

SIXTY-THIRD ANNUAL CONVENTION

OF THE

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis,

Tuesday, May 26, 1903.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the Clergy and Laity assembled in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the choir, entered the Cathedral, singing the three hundred and sixty-eighth hymn.

The opening sentences and service to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. H. T. Cocke, of St. Paul's Church, Mexico.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. B. E. Diggs, of Holy Cross Church, Poplar Bluff.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. H. P. Horton, of Calvary Church, Columbia.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. T. A. H. Burke, of Christ Church, Moberly.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. G. H. Hunt, of St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Mission, St. Louis.

The Convention Sermon was then preached by the Rev. Wm. Elmer, of St. Philip's Mission, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On re-assembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Secretary of the Convention proceeded, under orders of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and thirty-six Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," appointed at the last Convention, whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report of the Committee containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then called the roll of the Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from seventeen Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President announced a quorum of both orders present and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. J. R. Winchester nominated Mr. Charles R. Skinker to be Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

There being no other nominations, and unanimous consent being given, on motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, Rev. J. R. Winchester was

The hour of recess having arrived, the House took a recess until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

On motion of Rev. J. R. Winchester, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Delegates from Mt. Calvary Parish have not presented to the Secretary evidence that their Parish has paid in full the assessments standing against it; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such proof of payment of the assessments be dispensed with, and that the Delegates from Mt. Calvary Parish be accorded their seats in this Convention.

It is with no uncertain voice we report a movement for the better from every part of the Diocese. Nearly every Parish and Mission is supplied by a rector or missionary and all these report a brighter outlook and take a hopeful view of the future.

The work in the Southeastern Deanery is in a flourishing condition. The Dean, aided by his able assistants, is supplying many mission centers. In Fredericktown a church has been built, also at Poplar Bluff the work is in a flourishing condition.

Trinity Church, St. Charles, has built a rectory and its minister is now residing in it. St. Paul's, Ironton, has built a new rectory. Jackson has lots and several hundred dollars on hand toward building a church. Kirkwood has added to and improved its church to the extent of \$8,000.

In the City of St. Louis the work of the Church has made considerable progress. The financial condition of many Parishes has been improved.

iderable nproved. St. Matthew's, St. Paul's, St. Philip's have paid the debt so long crushing them. A very large amount has been raised for St. Luke's Hospital. The Bishop is residing in his new home. The Hospital Missions have been fully supported. St. Mary's Home has been opened. The Convalescent Home is continuing its good work. It is also encouraging to note the starting of a new Mission in the northern part of the city, under the care of the Cathedral, and settlement work has been started in the congested district of Cass Avenue. Advent has secured a lot and is raising means to build a modest church. The Parish of the Good Shepherd is no longer dependent on the Missionary Board.

With all this hopeful outlook there are still large portions of the city without the privileges of the church, and the demand for a Diocesan Missionary is as great as ever. As this Convention has already passed a resolution to call for pledges, after those made for the Missionary Board and Hospital Mission, the Committee does not deem it wise to append any resolution to this report, believing that the appeal of the Bishop in his address for \$5,000 for new work will not fall on dull ears, but that a hearty response will be made, and the Bishop's mind relieved from the crushing weight of seeking to supply, without means, the destitute fields of the city and Diocese.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-FOURTH CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY-Not merely for the numbering of the Diocesan clan do we come up to our Convention. Such numbering, if it proved quite favorable, might beget in us hurtful pride and self-sufficiency, as in King David of old. If quite unfavorable, it might go to cool our ardor and quench our zeal. Numberings are to be taken. And as accurate and business-like as may be. But, under the figures and back of the figures and atop of the figures are to be counted minds and hearts and wills and souls-duty and loyalty and privilege-faith and hope and love. And so, if encouraging things are numbered, we thank God and take on more courage, never stopping to build up vanity or conceit out of the fact. And if discouraging things are numbered, we bate not heart or hope but apply ourselves to find the break and strengthen the weakness and make good the loss towards better future results. All this, because we have come up to the Convention not merely to count the past and rest in the present; but to take mutual counsel, to grow wiser and stronger by each other's help, to do better by finding through a wider outlook our mistakes and avoiding them, and to plan together to work and win future conquests for the Master and His Church.

As last year, four of our Bishops have laid their burdens down.

Bishop Whittle served Virginia thirty-four years; as Coadjutor nine years, and as Diocesan twenty-five. No other Virginia Bishop has had so long an Episcopate. Strong in will and character, resolute in action, when he fought it was always for his convictions and honestly, honorably, in the open. His Churchmanship was markedly different from that of most of the members of the House of Bishops; and yet I think no man in the House was more universally respected and admired and even liked than lie.

In scope and keenness of intellect and in wealth of scholarly acquirement he was second to none of his brethren. Force of thought and sharp clearness of style were characteristics of his writings. And he put his pen to much writing. Not a few of his earlier Tracts were widely and happily successful in rescuing Church ideas from the fog of popular misconception. It was not given to him to understand and master the little things of the daily task of a Bishop's ministration, as he could master thought and learning and doctrine and argument. Sua cuique sed non omnibus omnia.

Bishop Barnwell of Alabama lacked one day of being two years a Bishop. He was to the manner born, having been chosen Bishop from the Rectorship of an Alabama Parish. Dearly loved he was by all the people of his Diocese. Wise, courteous, warmhearted, unselfish, devoted, he won the love of all his brethren of the House of Bishops, and his death could not seem to us other than a sad disaster to the Diocese of Alabama.

Bishop Taylor was Bishop of Quincy for less than twenty-one months; a little while Coadjutor, but virtually the Diocesan for all the time. It is a strange coincidence that our four deceased Bishops of the year were all elected as Coadjutors. Bishop Taylor wrestled most bravely with the encompassing difficulties of a struggling Diocese, and with the accumulation of duties that faced him at the start; but the burden proved too great and he lay down to rest when only a little over fifty years of age. And now, while writing, the news reaches me of the death of Bishop Starkey, of Newark, eighty-five years old. His activity and vigor for twenty-three years of a Bishop's life were wonderful for so old a man.

We may not omit to chronicle the death of the late Archbishop of Canterbury, The Most Reverend Dr. Temple. Schoolmaster, Bishop, Archbishop, in each and every field of duty he was great. Massive, stalwart, rock-like, stern of manner but in heart loving and tender, an apostle of temperance, burning with missionary zeal, and as complete an embodiment of unceasing and unflinching devotion to duty as the world has known. All American Bishops who were present will remember his striking personality in the last two Lambeth Conferences, in the one as Bishop of London, and in the other as the Archbishop presiding. He was as a tower of strength to the Church of England whenever archers sorely grieved her and shot at her.

Two of our Clergy have departed this life during the year, the Rev. T. F. C. James, on September 3, 1902, and the Rev. C. H. Canfield, on May 24, 1903. Dr. James was trained to be a physician, and came to us from the Methodist ministry. He was a learned man and faithful to duty, serving the Diocese in the Parishes of Cape Girardeau and Ironton, doing specially useful work in the former. Mr. Canfield ministered at Kirks-

looking Mission steadily Rector ville and Bevier. By his efforts the Church in Bevier was built. He was over eighty years of age, and bore patiently and bravely the infirmities that pressed upon his last days.

Mr. D. F. Leavitt is dead after twenty-two years of custodianship of the moneys of the Missionary Board. Gentle, genial, lovable he was; though in all matters of his trusteeship unswervingly firm, accurate and true; and steadfast as a rock to his Christian faith and duty. The Diocese has lost a loyal and efficient officer; and the Bishop misses from his side a friend and brother and helper, valued, loved, lamented.

Death has gathered in no little of a harvest from among our people this year.

Mr. Robert E. Lear has left the community at Monroe and the whole world is much the poorer in losing one of the best examples of manly courage and stainless integrity and unselfish devotion that I have ever known. Mr. J. J. Mitchell, Mr. H. T. Simon, and Mr. Charlie Thaw, in their respective Parishes, and the one last named in the counsels of this Convention also, served the Church long and faithfully. Mrs. Forster, of St. Louis, was strong in the thing and sweet in the manner of her doing and giving for the Church. Miss Page in her schoolroom at Bishop Robertson Hall was kindly mother and skillful teacher in one. Mrs. Scheetz had shared for more than fifty years the wearing labors and spiritual recompenses of a veteran soldier and pastor of the Church Militant, who, himself, yet survives. Mrs. Chapin, of De Soto, was devoted to Sunday School work, and intelligent in the doing of it, and during vacancies in the pastorate was a band of strength to keep all forces in the Parish linked together in harmony. Mrs. Schweitzer, of Columbia; Mrs. Harris, of Cape Girardeau; Mrs. Viggers, of Thayer; and Miss Gill, of Kirkwood, were active for good in their different spheres, and will be sadly missed.

The diptychs are again recited. Once more we say them and hear them. But it will not be alway so. By and by, others shall say and hear, and we be in the list recounted. May God mercifully keep us cheery now, and have us ready then, for the loving Savior's sake!

The outlook over the Diocese is not discouraging. The confirmations are five hundred and fifty-five, within ten of the number of last year. We have sixty-one canonical Clergy as against the fifty-three of last year. One organized Mission, St. Peter's, Oakside, is added. The only real pastorships vacant are St. Paul's, St. Louis, Ironton and Thayer; and these are all looking out to get supplied. In St. Louis the Cathedral has added a Parish Mission in North St. Louis to its work; and St. Mark's and Ascension push steadily on with their respective Missions of Epiphany and Advent. sustained by a generous-hearted layman of St. Louis, has done a very great deal of missionary work indeed, not only in the region round about Kirkwood, but in the south part of the Diocese, at Ironton and Fredericktown and Piedmont and Jackson and Thayer and Grandin. The improvements in the Kirkwood Church are finished and paid for. In St. Louis, St. Paul's, St. Philip's and St. Matthew's have lifted and wholesomely put away their debts. Fredericktown and Poplar Bluff have completed and are occupying their new churches. St. Charles and Ironton have built rectories. Clarksville and Cuba have practiced good housekeeping ways of improvement and renovation. Monroe is rejoicing in the prospect of erecting a tower, and perhaps a recess chancel, for her Church. Palmyra has added several memorials to her church furnishings; some of them being in honor of her long-time faithful Rector, Rev. Dr. Wainwright. And the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Louis, has sent word to the Missionary Board that from and after September 1 it will relinquish the Missionary stipend of \$100.00, and rank itself among the selfsupporting Parishes. Thanks and all hail to the Church of the Good Shepherd!

Some generous men and women of St. Louis have provided a new "Bishop's House" in Vandeventer Place. The willing generosity of the gift of \$16,000.00 clothed itself in a vesture of quietness and delicacy that is beyond all praise. But it is not beyond my thanks and admiration and love. The giving, moreover, has been in the midst of, and alongside of, splendid gifts for the new St. Luke's Hospital, at this time rising in its handsome strength.

Now let me speak of missionary matters.

The record of the Sunday School Lenten offering for Missions has been excellently good. Only four of the working Parishes of the Diocese failed to give. And I think in only one of those four is there a Sunday School, and indeed that one for awhile was in a state of suspended animation. We may really say that every Sunday School in the Diocese without exception has contributed. It is a record to make us glad and proud. The amount is \$1,695.75, a little above one hundred dollars more than last year. Meanwhile the children are also busy month by month gathering for the "Missionary Host." How much in amount you shall hear next Sunday afternoon. In loyal confidence they allow the Bishop to use this sum as his wisdom may decide for Missionary work in the Diocese. Hardly a day passes that the Bishop has not occasion to be lovingly thankful for this treasure-house of help. If it isn't a safety valve to avert bursting explosions, it is a precious coal heap to supply fuel for the working engine. And coupled with the oil can of the "Bishop's Purse" it makes the steam and smooths the friction of the ever moving, sometimes grinding machinery of the Diocese of which the Bishop by his office is obliged to be the engine driver.

I was pleased with the report of Missouri last year in the Apportionment for General Missions. We were asked for \$4,231.68. We did not give it all. But we fell short only \$472.81, and did far better than ever we had done before. Only two Parishes declined to give. Only nine others gave less than they were asked. And fifteen gave more than they were asked. This year the Church at large needs and asks for \$850,000.00 for her great Domestic and Foreign Missionary work. The children by their Lenten offerings hope to furnish \$100,000.00 of this amount. I think they will succeed. It is hoped that the Woman's Auxiliary may provide another \$100,000.00. I trust our Missouri Woman's Auxiliary will have its share in this. (It has its share in almost everything. It has given this year, in cash, \$4,610.69; in boxes, \$1,083.20; total, \$5,693.89.) Then \$50,000.00 are available from fixed income. So \$600,000.00 were left to be apportioned to the Dioceses. Missouri is asked to give \$5,200.00 of this. The same excellent Committee, Rev. Mr. Davis and Messrs. Ford and Bagnell, has acted this year as last in apportioning this sum to the different Parishes. This Committee was chosen in 1901 to keep in touch with the Board of Managers, and to work for the dissemination of missionary intelligence and the arousing of missionary interest to the end that every member of the Church become a regular contributor to the work of the Board of Missions. May I suggest the reconstituting of this Committee, and, if it be thought best, by electing it instead of appointing it? At any rate, may I hope that this Convention by Committee and in all other ways will keep in close and warm touch with the great, world-wide missionary work which our American Church has upon its hands and, I trust, in its heart? . Our Dean Davis has been appointed by the Central office to be District Secretary for a large portion of the middle West. We hail this act as one of wisdom on the part of the Board of Managers, and count it a compliment to the Diocese of Missouri.

I earnestly desire that our \$5,200.00 may be given. But the year ends September 1. Up to April 1 only \$1,336.41 had been given. Dear brethren of the Clergy, dear friends of the laity, I do appeal to you. Let us every one have a warm heart and a zealous hand in this; to try to secure that, first we curselves, and then our Parishes shall do something and our part in this great and blessed work. May Missouri's record on September 1 be clear and clean in the matter! I fervently pray for it. I do not want to find fault. I have no idea of giving in to discouragement. But I must ask, how can one think that he is doing his full duty or grasping his full privilege, as a member of Christ's Church—or even as a citizen of God's world—if he or she he not personally serving, or annually giving to, Missions, such as is our great Domestic and Foreign work, which under a score of Bishops and hundreds of Clergymen is trying to care for unshepherded millions of souls for whom Christ died?

Some persons think that it is a mistake to set off the children's Lenten offerings and the Woman's Auxiliary gifts by themselves. They say it would be better to apportion to the Dioceses and Parishes the entire sum needed, leaving it to them to secure each its portion in the way it deems best. I cannot think so. I know well the good results of harnessing for action the enthusiasm of the children and the zeal of the women. But I believe, to follow these critics would be to lose much of the educative value of the apportionment plan as now in operation; which by its figures, or lack of figures, constantly pleads with Rectors and Vestries and Parishioners to come up to their share of duty and privilege, and does not suggest to them relief in seeking to devolve their consciously waning and perishing responsibilities upon women and children.

The Missionary Council is to meet in the City of Washington for a session of three days on October 27. I esteem these meetings of the Council of great importance and value in disseminating information about the Missions of the Church, and in developing an intelligent interest in them. Please God, I shall attend myself, and I most heartily wish that I may have by my side in Washington the six members, three Clergymen and three laymen, to whom Missouri is entitled. Rev. Messrs. Potter and Mizner and Messrs. Bofinger and Chapman have been already chosen by the General Convention. One clergyman and one layman are to be elected by us in this Convention. I venture to express the hope that care will be taken to choose those who are really interested, and those who will undertake to make earnest effort to attend. I am sure they can give help by their attendance, and I am equally sure that they will find themselves bringing back knowledge and warmth and hope and zeal to contribute to the earnest realization of our oneness in the Master's world-wide kingdom.

In our Diocesan Missionary field the stations have been more steadily occupied than ever before. We are glad; and yet as a result we are dangerously near to a trenching upon our sacred surplus of \$1,500,00. This surplus must remain untouched; else we cannot pay our missionaries promptly at the end of each quarter as we promise to do.

With pride I want to call attention to one characteristic of the people of our Diocese. Pledges made are always met, never repudiated. Look in the columns of the *Church News* and you will see that not one penny of the amounts pledged for Diocesan Missions in 1901 is found in the delinquent column as unpaid. Splendid is the warmth of enthusiasm which willingly promises great and good things. Yet the practical man of affairs cannot withhold his assurance that the meeting what is due and the paying what is promised are the things of deep and abiding comfort.

I want also to express my warm approval of the practice which the Missionary Board has continued and guided, of having addresses made on

Nebras Missou Church Sunday mornings upon Missions by a Clergyman and a layman appointed respectively to our different Churches. It is a wise way, and I think a happy way, not only of imparting knowledge and directing benevolence, but also of promoting harmonious co-operation.

Five thousand dollars are needed for the coming year by our Diocesan Missionary Board to keep its present work in hand steadily and healthfully. What a gracious blessing it would be if, in the pledges to be made to-morrow afternoon, five thousand dollars in addition could be promised for new work of Church extension appealing to us in many places, especially in northwest St. Louis, and at Jackson in the south of the State!

It would not be easy to find a better instance of what missionary work does and is than that which St. Stephen's, St. Louis, affords. Twenty-three have been confirmed there. Nearly five hundred are in its Sunday School. Reverence and worshipful devotion are in its congregation. By day and night its chapels and rooms are animated hives of industry, benevolence, instruction and religion.

Nor may any work be considered to be more in the line of the Master's approval and blessing than that of our Hospital Missions among those an hungered, and those sick in mind and body, and in prison. We may have our shortcomings. We do have many. But it cannot be counted for one of them that kindly and benevolent people furnish the two thousand dollars a year necessary to keep Mr. Cornell's Hospital Missions in steady continuance. Co-working with him the "Convalescent Home" and "St. Mary's Home" are organized to extend merciful help to friendless and shattered humanity. And year in and year out the Orphan's Home pursues its steadfast course of active beneficence.

For many years there existed a "Western Church Building Society" to help in erecting Churches in certain Dioceses and Missionary Districts. By the death of Bishop Whipple I, as senior of the Bishops interested, became its President. During the General Convention in San Francisco I looked into its condition. By the advice of Mr. George F. Henry, of Des Moines, Iowa, as its charter was expiring by limitation of term, it was determined to wind up its affairs. Mr. E. Walter Roberts, Assistant Treasurer of the Board of Managers, helped me to trace its assets. Mr. Henry helped to gather them in. Then our own Mr. Walker Hill helped me to turn them into cash. Through the American Exchange Bank I distributed on August 22 the proceeds, amounting to \$5,245.86, among the twelve beneficiaries concerned, viz.: the Bishops of Minnesota, Duluth, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Boise, Spokane, Salt Lake, Laramie, Nebraska, Kansas and West Missouri. The Bishops of Colorado, Iowa and Missouri were also beneficiaries. But they owed for loans made to Churches in their Dioceses and so received no cash dividends. To the

three gentlemen who so efficiently contributed unpaid service to this honorable and equitable closing up of the affairs of the Society I want to return and put on record abundant thanks.

Nor was Mr. Walker Hill tired out by that good work done. He and his Committee have been stirring up the matter of the reduction, if we cannot compass the extinction, of the debt on Bishop Robertson Hall. The reduction would be a great practical blessing to the Sisters. I can imagine only one greater, viz.: the extinction. I cannot speak too highly of the honest and wholesome achievements in health, education, useful discipline, moral training and spiritual culture accomplished for the pupils in Bishop Robertson Hall, and of the many works of mercy and charity which are conducted from the Hall as a center, and my heart is full of warmest gratitude to the hard-working and well-deserving Sisters.

The annual Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew will assemble in Denver, October 7. The Brotherhood here in St. Louis, notably in its care for the Lenten noonday meetings, deserves well of us all. As an old Rocky Mountain Bishop I have not felt at liberty to decline the invitation to go to this Convention. And I shall be glad if our young men can see their way for the appointment of a goodly body guard of their number to be with me in my wanderings and sojournings there.

I would renew my recommendation of last year of the two societies which exist for the benefit of Clergymen. First, the "General Clergy Relief" Society, which this year reaches its fiftieth year of life. By order of General Convention every Parish is asked for its Quinquagesima offering for this. It does an untold amount of good in helping aged and infirm Clergy, and the widows and orphans of Clergy, all over the land. Two beneficiaries are in our own Diocese. You will find particulars about it on the inside of the cover of our Journal. Second, the "Clergyman's Retiring Fund" Society, which is the best society I know of for a Clergyman to pay his \$1.00 per month of dues to, that at the age of sixty the dues may cease and he receive a pension graduated according to the aggregate amount he has paid in. The central office is with the Rev. Dr. Anstice, in Philadelphia.

Two years since the Board of Trustees of the University of the South at Sewanee invited the Diocese of Missouri to join in the federation of Dioceses connected with that institution. It is intimated to me that there are those in this Convention who desire that the invitation may be accepted. For myself I can say that I have visited Sewanee more than once; that I have had and still have students of theology in residence there; that I consider the educational training given there to be honest, healthful and efficient; that I sympathize warmly with the Spartan loyalty and courage with which the band of professors push forward their work,

and that I shall be happy to lend my help and co-operation in any way that it may seem good to the Convention to indicate and authorize.

Our Secretary will lay before you a communication from a Joint Committee of the two Houses of the General Convention, commonly known as the Committee upon Change of Name of the Church. Courtesy demands, it seems to me, that we should take action in this Convention so as to give answer to the questions asked by the Committee. I happen to be a member of the Committee and it is not becoming for me to discuss the subject matter presented. But I am already upon record, and I think in honesty I ought to re-affirm or disavow what has been recorded. In the "Living Church Quarterly" of 1901 over my signature are these words: "If I thought that the adoption of the excellent terms, "American" or "Catholic," in place of "Protestant Episcopal," would lead us to be more broad in sympathy, more charitable and allowance making towards all who are baptized in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, all who profess and call themselves Christians, all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity, then I would go in for it with all my heart and soul. But I cannot dispossess my mind of the apprehension that such adoption would have a tendency to make us less broad, less charitable, less allowance making." I am certainly older by two years than when I prepared that published statement. Whether I am wiser is very doubtful. I stand now where I stood then. I do not disavow that which I wrote.

Now I ask to speak out some words begotten of jealousy. Jealousy which is unreasoning selfishness and flaming resentment is a narrow, mean and hurtful thing. But the jealousy of unswerving loyalty and sensitive devotion may be wise and right and noble. It appears to me that a jealousy for the Prayer Book may not be an unwholesome affection for us all to cultivate.

Is not the temptation strong in this American land, perhaps stronger than in any other under the sun, for a man to decide that a thing is right because he thinks it right? Then the seducing temptation leads him easily on to the second step, to do what he decides to be right because he thinks it right. Do reasonable freedom and manly independence demand, even in America, that another consideration should be discarded, viz.: Do other people think it right? And, have other people's thoughts been embodied in law, or have they grown into custom, which by the old maxim, mos pro lege, may be counted in for law? If yes, though the individual man's thoughts need not be hampered—one could not hamper them if one would—yet how can he deem it wise to let his thoughts dominate his will, and how can he count it right for his will to project itself into action, along a line at variance with the custom or the law?

To leave the abstract for the concrete.

- 1. I have been led to believe that there are Churches in this City of St. Louis which on the last Good Friday were not opened for the customary morning services at ten or eleven o'clock. Perhaps and presumably the closed doors were awaiting the noon hour to invite in the congregation then to the "three hours' service." Now, I dare say the "three hours' service" is so arranged as to be beautiful, devotional, helpful. Nor am I disposed to criticise in the slightest degree its adoption and growing use. But, if it be true that there were those closed doors, what had become of the customary Morning Prayer and Morning Lessons and Morning Epistle and Gospel? Let it be understood that I am not objecting to the "three hours' service;" but it appears to me that the Rector who provides for it should take pains as well to provide that the regular Morning Service for the solemn day has been said. Is it seemly that a recent custom, not provided for in the Prayer Book, should in the solemnities of the great memorial day be allowed to work a displacement of services authorized and enjoined by the Prayer Book, and practiced in venerable use by all the Christian generations?
- 2. I was present, not long ago, at a celebration of the Holy Communion; or, to use the Prayer Book language, at an administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion. I may state that the occurrence I speak of was in another Diocese, not in ours. At the time for the actual administration of the sacred elements, I, kneeling in the chancel, was ready and desirous to partake. What was my surprise when the celebrant, after partaking himself, went right on with the service. There was no other partaker. Disclaiming any right to interfere in the order of worship of another Diocese, I felt constrained as a Bishop in the Church of God to write to the Rector of the Church where the service was held. I cited the rubric which says in the plainest of words, "Sufficient opportunity shall be given to those present to communicate;" and I entered my protest against such an open and direct disobedience to the law. The Rector answered that he showed my letter to the celebrant and that the latter asserted that he did give opportunity. I am bound to accept his statement and to give credit to his assertion. I was at the north side of the altar and a little hidden from him, and was not minutely watching him while celebrating. But I am equally bound to state that to my own sure knowledge and witnessing there was no sufficient opportunity given that day to those present to partake. So I cannot look on what was done and what was not done in that service as anything else than a clear and open disobedience to law. I will not advert to the plain etymological question, how could that solitary partaking be called a Communion at all?

Dear brethren, may I plead with you to be law abiding? In the family, in the State, in the Church, law-abidingness is the most wholesome practice that Americans can turn themselves to. The Greek word

anomia sums up a deal of shame and hurt that came to the early days of Christian history. It's English equivalent, lawlessness, may scarcely claim to originate or promote much that is sweet or sound or strong. It was a time of wanton idolatry in Israel when "every man did that which was right in his own eyes." Here in America there are not wanting voices, loud and strident, lifting themselves up against the law and the courts. Competing activities lock horns in almost deadly struggles. Individualistic contentions threaten the very being of society. Selfish out-reachings lay hold of forces which, misused, shatter the welfare of the race. Chaos is threatened and cosmos is not invited in when every one looks on his own things and not also on the things of others. Is now the time or this the age or ours the country in which religion shall abdicate its rightful influence by forgetting or neglecting to take the lead in honest obedience and reverent devotion to law?

Hooker's enthroning eulogy of law we know. God mercifully incline our hearts to honor her sovereign majesty! There is a fund designated the "Palmyra College Fund." As there is no church, college or school in the Diocese, except "Bishop Robertson Hall," under the care of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, your Committee recommends that the fund, about \$700.00, be paid over to the committee who have in charge the raising of funds for the liquidation of the debt on Bishop Robertson Hall, to be applied to that purpose.

The Treasurer of the Diocese shows assets of \$3,503.37, with liabilities of \$2,725.00, an apparent surplus of nearly \$800.00. Of the assets, \$1,713.00 is due from Parishes and Missions. One Parish is delinquent \$600.00; if this were paid it would help materially in reducing the assessment, and make it easier for some of the other Parishes. Of the \$1,713.00 due from Parishes when the Treasurer closed his books, \$544.50 has since been paid, leaving still due \$1,168.50.

The following missions are reported vacant:

Ironton, La Plata, Oakside, Shelbina, Thayer and St. Paul's, St. Louis.

On June 10th the Board gave its consent to the organization of a mission at Oakside, Shannon County. Missouri, on petition of church people at that place and vicinity.

It was with deep regret and sorrow the Board received the announcement of the death of Mr. David F. Leavitt, its treasurer, who died on the 18th of August, 1902.

For nearly twenty-two consecutive years, Mr. Leavitt was a member and the treasurer of the Board, and during this long period of uninterrupted service, was constant and habitual in attendance at the meetings, and prompt and accurate in performing the numerous duties devolving upon him. As a genial and sociable gentleman, who won the admiration and respect of us all, and as a devoted adherent to the cause of missions, his presence and wise counsel will be greatly missed.

On the 3d of September, 1902, the Board filled the vacancy in the treasurership, caused by the death of Mr. Leavitt, by electing Mr. F. J. McMaster temporarily to that office.

On the 13th of January, 1903, Mr. McMaster requested to be relieved of the duties of treasurer, and tendered his resignation, which was accepted, and the Board thereupon elected Mr. E. H. Lycett as treasurer.

The Board further reports that it again undertook to create an interest in Diocesan Missions, and on Sunday, November 23, 1902, had a layman visit each Parish and Mission in the City of St. Louis, and three Parishes in the County of St. Louis, and in connection with the clergyman in charge, make addresses to the congregations on the subject of Diocesan Missions and Missions to the city institutions. While pledges were requested at these services, yet the addresses were intended chiefly for the purpose of giving information to the church people concerning the missionary work that was being done in the Diocese, and the pressing needs for funds with which to carry on that work.

The Board finds that it needs to keep the present work in healthful condition the sum of \$4,975.00, besides the amount needed for the work in the city institutions.

The Canon says: "He shall catalogue and classify all books, documents and papers so as to make their contents accessible for reference." This has not been done, simply because there is no place provided where they may be stored and arranged.

Most of the Journals of the Diocesan Conventions have been received, and three hundred volumes of theological books have been presented to the Library by the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, S. T. D.

In connection with the Registrar's report, I wish to make a statement, and offer two resolutions.

In the list of officers of the Diocese I am entered first as Registrar, and then as Librarian. I venture to inform the Convention that the office of Librarian is nowhere recognized in the Constitution and Canons. It is true that the Canon says that the Registrar "shall receive and keep all books, documents and manuscripts belonging to the Diocese." But I interpret "books" to mean those only referring to the growth and history of the Diocese, and does not mean the "Diocesan Library."

I think there are grounds for saying—and I am willing to bear my share of the fault—that the present condition of the Library is a disgrace to the Diocese. But I am not willing to take the entire responsibility for this sad fact.

For reasons that I need not stay to mention, I must respectfully and absolutely decline to take any further responsibility in regard to the Diocesan Library.

Nor need I press upon the Convention the value of the collection of books we now have, nor the importance of carefully maintaining and increasing the Library.

The first resolution is:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered to the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham for his generous gift to the Library.

The second:

Resolved, That this Convention either accept my resignation, or elect a librarian.

In case it is considered that the office of librarian must be created constitutionally, I offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the matter of creating the office of librarian, with the duties appertaining, be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

A list of the subscribers to the Building Fund is submitted herewith, showing that the total amount subscribed up to April 30, 1903, equals the sum of \$113,550. The receipts and expenditures on account of this fund are shown in the Buildings and Grounds Account, which also includes the transactions pertaining to the sale of the old hospital property. For convenience this account embraces all receipts and expenditures from the beginning of efforts to raise funds for the erection of a new hospital, and shows that thus far the sum of \$165,056.30 has been expended as follows:

This indicates an increase of 861 days of paid treatment, and a decrease of 1,161 days of free treatment during the year ending April 30, 1903, as compared with the preceding year. The total number of days of both paid and free treatment, however, remain about the same, viz.: 12,806 days for 1902, and 12,506 days for 1903, thus showing that the hospital continues to provide for its annual quota of patients, notwithstanding the disadvantages of location, and the absence of improved facilities for comfort and convenience, such as exist in the modern hospital.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

ARTICLE I-NAME.

SECTION I. The name of the Society shall be the "Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

Section I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

Section I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

Section I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI-FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section I. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

Section I. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

Sec. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

- I, The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Unfinished Business.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education. VIII. On Sunday School Work.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
 - XI. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- II. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

The Parish was without a Rector from Easter until September, when Rev. Walter Mitchell became minister in charge. On December 21, Rev. H. W. Starr became Rector. A weekly Sunday School teacher's meeting was instituted, which has been excellently attended, and is noticeably increasing the efficiency of the teaching force. The Sunday School has become self-supporting, and has provided itself with an entirely new set of text-books and four large Bible maps. A musical director has been appointed to assist the Rector and superintendent with the music. A men's Bible class with ten adult members has been organized in connection with the Sunday School, the "Banner Class System" has been adopted to increase the attendance and punctuality, and the Sunday School session now begins at 9:30 instead of 9:45, which allows us to devote fifteen minutes each Sunday in practicing new hymns. The Friday night services, at which a series of addresses have been given on the history and principles of the Church, have been largely attended. The Sunday night congregations have fully doubled, and the morning attendance shows also a marked increase. A Lay Reader has been appointed to assist the Rector when necessary. There are now sixteen male voices in the choir. These are assisted by four ladies—unvested—three sopranos and one alto. A Choir Matron has been appointed to superintend repairing of vestments, etc. At the Easter Monday meeting of the congregation, reports on the past year's work were read by the Superintendent of the Sunday School, Treasurer of the Parish, Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the Vestry, Presidents of the Guilds, and the Rector. This was an innovation which met with general approval, and it was decided to have a similar meeting twice a year hereafter—at Easter and Advent. The reports showed all branches of the work to be in excellent condition, and there is much ground for encouragement and increased confidence.

I have held services at this Mission every Sunday afternoon. Several church families are living here, but they belong to the parish at Old Orchard, and do not attend services at St. Mary's. At present there is but little encouragment except in the Sunday School; the fifteen scholars are regular in their attendance and are interested in the services.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
