



CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Tuesday, May 28, 1901.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the choir, entered the Cathedral singing the 404th hymn.

The opening sentences and service to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. E. A. Neville, of Holy Trinity Church, Thayer.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. H. Percy Silver, of St. John's Church, St. Louis.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. H. E. Bowers, LL. D., of Holy Innocents' Church, St. Louis.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. J. M. Northrop, of Emmanuel Church, Old Orchard.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Mission, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The Convention Sermon was then preached by Rev. Allen K. Smith, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

The Offertory sentences and notices were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dean of the Cathedral.

The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded, under orders of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-six Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," appointed at the last Convention; whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report, which was read by the Secretary, including the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention.

The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from seventeen Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President announced a quorum of both orders present and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., nominated Mr. John R. Triplett for re-election as Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

There being no other nomination, and unanimous consent being given, on motion of Mr. E. H. Lycett, the Rev. Dr. Ingraham was requested to cast the ballot for Mr. John R. Triplett for Secretary.

The Rev. Dr. Ingraham so cast the ballot.

The Secretary reappointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, as his assistant.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay the editor of the Church News the bill for publication of the sermon of Canon Smith.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Dennison the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Convention.

On motion of the Very Rev. C. M. Davis the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9 o'clock in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 o'clock a. m. to 1

o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 p. m. and continue to 5 p. m.

The hour for recess having arrived, the House took recess till 2:30 p.m.

The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 p.m.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented a supplemental report to the effect that St. Paul's Church, St. Louis, had paid its assessment in full and was entitled to Lay Representation in the Convention. The Secretary called the name of the Delegate from St. Paul's, and Mr. George G. Anderson answered to his name.

The Rev. Dr. Bowers, of Holy Innocents', Oak Hill, asked the consent of the House to add the number of persons confirmed on Sunday last to his number reported in his parochial report, as it makes his number 107 instead of 94, and would thereby give his parish one more delegate.

Rev. Mr. Brennan moved that the Convention grant such request.

After some discussion as to the propriety of such action, and at the request of the Rev. Dr. Bowers, the Rev. J. K. Brennan, by consent of the House, withdrew his motion.

The Rev. William Short, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented and read the following report:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred at the last Convention the resolution of the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, in regard to the term of holding office by the members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese, page 39, Journal of 1900, respectfully state that after considering the same and the changes in Canon IX, which would be necessary to make such a plan effective, beg leave to report that in their opinion the change would be inexpedient. The Committee ask to be discharged from further consideration of the resolution and of the amendment which it involved.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-SECOND CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

We have called out our "All Hail" to the Twentieth Christian Century, While we are calling activities throng and press immensely. Scientific discoveries, beneficent appliances, commercial expansions, material betterments—their annals so crowd as to astound. Running into them and running with them we cannot avoid, though at times the running puts us clean out of breath. We do not wish to avoid, for God sets us to live in the age where He appoints, and we are to take it as it is and do the best we can in it and for it. Only that best cannot be with God counted out. It were shamefully to belie the adjective of its name, for a Christian Century to put all its trust in material forces and material advances and material successes and comforts. Not but that these are God's blessings, but they are lower blessings. Friendship and honor and chivalry and loyalty and love and devotion and sacrifice are higher. And the highest are personal knowledge of God and personal obedience to God and personal communion with God.

The Church is set as a gardener in the very thick of the world's activities to see that the good seed of the higher and the holier has a fair chance, and is not choked back and killed out by the lusty thrift of the lower. The gardener, then, must needs be active and much alive; well trained and watchful.

In this aspect of the case, our Diocesan Conventions are not trivial things. We are set in this portion of the Lord's vineyard to watch and dig and nurse and prune and guide and help. The real force of growth in the garden is God's. But the methods and processes in directing and promoting the growth He leaves to us. They are ours. And we gather

together as now to scrutinize the processes. Have our experiments been wholesome? Could they have been bettered? Have we made mistakes? How, from now on, can we avoid further mistakes, and take up other improvements?

In considering such questions raised, facts and figures and reports come in to make answer. Not seldom we call them dry things. Well, generally seeds are dry things. But the warmth of earth and the refreshments of moisture make the dry things live amazingly quick. It is no strange thing for facts which seem dry to work life strenuous and abounding; and out of figures and reports may be evolved living growths and valued results.

The Apostle's Creed is for the most part a simple recital of facts. The being good and doing good of personal religion are outgrowths from it of life and result. It says not a word about being good or doing good. But, assuredly, the being good and doing good of personal religion are wrapped up in it, as growth and fruit are wrapped in a seed. A house is a fact, or a congeries of facts, as walls and windows and floors and rafters are facts. But, if it shelter a family and be a home, love grows in it and out of it, and the most precious fruits of earth's experience are gendered and perpetuated by it. Let there be no harboring, then, of disesteem of our Annual Conventions; nor let them be labeled dry things. They are necessary meetings for the honest accounting of duty discharged in the field of the practical work of the Church. They may be seeds and shelters of life and growth and fruit.

Four of my brother Bishops have died during the year.

Bishop Jackson had served as Coadjutor of Alabama for nine years. Disease clouded with incapacity the experience of the later portion of that service.

Within six weeks after his death his chief also died—Bishop Wilmer, in the 85th year of his age. The Diocese of Alabama has been sorely distressed, but at present, under the guidance of one of her own clergy raised to the Episcopate, she is emerging from the troubles and moving vigorously on. Bishop Wilmer was consecrated in Richmond in the spring of 1862, in the early period of our sad civil war. In the preceding October the Church in the Confederate States had completed an organization of its own, which lived just four years. Bishop Meade, of Virginia, Bishop Elliott, of Georgia, and Bishop Johns, assistant of Virginia, consecrated Bishop Wilmer. Eight days after the consecration Bishop Meade died. The General Convention of 1865, in Philadelphia, was held in a very critical time. But, under God's good Providence, the Church of the North and the Church of the South came together without angry recriminations or heart bitternesses, and the "Protestant Episcopal Church in the Confederate States of America" ceased to exist. The annals of the Diocese are not strikingly suggestive, and yet they are suggestive. The number of persons confirmed is 550, just one more than last year. The Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, has been consecrated in proclamation of its emancipation from debt. St. Peter's, St. Louis, has also freed itself of debt. The congregations of Ascension, St. Louis, and Trinity, De Soto, are inconveniently crowding themselves, and there is a loud cry for more room. St. Paul's, St. Louis, is on its feet and has called a Rector. Improvements in the church edifice and tower in Hannibal are reverent and beautiful. Mt. Calvary, St. Louis, has provided for its fabric a needed and useful new roof. Moberly has raised the church structure out of its low position and is preparing to put in a furnace. Thayer, hopeful and earnest, is busy in building a new church. Assessments and Missionary pledges, with extremely few exceptions, have been paid in full. For the year ending September 1, 1900, we gave to Domestic and Foreign Missions \$4,144.42, or \$1,111.95 more than in the year preceding. And only four Parishes were non-givers. We have established two new organized Missions, St. Paul's, Fredericktown, and Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff. The Dean of the Southern Convocation, Rev. Mr. Potter, of Kirkwood, has been the efficient agent in establishing these Missions. He looks after Sappington; he looks after Eureka; he looks after St. Paul Station; and if the Greek for Bishop, Episcopos, be almost in meaning a "looker after," we might venture to wonder if Mr. Potter is not to be called a sort of assistant Bishop, as he certainly is an assistant most helpful to his Bishop. Really, I must add, we have not a few of these "lookers after." Rev. Mr. Hatch, of Monroe, for Hunnewell; Rev. Mr. Brittain, of De Soto, for Crystal City; Rev. Mr. Weddell, of Rolla, for Sullivan; Rev. Mr. Davis, of Ferguson, for Florissant; Rev. Mr. Little, of Hannibal, for his South Side Chapel; Rev. Dr. Winchester and Rev. Mr. Brennan, of St. Louis, for their Advent and Epiphany Missions; and Rev. Mr. Duckworth, for Portland.

St. Luke's Hospital has taken a magnificent step forward. Its friends have given \$100,000. Nor are they stopping with that. A new lot westward, escaping the narrowness and noise of the present location, has been secured. The "Harriet M. Tuttle" Memorial Fund for St. Luke's Hospital now amounts to \$1,714.00, and is growing. It may well be understood that

this Fund is near my heart. It looks now as if in the end I may ask that this Fund be raised to \$5,000.00 for the endowment of a bed.

The Church Mission House for convalescent women, under the management of some wise and faithful ladies, with Mrs. Holmes as matron, does an untold amount of good at an expenditure of about \$150.00 per month.

The Orphans' Home, Bishop Robertson Hall and the Brotherhood of St. Andrew are as steady in their beneficent activities as is the shining of the sun. The *Church News* is yet folded in among lean kine. It has never had the chance, like Pharaoh's kine, to eat anything fat to see whether, like them, it would remain still lean. It pays out more than it takes in. In the depths of its own subjectivity it counts it wondrous strange that people do not more cry out for it and pay down for it. But it has too much pluck to whimper. And it has no slightest thought of giving up.

The "Bishop's Purse" has received \$2,978.56, a sum greater than that of last year. Without claiming to have secured any official license to practice, it calls itself the best sort of application, wonderfully emollient, for distressing casualties and harrowing needs.

The Woman's Auxiliary, blessings be upon it, has raised and distributed \$4,988.80, of which \$3,717.57 were gifts in downright money. I am proudly hoping that this autumn, in San Francisco, it will stand well and generously high among the Branches in the amount it brings for the United Offering. I heartily wish all the women all through the Diocese would claim their part in giving for this United Offering.

The Sunday Schools of the Diocese have responded again nobly in their Lenten offerings for General Missions. They gave \$1,569.81, which is a sum \$116.06 more than that of last year. Only one, and that one, indeed, not actually living, but in a state of suspended animation, failed to give. I heartily rejoice, though a quiver of anguish interjects itself into the joy, if I discover that the Rector and people of a Parish have left all to the children, and neither at Advent nor Epiphany have themselves given a penny for Domestic and Foreign Missions.

The "Missionary Host" children will have their day of parade and inspection as usual next Sunday afternoon. Come and see them. Last year the street car troubles prevented their assembling. They know not, as I know well, the great good they do by the steady dropping of their gifts into the "Host" Treasury all through the year.

In the last Epiphany season a communication was sent to me from the Bishops of Albany, New York and Washington, on behalf of the Board of Managers of our General Missions, requesting me "to appoint a Missionary Committee who shall keep in touch with the Board of Managers, and

shall work for the dissemination of Missionary intelligence and the arousing of Missionary interest, in all possible ways, to the end that every member of the Church become a regular contributor to the work of this Board."

I was unwilling to appoint a committee merely pro forma. But I hope it is well understood that it would gladden my heart to have a warm and working Committee in this Diocese who would co-operate with the Board of Managers. It is a strong conviction with me that it should be the aim throughout our entire American Church to secure from every member thereof his or her intelligent interest in the great Foreign and Domestic Missionary work, his sympathy with it, and his individual gift for it at least once a year. I want to work towards this aim as long as I live. I shall esteem it a comfort and a help if a Committee appointed in this Convention may take into consideration the communication sent to me and advise me how best I can comply with the wishes expressed therein.

I ask attention to the fact that, besides our Diocesan Fund for Aged and Infirm Clergymen, we have a "General Clergy Relief Fund," with active headquarters in Philadelphia. The General Convention has requested that every Parish in America should on Quinquagesima Sunday, or some Sunday near thereto, make an offering every year for this Fund. I hope we will loyally comply with the request. Our Christmas offerings for our Diocesan Fund are generously good. But the General Fund helps in Dioceses that cannot make up much or any of a Diocesan Fund. And we want, I am sure, to help in such good work. Besides, in one or two or more instances in our own Diocese the General Fund is now helping our needs. I ask that there may be inserted in our Journal notice of the name, object, and agent of this Fund.

May I call attention, also, to the fact that this is the Bicentenary year of the existence of the "Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts" of our Mother Church of England? The Venerable Society was chartered June 16, 1701. Practically, it is to it that the Preface to our American Prayer Book refers in recording gratitude for "a long continuance of nursing care and protection." I shall be pleased, if it seem good to the Convention, if a Committee can be appointed to present for adoption the expression to the Venerable Society, on the part of the Bishop and Diocese, of our grateful remembrance and heartfelt appreciation of all it has been to us and done for us of the American Church.

Any thinking Churchman can foresee that the approaching General Convention in San Francisco in October, is to be a very important meeting of that body. I hope care will be taken that Missouri may have a full list of Deputies in attendance there. The cost of that attendance will be

But s Clergy The o tering Praye dictat greater than usual. I suggest to the Convention the consideration of the question whether, in this instance, \$100.00, rather than \$75.00, ought not to be appropriated for meeting the expenses of each Deputy.

I want to put on record my thanks for the action of the Convention of last year in releasing the Treasury of the Board of Managers of General Missions from any claim of ours. We took upon ourselves to raise \$1.000.00 more for Diocesan Missions; and we raised it and have paid it. I am proud and glad and grateful. Last year the pledges were \$4,609.25. This year we need, to keep our Diocesan Missionary work well in hand and healthful, the sum of \$5,195.00. I bespeak from Parishes and individuals thoughtful generosity in pledging. This sum, supplemented by \$1,000.00 kindly given by the Woman's Auxiliary, includes the provision for St. Stephen's Mission. But it does not include anything allowed for the Hospital Missions. These are under a Special Committee, heretofore consisting of Rev. Messrs. Duckworth and C. M. Davis, and Mr. Freeborn. This Committee has secured, in the past year, special pledges and gifts for the Hospital Missions to the amount of \$1,300.00 or more; and they really need \$1,600.00 per year.

St. Stephen's is to lose its pastor, Rev. Mr. Tuckerman. He retires after ten years of most faithful, self-sacrificing and successful service. I am warmly grateful for his laying of the sound foundation on which the practical work of the Mission rests. And I am sorry to lose him from my side. Rev. Henry W. Mizner has been chosen and appointed to take up the work which Mr. Tuckerman lays down.

The Hospital Missions I cannot speak of too highly. They are Christlike. Nor too gratefully of the brother who has them in active charge, Rev. Mr. Cornell. My heart goes out to him in love; a love that takes on wonderment at his cheerfulness and admiration for his efficiency. It is delightful to me that the men and women of St. Louis and the suburbs so willingly stand by his work and its expenses.

The Missionary spirit in interest and sympathy and generosity grows. It grows deeper and higher and wider. Nothing earthly makes me happier than that. I count somewhat of the improvement due to the deputations of Clergymen and Laymen visiting the different Parishes and making addresses in behalf of Missions. I feel warmly grateful for this good work done and to the men who did it.

General meeting full list will be latter. The care of the fabric and grounds of the church; the provision and distribution of the revenues of the church, save only in the case of the Communion Alms. And we of the Clergy, if not clean bereft of mother wit and American wisdom, will take great care how we attempt to dictate or interfere in these things. But to change the defining lines into dividing lines is all wrong.

There is a priesthood of the Laity. "A royal priesthood" and a "holy nation." They are consecrated to God in baptism and confirmation; in loyal service and holy obedience and self-sacrificing devotion. Official spiritualities they will not tamper with. But other spiritualities, interest in spiritual life and help to spiritual growth and companionship in spiritual brotherhood, let them enter into with heart and soul. Let the Layman, therefore, speak to that young man about his soul; and teach that class of learners about the Bible and the Church; and help that family to be a Christian home; and preach to that worshiping congregation about Missions, which is the very Gospel of unselfishness unto salvation.

And there is a businesshood of the Clergy. The official temporalities they will not take upon themselves to direct by dictation. But they will suggest and advise and persuade and try to convince, in the conduct of the business affairs of the Parish, though keeping themselves so well in hand as to submit, if the decision made by those who have a right to make it goes against them.

So Laymen may work spiritualities and Clergymen work practicalities in utmost harmony, and to great good resultant in a Parish or Diocese, It may be well seen how pleased and grateful I am that Laymen are willing to go about and speak and preach for Missions.

I observe that lately the Church Club of New York took up the matter of sending a Bishop to the Philippine Islands. It was the lay element of the Club which moved. It was the lay element which spoke. It is the lay element which is acting. That Club registers its decision that it means to try to keep a defining line from becoming a dividing line.

In two preceding Conventions the question of the provision of an Archdeacon or General Missionary for the Diocese has been considered. The feeling has been in favor and is, I think, in favor of procuring such a helper in caring for the Missionary work of the Diocese. There is dissatisfaction that the Church does not extend itself more rapidly and more vigorously into the unoccupied parts of the City of St. Louis and the country regions. It is thought that the presence and work of an Archdeacon might tend greatly to mend the fault. My experience in the early days of my life in Missouri strongly prejudices me in favor of the procuring of such a helpful agent. The Rev. Mr. Davis and, afterwards, the Rev. Mr. Miller were, it will be remembered, General Missionaries or, if you please, Archdeacons. There are difficulties in the way, however. Passes

And if one sets out to pick such an one for the service, a sum of \$2,500.00 per year is called for to give point to the angling. The main practical difficulty, I apprehend, rests just there. Whence can the \$2,500.00 be had? The \$5,195.00 are needed for our present Diocesan work. The \$1,600.00 additional are needed for our Hospital Missions. Is it reasonable to hope that over and above these needs our Parishes and

When the account of the Treasurer of the Diocese was audited there was due from Parishes and Missions \$2,271.34. Of this amount \$1,148.84 has since been received. To meet all liabilities June 1st will require \$3,325, and the Treasury has \$3,625.06, leaving a small balance on hand. We note with pleasure that the assessment made last year has been paid up in full, or nearly so. The necessity for the increase of the Permanent Fund still exists. Some progress has been made in this direction, and we hope substantial results will be reported in the near future. We estimate the needs of the Diocese for the coming year to be \$5,800, and would offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Assessments be directed to make an equitable assessment on the several Parishes and Missions for the sum of \$5,800.

Report of Committee on State of the Chungh.

Your Committee on State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

It is with pleasure your Committee reports that there has been a great improvement, both in the spiritual life of the Diocese and its missionary work. The number of confirmations are about the same as last year.

We notice first that there has been a marked increase in the amount offered by the churches for Diocesan Missions, and for the first time in its history the Diocese has carried its own burden.

The amount contributed to the Bishop's Purse has been largely increased over that of last year, while the Woman's Auxiliary has had a most successful year in carrying on their work.

But it is in the increased missionary work done that your committee finds the greatest reason for thankfulness. From reports laid before this Committee we learn that the energetic Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, has three Mission stations in connection with his Parish, viz., Eureka, St. Paul's, and Sappington. 'At each of these monthly and sometimes more frequent services have been held.

In Southeastern Missouri the Dean of that convocation reports as follows:

"The Mission points in this field are progressing well. Holy Cross, Mission at Poplar Bluff, has been organized and now has 35 communicants. They have raised \$500 and house rent, making at least \$600, toward the support of a pastor. One has been called, but his decision has not been made known. Seven persons have been confirmed during the year by the Bishop. I never saw a new work where quicker or more encouraging response was made. St. Paul's, Fredericktown, has been organized. They have twelve communicants, seven having been confirmed at the last visitation of the Bishop. They pay \$100 a year for a week-day monthly visit of the Missionary."

Other Missionary work has been carried on by Rev. E. P. Little in South Side Chapel, at Hannibal. Dean Hatch visits Hunnewell frequently.

Jackson has a church lot, but no church or minister, but they keep up a Sunday School, which sent the Bishop \$8.25 Lenten offering for Missions.

The services at Affton have been revived and promises some confirmations.

Rev. P. G. Davidson has been doing good work in Moberly. Rev. A. Brittain has done work in Crystal City. Rev. C. F. Collins has largely increased his Sunday School at Shrewsbury. Rev. E. Duckworth, at great sacrifice of time and labor, has done most excellent work at Port-

ON, ittee. land. St. Philip's, St. Louis, is filled with new life and only needs a new building to increase largely its work. Advent Mission, a new work of the Church of the Ascension, gives promise of future growth and usefulness, and Epiphany pursues the even tenor of its way.

St. Peter's Church, amid the ruins of its beautiful church, raised the debt which so heavily pressed upon it, and starts again with a beautiful building free from all incumbrances. St. Paul's, Carondelet, has put on new life and has called a rector. Other Parishes of the Diocese report a healthy spiritual life, giving the promise of future growth.

The Hospital Missions under Rev. F. W. Cornell and his able assistants, continues its blessed and beneficent work, carrying light, love, and helpfulness to the thousands to which this work ministers.

These are signs of life we see in the work of the Diocese, and we thank God and those who have done the work, for the encouragement they give us, but it would be foolish for us to close our eyes to the many towns where we are assured an open door awaits us. We are still a Diocese of many, many churchless counties. Of some of these, the Rural Dean of Southeastern Missouri truly says: "There are dozens of towns in Southeastern Missouri alone where there are church people who hunger for the ministrations of the church. Towns ranging in population from 1,200 to 5,000, according to actual statistics, I have found them ready to respond financially towards procuring the services of the church. The field is really ripe for the harvest."

What is true of Southeastern Missouri is true also of other parts of the State, and the demand is now imperative for one or more Diocesan missionaries. Your Committee last year called attention to this great need. God has opened a wide door for the church in this Diocese. Have we the courage and the faith to enter and possess this goodly land?

Your Committee most earnestly and urgently recommend to this Convention to take immediate action in securing a general missionary or archdeacon to be put into the field at once. Shall the people who are calling for the church be any longer put off? They ask for bread—the bread of life. Shall we give them a stone? Let us have the courage and the faith to trust, that the devotion and loyalty and generosity of the church people of the Diocese will supply the means for the missionary's support. Recent experiences teach us that the people themselves are willing to do their utmost toward maintaining the services of the church. The generous response of the good people at Poplar Bluffs in raising \$600 is an illustration to us of the ability and desire of the people to help the Diocese supply them with the ministration of a clergyman.

Your Committee therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Convention endeavor to raise the salary for a General Missionary Archdeacon, and authorize the Missionary Board, on the nomination of the Bishop, to secure the most efficient and available man for this work, just as soon as a sufficient sum has been pledged to guarantee his support.

Respecting the resignation of Rev. Gustavus Tuckerman as Missionary at St. Stephen's, St. Louis, after ten years of faithful service under the direction of the Board, the Board desires to express its appreciation of the ability, devotion, zeal and discretion with which he has manfully done his work through all these years of struggle, and its regret that it has to part with this faithful fellow-laborer.

It was with grief the Board was called upon to chronicle the death of one of its earnest and zealous Missionaries. On the 12th of August, at St. Luke's Hospital in St. Louis, the Rev. George W. Cobb received the summons and ceased his work on earth in his Master's vineyard.

Report of Segnetary of Moman's Auxiliany.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri:

The Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary makes this year its twentieth annual report.

There is a slight increase in the general work, though in actual figures the sum is less, owing to the omission of some of our local work. The Bishop has decided that hereafter we shall report whatever comes under the direction of the Diocesan Board of Missions, so that in the future the City Hospital Missions will be reported.

For work outside the Diocese we have contributed to Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, and North Dakota each \$100. For Mission work in Chicago, in gratitude for our Quiet Day given by its Bishop-coadjutor, \$100. Two hundred and forty dollars was contributed in money, besides many valuable boxes, to the sufferers at Galveston; \$125 was sent to the Board of Missions and our \$50 pledge continued at Birch Coolie, and \$346.54 given toward the United Offering. These, with several smaller gifts, make an aggregate of \$1,477.54.

The Boxes sent outside the Diocese amounted to \$980.88, making the total outside Diocese \$2,458.42.

Within our own borders, as helpers to our Bishop, we have given: \$1,000 for St. Stephen's Mission, \$100 for the rectory at Rolla, \$100 for Cape Girardeau, \$200 for the Bishop Robertson Scholarship, \$200 from the Mite Boxes for the Auxiliary Scholarship, the Diocesan Missionary pledge, \$125. These are our largest gifts, but many other objects have received smaller sums.

We earnestly bespeak for the Auxiliary a more intelligent interest in the work, which can only be gained by a larger attendance at our meetings. \$3,229-32

APPENDIX No. 12 A.

Report of the Committee in Charge of Yospital Missions.

To the Board of Missions, Diocese of Missouri—Gentlemen:

Your Committee, appointed to care for the Hospital Missions, beg leave to report that the work has gone steadily on for the past year. In addition to the paid Missionaries, the Rev. F. W. Cornell and Mrs. C. W. Holmes, there are some forty-five regular members of the Missions who assist in the Sunday services and visiting.

Regular services are held in the Insane Asylum, the Female Hospital, and the Poor House, conducted by Mr. Cornell. Two services are held in the City Hospital, conducted by clergy who volunteer for that duty. The report of the Missionary will make mention of the ministrations and of the help given in a material way.

We cannot commend too highly the whole staff of Mission Workers for their faithfulness at all times. The workers meet at regular intervals to hear reports from their several committees and to consider the needs and opportunities. A corporate communion is attended by all on the third Sunday of each month, and a prayer card has been arranged for the daily use of the members. The work of ministry to the sick and the poor is, we know, near to the heart of Christ, and those who would do this work must keep near to Him in their devotional life.

The support given the work by our several congregations has been encouraging and hearty, and we bespeak an increasing interest. One thousand six hundred dollars will be needed for the coming year.

A beneficent work, which has grown out of the Missions, is the Church Mission House for convalescent women. There is need of a similar house for men, and we commend this need to the thoughts and prayers of the men of the Diocese. Owing to the crowded condition of our city institutions many are obliged to leave before they are able to work, and such a home for convalescents would save many a self-respecting man from becoming a pauper. Thanking you for the privilege of having some part in this blessed work, we are faithfully yours.

Report of Chaplain St. Tuke's Yospital.

During the year ending April 30, 1901, there have been held at St. Luke's Hospital, 153 services; the Holy Communion has been administered 7 times; the Burial Service has been said 4 times; 38 addresses have been made, and numerous visits to the patients in the rooms and wards.

563 Cases have been treated. Of these, 433 have been pay patients, and 130 beneficiaries.

The number of days of paid treatment was	.0,132
The number of days of free treatment was	3,116
Total1	3,248

This means that 563 patients were in the hospital a total of 13,248 days, or an average of over $23\frac{1}{2}$ days each.

Of the above patients there were of our own Communion 116, Roman Catholic 68, Presbyterian 45, Methodist 58, Baptist 20, Lutheran 35, Christian 21, Congregational 4, Unitarian 2, Evangelical 9, Hebrew 20, no professed faith 164.

APPENDIX No. 16.

Report of Committee on Legal and Uniform Method of Cousteeships.

To the Diocesan Convention:

Your Committee, appointed to recommend some uniform legal method of trusteeship, etc., for receiving and holding real and personal property in trust for the Diocese or Parishes thereof, beg leave to report as follows:

Under the present Constitution of Missouri no religious corporation can be established in this State except for the purpose only of holding the title to real estate used for church edifices, parsonages, and cemeteries. No religious corporation created since the adoption of this Constitution can, therefore, hold title to any personal property or to any real property not used for one of the purposes named. Neither can any such property be held in trust for a religious corporation; to allow such a trust would be to permit an evasion of the Constitution. There is, however, nothing in our Constitution or laws to prevent the holding of any property in trust for a congregation, as distinguished from that corporation known as the Rector, Wardens, and Vestrymen, which manages the temporal affairs of the congregation. Our Supreme Court has clearly recognized the distinction between the congregation and the managing corporation. The same principles apply to the Diocese.

We, therefore, recommend that there be created in each Parish in the diocese a Board of Trustees who shall hold in trust for the congregation composing that Parish the title to all property which the corSt.

In order to avoid unnecessary duplication of officials, we recommend that the persons who from time to time constitute the vestry of each parish shall also constitute a Board of Trustees for the Parish; and that the persons who from time to time constitute the Standing Committee of the Diocese shall also constitute a Board of Trustees for the Diocese; these boards to hold all the personal property and all the real property not used for church edifices, parsonages or cemeteries which may be given, granted, bequeathed or devised to the several congregations or to the diocese. These recommendations are made to the final decision of the Convention as to the necessity or advisability of adopting any general plan in relation to this matter. If it is determined that there should be some general plan, then we recommend that a canon or canons be prepared and submitted to the Convention embodying the suggestions of this report.

APPENDIX No. 19 A.

Report of the Sequetary of the Orphans' Home.

To the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese and other Members of the Orphans' Home Association:

Your Board begs leave to present the following report:

We should be and are, we trust, truly thankful for the many blessings of the first ten months of our fifty-eighth year. Week after week of busy, happy days these months ran along. When unusual things did happen they were sure to be pleasant things, and we began to think we should round out a year of uneventful contentment. The remembrance of these blessings helps to patient thought in the midst of the sorrow and cares that have lately come to us, and make us see more clearly the many ways in which we have been helped and blessed even in our troubles.

With deep sorrow we report the death of our dear Matron at St. Luke's Hospital, where she was taken on the 14th of February, having fallen and broken her right hip. After a month of extreme suffering, borne most patiently, she was called Home suddenly on the afternoon of March 20th. Mrs. Bronson had been with us since October, 1899. coming from the Deaconess' Training School, Philadelphia. She has been an example of faithfulness to every one that knew her, and an inspiration to those who knew her well and loved her. She was a woman of wonderful sweetness of character, and consecrated, indeed, to the work she had undertaken, in its very highest form. The real things to her were the things of the spirit, and her "daily conversation was in Heaven." She felt deeply her responsibility to the children of the Home, and spoke often of her most earnest longing to put some lasting thought for good into each little heart during the months it might be in her care. The children loved her dearly, as did all who lived with her, for they only could know how absolutely unselfish and unvarying kind she really was. Her last earthly thought was for an employe of the Home, who also was ill in a hospital, and, like herself, away from old friends and kindred. The office for the dead was read in the Cathedral, March 22, by the Bishop, assisted by the Chaplain of the Home and the Dean; later her body was laid to rest at her old home, in Ohio, with those whom she "had loved long since and lost awhile."

When Mrs. Bronson went to the hospital, her work was taken up by Miss Anna A. Jones, the teacher of the Home school, who had come to us less than a year ago from Mississippi. She has proven a most able substitute and done her very hard work well. Too much cannot be said in praise of her faithful discharge of the numberless unaccustomed duties, and the capable way in which things generally have been managed. To add to our perplexities, a number of our children developed

illnesses more or less serious, and the infirmary has been in use almost constantly for the last two months. We count it a blessing to have had Miss Jones with us through these trying times.

Both the school and kindergarten had a good year. The school at present is under the care of Miss Hawkins, who has taught it most acceptably for the last two months. The classes in cooking and sewing have done so well that we feel justified in keeping them up, even at an additional expense.

At Thanksgiving and Christmas the children had a number of pleasures, and through the summer their friends gave them afternoons in the country and treats at home. They were invited this year, on the evening of Holy Innocents' Day, by the Sunday School of the Church of the Holy Communion, and entertained in a most delightful manner. We have again to thank Miss Hawthorne and Mr. Fetherstonh for their kindness to our children, and their great steadfastness in the work of the Home Sunday School. Their untiring interest is greatly appreciated. The bright, sunny day nursery and kindergarten room is not building yet, but we are hopeful and believe it will come some day.

The fund has increased a little since last year—to it has been added a legacy of \$1,000, left the Home by Mrs. Lamareaux, and one of \$250.00, given us by Mr. Leonhard Roos. The fines for non-attendance of members are now also given to this fund, and \$30.00 was raised and given us by two little girls belonging to Ascension Parish, St. Louis. We are very thankful, indeed, the fund grows. We wish it grew faster.

The Home received during the year a legacy of \$2,000.00 from Mrs. C. D. Wainwright, which was added to the Permanent Endowment Fund, as directed.

We ask that our subscribers continue their interest and help us with their money to do more and better work each year.

We wish to thank Dr. Green and Dr. Fayette Ewing for their unfailing kindness to our children, and express our sincerest gratitude to Dr. Saunders, Dr. Zaforsky, and Dr. Johnson, who are untiring in their goodness to the Home.

The board wishes also to thank the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, our chaplain, and the gentlemen of the Advisory Committee.

There have been twelve baptisms and nine confirmations at the Home since Easter, 1900.

We have received into the Home during the year 33 children—39 have been restored to friends, 9 indentured, and 1 sent to the House of Refuge.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionany Society.

ARTICLE I-NAME.

Section 1. The name of the Society shall be the "Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

Section 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

Section 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

Section 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

Rules of Order.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - On Constitution and Canons. II.
 - III. On Unfinished Business.
 - On Finance. IV.
 - On Assessments.

 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education. On Sunday School Work. VIII.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
 - On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nayes.
- 11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had

previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

On December 16th pledges were taken from the congregation for the church debt, amounting to about \$35,000. Nearly \$25,000 of this amount has been collected and paid on the mortgage. Besides this, the Ladies' Guild owed about \$2,700 on the organ. One thousand of this amount has been paid during the year, and the balance is nearly all in hand. Fifteen thousand dollars, paid on account of repairs, was received from the fire insurance companies. During four months the services were very much interfered with, while the church was undergoing repairs, and the work of the Parish was seriously interrupted.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

Sec. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
