

Journal of the Sixty-Kifth Convention

BEING THE

SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

OF THE

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis,

Tuesday, May 24, 1904.

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the Clergy and Laity assembled in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Cathedral singing the one hundred and seventy-sixth hymn.

The opening sentences and service to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. B. T. Kemerer, of Trinity Church, St. Charles.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. F. C. Berry, of St. Peter's Church, Canton.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. C. M. C. Mason, of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, of Emmanuel Church, Old Orchard.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Right Rev. L. L. Kinsolving, D. D., Bishop of Brazil.

The Convention sermon was preached by the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D., of Ascension Church, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Rev. A. K. Smith, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Secretary of the Convention proceeded, under direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and thirty-six Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, appointed at the last Convention, whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report of the Committee containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then called the roll of the Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats in the Convention, and Delegates from twenty-five Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced a quorum of both orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the election of a Secretary of the Convention was the first order of business.

The Rev. J. R. Winchester nominated Mr. Charles R. Skinker to be Secretary of the Convention with authority to appoint his assistant.

No other nomination being made, Mr. Skinker thanked the Convention for the compliment, but declined the nomination for imperative reasons which, he stated, he had already explained to the Bishop.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was presented and read by Rev. Wm. Elmer, Chairman, on behalf of the Committee, as follows:

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

The outlook in the Diocese is distinctly encouraging. The wave of improvement reported last year has not subsided, but is still rolling on.

The mission work in the Southeastern Deanery is in a most flourishing condition. There is in hand nearly sufficient money to erect a Church on our lots in Jackson, and the Mission in that place is now fully organized. St. Luke's Mission, Valley Park, has been organized with thirty communicants and in Sullivan a new Mission, St. John's, has been formed with about twelve communicants. A new Rectory is being built in Cape Girardeau. The three years past has seen in this Deanery a remarkable growth, five Missions having been organized and are in a flourishing condition. In the Hannibal Deanery numerous improvements have been reported. The churches in Canton and Moberly are being enlarged, and in Monroe a new tower is being built.

In the city of St. Louis the dark outlook has brightened and the prospect is most encouraging. The Advent Mission is completed and occupied. St. Peter's has nearly completed a costly Parish House. The new Cathedral Mission is in its church home on North Grand Avenue. St. Luke's Hospital, the most up-to-date hospital in the world, is completed and occupied. Bishop Robertson Hall, St. Mary's Home, the Convalescents' Home, St. Stephen's and the Hospital Missions are all doing their most blessed work, while the Orphans' Home is still stretching out its hands to care for helpless children.

Encouraging as are all these, the most hopeful sign is the revival of Church extension in this city. Year after year we have pleaded for a Diocesan Missionary, and the need for one is greater than ever; but it was also thought that the immense stretches of territory in the northern and southern parts of this city inhabited by tens of thousands of what, in common parlance, we call the working classes, but which in this case is composed of the better class of mechanics, clerks and professional men, needed the direct attention of a Missionary specially fitted for such work. An appeal for the support of the Missionary was made and in one congregation more than a year's stipend was promptly given, and on June 1st the new City Missionary will enter upon his work of organizing Missions in the most promising districts of the city, and your Committee believe that this new venture of faith will be blessed of God to the glory of His name and the extension of this Church.

When a Mission is to be started, it is by means of a Sunday School. When a Parish is without a Rector, the Sunday School is the center around which the Church people gather until a Rector is called.

Therefore, as it is the seed-ground of the Church, your Committee commends institutes for the study of new methods, and whatsoever tends to a more uniform method of instruction.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-FIFTH CONVENTION

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY—I am permitted once more to say to you a loving welcome. We are here to tell of the past and to plan for the future. The unity of the Diocese in its life and growth is emphasized, and it is promoted by our annual Conventions. I hope attendance on them will always be regarded as a duty and a privilege. I hail with joy indications that the Laity all through the Diocese are thinking more about the Convention, and are growing in willingness to put themselves out to come to it. The good of it is not merely that we see each other and shake hands together, though that of itself is of value, nor that we make reports and get light from reports, and make plans and shape action from plans, though these, too, are of value, but it is that we are made to realize that we are largely one and warmly one in a sense not readily learned from such teachers as local experiences and local interests. It is a blessed lesson for us to learn and practice along Catholic lines, if only we will avoid misusing and misreading the good old Greek word, Catholic.

On the seventh of September, last, Bishop Clark, of Rhode Island, died in his ninety-second year. No other one of our two hundred and more Bishops has lived to be ninety. He had been a Bishop for nearly forty-nine years, and was Presiding Bishop for sixteen years. A godly man, a profound scholar, a great preacher and a wise administrator,—all these he was. The office of Presiding Bishop has now fallen, by the simple ongoing of the years, to your Bishop until the Church shall have perfected, perhaps, its change of method in appointing the Presiding Bishop. Therefore, duties and responsibilities, and with them no little of wonderment and awe, have devolved themselves upon me.

Four others of our Bishops have departed this life within the year.

Bishop Starkey was in his eighty-fifth year and had been twenty-three years a Bishop. He came to the Episcopate somewhat late in life, but none was more faithful than he in the vigorous discharge of its duties.

The death of Bishop Dudley has come keenly home to my heart and life. He was Chairman of the House of Bishops and Assessor to the Presiding Bishop. I had need to consult with him in some perplexing difficulties which came upon me along with the higher office. . I went more than once to his Louisville home for this purpose. I knew before, what all the Church knows and what all the world who knew him knows, that he was eminent for kindness, courtesy, chivalry, eloquence, wisdom and devotion. But in my time of need his kindness extended itself into a brotherly tenderness which knit my heart to him as David's to Jonathan. Grief throughout the Church over his death is unlimited. Because of his high place and warm heart and wise head, his Diocese is stricken,—his neighbors and fellow citizens are sad,—the University of the South at Sewanee bewails the loss of him from their Chancellorship. And in the most perplexing problem of our work among the colored people, of our duty to them and their duty to the Church, and of the wise adjustment of the relations presented, the genial sympathy, the sagacious counsel and the skillful leadership of the late Bishop of Kentucky will be more sadly missed than can be told. His age was the same with mine. God mercifully have me ready, too, and keep me so for the loving Savior's sake!

Two Missionary Bishops have gone. Bishop Ingle, though his Episcopate was a short one—of less than two years—was a very embodiment of single-minded earnestness and great-hearted devotion. The light of his life penetrated many a nook in China for cheer and blessing. And its beams shooting across the rolling waves of the wide sea between have wakened other lives at home to unselfishness and holiness.

Bishop Leonard was one of us. He was born and reared in Missouri, and in the earlier years of his ministry held several pastorships in Missouri. For nearly sixteen years he struggled with the difficulties besetting the conduct of missionary work in Utah. Under the Canons it has strangely fallen to my lot to take charge of Utah again during the vacancy there. I have made one visit to Salt Lake City, where I read the Committal Service over the grave of my fallen brother. I am to make another visit soon. I have found many proofs of the faithfulness and efficiency with which the late Bishop did his work for sixteen years. Two fine institutions, St. Mark's Hospital and Rowland Hall, he enlarged and strengthened and left in excellent condition. He lies buried on the hillside overlooking Salt Lake, where also rest the bodies of two other clergymen of the Church. He promoted and extended the work which I was privileged to begin, and I desire to lay upon his grave this tribute of grateful appreciation.

Rev. K. M. Deane, on December 30, 1903, at Mexico, where he had been the faithful Rector. Mr. Deane was conspicuous for earnestness and

faithfulness and missionary zeal, and we are sad to lose him from the Church Militant at the comparatively early age of sixty.

Rev. F. B. Scheetz fell asleep at eighty-seven on Good Friday. Personally he was humility itself, but in discharge of a duty or fulfillment of a trust he was as unyielding as a rock. Unwearied industry, unswerving integrity and unselfish holiness were his characteristics. His sound judgment and practical sense induced his fellows to keep him upon the Standing Committee for years and years. His missionary zeal was a flame within him which constantly warmed others. During my first years in Missouri he was one of my kindest friends and wisest counsellors. In his death one of the very fathers of the Diocese has gone from us.

And I want to put on record my word of tribute to the memory of the Rev. J. L. Gay, who died March 22, 1904, in his ninety-fifth year. Canonically, he belonged to the Diocese of West Missouri, but to the hearts and affections of us all he was our "Father Gay." My relations to him were near and tender. The home provided for the last of his years by the generous kindness of St. Luke's Hospital, was a great blessing to him. It was wonderful how his alertness of mind and power of memory and strength and faith and brightness of hope held out almost to the very last. It was an aged warrior, indeed, lying down to rest when he died.

It cannot be but that each passing year shall add its names to the diptychs of the Diocese. Among them, this year, are Mr. Cunningham, of DeSoto, an earnest Churchman in his prime and a patient sufferer in his decline of life; Mrs. Beall, of St. Paul's, St. Louis. true to duty and interested in Missions and charities; Mrs. Triplett, of the Cathedral, who in faith and hope has soon followed him who was most faithful and helpful in the Secretaryship of the Diocese; Mr. J. W. Branch, of the Redeemer, St. Louis, who in former years was one of the very foremost in generous giving and active work; and Mr. B. Wells, of Palmyra, the sturdy Churchman and trusted Treasurer of the Vestry for many years. God's peace is theirs. God's work is ours.

The outlook over the Diocese in its first aspect brings a qualm of discouragement. Practically, Church work for its promotion depends on clergymen. Men and women and children everywhere help. Thank God, they do, and their help is indispensable; but if there be no leader whose sacred office it is to concentrate and unify the helping forces, and by his pastoral fidelity to bring out from them life and to make them into growth, it is rare that vigorous work is set forward.

Now, this year there are only fifty-seven clergymen canonically connected with the Diocese. Last year there were *sixty-two*. This seems a distinct loss. It looks like a retrograde movement, but I hope the damaging aspect is only temporary. Five places, accustomed to have each its own pastor,

are vacant: Ironton, Jefferson City, Mexico, Palmyra and Poplar Bluff. I hope, indeed, that these vacancies are not to remain long unfilled. We have lost, too, by the withdrawal of the Rev. H. B. Smith from the Diocese. His departure is a loss, for his missionary services carried on from Kirkwood as a center were most acceptable and efficient throughout South Missouri. But the Rector of Kirkwood, as Dean of the Southern Convocation, has sprung to the breach splendidly, and has secured by his zealous and wise efforts the establishment of two new organized Missions-the Redeemer, Jackson, and St. Luke's, Valley Park. At the same time one of our best and foremost Missionaries, Rev. F. M. Weddell, already in charge of Rolla, St. James and Cuba, has gone on, daring all imputations of imperialism, to found another organized Mission, St. John's, Sullivan. With these three new Missions hopefully organized this year in three towns heretofore unoccupied, our qualm of discouragement, after some twinges of real pain, quite passes away. I must avouch that our Diocesan Missionary work is in healthful condition. To keep it so we need that \$4,750.00 should be pledged tomorrow afternoon for its support.

Our Confirmations this year are only 536 where they were 555 last year. This deficiency of *nineteen* doubtless arises from the vacant pastorships. Fourteen confirmed in Columbia and the seventy-five dollars of apportionment for Missions fully paid are indications that our important University town is harnessed into the line and march of progress in Church development.

If we look for encouraging things, they are not wanting. The Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Louis, has voluntarily relieved the Missionary Board from its missionary grant and has become self-supporting. That is the same as giving one hundred dollars per year to Diocesan Missions. Macon has shown its wisdom in two ways. First, in buying a corner lot adjoining the Rectory on which to build the new church; second, in forbearing, on account of excessively high prices of material and labor, to build that new church at once, though having valid subscriptions of \$10,000.00. Cape Girardeau has built a new Rectory in which the Rector is comfortably housed. Were it not so, I fear he and his may have found themselves obliged to sojourn in tents. Our brother, newly come to Ferguson, can tell some tales of how a Parish without a Rectory may mean really a Rector without a place where he may lay his head. Moberly has enlarged its church, and, what is better, has paid for the enlargement, and has put in a handsome chancel window.

In St. Louis, Grace, with its new roof and further improvement, Ascension, with its enlargement, and the Redeemer and St. Peter's, with their new Parish Houses, send us greetings and challenge our congratulations. The three Parish Missions, Epiphany, belonging to St. Mark's, Advent, belonging to Ascension, and the Cathedral Mission, have each a

The Advent is the most ecclesiastical structure of the three, and though seemingly set in the midst of a muddy field, is already rejoicing in the selling of lots and the erection of homes near and around it. Epiphany is so built that it can be readily sold or changed into a business house. The Cathedral Mission Church is like a knock-down piece of furniture, so screwed and bolted together that it can be taken down and folded, if not so silently, perhaps, as the Arab's tent, and carted away to a new location.

Of good work of the quiet kind I know not any that is better done than that accomplished by the Sisters of Bishop Robertson Hall. One of them with headquarters at the Cathedral and another with headquarters at St. Stephen's, are daily giving their beneficent services to the sick and suffering poor. And the wholesome influences, intellectual, moral and spiritual, which flow into the minds and hearts and souls of the girls who are pupils in the Hall are incalculably valuable. We have been sharply put upon our mettle to get renewed the loan of \$30,000.00, which fell due in November. In the closing critical hours we did find that we could secure \$25,000.00 on mortgage at five per cent. Then we faced the problem of providing for the remaining \$5,000.00. Mr. Walker Hill, of the Committee, came to the rescue with furnishing us \$1,500.00 outright: and then on the last day of grace and in the last hours of the day I found five kind individuals possessed of that much of guileless innocence as to lend us \$700.00 each on no security whatever. If for the good done by the Sisters the good could be done to the Sisters of relieving them of the debt which presses on them, and which they did not at all bring upon themselves, I would be most glad and grateful.

St. Luke's Hospital has taken a wonderful step forward. The Board of Directors have challenged attention by boldly proceeding to build and equip an almost perfect place for the activities of medical and surgical science and for the skillful and thorough care of the sick. I hope and I believe that the benevolent and generous people of the city will stand by them and not let them suffer for their boldness of enterprise.

In organizations for benevolent and charitable work this Diocese is not lacking. It may not be doing all it ought, but it certainly is doing something. Besides the Sisterhood and the Hospital there are the Orphans' Home and the Convalescent Home and St. Mary's Home. The women of the Diocese are in the main attending to these, and blessed helpfulnesses flow forth constantly from them. Nor may St. Stephen's House and the Hospital Missions be excluded from the same category. If any of you have doubt about good being done by these, I wish you might go, forgetting satisfaction to Mr. Mizner, and learn what a very bee-hive of industry for every day and all the days St. Stephen's is in physical, mental, moral, social and religious activities; or to Mr. Cornell and move about with him

to see how the motherliness of the Church and the mercifulness of the Savior are brought to those in prison, in the Poor House, in the Insane Asylum and in the hospitals. If at St. Stephen's on a Sunday, I am sure you will come away feeling that nowhere in St. Louis will be found a larger Sunday School or a more reverent service or a more interested and worshipful congregation. The generous steadiness with which the good women of the Church have stood by St. Stephen's in furnishing their \$1,200.00 per year through the Woman's Auxiliary warms my heart with thankfulness. Women in the country parishes as well as in St. Louis have kindly helped, and never before has the help been more cheerfully or promptly given. In fact, the Woman's Auxiliary stands for life and warmth and growth and vigor of missionary work all around. It pledges for Diocesan Missions. It stands by St. Stephen's. It gives a hundred dollars at a time to one or another Missionary Bishop or Missionary want. It gives a share towards the \$100,000.00 asked of the women of the whole nation for the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and this, over and above what they constantly do in their respective Parishes towards the apportionment. It gathers a United Offering Fund,—ours is to be over one thousand dollars for the coming general Convention. It supports scholarships. It sews and sends garments in boxes and barrels, which are blessed helps to Bishops in supplying the commissariat for their missionary soldiers. Look at it all around, and one is convinced that the rolling wheels of the beneficent missionary machinery of the Church would drag heavily but for the steady faith and helping works of the women. God bless and reward them all! Our Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has this year given, in cash, \$5,004.28; in boxes, \$989.93; total, \$5,994.21.

The children, too, are helpers. We may be inclined to rate them as impulsive rather than steady. It is not unlikely that we might proffer them for a fit motto, "Off with the old love and on with the new." But the steadiness of our children is wonderful. Look at their Lenten offerings for Missions. A year ago they were \$1,695.75. This year they are \$1,726.51. Look at their Missionary Host. With a "Steady, boys, steady," and an equal "Steady, girls, steady," month by month they pour into the coffer of the Missionary Host Treasury their unfailing gifts. And I assure you and them that the thousand dollars and more which they so give are no small part of the comfort and cheer of my Bishop's life, relieving it from many anxieties when they become pressingly sore. It makes me happy to stand up and tell them, as I hope to do next Sunday afternoon, my love and thanks.

I have felt for a long time that we are not adequately planting Parishes to keep up, on the part of the Church, with the growth of this city of St. Louis. One looking on the map of the city can discern how in the north part of it and the south part of it we are failing to place centers of Church work. Now, I am glad and grateful to say. a movement has been started for Church extension in the city. The Committee having charge of it, under the Diocesan Missionary Board, consists of Rev. Messrs. Duckworth, Davis and Blaisdell and Rev. Dr. Winchester and Mr. William Bagnell. The agent in the field is the Rev. William Cochran. So eyes and hands and feet and a purse are provided to do for the Bishop what he has found himself unable of himself to do, viz., the work of spying out and going in to possess new points for the planting of the Church.

For the second time since I have been Bishop of Missouri the *Church News* has this year asked no subsidy from me. The last Convention generously voted one hundred dollars to its benefit, and I have not been called on for anything. The *Church News* is, I am sure, a help to the Diocese. I think it is an honor to the Diocese. Grateful acknowledgments are due from us all to the Rev. Mr. Miller for his management and care of it. Not many, I fear, appreciate how much of time and thought and patience and work is involved in that care and management. Mr. Miller's labor of love sends a warm overflow into his Parish. That little Parish meets its apportionment in full, and its Sunday School this year sends \$93.00 for General Missions.

I hope somewhat will be given in the Diocese for the help of the Theological Department of the University of the South, at Sewanee. No matter if we were told that our affiliation as a Diocese and our membership in the Board of Trustees would not entail any assessment, yet we are Trustees. The University, and especially its Theological Department, needs help. Two of our Missouri theological students are in training there, and such honest and faithful work as the University bravely struggles to do ought to be supported. This year it has a new and helpful feature in the Summer School of Theology, which it has instituted. I hope we will be willing to stand by and to give. Send gifts to Rev. Dr. Winchester.

This is a year of the General Convention, which is to meet at Boston. Missouri has never failed to be well represented in the General Conventions; I have no reason to fear any failure of such representation this year. This Diocesan Convention will, I am sure, take earnest thought and make careful choice in the matter.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew will hold a National Convention in Philadelphia at the end of September, a little before General Convention. I was present at its last Convention in Denver and had proof of the strength and wisdom characterizing the Brotherhood. I shall be glad and grateful if Missouri will send on many delegates to be present in Philadelphia.

One of our general institutions, for the support of which the whole Church is pledged, is the "General Clergy Relief Fund," for the aged and infirm Clergy and for the widows and orphans of Clergymen. The agent is the Rev. A. J. P. McClure, Church House, 12th and Walnut Streets, Philadelphia. Pa. By request of the Society I ask that its technical Will Title may be inserted in the Journal of this Convention. It is now helping three clergymen and two widows connected with Missouri. Every Parish in the land is asked for an offering for its benefit on Quinquagesima Sunday.

As Presiding Bishop I am the head of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church which supports our twenty Domestic Missionary Bishops and our four Foreign Missionary Bishops and the hundreds and hundred of Missionaries at home and abroad. The cost of the suport this year is \$850,000.00. The Diocese of Missouri is asked to furnish \$5,200.00 of that cost. Our Committee, Rev. Mr. Davis and Messrs. Ford and Bagnell, has asked our Parishes to furnish certain sums apportioned to them. The year for the Society closes September 1, yet, up to April 1, only six of our Parishes have met this apportionment in full: Clarksville, Columbia, Ironton, Moberly, Portland and All Saints', St. Louis. Thirty-three Parishes have given nothing. And altogether the Diocese has given only \$1,660.72 of the \$5,200.00 asked. A little bit of brightness lighting up the story is that this amount is \$300.00 more than that given by us a year ago at this time. I cannot get it out of my head, nor out of my heart, that the Presiding Bishop will be disgraced if, when his own Society is in need and in debt, his own Diocese does not respond with help to the honorable and full meeting of its own apportionment. If the \$5.200.00 are not given, I shall try, please God, humbly to go on to do duty, but I shall hang my head in shame.

The Church is waking to the needs and greatness of the Missionary work given into our hands to do. Walk up to the World's Fair grounds, and walk when inside them. Observe and study a bit. We are an entity of many States and Territories. So we are. And in the States and Territories the Church has much work and growing work to do. We have dependencies. So we have. God's Providence, war's happenings and the logic of events have lodged them upon our hands. We did not snatch them nor seize them. And the Church has more work in them to do. The Bishops of the Philippines and of Hawaii and of Porto Rico are taking it in hand as best they can. It must grow upon them mightily. It is a matter of ten millions of people with whom they have to do. Then walk over to the foreign exhibits, of that Empire, the oldest in continuous existence of any under the sun and the most populous, China; and of that other Empire, a wonderful infant that has burst its swathing bands in the last fifty years, Japan; and think of the nearness to them of our Pacific Coast, of our growing commercial interests and their open door,

of international diplomacies and what a hand in them Mr. Hay has had and has, and, thinking it all out, try to realize how the rustling tide of events has to a bewildering degree transformed our hitherto self-contained and self-sufficient country into a world nation. Then, having thought it all out, will you find it in your heart to feel or say that the Church can allow herself to rest back in ease or indifference or apathy, content with her home Parishes and Dioceses and their work, or can hold her hand from earnest effort to mould the intellectual and moral and religious influences which shall pervade the whole wide field?

Is that not what our great Missionary Society is trying to do? Shall we not have a hand in the work? A free hand, a full hand, a vigorous hand, a generous hand?

Now, may I be allowed to say what seems to me the best way to take a hand in such work?

I want to speak to the practical question. I want to presuppose faith, prayer, sympathy, interest, loyalty, love. If we are to do for Missions, these are necessary. I quite understand that. Except the Lord build the house of Missions from foundation to roof ridge, their labor is but lost that build it; but how to do is what I want to consider now.

Heretofore, we have largely depended, all over the Church, on offerings made on occasions of divine worship for our supplies to General Missions which need, or soon will need, millions of dollars annually. It is a haphazard source of supply; dependent much on the amount of coin or currency happening to be in the man's pocket or the woman's purse of a Sunday morning. And rainy Sundays play havoc with it. The great Missionary Society is left to a lean and hungry condition. Supply is woefully changed into debt. I do not oject to have the supply for Missions brought to the Church and given in church, but I want it to be a thoughtful supply, a prepared for supply, a premeditated supply. Now, faith and loyalty and love being presupposed, with thought and premeditation—those are what I want. Many a poor man or woman would say, I can and I will give one dollar each year for Missions. Without thought and premeditation only ten cents or at most twenty-five cents would go into the alms basin. Another man or woman of moderate income would say, I will put by five dollars or ten dollars for this great work, otherwise only a half-dollar or at most a dollar would have been thrown into the offering. Not a few men or women, also, would say, I will appropriate fifty dollars or one hundred dollars yearly for this blessed cause of Missions; without thought and premeditation not more than five dollars or ten dollars would have found their way into the alms basin. And there would not be wanting those who would say, I have been greatly blest, my gift shall be one thousand dollars or five thousand dollars or ten thousand dollars for this worldwide work.

Can we not see how with thought and premeditation,—call it subscription or promising or pledging, if you will,—the offering in a country Parish or a Mission might be one hundred dollars instead of ten dollars; and in the large city Parish one thousand or two thousand dollars instead of a hundred dollars? And with the long pull and the strong pull and the pull altogether throughout our American Church the great work of Missions need not be any more cribbed, cabined and confined, humbled, hindered and handicapped.

How shall the thought and premeditation be secured? I do not know unless the pastor, with all the other duties pressing on him, can and will take the trouble, personally or by letter or by a Committee appointed, to see to it that each one and every one in his Parish have the opportunity to pledge himself or herself to give a thoughtful sum for Missions.

If the giving must be left to the unpledged and unpremeditated offerings made in Divine Service, then I have another suggestion to make. It is one proffered and pressed by the wise and practical Bishop of West Virginia, namely, that in our use of money for the support of religion we ought to make a distinction between paying and giving. Then the paying of money would go in general for our Parish needs and expenses; such as, the support of the pastor, the sexton and the choir; the provision of a suitable church building, and the heat and light and equipment necessary to make our church home clean and comfortable and reverent. The giving of money would so be left for charities and benevolences and Missions. The paying would be done for our own spiritual health and growth, as paying to schools is done for intellectual health and growth, and to grocers and butchers for our physical health and growth. And, as no self-respecting person wants another to pay gratuitously for the schooling of his children or for the table supplies of himself and family, so each and every one in the Church or Parish should have the self-respect and honest pride to want to bear his or her own share of the Parish expenses. The provision for these expenses should be arranged for in a plain, business way, either by pew renting or by subscriptions carefully secured. The income so provided should be collected in a business way and put into and paid out from the Parish treasury. When all this paying is provided for in a business way, then giving begins. If the paying is done cheerfully and honorably and to the full, all the offerings in church can go for charities, benevolences and Missions.

I venture to think that we can see a deal of truth in the contention of the Bishop of West Virginia. When we pay the pastor for the care of our spiritual life, is it any more a giving than when we pay the doctor for the care and cure of our physical life? When we pay for the music ministering to our higher tastes in reverence of worship, are we entitled to call

The plain business methods called for—the business rentals, business subscriptions, business collections and business payments—were best, all of them, kept out of the Church altogether. Then all offerings in Church could be indeed unto the Lord. "All things come of Thee, O Lord, and of Thine own have we given unto Thee." They would be gifts to Him and for His poor, His sick, His ignorant ones, His Missionary kingdom. If this distinction could be so adopted and the real giving could be so practiced it might go far to solve the difficulties besetting our support of Missions.

I venture to make two other observations:

1. What is known as the envelope system in the support of a Parish is an excellent thing philosophically, and it is a hurtful thing practically. It is excellent in that it rallies all the constituency of the Parish to its support. Men and women, who are obliged to limit themselves to small gifts and who, from pride, perhaps, or from the lack of careless or timid canvassers, do not find themselves on subscription papers, will gladly give their dimes or quarters through the envelopes. This massing of the littles, and this upholding of the respect of the small givers, and this nourishing of the satisfactory feeling in their breasts that they are really helpful constituent elements in the unity and prosperity of the Parish, are things of very great value.

It is hurtful, in that many and many a one, and not always the poorer parishioners either, never think of putting anything else in the alms basin than the envelopes themselves. As the contents of these are generally for the Rector's salary, all other needs get poorly treated. Charities, benevolences, Missions and special needs are likely to receive only a starving support. The evil could be remedied—as in one Parish I know of it is remedied—by using a sort of double envelope, one part of it for needs in the Parish and the other for needs outside of the Parish.

2. I must give utterance to a deeply felt lamentation that in many of the Parishes of our Diocese it is the custom to take the Easter offerings for Parish purposes. Surely, this practice ignores any such distinction as the Bishop of West Virginia urges. People have not paid their pastor. They have not planned and arranged and collected payment of his salary. They have not paid their sexton and their organist and their coal bills and gas bills, and now they are ready—and it does seem as if often they are entirely callous to the incongruity and unfairness and almost irreverence of the act—they are ready to lay hold of the gifts made to God and to apply them to pay their own debts.

Lent is the time for saving. Easter is the time for giving. Ah! If only that business paying which we have talked of could be properly at-

tended to at other times and places and throughout the year, then what blessed results might surely be expected from really giving outside, and often if not always for Missions, the best offering of the best giving day in all the Church Calendar?

I do not believe the bad habit of using Easter offerings for dencits in Parish expenses has grown out of wilful selfishness. But rather from an easy natured way of letting things drift, and then concentrating on that blessed day energies to the grappling with and overcoming financial difficulties.

But I do ask the people to consider what an injurious relaxation of effort in planning and persuading and collecting throughout the year it breeds, when they indulge the habit of looking to Easter generosity to make full settlement.

And I furthermore ask if we do not honestly think that that generosity would be more a sweet smelling savor unto God if the giving should be free, generous, unselfish, for God's work and glory, and in a way quite regardless of the saving to our own pockets and our own income.

I do not think that a habit of years can be immediately or easily broken up. But, if you agree with me that there is a better way, how many of the Rectors and Vestries who hear me will be willing to take a step forward along that better way?

A few of you now give the Easter offerings unselfishly for outside purposes. May the number of such increase! Are there not others who may be willing to resolve that next Easter they will at least tithe their offerings of that day? That they will give one-tenth of that day's offerings to General Missions?

If you will do that, I shall feel that my poor pleading here has not been utterly in vain.

On April 23 Rev. C. M. Davis, of the committee, reported to the Board that \$1,200 for the salary of such Missionary for one year, had been secured. Whereupon the Bishop appointed Rev. Wm. Cochran as Missionary to do Missionary work in the City of St. Louis for one year from June 1, 1904, and recommend an appropriation of \$1,200 for his salary for that period. The Board approved the appointment and appropriated \$1,200 as his salary for one year from June 1, the same to be paid out of the funds raised by the committee. The Board further ordered that the work of the Missionary be done under the direction of the committee already appointed, subject to the control and supervision of the Board. The committee to take charge of and disburse the funds raised by it, make report to the Board of its action as often as required and at least once a year.

The Board further reports that it made the annual campaign in behalf of Diocesan Missions, and Missions to the city institutions by sending laymen to the Parishes and Missions in the City and County of St. Louis, to present the work that was being done and the need of support it required from them.

The Board further reports that it will need the sum of \$4,750 to keep the present Diocesan Missionary work as it is at present, and \$1,600 for Missions to city institutions.

Report of Secretary of Moman's Auxiliary.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri:

In presenting the twenty-third annual report we are glad to add Poplar Bluff to the list of Missions working with us. Two scholarships, one to be known as the Bishop Tuttle Scholarship, at Anvik, Alaska, and the Carroll M. Davis, not yet assigned, have been added, making seven scholarships, costing \$695.00, now supported by Missouri.

There is, even in the minds of the officers, sometimes a mistiness as to what are "specials" and what are designated "offerings" to the Board. The last two scholarships are designated offerings, as are our annual pledges for General Missions and for Foreign, and our gifts towards the salaries of any workers in the field. While "specials" will always form a large part of our work, these designated offerings aid the work of the Board and pay in part the \$560.00, which is Missouri's share in the apportionment of \$100,000.00, which is asked of the Auxiliary to aid the work of the Board of Missions.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

ARTICLE I-NAME.

SECTION I. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

SECTION I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

Section I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

Section I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

Sec. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

Sec. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI-FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section I. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section I. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

Section 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

Rules of Order of Convention.

- The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed. viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 II. On Constitution and Canons.
 III. On Unfinished Business.

III.

On Finance. IV.

V. On Assessments.

VI. On Missions.

- On Christian Education. VII.
- On Sunday School Work. VIII.
 - On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses. IX.

On the State of the Church.

- On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- II. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
