Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

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

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Note—In the above list the names in italics are those of alternate delegates, not in the original report, who were seated in the place of delegates absent at some time during the Convention.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Assessments.
 - III. On Constitution and Canons.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - VIII. On State of the Church.
 - IX. Unfinished Business.
 - X. On Social Service.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the services of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

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- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

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21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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Journal of the Eighty-second Convention

OF THE

Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, SAINT LOUIS.

Tuesday, January 25, 1921.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-second Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, on January 25, 1921, at 10 a. m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, assisted by Dean Davis, the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, and the Rev. W. L. Witmer. The Rev. J. H. Taylor of Cape Girardeau read the Epistle, and the Rev. C. B. Carpenter of the Hospital Missions read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the Schuyler Memorial House, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-eight who were entitled to vote, thirtyone were present.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See page 16.)

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the Lay Delegates to the Convention.

Fifty-three Parishes and Missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from twenty-three were present.

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The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

Mr. Bull presented the following committee report:

We, your Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, to whom was referred the application of St. Stephen's Parish, St. Louis, for union with this Convention, respectfully report that said application complies with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Missouri, and we therefore recommend that said St. Stephen's Parish, St. Louis, be admitted in union with the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

H. W. MIZNER, Chairman.

Report received and St. Stephen's Parish, St. Louis, was admitted in union with this Convention.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

The visiting Clergy and Candidates for Holy Orders were invited to seats on the floor of the Convention.

The Clergy who are canonically resident in this Diocese, but not entitled to vôte in the Convention, were invited to seats on the floor of the Convention, and were given the privilege of speaking.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Dean Davis, Rev. Dr. Wilkins, and James A. Waterworth as members of the Nominating Committee.

Dean Davis introduced Resolution No. 1 as follows:

RESOLUTION NO. 1-

Resolved, That the Rev. Canon Talbot of Washington, who is here at this time, has with him slides showing views of the proposed Cathedral at Washington, be requested to present them immediately at the close of the address of the Bishop Coadjutor.

Resolution No. 1 adopted.

It was ordered that the Convention should meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9:30 o'clock in the Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m., when it will take a recess until 2:30 p. m. and continue to 5 p. m.

The Report of the Committee on the Cathedral, under Resolution No. 9 of the last Convention, was made a special order for Wednesday at 11 o'clock.

Mr. Warner presented the following report:

Your Committee appointed at the Eightieth Convention, and continued by the Eighty-first Convention to consider Resolution No. 6, introduced at the Eightieth Convention by Rev. C. E. Remick, with instruction to report to this Convention, respectfully reports that because of continuing impracticability of determining what changes in accounting and in records to be kept by Parishes and Missions are necessary to properly meet requirements growing out of the Nation-Wide Campaign, which requirements cannot yet be fully determined, it is not possible to make definite and intelligent recommendation to this Convention as to action to be taken upon said resolution, and suggests that the committee be continued with instructions to report to the next Convention.

G. K. WARNER, Chairman.

The request of the committee was granted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the following report:

Your committee, which was appointed at the last Convention to compile the amendments and additions to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese since the Convention of 1913, respectfully report that they have performed the work assigned to them, and have had said amendments and additions printed.

J. C. JONES, Chairman.

Report received.

Mr. Dix presented the report of the Finance Committee of the Associated Vestries. (Appendix 3.)

Consideration of above report was postponed informally.

Bishop Tuttle presented a Preamble and Resolutions from the Provincial Council. (Appendix 4.)

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The balance due on the assessment of St. Paul's Parish, Saint Louis, was remitted, and the delegates were given seats and votes in the Convention.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

Mr. Block introduced Resolution No. 2 as follows: RESOLUTION NO. 2—

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to consist of the present members of the Finance Committee of the Associated Vestries, and Mr. Robbins, the President of the Associated Vestries, who shall be its chairman, together with such other members as may be appointed by the President of the Associated Vestries, sufficient in number to make said Committee consist of five members, to whom is hereby referred the report of the Finance Committee of the Associated Vestries [see Appendix 3], with directions to prepare and submit to the next Annual Diocesan Convention a comprehensive survey of the present financial system and financial status of the diocese and also to submit to said Annual Convention a complete scheme and plan for the carrying out of the recommendations contained in and set forth in said report of the Finance Committee of the Associated Vestries;

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der Resoorder for That the President of the Associated Vestries be and is authorized and empowered to fill any vacancies in the committee hereby authorized that may arise by reason of the sickness, death, resignation or inability of any of the members which may arise in the membership of said committee at any time before it makes its report so that said committee shall always consist of at least five members;

That the said report and recommendation of said committee hereby authorized and appointed shall be fully completed on or before the 1st day of December, 1921; and

That the said report when completed shall be printed and a copy thereof shall be sent to the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, and to the Rector or Clergyman in charge of every parish or mission in this Diocese, so that the same shall be received by them on or before the 5th day of December, 1921.

Resolution No. 2 adopted.

The Rev. W. H. Tomlins of Granite City presented his card to the Secretary.

The Secretary read the report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. (Appendix 5.)

Report received.

The Secretary read the report of the Parochial Trust Fund. (Appendix 6.)

Report received.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 3 as follows: RESOLUTION NO. 3—

Resolved, That Canon viii be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 4 thereof, which said Section 4 shall read as follows: "Section 4. In the event any mission shall become dormant, or cease to function as such, all property theretofore acquired or held by such mission—both real and personal of whatsoever nature—shall thereupon be held by the officers of such mission, subject to the control, direction and disposition of the Diocesan Missionary Board, which Board shall have power and authority to hold, use or dispose of such property for such other missions or missionary purposes as, in the judgment of the Missionary Board, may seem best."

Resolution No. 3 referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 4 as follows:

Resolved, That Section 4 of Canon ix be amended by adding thereto, after the word "Missions" in the first line thereof, the following:

"to take, hold, use, transfer or otherwise dispose of such property—both real and personal—for missions or missionary purposes as may devolve upon it or be recieved by it from dormant missions,"

so that said Section 4 when so amended shall read as follows:

"Sec. 4. The Board shall have power to locate and organize Missions; to take, hold, use, transfer or otherwise dispose of such property—both real and personal—for missions or missionary purposes as may devolve upon

it or be received by it from dormant missions; to purchase ground and erect mission buildings thereon, and to assist organized missions in purchasing ground and erecting buildings thereon; provided that the Board shall not incur any indebtedness for the foregoing purposes."

Resolution No. 4 referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. Witbeck presented a report for the Committee on The Church News, containing Resolutions Nos. 5 and 6. (Appendix 7.)

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

These pledges extend over several years.

The committee respectfully asks to be discharged and that the further collections of these pledges be placed in the offices of the Cathedral Staff, as in the opinion of the committee, they can be more promptly and satistorily collected in that way.

Whereas, The matter of vacations of Clergy both in the city and country have been subject to some criticisms as to irregularity or lack of co-operation between parishes; and

Whereas, It seems wise to the Associated Vestries of St. Louis that all vacations be arranged in an orderly manner with emphasis given to importance of such co-operation as will insure by combination, the continuous ministrations of our Church to all neighborhoods; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we recommend that the Chairman of the Diocesan Convention be authorized to appoint a committee of three to compile at the earliest possible moment, a list of the parishes of the Diocese and append to each the date of the absence of the Rector so that it will be at once evident which Rector can be called on for such spiritual aid as is needed; and be it further

Resolved, That this committee be instructed to publish this list either in the form of a leaflet or in "The Church News" in a prominent position.

Resolution No. 7 adopted and referred to a committee composed of the members of a committee of the Associated Vestries, which had previously been appointed to consider this subject.

Said committee should include a Warden, a Secretary and a Treasurer; and said election shall be subject to the approval of the Missionary in charge and the Bishop, or Bishop Coadjutor.

The function of this committee shall be to assist the Missionary in the business affairs of the Mission and to look after its local interests in case of a vacancy. Its authority shall be restricted to the present rights and privileges accorded to organized missions.

Resolution No. 17 referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Second: That this committee obtain as many signatures as possible to petitions demanding the passage of this law providing for censorship of motion pictures, as the passage of this proposed law is evidently the most practical and prompt method to curb the evil that now exists.

We, your committee to whom was referred Resolution No. 14, relating to holding the next Convention at Columbia, introduced by Rev. Mr. George, have examined it, and respectfully recommend that it be adopted.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

The Bishop appointed Nelson G. Edwards instead of E. H. Lycett, resigned, on the Committee on Assessments.

The Bishop appointed Miss Ada Winston to be an additional member of the Committee on The Church News.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to have 600 copies of the Journal printed.

The Treasurer was authorized to pay the Cathedral \$25.00 for janitor services.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the last day of the Convention.

By authority of the Convention the Bishop appointed the following named committee to serve with the Bishop Coadjutor on the Mission at Kirksville:

Geo. C. Mackay of St. Louis, Rev. E. S. White, and Alonzo Mackay of Palmyra.

Resolved, That the Convention makes recommendation, that all alterations to Constitution and Canons to be proposed for action by the Convention of 1922, be given to the Committee on Constitution and Canons at least one week prior to the meeting of said Convention, and that such alterations be printed for distribution among the members of the Convention at the time such alterations are under consideration.

Resolution No. 23 adopted.

The Bishop appointed the members of the Social Service Committee as a Social Service Commission for the Diocese.

The vote by which Resolutions Nos. 3 and 4 were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons was reconsidered.

Resolutions Nos. 3 and 4, relating to Canons viii and ix, were adopted.

After a benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned sine die.

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Annual Address of the Bishop of Missouri

Eighty=second Annual Convention.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

The Diocese of Missouri is eighty years old, and more. This is the Eighty-second Diocesan Convention. There were 17 Bishops in the American Church in 1840, when Missouri was admitted as a Diocese. The Senior was Bishop Griswold of the Eastern Diocese and he was Presiding Bishop. The Junior was Bishop De Lancey of Western New York. We now have 133 Bishops. Then the ratio of communicants to population was 1 in 308. Today it is 1 in 99. In 1840 our communicants were 55,000. Now they are a million. An actual increase of twenty fold. And a per cent of increase, compared with the population, of three fold. Substantial growth, undeniably. In watching out for the Church, in waiting for the Church, in counting up for the Church, there are not a few disappointments, in backflowings of the current, and in ebbings of the tide, and in shoals and snags of the course. But substantially there is growth, and vigorous growth. That cannot be denied. Let us harbor no disappointment then from the smallness or infertility of our own field. Rather let us thank God, and take courage, and carry on.

We have no gathering of great multitudes at our Annual Diocesan Convention. There are no triumphant hosts massed for conflict and clamorous for victory. We meet together and talk, and we are glad to think that talk is a thing of life and warmth. We present reports and reports embody facts and convey instruction. This year the reports are for the exact calendar year, 1920, from January 1 to December 31, 1920. By harmony of view and by each stoutly upstanding for his own view we get growth and breadth and strength. We ask and answer questions and such asking and answering are excellent ways of acquiring knowledge and imbibing wisdom

We have had eighty years of Diocesan life. Those eighty years are not merely that much of a dead past. They are rather, in life and growth and experience and consciousness, a living present. We have not grown great. But we have grown. And our Diocesan existence is not merely an existence, but it is a life, a hope, a strength, an inspiration. Our existence throughout the nation we may denominate the American Church. But with no desire to boast or to exclude by the use of the word, American.

In popular use the American Nation means the nation born out of and builded on the thirteen historic colonies of the Atlantic seaboard.

In like manner the American Church is a unified national thing framed from many elements,—not only from the Anglicans of Virginia and Maryland and Deleware and the Carolinas and Georgia, but also from the Puritans of New England, and the Hollanders of New York and New Jersey, the Scandinavians of Eastern Pennsylvania and the Scotch-Irish of Western Pennsylvania and the Quakers of Philadelphia and the Huguenots of Long Island, and, in these later years, from the Spanish Christians of California, Texas and New Mexico.

As a matter of fact, the eighty years we are considering form the most active part of the development of the Far West portion of our national domain. It was in 1847 that the Mormons made their settlement in Utah, which was then Mexican Terrotory; it was in February, 1848, that a Treaty of Peace was signed between the United States and Mexico after three years of active war; and it was in 1849 that gold was discovered on the Sacramento River and the inrush of Americans into California began. Before that we had little to do with the Pacific Coast save that our whaling vessels went there sometimes. But now we are planning for our General Convention to meet there in Portland, Oregon, in 1922, as it met in San Francisco in 1901.

Have you observed how fitly the appellation, "the American Church," may be applied to our own Church?

Note these facts:

- 1. Among the signers to the Declaration of Independence there were more members of our Church than of any other religious body. The like ratio was a fact in the membership of the Constitutional Convention of 1787, and also in the early Congresses of the Confederation and of the Union.
- 2. Representative government is the wisest and best government for a free people. Direct government by the masses, as in the New England town meetings, has not the wholesome checks or the wise opportunities for discussion that representative government has. It was the meetings of the House of Burgesses, as in Virginia, and of the civil assemblies in the Colonies for purposes of deliberation and debate,—meetings held for the most part in the churches,—that prepared the way and presented the example for the best kind of government for the American people.
- 3. Ours has always been a united Church. Even in the sad Civil War its unity was not broken.
- 4. It is found wherever the flag flies. There is not a rood of earth over which the flag rules in sovereignty that is not also under the active jurisdiction of a Bishop of this Church or his representative.
- 5. It is self governing, very much after the fashion of the Government of the States themselves; and no allegiance or obedience is due from it to any un-American prelate whatever.

Take in all these points of view, and it may be noted how our own Church, more fitly than any other, might be named the National Church or the American Church.

Our Nation-Wide Church Campaign, in which we have been engaged of late, has served in no small degree to deepen within us the consciousness that we are a National Church.

Touching this Nation-Wide Church Campaign, we may not be able as yet to understand fully its working life, or to grasp all its relations and intertwinings. But we do know enough of it to welcome it cordially as a present living thing, It is working blessed results in harmonizing and unifying the Church, in rousing its interest, in firing its spirit, in enlarging its scope of vision, in warming its sympathy, in quickening its zest for work, and in promoting its activity and influence among all people. Let us thank God and take courage. We will gather to the colors of the campaign. It will give us push. It will minister the uplift of hope. It will teach the down-delving of labor. Its streamers flying to the four winds of heaven shall be Faith, and Hope, and Love, and Work.

Let us look a bit at details. In the Church News of November, the apportionments of 71 parishes and missions are listed. Of these 10 report nothing at all paid. But 16 report amounts that are full payment, or overpayment. That is good. I want to mention the 16. They are Affton, Bloomfield, Chaffee, Cuba, De Soto, Doniphan, Poplar Bluff, Portland,

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ing framed and Maryn the Puri-New Jersey, of Western ts of Long California, Prairieville, Sherman, St. Charles, Valley Park, with the following four from St. Louis, viz, Good Shepherd, Prince of Peace, St. Luke's and St. Thomas'.

By the New York City report of December 1, \$11,344.33 are still to be paid. That seems a big sum. Only the month of December left in which to pay. The fiscal year closed December 31. I can only hope that it was

found to be paid on January 1.

The parishes and congregations in the main are in healthful condition. Though for a time the Rectorships of Ferguson and Jefferson City and Palmyra are vacant. The list of confirmations is a good one, footing up 619 in all. Under the skilled hand of the Bishop Coadjutor the missionary work of the Diocese advances.

Our benevolences and beneficences stand steady and work hard. Count

them up a bit and see if you are not proud of them.

St. Luke's Hospital, St. Andrew's Brotherhood, the Orphans' Home, the Arthur Brittain Hall, the Convalescent Home, the Girls' Friendly, the Church Club and the Churchwoman's Club, the United Thank Offering, the Missionary Host, the Women's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, the Guild for Nurses, the Church School Service League, the Lay Readers' League, with, I dare say, not a few other agencies which my crowded brain will not take in for enumeration. And all this besides the general missionary activities and the Social Service helpfulnesses which each parish or mission station by itself constantly sets up and continually carries on. May I put on record that the giving of the Woman's Auxiliary for 1920 has been the large sum of, cash, \$10,522.16; boxes, \$2,350.14; total, \$12,872.30.

There are three things that make national life strong and keep human life sweet. They are Homes, and Churches, and Social Good Will. And it is the little, every-day things of life in homes and churches and neighborly

association that contribute to the strength and sweetness.

I know how loudly is sounded out that ignorance is the mother of sin, and that education is the cure for crime, and that science more than religion makes for good to the human race. But, is it so? Test it by your own experience. Take the automobile for an example: Science has given it to us. Science perfects it for us. If that perfecting make all to the good, how is it that there is such a riot of hold-ups, robberies and burglaries since its advent? It gives help to us in many ways. That is true. But it also gives such facility of escape to the workers of evil that we hesitate to rate it as an all around benefit or blessing. Knowledge is power. Education is help. And science does outwork good. But it outworks evil also; and it is only the little things of training in the home and teaching in the Church, and the kindnesses of neighborly association that keep the evil from out-balancing the good, many times over.

It is quite in order for us, then, to keep at it in the little things of home-training and Church-teaching and neighborly kindnesses and Diocesan Convention observances, that make for love and obedience to God and for

love and service to men.

The women of the Diocese, in behalf of harmony and unity, have planned to federate their different benevolent activities. The officers of the Church Periodical Club and of the St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses and of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Girls' Friendly and others have conferred, and requested me to appoint a woman to be the President of a body to be known as the Diocesan Church Service League. In compliance with their request I have appointed Mrs. George H. Capen to be such Chairman, and she has accepted the appointment. During and since the General Convention at Detroit a National Church Service League has been in process of formation and is really formed; and our own Diocesan organization of women will be ready at once to fall into line as a unit of the said National Society.

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All this, it appears to me, is entirely in the direction of efficiency and of the best sort of co-operation, and I earnestly hope that all the women of the Diocese will be alive and alert to perfect the vigorous working of the League. Moreover, I hope that the Clergy and Vestries will cordially stand by and help on such perfection. It is no great change. The Woman's Auxiliary goes on as before and the Girls' Friendly, etc., as before, not only in their activities, but in their very names. They have not been merged; they only become federated, and, going on under the old names, they will increase and grow in efficiency and accomplishment.

We are wont to think of the dead as well as of the living in our yearly meetings. In the year 1920 three of our Bishops have died—Bishop Adams, Bishop Burch and Bishop Israel.

Bishop Adams was 87 years old. He was consecrated in 1875 as the Missionary Bishop of New Mexico and Arizona. But his traveling by stage over his vast field and his inhaling of the alkali dust in his sensitive lungs obliged his physiican to say to him that he must withdraw. After a missionary service of only two years he resigned. Then, ten years later, in 1887, he was elected to be Bishop of the Diocese of Easton, a portion of the State of Maryland. He was Bishop, therefore, for 45 years, and in active service as Bishop for 34 years. His help in the House of Bishops was of great value and he held for years the Chairmanship of the important Committee on Rules.

Bishop Burch died at 65. He was Suffragan Bishop of New York for eight years, and his faithfulness and efficiency won for him election to be Bishop after the lamented death of Bishop Greer. Godly, energetic, kind, firm, devoted, he was the wise ruler of the great Diocese of New York for nearly two years, and mourning—heartfelt and universal—has followed upon his sudden death. Bishop Israel died a few days ago, while I was writing this address; 66 years old, having for ten years served most faithfully the new Diocese of Erie.

No one on our Diocesan Roll of Clergy has died. But many of the Laity, and conspicuous ones, have laid their burdens down. Some of them are these: Mr. W. H. Thompson, Senior Warden of Trinity, St. Louis, and a founder and President for many years of St. Luke's Hospital; Mr. E. C. Simmons of St. Peter's, St. Louis, largely the giver of two or three of our Churches, and a founder and steadfast friend of the Missionary Host; Captain Jones of Kirkwood, an untiring supporter of all good works and in the brightness of his faith cheerfully bearing the affliction of blindness in his later years; Henry Wood, Warden of Rolla, a faithful and steadfast churchman; Arthur M. Hough, of Jefferson City, Senior Warden of the parish and devoted to its welfare; Mrs. Church, also of Jefferson City; Miss Tijon, one of the founders of Epiphany, St. Louis; Miss Drumond, of Palmyra; Miss Mary Hill, of the Cathedral, and Mrs. C. G. Davis, widow of our former Rector of Ferguson.

Mrs. Chas. S. Freeborn of the Cathedral, and Mrs. Archie Robinson of Old Orchard, and Mrs. Mary J. Chambers, for a long time Superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital and organizer of the Training School, had removed from our midst, but for years they had walked beside us, honored and loved, and we cannot leave them out from the reverent recital of our diptychs.

Dear Brethren, we have been glancing at the four-score years of the existence of the Diocese.

We are not discouraged nor ashamed at the look. Devoted men and women of the past have faithfully met and discharged duty as it presented itself, and have recognized and supplied needs as they arose.

They have handed on to us the torch of Diocesan life. We are to hold it steady and to lift it high before we pass it on to others.

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If we are soldiers, God help us to be brave. If we are stewards, God help us to be faithful.

If we are runners in a race, God help us to "bate not one jot of heart

a hope, but still bear up and press right onward."

Thirty-four of the eighty years have been mine also. I find it hard to take it in. The goodness of God and the generous thoughtfulness of the Diocese make the evening years, which have come upon me, as the brightness of the morning. Near ten years ago a pleading word was sent to my brother, the Coadjutor, to come to my side. And he came. The help that he has given and the skill of his guiding have been wonderful. There has come to me my second wind, and there has come from a thoughtful and generous Diocese an addition of \$800.00 to my salary.

Then, too, some good men or good women, somewhere and somehow and some when, keep up the provision of a car for me to ride in. That helps, too, to change evening years into morning years. I would not forget thanks to the unknown generous ones. And thanks to them, strengthen and

sweeten the reverent supplication,

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APPENDIX No. 2.

Address of the Bishop Coadjutor, Eighty=second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

During the twelve months covered by the reports submitted to this Diocesan Convention, I have confirmed in Missouri 195 persons (also three for the Bishop of Connecticut). I have baptized seven children and one adult. I have officiated at one burial. I have celebrated the Holy Communion 18 times, and have twice assisted in its celebration. I have preached and delivered addresses within the Diocese 110 times. I have licensed Lay Readers in my field: A. J. Kirby, St. Luke's, St. Louis; Ernest Kroehle, St. Mary's, St. Louis; Arthur O. Stiedemann, St. Thomas', St. Louis; Charles K. Hitchcock, Jr., Bonne Terre; E. W. Broemmelsiek, Jennings. I have given letters dimissory in favor of the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., to the Bishop of South Dakota; in favor of the Rev. J. H. Lever to the Bishop of Michigan.

Early in the year, Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore, after a long illness, peacefully fell on sleep. For nine years he was Chairman of the Bishop (Coadjutor's) Committee for the business management of Grace-Holy Cross Mission in North St. Louis. I believe that he had no mission in life greater, and no desire more eager, than to develop this work, that God might be glorified and fellowmen rescued and strengthened through its manifold

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"Mother" Church, as her friends in Jefferson City used to call her, was one of those rare souls whom it was my privilege to see in her last illness. Beyond her highest joy, she prized the Church's heavenly ways.

I ran down to Rolla from St. James the day after Easter to call on dear Mr. Henry Wood, who was ill. A few Sundays later, we buried him from Christ Church, which he so devotedly loved and served. He had been Warden of the Church since its organization, and Superintendent of the Sunday School for thirty-eight years.

Several years ago, preaching in St. Peter's Church, in this city, I quoted

a little prayer that I had once learned:

"Now I get me up to work, I pray the Lord I may not shirk; If I should die before tonight, I pray the Lord my work's all right."

Mr. E. C. Simmons was in the congregation. He took the prayer home in his heart, and printed it in the next issue of the trade journal which his big hardware house sent out to all its salesmen every week. In the spirit of that prayer he carried on, until in his eighty-first year he was "caught away" by the Spirit of the Lord. Among the things I prize is a letter he wrote me on his eightieth birthday: "I consider it a privilege to be a helper to you in the work you are doing."

Miss Mary Hill was kind and helpful to me from the day I came to the Diocese. During the last two years of her life, she used frequently

to come and tarry a little with us in our home.

Frequently, when I have visited St. Paul's, Ironton, I have been the guest of Mr. William H. Thomson and his family, at Valley Home, Arcadia. I had prayers with him often during his long illness, which he bore so patiently. I miss his kind friendship.

Mrs. Roxanie Johnson, of St. Jude's, Monroe-I sometimes really used

to think she almost erred in working for the Church beyond her strength, and giving to the Church beyond her means.

I knelt with Captain Lorraine F. Jones in prayer, in his home at Ivy Lodge, Kirkwood, on the afternoon of a beautiful October day, little thinking that for him "twilight and evening bell" were coming on so soon. He ofttimes refreshed me. He helped me generously to care for poor and needy people and strangers destitute of help. Often he used to tell me that giving was the greatest joy he had, since blindness shut him in nine years ago.

"For these passed on before us, Saviour, we Thee adore!"

The Lambeth Conference met last summer, in historic Lambeth Palace, London. An invitation to be present reached me as early, I should think, as January, of a year ago. Mrs. Johnson and I talked it over together at no considerable length. We knew our income, and we knew what the cost of living, without a trip abroad, was likely to be, and we said to each other that we couldn't both go. And then I said that we wouldn't either of us go. And we put it among the things that were settled. But you know what happened! Funds were put into our hands more than sufficient to pay all of our expenses from St. Louis to England, to France and back to St. Louis. In Church News letters I have tried again and again to say how much this great outpouring of affection and good will has meant to Mrs. Johnson and me. In Church News and in frequent talks which the people here at home have generously asked us to make, we have tried to tell you how delightful and beautiful the experiences you provided for us were. Because you asked us to "spend all the money," and because the Standing Committee gave unanimous consent that I should forget that there was any Canon placing a limit to the number of months a Bishop might absent himself from his Diocese, we left New York the 12th of June, and, returning, landed there September 22. We had a wonderful experience. We didn't see all the Cathedrals; only eleven, to be exact. Somewhere we met an American woman tourist, who exclaimed to us triumphantly: "I've seen twenty-seven cathedrals so far." We were reminded of the woman in Kate Douglas Wiggin's Cathedral Courtship "What! Leave out Durham and spoil the set?"—as if England's old Cathedrals were to be "collected" like souvenir spoons! Canterbury, Durham, York, Winchester, Salisbury, Wells, Exeter, Westminster, St. Paul's; two days and nights as guests of the Archbishop of Canterbury and Mrs. Davidson in Lambeth Palace; two days and nights as guests of the Bishop of London in old Fulham Palace; a Buckingham Palace garden party; a Mansion House (Lord Mayor's) banquet; a reception given by the Dean (Inge) of St. Paul's Cathedral and Mrs. Inge; Glastonbury and the ruins of St. Joseph's Chapel; Windsor Castle, Eton College, Runnymede, where in 1215 King John signed Magna Charta; placing our feet upon the very spot in Oxford where Ridley and Latimer, in Reformation days, lighted such a torch in England as by the grace of God should never be put out; Edinburgh and Melrose and Abbotsford and the Trossachs; Kilkhampton and Tintagel and Lynton and Clovelly; the Downs and the Forest of Exmoor and the Kirk in the vale where Lorna Doone was married to John Ridd,—these are among the places that stand out conspicuously in memory as we review those enchanted weeks!

Then there was a rare week in Paris among the art treasures; Reims Cathedral; Soissons, the Valley of the Aisne—a cross section of the theatre in which our brothers fought the devil and all his works as he had not been fought before in our world in nineteen centuries. We said before we left St. Louis that we had no desire to go among the battle fields. But we changed our minds, and would have been ashamed of ourselves if we had not gone; not as curious gazers at the desolated, shell-torn fields of Flanders, but as pilgrims to a Holy Land. Yes, the vineyards and olive-

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a par Wides yards and orchards of France are Gardens of Gethsemane. The hills are Calvarys where, for us men and for our salvation, the men and women and boys who never came back offered up a mighty sacrifice.

"That other generations might possess
From shame and menace free, in years to come,
A richer heritage of happiness,
They marched to their heroic martyrdom."

Are we, who walk these streets, and do business in these shops and counting houses, and worship in these churches, and live in these homes, and sit this afternoon in this assembly room—are we the men and women for whom those men and women died, with a glad heart, whose bodies lie beneath the wooden crosses over there? Oh, by the grace of God, may the year upon which we have now entered give greater evidence that their blood has ennobled and cleansed and purified our lives!

Two years before the Lambeth Conference, speaking in my annual address in this place, to the Annual Convention, I asked the question: "Who are these Christian brethren from whom we are separated and they from us? . . . Baptized with water in the Triune Name, have they not as effectually as we been made members of the Body of Christ? Are we right in thinking that . . . this is not a time for us of this communion to continue to reiterate our 'sorrow for our aloofness in the past', and to treat too often with scant courtesy those who eagerly approach us with the anxious hope that they and we together, by the Holy Spirit's aid, may find a way by which the middle walls of partition may be broken Of course, you know I had a more than lukewarm interest in the whole subject of Christian Unity, or I would not have spoken so. I was glad, therefore, to be appointed to the Committee on Reunion, and not some other, in the Lambeth Conference. And I was glad that the Lambeth Conference of 252 Bishops answered as clearly as it did the question which I considered with you here two years ago: "We acknowledge all those who believe in our Lord Jesus Christ, and have been baptized into the name of the Holy Trinity as sharing with us membership in the universal Church of Christ which is His Body."

In speaking of the Episcopate, Resolution 9 says: "It is not that we call in question for a moment the spiritual reality of the ministries of those Communions which do not possess the Episcopate. On the contrary, we thankfully acknowledge that these ministries have been manifestly blessed and owned as effective means of grace."

One seeks in vain in the Lambeth Resolutions of 1908 for any "acknowledgment" of "membership" in the "Body" of persons baptized by other than an Episcopally ordained ministry. Persons so baptized are nowhere even mentioned in the Resolutions. As for the "ministries of other Communions," the Lambeth Resolutions of 1908 were silent on that point. But the Report of the Committee (1908) paid them the doubtful compliment of remarking that it was no part of the duty of Anglican Churchmen, and therefore not their desire, to "pronounce negatively upon the value in God's sight of the ministry of other Communions." The above comparisons show how much water flowed under the bridge between the Lambeth Conference of 1908 and that of 1920.

I am not permitted to keep you here to enter with you into the findings of the Lambeth Conference. I have been invited in many places to speak of the Conference; and the attentive attitude of my listeners has made me sure that they had more than a passing interest in the things that were done by the 252 Bishops. The Appeal to All Christian People, being a part of the report brought in by the Committee on Reunion, has created widespread interest. The committee numbered 72. Of this number, 15 of

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us came from that branch of the Church which is known as The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. The Archbishop of Canterbury told us that it was the largest committee ever appointed at a Lambeth Conference, and charged to consider the most important subject that had ever been given to the Lambeth Conference to handle. We went about our task with a profound realization that it was serious business to occupy posts like ours in times like these. I hope that you who have not seen the Appeal will get it and read it. Two points only in addition to those mentioned above, I want to mention now—we cannot stop to dwell on them. First, the statement which I know to have been made in a spirit of deep contrition: "We acknowledge this condition of broken fellowship to be contrary to God's will, and we desire frankly to confess our share in the guilt of thus crippling the Body of Christ and hindering the activity of His Spirit." Such confession must surely be "good for the soul" of the Anglican Church. Second: "We do not ask other Christian people to be absorbed in the Anglican Church. We do ask them to unite with us in a new and great endeavor to recover and to manifest to the world

the unity of the Body of Christ for which he prayed."

I wish I could find time to quote to you at length comments which have been made on the Appeal and the report in the Free Church press of England. Here is one: "Through all and under all there is a sensitive and kindly spirit—a Christian spirit—of brotherliness and affection, utterly removed from any element of arrogance sometimes associated with ancient privilege and historic sanctions." Again: "Prayer has wrought its ancient miracle. We can do nothing finer than approach the Bishops in the spirit in which they have approached us. The Bishops call us to 'adventure' in so far as they have adventured in their powerful appeal." Again: "Viewed spiritually, Lambeth is a triumph of the grace of God. Viewed historically, it is the loosing of a great seal in the unfolding of God's revel-"It seems possible to say without exaggeration that the issuing of this appeal may well prove to be the greatest ecclesiastical event since the Reformation." . . . "If the Lambeth Conference had set forth nothing save the suggestion on reunion, it would have been epoch-making." The report of the 72 Bishops was returned to the whole Conference of 252 and adopted by the entire body with only four dissenting votes. And, if you had been in that old Lambeth Library at the conclusion of the vote, after a silence so profound that it was awesome, you would have joined with us in the singing of the Doxology as you never heard it sung before! It is for you and me, in such right ways as are open to us, to do what we can to translate from the abstract into the concrete that desire for closer fellowship which the Lambeth Conference of 1920, with bowed head and contrite heart, put into its Resolutions and its Appeal. Acting in the spirit of the Conference, I have already agreed to do a thing which it suggests ought to be done-have agreed to co-operate with Ministers of other Christian Communions in a Christian Unity Conference in this city the first week in February. I have sent letters to all the Clergy of our Diocese informing them of the coming Conference and expressing my earnest hope that they and their people may attend.

Let us now come back to the Diocese of Missouri.

The Annual Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in the United States met in Missouri in October. Their executive officers report that the Convention was the best ever. I entered into it in such ways as I could. Bishop Tuttle is the Honorary President in the Diocese of Missouri. On a recent visit to Columbia, I was especially pleased to find a new Chapter there which promised much good.

I should think that the Girls' Friendly Society had had a successful year. I know that there are live branches in several of my missions, and I am glad to see real results of good accomplished. I should like to see

branches established in many places where there are none.

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I shall ask you, as I have usually done in my annual address, to take a look with me about the rural Missouri field entrusted to my care; also to look at some of the enterprises in St. Louis, which I deem it worth while to speak about.

A year ago, the Rev. Charles F. Edwards, Rector of Macon, took hold of the parish of Christ Church, Moberly, which had had very little pastoral attention for over ten years. Mr. Edwards has arranged a plan by which he spends one week-day every week in Moberly. The people look forward to his coming, and results are in evidence. He also goes down every Sunday afternoon and has a well-attended evening service. The congregation has just made a twenty-five per cent increase to his salary, which shows the good heart of the people and pleases me greatly. The sanctuary has been newly decorated and needed repairs made in the guild room. All bills are paid. The insurance coverage has been raised from \$4,000.00 to In memory of their father, Harry V. Estill, many years the beloved Senior Warden, Hartley and Louise Estill have placed a new door and canopy at the entrance to the church, and have rebuilt the approaching stone steps. Christ Church, Rolla, has been greatly beautified by a new chancel rail. The rectory has been repaired and painted, the bills paid by St. Margaret's Guild, assisted by St. Agnes'. A twenty percent increase has been added by the congregation to Mr. Tragitt's salary. The people of St. Jude's, Monroe City, have wonderfully brightened the rectory, by repapered walls and by more windows in the kitchen, improvements which I was most glad to observe on a recent visit there. In memory of his wife, Sarah Green Scheetz, Mr. Harvey Scheetz has added a beautiful memorial to those already in St. Jude's Church, a brass cylinder pulpit lamp. St. Paul's Mexico, is much cast down because two families of the parish, one of three communicants and one of four communicants, have moved out of the town just recently. This, for St. Paul's, Mexico, is the same ratio of loss as would be suffered by the Cathedral Parish in St. Louis, if 128 communicants should take letters of transfer in two or three months. But Mr. Wharton continues to exercise his office with great faithfulness and is helpful in many civic matters which make for righteousness and peace and joy, though there are no spaces for tabulation of these doings in reports made to this Convention. The Rev. F. M. Weddell has spent a quarter of a century doing the work of an evangelist in the State of Missouri. (Two of these years were spent in that part of the State which is the Diocese of West Missouri.) At present he has six congregations in his spiritual care and he minds them with that high sense of devotion to duty which has been characteristic of him during all the years. He also has served here and there on emergency cases most helpfully and acceptably.

It has been communicated to me that the interior of our beautiful stone church in De Soto has been adorned and improved. Fredericktown and Ironton, which were on a "circuit" with De Soto for several years, have dropped out of the partnership relation, at their own request. I have been to both places, in the last few month, and in each place have found indications of real spiritual hunger. Fredericktown has asked me to help in some arrangement whereby services may be had at least one Sunday in each month. I shall do everything in my power to meet this wish. Improvements have been made in the fabric of our attractive St. Luke's Chapel, Valley Park—broken windows repaired, new stove, new organ, new paint. A goodly sum of money is in the treasury of the Guild, in anticipation of making still further improvements. A vested choir of boys and girls has been arranged. Christmas Eve, under the leadership of Mr. Richard Kopplin, Lay Reader, they sang the Christmas carols in the streets of Valley Park, a thing which has never happened there before, and of real spiritual value to the community. Sunday School and congregation

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sions, and I like to see assemble Sunday after Sunday with remarkable faithfulness. I am pretty sure there is no place in the Diocese where the ratio of attendance to membership is so high. The reason? Mr. Kopplin's absolute fidelity, in all weathers, under all circumstances, to the assignment which he has accepted. No person who has not known him at close range can estimate how great a loss the Diocese suffered when the Rev. George L. Barnes responded to a call to Arkansas, and left us, in December. The experiences that he had, in carrying on missionary activities at Portland, were of a kind which the Spirit of Missions would be eager to write up and illustrate, if Missouri were a Missionary District and not a Diocese. The people of Portland loved him, trusted him, and followed him, for they knew his voice.

It is seven years ago that the Church made its first visit to Herculaneum. Then there was no religious organization in the town of twelve hundred people; no Sunday observance, no Sunday School, no pastor of any name, Roman or Protestant. We thought there was a need, and we began our efforts to supply it, combining the educational with the social and religious, in the work of the Kingdom. At first we had the whole town. Shortly we built and paid for a combination chapel and deaconess' house. All the "uplift" work of Herculaneum was left to us. We had, among other valuable features, a library, which was well patronized. Sunday worship was well attended. The Sunday School was large. Before long, the Roman Catholics built an imposing church, with parochial school; the Methodists organized a congregation and built a dignified church; the Baptists revamped and put into commission their long deserted chapel. The white population of 1,200 was split into four fragments, and went in four directions, instead of walking all together. We have kept on with our work, and we have reason to feel that we have been needed there. Miss Emma Luther is now the faithful parish visitor; and the Rev. L. C. Sherburne (residing in Crystal City, five miles distant) is minister in charge. Reports show an average weekly Sunday School attendance of 40; an average weekly Sewing School attendance of 23; a Guild, meeting regularly and working harmoniously; a service every Sunday evening with an attendance of 25 to 30. Mr. Sherburne, with his Ford car, is able to be in a real sense a resident pastor in both Herculaneum and Crystal City. He also ministers occasionally at Bonne Terre.

St. Paul's, Overland, appears for the first time in the official lists of the Diocese in 1907. It is grown now to a communicant membership of 45. The givings of the people in 1920 show a twenty percent increase over 1919. The Sunday School offerings show an increase of forty percent. This congregation worshipped in halls and private homes until, in 1912, a tasteful chapel was erected and paid for. It has been entirely outgrown by congregation and Sunday School. There is no suitable place for Guild meetings, etc. The people are eager to set their feet in a larger room. I hope that some extension work can be undertaken soon.

Kirksville.—It would have been well if the beautiful brick church which was built here in 1917 could have been completed without debt. That was our expectation and our hope. Indeed, if I may be pardoned for saying so, there was what might be called a promise to keep within a certain limit, and cut the garment according to the cloth. But such promises seem very difficult to keep. There is a debt of \$2,700.00 still. That would be a mere bagatelle (for we have a \$15,000.00 beautiful property) if a right good man could be sent there, and given cash enough to stick there and to keep alive. The Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, Rector of Monroe, goes now one Sunday each month. We are grateful to him. He is persona grata to the people, but he and I and everybody else knows that there is no hope of constructive work in Kirksville except with a resident pastor. I am told that communicants among the students now number 26. We have 27 com-

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municants whose permanent home is Kirksville. I believe that a committee ought to be appointed at this Convention to try to get an understanding of the situation and to report to this Convention.

On the Sunday after Easter, 1920, the mission of Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff, was filled by the coming of the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer, from the Diocese of Bethlehem, and there was great joy in that city among our small but devoted band. New heart has come into the congregation with the coming of the new pastor and his wife. The last dollars of a debt which has stuck on the church building, I think, ever since it was built, will probably be paid in a few weeks. I hope so much that then a new parish house or rectory may be built.

The important rectorship at Cape Girardeau was filled by the coming to it of the Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor, from the Diocese of Virginia, the first of September. The good women of the Guild have recently paid off the mortgage on the rectory, on which they have been working since long before I came to the Diocese. The upper part of the house has lately been made into an "apartment" in which the Rector and his family have their attractive home. The lower floor has been made into commodious parish house rooms. The whole arrangement is admirable. What would have become of the Sunday School if Miss Amy Kimmel hadn't kept it going nobody knows! Chaffee, Bloomfield and Illimo look to the rector of Cape Girardeau for such occasional services as his other duties permit him to render. He is no stranger to hardness, having spent several years in missionary work among the cotton-mill workers of South Carolina. Nobody knows how glad I was to get Mr. Taylor to Missouri. He tells me that he never knew a man to hang on as I hung on during the years I was trying to get him. Why shouldn't I hang on? Aren't good men worth hanging on for? "Thou wilt have to wait a long time before a roast partridge fly into thy mouth."

Columbia was given into my hands just a year ago. Calvary Church there has about one hundred and thirty communicants. The Rector spends a great deal of his time among the students of the State University, and, to the credit of Calvary Parish be it said, the parish encourages him in doing so. The Vestry numbers among its members (or did last year) the Dean of the Law School, the Professor of American History, the Professor of Art, the Professor of Forestry and one who for years was Secretary of the Board of Curators. Of the medical faculty, the Dean and two other of the best men are communicants. The Rector has a house admirably suited to student gatherings, within three minutes' walk of the Academic The Rector, in October, told me that, of 91 names of communicants in his card catalogue, 32 came from Missouri, 39 from West Missouri. The rest were scattered through Illinois, Ohio, South Carolina, Oklahoma, Massachusetts, North Carolina, Colorado, Texas, Indiana, Arkansas, Iowa, New Mexico, New Hampshire, Wyoming, Michigan. Of those who come from Missouri, 20 of the 32 are from outside Columbia. Kansas City alone has 20 Church students among this 91. Thirty-five per cent are from Missouri; 43 per cent from West Missouri; 22 per cent from all over the country. Calvary Church is practically filled every Sunday morning, a large percentage being students. Every Sunday night "open house" is kept in the rectory from 5 o'clock on. The Rector writes me in a recent letter: "There is no question in my mind that I shall be able to accomplish much more another year in the things that show in statistics and in the things that do not, than ever before." In April I had the privilege of being a guest at a dinner given by the Men's Association of Calvary Parish. Twenty-five were expected, and more than that number came. Mr. H. S. Bill, instructor in architecture at the University, a member of the Men's Association, submitted tentative plans for a "Service Building," in connection with Calvary Church's work among the students. The plans were elaborate, pro-

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viding for dormitory rooms for 90 students, with modern baths and other creature comforts, a billiard room, an auditorium and dance hall, a ladies' parlor, a lounge, parish room, kitchen, swimming pool, choir and guild rooms with connecting cloister to the church. It was estimated that the cost of the building without furnishings or equipment would be about \$150,000. I was informed that Calvary Parish would contribute for the purpose a lot (nearly half a block) adjoining the church, valued at about \$15,000, and would make a cash contribution of \$2,000. The tentative plans were favored by the Men's Association to the extent that Bishop Johnson was requested to submit them to the committee appointed by the Convention to have this matter in charge. (Dr. Phillips, Dean Davis, Mr. L. W. Berry of Columbia.) The Rev. Harris Masterson, Jr., rated by the Church as an expert in the problem of Church work at University centers, a Secretary for Church Student work in the Province of the Southwest, himself in charge of Church activities at Rice University, Houston, Texas, wrote me after he had spent a Sunday with the parish and with the students, "I think that Mr. George's work at Columbia is one of the best pieces of work that is being done at a State University."

On July 6th, in London, I received the resignation of the Rev. J. H. Lever, who has so successfully superintended the Church's work in the City Institutions since November 1, 1913. It was quite impossible to seek a man to be his successor while I was in England. Landing in New York Sept. 22, I had interviews with a number of friends in the East, and as a result I called the Rev. Charles B. Carpenter to the work. The Missionary Board approved the appointment by voting the salary, and Mr. Carpenter took up his duties January 5. I feel that the Diocese has reason to be glad that we have secured for this important and difficult task a man of such winning personality, such strong spiritual character, such sweet spiritual sympathies, and with such zeal to serve his Master in the service of the least of His brethren. I commend Mr. Carpenter to you, confident that he will presently be conscious of your affection, your substantial support, and your loyal co-operation. Mr. Carpenter served three years on the staff of the great Church Seaman's Institute, New York, having his home in the slums of Houston Street. He served eleven months as a Y. M. C. A. Chaplain in Base Hospital 27 in France. The Rev. Mr. Harvey and all the members of the staff know how grateful I am to them for going on with the responsible work, true to form, since Mr. Lever went away.

Mr. Elias S. Gatch has been a most watchful Secretary of the Bishop's Committee of Grace-Holy Cross, St. Louis, ever since Grace-Holy Cross was started, more than ten years ago. He never misses a monthly meeting. He is in a position to know all the ups and downs in the history of this most important work. I have under my eye a letter, recently dictated by Mr. Gatch, in which he says: "We are doing an immense amount of good in North St. Louis, and have just closed one of the most successful years in our history." Anyone visiting the property of this mission at North Twelfth Street, Warren and Benton, will immediately be ready with the criticism that everything looks "all tattered and torn" and "all forlorn." Quite true. We have the funds (\$50,000.00) for the erection of a new church. These we have had for two years. Business men of our Board and others, whose judgment we have sought, have strongly advised us not to begin building until building conditions had returned to something near "normalcy." We hope to go on with our building project in 1921. Until then, such business gumption as we have cautions us that money spent on the present buildings, beyond what is absolutely necessary, is money wasted. We ask all who have been friends of the work to continue their interest, spite of the fact that the property for reasons just stated, looks disheveled and neglected. There is no neglect. With poor tools, good workmen and workwomen are doing good work. To quote again Mr. Gatch, in a letter only a few days old: "We believe that, within a few years, Holy Cross Corporation will he 0 doin on A latel

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Mr. Eli H. Larkin, of the Cathedral, long our generous friend, died on April 16, last, and left \$10,000 in his will for Holy Cross. Another friend lately gave a parcel of ground and building in that general neighborhood. We have a small accumulation in a Hospital Fund. We have, as I said, above \$50,000.00 in a building fund. But all these are designated for special purposes. We need money for current expenses. It takes about \$8,000.00 a year to meet our budget. We have about \$4,000.00 already subscribed on the budget for 1921. We want to secure the other \$4,000.00 before many days. You who have ability to give, and an interest in such beneficient ministrations done for His sake Who went about doing good, are earnestly asked to respond to the requests which Mr. Gatch will make of you to help "carry on," at Grace-Holy Cross. There is an overflowing Kindergarten, a free dispensary, a pure milk station, a baby feeding clinic, a boys' club, a needlework class, and other organizations which are steadily doing a work of Americanization. Sunday worship and Sunday School are regularly maintained. The work is under the immediate supervision of the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, now in his fourth year, who lives at the plant. Miss A. B. Skinker, who was away for over a year out of the State, has pleased her friends at Holy Cross by recently returning to work among them. The Committee of the Corporation has just been strengthened by the addition of Dr. Malvern B. Clopton. Mr. J. Herndon Smith

is Chairman of the Managing Board, Mr. J. E. Williams, Jr., is Treasurer, and has been for ten years. Miss Amy G. Thompson is the Deaconess.

The Chapel of the Prince of Peace, Baden, continues doing a work which means everything in the life of that part of St. Louis. Sister Miriam devotedly summons the elders, gathers the children. She works quite beyond her physical strength. Improvements in the plant are partly accounted for by the fact that the men folks have sufficient interest to work with their own hands now and then, building partitions, putting on paint. etc., and the women folks have great pride in keeping the chapel always in a neat and tidy condition. Prince of Peace was started by Sister Miriam

with a Sunday School in a box car in Baden in 1913.

In my address of 1914 I said of St. Augustine's (Benton), St. Louis. "As now and then I go by the corner where our chapel is, I permit myself to hope that the time may not be far distant when a parish hall, or a bungalow for the minister, may be built." In 1916, the Rev. J. H. Harvey in charge, a \$500 fund toward a parish house was reported securely banked. In February of 1918, the Rev. Douglas H. Atwill was appointed to St. Augustine's. In October of 1920, Miller Memorial Hall was opened. It is named in testimony to the love which St. Augustine's bears to the Rev. G. B. D. Miller, who founded it and continued its faithful pastor until he fell on sleep in 1910. The hall is beautifully and substantially built of stone, is well placed close beside the church, consist of guild room and kitchen, lavatories, a stage and dressing rooms, an assembly room capable of seating 350 persons. The cost was \$9,000.00. Six thousand dollars of this was raised and paid by St. Augustine's people themselves. In the one year of 1920, they raised and paid in \$3,000.00. In the same twelve months they added \$200 to Mr. Atwill's salary. And just the other day they increased it by another \$200. I verily believe that no congregation in the Diocese has a better record of spiritual development and financial accomplishment than St. Augustine's this past year.

The Rev. Linden H. White, who is just leaving St. Louis, came to us from the Diocese of Massachusetts, eight years ago. He began his pastorate of St. Mary's, St. Louis, in a cement block building, of one small, low-ceilinged room. He leaves an attractive combination chapel and parish nouse, on a beautiful lot, 164x184, large enough for any possible future

development, the whole property valued at about \$50,000. With the entire consent of Bishop Tuttle, this purchase of lot and the building project was undertaken to mark the completion of Bishop Tuttle's fiftieth year in the Episcopate, and it is designated as the Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church. With so good an instrument to work with, and a growing section of the city to work in, St. Mary's Mission, having put on beautiful garments, ought soon to show a very considerable putting on of spiritual and financial strength. Mr. White is entitled to warm praise for the tenacity of purpose with which he undertook and accomplished the task which he set himself of securing for the Diocese a valuable property, leaving it without debt. We thank him. And our best wishes go with him.

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St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights (Motor City), was organized in February, 1916. In May of that year we bought a corner lot at Arlington and Thekla, which cost \$850, on which we paid \$500 cash. The balance has lately been paid. We bought a second-hand portable chapel which cost us \$500 when it was set up and ready to use. The last payment on this has now been made. The mission has 33 active communicants, a Sunday School of 53, a Woman's Guild of 10, a Girls' Friendly of 14. The Rev. F. M. Weddell has spiritual oversight. Deaconess Sniffen, living close among the people the past year, is largely responsible for the present healthy condition of the work. She reports that she made 1,329 visits during the year, in addition to all the work of the Sunday School, guilds, etc. St. Luke's raised over \$800 last year for its work and for outside givings. I happen to know that an interested company of generous churchwomen stand ready to supply the funds to equip the Chapel-Guild Hall with many creature comforts for Deaconess Sniffen and the women who work with her in the guilds and clubs and other activities. Whether I'm right or wrong, I do not know, but my advice has been that we'd better settle the question of permanent location before we spend any more money on betterments. It may be that we ought to move to a larger lot. I want to give notice now that this will be the first question that I shall ask the new Missionary Board to take up and give a judgment on.

St. Stephen's, St. Louis, in addition to its manifold activities as of former years, has established or re-established a dispensary which ministers to a real need in that quarter of the city. You are aware that Canonical action was taken this morning admitting St. Stephen's into union with the Diocese, as a parish. This is the happy consummation of many years of faith and works on the part of the Rev. Mr. Mizner, its pastor for 20 years, and others who

have labored in and for St. Stephens'.

St. Timothy's has made many needed repairs and improvements of its physical property, at which some of the young men of the congregation have worked with a will. The women have plans for betterments in the near future. The Rev. Mr. Rein tells us that he feels sure that there will be both spiritual and material progress in 1921.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

I do not at all understand the point of view of those who say that five or ten are too few children for whom to maintain a Sunday School. I can understand when they tell me that a Sunday School of five or ten is "harder to run" than one of fifty or one hundred. But it is not impossible. And we shall have no "church of tomorrow" if the Sunday School or its equivalent is given up. There are several places where neglect of this side of the Church's work makes me very anxious. Per contra, some places make me very encouraged. Valley Park is much more hopeful today, with a communicant list of 16, and a Sunday School of 23 (children) meeting every Sunday, average attendance 15 or 16, than it was ten years ago, with a communicant list of 29 and no Sunday School reported. Canton reports now only 11 communicants. But it reports as many children in the Sunday School as there were ten years ago, when twice as many communicants were on the

roll. Bonne Terre reports 18 communicants, 13 children in the Sunday School. Ten years ago, eight communicants were reported, and no Sunday School. From Overland Park no return of Sunday School enrollment was sent ten years ago. Communicants were 23. Last year the communicant list was 45; the Sunday School enrollment 54. Poplar Bluff reported ten years ago, 41 communicants; 15 children in the Sunday School. The present report is: Communicants, 31; Sunday School 41. I haven't the necessary figures for comparison in the case of Cape Girardeau; but I know that the Sunday School increase is most encouraging. St. Luke's, Harney Heights, appears first in our records in the Journal of 1916; communicants 22, Sunday School pupils 36. Last year communicants, 27; Sunday School pupils, 53. Teachers and officers are not included in the above comparisons.

The League of Lay Readers rendered valued assistance in many places, a total of 214 services, during the year. Worthy of special mention and thanks are the services and visits which were made, week in and week out, by Mr. A. D. Pomeroy at the Infirmary; and the long round trip of thirty miles which Mr. Richard Kopplin made in his car every Sunday, in all weathers, to superintend the Sunday School and conduct the morning service at Valley Park. Mr. A. J. Kirby served frequently at St. Luke's, Harney Heights; Mr. de Renthel at St. Luke's, Harney Heights, and St. Timothy's; Mr. Mayberry at St. Timothy's and Valley Park; Mr. A. T. Cotsworth at St. Luke's, Harney Heights, and Overland Park; Mr. E. Freegard at Harney Heights, Overland, and on a number of occasions at Parkview Home. Mr. F. G. Williamson has been engaged almost wholly at lay work in his own parish at Ferguson. Mr. Fauntleroy has had an illness, which has incapacitated him for work for more than a year, but he was able to meet with the League at the last meeting of the year, in December.

A most happy surprise came to me in October at St. Peter's Church, St. Louis. I had been asked to meet with the monthly gathering of the Auxiliary, to tell them of Lambeth and England, and some other things, including the missionary work in Missouri. The St. Peter's Auxiliary subsequently sent me \$600, with an affectionate message of appreciation, and begged me use the check according to my discretion. I have made an accounting of the purposes for which the money was spent to the Auxiliary, and here record my grateful thanks. Two hundred forty dollars and eighty cents of it was spent to reimburse my private bank account for checks which I had drawn to help to buy a Ford for one of our rural missionaries, to help to pay overdue notes on the lot occupied by St. Luke's, Harney Heights, to help pay house rent for one of our valuable workers. One hundred fifty dollars of it went to the help of an important building project in an assisted mission of the Diocese. One hundred thirty-five dollars of it went to slightly relieve the pinch which some of our workers on slender stipends must feel; and the balance of it is unspent. My very appreciative thanks for this timely aid! The Diocesan Auxiliary has given me during the year, (including that just mentioned) \$660. The Auxiliary gave substantial pledges also for the missionary work of the Diocese, which were paid directly to the Treasurer of the Missionary Board.

My grateful thanks are due to the Churchwoman's Club for generous

My grateful thanks are due to the Churchwoman's Club for generous assistance toward the support of the activities at Grace-Holy Cross, paid directly to its Treasurer; and for \$300 which went through my books toward cancelling the mortgage on St. Luke's mission property, Harney Heights.

I have just been the recipient of a substantial increase to my salary, an action on the part of this Diocese which touches me deeply, and for which it is quite impossible to summon words of thanks. Especially so because, in the nature of things, the money which pays the increase must, I am sure, come from those to whom, in the circumstances of the case, I am in no position to render any service except the unrecorded acts of kindness and of love!

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A year ago, I had much to say about the Church's new piece of machinery, the Nation-Wide Campaign, and urged that we make ready to use it. I urged this, not because I was espoused to this particular scheme. Whether another scheme would have been as good or better than this, none of us was ready to say. And, anyhow, that question hadn't anything to do with the case at that time. A year before, the Convention of the Diocese had committed the Diocese to the project by a resolution pledging "hearty support," and by the appointing of a committee "with power to act . . . in making this Campaign a success in this Diocese." And the Diocese was not on record as withdrawing from that "hearty support" pledge. One result of our deliberations last January was that I was made the Chairman of a Diocesan Executive Committee to carry on the Nation-Wide Campaign.

By an apportionment made by the General Executive Board, Missouri's share of the funds needed to be raised for the prosecution of the Church's work within the Diocese and throughout the world was \$137,490.00 for the year 1920. It was clear that much of the work of the Missouri Executive Committee must be that of trying to secure from our parishes and missions this amount—a so much greater amount than the Diocese had

ever raised before, that it seemed almost hopeless!

Our Executive Committee was composed of six clergy and thirteen laity. Without an "Executive Secretary of proved business ability," the need for which I suggested at the Convention a year ago, my responsibility as Executive Chairman has, in its practical operation, been largely that of a financial agent. (I raise the question, Is it a wise "division of tabor" which sets a Bishop of the Church to the doing of a thing for which he confessedly has no business training—and this with his time so already preoccupied with the spiritual duties of the office to which he nas been called?) The Nation-Wide Campaign was a layman's movement. Should not a layman be chosen to manage and direct the business and financial side of it, calling the bishops and other clergy to his aid in

emphasizing the spiritual character of the movement?

I have no apology to offer for the year's work. Side by side with my Episcopal duties, I have to the best of my ability done this other duty. Mr. G. K. Warner, as Treasurer, has received the money and apportioned it with that fidelity which is so characteristic of him; the Rev. R. D. S. Putney has frequently been in the chair when I was obliged to be out of it; Miss Jessie B. Kelley has acted as Corresponding Secretary. I have made myself responsible for much publicity within the Diocese. Many of the letters which have been sent, I have written by my own hands on my own typewriter. (Again I interject the remark that, in my judgment, a Bishop—even a Bishop Coadjutor—is likely to serve his Diocese better by wearing out the leaves of his Bible than the ribbon of his typewriter.) The result of the year's work, in figures is, according to the statement handed me by the Treasurer, \$78,201.02 for the year, January 1 to December 31, 1920, inclusive. The quota being \$137,490.00, it will be seen that the Diocese has secured practically fifty-seven per cent of the quota. Among my own congregations, in addition to the work which I have done as Chairman and Financial Agent of this Nation-Wide Campaign Executive Committee, I have tried frequently (as was my duty as their Bishop) to stir up their pure minds by way of remembrance. I am gratified to find that, while the Diocese as a whole has given fifty-seven percent of its quota, the Bishop Coadjutor's field has given sixty-eight percent of its quota. I feel that it is due to my congregations that I make this statement; and I make it with warm appreciation and thanks. Looking a little closer at the figures, I find that 29 congregations paid or overpaid their quotas; of which 21 are in the field of the Bishop Coadjutor. Looking once more,

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up to January 1, 1921, 17 congregations had reported definite pledges on the Nation-Wide Campaign for 1921; 13 of these being in the field of the Bishop Coadjutor. (Comparisons above are based on figures reported to me at the close of business December 31. I note, in January Church News, that remittances received subsequent to that date bring our payments for 1920 to a total of \$81,448.17.) I am leaving it to the Treasurer of the Nation-Wide Campaign, when the proper time comes, to explain what division of these funds has been made, as between the Diocese of Missouri and the general work of the church.

I want to again say, what I have said in print more than once this past year, that there is a vast difference between the object of a campaign and its result. The object of the past year's work has been to get before the Church's membership a clearer knowledge of the Church's responsibilities "in this dark world of sin," and a deeper conviction of what it really means to be "a soldier of the Cross, a follower of the Lamb." Whenever this "clearer knowledge" has seeped into the mind and this "deeper conviction of the Cross, a follower of the Lamb." tion" has gripped the soul, as a result has followed a more devoted consecration to the cause of Christ; and this more devoted consecration has cut a channel for itself in more devoted worship, more zeal to serve, more eagerness to give. I repeat, our objective was a convicted conscience. Much of this \$81,000.00 is, in a true sense, real "conscience money." "Conscience money," according to the Century Dictionary, is "money paid to atone for some act of dishonesty previously concealed." Dishonesty? Yes, precisely that. Whose is this great, wide, beautiful, wonderful world? "The silver and the gold are mine, saith the Lord, and so are the cattle upon a thousand hills." Whose is that business property on the busiest corner of this great city? Whose is that mansion on the city's most attractive boulevard? "It's mine," do I hear somebody say? And in the same breath, I hear Him say, Who was equally at home with Zaccheus, the richest man in Jericho, and with the blind beggar, who was the poorest man in Jerusalem, "Thou fool!" The silver and the gold are His. And most of us have robbed Him. And we must be more honest in our stewardship. We have viewed this whole question as though it were a question of how much of our own money we should give to God; when, in reality, we were keeping back God's money for ourselves. This is what I mean when I say that much of this \$81,000.00 is "conscience money.

I am sure that we may rightly say that, taking into the reckoning the enormous difficulty of inaugurating a method so radical in so short a period of preparation, our Diocese has done better than we hoped. We may, and we must, in the year that is before us, rise on stepping stones of last year's accomplishments to higher things. We must more devotedly fall down and worship. We must more lavishly present gifts.

I close this over-long address (but I have presumed to try to take you into France and into England and into the Lambeth Conference, as well as into some of the highways and byways of Missouri, and streets and alleys of St. Louis, in an hour), I close with some of the last words of the late Archdeacon Stuck: "God, the immortal adventurer in me, God, Who calls men from home and country, God, scourged and crowned with thorns, Who rose in a nail-pierced body out of death, and came not to bring peace but a sword, calls me to a task of love and daring." And, with some words which I copied from Roger W. Babson, as you and I, many of us, listened to him the other day before the Chamber of Commerce and the City Club: "When 51 per cent of our people are headed toward the star of service, we have prosperity. When 51 per cent are headed toward selfishness we have depression. Why can't we go out from this meeting today determined to do what we can to get ourselves and our associates back into the ways of righteousness?"

APPENDIX No. 3.

Report of Finance Committee Associated Vestries.

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Your committee, appointed by the President to make a comprehensive survey of the present financial system and financial status of the Diocese and to report back to the Associated Vestries at its meeting in January, 1921, with their recommendations and suggestions, to the end that the Associated Vestries may consider same and present said recommendations and suggestions or such part thereof as may be elected to the Diocesan Convention in January, 1921, and take such action as may be decided upon, begs to make the following report:

1. The subject covered such a wide range of inquiry and study that it was deemed advisable to confine our investigation and report at this time to one phase of the subject, viz: "The Handling of Trust Funds and Endowment Funds."

The basic thought which we wish to emphasize in this report is that there should commence a concerted educational movement to the end that all persons who may be expected to make special gifts, either during their lifetime or by will at their death, may see the importance to the work of the Church in making such gifts payable to a thoroughly representative body, which committee or body shall have full power to hold and use such gifts, or the income from them, in such manner as will best serve the work of the Church as a whole in the Diocese, rather than to give or leave their gifts to a specific parish or church or mission, or for a specific purpose as has usually been the custom heretofore.

purpose, as has usually been the custom heretofore.

This committee should be appointed by the Bishop or elected by the Diocesan Convention, and should be thoroughly representative of the whole Diocese. It should act as a board of strategy in unison with the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor, and to it should come all questions relating to the purchase of property, building and equipment of churches, parish houses, and the opening and development of new missions, etc., to the end that there may be worked out a definite plan for the development of the work of the Church of the Diocese, that adequate help may be given where help is needed, that wasteful and ill-advised expenditures may be avoided, and that we may develop a big co-operative Diocesan view of our work, in place of our present competitive parochial view.

We believe that with our Trust and Endowment Funds administered by a single representative board, having broad powers and large responsibility, the work of our Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor will be both lightened and strengthened, and that more and larger gifts could be expected and the cooperative interest of our people aroused for constructive work which had the approval of such a board.

The Church is on trial and unless we use, not only our money, but our brain and ability as well in the Master's work, the record of the future is sure to be one of lost opportunities and lessened strength and influence in the community.

Your committee believes that this suggestion is well worth the earnest consideration of the Associated Vestries, and might very properly be brought before the next Diocesan Convention for discussion and such action as may be decided upon. We, therefore, move the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, The Diocese of Missouri, as at present constituted, does not comprise a centralized administrative body; and

Whereas, Centralization of management and administration of all pro-

jects, questions or affairs of purely general Diocesan character would tend to raise Diocesan responsibility and improve Diocesan efficiency, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That the Associated Vestries recommend to the Diocesan Convention that it take such action as may be necessary for the establishment of a properly constituted centralized committee, selected in such manner as will be thoroughly representative of the whole Diocese, with authority and responsibility over all matters of general Diocesan concern, spiritual, business and administrative, said body to act as a Board of Strategy and Counsel under the authority and in co-operation with the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor.

APPENDIX No. 4.

APPENDIX No. 14

Report of Committee Appointed Ander Resolution Aumber Aine of the Convention of 1920.

Your committee, appointed by the Eighty-first Convention of the Diocese at its session in January, 1920, "To enquire into and report on the Constitution and Functions of the Cathedral Church, with special reference to its beneficial uses in the Diocese of Missouri; the report to be made to the Eighty-second Convention of the Diocese in1921, with recommendations," beg leave to report:

We have given very careful attention, thought and study to the important duty assigned us, and are thoroughly convinced of the great desirability of the Cathedral System for this American Church; that it is entirely adaptable to American ideals and institutions, and that it might easily be made a solvent of many of the administrative problems which beset us, and an instrument of unity, concentration, efficiency and power in our general and diocesan Church work.

It is historically clear, indeed, that the Cathedral has been such an instrument from very early times, and that it so proved its value that "A Bishop without a Cathedral is like an admiral without a flagship"; "A Bishop without a Chapter is like a general in battle without a staff," quickly became almost a proverb.

The purposes and functions of the Cathedral were to establish an elevated type and example of the Church's worship; to furnish an official seat, a cathedra for the Bishop; to provide a spiritual home for himself and staff—a concentration encampment, as it were, in and from which he could mobilize and distribute his working forces; a sacred place for the frequent assembling of the clergy of the Diocese around their Bishop for instruction, corporate worship, counsel, and the distribution of alms; and whither "the tribes of the Lord" could go up, even as they once went up "unto the testimony of Israel, to give thanks unto the name of the Lord."

Under this Cathedral System of constant spiritual communion, counseling of the Bishop with his clergy, and corporate unification and administration of activities, Christianity was established in the chief cities of the Roman Empire, her mighty legions leavened with the Spirit of Christ, and the Gospel spread to the far-off coasts of the British Isles, in an incredibly short space of time. The system proved itself, in short, to be a vitalizing and energizing agency for the diffusion of Christian truth and the building up of the Church in ages when the Dioceses of the Church virtually meant the commercial, military, civic, social and art centers of the Roman Empire. Its efficiency for government and mission in the early history of the Church is too evident to be questioned or misunderstood.

And that efficiency has been repeated, your committee beg to submit, wherever the Cathedral System has been maintained and readjusted and adapted to altered conditions and environments. If anywhere this system has failed consistently to fulfill the Cathedral idea, it was only because there was no such readjustment and adaptation. And we cannot but believe that, while many of the functions of the Cathedral System and Chapter have been transferred, in this American Church, to the Convention and Standing Committee and Board of Missions of the Diocese, yet enough remains to make a revival of the primitive institution of the Cathedral carefully adjusted to present needs and conditions, very desirable, if not essential to the securing of the best results, and that it would prove to be not only a diocesan unifying and administrative agency, but a much needed vitalizing and spiritualizing influence and power in the Church today.

This, indeed, seems to your committee to be the conviction of a large portion of this Church of our faith and love, not less than fifty Dioceses having adopted the Cathedral System with more or less fidelity to the primitive pattern. We are not now prepared, however, to go more deeply and extensively into the subject, nor to present a scheme of Cathedral organization for this Diocese. We fully realize that the question and the issues involved are too complex, important and large finally to be dealt with in the short time given us for their consideration. But we do venture to remind this Convention that the Diocese of Missouri has all the necessary material and facilities for a perfected Cathedral System at its hand. We have a physical plant for such a Cathedral, beautiful, dignified and commodious, with a Chapel and Parish House, in the very heart of this great city—a location ideal for worship and service. A charter exists under which the organization could successfully operate without radical amendment. There is a parish willing to co-operate and to contribute the plant and a considerable part of the income and endowment to any properly constituted and endowed Cathedral Church and work. There is a hospitable Cathedral spirit and a genuine productive Cathedral work on progressive, modern lines already established and in vigorous operation; and for all this the Diocese is indebted to the loyalty, devotion and generosity of the people of Christ Church Cathedral Parish. They have put an appealing opportunity before us. Your committee hopes that the Diocese will seize and use it to the utmost of advantage; and to that end offers the following resoluion:

RESOLUTION No. 9-

Resolved, That the Committee on the Constitution and Functions of the Cathedral Church be continued; that one additional clerical and one additional lay member be added thereto, and that the committee be authorized to endeavor to secure the approval of the Bishop, of the Bishop Coadjutor and of the Standing Committee and the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, for the organization of Christ Church Cathedral Church; and to take such other steps looking to that object, as may in their judgment prepare the way for the action of the Convention in the premises, and to report with recommendations to the next Convention.

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APPENDIX No. 15.

Report of the Chairman of Executive Committee of the Mation=Wide Campaign.

During the year 1920 the following served on the Diocesan Executive During the year 1920 the following served on the Diocesan Executive Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign: Bishop Tuttle, ex-officio; Bishop Johnson, Chairman; Rev. R. D. S. Putney, Vice-Chairman; Mr. G. K. Warner, Treasurer; Rev. Messrs. H. W. Mizner, B. T. Kemerer, Z. B. T. Phillips, C. M. Davis, Jos. H. Harvey, J. S. Bunting; Mr. Thos. Q. Dix, Chairman Speakers and Organization Bureau; Mesdames W. H. Burritt, E. F. Cushing, Thos. Q. Dix, Mac H. Jolley, Messrs. H. H. Bell, James M. Bull, Lawrence Dallam, A. W. Donel, E. C. Freegard, H. S. Graves, E. A. Logan, E. H. Lycett, R. L. Orcutt, Geo. A. Randolph, B. P. Williams.

On the evening of February 24, 1920, was held a most inspiring meeting, preecded by a supper, at Schuyler Memorial House, at which clergy and laymen from the different parishes in the Diocese gave enthusiastic accounts of the progress of the campaign in their parishes, and told of plans for meeting their quotas, and the cordial co-operation of clergy and vestrymen pledged to this committee.

At a meeting of the committee on March 2d, Rev. B. T. Kemerer presented a plan for unification and program to include the help of every interest in the city, and to further the campaign it was decided to use publicity, which work was put into the hands of Miss Gooding. The plans for the Easter drive included four sermons to be preached four weeks, simultaneously, in every church, and during these four weeks advertisements were put in the papers announcing the time of service at every church and mission in the city and county.

A mass meeting was held at the Odeon on the evening of March 23rd, which was remarkable for the imposing number of vestrymen massed with the clergy on the stage. The speakers at this meeting were Mr. Lewis B. Franklin of New York, Mr. Geo. K. Gibson of Chicago, and Rev. J. M. Maxon of Louisville, Ky. This was followed by a Day of Intercession in

every parish on March 25th.

It was felt by the committee that the spirit aroused among the vestrymen and laymen by the campaign drive should be capitalized, and it was decided that a committee be appointed by the Chairman to look into the matter of a proposed organization of the vestrymen of St. Louis and vicinity and to prepare a written statement of objectives, Messrs. B. T. Kemerer, Thos. Q. Dix and James M. Bull being appointed on this committee.

On May 21st a supper and meeting was held at Schuyler Memorial House, at which the Associated Vestries of Missouri was organized, with about 175 clergy and vestrymen in attendance from the Diocese; and at the adjourned meeting held June 15th, Mr. Geo. C. Mackay, as Chairman of the Organization Committee, read the proposed Constitution of the Associated Vestries of Missouri, which was unanimously adopted, and officers of the new organization were elected. This Associated Vestries of Missouri is a direct outcome of the Nation-Wide Campaign in Missouri.

We had a visit from Dr. Patton on the evening of June 9th at St. George's Church, who spoke to the Executive Committee, giving an enthusiastic account of the Campaign all over the country. And on October 1st was held a conference at Schuyler House, when Rev. Mr. Ten Broeck out-

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lined the program for the fall campaign as proposed by the New York office. Following this, on October 26th, a conference of the clergy of the Diocese was had with the Diocesan Executive Committee, at which conference it was recommended that the Diocesan Executive Committee put into operation the program which came from the Nation-Wide Campaign head-quarters, the emphasis to be placed on the spiritual side, and the sympathy and co-operation of the Associated Vestries was invited in carrying out this program.

A Day of Intercession was observed in all the parishes on November 19th, and in conformity with the national program, a conference of the clergy was held at the home of Mr. Geo. A. Randolph on November 23d, a study class being held at that time under the leadership of Mr. Kemerer. This was followed by a six days' Preaching Mission, beginning November 28th, held at Christ Church Cathedral, with Dr. Z. B. T. Phillips as Missioner. During the week beginning December 5th, such of the clergy as were invited to do so held Preaching Missions in parishes and missions of the Diocese to which they were invited.

At a meeting held on January 7th, 1921, the following resolution was

adopted:
Believing that a better knowledge of the information contained in the General Survey is necessary to increased interest in the Nation-Wide Campaign, it is resolved, that this committee recommend to the Diocesan Convention, at its approaching meeting the following resolution:

RESOLUTION NO. 10-

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to work out some plan for informing the minds of the people of our parishes and missions of the material contained in the General Survey.

APPENDIX No. 16.

The Brotherbood of St. Andrew.

Reverend Fathers in God, Clergy and Lay Delegates of the Eighty-second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

In the report of the Brotherhood last year you were told that on June 4th, 1919, only four Chapters were represented in our Assembly, but that four new Chapters had been chartered since that time and prior to the last Diocesan Convention, and that eleven probationary Chapters had been established. During the year 1920 new Brotherhood Chapters were given charters by the Philadelphia office as follows: Junior Chapter at the Church of the Ascension, Senior Chapter at the Cathedral, Senior Chapter

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In March of this year the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, under the leadership and guidance of Mr. Thomas E. Powe, assumed full charge of the ushering at the Healing Mission of Mr. Hixon held in St. Peter's Church. This included the care of and help to many who were afflicted.

Upon invitation of Mr. Geo. R. Robinson, Brotherhood men, assisted by some of the clergy, conducted a summer camp for boys from various Church Schools. Groups of boys, ten to twenty in number, spent happy days at La Barque Hills Camp, near Eureka, Mo.

Two representatives of our Assembly went to Columbia, Mo., in November and assisted in the formation of a probationary Chapter of the Brotherhood at Calvary Church at that point, and we shall be glad to render assistance in Brotherhood work at any place in the Diocese.

The National Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew held in St. Louis in October was reported by the Philadelphia office to be one of the most efficiently planned and managed conventions, so far as the entertaining city is concerned, which has ever been held. We wish to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to Bishops, clergy and laity who assisted us in making that Convention a success.

We have arranged for our Lenten services, downtown, in 1921 as heretofore, these meetings to be held at the northwest corner Seventh and Locust streets (entrance 411 North Seventh street), and the January issue of The Church News will give you a full list of the speakers at those services.

As we are dependent upon the generosity of the Church people for funds for defraying the expenses of these Lenten meetings, contributions to Mr. Charles J. Miller, Treasurer, for that purpose will be thankfully received.

Our officers for 1921 are Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D.D., Honorary President; George C. Richardson, President; Charles M. Day, First Vice-President; Robert N. Nash, Second Vice-President; Frank B. Murray, Third Vice-President; Charles J. Miller, Treasurer; Rev. E. S. White, Chaplain; W. L. Henry, Secretary.

We do not wish to appear egotistical, but believe those Rectors who do not have a Brotherhood Chapter in their parish will find it the concensus of opinion of their brother clergy who have the assistance of a Brotherhood Chapter, that they are missing something.

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APPENDIX No. 18.

Report of Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Board organized February 12th, 1920, by electing Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, Secretary, and Mr. E. H. Lycett, Treasurer. The Bishop appointed as members of the Finance Committee Mr. F. C. Thompson, Mrt C. C. Curtice and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones.

The budget for stipends, etc., for missionaries and workers presented by the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor was approved as amended, calling for total needs of \$16,500 for the year. At the April meeting a supplementary budget was presented by the Bishop Coadjutor and unanimously approved, calling for an increase of \$1,390.00 over the original budget.

The Bishop Coadjutor explained that most of these additions would merely be for the purpose of relieving the Contingent Fund of the Bishop Coadjutor and would add but little to the present stipends of the recipients.

Meetings of the Board have been held regularly every month with the exception of July, August and September, at which meetings reports have been received from the Bishop Coadjutor covering the missionary work in the various fields of the Diocese.

In May a committee consisting of the Rev. ZeB. T. Phillips and F. C. Thompson, empowered to add a third lay member, was appointed for the purpose of investigating the situation at Motor Heights with a view to selecting a more desirable site for St. Luke's Mission. While a lot has been selected and it was the opinion of the Missionary Board that the present lot should be sold and the new lot purchased and funds raised for a church building and the stipend for a clergyman, no action has yet been taken and the matter is still in the hands of the committee.

Owing to the failure of the various parishes and missions in the Diocese to complete their quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign, there has been a serious shortage in the amount received by the Treasurer of the Missionary Board necessary to carry on the work of the Missionary Board and, at the close of the year, we found that the Reserve Fund of \$2,500.00, which for a number of years has been kept for emergency purposes, had been completely exhausted and, in addition, the Treasurer did not have sufficient funds on hand with which to pay the stipends due January 1, 1921. Inasmuch as the Bishop Coadjutor reports that it will take at least \$15,670.00 to conduct the work in his field as it is being done at present, and that, provided the Church at Kirksville is reopened and one or two other groups strengthened as they should be, the amount required for 1921 will be practically \$18,000.00 in the Bishop Coadjutor's field, it is easy to see that some radical change must be made in the present method of apportioning funds for the Missionary Board in order that the \$2,500.00 Reserve Fund may be replaced and sufficient funds be put in the hands of the Treasurer that the work may be carried on as it should be.

The records of our missionaries in rural Missouri have been one of faithful service and we should see to it that they are backed up and given the necessary support.

We have four missionaries who have remained at their post for eight years or longer each, and four who have remained four years each or longer, an exceedingly creditable record when the difficulties of the work are understood.

The Rev. J. H. Lever resigned to take effect October 1, 1920, as missionary to the City Institutions, and his place has been taken by the Rev. Chas. B. Carpenter, who started his work January 3, 1921.

The Bishop Coadjutor was authorized to permit the Methodist minister at Sherman to use our church building two Sundays each month. The Rev. Oscar Lindstrom of Monroe and Canton, is at present giving one service a month at Trinity Church, Kirksville. The Rev. C. F. Edwards, Rector of St. James' Church at Macon, has also been elected Rector of Christ Church of Moberly, in addition to his work at Macon, the people at Moberly having voted a salary of \$500.00 a year for him.

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APPENDIX No. 19.

The Report of the Board of Religious Education.

The Diocesan Board of Religious Education, being deeply conscious of the vast needs of the subject committed to it, is serious in regretting it has so little to report. In excuse, it is fair to state that for various reasons, the Board was without a Chairman for eight months of the year, and that it could not function until late in September when the Bishop was able to find some one to accept the Chairmanship.

The difficulty that deterred Chairmen is the difficulty of the Board. It seemed to exist only to bring in a report, which report is read to a not over attentive Convention, and is buried in the Secretary's files, and is gone forever more. The members of the Board seem to think that this is hardly worth while. Moreover those who have attended the Board's meeting, thoroughly disapprove of themselves as members of the Board, not being educators and having no training in, or experience of educational work.

The Board had no funds, not even for postage; it could make no adequate survey of conditions; it could issue no suggestions; it could do nothing but report.

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Neverthless, the Board met three times. It accepted the resignation of three members and received from the Bishop the appointment to membership of one in addition to those named in the Journal.

It assumed responsibility for the new Church School Service League by appointing a sub-committee to further as far as may be the work of the Church School Service League in the Diocese, according to the plan recommended by the Department of Religious Education of the Presiding Bishop and Council.

The report of this sub-committee was approved and issued by the Board, copies being sent to all the clergy of the Diocese.

The Board approved the reopening of the Church Institute of Religious Education for Grown Persons, arranged its curriculum and sessions, but was unable to fit together dates and faculty so that the Institute could begin work any sooner than mid-February.

If the members of the Convention have carefully followed the news items in the daily papers, they must be forcibly impressed with the constructive work being done by the denominations, through just such institutes as the Board recommends; the greatest care being taken to provide able leaders for the courses of study selected.

The Board directed the Chairman to suggest the advisability of making the persons holding the office of "Diocesan Director of the Church School Service League" and the office of "Diocesan Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary" *ex-officio* members of the Board.

We of the Board also suggest the desirability of some arrangement by which the new Board may function in connection with the Diocesan Treasurer, in order that such literature may be distributed in the Diocese as may gradually establish better and more uniform methods and courses in all our religious educational work.

The last number of the Church News, January 21, publishes a list of 72 parishes and missions, only five of which are unorganized. In the past year effort has been made to learn something of the leadership in the Church Schools, but with small success. It becomes apparent, therefore, that something must be done to assist in developing the resources of these centers already established in the Diocese. So we further feel that it is needful that there be a Diocesan Administrator of Religious Education supported by the Diocese, whose work shall be to present to every educational agency in the Diocese latest information as to best courses and methods, in the hope that through such knowledge, suggested improvements may be freely accepted and religious education brought more nearly up to the standard. Such Administrator must be an expert, specially trained and equipped for this special work and would have to be adequately supported. The incoming Board, appointed at this Convention, will perhaps be able to supply such a person. Until this is possible some degree of approach to the same ends may be attained by the dissemination of properly adapted literature and by the developing of a group of volunteer leaders so instructed and trained that they can go through the Diocese and present with enthusiasm and force, at least the foundation things of Church instruction.

It will be impossible to do any part of this work without some funds. We therefore offer the attached resolution, asking that the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to place the sum of \$500.00 at the disposal of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

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APPENDIX No. 23.

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It is not necessary to argue with you who are here today about the reasons for the existence of such an institution as Grace-Holv Cross. Too many of you are deeply interested in it. You know something of the need and something of the aims, and are chiefly anxious to be assured that the need can be met by the instrument used. If not, any amount put into it is waste, and, if it can, it is wise to put into the enterprise all that can be had and it is an economical expenditure. In this connection I refer you to page 11 of the Year Book that is here, and ask you to note that Mr. Mortland, Secretary of the St. Louis Pure Milk Commission, in writing of our milk station says, "I believe that it is the best report I have ever made out for your work." The work of the Dispensary also shows a notable improvement over the past. The store has been somewhat hampered by the lack of supplies, a condition which will have to be met by a revising of our methods of collecting and advertising. The usual summer school has been held and the spirit that was in evidence was most desirable. Both this school and the kinder-garten have contributed to the physical well being and the mental as well. Friends of children and of our work have made it possible to give them treats and outings. These are a wonderful help and have widened the circle of our friends, so that we feel that real progress has been made in extending the number of those who are touched with the value of the work. Outdoor Sunday night services were featured for about three months and were more largely attended than ever before. The different congregations of the city contributed to the expense and the different clergymen gave of themselves. A good, portable moving picture machine was presented to us by Mrs. J. Herndon Smith, and helped these services very much.

Thanksgiving and Christmas are the seasons when people give. The citizens of St. Louis and vicinity must be well up among those who give most generously. Certain it is that none who needed help through us were unsupplied if they made their wants known. To all who helped us to be their distributors at these seasons we give thanks, and we trust that your generosity will extend to our work throughout the year.

A widespread interest has been maintained in our milk fund for the benefit of the children in the Kindergarten. It has helped us to give the children the certified milk without any diminution of amount or interruption of supply. For this we thank our many friends, but their best thanks are in the strengthened bodies of the children and in the appreciation from above for this service to the lives of His little ones.

Much to our gratification, Miss Skinker is with us again this year. She is keeping the little library that we have open on Saturday afternoons and is conducting a sewing school as well.

The old junior auxiliary is functioning as the Church School Service League. The Woman's Auxiliary and the two guilds for women are also active.

The most remarkable improvement that we have made in our work this year has been among the boys. We have a Woodcraft League meeting on Monday nights under the direction of Robert W. Burns, of the Soldan High School, a Marten Memorial Brotherhood on Thursday nights under the leadership of August Spiering, of the faculty at the State School for the

Blind, and Boy Scouts, Troop No. 3, on Tuesday nights under the training of J. P. Simons, one of our business men in the neighborhood. Eighty would be a moderate estimate of the enrollment in these three organizations. The boys are interested and growing to have a real interest in the place. We look for big things from this, and we must give the credit under God to those two men, J. P. Simons and August T. Marten, who have labored throughout the past year, and who now see the fruits of that labor, for I cannot but think that Mr Marten must know something of the blessedness of that work which he did. In fact, as he lay dying in the hospital in December, he said to me, "Do not worry. I shall get well, and the work will be the better for this accident that has happened." The crowning work of all is to bring these better nurtured and better trained to the Sunday School and the Church. Here we have made notable strides this past year. There is much to be done, but it is a high achievement to secure the faithful services of someone who is capable of teaching the truths of our religion and at the same time hold the interest of the boys. We were having that with Mr. Marten through the fall. We have such a teacher now in the person of Miss Ormsby. Attendance at all of our services is increasing, especially among the younger people.

With our limited facilities and meager equipment we are averaging an attendance at the activities in the Guild Hall of over nine hundred a week, and it will not be long before a thousand a week will be our record. Plans are on foot that will increase that average greatly.

Figures do not enter into this report. They come to you from the Treasurer, Mr. J. E. Williams, Jr., and his Assistant, Mr. W. C. Stith. They will be found in the accompanying Year Book, copies of which are here for distribution.

Missouri Branch Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri, and the Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson and Members of the Convention:

I have in my hands the report of the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in full, and which we will be glad to have you listen to on Friday morning at our annual meeting, for we are told "to condense it" for this afternoon, which I am sorry has to be done. Two of the outstanding events of the year: The visit of Miss Elizabeth Matthews, National President of the Church Service League, at our October Quarterly Meeting, which has resulted in the appointment by Bishop Tuttle of Mrs. George Capen, the Second Vice-President of the Auxiliary, as Chairman of a Diocesan Church Service League which wil be organized as rapidly as possible, and to which we earnestly hope the clergy will lend encouragement and support. The other was the Convocation at Hannibal, where a whole day was given the Auxiliary at the suggestion and through the courtesy of the Rev. Mr. Wharton,

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of Mexico, Mo., Dean of the Convocation. Our Third Vice-President, Mrs. J. W. Mackey, of Palmyra, had worked faithfully, and there were present that day representatives from Columbia, Macon, Palmyra, Canton, Monroe City and Hannibal. Five officers went from St. Louis and was, indeed, an inspiring day for us, and we hope for all. It is, since we have had the Nation-Wide Campaign, left entirely to the wish of the Diocesan Auxiliaries as to whether they make pledges at their Quarterly Meetings. The Missouri Branch has chosen to continue its gifts, thereby showing their devotion to the "Mission of the Church." Our gifts in money have amounted to \$10,522.16, which includes a large amount from social service, now officially part of the Auxiliary work. Of this amount, \$2,634.44 is credited to Missouri's quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign. The boxes sent since January, 1920, were valued at \$2,350.16, and have gone to Alaska, Maine, Nebraska, North and South Carolina and Virginia. Total amount from January, 1920, to January, 1921, is \$12,872.30.

that there is a well organized branch in your parish.

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APPENDIX No. 25.

Report of the Missionary to the City Institutions.

Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson and Members of the Convention:

I have the honor to submit the report of the Missionary to City Institutions for the year January 1, 1920, to December 31, 1920, although I have had no intimate acquaintance with all of the work, except for the past three months. The work in the nine city institutions had been developed to such a degree in the year 1919, under the leadership of the Rev. John Howard Lever, who served for seven years as City Missionary, that it became necessary for men giving full time in this work to be added to the staff. The Missionary waited not for the results of the Nation-Wide Campaign, but, with the help of the Diocesan Missionary Board, arranged for the money with which to pay more workers and then went out to get them. On the fifteenth of January, 1920, the Rev. Jos. H. Harvey, who was finishing up his work as Secretary of the Nation-Wide Campaign in the Diocese of Missiouri, was called to assist in the work and was given work in the City Hospital No. 1, Work House, and later took over the services and visits at the Jail. Beginning with the middle of last January, the Hospital was visited daily; in the month of February, during an epidemic of "Flu" visits were twice or three times a day. The Work House and Jail visited once a week; services in each of these three places every week, with a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion on first Tuesday of the month in the hospital. The Rev. Mr. Lever took charge of Sanitarium visits and services, visiting Tuesdays and Thursdays, with monthly celebration on first Sunday,

and other services on other Sundays, Miss Cora Pearce making visits once a week. He also made visits on Fridays to Koch Hospital, with service in the afternoon, and a celebration once a month, Miss Pearce making weekly visits to Koch. The House of Detention had weekly visits on Fridays by the Rev. Mr. Lever and Deaconess Brainerd, and services on Sunday afternoons by the Deaconess. The Jail was visited by the Deaconess on Fridays, and up until June the Rev. Mr. Lever made visits there on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and conducted services on Saturdays at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon. After June, the Rev. Mr. Harvey took over the services and visits. The Rev. Mr. Lever had charge of services every Monday night at Bellefontaine Farms and provided "movies" or other form of entertainment on the same nights after the service.

At the Work House the Rev. Mr. Harvey made visits on Wednesdays and Sundays, and held services on Sundays at two o'clock in the afternoon. Deaconess Brainerd visited each Friday afternoon.

At City Hospital No. 1, daily visits were made by the Rev. Mr. Harvey, Mrs. M. A. Holmes, who has been in City Missionary work for many years, and by Deaconess Brainerd, and Miss D. M. Lorick on Fridays. The Infirmary was put in charge of the Rev. D. H. Atwill, rector of St. Augustine's Church, who had been making visits each week in Hospital No. 1, before the addition of the Rev. Mr. Harvey to the staff. Mr. Atwill visited the Infirmary on Thursdays, held celebration of the Holy Communion once a month, and took a part of the Sunday services; Miss Pearce visiting each Tuesday.

The Lay Reader, Mr. A. D. Pomeroy, who has been doing Mission work for several years, took services on some Sundays in the Sanitarium, Infirmary and Hospital No. 1. City Hospital No. 2 was placed under the charge of the Rev. D. R. Clarke, rector of All Saints' Church, who made visits on Sundays and Wednesdays, and celebrated the Holy Communion weekly. Visits were made by Miss Lorick on Thursdays, and services conducted by the Lay Reader, Mr. George B. Jones, on Sundays. Miss Lorick also made visits weekly to Koch and Hospital No. 1 until the colored people were removed from No. 1 to No. 2 in July. We must not omit mention of the faithfulness of our several organists at the various institutions, and note that we had most excellent talent in the line of vocal music at various times, especially at Easter and Christmas.

Some time ago the Rev. Mr. Lever asked that we might have the field in the City Institutions for ourselves, and asked the other bodies of Christians to co-operate rather than compete with us, because we had announced that we were prepared to do the work and felt that no other Church could bring to this kind of work all that our own Church has to give. We gave our promise to do this work and the workers have faithfully tried to see that the promise was kept during the year 1920.

The services averaged fifty a month, seven of which were celebrations of the Holy Communion; visits to institutions were over 300 a month; calls out in the city, connected with the work, over 200 per month; there were over 100 letters written each month; and during the past year we baptized seventeen, presented for confirmation twenty-five, married one couple, and buried sixteen persons.

On October first, the City Missionary, the Rev. Mr. Lever, resigned his work to accept a similar position in Detroit, Mich., and Bishop Johnson asked the Rev. Mr. Harvey to take charge of the work in the City Institutions until another head could be found for the work. This meant three months of strenuous work for one who had already found plenty to do in the part of the field that had been assigned to him. Within a few weeks the Bishop told us that that new man had been found in the form of an old friend, the Rev. Charles B. Carpenter, who is to be with us on the first week of January, 1921. By calling on our loyal lay workers and the others interested in

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the work to take more visits and a few more services, we were enabled to look after all of the work in a fair way, with the exception of Bellefontaine Farms which had an enforced vacation for three months.

In October, the Rev. Mr. Clarke resigned the care of Hospital No. 2, on account of other duties, and the Rev. Mr. Harvey arranged to make an occasional visit, and to have a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion for the ten inmates that had been removed last July from Hospital No. 1 to the Infirmary part of Hospital No. 2.

He who makes this report is happy to say that there are not so many inmates in the Koch Tubercular Hospital—not nearly so many children—as there were last year; the Jail had fewer than usual up until last November, when bail was not so easily obtained as in the days gone by; the City Hospitals 1 and 2 did not have so many during the last three months of the year as they usually do; and the Work House, which used to have over 400 a few years ago now averages 225.

But let no one think that these improvements mean that the workers are less busy; we can find time to more thoroughly do some of the tasks that had to go with "a lick and a promise;" there is plenty to do, and the workers are ready and desirous to do what is to be done.

I wish to speak of the kindly co-operation of the city officials and of the loyal and hearty support of all of our workers in the missionary work of our church in the city institutions.

I can say that they have all tried to go to "all those who are in any ways afflicted or distressed in mind, body or estate;" they have tried to "relieve them according to their several necessities;" they have tried to help them to thank the Lord for his goodness, and be able to say, "He brought me out of the horrible pit, out of the mire and the clay, and set my feet upon the rock, and ordered my goings. And he hath put a new song in my mouth; even a thanksgiving unto our God."

6—St. Louis. In the evening attended a meeting of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral and presided.

7—St. Louis. In the evening Mrs. Johnson and I were the fortunate guests of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Bull at a delightful dinner given in the parish house of the Church of the Ascension.

8—St. Louis. In the afternoon monthly meeting of the Committee of Grace-Holy Cross. In the evening met with the League of Lay Readers at the Church of the Ascension, and listened to many most interesting and encouraging reports of services rendered by members of the League. It was one of the best meetings, I think, that we have ever had.

9—St. Louis. In the evening attended monthly meeting of the Missionary Board.

10—In the afternoon Mrs. Johnson and I were invited to collaborate in a program at a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the parish house of Emmanuel, Webster Groves. Mrs. Johnson told of some of our happy experiences as guests in delightful homes in England. I told of visits to Cathedrals and of the Lambeth Conference.

12, Sunday—In the morning I ministered the Holy Communion and preached in St. Paul's Church, Ironton. This congregation has been without regular services for a good many months. I was pleased to see how glad they were to respond to the opportunity. In the evening I assisted the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer in Evening Prayer at Poplar Bluff, confirmed one person presented by Mr. Witmer, and preached.

13—Poplar Bluff. In the evening at the pro rectory, met with a fine gathering of the Men's Club of the parish at a delightful supper served by Mrs. Witmer and ladies of the parish. At the conclusion of the feast, as we sat about the tables, speeches were made by the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer, by Mr. Thomas Q. Dix of the Diocesan Board of Missions, who had come down to tell of some of the opportunities which now await the layman in the Church, and by the Bishop Coadjutor. Appreciative responses to the speeches were made by several representative men of the parish and by a member of the St. Margaret's Guild.

21—St. Louis. Evening, Hotel Buckingham. Attended annual banquet of the New England Society, being a member of the Reception Committee on this three hundredth anniversary.

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23—St. Louis. Received and accepted from the Bishop of Virginia, Letter Dimissory in favor of the Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor.

25—Christmas Day. With the Rev. J. H. Harvey and a quartet of singers, started out before 7 in the morning and made the round of City Jail, City Workhouse, House of Detention, City Sanitarium and Koch Tubercular Hospital, singing the beautiful Christmas carols. We traveled over 100 miles and got back just before 2 o'clock. Many were those who said to us very expressively and with a mist in the eyes, "Wish you all a Merry Christmas and thank you for coming to sing." Mrs. Charles F. Edwards of Macon, and the twins, Charles and Frederick, aged five, and Deaconess Brainerd took Christmas dinner with us.

26, Sunday—In the morning went with Mr. Richard Kopplin to Valley Park. I ministered the Holy Communion and preached. The congregation was excellent for a stormy day. There were 17 at the Holy Communion.

28—St. Louis. Evening, St. Augustine's, assisted the Rev. D. H. Atwill in the services in celebration of the Christmas festival for the Sunday School. Listened to the sweet singing of some very little people, and to the speaking of pieces, and gathered around the Christmas tree in the Miller Memorial Hall.

29—St. Louis. I received word from Bishop Tuttle that he transfers to me the jurisdiction of Grace Parish, Jefferson City, effective January 1, 1921.

31—St. Louis. Received and accepted, from the Bishop of Connecticut, Letter Dimissory in favor of the Rev. L. C. Sherburne. By request of the congregation of Trinity Church, Kirksville, and with the consent of the Vestry of St. Jude's, Monroe City, I have appointed the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, Rector of Monroe City, to be in charge of Trinity, Kirksville, as of December 11, 1920.

From Sunday, February 1, to Sunday, March 7, inclusive, I was in charge of the religious services and the preaching at St. Paul's School Chapel, Concord, N. H.
