

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Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Unfinished Business.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward

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at the calling of their names and deposit their ballot. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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Journal of the Eighty-Eighth Convention

OF THE

Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, Tuesday, January 25, 1927.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-eighth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on January 25, 1927, at 9:00 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Rev. David Coombs read the Gospel, and the Rev. Thomas L. Small read the Epistle. The Rev. C. E. Remick, the Rev. Roy S. Rawson and the Rev. Walter G. Harter assisted in the ministration.

The Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix I.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Schuyler Memorial House with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-nine who were entitled to vote, twenty-five were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 16.)

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the forty-seven Parishes and Missions of the Diocese who were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-seven were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

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The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese by the unanimous vote of the Convention.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

It was ordered that the first four items in the Order of Business be stricken out.

It was ordered that two new items be added to the Order of Business to be known as Items 1 and 2, as follows:

- (1) Adoption of the Rules of Order;
- (2) The Bishop's address;

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That the remaining items in the Order of Business be renumbered in accordance.

The Bishop appointed a Committee on the Dispatch of Business as follows:

The Rev. L. H. Nugent and Mr. Roy Campbell.

It was ordered that a special committee be appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's address referring to the Bishops' Crusade in this Diocese and to report to this Convention.

A Nominating Committee was elected as follows:

The Rev. L. H. Nugent, the Rev. James H. George, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, Mr. A. J. Watling, and Mr. E. A. Logan.

The report of the Treasurer of the Diocese on the General Expense Fund was received and filed. (Appendix 2.)

It was ordered that the Convention convene each morning at 9 o'clock, beginning the session with Morning Prayer; that a recess be taken from 1 p. m. until 2 p. m. for luncheon; and that it adjourn each day at 5 p. m.

The reports of the Treasurer of the Diocese on the following named Funds were received and filed:

Church Program Fund. (Appendix 3.)

Theological Education Fund. (Appendix 4.)

Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 5.)

The report of the Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate was received and filed. (Appendix 6.) The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan Council, with appended resolutions, which was received and filed. (Appendix 7.)

Resolution No. 1 pertaining to appropriating funds for the General Expenses of the Diocese in the Diocesan Council report was adopted.

It was ordered that a resolution proposed by certain Clergy of the Diocese pertaining to a 50-50 division of the Church Program Fund be made the Order of the Day for Wednesday at 10 a. m.

Noon Day Prayers were read by the Rev. Dr. Davis.

The foregoing Order of the Day for 10 a.m. Wednesday was reconsidered and cancelled.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 3, which was unanimously adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

WHEREAS, At a Conference held in St. Louis January 17, 1927, at which twenty-three of the Clergy of the Diocese were present, the question of the Church's Program for 1927 was thoroughly discussed, and as a result of the discussion, it was unanimously agreed that it was generally understood in all parts of the Diocese that pledges solicited for the Church's Program of 1927 had been solicited on a fifty-fifty basis of division as between the Diocese and the General Church; and a Committee was appointed at the said Conference and was asked to respectfully request of the Diocesan Convention the adoption of the following resolution, therefore,

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Convention hereby adopts the fifty-fifty basis of division and directs the Treasurer of the Diocese to divide all money received on account of the Church's Program, one-half to the Diocese and one-half to the General Church, during the year 1927.

Resolution No. 2 in the Diocesan Council Report was adopted, as amended, the amendments being made by the Secretary in the original text.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p. m.

The Rev. Dr. Block presented the report on the Department of Religious Education of the Diocesan Council, which was received and filed as a part of the Diocesan Council report. (Appendix 7.)

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 5, to amend the Canons of the Diocese, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

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Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That a new Canon, to be called Canon 31, be adopted as follows:

Canon 31.

The Examining Chaplains elected by the Convention on nomination of the Bishop pursuant to the Canons of the General Convention, shall hold office for a term of one year, or until their successors are elected.

A report of the Trust Funds held by the Bishop was received and filed. (Appendix 8.)

Under a previous order providing for the appointment of a Committee on the Bishops' Crusade in this Diocese, the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

The Rev. H. H. Marsden, the Rev. H. S. Ablewhite, the Rev. Dr. Karl M. Block, Mr. Harry Rhodes and Mr. E. G. Lasar.

The tellers for the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Dean Scarlett elected a member of the Diocesan Council.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one Clerical member and two Lay members of the Diocesan Council, and given into the hands of the tellers.

Prof. H. M. Gass of the University of the South addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Tragitt introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 6.

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WHEREAS, This Convention has learned with great interest of the proposed plan of the University of the South to raise a two million dollar fund for expansion of the University;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, that we commend this effort on the part of the authorities of the University to increase the usefulness of the University to the Church and to the cause of education, and pledge our interest in, and prayers for the success of the campaign.

The Bishop read a letter from the President of the National Federation of Church Clubs of the United States, as a matter of information.

The tellers for the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. R. C. Beckett and Mr. W. J. G. Neun elected members of the Diocesan Council.

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The ballots of the Convention were cast for one Clerical member of the Diocesan Council and given into the hands of the tellers.

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The tellers for the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Mr. White elected a member of the Diocesan Council.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Vincent L. Price as Treasurer of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. H. H. Marsden and Mr. F. G. Williamson as delegates to the Provincial Synod, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Mr. Jones was nominated for membership on the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Judge Biggs, Mr. Lynton T. Block and Mr. Frank C. Thompson, as members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three Clerical members of the Standing Committee, and given into the hands of the tellers.

It was ordered that a report from the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council on the matter of raising funds for the Church Program Budget be made the Order of the Day for Wednesday at 10 a. m.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Frank C. Thompson, Mr. Charles J. Miller and Mr. John G. Lonsdale, as Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Dr. J. J. Wilkins, Mr. S. G. Sutherland and Mr. W. L. Henry, as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

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The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. B. E. Reed, Mr. Thomas Q. Dix and Mr. George C. Mackay, as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Dr. Carroll M. Davis, Mr. John G. Lonsdale and Mr. R. L. Orcutt, as Trustees of the University of the South, and the Bishop declared them elected.

On nomination of the Bishop, acting under the provisions of Article XI of the Constitution of the Diocese, the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Judge George C. Hitchcock, as Chancellor of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

By authority of the Convention, the Bishop appointed the Rev. Edmund Duckworth and the Rev. Dr. Carroll M. Davis, on that part of the Bishop's address referring to the death of the Rev. George A. Chambers and the Rev. Dr. James H. Cloud.

The Bishop appointed the following named members on the Committee on the Church Pension Fund:

The Rev. Dr. J. J. Wilkins, the Rev. Dr. Edward S. Travers, Mr. C. H. Middleton, Mr. James A. Waterworth and Mr. J. Herndon Smith.

It was ordered that a Committee be appointed to consider the matter of having a Diocesan Get-Together Meeting on the evening preceding the next Diocesan Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Dean William Scarlett, the Rev. J. Courtney Jones and the Rev. Edmund Duckworth elected members of the Standing Committee.

Judge Biggs presented his report as Secretary of the Standing Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 9.)

Judge Biggs presented his report as Secretary of the Parochial Trust Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 10.)

Mr. A. T. Cotsworth presented his report as Secretary of the League of Lay Readers, which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

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SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, Wednesday, January 26, 1927.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 9:00 a.m. Morning Prayer was read by the Rev. Mr. Wilcox. The minutes of the first day were read and approved.

The Bishop announced that Resolution No. 4, amending Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution of the Diocese, had not been adopted in the manner required by the Constitution.

Resolution No. 4, amending Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution, was finally adopted by a vote by orders in accordance with provisions of Section 4 of Article X of the Constitution, and received the unanimous vote of each order, voting separately, and is set forth in full as follows:

Resolution No. 4.

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RESOLVED, That Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution of the Diocese as amended and approved at the Convention of 1926 be adopted as follows:

Section 2. Every Clergyman in regular standing, who shall have been for six months actually and canonically resident in this Diocese, shall be entitled to a seat and vote in the Convention; provided, that he shall have been admitted, and at the time of the Convention shall be actually settled as a Rector, Assistant Rector or Assistant Minister of some Parish in union with the Convention of this Diocese, or shall be a Missionary under the direction of the Convention and the Bishop, or shall be engaged as an instructor of youth in some Seminary of learning under the auspices of the Church, or in some Parochial School within the Diocese, or shall be engaged in an active capacity under the direction of the General Church, provided further that in this last case, actual residence shall not be required at the time of the annual Convention, though actual residence must have been acquired under the previous clause of this section.

The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor introduced Resolution No. 7, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That all clergy connected with the Diocese of Missouri for a period less than six months be given seats and voice in this convention.

The Order of the Day was suspended and the Rev. Dr. Davis spoke on the American Church Building Fund.

The report of Mrs. Robert Burkham, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, was made the Order of the Day for 11:15 a. m.

The Committee to prepare plans for raising funds for the National Church, of which Dean Scarlett was Chairman, whose appointment was entered in the records of the Diocesan Council on June 8, 1926, was appointed as a Special Committee of this Convention to continue its work.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 8, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That we, the representatives of the parishes and missions of the Diocese of Missouri in convention assembled, offer our support and co-operation to the finance authorities of the Diocese to the end that the full amount may be raised for the Church Program Budget for 1927.

The Rev. Mr. George presented his report as Superintendent to the City Institutions, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

Mrs. Burkham presented her report as President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, which was received and filed. (Appendix 13.)

Mr. Lester Martin addressed the Convention on the subject of proposed campaign to raise \$25,000.00 for the Student Work at Columbia.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 9, as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

BE IT RESOLVED, That this Convention expresses its very great interest in the work of the Church at Columbia, Mo., and pledges its active co-operation in the effort to raise \$25,000 for student work at Columbia.

The above resolution was adopted and referred to the following named Committee, appointed by the Bishop:

The Rev. L. H. Nugent, the Rev. James H. George and the Rev. Dr. Karl M. Block.

Noon Day Prayers were read by the Rev. Mr. Warner.

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The Rev. Mr. Jones for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of Resolution No. 5, providing for a new Canon, to be known as Canon 31, which was adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders, voting separately, under the provisions of Section 4 of Article X of the Constitution.

Mr. Roy Campbell presented his report as Business Manager of the Church News, which was received and filed. (Appendix 14.)

The Rev. Dr. Block introduced Resolution No. 10, as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

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RESOLVED, That each Clergyman in this Diocese promise to conduct or to have conducted in his Parish or Mission within the next two weeks a campaign for subscriptions for the Church News with the aim of getting the News into every home of the Diocese;

And be it resolved further, that an immediate roll call be made with responses from the representatives of the parishes here as to the number of subscriptions they are prepared to underwrite.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p. m.

Resolution No. 10 was adopted.

The Bishop appointed the following named Standing Committees:

Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials:

The Rev. C. E. Remick, Mr. James M. Bull and Mr. A. B. Ambler.

Committee on Constitution and Canons:

The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. C. E. Remick, Mr. George M. Block, Mr. Kent Jarvis and Judge James A. Seddon.

Committee on Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate:

Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. Clinton L. Whittemore and Mr. J. Herndon Smith.

Committee on Unfinished Business:

The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 11, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 11.

The Convention has heard with great pleasure and interest of the plans of the Episcopal Students Association of Columbia for a campaign beginning March 1, 1927, to raise the sum of \$25,000 for the establishment of a student centre at the University of Missouri, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That this Convention heartily endorses the movement and pledges its active support and respectfully requests the Bishop of Missouri to appoint a committee of five laymen and laywomen to co-operate with the Episcopal Students Association Committee in the furthering of this endeavor.

The Bishop, acting under Canon 6 of the Canons of the General Convention, nominated the following named Presbyters to constitute a Board of Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. James Hardin George and the Rev. David Coombs, whose nomination was confirmed by the unanimous vote of the Convention.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 12, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

RESOLVED, That a new Section be approved, for addition to Article X of the Constitution of the Diocese, to be called Section 8, (for adoption at the next Convention), as follows:

Section 8. Whenever a vote by **Orders** shall be required under any provisions of the Constitution or Canons of this Diocese, a rising vote of the Clergy and Lay Delegates, voting separately, may be taken, instead of a vote by roll call, by unanimous consent of the Convention.

The Bishop appointed the following named Committee on the Church News:

The Rev. F. J. Bloy, the Rev. L. H. Nugent and Mr. Roy A. Campbell.

The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor introduced Resolution No. 13, which was adopted as follows:

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WHEREAS, The members of this Convention note with profound regret the absence of one who has been active in the affairs of this Diocese, for many years, James A. Waterworth;

RESOLVED, That that regret be expressed to him, together with our appreciation of his many valuable services, and the hope that he may be able to lead in the affairs of the Church again very soon.

Archdeacon Marsden, Chairman of the Committee to consider that part of the Bishop's Address referring to the Bishops' Crusade in the Diocese, presented the following report:

The Committee to whom was referred that part of the Bishop's address touching "The Follow-up of the Bishops' Crusade," begs leave to offer the following resolution:

Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That this Convention recommends the carrying on of the Bishops' Crusade in various centres of the Diocese through groups of our Diocesan Clergy;

And that a Committee be appointed to formulate plans and de-

vise means for the conduct of the Crusade.

Resolution No. 14 in the foregoing report was adopted, and the Committee was continued to carry out the purposes of the resolution.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth, for the Committee appointed on that part of the Bishop's address, referring to the death of the Rev. James H. Cloud, D.D., and the Rev. George Alexander Chambers, presented memorials.

Following a hymn and prayers, in which all of the members of the Convention who had died during the last year were remembered, these memorials were adopted by a rising vote, and ordered printed on separate pages in the Convention Journal, as follows:

THE REV. JAMES H. CLOUD, D.D.

The Rev. Dr. James H. Cloud was the minister and friend of "the silent people." His ministry in this city covered thirty-four years. As student, teacher and priest he filled his place by diligent study and fervent consecration. Despite his inability to speak he uttered to us all many messages of love and strength. He has now joined that great multitude which no man can number— and with unloosed tongue—he sings the song of the redeemed before the throne of God.

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THE REV. GEORGE ALEXANDER CHAMBERS

The Rev. George Alexander Chambers was a Clergyman in this Diocese for twenty-five years. His Christian life was modest but manifest, void of noise and display, yet bright and beautiful in its influence both in his public and in his private life. He possessed a radiant personality and his face beamed with joy. Its essence was love, which showed itself in sympathy with all kinds of suffering and interest in the welfare of humanity. In him there was nothing morose or gloomy. He was as welcome at a marriage feast as at a funeral, for he carried with him everywhere the inspiration of grateful, exuberant joy.

Such pure and beautiful living powerfully affected others in ever-widening circles, and shall continue to do so. For truly

> Alike are life and death When life in death survives, And its uninterrupted breath Inspires a thousand lives.

Were a star quenched on high,
For ages would its light
Still travelling downward from the sky,
Shine on our mortal sight.

So when a good man dies,
For years beyond our ken
The light he leaves behind him lies
Upon the paths of men.

Under a previous order of the Convention, the Bishop appointed a Committee in the matter of a Diocesan Get-Together Meeting on the evening preceding the next Diocesan Convention, with power to act and arrange such a meeting as they deem best, as follows:

Mr. Campbell introduced Resolution No. 16, which was adopted as follows:

Mr. Campbell introduced Resolution No. 17, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 17.

RESOLVED, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Sexton of the Cathedral the sum of twenty-five dollars for extra janitor work during the Convention.

The Bishop appointed the following named members of the Diocesan Council:

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I h minute Diocese Mrs. Cushing introduced Resolution No. 18, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 18.

WHEREAS, We note with deep gratitude the progress that has been made through the constructive program carried on by the Near East Relief among the Christian peoples in Bible Lands, and we rejoice that we have had part in extending a helping hand to these Christian peoples whose suffering on behalf of their religious faith gives them a right never to be forgotten or neglected by the Christian people of our nation;

AND WHEREAS, 35,000 children of tender age, from whom we hope will come leadership of the Near East, are still under the care of the Near East Relief;

RESOLVED, That we take pleasure in commending the work of the Near East Relief to our churches in the Diocese of Missouri and urge their continued support.

It was ordered that the next Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral.

It was ordered that the Boards of Trustees of St. Luke's Hospital, the Episcopal Orphan's Home and Brittain Hall, be invited to present reports at the next Diocesan Convention.

The Bishop and Secretary were authorized to certify to the correctness of the Minutes of the second day of the Convention.

By request of the Bishop for advice, the Convention approved the hour of 9 a.m. for the opening of the next Convention.

After the singing of the Gloria in Excelsis, and the Benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned sine die.

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Bishop's Address to the Eighty-Eighth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Dear Brethren:

We meet in the Eighty-eighth Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri. I bid you loving welcome. Many things are in this big city. But only once each year do we gather corporately to hold fellowship with one another and to take counsel together concerning the well-being of our diocesan life; and our two days of fellowship and conference are quickly spent. I hope that we shall all of us as much as possible withstand the pull of the big city during the hours in which the Convention is in session; that we shall consider that our primary duty is beneath the roof of this Cathedral Church and this Parish House; that we shall try to contribute to this Convention all that we ought, and to get from it all that we can; that we shall feel that we are about the Master's business, and shall let the Master's business have the right of way.

I do not presume to know the complete list of names of those members or associates of our diocesan household who, during the past year, have reached the bound of life and laid their burdens down. Some of you will recognize in the partial list which follows many with whom you were accustomed to take sweet counsel together and with whom you walked in the house of God as friends. As the year was passing, Mr. T. Fitzhugh Turner went, long years a member of the Cathedral Chapter. Dr. George M. Tuttle, also a member of the Cathedral Chapter, was called in the early autumn while he was pleasuring in London—a beloved physician, to whose professional care, many parents in St. Louis were accustomed during many years to entrust the choicest treasures that they have. Mrs. Sarah Miranda Davis, mother of our former Dean, had traveled more than fourscore years and ten when she met the Blessed Master coming to receive her unto Himself and to conduct her to the place prepared, where the many mansions be. Mrs. Lucy Cable Castleman's generous heart is stilled and her generous hand is stayed. She was a long-time member of the Cathedral parish. Miss Julia Hawthorne of Mount Calvary will be specially missed in the meetings and work of the Orphan's Home. Mr. John A. Harrison of Overland, in the prime of life, plunged into the river in utter self-forgetfulness to try to save a drowning girl, and himself was drowned. Mr. William Bagnell, and Mr. Edmund J. Thomas, of the Church of the Holy Communion and Mr. John A. Warner of the Church of the Redeemer, are missed from the convention floor and from boards and committees of the Diocese on which they served faithfully during many years. Mrs. Sarah Meinberg was a member of the Sunday School of the original Grace Church at Twelfth and Warren Streets, St. Louis, when she was seven years old. That was in 1846. Seventy-seven years later, she turned the first sod in the digging of the cellar for the beautiful new Grace Church on the same site. Eighty years she was a worshipper in Grace Church, until in August last she laid aside her earthly tabernacle for the house eternal, in the heavens. Dr. Charles P. Hough, old-time friend of Bishop Tuttle in Montana and many years a vestryman of Grace, Jefferson City; Mr. Lewis W. Berry, vestryman and generous giver in Calvary, Columbia; Mr. Gust J.

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Hamel, forty-one years a vestryman of Trinity, De Soto; Mrs. Bertie Ellis, one of the most helpful of the little band in St. Andrew's Mission, Cuba; Mrs. Sara Adele Gale of the Chancel Guild of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, a saintly soul; Mrs. Alice Dimmick of St. James', Macon, in her eightieth year; Mr. Elon Alonzo Woodward, father of the beloved rector of Palmyra, in his eighty-fourth year; Mr. William J. Wood, of St. Philip's, St. Louis; Miss Cora Forbes, sweet companion for many years of the late Mrs. Garth of Hannibal; Mr. E. F. Elbrecht of St. George's; Mrs. Florence Nightingale Platt, of Ascension Parish Auxiliary, and Mr. Thomas Glazebrook and Mrs. Mary Isaacs Lockwood also of the Ascension; Miss Anna C. Gates, a member in the olden days of the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Louis. who died in Webster Groves; Mrs. Martha Cooper, matron of the Convalescent Home when it was on Leffingwell Avenue; Mrs. Josephine Moller Fiske of St. Augustine's; Miss Emma Owen and Mrs. Ellen Fay of the Church of the Holy Communion; Mr. Peyton H. Skipwith of the Cathedral; Mr. Kinsey D. Mellier, and Mrs. John D. Filley. and Mr. Charles N. Whitehead, President of the Katy Railway, all of St. Peter's, St. Louis—their traveling days are done!

Two of our clergy are gone. A quarter of a century ago, the Rev. George Alexander Chambers came to Missouri from the Missionary District of South Dakota and became the much-loved rector of Grace, Jefferson City. Retiring several years ago from the responsibilities of a parochial cure, Mr. Chambers continued until recently to make his home in Jefferson City. He died suddenly in Boston the week before Christmas in his ninety-first year. The rector of the parish and loving friends and former parishioners laid his body to rest in

the Jefferson City burial ground.

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The Diocese of Missouri and this whole middle section of the map of the United States suffered an irreparable loss in the death of the Rev. Dr. James H. Cloud, last October. Dr. Cloud was nationally known as a wise and sagacious counsellor in all matters related to the moral, intellectual, and spiritual well-being of the deaf. He recently served two terms as President of the National Association for the Deaf. In this city, his principalship for thirty-two years of the St. Louis Day School for the Deaf contributed more than any other single factor to develop educational work among the "silent people" to a point where the splendid facilities now afforded in the beautiful new Gallaudet School on Grand Avenue were required. In Bofinger Chapel and Schuyler Memorial House, and in constant pastoral oversight of his flock, he made St. Thomas' Church for the Deaf in St. Louis the third largest work of its kind in the country. He traveled on regular schedules of missionary activity far outside of Missouri in response to requests of bishops who asked him to help them in spiritual ministrations to the deaf; and everywhere he went, his ministry yielded fruits of faith and hope and love. Dr. Cloud came to St. Louis thirty-four years ago and was ordained to the priesthood here by Bishop Tuttle. When he died, his name was at the top of the list of clergy in active service in the Diocese.

Is there a single person who has been intimately acquainted with the life of the Church in these parts who does not miss Mrs. Garrie Welch Simmons! She served as an officer of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary thirty-four years. Succeeding Mrs. Daniel S. Tuttle as President, she continued in that office seventeen years. She was the Auxiliary's Honorary President since 1916. She loved to be busy in the work and worship of the Church. She loved to give generously toward the Church's support and toward the extension of the Kingdom. And God was very good to her in that He

let her labor on almost to the very end of a long life. Only for a short time was she compelled to deny herself the joy which she had always found in unselfish, active service. Just for a little while she waited with folded hands while others worked. And then the shadows lengthened and the evening came. It was the evening of the day before the blessed Feast of All Saints! And she finished her course in faith and peacefully fell on sleep. We thank God for her sweet friendship and for the good example of her holy life.

"God of the living, in Whose eyes Unveiled Thy whole creation lies, All souls are Thine; we must not say That those are dead who pass away, From this our world of flesh set free; We know them living unto Thee."

I confirmed 506 persons in 1926. In addition to those confirmed, six were received into our communion from the Roman Catholic Church. I baptized six children and one adult. I officiated at six burials. I solemnized four marriages.

We have at present six Postulants and five Candidates for Holy Orders. The record of Candidates during the past ten years is as follows:

St. Luke's Hospital under the management of its competent Board of Directors, and under the superintendency of the Rev. Mr. Putney, with its devoted staff of physicians and surgeons and nurses, has had a wonderful year, both in opportunity to minister to a larger number of sick and bruised and broken and suffering humanity and also in a large number of substantial gifts generously made toward its support. It is a pleasure to see evidences that the Clergy are more and more interesting themselves in its affairs. It ought to be so; for the hospital has from the very beginning greatly interested itself in the affairs of the Clergy. There is scarcely a month in the year that the Bishop or some other Clergyman of our field or some member of the family of some of us is not at St. Luke's. And we know what the hospital does for us. Each one of the Clergy and each member of our families should be a missionary for St. Luke's. I am glad to learn that the St. Luke's Day special offering taken every year in the churches is more and more appealing to our people. And I am grateful for the labor of love which so many of our church women are giving in the surgical dressings room under the chairmanship of Mrs. Francis G. Eaton.

May I ask again that we take more serious thought of our duty to maintain and sustain our Diocesan paper, The Church News? The Rev. Francis J. F. Bloy has carried the responsibility of editing the paper since December, 1923. He took the job because he was drafted—not because he was idle. He took the job under a compelling sense of duty—duty to the Diocese. Mr. Roy Campbell came on the Board in March, 1924, and has worked desperately hard as Business Manager. The Church News is not successful in the same sense that the New York Times is. How should it be? Mr. Bloy is rector of a parish of 450 communicants, and his people must be shepherded. Mr. Campbell has his personal business to look after. These men serve the Diocese as a labor of love. They keep the subscription pages straight, change addresses, (when they are notified), enter new names and discontinue old, revise the mailing lists, prepare

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ied), pare the wrappers monthly, gather in the money, (when the people pay) and pay the bills. And they do it by adding extra hours of labor to days already full. Not until we figure out a way by which Church News can be managed by the Diocese as a business proposition can we hope to see it a business success. But the present Board need offer no apologies. They have gratuitously put into Church News a lot of hard work, and they are continuing to do so. Their labors have merited a friendlier co-operation from all of us than they have received; but I am confident that the lack of co-operation is due to our thoughtlessness and not to our indifference. A year ago the Convention adopted resolutions which greatly encouraged the Board to try to carry on. The St. Louis Clericus, if I remember rightly, offered crumbs of comfort and proffers of a desire to be of help. The Auxiliary, I think, gave (perhaps unofficial) encouragement that co-operation might be expected from that quarter. But the fact seems to be that the Board has had to carry on pretty much alone. Under a cumulative burden of discouragement, all the members told me in early November that I must let them out. Mr. Bloy and Mr. Campbell were moved by my tears as they have often been before, good fellows that they are! and are still doing business at the old stand. Meanwhile, at my request, a considerable number of the Clergy met with Mr. Bloy and Mr. Campbell and me the last week in December to talk things over. Contrition was manifested on the part of several of those present. Confessions of sin were heard in several quarters, and they sounded genuine. Promises of amendment of life were made. A continuation committee was appointed and I hope that some constructive suggestions for a better Church News, growing out of the deliberations of the continuation committee, may come before this Convention. We have the oldest Diocesan paper in the American Church. We ought to take pride in it. We ought to stand by it. We ought to build it up!

St. Michael and All Angels' in the City of St. Louis is doing a splendid piece of construction and expansion under the strong and kindly leadership of its new rector, the Rev. Dr. Block. At St. Philip's, I understand that nearly the whole of a \$15,000 debt on the church property has been paid since the Rev. Hayward S. Ablewhite became rector in October. I hear it rumored that blue prints for a new parish house may be looked for as the next promised exc tement in that bustling parish. A year ago I expressed the hope that a suitable home for the Rev. and Mrs. Carl Reed Taylor might soon be provided on the Grace Church property at Marion Place. I promise myself the pleasure of sitting in a comfy chair by their blazing fireside some evening before winter is over; for the attractive new rectory is almost finished. The new President of the Holy Cross Corporation is Mr. Cevedra D. Blake. I thank him for coming to our help when I told him that we needed him. He has been unofficially interested there during many years. By the way, a new pipe organ will presently be installed in Grace Church. The good people of the congregation - wonderful workers they are - paid half the cost. The other half was given by Mr. Clinton L. Whittemore. Raymond E. Brock came as rector of St. George's, St. Louis, in May. I hear of increased activities in guilds and clubs and organizations of various kinds at St. George's, and of a growing Sunday School.

The Church of the Redeemer has renovated and greatly beautified the interior of its parish house. St. Paul's, Carondelet, has a new furnace—and also a warm and friendly atmosphere in no way accounted for by carbon combustion, but by the Holy Spirit's gracious presence in the midst. The people of St. Stephen's, Ferguson,

have neated up their church and rectory property and at the same time overpaid their quota for the Church's Program. Christ Church Cathedral has raised the funds for a wonderful new Skinner organ in place of the Roosevelt which was installed forty years ago, and at the same time has promised \$2,000 in excess of its Budget Quota for 1927. Grace, Kirkwood, has developed all sorts of activities in its beautiful new parish house, and has had a year of splendid spiritual growth and of satisfactory financial success. Emmanuel, Webster Groves, has paid a mortgage debt. Ascension, St. Louis, has taken on a curate in the person of the Rev. C. D. Lathrop, whose special ambition it is to absorb young people of the Cabanne district into the Church's life and to enlist them in her worship and her work.

The Rev. Henry W. Mizner was assistant at the Cathedral here three years in the beginning of his ministry. In April, 1899, he became rector of St. Paul's, Palmyra. Two years later he succeeded the Rev. Gustavus Tuckerman as Minister of St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis. Mr. Tuckerman handed the mission over to Mr. Mizner with 160 Communicants. Mr. Mizner developed it into a parish 21 years later with 356 Communicants. He resigned the charge of St. Stephen's (also of the Church of the Good Shepherd) in June. We wish him a continuance of happy and fruitful ministry wherever he may go. The Rev. R. S. Rawson has been elected to succeed Mr. Mizner as rector of St. Stephen's.

St. Mary's, St. Louis, is offered for sale. This action was taken by the Diocesan Council after a Committee of the Council had conferred with the Committee of St. Mary's on the probable outcome of continuance of the work. In view of the action taken by the Council, I venture hereby to pronounce St. Mary's Mission deorganized and discontinued. The attractive lot on which St. Mary's parish house stands was purchased about ten years ago. The parish house was built in 1918 under the energetic leadership of the Rev. Linden H. White. It was, of course, hoped, that there was a real service for which St. Mary's was needed in that part of the city; though some doubted, because of the geographical nearness of the Ascension and St. Philip's. The records show that the mission which finally developed into St. Mary's was originally begun in Wellston. The logic of subsequent events suggests that its removal to its present location, long before I came to Missouri, may have been a mistake; for the move created a congestion of churches in the new neighborhood, and left Wellston entirely without a church of our faith.

A Committee of the Department of Missions has investigated conditions at Sherman (Jedburg) and has recommended that our chapel there be sold; which recommendation was approved by the Council. In view of the said action, I venture hereby to pronounce Holy Cross Mission, Sherman, deorganized and discontinued.

I am sure that the whole Diocese joins with me in thanking Mrs. Burkham for her splendid work as President of the Woman's Auxiliary the past three years. The year just closed was the biggest in its history of almost half a century. Mrs. Burkham furnished inspiring leadership. The lesser officers and the parish branches furnished eager co-operation and steady teamwork. And, by the blessing of the Holy Spirit, the thing was done. Mrs. Burkham will make her annual report to the Convention. Under the rule of the Auxiliary which provides for a three-year term, she retires from office this week. We understand that she is sailing soon for an extended Old World visit. We wish her a delightful journey, profitable and happy experiences wherever she may go, and a safe return.

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Four years ago this week, in this place, I spoke my belief that "a true man of God, one who loves the open spaces, one who loves his Master and eagerly seeks opportunity to introduce his fellow-men to Him, ought to experience an unwonted joy in compacting Louisiana and Prairieville and Clarksville into one cure. I persuaded the Rev. David Coombs to come to Pike County. He entirely fitted the specifications. He has compacted the three congregations into one cure, each living -its autonomous lire and each provided with a regular schedule of services and frequent pastoral calls. Friends of the work (with some assistance from discretionary funds in the hands of the Bishop) have presented Mr. Coombs with a Ford sedan. My prophecy that "a whole man for this whole job ought to be more spiritually effective than a third of a man for each third of it" has been justified. If the "group plan" could be undertaken and consecutively continued in several sections of the Diocese, I verily believe that Rural Missouri would experience what Wesley's beautiful old Christmas hymn calls "second birth."

I can hardly express to you how much I wish that the "group method," as operated in Mr. Coomb's field, might be operated in other places. We are living in a new day. In the old days, a pastor who had three or four communities to look after could give quite diligent pastoral attention to the central point, but could do little for the other points except to have a service once a week, or two or three times a month, as the case might be. Practically no pastoral work was possible except at the central point. But in these days of automobile and jitney and bus and railroad, a community twenty miles distant is brought quite near. In the old days, a pastor who had to make the rounds of his parish with horse and buggy often drove to visit families three and four and five miles from the church and rectory. It is easily possible now for a pastor to reach a community twenty miles distant in quicker time and with a greater degree of comfort than, in the old days of horse and buggy travel, he could call on a family four miles away. The "group method" will not yield satisfactory returns if by the "group method" we simply mean a certain number of public services held each month at each point. The personal pastoral touch must be kept constant in each community. The man in charge of the group must whirl himself around the group in such fashion as to make each unit of the group conscious that the pastor has his hand steadily on the whole group, though he may live twenty miles away from some of the centers comprising the group, and thirty or more miles away from some of the families of the group. I do not want to seem to my brethren to be demanding a type of work which requires of them too great a sacrifice. I am confident that if we will accustom ourselves to the idea that twenty miles is no more difficult to travel now than four miles was a few years ago, we can do a piece of work which is much worth while, and can greatly extend and strengthen the Church's influence in the rural sections, and can experience a real thrill in doing it. What I have said applies especially to those portions of the map where good roads are in. I really don't expect my brethren to wallow through twenty miles of Missouri mud and mire in a Ford car, or any other car, and call it fun; even though that kind of hardness would leave us far short of the "perils in the wilderness and perils in the sea" which Paul endured for the furtherance of the Gospel of the Christ!

The Rev. George E. Wharton returned to us in the autumn after an absence of three years in a neighboring diocese. He had been seven years rector of Mexico when he went away. We welcome him home as rector of Jefferson City and missionary of St. Mark's, Portland.

The important post of rector of Calvary parish, Columbia, was filled by the coming to it of the Rev. David R. Haupt, from the Diocese of Minnesota, the week after Christmas. We welcome Mr. Haupt to our assembly. I trust that he will feel that he is among friends. The Missouri State University is at Columbia. Mr. Haupt is especially interested in problems of youth. I think he easily gets the point of view of youth. I anticipate that he will do a whole lot to help build interior braces in the students; to help equip them with special strength for special strain. I am glad that Mr. Haupt is in Columbia.

The Rev. James Hardin George, who retired from ten years' rectorship at Columbia to head up the Church's Mission to the City Institutions in St. Louis, is doing that important duty thoroughly and well, and his friendly personality and optimistic outlook bring joy and gladness to all to whom he ministers. This department of our diocesan missionary work has been greatly strengthened by adding the Rev. J. Malcolm Taylor to the staff during the past year.

Deaconess Sarah H. Sniffen resigned charge of Grace Mission, Herculaneum, last spring. In May, 1915, I found Miss Sniffen in New Hampshire, and asked her to help us as a "ministering woman" in a new missionary enterprise upon which we were embarking in the Lead Belt, where the Episcopal Church was almost unknown. November 21, 1915, I set her apart as a Deaconess. We soon built a combination Deaconess House and Chapel, the St. Joseph Lead Company giving us a spacious lot. Deaconess Sniffen did a notable work at Herculaneum, one which cannot be weighed in any balances or added up on any adding machine. She prepared 54 persons to be confirmed and 129 children and adults to be baptized. At times her health has seriously suffered. I used to ask her not to work so hard. But because there were things to be done that would not be done unless she did them, she went on doing them, often quite beyond the limit of any one woman's strength. The work which started from nothing grew under her direction to a communicant list of 44 and a Sunday School enrollment of 92. The total givings of Grace Mission during her last year there were almost \$1,400, of which nearly \$200 was given for "others." Deaconess Sniffen is now in St. Luke's Hospital. We pray that she may presently be built back to a good degree of her former health and strength. Miss Lucy Pepoon is successfully continuing the work at Herculaneum which Deaconess Sniffen felt compelled to give up.

Archdeacon Marsden has kept himself steadily busy in all corners of our diocesan map during the whole year. Wherever he goes, the people love to have him come. I cannot adequately express my appreciation of the value of his work, both in quantity and in quality. He goes on a regular monthly or bi-monthly schedule to certain pastorless congregations. Wherever there is a vacancy in parish or mission, he throws himself into the emergency. To his influence and industry we owe many of the one hundred per cent quota returns from the rural field in 1926. And, what is better still, his contagious enthusiasm and practical judgment have revived and steadied many a situation which otherwise would have suffered discouragement and disintegration.

Lay Readers have done much to keep the home fires burning. The report of the Diocesan League will tell its tale of times and places. Mr. W. F. D. Batjer (with the help of the Archdeacon) has

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accomplished a really remarkable work at Cape Girardeau for more than a year. In November I confirmed 13 there; all of them brought in through his effective lay evangelism. For a whole year, Mr. Lester Martin, a student at the State University, supplied lay services most acceptably at Calvary, Columbia, the Archdeacon making regular monthly visits to minister the Holy Communion. Mr. A. T. Cotsworth was appointed to conduct lay services at Mount Calvary, St. Louis, the first of October. He found a congregation of eight or ten and has developed it into a congregation of 45 to 55, in which enumeration are included 25 or 30 children from the Episcopal Orphans' Home near by. Mr. C. K. Hitchcock has for several years held together the Sunday School and conducted the Sunday worship at St. Peter's, Bonne Terre.

I have fallen into the habit of speaking of "the Kopplins" in connection with Valley Park; and rightly so, for Mrs. Kopplin is a strong partner in the work. Mr. Kopplin began his lay reading venture there eight years ago. At the end of a year, a Sunday School had been built up from nothing to an enrollment of 18. At the end of eight years, the Sunday School enrollment is above 100 and there is an average attendance of over 80. This is what persistent, patient, plodding, friendly endeavor, in all weathers, has accomplished in one community where the odds seemed all against us. And something more has been accomplished, too. A fine addition has been built to the chapel—we had to have it. A basement has been excavated and walled up and a furnace has been installed. The cost of addition and furnace was \$2,000. All but about \$800 has been raised. I asked Mr. Kopplin where he was going to get that \$800; and he replied, "Oh, it'll come pretty soon!" Yes, I am quite sure it will.

Last summer Bob Plumb, as he is affectionately called, of the Virginia Seminary, did a lot of good as a "Ford car missionary," from De Soto as his base. We were fortunate in being able to place the Rev. Frank Maples in charge, under the Archdeacon, of the Poplar Bluff-Ironton-De Soto group almost immediately after Bob Plumb quit. Mr. Maples is ministering under license of the Bishop while he is on his way into our ministry from the Congregational ministry.

Some of us are aware that the Trustees of old Virginia Seminary have summoned the Rev. J. Courtney Jones to appear at Alexandria in June to receive the Doctor of Divinity degree. We who have learned the depth and accuracy and versatility of his scholarship feel that our brother well merits this distinguished service decoration; and there is not a member of our clergy staff who will not enter personally with him into a real measure of enjoyment of the honor thus conferred upon him.

A special Committee was appointed by the Diocesan Council last summer charged with the responsibility of organizing and putting on the autumn Every-Member Canvass. As a result, there was developed in all parts of the Diocese a desire to be informed of our Whole Duty to the Whole Church; to look that duty squarely in the face; and to contrive the ways and means to get the duty done. I am sure that the report of the special Committee on the Every-Member Canvass will be of interest to every Clerical and Lay Deputy to this Convention. The final report is not yet officially before me. When it comes, if it tells us that what we were out for has been accomplished, namely, that our congregations have reported "expectancies" to pay enough to meet our 1927 liabilities, both to the General Church and to our Diocesan Mission Field, we shall thank God

and take courage. If, on the other hand, probable assets are reported short of the liabilities which we are persuaded that we ought to assume, I earnestly hope that we shall not leave the Convention until we have devised a way. And I pray God that we shall not cut and trim and pare and peel our budget. The amount which the General Church asks of us, (\$36,000.00) is Missouri's equitable share toward the Work of the Whole Church. If we pay less than \$36,000.00 to the General Church, we shall be slackers there; and, as always happens, someone must take up the slack; or, in other words, other dioceses must pay a part of Missouri's bills in addition to their own. And the amount which the Missouri Department of Missions asks of us. (\$36,000.00) is the smallest amount which Missouri can get by with and carry on its present missionary work. I hope it will not be so, but if there should appear a shortage of (say) \$5,000.00 or \$8,000.00 between probable income and probable outgo, surely we can put a Special Gifts Committee in the field to fetch the balance in. I know of many men and women in Missouri who honestly feel that their pledges in the Every-Member Canvass did not represent their whole duty toward the Whole Church, though they may have represented their whole share of the Parish Quota in the parishes in which they are enrolled. And one other word. I hope that there is no likelihood that any of the Clerical or Lay deputies will forget that our appeal for pledges for the 1927 Church Program was everywhere responded to on the expectation that the funds would be divided on the basis of Fifty Percent to the General Church and Fifty Percent to Missouri. I trust that the Convention will commit the Diocese to that basis of division, and no other.

While we are speaking specially of money matters, I want to write into the record my appreciative thanks for the help that Mr. Elias S. Gatch has given us as Vice-Chairman of the Department of Finance. Indeed, we owe much to all the members of the Department, but especially to Mr. Gatch as Vice-Chairman and to Mr. Vincent L. Price, as Treasurer, for a better year than we have had in several years.

Probably some of you, especially the children in the Sunday Schools, are wondering whether I have forgotten that there is a goodly unexpended balance in the Missionary Host Fund, available for my use. No, my dear children, I have not forgotten. And I'll take you into my confidence and tell you what I have thought best to keep as a secret until now. For several years it was my custom each year to use the Missionary Host givings for items of many sorts; a little dab here and a little dab there and a little dab somewhere else. Some checks were for "postage," some for "printing," some for "supplies," some for "traveling expenses," some for "repairs," some for "insurance." There were also matters of greater consequence which were taken care of by the Missionary Host—salaries of missionaries, sick relief, rent of houses of missionaries, pension fund premiums, building projects, relief of the poor. All these were legitimate charges against a fund which was at my discretion for missionary uses.

But here's my secret. A couple of years ago I said to myself, "I wonder how the children who compose the big Missionary Host Army would like to have me use the Missionary Host money for some one fine thing every year?" And the more I thought along that line, the better I liked the idea. What I've really had in mind is a special "Missionary Host Worker," perhaps a man, perhaps a woman. Just as the Woman's Auxiliary has what is called a "United Thank"

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Offering Worker' somewhere in the mission field of the Church, so it occurred to me that we might have a "Missionary Host Worker" somewhere in the mission field of Missouri. I hope that the children of the Missionary Host will like my idea. If you do, you will bring along your big and generous offering in 1927, just as big and generous offerings have been brought by the Missionary Host for more than fifty years. And I'll keep busy trying to find someone to do this special kind of work. And when another year rolls round, and we have our annual rally, perhaps I can say to the big assembled crowd, "Children of the Missionary Host, I have brought with me today our special Missionary Host Missionary, who works in such and such a part of Missouri and whose work is chiefly supported by your offerings!" That's what I have in mind. I hope you'll like the plan. Perhaps we can't make it go. We never know what we can do till we try. If it does go, I think we'll get quite a thrill out of it. If it doesn't go, we'll try to think up something else. The whole point is, Won't it be great to look at some definite, important work accomplished in the Diocese—something really worth while—and to say, "The Missionary Host did that!" Now I've told you my secret. And now you know that I didn't leave all that balance in the bank because I didn't know where to spend it; but because I was planning this bigger thing that I have just talked to you about.

I have had to speak again in opposition to methods of raising money for Church purposes which do not seem to me to be quite There is no surer way to blight the spiritual life of a congreright. gation and to postpone the day of generous, glad givings, each according to his ability, for Church support, than "short and easy" popular schemes for raising funds. I hope that my brethren of the Clergy will be watchful that doubtful methods of financing the Lord's treasury do not creep in unawares in the congregations committed to their charge. It has come to my notice that the suggestion is now and then made that some piece of fancy work should be raffled; that "chances" should be sold on a quilt or other piece of merchandise. I hope that such means of raising money need not be resorted to in this Diocese. To sell articles of real value to persons who see real value in them, and for a fair price which is agreed upon, and to put the proceeds of the sale into the Church's income is just as dignified now as was the sale of lands and houses in the early days by those who brought the price of the things that were sold and laid them down at the Apostles' feet. But there's a difference between selling an article and "selling chances" on it. And we of the Clergy are expected to sense the difference and to call attention to it-courteously, of course.

Canon 6 of the General Convention requires that the Bishop nominate at least two learned Presbyters as a Board of Examining Chaplains, the nomination to be confirmed by the vote of the Diocesan Convention. The Canon of the General Church further provides that "their term of office shall be fixed by Diocesan Canons." I have searched diligently and do not find any reference to Examining Chaplains in our Diocesan Canons. I suggest to the Convention the propriety of adopting a Canon on this point.

In the Diocesan Convention of a year ago, at the close of my address, I spoke of a resolution proposed for the revision of the Communion Office, which failed of adoption by the General Convention of 1925; namely, a resolution which provided that, under certain circumstances, a portion of the consecrated Bread and Wine remaining after Communion might be reserved for communicating

of the sick or absent. I said that I was aware that there were members of our staff and many throughout the Church who had hoped that the proposed amendment (or something like it) would be adopted. I said that those who desired the proposed amendment were now in the position of having asked legislation which the Church had declined to provide. And I closed by affectionately requesting that the rule in this matter as now contained in the Revision of 1925, "published by authority of General Convention," should be observed in all the churches of our Diocese.

Since the Diocesan Convention of a year ago, one who has a perfect right to want to know my mind in matters which have to do with the "Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of this Church," has asked me whether it is my godly judgment that reservation of the consecrated Bread and Wine is a thing not lawful in this Church; and ventured the opinion that "it is permitted under the rubrics." The question raised has to be answered. My reply is that this specific question was introduced in the General Convention of 1925, and by vote determined there. That decides the question for me for the present. I see no path of duty but to abide by the decision and to obey the law.

If anyone says that reservation of the consecrated elements is "permitted under the rubrics," my reply must be that the General Convention adopted a rubric in 1925 which says the contrary; namely, that "if any of the consecrated Bread and Wine remain after the Communion, it shall not be carried out of the Church." (See Revised Book, Edition A, page 77.) I am not able to interpret "It shall not be carried out" to mean, "It may be carried out." The same rule directs that the Minister and others shall "reverently eat and drink" the consecrated Bread and Wine remaining. I am not able to interpret that to mean "It may remain upon the Holy Table, or be placed in a receptacle within the sanctuary or elsewhere in the Church." Replying to the direct question which has been put to me during the past year, in my judgment the reservation of "consecrated Bread and Wine" remaining after the Communion is not lawful in this Church. Not only has no permission been given; but—whether for better or for worse I do not know—permission has been denied.

For the benefit of Clergy and others who have not a Journal of General Convention at hand, I print below the official record touching the resolution to which I have referred:

Message No. 124 of the House of Bishops.

October 22, 1925.

The House of Bishops informs the House of Deputies that it has adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the following change be made in the Order for the Administration of the Holy Communion and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses in order that it may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with the provisions of Article X of the Constitution.

Add to second rubric of Prayer Book, page 240, the following:

But note that, subject to the regulation of the Bishop, the priest may reserve so much of the Consecrated Bread and Wine as may be required for the Communion of the Sick and of others who could not be present at the services in the Church.

The House of Deputies did not concur in the foregoing Message.

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The above is copied from the Journal of the General Convention, 1925, page 430. At the bottom of page 395 and the top of page 396 of the same Journal is the record of how this resolution originated. The Rt. Rev. Arthur C. A. Hall, D.D., Bishop of Vermont, presented it. The proposal was adopted, by a good majority as I remember it, in the House of Bishops. The House of Deputies did not concur. It is interesting to note that the Bishop of Vermont, who himself desires reservation for Communion but not for any other use, and who himself presented the resolution in the House of Bishops which failed of confirmation in the House of Deputies, returned from the General Convention to his diocese and printed in the Vermont Diocesan Paper, ("The Mountain Echo"), January, 1926, a letter in which, among other things, he says:

"The question cannot be said to be the same after this Convention as it was before......

"Those of us who desired authoritative recognition of Reservation for Communion must in my judgment submit our practice to the actual rule of the Church, and not take for granted permission where none has been granted (but on the contrary refused); we can only go beyond the provisions of the Prayer Book in cases of emergency, where no law applies."

I again request that the rule of the Church in this matter as contained in the Revision of 1925, published by General Convention, may be observed in all the churches of our Diocese. And in the whole matter of the Revised Book now "authorized for use in churches," I do again earnestly request my brethren of the Clergy to co-operate with me in a deliberate purpose to prove our loyalty to the Church's rule. Someone has rightly said that "no one is prepared to govern who has not learned to obey." And I recall that it is even recorded of the Lord Jesus that He was not "highly exalted" until He had first "learned obedience." How shall we of the Clergy lead our people, by precept or example, in a day when we see all about us such alarming disregard of the law of the land, if we disregard the law of the Church, whose commissioned officers we are?

The Bishop's Crusade, by arrangement of the local committee, was brought to Missouri last week. Through the kind courtesy of the Rev. Dr. Travers, the afternoon and evening sessions were held in St. Peter's Church. A report of it does not properly belong among the things which happened in 1926. But before the impression blurs, I want to make acknowledgement of my own deep sense of obligation to Dr. Joseph Fort Newton for what he did for us. From the abundant treasure of his own rich and varied spiritual struggles and experiences, he brought forth things new and old, instructing us unto the kingdom of heaven. We who heard him every time he spoke, can never again be just what we were before; can never in the future be what we would be if he had not come and spoken unto us with such rare insight, with such consummate skill and beauty of utterance, and with such strength of conviction. Yes; responsibility treads always close upon the heels of privilege. If we know these things, happy are we if we do them. Will the Convention express itself on the question of carrying the Crusade, through groups of our diocesan clergy, to various parts of the Diocese? Will the Convention appoint a Committee to confer together on this matter today and to report tomorrow? And will the Convention embody in a resolution and send to Dr. Newton and his co-worker, the Rev. Mr. McHenry, our appreciative thanks for what they did for us?

Scarcely a week passes that someone does not enquire of me when the building of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial will begin. I am glad to say that my understanding of it is that bids are now being asked for on the basis of plans and specifications submitted by the architects. I hope, with all those who made pledges, that the Memorial will presently take visible form, and that it will prove to be not wholly unworthy of the life of our late great Bishop, and of his unique service to this City and this State and this Nation. Ninety years ago tomorrow he was born.

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the knowledge of the love of God, and the communion and fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all in this Annual Convention. Amen.

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Report of the Department of Religious Education for the Year of 1926.

The first duty devolving upon your Vice-Chairman at the time of his appointment, was the organization of a Department qualified to stimulate effort along general and special lines parallel to those developed by our National Department of Christian Education. Through the generous action of the Diocesan Council, we were authorized to add to our numbers such persons as might be needed to act as chairmen of various sub-committees:

Church Schools.
Young People's Societies.
Schools and Colleges.
Adult Bible Classes.
Teacher Training.
Week-Day Classes and Cooperation with the Public Schools.
Theological Education and Summer Schools.
Pageantry and Cooperation with the Woman's Auxiliary.

As we were quite ignorant of the situation which confronted us, questionnaires were sent out to determine the condition of our Church Schools, a blank copy of which is filed with this report. It deals with such matters as enrollment, attendance, courses of study or instruction, finance, Teacher Training, etc. A second questionnaire requested names of students attending boarding schools and colleges. The material was gathered together and upon the results of these questionnaires was determined, in large measure, the program of the Department. Meetings have been held, with commendable regularity, and committees have been put to work in their several lines, to build up that part of the Church life essential to its being, as well as well-being, and pathetically neglected hitherto.

The first great forward step undertaken by the Department was the securing of Miss Mabel Lee Cooper, the Head of the Teacher Training of the Episcopal Church, to conduct an Institute lasting five days and in progress at the present time. Her subjects deal with Child Psychology, the Principles of Pedagogy and the Art of Story-Telling. She holds two conferences daily, at 5:15 and 7:30 P.M. respectively, and on four of the afternoons, a Story-Telling Hour for the Children.

In February Miss Dorothy M. Fisher, the Secretary for Young People's Work of the Diocese of Texas, comes to Missouri to organize and stimulate the development of Young People's Societies. Her training, experience and ability, qualify her especially for this work and her visit to us we owe to the generosity of the Synod.

The great work of the year will be a Summer School to be held at Camp Huldina, through the generosity of Rev. E. S. White, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion. This will last for five days beginning Sunday night, June 19th, and will have classes in Pedagogy, Young People's Work, Coaching in Christian Nurture, with a class for the Clergy on present day problems of the ministry, and for the entire Conference, a Bible Class on—"The Life of Christ," as portrayed in the Synoptic Gospels.

Your Vice-Chairman has attended the Conference of Executives in Religious Education held in Detroit; has organized one Young People's Group and visited another; has made addresses on the subject of Religious Education to both Convocations and to the Clericus. Literature was provided preparatory to the Every-Member-Canvass, dealing with the work in the Diocese and suggestions were sent to the Clergy in the hope that Christmas in the home might have more of a Christmas emphasis than the commercialism of our own day would naturally suggest.

A small booklet on Family Prayer is in the course of preparation, for sale at a cost price of ten cents a copy, available for circulation through the homes of the Diocese, in the earnest hope that the Family Altar will thereby be reestablished. The Department has cooperated with the Editor of the Church News toward the publication of a more and more valuable Diocesan magazine.

We wish to express our gratitude to the Diocesan Council for the allocation of the sum of \$1,200.00 toward the accomplishment of our program. Even so, this is a small figure for the entire Diocese to invest in a work which determines, beyond a peradventure, the loyalty and efficiency of the churchmen in our Diocese in the years to come.

Last Sunday night 180 people, all but a few of whom were in a Young People's Society Group, met at St. Michael and All Angels' Parish House for a supper and address by Miss Cooper. From this meeting a City Council has already emerged and monthly meetings will be held in various parishes, thus bringing together our Young People coordinating their efforts and integrating their aims and purposes. The Department is eager to serve any parish or mission to the limit of its ability. Its program will be limited only by the funds available and the desire of the Diocese to develop a comprehensive work in Christian education.

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APPENDIX No. 12.

Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to City Institutions for 1926.

For those who are interested in statistics there is appended to this report a summary of the activities of the City Mission Staff for the past year. However, I never present such a schedule without a strong mental protest. Nobody has yet invented a system of categories for this kind of work that means much. It is much as if we were obliged to give a description of a population by a minute enumeration and classification of their noses. At the best it is a pretty indirect index of what is behind them. I trust that it is at least fair evidence of faithful work and continued zeal. At that point the function of statistics stops.

When my last report was presented I gave a brief summary of the work of each member of the staff with some little appreciation of the efficiency with which it was done. No modification of my description need be recorded except a sense of the inadequacy of the acknowledgement I then made of their work. I doubt if finer work among junior delinquents can be found anywhere than what our own Deaconess Brainerd is doing at Meramec Hills, no one is better known or more beloved by the patients at Koch Hospital than Miss Pearce. Miss Daisy Lorick's certificate is written on the faces of the patients at Hospital II when you mention her name. Ask the Warden at the City Jail or a hopeless prisoner under extreme sentence about my associate, Mr. Malcolm Taylor; or chat with the inmates of the Infirmary about the native goodness of Mr. Small or the substantial generosity of Mrs. O'Bannon,-and these cases are mentioned not that they cover their fields of labor, but as really striking instances of their unremitting zeal and success. To these one must add the names of our lay-readers, Mr. Allen Pomeroy and Mr. Jones, without whose aid it would be impossible to carry our present schedule. Miss Williamson, who has been our faithful organist for many years, still gives her time and talent out of a busy life at Hospital II and the House of Detention. Mr. David Kopplin, Mrs. Medairy, Mrs. Hal Temple, and Miss Schwarzer have served regularly as volunteers during the year. To a host of others the diocese is indebted for consistent interest and encouragement, such as Dr. Van Aller of Koch Hospital, Mr. Cotsworth of the League of Lay Readers, Miss Anne Cousland and many others whom it seems positively ungracious not to mention. Indeed I have been so universally supported by the Church in everything that I have set my hand to, that to give acknowledgement would require that I fill my report with expressions of appreciation of the Church in the City of St. Louis, and with nothing else. I have yet to plumb the depths of their Christian love. What the Woman's Auxiliary has done will appear, no doubt, in their report. That is a story in itself and to enter into a small part of it would be invidious. The Church Periodical Club with their continuous supply of magazines and welcome cards at Christmas time, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew which for a generation has ministered every Sunday in the City Hospital, the Needle-work Guilds of Webster Groves, Kirkwood and St. Louis with their invaluable contributions of clothing, the League of Church Women,

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the Cathedral Altar Chapter, the various chapters of the Church Service League, the Sunday Schools of the city, and various other organizations; these and literally hundreds of individuals inside and outside of our communion who during this past year have contributed aid in one form or another would turn my report into something suspiciously resembling a census. It is very wonderful to be in the center of so much human goodness, and I hope I may long be the Church's agent in this great field of extra-parochial work in our beloved big town.

Religious work ought to head up in public and private worship, if possible, on the Lord's Day. One of the items of progress during the past year has been the rearrangement of our schedule so that Sunday services are held in all the major institutions with the exception of Bellefontaine Farms and the Isolation Hospital. Bellefontaine Farms is too remote to be accessible and services are impracticable in the Isolation Hospital on account of the nature of the institution. With the aid of the Bishop the new chapel in the jail has been fitted out and equipped. A chapel has also been assigned to our Church and the Lutherans at Koch by the authorities there. The attendance at both these institutions has been impressive.

By arrangement with Canon Remick as Secretary of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund I have been able to secure the services of his secretary for an hour a day. The cost is \$150.00 a year. The release obtained for pastoral work from writing innumerable letters and in serving tables has been almost the equivalent of adding another member to the staff. With the exception of the detached groups visited by Deaconess Brainerd and the white inmates of the Infirmary visited by Mr. Small, Mr. Taylor and myself now cover our city institutions according to a schedule much more satisfactory than was humanly possible before. To this list of regularly visited institutions should be added the Isolation Hospital on Arsenal Street, taken on this year. So far as I know I am the only regular clerical visitor who goes here. I go Saturday mornings when I am scheduled for no other institution so that there is no danger of the mission being accused of spreading contagious diseases; I take all the precautions prescribed by Dr. Lohr, the superintendent, and my visits are with his full approval.

It is not possible to sketch the ramifications of our work. A few illustrative instances must suffice. Among the patients presented for Confirmation at Koch Hospital recently was a young mother whose husband is suffering from a malignant disease. Our ministrations there led me to her home where I found her husband's parents, two splendid Christian people, and her fine vigorous little boy. I was able to baptize him and to put the older people in touch with the nearest parish. I take this case up at random simply as an example of a multitude of people to whom Miss Cora Pearce ministers, whose history and background are so thoroughly and sympathetically understood and mapped out by her devoted energy that the Kingdom reaps the benefit to the uttermost.

At Hospital II is a cot where I am always asked to stop and have a prayer and give a benediction. Hospital II is Miss Lorick's field, but the sufferer has come from Deaconess Brainerd's. I believe she is a living proof of the Deaconess's marvelous power with those who wish to set their feet out of the mire and clay of an abandoned life on the ladder of eternal life. It illustrates how so much of our work is interdependent.

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Miss Lorick herself is bravely struggling all the while with the problem of following up the constantly changing population with which she deals. Not without success, I may add. It was only a day or two before this report was written that she saved the Mission a very considerable expenditure from the burial fund by her intimate knowledge of a case.

The Reverend Mr. Taylor's work would best be illustrated from the City Jail, for the Church would search far before it would find a more sympathetic but canny labourer in God's vineyard. It is work full of disappointments and defeats as one would expect, but the tangible success is all the more precious. Naturally we cannot put much in black and white, but there is something of promise in the fact that the Mission has held its first Baptism and Confirmation in that institution this year.

More and more the work of the office has been done in contact with the great tide of homeless and jobless men. Our connection with the social agencies of the city has become increasingly close and cordial. It would be impossible adequately to acknowledge the numerous instances of this cooperation. At present, for example, we are helping to locate a half insane man who has thrown himself time and again on my mercy as a priest of the Church. The circumstances are too intricate to detail, but I wish to record my appreciation of the forbearance of these workers when I indicated the limits of my ability to work with them, their gracious acknowledgement of what I have been able to do. The field of correspondence in this one case ranges from the Great Lakes to Florida.

Notwithstanding all this there are certain appealing human beings who refuse to pigeon-hole or card-index; cases that only the Church can deal with for they fall between the stools of secular classification. Most frequent, perhaps, are those who need only the price of an artificial limb to restore them to independence and spiritual health and self-respect. Sometimes it is a man beyond middle life absolutely determined to die rather than face life in a public institution. I could tell many a romantic tale of the unconscious but tremendous courage of a man getting out of his bed and travelling far in search of health without money in a distant part of the country, usually cursed with some obvious defect of temper brought on by long suffering and long adversity, but at least to my eyes a marvellously heroic figure. Here I can pray and advise and in some cases help. And may I say here that not once or twice I have turned to my brethren in the city for aid from their discretionary funds and have never yet been refused.

Out of the experience of the last year have come one or two clear convictions in regard to the future development of the City Institution if it is to develop. One of these is that the work is not complete in itself. The ideal issue of our work for those who live and come out of our institutions is to return to one of our parishes or to some other form of organized Christianity when, as often happens, we minister to members of such bodies. But in a great many cases this does not prove feasible. We preach to, baptize, and sometimes confirm, people who would be ill at ease in any place of worship frequented by conventional people. We have no method of follow-up and tying to the Church's life. Besides such children of God there is a vast strata of people whom we never touch. We just must do it.

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With this problem in mind I made a pilgrimage to Philadelphia last year, and while I am beginning to formulate my ideas on the subject I am still too uncertain to be able definitely to state with just what kind of institution it would be practicable for us to begin. However, there is, it seems to me, a possibility for a safe and inexpensive experiment in the case of Bethany Mission. Here we have at least some equipment to start with in the form of an established mission for colored people properly located. If I might be able to add to the staff a colored priest who would make Bethany his center, with the assent and cooperation of the Bishop, the Department of Missions and others interested, if this mission might be added to our equipment and the colored work and follow-up in cooperation with Miss Lorick put under his immediate supervision, I believe we would soon be gratified by the contribution our Church could make to the community and the stoppage of a very considerable leak. It would also be a logical step toward crystalizing our ideas in regard to the work among the whites. I sincerely wish this move might be made this year.

I would also be happy if some generous layman would put in my hands the means to make a survey from the point of view of a devoted Church woman of the relation in St. Louis of the Episcopal City Mission to social work in general, with an eye for suggestions in regard to the development of the work itself. It is possible for me to obtain the services of such a worker, who has just refused the offer of a position of five thousand dollars a year in one of our largest cities, and has back of her a wide experience. Incidentally she is much interested in this very matter. I think that it could be very reasonably done, and would make our work much more unified and effective.

I wish to close with a hearty "thank you" to all the generous people of the Church in this city who during the past year and especially at Christmas time gave so much of themselves and their money. These many instances, occurring continuously throughout the year, make me confident that, barring conspicuous folly on my part, I may be sure of consistent and enthusiastic support for our staff and myself in the future.

The past year has been a busy and a successful one for the Auxiliary. In every way susceptible of definite comparison. The Auxiliary accomplished more in 1926 than it did in any former year. I feel too, that from the point of view of the spiritual life of its members, the year just passed gives cause for satisfaction. I do not desire to overstress the purely financial side. And yet, it is but fair to assume, it seems to me, that a striking increase in the contribution by the Auxiliary to the Church's work in terms of dollars, must be taken as affording some evidence of a corresponding growth of the organization in terms of its spiritual life. In this view these figures are significant: In 1925 the Treasurer disbursed \$6,849.29. In 1926 she disbursed \$13,002.62—an increase of approximately 100%.

The regular meetings of the organization have been well attended. The various speakers have all had messages of real inspiration. At the January meeting Dr. Arthur Bostwick, head of the St. Louis Public Library, described his recent trip to China, made under the auspices of the American Library Association. In May we were fortunate to hear the Rev. B. S. Spurr, Archdeacon of the Diocese of West Virginia, who told us of his work in the prison and in the Reynolds Memorial Hospital at Moundsville, W.Va., in the mountain section of that State. The Auxiliary has never been privileged to hear a more inspiring speaker. At this meeting the Auxiliary, though not solicited, raised the large sum of \$1,213.00 to support two nurses in this hospital. In October Mrs. C. R. Pancoast of Philadelphia spoke on the Corporate Gift and the fine beginnings made by our Diocese in this work is largely attributable to her clear and eloquent description of its purposes.

Under the auspices of the Educational Department the usual mission study classes were held, "Latin America" being the subject for the year. A day of prayer in preparation for Mrs. Pancoast's class was held in Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves. This was conducted by the Rev. H. W. Prince, rector of the Church of the Holy Spirit, Lake Forest, Ill. A conference on the "Message," now merged into the Bishops' Crusade, was held at St. George's Church and was conducted by Mrs. C. R. Pancoast of Philadelphia.

Under the direction of the Devotional Secretary a Quiet Day was conducted at Christ Church Cathedral by the Rev. F. S. Fleming, D.D., Rector of the Church of the Atonement, Chicago. The devotional work has also included a Day for Self-Examination and Rededication and a Day of Intercession for the Bishops' Crusade. A leaflet of self-examination, prepared by our devotional secretary and by the Rev. E. S. White, Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion for use on the Day of Self-Examination was found to be so helpful that it has been adopted by the Commission on Evangelism for nation-wide circulation.

The Supply Department has sent during the year two personal boxes; one to the Rev. G. Lawrence of Sisston, S. D., and the other to the Rev. J. S. Dixon of Yoakum, Texas. Two hospital boxes, one

to the Reynolds Memorial Hospital, Moundsville, W. Va., and the other to St. Agnes Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., were also sent. The Supply Department has also been responsible for the collecting and distribution of clothing in the community and diocese. Garments have been sent to the Workhouse, the Jail, the Colored Hospital, the Orphans Home, the Needlework Guild to Deaconess Brainerd, Brittain Hall, St. Luke's Mission and Holy Cross House. This department has been responsible for making the surgical dressings at St. Luke's Hospital. Those in charge of this institution state that this contribution has been of immeasurable help. In addition, vestments were sent to a number of clergy both within and without the diocese.

This is the second year that the Social Service work has been carried on under the auspices of the Auxiliary. It would be impossible to review in detail all the splendid things this department has accomplished, but there are several which I feel must be mentioned. The Department has provided Sister Miriam with an oil burner and \$150.00 towards a furnace, besides much of the oil. It has sent over \$1,000 in money to Brittain Hall. It has furnished the flowers for the Chapel in St. Luke's Hospital. It has been responsible for twenty-nine parties in the City Institutions and distributed Christmas baskets and gifts in these institutions, having an aggregate value of \$798.46.

The United Thank Offering is growing remarkably. During 1926 \$6,520.07 was reported as collected. During the corresponding year of the last Triennium \$3,696.57 was received—an increase of \$2,823.50.

The Church Periodical Club during 1926 distributed thousands of books and magazines.

The term of the President of the Auxiliary, which is one for three years, expires in the immediate future. I shall leave office with real regret and with a feeling of gratitude to all for help and encouragement uniformly received. This has turned what would otherwise have been a hard task into a joyful opportunity for service.
