Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Suiday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and Dicrease of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

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Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz:

- I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
- II. On Assessments.
- III. On Constitution and Canons.
- IV. On Finance.

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- V. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
- VI. On Missions.
- VII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- VIII. On State of the Church.
 - IX. Unfinished Business.
 - X. On Social Service.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. Any member shall not absent himself from the services of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

RULES OF ORDER

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

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11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

RULES OF ORDER

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest **a** number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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Journal of the Eighty=first Convention OF THE Church in the Diocese of Missouri

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, SAINT LOUIS,

Tuesday, January 27, 1920.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-first Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, on January 27, 1920, at 10 a. m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. John S. Bunting read the Epistle and the Rev. B. E. Reed read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the Schuyler Memorial House, with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the forty-two who were entitled to vote, twenty-six were present.

The Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented his report. See page 16.)

Report accepted by the Bishop.

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The Secretary called the roll of the Lay Delegates to the Convention.

Forty-three Parishes and Missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from twenty were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

On motion the Rev. Mr. Mizner cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

On motion the Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

On motion the visiting Clergy and candidates for Holy Orders were invited to seats on the floor of the Convention.

On motion the amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution which was contained in Resolution No. 21, adopted at the last Convention, was approved by the unanimous vote of both Orders, voting separately, and by the Bishop.

On motion the amendment to Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution which was contained in Resolution No. 7, adopted at the last Convention, was approved by the unanimous vote of both Orders, voting separately, and by the Bishop.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Dr. Wilkins, Dean Davis and the Rev. Mr. Coxe as clerical members of the Nominating Committee, and the Bishop declared them elected.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Messrs. C. C. Curtice, James A. Waterworth, and James M. Bull as lay members of the Nominating Committee, and the Bishop declared them elected.

On motion all delinquent diocesan assessments against St. Luke's Mission, Saint Louis, were remitted.

Recess of the Convention until 2:30 p.m.

Mr. Jennings presented his report as Secretary of the Standing Committee. (Appendix 3.)

The Rev. Mr. Wharton introduced Resolution No. 1 as follows: RESOLUTION No. 1.—

Be it resolved, that the Diocesan Board of Missions be instructed to pay stipends monthly instead of quarterly.

WHEREAS, in this great crisis of the Nation's life there is a more urgent need than ever for a trained youth whose ideals are Christian, because their training has been Christian, and which training is only possible under such Christian auspices as Sewanee affords; and,

WHEREAS, we have received the word of the contemplated effort to raise a million dollar endowment necessary to make these ideals and accomplishments possible;

Be it resolved, that the Diocesan Convention of Missouri most heartily endorses this whole movement for a more adequate endowment; and hopes that the people of this Diocese may be able to make a generous response.

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APPENDIX No. 1.

Annual Address of the Bisbop of Missouri

TO THE

Eighty=first Annual Convention.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

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I do not think that we have an entire "at home" feeling in our assembling today. From time immemorial we have been accustomed to gather for our Diocesan Convention in the balmy month of May. To lay hold, for investiture, of the chillingness of a midwinter day of January is not an altogether pleasant change. But there is not wanting good reason to commend the change to our consideration and acceptance.

This Church of ours is a national institution, and it spreads itself along lines of a far-flung extension. Along such lines in all reasonable ways we want to keep it at unity with itself. One way to conserve the unity would be to have all the accounts and reports and financial summings made up and brought in at one specified time. In this way uniformity and accuracy, much desired, would come in to characterize our statistics. I know statistics are like sausages, valued and accepted only through faith in the one who makes them. But I also know that statistics are very useful to guide to an intelligent judgment and to help to a wise planning. It is worth while then for the national church to reduce the accounts and reports and financial summings in all places to the terms and times of the calendar year from January 1 to January 1. Hereafter we shall be called upon to contribute our part to the uniformity desired. For this time, however, our Diocesan year must be reckoned as eight months only. viz., from May 1, 1919, to January 1, 1920. But hereafter it is to be exactly the calendar year from January 1 to January 1. So the Canon commands. And so the principles of accuracy and regularity and uniformity demand.

In the eight months cited only two of our Bishops have died, Bishop Gray and Bishop Sage. Bishop Gray was 84 years old. Bishop Sage was only a little past 53. Bishop Gray was in active Episcopal duty in the Missionary District of Southern Florida for twenty-one years. Then for the last six years he exchanged his sword of the spirit for the wooden lath of retiracy in comparative rest. Devoted and faithful, eminent for priestly loyalty and pastoral fidelity, he won his way into the hearts of his flock, by whom he was Geeply respected and greatly loved. Southern Florida responded to his tillage and culture; and today that Missionary District has more communicants in it than any one of sixteen of our Dioceses, and more Clergy than any one of thirty-fcur. With the large-heartedness of a real father in God he made it an eminent feature of his Bishop's work to seek out and care for the colored people of his field.

Bishop Sage died in his prime. With the optimism of youth combined with marked practical sagacity he was maturing plans for the Church to enlarge her grasp and tighten her grip on the sturdy Kansas population that made up his Missionary District of Salina. But ere he was two years at work he died.

We had 293 Bishops before Sage. Of these only eight died with less than

two years of Episcopal work done by each. Among the eight were two Bishops of Massachusetts: Bishop Parker, the second of that Diocese, whose Episcopate was the shortest in American history, continuing only for two months and twenty-two days; and Phillips Brooks, the sixth Bishop of that Diocese, who was Bishop for only one year, three months and nine days.

We have now 125 Bishops in the House. Of one of them, a kindly and scholarly man, a sad story must be entered in the record. It is Bishop Kinsman, the late Bishop of Delaware. He has been received into the Roman Catholic Church. He has been suspended from the exercise of his office by the authorities of our Church, and, if he do not retract or return, he will in six months be deposed from the Ministry. He seems to have withdrawn from us because, as he thought, some in the Church do not hold the doctrines and follow the practices that they ought. He should have given heed to the Master's words to Peter, "What is that to thee. Follow thou me." Instead, he slackened in duty, much like a sulking Achilles, and, leaving the flock which he had tended and the fold which he had guarded, he has gone into a strange land, there to abide. If he descried a lack of earnestness on the part of some of his brethren touching their valuation of the grace of Orders and their desire to ensure and perfect the validity of the same, it was his bounden duty, it would seem, with his learning and devotion to stand by and uphold the worth of these Orders to the conviction and conversion of all gainsayers, instead of deserting his post or throwing up his commission and retiring into alien ranks in open flout of the mother who had borne him and reared him and honored him.

We are sad and sorry for the defection, and, in recording it as a closed incident, we pray God to help us to gird up our loins and to gather all the closer to our colors and to stand in unshaken fidelity beside and under the guidance of our own Church.

Death has taken from our list one Clergyman, Grover W. Harrison, who was ordered Deacon in this Cathedral, in June, 1917, and who died in New Mexico in July, 1919, having never done active duty in our Diocese.

Among the laity who have died during the year are: H. V. Estill, a typical Virginia Churchman and the Warden of the Church at Moberly for a third of a century; D. S. Brown, a faithful helper years ago in the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Louis, and later in Grace, Kirkwood; George Prothero, of St. Mary's, St. Louis; F. N. Judson, staunch and steadfast, who offered his wealth of learning in the law to the use of the Church whenever the need arose; H. H. Denison, who was the painstaking Secretary of the Diocese for some years and always a working member on several Diocesan Boards; and Mrs. Sherburne, wife of the pastor of Grace, Crystal City. She came with her husband to his new field and almost the day after her arriving was stricken down in death. Our deep sympathy goes forth to our brother in such sudden and sad bereavement.

The histories of the living! The diptychs of the dead! We belong to the histories now. Soon we shall be listed in the diptychs. God mercifully have us in His holy keeping!

Though this be a shortened year, some things in it are bright and encouraging.

The cheery way in which Ascension Church, St. Louis, laid hold of its debt and cleared it out of the way is one of them. Not long ago that debt was \$24,000. It got reduced to \$17,000. Then, with a harmonious sound of voices, and an equally harmonious beating of hearts, and furthermore, also, with a harmonious opening of pocketbooks, the Vestry and people sprang forward to the attack and under it the debt went down out of sight, and the waves of a triumphant success closed over it. So, just a few days—almost a few hours—after the year closed the Church was consecrated. The whole Lucese is in a warm glow of congratulation extended to Rector and Vestry and people.

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The observance of the Centennial of Christ Church Cathedral was a most happy event. There was an outpouring of sympathy and a wealth of congratulation that came from hearts with wonderful warmth and went to hearts with wonderful force. Kindly thought and kindly words and helpful deeds sprang up from State and City and neighborhood as well as from Church and Parish and Diocese. There is a civic pride in the Cathedral. There is an American reverence for the Cathedral. And I venture to say that in all the thirty years of its existence the warm red blood of brotherly harmony and affectionate appreciation between the Cathedral and Diocese has never flowed in stronger or sweeter channels than those in which it flows now. God be thanked!

One of the oldest parishes of the Diocese, almost the oldest outside of St. Louis, viz., Trinity, St. Charles, has been trembling under the infirmities of age. Rev. Mr. Reed has taken hold of it. He says he isn't old himself, nor mfirm, nor trembling, and that he does not want to hear such words flung out. So Trinity, St. Charles, has stopped trembling and is taking on a wholesome vigor. In Lindenwood College, a Presbyterian institution, is quite a goodly contingent of our own Church girls. They are loyal and helpful, and are standing by Mr. Reed in his work of banishing the tremors of the old and of introducing the freshness and strength of the new.

The activities in the Diocese of the Nation-wide Church Campaign under the leadership of the Rev. Mr. Putney have roused Parishes and heartened people wonderfully. The campaign enlarges horizons. It broadens minds. It warms hearts. It inspires souls. It collects and concentrates and transmits and distributes spiritual force. It harmonizes and unifies. "All hail" and "God speed," say we to the Nation-wide Church Campaign.

The Woman's Auxiliary, Semper fidelis et benedictus, has given a grand total of \$8,205.35. When done with great things and wide things and comprehensive things may I turn aside to speak of a personal thing, a little thing? Yet, not a little thing either. For the eight months of the constructive year—and if the year were longer I would have it longer—I have had a motor car and its chauffeur to dance attendance on all my needs. And neither car nor chauffeur, neither original cost nor upkeep has called for one penny out of my pocket. Furthermore, I don't know who the benevolent and generous Cheerybles who furnish it are—friends or strangers, old or young, trousers or gowns. I absolutely know nothing about it; I call that a big thing and no little thing at all; and I want to tell out loud that the car helps me to do a heap of things that couldn't well get done without it.

There is one town in the Diocese to which I want to call special attention, viz., Columbia. Calvary, Columbia, is a most important Parish. At the University of Missouri there are 4,000 students. At the Baptist School and the Christian School, both for girls, are hundreds more. One may say, the youth of the State are quite congregated here, and the pick of the youth too. Every thoughtful Churchman would say, here, surely, the Church should be presented in her dignity, in the completeness of her influence and the fullness of her power. He would add in thought, Ministers must have learning for one of their equipments. Then the young men in Colleges and Universities must furnish the supply of future Ministers needed. How gravely important, then, that that this Church should commend herself to them, to be known by them and studied by them in her dignity and comeliness, and to be loved and served by them, or by a fair percentage of them, in her Ministry of the future. Yes, this Church should be presented and represented in Columbia in her beauty and her power. And St. Louis and Kansas City and St. Joseph and Joplin and other large places should send help, if need be, in the presentation. These thoughts have pressed themselves with urgency upon me of late. Then I bethought myself of my age and said reflectingly to myself, You are not one fitted to lead and guide the advance movement for Columbia, even if the Nation-wide Church Campaign and its Department of Religious

Education should promise to stand by for help. This truth I took in, and therefore I have turned over the jurisdiction of Calvary, Columbia, to the Bishop Coadjutor, that he with his youth and wisdom and skill and efficiency may exercise in the Parish and town the leadership called for in the New Era setting in. May God's guidance and guardianship and grace be abundantly ministered to him and to the Parish, as they go forward on their way rejoicing!

There is also one institution to which I wish to call special attention, viz., St. Luke's Hospital.

St. Luke's Hospital is a Church Institution. By the Articles of Association all the Clergy of the Diocese of Missouri are members of the Association; and nine of the thirteen members of the Board of Directors must be members of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Missouri. And the Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri is President of the Association. It is in a sense an institution of our own to which I desire to call your attention.

I do not think that I can attain my object in any better way than by reproducing with the voice, if you will allow me to do so, the thoughts about the Hospital which have been already printed and published in the Church News.

The thoughts are these:

St. Luke's Hospital needs publicity. In modern days publicity is an altogether wholesome and an unceasingly active force. For more than fifty years St. Luke's Hospital has been doing its blessed work. Blessed, indeed, even to the well-to-do who become its patients, who can afford to pay and who generously do pay for its ministering skill and care. To the cure of sickness skilled and experienced nursing is a most valuable contributor. Not seldom it is of more value than would be the devoted attention of loving ones in the home. But if Hospitals be blessings to the well-to-do with their good homes how doubly and trebly are they blessings to the homeless and the lonely and the poor who can not command the sanitary helps and the remedial equipments that sickness imperatively demands. Hearts that are softly human are always touched to the quick when thinking of these in their sicknessthe homeless, the lonely, the poor. All Hospitals do more or less of the blessed work of charity for the homeless and the lonely and the poor who have nowhere else to look but to their beneficent care and cure. And, thanks to soft human hearts, almost all men and women are ready and willing to give to Hospitals and to leave gifts to Hospitals in their wills when the need for help gets itself placed before them.

St. Luke's Hospital has not been slow to do its part in this charity work. For fifty years she has done it. Clergymen she has always cared for. And Clergymen belong to the list of the poor in this world's goods. And the families of the Clergy she has taken in for care and cure. And quantities of other people she has invited in—you can count them by scores and hundreds, when their need was the only thing that evoked their invitation and their humble thanks the only things that could be proffered for repay.

Now, St. Luke's greatly needs help. Modern Hospitals are costly things to run. Doctors do not swell the cost. Bless their benevolent hearts, they do a heap of charity work all the while. But Science calls for large expenditures to secure its wonderful benefits. Medical and surgical operations must have up-to-date equipments, and they are costly. Skilled nursing cannot be had without expense accounts piling themselves up somewhere. And high prices show no more merciful leniency to the sick than they do to the poor

By gifts, by pledges, by subscriptions, by annual dues, by bequests in wills, St. Luke's must have help. From the depths of my heart, I avouch that she is worthy of the help and deserves it.

Brethren of the Clergy, by the Charter you all are members, voting members, of the St. Luke's Hospital Association. Will you not give us your influence ar Missou and ler Luke's Church turned stark u much fe ment in ing Pur hands v pital?

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g memr influence and your pleadings? Churchmen and Churchwomen of the Diocese of Missouri, will you not look up in faith, and forward in hope and out in love and lend a hand to our pressing need? Citizens of St. Louis, though St. Luke's was founded and is conducted under the auspices of the Episcopal Church, yet never is any line of demarcation drawn and never is any one turned away from its door because of his religious belief, or even for his stark unbelief. Citizens of St. Louis, it is benevolent institutions that make much for the good fame of a city and that tend mightily to promote contentment in the hearts of its inhabitants; then, if aught be left over in your Giving Purses after the good help you are rendering elsewhere, will you not join hands with us to the rescue of one such benevolent institution, St. Luke's Hospital?

May I add thanks for myself and bespeak the thanks of the entire Diocese, to the Board of Directors for what they have done and what they are doing for the Hospital? By the nature of their office they are Trustees of the benevolences and beneficences of the community. And most wisely and helpfully have they discharged the duties of their trust. They have watched over the Hospital. They have guided its activities. They have protected its credit. They have given their valuable time and their business skill and their American energy and their co-operative force and, indeed, their loving hearts to the service of St. Luke's. And besides all this they have once and again put their hands into their own pockets, and deeply too, to sustain the credit and supply the needs and keep clear and clean the good name of the Hospital. This cannot go on. We ought not to expect of them such inequitable sacrifices. Were it to go on indefinitely the warm love which they now have for St. Luke's would be in the way of changing into a chilly resentment for that the Church and the Diocese and the community were shoving upon them a burden that ought to be cheerily borne by all.

The Hospital wants the help of all. And it needs that help now. If the help be delayed, grave results are to be feared. The chilliness of the Directors may grow more cold. Present supporters may get discouraged. Criticisms and suspicions may raise their heads. Love of the Hospital, pride in the Hospital, loyalty to the Hospital, may be in danger of dying out.

Then bear with a cheeerful patience my two strong entreaties, all ye with whom I am pleading:

1st. Give help to St. Luke's in its sore need.

2nd. (The second being almost of twin value with the first): Do it now.

Dear Brethren, I summon you now to thoughtfulness and care about reports and accounts and plans, about budgets and assessments and apportionments. These be little and unimportant things, do you say? Yes, just as breakfasts and lunches and dinners are little and unimportant things in the ongoing of life. But, without them, "Carry On" would not be a slogan of much value. We need not be so intent on these things as to think of naught else. No, rather, "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, if there be any praise," let us "think on these things."

APPENDIX No. 2.

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Address of the Bisbop Coadjutor, Eighty = first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

My convention address at this time, as you know, covers only the eight months from May 1 to December 31, 1919.

During that period I have confirmed within the limits of the field assigned to me a total of twenty-four persons. I have baptized three adults and nine children. I have officiated at one burial. I have celebrated the Holy Communion or have assisted in its celebration seventeen times. I have preached and delivered addresses within the Diocese seventy-three times. I have assisted at the consecration of one church. I have licensed lay readers from congregations in my field as follows: A. J. Kirby, St. Luke's, St. Louis; Ernest Kroehle, St. Mary's, St. Louis; Arthur O. Steidemann, St. Thomas', St. Louis; Charles K. Hitchcock, Jr., Bonne Terre; E. W. Broemmelsiek, Jennings. These licenses expired December 31st, and I have as yet had request for only one renewal. The clergy know the canon in the premises.

For many years, from time to time, the Church's worship has been held at the farm house of Mr. George Colvert, near Vandalia. Last New Year's Day I ministered the Holy Communion to him and two others there. Full of years, he has now entered into rest—a man who swore unto his neighbor and disappointed him not, though it were to his own hindrance.

Mr. Frederick N. Judson of this city was helpful to me on many occasions when I needed just a word of reassurance from a kindly man who understood the genius of the Church and was learned in the law. Putting strength without stint into the work of Commissions charged with grave responsibilities while the war was on, he died in the world struggle for humanity and liberty quite as really and truly as though he had been shrapnelled on the field of battle. We remember him affectionately and miss him here today.

In the month of December Mr. Harry V. Estill of Moberly finished his course in faith—a good man, of clean hands and pure heart, passionately fond of home and family, honored by his fellow-townsmen, devoted to the Church.

Mrs. Essie G. Hull of DeSoto, long invalided, tired of tarrying here, has crossed the bar. I have reason to suppose that she had only slender means, but, doing good by stealth, she ofttimes ministered to my necessities. Among gifts recorded this year as received by me for missionary work, \$20.00 came from her.

I had prayers at the bedside of Mrs. Rohre of Ironton not long before the Master came and called her. She talked with me at that time in such fashion as to make me feel that the light was pure that marked the road that led her to the Lamb. She is greatly missed.

Mr. George Prothero, who had worshipped many years in St. Mary's and supported its work, a man much beloved by his Rector as a good and faithful servant, entered Paradise on the last day of November.

Love and sympathy and substantial help of many kinds were poured out to the Rev. L. C. Sherburne of Crystal City whose home was left desolate by the passing out of it of his wife only a few weeks ago—a woman whose gentle ways had brought about her many friends.

Mrs. Jane Newman of Ironton, constant at the Church's worship, fruitful unto every good work, after a brief illness, just having asked a neighbor, who was in to play on the cottage organ "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," knowing Whom she had believed, passed on only a few days ago to await in Paradise the reward of them that love His appearing. She lacked only a few days of being four score years old, had lived in Ironton nearly sixty years, and was a charter member of St. Paul's Church.

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tor as day of For the good examples of these and of others whose names we have not written down, for whom Christ's call hath come and with sweet enlargement hath dismissed them hence, we yield our thanks to God.

Pretty much everywhere throughout the Church during the past year, the Nation-Wide Campaign has held the middle of the road. In this Diocese we deliberately committed ourselves to the project by resolution of the Convention last May, pledging "hearty support" and requesting the Bishop to appoint a Diocesan Campaign Committee of five members "with power to act . . . in making this Campaign a success in this Diocese." The Campaign Committee was named by the Bishop on the following day. A Chairman was appointed who has put an immense amount of time and labor into the effort to help to move the Diocese to accomplish what we said we should try to do. The Committee has done solid work; but much remains to be completed.

As I approach this Convention—we are now in its opening hours and our custom has been to sit each year the greater part of three days —I approach it with the sincere hope that, whatever other things we do or leave undone, we shall make Nation-Wide Campaign interests the order of the day as often as is necessary to the end that we may have a clear understanding on two questions of large importance now touching the Campaign: First, Where are we at? Second, Where do we go from here?

The seriousness of this Nation-Wide Campaign business first gripped me in the Church Missions House in New York City early in September, though I had been busy about it before that. That was the day when Pershing marched with thousands of his men from Central Park to the Battery. New York had never seen such a day in all her history. Unless we shall have another world war, she will never see another such a day. New York was filled with people. They were jammed together a-tiptoe at the intersection of every street with every avenue. They were on the roofs and leaning out of the windows of office buildings and skyscrapers. And in an office building at Fourth avenue and Twentieth street a hundred busy men and a number of women stuck in their chairs all day. The Chairman of that day's meeting was a layman lately back from duty overseas. Had he no interest in the troops? Had he no enthusiasm for the General who had just come home, having led "the finest army ever sent by any country into any war?" Sure he had. Six stars were in the lapel of his coat, which meant that he had sent six sons to fight the fight for humanity and liberty. What was he doing, then, in a chair with a gavel at his hand in an office room at Fourth avenue and Twentieth street, while Pershing and his men were crossing Twentieth street at Fifth avenue, with bands and banners? The Nation-Wide programme was under discussion. That's what was holding him. Returning from a campaign in

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the name of his country, this layman that I speak of was enthusiastic for a crusade in the name of his Christ. Plans for carrying forward the royal banners of the Christ were being carefully studied. That's what was going on. And these plans kept over a hundred patriotic men and women in that office building from even looking at Pershing's big parade. I said to myself, It isn't true that there is nothing new under the sun. And I came back to St. Louis from that meeting and I told you that I verily believed it might yet come to pass, in our day,

"Like a mighty army Moves the Church of God."

I told you that I believed the Nation-Wide Campaign was going to sweep across the country confident of its mission and with great spiritual power. I told you that I believed that it might yet come true that Church people here in Missouri should be a "happy throng," instead of seventy unrelated congregations and half-discouraged groups. I begged the clergy to distribute the literature through dependable committees as thoroughly as possible, and to make Paul's motto, "This one thing I do," their own as they met with their congregations week by week. I begged the laity to inform themselves; to let a more devoted and devout attendance upon the worship of the Church invigorate them and inspire them so that they should sense a genuine warfare and should harness themselves anew and carry bows and really face the battle.

Yes, I have been enthusiastic for this business which is the King's business, from the first day until now. And I ask that this Convention will be enthusiastic for it and take whatever steps are necessary to follow up the steps already taken until we see it through—that portion of it which properly belongs in our programme for the year that has just opened. **Enthusiastic**, I say. I do not say **excited**. There is a difference. And we know the difference. The toy acrobat that tops the clothes-line post in your back yard gets nowhere. He swings his arms frantically in all directions at every slight suggestion of a breeze. But he gets nowhere. There is a maximum of motion, but no progress. What this Diocese needs in this greatest year of her opportunity is enthusiasm. Look up its derivation, if you have forgotten it, and it will strike you as a word worth while.

Let us then, dear people, at this Convention, do all that we can do to send us back, clergy and laity alike, to the several congregations of the Diocese, with a clear understanding of what the Diocese is committed to in the Nation-Wide Campaign, and of what it has already done; and with **enthusiasm** to stick at this piece of duty until Missouri has exhausted the endeavor to persuade every communicant and every baptized person to assume his whole share in this effort to enlist the whole Church's membership for the whole Church's work.

This is not a duty which we can disown without dishonor. Some have stood aside because they thought and said that it was a scheme wished on them by a bunch of self-appointed reconstructionists. Not so. Here in St. Louis at the General Convention three years ago a canon was adopted requiring the Board of Missions of the whole Church to submit a budget for the whole Church for 1920, and an estimate for 1921 and 1922. Required and empowered by that canon to act, the Board of Missions through the Rev. Dr. Patton and others associated with him as the Board's agents for this department of its work, set themselves at it to bring in a completed picture of "the world's extremity and the Church's opportunity." This picture or survey was reported to the Board of Missions and by the Board of Missions exhibited to the General Convention in Detroit last October as a suggested

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vey was ions exiggested basis for the required budget. The General Convention in both Houses, with scarcely a dissenting vote, took the whole project over, stamped it with its imprimatur, and appointed a Commission of the whole Church to prosecute the Campaign to its conclusion. Things standing as they do, we have, I think, a duty which we cannot disown without dishonor. We may try and fail. **Have** we tried? If not, shall we? And when? Ash Wednesday is almost here. The Church asks every Diocese for its final reckoning at Easter. And Lent is just the season of all seasons for doing this intensive spiritual work. The primary purpose of the Campaign is a 100 per cent member-

The primary purpose of the Campaign is a 100 per cent membership intelligently informed as to the Church's present-day responsibilities; a 100 per cent membership awakened to a new realization of the vitalness of their spiritual life by reason of their baptism into Christ; a 100 per cent membership reconsecrated to the carrying on of the warfare for which each one, witnessed to by men and angels, pledged himself when he was signed with the sign of the cross in token of his enlistment to be "Christ's faithful soldier" and "manfully to fight;" a 100 per cent membership startled into a new appreciation of the weight of their accountability as accredited messengers for Christ by reason of the renewal of baptismal vows in confirmation.

You who have not done it yet, be persuaded, I beg you, that this Campaign is a "call to knowledge." Be quite sure that a wider knowl-edge of the Church's shortcomings, duties and opportunities, must be followed by your own reconsecration to supply the Church's needs. And this individual reconsecration will surely register itself in increased activity along the lines of personal service and more generous gifts. Following close upon the heels of a war which passed in review before us such shining examples of heroism and sacrifice for what was known to be an inspiring cause, the Church needs not to be surprised to find that, once her cause is known, her members are ready to make at least as large a sacrifice of personal comfort, of time, of income, for the Christ in a war from which there is no discharge, as they made for their country, when her need was known. When the allotted period of pub-licity has done its work, you will of necessity ask yourselves, Shall I give for my Christ as I gave for my Country? Shall I be an outstand-ing Christian, as I was an upstanding Patriot? Shall I bear up the Cross, as I bore up the Flag? When you have asked these questions, the Every Member Canvass is a necessity. Not as the end aimed at in the Campaign, but as a privilege to be participated in by you after an intensive educational programme has made you aware how, with increased givings into her treasury, the Church might confidently and triumphantly carry the world forward toward "the goals of God." You see, therefore, how your pledges of more devoted personal service and of enlarged offerings of money must come, not as the object of the Nation-Wide Campaign, but as its result. And the Diocese of Missouri will be found, please God, at Easter, to have pledged its whole quota for the doing of the Church's task; every man giving "according as he is disposed in his heart" after having knowledge of the situation; the only "necessity" compelling him being the "love of Christ" of whose sore need he knew so little until this Campaign brought him to his senses!

If this whole question of the Nation-Wide Campaign and the response of this Diocese to its appeal is as intimately interwoven with the honor of the Diocese and the extension of Christ's kingdom as I have thus far in my address tried to tell you that I think it is, may I not suggest that, if it meets with your approval and in no way conflicts with worthier plans which the Bishop of the Diocese may have it in mind to suggest—may I not suggest that the report of the Diocesan Nation-Wide Campaign Committee be made the order of the day at as early an hour as possible tomorrow?

And, ought not this Convention to provide a strong Carry-on Committee of persons who, in one way or another, have disclosed that they have more than a desultory interest in the Church's Mission, said Committee to be charged with the important and by no means easy duty (begging your pardon; for, believe me, we must be good sports and play the game) of so directing the team work that we do not get crowded back from the gains we have already made, and of giving the signals which seem most likely to fetch us across whatever "yards" are yet "to gain," to make a touchdown and to win the goal.

And, looking a bit further ahead, let us have as soon as possible, if you agree with me, a paid Executive Secretary for the Diocese, of proved business ability, in whose office all Diocesan Nation-Wide activities should head up, working in connection with the Bishops and the Carry-on Committee.

I do not particularize in the matter of what the Nation-Wide Campaign has accomplished in my field. The report, I hope, will soon be printed in full and circulated in every congregation. It will then appear how splendidly resultful the work was in many places. I have returns from my field which give me a good hope that the few congregations which have not made the canvass yet will complete it before Easter and that our quota will be wholly raised. I do not forget that mere figures never tell the whole story of work accomplished and victories won; but from such reports as were returned to me, if you could know the circumstances as I do, I think you would say that St. Augustine's, St. Stephen's, Prince of Peace, and St. Luke's in this city, and Poplar Bluff, Rolla, Moberly, and St. James outside, have done things especially worthy to be remembered. And let me in this connection say how greatly appreciated were the services rendered by Mr. Thomas Q. Dix and members of his Speakers' Bureau in all places where they went and by the Bishop Coadjutor who was anxious that they should go.

If you could know the rural field, as I think I know it, though my knowledge of it makes me not dissatisfied but most unsatisfied, you would agree that, while there is much to desire, there is also much cause for rejoicing.

Moberly, practically without services for eighteen months, has at my suggestion called the Rev. C. F. Edwards as rector, and he has taken charge. This does not in any way disturb his relations to the Macon parish of which he has been rector for three years. Cape Girardeau, vacant eight months, has on my nomination elected the Rev. William E. McCord of the Diocese of Long Island lately home from France where he served as a senior chaplain with rank of Major. We have a good hope that he will come. Poplar Bluff, which for some time has been trying to satisfy itself with a monthly Sunday service, has just assured me of pledges sufficient to give good support and has approved my appointment of a clergyman who we hope will soon take charge. Crystal City and Herculaneum, vacated on October 1 by the withdrawal of the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., were on November 1 committed to the care of the Rev. L. C. Sherburne of the Diocese of Connecticut, lately home from Y. M. C. A. work in France. At Kirksville which has had Sunday evening services only for a year. I approved for temporary appointment, November 15, the Rev. Lyman Howes, formerly rector at Chillicothe in the Diocese of West Missouri. The Rev. George L. Barnes ministers occasionally at Fulton in the homes of our people, the church building erected about twelve years ago being practically condemned; and at Portland where interest in the Church has greatly revived of late. The Vestry at Jefferson City not only releases Mr. Barnes for these extra-parochial ministrations, but insists also on paying a part of the expenses connected with his journeys into-

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the regions beyond—a refreshing indication of interest in home missionary work. Mr. Charles K. Hitchcock, Jr., makes himself responsible for gathering a little Sunday School regularly in the guild hall at Bonne Terre. The Rev. Mr. Atwill volunteered for duty there for several months of the summer, was greatly appreciated, and presented four for confirmation. Ironton became vacant November 1, when the Rev. V. O. Penley asked to be relieved of the charge after faithfully serving them from DeSoto during a period of five years. Mr. Penley continues as rector of DeSoto, which has a parochial organization, ministering one Sunday each month at Fredericktown. It is eighteen months since I last visited Salem. No service has been held there during that time, though the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt of Rolla is available for emergency calls.

There are over a dozen congregations in my rural field not mentioned in the paragraph above. Of these Rolla should be especially congratulated. Its quota in the Nation-Wide Campaign was the largest assessed to any congregation in my field outside of St. Louis and the entire amount is reported pledged. I want to speak of Valley Park, where spite of the fact that the one industry of the town has been closed all the year, our little congregation has faced the road with a fine courage and has reaped much spiritual blessing as a result. Worthy of all praise is the faithfulness of the lay reader, Mr. Richard Kopplin, of Emmanuel Parish, Webster Groves, who through thick and thin, and heat and cold, and sun and rain, has made the round trip of thirty miles by auto every Sunday since last March to instruct the Sunday School and to conduct the worship. And sheaves as the result of bearing forth good seed are coming in.

South of an east-and-west line drawn through Rolla is a rectangle whose sides are 105 by 160 miles. Included in this area of 16,000 square miles is the one parish of Cape Girardeau, eight organized missions, three unorganized missions, a total of twelve congregations. Today there is not a minister of this Church resident in that whole area, though a Sunday School is maintained at Bonne Terre and at Cape Girardeau, and services of a clergyman are had one Sunday every month at Fredericktown and at Poplar Bluff. In this address I have already told you of my hope that Cape Girardeau and Poplar Bluff will soon have resident pastors. Even so, if these are found presently and take the work assigned them, it will still be true that this section of our Diocese of 105 by 160 miles, into which one can put the whole state of Massachusetts twice, will have but two clergy. I am so strongly impressed that I cannot get away from it, that the Diocese of Missouri must make the above described area one of its first objectives just as soon as Nation-Wide Campaign returns make it possible to put a strong man with a strong car into the field as circuit rider and to pay him a salary somehow proportioned to the amount of hardness that he must endure.

In St. Louis, St. Augustine's has increased its building fund to a figure which will justify, presently, the laying of the corner stone of the new Miller Memorial Hall. The good people have also just added another \$300 to the Rev. Mr. Atwill's salary. The guild rooms of the chapel of the Prince of Peace have been improved by water supply and sewer connections, and the chapel has been painted and repaired. Sister Miriam and the Rev. Mr. Weddell are constant in good works for the spiritual health of the growing flock, and Mr. Frank Rushton, whose life hung in the balance as a consequence of wounds received in the Argonne, is back as efficient lay reader and superintendent of the Sunday School. New life has been infused into St. Luke's, Harney Heights, by Mrs. A. V. Clark as parish visitor, succeeded now by Deaconess Sniffen, who ministered so faithfully at Herculaneum several years. St.

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Timothy's, the Rev. A. P. Rein in charge, has cleared away its debt of \$2300. The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor will report for Grace-Holy Cross, which celebrated its seventy-fifth anniversary in June, and has received a Susan Mount legacy of \$50,000 for a new church, and a pledge of \$1200 annually for a period of ten years from the heirs of the late W. H. Woodward, toward current expenses. Our loving sympathy and earnest pravers are with Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore, who is seriously ill at his home. For nine years he has been the faithful and devoted chairman of the Business Committee of Holy Cross Corporation. St. Stephen's has added a dispensary and has enlarged the sphere of its activities in other ways, which the Rev. H. W. Mizner will tell you of. The Epiphany, a mission of St. Peter's parish, with the Rev. J. G. Seacord in charge as vicar, has done effective community and social service work in a section of the city which furnishes large scope for such endeavors. The Rev. I. H. Lever will tell you how the work in the City Institutions has gone and how they had the best and biggest Christmas festivities that they have ever had. Mr. Lever asks for the appointment of the Rev. J. H. Harvey to our staff for full time duty in the City Institutions, and of the Rev. D. R. Clarke and Miss Daisy Lorick to assignments with special reference to City Hospital No. 2, which has recently been established for the colored people. Under appointment of the Missouri Dio-cesan League of Lay Readers, Messrs. deRenthel, Broemmelsiek, Faun-teleroy, Freegard, Kopplin, Maybury, Pomeroy, Saunders and Williamson have served various places in my field, to all of whom, as also to Mr. Jones of All Saints' Parish, I give my warm thanks. I record with gratitude that the Woman's Auxiliary and the Juniors and the Missionary Host, which last year had the biggest offering in thirty-three years, have given me money without which the Ford car used by one of our missionaries would have been stalled, sewing schools would have lacked for raw materials, and fires in several places would have died out. A never-failing bank check from one devoted friend each month pays the entire stipend of the Deaconess at Grace-Holy Cross. In its proper place in the Journal will be found statements of offerings to my Missionary Purse of over \$200, and special gifts of nearly \$2400, from many generous friends, which amounts have gone to the easing of burdens here and there, the meeting of emergencies in homes where sickness and death have entered, and the payment of additional stipends and traveling expenses. The Church Woman's Club made a generous contribution to our work at Grace-Holy Cross, which did not pass through my books and for which I am deeply thankful.

With the fine sense of duty which characterizes his every deed, the Rev. F. M. Weddell, as Special Missionary, has completed his fifth year, traveling many tedious miles, giving regular ministrations to eight congregations which received him gladly, supplying at other points as occasion required, and doing faithful pastoral work as opportunity for it was had. Miss Emma Luther is doing splendid work at the Deaconess House at Herculaneum.

I have somewhere read that the General Motors Company is the biggest corporation of its kind in the world. An immense branch of this corporation and other important manufacturing plants are rapidly building a whole new city in the northwest part of St. Louis on what was raw land only a year ago. Just as the War Commission carried the Church and kept it there wherever any considerable number of soldiers were congregated in one spot, and called upon the Church to pay the cost, so the Missionary Board of the Diocese, it seems to me, ought to carry the Church strongly into this new factory division of St. Louis and put the cost of doing it into the budget for Diocesan extension work, just as soon as it can bear the load. At present, a temporary chapel on a lot 40 by 125, a deaconess, a service of a clergyman one

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nporary nan one Church News is fifty years old. It is the oldest diocesan paper in the Church. Surely there are many who would like to help it keep its jubilee by sending in subscriptions. What the Editor and Board of Managers do with the meager funds at their command is almost as remarkable a feat as to pilot a Mississippi River steamboat on dew.

In August, 1915, Missouri went into the honor list in the matter of meeting its entire apportionment for General Missions. Four years we kept our place. We were the happier because of it. 'Tis pity, 'tis true, that we have not met our apportionment this year, when only \$541.05 was needed to make us 100 per cent loyal. The table, as printed in Church News, shows that seven congregations paid nothing. Six are in my field. One of the six, Jennings, is an unorganized mission. As such, it is a fair question whether it belongs in any table of assessments or apportionments. Two, Jackson and Salem, have had no minister in charge. Fredericktown, Fulton and Epiphany, St. Louis—I wonder if they forgot that this year closed the last of December, and that December hath only thirty-one days? Spite of the six lapses, my field, as I figure it from Church News table, quite overpaid its apportionment. My thanks to those who did it. My exhortation in a kindly but earnest spirit to those who left it undone.*

In the last week of the year, Bishop Tuttle sent me word that he had transferred the jurisdiction of Calvary Parish, Columbia, to my care. It will be remembered that Columbia is the seat of our State University. One who for several recent years has been close officially to Dr. Henry Smith Pritchett, President of the Carnegie Foundation, tells me that the Missouri U. is rated among the first-rank state universities. Those who go there with a determination to get a thorough literary or scientific education have the opportunity to get it. But it is no part of the purpose of any State University to teach the Christian Religion. And if Russia, with ninety-seven per cent of her people illiterate, has shown us what no education will do, Germany, with but one-tenth of one per cent of her population illiterate, has shown us what education which is not Christian Education will do, it is not necessary to join with those who make the loud acclaim that our State Universities are godless institutions, hotbeds of agnosticism. I dare affirm that the Missouri State University is equipped with a teaching corps whose sense of responsibility for the lives of the young men and women committed to their trust is high. But, because our laws require that the State shall not teach religion, this is the reason why we should be much concerned about Columbia. If our sons and daughters, children of the Church, are in danger of losing their religion at the State University, it is not for us to fault the University. It is the fault of the Church, which did not follow them into the University with special strength for special strain. I do not speak at this time of our opportunity, which is great. I speak of our responsibility. I am in my ninth year as your Bishop Coadjutor. Not until to-day have I discussed Columbia. To have done so might have seemed an impertinence. But to forbear to speak now that it has been transferred to my spiritual care would be a neglect of duty. I must not be supposed to have an exhaustive understanding of Columbia, having received it from the Bishop only six days before the close of the convention year. But this I know, that there are more students than ever before in the history of the University; that the attendance of students at Calvary Church is greater than ever before in

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the history of the parish; that there is a large enrollment of students in a study class which meets every Sunday morning under a skilled instructor in connection with Calvary Church Sunday-School. The Church has a responsibility for Columbia which she has long enough ignored. The diocese has, so far as the records show, viewed the problem as a problem of the local parish, and has left it there. But it is a Diocesan responsibility. No, it is wider than that. It is a Nation-Wide responsibility, and when the Nation-Wide machinery is set up, it must be so regarded. Without waiting for the Nation-Wide assistance, which must come, let us make a beginning now in the faith that when we make a beginning we shall also make an end. As such beginning I would suggest, if you think as I do, that some such resolution as the following might be presented at the proper time for action by the Convention:

"Resolved, That, in the belief that the Nation-Wide Campaign will presently be so organized as to proffer substantial aid in the Church's work at Columbia, this Convention does hereby pledge the Diocese of Missouri to appropriate the sum of \$500 per year for the year 1920, and a like sum for 1921, for the work of the Church at Columbia; \$300 of the amount to be added to the rector's salary and \$200 to be placed in the rector's hands as a Discretionary Fund."

In this connection let us frankly say that, if the proposed appropriation is made, the salary of the rector from January 1 will be \$1800 per year and a house. Columbia has within a month voluntarily added \$300 to the rector's salary. But, even so, the salary today is only \$1500 and a house. I am not able to see how the Diocese of Missouri can maintain her self-respect, if for another year she declines to make some practical acknowledgment of the responsibility which is laid upon her for Columbia. (I wish it understood that I have conferred neither with the rector of Columbia nor with the vestry of the Parish before making the above suggestion.)

I will not discuss stipends, which I discussed thoroughly in the Convention of 1919, except to say that the need of larger stipends has increased rather than diminished in the last eight months. It must be clear to all of us that, if we are to keep stipends at a figure below which we cannot go without moral obliquity and take in hand even one or two items of the extension work which I have spoken of as so very necessary, the Missionary Board will require at least \$4000 in excess of the amount designated for its work last year. Will the red side of the pledge cards, as they have already been returned, and as they are yet to be returned before Easter yield the requisite total? We have faith to believe that it will.

I am going to ask you to permit me to make a quotation as I close from a magazine from which I do not often quote in a Convention Address, though I might profitably do so now and again. The quotation is this: "Everybody agreed that the world must be made over. It was a plain case. Materials were called for. Whereupon with the greatest alacrity ninety-nine per cent of the population brought words, bombs, drives, more words, free verse, reforms, restrictions, investigations, soft drinks and—more words. And then, quietly, after waiting a year or so, father and mother and the children got up early one morning and brought picks and shovels, backbone, concrete, coffee and doughnuts, humor, thrift, sweet oil, a sixteen-hour day, and one or two real ideas. And then the world was made over."—Life.

After all, for whatever making over this diocese needs under the new dispensation, which followed the war and the new dynasty which was set up at the late General Convention, we must depend on "father and mother and the children." Leaders are needed, we all agree, and leaders are ordinary persons with extraordinary determination. We must not wait "a year or so."

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And then, letting God see that we put not our trust in anything that we do, remembering that while we keep the hammer going we must also couple prayer, let us lean heavily upon the hope of heavenly grace. This means the renewing of devotions which have been much neglected in the home. It means more loyalty in attendance upon the Church's Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer, contemned by some, forgetful that Jesus Himself hath promised, "Where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them." It means a sharpened appetite for the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood provided for us in the Supper of the Lord.

An American woman, caring for orphaned children in France, was going over the Verdun battlefield with the officer who had been in command. They came to an altar with a large cross above it. "It was here," said the officer, "that my men got the strength. It was here that Verdun was saved."

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APPENDIX No. 6.

Report of St. Luke's Mospital.

BY MR. EDWARD MALLINCKRODT.

I have been requested by the Board of Directors to give a brief account of the operations of St. Luke's Hospital during my connection as a member of the Board, and statement of its present financial condition and requirements.

My connection dates from 1891, when plans for the removal of the hospital from its location at Nineteenth Street and Washington Avenue, were being considered.

The purchase of the property now occupied was made in June, 1901, and the hospital buildings were completed for occupancy in April, 1904, the total cost, with equipment, aggregating about \$400,000.

A fund of \$133,000 had been secured through voluntary subscriptions, and the old hospital had been sold for \$78,000. The hospital's property, 610 Olive Street, was mortgaged for \$150,000, the total funds received being \$361,000, so that the hospital started with a material debt.

The capacity of the hospital then was 64 private rooms and 44 ward beds. The nurses' home and training school contained only a small lecture room, and, with two and three crowded in a room, could house only 38 nurses.

At first the hospital was not well patronized, and continual annual deficits were incurred. Gradually, however, the capacity of the hospital became overtaxed, and by 1912, the number of patients applying for admission had increased to such an extent that patients had frequently to be turned away. The necessity of providing additional accommodations became so urgent that the Board resolved to plan, and have erected, a fourstory extension to the west wing. In June, 1913, a committee of the Board was authorized to let contracts for the work, and the addition was completed in April, 1914. This extension of the west wing added 46 private rooms, a ward of 16 beds and 4 rooms for use in connection with the ward for the isolation of special and infectious cases.

The third floor of the addition was set aside for a maternity division. The fourth floor was temporarily reserved for the housing of additional nurses.

The extension of the west wing made necessary the enlargement of the laundry, kitchens, boiler, heating and refrigerating plants, the addition of three operating rooms, biological and chemical laboratories, new X-Ray installation, additional utility rooms, rooms for internes, etc., the total cost of which was \$205,000. The members of the Board subscribed \$50,000 to a building fund, and a few additional subscriptions were secured. On August 1, 1914, the \$150,000 mortgage on the 610 Olive Street property was converted into a \$200,000 mortgage, the mortgage being made to cover also the hospital grounds and buildings.

A further need for hospital accommodations was soon demonstrated, the additional capacity of the west wing extension not being sufficient at times to accommodate the patients applying for admission. The maternity division proved to be a great boon, particularly for women living in contracted quarters and hotels, where proper care during confinement could not be secured. During the past year 242 babies were born in the division.

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The fourth floor of the building proved insufficient to house the increasing number of nurses made necessary by the enlargement of the hospital and increased number of patients. Part of the nurses had to be placed outside of the hospital in boarding houses and it was found necessary to lease the building, 5407 Delmar Avenue, for temporary quarters. The housing of the nurses in these several places involved much inconvenience and loss of time, made the control, enforcement of discipline, and the maintenance of high efficiency impossible, besides proving expensive. The lack of adequate lecture and demonstration rooms also made it impossible to give the nurses the thorough training necessary to keep up the high standard of the school. The work of nurses in training is hard and good results cannot be obtained unless the necessary rest, in comfortable quarters, is provided for them. A crying need for an enlarged nurses' home and training school, therefore, became apparent, particularly as the lease on the building, temporarily occupied, could not be extended and no other adequate building in close proximity to the hospital could be secured. The Board, therefore, in the fall of 1916 appointed a committee to submit plans, and a contract for the erection of the building was let in May, 1917, and the building completed for occupancy April, 1918.

Subscriptions for the necessary funds for the erection of this building were again solicited. The members of the Board subscribed \$70,000 and were led to believe that additional subscriptions in an amount of not less than \$100,000 could be obtained. The breaking out of the war, however, and other causes, interfered and less than \$15,000 outside subscriptions were secured. The cost of the new nurses' home and training school, with its equipment, and alterations in the main building made necessary, amounted to \$225,000. We now have an up-to-date, model, fireproof nurses' home and training school, the best in the city, provided with a lecture room seating 125 persons, an equally large demonstration room, reception, living and rest rooms, library, suites of rooms for the superintendent of the hospital and superintendent of the training school, ample modern bath, toilet and wash rooms, and comfortable single bed rooms with a maximum housing capacity for 150 nurses. The building is constructed so that if further extension becomes necessary another story can be added increasing the capacity to 200 or more. We feel, therefore, that the nurses' housing and training requirements of the hospital have been amply provided for, for many years to come. The present capacity of the hospital is 93 private rooms for patients, 82 ward beds; 46 for women and 36 for men.

The result of these operations has left St. Luke's with a present mortgage indebtedness of \$180,000, an indebtedness in banks of \$123,000 and a floating debt of about \$40,000, or a total of \$343,000.

St. Luke's Hospital is a benevolent institution. It has never been selfsustaining; since its removal to the present site there has been a continuous, earnest effort, on the part of the members of the Board of Directors, to furnish the best accommodations and the best of care for the ever-increasing number of patients and to take into its wards as many free patients as the available funds would admit. It has been a constant struggle to secure the necessary funds and the work of the hospital has only been limited by the means at hand. The constantly recurring annual deficits have been largely made up through contributions from members of the Board and a few friends of the hospital, many of them not members of the Episcopal Church. The Board now feels that it can no longer carry the burden and that immediate and continuous help from the Church must be given.

The bank loans are made for four to six months periods and will have to be paid, as it is the policy of banks to make only limited renewals of such loans. To pay the bank loans and floating indebtedness a total of \$175,000 is immediately needed.

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Association of which Bishop Tuttle is President, and all of the Episcopal Clergymen of the Diocese are members. The hospital represents an investment of more than a million dollars and is rendering a great service to the citizens of St. Louis and surrounding country, in supplying the very best of hospital accommodations and care for the ever-increasing number of patients, and by training and graduating large numbers of efficient nurses for which a very great need exists. The hospital during the long period I have referred to has taken care of the sick clergymen of the Diocese in private rooms, and in its wards has taken care of the charity patients recommended by the Episcopal Clergy, all without charge. The Board feels that this expense is one that should properly be borne by the Church.

If the Church had met these expenses during the past years, the hospital would not now be in financial distress. The present indebtedness, accumulated during the past nineteen years, involves the payment of not less than \$18,000 per year for interest. Against this we have an income, from the 610 Olive Street leasehold, of \$8,000 per year, and from the Endowment Fund of about \$9,000.00.

The Board of Directors is most anxious to keep St. Luke's Hospital in the front rank, as rendering the best service in the city and particularly to extend the free care of charity patients in its wards, but it cannot do so without adequate funds and it appeals to the Church, and all friends of the hospital, for help.

Report of Committee on the Mation = Mide Campaign.

Reverend Fathers in God, Member of the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, and Friends:

Last May, by the act of the Convention, we committed the Diocese of Missouri to the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission, Bishop Tuttle appointed a Committee composed of the Rev. Dr. Z. B. T. Phillips, Mrs. Burritt, Mr. Harry Hurd, Mr. George Warner and Rev. R. D. S. Putney, Chairman, and the Bishops ex-officio to co-operate with the National Committee. Subsequently this Committee was enlarged to include Mr. L. B. Woodward, Mr. John Lonsdale, Mr. Frank C. Thompson and Mr. Geo. M. Block.

To most of us last May, the Nation-Wide Campaign, as vaguely set forth by the Rev. Mr. Long, who was sent to this Diocese by the National Committee, seemed a good thing to undertake though somewhat utopian.

But we had just emerged from a world war, where men and women had, alike, sacrificed life, service and money to bring peace once more upon earth; and in the light of the sacrifices already made for humanity and country, we believed that men would make even greater sacrifice for Christ and His Body, the Church. And so we undertook our task willingly and gladly.

To many the Nation-Wide Campaign seems as yet to be merely a name or a wild dream, but to those who have labored to make the Church a leader and not a lagger in the great task of reconstruction (by bringing her up only to the minimum of effectiveness) the Nation-Wide Campaign has become a stern reality to be dealt with soberly, discreetly, fearlessly and honestly in the sight of God and man. Before entering into a statistical report of the work of this Committee I want to thank each member for the particular service both to myself, as Chairman, and to this Diocese, that he or she has rendered, and I must make particular mention of two persons who are largely responsible for the amount of success the Campaign has reached at this time in this Diocese.

Never have I seen such unselfish and tireless service as Mr. Dix has rendered the Church of God in the Diocese of Missouri, and at large. Six solid weeks of his time have been devoted with no monetary return and with the financial loss that such time means to a business man. It was his voice that started the laymen speaking in Detroit and from that day calls have come for him from East, West, North and South. But he has given his best to his own Diocese, and we owe him a deep debt of gratitude.

Mr. Harvey, who was the paid Secretary for the Campaign, is the other one to whom we are so deeply indebted. His patience and tireless effort reached many days, from daybreak almost to the break of the following day in order to get literature that came late, into your hands on time. He did not work by the clock, and he would never pass muster with any union save that of the Church of the Living God which he serves so faithfully.

The first task that came to your Committee was to send out questionnaires to every parish and mission in the Diocese. If there was anything left out of the form, the Committee has failed to discover it.

Seventy-three of these questionnaires were sent out on the 15th day of June with instruction that they should be returned by July first, in order that the Committee might report its findings to the Central Committee by July 15th when the budget for the Church's work at large was to be made up.

The time of year was unfortunate—everybody away on vacations—and on August first we had but ten questionnaires in hand. To date, out of seventy-three sent out, we have forty-six returned. We arranged with the National Committee to keep the budget open to us until September 9th, when our budget was finally sent in showing that in order to pay our clergy, in this Diocese, a living wage and to put us on a basis of the minimum efficiency, we needed \$229,900. This included new churches, parish houses, rectories, social service work and workers, and clergy.

On the basis of the national budget it was ascertained that the Church needs \$42,000,000, \$28,000,000 for the general work of the Church at large and \$14,000,000 for the work of the several Dioceses to be raised for themselves by themselves.

The method of reaching the quota for each Diocese was arrived at by a system of classification of expenses and percentages, as per formula attached to this report. Our quota, we learned, was \$91,660 per annum, or for the three years, \$274,980.

A sub-committee composed of Mr. Bull, Mr. Lycett, Mr. Randolph, Mr. Warner and the Chairman, was given the task of allotting the apportionment to the several parishes and missions in the Diocese. After due consideration it was determined to use the same method prescribed by the Central Committee in reaching the Diocesan quota.

After ascertaining that the Diocesan apportionment would have to be \$16,500 for the year 1920, and the Diocesan assessment would have to be \$13,500, the latter figure including a raise in salary for Bishop Tuttle to \$5,000 per annum and of the salary for Bishop Johnson to \$4,500 a year and \$75,00 a month for a secretary to help Bishop Johnson in carrying on his work, the total figure of \$121,660 was placed in the hands of Price-Waterhouse, to be apportioned on the above mentioned basis to the parishes and missions of the Diocese. The report of Price-Waterhouse is herewith attached.

After the Joint Commission had received the report of your Committee they informed us that our Diocesan budget to be spent on ourselves was too modest and we would have to appropriate a sum equal to half of our budget for the work of the Church at large, making an excess sum of \$15,830 to be raised by the Diocese, and which can be used for extra-Diocesan work. The final total budget for the Diocesan work amounting to \$45,830.

The quotas as shown by the attached report of the Committee were sent to the various parishes and missions, and, as the attached returns report, shows to date we have pledged toward this quota of \$137,490 annually, \$27,627.59 from 33 out of 73 parishes and missions making either full or partial reports. Some of the largest parishes have not as yet made the canvass and will not do so until Lent.

Since for every dollar received we must send $66\frac{2}{3}$ cents to New York and retain $33\frac{1}{3}$ for our own use, it appears a most important duty to at once raise our quota or the work in this Diocese will suffer and clergymen go without their salaries.

Series of meetings were held in September for instructing committees, also a mass meeting of an inspirational nature. Later more meetings with Bishop Roots of China and Rev. Robert Patton were held at Columbia and St. Louis. A speakers' bureau was formed under the direction of Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, and men and women have gone into the far corners of the Diocese and have received a most hearty welcome; and judging from the return cards of the Every Member Canvass, they have done good work, and we thank them individually and collectively.

Mr. Warner and your Chairman were elected a Committee to finally take under advisement the askings of the parishes and missions, and since many requests had been made after the closing of the National Budget, it became necessary for us to redistribute the \$229,900 total of askings for the period of three years in this Diocese. The report of this Committee is not final, as the Committee that shall continue this work must use their discretion as to where the maximum result is to be accomplished for each dollar expended. This is a sacred trust and stewardship, and must be administered wisely and discreetly. It calls for a committee of thoughtful men and men of vision, and that does not always mean popular men. I urge the election of the very wisest and best fitted men for this duty. The administering of a fund (if the National Campaign goes over by Easter, as it must,) of \$402,470 for three years in this Diocese is a task that should challenge some of our laymen of large affairs. As the minister of today is making new ventures for Christ and His Kingdom, so laymen are challenged for Christ and His Kingdom in a new and bigger way than ever before.

Here is the chance for the use of consecrated business sense, the same kind that you use on the street in a business deal.

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The challenge of the day is clear—Chaos or Christ? We haven't begun to give! Ten cents a day from every communicant in the Diocese would put us way over the top, but it would have to be everyone.

We must ask ourselves if Christ is more essential in our lives than automobiles, movies, theatres, parties and a vast number of things that we spend dollars on every day while we put the left-overs into the treasury of His Church.

We are at the cross-roads of civilization. Christ spells order. Carelessness and selfishness spells Chaos. We can deport and lock up disturbers, but until we take Christ out into the community from behind our beautiful church doors we are only being content with small things, and for our careless indifference we will reap hell and a whirlwind of tears. The Nation-Wide Campaign is the challenge to the Church to show what Christ means to it. He never failed us; can we in this critical hour fail Him?

Under the direction of Mrs. Dix, who was former head of the Junior Auxiliary in the Diocese, the Church Schools are being formed into the Church School Service League. Already they have shown that the boy and the girl can do their bit.

It is the time for all ages to rally to the Cross of Jesus Christ to prove to the world that we can move "like a mighty army."

RESOLUTION No. 7 .--

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WHEREAS, the Bishop of this Diocese has said repeatedly that in order to carry out the Church's new program he needs the youth and vigor of this Diocese to aid him; and

WHEREAS, this Diocese has by act of its Convention committed itself to the Church's new program,

Therefore, be it resolved, that a Committee be formed in this Diocese composed of ______ Clergy and ______ Laymen and that a member of the Social Service Committee, Religious Education Committee, Diocesan Missionary Board, together with the Diocesan Treasurer of the Nation-Wide Campaign, Treasurer of Assessments and Treasurer of Apportionment in the Diocese, together with the Chairman of the Joint Committee, be constituted a Committee of Finance for the Diocese; and

Be it further resolved, that two of the lay members shall be women, one representing the Women's Auxiliary.

Be it further resolved, that a paid Secretary shall be employed at once whose duty it shall be to carry out the plans as directed by said Committee in the several fields of religious endeavors known as the Church's Mission within the diocese.

Be it further resolved, that this Committee shall have power to raise money to the amount not exceeding \$10,000, and further that said Committee shall have power to employ such office assistance as is needed for the effective carrying out of its program, all salaries being fixed by the Committee and paid by the Treasurer of the National-Wide Campaign fund who shall also be Treasurer of this Committee which shall be known as the Executive Committee for the Church's Mission in the Diocese of Missouri.

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Be it further resolved, that the Bishop Coadjutor be Chairman of said Committee.

APPENDIX No. 13.

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Report of the Executive Committee on the Cathedral Centennial.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Executive Committee appointed to organize and conduct the Celebration of the Centennial of Christ Church Cathedral Parish, and approved by the Eightieth Convention of the Diocese in 1919, beg leave to report:

That the Committee organized by electing Right Rev. D. S. Tuttle, President; Right Rev. F. F. Johnson, Vice-President; Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Vice-President and Chairman of the Committee; Richard W. Shapleigh, Treasurer, and George C. Mackay, Secretary; and as thus organized the Committee took entire charge and direction of the Celebration.

A program was adopted which covered every form of service deemed essential to a celebration adequate and worthy of the historic importance of the occasion. Committees were appointed to take charge of every department of the celebration and co-ordination of the work was furthered by appointing a member of the Executive Committee Chairman of each Committee. The Chairman of the Executive Committee was ex-officio member of all Committees.

Mr. James A Waterworth, whose long association with Christ Church and keen appreciation of historic values unusually fitted him for the duty, was made Chairman of the Program Committee. From him came the outline of the celebration and the inspiration which carried it to success.

Invitations to attend the celebration as guests of the Diocese were sent to every Bishop of the Church at home and abroad, to the Archbishop of York, to the Archbishop of Rupertsland, and to Rt. Rev. Edgar Jacob, Bishop of St. Alban's, England. The clergy and congregations of the Diocese were invited to attend and take part in the celebration, and invitations to mass meetings and receptions were sent to the Archbishop of St. Louis and to the Protestant Clergy of the city.

A full and detailed report of the celebration, including the composition of committees, the program, the religious services and mass meetings, social functions, parish meetings, press notices, addresses and other particulars will be placed on file with the Registrar of the Diocese. A short summary is all that can be attempted in this report.

Services of great dignity and impressiveness were held in the Cathedral on All Saints' Day, November 1st, and on Sunday, November 2nd, under the direction and marshalling of the Rev. H. W. Mizner, at which Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Brent, and Bishop Gailor were preachers. Services were also held in the parish churches of the Diocese at which the Centennial was the theme of the sermons. A mass meeting was held in the Odeon on Sunday evening which packed the hall to overflowing, hundreds being turned away for Iack of room. Bishops Johnson, Brent and Wise were speakers. A great service was held by the Woman's Auxiliary under the direction of its President, Mrs. Mac H. Jolley, at which Bishops Thomas and Kinsolving were speakers, followed by a public reception to Bishop Tuttle and the visiting Bishops under the direction of Mrs. Kate M. Howard and Mrs.

Geo. A. Castleman. A Founder's Day dinner was arranged by Mrs. George W. Niedringhaus at the St. Louis Club and a Cathedral parish dinner by Mrs. James A. Seddon at the City Club which brought together those most intimately associated with the past history and present membership of Christ Church. The hearty co-operation from the whole congregation was largely due to the Cathedral Organization Committee under the able leadership of Mrs. Harvey G. Mudd. A most interesting feature of the celebration was the reunion of members of the Cathedral Choir which brought together from all parts of the country the chief singers of the choir from its organization, thirty years ago. The celebration concluded with a great mass meeting at the Moolah Temple on Sunday evening, November 9th, which was successfully organized by Mrs. H. C. January.

The music for the whole series of services and public meetings was furnished by the massed choirs of the city, organized, trained and ably directed by Messrs. Arthur Davis and Charles Galloway, organists of the Cathedral and St. Peter's Parish.

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The entire program was well carried out and constituted a celebration, the splendor and appropriateness of which in all its parts are amply attested by press reports, which for volume, wealth of illustration and sympathetic treatment have not been surpassed by the notices of any religious event in the history of St. Louis. Your Committee attributes the success and smooth progress of the celebration to the ability, devotion and efficient work of the Committees and individual workers, cleric and lay, who were happily enlisted in its behalf, and its thanks are cordially extended to each and all of them.

The burden of keeping track of details and co-ordinating the work of the various committees fell upon Dean Davis and his able assistant, Deaconess Newell, and was ably performed.

There has never been anything of public occurrence in St. Louis which received more hearty and cordial support from the press than the Centennial Celebration—news columns, editorials, and even sporting pages were open to the celebration, and the interest aroused was truly splendid.

Through the services of an experienced publicity agent, Miss Hattie B. Gooding, 150 different stories, ranging from those of from three inches to whole page articles and pages of pictures, were obtained. Miss Gooding wrote the stories herself and the papers made little if any change in them, and we were able, therefore, to present exactly the points we wished the public to get about the history and work of the Cathedral. Stories were sent also to 150 newspapers through the near-by states, many of which were used. Generous space was given in the Church papers also.

The Centennial publicity was a demonstration of the possibilities of publicity for churches, and it is to be hoped that the Diocese will realize what may be done in this direction, and follow it up. Papers of the city were most willing to use material if presented in news style, and there is unlimited opportunity for us to get our problems and our service to the public, through the medium of the press.

An underlying purpose of the Celebration was to signalize the Centennial of Christ Church by equipping the Cathedral to become a center of spiritual thought, energy and effort for the whole Diocese. To furnish the funds for such an equipment it was considered necessary that an endowment of at least two hundred thousand dollars should be raised of which it was believed one-half could be furnished by the Cathedral parish and one-half by the parishes of the Diocese. To put the Cathedral idea and plan and need of funds properly before the parishes the Executive Committee employed Rev. W. W. Newell, favorably known as an expert in raising money for religious purposes, who addressed parish meetings in the

city and vicinity. The result of the appeal for funds, as far as known up-todate, is as follows:

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Of the above amounts, \$29,000.00 of the Cathedral pledges are to be spent for improvements on the property.

On the remaining pledges, \$27,695.13 have been paid to date.

It is evident, however, that more than mere endowment is necessary to embody the Cathedral idea and put it in operation. It implies a mobilization of the clergy and the aspirations, purposes, interests and efforts, spiritual and material, of the whole Diocese in co-operation with the Bishop and Chapter if the Bishop's Church and its equipment is to be successfully used as a Diocesan Power House for the promotion of the work of the Kingdom of God.

The Executive Committee would therefore respectfully recommend that this Convention appoint a committee to inquire into and report on the Idea, Constitution and Functions of the Cathedral, its relations to the Diocese, its proper sphere of operations and its beneficial uses in the Diocese of Missouri.

And in order to garner the results of the canvass of the parishes for increased endowment for Christ Church Cathedral the Executive Committee would also recommend that a Committee be appointed to co-operate with the Parish Committees in securing the pledges already made and in obtaining the minimum sum considered necessary for endowing the Cathedral:

The Executive Committee would accordingly offer the following resolutions:

RESOLUTION No. 9 .--

Resolved, that a Committee of five be appointed to inquire into and report on the constitution and functions of the Cathedral Church with special reference to its beneficial uses in the Diocese of Missouri; the report to be made to the Eighty-second Convention of the Diocese in 1921 with recommendations.

RESOLUTION No. 10 .--

Resolved, that a Committee of five be appointed by the Convention to co-operate with the Parish Committees in securing the pledges already made by the parishes and obtaining the minimum sum considered necessary to equip Christ Church Cathedral for the performance of Cathedral functions.

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Miss Daisy Lorick, colored worker at Hospital No. 2, salary at rate of \$300.00 per year.

Rev. Joseph H. Harvey, assistant to Rev. J. H. Lever in the Hospital Mission work, a stipend at the rate of \$900.00 per year from February 1. 1920.

To be continued only until funds are available for this purpose from the Nation-Wide Campaign.

Meetings have been held in June, October, November and December at which the Board has carefully considered conditions in the Missionary field as presented from time to time by the Bishop Coadjutor, and has thoroughly endorsed and approved the various changes and suggestions offered by him.

In the interest of the Nation-Wide Campaign lay and clerical speakers have visited and spoken at practically all of the Missions and Parishes in the Diocese, and a most healthy and encouraging revival, both spiritually and materially, is evidenced by the hearty response being made to the work of the Campaign.

APPENDIX No. 17.

Report of the Missionary to the City Institutions.

Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson and Members of the Convention:

After all these years during which the Church has maintained work in the City Institutions it does not seem possible that there are still Church people who do not know what the Church is doing for the dependent, defective and delinquent in St. Louis. Yet that ignorance is a fact, and, accordingly, I ask every member of this Convention to do this: Will each one of you in the next month tell ten other people that the Episcopal Church maintains work in every City Institution? You can safely challenge anyone to name a single institution owned and operated by the City of St. Louis in which this Church does not work. You may not be able to tell them much about the work, unless you have actually visited some of the institutions, but at least you can tell them that elementary fact, that the Episcopal Church visits and holds services in every City Institution— Sanitarium, Infirmary, the two City Hospitals, Koch Hospital, House of Detention, Bellefontaine Farm, Jail and Workhouse. Having told them this you can tell them as many of the following details as you remember.

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First, the services average thirty-five a month, more than one every day in the year, and the visits average 300 a month, ten every day, and more than 1,000 a week are reached in the services, to say nothing of the visits. We baptize, present for confirmation, marry and bury; we give money, clothing, books, magazines, eye-glasses, candy, ice cream and moving picture entertainments; we secure paroles and accept responsibility of looking after men and women who are paroled. Let me give you four illustrations of the work we are called upon to do. A man was taken to the Sanitarium last year who was suffering from dementia to such a degree that nothing could be learned about him before he died except a very incomplete address, and he was buried in the City Cemetery. After a long search, however, his relatives were located, and proved to be a prominent family of Church people in the East, and through our efforts they were enabled to have a proper burial for the man, much to their relief.

The Inspector of Immigration recently paroled to us a Belgian soldier whose children, while he was a prisoner in Germany, were brought to this country and all trace of them lost. The man followed as soon as possible and began to look for them, having the idea that America was about the size of Belgium. He was arrested as a vagrrant and was to be deported when it was decided to parole him, provided anyone could be found to assume responsibility for him, and this seemed to be our job, so that we are now caring for the man and trying to locate his children.

Last summer, for the first time in the history of the Institution, so far as we can ascertain, two ice cream treats were given to certain women in the Sanitarium, besides two treats at Koch Hospital, and two at the Infirmary. When you remember that in one of those institutions no ice water is provided, and that in all the institutions sugar is practically unknown as an article of diet, and remember also, how hot it can get in St. Louis, you will realize what a life-saver ice cream can be.

Fourth, we have subscribed to fifteen magazines to be sent regularly to Koch Hospital. Anyone who has to lie in bed day after day for weeks and months needs something to occupy his mind, and these magazines are sent from ward to ward for that purpose.

Those are illustrations of the work you do through the Mission to City Institutions, because it is your money and sympathy that keep the work going. And I want you to rejoice with me, not because of what has been done, but because of what is going to be done. For we are at the beginning of a new era in this work. I have not waited for the Nation-Wide Campaign, but, with the help of the Missionary Board—and I know you will back them up in what they have done-I have taken two great steps forward. First, we have secured Miss Lorick to work among the colored people in the two City Hospitals and Koch Hospital. The colored people in all the institutions are among our most responsive and devoted people, and we have begun a very promising work in the new City Hos-pital No. 2, for colored people. We have also as members of the staff the Rev. Mr. Clarke, who has charge of our work in that hospital, and Mr. George B. Jones as Lay Reader. Our services and visits there are the only ones given by any religious organization. And, second, the Rev. Mr. Harvey has come to give his whole time to the work. The Missionary cannot put into words the relief this will mean to him, to have a man like Mr. Harvey associated with him. The work is now measurably cared for (though the Nation-Wide Campaign will enable us to develop all aspects of the work), with the Rev. Mr. Atwill and Mr. Pomeroy at the Infirmary, the Rev. Mr. Clarke and Mr. Jones at City Hospital No. 2, the Rev. Mr. Harvey at Hospital No. 1 and the Workhouse, the Missionary at Koch, Bellefontaine, Jail and Sanitarium, and Mrs. Holmes at Hospital No. 1, Deaconess Brainerd at Hospital No. 1, House of Detention, Jail and Workhouse, Miss Pearce at the Infirmary, Sanitarium and Koch, and Miss Lorick at the two City Hospitals and Koch. Nor must we forget the organists

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and musicians (some of the organists are musicians also) who have brightened our services. Some of the best singers in the city have given their time and talents to this work, and not the least help to us has been the delightful cordiality of those in charge of the institutions. They seem not merely to tolerate us, but actually to want us to come, and the Bishops and Clergy have repeatedly evidenced their interest. But we miss more than we can say the genial and faithful presence of Mrs. O'Bannon. Without financial compensation she has for many years given her time and strength to the work, and she has been an inspiration to us all. We hope and pray that she may some day be able to help us again.

It is time, however, for us to emulate St. Paul when he said. "This one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind me and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." What has been done or neglected belongs to the past, and it is our duty now to set ourselves steadfastly for the work that confronts us. And, in a word, for I am going to surprise you by stopping before you expect me to, I want to enlist your interest and help, for the work cannot be done without you and all the people of the Diocese. We who are in the work will do our part to the best of our ability, for, with all our faults, you cannot call us lazy. The work would run right over and flatten out a lazy man. But where is the money to come from unless you see that we get it, and get it not spasmodically, but regularly, and where is the clothing to come from unless you send it, saving such as may be necessary for yourself, and the hundreds of magazines and books we could use every week if you would send them, and the singers we must have if the services are to be somewhat livelier than a burial service? I know you will not vote money for a work unless you are interested, and I know you will be interested, really interested, when you see the possibilities, for I assure you four clergymen and four women workers and the lay helpers do not give their time to a two-by-four propo-The problem is to break through the natural inertia of the human sition. mind and make other people see it. God has set great things before us, not rewards as the world commonly accounts them, not the praise of men, which is most easily and fatally mistaken for God's rewards, but open doors of opportunity to serve all human needs. I hesitate sometimes to press the claims of this work upon the Diocese for fear it may injure other necessary Diocesan responsibilities, but when I think of the hundreds of people dependent upon us for the strength of religious faith, the men and women whose minds must remain in darkness except for such light as we can bring, the men and women also who will stay in prison unless we believe in them, the boys and girls for whom nobody cares, then I realize that we have no right to be silent, and that in speaking we speak not for ourselves -if we did our speech would be in vain—but for those the fallen and the weak We have claimed this field in the City Institutions as our own, we have asked other bodies of Christians to co-operate rather than to compete with us, because we have said we were prepared to do that work. And so far as the Church herself is concerned we are prepared. No other Church, I believe, can bring to this work what our Church enables us to bring: the strong and stirring Creed, the beautiful and inspiring Sacraments, the dignity and beauty of the hymns, and underneath it all the doctrine expressed in the Church idea that we are blood-brothers one of another, sometimes called social responsibility, where in the world outside our Church do you find such a combination. And it means everything in such work as this. But even all that is dead and without fruit unless you make it a living thing. We have given our promise to do this work; let us now, with our money and time, and strength and prayers, redeem that promise to the end that not merely the little evidences of a Christian generosity may be given to the lonely and neglected, but that those the poor and friendless of God's Kingdom may hold to Him to keep their feet from falling, and their souls from death. Report of the Country Home for Convalescents.

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To the Bishops, Clergy and Lay Delegates of the Eighty-first Diocesan Convention:

I append herewith report of Dr. Cleveland H. Shutt, Hospital Commissioner of the City of St. Louis, who is Admitting Officer of the Country Home for Convalescents as well as a member of the Board of Directors.

I also append report of the Treasurer, showing receipts and disbursements for the year 1919, together with a statement of the present liabilities. As evidenced by the report of St. Luke's Hospital it is apparent that

As evidenced by the report of St. Luke's Hospital it is apparent that the time has come when the men and women of our Church must familiarize themselves with the Church Institutions in this Diocese and give to them their ungrudging support because the Social Service activities of our Church become a point of contact with people and a power for good, which, if followed up, will be of inestimable value not only to our Church but to the entire community.

There are at present 117 subscribers and givers of special gifts to the Convalescent Home in sums ranging from \$1.00 per year to \$1,000 or more per year. The Home asks for the appointment of a committee of women in each parish who shall be charged with the duty of securing annual pledges for the support of the work. As will be seen by the Treasurer's report only \$68.00 were received from patients during the year, while the cost of food, administration, heat, light etc., was \$5,855.60.

We must put on an addition to the present building in order to enable us to care for a larger number of patients, thereby enlarging our usefulness and at the same time materially reducing the per capita cost per patient by absorption of present overhead. Part of the needed funds have been pledged, but the cost of building has so increased that we are still far short of the sum necessary to pay off our mortgage and build the addition. First the war, then the Nation-Wide Campaign have interfered with our plans, but we live in hopes that the needed funds will be forthcoming. Of course, this work should have been included in the askings for the Nation-Wide Campaign, but this was not done.

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Report of Missouri Branch Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri, and the Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor:

We have the pleasure of presenting to you the thirty-ninth annual report, and the last, of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, hereafter to be known as the "Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council," till such time as a better title shall be found.

An Auxiliary year of eight months makes the work seem small, but in reality it averages about the same as last year.

The cash gifts were \$6,137.78, and the boxes, eight within the Diocese. several outside and the large general box to the Mission of St. John Baptist at Upward, N. C., were valued at \$1,198.76, which, with \$888.81 from the Juniors made a total of \$8,222.35.

Besides the Annual Meeting in May, there was the usual Quarterly Meeting in October and a special meeting, November 3rd, in connection with the Cathedral Centennial, at which Bishop Kinsolving of Brazil and Bishop Thomas of Wyoming were the speakers.

At the May meeting Rev. Dr. Cassell, the native president of Liberia College, Monrovia, Africa, who came unexpectedly, made a most interesting presentation of his work and needs, and in October the guest of honor was our own "Percy Silver Missionary," Dr. C. M. Wassell, of the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, who aroused great interest in his work there.

The two conferences, held in September and November, were chiefly devoted to the "Nation-Wide Campaign," with our Provincial Secretary, Rev. A. W. S. Garden, and Rev. Rufus D. Putney as speakers.

In both Northern and Southern Convocations, provision was made for the presentation of the Auxiliary, and the President, Mrs. Jolley, and other officers were present at the fall meetings at Monroe and St. James, and made addresses on different phases of Auxiliary work with the result that at St. James a branch was started in connection with the already-existing Guild—the on, new branch of the year. At the summer convocation meeting at Ferguson, the First Vice-President, Mrs. Cushing, led an interesting afternoon of missionary discussion. Our new Education Secretary, Mrs. C. R. McDonald, atlended the Racine Summer Conference, and has planned and started active work in normal mission study classes, preparatory to Lenten classes in the parishes.

The "C. P. C." has strengthened its work, and a new traveling library of children's books, called the "Bishop Tuttle Library," has been sent on its way, going first to Herculaneum.

The Triennial at Detroit was, of course, the great event of the year. Many new things were proposed and accepted, but most of them are as yet experimental, and must be tested and gradually worked out in detail, some of them being contingent upon the action of the "Presiding Bishop and

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Council." An Executive Secretary was elected instead of appointed—Miss Grace Lindley, of course—and an Executive Committee of sixteen, one from each province and eight at large—Mrs. John McEwan Ames, of Kansas, ably representing our province, of the Southwest. The Junior Auxiliary was separated from the W. A., to be merged with the Sunday Schools into a "Church School Service League." The work of the Auxiliary was enlarged to embrace social service and religious education, and a federation of all church societies proposed as the "Church Service League." The united offering of the Triennial was most gratifying, \$468,000.00, of which Missouri gave \$4,617.00. There are many things needed for the success of the new "Woman's Auxiliary," but the first one is that the clergy stand back of it and their parishes—not merely acquiesce in its creation and plans, but actually help by convincing their women that it is an important work for all and not an incidental matter for a few.

Brotherbood of St. Andrew.

The Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., the Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, D. D., and Gentlemen of the Convention :

The past year has been one of growth and activity in the Local Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. When we met at the annual meeting on June 4, 1919, but four chapters were represented, namely, Ascen-sion, Redeemer, St. Peter's and Emmanuel. Since that time, four new chapters have been formed and received charters—St. John's, St. George's, St. Philip's and All Saints-and eleven more are now on probation and will soon be ready to apply for admission into the National Council. Particular attention is being paid to the formation of Junior Chapters. Emmanuel is just starting their Juniors, and we hope to see a chapter's. Fur-parish in the Diocese. We have held five meetings since last June, the last one, on January 20th, being attended by representatives from ten different chapters. We have adopted a new Constitution, which provides for the election of a Junior Secretary, or rather, a Secretary from the Juniors, whose duty it shall be to keep in touch with all Junior Chapters in the Diocese. Our third Vice-President is also a Junior. The name of our organization has been changed to the Missouri Diocesan Assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. We are no longer a local assembly. April 1—Visited the Theological Seminary at Alexandria, Virginia, by invitation of the Dean, and preached in the evening in the chapel on the "Call of the Ministry."

3-St. Louis. Evening, attended monthly meeting of Missionary Board.

4—Evening, conducted service in the chapel at Jackson and preached. 6—Sunday. Morning, Cape Girardeau, with the Rev. J. J. Clopton, assisted in the service, preached, confirmed two and addressed the candidates; addressed the Sunday School.

Evening, Illmo, assisted the Rev. Mr. Clopton in the service and preached. Attended session of the Sunday School and spoke to the children.

7-Evening, Chaffee, conducted service in the Methodist Church and preached.

9—Jefferson City. Afternoon, addressed a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary on missionary work in Missouri; evening, assisted the Rev. Mr. Barnes in the service and preached.

10—Jefferson City. Morning, opened the session of the House of Representatives with prayer.

11—Fredericktown. Evening, conducted the service in St. Paul's, Fredericktown, and preached. Made many calls among the people and met a goodly number of them for a social hour after the service at the home of Mrs. Halliday.

12—St. Louis. At the St. Louis Club, attended a meeting called to consider plans looking to the celebration of the Centennial of Christ Church Cathedral and made a short address.

13—Sunday. Morning, St. Louis, St. Timothy's, assisted the Rev. A. P. Rein in the service, preached, addressed the confirmation candidates and confirmed four. A beautiful processional cross, from the Gorham studios, the gift of Mrs. W. H. Burritt as a thank offering for the work of the Rev. Mr. Rein, was dedicated. Afternoon, St. Thomas's, with the Rev. Dr. Cloud, preached, addressed the confirmation candidates and confirmed nine; later in the afternoon, St. Stephen's, confirmed a supplementary class of three presented by the Rev. H. W. White assisting me, celebrated the Holy Communion, preached, addressed a class of 14 and confirmed them. This is St. Mary's first Easter in their new church, which is very beautiful and well adapted to its purpose. Afternoon, went to Monticello Seminary, Godfrey, Ill., conducted Easter worship and preached.

22-St. Louis. Evening, at the home of Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore, meeting of Holy Cross Committee.

23—Evening, attended parish supper with the people of St. Augustine's Church, Mrs. Johnson also accepting the thoughtful invitation of the people to be their guest. Somehow somebody "got my number" and served us up a beautiful birthday cake with an appropriate number of candles lighted on it.

25—Received notice from the vestry of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, that they had accepted the resignation of the rector, the Rev. J. J. Clopton, to take effect May 1.

27—Sunday. Columbia, with the Rev. James H. George, accepted his invitation to assist in the services of Calvary Church and preached, morning and evening.

29-Ironton. Afternoon, made many calls among the people and had prayers with the sick; evening, conducted service in St. Paul's Church and preached.

30—Morning, made calls on Ironton and had prayers with the sick; afternoon went to DeSoto. Evening, DeSoto, assisted by Rev. V. O. Penley, in service, confirmed two, addressed the candidates and preached.

May 1-Evening, St. Louis, meeting of the Missionary Board.

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3-Appointed members of Committee and Officers for St. Augustine's Mission for ensuing year.

4—Sunday, Valley Park. Met with the session of the Sunday School (superintended by Mr. Richard Koplin), and talked with them. I celebrated the Holy Communion and preached. There was a goodly congregation and 12 at the Holy Communion.

5-St. Louis. Evening, attended meeting of the Advisory Committee of the Susan Mount Legacy at the Bishop's House.

6-St. Louis. Afternoon, attended meeting of the Committee of the Holy Cross Mission.

7—St. Louis. On nomination of the several ministers in charge, I appointed Lay Officers and members of the Committee for each of the following missions: Trinity, St. James; Prince of Peace, Baden; St. Luke's, Valley Park; Holy Cross, Sherman; St. John's, Sullivan; Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff; Christ, Rolla; St. Stephen's, St. Louis; Epiphany, St. Louis; St. Thomas', St. Louis; Redeemer, Jackson; St. Peter's, Bonne Terre; St. Paul's, Overland; St. Timothy's, St. Louis; Trinity, Salem; Emmanuel, Shelbina; Holy Trinity, Thayer.

June 1—Sunday. Mrs. Johnson and I spent a few delightful days at Hotel Chelsea, Atlantic City, as the guests of Miss Mary Coles, a devotedly helpful friend to me during these fourteen years of my work as a bishop. This morning in Miss Coles' room, with friends whom she had requested to be present, I celebrated the Holy Communion. It was to me, and I think to all, a sweet and satisfying experience. Later we attended service of morning prayer in a nearby church.

5-St. Louis. Evening, attended monthly meeting of the Missionary Board, at which meeting stipends for the missionaries in the Missouri field were voted.

June 6—St. Louis. Evening, joined in the social evening which had been arranged as one of the features of the anniversary of Grace-Holy Cross and made an address.

8—Whitsunday. Attended service of the Holy Communion in St. Louis. At 10:30, at Monticello Seminary, preached the commencement sermon and took dinner later at the seminary.

Evening—St. Louis. Grace-Holy Cross, assisted in the service which has been arranged as a feature of the anniversary and made an address.

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9-St. Louis. Morning, attended meeting of the Federation of Churches at the Public Library. Later lunched and sat in business session with a committee of the Federation.

At the request of the Rev. H. W. Mizner, appointed Mr. G. A. Randolph, warden; Mr. Henry Keller, treasurer; Mr. Eugene V. Miller, secretary and Mr. Ed C. Bergt and Mr. George Kleinpeter, Jr., other committee members for St. Stephen's, St. Louis.

10—St. Louis. Evening, made the invocation, delivered the address, and at the request of the Principal presented the diplomas at the graduation exercises of Jackson Academy.

12-14—At Hollister, Mo., at an annual encampment of the Y. M. C. A. for Missouri, Texas and Oklahoma. Had numerous conferences with students who desired to confer with me. Assisted in the conduct of various public meetings. Delivered an address on "The Call to the Ministry."

15—Evening. Kirksville. Assisted the Rev. C. F. Edwards in the service, confirmed one person presented by Mr. Edwards, addressed the candidate and preached. Had conference with the business committee and received from the treasurer a statement of the financial condition. Arranged with approval of the committee that Mr. Edwards should continue as minister in charge for the present.

17-St. Louis. City Hospital, confirmed one person presented by the Rev. D. H. Atwill, Mrs. Holmes joining with us in the bedside service. Evening. At the home of Mr. F. Churchill Whittemore, attended meeting of the Committee of Grace-Holy Cross. Nearly the whole membership was present, including Mr. J. E. Williams, Jr., the treasurer, whom we were glad to have with us again after his illness. Satisfactory reports on the work were made.

19-21—Sewanee, Tenn. In attendance as a trustee on the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of the South; serving as chairman of the Committee on Finance and as a member of the Committee on the Theological Department of the University. The guest here of Bishop Knight, Vice Chancellor.

Writing from the Seamen's Church Institute in New York, September 11, Bishop Johnson says:

Though I took much time in July and August for reading, study and recreation, my diary shows that I preached every Sunday but one, and sometimes twice on a Sunday. I ministered the Holy Communion on eight occasions. I was privileged to go with such comfort as I could carry to a number of persons who were in sorrow and sickness.

One Sunday I worshipped with members of my family in the Church in Connecticut in which I was baptized, confirmed, ordered deacon, consecrated bishop. During the summer I had a number of interviews with various clergy who cared to know about our work in Missouri and carried on a correspondence which I hope may eventuate in securing men. I made a trip to Detroit in July to assure myself of reservations for Mrs. Johnson and me in the thickly crowded city during the General Conven-

tion. I spent one day in August at a meeting in New York of the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee and one other day in August I spent in the same city in conference with members of the Committee.

The first few days of September I was busied in various places in the East in confabs with clergy who could not be reached in August and who may some day be persuaded to join our mission staff; also with friends of mine in the ministry who are minded to be helpful to me in my search for men. I had planned to be in Missouri the first Sunday in September. But, being urged to attend an important meeting here yesterday in the interests of the Nation-Wide Campaign, I cancelled my appointment in New York for the meeting. One hundred men and a goodly number of women crowded the room all day, busied in earnest discussion as to the King's business.

Last night I had a late interview with a chaplain who returned from France the day before and who had asked for an appointment with me. Tuesday night of this week I preached here at the Seamen's Institute. I am the guest here of my dear friend, the Rev. Dr. Mansfield, who has built up this remarkable work on the water-front and whose personality is its mainspring.

- September 14—Sunday. Monroe City, 8 o'clock, celebrated the Holy Communion, St. Jude's Church. Later, assisted the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom in the morning service, confirmed two and preached. Evening, St. Jude's Church, assisted in the service and preached.
 - 15-Passing through Hannibal, called on the Rev. Mr. Raymond and other friends.
 - 16-St. Louis. Met in the evening with the Rev. Mr. Atwill and members of Building Committee of St. Augustine's Church.
 - 20-Went to Rolla. With the Rev. Mr. Tragitt called on sick.
 - 21—Sunday. Rolla. Morning, attended the session of the Sunday School and spoke to the children. Later, assisted the Rev. Mr. Tragitt in morning prayer and preached.
 - Evening. St. James. Assisted the Rev. Mr. Tragitt in evening prayer and preached. There was a fierce downpour of rain just as people would have been starting for church. Spite of that there was a goodly congregation and a splendid children's choir. The interior of the church was so clean that it fairly shone.
 - 22-Left St. James for Kansas City.
 - 23-Kansas City, St. Paul's Church. Here by request of the Nation-Wide Campaign Central Committee in attendance at conference.
 - 26—St. Louis. St. George's Church, morning, opened quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary with prayer and continued in attendance. The meeting was given over to an earnest discussion of the Nation-Wide Campaign.
 - Afternoon, Cathedral, met with a conference to discuss the Nation-Wide Campaign, and spoke with reference to the proposed work.
 - Evening. Cathedral, spoke at a conference called to consider the work of the Nation-Wide Campaign.
 - 28—Sunday. Morning, St. Luke's, Harney Heights, St. Louis, celebrated the Holy Communion and made an address. It is good to see this mission reviving under the stimulus of the parish visiting that is being done by Mrs. A. V. Clark.
 - Afternoon. Monticello Seminary, Godfrey, Ill. Conducted the Sunday worship and preached.

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Evening. St. Louis. Assisted the Rev. Mr. Taylor in service at Grace-Holy Cross. It was all accompanied by a drenching rain, but a faithful few assembled. A friendly member of another communion than ours who worshipped with us said to us at the close of the service that it seemed to him that he had never, in large assemblies of worshippers, felt the Holy Spirit more distinctly present than He was that night. I think that others of us felt it, too. As I was preaching the storm put the lights all out. I had to finish up my sermon in the dark. Then, trusting to memory, we had the closing prayers and benediction and Charles Wesley's "Jesus Lover of My Soul," to the tune, "Martyn," without hymn books or organ. I seldom hear this dear old hymn in these days. And I aver that I have never heard it more sweetly sung than it was that night, save at the open fireside in my childhood's home!

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Sept. 29—St. Louis. Instead of the customary meeting of the Clericus, all the clergy of the diocese were invited in today to participate in preparations for the Nation-Wide Campaign. Many of the clergy participated in the discussion and the quizz. Two of a flying squadron from the Atlantic seaboard contributed to the success of the programme. I made an address.

Afternoon. Schuyler Memorial. Presided at a meeting in the interests of making preparations for the Nation-Wide Campaign and made an address.

Evening. St. George's Church. Attended an enthusiastic mass meeting in preparation for our part in the Nation-Wide Campaign and made an address.

30-St. Louis. Afternoon, attended meeting of the Executive Committee Cathedral Centennial Celebration.

October 2-St. Louis. Attended meeting of the Missionary Board in the evening.

4-Left St. Louis for Detroit.

5—Sunday, Detroit. Morning, attended service at Epiphany Church, the address being by a layman in attendance at the Brotherhood Convention. Afternoon, attended gatherings of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. Evening, St. John's Church, closing service of the Brotherhood Convention.

6-7-Detroit. Sessions of the General Board of Missions.

8-24—Detroit. In attendance on sessions of the House of Bishops' and meetings and services of various kinds in connection with the General Convention. Sunday, October 12, I preached in St. Paul's Church, Jackson, Michigan, and Sunday, October 26, in the Church of Epiphany, Detroit. Left Detroit for St. Louis the evening of Sunday, October 26.

27-St. Louis. Morning, attended meeting of the Clericus.

29—St. Louis. Afternoon, attended meeting of the Guild of St. Luke's Chapel, Harney Heights. Evening, met at Union Station the Rev. L. C. Sherburne and his family, arrived from the diocese of Connecticut to help us in our work.

30—With the Rev. L. C. Sherburne went to Crystal City, where acting in accordance with the wishes of the people, I have appointed Mr. Sherburne to the charge of Grace Church made vacant by the resignation of the Rev. H. N. Tragitt, Jr., which took effect the first of October. Called with Mr. Sherburne in the homes of many of our people and on the members of the Committee at their various places of business. In the afternoon met with the ladies of the Guild in their regular weekly meet-

ing and made an address; also introduced the Rev. Mr. Sherburne who made a happy address and at once established friendly relations with those who are counted upon to be so helpful in the carrying on of the church's work. Later in the afternoon Mr. Sherburne and I walked across the hills to Herculaneum, where I showed him our deaconess house and chapel. We called for a few minutes on Miss Luther who is at present among these people as a parish visitor, and then returned to Festus and got Frisco train which brought us to St. Louis about nine o'clock in the evening. Mr. Sherburne had a pretty full day's work with me. But he was in war work in France eight months—that made it easier.

Oct. 31—St. Louis. Morning, St. George's Church. Celebrated the Holy Communion at quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary; said noon-day prayers; lunched with the Auxiliary; and in the afternoon made an address.

November 1—All Saints' Day. St. Louis. Received the Holy Communion in Christ Church Cathedral in connection with the observance of the Cathedral Centennial. Breakfasted with others in the Schuyler Memorial House. At a later hour participated in the celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral and assisted in the distribution of the elements.

Evening, St. Louis Club, attended Founders' Day banquet with Mrs. Johnson and friends.

2—Sunday. St. Louis. In the morning celebrated the Holy Communion at St. Luke's Chapel, Harney Heights. This was the first communion this congregation had had for many weeks. Ten persons received. I preached. Also joined in the session of the Sunday School.

Evening, in the Odeon, presided at a great missionary mass meeting and made an address, the speakers of the evening being Bishop Wise of Kansas and Bishop Brent of Western New York.

3—St. Louis. Morning, attended meeting of the Clericus and made a brief report on some of the doings of the House of Bishops at the General Convention.

Afternoon, 4:00 o'clock, presided at a great gathering in the Cathedral in connection with the Women's Auxiliary celebration of the Cathedral's Centennial; read the service.

Evening, Moolah Temple, attended a reception given by the Cathedral to the Presiding Bishop and other Bishops.

4—St. Louis. Noon, with Mrs. Johnson took luncheon with members of guilds of Ascension Parish, and made an address, the occasion being the Rev. Mr. Bunting's birthday.

Evening, took supper with 150 members of the present choir and former choristers of the Cathedral at Schuyler Memorial House. After supper assisted in a splendid song service in the Cathedral, over one hundred vested choristers and many of the clergy forming the long procession. Read a portion of the service and pronounced the benediction at the close.

5—Evening, Mrs. Johnson and I were guests of Grace Parish, Kirkwood, at the Kirkwood Country Club, where I was invited to make an address on the Nation-Wide Campaign.

6—Took luncheon at the City Club with members of the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee. Afternoon, had conferences with various of the clergy. Evening, at City Club, joined with 500 members of the Cathedral congregation in a fellowship dinner complimentary to Dean Davis in recognition of his thirty years' of splendid service in connection with the Cathedral.

13-Monroe City. Participated in the session of the Northern Convocation. In the afternoon left for St. Louis.

14-St. Louis. Attended meeting of local committee of Nation-Wide Campaign.

16—Sunday. Morning, Ironton. Conducted morning prayer in St. Paul's Church and preached. A goodly congregation present. I told them of my hope that it need not be long before they might be able to resume the regular services of the church. Evening, Poplar Bluff. With the Rev. A. W. S. Garden and the Rev. F. M. Weddell, held service in Holy Cross Church. Made an address on the Nation-Wide Campaign. Mr. Garden and Mr. Weddell also made addresses. Much interest manifest on the part of the people.

17—Poplar Bluff. With the Rev. Mr. Garden and the Rev. Mr. Weddell, met a goodly congregation of interested people at the church and discussed the Nation-Wide Campaign. Evening, met a number of persons specially interested in the affairs of the church, and discussed with them some plan for securing more frequent services.

Dix, of Christ Church Parish, Cape Girardeau, at a bountiful supper. Later, in rooms of the Commercial Club, Mr. Dix and I addressed a large gathering on the Nation-Wide Campaign. I also discussed with the vestry and others a plan for securing a rector for the parish, vacant since May 1.

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Nov. 23—Sunday. Cape Girardeau. Morning, at hotel, met the Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign. Later in Christ Church ministered the Holy Communion and preached. Spent the hours from three in the afternoon till midnight trying to beat it back to St. Louis. A wreck on the Frisco held us up. Was obliged to cancel an evening appointment in St. Louis.

24-St. Louis. Discussion of the Nation-Wide Campaign at meeting of the Clericus.

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
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
