuttle bore the burdens and discharged the duties of his great offices graciously and efficiently to the very end. At the close of his fifty-five years' Episcopate he was the oldest Bishop of the Anglican Communion in actual service and one of the best beloved. The reverence and affection of men gathered about him increased with every year of his life and he died as he had lived, great in the estimation and affection of men, as Bishop, citizen and friend and the well beloved Presiding Bishop of the whole Church in America. May light perpetual shine upon him. Make him, O Lord, to be rewarded with Thy Saints in glory everlasting. Amen.

It is to such churchmen as Bishop Tuttle that monuments have been erected by churches and men of all nations throughout the ages; and no commemoration of the life and labors and memory of so great and notable a Missionary Bishop, no eulogies of his character or expressions of love and reverence for the Bishop or the man can possibly be considered adequate to the event or the man without some permanent memorial which while preserving his name shall also be contributory to the carrying on of the work that inspired his enthusiasm and absorbed his life. It would seem to be the duty of this Convention solemnly to resolve that such a memorial, challenging the attention of men by its sufficiency, its beauty, and its sacred uses shall be erected in St. Louis to preserve the memory of a great life and perpetuate the great work to which it was devoted.

The Secretary read the following communication from the Treasurer:

To The Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson, Bishop of Missouri, and The Members of the Eighty-fifth Diocesan Convention:

In submitting this my thirteenth Annual Report as Treasurer of the Diocese, it is with feeling of deep regret that, owing to the increased duties in connection with the office and increased responsibilities of my business position, I must ask to be relieved of the Treasurership, and that my name be not submitted for re-election.

In giving up this work, which I have loved, I ask for my successor the same kindly feeling which has been shown me by the Clerical and Lay Officers of the Diocese.

It was ordered that a committee of two be appointed to draft a resolution expressing the gratefulness of the Convention for the efficient, effective, and very faithful services of Mr. James M. Bull as Treasurer for the past thirteen years.

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Under the foregoing order the Bishop appointed as a committee the Rev. Dr. Travers and Mr. Dix.

At 11 a. m. the Bishop called up the Order of the Day, which was the consideration of the proposed budget of \$19,000.00 for General Diocesan Expenses, and its assessment against the various parishes and missions of the Diocese; and the proposed quota for the Church's Program for 1924, itemized as follows: Diocesan Missions, \$49,282.00; General Church Missions, \$36,274.80; and General Church Priorities, \$28,443.20;—a total of \$114,000.00, and its apportionment among the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

It was ordered that any increase in the budget for General Diocesan Expenses be prorated among the various parishes and missions in the assessments.

It was ordered that the sum of \$320.74 be added to the budget for General Diocesan Expenses, to allow for an increase of this amount in the expenses of the Provincial Synod.

The budget for General Diocesan Expenses, as amended, amounting to \$19,320.74, was adopted.

The quota of the Church's Program, for this Diocese, amounting to \$114,000.00, was adopted, as itemized above.

The apportionments covering the foregoing quota were adopted, as itemized in the records of the Diocesan Council.

Mr. Bergt, of St. Stephen's Parish, St. Louis, asked to be recorded as voting "No" against the foregoing order.

The Bishop called up the Order of the Day for the consideration of Resolution No. 16, introduced by the Rev. Mr. Bunting.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

The Bishop announced that Grace Church, St. Louis, had become an organized mission of the Diocese.

It was ordered that the Order of the Day, concerning Missionary Business, be suspended for not more than one hour, to allow for the further consideration of Resolution No. 16.

The assessments to cover the budget for General Diocesan Expenses, as itemized in the records of the Diocesan Council, including the increases made necessary by the addition of \$320.74 to said budget, were adopted.

The Nominating Committee presented the following report:

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis, Thursday, January 24, 1924.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Cathedral at 8 a.m. by the Rev. W. H. Decker, assisted by the Rev. J. H. Harvey.

Morning Prayer was read in the Cathedral at 9:30 a.m. by the Rev. Chas. F. Edwards.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 10 a.m.

The Secretary read the minutes of the second day which were approved.

The Nominating Committee was granted further time to complete its report.

It was ordered that Grace Church, Saint Louis, should be given representation in the Convention.

The Nominating Committee presented the names of the Rev. Edw. S. Travers, D.D., and Mr. Thomas Q. Dix as candidates for delegates to the Provincial Synod of the Southwest.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. H. G. Hurd as Treasurer of the Diocese and the Bishop declared him elected.

The election for delegates to the Provincial Synod was declared in order.

The Rev. J. H. Harvey was nominated as a delegate from the floor.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical delegate to the Provincial Synod of the Southwest and given into the hands of the tellers.

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The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Thomas Q. Dix as a lay delegate to the Provincial Synod of the Southwest.

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The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Edw. S. Travers, D.D., the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Mr. Joseph R. Barroll and Judge Davis Biggs, as members of the Diocesan Council, for a term of two years and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Very Rev. William Scarlett, Mr. C. C. Curtice, Mr. James M. Bull and Mr. Vincent L. Price, as members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Very Rev. William Scarlett, Mr. C. C. Curtice, Mr. James M. Bull and Mr. Vincent L. Price, as Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. F. C. Thompson, Mr. Charles J. Miller and Mr. John G. Lonsdale, as Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. J. H. Harvey elected a clerical delegate to the Provincial Synod of the Southwest.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Mr. Lorraine F. Jones, Jr., and Mr. William P. Nelson as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. B. E. Reed, Mr. B. F. Thompson and Mr. E. J. Thomas, as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Carroll M. Davis and Mr. John G. Lonsdale as Trustees of the University of the South, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Dr. Travers introduced Resolution No. 23 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 23-

Your committee, to whom was referred the preparation of a minute regarding the resignation of Mr. James M. Bull as Diocesan Treasurer, beg leave to offer the following:

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f a minute Treasurer, Whereas, this Convention has heard with sincere regret that Mr. James M. Bull, for 13 years the Treasurer of the Diocese, feels compelled to relinquish his office; therefore,

Be It Resolved, that we hereby place on record our deep appreciation of his faithful and efficient services.

Resolution No. 23 was adopted by a rising vote.

It was ordered that a cablegram be sent to the Rev. H. W. Mizner, Florence, Italy, congratulating him on the recovery of his health.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented the following report:

We, your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolutions 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 19, recommend that they be adopted excepting Resolution 19, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 6-

Resolved, that this Convention finally adopt a new section of Article VI of the Constitution, to be known as Section 3, as follows:

Section 3. The headquarters and offices of the Diocese and of the several Standing Committees and Boards of the Diocese shall be located in the Cathedral premises, 1210 Locust St., St. Louis.

Resolution No. 6 was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 7-

Resolved, that Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution be amended by striking out of lines 8 and 9, paragraph 1 of Section 2, the words, "the members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese," so that said paragraph 1 of Section 2, as amended, shall read as follows:

Sec. 2. 1st. The Convention shall take order for the election of three members of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, in manner and form following:

On the Thursday of the Annual Convention, or immediately after the meeting of the Annual Convention, under the Presidency of the Bishop, of the President of the Standing Committee, or some other person duly chosen to preside, the following Board of Directors shall meet, viz.: the members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Deputies to the General Convention, of the Diocese, and shall proceed to the nomination of three Laymen, who shall be elected by the Chapter to be members thereof for the ensuing year.

Resolution No. 7 was amended by changing the word "meeting" to "adjournment" in the fifth line of the printed copy, immediately following the words "after the"; so that Section 2 in said resolution when amended should read as follows:

"Sec. 2. 1st. The Convention shall take order for the election of three members of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, in manner and form following:

On the Thursday of the Annual Convention, or immediately after the adjournment of the Annual Convention, etc."

Resolution No. 7 as amended was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 8-

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by striking out the word "Coadjutor" in the last paragraph.

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Resolution No. 8 was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 9-

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by adding to the end of Section 6 the following words:

Provided, however, that should there hereafter be a Bishop Coadjutor, the Bishop shall have power to delegate to him the authority to appoint missionaries in the Diocese.

Resolution No. 9 was not adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 10-

Resolved, that Section 6 of Canon 9 be amended by adding after the word "department" in line 13, the following words:

Provided, however, that each department shall elect a Vice-Chairman who shall have power to call all meetings, general and special, and shall preside at all meetings and shall exercise the initiative usually exercised by the chairman of a committee, subject, however, to the right of the Bishop at any time to notify said Vice-Chairman, in writing, of his intention to suggest any action by said committee and to preside at any particular meeting of said committee, and to exercise the duties of chairman of any such meeting of the committee; saving and excepting when so notified by the Bishop, the Vice-Chairman shall exercise all the duties hereinabove specified to be exercised by the Vice-Chairman.

Resolution No. 10 was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 11-

Resolved, that Canon 9 be amended by adding an additional section to be known as Section 11, as follows:

Section 11. The Secretary of the Diocese shall be ex-officio Recording Secretary of the Diocesan Council.

Resolution No. 11 was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 12-

Resolved, that a new Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 28, as follows:

CANON 28.

On Standing Committees.

All Standing Committees shall be empowered to sit during recess, with instructions to report to the next Convention.

Resolution No. 12 was adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 13-

Resolved, that a new Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 29, as follows:

CANON 29.

On Renumbering.

Whenever, by authority of the Convention, the Committee on Constitution and Canons shall generally revise the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, said Committee shall have power to change the numbers of any of the Articles of the Constitution, Canons, Sections, or Paragraphs; and such changes shall have the same force and effect of changes in numbers made by direct action of the Convention.

Resolution No. 13 was adopted.

RESOLUTION NO. 19—(Reported without recommendation by Committee.)

Resolved, that the final paragraph of Section 6, of Canon 9, be repealed; and that Canon 8 be amended by adding to it, immediately following Section 1, the following section, to be known as Section 2: "The Bishop shall have the sole power of appointing missionaries in the Diosese"; and that the present Sections 2 and 3 be renumbered Sections 3 and 4, respectively.

Further Resolved, that Canon 9 be amended by adding between paragraphs 1 and 2, of Section 7, the following paragraph:

"Appropriations of funds by any Department of the Council shall be submitted to the Diocesan Council for approval."

Resolution No. 19 was adopted.

On motion of a member of the Convention who voted in the affirmative, the vote by which Resolution No. 8 was adopted was reconsidered.

Resolution No. 8 was not adopted.

Judge Hitchcock introduced Resolution No. 24 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 24-

Whereas, the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society has certain assets on hand; and

Whereas, said organization has long since ceased to function;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that all assets, now or formerly belonging to said Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society be and the same are hereby transferred to the Treasurer of the Diocese, subject to disposition thereof by the Diocesan Council; provided this Convention has, in the opinion of the Chancellor, jurisdiction and authority to dispose of said assets as herein set forth. The written opinion of the Chancellor, when filed with the Council, shall confer authority on the Council to act as stated in the Chancellor's written opinion.

Resolution No. 24 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, made the following report:

We, your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 5, recommend that it be adopted as follows:

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RESOLUTION No. 5-

Resolved, that Section 2, of Canon 20, as numbered in the Edition of the Constitution and Canons of 1912, on page 28, be and is hereby repealed.

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Resolution No. 5 was adopted.

Vice-Chancellor Benjamin S. Finney of the University of the South addressed the Convention.

Noonday Prayers were read by the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor.

Dr. Sturgis, Educational Secretary of the National Council, addressed the Convention.

It was ordered that the sympathy, good wishes and prayers of the Convention be conveyed by the Secretary to Mr. James L. Ford and Mr. Thomas K. Skinker.

Mr. Watling read the report of the Missouri Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. (Appendix 22.)

Report received.

Mr. Watling read the reports of the Secretary-Treasurer of the Missouri Diocesan League of Lay Readers. (Appendixes 23 and 24.)

Reports received.

The Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor introduced Resolution No. 25 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 25-

Resolved, that the Diocesan Council be instructed to consider carefully the relation of the Diocese of Missouri to the University of the South and to report with recommendations to the next meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

Resolution No. 25 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Edwards introduced Resolution No. 26 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 26-

Whereas, this Convention has heard with great satisfaction the words of our Bishop in his Annual Address concerning war and its abolition.

Be It Resolved, that this Convention places itself on record as cordially endorsing the sentiments of the Bishop in this matter and that it joins with the Bishop in sending greetings to those who are entrusted with the duties of legislation and governance at Washington, and that the Diocese of Missouri entreats the Government of the United States of America to make the moral power of America felt in the present world situation and to co-operate in every possible right way with other governments to bring in the promised time when wars shall cease; to hasten the coming of the time when Missouri's sons need not engage in such ugly business any more; and we respectfully suggest that the plan proposed under the Bok Peace Award offers a practical method for such co-operation.

It was ordered that Resolution No. 26 be amended by striking out all of it following the last semi-colon, referring to the Bok Peace Award.

The vote by which the foregoing amendment was passed was reconsidered, on motion of a member of the Convention who voted in the affirmative, and the amendment was laid on the table.

The original Resolution No. 26 was adopted.

Mr. Pomeroy, for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Committee of the Missouri Diocesan League of Lay Readers, introduced Resolution No. 27 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 27-

IN MEMORIAM.

There are times when words fail and we seek vainly for some adequate expression of sentiment too deep for words.

A Godly life is its own best eulogy and memorial and true beauty still needs no adornment, neither the lily to be painted.

We realize how true this is, as with heads bowed in common loss and grief, we contemplate the righteousness and beauty of holiness of our beloved Bishop Tuttle. He lived, loved, toiled, served, sacrificed and died after his Divine Master's example and ever reflected and was a most faithful witness to his Lord, as true an apostle in his time as were those of our blessed Lord's own time and choice. His most fitting memorial abides and will remain in the minds and hearts of all who knew and loved him and mourn his absence from us.

Resolution No. 27 was adopted by a rising vote.

It was ordered that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the traveling expenses of the Missionaries to the Diocesan Convention.

It was ordered that the Treasurer be authorized to pay to Christ Church Cathedral the sum of \$25.00 for extra janitor service during the Convention.

It was ordered that the Secretary be authorized to have 600 copies of the Journal printed.

It was ordered that the next Diocesan Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral.

It was ordered that the Bishop be authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the third day.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

Dr. Wilkins presented his report as Chairman of the Church Pension Fund. (Appendix 25.)

Report received.

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The Pension Fund Committee was granted further time to consider Resolution No. 14 of 1923.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 28 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 28—

Resolved, that the amendment to Sec. 2 of Art. 5 of the Constitution of the Diocese, which was approved at the last Convention, be finally adopted, so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Section 2. Every Clergyman and Deaconess in regular standing, who shall have been for six months actually and canonically resident in this Diocese, shall be entitled to a seat and vote in the Convention; provided, that he or she shall have been admitted, and at the time of the Convention shall be actually settled as Rector, Assistant Rector or Assistant Minister of some Parish in union with the Convention of this Diocese, or shall be a Missionary under the direction of the Convention and the Bishop, or shall be engaged as an instructor of youth in some Seminary of learning under the auspices of the Church, or in some Parochial School within the Diocese, or shall be engaged in an active capacity under the direction of the General Church, provided further that in this last case, actual residence shall not be required at the time of the Annual Convention, though actual residence must have been acquired under the previous clause of this section.

Resolution No. 28 was adopted.

On nomination of the Bishop, the Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Judge George C. Hitchcock as Chancellor of the Diocese for a term of three years and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the following named members of the Diocesan Council:

The Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. James H. George, the Rev. F. B. Bartlett, Mr. R. L. Orcutt, Mr. John F. Shepley and Mr. Albert Burgess.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the following named Committee of the Church News:

Mr. Roy Campbell, the Rev. F. J. Bloy, the Rev. Gordon M. Reese and Miss Ada Winston.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., a member of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Franck introduced Resolution No. 29 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 29—

Whereas, the Missionary Mass Meeting held in the Cathedral Wednesday evening, January 23rd, with the splendid address by Dr. Sturgis proved so inspiring and instructive to those in attendance, and

Whereas, our people need also the vision of Christian Social Service and Religious Education,

Be It Resolved, that the Program Committee for the Convention of 1925 be instructed to provide for the presentation and consideration of these

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subjects during the Convention and it is respectfully suggested that a special committee be appointed for the purpose of securing speakers for the same.

Resolution No. 29 was laid on the table.

The Rev. Mr. Coxe introduced Resolution No. 30 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 30—

Whereas, the Missionary Meeting held in the Cathedral Wednesday evening, January 23rd, with the splendid address by Dr. Sturgis, proved so inspiring and instructive to those in attendance; and

Whereas, our people need also the vision of Christian Social Service and Religious Education;

Be It Resolved, that we recommend to those in authority in charge of the program of the Convention of 1925, the advisability of providing for the due presentation and consideration of the subjects of Social Service and Religious Education during the Convention.

Resolution No. 30 was adopted.

The Nominating Committee presented as a candidate for election as Trustee of the University of the South, Mr. R. L. Orcutt.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. R. L. Orcutt as a Trustee of the University of the South, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The question of the duration of the next Diocesan Convention was referred to the Bishop and Standing Committee.

After the Bishop's benediction, the Convention adjourned sine die.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

EIGHTY-FIFTH DIOCESAN CONVENTION.

My Dear People:

During the more than eleven years in which I served this Missouri Diocese as Bishop Coadjutor, I felt increasingly your love and loyalty. I come to you this morning for the first time as Bishop of Missouri; and I make grateful record of your kindness to me during the years that are past, and especially during the critical year just ended. You have striven, at a time when faithlessness must have wrought great damage to the Church, to keep strong and steady and advancing the work from which one rests who through so many years was a compelling illustration here of what one man considered the Master's work was worthy of in the way of personal sacrifice and personal service. I give you my thanks. Let us, also, in the years that are to be, strive after the things whereby we may edify one another!

DANIEL SYLVESTER TUTTLE

When at the age of 86, on the 17th day of April last, Daniel Sylvester Tuttle finished his earthly course and entered on the life beyond the bridge, he probably had a larger following of personal friends than any other man in the United States. From early manhood he was marked for leadership. Throughout his life he was a spiritual, intellectual and moral dynamo. Rugged in frame, yet gentle as a woman, he drew the people to him with cords of love and grappled them to his soul with hoops of steel. He was a noble man. And the nobleness which lies in other men, sleeping but never dead, was quick to rise in majesty to meet his own.

Born in Windham, Greene County, New York, January 26, 1837, he graduated from Columbia University at the age of 20, and from the General Theological Seminary at the age of 25. On Sunday, June 29, 1862, in the Church of the Transfiguration in the city of New York, being 26 years old, he was given authority to execute the office of a deacon by Bishop Horatio Potter, sixth Bishop of New York.

The young deacon preached his first sermon in St. Peter's Church, West 20th Street, New York City, on the afternoon of the day of his ordination. The following Sunday, in the Church of St. James the Less, Scarsdale, N. Y., he for the first time ministered the cup in the office of the Holy Communion. The second Sunday in July, he came to Windham, where he had been brought up, conducted three services and preached three times. In July of 1863 he was advanced to the priesthood by Bishop Horatio Potter in Zion Church, Morris, among the hills of Otsego County, in the state of New York. A month later he became assistant minister to the Rev. George L. Foote, rector of Zion Church, Morris; and on New Year's Day, 1864, he succeeded Mr. Foote as rector of the parish, at a salary of \$800 per year. Four years and four months after he was ordered deacon, in October, 1866, being not yet 30 years old, he was elected by the House of Bishops to be Missionary Bishop of Montana, with jurisdiction also in Utah and Idaho; and on May 1, 1867, he entered upon the duties of his office as a bishop in the Church of God.

From the beginning of his ministry, the eyes of what we call the Middle West were on young Tuttle. In December, 1862, Quincy, Ill., called him at \$800 a year, which call he "declined with thanks." A week later Quincy wired him, "Come as rector at \$1,000 a year." To which he re-

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

turned, "Thanks, I cannot." St. Peter's, Sycamour, in what is now the Diocese of Chicago, went after him in March of 1863. On May 29, 1868, he having been occupied in the Missionary episcopate only a year and one month, he was unanimously elected at Kirkwood to be the Bishop of Missouri. This election he declined. Eighteen years later, in May, 1886, Missouri elected him the second time at a convention of the Diocese held in St. George's Church, St. Louis. The election was consummated by the required majorities of consents of Standing Committees, August 9, 1886. When Bishop Clarke of Rhode Island died, September 7, 1903, Bishop Tuttle became Presiding Bishop of the Church. These are the dry facts of his career. His life was a great epic poem; in the West, filled with wild adventure; in Missouri, crowded with great and increasing responsibilities. The years which multiplied upon him confirmed the promise of his youth. Unusual gifts of guidance and of friendship and a fire of faith enabled him to do good in his generation such as few men find opportunity to do. The steady-moving shuttle of his days wove the best that was in him into the very fabric of the spiritual and intellectual and political life of this city and state and nation.

Bishop Tuttle's first official act within this Diocese was in Christ Church, St. Louis, preaching and celebrating the holy communion in the morning of September 5, 1886. He was assisted by the Rev. Dr. Schuyler and by the Rev. Messrs. Sterling, Greene, Robert, and Benedict. His first confirmation in Missouri was in the evening of the same day, in Mount Calvary Church, St. Louis; four persons, presented by the Rev. Benjamin E. Reed, rector of the parish, who is with us today. The Rev. Frederick B. Scheetz and the Rev. Robert A. Holland assisted in the service. During his episcopate he confirmed a total of 18,780 persons in Missouri; else-

where he confirmed 2,000.

February 18 Bishop Tuttle conducted part of the worship at Westminster Presbyterian Church, St. Louis, at the annual patriotic service of the Sons of the Revolution. February 21 he attended the monthly meeting of Trustees of the Missouri Botanical Garden. February 22 he addressed at the College Club the Daughters of the American Revolution. The evening of the same day at Hotel Chase, he addressed the Sons of the Revolution. February 23, he preached in the evening at Palmyra. February 24, he appointed Mr. John F. Shepley of St. Louis a member of the Diocesan Council. February 26, he lunched with the "Community Drive" at Hotel Statler and pronounced the invocation. February 27, he buried his devoted friend and near neighbor, Mrs. Kate M. Howard, from the Cathedral to Bellefontaine Cemetery. (This was the last service of his life. It was public service "No. 13,700," counting from the day when he was ordered deacon in 1862.) These were his last working days. I have printed the record that we may remind ourselves how broad were his sympathies; how nothing that concerned the welfare of humanity lacked interest for him. You know how Gordon's journal closes, in the Soudan:

"I have done my best for my country. C. G. G."

Until today, not since the Convention of 1887 has Bishop Tuttle been absent from the annual Convention of the Diocese. Each year for 36 consecutive years as Bishop of Missouri (first as Bishop of the entire state, and later of the eastern half) he gathered with clerical and lay workers of the field committed to his charge, to confer with them, to seek counsel of them, to leave words of loving warning and wise exhortation with them. Many present today have come back year by year as affectionate children to grasp a father's hand, to catch the accents of a father's voice, to take the benediction of a father's smile, and to return heartened to their work because of tarrying together for a space in a father's gracious presence. I venture to say that there have been few dioceses or missionary districts in the length and breadth of our land—or of any land

—where the Prayer Book phrasing, "Reverend Father in God" has hit so close to the truth of the matter in expressing existing relations, as in this Missouri diocese during the episcopate of Bishop Tuttle. Today we meet without him, and we are lonely, lacking our late Bishop's loving greeting. Yet, saddened as we are because he is away, and hungry as we are for him to feed us once again with bread which he through all his life had eaten and found good, we should do ourselves and God and him a wrong if we should say today, "My heart within me is desolate," and stop there. We must add, with the Psalmist, "Yet do I remember the time past!" I do remember concerning the first crude beginnings of the Church's work out in the Rocky Mountains and on the Western plains. I do remember concerning the laying of the bottom stones for the upbuilding of Helena and Butte and Salt Lake City and Boise and the rest. I do remember concerning the courage with which he faced the road in days of loneliness with none to share with him his cabin home but his cat Dick! I do remember how with a hand unshrinkingly firm but caressingly gentle he addressed his whole loving nature to sweetly winning souls to Jesus Christ, exulting in the good of all mankind. I do remember concerning his daily life and conversation in this great city, whose distinguished citizen he was for many a year before he fell on sleep. I do remember his incurable determination "to see a good in evil and a hope in ill success"; his entire belief that everywhere he that feareth God and worketh righteousness is accepted with Him. I do remember how he

". . . never doubted clouds would break;

Never dreamed though right were worsted wrong would triumph; Held we fall to rise, are baffled to fight better, Sleep to wake."

I do remember deeds of week-day holiness which everywhere fell from him noiseless as the snow, as through his whole long life he learned the luxury of doing good. I do remember concerning all the years in which he fed God's people faithfully and led them like a flock. I do remember concerning churches, chapels, schools, hospitals, orphanages, which made a fruitful field where once was howling wilderness. For these, memorials all of them to his love and labor, now thank we all our God! And thank we God the more for the nobler and imperishable monument found in souls which have heard his voice as that of a good shepherd and have followed him in those paths in which he followed Christ; in lives led by his loving counsels and strengthened by his strength and purified by the contagious purity of his life; in Christian families sanctified by his frequent presence in them as a winsome guest.

Above the dust and din and fuss and fret and grime and greed and rush and roar and stress and storm and toil and tears and work and worry of the world, I seem to hear today a voice whose sound is as the sound of many waters, "Unto the angel (or messenger) of the church of Missouri write: I know thy works and thy labor, and thy charity and thy gentleness. I know thy faith and thy courage and thy patience. To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna. To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the tree of life which is in the midst of the paradise of God."

In the soft sunset glow of a perfect April afternoon in Bellefontaine Cemetery, among the graves of dear ones loved long since and lost awhile, we "sowed" the natural body of the great fourth Bishop of Missouri, until the day dawns and the shadows flee away. After the singing of sweet hymns which he and those who loved him loved,

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work was line of ou who loved appropriate where it beneath a wilderness of flowers we left him sleeping; and we rendered unto God most high praise and hearty thanks for the wonderful grace and virtue declared in that choice vessel of His grace. At this first corporate assembly of our clergy and people since our late leader went away, we take up the work which had so long been his, conscious of how unspeakable is our loss, yet rejoicing that he has entered through the open door which leads to larger life and wider liberty. And we pledge ourselves to carry on, in humility striving to build better up to best; in humility asking the Giver of every perfect gift to teach us to

"Measure our lives by loss instead of gain, Not by wine drunk, but by the wine poured forth."

Before the flowers were withered which loving hands had scattered on his grave, friends everywhere were asking whether steps would soon be taken to provide a suitable memorial to Bishop Tuttle's life and work. Conferences of clergy and laity of the diocese were soon had. As a result, plans are going forward looking to a Bishop Tuttle Memorial and Endowment Fund. The minimum is fixed at a Million and a Quarter of Dollars.

If a memorial is to be erected (and that has been determined) where ought it properly to be? In the absence of any designation of any particular locality as the officially determined permanent National Headquarters of our Church, where more fittingly could the proposed memorial be placed than in Missouri, chosen by Bishop Tuttle as the state of his adoption almost forty years before his fruitful life was closed? And if in Missouri, where but in St. Louis, which in 1835 was made the See City of Jackson Kemper, the first Missionary Bishop ever consecrated in America, and where Bishop Tuttle had his home continuously since 1886, during twenty of which years he was Presiding Bishop of the Church. And, if in St. Louis, where else than in connection with the group of buildings which house the lineal spiritual descendants of the first parish ever established in these United States west of the Mississippi River, old Christ Church; where else than in the near neighborhood of the Cathedral which he designated nearly forty years ago as the official seat for himself as Bishop of Missouri and for those who should succeed him in the exercise of that high office?

For such a man as Bishop Tuttle, our memorial must be no merely decorative thing. Bishop Tuttle was a man always throbbingly alert and active. It is in the record that until his last illness shut him in, only once in 61 years as a minister of Christ did he miss a Sunday engagement because physically disqualified for his appointed task. Bishop Tuttle dignified whatever occasion he participated in. But he was built on energizing, not decorative, lines. His memorial must be built to spiritually energize, as he energized while he was here. We are not saying it must not be beautiful. It must be and it will be; worthily conceived and splendidly achieved. It shall "speak our gratitude, but not his fame." And it must be tremendously alive. It must not only commemorate the distinguished chief official of the Church. It must also carry forward to generations yet unborn the beneficent influence of this great patriot, and statesman, and citizen, and lover of his fellow-men, who was by everybody everywhere so genuinely mourned, so affectionately loved, so highly venerated, so generously trusted. By what we may regard a most favorable conspiracy of circumstances, the City of St. Louis is providing for a magnificent Civic Plaza, to cover more than 40 acres. In the year in which our Bishop died, this work was projected. The eastern limit of the Plaza reaches to the western line of our Cathedral property. This is the splendid opportunity for those who loved Bishop Tuttle to build his fitting memorial, and to build it so appropriately that, when completed, it may be recognized as standing where it properly belongs, advancing the cause of religion in which he

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in Bellefong since and h Bishop of After the him loved, was a conspicuous leader, and also, right alongside of the buildings of the civic group, adding splendor to the splendor of the city whose noble citizen he was during nearly half of the days of the years of his pilgrimage; whose flags were half-masted by order of the Mayor from daylight until sundown on the day we bore him to his burial.

Situated in this strategic central city of the West, and erected in connection with the Parish buildings of the first Parish which our American Church ever organized west of the Mississippi River, the Bishop Tuttle Memorial will also be of much more than local value and significance. We shall wish to make it always available for the use of the General Church in connection with national and provincial gatherings. It must also house the missionary activities of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri. It must adequately care for the noble humanitarian work being carried on in the very heart of a great metropolis, and it must provide for the expansion of the work to meet a daily growing need.

All who loved Bishop Tuttle are under obligation to the large group of prominent men and women, (a group broadly catholic in the true meaning of the word) who have already told us that they count it high honor to have been asked to serve as Executive Committee and as Campaign Committee in making known the purpose of our project and in soliciting the funds for the memorial. The movement is world-wide in its scope. We shall lay the opportunity of giving before those who have large wealth. We shall present the privilege of giving to persons of slender means who will feel that they have been deprived of a precious privilege if they are passed by in the gathering in of funds. Letters from those whom Bishop Tuttle somewhere, some time, somehow served, now scattered to the ends of the earth, testify how great is the company of those who are ready to "rise and build." Prosper, O Lord, the work of our hands upon us; oh, prosper Thou our handiwork!

Besides our Bishop Tuttle, there died last year, The Rt. Rev. Alfred Harding, D. D., in the 71st year of his age, second Bishop of Washington since 1909; the Rt. Rev. Charles David Williams, D. D., in the 67th year of his age; fourth Bishop of Michigan since 1906; the Rt. Rev. G. Mott Williams, D. D., in the 67th year of his age; first Bishop of Marquette from 1896 to 1919, and, latterly, Bishop-in-charge of American Churches in Europe; the Rt. Rev. Granville Hudson Sherwood, D. D., in the 45th year of his age; third Bishop of Springfield since 1917.

The list of those who, in the diocese of Missouri, since last we met, have been called from homes of earth to the house not made with hands is a sobering recital. In this Cathedral parish the first to go was Mrs. Kate M. Howard, abounding in love, thoroughly furnished unto every good work, one of those rare Christian souls who

"Do good by stealth and blush to find it fame."

Her burial on the 27th of February is the last recorded act in the journal of Bishop Tuttle's life. Shortly after went Mrs. Robert B. Whittemore, and Mrs. Cordelia Leet, during long years among the most devoted and constant of our people. Mrs. Henrietta Boone, member of St. Mary's Church, widow of the fourth Bishop of China; Melchizadek Yates of St. John's; Trescott F. Chaplin, vestryman of St. Michael and All Angels; Mrs. James B. Carpenter of St. George's; Mrs. Mary Kennedy Tully, the oldest member of St. George's and Master Rolla Wells, also of St. George's, fourteen years of age and in the last recruited class of confirmees; Mrs. G. W. Strodtmann of St. Alban's, many years a faithful officer of the Church Periodical Club of the Diocese; Mrs. Shoening, Mrs. M. T. Harris,

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the journal Whittemore, devoted and St. Mary's Yates of St. All Angels; y Tully, the St. George's, rmees; Mrs. Hicer of the I. T. Harris.

Miss Viola Frank, active workers in St. Stephen's parish; from the Ascension parish, Mrs. George R. Lockwood, generous supporter and worker for a quarter of a century; Mrs Benjamin A. Wood, who organized the parish branch of the Girls' Friendly and built constructively in the Church School, quiet, patient, unquitting in the service of her Lord; Colonel Robert Buchanan, a hero on the Union side at the Battle of Vicksburg, soldier of the Cross and of the Flag; Mrs. Eleanor T. Keiser, especially active in the work of the Auxiliary, until in the midst of one happy, busy day, she lay down to sleep and in the selfsame hour awoke in paradise. From St. Peter's, Edward H. Boehnken, Junior Warden, and Sidney M. Phelan, both so loving for a dozen years in loyalty to me that earth seemed cold and cloudy when they went away; Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Owen, of the Holy Communion parish, who had lived together and worshiped together through an unusual length of years, and by a gracious Providence were not divided in their deaths; Mrs. Agnes Gilliam, also of the parish of the Holy Communion, whose deep spiritual character manifested the real presence of Christ through years of invalidism sweetly borne. All Saints has lost Mrs. Lucy Evans, one of the oldest of the communicants; Mrs. Eva James, steady in her loyalites though estopped from active duty by illness during many years; and Mrs. Mary T. Burgess, wife of the senior warden, faithful to the end, after more than forty years of constant and consistent witnessing for Christ. Maria Eyer, five years old when she was admitted to the Orphans' Home two years before it had a charter, at the time of her death had been a member of its family four score years. We who know the Rev. Mr. Tragitt of Rolla know that he has gone every week for a dozen years to fill the woodbox and the water pail for aged Caroline Ball, who cared for her aged invalid brother, both poor in purse, and who died in the month of March in her lowly and lonely cottage on the edge of town.

George C. Hurd, of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, a Godly man, enthusiastic in devotion to the Church, offered himself to me as a lay missionary a year ago, and served with high efficiency and real joy in various congregations in the rural field. While on a missionary journey, after an illness of a single day, he answered ad sum to the summons of his Lord. W. L. Truckenmiller no longer responds to the roll call of vestrymen and Church School teachers of Emmanuel, a man greatly beloved, always to be counted upon when work was to be done. Kirkwood has lost Mrs. Mary B. Harvey, and Mrs. Emily K. Patton, who, while a pupil in Grace Church Sunday School, had attended every session continuously for eight whole years; Mrs. Elizabeth Tracey, a daughter of the late Rev. F. B. Scheetz, former rector of Grace Church; Mrs. Mary Funsten Reed, warmly loved by a great company of friends who know how devoted she always was to the Church's interests in partnership with her husband, the Rev. Benjamin E. Reed; and Charles A. Lawton, father of the wife of H. C. Stribling, Grace Church's Senior Warden. Henry P. Jacques, a generous and faithful vestryman, is missed from St. Stephen's parish, Ferguson. Ruby Tully of St. Paul's, Palmyra, whose child nature developed into an unwonted sweetness under the tutelage of her friend and rector, the Rev. Mr. Woodward, was taken after a most painful illness.

Where no sigh of anguish sore Heaves the little bosom more.

Mrs. Benjamin Bowman was a faithful steward in the struggling mission of St. Luke's Valley Park. John R. Hamer, lately come from England, entered with zest into plans for developing the Church's work at Cape Girardeau, and his sudden taking off, according to every human mode of measurement, is a sad misfortune to the parish. From Hannibal, Mrs. Helen K. Garth, true mother in Israel, beloved benefactress of Trinity Parish, loved by everybody everywhere, builder of Hannibal's public library, patroness of education, a friend to the friendless and a helper of the needy in distress; and Mrs. Thomas Robinson, a cheerful, generous giver, a will-

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ing worker, a devout worshiper, are gone. Thomas N. Boulware died at the height of his usefulness as he was following the footsteps of his honored father as vestryman of the parish of St. Jude, Monroe City. Franklin Pierce Miller, Senior Warden of Columbia, had been a strong tower in Calvary parish during many years, peaceable, gentle, strong, constant, trusted and loved by all.

John Scovern had served the city of Macon as banker, mayor, president of the School Board, honored and beloved. Forty years he was untiring in his devotion to the upbuilding of St. James' parish; thirty years he was its senior warden; twice he was elected by Missouri a deputy to the General Convention of the Church.

James Fetherstonh, confirmed as a youth in old Christ Church, St. Louis, was through many years one of the leaders in the work of Mount Calvary parish. His name stands in the diocesan record as a licensed lay reader since 1896.

It is a lengthy list,

Bright youth and snow-crowned age, Strong men and maidens meek.

God keep us faithful to our several trusts until the Master comes and calls for us!

In the matter of what we used to call the Nation-Wide Campaign, we have paid a little over 79 per cent of the amount which we were asked for under the budget quota of the National Council. I long for the coming of the day when Missouri shall realize that the Church throughout all the world is all one body; shall remember, also, that St. Paul says, "No man hateth his own body, but nourisheth it and cherisheth it." In Paul's bold imagery that means that a member of the church, who withholds support from worthy items in the Church's Program when it is in his power to give, is acting just as contrarily to what should be expected of him as the man who neglects to give proper attention to the "nourishing" and "cherishing" of his own eye or hand or foot or heart or lungs.

According to the report which was sent me from the Treasurer's office, twenty-seven congregations and the Episcopal Orphans' Home have paid their budget quotas for 1923, as follows:

Affton, Columbia, De Soto, Palmyra, Prairieville, Bloomfield, Bonne Terre, Canton, Crystal City, Illmo, Ironton, Kirksville, Sherman, Sullivan; and, in St. Louis, the Church of the Holy Communion.

The following congregations have overhaid the budget quota: Kirkwood, Cuba, Fulton. Herculaneum, Salem, Valley Park; and, in St. Louis, Grace-Holy Cross, St. Timothy's, St. Thomas', Bethany, Prince of Peace, St. Luke's, Orphans' Home.

At a great meeting of Associated Vestries. April 30, one hundred mighty capable lay officers of the Church in Missouri resolved (I think with not a single dissenting voice) that our quota for 1923 could be raised and should be raised and would be raised. I have been greatly grieved that the good resolve of that night was not brought to good effect. The self-starter worked admirably. The engine turned over successfully. It hit on all cylinders and whizzed and spinned. Why, then, didn't the bus arrive? Because no one took definite responsibility for shifting the gear, after the engine began to buzz, out of neutral into first, then second, then high! I am extremely sorry. But I thank the Associated Vestries for the interest they evidenced, and I hope they will try again this year. I am hoping that they will, early in 1924, take up some definite portion of the quota and definitely pledge their honor to its accomplishment. I feel sure that it can be done. I feel sure that the Associated Vestries have a desire to do it. I want them to know right at the start that I hope that they will do it. Foolish men make of their failures graves in which they bury

all their hopes. Wise men make of them stepping stones to higher things!

BEQUEST. Under the will of the late Mrs. Mary I. Maffitt, who finished her course in faith in the year 1922, I received June 26, 1923, a bequest "to the Bishop (for the time being) of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Missouri, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), for Diocesan Missions in Missouri." She rests from her labors and her works do follow her!

Assembled today as the guest of this Cathedral, I know we want to offer our congratulations because of the witness she is bearing and the work that she is doing at the very heart and center of this great city. Increased number of worshipers; the enlisting in the real work and worship of the Church a really great company of the younger generation who are really keen about the work—it was under their leadership that the every member canvass for this year yielded pledges exceeding those for 1923 by almost \$10,000. The church fabric was also repaired this past year at a cost of over \$7,000. We congratulate Dean Scarlett and his co-workers; and we also thank them—for Christ Church parish is the mother of us all! (Speaking of the every member canvass and of pledges, it seems to me that the work accomplished at the Church of the Holy Communion, St. Louis, a total of \$5,000 for the Church's program in 1923, is worthy of high praise.)

GRACE CHURCH, ST. LOUIS. In 1910 Bishop Tuttle reported that a board of six laymen took over the business management of a merger of old Grace Parish in North St. Louis and Holy Cross Mission which had been begun in faith by Deaconess Anna. Mr. Henry C. Scott was chairman of the board. Subsequently the undertaking was incorporated. Mr. Scott having died, Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore became president. The work has had God's blessing. Mr. Philip S. Russel holds the office made vacant by Mr. Whittemore's death in 1920. By the will of Miss Susan Mount of New York, a bequest of \$50,000 for a new Grace Church became available in 1923. A Building Committee presided over by Mr. Clinton L. Whittemore has secured for us a stone church of such a sort that it might have been picked up in rural England and planted in North St. Louis. We are under heavy debt to Mr. Whittemore and his committee for the attention they have given to every detail in working out this beautiful fabric. Messrs. Jamieson and Spearl are the architects. The church is now ready for occupancy. The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor (and Mrs. Taylor whose devotion to this work is that of a mother to her firstborn) have finished six years of blessed ministrations at Grace-Holy Cross.

Because of the high cost of building, the Building Committee took twelve feet off the tower which the architects designed. The parishioners were not satisfied with any stubby tower. They organized their own "drive," aided and abetted by the Rug Fund and the Woman's Guild, and brought in the pledges to complete the work "as planned."

I hereby give notice, as provided in Canon 8, Section 3, that Grace Mission in the City of St. Louis, (hitherto an unorganized mission under the name of Grace-Holy Cross) is now an organized mission of the Diocese of Missouri.

TRINITY CHURCH, ST. JAMES, one of the most attractive and best cared for of all our rural churches, has new chancel windows, new finishing of interior woodwork and pews, new heating device which does away with an unsightly stove, new carpet, new brass altar desk and cross, new foundation under chancel and vestry room, new paint covering the whole exterior. The parish guild did the exterior. The cost of the interior betterments was provided by Mrs. Wortham James. The guild of young girls gave a beautiful new window.

Trinity, Hannibal, has made much needed repairs and improvements and has newly decorated the interior of its beautiful stone church.

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The parish church at ST. CHARLES has been repaired and renovated. The women raised \$1,400 for the purpose, and I understand that all but \$400 of the total cost is paid. Five years ago, the Rev. B. E. Reed who at that time had been in Holy Orders 50 years, answered the call of the people of Trinity, St. Charles, which had been without fegular services for two years, and made himself their servant for Jesus' sake. In season and out of season, Mr. Reed failed only once during five years to be on hand to give the service he had promised. Having rebuilt the physical fabric, we want to devise a way to keep the spiritual temple growing; for Mr. Reed has now asked to be relieved of further duty at St. Charles.

The chapel and deaconess house at HERCULANEUM has been repaired at a cost of \$600, nearly one-half of which was paid by the Women's Guild of 15 active members. Herculaneum had a Nation-Wide quota of \$50 in 1923, and it paid \$60. (Why didn't more of us do something of that sort and so help Missouri to come clean in its record for the year? I wonder. I am afraid that what we mostly lack is a tremendous zeal. How strangely sound today the words of our great Captain which tell how the zeal of His Father's house had eaten Him up!) We had a quite remarkable service at Herculaneum one Sunday night in late September. The chapel was crowded. Some 20 persons stood outside and joined the worship through the open windows. I baptized 14 and confirmed 16, presented by Deaconess Sniffen, who has regained her health and is again doing a blessed work.

ASCENSION, St. Louis, lost its parish house by fire in May. This was a staggering blow, especially because of increasingly important young people's activities which were thus left without assembly rooms. Before the ashes were cold, the Rev. Mr. Bunting and his vestry were planning a new parish house which should be far better than the old. Patiently and persistently they have labored and I rejoice with them that new building operations will soon begin.

EPIPHANY, a chapel of St. Peter's, has new hard-wood flooring, laid by the men of the congregation, over the entire main floor. New pews, new pulpit, new lectern, have converted an assembly room into a church. The chapel people paid the cost. I visited them a Sunday night in March, and we rejoiced greatly together as we saw a bundle of papers, representing a mortgage debt of \$5,000, go up in smoke.

In St. Louis reports reach me of renewed vigor and warm fellowship and promising outlook at St. Philip's, St. Louis, where the Rev. Frederick B. Bartlett, formerly of South Dakota, has been rector since September.

Under the wise and kindly leadership of its first resident pastor, the Rev. Thomas L. Small, ST. LUKE'S HARNEY HEIGHTS, will soon move from the little old portable chapel at Arlington and Thekla to a larger lot at Arlington and Lillian. Funds are in hand with which we intend to build the beginnings of an attractive place of worship.

The Rev. H. H. Marsden was snatched away last autumn from ST. MARY'S, which didn't want to give him up, to be Archdeacon of Missouri. We fortunately persuaded the Rev. Jesse A. Ryan to enter at once upon the work at St. Mary's. Church school membership has greatly increased in these last few months and pastor and people are happy in the new-formed partnership.

The Rev. Phillips B. Warner was ordained deacon by the Bishop of Missouri in May and priest in December, and is rector of ST. PAUL'S, CARONDELET. I have seen with my eyes that the coming of Mr. Warner has much stimulated the whole life of the parish. Conferences recently had with interested members have begotten a lively hope that St. Paul's may deliver itself from the bands of a \$3,000 debt and rise to newness of life in this year 1924. Mr. Warner is appointed Chaplain of Orphans' Home for an unexpired term. We should be false to ourselves if we neglected to say how deeply we regretted the decision of the Rev. George E.

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Norton, first rector of ST. MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS, to go away to Rochester. The parish soon found a worthy successor to Mr. Norton in the person of the Rev. Robert J. McFetridge of Philadelphia. Reports indicate that activities of work and worship are alive. I have been delighted to hear that the beginnings of an endowment have been made.

The congregation of ST. AUGUSTINE'S knew the sacrifice they made when they said their fond goodbyes to the Rev. Douglass Atwill in November. They give thanks to God upon every remembrance of him and are holding loyally together until the man is found whom they are seeking to take his place.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent, retiring from an assistantship in St. Peter's Church, became rector of ST. JOHN'S, St. Louis, in September. Mr. Nugent is appointed for an unexpired term as Chaplain in Brittain Hall.

A good bit of community work has been done among a congested negro population at 16th and Wash streets, St. Louis, by Mr. Ira S. Ashe, a lay worker, at BETHANY mission. The financial returns show a total of \$312.00 raised for all purposes. There has been an average church school attendance of 35, and an average of 38 at the chief Sunday service. There have been frequent meetings, guilds, clubs, visits to persons in distress. Several plans have been suggested in the Department of Missions looking toward the stabilizing of Bethany. I am hoping that we may be guided in the matter wisely and well.

The Rev. Dr. Cloud is at the top of the list of the clergy resident and active in Missouri. Thirty-two years Dr. Cloud was principal of Gallandet (Public Day) School for the Deaf, in St. Louis. At our request he last year gave up his secular work to devote himself wholly to the spiritual care of the deaf of St. Thomas' Mission, St. Louis, and of Ephphatha, St. Louis, a new mission for the deaf, only a year old. The rector and vestry of All Saints kindly provide a chapel for Ephphatha. The report is most encouraging. Services are held on Sunday afternoons for the most part. There have been four adult baptisms and I have confirmed a class of nine. By request of the Bishops of Colorado, Nebraska and West Missouri, and under a business agreement with our Department of Missions, Dr. Cloud is special missionary to the deaf in those three dioceses; and I have appreciative letters telling me how splendid is his spiritual influence and how warmly he is loved.

The benefits of ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL are at all times available for our clergy and their families, without cost. Its doors are open day and night for charity patients, up to the limit of capacity and of funds provided for free work. I have often stated that these facts should make every one of our clergy an aggressive missionary for St. Luke's. I am happy to report that the congregations of the diocese, by their contributions in 1923, manifested an awakened interest in its welfare. The Rev. R. D. S. Putney, the new superintendent, is encouraging the trustees to hope for a banner year both in volume and in quality of work in 1924. I earnestly exhort our people to help in the effort to extend the beneficent ministrations of the hospital.

The Rev. F. J. Bloy knows the high degree of confidence which we have in him as the result of the very remarkable way in which he has organized the work which has been accomplished by him and his staff in the CITY INSTITUTIONS. Mr. Bloy will make the report. I have read it and I endorse it as though made by me. Let me simply mention here that the services held by staff members in the nine institutions have averaged more than two each day and three on Sundays throughout the year, and these have been attended by more than 47,000 persons. Mrs. M. A. Holmes, after thirty years of continuous service in this field, handed in her resignation a few weeks ago. Many persons belonging to the class whom Harold Begbie calls "Twice Born Men" have traced their second

birth to strivings in their souls first stirred by kindly deeds done for them in the Master's name by Mrs. Holmes.

We all have pride in the fact that Deaconess Brainerd has received high praise in official statements by the Hospital Commissioner and by the Hospital Superintendent for the exceptional quality of the work which she has done in the Maternity Division of the City Hospital.

It is several years since CALVARY, LOUISIANA, has had a rector so disentangled from secular employ as to give himself entirely to the work of the ministry, applying himself wholly to that thing and drawing all his cares and studies that way. We can therefore understand why new life has come to the parish with the new rector, the Rev. David Coombs. There is a better business basis, a quickened spiritual pulse. From Prairieville and Clarksville we have letters telling of the joy that Mr. Combs brought to both of these unshepherded congregations on Christmas day.

The new rector of MEXICO, the Rev. W. H. Decker, reports every one of his vestrymen at the Lord's Table on the first Sunday of the year. I feel that this is as it should be. Mr. Decker has also taken responsibility for Fulton and proposes to arrange a monthly Sunday service there. The Fulton people tell me the news seems too good to be true; they have for so long had only a semi-occasional week-night service.

The report from Kirksville for 1923 shows diocesan assessments paid, the Nation-Wide quota paid, a larger amount contributed for salary than in any of a dozen years last past and a goodly sum paid toward the debt which was left on the new church built in 1918. It is a happy circumstance that students in Kirksville have manifested a new enthusiasm this past year, both in the Church's worship and in helping to raise money for the debt. I must not fail to mention how Mrs. T. W. Gorrell, spite of heavy handicap, for she is not physically strong, during all the years that I have been here, has counted the success of the Church's work at Kirksville beyond her highest joy. I am delighted to learn, from those who are in position to know the facts, that the Rev. Mr. Sherburne has won to himself and for his work a wide circle of friends, many of whom are not of our communion. Mr. and Mrs. Sherburne set a table for 26 guests at the prorectory Thanksgiving day.

A cyclone tore through JACKSON in the month of March, stripped off the roof of our beautiful church, pulled down the bricks, twisted the building out of shape and left a sad and sorry sight. Dear Mrs. Linus Sanford has herself, single-handed, trained many persons in the little Sunday School at Jackson, who have scattered in many directions and have helped to maintain churches in many places. Thanks be to God for this devoted servant of her Master and for her patient, zealous missionary labors.

GRACE CHURCH, JEFFERSON CITY, informs me of a wish to wait until next autumn for a rector to take the place of one who left four months ago. I have begged the officers to bear in mind that long vacancies between rectorships spell spiritual loss of which no adding machine can give the total sum.

It was my pleasant privilege in June to dedicate the Girls' Friendly Holiday House on a beautifully wooded hill near the Missouri River at Monarch. I have an eager hope that this new work, so greatly needed and so enthusiastically entered upon, may be steadily maintained.

I must again record my admiration for the faithfulness with which Mr. Richard Kopplin, a member of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, in all weathers, in summer's heat and winter's cold, drives to Valley Park and conducts the Sunday School, leads the congregation in its morning worship, visits the sick, counsels the troubled. Our thanks to women of Grace, Kirkwood, who drive each Sunday to the chapel at Sherman and carry on the Sunday School. Our thanks to Mr. A. D. Pomeroy of St. John's

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our Savio mands me As w and to Mr. George B. Jones of All Saints for lay services in connection with the Mission to the City Institutions. Our thanks to the Woman's Auxiliary and to the Churchwoman's Club and to the Church Service League and to the Missionary Host for substantial aid in sustaining and developing the missionary work of the diocese, and to the Lay Readers League for a total of 301 services rendered, and to the Brotherhood of St. Andrew for help in City Institutions, all which will be set forth in detail in the various official reports.

ARCHDEACON. Soon after Bishop Tuttle went, friends in the diocese whose counsel I prize suggested to me the wisdom of keeping an eye out for an Archdeacon. I replied that there was good timber close at hand, if it should seem good to set up such an office.

The Department of Missions concurring in my judgment, the Rev. Henry H. Marsden was appointed. He began his new duties October 1. We have reason to believe that this particular Archdeacon will prove a helpful arm of the Diocese when he has had time to get adjusted to the new task. He has already done much to encourage many places which I used to visit with considerable frequency when I was Coadjutor. He has been of great help as an emergency man in various congregations between the going of one pastor and the coming of another. Several congregations which have paid their quotas have done so because the Archdeacon has helped them to understand the significance of world-wide work.

The Rev. Mr. Weddell continues to care for a special phase of missionary work in city and in country, in splendid fashion and with absolute fidelity.

With thanks to Judge George C. Hitchcock (whose term as Chancellor expires with this Convention) for the kind courtesy with which he lays all other duties to one side to help me when I come to him for legal counsel, I nominate him for another term of three years, and request the Convention to take action under Article XI of the Constitution.

Acting under Canon provided, I give notice of the appointment of the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Dean of the Southern Convocation, and of the Rev. Charles F. Edwards, Dean of the Northern Convocation.

Bishop Tuttle held no services in the Diocese for confirmation in 1923. My confirmations in 1923 in the Diocese of Missouri were 504. My average annual confirmations for the 11 years previous to 1923 were 159. I baptized in 1923, 25 persons.

I gave Letters Dimissory to six Presbyters. I received into the Diocese by Letter Dimissory 11 Presbyters. I have ordained one Deacon and one Priest. The number of Lay Readers' licenses issued as of January 1, 1924, is 42. We have two Postulants.

On the first day of September, Japan suffered the most awful physical catastrophe recorded of any nation in modern times. That which was left by the earthquake was licked up by the flames. Heathen gods—"eyes have they and see not, ears have they and hear not, feet have they and walk not, neither speak they through their throats"—were burned up in the fire! Christian schools, homes, hospital, churches, cathedral—were burned up, too. Out of the midst of the ruin, seated in ashes, Bishop McKim cabled over here, "All is lost save faith in God." Thank God that the citizenry of America, while the message of the disaster was yet on the wires, forgot the claimant voices which had been raised of late in hateful hostility to the yellow peril, stood uncovered in the presence of the peril in which the people of Japan were plunged, saw in the dwellers in Yokohama and Tokyo the children of our Father, mobilized the American Red Cross, organized relief work in churches of all faiths, and went and did the "likewise" which our Saviour Christ, who spilt His blood for them as well as for us, commands men everywhere to do!

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matter most, are we satisfied to reflect that there are problems of essential consequence to the establishing of peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety throughout the world throughout all generations debated today by representatives of all great nations save our own? Are we satisfied that, in the council chamber made up of representatives of all the highpower nations, our voice, which in these five late years might have contributed weightier counsel than any other voice, has not been heard? When America's influence was needed in an effort to help bind up and mollify with ointment the shattered fragments of a world broken into a wide, weltering chaos, we apportioned 85 cents out of every dollar of our National Budget for one year to pay the costs of a war lately ended and to prepare for the next war; and only 2 cents of every dollar was made available for development work, and education, and research! What else is this on the part of America but a deification of that same god Force, whose menacing head raised in Prussia, was crushed at a total world cost of 13 million dead soldiers, 13 million dead civilians, 20 million wounded, 9 million war orphans, 5 million war widows, 10 million refugees, untold millions doomed to hunger, a ruined continent, shattered morals, blasted faith, wholesale despair and misery, and at a cost in money of \$20,000 for every hour of day and night through all the nineteen hundred years since the Prince of Peace was born! (Statistics from "War," by Kirby Page.) Are we satisfied with our determination not to see in wounded, crippled, dying neighbor nations, an opportunity to minister to Jesus Christ in ministry to them?

From reliable commercial statistics we learn that America has just passed through a year of "the largest pig iron production in the history of the country; the largest steel ingot production; the largest crude oil and gasoline production; the largest output of railway locomotives; the largest production of automotive vehicles; the largest volume of railroad freight car loadings; the largest volume of construction of homes for folks to live in; the largest volume of retail sales; the largest total of mail order business.

"Oh, this is a wonderful country," we are saying to ourselves, "with its mountains and valleys, and lakes and rivers, and wheat fields and orchards, and iron and copper, and gold and silver, and coal and lead!" Yes. But will the Lord be pleased with all these, and with ten thousand of rivers of oil? What doth the Lord require but to love mercy, and to deal justly, and to walk humbly? Let us be careful that we do not tempt God till He says, "Shall not my soul be avenged on such a nation as this?" Thy mercy on Thy people, Lord, that we have forgotten that America's true greatness is not material, but spiritual. Hitherto hath the Lord preserved us and helped us in order that our highest use may be a spiritual use. If our great prosperity be by selfishness maintained, then is our great prosperity our deep and damnable disgrace! The God who showers down manna on His people, that they may gather it, and grind it in mills, and beat it in a mortar, and bake it in pans and make cakes of it the taste of which is like wafers made with honey, is the same God whose righteous judgments have decreed that manna accumulated selfishly and selfishly stored up breeds worms and stinks! We take pride in the fidelity to duty which these Missourians exemplified in the stepn task to which they were assigned. But I want to send greeting, as Bishop of Missouri—and I should be happy if this Convention would join with me in this—to those who are entrusted with duties of legislation and governance at Washington, that the Diocese of Missouri entreats the United States of America to co-operate in every possible right way with other governments to bring in the promised time when wars shall cease; to hasten the coming of the time when Missouri's sons need not engage in such an ugly business any more. Many there are who think the Bok Peace Award method a plan worth trying. I have personally thought so and I sent in my ballot for it several days ago.

And now, dear Brethren, assembled in the 85th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, may grace, mercy and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ our Saviour be with us, that we may both perceive and know what things we ought to do, and that we may also faith-

fully fulfill the same.

We, the members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, desire to record our testimony of gratitude and love to Almighty God for the long and faithful life and service of our late beloved Diocesan, the Rt. Rev. Daniel Sylvester Tuttle.

With all our fellow-churchmen and fellow citizens of St. Louis and of the Church at large, we feel deeply the passing of this great soldier of Christ and leader of men and servant of the Church. Notable he was and honored for his devotion to Christ and His little ones, for his leadership of great spiritual causes and for his patriotic love of his country and flag.

The cause of Missions at home and abroad always found in him not only an advocate but also an exemplar who had given a large part of his own life to witnessing for Christ in difficult fields, in lonely places, and uplifting Christ in His Crucifixion before the eyes of careless men. What he was and what he did have gone into the moral fabric of our far Western life.

As members of this committee we felt an especial nearness to him in the contact and fellowship which we had with him in his direction of the affairs of the Diocese, but believe that the same Christ who ever inspired him may turn this sorrow into renewed consecration to the Kingdom which he served so well.

While we offer our thanks to Almighty God for the wonderful grace and virtue in his life, we wish to extend to all his family and to the Diocese of Missouri our sincere sympathy and love at his death.

Carroll M. Davis, of New York, five hundred dollars, being his equity in the property.

October 22.—The request of the Vestry of St. Mary's for four hundred and fifty-four dollars of their funds to pay insurance and for necessary repairs to their church building was granted.

November 9.—Bishop Johnson given permission by the Board for the sale of property of St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights, St. Louis.

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REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Diocesan Council met in primary session and organized on Tuesday, January 30, 1923, at 1210 Locust Street, St. Louis.

At a special meeting on February 9, the Missionary Board of the Diocese, the Committee on Finance, the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, and the Diocesan Commission on Social Service, were authorized and instructed to transfer their records and assets to the Diocesan Council, and the Council assumed their budgets for the year 1923. At this meeting, the Department of Missions and Church Extension was organized, and Mr. Thos. Q. Dix was elected Assistant Treasurer of the Council in charge of the funds of this Department.

At a regular meeting on March 6, the Department of Ways and Means, of Religious Education, and of Social Service were organized.

At the meeting on May 15, following the death of Bishop Tuttle, the Council readjusted the salary of Bishop Johnson, and provided for his traveling, office, automobile and incidental expenses, as will appear in detail in the Treasurer's report.

The Council also provided for certain stipends for Mrs. S. K. White and Mrs. G. D. B. Miller of Bishop Tuttle's household, which items will also appear in detail in the Treasurer's report.

At the meeting on June 5, the Secretary announced that the following named members had been added to the Diocesan Council: the Rev. Chas. F. Edwards, Dean, and Mr. F. T. Hodgdon, lay representative, of the Northern Convocation; and Col. Chas. L. Woods, lay representative of the Southern Convocation. At this meeting the Council gave its approval to the proposed Memorial Building to Bishop Tuttle, and recommended the sale of the property at 74 Vandeventer Place, and the purchase of a new Episcopal Residence.

At several meetings of the Council, during the latter part of the year, the budgets for General Diocesan Expenses, for the Ways and Means Department, and for the Department of Missions and Church Extension, were considered, and were finally approved, as presented with this report.

Proposed assessments for General Diocesan expenses, and proposed apportionments of the quota for Diocesan and General Missions were made, and are presented with this report for consideration by the Convention.

The Rev. Chas. F. Edwards was elected a representative to the Regional Conference at Manitou, Colo., and the Rev. E. S. Travers, D. D., was appointed by the Bishop a representative to the Provincial Synod of the Southwest.

Some minor appropriations were made by the Council during the year, which will appear in detail in the reports of the Treasurer.

REPORT OF EPISCOPAL MISSIONARY TO CITY INSTITUTIONS.

To the Bishop and Members of the 85th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

In making my report of the work carried on during the past year, and that you may be able to visualize the scope of the work, it seems to me to be necessary to mention each of the nine Institutions in which we minister, and briefly to describe the work we are attempting to do.

1. Hospital No. 1, with an average of over 700 patients, is visited daily by the Assistant Missionary (Rev. Jos. H. Harvey), ready to minister to spiritual needs. A member of the staff devotes her whole time to paying attention to the needs of patients, investigation and follow-up work in the homes of those discharged from the Institution. In the Maternity Division Deaconess Brainerd has full charge of all Protestant cases, which means caring for both married and unmarried mothers, investigations, securing positions, homes, clothing, referring to special agencies, etc., a work which during the past year has received high commendation from the Hospital Commissioner and the Superintendent of the Hospital. The following is a summary of the work done by Deaconess Brainerd in the Maternity Division:

Each Sunday services are held in the Chapel. During the past year the Brotherhood Chapters of the City have rendered valuable assistance by bringing the patients from the Wards to the Chapel in wheeled chairs, and at the conclusion of the service assisting them back to their respective Wards, and then distributing reading matter. A celebration of the Holy Communion is held once a month in the Chapel, followed by bedside Communions. An additional and important piece of work has been undertaken by Deaconess Brainerd during the past year; that of weekly visiting the Board of Health cases incarcerated in the City Hospital, where a service is held and Testaments and literature distributed.

Early in the fall Mrs. M. Holmes, who had been associated with the work of the City Mission, particularly with the City Hospital for 30 years, tendered her resignation.

The work at the City Hospital has now been placed under the direct supervision of Deaconess Brainerd with Miss L. W. Caldwell as her associate. Miss Caldwell is a graduate of the Missouri School of Social Economy and for the past two years has been connected with the work at Grace-Holy Cross.

2. Hospital No. 2 (Colored). Here the work is looked after by Miss D. M. Lorick, who visits most faithfully and is beloved by all with whom she comes in contact. Miss Lorick is also doing a very fine piece of work with the mothers and babies. No less than thirty babies have been baptized during the year, due to her faithful work. A great deal of follow-up

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work is necessary and made very difficult by the tendency of these people to move often. Mr. G. B. Jones has for a number of years held services in all of the wards each Sunday. When I tell you that his work is purely voluntary, that he never misses a Sunday, summer or winter, I think you will agree that he is a valuable man. The helpful messages and the reverent manner in which the services are conducted meet with a ready response from the sick and weary. We are fortunate indeed in having these two devoted people represent us in Hospital No. 2. The Holy Communion is administered as occasions arise.

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- 3. City Infirmary. Since the last report, the aged and infirm people domiciled in several Institutions have returned to their old building on Arsenal Street, vacated by the soldiers who now occupy the beautiful, new Veterans Hospital at Jefferson Barracks. The infirmary houses 600 inmates. Miss Cora Pearce is in charge of the work among the white inmates, as well as organist at the Sunday services. Miss Lorick has charge of the work with the colored people. For a number of years the Rev. Mr. Atwill, who left the Diocese in November for Minnesota, had charge of the spiritual work. He was much loved by the aged and infirm (one old lady declared she cried all night when he left). Mr. Atwill has been succeeded by the Rev. P. B. Warner, Rector of St. Paul's. Services are held each Sunday, a short service in the ward for those who are not able to journey to the Chapel, followed by a service in the Chapel which is always well attended. The Holy Communion is celebrated once a month.
- 4. At the Municipal Jail a service is held every Saturday afternoon, and with an exceptionally large congregation; when one remembers that the attendance is entirely voluntary, it makes one feel the responsibility and opportunity of the challenge presented. We aim at this service to bring an encouraging and inspiring message, "conducted in such a way as to promote respect for religion and a desire for right living, and not to stimulate hypocritical professions, dictated by the hope of 'working' somebody in order to get out of jail." At the conclusion of the service, reading matter is distributed. We have long since learned that the holding of a religious service is only part of the work in such Institutions as jails; consequently, we make a point of getting in touch with the inmates by visiting with them, and rendering aid in many ways. In addition to the weekly service, Deaconess Brainerd holds each week a Bible class for the women inmates, by which means she comes into close contact with them and is able to be a real friend and adviser. This particular branch of our work ought to be extended.
- 5. The Workhouse presents very much the same problems as the jail. Owing to difficulties brought about by the schedule under which the Workhouse is operated, and the hours already given over to certain people who hold religious services, we have not as yet been able to arrange for a weekly service. Deaconess Brainerd, however, does exactly what she does in the Jail-holds a WEEKLY Bible class for the women inmates. At present all we can do is to visit with the men, holding ourselves ready to give what spiritual and material help we can when the opportunity presents itself. During the year certain Social Welfare Agencies have been studying the problem of the Discharged Prisoner with a view to selecting some agency to more thoroughly cover the field. I am very happy to be able to report to you that the Department that undertook the survey reported that the Wardens of the Jail and Workhouse spoke in very high terms of the work we are doing in the Institutions of which they are the heads, and furthermore the Director of Public Welfare, when approached by this same Committee asking him if the City was prepared to employ a worker or workers, replied (1) that if the Department of Public Welfare should undertake

any intensive case work for discharged prisoners, it could only be done by ordinance through the creation of the office of Commissioner of Corrections; (2) the Director of Public Welfare believes the work in the Jail and Workhouse should be done by a woman in uniform and preferably by one with some religious affiliation; (3) that the work now being done by the Episcopal City Mission is satisfactory and should be extended.

- 6. At the Detention Home a song service is held each Sunday afternoon, closing with an instruction period or short inspirational address.
- 7. At the Robert Koch Tubercular Hospital a service is held in the Chapel each Friday morning, attended by patients who are able to leave their beds; until recently a second service was held in the Incipient Cottage but most of the patients who attended our service are now on walking exercise, and so are able to walk down to the Chapel. The increased attendance has helped to make the service more enjoyable. The Holy Communion is celebrated once a month, also bedside Communions once a month; of the 423 bedside Communions held in the Institutions during the year, 303 of them have been at Koch Hospital. Miss Cora Pearce, in addition to her work at the Sanitarium and Infirmary, has charge of the work at Koch Hospital, visiting the patients one day each week and also playing the organ at the services. I cannot speak too highly of the splendid devotion and thoroughness exhibited by Miss Pearce. The patients derive much benefit and help from her visits. We have been able, thanks to our generous friends, to distribute large quantities of warm clothing to the patients, many of whom are here for long periods.
- 8. At the City Sanitarium for the Insane a service is held each Sunday morning with a celebration of the Holy Communion on the first Sunday in the month. Here we have our largest congregation with an average attendance of 175. One would think that from the nature of the Institution any effort at preaching would be futile, but I can assure you from experience that such is not the case. Indeed the congregation is a very critical one, much interest in the service is exhibited by all who attend, and the singing is most hearty. We have been told repeatedly by those in charge that the Sunday morning worship is a helpful influence to the mentally sick.
- 9. Bellefontaine Farms, the Industrial Farm for boys, is visited each Monday evening; a short service is held with an inspirational address, followed by a moving picture entertainment. The films are donated by the local film houses, to whom we are greatly indebted. We regard Bellefontaine as one of the most encouraging places we visit, for the reason that we find the boys responding in a splendid way. We are of the opinion that the City of St. Louis is doing a really worth-while piece of work with the youth, who largely through environment has early gotten into trouble. St. Michael and All Angels' Sunday School at Christmas provided gifts for every boy at the Farm. Figures, especially in reports, are always tiresome. I do not intend, therefore, to burden you with statistics, but the following figures are given to indicate the scope of our work, and in an endeavor to convey to you, in the shortest possible manner, the accomplishments of the staff during the year 1923. Visits by staff members to Institution, 2,017. Services held, 792; attended by, 47,369 persons. Celebration of the Holy Communion, 95. Number of communicants, 1,465. Number of bedside Communions, 423. Letters written, 1,192. Calls made in city, 2,399. Interviews, 1,788. Baptisms, 47; Confirmations, 57; Marriages, 1; Funerals, 12.

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It would be almost impossible for me, in this report, to enumerate the names of individuals, organizations and parishes, who have donated magazines, books and clothing throughout the year. An accurate record has been kept of all that has been donated, and we wish to take this opportunity of thanking those who have helped us so splendidly with the many things so needful in this particular field. I must, however, make mention of the wonderful donations of new clothing from the St. Louis and Webster Groves Branches of the Needlework Guild of America—a most welcome donation of nearly 550 pieces, which comes at the time of the year when we most need it.

During the hot weather ice cream parties were given at the Sanitarium, Infirmary and Koch Hospital, by means of contributors to a special fund for that purpose. Additional parties were given by several individuals and organizations for the women at the Workhouse and Jail, and also for those in the Maternity Division at the City Hospital.

At Easter, 1,500 inmates were given chocolate Easter eggs and small celluloid crosses. This may seem very simple, but it meant a great deal to the recipients, many of whom still exhibit the little crosses. Our finances have been greatly helped by regular monthly contributions from St. Peter's Guild, St. George's Guild, St. Philip's Woman's Auxiliary and the Church School of St. Philip's. We are indebted to St. Michael and All Angels' Social Service Department, not only for substantial financial aid, but for much personal assistance in the various Institutions. The \$100.00 given us by the Church Woman's Club enabled us to make the initial payment on a much-needed motion picture projector. We now possess a really reliable, portable machine. Quantities of fruit, jellies and preserves have been donated, for all of which we are deeply grateful.

In response to an appeal made at the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, a beautiful organ was subscribed for, to be used at the City Hospital. The Auxiliary decided to give the organ as a Memorial to Miss Mary W. Triplett, for many years a faithful officer of that organization. The dedicatory service was held by Bishop Johnson and largely attended by members of the Auxiliary from the various parish branches of the city. The Rev. Carroll Davis, for many years connected with the City Missions work, as Dean of the Cathedral, made the address.

At Christmas we carried out our usual programme. This year we added 500 to our family, taking gifts, candy, oranges, cigars, tobacco, etc., to 3,500 people. Beginning with Christmas Eve, an excellent quartette visited each Institution singing carols. Many have been the expressions of real pleasure and comfort received through this means of bringing the message of Christmas to those "suffering long in pain." To those parishes, organizations, Sunday Schools, and individuals, who contributed to our Christmas Fund, both in money and kind, we are glad to be able to tell you that much joy and happiness was brought into many lives.

I feel this report would be incomplete without my making mention of the splendid assistance rendered by those who give their services voluntarily. Our thanks are due to Miss Williamson, who, Sunday by Sunday, plays the organ at the City Hospital; to Mr. G. B. Jones, whose work I have already mentioned in connection with Hospital No. 2; to Mr. A. D. Pomeroy, who for many years has been most loyal, always ready to respond to calls. ofttimes at great self-sacrifice. His services are most acceptable—greater devotion and real love for the unfortunate it would be hard to find. Last,

but by no means least, to Mrs. H. S. O'Bannon for her valuable assistance in many, many ways. Advancing years do not seem to check her eagerness to still do what she has been doing for thirty years. Summer and winter, sunshine and rain, Sunday after Sunday, Mrs. O'Bannon is to be found at her post. No greater tribute can be paid her than to say the inmates eagerly look forward to her coming. Through the insistent activities of Mrs. O'Bannon, many members of the Church of the Holy Communion have contributed to the general funds and to the special Funeral Fund.

In November we were asked to include in our work a monthly service at the Memorial Home on S. Grand Ave. We were glad to accede to this request, and have made ourselves responsible for a service on the 4th Sunday in each month.

On the first of December we vacated our office on Chestnut street, and are now housed in the Cathedral. Although the Cathedral was already overcrowded, Dean Scarlett, by means of some structural alterations, provided us an office; if I may be permitted to say so, I think the City Mission office should be located at the Diocesan center.

In bringing my report to a close, I want to take this opportunity of thanking the Bishop, the members of the staff, and the many parishes and organizations interested in the work of the City Mission, for their kind help, encouragement, co-operation, and loyal support during my first year. I am aware of much that has been left undone that ought to have been done, but I trust that with the same co-operation and support through the new year, we may accomplish much more in the Name of Him who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me."

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REPORT OF SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, 1923.

To the Rt. Rev. Frederick J. Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, Officers and Members of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council:

As the year has rolled away since the Annual Meeting of nineteen hundred and twenty-three, not a month but has carried with it some splendid achievement by the ever-busy Woman's Auxiliary of Missouri. Throughout the year, mind and heart and hand and purse have all united in the glorious work, whose scope is the whole wide world, whose interest embraces every people, whose joy is in pressing on, strengthening the warm ties at home and reaching out farther and farther to the needy, to the distressed, to the degraded; helping, always helping, to the very limit of its means. There is no spur to accomplishment like the zeal which the Woman's Auxiliary has in such large measure.

It is in summing up the work that one often gains the clearest view of what has been done—let us, then, take a moment for this.

The Annual Meeting, January 26th, was at the Cathedral. Dean Scarlett was the speaker of the day, giving a wonderful picture of Arizona and the Church's work there. Rev. Francis Bloy, the City Missionary, and Canon Reese spoke briefly and were listened to for the first time by the Auxiliary with much pleasure. The Quarterly Meeting in May was at Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, many splendid reports were made. Mrs. Hunt, wife of the principal of the Fort Valley High and Industrial School near Atlanta, Ga., was the speaker of the day. She stressed the value of industrial training for the negro under Christian leadership.

The October Quarterly was held at the Church of the Redeemer. Two more interesting speakers added greatly to the pleasure and information of the Auxiliary. Dr. Eleanor C. Kemp of New York, who lived among the Moros for a year, and Miss Mabel R. Schaeffer, a teacher of St. Margaret's School, Tokyo, who returned to America only a month before the disastrous earthquake.

Mrs. Robt. Burkham, the Supply Secretary, has accomplished wonderful things in her Department, providing medicines, hospital necessities of every sort, bedding, clothing and boxes that brought relief and comfort and cheer to many hearts.

Mrs. Francis Eaton has been very zealous as Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, one of the important phases of the Woman's Auxiliary Work, she reports the splendid sum of \$4,457.31.

Mrs. George Graham, correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, is another officer whose efforts bring joy to many—those who are sick or shut-in, who are far off from community life, those who are unable to afford books and magazines and cards, all these welcome with gratitude the gifts of the C. P. C.

St. Stephen's Fund, gathered so faithfully by Mrs. Wm. Burritt, appeals to us very warmly, it is used for community work done in St. Stephen's. There are hundreds who monthly enjoy the benefit of this Fund and who find uplift in the community activities which it serves to provide.

Mrs. C. R. McDonald, the Educational Secretary, reports advancement along numerous lines of work. Two Bible Classes were held by the Rev.

Edmund Duckworth, much appreciated and well attended, also normal classes developing leaders who carried on Lenten Study Classes in some of the Parishes. Mr. and Mrs. McDonald's kindly help made possible Deaconess Bedell's visit to St. Louis last Spring. During her visit the Deaconess aroused great interest in her Alaskan Mission and secured a fund to purchase much-needed equipment.

Mrs. E. F. Cushing, as the Messenger, has visited country parishes, strengthening and cheering the hearts of many who might be discouraged, gathering the women together to hear of the Auxiliary work. She is also the Treasurer in this Diocese, for the "Woman's Auxiliary Specials," the two houses, which are to be erected in New York and in Raleigh, each to be named the "Daniel Sylvester Tuttle Memorial," to be given by the Woman's Auxiliary during this Triennium.

The far-reaching disaster in Japan aroused the sympathy and generosity of America. A pledge of over a thousand dollars subscribed at the October Meeting shows how the ready sympathy of the Auxiliary Women found large expression.

One of the beautiful gifts this year was an organ placed in the City Hospital, for Rev. Francis Bloy's use, in memory of Miss Mary W. Triplett, who served as Secretary for thirty-five years, and to whom the Woman's Auxiliary owes much for her faithful, joyful and consecrated work.

There is no opportunity in the Secretary's report to dwell on the devotion and enthusiasm of the Executive Board, nor upon the hearty co-operation of the Representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary, who by their united efforts have reached such splendid results.

GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY has worked in the five fields of service. Its members have helped in a modest way in their parishes, the City Institutions and the Big Sister Movement. Indeed, most of our failures have come through lack of leaders.

The Annual Members' Service was well attended, and a helpful and inspiring one. We sent a member to the Summer Conference at Gambier, Ohio. She proved quite an addition to the young people with her friendly ways and lovely voice, being known as Miss St. Louis.

Missions and social service work have played quite a part in the program of the branches. The Senior Members' Club gave a pageant, "The Women of History," at the annual party for all members, which was enjoyed by all in its picturesque setting in the open, under huge trees.

The greatest event of the last year was the opening of our beautiful Holiday House at Monarch, in St. Louis County. There, many of our members and of our friends spent days of relaxation and pleasure. The Bishop planned a beautiful vesper service for Sunday afternoons, and members of the clergy came on different Sundays, who, we hope, enjoyed the services as much as did the members. An atmosphere of friendliness has already been established in the community about the Holiday House by our fine House Mother. We are aiming to be more and more of a social center and happiness to our friends at Antioch and other villages near by.

Fourteen new branches have been organized in West Missouri, and we want to keep up with the rest of our state, which we feel will be quite possible to do if we have the support and sympathy of the clergy and their intelligent interest in naming their branch secretaries. More and more our women in the church should be urged to give of their leisure and culture to the development of the girls. As yet, we have hardly touched the problem. What will we do:—Criticize the flapper, or make of her a friend and a Girl For Service?

REPORT OF THE CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE LEAGUE.

Right Rev. Father in God:

The Church School Service League in the Diocese of Missouri begs leave to submit to you and to the Eighty-fifth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri the following report of its work in the year of Our Lord, 1923.

I trust you will bear with me if I preface the report with a statement of the nature and scope of the C. S. S. L.

When the Church Service League was founded with the idea of coordinating all the women's work in the Church, the Department of Education of the National Council saw the wisdom and appeal of the general plan if it were applied to the children of the Church, and so it established under its auspices and direction the Church School Service League.

Briefly put, its purpose is to co-ordinate and systematize all the expressional part of the child's religious education, to instill the principle that the test of our faith is our interpretation of that faith in terms of life, that the fruit of our faith is our service. If the work of our Church Schools is not to be barren of any great results there must be presented to the child the opportunities of giving expression, in practical, tangible ways, to the lessons which are being learned from week to week.

Before the inception of the Church School Service League, that opportunity of expression was confined to the activities of the Junior Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, except where the ingenuity of individual Rectors devised such schemes of activity as would meet the particular needs in their parishes. Splendid as was the Junior Auxiliary both in its principles and in the work it accomplished, it had two glaring defects, (1) its appeal was exclusively to the girls, and (2) its very title proclaimed that its work was to be confined to that field of the Church's labors which was popularly known as "Missions." The first defect is obviated in the Church School Service League by including in its membership all the children of the Church School—boys and girls, the second by the embracing of a new and better conception of "Missions." Under the old and generally accepted meaning of the word, "Missions" had a geographical connotation. "Missions" meant "out there," and "out there" meant across the Pacific, or in Alaska, or among the Dakota Indians, or with those benighted mountaineers of Kentucky and Tennessee, or the ignorant blacks of the south. That was the old conception of Missions. We have come to know better in these latter days. We have learned that Missions are the result of the world-wide program our Blessed Lord holds for His Church. "Go ye into all the world," He said to His apostles, and the same command He gives to us today, "Go ye into all the world." But there are no geographical limitations. The world is wherever there are souls to be brought into the kingdom, wherever there are lives to be made brighter by a new and divine ideal, wherever there is suffering and sin and sorrow and poverty and ignorance that we can alleviate by the gospel of Jesus Christ and the right hand of the fellowship of love and service. Wherever in the kingdom there is need for our gifts and our service—there we are sent, that place is what our Lord meant by "the world," that place is "Missions" to us. We will find it in far-off Japan, but we will find it, too, within our own Diocese, in our Community, yes, within the limits of our own Parish. The founders of the Church School Service League recognized that important fact, and established the

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principle that as of life, that thurch Schools and to the child ways, to the

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five fields of service—the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation, and the World to invite the services of the children. The child is taught that whatever he is called upon to do, from the simplest task in the Parish House to the great work of the Lenten Mite Box Offering, is service to Christ's Holy Church. No work is either too great or too small, so long as the Lord hath need of it. The year is divided into five blocks, one for each field of service, but so elastic is the plan, that work for any field may be done at any time, as the need may arise.

The child is taught the privilege of giving whatever he has to give, his time, his ability, his labor, his money and (greatest of all gifts) his prayers to the Church.

All this work is directed in a general way by the department of education in New York, but immediately by the Church School Service League directors in the parishes, who are appointed by the Rectors. In any given Diocese these parish directors constitute a Diocesan Council of Directors, which meets once a month for advice and the formulation of diocesan activity, for the exchange of ideas, and for fellowship. But each parish is free to adapt the general system and program to its peculiar conditions and needs.

In the Diocese of Missouri we have now 24 active parish branches. We hope the time is not far off when every Parish and Mission in the Diocese will have a branch of the Church School Service League. We appeal to you for your prayers, your sympathy, and your co-operation in our work of developing the future workers of the Church—our boys and girls, whom we hope to train into faithful, loyal, loving servants of Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and of His Body, the Church.

Dollars and cents cannot begin to tell the tale of loving service given by our children, for much that was done by them, indeed the greater part cannot be measured by that standard. I wish you could have read with me the reports from the various parish branches, and learned how devious were the ways in which willing hearts and hands served our beloved Church. Let me give you the detailed report of one Parish branch, which is typical of the work of the Church School Service League: "Distributed hymn books and service cards, assisted in serving luncheons, ushered at Church School, arranged Christmas decorations, boys sang in choir, trimmed Christmas tree for party, gave to pray book fund, gave to Parish laundry expenses, gave to fund for keeping parish house clean, gift to janitor during sickness, made and sold Easter Eggs, made and distributed valentines to 90 children, gifts to 60 orphans, burse and bible markers to the chapel of the Prince of Peace, manger gifts (cash) to the Prince of Peace, subscribed to St. Luke's Hospital fund, subscribed to C. S. S. L. C. Treasury and Racine conference fund, gave to Missionary Host, subscribed to Near East Relief and French orphans, sent gifts to Seamen's institute, gave to missions through the Mite Boxes, subscribed to duty fund on Christmas box of 1922, gave to the Birthday Thank Offering, sent a Christmas box to 45 children, value of box, \$14.31; total money gifts: to Parish \$45.00, to Community \$133.32, to Diocese \$107.47, to World \$371.98, Amt. Birthday Thank Offering \$12.84. Total \$684.92." Many a parish handed in just such a report as this. And now for the figures.* The Christmas Box work consisted of boxes sent to the Corn Creek Mission, Allen, S. Dak., to Allakaket, Alaska, to a colored Mission in Springfield, Ill., to Trinity Church, Monroe, N. C., and to the Seamen's Institute, New Orleans, La. The number of persons cared for was 450, and the combined value of the boxes was \$338.20.

APPENDIX No. 19

CHURCH WORK AMONG THE DEAF.

At the suggestion of our Bishop I have prepared a brief statement concerning the work our Church is doing among the deaf of our Diocese. By the "deaf" is meant the happy aggregation of the community who are conversant with the language of conventional signs and, therefore, are able to enjoy collectively in large numbers Church services, lectures and the like as well as people possessed of normal hearing. There is another and larger class composed of the "deafened" and "hard-of-hearing," some of whom rely on mechanical aids to hearing, some upon the tedious and uncertain means of lip-reading, while the remainder for the most part too deaf for mechanical aids, and possessing neither the patience nor talent for lip-reading, and not knowing the sign-language, do not seem to fit in anywhere.

According to the Census Returns there is proportionally one deaf person in every fifteen hundred of the general population. In the larger cities like St. Louis, where opportunities for employment are greater and more varied, and social and cultural advantages more numerous, the proportion is about one in twelve hundred. Consequently, there must be no fewer than 800 deaf citizens residing in St. Louis and adjoining suburbs. Church work among the deaf of our Diocese had a comparatively early start, beginning forty-nine years ago with an occasional service by a lay-reader followed by services every few weeks by a deaf clergyman-the late Reverend A. W. Mann. These occasional services continued for a period of fifteen years-up to 34 years ago when I came to take charge of the St. Louis Day School for the Deaf, now the Gallaudet School, which position I resigned over a year ago in order to give all of my time to the work of the ministry. St. Thomas' Mission was organized soon after I came to St. Louis to reside and since then weekly Sunday services and monthly lectures have been the rule. During the first 32 years of my residence here, school duties precluded more intensive work along Church line. In point of numeral strength our Mission here is the third largest of its kind in the country, being out-classed by All Souls', Philadelphia, and St. Ann's, New York, both older missions in much larger centers of population, each having had, for many years, a church building and parish house for the exclu1,700.73 75.86 2,886.77 140.29

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sive use of the deaf with clergy and parish visitors giving all their time to the work.

Our Cathedral here, is the only Church home our Mission has ever known. We have tried to fit into the working schedule of the Cathedral, so as to occasion the least possible inconvenience. We are very thankful for the opportunities enjoyed here, for the holding of services and other meetings and for the uniform kindness shown us during the years we have been here. The fact that St. Thomas' is a guest and not an integral part of the Cathedral may not be a matter of common knowledge. We have hardly been conscious of it ourselves, so perfectly at home has the Cathedral family made us feel.

Up to the present time our Mission register shows 189 baptisms, among them being quite a few hearing children of deaf parents; 296 confirmations; 73 marriages; and 320 communicants. The present number of communicants is 157. There are over 200 confirmed persons among the deaf residents of St. Louis. Our Mission is composed almost exclusively of working people, most of whom also are the support of relatives. While our Mission has experienced a steady growth, the growth necessarily has been rather slow since our field is restricted to a special class. Should the wonders of science and invention ever overcome the obstacle of deafness, then our occupation, like Othello's, will be gone. However, there is not the slightest indication that it is passing, hence, the Church in fulfilling Our Master's command to carry the Gospel to every creature must carry on her work among the deaf.

We have tried to make St. Thomas an educational and social, as well as a religious center. Current topics have been made a study since the time the Mission was organized, lectures and readings by local and visiting talent have featured all along in our program. The several socials each year have been popular and well attended. The sign language is a priceless boon to the deaf. By means of it as much may be said, and said as well, within a given time as in any other language. As a clear, rapid, and ready means of instruction and entertainment for the deaf, there is nothing so satisfactory as the sign-language. Our Mission is fortunate in its lay helpers. Mr. Steidemann, a graduate of Washington University, has served efficiently as lay-reader and treasurer for a number of years. Miss Deem, a Gallaudet School teacher, for several years past has taught our Sunday School class and is a devoted worker imbued with the true missionary spirit. The Woman's Guild, organized by Mrs. Cloud and presided over by her for several years, is a wonderfully helpful agency of the Mission. Its eighteen willing and efficient workers give a supper and bazaar twice a year, arrange for a picnic, and a lawn party, annually, get up an extra social now and then, and can be depended upon to answer special calls. The Mission Committee, led by the faithful warden, Mr. Brockmann, is a source of encouragement and support. The Nation-wide Committee, under the leadership of Miss Roper, a Gallaudet School teacher, came into being more recently, but during the short time of its existence has rendered valuable help. Fifteen months ago, as soon as released from school duties, I began conducting weekly Sunday afternoon services for the colored deaf at All Saints' Chapel, an arrangement made possible through the kindly co-operation of the Rev. Mr. Clarke, rector of Ali Saints, whose help and encouragement is gratefully acknowledged. The work at All Saints' Chapel, still in an unorganized state, is known as Ephphatha Mission.

At the present time Ephphatha Mission ministers to some 30 individuals, among whom there have been 6 baptisms, and 9 confirmations. The present number of communicants at Ephphatha is 11. During the past year a part of my time has been sold to other Dioceses. Regular monthly week evening services are held in Kansas City and Omaha. Quarterly visits are

made to Colorado with a Sunday at Denver. A member of the Denver Mission is a student at St. John's Seminary at Greeley and expects to be ordained and put to work in the mission field in a few months with headquarters at Denver. He will be expected to assume charge of a considerable part of my present field outside of Missouri. During the past year I have baptized 23, presented 43 for confirmation within my Missionary field, filled special appointments in the Dioceses of Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Duluth, Chicago, Springfield, and Atlanta; served as chaplain of the Missouri Alumni Association at Fulton, of Gallaudet College Alumni at Atlanta; presided over the National Association of the Deaf convention at Atlanta, and the Missouri State Association at Fulton. I also addressed the Round Table conference on "The Deaf," at the convention of the Council of Jewish Women held in this city last November. I officiated at the State Schools for the Deaf, at Fulton, Olathe, Jacksonville, Council Bluffs, Omaha, Colorado Springs, and Faribault. Altogether my audiences have been made up of about 4,500 individuals.

On the occasion of one of my early interviews with Bishop Tuttle, he spoke of his own hearing defect and of his great interest in the deaf. Years afterwards, at my suggestion, he composed a special prayer for the use of the deaf, which has been widely used and which will continue to be used because it strikes a responsive chord in the hearts of the deaf. It seems fitting that this prayer of our beloved, departed Presiding Bishop be read into the concluding part of this address.

CHURCH SERVICE LEAGUE.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The regular meetings of the Executive Council of the Church Service League have been held the third Wednesday in each month, always beginning with a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Chapel.

The attendance has been large, and every meeting has been full of life and stimulating interest. At these meetings publicity is given to work already begun, and opportunities presented for new work which attract the attention, and enlist the sympathy of all present. The progress of the work is reported, the pressing needs of the various departments brought to the attention of the members, and ways and means devised for giving practical help. These needs are the challenge to this body, which has never failed to call out a prompt and generous response.

Two new departments, the patriotic work and the church publications have been added this year, so the League now numbers 21 departments or organizations. Most of these are giving interesting reports of their own.

The work at the City Institutions, St. Luke's Mission, Holy Cross, The Prince of Peace, Brittain Hall, and Herculaneum, and the new patriotic work have called forth great interest and furnished the opportunities for the parishes to respond in a most generous way.

Reports from six parishes: Ascension, St. George's, St. John's, St. Michael and All Angels', St. Peter's and St. Philip's have been sent in, and the figures show their interest and the development of their activities.

The Executive Council has had some changes in the personnel, but always the vigor and interest seem to grow. Our thanks are again given our publicity representative, Miss Gooding, who has given us so many notices in the daily papers and to the Church News which has so generously given us space for reporting work.

No record of this year would be complete without a mention of the loss we all felt in the death of our beloved Bishop Tuttle, who was the Father of this Council. Although he had retired as the active head, he ever felt a kindly interest, which was a benediction. We fully realize how fortunate we are in having the benefit of the counsel and presence of Bishop Johnson as president of the Council, and so the work will grow and prosper.

GRACE CHURCH-HOLY CROSS HOUSE.

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Grace Church and Holy Cross House come before you this year in a changed relationship. For the first time since the Rev. B. E. Reed ceased to be rector in April, 1910, this congregation is in official relation with this Diocese along the normal lines. Then it was one of the older parishes of the city. Today, it is listed as an organized mission. In the time between it has been known as an unorganized mission; a term that was practically incorrect, but technically correct. I think that I can testify that it was well organized. A picked body of laymen under the leadership of Bishops Tuttle and Johnson have made the present development possible. I wish to pay tribute to their self-sacrificing labors. For years they have carried on this work without any financial support from the missionary funds. They have preserved a valuable piece of property to the Church and have given opportunity to her members to do constructive missionary work at home. Today, they can report that property as greatly extended and increased in value and also that work has been conducted there continuously, and with increasing influence for goo'd. That increase has called for change in administration. A congregation with over 160 communicants, a Sunday School that has an enrollment of 250 and an attendance that exceeds 170, and good working organizations of adults and children, called for some opportunity, to take its place with the other congregations of the Diocese and have a voice and a part in carrying on the work of the Church. Some sixty of our communicants petitioned the Diocesan Council this past year to be admitted as an organized mission. That request was granted.

Up to this time Holy Cross Corporation has administered Grace Church and Holy Cross House as one organization with one budget. Since the first of this month the work is being carried on with separate budgets and with distinct and different organizations in charge of each. What is known as the social service or settlement work is under the immediate supervision and control of Holy Cross Corporation. This part of our work is a member of the Community Council and of the Community Fund.

Grace Church has its own Bishop's Committee. It conducts its own affairs and pays its own bills. Not one dollar comes to it either from the Community Fund or from Holy Cross Corporation. It is being generously supported by Church friends from other congregations and is promised the assistance of the Department of Church Extension and Missions. It is starting out under friendly and favorable auspices and gives promise of increasing strength. Already the responsibility coming with this opportunity is creating enthusiasm and initiative.

The title to all of the property is held by Hoiy Cross Corporation. This includes the beautiful, new church building which is now ready for use. This new building is having a very important part in the awakening of people to the desirability of being active in the Church. Miss Susan Mount, Bishop Tuttle, the Committee that he appointed to consider the proper place for this church to be built and to the members of the Corporation whose ability and integrity made the givers feel that the money would be safely and wisely administered, the congregation and the members of the Diocese owe their thanks. Under the able leadership of Philip S. Russel, President of the Corporation, and Clinton L. Whittemore, Chairman of the Building Committee, we have this most satisfactory addition to the churches of the Diocese. It was used for the first time last Sunday. As soon as possible arrangements will be made to have Bishop Johnson consecrate it. I hope that you will take an early opportunity to see it. Of course much will be

needed in the way of equipment and fittings. Having the edifice, these things will come to us and we shall rejoice over each addition to our furnishings.

In addition to the new church building, we are replatting the extensive grounds and will have a good sized playground for older children and a smaller place where little children and their mothers can come. In this latter a wading pool will be a feature and equipment for both of these places will be needed. All of the ground is to be fenced in so that it can be controlled and protected. Very shortly some needed improvements will be made in the Guild Hall and then the problem of a Rectory must be solved. If someone wants to do something worth while, let him think on this rectory problem and present us with an adequate sum for the building of a comfortable home.

We dream some way of a gymnasium and swimming pool, a day nursery and a housing arrangement by which working girls and women could find a home-like place in which to live. I feel sure of your appreciation of our endeavors and I ask that you help us to gradually make these become realities and thus contribute our share as a Church to the better citizenship of the coming generations and show our gratitude to God for His blessings to us.

REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW.

Reverend Father in God, Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-Fifth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Missouri Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew reported to you, last year, eleven Senior Chapters and that number has neither been increased or decreased, and the total membership of the various Chapters is approximately the same as when our last report was made.

In addition to the individual work of the Chapters, in rendering assistance to the Rector of the Parish, the Assembly has been engaged in such diocesan work as arranging for the sending of twelve boys from St. Louis to Camp Tuttle, this camp being conducted under the auspices of the Philadelphia Office of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, having as its object the training and development of the boys along Church lines, so that they may become leaders in the various work necessary for the welfare of other boys. We are, also, supplying men, each week, to assist at the City Hospital in getting the patients to and from the services and such other work as the City Missioner may find for them to do.

APPENDIX No. 25

REPORT OF CHURCH PENSION FUND.

St. Louis, Missouri, January 22, 1924.

It would be difficult to conceive anything more gratifying and helpful to the clergy of the Church than the constantly increasing usefulness and security of the Church Pension Fund. The management is justifying itself not only as having the best welfare of the clergy at heart, but also as being wise, prudent, and of great ability in affairs.

The inflow of pension assessments, so generally and promptly paid as to excite the wonder of other like institutions, is met by a daily contractual output of pension benefits to incapacitated and retired clergy, and to widows and minor children of clergy deceased.

To illustrate: The pension benefits, proper, thus distributed during the year, 1923, amounted to the great sum of \$299,000, which, together with the annual grants assumed by the Pension Fund from the late General Clergy Relief Fund, other merged funds and "The General Convention of 1907 Account," reached the sum of \$486,000—an average outlay to beneficiaries of \$1,365.00 per day.

In this distribution the Diocese of Missouri shared as follows:

• To this beneficent result, diocesan and general, the Diocese of Missouri contributed, in the main, its allotted part. Our pension assessments, for the most part, have been promptly paid month by month. Arrearages have been comparatively few and for small amounts. But your Committee knows of no reason why there should be any arrearages at any time; and we venture to recommend to parochial and mission authorities the plan of regularly setting apart their respective monthly pension assessments, just as they set apart for fuel, light and service, in order that remittance may be made to the canonical treasurer not later than the 25th of each month. The assessment is of canonical obligation, and its prompt payment is the only means whereby the pension interests of the clergy can be assured.

Your Committee also ventures to express the hope that the parishes of the diocese which now allow their clergy to bear their own pension charges will assume their rightful obligation at an early day; and also that such as have not yet entered the Pension Fund will quickly redress the wrong which they thus commit against those who minister to them in holy things by becoming a part of the institution which safeguards them against the vicissitudes of disability and age, and which, in the event of death, saves their widows and minor orphans from the ills of poverty and anxious care.
