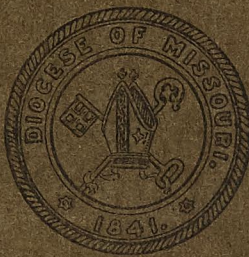

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS ENJOINED BY CANON XIX

Section 1. Offering shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Third: For the support of St. Luke's Hospital, which shall be made on St. Luke's Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

RULES OF ORDER OF THE CONVENTION.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Missions.
 - IV. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - V. On State of the Church.
 - VI. On Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgement of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a

member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the

following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballot. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

JOURNAL OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH CONVENTION
OF THE
CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis,

Tuesday, January 27, 1925.

The Clergy and lay delegates to the Eighty-sixth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, on January 27, 1925, at 9:00 A. M.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Rev. J. Courtney Jones read the Gospel, and the Rev. W. G. Harter read the Epistle. The Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor and the Rev. Carl R. Taylor assisted in the ministrations.

Instead of a Convention Sermon, the Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and lay delegates assembled in the Schuyler Memorial House with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the forty-two who were entitled to vote thirty-four were present.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 15.)

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the lay delegates to the Convention.

Fifty-three Parishes and Missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from twenty-six were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Secretary's Assistant cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

By authority of the Convention the Bishop appointed Mr. George M. Block as a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

The Committee on the Dispatch of Business was authorized to invite Vice-Chancellor Finney of the University of the South to address the Convention for not more than thirty minutes, and to invite the Rev. Dr. Armstrong of the Church Federation to speak for not more than fifteen minutes, the time of both addresses to be fixed later.

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a Nominating Committee to nominate to the Convention candidates for all elective offices except Deputies to the General Convention.

Under the foregoing order the Bishop appointed as a Nominating Committee the Rev. Dr. Wilkins, the Rev. Mr. Bunting, the Rev. Dr. Travers, Mr. James M. Bull, and Mr. F. C. Thompson.

The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan Council which was received and filed with appended Resolutions Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5. (Appendix 2.)

The Secretary read Resolution No. 1 appended to the Report of the Diocesan Council, pertaining to the Budget for the General Diocesan Expense Fund, which was adopted.

The Secretary read Resolution No. 2 appended to the Report of the Diocesan Council, pertaining to the Schedule of Assessments for the General Diocesan Expense Fund, which was adopted.

The Secretary read Resolution No. 3 appended to the Report of the Diocesan Council, pertaining to the Budget for the Church's Program in the Diocese, which was adopted.

The Secretary read Resolution No. 4 appended to the Report of the Diocesan Council, pertaining to the Budget for the General Church Program beyond the Diocese.

Consideration of Resolution No. 4 was postponed until after luncheon, and the Convention took a recess until 2:00 o'clock.

After luncheon the Convention was called to order at 2:00 P. M. by the Bishop.

The consideration of Resolution No. 4, pertaining to the Budget for the General Church Program beyond the Diocese, was pending.

Under a temporary suspension of the rules, the Rev. Dr. Armstrong, of the Church Federation of St. Louis, was invited to speak on Wednesday at 2:30 P. M., and Vice-Chancellor Finney, of the University of the South, was invited to speak on Wednesday at 3:00 P. M.

Resolution No. 4 was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, pertaining to the Schedule of Apportionments for the Church's Program, was adopted.

By unanimous vote the Bishop was asked to appoint a committee to draft and present to this Convention a memorial resolution on the death of the Rev. Jesse A. Ryan. For this purpose the Bishop appointed as a committee the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, the Rev. F. B. Bartlett, and Dean Searlett.

By unanimous vote the Bishop was asked to appoint a committee to draft and present to this Convention a memorial resolution on the death of Mr. Charles C. Curtice. For this purpose the Bishop appointed as a committee the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. Edmund Duckworth, and Mr. James M. Bull.

By unanimous vote the Bishop was asked to appoint a committee to draft and present to this Convention a memorial resolution on the death of Mr. W. C. Stith. For this purpose the Bishop appointed as a committee the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., and Mr. James M. Bull.

The Rev. Mr. White introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted as follows:

RESOLVED, That this Convention endorses the project for a World Conference on Faith and Order, and commends it to the interest and prayers of the clergy and laity of the Diocese; further

RESOLVED, That the Bishop is hereby requested to appoint for this Diocese the eight days ending with Whitsunday (May 24-31, 1925) of this year as a special period of prayer for unity and for the efforts to promote it.

The Report of the Standing Committee was called for, and the Committee requested further time to report, which was granted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, gave notice in detail that on the following day there would be presented to the Convention for action an amendment to Section 1 of Canon 12.

The Rules of Order were suspended.

The Secretary read the report of the Treasurer of the Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, which was received and filed. (Appendix 5.)

The Bishop read the report of the Trust Funds held by him as Bishop of the Diocese, which was received and filed. (Appendix 6.)

Mr. Henry read the report of the Missouri Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, which was received and filed. (Appendix 7.)

The Convention adjourned until 9:00 o'clock Wednesday morning to meet for Morning Prayer in the Convention Hall, to be followed by a business session at 9:30.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for all the candidates for all the officers named in the foregoing report of the Nominating Committee, and the Bishop declared them elected.

Resolution No. 8—

IN MEMORIAM.

MR. WILMER C. STITH.

Mr. W. C. Stith, Senior Warden of the Church of the Ascension and several times a vestryman, passed into Eternal Rest Monday, December 22, 1924. He was found serving his fellowmen when the great Call came, having just addressed the young people at the Y. M. C. A.

Mr. Stith was a remarkable man—a man of well known and varied ability in his business, and had attained some eminence as authority on Railroad traffic management. Also a man of wide reading, broad views and excellent culture.

But his life had also been devoted to his Church and her problems and needs quite as distinctly and devotedly as to his business. He had been a communicant since his youth, and had been a member of the Church of the Ascension for thirty-two consecutive years. He had been several times vestryman, Junior Warden, Senior Warden, and then had been a member of the Building Committee of the new church of the Ascension, and later still was chairman of the Building Committee of the new Parish. He labored unto weariness at this task and saw it through. Its completed form and its appointment will be a monument to his unquitting and heroic devotion.

He had also been Treasurer of Grace Church Holy Cross, and worked long and devotedly on the plans for the erection of the beautiful new building that now stands where it is. He was always profoundly interested in Holy Cross. The severe strain which these two enterprises put on this man, at a time when he might have lightened his load, in the opinion of many might have shortened his life.

He also organized and set into operation the machinery for raising funds in this Diocese for the Church Pension Fund, and kept in continuous contact with its progress.

He had been a delegate to the Diocesan Convention for a number of years, and rendered invaluable service in counsel and debate and as a member of important committees.

The whole Church in Missouri has suffered a grievous loss by the death of this able and devoted Churchman and disciple of the Master. But we also know that God's calls to those who pass in death are calls to the living through the passing of those who die. God has mightily called to us all in the life and service of Wilmer C. Stith.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three Clerical deputies and were given into the hands of the tellers.

Mr. Ambler presented the report of the Missouri Diocesan League of Lay Readers, which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

By the unanimous rising vote of the Convention the Bishop was requested to write a letter of loving sympathy and deep appreciation to Mr. Joseph R. Barroll.

The tellers of the pending election for lay deputies reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. James M. Bull elected a deputy to the General Convention.

The tellers of the pending election for clerical deputies reported, and the Bishop declared the Very Rev. Wm. Scarlett and the Rev. Edward S. White elected deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three lay deputies and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The Convention took a recess for luncheon and re-assembled at 2:00 P. M.

The tellers for the pending election for lay deputies reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three lay deputies and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for lay deputies reported and the Bishop declared Mr. F. T. Hodgdon and Mr. George M. Block elected deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Coxe introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted by a rising vote, as follows:

Resolution No.9—

IN MEMORIAM

REV. JESSE ASA RYAN

On January 12, 1925, the Reverend Jesse Asa Ryan was suddenly called to his rest. Though he had for several months suffered from a serious malady, as the year 1924 drew to a close, he and his friends were alike encouraged by the apparent improvement in his condition, and his sudden death was all the more shocking.

The burial office was said at St. Mary's Church, where he had served with such unobtrusive and faithful labor for fifteen months as Priest-in-Charge.

Loyal, gentle, lovable, earnest, untiring in good works, he was a true Priest and Pastor, a friend in whose affection those who knew him well could confidently rejoice.

No better words could describe his life than those which please God may be said of us all when we shall be called home—

Faithful unto death.

It was ordered that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be sent to the family of Mr. Ryan.

Mr. Carl Reed Taylor introduced Resolution No. 10, as follows:

Resolution No. 10—

Whereas, it is the sense of this Convention that a copy of The Church News should be regularly placed in every Church household of the Diocese; Therefore, be it

Resolved, That in any congregation where a definitely agreed upon percentage of the support of the work of that congregation is set aside for the publication of the paper, copies of the paper be distributed to the households of that congregation.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The Rev. Dr. Armstrong, of the Church Federation, addressed the Convention.

The tellers of the pending election for one lay deputy reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

Mrs. Robert Burkham, President of the Missouri Branch Woman's Auxiliary, made an oral report.

The tellers of the pending election for one lay deputy reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

By the unanimous vote of the Convention, the Order of the Day was suspended, and the ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The Order of the Day was further suspended, and the ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one lay deputy reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay deputy and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one lay deputy reported, and the Bishop declared Judge Biggs elected a deputy to the General Convention.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. John S. Bunting elected a deputy to the General Convention.

The Rev. G. Warfield Hobbs of the National Council addressed the Convention.

The Bishop declared an election for Provisional Deputies to the General Convention in order.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for clerical alternate deputies and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. White presented a report on the University of the South, which was received and filed, as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE DIOCESAN
COUNCIL APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THE RELATIONSHIP OF THIS DIOCESE TO THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH, AS CALLED FOR IN RESOLUTION 25 OF THE LAST CONVENTION.

After due deliberation your committee begs to report as follows:

It is our opinion that the Diocese of Missouri is placed in an anomalous position with respect to the University of the South, so long as it retains formal official relationship thereto, while giving no specific support.

We are therefore led to suggest one of two alternatives:

(1) To withdraw formally, severing our definite relationship with the University.

(2) To adopt the following resolution, thereby giving this great institution our definite support:

Resolution No. 11—

RESOLVED, That this 86th annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, recognizing its official sponsorship of the University of the South, and realizing that such relationship involves the responsibility of interest and support, set aside the Second Sunday after Epiphany in each year as a day upon which the offerings of each parish and mission in the Diocese shall be designated for the University of the South.

Resolution No. 11, contained in the foregoing report, was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins introduced Resolution No. 12, as follows:

Resolution No. 12—

As it is the conviction of the Committee on the Bishop Tuttle Memorial that the national campaign must be largely a personal campaign of seeing wealthy and interested people of the Church—and as only the Bishop of the Diocese, who was Bishop Tuttle's Coadjutor and Successor, has the right to make this National appeal, and the acquaintance and the ability to bring it to a successful issue—therefore be it

Resolved, that this Convention expresses the hope that Bishop Johnson will so arrange his program in the near future as to be able to give to this work the time necessary to the accomplishment of the task to which we have set our hand, the task of erecting a worthy memorial to Bishop Tuttle.

At the request of the Bishop, the foregoing Resolution was put to a vote of the Convention by the Secretary, and was adopted.

Resolution No. 10 was called up for consideration, and was not adopted.

Dean Scarlett introduced Resolution No. 13, which was adopted by a rising vote, as follows:
Resolution No. 13—

We call the attention of the Convention to the following passage of the Bishop's address:

"The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, ten years rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, retired from parochial responsibilities November 1. Bishop Robertson took him from a successful business career and made him deacon 40 years ago. Many of the best of those years he served the Church in his own native Diocese with singular success. Our present Pension Fund system, with assets of more than \$15,000,000, is really the outgrowth of a movement which started nearly 20 years ago when Dr. Wilkins resigned his important office as Dean of the Los Angeles Pro-Cathedral, and went up and down the Church, intent on rousing the consciences of our people to provide protection for the old age of enfeebled clergy, and for the widows and orphans of clergy who had died. Dr. Wilkins has always been thoughtful of his brethren in the ministry and is much beloved by them and all good people. We are glad that he has decided to reside in St. Louis where we may have him as neighbor and counsellor and friend."

Be it resolved, therefore, that this Convention extends to Dr. Wilkins its deepest appreciation of the many years of faithful service behind him, in the Great Cause, and assures him of our affectionate best wishes for the **years to come.**

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Harry G. Hurd and Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock as alternate deputies to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for two alternate lay deputies and were given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for alternate clerical deputies reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. H. W. Mitzner, the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D. D., and the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt elected alternate clerical deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, for a special committee, introduced Resolution No. 14, as follows:

Resolution No. 14—

IN MEMORIAM

MR. CHARLES C. CURTICE

WHEREAS, during the past year Mr. C. C. Curtice, for many years a member of the Annual Convention of this Diocese, and for some years the Secretary of the Standing Committee, entered into the life beyond the grave;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Convention desires to place on record its grateful memory of his saintly life, and of the faithful and efficient service he rendered in the work of the Diocese, that we thank God upon every remembrance of him, and pray that God may help us to follow him as he followed Christ.

On invitation of Dean Scarlett, it was ordered that the next Diocesan Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral.

The tellers of the pending election for alternate lay deputies reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. Thomas Q. Dix and Mr. A. J. Watling elected alternate lay deputies to the General Convention.

On nomination of the Bishop, the Rev. Frederick B. Bartlett and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones were elected Examining Chaplains.

The Bishop appointed the following named committee on the Church Pension Fund: the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D. D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, Judge George C. Hitchcock, Mr. James A. Waterworth, and Mr. J. Herndon Smith.

The Bishop appointed the following named committee on The Church News: Mr. Roy Campbell, Rev. F. J. Bloy, and Miss Ada Winston.

The Bishop appointed the following named members of the Diocesan Council: the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. James H. George, the Rev. F. B. Bartlett, Mr. R. L. Orcutt, Mr. John F. Shepley, and Mr. Albert Burgess.

The Convention adjourned until 9:00 A. M. Thursday for Morning Prayer, to be followed by a business session at 9:30 A. M. The first Order of Business on convening to be a report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to be followed by missionary reports.

THIRD DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis,

Thursday, January 29, 1925.

The Convention opened with Morning Prayer in the Convention Hall at 9:00 A. M.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 9:30 A. M.

The minutes of the second day were read and approved.

The Rev. Mr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented a report, as follows:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons recommends the adoption of certain amendments to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, which were read in detail to this Convention yesterday, and are set forth in full as follows:

(The Temporary Edition of the Constitution and Canons, published in January, 1924, is the basis of the following proposed Amendments.)

Amend Canon 29 by adding to it a new Section to be known as Section 2, as follows:

Sec. 2. The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall have authority to make such changes in the punctuation, paragraphing, and verbiage of the Constitution and Canons as it deems advisable, provided that no change be made in the meaning.

Amend Section 1 of Article V of the Constitution by inserting the word "each" between the words "shall" and "have" in line 2.

Amend Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution by adding to it the following:

Every Deaconess in regular standing who shall have been admitted and who for six months previous to the meeting of the Convention has been actually and Canonically resident in this Diocese, engaged in missionary work under the direction of the Bishop, or in parochial work under the direction of a Rector of a Parish, shall be entitled to a seat and vote.

Amend Section 6 of Article V of the Constitution by adding to it the following words:

provided, that no such Lay Delegate shall take his seat until he shall have presented to the Secretary satisfactory evidence that the Mission which he represents has paid in full all assessments to the Treasurer for the necessary expenses of the Diocese, and all assessments for dues to the Church Pension Fund; but the Convention may, by a two-thirds vote, release the Mission from such payme...

Amend Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution by striking out all of said Section following the word "delegate" in line 6, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

provided, such absence is first certified to the Secretary of the Convention, in the case of a Parish by the Rector, Minister or Secretary of the Vestry, and in the case of a Mission by the Minister or by the Secretary of the Committee. The alternate shall serve until the Secretary of the Convention certifies that the Lay Delegate in whose place said alternate is serving has returned to take his seat.

Amend Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution by striking out in the first paragraph all the words after the word "follow" in line 3, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

On the Thursday of the Annual Convention, or immediately after the adjournment of the Annual Convention, under the Presidency of the Bishop, of the President of the Standing Committee, or of some other person duly chosen to preside, the following Board of Directors shall meet, viz: the members of the Standing Committee, and the deputies to the General Convention, and shall proceed to the nomination of three laymen, who shall be elected by the Chapter to be members for the ensuing year.

Amend Section 2 of Article IX of the Constitution by striking out the words "Standing Committee" wherever they may appear, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Diocesan Council."

Amend Section 1 of Article X of the Constitution by inserting between the words "Parishes" and "entitled" in line 2, the words "and Missions."

Amend Section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution by inserting between the words "shall" and "elect" in line 7, the words, "on nomination of the Bishop."

Amend Section 2 of Canon 4 by striking out all the words after "Convention" in line 1, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

Upon closing his accounts at the end of the diocesan year, said accounts shall be examined by certified accountants, selected by the Diocesan Council. Said accountants shall make their report to the Diocesan Council.

Amend Section 2 of Canon 7 by striking out the words "at Easter" in line 3.

Amend Section 2 of Canon 7 by inserting between the words "Convocation" and "The" in line 4, the following words:

In the Event of the death, resignation, disqualification or removal from the Diocese of the Dean of any Convocation, the Bishop shall have power to appoint a Dean who shall serve for the unexpired term.

Amend Section 5 of Canon 8 by striking out all the words after the word "be" in line 3, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

transferred to the Parochial Trust Fund to be held in trust subject to the control, direction and disposition of the Department of Missions and Church Extension of the Diocesan Council, which Department shall have power to hold, use and dispose of such property for such other missions or missionary purposes as, in the judgment of such Department with the approval of the Diocesan Council may seem best.

Amend Section 3 of Canon 8 by striking out the words "on the first Monday in May of" in lines 3 and 4.

Amend Section 2 of Canon 9 by inserting after the words "Vice-President" in line 3, the following words, "the Chancellor of the Diocese; the Secretary of the Diocese;"

Strike out Section 5 of Canon 9, and insert in lieu thereof a new Section to be known as Section 5, as follows:

"The Council shall have power to employ an Executive Secretary."

Amend Section 6 of Canon 9 by inserting the word "Christian" between the words "of" and "Social" in line 6; and by striking out the words "Ways and Means" in line 7, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Finance"; and by adding the names of two new Departments, as follows:

5. Department of the Field.
6. Department of Publicity.

Amend Section 8 of Canon 9 by striking out the words "Three members of each order shall constitute a quorum" in line 1, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words: "Six members shall constitute a quorum, provided that at least two of each order be present."

Amend Section 1 of Canon 12 by inserting after the word "present" in line 10, the following words:

The voting shall be by ballot, and no proxies shall be permitted; but by unanimous consent the rules may be suspended and the Secretary or some other person present may be authorized to cast all the votes present for any candidate or candidates.

Amend Section 1 of Canon 13 by inserting after the word "Register" in line 2, the following words, "As is required by the Canon of the General Convention."

Amend Section 2 of Canon 13 by striking out the words "required by the Canon of the General Convention" in lines 1 and 2; and by striking out the word "distinguish" in line 11, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "set out."

Repeal Sections 2 and 4 of Canon 18.

Amend Section 1 of Canon 25 by striking out the words, "a regular Communicant, and which shall be evidenced by communing at least once in each year in the Parish Church to which he or she may belong" after the word "mean" in line 2, and inserting in lieu

thereof the following words, "a confirmed person who has communed at least once in each year in the Parish Church to which he or she may belong."

Amend Section 1 of Canon 27 by striking out all the words after the word "Convention" in line 3, and by inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

and, unless such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a Committee on Constitution and Canons, unless such reference shall have been dispensed with by unanimous consent."

Amend Section 1 of Canon 4 by striking out the words "Standing Committee", wherever they may appear in said Section, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "Diocesan Council."

Repeal Section 2 of Canon 6.

Each amendment and repeal of a section recommended in the foregoing report was adopted separately as read, and the amendments and repeals recommended in the report as a whole were adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders.

On invitation, Prof. McFayden of Washington University addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Henry H. Daniels made his report as Missionary to the City Institutions, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

Archdeacon Marsden made his report, which was received and filed. (Appendix 13.)

The Rev. Carl R. Taylor made an oral report for Grace Church—Holy Cross Mission.

It was ordered, as the sense of this Convention, that next year the Convention assemble at 9 o'clock each morning.

The Rev. J. H. Taylor of Cape Girardeau introduced a resolution, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 15—

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Council be requested to consider means for expediting the routine business of the Convention, and for providing opportunity for fuller consideration of reports of the work of the Church and other inspirational matters, and report to the next Convention.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the third day.

After the Bishop's benediction, the Convention adjourned sine die.

**BISHOP'S ADDRESS TO THE EIGHTY-SIXTH CONVENTION OF
THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI**

Dear Brethren:

Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ.

We meet together in the 86th Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

Recollections of longer or shorter periods of sweet communion and fellowship with some or with many of those whose names I give you now will stir our hearts—names of fellow-members in the mystical body of Christ our Lord, whom we shall specially remember as presently in the Communion Office we bless God's holy name for all His servants departed this life in His faith and fear.

Eight of our Bishops finished their course in 1924:

Bishop Alexander C. Garrett, first Bishop of Dallas since 1874, and Presiding Bishop of the Church.

Bishop Edward A. Temple, first Missionary Bishop of North Texas since 1910.

Bishop Edwin G. Weed, third Bishop of Florida since 1886.

Bishop Frederick W. Keator, fifth Bishop of Olympia since 1902.

Bishop George C. Hunting, fourth Missionary Bishop of Nevada since 1914.

Bishop Charles T. Olmstead, second Bishop of Central New York since 1904.

Bishop William Ford Nichols, second Bishop of California since 1893.

Bishop George Y. Bliss, Bishop Coadjutor of Vermont since 1915.

The Rev. John Davis, D.D., on a visit to his old home in South Carolina, died there, July 30, at the age of 74. Dr. Davis was for a number of years Rector of Trinity Church, Hannibal. He also served as Missionary at old St. John's, Prairieville. He was a botanist of distinction, and even in the later years of his life had done valuable research work in that department for Harvard University. Three years of his ministry were spent in Japan, where he founded the chair of Ecclesiastical History in St. Paul's Theological Seminary, Tokyo.

Mr. Thomas K. Skinker, gracious, courteous, given to hospitality, had come to four score years when in the city of St. Louis he fell on sleep a year ago today. He was first enrolled as a delegate in the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri in 1875. He was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court of the State of Missouri in 1876. Half a century he served the Commonwealth as a distinguished member of the bar. Half a century he was an outstanding layman in the councils of the Church. When, largely through the subdividing of what had been the farm-home of his boyhood, a new community of

Homes grew up directly west of what is now called Skinker Road. Mr. Skinker became one of the leaders in organizing in that neighborhood a mission, which grew quickly into St. Michael and All Angels' Parish. He was the first Senior Warden of the new Parish. He was one of its delegates to the Diocesan Convention until the day he died.

Mrs. Rachel Hays Sullivan, generous supporter of every good work in connection with Grace Church, Jefferson City; Mr. Frank Wyman, member of Ascension Parish, former postmaster of St. Louis by appointment of President Roosevelt, generous-hearted head and chief supporter of the Frank Wyman Outing Farm for children, and Treasurer for many years of Missouri's Missionary Host; Mr. A. S. Pidding, Secretary of the Vestry of the Church of the Ascension and officer of the Sunday School; Mr. John B. Vashon, Lay Reader of All Saints' Parish, and Secretary of the Vestry; Mr. Gerrit H. Ten Broek, sometime Consul for the Netherlands for Missouri, Superintendent for many years of Niedringhaus Memorial Sunday School, long-time member of Grace Church; Mr. Charles W. Whitelaw, a leading business man of St. Louis, Vestryman of Christ Church Cathedral, and member of the Cathedral Chapter; Mr. William H. Loker, Senior Warden of St. Paul's, Carondelet, and a member of the Vestry of St. Paul's for more than thirty years; "Charley" Curtice, as all his friends affectionately called him, district passenger representative of the Pennsylvania Railroad lines, Senior Warden of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, Secretary of the Standing Committee of the Diocese; Mr. Walter B. Woodward, senior member of a great St. Louis printing house, sometime Vestryman of the Ascension Parish, member of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Hospital, generous benefactor with his brother Louis of the splendid missionary work of Grace Church; Mr. Wilmer C. Stith, traffic manager of the Terminal Railroad Association, Vestryman of the Ascension Parish, the Rector's right hand in all the work involved in planning and financing the new Ascension Parish House, close to me for thirteen years as a valued member of the Holy Cross Corporation, and at the time of his death the trusted custodian of its funds; Mrs. Shepard Barclay, many years a devoted member of St. George's; Mrs. George H. Hunt, widow of a clergyman of the Church; Mr. Frank H. Young, and Mrs. M. C. Marshall of St. George's; Mrs. Minnie Wood of Mt. Calvary; Mrs. Ida Haarstick Herf of St. Michael and All Angels'; Mrs. C. N. Trowbridge and Mr. George J. Wood of the Redeemer; Miss Sarah Heath of Emmanuel, Webster Groves; Mrs. M. Wilda Mills, whose daughter is the wife of Emmanuel's Rector; Mr. Clifton R. Scudder of the Church of the Holy Communion; Judge David P. Dyer of Holy Communion Parish, appointed to the Federal Judgeship of this district by President Roosevelt in 1907; Mr. George Lockwood and Mrs. Edward Mead, Sr., of the Church of the Ascension; Mr. Louis E. Walser, aged member of St. Augustine's; Mrs. Eleanor Owen, charter member of St. Luke's Mission, Valley Park, and Guild President for many years; Mr. W. H. Wilsey, Warden of Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff; Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Pinto and Mr. Thomas G. Stimson of Trinity Mission, in the city of St. James; Mrs. Eleanor Parkhurst and Miss Marion Fulton of Christ Church, Rolla; Mrs. Mary E. Overall of Calvary, Columbia, whose father, the late Senator Rollins, was founder of the University of Missouri; Mrs. Elizabeth Chambers Hull of the Holy Communion; Miss Mabel Wilson, writer of attractive books for the religious instruction of children, and founder and principal of Miss Wilson's Kindergarten, and Mrs. Nannie Wright and Mrs. Lyman T. Hay, all of the Cathedral; Mrs. M. L. Samuels, faithful helper to Bishop Tuttle in secretarial work in earlier days, Parish Worker at St. George's, and power for good as welfare worker with the Shapleigh Hardware

Company; and Mrs. Ellen Bankhead Knight of Prairieville, who was confirmed there by Bishop Robertson in 1866. All these are gone!

With dignity and reverence and deep affection and sweet simplicity, we bore to his burial from St. Mary's Church, St. Louis, of which he was the pastor, the Rev. Jesse Asa Ryan, two weeks ago tomorrow. Twenty-two of the Clergy of the city and county, together with the Bishop and a church full of people, were there. Mr. Ryan came to our Diocese only fifteen months ago. Spiritually and intellectually strong, he had always during the twenty years of his ministry answered calls which took him into places not conspicuous. He died at work. As pastor of St. Mary's, he watched over and fed the flock with a shepherd's tender care, and was much beloved by his people and by his brethren.

Everything that we know of the revelation of God's works and ways supports us in a firm conviction that faithful service which men render here prepares them for more joyful rendering of higher service in life beyond this life. What unspeakable comfort lies in the thought that death is not a blind alley, but rather a broad thoroughfare which leads out into spacious fields in larger worlds of wider opportunity and higher understanding—such a thing is death!

BEQUEST. I reported last year the death of dear Mrs. Helen K. Garth, whose home had been my home for a dozen years when I had been in the neighborhood of Hannibal. She left generous bequests to charitable and religious and benevolent purposes in Hannibal and elsewhere, and especially to Trinity Parish, of which she was a life-long member. Under her will there has come to the Bishop of Missouri a bequest of five thousand dollars, in trust, the income to be used for religious and charitable purposes, at his discretion. I reported a like amount received in 1923 for a similar purpose under the will of Mrs. Mary I. Maffitt of St. Louis. Are there not others, many others, whose zeal for the Church may lead them, while there is time, to make provision in their wills toward the support and extension of our mission work? I very much hope that it may be so.

In my address a year ago I spoke of an Executive Committee already formed, and of plans already discussed among the people of his own Diocese to raise throughout the Church sufficient funds to build and endow a worthy memorial of the life and labors of him who had been for nearly forty years chief pastor of our people. The Convention went on record as being greatly interested in the program outlined for the erection of a living memorial to Bishop Tuttle. And you voted unanimously,

"That this Convention heartily endorse the program of the Executive Committee * * * and that the members of the Diocese, both Clergy and laity, agree to bend their best energies to the accomplishing of this project, making it their special objective of the year 1924."

Shortly after the Convention I presented our plan to a meeting of the National Council in New York, and the project which had been begun locally was "approved and endorsed" by the National Council as a National Memorial. Men and women of our Church, and of other Churches, and of no Church, offered themselves willingly to help to organize the endeavor here at home, and to help to raise the funds. Quietly, from February to October, the memorial project was planted in the hearts of the people of the Diocese. We planned an intensive period of three weeks in October. This began with a great public dinner meeting in St. Louis. Rabbi Thurman of the United

Hebrew Temple made the invocation; Rev. Dr. Bitting, twenty years pastor of St. Louis' Second Baptist Church; Mr. Festus J. Wade, a St. Louis banker of international reputation (the foremost Roman Catholic layman of the Middle West), and Mr. Charles Nagel, Secretary of Commerce and Labor in the cabinet of President Taft, made notable addresses. Because Bishop Tuttle had been a kind of pastor at large to all sorts and conditions of men in every walk of life, all communions in St. Louis co-operated in the endeavor to make a successful campaign. Archbishop Glennon sent a letter which was printed in the St. Louis papers, commending the memorial project to all good citizens. The weekly bulletin of the St. Louis Church Federation, whose first President Bishop Tuttle had been a dozen years before his death, carried a full-length picture of the Bishop in his Episcopal robes as its cover page. The Modern View, weekly publication of the Jewish Church, used a Bishop Tuttle photograph for its full-page cover. After nineteen days, the closing dinner was presided over by Mr. Festus J. Wade, a member of the original Executive Committee. When the lists were in, it was announced that St. Louis had subscribed over \$500,000, and that more was in sight. For the women, a team headed by a member of Temple Israel reported the highest total pledges outside of special gifts. Dr. John W. MacIvor promised \$1,000 on behalf of the Second Presbyterian Church, of which he is the pastor. When it is remembered that the Bishop Tuttle Memorial was trying to make its way in St. Louis in the midst of a bunch of local drives totaling \$7,000,000, the raising of over half a million in this initial effort is a significant success. The Church Federation weekly, after thanking the Episcopal leaders for being generous enough to permit what might have been solely a family affair to be shared by the religious life of the whole community, went on to say:

"This is another answer by the Church to the civic challenge of the Bond Issue and the the philanthropic challenge of the Community Fund. All the churches of greater St. Louis, and every denominational board of local missions, is strengthened by this forward movement. The forces of righteousness are advantaged. St. Louis will be a better and a finer city. St. Louis Episcopalians, the Churches of all faiths, the city and the Kingdom, will be the richer in spirit and the stronger in influence for this signal achievement."

The General Church knows now how much St. Louis cares. We ought soon to have encouraging reports from the country at large. If men and women of many faiths in St. Louis have given this wonderful testimony to the affection in which Bishop Tuttle is held, and to the value of a life like his, we surely may expect that members of the Episcopal Church everywhere, to whom Bishop Tuttle gave himself so generously, will wish to do their full share in making this a splendid and worthy memorial. It is confidently expected that gifts, large and small, will continue to come in from individuals who loved Bishop Tuttle, and from Churches throughout the world, in which his name was a familiar household word. We hope to have, from all sources, one million dollars to build and perpetually endow this National Memorial in the City of St. Louis, the See city of the first Missionary Bishop this Church ever had, Jackson Kemper, and on ground adjoining Christ Church Cathedral, the oldest Parish of our Church west of the Mississippi river. It is hoped the Memorial will serve the National Church in various ways, and that it may be much used as a Mid-Western center for Provincial and Regional Conferences of one sort and another.

The \$500,000 subscribed in St. Louis includes, I know, gifts from givers who gave beyond their ability to give. But I am wondering whether there are not many individuals who have forgotten how generously Bishop Tuttle gave himself to them and to those who were dear to them, and have neglected to respond generously to this Memorial appeal. And I am wondering whether there are not Parishes and Missions in Missouri which have forgotten that, at the Convention a year ago, both Clergy and laity agreed "to bend their best energies to the accomplishing of this project". I think there are returns in the Treasurer's office of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial which we would not wish to record as measuring the "best energies" of Clergy and laity of our Diocese in the congregations from which the gifts and pledges came. Having said this much, "to stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance", I want to repeat that many of the returns from Parishes and Missions have been most generous. I urge and beg, for the completion of a fund so auspiciously begun, the eager and active co-operation of every man, woman and child who knew Bishop Tuttle, and the splendid equipment of heart and mind and strength of soul which he gladly placed at the disposal of the people of this State and of this city during almost half a century.

When the Convention of the Diocese, last January, voted that we must make the Bishop Tuttle Memorial "our special objective in the year 1924", it was, of course, assumed that I would put a good deal of time and effort into this "special" work. This I have done. It is not too much to say that more than two whole months were so largely devoted to this "special" duty as to prevent me doing the normal duties of the Bishop of Missouri. A mass of correspondence was also handled in my desk too big to catalogue. Having neither Coadjutor nor Suffragan nor helper of any sort to whom I could delegate any of those duties which, under an Episcopal form of government, can be done only by a Bishop, it was inevitable that the work and morale of the Diocese must suffer. My Confirmations in 1924 were only 442. This is 62 fewer than I confirmed in 1923. I baptized eight children. I officiated at six burials. I solemnized one marriage. We have six Postulants and one candidate for Holy Orders.

The Forty-eighth Triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church will assemble in New Orleans in October of this year. Vital problems of faith and doctrine, as well as details of the work in which the Church is engaged in all parts of the world, will be laid before the New Orleans Convention for consideration and decision. Among the subjects which will be discussed will be Prayer Book revision, the status of women in the Church, divorce, the youth movement, Church unity, Christian healing and home and family life. All the important proposals for Prayer Book revision were acted upon at the last General Convention of the Church, which met in Portland, Oregon, September, 1922. The Church Constitution requires, however, that these propositions must be approved at the next succeeding Convention to make their adoption final and legal. One of the most important tasks of the New Orleans Convention will be the adoption of a program for the ensuing three years following serious agitation within the Church for the curtailment of expenses. We must elect four clerical and four lay delegates. I hope that the men whom we elect will be able to so shape their affairs at home that they may go, and that they will go with a determination to take their duties as members of the great General Convention seriously.

During the ten years in which I was Bishop Coadjutor, I used to tell to the Convention each year at considerable length, and in par-

ticularity of detail, the story of that portion of the Diocesan work which is more peculiarly "missionary". I want to again take your time to personally conduct you about the Diocese, so far as time permits.

The Rev. Henry H. Marsden has ministered in the office of Archdeacon for the past fifteen months. He has looked after a number of congregations in various parts of the field which otherwise must have gone unshepherded. He has encouraged many congregations which needed some one to encourage them. He has served as an emergency man in a number of places which were temporarily without a Rector. He has brought the missionary activities of the Church to the attention of groups of people in such fashion as to make them eager to take their share in the Church's missionary work. Practically the entire spiritual care of Poplar Bluff, Ironton, DeSoto, Crystal City, Bonne Terre, St. Charles, Portland, Jefferson City, Fredericktown, was handed over for 1924 to the Archdeacon. This was done, as I have said above, in order that the Bishop might be released to attend to special duties thrust upon him by the Bishop Tuttle Memorial. I shall let the Archdeacon make his own report. The Rev. Mr. Weddell was pastor in 1924 of Prince of Peace, St. Louis; Valley Park, Sherman, Sullivan, Florissant, St. Clair and St. James (where the Rev. Mr. Tragitt also comes from Rolla two Sunday evenings in each month). He was also drafted by the Archdeacon for a number of services at Herculanum and by the Bishop for emergency duty here and there. You have frequently heard me say that Mr. Weddell's time is chiefly spent in a field where no eye looks in but God's. Three of his Missions (Trinity, St. James; Prince of Peace, St. Louis, and Valley Park) manifest a wholesome spiritual strength. The others are points where little development can be looked for, but which I still feel ought to be pastored by this Church unless we wish to hurry on the day when the Diocese of Missouri shall be composed of nothing else but urban parishes.

The Rev. Charles F. Edwards served nearly eight years as Rector of Macon, and left us in November. St. James' Parish substantially increased its givings for Parish support, for the missionary work of the Diocese, and for the extension of the Kingdom in all parts of the world. A new piece of ground alongside the church was bought and paid for and improved, making our whole property much more valuable and attractive. As Dean of Northern Convocation, Mr. Edwards helped greatly to enlarge the influence of the Church. He also served as Rector of Moberly from January, 1920, to November, 1924, and brought much spiritual joy and strength to that city.

Soon after I came to Missouri, Mr. Augustus P. Rein asked me if I would accept him as a candidate for Orders, if he would give up important business as agent for the New York Mutual Life Insurance Company. I ordained him in due course, and nine of the best years of a good man's life he gave to our Diocese. He ministered faithfully at St. Timothy's, St. Louis. He served also as pastor of Overland, and brought the people of St. Paul's Mission there to such a degree of confidence in themselves that they have asked to have a resident pastor, "all our own", as they say; and have pledged that they will pay the salary. The Rev. Mr. Rein left Missouri in November, to accept a call back to the New England of his earlier love, as Rector of Charlestown, N. H.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, ten years Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, retired from parochial responsibilities November 1. Bishop

Robertson took him from a successful business career and made him Deacon forty years ago. Many of the best of those years he served the Church in his own native Diocese with singular success. Our present Pension Fund system, with assets of more than \$15,000,000, is really the outgrowth of a movement which started nearly twenty years ago, when Dr. Wilkins resigned his important office as Dean of the Los Angeles Pro-Cathedral and went up and down the Church, intent on rousing the consciences of our people to provide protection for the old age of enfeebled Clergy and for the widows and orphans of Clergy who had died. Dr. Wilkins has been always thoughtful of his brethren in the ministry, and is much beloved by them and by all good people. We are glad that he has decided to reside in St. Louis, where we may have him as neighbor and counselor and friend.

Deaconess Leonora Hoffman, fifteen years matron of the Episcopal Orphans' Home, asked that she might be relieved of that responsibility last spring. She was succeeded by Deaconess Ellen Humphreys, June 1, who brought to the work valuable experience gained in institutional work of various sorts in big New York.

The Rev. Walter G. Harter, whom I found busily engaged in an essential industry as Rector of St. Paul's Parish, Gardner, Mass., took charge of St. Augustine's, St. Louis, in October; and the Rev. George E. Renison, Dean of the Wind River Convocation in Wyoming, has just come in this month of January to be Rector of Grace Church, Jefferson City.

With the exception of Ascension Parish House, in St. Louis, in architectural beauty conforming to the lines of the beautiful church building beside which it stands with fine faith and splendid Christian optimism, built by the congregation under the leadership of the Rev. Mr. Bunting, to take the place of a former Parish House destroyed by fire—with this exception, we undertook practically no building enterprises in 1924. It is well, perhaps. It cannot be charged against the Diocese that we provided for ourselves and neglected to provide for others.

We consecrated beautiful Grace Church, Marion Place, a gift to the Diocese by reason of Miss Susan Mount's rich legacy of \$50,000. Not dark lanterns, but beacons and lighthouses, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and Mrs. Taylor and Deaconess Reynolds are. I cannot speak in too high praise of the wonderful light and warmth which they have brought into the whole neighborhood surrounding Grace Church during the last seven years.

In the middle of September of a year ago, I nominated the Rev. Phillips B. Warner, a Deacon, to the charge of St. Paul's Parish, Carondelet, St. Louis. The chief assets of the Parish were a band of devoted people and a beautiful stone church. Its liabilities included a debt of more than \$4,000, which had bent the back of the Parish for many a long year. Last Easter St. Paul's rolled the burden off and stood upright on its feet. Mr. Warner would be the first to give credit for his fine performance to the people of the Parish. "This," he said, in his word of thanks to the congregation, "is evidence of what can be done by love for the Church, loyalty to the cause and earnest co-operation." But the people know, and I know, that the Parish wouldn't have rallied to the task without the leadership of such a man as Mr. Warner has proved himself to be. He is Rector now, and has been since I advanced him to the Priesthood in November, 1923. St. Paul's faces a new day. We consecrated the beautiful stone church on the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. I

want to here say thanks to the Rector and to all good men and good women of the Parish, and especially to Mr. Guido Doering, for the lifting of the debt.

I am happy to hear the Rev. Mr. Tragitt say assuredly, having labored for it for more than a dozen years, that in the spring Christ Church, Rolla, will begin the erection of a much-needed Parish House.

Bethany Mission, at 1606 Wash Street, is the outgrowth of beginnings made among the colored people of that neighborhood by Mr. Ira S. Ashe, a colored layman, in 1921. Mr. Ashe asked to be relieved of responsibility of the Mission last May, and I appointed the Rev. D. R. Clarke, Rector of All Saints' Parish, to the charge of Bethany from June 1. The work is prospering under his pastoral care, and the people to whom the Mission ministers are plainly trying to develop a larger measure of self-help.

The venture of faith which we made when we undertook bigger things than we had thought were possible at St. Luke's, Harney Heights, St. Louis, has been fully justified and greatly rewarded. The Rev. Thomas L. Small, who came to us little more than a year ago, found in the congregation of St. Luke's a congenial people, and the people found in him a wise and devoted pastor. Since a year ago, the Sunday School and the communicant list have practically doubled. St. Luke's lost its chapel, which was a pretty poor apology for a house of worship, by fire in early September. Nothing was saved from the wreck. The spirits of the people were enthused rather than disheartened by this calamity. Work is already begun for the building of a new chapel suited to the uses of the congregation, on a new lot a couple of blocks away. The Church Women's Club recently sent a generous check to assist the St. Luke's Building Fund.

Calvary Parish, Louisiana, has put a new furnace in the rectory; has paid a note for \$250 at the bank; has raised the insurance on the Church property from \$3,500 to \$7,000, and paid the three-year premium; has adopted a budget for 1925, which makes a larger provision for Church support, local and general than has ever before been made in the history of the parish. Diocesan Assesment and Church's Program for 1924 are paid in full; the first time, I think, that this thing has happened there. The Rev. David Coombs has led in these matters, and the people have cordially followed. Mr. Coombs ministers with great acceptance in Grace Mission, Clarksville, and is Rector of St. John's, Prairieville. It is a very considerable comfort to me that I do not have to think of the good people at these three important points as being without a local pastor.

I recently spent three days in what I sometimes call the Southeast Missouri Circuit. The largest congregation and the biggest Sunday School that I have seen in thirteen years in Cape Girardeau gathered in Christ Church the Sunday morning I was there. With the Rev. Mr. Taylor, I went to Jackson, Bloomfield, Illmo, Chaffee, greeted everywhere with great kindness and real appreciation. This is that part of our Missouri field which you have sometimes heard me speak of as twice the size of Massachusetts, with only one minister of our Church in it!

St. Philip's, St. Louis, in various ways has registered appreciation of fine work done by the Rev. Fred B. Bartlett, who came as Rector there a year ago, and at Christmas time presented him with a sedan car. I am glad. Every parson's family ought to have a house to live in, and every parson ought to have a car to work with.

Thirty-two years ago, on New Year's Day, the Rev. Dr. Cloud was presented by Dean Schuyler and ordained to the Priesthood by Bishop Tuttle. Under a business arrangement, agreeable to the Bishop and to Dr. Cloud, we loaned him last year for a total of seventy-one services to the deaf in a number of Dioceses outside of Missouri. In connection with these extra Diocesan ministrations, he baptized twenty-one persons, presented twenty-one for Confirmation. We are glad that our Dr. Cloud, so rarely equipped for his work, is so greatly needed in so many places to help spread the Gospel of the Christ among the deaf. In March, Dr. Cloud will present for ordination to the Priesthood in Denver a deaf mute whom he baptized and prepared for Confirmation and presented for Deacon's Orders.

The City institutions. The Rev. Francis J. Bloy left this work, after having labored in it most successfully and faithfully, and became the Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, in October. Mr. Lester S. Martin of the State University, a Postulant for Holy Orders in our Diocese, was appointed by the Bishop to have practically the entire overseership of this department of our work from June to November. He did his duty well, and won merited praise from members of the staff, and from those to whom we minister. The Rev. Henry H. Daniels came from Wyoming to the vacancy created by the going of Mr. Bloy. Since he arrived, November 1, many of you have kindly made Mr. Daniels feel that he is among friends. When I asked him to come, he avowed that he was no "expert" in such matters. Well, I have always felt that if we acquire too great expert efficiency in our ministry to the boys and girls of the delinquent class, and to sick and poor and prisoners in other city institutions, it is more than probable that we shall leave them "cold". For thirty years our rejoicing has been "the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God", we have behaved ourselves toward this blessed work of ministering to the hungry and thirsty and stranger and naked and sick and imprisoned.

I regret that it becomes necessary, under the provisions of Canon 17 of the Diocese, to report that Mount Calvary Parish, in St. Louis, has for three successive years failed to make report to the Convention as required by Canon.

To the members of the Council, and to the Department of Ways and Means, and most of all, I think, to Mr. Harry Hurd, Treasurer of the Diocese, we owe thanks which words cannot express. For 1924 was a hectic year. Make no doubt of that. We started out last January committed to a schedule of work larger than were the pledges and promises to pay the bills. "This thing was not done in a corner". We did it deliberately. Two questions were before us: Should the Convention adopt the budget for mission work which was recommended by the Department of Missions and Church Extension, and by the Diocesan Council? Or should the Convention take counsel of its fears and pare and peel and cut and trim and amputate and butcher? What we did was to adopt the budget as presented. So, then, we started 1924 with promises to pay out more than our people had pledged to pay in, and with a note at the bank for \$4,500, which we had borrowed to help pay the cost of operation in the Church's Program in 1923. When he closed his books for the year just done, Mr. Hurd informed me that he had reduced the bank note from \$4,500 to \$3,900, and that all current accounts and bills were paid. This is good news. As I said above, Mr. Hurd merits our appreciative thanks.

One feature of the situation troubles me. And I know that all the officers and members of the Council share with me a deep regret

that the amount which we sent to the general work of the Church is so much less than the amount kept here for mission work in our own Diocese. In 1923 the division of our offerings, as between Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, custodian of funds for General Mission Work, and Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, custodian of funds for Missouri Mission Work, was practically a fifty-fifty proposition. In 1924 the division was practically seventy-thirty. And Missouri kept the "seventy" share. Your Diocesan Council, the body which, under your reorganization plan, is charged with the responsibility of managing missionary matters, will report to this Convention a proposed budget for 1925. I will not anticipate the Council report, except to say that I shall be glad if it emphasizes a desire that Missouri should bear a larger share in the general work of the Church in 1925, and yet should permit no slacking or sagging of our Diocesan work.

I beg that the Convention will give its best thought to the recommendation of the Council with reference to the 1925 budget. And I beg that you will register your honest judgment and conviction by your votes. We are not here to take a line of least resistance.

"We are not here to play, to dream, to drift.
We have hard work to do, and loads to lift.
Shun not the struggle. Face it, 'tis God's gift."

The heresy which more than any other needs to have its hateful head hit in days like these is the heresy which says that a man may substitute "as little as I must" for "as much as I am able", and still be a Christian. Love never asks, how much must I do, but how much can I do? And I am not convinced that we are to follow too closely Micawber's classic lecture on economy as found in "David Copperfield":

"My other piece of advice, Copperfield," said Mr. Micawber, "you know. Annual income, twenty pounds; annual expenditure, nineteen pounds six; result, happiness. Annual income, twenty pounds; annual expenditure, twenty pounds ought and six; result, misery. The blossom is blighted, the leaf is withered, the god of day goes down upon the dreary scene and—and in short you are forever floored. As I am!"

I am not sure that disciples of Him whose Church was founded on a cross can justify themselves in following Micawber more than Christ! I am not suggesting that we plunge along in reckless abandon as to the future, careless of whether or not we are assuming liabilities wholly out of proportion to our ability to pay. But I am saying that debt is not so damnable a thing as doubt—doubt, I mean, of the Master's ability to make good His promise. "Go, and lo, I am with you!" I insist that the promise of His accompanying presence and supporting aid is conditioned upon our going. It was because Abram went forth at God's command to the place where God commanded him to go—it was because he went that God disclosed to him how God's will was to be accomplished. Read the story, step by step, up to the very moment when it must have seemed to Abram that all was for him utter ruin and disaster and defeat! "And Abram looked, and lo, a ram caught in the thicket by his horns!" No, I don't believe that the Blessed Master expects us to "sit pretty". The secret of good management for cities, states and nations may be to keep expenditures always within assured income. But Christ crucified upon the cross would seem to suggest that the Blessed One does not intend that His Church shall always be "on easy street".

For our own soul's health, then, we need to generously give. "Happiness was born a twin. To have joy, one must share it." And for our own salvation we must generously give; for "when we climb to heaven 'tis on the rounds of help to fellow-men". He that saveth his life shall lose it; but he that loseth his life shall find it. And for those who shall come after us, we need to work and build.

'An old man, going a lone highway,
Came at the evening, cold and gray,
To a chasm vast and deep and wide.
The old man crossed in the twilight dim;
The sullen stream had no fear for him.
But he turned, when safe on the other side,
And built a bridge to span the tide.
'Old man,' said a fellow pilgrim near,
'You are wasting your strength with building here;
Your journey will end with the ending day;
You never again will pass this way;
You've passed the chasm deep and wide.
Why build you this bridge at eventide?'
The builder lifted his old gray head.
'Good friend, in the path I have come, he said,
'There followeth after me today
A youth whose feet must pass this way.
The chasm that's been as naught to me
To that fair-haired youth may a pitfall be.
He, too, must cross in the twilight dim.
Good friend, I am building this bridge for him.'

I have told you my regret that we sent so comparatively little to the General Church in 1924. My regret is softened a bit by reason of the fact that we did not keep back payments toward salaries elsewhere in order that we might spend money extravagantly for payroll and for building enterprises here at home. Save for the rebuilding of one Parish House destroyed by fire, we did practically no extension work in 1924. We simply held our work from slipping—that was all. In addition to our work in the Church's Mission to the City Institutions, we assisted in maintaining the ministrations of the Church in forty-five Missions and aided Parishes, ministered to by fifteen men in Priest's Orders, who devote their whole energies to the work of the ministry, and whose average salary from all sources, not including moving and traveling expenses, and allowing only \$50 per month for house rent where there is no rectory, was less than \$1,900 per year. We also paid the salary of the Archdeacon at \$3,000, permitting him to pay his own house rent; the salaries of two Deaconesses and one sister, amounting to \$2,500, and provided \$1,200 to assist in student work at educational centers. This total, including Pension Fund, is practically \$27,000. I do not discuss the items here, for discussion here would manifestly not be unto edification. But if any person who has a fair understanding of this Diocese, and of the conditions of our work, can tell us where money is spent extravagantly or uselessly, I wish, as I have always wished, that my spoken address may be made a topic of discussion in the Convention hall. If you think that there should be more "grouping" of the work, tell us in the Convention hall what forms the reassembling of the units ought to take; for grouping in some Dioceses is comparatively easy, in others very difficult. If you are among those who think that substitutions by radio ought to be made for "holy men of God who now

pass by continually" in Missouri communities, tell us so, and perhaps appoint a committee to take up the matter of the radio and to report in 1926.

Save money by using radio? Perhaps so. But only I think, where those methods which have proved fruitful in the Church's work in other generations have proved to be not workable. "Run, speak to that young man;" bring your personality to bear on his; that was the ancient way. And when the Blessed Master entered upon His ministry, it was with the assertion, "A body hast thou prepared me." Eyes, lips, feet, hands, to fetch men to see the knowledge of the love of God in the face of Jesus Christ! Yes, we may carry religion to communities by radio and save money. But we are not here to save money!

Without the Missionary Host and its strengthening supplies, our lines would have broken at several points on what we may properly call "the front" this past year. There are a number of places in which the Sunday worship must have been practically discontinued except for the help supplied by the Lay Readers' League. The Church Woman's Club has assisted much of our missionary endeavor with gracious and ready help. The year's work in the Woman's Auxiliary has been wonderful; and generous pledges have been made by the Auxiliary to assist in missionary work in Missouri and elsewhere in 1925. Early in the summer, when it was clearly apparent that only a special effort by our people, over and above any other pledges they had made, could keep our work from slipping, I sent out a special appeal letter, to which you responded generously (and I thank you from my heart) with nearly \$4,500. Four Parishes paid their quotas, and three overpaid their quotas; ten missions paid their quotas, and nine overpaid their quotas, in 1924. Our thanks to these!

In these days, when most of the Church is discussing the necessity of more publicity, I am puzzled to know why so few of the Clergy help to make Church News the valuable publicity missionary agency which, by their help the editor and the business manager could soon make it to be. "Church News" ought to be in fact as well as in name the Church news of the Diocese of Missouri. Again I earnestly ask that the Clergy will co-operate to this end. And won't you help build up a reasonably big subscription list?

We must now conclude this opening service and get about our business session. Beloved, let us confess some indifference and some ignorance; let us confess unworthy standards of obedience and love; unworthy standards of eagerness to bear in our bodies the stigmata of the Lord Jesus—hard work done for Him, shame suffered for His name, "You know Lieutenant Adams?" was asked by one civilian of another when the war was on. That's his mother there. She'll be proud to know her son has a bullet in his shoulder." "Sorry you lost your arm," was said to a soldier lad who came home with an empty sleeve. "I didn't lose it, sir; I gave it." Let us make a trial of giving our very best in the year that is before us. Let that thought be the dominant note while we tarry here these two or three days. Nothing else can justify our taking time in days like these from what are called essential industries for this Diocesan Convention, except the fact that the Churches have the medicine which can bring relief to a perilously sick world. Said Jowett of Balliol to Margot Asquith: "Margot, you must believe in God, in spite of what the Clergy say!" And we must believe the Gospel of Christ to be the power of God unto salvation for God's world, in spite of what Bishops and other Clergy and Diocesan Conventions and Provincial Synods say or con-

clude not to say with reference to the Church's Program. There is no substitute for that Gospel of Christ which the Program, through churches and schools and hospitals and ministers and teachers and nurses proposes to advance. Where the blessed influences of the Gospel are withdrawn, every decent thing in family and civic and social and commercial and political life dries up, and withers and disappears; just as effectually as all the precious things of the earth and the fullness thereof, and all the precious fruits brought forth by the sun would dry up and wither and waste away if the sun were under a perpetual eclipse. "Lord, to whom shall we go?" said the first disciple of the Master to Jesus when Jesus asked them if they were going to desert Him for somebody else, and His teachings for something else. And in this twentieth century, dear Lord, to whom shall we go? Where else except in Thy company and dominated by Thy love, and guided by Thy light, and led by Thy leadership, is any way, is any truth, is any life, is any love, is any joy, is any peace, is any strength, is any safety?

"Revive Thy work, O Lord,
Exalt Thy precious Name;
And, by the Holy Ghost, our love
For Thee and Thine inflame."

APPENDIX NO. 2

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

On February 5, 1924, the Council met for organization.

On March 12, the Department of Ways and Means recommended to the Council that an effort be made to raise the anticipated deficit for the Church's Program. The Council suggested that the Bishop authorize the Ways and Means Department to undertake to raise the deficit, and the Bishop appointed the Department of Ways and Means as a Committee for this purpose.

On September 10 a special meeting was held to discuss matters of finance. The Rev. Mr. Bunting reported from the Department of Ways and Means that arrangements were being made for a Training Institute in the month of November in the matter of the Church's Program, in charge of the Rev. G. W. Hobbs of the National Council. The Council authorized the necessary appropriation to defray the expenses of the proposed Training Institute.

At this meeting it was determined that the Every-Member Canvass in the Diocese of Missouri should be held in the various Parishes and Missions on Sunday, December 7.

At a meeting of the Council on November 5, 1924, the Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society was requested to transfer to the Treasurer of the Diocese the funds and securities then in his possession as Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, advising him (the Treasurer of the Diocese) of the terms and conditions upon which such assets were originally received by the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society. The foregoing action was taken in accordance with Resolution Number 24, adopted in the 85th Convention of the Diocese. It was ordered that the principal of the Fund received by the Treasurer of the Diocese from the Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society should hereafter be known as "The George H. Gill Legacy".

Acting under Resolution Number 25 of the 85th Convention, by request of the Council, the Bishop appointed the Rev. E. S. White, the Rev. John S. Bunting and Mr. Lee Orcutt a Committee on the University of the South, to report with recommendations to the next meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

At the meeting on November 5 the Department of the Field was organized with the following named membership:

At several meetings of the Council, during the latter part of the year, budgets for General Diocesan Expenses and for the Church's Program in Missouri were considered. At the meeting November 5 the budget for General Diocesan Expenses was approved, amounting to \$20,250.06.

At other meetings, budgets were discussed for the work of the Departments of Ways and Means, Missions and Church Extension, Social Service, Religious Education and Field, and the total budget

for the work under the direction of these departments was adopted, amounting to \$44,670, as follows:

The Council has approved a division of funds between the Diocese of Missouri and the General Church on a ratio of 7/11 for the Diocese and 4/11 for the General Church.

The Council has approved a total appropriation of \$66,203.16 for the Church's Program.

At the meeting of December 10, the schedule of Diocesan Assessments for the General Expense Fund of the Diocese, amounting to a total of \$20,250.40, was unanimously approved.

At the meeting on December 10, the resignation of Miss Hattie E. Gooding, Publicity Representative, was presented and accepted.

The Department of Ways and Means reported that as the result of conferences with Vestries and people of the various Parishes, there would be available in the year 1925 for the Church's Program approximately \$56,000.00. On that basis, the schedule of apportionments for the Church's Program, amounting to a total of \$56,192.60, was unanimously approved, and the items are on file.

It is evident from the above figures that the amount required to pay the budget of the Church's Program is practically \$10,000.00 in excess of that which is pledged by the various congregations. On the assurance of the Bishop and the Rev. Dr. Wilkins that they would undertake to raise \$10,000.00 over and above the amounts which have been promised by the various congregations, the Council adopted the figures for the budget mentioned above.

Resolved, in accordance with the recommendations of the Diocesan Convention, that this Convention adopt the budget for the Diocesan Expense Fund, amounting to a total of \$20,250.06.

Program in this Diocese, amounting to a total of \$44,670.00, and itemized as follows:

For the Department of Missions and Church Extension, \$40,470.00; for the Department of Ways and Means, including interest, \$3,300.00; for the Department of Social Service, \$200.00; for the Department of Religious Education, \$200.00; for the Department of the Field, \$500.00.

Resolution No. 4.

Resolved, in accordance with the recommendation of the Diocesan Council, that this Convention authorize the Treasurer of the Diocese to divide all funds received by him from the apportionments, or from other sources, for the purposes of the Church's Program, in a ratio of seven elevenths (7-11) for the Diocese and four elevenths (4-11) for the General Church Program beyond this Diocese;

And, resolved further, that this Convention hereby appropriates the total sum of money derived from the said four-elevenths (4-11) of said funds for payment to the Treasurer of the National Council for the purposes of the Church's Program.

Resolution No. 5.

Resolved, in accordance with the recommendation of the Diocesan Council, that this Convention adopt the schedule of apportionments for the Church's Program on file in the records of the Diocesan Council, amounting to a total of \$56,692.60.

APPENDIX 3.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

The original Committee had as a member Mr. W. C. Stith. Within the year, Mr. Stith departed this life for the higher. The Committee regrets the loss of Mr. Stith and the valuable assistance he would have rendered, and thanks God for the great assistance he has rendered to the Diocese in the past.

Your Committee has searched the Diocesan Journals for the past two years to see what the Committee on State of the Church had reported, but found no reports from that Committee. When it became time to draw up a report on the condition of the Church for 1924, your Committee discovered why, perhaps, no report had been made in these past years.

The state of the Church must be gathered, for the most part, from statistics. The complete statistics of the Church are to be found in the parochial reports. But some of these reports do not reach the Secretary of the Diocese until after the Convention meets. Without these reports it is impossible to give an adequate report of the state of the Church. The Committee, therefore, urges greater promptness in sending in parochial reports in order that the Committee on State of the Church may properly function.

It is observed from the vital statistics of the Diocesan Journals that year after year from two hundred to three hundred communicants are "lost by removal without transfer". What becomes of these people is a serious question. In many cases it means that they are actually lost to the Episcopal Church. To obviate this leakage, your Committee recommends a general Parish Register, in charge of the Secretary of the Diocese, or some other responsible person, to whom could be sent by the Rectors and Missionaries the names and last known addresses of communicants removing from their Parish or district, when such communicants indicate no intention of maintaining their former Parish connections, in order that they might be looked up by the Church into whose neighborhood they come. In this connection, we further recommend that Rectors and Ministers in charge of Parishes and Missions insist, in so far as they can with due propriety, that communicants removing to or from the Parishes or Missions in their care procure and present the proper transfer of their membership, in accordance with the Canons of the Church. It seems that these might be ways of offsetting the leakage in communicants which goes on year after year.

Judging from the attendance at the Missions which have been held in several Churches in the city, there appears to be a spiritual awakening of the Church, a hungering for the Good News. It is to be hoped, and prayed for, that this hunger will be greater and more generally filled in 1925.

**THE BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW,
MISSOURI DIOCESAN ASSEMBLY.**

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 31st, 1924.

Reverend Father in God, Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-sixth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Missouri Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, in its report to you last year, stated that there were eleven Senior Chapters in the Assembly. Since that time there has been a Chapter organized at St. Luke's, St. Louis, so that there are now twelve active Chapters of the Brotherhood (that is, Seniors), and there are some Junior Chapters in the Diocese, which are not affiliated with this Assembly.

The total membership of the various Chapters is approximately the same as last year, but we are informed that in some Chapters there are prospects for increasing the membership, which is encouraging, in view of the fact that the Brotherhood idea is not to strive for numbers of members, but to maintain an organization of active, working men, striving for "the spread of Christ's Kingdom among men".

One of the very important activities of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is the summer camp for boys, and this Assembly has been making an earnest effort to co-operate with the National Office in this movement. The camp in this Province is known as "Camp Tuttle", and this year it was located near Rogersville, Mo.; but a permanent site has been secured a few miles east of Springfield, Mo., and the National Office plans to erect buildings and make such other improvements as are necessary for the successful carrying on of the work. The recreation feature is a secondary consideration, and in choosing boys for this camp, the thought is to secure those who will, through proper training, develop into leaders among the boys of their Parish. While there are certain wholesome diversions included in the program, the religious training is what is emphasized. In view of the new and permanent location, it is hoped that the number of boys from this Diocese attending Camp Tuttle may soon be increased to the total number which we are permitted to send.

The Lenten noonday meetings of the Church, under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, at Christ Church Cathedral, were well attended this year, and we are planning for these meetings at the Cathedral again next year, and we have on the program of speakers for 1925 such men as the Bishop of Missouri, Bishop of Colorado, Bishop of Wyoming, Bishop of Marquette, Bishop of South Dakota, etc.

Officers of the Assembly for the year 1925 are: Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, D.D., Honorary President; Arthur J. Watling, National Council Member, representing this Diocese; Frederic J. Reece, President; Frank E. Murray, First Vice-President; Robert N. Nash, Second Vice-President; Charles J. Miller, Treasurer; William L. Henry, Secretary, and Rev. J. Boyd Cox, Chaplain.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri beg to submit their official acts for 1924:

January 3rd—Request for election of the Bishop Coadjutor, Diocese of Vermont, for that Diocese, by the Standing Committee, was approved and consent given.

Testimonial of the House of Bishops regarding election of Rev.

Edwin Makin Cross to be Bishop of the Missionary Diocese, Spokane, and of Rev. Charles Schrieber Reifsnider, L.H.D., to be Suffragan for the Rt. Rev. John McKim, Bishop of Tokio, unanimously carried, and the Presiding Bishop, Rt. Rev. A. C. Garret, Dallas, Texas, so advised.

January 17th—Testimonial of the House of Bishops regarding election of Rt. Rev. Manuel Ferrando to be Suffragan Bishop of Porto Rico, was presented, and the election unanimously approved, and the Presiding Bishop, Rt. Rev. A. C. Garrett, so advised.

February 4th—Organized for the year by election of Rev. J. Courtney Jones as President, Rev. J. S. Bunting as Vice-President, and Mr. C. C. Curtice as Secretary.

Testimonial of the election of Rt. Rev. Thomas James Garland, P.D., D.C.L., to be Bishop of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, was presented and unanimously approved.

March 13th—Application from the Diocese of Western New York for the election of Bishop Coadjutor for that Diocese was presented, and request granted.

The Certificate of Election of the Venerable John Chanler White to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Springfield was presented, and the petition granted.

May 21st—The appointment by Bishop Johnson of Rev. Frederick B. Bartlett to be a member of the body of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Missouri was approved.

June 11th—The credentials of the Diocese of Central New York for the ordination and consecration of Rev. Edward Huntington Coley, D.D., to be Suffragan Bishop of that Diocese was approved, and the consent of the Standing Committee sent to Rev. H. H. Gesner, S.T.D., Utica, New York.

Request to become a candidate for Holy Orders made by Mr. Vincent C. Frank was approved.

The Certificate of Election of Rt. Rev. David Lincoln Ferris, D.D., L.H.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Western New York, and of the Rev. Frank Alexander Tuhon, to be Bishop of the Diocese of Florida, were unanimously approved.

October 8th—The Rev. Mr. Jones and Rev. Mr. Bunting were appointed a committee to draw up suitable resolutions on the death of Mr. C. C. Curtice.

**Resolution of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri
on the Death of Mr. Charles C. Curtice.**

Whereas, On October 7th, 1924, our dear friend and co-worker, Mr. Charles C. Curtice, was called to his rest and his reward, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the following Memorial be spread upon the minutes of the Standing Committee:

In Memoriam Mr. Charles C. Curtice.

Charles C. Curtice was born in Big Springs, Virginia, in 1854. He spent his boyhood in his native State, and came into the Middle West while he was yet a young man, settling in Kenosha, Wisconsin, where he was confirmed. He passed his early business life in Illinois. At the time of his death, he had been living in St. Louis about thirty years. During all that time he was connected with St. James' Church and the Church of the Redeemer, serving as Vestryman and as Senior Warden.

His death, on October 7th, 1924, took from his associates on the Standing Committee a dear friend; from his family, a devoted husband and father; from the Pennsylvania Company, an able official, whose term of service extended over many years; and from the Church, one of her most stalwart sons and faithful workers.

He was elected a member of the Standing Committee, and was chosen as its Secretary, a position which he filled ably and faithfully until the day of his death. He thus became intimately acquainted with the great responsibilities and activities of the Church in this Diocese and elsewhere; and he gladly gave his time and thought to the solution of the difficult problems that frequently presented themselves. We shall sorely miss him from our number, as we meet from time to time.

There are certain qualities that stand out clearly defined in his character, which will always inspire and strengthen us as we think of him—his absolute fidelity; his great spiritual strength, calm and quiet and deep; not only the gentleness of his spirit, but also the strength of his gentleness; his entire dependability in all the relationships of life; his prompt and punctual attendance upon all the calls and duties that came to him in the life of the Church. He delighted in the worship of God, and was most faithful in his attendance on the services of the Church, always possessing a deep sense of their Divine meaning. He was a man of excellent wisdom in the counsels of the Church, and of fine judgment in practical affairs. Above all, there was revealed to him the spirit of the living Christ, Whom he served and knew. Into His great light he has now passed for his reward.

Resolved, further, That a copy of this Memorial be sent to Mr. Curtice's family, and also that it be published in The Church News.

January 17th—The Secretary reported consummation of the sale of property, Arlington and Thekia Sts. belonging to St. Luke's, Harney Heights, to Walter Kowlski and wife for \$1,600.00, from which amount was deducted past taxes, commissions, etc., \$284.31. The Treasurer is holding \$1,315.69 to their credit.

The Secretary presented memorandum of interest note on property of St. Luke's, Arlington and Lillian streets, due January 19th, for \$69.00, and was instructed to pay same, and to advise Rev. Thomas L. Small, in charge of this Mission, that there remains to the credit of St. Luke's \$1,246.69, which would be paid to him on call.

The Secretary reported acknowledgment from the Parish Clerk, St. Mary's, St. Louis, for receipt of check for \$454.00 of its fund, to be used in repairs of the Church and the payment of fire and tornado insurance.

March 13th—Request that the money in the hands of the Treasurer for the benefit of St. Mary's, St. Louis, be given to it for the purpose of erecting a Parish House, was granted, provided that in building the said Parish House St. Mary's Church should not go into debt for that purpose.

June 20th—The Secretary reported that the Cohn loan on St. Mary's Church had been paid; that St. Mary's had a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$2,262.56.

The Treasurer was instructed to turn over to St. Luke's the funds in his hands held for their benefit for the purpose of paying off deed of trust of \$2,300.00 on the lot at Arlington and Lillian Avenues.

June 27th—The request from the Rev. Thomas L. Small that the Trustees endorse application for a loan of \$5,000.00 on the property of St. Luke's Mission, St. Louis, to be made by the American Church Building Fund Commission, was approved.

September 16th—The action of the Secretary in paying St. Mary's Board \$125.00 of their fund on August 9th, to cover bill for repairs on the Parish House; also endorsement for payment to All Saints' Church check for \$27.75 by W. H. Markham Agency, to cover loss of March 12th, 1923, was approved.

Bill for granitoid sidewalk accruing against St. Luke's property on Lillian Avenue, in the sum of \$265.66, was presented and ordered paid by the Treasurer from the funds on hand, leaving that Mission a balance of \$1,002.11.

October 23rd—Request of Rev. R. N. Spencer, Secretary Parochial Trust Fund, Diocese of Western Missouri that the Trustees transfer to the Parochial Trust Fund of that Diocese Lots 13 and 14, Block 20, in St. Joseph, Missouri, now standing in the name of Parochial Trust Fund, Diocese of Missouri, was granted, and the President and Secretary authorized to execute and deliver a quit-claim deed for same.

Request from Rev. D. A. Coombs, Rector, and the Vestry of Louisiana, Missouri, asking permission to borrow \$700.00 on the Rector's residence to install new heating plant, was approved.

November 19th—Judge Davis Biggs was elected Secretary and Treasurer of the Parochial Trust Fund.

The President and Secretary were directed to execute deed of trust and note for \$700.00 on the Church property at Louisiana, Missouri, for a heating plant in the Rector's residence.

December 26th—Resolution was adopted authorizing the Trustees to execute a deed of trust on the property of St. John's Mission, to secure a loan in the sum of \$5,000.00 from the American Church Building Fund.

The Secretary was authorized to turn over draft for \$170.00 to Rev. W. H. Decker, Mexico, Missouri, Rector of Fulton, Missouri, Church, which sum represents claim under a tornado insurance policy for damages done to the church building at Fulton, Missouri.

APPENDIX NO. 12.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL MISSION TO CITY
INSTITUTIONS, JANUARY, 1925.

To the Bishop and Members of the 86th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

In making this report, you will bear in mind that I have endeavored to present certain facts and figures, although I did not take charge until the early part of November, 1924. I shall attempt to describe briefly the work we are doing in each of the City Institutions.

Hospital No. I.

Deaconess Brainerd makes this institution her headquarters, and does special work among mothers and babies. This includes caring for both married and unmarried mothers, investigations, securing of homes and employment, referring to special agencies, and follow up work whenever possible. The Deaconess visits in other departments of the hospital, and holds many services. Special attention is given to those who are poor and friendless. Through the generosity of many friends, we are able to distribute articles of clothing and certain necessities. The Deaconess also renders valuable service in writing letters and delivering messages to friends of the patients.

I might mention here that Deaconess Brainerd serves several institutions, and that many people, both officials and inmates, have spoken very kindly of her devotion and zeal. A service is held each Sunday in the chapel, and the Holy Communion is celebrated on the first Tuesday of each month. The Chaplain visits the hospital from time to time for such services as he is able to perform.

Number of Baptisms—2.

Hospital No. 2—Colored.

Miss Daisy M. Lorick visits in this Hospital regularly, and does an especially valuable work among the mothers and babies. I cannot speak too highly of the devotion shown by Miss Lorick in caring for all kinds of sick people in Hospital No. II. The Baptisms are due entirely to her faithful work.

Mr. George B. Jones, a Lay Reader, conducts services every Sunday. This is the eighth year in succession that Mr. Jones has performed this labor of love without any material remuneration. Four services are held by him every Sunday in the different wards. In addition to this, Mr. Jones offers private bedside prayers for those who desire them.

The Holy Communion is celebrated once a month, or as opportunity offers.

Number of Baptisms—40.

Hospital No. III—Workhouse.

This hospital is for delinquent girls. A weekly Bible Class is conducted by Deaconess Brainerd, followed by distribution of Bibles and literature. Personal interviews and spiritual help are given whenever possible.

City Workhouse.

The male prisoners are visited each week by Mr. Martin, and various services are rendered. Among the women, Deaconess Brainerd conducts a weekly Bible Class.

City Jail.

A service is held every Saturday afternoon, and with an exceptionally large congregation. We aim to give a simple Gospel message that can be understood and applied in daily life. The average congregation is always well over a hundred, and as attendance is purely voluntary, I consider this a tribute to our service.

The holding of services is only part of the work, however, Perhaps the most important part is the visit made each week by Deaconess Brainerd and the Rev. Henry H. Daniels. The Deaconess holds a Bible Class and works among the women. I give personal interviews to all who wish to see me, and in many cases pick out certain men who seem to make an appeal to me. This part of the work has been most encouraging, especially among the younger men and boys. Many there are among the imprisoned whose longing is not simply for release from jail, but rather for release from sin. As ought to be expected in a work like this, frequently there are those who cannot by any other means quiet their own consciences; and it is a blessed part of my ministry that there are those who come to me to open their griefs, that I may give them comfort and counsel, spiritual consolation and advice, quieting of conscience and removal of scruple and doubtfulness. Prayer Books, Bibles and literature are distributed each week.

House of Detention—Children.

Deaconess Brainerd holds a song service every Sunday, and gives inspirational talk to the children. The Rev. Henry H. Daniels has a service once a month, and visits once a week, performing duties similar to those in the jail.

City Sanitarium.

A service is held each Sunday morning, at which there is always a large and attentive congregation. Miss Pearce faithfully visits the inmates, and reports where the special attention of a clergyman is needed.

City Infirmary.

Well attended services are held every Sunday afternoon, and the Holy Communion is celebrated twice a month. Regular visits are made by Miss Cora Pearce, Miss Lorick, Mrs. O'Bannon, and the Rev. Phillips Brooks Warner.

Koch Hospital.

Work in this hospital is especially appealing, and calls for a large expenditure of sympathy. Once a month the Holy Communion is given to patients who are confined to bed. There are usually over fifty Communion made in this way. It is a great responsibility thus to feed these people with the Bread of Life, for the priest knows that many will have passed beyond before he returns again.

There is also a Celebration of the Holy Communion in the chapel once a month, and a service is held every Friday. Regular visits are made by Miss Pearce, Mr. Martin and the Rev. Henry H. Daniels. Patients frequently ask us to make special prayers for them. Many generous friends have made it possible for us to distribute articles of warm clothing and other comforts to those who would otherwise be unable to acquire them. The good work done by Miss Pearce calls for special commendation.

I feel sure that many lonely souls were cheered and blessed by our efforts. I wish to thank all individuals, Sunday Schools and other organizations who contributed in money and kind towards this blessed work.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the staff, who so faithfully labor day by day. I regret that the Rev. Phillips Brooks Warner feels compelled to sever his connection with us. He has done good work in the City Infirmary.

Mr. Martin also is leaving us at the end of the present month, and while we rejoice that he is returning to college to complete his studies, we feel that his going will leave a gap in the staff which will be hard to fill. Mr. Martin has been very faithful and a great help to me personally.

Our thanks are due, also, to all volunteer workers: Mrs. H. S. O'Bannon, Miss Williamson, Mr. George B. Jones, Miss Pauline Thompson, Mr. Allen D. Pomeroy, Miss Pauline Fite, Mr. G. Reese, Mrs. Holmes, Brotherhood men and others, who freely give of their time and talents **week by week**.

I am grateful, also, to the Bishop and the Rev. Francis Bloy, who have been unflinching in their sympathy, help and kind suggestion.

The members of the staff ask you for your prayers and hearty co-operation.

APPENDIX NO. 13.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON.

To the Bishop and the Members of the 86th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

In making my report of the work carried on during the past year, I wish it were within my power to impress upon you the great importance of it. I labor in that part of the Diocese which the Bishop spoke of in his address, in which he said that he wondered whether or not we ought to shepherd it or cast it adrift. In area, I suppose it is twice the size of the State of Massachusetts, and I am the only person who ministers in it. It is the field which challenges the Diocese. Places where I have been giving a service once a month now ask when they can look forward to more services, and perhaps a pastor who can devote his whole time.

Herculaneum, where Deaconess Sniffen is working out an excellent Social Service Program, shows decided improvement in contributions and added interest.

Bonne Terre, assisted by the gift of a young layman who is employed by the Lead Company, has put its property in excellent condition. Several new families have moved into the city, and have entered into the work with enthusiasm. The Church School has been reorganized, with a good increase in attendance. Several Greek families asked if they could send their children to our Sunday School while they were without a pastor, and are now among the most regular attendants.

Poplar Bluff has adopted the Budget System, and expects for the first time to meet all apportionments.

A new roof has been put on the church and the woodwork repainted, the work being done by the men of the congregation.

As a result of the increase in the student body of Lindenwood College, St. Charles, the Church attendance at Trinity Church has increased 300%. We find about forty young women registered who are affiliated with our Church.

The Woman's Guild has pledged itself to meet the expense incurred in putting a new roof on the Rectory, and the painting of it. There is the possibility that Trinity Church may in the future be another center of student work.

During the year I have ministered in the following: Grace, Jefferson City; Grace, Crystal City; Trinity, St. Charles; St. Augustine's; St. Paul's, Fredericktown; Trinity, De Soto; Grace, Herculaneum; Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff; St. Peter's, Bonne Terre; Portland; Macon; Moberly; St. Timothy's; St. Paul's, Overland.

Celebrated the Holy Communion 62 times—two in private; Morning and Evening Prayer, 35; officiated at 11 funerals, 1 marriage; baptized 21 infants, 3 adults; presented 16 for Confirmation; held 28 Lenten services; attended 4 Parish Meetings, 8 Vestry and committee meetings.
