Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Assessments.
 - III. On Constitution and Canons.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - VIII. On State of the Church.
 - IX. Unfinished Business.
 - X. On Social Service.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the services of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

Journal of the Eightieth Convention
OF THE

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Tuesday, May 20, 1919.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eightieth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on May 20, 1919, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. George L. Barnes read the Epistle and Bishop Richardson of Frederickton, New Brunswick, read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address (Appendix 1)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the Schuyler Memorial House, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the forty-two who were entitled to vote, twenty-eight were present.

The Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented his report. (See page 17.)

Report accepted by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the Lay Delegates to the Convention.

Twenty-seven Parishes and Missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from twenty were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

On motion the Rev. Mr. Mizner cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

On motion the Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

The Bishop announced the election of a Nominating Committee in order.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Dr. Phillips introduced Resolution No. 1, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 1.—

Resolved, that the portion of the Bishop's address referring to the Centennial of Christ Church Cathedral, which will occur on All Saints' Day next, be referred to a Committee of five, consisting of *three* clergymen and *two* laymen, said Committee to report to this Convention a plan whereby the Diocese of Missouri may co-operate in making this celebration memorable in the history of the Church.

Resolution adopted, and the Bishop appointed the following named Special Committee:

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, the Rev. Mr. Duckworth, the Rev. Mr. Barnes, Mr. Geo. K. Warner and Mr. H. G. Hurd.

Recess of the Convention until 2:30 p. m.

Mr. Jennings presented his report as Secretary of the Standing Committee. (Appendix 3.)

Report accepted.

Mr. Jennings presented his report as Secretary of the Parochial Trust Fund. (Appendix 4.)

Report accepted.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Dr. Wilkins, Dean Davis and Mr. C. C. Curtice, elected members of the Nominating Committee.

The Rev. W. H. Tomlins, of Granite City, Illinois, presented his card to the Secretary.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Mr. Coxe, Mr. J. A. Waterworth and Mr. James M. Bull elected members of the Nominating Committee.

The Rev. Mr. Coxe introduced Resolution No. 2 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 2.—

Resolved, that the election of deputies to the General Convention be made the order of the day for Wednesday, May 21, at 11 a. m.

Resolution adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner presented a report as Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials as follows:

Report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.

Your Committee on the admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials have examined the application of New St. George's Parish, St. Louis, for admission in union with this Convention, and find that said parish has complied with the provisions of Canon X of this Diocese, with the exception set forth as follows:

Said parish has not fully complied with Section 4 of said Canon X, which directs that a parish applying for admission in union with the Convention, shall adopt and cause to be prepared and presented to the proper court, Articles of Association, and shall procure from said court a certificate of incorporation and file the same in the office of the Secretary of State, and take any and all other steps necessary under the laws of this State for their consolidation into a religious corporation. Said parish, having failed to comply fully with the provisions of said Section 4, has not been able to fully comply with the provisions of Section 6 of said Canon X, which directs that the written application for admission into union with the Convention shall be accompanied by a copy of the certificate obtained from the Secretary of State, as above mentioned.

Your Committee submits its findings as above to the Convention.

Report referred to the delegates from St. George's Parish.

The Bishop Coadjutor read his Annual Address. (Appendix 2.)

By unanimous invitation the Rev. George Long addressed the Convention.

Mr. Mackay introduced Resolution No. 3 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 3.—

Whereas, the Diocese of Missouri, in convention assembled, in the City of St. Louis, on May 20th, 1919, has heard the plan for a Nation-wide Cam-

paign to be conducted by the whole Church during the year 1919, culminating in a Nation-wide Every Member Canvass of every parish late in the fall;

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that a vote of thanks be extended to the Rev. Geo. Long for his able presentation of this message, and;

Further, Resolved, that the clergy and laity representing the Church in this diocese pledge their hearty support to this well timed movement on the part of the Church and hereby request the Bishop to appoint a Diocesan Campaign Committee of *five* members, with power to act to assist the Bishop in co-operation with the Campaign Executive Committee in making this Campaign a success in this diocese.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Judson introduced Resolution No. 4 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 4.—

Resolved, that the Rectors and Delegates from Parishes and Missions, which have paid their Diocesan assessments and apportionments, but who have not yet paid the Church Pension Fund assessment, may take seats in this Convention, *provided*, that such action by this Convention shall be deemed for the purposes of this Convention only, and shall not in any way impair the obligation of such Parishes and Missions to make such pension payment as soon as possible.

Resolution adopted by unanimous vote.

On motion the vote by which a report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials was referred to the delegates of the New St. George's Parish, was reconsidered and said report was referred to said committee and the Committee on Contitution and Canons, to be reported upon at 10:30 a. m. of the following day.

Mr. Dix presented his report as Secretary and Treasurer of the Country Home for Convalescents. (Appendix 5.)

Report accepted, but the reading of it was postponed, and it was referred to the following named Special Committee:

Mr. C. H. Middleton, the Rev. Dr. Phillips, Mr. W. C. Stith, Mr. Harry Hurd, and Mr. Geo. K. Warner.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 5 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 5.—

Resolved, "That Section 1, of Canon No. 9, be amended by striking out the words 'three clergymen,' and substituting the words 'ten clergymen,' and by striking out the words 'five laymen,' and substituting the words 'twelve laymen,' and by the addition of the words, 'no parish can have more than one layman as a member of the Board'."

Resolution referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Remick introduced Resolution No. 6 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 6.—

Resolved, that Canon XIII be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, as follows:

Section 4. When any Mission or Parish organization in this Diocese expends any money for any purpose other than its operating expenses, such expenditure shall be made through the Treasurer of the Mission or Parish in which such organization is located. The Treasurer of the Mission or Parish through which any such expenditure is made shall credit the money received for such expenditure as a designated contribution and shall expend it for the purpose designated by the organization from which he received it.

Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer introduced Resolution No. 7 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 7.—

Resolved, that Article V of the Constitution, Section 2, be amended by inserting, after the word "Clergyman" in the first line, the words "and Deaconess," so that Section 2 shall read "Every Clergyman and Deaconess in regular standing, etc." and in the third line, after the word "he," insert "or she."

Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer introduced Resolution No. 8 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 8.—

Resolved, that the Missionary Apportionments, for both Diocesan and General Missions, be made by the Missionary Board of the Diocese and that this Board be constituted a Board of Equalization with power to adjust the apportionments so made.

Referred to the Committee on Missions.

The Rev. Mr. Norton introduced Resolution No. 9 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 9.—

Resolved, that Canon XII be amended as follows:

Amend Canon XII—"Of the Election of Vestries and Their Duties"—by striking out the words "a Vestry" in the third line of Section 1 of said Canon 12, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Such members of the Vestry whose term of office has expired." also by inserting between the word "service" and the word "They," in the thirteenth line of said Section 1, the following:

"The members of the Vestry may be divided into classes in respect of their term of office, provided no term of office of Vestrymen shall be created for a longer period than three years,"

so that said section, when amended, shall read as follows:

"Section 1. On the first Monday in May of each year, after due notice, publicly given on an occasion of Divine Worship, the parishioners of each Parish shall assemble in annual meeting to elect *such members of the Vestry*

whose term of office has expired and transact such other business as shall be brought before them. At such meeting the Rector, or Minister in charge, if he be present, shall preside, and the polls shall be kept open for the space of two hours; provided, however, that after the polls have been kept open for one hour, they may be closed at any time thereafter by the unanimous consent of the presiding officer and the electors present. The right of challenge shall be admitted; the Secretary of the Parish meeting shall make record of such challenge and cause, and reference may be made to the Bishop, whose decision shall be final. The Vestry shall consist of not less than three, nor more than thirteen members; the number to be determined by the Parish meeting for each year; provided, however, that notice of any proposed change of the existing number shall be duly given at least thirty days previously, by the person officiating at a regular Sunday service. *The members of the Vestry may be divided into classes in respect of their term of office, provided no term of office of Vestrymen shall be created for a longer period than three years.* They shall be baptized persons and eligible as Delegates to the Convention from the Parish which they are called to represent, and not under suspension as Communicants. But no suspended Communicant who shall have appealed to the Bishop to remove such suspension shall be disqualified either as a Vestryman or as an elector pending such appeal."

Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth introduced Resolution No. 10 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 10.—

Resolved, that that part of the Bishop's address relating to the death of the Rev. Arthur Brittain be referred to a Special Committee to prepare a suitable minute.

Resolution adopted, and the Bishop appointed the following named Special Committee:

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth, the Rev. Mr. Stimpson, and Mr. De Renthel.

On motion the Bishop appointed the Rev. Dr. Phillips, the Rev. Mr. Duckworth, the Rev. Mr. Putney, Mr. C. C. Curtice, Mr. James L. Ford, and Mr. Thos. Q. Dix as a Special Committee to send greetings to the Presbyterian General Assembly, now in session in St. Louis.

On motion the Convention adjourned under the rules.

SECOND DAY.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 10:00 a. m.

From the Eightieth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri, now being held at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, now convened at the Odeon, St. Louis—Greeting:

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ.

"We bow our knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, that He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might by His Spirit in the inner man; that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith, that ye, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all

saints what is the breadth and length and depth and height, and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye may be filled with all the fullness of God."

The Rev. Mr. Boden led the Convention in Noonday Prayers.

On motion the report of the Social Service Commission was referred back to the Commission.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins introduced Resolution No. 16 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 16.—

WHEREAS, the Right Reverend David Hummell Greer, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of New York, has been removed by Divine Providence from the church militant to the church expectant; be it

Resolved, that this Convention of the Diocese of Missouri gratefully recognizing the power and influence of the late Bishop of New York as a Christian man, a great administrator, a preacher-orator and his catholicity of spirit and method in governing the Church within his jurisdiction, and in dealing with many current problems, do hereby express to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the said Diocese our profound sympathy with them in the great loss which the Church in the Diocese of New York has sustained, that we claim a substantial share in their grief, and that we are thankful to Almighty God for the late Dr. Greer's heroic fidelity and loyalty to Church and duty, and for the fruits of his faithful ministry to the Church at large.

Resolved, that the Right Reverend Chairman and Reverend Secretary of this Convention do attest this preamble and these resolutions by their signatures thereto, and that a copy of the same be transmitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the aforesaid Diocese.

Resolution adopted by unanimous rising vote.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Z. B. T. Phillips, D. D.; the Rev. J. J. Wilkins,

D. D.; the Rev. Henry Mizner, F. N. Judson, John Scovern, Geo. C. Mackay and W. C. Stith elected Deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one Deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. George L. Barnes elected Deputy to the General Convention.

Recess of the Convention until 2:30 p. m.

The Rev. Mr. Remick introduced Resolution No. 17 as follows:
RESOLUTION No. 17.—

Resolved, that this Eightieth Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri hereby expresses its approval of all legitimate efforts to bring into effect a uniform eight-hour day for men and women wage-earners in the United States.

Further, that this Convention is opposed to allowing children under the age of fourteen years to be employed in any occupation for gain, it being the opinion of this Convention that all children should be occupied in some form of constructive education up to the age of fourteen years, and not be forced to earn any part of their own living by any form of labor.

Further, that this Convention shall elect a representative, who shall be

instructed to co-operate with all other citizens of this State and Nation who are striving by legitimate means to bring into effect the above mentioned labor reform.

Referred to the Committee on Social Service.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, as a supplementary report of the Nominating Committee, presented the names of the following named candidates for election as Alternate Deputies to the General Convention:

Mr. Dix presented his report as Secretary of the Missionary Board. (Appendix 13.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary presented the report of the Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society. (Appendix 14.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary presented the report of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board. (Appendix 15.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary presented the report of the Treasurer of St. Stephen's Expense Fund. (Appendix 16.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Putney introduced Resolution No. 18 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 18.—

Resolved, that this Convention place itself on record as indorsing that part of the Bishop Coadjutor's address which referred to the stipends of Missionaries in the Diocese; and be it further

Resolved, that this Convention sets as its aim a minimum stipend of \$1,500 per annum and a rectory or dwelling for its missionaries.

Resolution adopted.

Mrs. M. H. Jolly read the report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. (Appendix 17.)

Report accepted.

Mrs. E. S. Cushing, First Vice-President of the Woman's Auxiliary, addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Penley, of De Soto, addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Lever presented his report as Missionary to the City Institutions. (Appendix 18.)

Report accepted.

On motion it was ordered that the Secretary have 2,500 copies of the above report of Mr. Lever printed for public distribution, to be paid for by Mr. H. G. Hurd.

Deaconess Brainerd, Assistant to the Missionary to the City Institutions, addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner made an oral report on St. Stephen's House and presented a written financial report. (Appendix 19.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor made an oral report on Grace Church-Holy Cross House.

The Rev. Mr. Remick presented his report as Registrar of the Diocese as follows:

REGISTRAR'S REPORT.

The only duty of the Registrar consists of compiling all available historical matter pertaining to this Diocese. This duty has been fulfilled as time and opportunity would permit during the past year. An appropriation of \$75 is asked by a resolution which will be offered for office equipment and clerical help.

Morning Prayer was read in the Chapel at 9:30 a. m. by the Rev. George L. Barnes and the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 10 o'clock.

The Secretary read the minutes of the second day, which were corrected and approved.

Mr. Curtice presented a report of the Trust Funds held by the Bishop. (Appendix 20.)

Report accepted.

Mr. Curtice presented his report as Chairman of the Committee on Finance. (Appendix 21.)

Report accepted and Resolution No. 20 therein adopted, and report and resolution referred to the Committee on Assessments.

Mr. Waterworth introduced Resolution No. 21 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 21.—

Resolved, that Article VI of the Constitution be amended by striking out Paragraph 2 of Section 2 thereof and by inserting the following as Paragraph 2 in lieu thereof:

2. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be a member of the Cathedral Chapter and President thereof; and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one; the Chancellor of the Diocese, the Secretary of the Diocese, and the Treasurer of the Diocese, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Cathedral Chapter;

And by adding the following new section, to be Section 4 of Article VI:

Section 4. The headquarters and offices of the Diocese and of the several Standing Committees and Boards of the Diocese shall be located in the Cathedral premises, 1210 Locust Street, St. Louis.

Mr. Pomeroy introduced Resolution No. 22 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 22.—

Resolved, that the missionary work heretofore known as Hospital Missions be officially recognized under the name of "Mission to City Institutions."

On motion the rules, by unanimous vote, were suspended, and Mr. Lycett presented his report as Chairman of the Committee on Assessments. (Appendix 22.)

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 12, introduced by Rev. Dr. Wilkins, report that they have examined it and recommend that it be adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented a report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons as follows:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 5, introduced by Rev. Mr. Jones, report that they have examined it, and recommend that it be adopted.

J. COURTNEY JONES, Chairman.

Report accepted and Resolution No. 5 adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented a report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons as follows:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 7, introduced by Rev. Mr. Kemerer, report that they have examined the same, and recommend that it be adopted.

J. COURTNEY JONES, Chairman.

Report accepted and Resolution No. 7 adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Constitution, which was approved at the last Convention:

Amend Section 5 of Article V of the Constitution by inserting the words, "male or female," after the word "persons," in the third line, so that said section when so amended shall read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Lay Delegates shall be chosen by the Vestry of each Parish, or if there be no Vestry, or if the Vestry fail to act, then by the Congregation of the Parish duly convened. They shall be baptized persons, male or female, and shall have been for the year next preceding stated worshipers in the Parishes which they severally represent, and canonically entitled to vote for Vestrymen of the same; but no candidate for Holy Orders shall be admitted as a Lay Delegate to any Convention."

Amendment adopted by majority vote of both orders, voting separately, and approved by the Bishop.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Constitution, which was approved at the last Convention:

That Article III of the Constitution be amended by striking out the words, "the fourth Tuesday in May," in the second line of said article, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "the fourth Tuesday in January," so that said article, as amended, shall read as follows:

"The Convention of the Church of this Diocese shall assemble annually, on the fourth Tuesday in January, at such place as shall have been appointed by the preceding Annual Convention; but in case of the prevalence of infectious or epidemic disease at the appointed time and place of meeting, or for other sufficient cause, the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese shall have power to change the time or place, or both, as the emergency may require; provided, however, that at least ten days' notice of such change shall be given to every Vestry, and to the Minister in charge of every Parish and Mission in the Diocese."

Amendment adopted by majority vote of both orders, voting separately, and approved by the Bishop.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented a report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons as follows:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 21, introduced by Mr. Jas. A. Waterworth, report that they have examined it and recommend that it be adopted.

Report accepted and Resolution No. 21 adopted.

On motion the Convention prepared to receive a deputation from the Presbyterian General Assembly, now in session in this city.

The Rev. Mr. Boden presented a letter from the Joint Commission of the Protestant Episcopal Church on Press and Publicity, requesting an appropriation of \$50 for the work of the Commission at the General Convention in Detroit.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. Mr. Wharton, of St. Paul's Church, Mexico, Missouri, addressed the Convention.

Prof. James H. Snowden, Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; the Rev. Dr. Robert Johnston, Pastor, American Presbyterian Church, Montreal, and Elder James Yereance, Central Presbyterian Church, New York City, a deputation from the Presbyterian General Assembly, were received at noon. After Noonday Prayers, led by the Rev. Dr. Phillips, each gentleman of the above named deputation addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Lever presented an amended report of the Commission on Social Service. (Appendix 12.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Lever introduced Resolution No. 23 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 23.—

Resolved, that the sum of \$150 be appropriated, subject to the approval of the Committee on Finance, of which the sum of \$100 (one hundred) is to be sent to the Joint Commission on Social Service and the sum of \$50 (fifty) is to be given to the Social Service Commission of the Diocese of Missouri for use in its work.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. Mr. Lever presented a report of the Committee on Social Service as follows:

We, your Committee on Social Service, to whom was referred Resolution

No. 17, introduced by the Rev. Mr. Remick, beg to report that they have examined the same, and recommend that it be adopted; and further recommend that the Rev. C. E. Remick be elected as said representative.

Report accepted and recommendation as to representative and Resolution No. 17 were adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Putney presented a report of a Special Committee as follows:

Your committee appointed to consider Resolution No. 22, introduced by Mr. Pomeroy, on the change of name from "Hospital City Missions" to "Missions to City Institutions," report favorably for this change.

Mr. Stith introduced Resolution No. 24 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 24.—

Resolved, that Grace Church-Holy Cross, St. Louis, be relieved from the payment of the Diocesan assessment and apportionment reported by the Assessment Committee, it being an unorganized Mission.

Recess of Convention until 2:30 p. m.

Mr. Lycett introduced Resolution No. 25 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 25.—

Resolved, that the Treasurer of the Missionary Board be instructed to expunge from his records the unpaid apportionments standing against the following Missions: Fredericktown, \$12.75; Fulton, \$5.50; Portland, \$10.25; Salem, \$14.00; Sherman, \$6.00; Sullivan, \$5.00. Total \$53.50.

Resolution adopted.

Resolution No. 24, introduced by Mr. Stith, was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Middleton presented a report of a Special Committee as follows:

The Report of the Treasurer of the Country Home for Convalescents has been carefully considered by your Committee, which was appointed for that purpose.

The work now being done at this home is urgently needed in this community, and those who are conducting it should receive all the help and encouragement that can be extended to them.

The work is entitled to the hearty support of the Convention and churchmen generally.

Your committee respectfully submits for the consideration of this Convention the attached resolution, and asks for its adoption.

Report accepted.

Mr. Middleton introduced Resolution No. 26 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 26.—

Resolved, that this Convention approve the work of the Country Home for Convalescents and commend it to the churchmen and churchwomen of the Diocese as an institution, the purposes of which entitle it to their loyal encouragement and support.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Dix read his report as Secretary and Treasurer of the Country Home for Convalescents, which had been previously accepted.

Mr. De Renthel presented the report of the Diocesan League of Lay Readers. (Appendix 23.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth presented the following report of the Committee on Missions:

Your Committee on Missions having considered Resolution No. 8. offered by Rev. Mr. Kemerer, beg leave to report that in its judgment the resolution is a wise one, and ask for its adoption.

Malone, E. A. Logan, and C. K. Hitchcock.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the above named candidates, and the Bishop declared them elected members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth presented a report of a Special Committee as follows:

Your committee appointed to prepare a minute on the death of the Rev. Arthur Brittain ask that the following be adopted and printed on a separate page of the Journal of this Convention:

Since our last Diocesan Convention, one of our number, the Reverend Arthur Brittain, the Rector of St. John's Church, passed on to life eternal. He was for many years a faithful priest in this Diocese, and a devoted servant of Jesus Christ. A wise and brotherly adviser, he had the courage of his convictions, and was capable, as such natures are, of sharp and strong feelings, yet he always exhibited kindly strength in speech and action, and when his opinions and preferences were not triumphant, he showed no sullenness of spirit, but rather, helped to make a course of action succeed that he had thought the less excellent alternative.

The flowers placed upon his casket and grave were eloquent of genuine and profound emotion, but it is a higher, wider and deeper tribute than can come from any wreath of appreciation to be able to say to-day:

Keener is thy loss in counsel
Than when the blow first fell.

He was strong in courage, fidelity, vital energy, in the love of justice and honor, and he possessed that deep reverence of soul which is the sure indication of a refined and great nature. A modern writer has declared that "The noblest workers of the world bequeath us nothing so great as the image of themselves."

On the granite shaft over the graves of Canon and Mrs. Kingsley are these words:

We have loved.
We love.
We shall love.

What a glorious faith! What sublime confidence! Every loving heart has that same unshakable assurance.

RESOLUTION No. 28.—

WHEREAS, the Centennial of Christ Church (now Cathedral) Parish, St. Louis, will occur on All Saints' Day, November 1, 1919; and

WHEREAS, Christ Church, St. Louis, was the first Parish of the Protestant Episcopal Church organized west of the Mississippi River, and by its organization the Church assumed spiritual jurisdiction in the vast territory lying between the Mississippi River and the Pacific Ocean, in which territory, by the blessing of Almighty God, she now exercises jurisdiction in thirty-six Dioceses and Missionary Districts by forty Bishops and two thousand Clergy; and

WHEREAS, Christ Church, St. Louis, has been for one hundred years the loving and helpful Mother Church of the Diocese of Missouri and a center of spiritual life and charitable works in the City of St. Louis and in all respects worthy of the respect and affection of the Church in Missouri; be it

Resolved, that the Diocese of Missouri, in Convention assembled, extends its hearty and filial congratulations to the Mother Church on her hundredth anniversary and pledges itself to co-operate fully to make the celebration of that event in every respect adequate and worthy of the historic importance and sentimental interest of the occasion; and

Resolved further, that the President appoint a committee of five, to consist of three clergymen and two laymen, to prepare and submit a minute descriptive of the occasion and of the sentiments of the Convention, for entry on the records of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. (Appendix 24.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Lever introduced Resolution No. 29 as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 29.—

Resolved, that in the death of Carl W. Minch the Diocese of Missouri, the Diocesan Social Service Commission and St. Paul's Church has lost a devoted and unselfish servant and friend.

Resolution adopted by unanimous rising vote.

On motion it was ordered that the next Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

On motion acceptance of the report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew was reconsidered and said report referred back with the request that it be signed only by officers who are laymen.

Report was corrected as ordered and refiled with the Secretary.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer for \$25, payable to the sexton of the Cathedral.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to have 600 copies of the Journal printed.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer for \$50, payable to Geo. F. Parker, Secretary of the Joint Commission of the Protestant Episcopal Church on Press and Publicity.

Mr. Warner, member of the Committee on Finance, to which had been referred Resolution No. 23, introduced by the Rev. Mr. Lever, returned said resolution without recommendation for the reason that a quorum of said committee could not be secured.

Resolution No. 23 adopted.

Mr. Warner, member of the Finance Committee, to which had been referred Resolution No. 24, introduced by Mr. Stith, returned said resolution without recommendation for the reason that a quorum of said committee could not be secured.

On motion Resolution No. 24 was laid on the table.

On motion the Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the last day.

Convention adjourned *sine die*.

Annual Address of the Bishop of Missouri
TO THE
Eightieth Annual Convention.

"And they shall walk and not faint."

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

These are words of the Prophet Isaiah and out of that most helpful chapter, the 40th, beginning with "Comfort ye, comfort ye, my people," and ending with "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run and not be weary; and they shall walk and not faint."

They that wait upon the Lord shall do such things. They that believe in the Lord and trust Him. They that serve the Lord and obey Him.

Something in the order of statement seems strange. First come those who arise and outreach unto a renewal of their strength. Then those aroused with emotion and mounting up as eagles upon the wings of enthusiasm. Then those springing forward with eagerness and zeal to run unweariedly. Next, we should expect to hear mentioned some fourth class, heated with the fever of earnest endeavor or with the fervor of ambitious aims, rising, moving, outreaching vigorously. Instead we are told of those who simply walk. "And they shall walk and not faint."

It seems an anti-climax—so to tell of the faithful who rise and soar and run, and then to fall down to speak of those who only walk.

Is it really, however, an anti-climax? In rhetoric, maybe, yes. But in spiritual philosophy, surely no. For is not walking the main activity of the upstanding and outmoving human frame? And is not, to be free from weakness in walking of higher importance than to be free from weariness in running or in mounting like eagles?

The everyday life—the routine world—the duties of home—the responsibilities of business—the loyalties of citizenship—the claims of the Church Militant—these things and the relations to these things make up the walking which we are considering. Observance of these relations and steadfast effort to discharge the obligations involved are ever so much higher in importance than are mere emotions and enthusiasm and spiritual exaltations. So routine in duty doing, monotony in duty doing and the commonplace in duty doing are not low down things. By the prophet's rhetoric they are of highest spiritual value.

Let us not, therefore, rate the meetings of Convention and the making of reports and the passing of resolutions and the tinkering of canons as things of no account and not worth while. In a way they constitute the walking of our church life, and if in the spirit of waiting upon the Lord we handle them we shall not faint.

During our convention year six Bishops have died.

Bishop Olmstead was Bishop of Colorado for sixteen years, though during the last two years of his life he practically withdrew from active jurisdiction. He was the much loved pastor of an important parish near Philadelphia when chosen Bishop. His poetic temperament and his refinement of nature and habit hardly fitted him to cope with the strenuous activities of Rocky Mountain life. Yet he stood for fourteen years faithful in his appointed field of duty.

Bishop Brooke rounded out twenty-five years of faithful service as Bishop of Oklahoma. He was gentle, godly, devoted, and he grappled bravely with the difficult problems and burdening anxieties pressed upon him by the rapid development in population of his imperial Western State. He had gone up in the line of consecration and had become one of the senior Bishops of the House.

Bishop Funsten had stood for twenty years in the Episcopal leadership of Idaho. His St. Luke's hospital and his St. Margaret's school for girls, both at Boise, and his sixty Parishes and Mission Stations throughout the State indicated his vigor of administration and his success of accomplishment. I had opportunity to note the vigor and success, for I was with him last September and preached the sermon at the consecration of his Cathedral.

Bishop Williams guided Nebraska for almost twenty years. He was of a charming personality, an earnest winner of souls and a wise leader of men.

For nearly twenty-two years Bishop Gibson was Bishop of Virginia. For the first five years he was Bishop Coadjutor, with Bishop Whittle for his chief. For the last five years impaired strength and the impending burden of his seventy years had in a measure withdrawn him from active duty. He was to the manor born, a Virginian of Virginians, the son of the Rev. Dr. Gibson, a distinguished Rector of Petersburg in earlier days. He was greatly beloved in life and is much lamented in his death, which occurred a few weeks ago.

And now almost in the hour of our assembling comes the news of the death of Bishop Greer of New York. A great leader and a faithful soldier in the Church Militant has fallen. I was in his home for a few days' sojourn a fortnight since. The tears fall and the heart is very sorrowful but faith and hope in Christ refuses to grow dim.

By his death the number of Bishops in the House is brought down to 122. I dare not say out my thoughts about the steadily vanishing forms of the membership of that House. In the House we do not say anything about the dead, save solemnly to cite their names and pray. It may not be amiss to note that 137 Bishops of that House have died since I entered it; all of whom I personally knew except four—Southgate, Auer, Schereschewsky and Ingle. God mercifully have us in His holy keeping!

One of our Diocesan clergy has fallen out of the ranks, Rev. Arthur Brittain. He did faithful work in Missouri for twenty-one years in Ironton, De Soto and St. Louis. The later years of his life in St. John's and in the Orphans' Home and in the Hall for Boys were aboundinglly filled with pastoral and priestly service. His good works follow him. The Boys' Home, on Louisiana Street, is named after him—Brittain Hall.

In the Diocese at large men and women and children have been called away in death. In the changes and chances of this mortal life such summonings are to be yearly expected. Some of those who have gone are: Mrs. Deane, widow of our late Rector at Mexico; Mrs. Bryan, of Kirkwood; Mr. Meriwether, Warden and Treasurer of Calvary, Louisiana; Mr. Clarkson, of Columbia; Mr. Conover, Warden of St. Peter's, Bonne Terre, and Mr. Strobach, of Rolla, and Mr. E. C. Dameron, of Clarksville, who had been our

faithful Warden and Caretaker there for years. In St. Louis, Mr. Grant and Dr. Benson, Vestrymen of All Saints', and Mr. Minch, Vestryman of St. Paul's, and Mr. Schill, of St. Stephen's; Mr. Kilpatrick, of Holy Communion; Mrs. Benjamin Gratz, of St. Peter's; Mrs. R. W. Shapleigh, of the Cathedral; Charles D. McLure, who gave munificently to make over Christ Church into Christ Church Cathedral; Mrs. Skinner, of Clayton, and Captain Alexander Skinner, who in France gave his brave young life for flag and country.

"They climbed the steep ascent of heaven
Through peril, toil and pain;
O God, to us may grace be given
To follow in their train."

This year proffers to our observance two marked anniversary days.

For one thing, it is the jubilee year of the Missionary Host. Fifty years ago at just about this time the Missionary Host began. It was built on a simple plan. It aimed to get our Sunday school boys and girls to be acquainted with each other and to meet each other once a year with badges and banners and reports and singing and prayer. And in the meeting and through the meeting to learn about and get interested in the missionary work of the Diocese. A Sunday school giving \$1 a year was qualified to be a member of the organization. The dues for the boys and girls were 5 cents per month for each, to be paid monthly. Laymen got it up. Laymen in the main managed it. There were few officers—a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and marshal. The only clergyman officer was a Chaplain to conduct the service on the annual celebration day. Possibly, also, Rectors met with the Sunday school superintendents and teachers on the annual business meeting day. But it has been very simply managed, without noise, or shoutings, or loud or high claims. Mr. Wallace Delafield, I think, was the first president, and he was the president when he died a few years ago. Year by year he was a diligent visitor of the several Sunday schools, and the visits encouraged the children and quickened his own interest. It was intended that all the Sunday schools of the Diocese should range themselves in the organization. But, practically, in the years that I have known it, only the St. Louis Sunday schools, city and county, have belonged to it. Yet I remember that so long as Holy Comforter, Montgomery, remained in existence 60 cents came regularly every year from one child there. Mr. Nelson and Mr. Wyman are veteran officers of the Host. And, I think some time back Rev. Dr. Wilkins had not a little to do with it. And almost from the very first and with fresh energy and generous help down to the very now of the last, Mr. E. C. Simmons has stood by the Host and for the Host as founder, friend, guide and benefactor.

The Missionary Host! It has deserved its name and it has honored its name. Once it paid the salary of dear Mr. Scheetz, a faithful minister whom we all knew and loved. He lived at Monroe, but for two or three years served as a missionary throughout all Northeastern Missouri, and was the special missionary of the children of the Host and was supported by them; and out from his loving heart and busy life he wrote letters of interest and thanks to them. Of late years the Host has furnished about \$1,000 each year to the Bishop Coadjutor and myself for missionary work in the Diocese; and our hearts are full of the warmest thanks for such splendid help. We can both asseverate that of the important and valuable missionary work going on in the Diocese much would have been crippled in the doing or would not have gotten done at all except for the generous help of the Missionary Host.

O Missionary Host of the Diocese of Missouri, we hail thee in joy and grateful acclaim on this year of your fiftieth birthday. May God be good

and gracious and kind to thee in the new fifty years now opening, as thou hast been good and gracious and kind to us in the old fifty years now closing!

For another thing, this is the centennial year of Christ Church Cathedral. The actual birthday of Christ Church was All Saints' Day, November 1, 1819. Her first pastor was the Rev. John Ward, a missionary, who had come from Lexington, Kentucky.

The practical birthday of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as an organization, was October 16, 1789. Its official birthday as the Prayer Book Church was October 1, 1790. The real birthday of our American Union was March 4, 1789. In a sense, our American Union is seven months older than our American Church. It has been frequently pointed out that very many of those who framed our American Constitutional Union were members of our American Church. Among them were Washington, Hamilton, Livingston and Jay. When Christ Church was born the Union in its Constitutional existence was thirty years old.

Those were years of leanness and dullness and doubt in both State and Church. The nation for eight years had been braced up by vigorous war. With peace had come relaxation, disclosing disunited policies, paralyzed industries, disintegrated commerce and beggared credit. The Prayer Book Church had not had time to change its name. It had been known as the Church of England, and so had to bear a burden of odium and contumely. It was a struggle with it to keep its own parishes from dying out. It had no strength to do missionary work. However, about 1819 there came a little change for the better. In the General Convention of 1820 the Church moved in the direction of organizing a Missionary Society. Something ought to be done for the Far West, it was thought. The Far West was then the Alleghenies and parts beyond, and the frontiers were Ohio. The Church began waking up; and waking and outlooking, it sent men for missionaries, such as Chase (afterwards Bishop), to Ohio, and Ward to St. Louis. But it was not until sixteen years after, in 1835, that the splendid step forward was taken of choosing and sending Missionary Bishops to the border. The first of them all was Jackson Kemper. Thanks, we say most earnestly, as to God, thanks for John Ward, and thanks for Jackson Kemper.

In the list of the Rectors of Christ Church are two outstanding names—Bishop Hawks and Dr. Schuyler. Bishop Hawks, consecrated in 1844, was Rector and Pastor of Christ Church, as well as Bishop of the Diocese, until 1854. Then Dr. Schuyler came and served as Rector of Christ Church and Dean of the Cathedral until his death in 1896. In the annals are other faithful ministers, but Christ Church and Christ Church Cathedral owe largely what they have been and what they are to the fifty years of leadership of these two men. Dr. Schuyler's pilotage, during the distressful four years of our Civil War and the subsequent years of reconstruction, was eminently wise and skillful. His consistency and firmness, with his unfailing consideration and sympathy and his loving kindness, checked tendencies to disruption and mightily strengthened the forces of harmony and union; and his faithful service of forty-two years ripened into an abounding fruitfulness the seeds which his devoted unselfishness had shown.

Christ Church became Christ Church Cathedral in 1889. I may be permitted to quote some words I said in the Bishop's Address of that year. "Christ Church Cathedral is launched with the good will. I rejoice to think, of everyone. I indulge in the hope that the Diocese will learn more and more to take interest in the Cathedral; to be loyal to it and proud of it and to stand by it as its own. I am impressed with the conviction that, for the Cathedral to do successfully the work that God seems to lay before its future, it must have a large endowment. Such an endowment would be as the anchor to a tossing ship. It would hold the Cathedral with a blessed

steadfastness to the missionary work to be done downtown. It would provide fitly that Diocesan hospitalities, Diocesan dignities, Diocesan shelterings, should never be ignobly neglected. It would uphold the hands and nerve the heart of the Bishop for embarking upon any and every prudent course towards strengthening Diocesan work and exalting Diocesan standards."

The American Cathedral is not a fixed and crystallized institution. It is a thing of life and growth. It is not stored with inherited treasures, nor hedged by ecclesiastical dignities nor tied to traditions and practicings. There are thirty-nine Cathedrals in our American Church. They live to grow, and they grow to live. Their growth and development shall show more and more what they can be in strength and efficiency of help. When our Christ Church Cathedral in November next is presented to us as a centenarian, because built upon the foundation of old Christ Church, let us be ready to greet her with all good wishes, extending a strong hand grasp of sympathy and a warm heart thrill of love.

Our annual count of confirmations is to the good—449 last year, 530 this year. And this, too, spite of the serious invasion of our field by the influenza epidemic, which laid ban upon public services in many a one of our churches, and which hampered and hindered greatly the clergy in their pastoral ministrations. For the goodly confirmation record we thank God and take courage.

In the field of General Missions we are glad and grateful for the record for the year, because we went over the top. We were apportioned \$17,000. We gave \$19,000. Everybody helped. The Sunday schools in Lenten offerings gave \$2,800. The Woman's Auxiliary helped, and their gifts this year are near \$12,700, of which over \$10,300 are in cash. The Parishes helped. The One Day's Income plan helped. And then generous individuals all over the Diocese helped. It warms the heart of an old Missionary Bishop to note the outcome. We are, I hope and I think, learning that, if the million and a half or more of dollars yearly needed for our 2,700 missionaries are to be forthcoming, ours must be steady and sustained and systematic and repeated giving, from all sides. The Board of Missions from New York City is planning a nation-wide campaign in the interest of its great work. A speaker has been sent on to give us information. I have ventured to promise him this afternoon (Tuesday) at 4 o'clock as a suitable time for his presentation. Let us all in Missouri wheel into line with alacrity to promote such plan as the Board may submit. Really it is a joy to give. As it is a joy to do things to get things done. And as it is a joy to do good. So a habit of giving is formed. And the habit lives and grows by what it feeds on, and the joy grows with it. In the generous outpourings of benefactions and helpfulnesses in the late world war, and yet going on, analysis would discover, I venture to say, that joy in giving was quite as much an impellant force, to say the least, as was duty of giving. "Are you ever going to let up from begging for money?" sometimes we are asked. We answer, "No, never, for not only do crying needs never let up, but we ourselves do not want to be so hard-hearted as to deprive men and women of the joy that comes to them by the practice and habit of giving. So really we thank God that there are wants to be supplied, and we thank God again that the men and women have not by any means died out of the world who find joy in trying to supply them.

We do not want to boast, we do not boast, of our gifts of money and time and energy and service to General Missions and to Diocesan Missions and to City Missions; to the Orphans' Home and Brittain Hall and to the Country Home for Convalescent Women, now moved to St. Louis County; to St. Luke's Hospital and to our manifold ministrations to our eleemosynary institutions in St. Louis; to our Girls' Friendly and to the Red Cross, and to the St. Andrew's Brotherhood, and to the Provident Association, and

to all other benevolent activities—for the giving to all these brings its own substantial joy without boastfulness of claims or shoutings of commendation. Details of these things can be given by the Bishop Coadjutor, whose faithful service and wise leadership in them conduce to their wholesome and abiding success.

I pause to return a word of thanks. But to whom I know not. From somewhere and somehow and some way, a chauffeurman and a motor car come to me whenever I want them. And no bill of costs presents itself. Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore is the outward and visible agent about it all. But he is as uncommunicative as a sphinx. Well, here are my thanks to some one—some men and some women, probably—my warm thanks, poured in and shaken together, poured out and running over. The car is a wonderful help.

One parish has fallen out of the list this year. St. Andrew's, St. Louis, has been disorganized and terminated. Formed under the auspices of the Church of the Holy Communion, having the Rev. Mr. Deane as its first pastor, its record has been a right good one, especially in the line of faithful missionary giving. But alien races have pushed in for domicile in the region round about, and its own constituency of church folk has been so pushed out that, by the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, it has been deemed wise to abandon the Parish work and sell the fabric.

St. George's, St. Louis, hitherto for a time a Chapel of the Cathedral, is setting up housekeeping for itself. It will apply to this Convention to be admitted at St. George's Parish. Rev. Mr. Raymond has come to Trinity, Hannibal, from the Diocese of Olympia, and Rev. Mr. Stimpson to St. John's, St. Louis, from the Diocese of Milwaukee.

Canon XIX, Sec. 5 of our Diocesan Canons, was at the last Convention amended so as to read as follows: "The fiscal year of the Diocese shall be from the 1st day of January to the 31st day of December, inclusive, and all Diocesan reports and all parochial and financial reports of Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall conform thereto."

Other amendments, as found on page 104 of the Journal of the Diocesan Convention of 1918, connected with the time of meeting of our Convention, were adopted.

Strictly these amended Canons are our present law. But the Canonical Amendments were adopted along with an amendment to the Constitution, which amendment does not become law unless and until it be adopted by this Convention subsequent. Therefore, the Bishop ventured to allow a virtual suspension of the law for this year; and he instructed the Secretary to consider the present year as ending on April 30, 1919, and to request that reports and certificates be handed in accordingly as of old. This Convention is to vote upon the proposed Constitutional Amendment as found on pages 103 and 104 of the Journal of 1918. If the vote be affirmative, our next Convention will meet on Tuesday, January 27, 1920; and all reports and accounts will be for a constructive year of eight months only, namely, from May 1, 1919, to January 1, 1920. If so, Committees on Assessments and Apportionments will need to take note of the exceptional year to govern their action accordingly.

In the matter of merging our Diocesan Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund with the Church Pension Fund, our Diocese has not yet definitely acted. It was ordered at the last Convention that a committee be appointed to consider the subject and to report to this Convention. Looking over the Journal, I find, to my deep chagrin, that I failed to appoint such committee in the session of the Convention. I cry, *peccavi*. In March I ventured to appoint that committee—the Rev. Drs. Wilkins and Phillips and Messrs. Waterworth and

Stith and G. K. Warner, with the Chancellor of the Diocese, who was named in the resolution. Their report to this Convention may be expected by us.

The great world-wide war is over. That is, in the awful carnage of its actual battlefield, it is over. In the sorrows entailed and the perplexities bequeathed it is not over.

Among visible things, wherever there is light there is shadow. The bright light of self-sacrificing patriotism must have its shadow of patriotic sacrifice. Our hearts are glad and sad. Glad—glad and proud for the wonderful way in which the whole nation men, women and children, have gathered to do and give and die; and sad—sad and lonely for the goodbyes, for the goings forth to death, and for the remainings behind in mutilation.

In the gladness and the sadness the Church has never let herself be counted out. Near a half-score of our Missouri Clergy have been on duty at the front. Prayers and praises, hope and cheer and help, she evermore and abundantly holds forth. To the conquerors she says—love, mercy. To the conquered—look up to God. She looks for the right and hopes for the best to come out of the peace of Paris and the League of Nations.

If she cannot understand it all or be sure about it all, she is certain of this—that in the discussions and differences and in the agreements and fellowships the civilized peoples of the earth are learning to know one another better; and have stabilized and strengthened mutual good will. And she knows well that these results are not the things that make for war. Thank God!

APPENDIX No. 2.

Address of the Bishop Coadjutor, Eightieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Since last we met an unusual number of those who had been in touch with the work which is given me to do have entered on the life beyond the bridge.

St. Timothy's, in St. Louis, owes the possession of its property very largely to the kindness of Mrs. Ann Betts. She made the congregation a gift of \$7,500 while she was yet alive. I owe her a debt of gratitude for much help and many kindnesses. She had sent on ahead materials out of which a goodly mansion had been builded to await her coming, I make no doubt.

Sister Eliza was formerly in rescue work in St. Louis in connection with the Cathedral. She had lived on a small farm among the Ozarks three miles out from Poplar Bluff the past ten years. I usually visited her cabin home whenever I went to Poplar Bluff. She continued rescue work in highways and hedges and hills and hollows, according to a method all her own, until she fell ill last autumn and died in St. Luke's Hospital. Many poor folk in the Ozarks are poorer than they were when she lived with them.

Mr. Walter A. May, of St. Stephen's, St. Louis, died at the front in June. His pastor says of him that, before he went off to the war, he had made provision for the regular paying of his monthly pledge for church support while he was away. That was a laying up of treasure where no rust corrodes or thief breaks through to steal. Mr. Eugene A. Schill was buried from St. Stephen's Chapel in Christmas week. He had been a most enthusiastic worker at St. Stephen's from a child. He had been treasurer for three years, which trust he executed with great fidelity. His influence for good among his fellows was constant as the moon's pull on the tides.

The year I came to Missouri I appointed Mr. David C. Smith as treasurer of St. Paul's, Overland. He held the office until his death, in Holy Week. If only every treasurer would send me such perfectly transparent financial statements as those he sent, without my asking for them, every year. He was "Uncle David" to every child knee high in Overland. They loved him, every one.

I was permitted to minister to Mr. Carl W. Minch the day he died, in December, in St. John's Hospital; a desperate case of the influenza. I miss him much from the ranks of the younger laity. In lay reading matters we came close together frequently. He was to be trusted and relied on always and everywhere.

The Church in De Soto and the Church in Fredericktown, which can ill afford to lose male members, gave fine young men to the country's service when Ewart G. Pelly and Willie Engle sailed for France. They are among those who don't come back because they are gone on. Mrs. Helen M. True, of Trinity, De Soto ("Grandma True" everybody called her), and Mr. Charles L. Harris, of St. Paul's, Ironton, have finished their course in faith.

At St. Mary's, St. Louis, I have assisted at a service commemorative of Victor Edwin Mesplay, who fought a good fight at Chateau Thierry.

Mr. Charles F. Strobach, faithful in the responsibilities as a member of the Church Committee at Rolla, is greatly missed. Mrs. Malcolm, also of Rolla, and Mr. William Beach, of Canton, both of them long blind, devoted to the Church, have passed out of their sorrow and darkness and night into Christ's gladness and sunshine and light.

In December I buried Mr. W. H. C. Conover, in Bonne Terre. It was largely due to his efforts that a good location was secured and a modest chapel built and paid for. Just before his death, Mr. Conover's boy, Arthur, had met his death in Flanders. In December I also buried Mrs. Frances Deane, widow of the Rev. Kenneth M. Deane, rector during many years of Mexico.

Those who know the remarkable work that Deaconess Brainerd does among the wayward, sin-sick and sorrow-worn in our big city, know what a sympathetic helper she had in her good mother, who fell asleep at St. Luke's Hospital in January.

For the good examples of these, and of others, if there be any, whose names we have not written down, for whom Christ's call hath come and with sweet enlargement hath dismissed them hence, we yield our thanks to God.

I have confirmed during the year in my own field 165 persons. This is 31 more than I confirmed in my own field last year. I have celebrated the Holy Communion 24 times and have several times assisted in the celebration of the Holy Communion. I have preached in the diocese and delivered addresses 137 times. I have baptized three infants. I have officiated at six burials. I have officiated as co-consecrator at the consecration of one bishop. I have issued four lay reader's licenses. For a number of weeks in the autumn we were practically inhibited from carrying on our normal church activities by reason of the influenza quarantine. Knowing that the condition at Jefferson Barracks was acute, I volunteered my services there and was cordially received and permitted to help as chaplain and nurse for two weeks while the epidemic was at its height in the pneumonia wards of the Post Hospital. Notwithstanding the fact that my regular visitations were interfered with for many weeks, the offerings and gifts which have come into my hands for the work in the diocese have been larger this year than any year before. The Woman's Auxiliary, the Juniors, and a goodly company of personal friends have been wondrous kind. My grateful thanks to them all.

Miss Cora Hofman removed from St. Louis to California in September. For fifteen years as a worker in the city institutions she was a blessed instrument through whom the Holy Spirit's gentle influences fell on jaded souls like dew upon the grass. Miss Cora Pearce has accepted temporary appointment to the vacant place.

The Rev. R. D. S. Putney, after three fruitful years in charge of Trinity, Kirksville, was called in November to become rector of St. Philip's, St. Louis. The Rev. Oscar Lindstrom was released from the charge of St. Timothy's, St. Louis, a year ago, that he might become rector of old St. Jude's, Monroe City, with charge also of Canton. At Monroe the guild has repainted the rectory and repapered some of the rooms. The steam plant has been reconstructed; delinquent diocesan assessments have been paid; Mrs. Lindstrom has a Girls' Friendly Society so big that she has had to put prospective members on a waiting list. At Canton conditions are unusually good. A point worth mentioning is that the parishioners at Canton take turn about in hospitably entertaining Mr. Lindstrom when he goes to spend two nights and a day twice every month. When Mr. Lindstrom left St. Timothy's, St. Louis, I was fortunate to be able to persuade the Rev. A. P. Rein to become their minis-

ter. The work has developed and strengthened. Arrangements are just completed to dispose of a debt of \$2,300 which has rested on the property for six years. Mr. Rein continues also in his successful and helpful ministrations at St. Paul's, Overland. I can't guess what Kirksville would have done when Mr. Putney left it for St. Louis in November, but for the ready willingness of the Rev. C. F. Edwards, rector of Macon, to annex it temporarily to his cure. The vestry of Macon contributed no little to the success of the plan by voting to release Mr. Edwards, with continuance of salary, from certain duties which he owed to Macon. The arrangement with Mr. Edwards has enabled us to continue the Church's ministrations at Kirksville without a break right through the year and the reports from there, spiritually and financially, are excellent. The Rev. F. M. Weddell continues to perform his duties as special missionary and carries strength and courage to all to whom he ministers. His work keeps him much on the road and permits him to have no continuing city. He has unusual gifts for this position, not the least of which is that he spares not himself. I am grateful to the Rev. Mr. Penley, who has gone over to Bonne Terre from De Soto several times in answer to hurry calls. The work at Mexico is excellent under the direction of the Rev. George E. Wharton. I count it a compliment to him and to the Church that the Missouri Military Academy, with our consent and that of his vestry, has carried Mr. Wharton on its teaching faculty this last year. Rolla has tidied up a whole lot. New floors in the church, new walls and ceiling, and the exterior nicely painted, are among the improvements for which St. Hilda's Guild paid the bills. Then there was a huge new basement made underneath the church, a new chimney built and a hummer of a new furnace installed. All of these improvements are paid for, I believe. And I understand that \$250 was tucked away in a bank at Easter toward a parish house fund. This is fine. But there is an item of \$127.75 charged up as delinquent in the Diocesan Treasurer's report that stares me in the face every time I open a Church News. I don't understand it. If it is a real liability, I wish it might be paid. If there is any mistake about it, I wish it might be satisfactorily adjusted. At Crystal City and Herculanum a good work has gone on, the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., being in charge. The Junior Auxiliary has been generous in putting into my hands \$200 to help maintain the Ford car which the Juniors also helped to buy in order that Mr. Tragitt may be constant in pastoral work in both these places and may supply services as he could not do without a Ford. Deaconess Sniffen, at Herculanum—you have more than once heard me say in Church News that she is doing the work of two women. I do not see how she can keep it up. I have no right to permit her to do so much. I am delighted that a Sunday School has been revived at Valley Park by the kindness of Mr. Kopplin and Mr. Watling, of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, who also lead the people in the Church's worship every Sunday morning. In city institutions and in various congregations of my field the League of Lay Readers have rendered helpful aid, for which my thanks to them.

St. Mary's, St. Louis, is now enjoying the use of the new Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church and Parish House which is located on a prominent corner in a rapidly developing section of the city. The building and land represent an outlay of more than \$35,000. Most of the money was raised by the Rev. Linden H. White, who has been pastor of St. Mary's for six and a half years. I was invited to dedicate the building on the first Sunday in October, a debt still resting on it of \$4,500. In January a little company of generous friends of mine in the city met with me one evening in a private home and listened to my story. The reply they made was to place in my hands the entire amount needed to discharge the debt. I have never found words warm enough to express my appreciation of this unexpected out-

reaching of generosity, but those who gave me the money that evening know how deeply moved with gratitude I was. The Rev. Mr. White and his people assure me that they can make this new church a real spiritual power plant. For this we will continue to hope and pray. And we will also, I hope, through the Missionary Board, examine closely into conditions in that neighborhood and back the work, if our judgment approves it, with such funds as fairness to the people and consideration for the future welfare of the Church justify us in expending. There is a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to give, and a time to withhold from giving.

St. Augustine's, Benton, under the leadership of the Rev. Douglass H. Atwill, has had a prosperous year and a happy one. No money has been borrowed, all bills have been paid when due, many old accounts of long standing have been settled, the church has been painted, all assessments and apportionments have been paid. In addition, six hundred feet of sidewalk were ordered in on Bruno Avenue and the men of the mission had a sidewalk bee and laid it with their own hands. Two hundred dollars has been added to the parish house fund which is now about \$1,500. The committee has voted to raise the salary of the minister from \$900 to \$1,200. The highwater mark for salary at St. Augustine's during the past ten years seems to have been about \$875. The average has been quite below that. I am so glad that the committee understands the meaning of the symbol HCL.

Reports from Grace-Holy Cross indicate that the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, without the sound of hammer or axe or any tool of iron, has builded substantially in the eighteen months that he has been there. He knows that I appreciate what he has done. The staff has been much strengthened by the addition of Deaconess Amy Greer Thompson, who resigned her position in East Side work in connection with Grace Church, New York City, to come to us, last month. Some idea of how far out into its neighborhood Grace-Holy Cross reaches may be had from the fact that the count of those who came to various guilds, clubs, meetings, etc., etc., exclusive of church attendance, Sunday School, dispensary and clinic, during two weeks in April was 1,950. Mrs. A. V. Clark continues to do splendid duty as parish visitor. Miss Skinker continues her gracious ministries, and Dr. Hild stands at his post as for many years. The business committee, of which Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore, is chairman, is faithful in the trust committed to it.

The Rev. J. Howard Lever will give you his own report for the Church's work in the City Institutions. In season and out of season he and his staff have "carried on." Volunteers have been most helpful, I don't know who they all are but among them are Mrs. O'Bannon, Mr. Jones, of All Saints', Messrs. Cotsworth, Freegard, Pomeroy, Saunders, of the League of Lay Readers.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner will give you his report for St. Stephen's. I have confirmed there this year 47 persons, the largest number confirmed by me in any year in any church since I came to the diocese.

I have had one service at the Country Convalescent Home. I hope that reports may be presented by the business management of such a sort as to encourage and stimulate the Convention in the support and development of this most useful auxiliary of the Church.

Sister Miriam works hard and lovingly at the Prince of Peace. The assistance of Miss Emma Luther, of St. James, Mo., is greatly appreciated by me and by us all. The Rev. Mr. Weddell serves as pastor. The debt of \$200 which rested on the property a year ago has been taken care of. Friends of the mission have made gifts of chancel furniture and a communion rail.

In the annual report of St. Thomas' (deaf) Mission, the Rev. Dr. Cloud

usually tells us of his official acts over a wide stretch of territory. East of the Mississippi there are twelve missionaries to the deaf. From the Mississippi to the Sierras and from Mexico to Canada the Church has no representative among the deaf but Dr. Cloud. And he, as he sometimes phrases it, is doing Church work as a "side line," being engaged in the public schools of St. Louis "to pay expenses." I am not sure that we are doing all that we ought to want to do for the spiritual needs of our silent brethren.

As the year was closing, the Rev. J. J. Clopton, who had done five and a half years of most effectual missionary work in southeast Missouri with Cape Girardeau as his base, gave his resignation to the vestry of Christ Church which was accepted to take effect May 1. We thank him for what he has done for us.

One new man has come to my field in the last twelve months, the Rev. J. G. Seacord, who, as vicar of St. Peter's, St. Louis, is in charge of Epiphany Chapel.

The Rev. Samuel M. Dorrance, after having served as Chaplain at Jefferson Barracks for sixteen months, was honorably discharged May 1. Mr. Dorrance came to the work as civilian chaplain by my appointment and his salary was at first provided by the Church Club of the diocese. Last June he was commissioned a First Lieutenant by the War Department and appointed chaplain. His ministrations were of a sort to bring spiritual help to all who needed help and his life counted for much in strengthening the morale of the army post. The diocese may congratulate itself that it was the means of introducing such an exceptional man to so important a duty at such a critical time.

Salaries.

I told you a year ago that the average salary in my rural field was \$1,100 and a simple house, and \$1,170 and a house in the city. In several instances congregations have acted favorably on my expressed desire that the salary of the minister should be increased. The most conspicuous advance is that reported by St. Augustine's, St. Louis which has increased from \$700 to \$1,200 in fourteen months. Fredericktown, with its 14 communicants, is showing some betterment; Crystal City, with 50 communicants, has raised its \$300 to \$600 in two years; Mexico, with 40 communicants, has raised its \$600 to \$800; Cape Girardeau, with 70 communicants, will increase from \$700 to \$900 and a house. All this is to the good, and I make my gracious bow with grateful thanks. But we must not stop here. How am I to get a good man to fill a vacancy if I must offer a salary which is less than the wage which is paid to some illiterate vagrant in the same community whose only equipment is a shovel and a hoe? Is it right? Last autumn a man wrote me turning down a proposition which was \$1,200 and a house and said, "If a man goes into a parish to take his place prominently in the community, he must have sufficient salary to do so. Laymen must face the fact that, if the Church is to get anywhere, things must be done in such a way as to command the attention of business men who have not the inclination to spend their time and means on small things. Your call appeals to me strongly, but I cannot consider it." I have gotten practically that same answer twenty times in the last year. Something must be done, I think, if we are to "carry on." We are behind the procession. The Bishop of Arkansas, our near neighbor asked his convention last year to consider \$1,500 and a house as the minimum "living wage" for the clergy. In the army a First Lieutenant Chaplain here at home gets \$2,000 and his house. The university of Arkansas at Fayetteville has 700 students. The university of Missouri at Columbia has 3,300. The diocese of Arkansas

helps to maintain a rector at Fayetteville at \$1,800 and a rectory. The salary of the rector at Columbia is \$1,200 and a rectory. All manner of business prospectuses speak of the effort of employers to *do the fair thing* by men and to reimburse them as liberally as possible for their services now that the war rush is ended. They also speak of the necessity that schedules of wages should be revised and adjusted to changes in food prices and living costs. It is not difficult to ascertain what the words "High Cost of Living" really signify. The Mechanics-American National Bank in St. Louis recently printed in a financial letter, that the rise in retail food prices from October, 1914, to October, 1918, reached 73 per cent. And someone has said that the Christian ministry is the single exception to the general advance that has been made in the remuneration of industrial and professional labor. We in the mission field of this diocese are paying practically what we paid for salaries when a dollar bought what costs us a dollar and seventy-five cents now. This Church in its social service commission has long been insistently pressing upon employers "the iniquity and immorality of less than a living wage." If the cry of the laborers who reap the fields and mine the coal and weave the fabrics in the factories enters the ears of the Lord of Sabaoth because of hire kept back, have we any reason to suppose that a Church can prosper which neglects its duty toward its ministry? If it commends itself to this convention, I should be glad of some expression of your approval (leaving room of course for special treatment of special cases) of the Bishop Coadjutor's desire to provide for every clergyman the equivalent of \$1,500 and a house.

After the War.

A thousand years from now no more splendid story will be written than the story of how Albert Leopold, King of the Belgians, gave answer when Germany offered him money and said, "We will pay you in minted gold when we have reached our goal." "Thy money perish with Thee! Belgium would lose here honor thus," said Albert. And back of King Albert stood the King of kings, the Lord of the whole earth, sworn ally from that moment of Belgium's king in Belgium's righteous cause. The principle at stake was clear, namely, that the sacred rights of smaller nations to exist should not perish from the earth. Into the controversy came other nations, England, France, Italy, Russia. America came also. Making an offering of life that was truly sacrificial, two millions of the best blood of our nation flung themselves into the mightiest conflict in all history because America "would lose her honor" to do any otherwise.

"And the battle boiled and seethed and bubbled and rose and fell,
In the rocking cauldron, over the coals of hell."

What we owe to those allies whose line, worn often very thin, surged to and fro and twisted and bent but never broke and furnished us a wall under whose defense we trained our men and assembled our equipment, we shall never know. But we shall not forget our debt to them if words begin to form on our lips to boast that "America won the war." What happened was that America came gloriously in at the decisive moment and dealt the determining blows before which the biggest war machine the world had ever seen broke into shivers. A thousand years from now no more splendid picture will be painted than the picture of Belgium's King, scorned by the Hohenzollern emperor as too insignificant to stand against the power of Germany, riding back into his Brussels capital amid the hosannas of his people at the end of four tragic years in which Belgium lost everything and saved her soul; at the very moment when the German kaiser was a fugitive in a land not his and eight affiliated European monarchs had renounced their crowns; at the very moment when Admiral Beatty was issuing

the order from his British flagship to seventy-one surrendering German warships, "The German flag will be hauled down at sunset today. It will not be hoisted again without permission." And that night Admiral Beatty directed a thanksgiving service to be held on his flagship "for the victory Almighty God had vouchsafed." Yes, we have had in this war a demonstration of the fact that God is an energizing personal Being who stands up to maintain His own cause; that the Judge of all the earth may be trusted in the long run to do right. Well is it that we give thanks to God continually who hath made bare His holy arm in the sight of all the nations.

Splendid men they were who went out from our homes, "the cleanest army ever sent by any nation into any war." Some homes are sad and hearts are stricken because of father, husband, brother, son, who don't come back when it's over over there. We pray Christ's tenderest compassion on those who mourn.

"For those to whom the call has come,
We pray Christ's tender welcome home;
The toil, the bitterness all past,
We trust them to His love at last."

Some come back stronger in soul and body than when they went away. Some must limp and go disfigured all their days in consequence of what befell them at the front. The wounds they bear are the chastisement of our peace—let us say it reverently. Our grateful thanks to all who fought to keep us safe and to preserve our liberties! And the men and the women who went over in the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A., and the surgeons and the nurses, and the men and the women and the children who stuck at home and denied themselves and made their contributions to "carry on"—these all have given a real interpretation to the words of the Lord Jesus when He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

We Must Clean Up.

In a great address, in Trinity Church, Boston, shortly after the armistice, Bishop Lawrence said: "The first thing that the people of this city and state have to do to prepare to welcome the returning soldiers is to clean up. In the question of drink and morals the men and boys of our armies and navies are more temperate and cleaner than the men and boys of the towns and cities and villages of Massachusetts."

We must set about "to clean up." And where shall we begin? Suffer my words of earnest exhortation. Some of you will say to me that the question of the liquor traffic has been settled; why speak about that? No, it is not settled yet. What has happened is that 45 out of 48 of our sovereign states have ratified an Act of Congress abolishing, after a certain date, the manufacture and sale of beverage liquors. Those who enacted the law constitute the legislative department of our nation. *The law may at some subsequent time be modified or even repealed.* But if it is now written in the Constitution, it is up to Christian people to help to make the law effective. Some say that the recent legislation has been accomplished by skillful tacticians in opposition to the popular will. The facts do not bear out that statement. There has been no referendum, I know. But, through a long stretch of years the question has been discussed and debated. Many kinds of effort expressive of the public will have been made to restrict the liquor traffic. As a result of these experiments it has become increasingly doubtful whether any restriction is practicable short of absolute suppression. And so that "public opinion" which Bryce has called "the real ruler of America," having made trial of local option and state prohibition, has registered itself in the eighteenth amendment. At least, so it seems to me; and not

by the legislatures of a bare constitutional majority of three-fourths of all the states, but by the legislatures of all the states but three.

I am familiar with the "personal liberty" argument as applied to this question. I have read Mr. Gilbert K. Chesterton's query in a recent London "New Witness." "If a man does not own his own body, what does he own?" to which one answer is, "Ye are bought with a price!" I am familiar with the "personal liberty" argument. But Phillips Brooks has reminded us that "liberty is the fullest opportunity for man to be and do the very best that is possible for him."

Judged by this definition, how does the objection that the suppression of the liquor traffic is an infringement on personal liberty stand? I am familiar with the "personal liberty" argument. I am also aware, as you are, that we have just escaped from the grip of the bloodiest tyrant in all history because of the sacrifices made by those who rejoiced to lay aside their own personal liberty in order that they might set at liberty them that were bound. We are hearing much about the rights of people; but a justice of the United States Supreme Court has said that a license to do that which is odious and against common right is necessarily an outrage upon the equal rights of citizens. Liberty? The Supreme Court of the United States has said, "As this is a business attended with danger to the community, it may be entirely prohibited." Liberty? The Supreme Court of the United States has recently reaffirmed the principle which has often been affirmed by the courts, that liberty of speech does not mean liberty to incite men to crime. Does liberty to drink and to sell mean liberty to incite men to crime? But the crime curve and the drink curve are pretty closely related in this country, don't you know they are? Bishop Lawrence, a man not given over much to raising a panic or even creating a sensation, has felt it his duty to print and scatter broadcast recently an address of his at Harvard University touching the conflagration of "social evil" diseases which threatens to burn up our people. And because the "social evil" and the drink evil are so inextricably intertwined, has the nation no right to rise up and shackle the ravisher of our sisters, the ruiner of our daughters, the destroyer of our brothers and our sons?

We are speaking of the crime curve and the drink curve. We all cheered when General Pershing's address to the first troops landed in France was repeated here at home: "You will be courteous to all women and never have so much as an evil thought in your mind. You will be very tender and gentle with little children. You will do well, therefore, to forswear the use of all liquors." What is the significance of Pershing's choice of that word "Therefore"? Does he mean to imply that there is some traceable connection between the "use of liquors" and "discourtesy to women, evil thoughts in the mind, harshness and ungentleness and cruelty toward children"? Precisely that. I do not say that every liquor dealer deliberately co-operates in maintaining a bawdy house. But the saloon and the brothel are often found to be close partners. Social service experts who have written in the last few weeks in approval of the eighteenth amendment tell us that they are more than sure that drink is "the very most potent urge to prostitution"; that "the happiness and peace of women and the welfare and health of children will, by the new legislation, be immeasurably increased." We introduce many resolutions into diocesan conventions and provincial synods for the establishment of a social state where every individual shall have a chance for living a full human life. Go to the east part of St. Louis and observe how "full" a very considerable cross-section of the human life is over there! We have looked into the dark alleys of our cities. We have even heard sad stories of some of the boulevards which stretch on beyond the limits where the red light districts are supposed to stop. We have studied the surveys of Flexner and Kneeland and the rest and have learned

how the traffic in drink and the traffic in women are not two separate problems but one identical problem. The business has become so heartless, so unscrupulous; the places where liquors are sold at retail have many of them become so full of vomit and filthiness and uncleanness!

It is an old, old saying that you can never make a nation virtuous by Act of Parliament. But we are not talking now about making a nation virtuous. We are talking about putting a pestilence under quarantine. We are not talking about making drunkards sober by legislation. We are talking about putting down an abomination. I am not affirming that the form of legislation of the eighteenth amendment is the best thinkable. The method which was taken to prohibit the poison growth of Prussianism was not the best thinkable. But, in the language of the Pastoral Letter of the House of Bishops last April, "It was the only way open to us." The question now is, shall we of this Church, who liked the Constitution better when it had only seventeen amendments, continue to teach our people (and shall our people strive to follow the teaching) "Whosoever resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God?" I am not a member of the Prohibition party. I have never been. I know the taste of many wines and liquors, and, frankly, the taste is agreeable to me. I will go further and say I like them, perhaps, as much as any one of you. But I never drink them. I care just as much for a glass of beer as any one of you. But I never take a glass. I lived to be fifty years old and had cast my ballot thirty times before I ever cast a vote for prohibition. And now that the law has been enacted, I feel in duty bound to say, and to say it here and now, that to render aid and comfort to those who would seek to obstruct the operation of the law is criminal. I am not saying it were criminal to work for its repeal. But why should Christian folk work for its repeal?

In the middle of the last century in England Mrs. Browning wrote "The Cry of the Children," ending with the lines:

"They look up with their pale and sunken faces,
And their look is dread to see,
For they mind you of their angels in high places,
With eyes turned on Deity.
'How long,' they say, 'how long, O cruel nation,
Will you stand, to move the world, on a child's heart,
Stifle down with a mailed heel its palpitation,
And tread onward to your throne amid the mart?
Our blood splashes upward, O gold-heaper,
And your purple shows your path;
But the child's sob in the silence curses deeper
Than the strong man in his wrath.'"

What was Mrs. Browning aiming at? The emancipation of women and girls employed as beasts of burden in mines and collieries. With what result? The mine-owners were up in arms. For why? They feared for shrinking profits. Lord Shaftesbury then entered upon a noble crusade. The sunken faces of the children and the shrunk forms of the women chased him as his shadow, and their look was dread to see. He undertook to prohibit their employment. And when the standpatters stood pat on the proposition that the proposed prohibition was an infringement on the theory of "personal liberty," Lord Shaftesbury rose up like a man of wrath and said, "Theory or no theory, this state of things is intolerable." And an Act of Parliament was passed prohibiting forever, after a certain limited period, the harnessing of girls and women to produce enormous profits for the owners of England's collieries and mines.

I do not deliberately strive to give offense to any by speaking unpalatable truths. But if the truths ought to be spoken, I ought not to be silent.

Now that a stringent liquor law has been put into the Constitution, we are compelled to ask whether the Church has no other way of viewing this problem than she had before the war which enlisted 2,000,000 of our best and strongest citizenship, for what? To put down the principle that a bunch of privileged people could be permitted to be a menace to the whole round world. We may poke fun at the amendment if we like. One editor facetiously remarks how ridiculous it would be to think of drinking tea with a Welsh rarebit, or to take the hissing urn on a fishing trip up the Sound or down the river. Another suggests that some congress may presently pass a nineteenth amendment making the consumption of coffee a crime. But when all our fun-poking is over, it stands on record that, when it was imperative that our defenses against Germany be made as strong as possible, we established dry zones around shipyards and munition factories and other war industries. When we dared to take no chances in the matter of national security, one of the first things that we did was to stop the flow not of tea nor of coffee, but of booze. Let us not forget that "we have a civilization to sustain as well as to save." The eighteenth amendment has been ratified. Is it or is it not the Church's business to teach that a Bolshevism which is condemned in Russia must not be condoned at home?

Christian Fellowship.

I have somewhere read that Cecil Rhodes once put in writing and for a long time carried in his pocket some splendid dream that he was cherishing which did eventually come true. And now and again, amid the petty details of his office, he would suddenly pull out of his pocket the paper on which his dream was written, and reassure himself by a new consideration of what it was that he was aiming at. There are encouraging evidences that leaders in the churches are keeping within reach the documents which contain the record of some of the splendid dreams of Christian Unity covering the past fifty years; that they are taking them out of their pockets to consult them frequently and to try to determine what it is that the churches should be aiming at. It would be strange if it were otherwise in the world which we are living in just now. If it is true, as we know it is, that the Hohenzollern power never could have been battered down by a dozen armies fighting under a dozen different banners, so is it true that that old serpent the devil will never capitulate so long as we continue to fight him in a split church. There are on the earth, it may be, 500,000,000 of professing Christians, broken into I don't know how many hundred sectors, these sectors all occupied in watching one another instead of making a concerted drive against the foe. Something similar to that went on in Europe for a time during this great world war. There was a perilous dividing of those who were enlisted for the fight. But it was clear that only by massing forces could the enemy be driven back. It was clear that Pershing was not in France to secure the glory for the Yanks. Haig and Smuts were not there to make America's strength look contemptible in comparison with that of England. The manhood and the womanhood of all the allied peoples agreed that nothing else mattered but to hammer back the Hun. The lesson is plain.

"Impossible," you say, "that Episcopalians should associate themselves with Methodists, Congregationalists, Baptists, Presbyterians and the rest for the carrying on of any Christian warfare." And yet, when the truth of the matter is sought and found, is there anything absolutely fundamental which separates these bodies from each other, or any one or all of them from us? Is anything lacking in them of those "necessary things" for the defense of which the believers of the early centuries were mocked and scourged, were bound and imprisoned, were afflicted, tormented, were stoned, sawn asunder, slain with the sword! The Y. M. C. A.

has no point of contact with the Knights of Columbus or with the Jew, nor have any of these any dealings with the Salvation Army. And yet, because the enemy was so clearly visualized and was coming on so fast, these all lined up, shoulder to shoulder, and with them two organizations entirely secular, the War Camp Community Service and the American Library Association. And almost as soon as this combination of forces was put into action, backed by liberal offerings and fortified by heavenstorming prayers, Germany's red flag came down and her flag of truce went up. And yet, it was an infinitely more impossible feat for these seven organizations to get together and pray together and work together and share together the successes of their efforts, than for us of this Church to co-operate with our brethren of other names in carrying forward the message of the gospel of Christ.

There is a tide in the affairs of nations. That tide was taken at the full and by leaps and bounds led on to fortune, when Pershing and Haig and Foch and Petain agreed that they *would*, and, without repudiating any fundamental principle which their constituencies in America or England or France or Italy held dear, they *could*, form an alliance of all their fighting forces for the defeat of him who was bent on ruling the world in wickedness. There is a tide in the affairs of churches. If we believe that what Jesus prayed for, "that they all may be one," is not yet accomplished according to the intention of His prayer, may we not think that the tide is just now at the full, or nearly so? Ought we to strive to prepare to "take" it? Or must we watch it swell and full and ebb and flow and permit it to leave us high and dry?

Mons and Gallipoli and Verdun are words that thrill whenever they are spoken. But there is a remembrance associated with the mention of these names that we Americans would fain forget and that is this: that France and England hoped that America would help them make those great offensives, and hoped in vain. Said the Bishop of Oxford, speaking in Chicago not long before the armistice, "We on our side of the Atlantic hail your America as the saviour of the world. But we claim that to France and England belongs the credit that any world was left that could be saved." Are the other churches wondering why we hesitate to join them in some offensive, as France and England wondered and called out, "We need you. We need you now. We can hold on, but not forever. And it is not enough to just hold on. We must push forward!" In almost every quarter of the globe, sometimes by efforts to re-unite parts of one communion, sometimes by attempting to bring together entire communions not differing much in discipline or worship, the desire is demonstrated for an alliance of Christian forces in some sort similar to the alliance of fighting forces that strangled Germany. Have we, really, sympathy with that desire?

Who are these Christian brethren from whom we are separated and they from us? (No matter who was originally responsible for the cleavage. When the fate of the world hung upon the question whether Haig and Pershing would put their forces side by side, no one cared a button about who was responsible for spilling the tea in Boston Harbor a century and a half ago.) Who are these brethren who approach us with the wish that we should join with them and they with us in fellowship and service? Baptized with water in the Triune name, have they not as effectually as we been made members of the body of Christ? Are not the beliefs which they hold as absolutely essential the beliefs which Paul insists upon in his epistles? Are they not the beliefs which martyrs and confessors held who were thrown to the wild beasts in the Roman amphitheatre by the persecutors of the early Christian Church? The willing and praying and acting together of peoples who sank all differences that could be sunk without a betrayal of a sacred trust and united in a dogged determination that the Prussian power

must be broken in pieces like a potter's vessel has in these last days rescued the world from the reign of intolerable tyranny and cruelty and lust. Are we right in thinking that one lesson that God would teach us by the war is that this is not a time for churches to elaborate plans to shut members of Christ off from other members of Christ by a still higher fence, with barbed wire stretched across the top and knotholes all plugged up; that this is not a time for us of this communion to continue to reiterate our "sorrow for our aloofness in the past," and to treat too often with scant courtesy those who eagerly approach us with the anxious hope that they and we together, by the Holy Spirit's aid, may find a way by which the middle walls of partition may be broken down?

Not many summers ago I was preaching in a village where there was no worship of the Congregational sort, and one of the worshippers with us was a distinguished minister of Christ, president of a Congregational theological school which is classed among the best in this country. The rector gave notice that there would be a celebration of the Holy Communion on the following Sunday. Said my Congregational friend to me as we exchanged greetings at the door. "Do you think that Rector So and So would permit me to come to the Holy Communion next Sunday, with my wife?" (The wife, by the way, had been raised in the Church of England.) And that night I fell to thinking how Bishop McCormick, home from France, having jurisdiction of our chaplains at the front, had told us at a meeting of the clergy here in St. Louis that our chaplains over there were "instructed to *invite* to the Holy Communion Christian men of all churches." And I fell to wondering whether we truly have the mind of Christ when we retain in our Book of Common Prayer a rubric which does not, *ex animo*, encourage us to welcome to "the Lord's own service" a Christian man who is daily going over the top against spiritual wickedness, that he may strengthen and refresh his soul as a comrade in arms with us at one Holy Table of the Lord! I fell to wondering whether we truly have the mind of Christ when it has come to pass that a fellow member of Christ, of sublime faith, whose credentials of having been "*admitted into* the fellowship of Christ's religion" in the sacrament of baptism are not doubted, who finds himself in a village where there is no church but ours, must stop at the door of the church and ask whether he would be "permitted" to "draw near with faith" to the Holy Table and take with us the other of the two sacraments which Christ hath ordained in His Church and put himself in touch with this special channel of the grace which assists us to "*continue in* that holy fellowship and to do all such good works as He hath prepared for us to walk in!"

Dear people, I am not presuming to suggest any platform of Christian Unity. I am expressing my earnest conviction that these are days in which we have a more compelling duty than simply to hold our membership against possible dangers of centrifugence. Is it necessary for us or good for the world that we should "dig in" any more securely? These are wondrous days of opportunity for fellowship with all who worship Jesus Christ as God and Lord.

"God grant us wisdom in these coming days,
And eyes unsealed that we clear visions see
Of that new world that He would have us build,
To life's ennoblement and His high ministry."

APPENDIX No. 5.

Report of the Country Home for Convalescents.

As many of you may know, the plans for starting this home were submitted to the Bishops and Clergy of St. Louis at a luncheon held at the City Club in March, 1917, and after a full discussion were unanimously indorsed, and the support of the parishes promised by the Clergy present.

While we have had possession of the house and farm at Kirkwood since April, 1917, it was not until September, 1918, that the directors felt sufficiently encouraged financially to commence receiving patients. Since that time, however, we have maintained the home, and have cared for as many patients as our limited accommodations would permit.

Because of its beautiful location and immaculate, homelike character, the house is admirably adapted for the work of caring for convalescent women needing rest and good food and cheery environment, that they may quickly regain their strength and return to society strong and well and heartened.

The home has been inspected by the Charities Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce and the Central Council of Social Agencies, and has received their unqualified indorsement, both as to the need of the work, the way we are doing it and the financial management.

As a result of this investigation, the home was elected to membership in the Central Council of Social Agencies.

The real work of the home, and the results accomplished, is a human story which cannot be told in any formal report, and can only be known and understood by those in everyday association with the women who come to us—many of whom tell us that this is their first experience of the meaning of the word home.

Miss Tatum, our superintendent, ably assisted by our housekeeper, Mrs. Henneburg, is doing splendid work and has endeared herself to her patients by her wise, womanly and loving care.

Our farm superintendent, Mr. J. A. Brennan, who came to us early this year, after service in France, where he won his commission as Lieutenant, has had wide experience in farm work, is a most efficient and conscientious worker and we are fortunate in having his services.

Much work has been done, and much has yet to be done, to bring the farm to a proper standard of productivity, and the home to the size necessary; but it is the judgment of the Board of Directors that the time has come when the question as to whether the home shall be continued or discontinued should be laid before this convention, because of the fact that the support of our people is not yet sufficient for our needs, and we cannot continue without sufficient funds.

Our total receipts from 114 subscribers and from sales of farm produce are:

From April, 1917, to Jan. 1, 1919.....	\$8,639.40
And from Jan. 1, 1919, to May 1, 1919.....	2,863.53
Loans	1,000.00
Total	\$12,502.93

Of this sum, \$4,180.41 has been used to pay part of the purchase price of the property, and for interest on the mortgage; \$3,432.56 has been used for two years' labor on the farm improvements, moving and rebuilding barn, purchase of stock, and feed and supplies for stock and for farm; \$1,948.49 has been used to furnish the home and for equipment; \$1,808.67 has been used for food and supplies, and for salaries of superintendent and house-keeper; \$989.77 has been used for incidental expenses. Total expenditures, \$12,359.90.

We have bills outstanding, for lumber, new roof, interest, supplies and current bills amounting to approximately \$2,500.00 and still owe for balance due on purchase price \$13,375.00.

It is imperative that the Home be enlarged so as to enable it to care for a sufficient number of patients to use the food the farm is able to produce, and also to average our overhead expense.

Unless this is done, we shall lose the approval and confidence of the Chamber of Commerce and the Central Council of Social Agencies, and such a calamity would be a distinct reflection on the vision of the men and women of our church, for in no other field is there greater opportunity for constructive social service, nor one where the visible rewards are more apparent. We may not be able to do more than fight against the economic wrongs which are responsible for so much of the misery and suffering in the world, but through this blessed charity we can bind up the wounds of some of those who have been broken in the struggle; we can bring the Kingdom of Heaven into their lives; we can help them to become strong and vigorous, and clean, useful members of society.

If the Home is to be continued,

SUMMARIZED: We must have:

- (a) Money for outstanding bills; money for operation of the Home; money for new building; money for completion of purchase price.
- (b) A strong Committee, of devoted women, who will assist the present Board in working out plans for the betterment of the Home, and in raising money in small and large amount.
- (c) Men and women, to whom God has given home and friends, and the comforts of this life more abundantly than to some of their brothers and sisters; who will answer the call; who believe that the question is not "how much of their money they shall give to God," but "How much of God's money may they keep for themselves."

We, therefore, respectfully ask this convention for its counsel and advice, as to whether this work shall be continued or discontinued, and should it be the judgment of the convention that the work be continued, we ask that our presiding Bishop be empowered to appoint a Committee of men and women, to investigate and assist the present Board in the work of the Home, and to make a vigorous and immediate campaign for the funds necessary to put the Home in such financial condition as will enable it to fulfill its mission.

APPENDIX No. 6.

Report of Church News Committee.

The Church News Committee has tried to keep the expenses down to a minimum. We inherited a debt to the former Editor of \$112.50 and an unpaid bill to the Freegard Press of \$54.25, with \$48.52 in the bank. During the year we spent \$54.33 for cuts to help make the paper a better paper and although we only spent \$8.00 for addressing, it will cost the next Committee at least \$24.00 unless the new Committee addresses its wrappers.

We addressed all the wrappers for the first eight months, but found it advisable for the last four months to pay to have this work done. The cost of printing has gone up and the Government ruled this year that papers could not make exchanges and therefore we were obliged to pay for a few necessary Church papers.

The bad feature of our report is that subscriptions are not increasing, or at least we believe that 600 subscribers is about all that can be counted on.

At one time during the year a meeting of the Clergy was called to discuss subscription lists, after which meeting a number of copies of the Church News were sent out together with a letter signed by the different Clergy, which gave us some new subscriptions, but still 600 is about the limit that this Committee has been able to get. A solicitor would, we believe, cost more than such an expense would warrant.

In order that the Church News might start out with all bills paid, some donations were solicited and the committee wish to thank Misses Welhelmina and Gertrude Mitchell, Mrs. George D. Barnard, Mr. Homer P. Knapp and one other person who donated \$375.00. If this money had not been received this Committee could not report ALL BILLS PAID and paid promptly.

The Committee has not solicited many ads, as it could not do so conscientiously. We believe it not fair, generally, to ask people to advertise, as the returns would be too small. We preferred to ask for donations.

The total expenses for the year were \$1,385.14, and for the information of the Convention we are told that printing, paper, etc., will cost 20% more during the coming year. If the paper is kept at its present size, and without figuring on any advances in prices, our estimate for a budget for next year will be about \$1,350.00. We will show below an itemized statement of receipts and expenses, together with an itemized list showing our idea for the next year's budget. We do not believe it fair to ask any committee to handle this work another year unless the Convention votes the Committee \$600.00 for the year instead of \$300.00. This, in our opinion, is little enough.

In estimating the amount necessary for the next Committee we assume that the subscription list will total about \$600.00, the advertisements about \$30.00, the sale of extra copies of Church News about \$25.00, while at the present date there is cash on hand in the bank amounting to \$77.77. This makes a total of \$732.77, which, deducted from estimated budget of \$1,351.25, will leave a necessary amount to raise of \$618.48. To meet this deficit of \$618.48 is the Committee's reason for asking the Convention to give the new Church Committee at least \$600.00 for their next year's work.

APPENDIX No. 7.

**Special Committee on the Aged and Infirm Clergy
Fund and the Church Pension Fund.**

To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

St. Louis, Mo., May 20th, 1919.

We, the undersigned Committee appointed by the Bishop of Missouri, during the recess of Convention, "to consider the whole question of the relation of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese and its beneficiaries to the Church Pension Fund, with a view of merging the said Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund with the Church Pension Fund and the taking over of the obligations of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund to its beneficiaries in this Diocese," respectfully report the following conclusions and recommendations:

1. We have carefully considered "the whole question of the relation of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese and its beneficiaries to the Church Pension Fund," and have also closely studied the contractual agreement upon which the Church Pension Fund requires the merging of Diocesan Clergy Funds to be made; and whereas it appears that the Church Pension Fund cannot extend the full benefits of the Pension Fund to the beneficiaries of our Diocesan Fund we are unanimously of the opinion that neither their interests nor those of the Diocese would be furthered by the merging of our said Fund with the Church Pension Fund, and do therefore recommend that this Convention do resolve to retain and maintain intact the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese for the purposes of which it was designed.

2. We unanimously recommend that, whereas the third resolution presented by "The Church Pension Fund Committee," and adopted by the Diocesan Convention of 1915 (Appendix No. 3, page 84, of the Journal of the Seventy-sixth Convention), was predicated on the enrollment of the beneficiaries of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of the Diocese as beneficiaries of the Church Pension Fund, with all the benefits of said Fund, thereby protecting their rights and in increasing their annual stipends; and, whereas the Diocese is notified that the Trustees cannot under the contractual obligations of the Church Pension Fund enroll the beneficiaries of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund in the Church Pension Fund as contemplated, in Resolution No. 3 of 1915, this Convention do now rescind the action taken by the Convention of 1915 in the adoption of the said Resolution.

3. We recommend that our people be encouraged to support our Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund by their offerings as heretofore; and that, whereas all the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese are under obligation to pay the

APPENDIX No. 12.

Report of Social Service Commission.

Members of the Convention:

Following is the report of the Social Service Commission, Diocese of Missouri:

Much is said about what the returning soldiers will require of the Church. The least requirement would seem to be that the Church should stand for justice in economic relations. And, very practically, this justice ought to be evidenced first in the speedy and liberal re-employment of the returning men. It is the judgment of your Commission that such re-employment ought not to have been and ought not to be left to the voluntary pleasure of individual employers, but that a definite, national plan should be put into effect. The general features of such a plan ought to include the pensioning of all wage earners over sixty years of age, the return to home and school of all under eighteen, application of the principle of the eight-hour law, the institution of public works, and the settlement of the soldiers on vacant land. It should also be borne in mind that men who have gone through such an experience as the war will not be content with any monotonous or treadmill or cheap job.

Readers of the Church News will recall that the Commission has published in the Social Service Column a number of brief articles dealing with the education of handicapped children. It was shown, for instance, that the semi-sighted child could, by special methods of instruction, acquire an education which is denied him under present conditions. Crippled, deaf and partially deaf, anemic, tubercular and mentally defective children can all be educated by methods adopted to their several needs. The Missouri Legislature has just passed a law requiring that public school districts shall establish special classes for these defectives.

Have those conducting Sunday Schools thoroughly appreciated the handicaps of children of this type and the necessity of modifying methods of instruction to insure to them the full benefits of spiritual training?

The Church has always recognized the need of hospitals and dispensaries, and has ever been foremost in establishing and maintaining these very necessary institutions. It has provided these helps toward cure, but has it always recognized and put into practice the very much simpler means of prevention of disease? Has it, in respect to the Child's House of Worship, the Sunday School, kept pace with the hygienic advances of the public school?

The school architect has solved the problem of ventilation in the school room. Has the architect of the Sunday School sought to insure an abundance of fresh air in the often overcrowded Sunday School room? Great care is taken to seat school children so that their books shall be illuminated by light coming over the left shoulder. Is this question ever considered in Sunday Schools? The Health Department gives information of the existence of contagious disease in homes to the school superintendent so that he may debar the brothers and sisters of the sick children and thus prevent the spread of contagion. Is this information ever sought by Sunday School superintendents so that like measures can be taken? During the "Flu" epidemic the Health Department closed Sunday as well as day schools, recognizing the likelihood of the spread of disease through any gathering of children. Contagious and infectious diseases are always with us (though not always in epidemic form), and the Sunday School should not be behind the public school in adopting measures to safeguard the health of its little charges.

Your Commission is convinced that the time has come also for the Church as an organization to take cognizance of and sympathetic interest in the motion picture business. Motion pictures seem to us to offer the best opportunity not only for wholesome and inexpensive amusement, but also for definite instruction about historical and religious subjects and the Church should work not for a merely repressive censorship of films, but for the improvement of conditions surrounding the presentation of the pictures and also for better pictures. Picture theatres must be made safe for women and children to attend without annoyance or moral danger, and the pictures without being namby-pamby or goody-goody, ought to have a wholesome tone and a worth-while subject. Picture producers claim that such pictures are not as profitable as the unworthy pictures. If this is true, it would seem a more constructive policy on the part of the Church to help make the good pictures profitable by using them in parish houses, rather than to depend upon the "Thou shalt not" of a censorship.

A recent survey of the Diocese discloses the following interesting facts concerning the social service work being done by the Church. Several parishes have taken an interest in the poor and needy, supplying food, clothing, and even fuel, where necessary. They have also looked after the sick, arranging for medical attention at the various clinics and hospitals of the city. One parish in particular has done considerable work in connection

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with the Tuberculosis Society, and several have been actively engaged in work connected with the Juvenile Court and the Children's Aid Society. One parish, through its Sunday School, has supplied gifts for the boys at the Industrial School, and several parishes have helped bring joy to the inmates of the various city institutions through the City Missionary. Leaders and workers are being trained for social service work through the Sunday School and Junior Auxiliary of a few parishes. In not a few parishes and missions recreation and amusements are provided, and people are being taught how to live well balanced lives. A kindly interest is taken in those whose lives would otherwise be devoid of true friendship. Twenty-five voluntary workers are being supplied by five parishes and missions for work at the city institutions. Our City Missionary is in need of many more such workers. Practically every report shows that a great deal of work has been done for the Red Cross and other war agencies. As stated in the last issue of The Church News, we are greatly handicapped in our work with the Juvenile Court in that we have no home in which to place those children turned over to us by the courts.

In view of the approaching prohibition of intoxicating liquor the duty of the Church is clear. A number of the sectarian churches are making provision for this emergency. The Volunteers of America have already opened two places in the downtown district, where coffee, tea, lemonade, etc., are being served. One interesting case has been brought to our attention. A "drunk" who visited one of these coffee houses, demanded liquor, and upon being informed that it was not served there, asked what it was possible to get. The proprietor sold him a cup of coffee and gave him a sandwich gratis. After he had consumed this, he remarked, "Well, it was pretty good, after all." When we think of the possibility of reaching men through this means, would it not be advisable for each parish to undertake the management of one such "saloon" in its locality? Not only would we have an opportunity of influencing men outside the Church, but it would be a splendid way of getting our male communicants interested, and giving them some particular work to do. Supposing each parish opened one such place, where men could enjoy an evening playing games, and where light refreshments would be served, and made two or three men responsible for the management each evening, this would provide an interesting evening's work each week for a great number of our communicants; and think of the good we could do for the community and for the Church. Surely we cannot close our eyes and shut our ears to this opportunity.

Your Commission feels that the attention of the Church should be called to the existence of certain moral conditions in our city which did not prevail during the activities of the Federal Government in behalf of the moral welfare of our soldiers in and about our training camps. One does not have to travel very far in certain sections of our city before he is impressed with the fact that many temptations are openly awaiting the young manhood of our city. We feel the time has arrived for the Christian people of St. Louis to take whatever steps may be necessary to rid the city of the various inducements to immorality. We think the most practical method of attack upon this evil would be some such law as the Injunction and Abatement Law enforced in Chicago.

Finally, we would earnestly recommend to the Church in this Diocese the study of four great documents. Above all is the program of the British Labor Party, called by Bishop Brent the greatest religious document produced during the war. The nation of the future is compared to a house whose four pillars or supports must be the enforcements of the minimum wage, the democratic control of industry, a revolution of national finance, and the use of the surplus wealth for the common good. To quote from the program. "Its aim is a deliberately planned co-operation in production

and distribution for the benefit of all who participate in such production and distribution by hand or by brain."

The other three documents are largely based upon this one. We refer first to the Report of the Fifth Committee of Inquiry of the English Archbishops. This report insists that "a new spirit must be introduced into industry and economic life in general, which shall provide not only for co-operation for public service, but also for adequate remuneration of workers, proper conditions of employment, adequate leisure, and the prevention of unemployment."

Second, the reconstruction program of the Canadian Methodist Church, which declares against special privilege, unearned wealth, profiteering and the company-owned town, and declares for the nationalization of resources.

Third, the report of the Roman Catholic Bishops on Social Reconstruction, in which is urged a full share of labor in the profits of industry.

All these reports, together with the splendid utterances of our own Joint Commission on Social Service, indicate that the Churches of whatever name realize the social meaning and application of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For we who are Christian need not look afield to statesmen or economists for our guidance in this most exciting of centuries. We have only to read intelligently and discerningly the Bible and we shall find there perhaps, indeed, not every detail of the future political and economic organization, but certainly the great principles and the informing spirit upon which and by means of which the nation of the future, if it is to be Christian and is to care for the least of these Christ's brethren, must be built.

Afton and Palmyra.

Regular meetings have been held on the first Thursday of each month, except during the months of July, August, September and November. The November meeting was omitted on account of the influenza epidemic, but two meetings were held in October.

The tremendous increase in the cost of living has caused special attention to be given to the inadequate stipends of our missionaries, and wherever possible some measure of temporary relief has been afforded. It is the unanimous opinion of the Board that a complete readjustment of stipends must be made, and adequate incomes provided for our missionaries, commensurate with the present cost and standard of living.

After discussion by the Board, the Bishop appointed the Rev. John Boden, the Rev. J. C. Jones and Thomas Q. Dix a committee, empowered to "outline a plan for the more active participation by members of the Board in the missionary work of the Diocese." The report of the committee follows:

REPORT.

St. Louis Mo., October 3, 1918.

To the Bishops and Missionary Board, Diocese of Missouri:

At our last meeting a resolution was presented and adopted, calling for the appointment of a committee to "outline a plan for the more active participation by members of the Missionary Board in the missionary work of the Diocese."

Your committee met and discussed the missionary situation. We feel that the time has come to take hold of such work with a dogged determination to accomplish something worthy of our opportunities and ability. We are not unmindful of the multitudinous demands, financial and otherwise, made upon all of us at this time. Nevertheless, we are quite convinced that the work of the Church whatever it may require of us in time, money and effort, must be forwarded to the utmost of our ability. In the period of reconstruction that will follow the war we shall be confronted with industrial and social problems calling for the very best of thought and energy. The Church is doing its best to help solve many of our war problems, and it must also be ready to aid in the solution of our "after-the-war" problems. This can best be done by, to quote our President, "strengthening our Churches" at home. The time to prepare for such work is now. After the war it may be too late. This is the time to develop our fields and resources, and to bring our work, in all of its phases, to the highest point of efficiency. The time to carry out a specific, effective and aggressive program is the present. Your committee, therefore, feeling it to be a step in the right direction, offers for your serious consideration the following suggestions:

I. An acquaintance with the field and its work. We believe that the most of us are woefully ignorant of what is going on in our missionary territory, and we also believe it to be a fact that, aside from those directly connected with this work, we have not the slightest conception of what might be accomplished were the means and the men at our disposal. There are several ways in which a practical knowledge of such things may be acquired, namely:

1. *A map of the field*, by means of which we can fix in our minds the location of our Missions and the territory covered by each Mission or mis-

sionary. Maps play a very important part at the headquarters of an army, and such a thing can be utilized to good advantage by this Board in tracing the movement and work of Christ's army.

2. Members of the Missionary Board, both clergy and laity, should be required to visit our various Missions when such a thing can be practicably and conveniently done. Your committee feels that this would bring about two very good results, namely: (a) A more personal and intimate acquaintance with the missionary and his problems; (b) a better understanding of the field, its requirements and possibilities. The presence of a layman from this Board would do much towards stimulating the interest of laymen in the work of their particular Mission. The clergy of this Board would do well, and we are confident would be quite willing, upon such occasions to participate in the services, should such a thing commend itself to Bishop Johnson and the clergymen in charge. The conducting of a Preaching Mission might also add much to the work and interest of the Mission. After such visits the members could report their findings and impressions to the Board.

3. Missionaries should be present at some of our Board meetings. Through the Board, or, preferably, through Bishop Johnson, they should be required to come before us and present, each in his own way, a specific report of what is going on in his field, its difficulties, needs and opportunities for further service. In this connection it would be well for us to hear also of what is being done in the same field by other Churches. The missionary should have ample notice of what will be required of him, so that he may be duly and truly prepared to place before us such a vision as will send us to our knees, and thence to the Master's vineyard to use our faith, as another has expressed it, in doing concrete things for the building up of the Kingdom of God. Two items of expense will be involved in the carrying out of this suggestion—transportation and entertainment. Your committee feels that the matter of transportation should be taken care of by special contributions. The missionaries will be entertained by our city and neighboring clergy. Such an arrangement will serve two very good purposes; first, there will be no expense for entertainment; second, it will bring the country clergy into direct and personal touch with their city brethren. There are times when the clergyman stationed in the rural district feels that we have no interest in him or his problems. This will give opportunity for a more friendly and intimate relationship, and will send the man back to his work feeling convinced of our interest in him, his family and all that concerns him.

II. "*Committee on Public Information*," to acquaint our people with what is being done, and what ought to be done in missionary territory. The missionaries can present their work and problems to our city parishes. This, perhaps, can best be done during the week through our Auxiliaries, or other parochial organizations. When deemed convenient and advisable, it can be done in our Sunday services. The work of the Church at large is presented in such ways, and why not the work at our very doors?

III. "*A Board of Strategy*." This Board should be for work within the city, as well as in the rural districts, putting struggling Parishes and Missions on their feet, converting, when all the facts warrant it, a dependent Parish or a weak Mission into a producing plant. Also planting new Missions fully equipped as to means and men, whenever it may be deemed advisable. This may require a great sum of money. We have no desire to add to our present large and, in some instances, burdensome apportionments and assessments. Such special or strategic work should be turned over to the Church Club or other organized body of laymen. We believe our laymen would welcome the opportunity of doing something of the kind, and that they can do it as efficiently as has been done in other cities.

IV. Missionary work should be featured in The Church News. Not merely reports as to number of baptisms, confirmations, services, etc., but articles by the pen of the missionary, that will grip both the imagination and the heart.

V. Advisory Board to the Bishop Coadjutor. At our last Diocesan Council a Committee on the Bishop Coadjutor's Address made the following report, which was adopted, namely: "Your committee suggests that the Missionary Board of the Diocese might select six communicants of the Church, who, with such of their members as they may designate, shall constitute an Advisory Board to the Bishop Coadjutor; said Board to meet with the Bishops monthly, or at such stated periods as may be considered necessary." Your committee not only suggests, but recommends, that such an Advisory Board be selected. This to be done, of course, in conference with Bishop Johnson. There are many reasons for this. This recommendation, together with the foregoing suggestions, has many possibilities, and we believe the whole matter to be worthy of our time and prayerful consideration.

The Bishop also appointed the Rev. J. Courtney Jones and the Rev. Z. B. Phillips a committee to formulate a new Canon, enlarging the membership and scope of responsibility of the Board.

At a subsequent meeting this committee reported that Canon No. 9, as now written was, in their opinion, sufficiently broad in its scope to cover any proposed increase of activity by the members of the Missionary Board, the only change necessary being such as would permit an increase in the membership of the Board, for which purpose the following amendments were suggested:

"That Section 1 of Canon No. 9 be amended by striking out the words "three clergymen" and substituting the words "ten clergymen;" and by striking out the words "five laymen," and substituting the words, "twelve laymen," and by the addition of the words "no Parish can have more than one layman as a member of the Board."

By this change the membership of the Board would be increased from its present number of twelve to twenty-six, made up of two Bishops, two Deans of Convocations, ten Clergymen, twelve Laymen. Total, twenty-six.

The Board will need the sum of \$13,135 for the purpose of paying stipends to missionaries and the maintenance of the missionary work of the Diocese, and \$865 to pay the premiums to the Church Pension Fund on that part of stipends of missionaries to be paid by the Board, a total of \$14,000.

*To the Right Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri,
and the Right Rev. Frederick P. Johnson, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor:*

It is our pleasure and privilege to present to you the thirty-eighth annual report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, a report not quite so large as last year in money gifts, a little larger in boxes.

This has been a year of unusual conditions, with a new Constitution and a number of new officers, with impelling war work claiming many of our women, with the deadly influenza paralyzing for a time almost all branches of Auxiliary work, so, perhaps a smaller report ought not to surprise us.

Our pledges, however have been fully met, and thanks to our Treasurer, we have the largest gifts for General Missions ever made by our branch.

Personal boxes needed in the Diocese have been provided; two have gone to Deaconess Brainerd, besides one of altar linens for use in the Hospital Missions, and five to Deaconess Sniffen at Herculanum, and a gift of \$25 per month for her work, from an Auxiliary woman.

Five individual or parish boxes have been sent to Virginia, Tennessee and Oklahoma, and two splendid general boxes, valued at about \$950, from all the parishes to a Kentucky mountain school, and to the Shoshone Indian girls of Wyoming.

With the exception of Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming, in November, our speakers this year were all our own and our "Quiet Day" was most helpfully conducted by Rev. H. W. Mizner, of St. Stephen's House, to whom we give our grateful thanks.

One unexpected visitor came to us in January in the person of Miss Bowden, principal of St. Philip's Colored Industrial School at San Antonio, Texas, a "United Offering" missionary, and herself one of the best examples of the fine work of our Church schools for her race. It is needless to say she did not go away empty-handed.

Our pledges, however have been fully met, and thanks to our Treasurer, interest centered being for the education, for the diaconate of an Eskimo boy, a protege of Rev. Mr. Hoare of Alaska.

Our year, however, has not been given entirely to the material things of boxes and money. The "Advent Call," originally planned as the "war work of the Women's Auxiliary," was distinctly an effort to utilize the spiritual power of our women in a campaign of prayer, and was carried out in our diocese under the guidance of our First Vice-President, Mrs. E. F. Cushing, despite the fact that the influenza played havoc with her well-laid plans for preparation.

An important feature of the year's program was the Conference on "How can the Auxiliary reach the isolated Church woman?" which resulted in the appointment of a committee, with Mrs. Frederick F. Johnson as Chairman, to bring the subject before the annual meeting.

We are expecting mutual benefit from this effort at extension, and, to further increase interest in the Auxiliary, a motion to add two Vice-Presidents (one from the Northern and one from the Southern Convocation) will be presented at the same meeting.

We note with regret a marked falling off in the number and the work of our out-of-town branches, and we appeal to their clergy to help us in regaining their co-operation.

One other matter also brings sorrow to our hearts.

Our Treasurer, Mrs. T. Ewing White, who for twenty-five years has maintained such a wonderful standard of efficiency and devotion, and whose reports are miracles of accuracy and beauty, has announced that she can no longer continue in office.

How the Auxiliary can survive such an irreparable loss we do not know, but we can only trust that some portion of her mantle may fall upon her successor.

Our report would be incomplete without a mention of the Educational Secretary's Normal Mission Classes, which resulted in thirty parish classes, and of the United Offering membership "drive," which added many new names and materially increased this year's offering.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Report of Missionary to City Institutions.

Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson and Members of the Convention:

I have the honor to submit the report of the Hospital Missionary for the period from May 1, 1918, to May 1, 1919.

No report this year, of whatever organization, is complete without the alibi—namely, influenza—so, at the outset, let me state that there were about 100 fewer services and 300 fewer visits this year, because for more than two months the institutions were under rigid quarantine. When necessary we were allowed to visit, but unnecessary visits were discouraged. Nevertheless, 430 services were held and 3,408 visits made in the institutions and outside. This method of counting a visit to an institution simply as one visit, whereas, as a matter of fact, anywhere from five to twenty-five individual visits may be made in that one visit, is hardly fair to us, as long as the New York City Mission counts every individual visit; but, at any rate, you will see that we do not pad the figures to make a showing.

There have been 14 baptisms, 17 confirmations and 6 burials.

It is with fear and trembling that I mention the financial aspect of the work, because you may think that Hospital Missions are too prosperous. I beg you to remember that this is a kind of work which needs and can use an indefinite amount of money and that the money is spent just as fast as it is received. From the Board of Missions we received, exclusive of salaries, \$1,200, and from all other sources \$2,067.10, making a total of \$3,267.10. The expenditures were \$2,946.84, leaving a balance of \$320.26. But I hasten to add that \$300 of this amount was given toward the salary of another worker and is kept intact until the worker is secured. Therefore, the real balance is \$20.26, and instead of being sinfully rich, the work is as poor as Job's turkey. But no arts are needed to secure financial support in this Diocese. I have heard of Dioceses where burglar's tools were necessary to secure funds, but the Hospital Missionary can testify that the people of this Diocese are cordial and unstinted in their generosity.

New, let me itemize the work. And let me say first that I enter somewhat into detail, because the people of the Diocese not only have the right to know how their money is being spent, but it is their duty to know. I preach to Sunday congregations. I show the lantern slides, I talk to Guilds and other societies, aided and abetted by those associated with me in the work, until my throat is parched; indeed, I talk so much that one of my friends accuses me of being all "talky-talk." But we who are in the work are convinced that anyone who knows what the work is will enthusiastically support it. I have never known anyone who, having visited an institution and found out what is being done by our Church for people in whom no one else takes an interest, has failed to become a strong and sincere friend of the work. And that is one of the plans we are trying to carry out—that is, to take people who may be interested to the various institutions. It is good for the visitors, good for the institutions and good for our work.

I have already put on record the loss sustained by the resignation of Miss Hofman, who for more than fifteen years, with very little financial

compensation, carried the message of the Church and was a friend to the people in Sanitarium, Infirmary, Koch, and the women in jail and workhouse. As her temporary successor we secured Miss Cora Pearce, who has done really remarkable work at the Sanitarium, Infirmary and Koch. At the Sanitarium there has been more regular visiting than ever before, and the Chapel is full every Sunday morning for our service. Mr. Saunders has relieved the missionary for the service once a month. And what an opportunity there is for the message of our religion! The people love to talk about religion, for, as one woman said, "That is all most of us have left," and the good to be accomplished by systematic visiting of many of those patients is beyond all estimate. And sometimes I cannot sleep of nights for thinking of the children scattered through the various halls instead of being out on a farm on the cottage system. A few weeks ago I helped an attendant take five of the boys, from nine to sixteen years of age, downtown, and on the way she told me that that was only the second time two of those boys had ever been downtown, and that on the first occasion they tried to walk through plate glass windows, never having seen windows like that. When will Missouri, or St. Louis, provide a farm for the employment, and so the partial self-support and the happiness of the pathetic waifs, with bodies strong but minds incapable?

The Infirmary has been a difficult problem this year, because the building was taken by the Government for a soldiers' hospital and the old people were moved to the old C. B. C. building. Two officials of the city administration told me privately that, in view of the unexpected peace, the Infirmary was not needed for a hospital, but that the matter had gone too far to stop. Consequently, 500 old men and women were moved into a building which in one part is a firetrap, in another is damp and dismal, and everywhere is a barren barracks. I don't know where the blame lies. I suppose the question resolves itself into a contractor's problem of whether a proper hospital could have been constructed in time to receive the few soldiers who, because of the end of the war, might be expected in St. Louis. But I am sure that the citizens of St. Louis, to preserve their self-respect and to carry out the command of Jesus to care for His little ones, must not sanction careless and indifferent treatment of the city's dependents. The services and visits of the Church's representatives have been uninterrupted in this time of upheaval, and I know that many of those people who do not claim our name look upon us as their friends because we have stood by them when it cost something so to do. Mrs. O'Bannon in spirit is the youngest of our Mission helpers, and in storm and sunshine, without financial reward, visits the people in the Infirmary.

At Koch Hospital, due to the energy of Miss Pearce, we have had a weekly service. We began with small expectations, and we have been shamed by the results, for the Chapel has been nearly full every week.

A devoted churchman made possible a new organ. The visits, with the Holy Communion, in the wards have been to the missionary an inspiration, and he has watched there by deathbeds of men and women whom he had learned to love. A layman has had the billiard table completely renovated, which adds much to the pleasure of the men. The work at Koch is one of the most gratifying features of the past year, not because of anything spectacular, and not only because it has meant much to many people, but because it has deepened the spiritual element in our work as a whole.

The City Hospital has more visits and services than any other institution. Mrs. Holmes, Deaconess Brainerd and the Rev. Mr. Atwill visit there constantly. We are accustomed to refrain from even referring to a woman's age, and Mrs. Holmes is not old, but, at any rate, she is older than I am, and I may be permitted to hope that when I am as old as she is I may show as

much energy. I cannot tell you how much I appreciate the help of Mr. Atwill. The work, of course, has for a long time been entirely too much for one man, and finally, for the work's sake, as well as for mine, I was compelled to spend some of the Contingent Fund for assistance. The amount, however, is more an honorarium than a stipend, but it has not seemed to make any difference to Mr. Atwill. He does all the pastoral work at the City Hospital and goes to the Infirmary once a month. That means more than perfunctory visiting. It means the most exhausting personal giving out of energy and strength. It means visiting not only at regular hours, but in emergencies, and Mr. Atwill has never failed to respond. I can think of nothing that would so increase the power and scope of our work as to have a man like Mr. Atwill in it all the time, not as assistant at all, but as a partner. How I wish it could be! And I think something must be done soon, for we are not keeping up with the work at the City Hospital. The turnover is too frequent, and volunteer visitors cannot go as regularly as necessary to keep up with the tide of patients going in and out.

Mr. Alban presented us with a wheel-chair, which is in use there, and we need more. Perhaps the most satisfying part of the work of Deaconess Brainerd is her success in changing the attitude of many mothers toward their babies. Where there is disgrace or widowhood or financial stress, the mother's impulse is to put the child in an institution, and it is Deaconess Brainerd's task to persuade the mother to see in the child something to live and to work for. And the Deaconess is helped in this effort if she can enable the mothers to leave the hospital with complete outfits for their babies. One mother pawned her wedding ring for baby's clothes, and another made a baby's blanket out of the flags of all nations, the flags obtained from cigarette packages.

There is soon to be added to the list of institutions City Hospital No. 2, for colored people, and I secured in advance Mrs. Myers, a communicant of All Saints' Parish, with the help of Rev. Mr. Clarke, to visit the colored patients in the City Hospital and follow them to the new one. You may understand how efficient she was, when I tell you that just one month later she was taken from us by the Social Service Department of the city, and we must find a successor. Of course, I haven't any money to pay any kind of salary. My usual procedure in an emergency like that is to incur the expense first and get the money afterwards. But I think the Convention should provide for a colored visitor, because one is absolutely necessary if we are to do any work in the new institution and her salary is not, I think, a proper charge upon the Contingent Fund, even if we had the money.

The old Industrial School is rapidly becoming only a memory, for soon all the cottages at Bellefontaine will be completed. And what a wonderful institution the farm is, with the boys grouped in cottages and going to school part of the time and on the farm or at the work bench some of the time and playing games on every opportunity. One very little boy ran away when he had only three days more of a year's commitment, and was easily caught and returned, which meant that he had to stay at the farm six more months. When he was asked why he did such a foolish thing he replied: "I didn't want to go home; I wanted to stay at the farm all summer." That is not only a recommendation of the farm, but an indictment of conditions in St. Louis. Our "movies" this year are officially recognized by the school, and as part of the school curriculum we show two educational films each week, in addition to what is known as "two-gun stuff" and "slap-stick comedy." But we do not lose sight of religion, and I am sure that those boys can say the Creed and General Confession and the Lord's Prayer better and sing the hymns louder than any Sunday school in the Diocese.

In addition to her work at the City Hospital, Deaconess Brainerd, at

the request of the Superintendent of the House of Detention, has had service every week for the boys and girls there, and I have heard that it is for those children the best hour of the whole week. This work is in connection with the Juvenile Court, which the Deaconess and the Missionary visit regularly.

The report of the Warden of the jail shows that two-thirds of all offenders were under the age of thirty, and that most of them were by occupation ordinary laborers. I think the only occupations not represented were those of lawyers and clergymen. But the youthfulness of the majority of the offenders should give us pause. We ought to consider whether we are giving through schools, playgrounds and parish activities full opportunity to boys and young men to grow into normal and healthy manhood. Mere boys often come into the jail, plunged suddenly, and often unknowingly, into the beginning of an evil life. I think, also, that there should be teachers installed at the jail by the Board of Education, and books by the Public Library, so that the men might have something else to do than play cards and regale each other with questionable stories. When the new bond issue is passed the upper floors of the jail will be completed and we shall have a real Chapel, and I want the Convention to know who is responsible for keeping that item in the proposed schedule of expenditures. It was Judge Hitchcock. I wrote him and asked his support for that needed construction, and in the sessions of the Citizens' Committee, of which he was a member, he repeatedly defended the proposal until he finally succeeded. We do need the Chapel, because the present one has been filled to overflowing and men have stood during the service. We have new and costly hymnals there, and lest some of them should be—not stolen, but "lost"—I have requested the men to be sure to leave them as they went out, and once when I made that request one of the prisoners, a notorious burglar, said smilingly: "Surely you don't insinuate that there are any thieves in here." There is hope for any man who has a sense of humor like that. Deaconess Brainerd visits the women prisoners and the missionary visits the men, and whatever we can do for them we do. I have interviewed Judges, Circuit Attorneys and Parole Officers, telephoned, run errands, written letters, taken charge of property, and I have received letters from the State Penitentiary and Leavenworth and relatives of prisoners from all parts of the country, California to Virginia, and Michigan to Arkansas. I think the hardest part of our task is to convince the men and their relatives that our motive is purely unselfish; that we do not expect or want any other reward than the opportunity to help and the knowledge that we have helped. One man whom I convinced, after much effort, that I could not accept \$50 from him—and that money looked as big as a house to me—and that the Church I represented was not in this work for any selfish purpose, said to me: "Well, that Church must be the real thing," and I allowed that it was.

I have saved the worst for the last. I refer now to the Workhouse. Our work there this year has not been at all satisfactory, and I should be glad to take the blame myself, were it not for the fact that the work in all the other institutions has been so eminently satisfactory. One reason for the prevailing conditions at the Workhouse, according to one of the Judges, is that the war absorbed all surplus labor and only men of the very lowest type, with some exceptions, have been sent to the Workhouse. Another reason, perhaps, has been the unusually pleasant weather all winter so that the men on Sunday afternoons preferred the yard to the Chapel—not very different, after all, from the golf players and automobilists of our best families. Those are possible reasons. But those who have visited and held service there will bear me out in saying that, from causes wholly outside our control, the Workhouse has undergone a great change for the worse; that discipline is lax; that there is a complete absence of ideals on the part of those in authority; that

favoritism is shown to some prisoners and cruelty to others, and that profane and obscene language continually assails the ears of visitors. I therefore give it as my deliberate judgment that, under prevailing conditions, any constructive effort along moral and religious lines is a useless waste of time. This is, in all my experience, the first adverse report I have been compelled to make about any institution, because in all other institutions we have been met not only with the utmost courtesy, but with the most eager and ready help and most cordial good will, from heads of institutions down to scrub-women. But I do feel that the Church must unqualifiedly stand for ideals and for the best interests of the city's delinquents and dependents, sacrificing, if necessary, present popularity.

The Christmas celebration this year was the best we ever have had. Instead of bags, we gave Christmas stockings filled with candy, and they could be seen hanging on hospital beds and wheel-chairs for weeks afterwards. Every child in every institution received a toy, thanks to the interest of Mr. and Mrs. Randolph and the Sunday schools of St. Peter's, Kirkwood, Webster, Redeemer and St. Stephen's House. The Sunday school of St. Michael and All Angels' continued their beautiful custom of sending individual gifts to the boys at Bellefontaine. The quartet went to five institutions Christmas morning and sang the Christmas carols, and the people in the Chapels and beds said they never heard such wonderful singing. Our Christmas is, without doubt, the best part of the Christmas celebration in the institutions, and in hundreds of instances it is the only Christmas the people receive.

There are few automobiles built that can stand the gruelling pace of 1,000 miles a month, and it is no wonder that last fall the second automobile practically collapsed. We could not impose on Mr. Hurd again, and the missionary was in despair until a friend, not a communicant of the Church, by personal effort made it possible to secure another car of different make at comparatively little cost to the Mission. What I like best about the new car is that, according to the prospectus, it is capable of going "fifty miles an hour, hour after hour, without apparent effort."

I have already spoken of certain men and women who are actually doing the work of the Mission. I mention also Mr. Freegard, who takes services at the Hospital; Mrs. Cotsworth, at the Workhouse, and Miss Williamson, Miss Hane, Miss Stout and Miss Beck, who make more or less music; and there are also the singers and violinists who have brightened the services. There is Mr. Pomeroy, who goes for services to Infirmary, Workhouse, Hospital and Jail, who, by his personal services, enables me to leave the work for a summer vacation, and who not only is absolutely dependable himself, but keeps the missionary up to the mark also. Bishop Johnson has helped me personally in many ways this year, and Bishop Tuttle is just as generous and as unassuming in his generosity as ever. I also again want to put on record my appreciation of the helpfulness of all who are in charge of institutions, with one exception, already mentioned. They are Director of Welfare Schmoll, Hospital Commissioner Shutt, Warden McCully, Dr. Johns, Dr. Bauer, Dr. Dwyer, Mr. Soest, Mr. Fath, Dr. Henry, Miss Merriam, and all the Judges and officers of the Juvenile and Circuit Courts. The effectiveness of our work is, of course, largely dependent upon their good will, and I am glad to say that they have always been glad to have us and help us.

I have had to decline numerous invitations from vestries and clergy to take occasional services this year at the risk of seeming unaccommodating. But my first duty is to Hospital Missions, and a man with ten parishes on his hand, which is what this work amounts to, has little time for other work. But every parish has the right to call on the missionary once a year to tell the congregation about the work.

The missionary has been in the work now five and one-half years, and it seems as though that were long enough. But I cannot let the opportunity pass without a retrospective glance. And in what I shall say now I want it clearly understood that I am absolutely sincere when I say that what has been accomplished in the last five years has come from God, and that the most important instruments in His hand have been loyal and devoted and generous people of the Diocese, who have given their money confidently and without stint, and those others who have given themselves to His service. Please believe that as I compare in a word or two the work of 1914 with the work in 1919. Then there were two part-time workers and the missionary as paid workers, a total of three. Now there are the missionary, a part-time clergyman, a deaconess, who gives all her time; two half-time women assistants, a woman visitor for the colored people and a layman assistant in the summer, a total of seven. Then there were five important institutions covered, now there are ten. The population then was about 4,700, now it is 5,500. Then there were annually about 350 services, now there are 500, and then about 1,500 visits, now there are about 4,000. The Contingent Fund the first year was about \$1,200, this year it was \$3,200. And then the missionary walked, while now he gets there.

All of which is the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes. I know you want it so; indeed, I hope you want the work just as great and just as helpful as it can possibly be made. If that is true, all that is necessary to accomplish that result is to build upon the foundations laid many years before the present missionary came to the work, and to do faithfully the three things you have always done. The first is to pay your Diocesan apportionments promptly; the second is to volunteer your personal services, and the third is to give money for specials, such as moving pictures, clothing, car fare, ice cream treats, eyeglasses and everything else. The work would break down unless we could count on nearly three times the regular fund of \$1,200. Above all, I want you to feel that this work is not a mere appendage to the work of the Church in this Diocese, but that it is one of the reasons why we have a Church at all. We talk much nowadays about democracy, but I do not hesitate to say it, that democracy will be a sham and the Church a social club unless religion be made an electric and vitalizing influence in the lives of those who are out of the way, the personally unpleasing, the insane, the poor, the sick and the wrongdoers. It is for them that we give money and time and prayers, and we glory in it, because ours is the opportunity not to be ministered unto, but to minister, with no thought of condescension or snobbishness or stinginess, but in the sure and certain hope of a resurrection in this present world of dead hopes, of crushed ideals, of souls, with all their infinite possibilities, for whom Christ came and lived and died and rose again, and whom God will miss unless we do our part in bringing them into His Kingdom.

The activities of the St. Louis Local Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew during the past year have been as follows:

The annual meeting was held in Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, on the evening of June 16, 1918. The meeting was opened with a Quiet Hour which was both inspiring and helpful, conducted by the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Rector of Emmanuel Church, after which a delightful supper was served by the ladies of the parish. After dinner officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, Mr. Arthur J. Watling of Emmanuel Church; First Vice-President, Mr. Vincent L. Price of St. Peter's Church; Second Vice-President, Mr. C. L. De Renthel of St. Mary's Mission; Third Vice-President, Mr. Thomas K. Knight of St. Peter's Church; Secretary, Dr. Ira C. Young of the Church of the Redeemer; Treasurer, Mr. Oliver C. Smith of St. Peter's Church; Associate Secretary, Mr. Carl Minch of St. Paul's Church; Chaplain, the Rev. Mr. D. H. Atwill of St. Augustine's Mission.

Addresses were given by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, and the Rev. John Boden, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion.

During the year the Treasurer, and the Associate Secretary died from phenmonia, following influenza. The Executive Committee elected Mr. Charles J. Miller of St. Peter's Church to be Treasurer to fill the unexpired term.

St. Andrew's Day was celebrated by a Coroprate Celebration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop of the Diocese for all men of the Church, at Christ Church Cathedral, at 8 o'clock a. m., and by a meeting in the evening at 8 o'clock, at which the flags of several of our allied nations were presented to the Cathedral and dedicated by the Bishop, assisted by the Dean of the Cathedral, and the Rev. Henry W. Mizner of St. Stephen's House. The flags were presented by citizens of St. Louis who were born in the countries the flags represent, in most instances, through the Consuls of those countries. The address, which was a very eloquent one, was delivered by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Sidney C. Partridge, Bishop of West Missouri, and for many years Missionary Bishop to Japan. The flags will hang permanently in the Cathedral, thus indicating the righteousness of the cause of ourselves and our allies in the recent war; the world-wide mission of the Church; and the open door which the Cathedral offers to all peoples, and nations, and kindreds, and tongues. Certainly those who attended that service will ever remember it.

The Noon-day Lenten services were held during the last Lent in Christ Church Cathedral. The preachers were the Rt. Rev. Dr. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Presiding Bishop of the Church; the Rt. Rev. Dr. Theodore Irving Reese, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor of Southern Ohio; the Rev. Dr. William

O. Waters, D. D., Rector Grace Church, Chicago; the Rev. R. D. S. Futney, Rector St. Philip's Church, St. Louis; the Rev. John S. Bunting, Rector of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis; the Rev. Gibson W. Harris, Rector Trinity Church, Ossining, New York; the Rev. Arthur H. Lord, Rector St. James' Church, Milwaukee, and the Very Rev. William P. Ladd, Dean Berkeley Divinity School, Middleton, Conn. The local clergy took turns in serving as chaplains.

Missions were preached by the visiting preachers as follows: Bishop Reese at the Church of the Redeemer; Mr. Harris at St. Philip's Church; Mr. Lord at St. Peter's Church, and Dean Ladd at Christ Church Cathedral.

The attendance at the Noon-day Services was not as large as in former years, due perhaps to the newness of the location. But many expressed the opinion that the loss in numbers was more than made up for through the increase in the devotional spirit.

The officers of the Brotherhood wish to express their thanks for the help which was so cheerfully given by the local clergy who were preachers and chaplains. And also for the many courtesies which were extended to the visiting preachers; and the officers of the Brotherhood by Dean Davis and the members of the Cathedral staff.

9.—St. Louis. Had conference at my home with the Rev. V. O. Penley of De Soto, who spent the night with me.

10.—Conference in my study with four of the clergy of my field. Received the resignation of L. H. Niederluck as Treasurer of St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis. In the evening had business meeting with the Committee of St. Timothy's Mission, St. Louis.

12.—St. Louis. Appointed the Rev. A. P. Rein to serve as Minister of St. Timothy's, St. Louis, and St. Paul's, Overland, from October 1.

13.—Regretfully accepted the resignation of Mr. Niederluck as Treasurer of St. Mary's. Left on Frisco for Thayer.

15.—Sunday. Thayer. Morning, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached in Holy Trinity Church. Evening, conducted the evening service and made an address. Had conference with the people of the Mission at close of service.

16.—Thayer. Made an address in the morning at the High School.

17.—Crystal City. Conference with the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., and spent the night at the pro-rectory with him.

19.—St. Louis. Business meeting with the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund and, later, with the Standing Committee sitting as a Council of Advice. Later, conference with the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor.

22.—Sunday. Morning, celebrated the Holy Communion and made address at St. Timothy's, St. Louis. Had conference with the people of the mission at the close of the service. Afternoon, conducted the worship and preached the sermon at the autumn opening of Monticello Seminary, Godfrey, Ill. Evening, assisted in the service at Ascension Church, St. Louis.

25.—St. Louis. Attended all-day meeting of War Activities Committee at Statler Hotel. Evening, called at the Hotel Jefferson, on the Archbishop of the Greek Church and, in the name of the Church in this diocese, in the absence of Bishop Tuttle, gave him welcome. Later, guest at banquet, St. Louis Club, Festus J. Wade, presiding, and Dr. John R. Mott being the chief speaker. Left at night for Chicago.

26.—Great Lakes Naval Station. Visited my nephew who is training here, also looked up some of our Missouri Church lads. Attended session of National Inter-Church War Work Congress, Chicago.

27.—Chicago. Called by appointment on the Bishop of Oxford, Hotel Sherman, and had a helpful chat with him. Attended by invitation the sessions of the War Work Congress. At night attended the great public mass meeting at the Auditorium, the Bishop of Oxford and the Rev.

Dr. Guttery of the Primitive Methodist Church, Liverpool, being the speakers. In the afternoon was present by invitation of the Bishop of Chicago at a meeting of the clergy addressed by the Bishop of Oxford at the Church Club rooms.

Sept. 29.—St. Louis. Officiated as Co-consecrator at the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Demby as Suffragan Bishop of Arkansas, in All Saints' Church. Evening. All Saints' Church, attended mass meeting in the interests of the Church's work among the colored people.

30.—St. Louis. Attended special meeting of the Clericus. In the evening attended reception given by the rector and vestry and people of All Saints' Church in honor of Bishop Demby.

Oct. 2.—Evening, guest of the Rev. J. S. Bunting, with many of the clergy of the city, at supper given at the parish house of Ascension, to meet Bishop McCormick. Later, Ascension Church, assisted in service of evening prayer, Bishop McCormick making the address.

3.—Evening, St. Louis. Meeting of the Missionary Board.

4.—St. Louis. Appointed Miss Cora Pearce to temporary duty in the position on the Hospital Missions staff made vacant by the retirement of Miss Hofman. Evening, attended a meeting of the Advisory Board in the matter of the Mount legacy.

6.—Sunday. St. Louis. Morning, with the Rev. L. H. White, celebrated the Holy Communion in the new St. Mary's parish house and preached. In the afternoon, with Mr. A. D. Pomeroy, Lay Reader, and Mrs. Holmes, visited the City Hospital, made an address and confirmed 2.

7.—St. Louis. Attended an all-day meeting, by invitation of the Church Federation, of clergy and other interested persons in Schuyler Memorial House.

8.—St. Louis. Attended monthly meeting of Committee of Holy Cross.

11.—Evening. Attended meeting of Missionary Board.

13.—Sunday. Morning, preached at Post Hall, Jefferson Barracks, by invitation of Chaplain Dorrance. Spent the day there.

15.—Evening, attended meeting of the Committee of Holy Cross at the home of Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore.

20.—Sunday. Jefferson Barracks.

22.—By request of the Rev. L. H. White, licensed Mr. Ernest Kroehle to serve as Lay Reader in St. Mary's, and as requested elsewhere in the Diocese, as a member of the League of Lay Readers.

23.—Appointed the Rev. Dr. J. J. Wilkins to serve as chaplain of the Country Convalescent Home.

26.—We had as our guest all day Bishop Thurston of Eastern Oklahoma, returning to his home from the burial of Bishop Brooke at Gambier, Ohio.

27.—Sunday. Morning, celebrated the Holy Communion in my home, inviting friends to participate with us in the service. Afternoon, visited the City Hospital, Infirmary and Sanitarium, making calls upon the sick and the troubled so far as quarantine regulations permitted.

28.—The Rev. Dr. Wilkins accepted his appointment as chaplain of Convalescent Home. The Rev. George E. Wharton of Mexico in conference with me and spent the night.

31.—Afternoon. Called on sick and shut-in people in Moberly. Evening, Trinity, Kirksville, with the Rev. R. D. S. Putney, held services, con-

firmed 5 adults, addressed the candidates and preached. At the close of the service held a conference with members of the committee, at which conference it was decided to request the Rev. C. F. Edwards of Macon to have temporary oversight of Kirksville after Nov. 3.

During the greater part of the month of October, quarantine regulations were in operation, which practically inhibited the carrying on of services and other Church activities in the city and quite generally throughout the Diocese. Knowing that there must be a shortage of nurses and other helpers to care for the great number of influenza patients at Jefferson Barracks, I offered myself for duty there, and was permitted by the officers to be of service almost continuously, chiefly in the pneumonia wards, during the two weeks when the epidemic was at its height. The chaplain and the physicians and nurses gave me splendid opportunities to be helpful. Many of the fine lads with whom I spent much time courageously "went west," after heroic fighting to recover. Many desperately fought and "made it" and are convalescing now. It was much to the good to be permitted to serve in such an emergency, and I am glad to have been given the privilege.

November 1.—All Saints' Day, Kirksville. Celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. R. D. Putney, in Trinity Church. Went to Macon in the afternoon for conference with the Rev. C. F. Edwards. Appointed him to the temporary charge of Trinity, Kirksville. At night I went to Monroe City and tarried until morning with the Lindstroms at St. Jude's rectory.

2.—Morning; Monroe City. Had prayers with Mr. H. C. Sheetz at his home. Mrs. Sheetz died last night. Went from Monroe to Hannibal, where I made several calls. Home at night to St. Louis.

3.—"Shot to pieces" about describes the condition from now on to the end of November, so far as being able to keep engagements is concerned. The "flu" ban in St. Louis and pretty much everywhere has made it impossible to follow any schedule. I was due this morning at Crystal City, and to-night at Bonne Terre, but was not permitted to hold services. I said morning prayer in my home, with friends of the family, and spent the rest of the day at my desk and in calling on the sick in St. Louis.

4.—St. Louis. Attended meeting of Committee for Holy Cross.

8.—St. Louis. Attended meeting in evening of the Advisory Committee in the matter of the Susan Mount legacy.

10.—Sunday. Not permitted, because of the "flu," to keep my appointments to-day. Ministered the Holy Communion for my family and friends in my home. Spent the day in study and calling among the sick in St. Louis.

11.—St. Louis. Joined in the celebration which followed the coming of the news of a signed armistice.

12.—St. Louis. Attended meeting of Committee for Holy Cross.

15.—Appointed Mr. George W. Adams, manager of the Carleton Dry Goods Company, as a member of the Committee for Holy Cross, from Emmanuel Parish, Webster Groves, and Mr. Adams, I am glad to say, has signified his readiness to accept the appointment.

17.—Sunday. Not permitted to keep the appointments that I had made for to-day. But I was glad to be with the Rev. Mr. Atwill in the morning worship at St. Augustine's, St. Louis, where he asked me to preach. I had never seen so many people at any service in St. Augustine's

before. It was evidently a joy to them, after many weeks of deprivation, to "go into the house of the Lord." And the offering, Mr. Atwill told me, was almost as big as Easter offerings sometimes are in St. Augustine's. I was made very happy at St. Augustine's. At night I enjoyed, as I always do, the privilege of leading in the worship at the Chapel of the Prince of Peace, Baden. Not many were present, for there is great sickness among our people in this part of the town. But those who came seemed as glad as I was to be there.

Nov. 19.—St. Louis. Morning, Church of the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. John Boden, celebrated the Holy Communion at the opening session of an all-day meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. I was in attendance all day at the Auxiliary meeting.

20.—St. Louis. Was present in the evening for supper at the Missouri Athletic Club with the members of the Lay Readers' League, and made an address. We were glad to have Mr. David Bailey of the Church of the Ascension, who was one of the original members of the League and then moved to California, meet with us again and renew his membership.

22.—Ironton. Met with the members of the St. Paul's Guild for conference. Made calls on many people in the neighborhood. At night conducted services in St. Paul's Church and preached.

23.—Met in conference with a special committee called together by Bishop Tuttle to devise ways and means for raising our fair part toward the emergency fund that is needed for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Board.

24.—Sunday. By invitation of the Rev. Mr. Duckworth, I preached in the morning at the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis. In the afternoon I conducted the worship and preached at Monticello Seminary, Godfrey, Ill.

26.—St. Louis. Afternoon, Schuyler Memorial House. Attended special meeting in the matter of raising money for the General Missionary Board. Evening, at the home of Mr. E. C. Simmons, attended meeting of the Advisory Committee in the matter of the Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church.

27.—Thanksgiving Day. Mrs. Johnson and I were delightfully entertained and made very happy in the family of the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, Monroe City, and with his parishioners. I assisted in the morning service at St. Jude's Church, preached and administered the Holy Communion.

In connection with my trip to Monroe, I had intended to do official duty at Canton, Moberly and Kirksville, but was prevented doing so by the influenza quarantine.

December 1.—Sunday. In the morning I celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by the Rev. C. F. Edwards, in St. James' Church, Macon, and preached. I had an appointment for the evening of today at Christ Church, Moberly, which I was not permitted to keep by reason of the "flu" ban.

2.—Canceled my appointment for Holy Communion at Moberly because of the quarantine.

3.—Evening. Went to Herculanum and met several men of the community and the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., in conference concerning our work.

Dec. 5.—St. Louis. Morning, met with the Advisory Committee in the matter of the Bishop Tuttle Commemorative Church. We are glad to announce that the building is completed and that funds are in bank for the payment of all bills in connection with the purchase of the land and the erection of the building. My cordial thanks go to Mr. William Bagnell, Mr. Walker Hill, Mr. L. H. Niederluck, and Mr. E. C. Simmons for their kindness in serving on this committee. It is not at all generally known how frequently, during this last crowded year, these busy men have responded to our request that they should meet with us for a few minutes' consultation in a downtown office at 8:30 in the morning of a busy day. Their kind helpfulness has meant much to me. And I have several times, by spoken word and written word, told how large a debt the Diocese owes to the Rev. L. H. White for his hard work in soliciting and collecting most of the funds. Evening, St. Louis. Attended monthly meeting of Missionary Board.

6.—St. Louis. Evening, assisted the Rev. R. D. S. Putney at St. Philip's Church and made the address.

8.—Sunday morning, St. Louis. Assisted the Rev. George E. Norton at Church of St. Michael and All Angels' and preached. Evening, Jefferson Barracks. Preached in Y. M. C. A. hut.

10.—St. Louis. Morning, read service of the burial of the dead at the funeral of Mrs. Frances Deane. Afternoon, attended meeting of Committee of Holy Cross Corporation.

11.—Bonne Terre. At his late home, officiated at the burial of Mr. W. H. C. Conover, long years a faithful layman of St. Peter's Mission here, and in the nearby churchyard committed his body to the ground.

13.—St. Louis. Afternoon, attended funeral of Mr. Carl W. Minch, devoted layman of St. Paul's, Carondelet, and officiated at the grave in Mount Hope Cemetery.

15.—Sunday; morning, Jennings. Celebrated the Holy Communion in St. Luke's Chapel and preached. Evening, St. Louis, read evening prayer and preached in Epiphany Chapel for the Rev. J. G. Seacord, who was ill.

17.—St. Louis. Afternoon, attended special meeting of the Committee of Holy Cross Corporation.

18.—Mexico. Conference with the Rev. Mr. Wharton and the Rev. Mr. Ten Broeck in regard to missionary work. Evening, Jefferson City, Grace Church, made address, the Rev. George L. Barnes conducting the service.

22.—Sunday; morning, Sullivan. Celebrated the Holy Communion and preached in St. John's Church. Evening, St. Louis, St. Augustine's Church, confirmed one candidate presented by the Rev. Douglass H. Atwill, and made an address.

25.—Christmas Day; St. Louis. Morning, attended service of the Holy Communion with Mrs. Johnson in her parish church, the Church of the Ascension. Later, Ferguson, St. Stephen's Church, read morning prayer, preached and celebrated the Holy Communion. In the afternoon the Rev. and Mrs. Douglass H. Atwill and Chaplain and Mrs. Samuel M. Dorrance came to take Christmas dinner with Mrs. Johnson and me and made us very glad.

29.—Sunday; morning, St. Louis. St. John's Church, read morning prayer and preached. Evening, Mexico, Christ Church, assisted the Rev. George E. Wharton in the service and preached.

5.—Sunday; St. Louis; 9 a. m., with the Rev. J. H. Lever, celebrated the Holy Communion at the Infirmary; 11 a. m., St. George's Church, preached and celebrated the Holy Communion, the Rev. Mr. Kemerer being ill; 3:30 p. m., with the Rev. J. H. Lever, at City Hospital, made an address.

7.—St. Louis. Attended meeting of Bishop's Committee for Holy Cross Mission.

8.—St. Louis. Met with members of the Committee on Canons and of the Missionary Board.

11.—St. Louis. Morning, Church of the Holy Communion, at a meeting of the Juniors to present their united offering, made an address on missionary work in the Diocese.

12.—Sunday; St. Louis. Morning, preached and conducted the worship at St. John's Church; 3 p. m., Coliseum, at a monster exhibition of war relics, made an address, the Rev. Dr. McIvor and Rabbi Leon Harrison also making addresses. Evening, with Deaconess Brainerd, House of Detention, had a song and story hour with the children and made an address.

13.—Evening, Kirkwood, in the beautiful club house of the Country Club, met a delightful company of people gathered under the auspices of the Guild of Grace Church, and made an address on missionary work in Missouri. A kind friend, not of our communion, gave me \$100 for the work. Another dear friend promised me \$300 a year toward putting another missionary agency at work as soon as I can see my way to do it.

16.—St. Louis. In Bofinger Chapel, baptized Samuel Richmond Dorrance, infant son of Chaplain and Mrs. Samuel M. Dorrance of Jefferson Barracks.

19.—Sunday; St. Louis; 7:30 a. m., Church of the Redeemer, the rector being ill, celebrated the Holy Communion; 11 a. m., Church of the Redeemer, conducted morning prayer and preached.

20.—St. Louis. In my home, Deaconesses Brainerd and Sniffen and members of my family being present, ministered the Holy Communion; 2 p. m., St. John's Church, with the Rev. John Howard Lever and the Rev. Douglass H. Atwill, officiated at the burial of Mrs. Mary Brainerd, mother of Deaconess Effie M. Brainerd, and in Valhalla Cemetery committed her body to the ground.

31.—St. Louis. Christ Church Cathedral, assisted Bishop Tuttle in the celebration of the Holy Communion and attended an all-day meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

February 2.—St. Louis. Morning, Y. M. C. A., took breakfast with the men and made an address. Afternoon, with the Rev. J. H. Lever and helpers in the City Infirmary, had services in four wards and in the chapel. Made three addresses and confirmed 14 persons. Evening, at the House of Detention, with Deaconess Brainerd, joined with the children in the hour of song and story-telling and made an address.

9.—Sunday; St. Louis. Morning, assisted in the services at Christ Church Cathedral by invitation of the Dean and preached the sermon. Evening, services at the Country Convalescent Home, Kirkwood, and made an address.

12.—Spent the day in Bonne Terre, calling among the people and in consultation with our lay officers.

15.—Took early morning train for Cape Girardeau. Made many calls among the people. In the evening, by request, attended an informal meeting of the vestry of Christ Church.

16.—Sunday. Morning, Cape Girardeau, visited session of the Sunday School and made an address. Assisted the Rev. J. J. Clopton in morning prayer and preached. Evening, Chaffee, accepted invitation of the pastor of the Methodist Church to join with him and his people in the evening worship and preached the sermon.

19.—Left St. Louis for Muskogee, and on the morning of Feb. 20, in Grace Church, Muskogee, assisted by Bishop Thurston, I celebrated the Holy Communion. This was the closing day of a series of conferences which Bishop Thurston had had with the clergy of Oklahoma. I made the address which brought the conferences to a close. Had a short visit with Bishop Thurston and took a late afternoon train for St. Louis.
