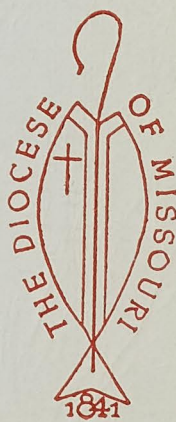

1. Service.

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Rules of Order of the Convention

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admissions of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Dispatch of Business.
 - IV. On Resolutions.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions for order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. Except in cases where majority vote is required by the Constitution, all elections provided for by Canon shall be by plurality of all votes cast. When more than one is to be elected for a particular office, the number required by Canon receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

22. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the votes of each Order shall take their stand at stations indicated by the Chairman, the Tellers for the Laity in one area, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. Those casting their ballot shall pass by the Tellers as they deposit their ballots in the proper receptacle they speak out their names to the Teller with the list of names of Delegates to Convention. No persons whose names do not appear in their role shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

Minutes of the 131st Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

St. Louis, Missouri
February 5, 1971

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred Thirty-First Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, Protestant Episcopal Church, assembled in the nave and transepts of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 4:10 P. M., Friday, February 5, 1971.

The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, D.D., was in the chair and opened the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the Roll of the Clergy. Of the 66 entitled to seat and vote 50 responded.

The Secretary called the Roll of Parishes and Missions. Of the 56 entitled to representation Lay Delegates from 53 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened and ready for business.

The Secretary of the Diocese introduced Resolution No. 1 which, following a second was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 130th Convention of this Diocese be adopted for this Convention and that Rule No. 23 which sets forth the Order of Business may be suspended by the Bishop at any time; and be it further

RESOLVED that all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, all licensed Lay Readers, full-time and professional Lay Church Workers, and Lay Members of the Standing Committee not otherwise members of the Convention be admitted to seats without votes in this Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Order of Business shall be substantially as follows: (see P. 25)

Bishop Cadigan, acting under authority given him by Canon 3, appointed the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf to serve as Secretary of this Convention and of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Steidmann reported for the Committee on Dispatch of Business:

St. James Episcopal Church, St. Clair, Missouri has made application for admission into union with this Convention as a parish, pursuant to Canon 12, section 8, of the Constitution and Canons.

This Committee seeks the advice of this Convention.

St. James Church is presently a Mission. It is a small congregation of less than 25 families, with communicants of approximately 65. It is questionable whether it is self-supporting in that \$4,200 of its proposed \$14,000 budget comes from a diocesan grant to St. John's Church, Sullivan, for diocesan work being done by St. James there. It is obvious that if in the future this grant to Sullivan is withdrawn, St. James will not be self-supporting. Under these circumstances, should St. James be admitted as a Parish?

While there is no requirement as such that a parish be self-supporting, the Constitution and Canons so imply.

It is suggested that perhaps this application might more readily be submitted to a special committee of broader membership for study and report back to the next Convention.

Discussion ensued in which certain questions were asked for clarification. It was reported that the Standing Committee had given its approval under Canon 12 and that the Committee to Study the Matter of "Aided Parishes" would be making no report in this Convention.

Mr. M. Ogle, Lay Delegate from St. James Church, St. Clair, moved that the application of St. James for admission as a Parish be received and that the Mission be admitted to Parish status. The motion was seconded.

Further discussion ensued as to what standards there might be for such admission.

Upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Vair, duly seconded, the application was laid on the table for this session with the expectation it would be considered on Saturday morning.

The Rev. Mr. Swift reported for the Committee on Constitution and Canons. He recommended that the proposed amendment to Art. V, sect. 4 of the Constitution, as adopted on first reading in the 130th Convention be ratified at this time. Upon motion, duly seconded, the rules were suspended and the vote by Orders was not required.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the following Resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that Article V, Sect. 4 of the Constitution be amended by deleting from line 7 the following words: "in full all assessments to the Treasurer for the necessary expenses of the Diocese, and."

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented for second reading the proposed amendment to Art. V, sect. 6. The same process was followed and the following Resolution adopted:

RESOLVED that Article V, Sect. 6 of the Constitution be amended by deleting from line 7 the words: "in full all assessments to the Treasurer for necessary expenses of the Diocese, and"

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented for second reading an amendment to Article VIII, sect. 1 of the Constitution. The same process was followed and the following Resolution adopted:

RESOLVED that Article VIII, Sect. 1. of the Constitution be amended by deleting in line 8 the word "Presbyter" and substituting the words, "member of the Convention."

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented the following Resolution:

RESOLVED that Article VI, Sect. 3 of the Constitution be amended (first reading) by deleting from line 3 the word "temporarily."

Following a second discussion ensued. It was inquired whether the Convention is intended to be a representative body or whether it might include non-representative persons such as non-parochial clergy. A vote to table the motion was defeated. The resolution upon being put to a vote was defeated.

(During the discussion several members of a militant group known as ACTION walked through the hall in a silent demonstration.)

A vote to reconsider the motion was defeated.

Upon request of the Chair the Chancellor of the Diocese opined that the Convention may not grant seats and votes to non-parochial clergy who are "without charge", but he advised that in this exceptional instance when the word "temporarily" is not clearly defined the Convention might by a 2/3 vote seat such clergy.

Upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Denkinger, duly seconded, and passed, all clergy present "without charge" were offered seats and votes.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then spoke to the proposal offered by Dr. Richard Gordon to amend Article V by adding a new section 8 to give Convention seats and votes to Lay Members of the Standing Committee not otherwise members of the Convention. He said the Committee on Constitution and Canons recommends against this proposal.

Dr. Gordon then moved the following Resolution:

RESOLVED that Article V of the Constitution be amended (first reading) by the addition of a new Section 8 to read as follows: Sect. 8. Lay Members of the Standing Committee, while still in Office, not otherwise members of the Convention, shall be entitled to seats and votes in all regular and special sessions of the Convention of this Diocese.

The motion received a second.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved as a substitute the following Resolution:

RESOLVED that Article XIV, Sect. 2, of the Constitution be amended (first reading) by the addition of the following words: "Lay Members of the Standing Committee, while still in office, not otherwise members of the Convention, shall be entitled, ex

officio, to a seat in the Convention with all the privileges of membership, except the right to vote."

Following a second the proposed amendment as substituted was adopted on first reading.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented the following Resolution:

RESOLVED that the present Canon 33 "Of Election of Examining Chaplains" be revoked and there be enacted a new Canon 33 "Of the Diocesan Commission on the Ministry."

Sec. 1. Pursuant to the Canons of General Convention there shall be a Diocesan Commission on the Ministry, which shall perform such duties and functions as shall be directed from time to time by the General Convention and the Bishop of this Diocese.

Sec. 2. The Commission shall be composed of not more than ten persons; including not more than seven priests canonically resident in this Diocese, and not more than three lay persons, communicants of this Church, elected by the annual Convention upon nomination of the Bishop. They shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Sec. 3. In addition to the elected members, the Commission may appoint from time to time with the approval of the Bishop such persons as it may need to aid in the performance of its duties. Such appointed persons shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission for such time as their services may be needed.

Following a second the new Canon was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift said that a new matter had been submitted to the Committee, but after the thirty-day limit had passed and might only be considered by a 2/3 vote of the Convention.

A two-thirds vote being obtained the following Resolution was introduced as the request of a number of clergy:

RESOLVED that Canon 19 be amended by adding to it a new Section 4:

Sec. 4. No clergyman shall take charge of any Parish or Mission, or become a Minister of Assistant Minister in any Parish or Mission, until there has been filed with the Office of the Bishop satisfactory evidence that adequate provision has been made for his support, including the minimum stipend and other perquisites as established by Canon or Diocesan regulations.

The resolution was moved by the Rev. Mr. Ripley and duly seconded. Discussion ensued. The Chancellor, when asked for his opinion, ruled it constitutional in that every Parish in its charter promises allegiance to the Episcopal Church and that the Convention might therefore take such action if it so desires.

An amendment proposed by Mrs. Carter (Grace-Kirkwood) was accepted by the mover and the whole matter referred to the Committee for editing.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented another matter which had come from the Standing Committee and would make plain the date of seating of Lay Delegates. Upon motion by Dr. Gordon, duly seconded, the Convention agreed to consider the matter.

The Rev. Dr. Gordon moved the following Resolution:

RESOLVED that Canon 2, sec. 2 be amended by insertion of the following words: "Such delegates as shall be elected in the January annual parish meeting, or otherwise, shall be accredited

delegates to the first Diocesan Convention which opens after March 1." so that the whole section shall read:

Sec. 2. Lay Delegates to the Convention shall be chosen by the Congregation in the same manner as provided for the election of Vestrymen. At their election in 1969 the Lay Delegates shall be chosen for a term of three years and in any congregation where more than one Lay Delegate is to be elected the terms shall be staggered. Thereafter, there shall be elected the number to replace those whose terms expire. No Lay Delegate having served a full term of three years shall be eligible for re-election until after the expiration of one year. When the Lay Delegates are chosen by the Vestry of a Parish, or by the Executive Committee of a Mission, because of the failure of the Congregation to act, such election shall be made at a regular meeting, or at one called especially for that purpose. Such Delegates as shall be elected in the January annual parish meeting, or otherwise, shall be accredited delegates to the first Diocesan Convention which opens after March 1. Any vacancies that occur may be filled by the Rector of the Parish, or by the Vicar of the Mission. But before filling of any such vacancy the Committee on Lay Credentials shall report the fact of the vacancy and appointment of the substitute, subject to the action of Convention.

Following a second the proposed amendment was adopted.

Dr. Gordon reported for the Committee to Counsel the Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust. This was part of his Report from the Standing Committee. (Appendix No. 4)

Mr. George Johnson, a member of the Standing Committee said that while Dr. Gordon's version does represent the consensus of the Standing Committee it does not represent his position.

The Rev. Mr. Chapman presented the report of the Committee on Housing. (Appendix No. 12)

Dr. Gordon took the chair for the balance of the afternoon session.

A number of resolutions were introduced in accordance with Canon 32 and were placed on the calendar for consideration on Saturday.

At 6:07 P. M. the Bishop addressed the Convention.

(Appendix No. 1, 2, 3)

At 6:30 P. M. the Convention recessed for dinner, casting ballots as the members left the hall.

At 8:00 P. M. the members of Convention and a number of other persons assembled in the Cathedral for the celebration of the Lord's Supper (1967 Rite). Bishop Cadigan was the celebrant, assisted by the Very Rev. Thom W. Blair, the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf, the Rev. Joseph W. Nicholson, the Rev. Stephen Bergmann, and John Good. Music was provided by THE JOYFUL NOISE, youth Group of St. Peter's Church, Ladue, under the direction of William Kelley and the Rev. Richard J Kirk. The offering was given to the Episcopal City Mission for its work among youth.

During the services newly-elected officers of Episcopal Churchwomen were installed and the women presented their United Thank Offering.

Also during the service the Bishop presented citations and engraved medallions to a number of lay persons: William J. Van Nice, F. Aritha Spotts, Richard S. Gordon, Melva Rae Martin, Joseph S. Summers, Jr., James R. Gimblett and THE JOYFUL NOISE

Following the service the Convention recessed until Saturday morning.
Saturday, February 6, 1971

At 9:10 A. M. the Convention reconvened in the Cathedral, the Bishop in the chair. The Rev. G. David Deppen opened the meeting with prayer.

The Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business moved the following order of business for the balance of the Convention:

Resolutions — immediately

Budget — 10:00 A. M.

Other Business —

Adjournment not later than 1:00 P. M.

Following a second the motion was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger introduced an amended version of the Resolution as offered by Mr. Jack Allen. With Mr. Allen's approval the Resolution No. 2 had been edited to read as follows:

WHEREAS, it has been said that every man has his own way of spreading the Gospel, in that the Gospel according to St. Paul is a bit different from the Gospel according to St. Matthew and St. John, and

WHEREAS, each clergyman also differs a bit from his brother clergymen in the Diocese, not only from the standpoint of having a slightly different way of seeing and spreading the Gospel, but also from the position of having a slightly different way of conducting corporate worship, and

WHEREAS, some variety during the course of the year in sermons and in the particular style of corporate worship would prove stimulating and interesting to the congregations throughout the Diocese
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Secretary of the Diocese be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to establish a voluntary schedule of Sunday pulpit and chancel visitations among the various Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, in order that each Parish and Mission receive a visiting clergyman who

is physically resident in the Diocese in its pulpit/chancel at least six times during each calendar year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that every clergyman physically resident in the Diocese is hereby urged to conform with the voluntary schedule as established by the Executive Secretary, and that every Vestry and Executive Committee is also urged to support this program.

The Committee had recommended passage of the Resolution.

The Resolution was moved by Mr. Allen, and following a second was discussed. Upon being put the Resolution was defeated by a voice vote.

Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 3 with the Committee recommendation that it be not passed:

WHEREAS the matter of Church investments is a grave one, serious enough to have been the topic of debate at previous Conventions of the Diocese of Missouri; and

WHEREAS the primacy of economic criterions in Church investments posits the attainment of material riches as the supreme object of human endeavor; and

WHEREAS the ontological materialism of the aforesaid economic criterions is contrary to the spirit and purpose of a Christian religion; there be it

RESOLVED the One Hundred Thirty First Convention of the Diocese of Missouri shall establish a committee to investigate the matter of Church investments; and be it further

RESOLVED the aforementioned committee shall be directed to draft guidelines for Church investments which shall be submitted to the One Hundred Thirty Second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri for consideration; and be it further

RESOLVED the aforementioned committee shall consist of no fewer than nine nor more than fifteen members, representing the diverse points of view present in the Diocese of Missouri, and meet no less than seven times during the span of the Committee's existence; and be it further

RESOLVED the meetings of the aforementioned committee shall be publicized by all practical means and shall not be closed to any interested communicant in the Diocese of Missouri; and be it further

RESOLVED the aforementioned committee shall consider and make specific recommendations on the following subjects:

1. Corporations and/or institutions which derive any portion of their income from the manufacture, processing, or handling of products whose primary purpose is the destruction or incapacitation of human beings.
2. Corporations and/or institutions which derive any portion of their income from investments in nations, or territories subject to such nations, which legally deny to any portion of its inhabitants, because of arbitrary considerations, the opportunities afforded all other inhabitants.
3. Corporations and/or institutions which derive any portion of their income from industries, operations, or organizations which perpetuate and/or benefit from the existence and/or perpetuation of human misery and suffering.
4. Corporations and/or institutions which arbitrarily discriminate in the hiring or promotion of any group of people, or consistently

- deal with any group of employees in bad faith.
5. Corporations and/or institutions which derive any portion of their income from, or support by their existence, processes which wantonly despoil the invironment.
 - 6 The establishment of a standard procedure for reviewing individual corporations and/or institutions in which Diocesan money may be invested or in which investment is anticipated.
 7. Correspondence and exchange of information with similar bodies in the Episcopal Church and other denominations.
 8. The establishment of a standard procedure for the review of queries and/or complaints pertaining to specific corporations and/or institutions brought forward by any communicants or any organizations within the Diocese of Missouri.
 9. Action to be taken against any corporation or institution which shall be demonstrated to be in violation of the guidelines established by the One Hundred Thirty Second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri and its successors.
 10. The disposition of proxies held by the Diocese of Missouri, including the offering of such proxies to groups protesting, in the public interest, against corporate and/or institutional policies.
 11. The dissemination of information obtained by the aforementioned committee, and decisions made by it, to the parishes and missions in the Diocese of Missouri and encouragement of those parishes/missions and individual communicants in the Diocese of Missouri to adopt similar standards.

The text of the Resolution had been submitted by Mr. Michael King, a non-member of the Convention. It was thereupon moved by the Rev. Mr. Stickney and was duly seconded. Discussion ensued.

Upon motion by Mr. John Davidson (Emmanuel-Webster Groves) the matter was laid on the table.

It being apparent that the motion to table had cut off further discussion of the subject, upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Kunz, duly seconded, Mr. George T. Guernsey III was given the privilege of introducing a Resolution on the same subject. Resolution No. 4:

WHEREAS the stewardship of our wealth is enjoined upon us by the scriptures, and the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in 1967 has already requested us to examine our investments in the light of ethical considerations; and

WHEREAS social problems affect seriously our nation; and

WHEREAS the Committee on Social Criteria for Investments for the Executive Council and other organizations may be called upon for advice on the social responsibility of companies; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Diocesan Investment Trust and those responsible for investments in the Episcopal parishes, missions and institutions of our Diocese be requested to review from time to time their investments in companies in the light of their social responsibilities and that the Diocesan Investment Trust be requested to report on its evaluation to the Standing Committee and to the next annual Convention of the Diocese; and be it further

RESOLVED that to inform the above-mentioned individuals and groups responsible for the handling of investments, the Bishop appoint a Diocesan Committee on Social Criteria for Investments.

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 5, which following a second was adopted:

WHEREAS The Rt. Rev. William Scarlett, with the vigor which characterized his Episcopate in Missouri, continues in good health; and

WHEREAS both our fond memory of him and the products of his labors continue to bear fruit in this portion of the Lord's Vineyard; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 131st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri does send cordial greetings to Bishop Scarlett, best wishes for continued good health, and ask that we may continue in his prayers as he does in ours.

Following adoption of the Resolution Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley spoke informally of Bishop Scarlett, saying that he is now in Phoenix, Arizona, and expects to visit St. Louis in March en route to his home in Maine.

Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 6, which following a second was adopted:

WHEREAS The Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, Presiding Bishop of our Episcopal Church, has continued to exercise firm and excellent leadership in these trying times in both a prophetic role and a reconciling one as demonstrated in the General Convention of our Church in Houston this past October; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 131st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri send to our Presiding Bishop our heartfelt support, best wishes and prayers for his personal strength as he continues to lead our Church in genuine renewal.

Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 7, which following a second, was adopted:

WHEREAS one of the treasured opportunities for renewal through contact from without for the Diocese of Missouri continues to be our companion relationship with the Diocese of Natal; and

WHEREAS during this past year the beloved and respected Bishop of that Diocese, the Rt. Rev. T. G. Vernon Inman, sustained the loss of his wife; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 131st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri sends Bishop Inman its warmest regards, deepest sympathy, and prayers for a continued mutual relationship of growth in Christ.

Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 8 which, following a second, was adopted:

WHEREAS the Dean, Chapter and people of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, were good enough to invite the 131st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri to meet here; and

WHEREAS within the compass of resolutions passed by the 130th Convention of the Diocese these arrangements have been spartan but gracious and accommodating; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 131st Convention of the Diocese of Missouri does hereby express its appreciation and gratitude to Dean Blair, Canons Feehan and Evans, the staff, the women and the people of Christ Church Cathedral for their hospitality.

Mr. Edmund Rogers (St. Peter-Ladue) on behalf of Metro II Convocation introduced Resolution No. 9 which, following a second, was adopted:

RESOLVED that all reports to be presented to Convention which

will require enabling resolutions be available (with the enabling resolutions) to Convocation members at least thirty days prior to Convention, thereby allowing adequate consideration in Convocation meetings before the Convention. (It being understood this need not include a proposed budget).

Mr. George Johnson (St. Stephen-St. Louis) introduced Resolution No. 10 which, following a second, elicited discussion:

RESOLVED that all Standing Committee meetings be open to members of this Diocese without voice or vote except when Standing Committee is acting as a council of advice to the Bishop.

A motion by the Rev. Mr. Vair to remove the words "members of this Diocese" and substitute "all Convention Delegates" was defeated. Mr. Johnson did accept an amendment which added the words: "or when meeting in Executive Session."

The Resolution, as amended, was adopted by a vote of 99 to 60.

Mr. Johnson then introduced Resolution No. 11:

RESOLVED that the votes and names of members of the Standing Committee on key issues of Standing Committee business be published in the summary of Standing Committee report.

Following a second discussion ensued. An attempt by Mr. Jack Allan (St. Matthew-Warson Woods) to obtain a vote by orders did not gain the necessary required support. A motion to lay the matter on the table was defeated. Finally, the Bishop asked the consent of the Convention to refer the matter to the Committee on Resolutions which was excused to meet in another room in an attempt to solve the seeming impasse.

Mr. Allen, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented the proposed Program and Budget for 1971. This, having gone through the Convocation process, was felt to be understood as fully as possible. The total amount of the Budget would be \$351,700, based on expected income from parishes and missions of \$253,700, \$75,000 from investments and \$23,000 from the 1970 balance.

Mr. Allen moved acceptance of the Program and Budget. Following a second, the motion was adopted unanimously. (Appendix No. 9)

The Rev. Mr. Benson moved an expression of gratitude to the Rev. Perry Burton for his four-months work as volunteer Convocation Executive, saying that without Mr. Burton's efforts the Convocation system might have collapsed aborning. Dr. Gordon spoke in similar terms and the motions of both men were adopted unanimously.

The Rev. Mr. Burton, who has accepted a call to the staff of a parish in Baltimore, Maryland, responded.

Dr. Gordon, as President of the Standing Committee, read the major portions of the report of that body, which was received and ordered printed in the Journal. It was noted that the report included also the report of the Race Relations Committee appointed by authority of the 130th Convention.

Mr. Guernsey reported for the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure. The following were declared elected:

Mr. James Hudson Jones (St. Peter-Ladue) spoke concerning the lack of information concerning the nominees, particularly for the Standing Committee. He asked that photos and other adequate information be prepared and circulated in advance of the next Convention. The matter was referred to the Office of the Bishop and to the Committee on Nominations.

The Bishop appointed the following persons to constitute the Committee on Nominations for the 132nd Convention:

The Committee on Resolutions returned to report that it would not recommend passage of Resolution No. 11, and that if defeated the matter should be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Secretary moved that the reports of the Treasurer, Registrar, Episcopal Churchwomen, and other bodies be received by title, and printed in the Journal if the cost is not excessive. Following a second the motion prevailed. (Appendix No. 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11)

The Bishop nominated the following clergy to serve on the newly-authorized Diocesan Commission on the Ministry:

These nominations being approved the Bishop asked permission of the Convention to nominate to the Standing Committee the three lay persons to complete the Commission. By motion, duly seconded, he was so authorized.

There being no invitation for the 130th Convention meeting place the matter of date and place was referred to the Convocations for consideration, and to the Bishop for action.

The matter of the application of St. James Church-St. Clair for admission to parish status was removed from the table and discussed. The Rev. Mr. Steidemann spoke in favor of the application.

The Rev. Mr. Benson moved that the whole matter of parish status for missions be referred to the Convocations for study and recommendation. Following a second the motion prevailed by a vote of 108 to 72.

The Rev. Mr. Tombaugh moved that the Bishop, after consultation with the Standing Committee present to the Convocations guide lines for discussion of the issue re: **Parish, Aided Parish, Mission**. Following a second the motion prevailed.

The Rev. Mr. Swift presented the edited version of the amendment to Canon 19 and moved its adoption:

RESOLVED that Canon 19, be amended by adding a Section 4 reading:

Sect. 4. No clergyman shall take charge of any Parish or Mission, or become a Minister or Assistant Minister in any Parish or Mission, until there has been filed with the Office of the Bishop satisfactory evidence that adequate provision has been made for his support as follows:

1. For full-time clergy, it shall be shown that provision has been made for the minimum stipend and other perquisites as established by Canon or Diocesan regulations;
2. For part-time clergy, adequate provision shall take into consideration such other income, including income for outside employment the clergyman may receive.

Following a second the amendment was adopted.

Dr. Gordon asked as a matter of legal procedure whether the Convocations may act for the Convention. The Chancellor opined that they cannot.

Dr. Gordon then asked whether the Convention might meet in separate parts from time. The Chancellor replied that only in an advisory capacity may they do so.

The Convention adjourned *sine die* at 11:49 A. M. following the benediction by the Rev. Dr. Hohenschield.

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE FOR 1970

1. 1971 Budget and Program
(Already mailed out by Benson, Van Cleve and Gordon.)
2. Other Matters
- A. Race Relations Committee

The 130th Convention voted to establish a Committee on Race Relations. However, part of the Resolve, "The work and activities be subject to the direction of the Standing Committee between Conventions" created a problem: persons requested to serve on the Race Relations Committee raised the issue of control; they were not sure they wanted to work under Standing Committee's direction. An additional requirement in the enabling resolution was that "all factions" be represented. This created some difficulty in the committee setting an agenda for itself.

The question of control and the question of representation, taken together, created such questions in the minds of persons chosen that they collectively decided they could not function or discharge their responsibilities under the several resolutions and declined to serve.

When it became clear to Standing Committee that the Race Relations Committee was no longer functional and, therefore, could not study and prepare recommendations concerning the other resolutions from the 130th Convention, Standing Committee then, after considerable discussion and review, endorsed a suggestion from one of its members, The Rev. Dr. J. W. Nicholson.

Dr. Nicholson feels that if all Diocesan functions, committees, commissions, task forces had black membership so that they were truly representative, race relations would not have to be assigned to a special committee, but would be built into every diocesan program/function/commission, etc. On the other hand, Dr. Nicholson pointed out that most white communicants had no understanding of the black experience. In fact, even many black persons have trouble articulating or reflecting what it means to be black and Christian in the latter third of the Twentieth Century. Dr. Nicholson proposed, and Standing Committee agreed, that discussion of black experience throughout the Diocese might be very useful in order to sensitize and focus concern, not only in obvious areas, where housing, jobs and health needed, but also within institutions whose racism is so ingrained as to be unconscious. Standing Committee will recommend to the Bishop that, in the next round of convocation meetings, a series of discussions be structured and an agenda prepared which will review the black experience and Diocesan commitment.

B. Counselling the Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust*

Following the St. Charles session of the 130th Convention, the Bishop asked the Standing Committee to serve as a committee of advice to the Diocesan Investment Trust. He felt the Standing Committee could provide focus for parishes and missions, with funds invested in the D.I.T., who were concerned that such funds not be invested in companies that were practicing racial discrimination. Even at the time the Bishop made his request, it was clear that church members throughout the nation were raising much broader questions concerning stewardship and the use of investment

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funds. Accordingly, Standing Committee agreed to accept this responsibility, feeling since its membership is elected by Convention, that it must deal with questions from delegates, parishes, missions and communicants. The Standing Committee then adopted the following policy and guidelines:

Policy:

Standing Committee will agree to serve as a committee of the whole, to advise both the Bishop and the D.I.T. concerning the sense of Diocesan resolutions dealing with the nature of investment of monies entrusted to the D.I.T. by the several parishes and missions, operating under the following guidelines:

Guidelines:

1. Standing Committee will act as recipient for expressions of concern.
2. Standing Committee will transmit requests for information members of the Diocese might have concerning activities of specific companies in which D.I.T. has invested.
3. If a responsible organization within the Diocese feels that investment in a particular company violates what we, as Christians, hold to be central, the Standing Committee, if it concurs, will officially request D.I.T. to make appropriate divestiture.
4. In general, the trustees will not be responsible for developing statements, explicit moral standards or moral dimensions of church investment, nor will the Diocesan Investment Trustees be expected to develop guidelines concerning investment in foreign countries, whose behavior is felt to be inimical to Christians. Rather, Standing Committee, Convocations, and ultimately, Convention must make such judgments.
5. The concensus of Standing Committee is that most major corporations in the United States, in fact, most major institutions in the private and public sector, all share some guilt and have at one time or another condoned morally dubious policies. However, Standing Committee feels that most institutions have become sensitized to such problems as are often cited (treatment of migrant workers, racial minorities, pollution, etc.), and are trying to work towards a new standard of behavior. In particular, institutions that have demonstrated by public testimony or by action that they do understand these problems and are working towards resolving them should not, in Standing Committee's judgment, at this time be pilloried on behalf of a past collective national fault or sin, of which all have been guilty to more or less the same degree.
6. Finally, unless a company very specifically has been convicted of wrong-doing, Standing Committee's feeling, in response to earlier inquiries on the same subject by ACTION, has been that as a stockholder one can bring matters directly to the attention of senior officers of a corporation. One's voice is lost when one no longer holds stock in a corporation.

Summary:

In general, Standing Committee will relay expressions of concerns to companies in which D.I.T. holds investment. Whether or not Standing Committee will recommend to the Trustees that D.I.T. remain a stockholder, will depend on the answer the corporation makes. Standing Committee might recommend the Trustees take no action, divest, or, further, Standing Committee might request guidance from Convocations (as Convention delegates).*

*This proposed policy was superseded by Convention Resolution No. 4, establishing a special Committee on Social Criteria for Investments.

C. Goal Setting

In view of the resolutions by Mr. Orr and The Rev. Mr. Kunz at the adjourned session of the 130th Convention, Standing Committee, in reviewing the work of the Diocese, pressed hard for goal statements from all organizations. Led by The Rev. Messrs. Ash and Rehkopf, goal statements were developed by most of the various organizations receiving Diocesan monies, between May and September. These goal statements were presented to convocations and convocation task groups during that time. These statements were reviewed further, modified, and plans of action developed which are reflected in the budget as 1971 program. Not all recipients of Diocesan support turned in goals, and this highlights a very difficult issue. How accountable to the Diocese should a recipient of Diocesan support be? In the older days of Diocesan organization, the Department of Mission and Strategy monitored all such monies. Organizations, particularly worshipping congregations, receiving aid, appeared to have a much better understanding (than at present) of limits and requirements: how long aid would be continued, or what they were expected to do with the money received. On the hopeful side, the creation of the River Parish Ministry and active discussions of similar ministries in the rural areas, plus the development of CICM, suggest that we are beginning to move in a positive way. Therefore, perhaps a summary of the Standing Committee evaluation of CICM during the year will serve to illustrate the process which many feel should be extended to all receiving Diocesan support.

D. CICM Review

A special task group of lay persons, containing a majority of Standing Committee members, made an independent review of CICM at CICM's request. During the year, CICM got quite heavily involved in operating matters due to the decision of the Ascension Vestry and congregation to close down as a parish. The review of CICM highlighted quite a fundamental question: Is CICM an operating body or, as was originally conceived by the Standing Committee, an agent for conciliary review and evaluation for which Standing Committee is responsible?

The review did highlight that the CICM process is functioning and that the four stations are living within the budgets and conducting the programs for which Diocesan support is being received. Standing Committee priorities for CICM are summarized as follows:

1. The work of the four stations supported by the Diocese in the City be operated within the budgetary limits and monies voted by Convention.
2. Stations individually set and achieve reasonable operating goals.
3. At least within the four stations, common direction as far as strategy, priorities be agreed to.

Long-term, CICM might be able to grow so that it could oversee all Diocesan work in the City, but first each operation must be placed on a reasonable long-term footing or phased out. In order to chart the long-term course, CICM members proposed and Standing Committee agreed, that CICM membership begin to articulate Diocesan goals for work in the City which should set the framework of longer term involvement and commitment.

In short, the CICM model is a crucial one in the life of our Diocese, highlighting many concerns.

Standing Committee feels CICM is proceeding pretty much along the timetable agreed to: CICM is trying to make common cause; CICM is informing the Diocese of what it does; CICM is building in a process of review; CICM is trying to make most efficient use of manpower and Diocesan resource; and CICM is able to formulate plans of action.

E. Concerning the Convocational Process

Standing Committee would like to reiterate its feelings that Convocations must spend more time as a Convocation, discussing substantive issues beyond budget. Many matters in this report itself require much greater examination by delegates. Convocational process must also actively engage persons at the parish level to make certain that individual concerns are heard and dealt with.

It is clear, too, that Convocations should not be expected to play an executive role nor to be so divided up into subcommittees as to create a cumbersome and largely unworkable time demand on delegates involved. Rather, Standing Committee hopes to see the present commissions, councils, structure strengthened during the year, and involve much broader constituency than elected delegates. Their task is to think through some of the tough issues we face. Here is a list Standing Committee discussed with Convocation leadership. Such questions as these should be discussed much more broadly in the parishes and missions in order that Convocational leadership can formulate recommendations for the future of the Diocese.

1. Aided Parishes and Missions

How long can the Diocese continue to support small congregations that do not want to work in a regional way or that will not explore less costly (non-stipendary, ecumenical and shared) ministries.

2. College Work

If we increase college work as proposed:

- (a) Do the delegates really have a priority for "interpretation of the counter-culture," rather than supporting present Episcopalians and recruiting new ones?
- (b) How will the programs proposed be different from previous programs which have been run on a voluntary basis?

3. MDEM

Has not enough been spent that we can in conscience say that federal, state and local monies can carry on?

4. CICM

- (a) Has the time not come that CICM should be directed to seek non-church funds to support its programs, particularly in education?
- (b) How long should the Diocese support work in inner city stations which have a dwindling or unhealthy parochial base?

5. Executive Council (Mission to the Church, Nation and the World)

How do we balance the need to invest in the Diocese for future growth versus the need to support the work of others in our name? What is long-term role of Executive Council?

- January 29, 1969 - Received word that Grace Hill House will authorize remolition of property at 1127 Benton St., because of hazardous condition of the building.
- February 4, 1969 - In consideration of the payment of \$8,000.00 principal plus \$480 interest received Full Deed of Release on the Note and Deed of Trust on the Sulphur Springs Road property now occupied by St. Luke's Church, St. Louis County. Deed of Release filed for record February 5, 1969.
- February 14, 1969 - Received from E. F. Jordan, Exec. u/w of Ola K. Blair, dec. Iron County Missouri, final statement of settlement of the estate and securities and cash with a total appraised value of \$44,457.58. This to be held in trust for St. Paul's Church, Ironton, and subject to direction by the Executive Committee of that Mission.
- February 20, 1969 - Elected the Rev. Donald McK. Williamson to fill the unexpired term of the Rev. Harlow P. Donovan, resigned. To 1972. Earnest money offer for the Sherwood Hill property received, \$35,000. To be countereted with \$37,500. Officers authorized to sell for not less than \$35,000.
- February 24, 1969 - Received notice that tax abatement (exemption) for St. Martin's Church, St. Louis County, was granted as of February 20.

No action pending further information.

Agreed to sell Sherwood Hill for \$37,000, after completion of termite-proofing and repairs.
- May 28, 1969 - Conveyed by warranty deed a parcel of property given to Trinity Church, Kirksville. \$1,200.00 transferred to the parish treasurer.
- June 3, 1969 - Conveyed by warranty deed the Sherwood Hill property, St. Louis County, (gift of Mr. and Mrs. William Bedal). Net to the Diocese, \$35,069.65. This sum being invested in units of the Diocesan Investment Trust.
- July 21, 1969 - Conveyed by warranty deed the Valley Park property occupied by St. Luke's Church. To become the site for a new Post Office. \$19,500.00. \$10,552.50 to retire a loan from Trustees of the Robert Memorial Fund of the Church of the Holy Communion. \$8,947.50 to the Building Fund of St. Luke's Church, St. Louis County.

- September 8, 1969 - Note secured by deed of trust on property of St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis, renewed. \$3,800.00. 8%. Manufacturers Bank and Trust Company.
- September 18, 1969 - Officers authorized to sign note and deed of trust on property of Trinity Church, Kirksville, 20 years. \$6,000.00. 7¾%. Monthly payments of \$49.26.
- November 26, 1969 - Note and deed of trust on properties held on Grace Hill House and Grace Church, St. Louis, signed. \$16,000.00. 8½%. Monthly payments by Grace Hill House, \$198.23 per month for eleven months.
- December 8, 1969 - Note secured by deed of trust on property of St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis, renewed for six months. \$3,800.00. 8%. Manufacturers Bank and Trust Company.

Appendix No. 6

The Parochial Trust Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri a corporation 1970

- January 15, 1970 - Gave authority to the President, Secretary or Treasurer to sign notes borrowing a total of not more than \$100,000 from Mercantile Trust Company, giving as collateral an assignment of income of the Thompson Bequest income as pledged by Bishop Cadigan. Proceeds of the loan are to be used to extend credit to responsible corporations in the field of housing for low-income families.
- April 1, 1970 - Note to Bank of Crestwood in the amount of \$1,500 signed, secured by a deed of trust on property held in trust for the Church of the Advent, Crestwood. This increased the balance due on the original note to \$54,900.00.
- May 15, 1970 - Conveyed by quit claim deed to the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Advent, Crestwood, its properties at 9345 Ewers Drive, and 9373 Garber Road, Crestwood, upon assumption by resolution of the Vestry for all loans on the properties. This action was taken at this time because of the failure to have the Quit Claim Deed of May 26, 1966, recorded.
The quit claim deed was recorded in Book 6459, Page 2 of St. Louis County records.
- April 16, 1970 - Authority given the Treasurer of the Diocese to loan to St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis, \$7,769.10 from the Episcopal Advance Fund to enable that parish to retire its debts, including a deed of trust held by Manufacturers Bank in the amount of \$3,800.00. The loan from the Advance Fund is to be repaid at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, including interest @2% per annum.
- May 6, 1970 - Loan in the amount of \$7,769.10 made to St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis, with interest @2% per annum, payments to be made each year: December 15, 1970, \$700; December 15, 1970 through 1977, \$1000; December 15, 1978, \$819.95.

September 1, 1970 - Conveyed by general warranty deed the tract in Section 9, T 43N, R 6E, known as the "Mattese Tract" for a total consideration of \$30,000. Net to the Diocese \$8,359.66 was added to the income of the Thompson Fund, since the property had been purchased with monies in that fund.

October, 1970 - Conveyed by general warranty deed the property at 607 West Miller Street, De Soto, held in trust for Trinity Church, De Soto. Net proceeds of the sale, \$18,404.21, transferred to the Executive Committee of the Mission who authorized its investment in the Diocesan Investment Trust.

November 12, 1970 - Sewer easement over a portion of the Vicarage property in Mexico held in trust for St. Matthew's Church, granted to a neighboring property owner.

December 4, 1970 - Note in the principal balance of \$14,938.72, extended to December 1, 1972, secured by property held in trust for Grace Hill House. Note and deed of trust held by Northwestern Bank and Trust Company.

Appendix No. 7

THE REGISTRAR

The Registrar of a Diocese is required to record official acts (ordinations, receptions, admissions and dismissions of clergy, consecrations of churches, etc.) and receive and protect books, documents and archives belonging to the Diocese and to some of the parishes and missions. Our collection includes the parochial registers of some 27 parishes, missions and institutions, most of them no longer in existence. Here are also the hand-written records of the first three diocesan conventions; the private registers of Bishops Robertson, Tuttle, and Johnson; confirmation records of the bishops since the beginning, and minutes of the Standing Committee and the Council. The collection includes also audiovisual records, motion pictures, slides, microfilms and tapes. If finances permitted many of the archives should be microfilmed; for old registers, some of them more than a century old, grow brittle and faint.

The Diocesan Archives maintains membership in the Society of American Archivists, a membership which gives the Registrar some status as an archivist! More importantly, it places the Diocese of Missouri among a select number of agencies known world-wide to have important materials.

We continue to provide resource material for persons interested in parish and diocesan history. Other groups use our files from time to time and our correspondence, while not voluminous, is interesting.

The importance of maintaining Church records becomes very evident when one observes the requests for records of baptisms before 1910. Persons nearing 65 finding themselves without birth certificates look to the Church for certification of age. Our collection of parochial registers is often in use and these requests come to us, as well as to the local parish which is still in operation.

We urge every local congregation to safeguard its records, especially its parochial Registers.

Finally, for a couple of years I have edited an occasional publication, a Newsletter, which Church Historical Society send to Diocesan Historiographers. Many of these persons attend, also, an annual conference-workshop, the most recent of which was held in Austin, Texas, where the official Archives of the Episcopal Church are kept.

- b. Conference to be held October 12, 13 and 14, 1971, Trout Lodge, Potosi by Spirit Images Inc. to help women find new images of the Holy Spirit relevant to their lives today.

The continuous support of devoted and committed Board members continues to make the EWC a viable and vital organization. The help of the Bishop's Office is greatly appreciated.

Goals and Objectives

A goal of the Council on World Mission is that the clergy, lay delegates to Convention, and vestries be aware of and informed concerning the program of the Episcopal Church beyond the boundaries of the Diocese of Missouri in order that the congregations of the Diocese may exercise a respon-

sible choice when confronted with calls for support. This goal is intended to be achieved by December 31, 1971.

Objectives or Sub-Goals:

1. A functioning communications network - through communicators in each congregation.
2. Meeting between Council on World Mission representatives and persons directly connected with National Church programming.
3. A continuing outreach to the world through the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief alerting all congregations to its needs and encouraging them to participate generously.
4. The Council on World Mission provides an opportunity for the companion relationship committee to promote its purposes in the relationship with our companion Diocese of Natal, in South Africa, and to see itself as one aspect of outreach beyond the Diocese of Missouri.

In 1970 our C.O.W.M. met four times, in March, May and twice in September. We hammered out the above goals and began to implement them. There remain some two dozen rectors who have not given us names of Parish Communicators and we do need these for the full implementation of our objectives. The Executive Council's *What We're Doing . . . What We're Spending* was mailed to all Parish Communicators (or clergy) in early January by Mrs. Upham.

The Chairman is looking into possibilities of Diocesan cooperation with Heifer Project, Inc., at least on a local congregational level. The headquarters of this operation has moved to St. Louis. Opportunities are afforded through this for church groups to send live farm animals of different kinds to people in developing countries. (Interested? Please let us know.)

In view of the financial crunch of our National Church, your attention is called to a resolution passed by the 1970 General Convention in Houston:

" . . . the Charter of the . . . Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the U.S.A.) provides that the said organization shall be considered as comprehending all persons who are members of the Church; and **Whereas**, At the laying-on-of-hands, communicants of this Church have confirmed the promises and vows for them at Baptism, including those entailing responsibility for the mission of the Church; and **Whereas**, the year 1971 in marking the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the said Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, is a fitting time for reaffirmation of missionary responsibility by all communicants; **Resolved**, that every member of this Church be urged to reaffirm in 1971 his missionary status and his membership in the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, through a free-will offering of \$10.00 to the said Society." (See p. 24 of *Summary of General Convention Actions 1970*, sent to all Deputies and clergy. Copies at 50c may be ordered from the Secretary of the General Convention, 815 Second Avenue, New York, N. Y. 10017. Your attention is also called to the last two issues of *The Episcopalian* magazine.)

 REPORT FOR 1970

I. Operations

- A. Understanding of Charge: The Committee has understood its charge to be to assist you to make available to non-profit, low-income, community based corporations \$100,000 in interest free loans for front end returnable expenses incurred in the production of low income housing. The loans were to have been repaid within a maximum of twenty-four months. Assurance of viability, such as the Federal Housing Administration Letter of Feasibility or the Housing Authority's Letter of Intent, was to have been received by the Committee before making a positive recommendation to you.
- B. Professional Consultation: The Committee has throughout been advised by Messrs. Dan Sullivan and Eric Taylor, both of whom are lawyers with Masters in Business Administration and are currently professionally involved in real estate, housing, and business investment under employment of a major St. Louis Corporation. These men have served without charge and have taken the time to meet and become familiar with the grass root movers of all the organizations with whom the Committee has been working.
- C. Scope of Activity: The Committee has received requests for assistance and met with representatives of the following groups: Compton-Grand, Murphy-Blair, Tandy Development Corporation, Belle Neighbors, United Front of Cape Girardeau, Jeff-Vander-Lou, Yvette, Young & Associates (East St. Louis), Buder-St. Henry, Gateway Holding Corporation, and Meacham Park Community Association. We have also been in close touch with resource agencies such as Ecumenical Housing Fund, Model Housing Corporation, and Metropolitan Housing Corporation, as well as the local Federal Housing Administration office and the Housing Authority.
- D. Actions:
1. Specific Requests Approved:
 - a. Belle Neighbors (12-15-70)

18 month interest free loan	\$21,160

 - b. Gateway Holding Corporation (1-20-71)

30 day reservation pending approval	20,000
	\$86,150
 2. Current Status:
 - a. Belle Neighbors: Having received your assurance of the \$21,150 loan, Belle Neighbors has begun demolition and is proceeding with other legal and architectural contracts for which funds are requested. They have asked for no money transfer yet. They have, however, submitted the anticipated proposal for demolition etc.
 - b. Gateway Holding Corporation: Reservations for 10 sites from Federal Housing Administration and Housing Authority has

been received and meetings with your Committee and its consultants for final approval will take place February 8-9, 1971.

3. Special Grant to Jeff-Vander-Lou: On your own initiative and in consultation with the Committee you have made a grant of \$3,000 to Jeff-Vander-Lou to assist them in their efforts to produce more housing. Our understanding is that rather than make them an interest free loan at some future date, you preferred to simply advance them currently a sum equal to the interest you would have paid on a loan.
4. Metropolitan Housing Corporation: While the Committee itself has not been involved in your efforts to support the formation of the Metropolitan Housing Corporation, some of its members have been active. As a committee, we have therefore been informally advised of your activities in this connection. We note here our understanding that you will be asking our counsel in the near future concerning the relation of your loan fund to Metropolitan Housing Corporation's Metropolitan Housing Fund and the Ecumenical Housing Fund. Also, the relationship of our ad hoc applicant screening procedures to the full time professional screening capacity anticipated from the staff of MHC. We await instruction from you in this matter.

II. Observations:

A. Positive:

1. Your loan fund has, in fact, encouraged several groups in their movement towards the production of housing, has been of direct assistance to one group, and is in the process of making direct assistance available in two other instances.
2. We feel your involvement has been a supportive resource in the face of our critical housing shortage and has been a sign of hope, where at present there is still much discouragement.
3. We feel that your role in obtaining major three year funding from two foundations for the purpose of establishing the Metropolitan Housing Corporation has been significant. We feel, too, that your \$100,000 loan fund has placed you in a position of formative influence on the character of that corporation by assuring that its staff will at all times be responsive to local community needs.

B. Negative:

1. We recognize that your own \$100,000 loan fund has failed so far to produce enough tangible results to promote the growth of the fund as you had hoped. Nor has this example of church involvement in housing been spread to other parts of the Diocese, as you had hoped.
2. The fact that far less housing has been generated by your loan offer than we had hoped for leads us to three relevant observations:
 - a. Little or no housing has been produced anywhere in St. Louis during the same period.
 - b. The terms of our loan are highly restrictive because of the fact that we can lend only when we have complete assurance that the money will be returned. The applicants have in effect been bound to demonstrate the equivalent of Federal Housing Administration or Housing Authority approval, which approval normally necessitates the kind of expense for which the seed money is needed in the first place. Thus, by the time a group has Federal Housing Administration approval, they no longer need the seed money.

- c. Most of the groups who have approached your committee have not had the organizational follow-through to assemble the data and develop the projections needed before Federal Housing Administration and Housing Authority will discuss a specific proposal meaningfully. Our Committee and its consultants have attempted to supply such help as is possible on a volunteer basis and when asked to do so. Clearly, a full or part-time professional staff person would be advisable, were you to continue next year as you have this year. The staff made available for implementing the work of the Ecumenical Housing Fund has been essential to the success of that operation. We have recognized such a need almost from the beginning of our work, but have been assuming that Metropolitan Housing Corporation staff was around the corner, which we believe still is the case. We should otherwise have recommended either contracting for staff services with some appropriate agency such as the Ecumenical Housing Fund or finding your own developer.
- d. We have also become aware that the limitation of your fund to "non-profit" sponsors has drawbacks. It results in our not being able to assist the poor in their efforts to create such profit making enterprises as conventional business corporations or limited partnerships. We have often been asked, "Why are the black and the poor excluded from your free enterprise, profit making system?"

III. Recommendations

1. We feel you should maintain your commitment to the production of housing in your Diocese and that you continue to place your major emphasis in the St. Louis area, until you have a track record and other resources.
2. We recommend that you pursue mutually advantageous contracts or agreements with Metropolitan Housing Corporation and/or Ecumenical Housing Fund for the purpose of more efficient use of financial and professional resources.
3. We recommend that you take steps to broaden the limitations presently inhibiting the use of your funds and at the same time protect your funds by insuring professional oversight of your screening and follow-up process.
