Saturday, December 7, 1974

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis

Pursuant to a call issued by the Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan and the Standing Committee, September 24, 1974, in accordance with provisions of Article IV and XX of the Constitution of the Diocese, the Convention assembled in the Nave of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, Saturday, December 7, 1974, at 8:30 A.M.

The Holy Eucharist (Trial Service No. 2) was celebrated by Bishop Cadigan assisted by The Rev. Messrs. George Zabriskie, W. Thomas Martin and David Benson, and Ms. Mary Ann Kerstetter, Mrs. Donovan Rhynsburger, Ms. Judith Upham and Mr. Frank Lyerson. The offering in the amount of \$284.70, was for the St. Christopher Fund for Diocesan support.

At 9:30 A. M. the Convention reconvened for its business session, with the Bishop in the Chair. The Veni Creator was sung and prayers were offered.

The roll of the Clergy eligible to seat, voice and vote was called. Of the 65 qualified under the Constitution 63 responded.

The roll of Lay Delegates was called. Of the 57 Congregations entitled to representation Lay Delegates from 55 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the President declared the Convention duly convened and ready for the business for which it was called.

The Secretary read the official notice calling the Convention into session:

Acting under provisions of Articles IV and XX of the Constitution of the Diocese of Missouri, and in accordance with Resolution No. 11 of the 134th Convention of the Diocese, a Special meeting of the Convention is hereby called to convene in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 8:30 A.M., Saturday, December 7, 1974, for the purpose of receiving the report of the Screening Committee and electing the VIII Bishop of Missouri.

The Rev. Canon Zabriskie welcomed the Convention to the Cathedral and its facilities, saying that this would be the fifth time the Convention has met here to elect a Bishop.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 134th Convention of this Diocese, except as non-applicable to a Special Convention, be adopted for this Convention and that no business unrelated to that named in the official message calling the Convention into session be considered unless by unanimous consent of the members of the Convention; and be it further

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RESOLVED that the Rules of Order shall not be suspended or amended except by a two-thirds majority vote of the members of the Convention.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 2 which was adopted:

RESOLVED that the following Process adopted by Resolution No. 11 of the 134th Convention be adopted for this Special Meeting as a Special Rule of Order; and be it further

RESOLVED that the following Order of Business shall be followed in this Special Meeting:

A. Report of the Arrangements Committee, explaining the plans for lunch and other housekeeping matters.

B. Report of the Screening Committee, certifying that the work of the Committee was done in accordance with the Process adopted by the 134th Convention, and placing in nomination the following names:

Scott Field Bailey William A. Jones Joseph A. Pelham Gordon S. Price G. Richard Wheatcroft

with no names to be nominated except as provided in the Process.

- C. The Chairman of the Screening Committee, and other members of the Committee receive and respond to questions and comments from members of the Convention concerning any of the Nominees. (Limitation of one hour, to be divided equally among the Nominees, with an added limitation of one minute per question or comment.)
- D. The Bishop announces the appointment of eight Tellers. The Tellers distribute the ballots and collect them in accordance with Rule No. 22. When ballots have been cast the President of the Convention shall declare the ballot closed and may declare a recess until the Head Teller announces the tally is ready for reporting. When the tally is ready the President shall call the Convention into session. The Head Teller who shall cause it to be announced to the Convention. Article XX of the Constitution provides: "the concurrent vote, by ballot, of a majority of the Clergy and of the Laity entitled to seats, voice and vote in the Convention, voting separately, shall be necessary." (It must be noted that this is not a majority of those present, but of those entitled to seat, voice and vote.)
- E. If a majority of the Clergy and Laity concur on the same ballot, the President shall declare an election has taken place.
- F. If a majority has not been obtained concurrently on one ballot the President shall declare a recess of ten minutes. The next ballot shall be distributed and voting shall be done without further debate, except on the question of adjournment.
- G. Any Nominee may withdraw his name at any time during the election process, if he is present, or may authorize a member of the Convention to do so. The written statement shall be laid before the President of the Convention.
- H. Balloting shall continue until an election takes place. The President may declare a recess for lunch at an opportune time. If there is no election by 5:00 p.m., the Convention will recess until 7:00 p.m., and resume balloting until 10:00 p.m. If there is no election by 10:00 p.m., the Convention will recess for four weeks and will

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then reconvene at the call of the President to continue balloting on the original list of names placed in nomination December 7. The Screening Committee may, at its discretion, add one or two more names next highest on the list certified by the Independent Auditor.

I. In the event the man elected does not accept the election, the Convention will reconvene at the call of the President to elect from the same list of Nominees, less the name of the man who did not accept and, in addition, the name of the next highest from the Auditor's list.

J. If the man elected does not pass the physical and psychological requirements, the Convention will reconvene at the call of the President to elect from the same list of Nominees, less the man elected, plus the next two names from the Auditor's list.

K. When an election has been obtained, the Convention will remain in session until the President has appointed a Committee of Notification, and the necessary testimonial documents have been signed.

L. Adjournment sine die: following thanksgiving and benediction. (If an election has taken place. If no election takes place by 10:00 p.m. the Convention will reconvene according to (H) (I) and (J) above.

Mr. Neal T. Dohr, Chairman of the Screening Committee, presented following report of the Committee:

Right Reverend Sir, Fellow Members, Guests:

Early in 1973 a Committee elected by the Convocations started the task of writing a Process for electing the VIII Bishop of Missouri. This activity was prompted by Bishop Cadigan's announcement that he planned to retire in April, 1975. The Process and the seven Criteria were eventually presented to and adopted by the 134th Convention. That Process defined the parameters within which the Screening Committee did its work in order to provide the list of Nominees to be considered by the Delegates gathered here today.

In the almost two years which have passed since those first meetings were held, an estimated 10,000 hours have been expended by a number of dedicated clergy and lay persons in developing the Process, the Criteria and in performing the Screening function. We are happy to report that only \$8,000 out of a \$10,000 budget were spent by the Committee.

The Process was a new and innovative one and was designed to provide maximum opportunity for the participation of every person eligible to vote under diocesan Canons. As a result, over 3500 people participated in this election by casting ballots for the final Nominees. More people have had more information about the Candidates in this election than in most any other diocesan election in the Episcopal Church.

The Process charged the Screening Committee to perform specific tasks within established time frames. The first of those tasks was to establish a method for the people of the Diocese to provide names of clergy for consideration by the Committee. This was accomplished on schedule by May 31 when 116 names had been received. The second task of the committee was to screen those names against the seven Criteria adopted by the 134th Convention and to present a list of 15 to 20 to the Registered Voters. A list of 16 Candidates for nomination was submitted to the Diocese on August 24. Addi-

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e Presi-If there atil 7:00 election and will tionally, the Committee was charged with the responsibility to receive the names of the three Candidates who polled the highest number of ballots in the popular election and to consider whether to add one or two names to those three. The Committee met on October 26 and at that time released a list of five Nominees — three elected by popular vote and two added by a two-thirds vote of the Committee.

The Committee has faithfully followed the Process and has operated within the guidelines established by the Convention last February. In retrospect I am sure that there are details of the Process which would have changed had our foresight been as good as our hindsight; even so the basic goals of the Process have been met. The Committee does intend to provide a final written report to the Diocesan Convention in February, which will include an evaluation of the Process. To assist us, we solicit your thoughtful comments concerning the strong and weak points of the Process as you have observed them. We would request that these comments be sent to the Screening Committee in care of the Diocesan office no later than December 31. I would now like to present the members of the Screening Committee who have given much of themselves during the past year to bring us to this point:

The Parish is the heart-beat of the Church and I have discovered that I am psychologically and theologically oriented to the deepening of that ministry. I am very grateful to all in the Diocese of Missouri who saw in my credentials and experience those qualifications and gifts they are looking for in their next Bishop. I shall always be indebted to them for their support and trust.

Our love and prayers are with you as you approach the sacred and glorious task of electing your next Bishop.

The Process now calls for a maximum of one hour's discussion on the Nominees. Inasmuch as the Rev. Price has asked that his name be withdrawn, his request will be honored and no discussion on his candidacy is planned. Each of the other four Nominees will be presented by a member of the Screening Committee who will then act as moderator for questions or comments from the floor. These presentations should not infer that any Committee member is, or is not, backing any particular Nominees. I would like to call on the Secretary of the Convention to explain the rules of debate at this point.

After the Secretary had outlined the procedure to be followed for not more than one hour, the four Nominees were presented in the following order:

Bishop Bailey by Mrs. Goodson The Rev. Mr. Jones by Mr. Pendleton The Rev. Mr. Pelham by Mr. Hindman The Rev. Mr. Wheatcroft by Dr. Hoey

Following presentation of the Nominees the Screening Committee was dismissed with the gratitude of the Convention for its work to this time.

WHEREAS after a length process of selection, nomination and consideration by several thousand members of the Diocese of Missouri the Rev. William A. Jones, Jr., has been elected Bishop; be it hereby

RESOLVED that the members of this Special Convention pledge our love, affection and full support of him as he ponders a most important decision in his life, with our fondest hope that he will indeed become the eighth Bishop of Missouri.

The Testimonial of Election, required under Title III, Canon 14, Section 1(a) was signed by members of the Convention.

The Convention adjourned sine die at 4:40 P.M., following singing of the Doxology and the Bishop's benediction.

Rules of Order of the Convention

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- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:

I. On Admissions of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.

II. On Constitution and Canons. III. On Dispatch of Business.

IV. On Resolutions.

- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions for order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Permanent Committees of Convention.
- 21. Except in cases where majority vote is required by the Constitution, all elections provided for by Canon shall be by plurality of all votes cast. When more than one is to be elected for a particular office, the number required by Canon receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.
- 22. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the votes of each Order shall take their stand at stations indicated by the Chairman, the Tellers for the Laity in one area, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. Those casting their ballot shall pass by the Tellers as they deposit their ballots in the proper receptacle they speak out their names to the Teller with the list of names of Delegates to Convention. No persons whose names do not appear in their role shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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Minutes of the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

Christ Church Cathedral St. Louis

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February 7, 1975

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred Thirty-Fifith Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, Protestant Episcopal Church, assembled in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 1:30 P.M., February 7, 1975.

The Holy Eucharist was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Frank N. Butler, David P. Hegg, David E. Johnson, Harvel R. Sanders, Robert B. Skinner, George Zabriskie II, and W. James Walker, Mrs. Rollin Fisher, Major Ronald Jones, Mr. Allan Burdick, and bagpipers Rauel D. Quimby and William Sandbach. Dr. Ronald Arnatt was at the organ. During the Service a short sermon was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Walker. The United Thankoffering of Episcopal Churchwomen was presented, and ECW officers were installed. The offering in the amount of \$504.27 was designated for relief of hungry people in St. Louis.

At 3.50 P.M. the members of the Convention convened in the Nave of the Cathedral, with Bishop Cadigan in the chair. The Bishop asked Mr. Robert Harmon, layman of St. Paul's Church, Ironton, to open the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the role of the Clergy eligible to seat, voice and vote. Of the 64 so entitled, 57 responded.

The Secretary then called the Roll of the Congregations. Of the 57 entitled to representation Lay Delegates from 51 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened and ready for business.

The Secretary of the Diocese introduced Resolution No. 1 which, following a second, was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 134th Convention, as printed in the Journal on pages 35-36, be adopted for this Convention and that Rule No. 23 which sets forth the Order of Business may be suspended by the Bishop at any time; and be it further RESOLVED that all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, all licensed Lay Readers, full-time and professional Lay Church Workers, and Lay Members of the Standing Committee not otherwise members of the Convention be admitted to seats without votes in this Convention; and be it further RESOLVED that the Order of Business shall be substantially as follows: (see page 24 in the Journal.)

Bishop Cadigan, acting under authority given him by Canon 3 appointed the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf to serve as Secretary of the Convention and of the Diocese.

By petition signed by six members of the Convention the name of the Rev. F. Allyn Walker was placed in nomination for the Cathedral Chapter.

There being no further nominations the nominations were declared closed and ballots prepared for use on Saturday morning.

The Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr. William M. Van Cleve, stated that while the Canons require three nominees for each position to be filled the Committee had not placed the required number in nomination for Lay Deputy to General Convention. The Convention might by unanimous consent accept the report of the Committee. Consent was so given.

Mr. John R. Rogers, President of the Standing Committee, read his report of the activity of that body. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 4)

Other reports of Committees, Commissions and Agencies were received by title and ordered filed or printed in the Journal.

The Rev. Frank Butler made an oral statement on behalf of the Episcopal Society for Ministry ot the Aging, Inc.

The Rev. F. Allyn Walker, chairman of the Diocesan Youth Commission, made an oral report for the Commission and introduced four young people who spoke of the program.

Mr. Guernsey made an oral report for the Committee on Social Responsibility in Investments, locally and nationally.

The Rev. David Benson reported for the Long Range Planning Committee. (Appendix No. 7)

Mr. Benson then moved that the Committee, having completed its assigned tasks be dissolved. Following a second the motion prevailed by a rising vote of the members of the Convention, which expressed gratitude for the work of the Committee.

Upon motion by Mr. Edward Kice, duly seconded, the members of the Youth Commission were given seat and voice in this Convention.

Mr. Neal T. Dohr, speaking for the Screening Committee which selected the candidates for Bishop, presented the report of the Committee by title. This was accepted and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 14)

Mr. Charles C. Allen, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented the proposed Budget and Program for 1975 and moved its adoption. The total amount budgeted was \$421,000, and is expected from the following sources:

Following a second the proposed Budget was adopted, it having been thoroughly discussed in Convocation meetings since November.

The Rev. Mr. Benson, speaking for the Task Force appointed by the Standing Committee to propose a Fair Share method of funding Diocesan Program from parishes and missions moved Resolution No. 2 as a response to Long Range Planning Committee Report No. 5 "The Ministry of the Church in the Metropolitan Area":

WHEREAS the Long Range Planning Committee, by its Report No. 5, recommended that the Diocese of Missouri adopt a "Fair Share" method of determining pledging by congregations to support the Diocese and its programs; and

WHEREAS the Bishop's special task force has proposed, and the Convocations and the Standing Committee have severally recommended, the adoption by this Convention of the Fair Share Plan set forth below to achieve the following desirable goals:

(a) Equitable formulas based on disposable income as set forth

in Parochial Reports;

(b) Recognition of differences among congregations as reflected by size of clergy staff, as well as the unique role of the Cathedral;

WHEREAS to be fully effective, the Fair Share Plan requires (a) wide publicity to achieve moral commitment to Fair Share giving throughout the Diocese; and (b) an appeal procedure for hardship situations; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the Diocese of Missouri hereby adopt the following Fair Share Plan:

- 1. The Fair Share Plan shall be effective for 1976.
- 2. The 1976 Fair Share shall be calculated on net disposable income as set worth in the 1974 Parochial Reports. Net disposable income shall consist of:

52	Pledge Payments

The Fair Share for succeeding years shall be similarly calculated. (For example, the 1977 Fair Share shall be based upon 1975 Parochial Reports.)

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3. The Bishop's Office shall publish and distribute to each congregation by July 1 in 1975, and in each year thereafter, the Fair Share for each congregation based upon the following formulas:

4. The Bishop's Office shall distribute periodically (not less than annually) to all members of the Diocese written information reflecting for each congregation its pledge and its contribution as compared to its Fair Share quota.

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- 5. The Fair Share Plan set forth in this Resolution shall remain in effect unless modified by future Diocesan Convention(s) provided, however, that:
 - (a) In the case of special hardship, a congregation may in any year(s) appeal for relief to the Standing Committee after first presenting its appeal for such year to its Convocation for such Convocation's recommendation. The Standing Committee may grant such relief, if any, as it may deem appropriate.
 - (b) The Standing Committee shall have discretion to issue such interpretations and to make such plan adjustments (except formula changes) as it may from time to time deem reasonably necessary.

Following a second, discussion began.

Upon motion by Mr. Richard Hawley debate was suspended on the resolution until the report of the St. Christopher Committee might be heard.

Mr. Hawley presented the report of the St. Christopher Committee. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 9)

Debate then resumed on Resolution No. 2.

Mr. Hawley moved as a substitute for Resolution No. 2, the following:

WHEREAS, The Christian principle of stewardship of possessions, time, and personality is the outgrowth of the fundamental teachings of Jesus Christ concerning man's response to God in thanksgiving and for the progress of God's kingdom; and

WHEREAS, Stewardship is meant to be an individual's response to God for which one is accountable to Him alone, and not to "fair shares,"; and

WHEREAS, The Biblical tithe has been the standard toward which, by which, and beyond which the Church has urged her people to judge their own several responses in the giving of monies; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri hereby adopt the following stewardship concepts for funding,

- 1. The 10% tithe is the standard of giving by the individual.
- 2. That the Every Member Canvass be the one time of asking.
- 3. By 1976, the 20% tithe be the standard of giving to the Diocese by each parish and mission, based on anticipated gross receipts.
- 4. By 1976, the 20% tithe be the standard of giving by the Diocese to the National Church based on anticipated gross income.
- 5. Provide opportunities for "above the line" giving to special ministries, but not so as to be interpreted as additional requests for funds.
- 6. Maintain a fiscal integrity of Diocesan expenses by budgeting within the realities of income.

Discussion on the substitute ensued. Following a vote on the previous question, the substitute resolution was put to a vote and defeated.

Debate resumed on the original Resolution No. 2. Following the close of debate the resolution was adopted.

Dr. James Hood, chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, presented Resolution No. 3 which the Committee did not recommend. It had been introduced by Metro Convocation 2 in response to Long Range Planning Report No. 5. Following a second debate ensued. During debate an amendment offered by Mr. Quentin Couch to change item 5 in the first Resolve to read "In the funding of congregations, fund only altar-centered ministries which engage in ministry to community." Following a second this amendment was defeated by a vote of 77-93.

A motion to table the Resolution was defeated.

A motion by Mr. Gordon Herzog to insert in item I of the first Resolve "(to the extent, if any, the Bishop chooses)" was adopted.

A motion by Mr. Herzog to insert in item 2 of the first Resolve any instead of all and the words "he chooses to make" between monies and available, was adopted.

As amended the Resolution then read:

WHEREAS the Long Range Committee of the Diocese of Missouri has published its fifth report: "The Ministry of the Church in the Metropolitan Area of the Diocese of Missouri"; and

WHEREAS that report makes recommendations and offers alternative methods of funding the Church's ministries in the metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS these recommendations and alternative methods of funding the Church's ministries in the metropolitan area have been considered in Convocations; now therefore be it

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ossessions, teachings anksgiving RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri accept the following general recommendations as the policy of the Diocese:

1. Diocesan mission is to be financed by revenue from parishes and missions, diocesan endowments, and Thompson Fund monies after 1975

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2. The Bishop of the Diocese is to be asked to pledge any Thompson Fund monies he chooses to make available for the programatic mission of the Diocese to the Diocesan Budget at the beginning of the budget process.

3. Undertake no more fund drives to make up a deficit in the Diocesan Budget.

4. Fund items listed as diocesan institutions (budget item No. 3) through special fund drives after 1976.

5. In the funding of congregations, fund only congregations engaged in ministry to community.

6. Urge merger of congregations where appropriate.

7. Reduce debts of debt burdened congregations with capital funds as available; and be it further

RESOLVED that the 135th Convention adopt the following proposals for Constructive Change and direct the Standing Committee to implement them:

1. Adopt a "Fair Share" method of funding the diocesan budget by 1976.

2. Explore the possibility of consulting experts on developing Stewardship within congregations.

3. Assist congregations in planning ministries to the community.
4. Assist with diocesan funds those congregations with resources and motivation to engage in ministry to the community.

5. Appoint an officer for development to help congregations obtain non-church funds for community programs.
6. Institute a special funding program to assist in the support of

6. Institute a special funding program to assist in the support of diocesan institutions, including those now listed as item III of of the budget.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Report of the St. Christopher Committee, with its program for 1975, was approved.

The Convention recessed for dinner at 5:30 P.M.

At 6:30 P.M. dinner was served in the Gold Room of Hotel Jefferson to 410 members of the Diocese and guests. Following the dinner the Bishop introduced clergy new to the Diocese since the 134th Convention, and their wives.

The Bishop presented medallions and citations to a number of Lay Persons for their work in behalf of the Church and the community: Mrs. George K. Conant, John M. Drescher, Jr., Russell Durgin, Carol Aileen Fleming, Dr. S. Allen Heininger, Helen Josephine Moore, John R. Rogers, Mrs. Richard D. Thomas and William M. Van Cleve.

The Bishop delivered his annual Address to the Convention and the Diocese. (Appendix No. 1)

The Convention recessed until Saturday morning.

Saturday, February 8, 1975

The 135th Convention of the Diocese reconvened in the Nave of the Cathedral at 9:08 A.M., with the Bishop in the chair. The meeting was opened with prayer by Mr. John Culhane

Tellers were appointed and ballots distributed. When all eligible members of Convention had voted the ballots were collected and the Tellers withdrew.

At 9:25 A.M. the Rev. James Paget, on behalf of the Communications Advisory Committee, introduced Resolution No. 4:

RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri direct the Diocesan Communications officer to initiate as soon as practical, but no later than May, 1975, a program of distributing to every Episcopal family in the Diocese a combination of the national publication THE EPISCOPALIAN and the Diocesan publication INTERIM. Funding for this program is to be obtained by billing each family — directly or through the parish — the sum of \$4.00 per year, and by making up any short fall from the funds allocated for Communications in the 1975 Diocesan budget, or by seeking a "Start-up" grant from THE EPISCOPALIAN Magazine.

Following a second Mr. Paget introduced Mr. Hiram W. Neuwoehner, Jr., chairman of the Communications Advisory Committee and President of the Board of THE EPISCOPALIAN. Mr. Neuwoehner outlined the plan whereby INTERIM can be made an insert in THE EPISCOPALIAN twelve issues per year, and the financial arrangements whereby the majority of the cost is paid by the reader.

During discussion a motion to amend the word "billing" to read "voluntary contributions" was defeated,

After further discussion the resolution was put to a vote and adopted.

Ms. Martha Matthaei, Executive Director of the Episcopal-Presbyterian Foundation for the Aging, Inc., was introduced to present orally the report of the Foundation.

The Rev. Andrew G. Kunz, Jr., Vicar of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, introduced Naomi Cook as the first Lay Delegate from this parish resident in the neighborhood to sit in Convention since 1969. He said that the Parish is once again organized and has an active program in its neighborhood.

During discussion of a number of Resolutions the Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr. William M. Van Cleve, presided.

Dr. Hood, for the Committee on Resolutions, presented Resolution No. 5, saying that this was the only response from a Convocation to Resolution No. 5 of the 134th Convention which had been forwarded to the Convocation for study, coming from Metro I, and that the Committee did not recommend the resolution be adopted in this form. He said also that recently Metro IV had adopted a shorter resolution in response.

THE RESPONSE FROM METRO I

WHEREAS war always requires that human beings kill other human beings; and

WHEREAS love of fellow human beings is not present in the condition of war; and

WHEREAS war always causes persons to judge that some persons' lives are expendable, less valuable than other persons' lives; and WHEREAS God loves all persons equally; therefore be it

RESOLVED
(1) that the Diocese of Missouri in Convention declare its belief to be that war is antithetical to God's will, and that war is inconsistent with, and contrary to, the spirit and teachings of Christ; and

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(2) that this Convention in expressing these beliefs does not express its own judgment upon the judgment and feelings of any person re-

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garding war. WHEREAS if this country is militarily threatened: be it

RESOLVED that this country should defend itself by military means until the threat is repelled.

WHEREAS it is not the purpose of this resolution to nullify or disregard the sacrifices made by veterans of all wars in defense of this

country; be it RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church express its gratitude for all sacrifices made in the military service by dedicated men and women with the hope that war will be eliminated as a means of settling international disputes.

WHEREAS there are a number of Episcopalians who, in Christian Conscience, cannot and will not bear arms and believe it is opposed to God's will that one human being kill another; therefore be it RESOLVED if any person of such conscience should be accepted by the military it should be in non-combatant service in no way having to do with the taking of life directly or indirectly.

WHEREAS only the growth of love, replacing hate, through the

Holy Spirit can bring peace to the world; be it RESOLVED that all Episcopalian pray for growth in the love and the power of the Holy Spirit so that peaceful maesures undertaken in our own time will lead us into seeing manifested God's peace on

earth and His good will towards men.

Mr. Herzog moved that the Resolution be divided. The motion was seconded.

The Rev. Mr. Park moved as a substitute the Resolution proposed by Metro IV, and that this be considered as a Memorial to General Convention:

WHEREAS God wants all persons to love each other and to live

in peace with one another; and

WHEREAS with this knowledge some persons choose to fight a war and some persons choose to object to fighting a war; therefore be it RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri urge that the Episcopal Church in General Convention lend its strength to peacemaking by:

1. Requesting the issuance annually of a Pastoral Letter from the House of Bishops concerning the making and keeping of peace;

2. Asking the respective Dioceses to conduct annual studies and seminars on making and keeping the peace; and

3. Urging each congregation to conduct annual seminars on making and keeping the peace; and

4. Urging each person to strive strongly to learn and know the will of God in matters which make for peace or war;

and be it further RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church hereby declare that its love, concern and polity embraces both those who choose to fight a war, and those who choose to object to a war.

Following a second discussion ensued. Debate being closed the Substitute from Metro IV was made the main Resolution.

Resolution No. 5, as substituted, was adopted.

Mr. Jones, for the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure, reported the following elections:

To the Standing Committee for terms to end with the 139th Convention: The Rev. G. David Deppen, Mr. Neal T. Dohr and Mrs. Donovan Rhynsburger.

To the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral. The Rev. Charles F. Homeyer and Mrs. Richard C. Brown.

As Deputies to the 65th General Convention: The Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf, the Rev. David H. Benson, the Rev. David P. Hegg, II, and the Rev. Frederick A. Pope; Messrs. George T. Guernsey III, John R. Rogers and Charles K. Baker, and Mrs. Frederick Peterson.

As Provisional or Alternate Deputies to the General Convention: The Rev. Messrs. David E. Johnson, Arthur R. Steidemann, William D. Stickney and Claudius Miller III; Mrs. George Roudebush, and Messrs. Darwin Hindman, Martin Gardner, Jr., and Hiram W. Neuwoehner, Jr.

Dr. Hood introduced Resolution No. 6, saying it had been presented by Metro I but the Committee on Resolutions did not feel it served any purpose since the matter and issue had been covered elsewhere.

A Resolution on Conscientious Objection to Military Activity.

WHEREAS the Lambeth Conference of the Anglican Communion de-

clared in 1930 and reaffirmed in 1948 and 1958:
"War as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ." WHEREAS the Bishops of the Episcopal Church stated in their Pastoral Letter of 1933: "The cross is above the flag. In any issue between country and God, the clear duty of the Christian is to put obedience to God above every other loyalty."

WHEREAS the Bishops in their Pastoral Letter of 1934 stated:

"War is murder on a colossal scale."
WHEREAS the Bishop's Pastoral Letter of 1939 says:

"We believe that war will never achieve peace, but only sow the seeds for further wars."

WHEREAS in 1940 the General Convention of the Episcopal Church established a Roster For Conscientious Objectors.

WHEREAS in 1961 the General Convention, referring to the action of the Convention in 1940, passed the following resolution: "Resolved, that the National Council be asked to provide in such

a way as seems best to them a similar agency to protect the rights and interests, under the National Selective Service Act, of the members of our Church who hold the Christian Pacifist Po-

WHEREAS in response to this resolution, the Executive Council of the Church maintains a Roster for Conscientious Objectors with provision for the registration of conscientious objectors through the Rev. Robert C. Martin, Jr., Registrar for Conscientious Objectors, 815 Second Avenue, New York, New York 10017, therefore be it RESOLVED that the Diocese of Missouri reaffirms that the con-

scientious objection to participation in military activities is an acceptable view for an Episcopalian.

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Mr. Herzog moved the adopton of the Resolution and, following a second, the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. F. Allyn Walker, on behalf of Metro III, requested permission to introduce a Resolution concerning Long Range Planning. By vote of the Convention he was granted permission to introduce Resolution No. 7, which with certain amendments, was adopted.

WHEREAS on-going planning is necessary to any organization if it is to avoid a reactive, crisis-type posture; therefore be it RESOLVED that this Convention request the VIII Bishop of Missouri and the Standing Committee to establish a Long Range Planning Committee within the coming year to discover, define and help us understand where this Diocese will be 5, 10, 20 and 50 years from now; and what problems, issues, opportunities, etc., will confront us then.

The Rev. Mr. Walker then on behalf of Metro III requested permission to introduce a Resolution on Financial Assistance to Congregations. Permission was not granted and the proposed Resolution was not introduced.

Dr. Hood said there would be two Resolutions in response to the portion of the Bishop's Address which dealt with hunger. Resolution No. 8 was moved by the Rev. Mr. Kunz on behalf of himself and the Rev. Messrs. Kolb, Mason, Skinner and Stickney. Following a second it was adopted.

WHEREAS the world wide hunger crisis is increasingly evident within our own nation and within the cities and towns served by the Diocese of Missouri; and

WHEREAS legitimate requests for food assistance are made almost daily at Ascension, Trinity, St. Stephen's and the Cathedral in St. Louis City, and Emmanuel Church in St. Louis County; and WHEREAS the projected shortage of food in the metropolitan St.

Louis area continues to increase for many persons, including those on fixed incomes, the unemployed, and those awaiting public assistance and food stamps; and

WHEREAS this increased need is documented by existing agencies providing emergency assistance such as United Methodist Metro Ministry, Christian Ministries, Inc., and Fellowship Center; now

therefore be it RESOLVED that the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri urge the communicants and parishes to respond to the intense hunger crisis by contributing canned and other non-perishable food for those

in emergency need situations; and be it further RESOLVED that the collection of these offerings within the congregations be encouraged on at least one Sunday in Lent, and on a

monthly basis after Easter where possible; and be it further RESOLVED that the dates and methods of collection within congregations be left to the discretion of the congregation; and be it

further RESOLVED that an ad hoc committee of this Convention consisting of Andrew Kunz, convenor, William Kolb, John Mason, Robert Skinner and William Stickney be charged with the management of this

effort; and be it further RESOLVED that this committee be responsible for informing the parishes of specific needed items; communicating a system for collecting from congregations and distributing to the points of need, including Ascension, Christ Church Cathedral, Emmanuel, St. Stephen's and Trinity; and for reporting on this project to the Standing Committee on a quarterly basis; and be it further

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RESOLVED that congregations in areas of the Diocese away from metropolitan St. Louis be encouraged to contribute and distribute food assistance directly or to work cooperatively with existing service agencies in their communities.

The second Resolution in response to the Bishop's Address was numbered 9. Following a second it was adopted.

WHEREAS in his Address to the 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri Bishop Cadigan reminded us forcefully of the tragedy of starvation and malnutrition which is present in large areas of the world, resulting in the death of thousands of men, women and children and permanent damage to thousands of others; and

WHEREAS the Presiding Bishop has issued a Pastoral Letter asking for the mobilization of the Church's efforts to relieve hunger and oppression; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri recognizes the desperate need of more than 450 millions of people who face starvation, and strongly endorses the Bishop's appeal for a meatless Wednesday each week, prayers for the hungry, and contributions to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief; and be it further

RESOLVED that each congregation of the Diocese of Missouri, through its clergy and Convention Delegates, be informed of this problem and charged to share its affluence with those in the world who are less fortunate, and that each congregation be charged to form a task force on hunger for action on this issue.

Mr. Donald Stimble requested permission to introduce a Resolution on Capital Punishment. He was given permission to introduce Resolution No. 10, which following a second and discussion was adopted:

WHEREAS Jesus clearly condemned the concept of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth"; and

WHEREAS the exacting of the death penalty for any crime presumes to judge the value of continued life from the point of view of its author; and

WHEREAS reconciliation and amendment of life are necessarily terminated by the act of execution; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 135th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri is opposed to reinstatement of the death penalty by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri; and be it further RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the General

Assembly within the next seven days.

Mr. Hawley, as Chairman of the St. Christopher Committee requested the Convention to clarify the relationship of the Committee to the "Fair Share Plan" adopted on Friday, saying that there seems to be a difference in philosophy. Discussion ensued.

Upon motion by the Rev. Dr. Tombaugh, duly seconded, the Convention declared its acceptance of goals 1, 3, 4 and 5 in the Report of St. Christopher Committee on February 7, and urged the Committee to continue the development and promotion of staywardship within the Diogram tinue the development and promotion of stewardship within the Diocese of Missouri in accordance with the spirit of the "Fair Share Plan" and the Resolution (No. 3) relative to LRPC Report No. 5.

The Rev. Mr. Hyde requested permission to speak about the Equal Rights Amendment to the United States Constitution, now before the Missouri General Assembly. He was granted permission and called attention to Resolution No. 8 of the 134th Convention which endorsed the amendment. Upon motion, duly seconded, the endorsement by the 134th Convention was reaffirmed and Mr. Hyde authorized to communicate this endorsement to the Missouri Senate.

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Upon invitation of Canon Zabriskie Christ Church Cathedral was named as the place of the 136th Convention, the date to be the first Tuesday in May, 1976, unless otherwise decided by ecclesiastical authority.

Upon nomination by Archdeacon Rehkopf the Rev. Frederick Boswell, Jr., and Messrs. Edwin Johnston and George Dexheimer were elected to terms of three years as Trustees of the University of the South.

Dr. Hood presented a number of Resolutions of courtesy. Following a second each was adopted.

WHEREAS Christ Church Cathedral and its people have hosted this 135th Convention with the efficiency and grace which the Diocese has come to expect from the Clergy and People of its Mother Parish; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri express its appreciation and gratitude to the clergy and people of Christ Church Cathedral for their hospitality.

WHEREAS Mrs. Margaret Bush Wilson has been chosen as the first Black woman to be chairperson of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in its 65-year history; and

WHEREAS Mrs. Margaret Bush Wilson has been a faithful parishioner of All Saints Church, St. Louis, for many years, serving presently as legal counsel to its Vestry, and has represented that parish several times in the Convention of the Diocese; now therefore be it RESOLVED that this 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri express to Margaret Bush Wilson our congratulations on her election and the continued support of the Diocese for the ideals and purposes for which her organization stands.

WHEREAS the Rt. Rev. John Maury Allin, Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, displays a firm leadership of the Church as Chief Pastor, Prophet and Reconciler; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri send to the Presiding Bishop our expression of support, greeting, and best wishes for his continued success as he leads the Church in these times.

WHEREAS the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri, after much effort and prayer, has chosen the Rev. William A. Jones, Jr. as its eighth Bishop and looks forward to his forthcoming consecration with great anticipation; now therefore be it

anticipation; now therefore be it RESOLVED that this 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri send to the Bishop-elect, the Rev. William A. Jones, Jr., our greetings, support and prayers as he prepares to become our Chief Pastor and Father in God.

WHEREAS the Diocese of Missouri has carried to completion the election of its eighth Bishop by means of a wide-ranging pioneer process which allowed and encouraged the participation of the people of the Diocese; and

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WHEREAS the election process was guided, prodded and prayed over by the members of the Screening Committee who invested thousands of hours of faithful service; now therefore be it RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri express its heartfelt thanks to the Screening Committee,

and its chairman, Mr. Neal T. Dohr, commends them for their work and its result, and discharges them from their task with gratitude.

That Resolution was adopted with applause.

WHEREAS Jane M. Cadigan has shared the life and work of George Leslie Cadigan since August 12, 1944, as a wife, mother, arbiter, and has been an integral part of the Diocese for sixteen years; now

therefore be it RESOLVED that the 135th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri send its greetings to Jane M. Cadigan who has earned our affection and gratitude and will remain in our thoughts and prayers always.

Mrs. Cadigan, being present, was greeted with a standing ovation.

WHEREAS the Rt. Rev. George Leslie Cadigan, seventh Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri, will shortly retire after serving

as Diocesan since April 16, 1959; and

WHEREAS in his sixteen years as Bishop of Missouri George Leslie Cadigan has built an impressive record as a caring ecumenical Churchman, a responsible citizen, and a prominent leader in St. Louis, in Missouri and in the nation; and WHEREAS from all the work and accomplishments of those years,

Diocesan Convention Address:

The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan

DEAR FRIENDS OF THE CHURCH OF GOD IN MISSOURI.

In an address to the clergy at our September conference, I began with these words:

"MORITURI TE SALUTAMUS!" Lest you think that your about-toretire Bishop is now engaging in glossalalia, or speaking in tongues, let
me quickly interpret for the non-Latin scholars that these words are taken
from the Satires of Juvenal and were spoken by the gladiators to Caesar
prior to their combat in the Stadium. Freely translated, the phrase means,
"We who are about to die salute you!" Perhaps they would be just as
appropriately used in the Super Bowl games today, which have become
the opiate of the American people. But I use them here in the last formal
address that I make before the delegates of Convention.

My temptation this evening is to avoid issues, or to make you laugh, or to speak pietistically — and exit, allowing you to feel that Bishop George is a pretty nice fellow after all. But somehow, I keep remembering other words, words of Hugh Latimer, the sixteenth century bishop, Protestant reformer and martyr: "Hugh Latimer, Hugh Latimer, tomorrow you preach before your King. Be careful what you say, Hugh Latimer, be careful what you say." Then he pauses and begins again: "Hugh Latimer, Hugh Latimer, tomorrow you preach before your God. Be careful what you say, Hugh Latimer, be careful what you say!"

I am indebted to John E. Hines for this quotation of Albert Guerard who, in commenting on the influence of the Italian poet Dante, made this observation: "The whims of diplomacy have parceled out the foothills of Mont Blanc among France, Italy and Switzerland but, when we gaze at the giant — man-made boundaries are soon forgotten!" The former Presiding Bishop goes on to say, "So it is with Christ... the Source of our surrender, and our power unto servanthood: the saving giant of Law and Grace. Is there anything that, more effectively, can serve to recall the Church to her mandate, when, as is happening at this very hour; an army of the dispossessed, and the halt, and the diseased, and the desperate, the confused and the hostile — confront the Servants of God with the plea: "Sirs — we would see Jesus!"

It is not that the poor and oppressed are better people than those of us who possess more of this world's goods. Like ourselves, the affluent, they, too, commit adultery, get drunk, commit murder and are dishonest. The difference is that the impoverished are so helpless and altogether bereft of the right to play a role in those decision-making processes which determine the course of their lives.

Let me begin with the most sensitive of issues — the question of amnesty. Some of you are aware that in our family there are four children, three of whom are men. The oldest is a career officer in the Infantry, who served twice in Viet Nam, was wounded and awarded the Purple Heart and the Silver Star. Our second son was a specific Conscientious Objector and was prepared to go to prison if drafted to fight in southeast Asia. The third son was working with the Peace Corps in Africa when at the summons of his draft board he was obliged to return to St. Louis — and served as a Conscientious Objector for two years in a Missouri hospital. During these war years, this was a rather interesting family to mother and father. I did not wholly agree with the position of any of these sons, but I endorsed the consciences of each and they knew it.

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The results of that tragic war are still in our midst and there are yet thousands of young Americans living in exile because of their resistance to military service during the war in southeast Asia. To be sure, a few of them have made the mistakes of many adolescents and are imprisoned in the jails of Canada, Sweden and other European countries. Many of them are yet in hiding in the United States. But most of these young people are the gifted, the sensitive, the concerned — and are exactly those who can most help in the rebuilding of this country and the nations of the world. Therefore, without reservation, I worked with other bishops to pass a resolution at the October meeting of the House of Bishops, which said in part that

"... the House of Bishops calls upon the appropriate authorities of this government to grant to Viet Nam Veterans every benefit it has given to Veterans of past wars; and be it further resolved that general amnesty be granted to all who refused to participate in the conflict in Indo China ...; and be it further resolved that even as we commend our President's initiative ... we recognize that the plan of 'earned re-entry' falls short of accomplishing the human goal of healing divisions resulting from the United States' involvement in Viet Nam; and we call upon the President, this nation and this Church to work toward the further goal of general amnesty for all those whose civil status is in jeopardy because of refusal to participate in the conflict in Indo China."

The Random House dictionary reminded me that the word "amnesty" comes from the Greek word "amnestia" — from which comes the word "amnesia." Therefore, amnesty has nothing to do with forgiveness, since forgiveness implies moral quilt of some sort. (The President of the United States did not grant amnesty to his predecessor — he granted him a pardon.) Amnesty means to "forget" or to "blot out" — the law's own way of undoing what the law itself has done. Amnesty which has been granted in America in other years, is an act done by a nation for the sake of that nation. "While legal in intent, it becomes moral in scope, and it is at this point that for the Church and for Christians, amnesty becomes an important element in that process of reconciliation which ought to be its constant concern." It is reconciliation which we need at this time, a reconciling of those alienated from one another — for the purpose of healing the larger human family in America and abroad. Bishop Browning of the American Church in Europe, and who is close to many exiled young men, reminds us that these men had to face issues which most of us never had to face and that nothing can be gained by forgetting them or punishing them. "Granting them unconditional amnesty will be one indication that we, as a nation, are willing to face the same issues we compelled them to face. To advocate amnesty is the least the Church can do at this time; while in and of itself it is not reconciliation. It is that first step which can enable it to happen." That is why, as your Chief Shepherd, I must ask for your involvement of thought and prayer and action at this time.

More than a year ago, I gave statements to the news media and issued a Pastoral Letter to be read in all the churches regarding the plight of the United Farm Workers. I received more hostile letters about these actions than I received during the entire Civil Rights movement in the 1960s. As I sought to analyze why, I came to the conclusion that in the minds of many, the farmer is the last vestige of American individualism. Actually, in my estimation, the small farmer would be greatly assisted in competing with the large landholders if the farm workers had the right to organize. Here I am not describing the farming operations in the east or middle west, but, rather, the situation of the migrant workers mostly in the southwest and west, who represent the largest employment pool of any business or industry in that portion of our nation. The struggle still endures and will continue to endure so long as these thousands of field workers are oppressed. Here in St. Louis, you are aware of the issue in

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the United Farm Workers' boycott, particularly of Gallo wines, grapes and iceberg lettuce, products which do not bear the Black Eagle Stamp of the United Farm Workers. Perhaps I may best describe my feelings in quoting from my letter in response to a letter from a good friend who cares for me, but who challenges me sincerely about my stands on issues of public import, particularly the United Farm Workers. To him I wrote in part:

"You know that I regard you as a warm friend and that my respect and affection for you are very great indeed. At our morning devotions this summer, my wife and I have been reading from the writings of the Old Testament prophets. They are filled with a profound concern for righteousness and justice. Then, as I read from the teachings of Jesus, I am made even more aware of His love for and ministry to the poor. All people are His people and for all people He came, He lived and He suffered, that reconciliation among all people might take place. It is not enough that we who call ourselves Christians read the Gospel. I believe that we are meant to act upon it also and serve as ministers and reconcilers, too. This is too simplistic, but it is the backdrop for my statement about the migrant workers in California or anywhere else.

"The life span of the migrant worker is only forty-nine years, which is considerably lower than the life expectancy of the average American. Eight hundred thousand children under sixteen work in the fields of America. The average wage of a farm worker is \$2,071 a year. Because of the pain of the migrant workers, the rest of the nation has fresh fruits and vegetables. These migrant workers, who are mostly Chicanos, are asking for two essential things: (1) fair elections; (2) and a union of their own choosing.

"The powerful and wealthy Teamsters' Union has made its own contracts with the growers and at the expense of Chavez' followers who are members of the AFL-CIO Union. The Teamsters' Union was created many years ago to help their people. At that time, their ideology was pure. But, like many large corporations, sometimes churches and individuals, I believe they have missed the mark here. You will remember Lord Acton's words. 'All power corrupts, absolute power corrupts absolutely.' Theologically, this is original sin. The migrant farm worker has suffered deplorable working conditions, physical violence, court injunctions and intimidations, and unfair farm worker legislation.

"The policy of Cesar Chavez, who is a devout Roman Catholic, has always been non-violent. He has stated, 'All the contracts in the world are not worth the life of one striker or his child, nor one grower or his child.'

"Unless concerned folk register their feelings and thoughts about this serious matter, as well as exercise the right to boycott, not only will injustice be served, but the possibility of violent eruption is altogether likely.

"Dear friend, this is the way I see it. I could be wrong, as I have been many times, and, if I am, I ask God's and your forgiveness. But I must speak the truth as I see it. The spiritual life of the Church must align itself with the problems of the poor and help such to discover that life abundant for which our Lord offered Himself.

Bless you, and "I am your friend,"

Here, again, I seek to speak as a Shepherd, not only to this small denomination called the Episcopal Church, but to all of God's children.

My third area of concern this evening deals with the tragedy of the millions who in this world at this time are starving for lack of food. I

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wonder if this issue really needs much amplification. The news media, particularly the television, have reminded us again and again of the massive famine that is spreading throughout the universe. There may be serious hunger even in St. Louis this winter. One of our own clergy, the Reverend John Mason, is serving as my deputy for this particular need and at a later time we may hear more about this.

The starvation of millions of people is not just another catastrophe, but rather a major tragedy of history. What of the pictures we see on the television screen as we sit in our comfortable homes? People too listless to walk to the bread lines, swollen bellies of children with legs too thin to stand upon. For such there is no home, no clothing, no food, no medicine, no fire, no water — and the abandonment of hope. And so we watch and are moved for the moment and then depart for our Weight Watchers' class and wonder if we can find space to park our car!

"The average American consumes two thousands pounds of grain each year, most of it indirectly through the meat we eat; in the developing world the average person consumes less than five hundred pounds, almost none of it in meat. America's pets consume the equivalent of a year's supply of grain for thirty-five million people. The fertilizer we spread on our lawns, golf courses, cemeteries and flower gardens amounts to three million tons each year; the fertilizer shortfall around the world this year is two million tons." This is a different kind of famine than the world has known and it is predicted that it will not be of short duration. It involves the climatic change, the population explosion, the energy crisis and the acute shortage of fertilizer. And the whole sorry picture is surrounded by the economic crisis which affects the traditional sources of aid.

I am not going to write a Pastoral to the Churches of Missouri about this issue. You have already received one from the Presiding Bishop. Nor am I going to appoint another committee, except the clergy of each parish, and you, who are the delegates to this Convention. I am going to suggest that clergy and delegates urge their respective parishes to adopt this simple standard for Wednesday of every week:

1. Eat no meat

2. Pray for those who are hungry

3. Send checks through your parish treasurer to the Diocesan Office and marked for "The Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief."

Last year this Diocese sent more than \$8,000 to The Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief. If each of the seven thousand Episcopal families in Missouri contributed \$1.00 per week for the hungry, that would amount to more than \$350,000 dollars and just one dollar can feed one child for sixty days! The Presiding Bishop suggests special offerings on either March 2 or 9. I am suggesting that Missouri — always in the lead in some things — go beyond this and, as Christian folk, make a special offering every week.

But even this measure can be only a temporary stopgap. Food, clothing, jobs, education, medicines and blankets will always be needed at any time. I should like to see The Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief begin to work for the elimination of injustice, oppression, joblessness and social changes, that people everywhere can, with dignity, provide for themselves.

In THE EPISCOPALIAN, I found this quotation and I assume it is accurate.

"If the world were a global village of 100 people, 70 of them would be unable to read, and only one would have a college education. Over 50 would be suffering from malnutrition, and over 80 would live in what we

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lems take and f and r the E serving call substandard housing. If the world were a global village of 100 residents, 6 of them would be Americans. These 6 would have half the village's entire income, and the other 94 would exist on the other half. How would the wealthy 6 live 'in peace' with their neighbors? Surely they would be driven to arm themselves against the other 94 . . . perhaps even to spend, as we do, more per person on military defense than the total per person income of the others."

So, as your Shepherd, I ask again, not that you consent to be herded like sheep, but that you remember forever — deep, deep inside yourselves — the words of the Good Shepherd: 'Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Because we are churchmen, perhaps this address requires a text. Here is mine, which is yours, and it is chosen from the Trial Service of Confirmation:

"Strengthen your servants . . . with the riches of your Holy Spirit. Sustain them and empower them for your service."

It is not just my age, it is rather my experience which at this period in my life makes me believe more than ever in the power of prayer, the nourishment of Eucharist and the fellowship of the followers of Jesus. But also at this period of my life, I think I understand the Mission of the Church more clearly than ever.

Our society today, in which God has placed yourselves and myself, desperately needs change. The question is — whether it will be ushered in by social revolution or will it come because the faithful respond to Mission as God has given us to see it? Such, as I understand it, means that change will have to come through a transformation of the institutions which now dominate rather than serve our lives. There are some faint signs that this is happening: The attempt to get representation for the larger public interest on the boards of our great corporations; the attempt of those trapped in our ghettoes to gain control over their economic circumstances and the education of their young; the effort by women to escape the cultural taboos which constrict their lives; the attempt of students to gain some small voice in the conduct of education; the endeavor to devolve authority and power from some distant center to the local level where an individual's voice may be heard and count.

Each and every one of these areas presents tough and complicated problems to be wrestled with, and it will take patient and resolute courage to take them on. But take them on we must — if we are to remain faithful and free. To have the courage and the intelligence to take on such tasks, and many more, seems to me is the Mission of a Church so privileged as the Episcopal Church; and, if we will fulfill that responsibility, we will be serving God's world and the children of God who live in it.

Appendix No. 4

STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI

In accordance with the Constitution and Canons, the Standing Committee submits herewith to the Convention a report of its actions during the past year and its recommended Budget for 1975.

THE BUDGET

The Standnig Committee has recommended to this convention the largest budget in a half dozen years, except for the unbalanced budget of last year that was \$50,000 larger. The Diocese cannot pay for this budget any more than it could pay for the previous budgets. Over the past half-dozen years the Diocese has only been able to or been willing to pay for about two-thirds of each of the annual expenditures of this Diocese. The balance of the income for expenditures has been paid for from gifts from the Bishop, gifts from individuals, or from income from endowments or, sometimes, the principal of endowments themselves.

Two-thirds of support comes from money freely given by parishes and missions of the Diocese out of monies given to them by their members. These gifts, freely given, seems to speak for a proper and healthy relationship between church members and their church, an extension of the lives of the members of the Diocese and of their commitment to the work of the church; a commitment of money, the expenditure of which the convention may decide and of which the Standing Committee must report and account.

The other third of the income, that comes from other gifts, is in a sense, "a free ride" to the diocese in terms of responsibility and accountability. That is to say, we don't get it together, we don't own it, but we need it, want it, and have come to depend upon it. The reporting and accounting for these funds, it would seem, is owed only to the giver. And yet, we in the Diocese have learned to want these funds, to depend upon them, and to wish for them to continue without a way of accounting to the giver.

One third of our income has this very troublesome relationship of ownership and stewardship. It creates pressures on the Bishops, the Convention, and the Standing Committee when they attempt to prepare a Budget. We struggle to evaluate all funded programs and missions so as to determine worthiness and appropriateness against some standard. Then we realize that we cannot afford all of our opportunities, but yet, we are unwilling to lose that which is of value and that we want to continue. So finally at each budget preparation we turn once again, to the survival stance and hang in there as best we can.

We cannot healthily afford all that we have and want. Neither can we part with that which we hold dear. So then, we prepare the budget, together, that lacks credibility, embarrassing us all. I have talked to no one who respects our budget as that which we want it to be.

Standing Committee recommends to this 135th Convention the proposed budget as the best possible for now. But Standing Committee also recommends to this convention and its convocations, as well as the St. Christopher committee, to hasten on to the serious consideration of this matter this year, for it is unlikely that all of the additional funds available this year will be available next year. Continue to agonize the alternative as to whether to give more or spend less. But also, look beyond yourselves to the provisions of your Diocesan structure and evaluate whether there isn't benefit to trusting it in a new way.

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whice work been com vent mitte By his I mean support of the Bishop's office so that it can perform its functions in the work of Planning, Program and Operations, Communications and Fiscal Affairs. We have recommended a form of "Fair Share" plan to Convention and await the recommendation of the St. Christopher Committee. Congregations and Convocations might not be able to do this directly but they can, and have been, supportive by sparking and training individuals that can and will do the work on a committee basis. We have so much encouraging evidence of this; we need to get this all together for the good of us all, together.

THE CONVOCATIONS

Because of forces beyond our immediate control in our society and in our church, we engage in a style of oligarchial decision making; this is to say, decision making by a few to serve the many. What we do, many times, seems to be unavoidable because oligarchial action seems to be the quickest and the easiest, the least bothersome and yet the most bothersome. While we are accustomed to this style of decision making, we seem to be uncomfortable with it. Examples of activities that seem to be more satisfying, fulfilling and rewarding are: our convocational process; clergy conferences; the several activities to elect the VIII Bishop of Missouri, noteworthy of which was the Screening Committee; the Long Range Planning Committee and the several sub-committees chartered by the Bishop; the Convention and Standing Committee; and such others as, the St. Christopher Committee, the Youth Committee, the Ringo Bequest Committee, Process Management Committee, and the like.

Our Convocational Process has provided us, and must continue to provide us, with individuals that are interested, informed, and influential to support the growth of our lives and therefore the life of the Church. Our spiritual lives seem to be influenced not so much by prayer as by the mystical body of Christ working together. We need to learn more and to do more about knowing ourselves and one another about living and supporting ourselves and one-another, accordingly.

Much of this is happening within Congregations. But, for the Diocese, the convocation is where it is at. The annual turnover of membership in Convocation, Communications, and leadership is troublesome. But, a half dozen years ago we embarked on a long range adventure to grow together out of grass roots development. It was never imagined that success would come quickly or easily, but that it would come steadily and healthily from within with hard work.

Standing Committee sees Convocations' tasks this year to be those of evaluating their own strengths and weaknesses and adjusting accordingly. Responsible leadership and a style of leadership requires up-dating. All of the issues that confront us cannot be resolved at once. So it seems appropriate to select those one or two or three issues that seem most important and achievable to undertake for this year. You are a wonderful group; you have enjoyed a growing life together and the benefits of it seem to be greater than ever within recollection. We commend to yourselves to get it all together for the sake of us all, together.

ON-GOING CARES AND CONCERNS

The Long Range Planning Committee has fulfilled the purpose for which it was chartered and has requested retirement. The product of its work has been reported in five reports that are in your hands and have been acted upon or await action by Convention. The Standing Committee commends Long Range Planning Committee for its work and urges Convention to resolve the issues undertaken by Long Range Planning Committee advising strategies and making decisions accordingly.

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n the promittee also as the St. ion of this is available alternative yourselves ther there Standing Committee observes that Convention, at times, has created committees and has adopted Resolutions, the fulfillment of which has created superimposed, crossing or counter-flowing activities. Such was the case this year with St. Christopher Committee, Long Range Planning Committee, the "Fair Share Plan" Committee and Standing Committee as they worked with matters of funding and budgeting. While there have been sufficient tasks for all to work creatively, this Committee will endeavor to coordinate this work in the coming year so that concurrent activities are in harmony. Earlier this year the Diocese learned that it would receive a bequest from the estate of the late Fredonia Ringo. From the work of a committee representative of the Diocese, we learned of many worthy opportunities to which this fund might be supportive while decisions on this matter have been scheduled for 1975; it is likely that the fund will remain intact, invested, and the income will be used for Diocesan program, as was recommended by the Ringo Bequest Fund Committee.

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An outstanding activity and event of the year was the Process of Electing the VIII Bishop of Missouri and our election of the Reverend William Augustus Jones, Jr. at the Special Convention on December 7, for which we applaud all of those who participated. Standing Committee is currently working with the Bishop-Elect to complete administrative matters associated with his office, consecration, household move, and the like.

Reflecting some of the activities of this committee during this year seems to affirm the reorganization requested in the Bishop's address at the 126th convention and subsequently provide by Convention 1966. The reorganization provided an Office of the Bishop "to aid the Bishop in the performance of his duties and hereby created within the Office of the Bishop the following Divisions: Administration, Research and Planning, Program and Operations, Communications, Fiscal Affairs, and such other divisions as may be hereafter created by the convention." But these provisions have not been able to be fulfilled, for in the months following reorganization, the atrophy of giving made it impossible to fund these positions, except for Administration. As it has happened much of the work intended for these positions has found its way to Standing Committee. The Standing Committee is concerned as to the appropriateness of such movement and the associated possible risks to the various parts of the institution. While creative and imaginative voluntarism has served the Bishop, Convention and Standing Committee, we believe that the work of the Diocese will not be satisfactorily accomplished until the establishment and support of the Divisions.

While we cannot fund these positions now, anymore than we could nine years ago, it seems likely that the convocations and the chartered and ad hoc committees that have served us so well in the past, now would serve as the source of persons to serve, to fulfill the requirements of the Divisions of the Office of the Bishop.

THE CALENDAR

In less than ten weeks, our Bishop, George, will retire. He will have completed sixteen years of Episcopacy as Diocesan of Missouri, for which we all rejoice in so many years. This event alone must bring us closer as we look forward to new adventures and opportunities. In this time, we must help our Bishop and ourselves to unhook and find new ways to greet each other anew; to receive our new Bishop, William, and to bring him and ourselves to begin in these times to serve, as it can. It is pleased with the support of Process Management Committee and the Negotiating Committee to provide services appropriate and necessary for these occasions.

THE STANDING COMMITTEE

I would be remiss not to report something of your Standing Committee's activities for this year, in a subjective way, for it is a delightful and talented group. The Standing Committee came together in March of this year to form itself and to plan its activities for the year. From early team building activities there emerged a team of strong, knowledgeable and dedicated members. It reviewed all known issues, activities and events that were expected to follow in the year and was staggered by them. The committee quickly adjusted to a management style of operation, adopted new and necessary disciplines and organized itself in depth through task-oriented sub-committees of itself and others to handle its responsibilities. The Committee met throughout the year without interruption in reponse to your trust and its obligations. I believe that the committee is its own reward and is grateful for its many opportunities.

Appendix No. 7

Report for the Long Range Planning Committee To the 135th Convention of Diocese of Missouri

During the fall of 1971 at the initiation of Bishop Cadigan and with the cooperation of the several convocations a Long Range Planning Committee of the Diocese was appointed with representation from each convocation and appointments at large by the Bishop.

In Resolution No. 6 of the 132nd Convention in February, 1972, the Long Range Planning Committee was directed to study and make recommendations within six months concerning the "nature, duration and type of support to the Parishes and Missions" that the Diocese should plan and carry out. At the 133rd Convention, though the LRPC had not completed the study of congregational support, the Committee was charged with two new tasks; one, to develop a plan for a process of electing the VIII Bishop of the Diocese and secondly, to study the structure of the Diocese especially the election and function of the Standing Committee and make recommendations for any needed change.

On its own initiative during 1973 the LRPC appointed Task Forces and produced reports on the question of new ways to fund the Diocese and the issue of Church Extension in the Metropolitan area.

During the past three years we have met as a committee on thirty occasions for five hour full committee sessions. There have been a great number of sub-committee and task force meetings beyond the regular committee sessions and we sponsored, in January 1973 a Town and Country Conference as a data gathering and hypothesis testing exercise.

Our first completed report Town and Country Ministry was published in February, 1973. Substitute resolution No. 4 at last years convention was at least in part a response to this report.

Report No. 2, A Proposal for an Episcopal Charities Funding Appeal, was issued in May, 1973, and led to the calling of the Special Convention of October 29, 1973 which gave birth to the St. Christopher's Committee.

Report No. 3, A Proposal for the Process for Electing the Eighth Bishop of Missouri was completed in June, 1973 and adopted with minor revisions by the 134th Convention in February, 1974.

Report No. 4, Church Extension in the Metropolitan Area was published in March, 1974 has been in the hands of Convocations and Standing Committee with no action proposed to the present time.

Report No. 5, The Ministry of the Church in the Metropolitan Areas came out in September, 1974 and has resulted in several resolutions before this present convention.

We have not issued any report on the structure of the Diocese though we have spent some time in our deliberations exploring and discussing this area. It is our judgment that both study and proposals concerning structure should await the coming and the active participation of our new Bishop.

It has been said by some people in the Diocese that our batting average in having our proposals and recommendations acted upon is very low and that we must feel that we have failed or that the Diocese has failed us. To the contrary we have understood our task and commission to be the gathering, ordering and sharing of information and alternative possibilities

on behalf of the decision making institutions and persons of the Diocese. We have not seen ourselves as a new power group to take over the prerogatives of Bishop, Convention, or Standing Committee. We hoped that our work would be taken seriously and at least that it would not be ignored. We believe our work has not only been taken seriously but that it is still a useful resource to those who must make policy for this Diocese.

We have learned in our three years something of the process of planning and would recommend that in future Long Range Planning a creative tension be recognized. On the one hand a committee with stable continuous membership has had the advantage of developing an inclusive and comprehensive understanding of the history, personality and interfaces of the Diocese as a whole. But, the same group has the disadvantage that however objective and honest it seeks to remain it develops over time a particular bias which will color in some way all that it sees. On the other hand, an ad hoc task force commissioned to deal with an issue can call forth tremendous energy and creativity in carrying out a specific and well defined task in a relatively short period of time, but has in it the danger of developing proposals which either conflict with or are uncoordinated with other areas of concern or aspects of the total Diocese. Both values, we believe, need to be held in tension in any future planning to bring about the most useful results for the Diocese.

We would urge the Diocese to continue a program of Long Range Planning, and would suggest that once the VIII Bishop is in place a new committee or a new process of planning be developed. But, since we have completed the work we set out to do, and since we are at a changing point in Diocesan life, and since the opportunity for re-thinking the planning process would be helped if we did not stand in the way, with this report we would respectfully submit our resignation. And so in gratitude to God for the opportunity we have had to meet, to know, and to work with one another, in penitence for what we may have added to the paper innundation of this country, and with a sure confidence in the future of this Diocese, we would ask of the 135 Convention to be discharged from further duties.

In closing I would like to express my thanks to those many people who have served with me in the process in official, if not actual, anonymity. First of all to our Bishop who gave us his trust and a great deal of his time and wisdom; to Archdeacon Rehkopf, the walking encyclopedia of Diocesan lore who always kept us working in relationship to all the data, to John Good who took our Committee's sometimes confusing thoughts and turned them into readable and non-bureaucratic English, to Howard Park who chaired the Task Force on the Process of Electing a Bishop; to Allen Heininger who chaired the Task Force on Church Extension; to Laura Booker, Margery Gantt, Katherine Nelson and William Ripley who stayed with it from the beginning; to John Adney, Jo Allen, Priscilla Baur, John Drew, Joseph Summers, Jr., William Stickney and Babe Van Nice who worked with us for various periods of time during our years together; a special word of thankful remembrance and appreciation to the late William Van Nice whose wisdom helped us through the Town and Country report; to Charles Allen, Jr., John Drescher, Jr., Richard Dunlop, James Hudson Jones and William Van Cleve who joined us on the Task Force for the funding proposal; to Robert Betts, Richard Bullock, Chandler Crawford, Neal Dohr, Eugene Fleming, Darwin Hindman, Carroll Lorenz, Lois Morgan, John Rogers and Jean Welter who helped develop the Process to elect the Bishop; and to Verner Burks, Quentin Couch, Thomas Ford and William Geddes who helped to make up the Task Force on Church Extension. To all of these and to all of you who in various ways have made possible the process of planning in this Diocese, I would express my deep gratitude and profound admiration.

Report of the Diocesan Commission on Housing 1974

As Bishop Cadigan leaves office this April, the Commission has been asked to prepare a detailed review of the status of the \$100,000 sum he made available five years ago for interest free loans to community based organizations interested in building housing.

Accordingly, a ten page review together with recommendations for the future was presented to the Bishop and Standing Committee in summer of 1974 for study. Copies are available upon request.

Through the present time the Commission has loaned a total of \$115,750 to five community projects. Of that sum, \$46,220.28 remains outstanding:

AIRPORT 20

Because of the Presidential impoundment of federal funds two years ago, especially the 235 scattered site subsidies, the Commission has written off the \$17,000 loaned to Metropolitan Housing Corporation for the Airport 20 project in Kinloch. St. Louis County National Bank and Chicago Title Company will lose much more, but they are in the process of putting the 13 houses that have been moved into marketable shape and the bank itself hopes to assume the permanent mortgages, in addition to the construction loan. There are still no federal funds available.

BELLE NEIGHBORS

The future of Belle Neighbors is still uncertain. A consortium of lenders (The Diocese of Missouri, Second Presbyterian Church and Ralston Purina) have loaned a total of \$153,500 to Belle Neighbors, all of which is still tied up in the project, for whom the developer is Union Sarah Economic Development Corp. Until there are changes in the operation of the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington or in the Missouri Housing Development Corporation in Jefferson City, a matter of at least six months to a year, nothing can be done. The Diocese, whose loan was for \$21,150, will, with the other lenders, proceed to get control of the four acre parcel at Finney and Fairfax and await an opportunity to develop alternative plans once it becomes feasible.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH

As the vehicle through which a loan of \$20,000 was made to Ralph Scales' Gateway Holding Corporation, All Saints Church is preparing to assign to the Diocese its lien on two unimproved parcels of land at the corner of Hamilton and Cabanne Avenues. The Diocese will then attempt to recover through foreclosure the \$4000 shortfall in the money returned from Gateway Holding Corporation.

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SKINKER DE BALIVIERE

Like wise a victim of federal cutbacks and impoundments, Skinker De-Baliviere has nonetheless returned \$11,829 of the \$15,000 loaned and we have been assured that the balance will be returned in six months to a year.

ALTA SITA

The Bishop issued a letter of credit for \$42,500 to this 76 unit development in East St. Louis at a time when it was foundering for lack of funds and because it had been caught in government red tape. The letter of credit did its work and Alta Sita is now a successfully completed development.

The Commission will make no further loans, of course, pending the policy of the incoming Bishop. Its attention is directed toward retrieving as much of the outstanding loan amount as possible — or where that is not possible — accepting it as a loss but at the same time attempting to make sure the money will have at least produced some of the intended housing for people who need it, Airport 20, for example. In these efforts the Commission will benefit from the professional guidance of Mr. Leon Strauss, an experienced, successful St. Louis contractor and developer.

As was originally provided for, what losses are accepted, such as Airport 20, will be repaid to the commercial lender over a period of time out of the interest income from the Thompson Fund.

REFLECTIONS

The Commission is grateful for having had the chance to join Bishop Cadigan in his practical expression of concern in helping communities in the Metropolitan area build badly needed housing. Its hopes five years ago were high. Political changes, skyrocketing costs, the inexperience of many of the good people to whom we have given help and perhaps the inexperience of the commission itself in this new style of the Church's engagement with the secular world — these seem to be the major contributing factors to the sense of disappointment the commission feels as it look back on its high hopes of five years ago.

On the other hand, as Bishop Cadigan leaves the office in which he has embodied in so many ways a strong pastoral concern for people and their communities, we want to thank him on behalf of the Diocese and the many people his housing efforts have helped and will continue to help:

- 1. There are thirteen fine homes now in Kinloch that would otherwise have been demolished at their former site at the Airport one mile away. When conventional lenders find a way to replace the absent federal financing, a new and hopeful sign will become a reality in that sorely disadvantaged community.
- 2. Seventy-six families have new and good housing in East St. Louis, because the Bishop stood behind Alta Sita when he alone would help.
- 3. From the Bishop's initial support, an entire neighborhood in the Skinker DeBaliviere area has succeeded in developing and getting long term support for a comprehensive supply of housing.
- 4. One of our strong inner city churches has been able to give to one of its members, Mr. Ralph Scales, a chance to build 20 scattered site houses. Two got built before the needed federal program was suddenly withdrawn.

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despair of str 5. Four acres of inner city jungle have been acquired in one site, and stand cleared ready for development.

Perhaps, most important of all, countless hundreds of private citizens, despairing of hope in so many ways, and deserted by so many other sources of strength, have known in George Cadigan's vision of Jesus and His church a source of hope that remains firm and fast.

We also received several suggestions regarding increased communications in the Diocese. Two indirect results of our 1974 campaign were of help to the Diocese: we performed a liaison between the Diocese and local parish congregations, and we began a trend toward an increased level of financial commitment on the part of the parishes and missions to the Diocese.

For 1975 our goals are as follows and our committee is structured to accomplish these goals.

- 1. Design, organize and present comprehensive stewardship workshops to reach Every Member Canvass leaders in the Diocese of Missouri by June 15, 1975.
- 2. Assemble details, statistics and data covering each Diocesan program or agency which requires Diocesan level funding.
- 3. Create a system which provides for the receipt of large or special gifts direct to the Diocese from communicants and/or from outside sources.
- 4. Draft a complete funding proposal covering all Diocesan concerns in accordance with paragraph 5 of Resolution No. 4: Funding of Diocesan Programs as adopted by the Special Convention, October 27, 1973.
- 5. Publicize the activities of the St. Christopher Committee to all Diocesan communicants.

During 1975 we are also conducting an indepth study, and designing a Diocesan program for stewardship of time and talents.

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Appendix No. 11

Report of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission

As reported to the 133rd Convention, Diocese of Missouri, the Liturgical Commission sent a completed evaluation of The Services for Trial Use to the Standing Liturgical Commission (S.L.C.) as the corporate response of the Diocese of Missouri. Following the 1973 General Convention's affirmative vote to continue with the work of the Standing Liturgical Commission, the Diocesan Commission sponsored a one-day clergy meeting on March 7, 1974 to discuss liturgical matters.

The conference was designed to set the guidelines for the continued trial use of all authorized liturgical services and especially to discuss the Initiatory Rite of Holy Baptism together with a Form for Confirmation. The Rev. Dr. Daniel B. Stevick, Professor of Liturgics, The Divinity School of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, was invited to lecture and lead a discussion on Prayer Book Studies 26 which deals with Christian Initiation.

The clergy attending the conference agreed that each would see to it that congregations committed to their charge would be given the opportunity to experience these trial services and send on to the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, advice and suggestions for a final Diocesan evaluation of Services for Trial Use.

The Bishop asked that serious consideration be given by all clergy to the possibility of using the trial initiatory rites during his Epscopal Visi-

In the Fall of 1974 the Diocesan Liturgical Commission requested final reports of congregations and individuals be received no later than November 31, 1974. The majority of the parishes responded by that date, and a final report was sent to the Standing Liturgical Commission on December 16, 1974.

"Although we requested specific comments and suggestions on the revision, we also received positive and negative votes. The negative comments were primarily asking that no change be made in our 1928 Book of Common Prayer. The positive comments ranged from asking that we complete a Revised Book of Common Prayer and stop Trial Use, to a sense of hopeful anticipation for continued liturgical renewal."

Letters which were too lengthy to summarize, but which contained good suggestions, were sent directly to the Standing Liturgical Commission. We apologize that letters sent to the Diocesan Liturgical Commission did not receive replies. The number was too great to make this practical. However, all letters were read by members of the Liturgical Commission at their meetings prior to writing our evaluation for the S.L.C.

The Commission has also assisted in the design and direction of Diocesan Liturgical Services of Worship. We are grateful to all the members for their work, and especially for those who travel many miles to attend meetings.

Screening Committee Diocese of Missouri Final Report

I. Introduction:

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(thru Aug.)

As a part of the process for electing the VIII Bishop of Missouri, a Screening Committee was formed to aid in the identification and selection of appropriate candidates for Bishop. The Committee was formed as a part of an overall Diocesan objective of giving its members as much opportunity as possible to participate in the electoral process. The Committee was composed of 17 persons, 13 elected by the various Convocations of the Diocese and four appointed by the Bishop. Details of the process are described in a special Long Range Planning Committee report dated June 3, 1973, as amended February 2, 1974.

In general terms, the process adopted by the Diocese envisioned a Screening Committee to select 15 to 20 ccandidates who would then be presented to the Diocese (along with appropriate information) for selection. From balloting by the Diocese, the top three men would be selected (independent audit firm). The Screening Committee would have the option of adding 1-2 additional names to the list of three. The procedures for operating and selecting candidates were to be left to the Screening Committee with the proviso that additional names could be added to the list only by two-thirds vote of the Committee. Budget allotted for the Screening Committee activities was \$10,500.

II. Committee Procedures and Activities:

The Committee first met on February 16, 1974 at Thompson House. Mr. Neal Dohr was elected Chairman of the Committee, the Reverend James Paget, Recording Secretary, and Dr. G. B. Hoey, Corresponding Secretary. The Committee met through the ensuing months until a final slate of 16 candidates for presentation to the Diocese was developed on August 26. Meetings generally were held on Saturdays, but during the interviewing phase of our activities, meetings were also held at night during the week.

Following our organizational meeting, the Committee proceeded to draft and implement procedures for the obtaining of suggested names for candidate for Bishop. The procedures adopted were (a) a written solicitation to all members of the Diocese, and (b) use of the CDO. A candidate information form prepared by the Committee, which was provided to all parishes and other appropriate places in the Diocese, was used to feed names back to the Committee.

Each clergyman suggested to the Committee was written by the Committee and requested to provide certain information about himself and his ministry. Following receipt of this information, reference checks were carried out as appropriate. Following a preliminary screening by the Committee, clergymen who were deemed worthy of further investigation were assigned a member of this Committee (dossier manager). This Committee member then became responsible for developing all pertinent reference and other information on a given man. Following the gathering of this information, it was then presented to the Committee, meeting as a whole, for further consideration and action. Those clergymen, whom a majority of the Committee considered worthy of further investigation, were then invited for an interview with the Committee. These interviews generally lasted for two hours and were on an informal nature. We endeavored to learn about the man's professional and personal life insofar as possible during these interviews. Rating sheets were developed for use by those committee members who wished to use them.

In addition to suggestions from members of the Diocese, the Clergy Deployment Office was utilized to develop a list of possible candidates. A subcommittee of the Screening Committee developed a list of some 50 names. These men were reviewed by the Committee which then presented a list of 22 names to the Convocations for their review. All 22 names were eventually suggested to the Committee by members of the Convocations.

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In summary, 116 names were suggested to the Committee as candidates for Bishop. Of these 116 clergymen; 42 withdrew from the process; of the remaining 74 considered by the Committee, 28 men were interviewed and after Committee voting, 16 names were presented to the Diocese for balloting. The Rt. Rev. Scott Field Bailey, The Rev. Gordon S. Price and the Rev. Richard Wheatcroft were elected by the Diocese as candidates for Bishop. In addition the Screening Committee added the names of the Rev. Joseph Pelham and the Rev. William A. Jones to the list for consideration by the Diocesan Convention on December 7. Prior to the Convention the Rev. Gordon S. Price withdrew. The Rev. William A. Jones was elected Bishop-elect at the Diocesan Convention.

Committee expenses amounted to approximately \$8,000, not including Diocesan-wide communications programs.

A list of appropriate forms and other material is appended to this report for possible use in subsequent elections.

III. Critique of the Process:

As a part of preparing this report, Committee members were asked for their comments on the process. This was done in the event this process or a variation of it would be used again by another Diocese. Our comments are summarized as follows:

A. General Comments:

The overall consensus of the Committee was that the process as adopted by the Diocese was a good one and that it functioned as well as could be expected for a pioneering effort. Among the noteworthy features of the process were: (a) the selection of a good cross-section of the Diocese for membership on the Screening Committee, though there was some concern that the Bishop had the prerogative to appoint members of the Committee, (b) the adoption by the Diocese of pre-set rules for the Diocesan Convention which provided for a democratic yet orderly process, (c) the option given the Screening Committee to add one or two additional names to the final list, b and (d) pre-registration of voters (although it was suggested that accurate parish records could serve as a substitute for voter registration).

B. Specific Comments:
1. Number of Candidates for Balloting by the Diocese:

It was generally agreed that the objective of 15-20 names to be presented to the Diocese was too ambitious. It was unanimously felt that it represented too many people for the Diocese to learn about in order to vote intelligently. It is felt that a slate of 10-12 candidates would be more appropriate. It was also suggested that the Screening Committee make the selection of the final 3-5 candidates and that there be no balloting by members of the Diocese. This, however, would in effect be a return to more traditional ways of selecting a Bishop and is not within the spirit of the process as operated in the recent election.

2. Preferential Voting:

It was felt that a more efficient means of selection of candidates by the Diocese would be by means of a preferential ballot. It was also suggested that if there were to be three elected by the Diocese to the final list, then voting be for three. Some clergy felt that the preliminary balloting should be by "Orders" and that clergy vote be weighted differently than the lay vote.

3. Communications:

Although not specifically provided for in our process, it became increasingly apparent from the beginning of the Committee's work that complete communication with the Diocese, with the organizations within the Diocese, and with the prospective candidates was of the utmost importance. Communication aspects of the process should be built into the process and an adequate budget provided for communications. For example, slide presentations for the 16 candidates (or its equivalent) should be an integral part of the process. Furthermore, once the final 3-5 have been selected by the Diocese, then arrangements must be made in an organized fashion for these men to be presented to the Diocese.

4. Interviewing System:

The system used by the Committee of face-to-face interviews by each prospective candidate coming to St. Louis was felt to be good. Sending a "team" to another city to interview candidates is usually an acceptable alternative but is not as anywhere near as satisfactory as the candidate coming to the Diocese. It should be pointed out, however, that the interview "system" must be carefully planned, important questions developed, and the Committee develop at least an informal team-work approach to their questioning. It should also be remembered that some candidates would not participate in the interview process.

5. Budget:

The Committee felt that the budget allotted was adequate for the purposes intended, however, any future processes must include an adequate budget particularly in the area of communications as noted above. This should include a professional in communications as well as secretarial staff.

6. Timing:

The Committee worked under considerable time pressure from its first meeting onward. To a certain extent this is beneficial in that it forces important decisions to be made, trivial decisions to be ignored, and focuses Committee attention on getting the job done. However, anyone wishing to use this process in the future must consider in advance what the appropriate amount of time between initiation of screening and final election should be for their specific situation.

7. Burden on the Candidate:

The provision of information, essay question answers, and interview trips does place a burden on the priests who enter the process. This should be recognized by the Committee and every effort made to make this as efficient and non-traumatic a process as possible for each person. Of particular importance, is to insure that each candidate know exactly what is expected of them in terms of information, travel and time.

8. Clergy Deployment Office:

It was the consensus of the Committee that the CDO was of little use in the initial selection of men for consideration. However, once a man had been suggested to the Committee, the CDO was of assistance in providing more reference material, background information, etc.

As established, the process does tend to favor local candidates (even though only one made the final list of 16 in this election). This should be borne in mind by anyone using the process in the future.

10. Withdrawals:

The withdrawal of one of the five candidates late in the process was unfortunate in that a qualified man was denied a place in the final Diocesan voting. It is traditional in our Church that priests have the option of withdrawing from an election for Bishop at any point during their candidacy; however, the Committee recommends that in any future use of this process, it be carefully and clearly explained to each prospective candidate that we strongly prefer that he remain in the process until final convention voting or withdraw prior to Diocesan voting. Alternatively, the Screening Committee could be given the option of adding additional names between the time of Diocesan voting and convention voting should a man withdraw during that interval. Should that happen, however, it will be a difficult thing for the Committee to arrange proper publicity, interviews, Diocesan trips, etc.

The Committee wishes to express their very deepest appreciation and thanks to the staff of the Diocesan Office, including the Ven. Charles Rehkopf, Miss Sue Rehkopf, and Mr. Steve Brehe for their thorough and unstinting help during the Committee's operations. We should also like to thank the Cathedral and the other churches which provided meeting places for various parts of the process.
