Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Unfinished Business.

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- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of

their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, Wednesday, January 28, 1931.

The Ninety-second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri met in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, Saint Louis, at 8 p.m., on Wednesday, January 28, 1931, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-three who were entitled to vote, twenty-four were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 17.)

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty-six Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from seventeen were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Secretary presented the following application for change of name of the Church of St. Philip the Apostle, to the Church of the Holy Apostles:

January 24, 1931.

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To the Ninety-second Convention,

Diocese of Missouri.

Gentlemen:

Under the provisions of Canon XI of the Diocese of Missouri, the Minister, Wardens and Vestry of the Church of St. Philip the Apostle respectfully apply for the name of said parish to be changed to the Church of the Holy Apostles.

The causes leading to this request are embodied in a merger agreement whereby this parish has associated itself with the former missions of St. Luke and St. Timothy of the city of St. Louis.

The Articles of Association of said parish have already been amended according to the provisions of the Canons of the Diocese and the laws of the State of Missouri, and the favorable action of this Convention will consummate the transaction.

That old Item 6 concerning resolutions pertaining to the Bishop's Address be changed to read, "Introduction of Resolutions pertaining to the Bishop's and Bishop Coadjutor's Addresses," and be renumbered 15, and that all other Items be retained in their present order and be numbered in accordance with this rearrangement.

Resolution No. 2.

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RESOLVED, That Section 1, of Canon 19, be amended by adding at the end of said section the following words:

Fifth. For the support of the Episcopal Home for Children, which shall be made on the first Sunday in June.

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That Canon 27 be repealed, and that a new Canon, to be known as Canon 27, be adopted in lieu thereof, as follows:

Canon 27

Of Alterations and Amendments.

Section 1. No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall be considered by the Convention unless such proposed alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by the Committee on Constitution and Canons, or unless such reference shall have been dispensed with by unanimous consent.

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That the following Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 10a:

CANON 10a.

Of Changing a Parish into a Mission.

Sec. 1. Any Parish desiring to become a Mission may do so by a vote of two-thirds of the members of its vestry, at a special meeting thereof, called upon due notice for such purpose, with the approval and upon such terms and conditions as shall be required by the Bishop and the Diocesan Council.

Sec. 2. When any Parish shall fail to file its annual report to the Diocesan Convention, or shall fail to pay its annual Diocesan Assessment under the provisions of Canon 18 within the year in which such payments become due, or shall remain for a period of more than twelve months without a rector, or shall fail to annually elect a vestry as provided in the Diocesan Canons, or shall become financially unable to pay current expenses, the Bishop may, with the consent and approval of the Council, declare such Parish to have the status of a Mission, and thereafter such Parish shall be deemed a Mission and shall thereupon become subject to the jurisdiction of the Bishop and Diocesan Council and shall thereafter be conducted as a Mission in all respects.

Sec. 3. In the event any Parish shall be declared a Mission pursuant to the provisions of Section 2 of this Canon, it shall be the duty of the vestry of such Parish to forthwith convey all its right, title and interest in any and all real estate held by such Parish to the Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese of Missouri, which shall thereafter hold such property subject to such uses and disposition thereof as may be determined by the Bishop and Diocesan Council.

Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That Canon 9, Section 2, be amended as follows—After the words "elected by the Convention" insert the following. Provided, that no clergyman or Layman receiving a stipend from the Council shall be eligible to membership on the Council.

The foregoing Resolutions were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

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The Rev. Dr. Jones resigned from the Nominating Committee, and the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt was elected to take his place.

The Rev. Mr. Hohenschild was elected Chairman of the Nominating Committee.

It was ordered that a rising vote of appreciation be given to the Committee of Ladies who provided the Opening Dinner for the Diocesan Convention.

It was ordered that the delegates from the Church of the Holy Apostles be given seats and votes in the Convention.

It was ordered that the delegates from Grace Church, St. Louis, be given seats and votes in the Convention.

On the suggestion of Mr. Mack, for the Department of Finance of the Diocesan Council, written pledges for the Church Program were called for from the Parishes who had not yet made their pledges. The pledges received were filed with the Department of Finance.

Mr. Mack, for the Department of Finance, introduced the first resolution recommended in the Report of the Diocesan Council, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 6:

RESOLVED, That the schedule of assessments for the General Expense Fund of the Diocese, contained in the attached report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$24,000.00, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with additional special funds received therefor, be appropriated to pay the General Expense Budget of the Diocese, for the year 1931.

Mr. Mack, for the Department of Finance, introduced the second Resolution in the Report of the Diocesan Council, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 7:

RESOLVED, That the schedule of apportionments for the Church Program Fund, contained in the attached report of the F nance Department, amounting to \$72,000.00 for the year 1931, be adopted; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$36,000.00 be appropriated from the proceeds thereof, to pay on the quota of the National Council, and a like amount for the Church Program within this Diocese, as itemized in the Church Program Budget attached: Provided, that if the proceeds from such apportionments are less than the full amounts so appropriated, the Diocesan Council shall make adjustments to conform thereto, including amounts owing on account of prior apportionments.

It was ordered that a Committee of three be appointed to present nominations for the office of Treasurer of the Diocese, and that nominations for said office be withdrawn from the province of the Nominating Committee.

Under the foregoing order, the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

Mr.H.E.Mack, Mr.C.H.Middleton, and Mr.James M.Bull.

It was ordered that Mr. Middleton be requested to send a message of sympathy and encouragement to the Rev. Dr. Wilkins, who is ill in St. Luke's Hospital.

It was ordered that nominations be received for Deputies to the General Convention.

It was ordered that a trial vote be taken for Deputies to the General Convention; that each elector vote for no more than ten clerical and ten lay candidates; that the ten clerical and ten lay candidates receiving the highest vote be accepted as the nominees of the Convention; and that the names of the other candidates be stricken from the list.

The election of the Deputies to the General Convention was made the first Order of Business Thursday morning, after the Bishops' addresses.

The Convention adjourned to meet immediately after the opening service Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Thursday, January 29, 1931.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, and the Rev. David R. Haupt, at 9 a.m.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled for business session of the Convention in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous day, which were approved with an addition, which was inserted in the text.

The Bishop read his annual address to the Convention. (Appendix 1.)

The Bishop Coadjutor read his address to the Convention. (Appendix 2.)

Mr. George M. Block introduced Resolution No. 8, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That the nominations for deputies, lay and clerical, to the Triennial Convention be closed; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, That at the end of the second ballot the names of the two clerical candidates and the names of the two lay candidates who shall not have been elected on said ballot as a deputy, who have the lowest aggregate votes, be dropped from the list of candidates and be not thereafter included in the persons balloted for; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, That at the end of each successive ballot a like action shall be taken on the names of the two clerical and two lay candidates who shall not have been elected on said ballot but have received the lowest aggregate vote.

It was ordered that the delegates from St. Paul's Church, Overland, be given seats and votes in the Convention.

The ballots of the Convention for four clerical and four lay deputies to the General Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers. Mr. Mack, for the Special Committee apopinted to nominate a Treasurer, presented the name of Mr. C. D. Blake, who was unanimously elected Treasurer of the Diocese.

Mr. Hohenschild, Chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the following report:

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the above named candidates, and the Bishop declared them elected.

Mrs. Shepley, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, made a report.

Mrs. Messick, President of the Episcopal Home for Children, made a report.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor addressed the Convention in relation to the Thomas Dunn Boys Hotel.

The Secretary was instructed to send a letter of appreciation to Mr. Dunn.

The Rev. Dr. Davis led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers. The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., the Rev. F. J. F. Bloy, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. R. L. Orcutt, and Mr. George M. Block, elected deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for two clerical and one lay deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley elected a deputy to the General Convention.

The votes of the Convention were cast for two clerical deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared no election.

The Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. John S. Bunting and the Rev. D. R. Clarke, as deputies to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Allen Evans, Jr., of the National Council, addressed the Convention.

Canon Rudd, of the Washington Cathedral, addressed the Convention.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., the Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild, the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, and the Rev. L. H. Nugent, as alternate deputies to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Dr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended that the Convention adopt Resolution No. 2 relating to the amendment to Section 1, of Canon 19, which was adopted by the unanimous vote of the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of Resolution No. 3, relating to Canon 27, which was not adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of Resolution No. 4, relating to the proposed new Canon 10a, as amend-

ed by the Committee, by striking out the word, "six" in the fifth line of the second section and inserting in lieu thereof the word, "twelve." It was ordered that Resolution No. 4 be referred back to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, with the request to consider and report at the next Convention.

Bishop's Address to the Ninety-second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Dear Brethren:

We meet for the Ninety-second Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri. We hope that close attention to business may enable us to conclude the work of the Convention today.

The event of primary importance in the Diocese in 1930 was the election of a Bishop Coadjutor at the Annual Convention last January. When the moment arrived to announce that nominations were in order, it was clear that the electors knew what they would like to do. And when the votes were counted, Dean William Scarlett was found to have been elected on the first ballot, with 22 out of 30 votes in the Clerical order and 74 out of 89 votes in the Lay order. The consecration in the Cathedral on the sixth of May was beautiful and impressive; the most impressive feature, to my mind, being the fact that the Bishop Presiding was dear Bishop Boyd Vincent of Southern Ohio, who was within twelve days of his eighty-fifth birthday and who had confirmed William Scarlett as a youth. Because I wish it to go into this official address and to be printed as a permanent record in the Journal of the Diocese, I want to repeat here a message which I published in Church News last June; "A new chapter of possibilities and probabilities in the development of the religious life of this part of the map opens with the consecration of Bishop Scarlett. It is an opportune meeting of a work to be done and a man specially fitted to do it. I give him loving welcome. I know, too, that the people of Missouri, of the Episcopal Church and of all Churches, will meet him with loving welcome and with a spirit of glad co-operation as he moves in and out among them. There are great numbers of spiritually-minded men and women of many faiths and of no clearly defined and formulated faith who are eager to hear religion and the things of the spirit interpreted as Bishop Scarlett can and does interpret them."

Before we go further, at this first corporate assembly of the Diocese since his consecration, I ask those present to rise and join with me in a pledge to Bishop Scarlett of our loyalty and love.

Eight of the Bishops of the Church have passed into the Larger Life since last we gathered here.

The Rt. Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson, D.D., LL.D., fourth Bishop of Chicago since 1905, died January 30, 1930. He was a man of delightful personality, a persuasive preacher, an able organizer and wise administrator. His leadership as Presiding Bishop was conspicuous, though he held the office only two months. He is a great loss to his own Diocese and to the whole Church. He was 65 years of age.

William Andrew Leonard, D.D., LL.D., fourth Bishop of Ohio, died September 21, 1930, at the age of 82. The resignation of Bishop Boyd Vincent of Southern Ohio in 1929 made Bishop Leonard the Senior Bishop of the Church in active service. Twice by right of seniority he was Presiding Bishop. Forty-two years Bishop of Ohio, he built his Diocese into one of the most important in the whole American Church. In personal life and in official life, he was a man greatly beloved.

The Rt. Rev. Arthur C. A. Hall, D.D., LL.D., fourth Bishop of Vermont since 1894, died February 26, 1930, at the age of 82. He had deep spiritual insights, was a faithful pastor to his flock, an unusually helpful teacher and preacher, and always fair and generous toward those whose points of view differed radically from his own.

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The Rt. Rev. Charles Lewis Slattery, D.D., eighth Bishop of Massachusetts since 1927, died March 12, 1930, at the age of 62. He was a peculiarly lovable man. Bishop Lawrence, who was in a position to know him better than anybody else, after enumerating many conspicuous administrative gifts, says this: "Through a subtle, sympathetic instinct, he seemed to anticipate in what home or at what sick bed he was needed, and his response was immediate." And this: "He has made to the Church and to his Master the greatest gift, that of a pure, high-minded and consecrated Christian character."

The Rt. Rev. Herbert Shipman, D.D., several years Chaplain at West Point and overseas Chaplain in the World War, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of New York since November, 1921, died suddenly, March 23, 1930, being 60 years of age. He too, like Bishop Slattery, was a loving pastor and friend. Practically all who wrote or spoke of Bishop Shipman after he was gone made special mention of his always affectionate and helpful ministries among the people of the Negro Race in the City of New York.

The Rt. Rev. Sidney Catlin Partridge, D.D., second Bishop of West Missouri since 1911, died June 22, 1930, in the seventy-third year of his age. Before his translation to West Missouri, he was eleven years Missionary Bishop of Kyoto.

The Rt. Rev. James Henry Darlington, D.D., LL.D., first Bishop of Harrisburg since 1905, conspicuous in conference with Eastern Orthodox and Old Catholic churches, died August 14, 1930, aged 74 years.

The Rt. Rev. Sheldon Munson Griswold, D.D., was consecrated Missionary Bishop of Salina in 1903; was translated to Chicago as Suffragan Bishop in 1917; was elected Bishop of Chicago in February, 1930, and died after a long illness, November 28, 1930, in the seventy-fifth year of his age.

I have often referred to the nobility and fidelity of the service of the Rev. Franklin M. Weddell. Shortly after I came to Missouri, I persuaded him to come. Nearly twenty years he made his way, patiently, faithfully, and with real heroism, among little groups of scattered people whose Good Shepherd he was. While he was ill in St. Luke's Hospital, I was talking one evening to a man not of our communion who was sitting by the bedside of his sick wife. "Who is this," he asked me, "in the next room? You come in every day to see him." I told him he was the Rev. Mr. Weddell, one of our Clergy. "Oh," was the reply, "I've often heard of him and his work among

the poor." What better commendation than that! He was a saintly man. He lived close to Christ. He leaned much on Jesus' breast. He ministered to Him in ministry to the least of His brethren. I'm sure the trumpets sounded on the other side when he passed over!

I spoke last year of the long ministry of the Rev. Edmund Duckworth. And messages of love were sent to him by the Convention. Less than a month later he was called to lay his burdens down. Thirty-five years in this Diocese, as a wise and faithful servant he gave their portion to that part of Christ's family which was commited to his charge. The people of the Church of the Redeemer in this city loved him well. Also the Clergy and Lay People of the Diocese which he served in many important offices and as a Delegate to the General Convention. We may be certain that the Master has opened to him the gates of larger life and has given him a wider opportunity for service.

News was received, July 9, of the death in Paris of the Rev. Henry W. Mizner. He was ordained to the Priesthood by Bishop Tuttle in 1896, and became one of the assistants to the Rev. Dr. Schuyler at the Cathedral. Three years later he was elected Rector of St. Paul's, Palmyra. In June, 1901, he became Minister-in-charge of St. Stephen's, St. Louis. He also established "St. Stephen's-in-the-Hills," a Summer Camp in the country, near Allenton, where mothers and children from the crowded city tenements found rest and refreshment and sunshine in God's out-of-doors. Mr. Mizner retired from St. Stephen's at the end of twenty-five years, June 1, 1926. Leaving St. Louis with his family shortly after, he spent some months in Florida. Then to Italy, and eventually to Paris. While abroad he ministered as health and strength permitted, especially in the American Cathedral in Paris. He was much loved by those who were in a position to know him well, to whom the message of his death brought profound sorrow.

The Rev. James D. Simmons was elected Rector of St. Stephen's, Ferguson, with consent of Bishop Tuttle, June 12, 1916. He became Rector of Mount Calvary, St. Louis, with consent of Bishop Tuttle, September 1, 1917. His ministrations there terminated, October 1, 1926. He died suddenly in St. Louis, last summer.

In my annual address in 1919, I mentioned that a Church School had been begun in Valley Park by Mr. Richard Kopplin, a lay member of Emmanuel Parish, Webster Groves. There were then 8 communicants and 20 baptized persons. There was no Church School. There are now 78 baptized persons, 36 communicants, and a Church School enrollment of 153. Since Mr. Kopplin took hold of the work, 113 persons have been baptized and 36 have been confirmed. An addition to the Chapel, costing more than \$2,000.00, has been built, the money given in response to Mr. Kopplin's appeals. Mr. Kopplin has had the assistance of lay helpers, men and women, from Emmanuel Parish, Webster Groves. But they all agree that he has been always the moving spirit in the enterprise. With high courage, with firm faith, with love and loyalty and devotion, for a dozen years, in sunshine and in storm, in summer's heat and winter's cold, this good man has shepherded the sheep in Valley Park. Ten days before he was to have been ordained Deacon in Emmanuel Church, the Master

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called for him and gave him the higher commission! He went as he would have liked to go—busy at his work, just returned from two trips to Valley Park to carry relief to the needy and to prepare for the Children's Christmas Festival in the chapel. His loss to me and to the Missionary Work of the Diocese is beyond the power of words to tell.

The name of Mr. James A. Waterworth appears in the 1885 Journal of the Diocese of Missouri as Secretary of the Vestry of Christ Church, St. Louis. When Christ Church became Christ Church Cathedral in 1888, Mr. Waterworth was elected Secretary of the Chapter; to which office he was re-elected each succeeding year. He was therefore Secretary of the Vestry of Christ Church and of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral forty-five successive years. He became Senior Warden of the Cathedral in 1916, succeeding Professor Marshall S. Snow; and he continued in that office as long as he lived. He was a gentleman of the old school. He loved the Cathedral and served its interests with a deep devotion. He loved the visible Cathedral fabric as the House of God. He felt, and felt truly,

"The joy of Thine abode all other joy excels."

In business life, Mr. Waterworth was many years Manager of the Missouri Inspection Bureau and a recognized authority on insurance rates in the United States. At the age of 89, a pilgrim arrived at the end of a long and happy journey, he put away his pilgrim staff and laid him down to rest. He left the high example of an honest, upright man, who in daily life walked close with God.

A sweet soul entered Paradise, Sunday evening, October 12, when Margaret Stickney, wife of Lloyd C. Stark of Louisiana closed her eyes to scenes of earth. During nineteen years, as a frequent guest in her home, I had learned to love her and her family with a deep affection. In every circumstance, whether in the community where she had lived for twenty years, or in Calvary Parish of which she was a loyal and devoted member, she stood for the highest and the finest and the truest things in life. It is beyond our finding out why she should have been taken away just when she was so greatly needed in the Home, and in the Community, and in the Church. Truly,

"The pathway of God's providence is on the hills Where we may never climb. Therefore our reason yields her hand to faith."

Her much-loved Rector, the Rev. David Coombs, and I said the burial service in Calvary Church, Louisiana. And in Riverside Cemetery, on a beautiful hillside overlooking the river, beneath a wilderness of flowers we laid her body down until the day breaks and the shadows flee away.

I was called to Ironton in March for the burial of Dr. Roger William Gay. I counted automobiles parked on both sides of the highway the length of twelve city blocks. Rich people from St. Louis and poor people from the Arcadia Valley and the hills surrounding it, where for thirty-four years he had done the work of a country doctor, came with their tributes of affection. Often I have spent the night in Dr. Gay's home. And often in the morning it would come out quite casually, in breakfast-table conversation, that twice since we retired the night before, he had been called to go through the

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valleys and into the woods to minister to the sick. He always went when he was sent for, night or day. He followed the footsteps of the Blessed Master as he went about doing good and healing those who were diseased.

Almost four years Mrs. Edward Mead lived after she had been told that her condition was hopeless. And she lived joyously and helpfully, in the home as wife and mother, in the community, and in Ascension Parish to whose work and worship she was devoted. It was really very wonderful to see her courage strengthen and her beautiful faith become more beautiful and more deep and more expansive during these years of testing, as her beloved Rector, the Rev. John S. Bunting, led her in green pastures and beside the waters of comfort. In the month of July, she went to join with the triumphant saints who sing the Saviour's praise.

Mr. Daniel M. Grissom was many years the sunshine of the Old Folks' Home in Kirkwood. I last saw him there in January of a year ago, on the occasion of his 101st birthday. He was bright and cheery that day, talking of activities in which he had been busily engaged fifty and seventy-five years ago, including the Lincoln-Douglas debate which he reported for the newspapers. The people of Grace Church, Kirkwood, of which he was a member, loved him well, and he was a regular worshipper there until physical infirmities prevented him attending. In the month of May the Master came and led him up into the higher room of the Heavenly Father's many-mansioned house.

Mr. Heman Judson Pettingill finished his earthly course a few days ago at the age of 79. He was a direct descendant of John Alden and Priscilla Mullens of the Mayflower. His birth and early business career were in New England. Coming to St. Louis in 1911, he soon rose to the highest office in the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, as Chairman of the Board. He had been President of the New England Society of St. Louis, President of the Missouri Society of Colonial Wars and of the Missouri Society of the Sons of the Revolution, and Governor of the Society of Mayflower Descendants in St. Louis. He retired from business three years ago and lived in "Little Arcady" in St. Louis County in an attractive home which he had builded, in the sweet companionship of family and friends and singing birds and springing flowers. He was a kindly, friendly, genial man and will be greatly missed by a wide circle of social and business associates.

The Rev. Dr. William C. Bitting was nineteen years the pastor of the Second Baptist Church in this city. He was a careful student, a deep thinker, a preacher of unusual ability, a lovable friend. No minister in St. Louis contributed more than Dr. Bitting to create an atmosphere of kindliness and good-will and fellowship among churches of all names, Protestant and Catholic and Jewish. He had been invalided several years. We who loved him were glad when we heard that God had called him home!

Mrs. Lou M. Winn died in Pasadena, California, in the early summer, 90 years old. "Mama Lou," she was affectionately called by many who loved her much. Her body was brought for burial in the churchyard which surrounds old St. John's Church, Prairieville, of which she had been a member from early childhood.

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Among others who are gone are Mrs. Benjamin H. Newman, who was many years the mainstay of St. Andrew's Mission, Cuba; Mr. George B. Dorsey, Senior Warden of Calvary, Columbia; Mr. Mark C. Hawkins of St. Jude's, Monroe City; Mrs. Chapin, who came seven years ago from Connecticut with the Rev. and Mrs. David Coombs and has lived with them in the rectory at Louisiana; Mr. Thomas Wardell of St. James', Macon; and from St. Louis, Mrs. Fred Armstrong of the Church of the Redeemer, Secretary of the Episcopal Home for Children; Mrs. Fannie Bourscheidt of St. Stephen's; Nelson Homer Snow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer S. Snow of the Church of the Ascension; Mrs. Arthur E. Bostwick of the Cathedral congregation; the father of Miss Henrietta Bull; the mother of Mrs. Carl Reed Taylor; Mr. George Welch Simmons; the father of Mr. Duncan I. Meier of the Church of St. Michael and St. George; also from St. Michael and St. George Mr. Edward Fisher, member of the Vestry, a delightful Christian gentleman; Irene, sweet daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theron E. Catlin; and Mr. Raymond Mancha.

Using a customary manner of speech, shall we say that these who were traveling along the road with us at this time a year ago have dropped by the wayside? No. Not that. They have gone on ahead to the end of the road where the beautiful light is shining!

I mentioned last year that the Rev. Augustus P. Rein had provided by will that his residuary estate should come to the Diocese of Missouri as "The Cora E. Rein Memorial Fund," the income to be used for missions and charities and benevolences. I ventured the guess that the amount would be in excess of \$6,000.00. I made final settlement as Executor of the estate, last June, and turned over \$7,430.43 to the Bishop of Missouri as Trustee. Many of us are aware that Mr. Rein lived a life of absolute simplicity. I am afraid that he often denied himself in order that he might leave a larger bequest to us. I wish he were where we might take him by the hand and tell him how deeply we appreciate this generous legacy.

The Rev. Dr. Carroll M. Davis was appointed Diocesan Missionary here in 1887 and continued in that position until elected Senior Assistant at the Cathedral, May 17, 1889. He became Dean of the Cathedral in succession to Dean Montgomery Schuyler who died March 19, 1896. Dr. Davis left us nine years ago to take duty as Domestic Secretary of the Department of Missions in the National Council. But he has kept his canonical residence in Missouri and his name stands at the top of our Clergy List. I am sure you are all as glad as I am to learn that he is returning to make his home here. He knows that he is among friends who are happy because of his return and because of the opportunity to renew the friendships which have been not broken, but only partially suspended during the past nine years.

The Rev. William W. S. Hohenschild, in the one year that he has been Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion in St. Louis, has established himself strongly in the affections and confidence of his people. In addition to what might be called regular parish work, the Kindergarten and the Playground and the various Social Service activities of the Church of the Holy Communion are a distinct benefit to the neighborhood which surrounds the parish church.

The Rev. Sumner Walters became Rector of the Church of the Redeemer in St. Louis, early in the year 1930. "New occasions teach new duties." Mr. Walters seems to have an understanding of the situation and there is an excellent spirit of co-operation in the parish.

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The Rev. Lee W. Heaton came to Missouri from the Diocese of Massachusetts early in the spring as Minister-in-charge of St. Luke's and St. Timothy's in St. Louis. When the rectorship of the Church of St. Philip the Apostle became vacant by acceptance of the resignation of the Rev. Bradner J. Moore, Mr. Heaton conceived the idea of uniting these three organizations to form one parish. The plan is to sell the three properties, to purchase a site in North Saint Louis, and to establish the new Parish of the Holy Apostles. The members of the various congregations are worshiping together in St. Philip's Church and are working together harmoniously. And there is every prospect of success.

I was fortunate to find the man to develop the opportunity in Overland when the opportunity arrived. Perhaps I ought to say, the man who arrived developed the opportunity. Yes. I think that is it. The Rev. Donald Veale has done a remarkable piece of work in the past eighteen months. St. Paul's Mission has purchased a new and attractive location with an appraised value of \$9,800.00. A Chapel and Parish House and Rectory are in process of construction, to cost something over \$42,000.00. The communicant list has increased from 109 to 140. There is an enrollment of 97 in the Church School. Receipts of \$2,578.85 are reported for the year 1930 for local support. And from gifts, offerings and other sources a capital account of \$10,604.21.

The Rev. James H. George, Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to the City Institutions, and his staff, have had a busy year. The statistical report shows 1,420 visits made to City Institutions; 738 services held at which more than 36,000 persons were present; public celebrations of the Holy Communion participated in by 2,858 persons; bedside communions, 1,463. Twenty-five persons were baptized and 25 presented to be confirmed. Miss Lois Phillips, in charge of Social Service Work, reports 513 individuals or families served; 260 visits; 602 office interviews; 60 interviews in institutions; 82 professional meetings; and 829 contacts with social agencies. It is suggested that the budget for this work be reduced this year by about \$4,000.00. If this must be done, I am certain that there are 40 individuals who will gladly contribute \$100.00 each to make up the deficit. For nothing is more important than that we continue to serve these City Institutions. It is a Christlike ministry, of enormous value to the moral and social and spiritual betterment of those who are served.

The Rev. Early W. Poindexter, coming by transfer from the D'ocese of Kansas, has joined the working force of the Church of St. Michael and St. George in St. Louis. He is helping the Rev. Dr. Block to carry the heavy load which he was carrying alone, is happy in his work and is making those happy to whom he ministers.

The Rev. Wayne S. Snoddy, D.D., Deacon, came to us in July from the D'ocese of Los Angeles, as Minister-in-charge of St. Paul's, St. Louis, which became vacant by the resignation of the Rev. George S. Gresham in the month of May. I ordained Dr. Snoddy to the Priesthood the first Sunday in November. He has accepted a call as Rector of St. Paul's and he and his people are working helpfully and hopefully together.

Reports for the year from St. Augustine's, St. Lou's, under the leadership of the Rev. Frank Maples, are exceptionally good. In the matter of property improvement, the item of importance is the pur-

chase of a Rectory at a cost of something over \$6,000.00. This is an objective which I have long hoped might be reached, supplying a comfortable and attractive home for the Pastor and his family.

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After two-and-a-half years as Rector of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, and missionary to many communities in that general neighborhood, the Rev. Carleton D. Lathrop accepted a call to Fort Smith, Arkansas, which took him away from us last May. He was specially adapted to the type of work that he was doing here and his going is a distinct loss to the entire Diocese.

The Rev. Ray M. Wilcox, almost five years Rector of St. James' Church, Macon, and Christ Church, Moberly, was transferred in June to the Diocese of Connecticut. We miss his genial presence from the occasional gatherings of our Clergy Staff, but we are glad to learn that he is happy and useful in his new field of labor.

The Rev. Henry H. Marsden came to St. Louis from Baltimore in October, 1921, as Minister-in-charge of St. Mary's Church. After the death of Bishop Tuttle in 1923, Mr. Marsden was appointed Archdeacon. He did his work with devotion and fidelity to duty in portions of the Diocese where conditions were always difficult and frequently discouraging. He has ministered in many communities which without his ministrations must have been deprived of the services of the Church. Bishop Scarlett and I have felt that we ought for the present to relieve the Diocese of the necessity of supporting an Archdeacon, and I so informed Mr. Marsden last July. I am glad to say that he has recently accepted a call to the Church of the Holy Trinity, Lincoln, the largest parish in the Diocese of Nebraska. We wish him success and happiness in his new field and we give him our thanks for all that he has done for us.

I visited Mrs. Jean Barron Hurbut, our United Thank Offering Worker, near Fredericktown, just before Christmas. I was glad to find that she had moved out from her cabin that was buried in the woods and well-nigh inaccessible. She has built a new little home, simple but attractive, on a sunny hillside, beside a sparkling brook and near to a much-traveled highway. An excellent school close by, with a teacher of exceptional ability, is available for her children. Mrs. Hurlbut, in her ministries of love and mercy, is the only friend whom many persons have to share with them their distress and loneliness and poverty.

A new enthusiasm is manifested in many parts of the Diocese in the work of the Women's Auxiliary. Mrs. John F. Shepley, the President, and her co-workers, have visited a number of isolated communities and have brought encouragement to half-discouraged groups; for which we give them thanks. I hope that some report of the year's activities will be given to this Convention. The Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary will be held in this room tomorrow. I really feel that these devoted women would appreciate it if a larger number of the Clergy would manifest their interest by attendance at the Annual Meeting.

The name of The Episcopal Orphan's Home has been changed to The Episcopal Home for Children. Reports of the year's work read at the Annual Meeting were most encouraging. Mrs. Charlton Messick as President, Deaconess Affleck the Superintendent, the Board of Managers and the Executive Board merit the grateful thanks of all who are interested in the Home. It will be well if closer contacts can be established between the Diocese and the Home; and to that end I hope that Mrs. Messick may have opportunity to say a few words to this Convention.

This whole unemployment situation troubles me, as I presume it troubles all of us who stop to think. Is there not something that we can do to help? I have heard a good deal about prayer for the destitute. I have received numerous prayers with the request that they be used. But isn't something in order now in addition to prayer? Or even sympathy? The words keep ringing in my ears, "If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, 'Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled,' notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?" I am wondering whether we may not in some cases use our Parish Houses, and perhaps our Churches, to provide shelter for our fellowmen who are in such pitiable condition, frequently through no fault of their own.

We shall soon have a new Dean at Christ Church Cathedral the Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, rector for 13 years of St. Paul's Church, Columbus, Ohio. One who is in a position to know his work says: "To catalogue Mr. Sweet's official connections is almost to list the social and religious agencies of the city of Columbus." After enumerating the various leagues and committees and associations and federations of which he is or has been president or chairman, and after telling that he has multiplied the communicant membership of St. Paul's Church by three in 13 years, this is added: "Even all the respect and admiration which this record of accomplishment has inspired is surpassed by the great wealth of personal affection which Mr. Sweet's friendly nature, sincerity of purpose and spirit of teamwork have inspired in the hundreds with whom he has come in contact. His departure will leave a tremendous vacancy in the ranks of the clergy of Columbus and the entire state." It sounds as if we should have a man who will carry the Cathedral work along on the lines which Dean Scarlett has projected, and which have given so much satisfaction to the people, during the past nine years. We feel that we are fortunate indeed. We shall give Dean Sweet a glad welcome. And he will soon find that he has made new friends here to take the place of those he left behind him in Columbus.

The Diocese in the past few years has borrowed money to make good on the "expectations to pay" which the Convention has authorized sent to the National Council. The borrowings of the Diocese now total \$9,000.00, spite of the fact that a note for \$4,000.00 was paid early in the summer. The "expectations to pay" which are given to the National Council by vote of the Convention are based upon the "expectations to pay" which are given to the Diocese by the various congregations which compose the Diocese. The Diocese takes the view that it makes a definite commitment when it tells the National Council that Missouri "expects to pay" so much. Ought not each of the congregations which compose the Diocese to take the view that it makes a definite commitment when it tells the Diocese that it "expects to pay" so much? Unless it be so, on what basis can the Diocese tell the National Council that Missouri "expects to pay" this or that or something else?

It may be that the time has come when we must represent to the National Council that we have a duty to Missouri which must be done before we make larger commitments to the work of the General Church. As things now stand, we have 30 active Clergy in a Diocese of 32,500 square miles. That is, practically, one active Clergyman to every 1,100 square miles. It is practically, one Clergyman to every 60,000 population. Outside of St. Louis and its suburbs, we have only seven active Clergy. If we allow that the area of St. Louis and its suburbs is 500 square miles—a liberal estimate, I suppose—then we have, outside of St. Louis and its suburbs, only one Clergyman to more than 4,500 square miles. If we allow that the population of St. Louis and its suburbs is 1,000,000 people, we have outside of St. Louis and its suburbs only one Clergyman to more than 100,000 population For purposes of comparison, I will say that Connecticut, a Diocese which I know intimately well because I go there every summer, has one Clergyman to every 23 square miles; one Clergyman to every 7,000 population. In the light of the figures which I have quoted, it may be that we have a duty to Missouri which we must discharge before we assume larger obligations than we have already assumed toward the General Church. It is the business of this Convention to decide.

While we are on this question, perhaps I ought to remind you that our givings in 1930 for the support of Mission Work in Missouri and in the General Church were less than twelve cents per week per communicant. We sing

"Brothers, we are treading Where the saints have trod."

But are we? "They were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were slain with the sword." Are we "treading where the saints have trod" when we give only one bottle of pop per week per communicant for the Missionary Work of the Church? We sing,

> "As Thou hast died for me, Oh, may my love to Thee Pure, warm, and changeless be."

And are we satisfied to express that love by giving one trolley fare or one cigar or two packages of chewing gum per week per communicant for the Missionary Work of the Church? Is there nothing that we can do to make the situation better than it is? Yes. I am foolish enough to still keep on believing that if we will lift Christ up, He will draw us unto Him. For He is, after all, the incentive to Missionary Work, always and everywhere, isn't He? Yes. When all is said and done, it goes back to Him! Back to that Cross whose transverse beam points in all directions into all the world! Back to Him who still says, "I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto Me."

APPENDIX NO. 2.

Bishop Coadjutor's Address to the Ninety-second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Since my consecration last May, I have had not only to carry on my new work as best I could but also to continue to act as Dean of the Cathedral as well. It seemed important to keep the work of the Cathedral up to the mark until my successor could take it over. It has been difficult to combine the two: I have felt I have done neither adequately: but I have sensed also the fact that you understood the situation and were making due allowance. With the coming, in two more weeks, of the Reverend Sidney E. Sweet from St. Paul's Church, Columbus, Ohio, to be Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, I shall be set free to give my full time to the Diocese.

I have had the privilege of holding seven Confirmation Services, confirming 95 persons. I shall not trouble you here with other statis-

tics of my work, which will be recorded in the proper place.

I would like to make two suggestions: We all have realized for many years that our city parishes are badly bunched and that large areas of the city are untouched by the Episcopal Church. It might be well to create a small board under the Council, composed of men competent to know and determine the probable directions of the city's growth in order that suitable future locations may be suggested and secured: and also to advise with parishes which are seeking

re-location.

Second: If we are to do this adequately, and if we are to be enabled to extend our work in the state as we ought, I should like to say again that we should be turning over in our minds the proposition that when conditions are right we should undertake properly to finance the Diocese. At present we are decidedly limited in any attempt to extend our work. Men in the field are inadequately equipped in the way of church plants to do the most effective work. Parishes are ground between the burdens of apportionments and assessments. When the time comes it would seem that we must undertake a campaign for a fund, the income from which would help to finance the administration of the Diocese and so relieve the parishes of much of the present heavy assessment: and also to provide each year an income for real extension work, whether in a new field, or in the strengthening of work already in existence and full of promise. Only so can we expect to make progress. And it is well at this time to begin to acquaint ourselves with the idea, and, if approved, to lay our plans.

It is a great pleasure to announce that the Reverend Carroll M. Davis, LL.D., former Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, has come back home to take up work again in this Diocese. He has been a Canon of the Cathedral for nine years now. He will assist us in the missionary work of the Church in this Diocese. I know how delighted his many friends are to have him here permanently, and how warm

will be his welcome.

The Diocesan Council submits recommendations embodied in the following resolutions:

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Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of assessments for the General Expense Fund of the Diocese, contained in the attached report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$24,000.00, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with additional special funds received therefor, be appropriated to pay the General Expense Budget of the Diocese, for the year 1931.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of apportionments for the Church Program Fund, contained in the attached report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$72,000.00 for the year 1931, be adopted; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$36,000.00 be appropriated from the proceeds thereof, to pay on the quota of the National Council, and a like amount for the Church Program within this Diocese, as itemized in the Church Program Budget attached: Provided, that if the proceeds from such apportionments are less than the full amounts so appropriated, the Diocesan Council shall make adjustments to conform thereto, including amounts owing on account of prior apportionments.

Report of the Department of Finance.

The finances of the Diocese are always a difficult problem, yet in 1930 the income for the Church Program Fund and the Diocesan missionary work was an improvement (notwithstanding the prevalent business depression) due to a number of parishes and missions paying their apportionment in full or exceeding it.

Those exceeding the apportionment are as follows:

Ferguson, St. Stephen's Kirkwood, Grace Webster Groves, Emmanuel

St. Louis: All Saints

Christ Church Cathedral Prince of Peace Mission St. Michael and St. George's St. Paul's

St. Stephen's House

St. Thomas' Mission to the Deaf

Those paying the apportionment in full are as follows:

Bloomfield, St. John's Mission Chaffee, Unorganized Mission Clarksville, Grace Mission Cuba, St. Andrew's Mission De Soto, Trinity Fredericktown, St. Paul's Mission Folla, Christ Church Mission Salem, Trinity Mission St. Charles, Trinity St. James, Trinity Mission Valley Park, St. Luke's Mission

The apportionment is made upon a uniform basis applicable to all, and is no longer arbitrarily proposed by the Council, and while it may be impracticable for every parish and mission to pay the apportionment in full, it is the goal to be reached, if possible.

We hope that the improvement of 1930 will be continued and bettered.

The great task of the National Council and the urgent need of strengthening and upbuilding the Church in the Diocese require money, and the interested, sustained effort of every communicant, vestry and rector is needed, not intermittently or when specially aroused, but steadily from the beginning to the end of the year. Not only must pledges be obtained, but it is important to organize and systematize collections, and make prompt remittances month by month. That is quite necessary because the stipends and expenses of those who are doing our work,—our substitutes, in fact—must be paid monthly, regularly and promptly.

Notwithstanding improvement in 1930, there is owing on account of past deficiencies \$9,300.00, which must be paid because it is owing, and to avert continued payment of interest charges year to year out of current funds.

We think it the duty of the Council to so adjust its work and pledges to the National Council that this debt be paid this year, and thereafter to keep its work within its income, moving onward to the extent the Diocese will supply funds.

Report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

After his consecration, Bishop Scarlett resigned the office of vice-chairman of the Department, and the Rev. Mr. Coombs was elected vice-chairman pro tem. Later the Rev. Karl M. Block was elected to that office. Mr. Orcutt was re-elected Secretary and Treasurer.

Many matters of importance to the diocese were transacted during the year 1930. A loan was made to St. Paul's Mission at Overland to help finance the building of a new plant, consisting of chapel, rectory and parish house. A rectory for St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis, was authorized to be purchased, the Department advancing a loan for that purpose.

The merger of St. Luke's Mission and St. Timothy's Mission with the Church of St. Philip the Apostle was authorized by the Department. Under the leadership of the Rev. Lee W. Heaton the merger was consummated, and the combined churches are now known as the Church of the Holy Apostles.

Christ Church at Affton has been re-opened, and repairs have been made to put the building in good condition.

Report of Department of Religious Education

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We

In order to inform the Diocese as a whole concerning the functions and policy of the Department of Religious Education, a committee was appointed and instructed to report at the meeting of November 4, 1930. That part of the committee's report which was accepted follows:

Many problems which arise in the Diocese may well concern several departments but there are some well defined functions of the Department. It is the purpose of this committee to attempt to set forth these and leave the special problems to be handled as they arise

The self-evident divisions are:

- (1) The Church Schools—Diocesan aid and guidance of Church schools clearly comes under this department. It is the duty of this body to co-ordinate and bring to the highest possible efficiency this work of Christian nurture of the children of our Church. This, of course, would include church school service programs and pageantry and such other sub-divisions as should definitely tie in with the church school program.
- (2) Teacher Training—Closely allied with the church school is the problem of teacher training. Without properly informed and trained teachers the school system becomes ineffective. It is a problem for the Diocese as well as for each parish. Several normal schools should be started at points convenient for the various parishes. These should be handled by the Department. This does not preclude the use of Parish Teachers' Coaching Groups but rather furnishes the background courses and training which is essential and difficult for individual parishes to provide.
- (3) Summer Conferences—There is no doubt that this Diocese should sponsor a regular summer conference either in conjunction with other adjoining dioceses or alone. Such work rightfully comes under this department as it deals to a large extent with training teachers for the church schools and leaders for the young people's organizations. It can also include other branches of the churches' work but since it is strictly educational, it should originate and be carried on by this department.
- (4) Daily Vacational Bible Schools—With the modern trend of the closure of many church schools during the summer there is increasing need for instruction during the vacation period. Daily Vacational Bible Schools have proved very effective and worth while where properly handled and this department should provide for them in their proceedings.
- (5) Week Day Church Schools—This movement has gained a great deal of headway in the last decade and should rightly be sponsored by the Diocese through its Department of Religious Education.

All of these five items are co-related but are individual problems nevertheless.

(6) Young People's Societies—The purpose of such societies is the training of young leaders who will later be effective in the work of the Church. This department should see that there is Diocesan co-ordination of the various parochial groups with as little interference as possible.

(7) Work among College Students—This covers work in the colleges of our own Diocese through aid to the local clergyman and contact with young people who have gone out of the Diocese to schools and colleges elsewhere. The first portion is the work of the Diocese pure and simple. This department should prepare a plan for presentation to the parishes for execution to cover the latter portion of the problem.

- (8) Recruiting for the Ministry—Some recognition should be made by the department of education in the seminaries and the recruiting for the ministry. It deals so fundamentally with religious education that it should tie in with this department.
- (9) Contact with the Isolated.—This includes shut-ins due to disease as well as those members of the church not near enough to be in direct contact with any parish. This department should cooperate with the National Department of Religious Education in the use of the plan now available and adapting it to our local conditions.
- (10) Library. The diocesan library should be increased regularly and a wider use of its privileges urged on the laity as well as the clergy.

Each of these items requires time and money and constructive thinking as well as some original research. It appears to the committee that to accomplish the maximum of good, a full time Executive Secretary of Religious Education of proper training and ability should be retained at the earliest date possible. More good can be done through this method than any other, assuming that the right person is selected.

It would seem desirable to subdivide the Department, providing committees on each of the aforementioned divisions of the Department's work. It is probable that the chairmen of each of these committees should be a member of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education but it is not essential that all of the committee's personnel be so related. In fact a better functioning could be obtained by appointing outstanding people in the Diocese in a particular field to such a committee. It is self-evident that the details of each of these fields can best be discussed and worked out by those in direct contact and only the final recommendations need be submitted to the Department as a whole for approval or for return to the committee involved for further consideration with the objections or difficulties stated. Very little of this actually happens as the Department is represented by the chairman and possibly by others.

It should be the policy of the Department to do the constructive pioneering work rather than the routine of minor details. This is possible through an Executive Secretary.

There will, no doubt, be other additions to the scope of the Department in the future but such a program would give more than we can accomplish at present and we should set goals in each field for probable attainment and always try to perfect and make secure as we go along.

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sponation. While your Department of Religious Education has worked generally in most of the divisions outlined in the above report, the field has not been covered specifically and as thoroughly as it should. The reason for this, undoubtedly, is that no one was definitely in charge of these various departments of the work. It was therefore decided to organize the Department along the lines suggested.

Instead of having a self-continuing body year after year it was decided that the Bishop of the Diocese should, annually, in January, appoint the personnel of the Department.

Great emphasis is being placed on religious education today, not merely in the churches but in the public and private schools.

It is no new thing that public schools have been cooperating with the churches in many cities throughout our country in releasing time to the churches for the religious instruction of the children during the week. Since its inception in 1914 the movement for Week Day Church Schools has spread to almost every state in the Union.

So far as we know, there is no released time by the public schools of this city or other cities of our Diocese for religious education nor is there any cooperation between the schools and churches in the matter of character training.

Each year we find an increasing number of parishes and dioceses that, realizing the importance of religious education in the growth of the Church and in the growth of religion in the people, procure trained Directors of Religious Education who give their sole time and work to that particular field. We have been far outdistanced in this respect.

It is a matter of record that our Church Schools are smaller in membership proportionately to their church membership than the Church Schools of other denominations and it is not due altogether to the smallness of families in the Episcopal Church but to a lack of emphasis on the Church School. The "Vital Statistics" in the Diocesan Journals for the last three years show a decrease of 324 members in the Church Schools which is almost ten percent of the whole membership.

In view of these facts it must be admitted that we are not keeping pace with the rest of the Church in the matter of emphasis on religious education. There is the feeling in your Department that the condition could be greatly bettered if a Director of Religious Education was retained.

It may not seem feasible, at a time when the budget of the Diocese is being pared in so many ways, to recommend the securing of a Director of Religious Education, yet business teaches us that in times of depression and curtailment of work one ought to advertise.

Unless there is greater concentration on the promotion of Church Schools, and the increasing of our Communicant strength from that source, it seems to us that the lowering of the budget will be a process that will have to go on year after year, which is certainly not a healthy sign.

Report of Department of Field.

The Field Department, whose chief function is to conduct the campaign for pledges and funds required for the Missionary work of the General Church and within our own Diocese, was enlarged in 1930 to be a composite of members of other Departments, for better understanding and co-ordination of work.

In booklets from the National Council and a jointly signed letter by the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor, the requirements were made known to every communicant of the Diocese; Rectors preached concerning the work and its needs, on Christian Stewardship Sunday; and parishes were asked to make an Every Member Canvass, November 30th to December 14th.

A Diocesan meeting was held in the Cathedral, attended by Rectors and Vestries in procession, and addresses were made by the Rev. Dr. James Thayer Addison and the Rev. Robin T. S. Chen.

A Diocesan Family Dinner, largely attended and addressed by three visiting bishops, was held in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial on December 16th, the speakers being Bishop Hugh L. Burleson, Bishop Coadjutor William M. Green, and Bishop Coadjutor F. D. Goodwin.

Partial reports of the Canvass were made totaling \$41,381.00. Confirmations in definite form have not been received to a satisfactory extent, and we recommend that a roll be called of parishes and missions, early in the Diocesan Convention, to complete the reports and assurances for 1931.

We also recommend that the Council ask each parish to appoint a regular Standing Committee on the Every Member Canvass from the Vestry, the Chairman of each committee to be appointed by the Bishop as an auxiliary member of the Field Department of the Diocesan Council, with the idea of maintaining throughout the whole year close co-operation and understanding of plans and methods, instead of confining the effort to a short period before the Canvass.

Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Bishops of Missouri and the Members of the Ninety-second Diocesan Convention, we present the report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Missouri for the year 1930.

After serving their three years term of office Mrs. Rumsey and eight members of her Board were replaced by others at the Annual Meeting in January, 1930.

It is difficult to adequately express appreciation of the valuable work accomplished by Mrs. Rumsey and her Board and those now carrying on the work cannot be grateful enough for the kindly interest and wise council, so generously given to them by the retiring Board.

Mrs. Rumsey inaugurated the plan of Districting the Diocese which has proved most helpful and we have endeavored to follow up her ideas and a number of very successful meetings have been held in the Northern Convocation at Hannibal, Columbia and Monroe City at which Mrs. W. E. Treat the Third Vice-President, presided, and also one in Cape Girardeau with Mrs. Wade H. Harvey, the Fourth Vice-President, in the chair.

Members of the Board and also some of the Parish Auxiliary members, from St. Louis, attended these meetings and we have had the pleasure of welcoming a number of Delegates from the out of town Parishes to some of our large meetings here.

The Budget for the past year was made by the retiring Board and we are happy to report has been met in full.

Bishop Johnson has continued his support and co-operation and by his constant presence at our general meetings has given inspiration and encouragement to all of our efforts.

We are very happy to have Bishop Scarlett with us also and we have accepted the challenge which he gave us, at the May meeting, to especially help meet the needs in our Diocese and one of our pledges, for the coming year, is to assist him in this work.

We refer you to the printed reports for full information about the Auxiliary but would like to call attention to a few features of the general plan.

When the General Convention, in 1919 formed the National Council to replace the Board of Missions, the General Board of Reilgious Education and the Commission on Social Service, the Woman's Auxiliary was made Auxiliary to the National Council and thereby Auxiliary to all its Departments.

Its scope became enlarged and included all work done in the Five Fields of Service, namely the World, the Nation, the Diocese, the Community and the Parish, and any baptized woman who is working for or giving to any of the Church's work in any of the Five Fields becomes automatically a member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Miss Julia Emery, one of the first Secretaries of the Auxiliary stressed that the things taken into account should be "what was best for the work of the whole Church rather than what would most stimulate the interest of the Auxiliary, since before we are members of the Auxiliary we are members of dioceses and parishes" and to quote again, she "would ask both the Board and the Auxiliary to consider whether a real gain might be made if we would emphasize the Auxiliary less as an organization but rather as a reminder, a cooperator, and a vehicle by and through which the general missionary interests of the Church might be strengthened in any and every department of parish life."

Our policy therefore is to stand back of our Bishops and Rectors and especially to help in every possible way to carry out the Church's Program.

In order to do this we have felt that an educational program was very necessary and we were most fortunate in securing Mrs. James H. George as our Diocesan Educational Secretary and through her able direction, untiring efforts, enthusiasm and interesting and instructive talks to groups all through the Diocese, she has strengthened and increased Auxiliary spirit. Her report is printed in full and we urge that it be carefully read and considered. This report explains the important part that Mrs. Rufus D. S. Putney has had in the educational program and also gives an account of two visits from Miss Margaret Marston, National Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our Devotional Secretary, Mrs. George Tittmann, very generously helped with the Educational work before the vacancy, caused by illness of the Educational Secretary, was filled by the appointment of Mrs. George, and in her own department arranged for a very helpful and inspiring Quiet Day conducted by the Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, last year and for another one very much enjoyed, conducted by the Rev. Alfred I. Newbery of Chicago, this December. There are Devotional Secretaries in 26 Parishes and these Secretaries with Mrs. Tittmann's suggestions and guidance have "assisted in promoting special services throughout the Church year and have helped in the development of classes in Personal Religion and in organizing prayer groups."

Mrs. Robert Burkham, our First Vice-President, felt obliged to resign on account of her position on the National Board, which necessitated constant absences from our Diocesan meetings, but she remains, at our request, during her term of office, Ex-Officio, member of our Board.

We are pleased to announce that the Advance work of our Diocese is being carried on through our Woman's Auxiliary and while the pressing needs of our own Diocese are requiring our special attention, we are not unmindful of the command "Go ye into all the world," and the greater part of our Advance Work pledge of \$2,700 is being given for the heating plant in a hospital in Wuchang, China.

Our Parishes have been brought into closer co-operation with each other and with the Board, by Discussion Groups made up of parish officers and members of the Executive Board and the policies of the Auxiliary, even to the Budget, have been largely determined at these group meetings.

We were asked by the National Office to lay special stress on our Social Service Department and here again discussion groups and the use of a small executive committee have contributed greatly to the better and fairer distribution of our Social Service budget. Under Mrs. C. C. Pangman's fine leadership this department is enlarging and increasing its influence, not only in our own Church but also by co-operating with civic agencies in St. Louis, and most important of all—it is through this department that the younger women of the Church are becoming interested in Auxiliary work.

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It was a matter of keen regret to every member of the Board when our former Church Periodical Club Secretary, Mrs. Albert A. Boettler's term of office expired and we are most grateful to her for the exceedingly valuable service she rendered to the Auxiliary. We are fortunate however, in having in our new Secretary, Mrs. Edwin Strassburger, another devoted and capable head for this branch of the work, which is a most important one.

Our Supply Secretary, Mrs. W. S. Mason has gone on very quietly but most efficiently with her work and has a fine report to give.

And our United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Herbert M. Edmunds, has every reason to feel pleased with the result of her labors and the offering this Diocese will present at the Triennial in September.

Our Treasurer, Mrs. Franklin Leavitt, has served faithfully and well for three years and her patience and kindness have endeared her to all her fellow workers and it is with real regret that we see her leave the Board because of the expiration of her term of office. She carries with her grateful thanks for and keen appreciation of the unselfish service she has given the Auxiliary.

It was a great loss to the Board when Miss Amy Chandler, the Second Vice-President, was obliged to resign, on account of ill health.

And we also accepted most reluctantly Miss Evelyn Stewart's resignation when she found that prolonged absence from the City would make it impossible for her to continue to serve as Recording Secretary.

We are greatly indebted to Miss Stewart for the arduous task she performed in compiling a very successful Cook Book, the proceeds from the sale of which are to be used by the Board, as a Discretionary Fund.

Our Representatives at Large, Mrs. Wm. H. Burritt, Mrs. George T. Peckham and Miss Martha Zimmerman have all rendered valuable service, Mrs. Burritt as Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, Mrs. Peckham representing the Spirit of Missions, and Miss Zimmerman in Charge of the Surgical Dressings at St. Luke's Hospital. Miss Edna Gamble is helping, as Vice-Chairman, with this work most successfully. The Board has just received the resignation of Miss Zimmerman, from her office and it is with great regret that we release her from this work which she has carried on so well.

The Endowment and Memorial Gifts Fund has received an additional gift from Mrs. W. C. Rumsey this past year. The interest only from this Fund may be used for special Auxiliary work and the Fund itself is taken charge of by a Board of Trustees, elected for that purpose.

Three Delegates went to the Synod meeting in Little Rock, and received both help and inspiration from that meeting.

We are happy to report that our Provincial President, Mrs. John C. Tolman is planning to be with us at our Annual meeting and will tell us some things about the Seventh Province and also about our Synod pledge, which comes in May, and is for the Helen Dunlop School for girls in Winslow, Arkansas. During the summer, it is also used for Conferences of young people and others. You have already heard that the next meeting of the Synod is to be in St. Louis in 1932.

I cannot close without a word of appreciation of our Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Walter E. Bryan. She came onto the Board with no previous knowledge of Auxiliary work and has taken hold with great ability and much interest and has already become one of the most valued members.

Report of the Educational Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary

This report covers only the last eight months, the period during which I have held the office of Diocesan Educational Secretary. In order to allow time for preparation for the active season in the fall, a meeting of the branch Educational Secretaries was held in June, at which plans for the ensuing year were adopted.

The prescribed subject for the year was India. An outstanding feature of this part of the educational program was a diocesan study group, most ably led in a series of six lectures by Mrs. Putney, devoted to this subject. These lectures were attended by representatives from the city and county.

Miss Marston, our National Educational Secretary, gave us an inspiring and informing day at the Tuttle Memorial, Nov. 6th. Her subject was "Educational Methods." On Nov. 7th she gave a program on India at Columbia to sixty women from Macon, Palmyra, Jefferson City and St. Louis.

Turning to my own activities, I was greatly inspired at the beginning of my work by the Racine Conference for Educational Secretaries held May 1st and 2nd. It has proved most helpful to me during the year. I also was greatly aided by the contacts and conferences later at the meeting of the Synod at Little Rock, Arkansas.

I have talked on Religious Education to the following branches: St.James', Macon; St. Augustine's, Maplewood(twice); Grace Church, Kirkwood; Calvary, Columbia; Emmanuel, Webster Groves; and in the city of St. Louis, at St. John's; St. Paul's; the Cathedral Branch, Cathedral; Ascension; St. Elizabeth's Guild, Cathedral and to two circles at the Church of the Redeemer. I have also addressed the G.F.S. at St. Peter's and the G.F.S. at St. Stephen's. Those listed in the Speaker's Bureau have also generously responded to calls by the various branches. Beside these addresses in the regular line of duty, I have talked to a group of young women at the Presbyterian Church in Webster Groves, and also talked on Gandhi to the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church.

I have attended two meetings of the Women's Missionary Federation, and three meetings of the Department of Religious Education of the Diocese. I was one of twelve Auxiliary women who went to Columbia on May 9th, and one of five who went to Monroe City Oct. 8th, each time to attend the District meeting and to help with the program.

In regard to present activities, I would say that at least fourteen of the parish branches are making a consecutive study of India. An index, perhaps, of the interest of the women of the Diocese will be found in the list of titles of books and the number sold. It is as follows: "India Looks to Her Future," 75; "Leaders' Manuals," 30; "India on the March," 50; "The Women's Auxiliary in the Life of the Church," 75; "Is Mahatma Gandhi the Greatest Man of the Age?," 10; "Our Expanding Church," 25.

In closing, I wish to express my deep obligation and my gratitude to Mrs. Shepley, the members of the Board and the other members of the Auxiliary, for their unfailing encouragement and cooperation which have made this work such a joy.

APPENDIX NO. 15.

Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

To the Right Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, Right Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri and Members of the Ninety-second Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew has made some worth-while progress during 1930. As you know, the movement originated in a Young Men's Bible Class at St. James Church in Chicago some forty-seven years ago. It was a young man's organization with an appeal to young men so strong that Chapters were organized in numerous parishes throughout the length and breadth of our land, having two very simple but definite rules—the rule of Prayer and the rule of Service. As the years passed, the members of these Chapters became grown men and a Junior department was formed so that the ranks of the Senior organization could be recruited.

Last fall, however, a reorganization was recommended by the Junior Advisory Committee, meeting at the National Junior Convention held at Oberlin College, Ohio, which recommendationwas approved by the National Committee. Under this reorganization the age limits for Juniors were made from ten to fifteen. Boys and young men sixteen to twenty-four years of age will be known as the Advance Division of the Brotherhood and will be full constitutional members, using the same rule of Prayer and Service—receiving the same Charter and wearing the same membership button as the Senior. Those over twenty-five will be known as Seniors. By this means the young man comes into his own again as in the beginning. They bring the enthusiasm and energy to repeat the success of the early days of the Brotherhood. An Advance Division Chapter has been organized at the Cathedral. The Chapters forming the Missouri Diocesan Assembly are—Cathedral, Emmanuel, St. Philips, St. Luke's, Trinity, St. Michael and St. George's, Holy Communion and St. Stephen's. The officers of the Assembly are:

> Right Rev. F. F. Johnson, Honorary President, Arthur J. Watling, President, James Payne, First Vice-President, K. Sturdivant, Second Vice-President. Charles J. Miller, Treasurer, John I. Robertson, Secretary, Rev. Sumner Walters, Chaplain.

The downtown noonday Lenten services will be handled this Lent the same as last year. They are held in the Cathedral from 12:05 noon to 12:30, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew having charge the first part of Lent and the Church Federation the last three weeks.

We wish to thank the Church people of St. Lou's for their kind contribution to the support of the Brotherhood of this Diocese.

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APPENDIX NO. 16.

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Report of the Episcopal Home for Children.

The year 1930 which has just closed witnessed a number of changes in our Home which we believe represent real progress. Realizing that our physical equipment and our methods were equally out of date, our Board entered, two years ago, upon a program of reconstruction which is now beginning to show results.

While awaiting a court decision as to our right to sell the present property, we are facing the necessity of deciding upon the future policy of this Institution: shall we continue the same type of Home? If so, should it be in the city or the country? Are we duplicating the work of other organizations? What is our place in the child welfare program of this community? The Executive Board, conscious of the tremendous importance of this step, requested the appointment of a committee to make a study of the community and our relations to the program. This committee, consisting of Bishop Scarlett, Dr. Block, Mr. George, Mr. Bloy, Dr. Clopton, Mr. Pangman, with the president and four members of the Board, have begun their investigations and their report will be readily received.

In the meantime, while realizing the handicaps of our present equipment, we have gone steadily on with the program of child care and training which we feel is a worth-while contribution to the community, and which does in some measure compensate for the loss of home and family life which these children have experienced. The moral and spiritual training of the children; the development of good habits; their physical welfare; their school work are all a part of our daily program. We believe that everything possible must be done to prevent illness, and to build up strong bodies, so particular attention is paid to diet, recreation etc. Complete physical examinations are held at intervals and special care given to underweight children. We are most grateful to Dr. Riley for his efficient and generous ministrations to our children and also for the splendid service rendered by the other doctors on the staff.

A young student who has made his home with us this winter has helped to bridge the gap between the life of the Home and the community and has added to the normal recreational program. We have had the use of the swimming pool at Tuttle Memorial on Saturday mornings and nearly all the children have learned to swim.

Our children attend Sunday School at the Cathedral and enjoy many privileges which go with such membership. Our much loved chaplain, Canon Small, comes to us once each week for a service and visit and is welcomed as a member of our family, a relationship which will be of great value to the children in the future.

The order from the fire department, condemning the third floor has limited our intake since 1929 but during the past year all applications have received careful consideration through our department of social service. A full report of Miss Hodgdon's work follows:

There were 100 applications for admission received. Of this number 71 were referred to another agency without investigation; 20 were referred after a partial investigation indicated that they could be better cared for elsewhere. Eleven children of eight families were dismissed, and fourteen children of nine families were accepted.

The family status of the children under our care is interesting and might indicate the diversified problems which we are asked to treat. We have only one child who is a full orphan; 8 of the children have only a father living, and 5 have only a mother living. 14 are from homes broken by either divorce or separation of the parents.

We have 6 children from homes where there is a step-parent and it has not been possible to return them to the family group. The 34 children under our care in the Home represent 17 families, 2 children are being supervised outside the Home; and contact is maintained with about 4 or 5 other children or their families, who were formerly in the Home.

During the year only one application for admission to Brittain Hall was received and accepted. 4 boys have left the Hall this year as other plans have been made for them. There are 7 boys in residence as 1930 closes. Three of these boys are full orphans; two half orphans and two are from homes broken by divorce or separation. They represent four additional families as three of the boys are related to children in the Home.

Our children, of course, attend public school but we have found in individual cases where the age limit has been reached before graduation from high school or where for other reasons a child will probably not be able to enter high school, there is an urgent need for vocational training. Our present income does not permit us to extend this kind of aid and we have decided to present to the Church in the near future, a plan for an educational fund to be used exclusively for this purpose.

There are certain children, who after careful study, are found unable to adjust to the group life of an institution and who are recommended by the specialist whom we consult, for foster home placement. Again our limited funds do not provide for this work and we are obliged to surrender the supervision of our children to another agency. This, in the case of children baptized or confirmed in the Church, we feel is a failure to fulfill our obligations and we are planning for a boarding home fund to enable us to care for our children in Church homes.

We are asking our Board members and friends to keep in mind that a fund of \$120 will endow a bed in the Home and suggesting that on anniversaries or memorial days a gift be made to one of these funds.

It was my very good fortune to be invited by President Hoover to attend the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection, held in Washington, the third of its kind to take place in the U.S. and I wish to record my appreciation of the kindness of our Board in sending me. It was a privilege and certainly an inspiration and help.

Our Home sustained a great loss in the recent death of our beloved secretary, Mrs. Fred Armstrong, whose devotion to our work was untiring and whose ability and excellent judgment will be sadly missed in our councils.

It has been an honor and a privilege to serve the Episcopal Home for Children as its president. I feel that we can be justly proud of the progress we have made and look confidently to the future for the realization of many of our hopes. I take this opportunity to thank the members of the Advisory Board and the Board of Managers for their devoted and loyal service.

Report of Secretary, Episcopal Home for Children.

The Eighty-eighth annual report of the Secretary of the Board of Managers to the Bishop of Missouri and members of the corporation of the Episcopal Home for Children. The Board has held its four regular meetings of the year, the Executive Committee its semimonthly meetings and the four Standing Committees have met at least once a month.

Under the able management of Deaconess Affleck and her well-chosen assistants we feel that the children have had unusual advantages. We regret very much that Miss Baylor was unable to remain with us longer, as she had a most happy way of winning the confidence and affection of the children.

The Deaconess has introduced some valuable changes, such as the plan of school visiting, each supervisor visiting the school on matters relating to her particular group. Also the plan of allowing the older girls some choice in the purchasing of their own clothing, within of course, a stated price limit.

There being no serious illness among the children last summer, the infirmary under the name of the "Boys Cottage," was used by the boys as a temporary dwelling place and they took great pride in keeping it neat and clean, and the windows were made attractive with house plants.

Many improvements were made in the Chapel under the supervision of Mrs. F. F. Johnson. Several handsome pieces of furniture have been given the Home this year, among them a beautiful mahogany library table belonging to the late Dr. Duckworth. An out of town visitor to the Home was Miss Nice, assistant manager of a large orphan home in Chicago, who gave us some valuable suggestions. One which we have adopted, was, small permanent endowments such as memorial bed endowments, for special education and for boarding homes. One gift of \$120 to the Bed Endowment has been received from Miss Ada Winston in memory of the late Miss Alice Lee Hough.

A gift from the Auxiliary of Grace Church, Kirkwood, and two private subscriptions of \$5 each were given for a musical fund. The Young People's Church Service League of St. Michael and St. George's Parish have agreed to give \$5 a month for a year for the same fund.

At the December meeting of the Executive Committee, we had a talk from Mr. Mayo of the Children's Village, Dobbs Ferry, N.Y., and recently from the Child Welfare Conference held in Washington.

The boys at the Home have had the advantage of a resident manual training instructor on most reasonable terms. A month at summer camp, swimming at the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, school picnic, Church School river excursion and tickets to the Municipal Opera, were some of the pleasures, accorded the children. On the 24th of December Mrs. Messick, the president of the Board, gave a delightful Christmas party for the children of the large Home and also Brittain Hall.

In the past year we have sustained a serious loss in the death of our faithful secretary, Mrs. Fred Armstrong, who entered into rest, Wednesday, October 22, after an illness of several months. at the due positioned tinue

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Canon Small as Chaplain, continues faithfully to administer to the children's spiritual needs and visits the Home every week.

With the exception of a few cases of scarlet fever and measles at the end of the year, our health record has been remarkably good due partly to the watchful care of the Deaconess and her staff and also to the supervision of Dr. Riley and Dr. Hobart, who still continue to give their services to the Home most graciously.

The average number of children has been 37 in the big Home and 9 at Brittain Hall.

In many ways 1930 has been a successful year, but we hope for even better things in 1931.

Report of the Girls Friendly Society.

The Girls Friendly Society in the Diocese of Missouri reports as of January 1, 1931, branches in the following parishes, Grace Church, Kirkwood, Church of the Redeemer, Prince of Peace, St. Alban's, St. John's, St. Peter's, St. Stephen's and St. Paul's, Overland.

The Annual Quiet Hour and Supper was held on March 23rd, at the Church of the Holy Communion, where a beautiful service of meditation was conducted by Father Hohenschild.

The branches carried on work apportioned them by the Woman's Auxiliary for the Mission box. They also made gifts of money to the special Girls Friendly Mission object, the purchase of some church property for St. Andrew's Mission, Mayaguez, Porto Rico. There was a mission tea at St. Peter's Parish House on Sunday, November 30th, when Mrs. George laid the foundations for a general study of India throughout all the individual branches.

Every branch has done social service work of one kind or another. Girls have visited the City Sanitarium, adopted a special patient, doing things for her comfort as well as visiting her regularly. Some of the branches work for Deaconess Brainerd and others have taken under-privileged families to provide necessities as well as luxuries for the holidays.

There were eleven members and associates from the Diocese of Missouri at the Girls Friendly National Council in Chicago in October. The benefit derived from the contacts with the larger phase of the work has already been demonstrated in the wider viewpoints of those who attended and cannot fail to be of inestimable worth to the entire membership.

Report of Southern Convocation.

The Dean of the Southern Convocation begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1930.

Of the eight parishes within the limits of our Convocation, four are without rectors, namely DeSoto, St. Charles, Affton, and Cape Girardeau; but at Affton services are being conducted by Rev. Francis Bloy.

Of the seventeen missions, Rolla, Cuba, Salem, and St. James are under the care of Rev. H. N. Tragitt. Overland, under the energetic lead of Rev. Donald Veale, is happy in the prospect of a new church and parish building almost completed at a cost of about \$42,000. The people at Valley Park, though sadly distressed at the loss of their former leader, Mr. Richard Kopplin, who died suddenly in December a short time before the date which had been set for his ordination, are working courageously under the leadership of Mr. Kopplin's son, David, assisted by his mother and by a band of workers from Emmanuel Church. Rev. Frank Maples is still doing excellent work with the people of St. Augustine's Mission, and is enjoying the use of a commodious rectory secured during the past year with the help of the Bishop Tuttle Extension Fund. The other missions are without resident ministers in charge, but are receiving from time to time such ministrations as can be given them by Bishop Scarlett and by those of the clergy who are able to volunteer their services.

In May the Convocation met at Overland where it received a most cordial welcome. The program was enjoyed by clergy and laity alike. On October 28, 29, and 30 the Northern and Southern Convocations held a joint session at Louisiana. Members of the two Convocations enjoyed the hospitality of the people of Louisiana, the interesting discussions at the afternoon meetings, and the delightful services at Calvary Church.

A committee was appointed to draw up resolutions with reference to the death of Rev. F. M. Weddell, who for many years had been a faithful member of the Southern Convocation, whose saintly life had been an inspiration to all who knew him.
