- 1. The Presiding Officer shall appoint members of Permanent Committees at each Meeting of Convention.
- 2. All resolutions from the floor shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read to Convention. A resolution from the floor that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions from the floor, whether or not a part of a committee report, after receiving a short explanation from the presenter, must receive a 2/3 majority vote of Convention before it may be considered by Convention.
- 3. When any member speaks to Convention, he shall address himself to the Presiding Officer, state his name and church, and confine himself to the point in debate.
- 4. A member, other than the Chairman of the Committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than five minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 5. Any member of the House may call for a vote by hands or standing vote. Every member who may be in the House when such a vote is called shall be counted unless he/she be excused by Convention.
- 6. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority.

Rules of Order as adopted by the 171st Convention

tary law not resolved by reference to the Canons or these General Rules shall be decided under *Robert's Rules of Order*.

8. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Presiding Officer, without debate; an appeal may be made to Convention by any member.

- 9. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during Convention.
- 10. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of Convention.
- 11. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, so far as possible, to the Permanent Committees of Convention.
- 12. Except in cases where majority vote is required, all elections shall be by Preferential Aggregate Transfer Ballot: a) Each elector shall mark his or her ballot by numbering the names of all the candidates for each office in order of preference, with the preferred name being numbered 1. The elector shall not give more than one number to any name, nor shall any name be left unnumbered. Any ballot which does not comply with the directions given in this section

will be invalid and will not be counted. b) The persons appointed by the Presiding Officer to conduct the election shall count each valid ballot by assigning to each candidate that candidates rank-ordered number on the ballot. c) The candidates shall then be ranked according to the respective sums of their rank-ordered numbers, beginning with the lowest sum, and the candidate or candidates with the lowest sums shall be elected, according to the number of vacancies to be filled. d) In case of a tie in which one or more candidates must be selected, that candidate or candidates with the highest number of first-place ballots shall be elected; and if the tied candidates have the same number of first place ballots, then the candidate or candidates having the highest number of second place ballots shall be elected, and so forth; and if the tied candidates have the same number of ballots at every rank, then the candidate or candidates to be elected shall be chosen by the toss of a coin.

- 13. The Presiding Officer may, having left the chair, enter into the debate on any question, but shall not then resume the chair until the main motion under consideration has been disposed of.
- 14. Once the Order of Business has been approved it may not be altered except by 2/3 majority vote of Convention, provided that the Presiding Officer may reorder agenda items at any time.

Report of the Standing Committee and Presentation: Ms. Jane Klieve

Video presentation

A brief talk was given by the Rev. Catherine Hillquist, vicar, St. Paul's Church in Ironton, on their use of a Community Ministry Fund grant. They have developed a community garden for community service.

The Rev. Daniel Handschy presented a report from the For the Life of the World subcommittee, asking that projects being done by parishes and missions be reported so that they can be placed on the diocesan website so that knowledge of them can be more widely disseminated.

Ms. Klieve thanked the committee members for their work.

Report of the Diocesan Council: The Rev. Robert Towner

He reported that the Council is an extension of the will of the Diocesan Convention. The official acts of the Council are reported in the Convention booklet. He reported that the Council is the steward of the diocesan investment policy. It evaluates and recommends grants for New Ventures in Mission grants, oversees the congregations who receive support from the diocese, oversees grants for capital improvements, and approves grants to aged and infirm clergy. It also oversees the process for building the diocesan budget each year. Members of council may visit congregations who do not pay their assessments. They are also responsible for diocesan employees' salaries and benefits.

Report Regarding New Ventures in Community Ministry Mr. Robert Daniels

This activity is part of the original Rockwell fund-raising effort. Mr. Daniels presented the financial history of the project on slides. \$866,000.00 remains in the fund. \$175,000 has been granted, and a list of grants was presented: St. Stephen's, Ferguson, \$8,000.00, Arcadia Valley Food Pantry and St. Paul's, Ironton, have been recipients. The 2011 grant requests will be available April 1. Bishop Smith complimented the committee that oversees the grants.

Presentation of the Operating Budget (overview): Mr. Tom Hedrick, Treasurer of the Diocese

Mr. Hedrick presented the 2011 operating budget. He noted that the 2010 budget had reflected the economic realities of the time, with no deficit spending. The new budget represents no changes in staff, but the diocese will live within its means.

He reviewed the budget process, stressing the intention to be responsible stewards, to balance the budget, and maintain the focus on ministry.

He mentioned the Thompson Fund which is under the control of the Bishop, and the White Fund used for capital projects.

The new budget includes a 3% increase in salaries for staff, after last year's salary freeze. Funds for a Youth Missioner are included this year. A copy of the budget is attached.

Announcements: Mr. Hal Burroughs

The Chancellor reminded delegates to patronize vendors.

Close of Plenary Session I: Bishop Smith Bishop Smith then declared that Plenary Session I was adjourned.

2:30-2:45: The Convention was in recess.

Opening of the Second Plenary Session Bishop Smith declared that the Second Plenary Session of the Convention was open at 3:48 PM

Budget Presentation--Mission Models: The Rev. Robert Towner

Fr. Towner reported on a group of parishes joined together with a Mission Grant: Grace Church, Kirkwood, St. Matthew's Church, Warson Woods, St. Paul's Church, Ironton, Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, Church of the Advent, Crestwood and Trinity Church, St. Charles. These are diverse parishes: rural, urban, suburban. They are jointly exploring being mission-driven rather than focusing on survival. The basic concept is to follow the Great Commission. He related several stories of activities in the neighborhood of the parish in Cape Girardeau, focusing on reaching out to neighborhood youth. The Rev. Doris Westfall spoke

of the Community Garden project at St. Matthew's Church, Warson Woods, along with a shelter for abused women. Mrs. Grace Nichols reported for Trinity Church, St. Charles, as they move from an internal to an external focus. They are involved with the Angel Food Ministry program and also regularly pick up bread from the St. Louis Bread Company for distribution to those in need.

Report of the Resolutions Committee: Mrs. Kathryn Dyer

Mrs. Dyer moved Resolution A-171; it was seconded.

A-171 - Minimum Clergy Compensation - Submitted on behalf of the Diocesan Council

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri set the annual standard base compensation for full-time clergy in 2011 as follows:

CASH SALARY \$39,510 HOUSING ALLOWANCE \$14,240

[The actual compensation should be determined by Resolution of the Vestry/Bishop's Committee, in consultation with the clergy.]

- 2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Church Pension Fund assessment will be paid by the congregation;
- 3. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that \$50,000 group life will be paid by the congregation;
- 4. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that medical coverage for clergy and eligible dependents, will be paid by the congregation:
- 5. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a standard of ten days per calendar year and \$500 will be provided for continuing education;
- 6. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the standard auto allowance will be \$2,000 per year; and
- 7. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all parishes and missions encourage their full-time clergy to set aside the equivalent of two days each week for personal time, 24 hours of which must be consecutive.

RATIONALE

2010 cash salary was \$38,585 and housing allowance was \$13,900 for a package total of \$52,485. The recommendation for 201 reflects a 2.4% increase in both Cash Salary and Housing. This increase is based on the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index - Midwest Urban Consumers first half of 2009 comparison to the first half of 2010.

The Canons of the Episcopal Church mandate that pension assessments be paid by congregations (assessment = 18 percent of cash salary plus housing and utilities allowance).

Provides for \$50,000 of term life insurance for active clergy. (In addition, all active clergy are eligible to receive an additional term life insurance benefit from the Church Pension Fund equal to four times total compensation to a maximum of \$100,000).

A list of medical plans can be obtained from the Office of the Bishop.

Congregations are encouraged to provide both time and

financial resources to assist clergy with continuing education opportunities.

Standard allowance for auto expense.

Congregations are urged to encourage their clergy to take two days of personal time in the manner stated above.

This resolution establishes a standard base compensation for clergy. Congregations are urged and invited to compensate clergy beyond the standard. It is understood that under individual circumstances and conditions internal adjustments in the compensation package may be negotiated.

The resolution was passed but not unanimously.

Mrs. Dyer moved Resolution C-171, and it was seconded.

C-171 - Diocesan Council - Submitted by Metro III

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri request that the Committee on Constitution & Canons evaluate the desirability of amending Canon III.6 to provide for the election of one lay and one clergy member of Diocesan Council each year for three year terms; and that the said committee report its findings back to the 172nd Convention or, if it so chooses, to submit such an amendment to that Convention for its consideration.

RATIONALE

- 1. On several occasions there have been attempts both by individuals and convocations to nominate clergy for the two at-large open positions on Diocesan Council every year. It was their conviction that their nominees were well qualified to serve on Council in addition to the clergy person serving on Council from their convocation.
- 2. As it currently stands, no clergy person on Diocesan Council is elected by the entire Diocese, as represented by Diocesan Convention, to serve on the Council. The only clergy on Council are elected by convocations or appointed by the Bishop.
- 3. This Convention elects members to Standing Committee, Cathedral Chapter, Diocesan Council, and our General Convention deputation. In all these elections, except for Diocesan Council, we elect an equal number of clergy and lay members. The proposed amendment to Canon III.6 would rectify that discrepancy.

After comments, Resolution C-171 passed but not unanimously

Mrs. Dyer moved Resolution D-171 on Health and Dental Insurance, and it was seconded.

D-171 - Health & Dental Insurance - Submitted by Metro III

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri encourages Diocesan Council in 2011 to consider how to assist congregations who pay their full assessment to the Diocese of Missouri with the costs of providing health and dental insurance to the active clergy and their

families, including but not limited to the possibility of using funds from the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

RATIONALE

The costs of health and dental insurance for clergy and their families continue to rise, and there is no guarantee that the costs will stabilize, much less decline, in the future, even though we will soon have a church wide health plan for clergy and their families. In addition, the cost of providing health and dental insurance coverage to clergy is well beyond the capacity of many smaller congregations.

After discussion, D-171 was passed but not unanimously.

Mrs. Dyer moved G-171, and it was seconded.

G-171 - Family Leave - Submitted by the Diocesan Resolutions Committee

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri convention strongly encourages the Diocesan Council to develop a model Family Leave Policy for congregations, to be presented for consideration at the 172nd Convention, taking into consideration Resolution L-170 previously passed by this convention.

RATIONALE

The 170th convention required the Resolutions Committee to craft a resolution for submission at this convention addressing family leave. After discussion, the Resolution Committee recommends that Diocesan Council may be a more appropriate body to draft language of a model Family Leave Policy. Council is working on other benefits, such as medical coverage, and its members represent a better cross section of our congregations.

After a vote to allow consideration, G-171 was put to a vote without discussion. It passed but not unanimously.

Mrs. Dyer then moved B-171, and it was seconded.

B-171 - Diocesan Policy on Serving Alcohol - Submitted by Episcopal Recovery Ministries

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri adopt the following policy on serving alcoholic beverages at church functions and that this policy remain in effect until changed at a subsequent Diocesan Convention:

Diocese of Missouri Policy on Alcohol at Church Functions This policy applies to all groups hosting events on church premises.

- 1. All applicable federal, state, and local laws are to be obeyed. Under no circumstances may minors consume, sell, or distribute alcoholic beverages. Distributing alcoholic beverages to those who are intoxicated is prohibited.
- 2. Alcoholic beverages and food containing alcohol must be

clearly labeled as such.

- 3. Whenever alcohol is served, non-alcoholic alternatives are always provided with equal attractiveness, accessibility, and quantity. Food is provided whenever alcohol is available.
- 4. The serving of alcoholic beverages should not be publicized as an attraction of the event.
- 5. No event will include alcohol without first consulting with and receiving the consent of the priest in charge of the congregation or his/her designee.
- 6. Responsible adults are to be in control of the serving of alcoholic beverages. Drunkenness is inappropriate and unacceptable at church events.
- 7. The furnishing of alcoholic beverages is limited to beer and wine.
- 8. The priest in charge and Vestry/Bishop's Committee of the congregation are responsible for ensuring that this policy is disseminated and observed.
- 9. Chemical distribution other than alcohol is clearly controlled under federal, state, and local laws and, as such, is forbidden at any function.
- 10. Alcoholic beverages stored on church premises are in locked storage, so that they are not accessible to unsupervised minors
- 11. Alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed by adults who accompany minors off church property on a parish-related activity.
- 12. Any outside group or group advertising to the public that hosts an event on church property and serves alcohol is required to obtain an event rider or certificate of insurance naming the church as loss payee and showing limits of liquor liability equal to the church's general liability.

Clarification and Additional Information Paragraph number

- 1. A "minor" is anyone under the legal drinking age of 21.
- 4. An event would not be advertised as a "wine and cheese party" or "champagne brunch," for example. Wine could be listed as one of the items being furnished as long as non-alcoholic beverages are also listed and the list of food items is prominent.
- 5. It is the intent of this policy that alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed on church property before, during, or after regularly scheduled gatherings. Examples include: Sunday or weekday worship, choir rehearsals, vestry meetings, guild/committee meetings. At the discretion and with the consent of the priest in charge, the serving of alcohol may be allowed on special occasions such as a major feast, Celebration of New Ministry, concert or choral Evensong, etc.
- 6. It is not permissible for attendees to bring their own alcoholic beverages for their private consumption to church events. Alcohol consumed at a church event is distributed and controlled by the hosting group.

The group or organization sponsoring the event assumes responsibility for any persons who might become intoxicated and must provide alternative transportation for anyone whose capacity to drive may be impaired.

- 7. Only low-content alcoholic beverages may be served. Hard liquor is not provided.
- 10. Alcoholic beverages (beer, wine) may not be stored in unlocked refrigerators in a church's kitchen, for example. The wine used for the Eucharist should also be stored securely to

avoid unauthorized use.

Drinking the consecrated wine left over following the Eucharist is never a requirement. Respectfully disposing of the wine by pouring it on the ground or down a piscina is always an option.

11. Alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed by adults who serve as chaperones on a mission trip or to a choir camp, for example. Adults are to abstain from drinking any alcohol during the entire period of time they are chaperoning the minors. 12. An "outside group" is defined as any group holding a nonchurch sponsored event, even if the leaders of the event are members of the parish. "Advertising to the public" is defined as publicity through radio, newspaper, television, website, or signage to induce the public to attend; however, this does not include notices published in the church's newsletter, e-mail list, website, etc.

RATIONALE

Alcohol is a mood-altering, potentially addictive drug. Currently the third leading health problem in the United States, alcohol abuse is a problem for more than 20 million Americans, roughly 10% of the population. The damage from alcohol addiction is inflicted on millions more, as families are fractured and torn apart by the addict's behavior.

In the United States one person is killed every half hour due to drunk driving. By serving alcohol at church events we run the risk of people driving while intoxicated, threatening their own safety and the welfare of our communities.

Chances are, at least 1 in every 10 members in our congregations abuses or is addicted to alcohol. By adhering to this policy we will model moderation in the consumption and serving of alcohol on our property. This policy is sensitive to those who suffer from alcohol abuse, while demonstrating hospitality and fellowship by allowing but not relying on alcoholic beverages.

The sponsor of this policy, Episcopal Recovery Ministries, is dedicated to helping Episcopalians and Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA) members suffering from addictions into recovery. The Committee is a group of clergy and lay volunteers appointed by the Bishop. Each of these people has had personal experience with addiction and recovery, and is an active member of the church.

An amendment was offered to strike the words "or group" from paragraph 12. After discussion, the amendment was put to a vote and failed.

An amendment was offered as follows:

5. No event will include alcohol without first consulting with and receiving the consent of the priest in charge of the congregation or his/her designee.

And replace with amended paragraph 5 from "Clarification and Additional Information"

It is the intent of this policy that alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed on church property before, during, or after regularly scheduled gatherings. Examples include: Sunday or weekday worship, choir rehearsals, vestry meetings, guild/committee meetings. At the discretion and with the consent of the priest in charge, or his/her designee, the serving of alcohol may be allowed on special occasions such as a major feast, Celebration of New Ministry, concert, etc.

After discussion, the amendment failed

An amendment was offered to omit clause 7. After discussion, the amendment failed.

An amendment was offered to add a clause at the end of the resolution as follows:

The Episcopal Recoveries Ministry shall develop nonbinding guidance for consideration by congregations and the diocese. Omit the remainder of the Rationale. After discussion, Resolution B-171 passed as amended. The amended text is as follows:

B-171 Amended

Diocesan Policy on Serving Alcohol Submitted by Episcopal Recovery Ministries, amended at convention

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri adopt the following policy on serving alcoholic beverages at church functions and that this policy remain in effect until changed at a subsequent Diocesan Convention:

Report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons: Mr. Harold Burroughs

Chancellor Burroughs, on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, moved Resolution E-171.

E-171 - Amendments to Title V: Ecclesiastical Discipline -Submitted on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons

BE IT RESOLVED that, effective July 1, 2011, this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri amend Title V of the Canons of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri:

A. by amending Canon V.5 in its entirety to read as follows:

CANON V.5 Title IV of General Canons. Those provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church which are applicable to this Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Title. To the extent, if any, that any of the provisions of this Title are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church, the provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church shall govern.

and

B. by adding a new Canon V.6, V.7, and V.8 as follows

Canon V.6. Discipline Structure

Section 1. Disciplinary Board. The Board shall consist of not less than seven persons, four (4) of whom are members of the Clergy and three (3) of whom are Laity.

Section 2. Clergy Members. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically and geographically resident within the Diocese.

Section 3. Lay Members. The lay members of the Board shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing, and geographically resident in the Diocese.

Section 4. Election. The members of the Board shall be elected by the Convention. Each member shall be elected for a three (3)-year term; except, if a member is elected to fill a vacancy, the term of such member shall be the unexpired term of the member being replaced. The term of the ember shall

commence on the first (1st) day of the year following election. The terms of office of the Board shall be staggered and arranged into three classes.

Section 5, Vacancies. Until such time as a replacement Board member is duly elected pursuant to Canon V.6.4, vacancies on the Board shall be filled as follows:

- (a) Upon the determination that a vacancy exists, the President of the Board shall notify the Bishop of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced.
- (b) The Bishop shall appoint a replacement Board member in consultation with the Standing Committee.
- (c) Persons appointed to fill vacancies on the Board shall meet the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Board members.
- (d) With respect to a vacancy created for any reason other than pursuant to a challenge as provided below, the term of any person appointed as a replacement Board member shall be until the next annual Convention. With respect to a vacancy resulting from a challenge, the replacement Board member shall serve only for the proceedings for which the elected Board member is not serving as a result of the challenge.

Section 6. Preserving Impartiality. In any proceeding under this Title, if any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel of the Board shall become aware of a personal conflict of interest or undue bias, that member shall immediately notify the President of the Board and request a replacement member of the Panel. Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The members of the Panel not the subjects of the challenge shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in that proceeding.

Section 7. President. Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following calendar year. The Bishop shall establish the time and place for each meeting within such sixty (60) day period by written notice to the members of the Board. Such meeting shall be held within the geographic boundaries of this Diocese.

Section 8. Intake Officer. The Intake Officer shall be appointed from time to time by the Bishop after consultation with the Board. The Bishop may appoint one or more Intake Officers according to the needs of the Diocese. The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.

Section 9. Investigator. The Bishop shall appoint n Investigator in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may, but need not, be a Member of the Church.

Section 10. Church Attorney. Within sixty (60) days follow-

ing each annual Convention, the Standing Committee shall appoint an attorney to serve as Church Attorney to service for the following calendar year. The person so selected must be a Member of the Church and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese.

Section 11. Pastoral Response Coordinator. The Bishop may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator, to serve at the will of the Bishop in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Title IV.8 of the General Canons and this Title. The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer, but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.

Section 12. Advisors. In each proceeding under this Title, the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant and an Advisor for the Respondent. Persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position provided for under this Title, and shall not include chancellors or vice chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.

Section 13. Clerk. The Board shall appoint a Board Clerk to assist the Board with records management and administrative support. The Clerk may be a member of the Board.

CANON V.7 Costs and Expenses

Section 1. Costs Incurred by the Church. The reasonable costs and expenses of the Board, the Intake Officer, the Investigator, the Church Attorney, the Board Clerk, and the Pastoral Response Coordinator shall be the obligation of the Diocese, subject to budgetary considerations as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

Section 2. Cost Incurred by the Respondent. In the event of a final Order dismissing the complaint, or by provisions of a Covenant approved by the Bishop, the reasonable defense fees and costs incurred by the Respondent may be paid or reimbursed by the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

CANON V.8 Records

Section 1. Records of Proceedings. Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Office of the Bishop.

Section 2. Permanent Records. The Bishop shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title, at the Office of the Bishop and the Archives of the National Church, as prescribed in Title IV of the Canons of the National Church.

RATIONALE

The foregoing amendments are necessary to implement, at the Diocesan level, the amendments to the ecclesiastical discipline canons (Title IV) of the National Church. Through the ac-

tions of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies at the 76th General Convention in 2009, the National Church adopted a new structure for ecclesiastical discipline matters. The new structure focuses on mediation and the opportunity for prompt resolution as opposed to the old Title IV which was modeled on the Uniform Code of Military Justice. By way of highlighting significant changes, please not the following:

A. A Disciplinary Board, whose members are nominated by the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure and elected by Convention, essentially replaces the Ecclesiastical Court, members of whom were nominated by the Bishop. A subset of the Disciplinary Board convenes as a "Conference Panel" in an effort to clarify the matter and pursue appropriate resolution and, as necessary, as a "Hearing Panel" to hear and adjudicate disciplinary matters.

B. The Diocese must make advisers available to all respondents and complainants to: "support, assist, consult with, and advise" them in the disciplinary matter.

C. The Bishop will appoint an Intake Officer as the person to whom information regarding offenses is to be reported.

D. Other Personnel include a Church Attorney, who will represent the Church in the disciplinary matter, a Conciliator, who is appointed by the Bishop to seek a settlement of the matter, and Investigators, who are to conduct investigations into the issues as hand.

Upon vote, Canon E-171 passed unanimously.

The Bishop then asked Chancellor Burroughs for announcements.

United Thank Offering Presentation: Ms. Rosemary Bagin

Ms. Bagin reported a decline in congregations participating in the United Thank Offering. Last year, seventeen congregations took part. Mailings have been sent to all congregations indicating a Spring Ingathering in March. \$7,845.00 has been received. There are now twenty ingathering congregations with eight new ones. One application for a UTO grant has been received. A new UTO Coordinator is being sought, and it need not by a woman.

Episcopal City Mission Presentation: Ms. Barbie Click Ms. Barbie Click presented a video detailing the work of the Episcopal City Mission.

Further Report from Constitution and Canons: Mr. Hal Burroughs

On behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, Chancellor Burroughs moved the adoption of Resolution F-171, and it was seconded.

F-171 - Adjusted Term Limits for Wardens - Submitted on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons and the Church of St. Michael and St. George

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri amend Section 6 of Canon IV.5A of the Canons of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri to read as follows:

SEC. 6. The Rector shall appoint annually from the Vestry a Senior Warden, and the Vestry shall elect from its members a Junior Warden, both of whom shall be canonically qualified for office. The terms of the Senior Warden and Junior Warden shall be for one year each. No person who has served three consecutive one-year terms as Senior Warden or Junior Warden shall be eligible for further service in each capacity until the expiration of one year; provided that, if warranted by extraordinary circumstances and at the special request of the Rector and Vestry (or if the Parish is without a Rector, as the special request of the Vestry), and subject to compliance with Section 2 of this Canon IV5.A, a Senior Warden or Junior Warden may at the completion of his or her respective third consecutive one-year terms as Senior Warden or Junior Warden be reappointed (in the case of the Senior Warden) or re-elected (in the case of the Junior Warden) to the office of Senior Warden or Junior Warden, as the case may be, for one additional year. The Rector may at any time commit the appointment of the Senior Warden to the Vestry. If the Parish is without a Rector , the Vestry shall elect from its members a Senior Warden. In the absence or illness of the Rector, or during a vacancy in the Rectorship (except to the extent such power has been delegated to an Interim Pastor or Priest-in-Charge by written employment agreement) the Senior Warden shall preside at meetings of the Vestry and of the Parish. In the absence of the Senior Warden, or in case of his or her inability or failure to act, the Junior Warden shall be the Presiding Officer. If

there be no Wardens present, the Vestry or Parish shall elect a person to preside at its meeting.

Rationale

The bolded text reflects the proposed new language to be added to the Canon. [The bold faced type is added for convenience of reference only and the new text will not be printed in bold in the Canons.] The foregoing amendment grants to a Parish the ability to extend the term of service of a Senior Warden or a Junior Warden at the request of the Rector and Vestry. This flexibility can be useful when a Warden is involved with a long term project and the Parish deems it appropriate to have a particular individual continue in a position of Parish lay leadership. The "extraordinary circumstances" standard is the same standard utilized in Section 2 of Canon IV.5A, which accommodates the extension of a Vestry term in order for a Warden to continue in office for an additional year notwithstanding the expiration of a Vestryperson's customary three year term.

After discussion, the Chancellor indicated that a 2/3 vote of Convention was necessary for the Resolution to be adopted. On vote, the Convention approved the consideration of F-171 by the necessary margin but not unanimously.

Upon vote, the Resolution was adopted but not unanimously.

Resolutions Approved by the 171st Convention

A-171: Minimum Clergy Compensation Submitted on behalf of the Diocesan Council

1. BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri set the annual standard base compensation for full-time clergy in 2011 as follows: CASH SALARY \$39,510

HOUSING ALLOWANCE \$14,240

[The actual compensation should be determined by Resolution of the Vestry/Bishop's Committee, in consultation with the clergy.]

- 2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Church Pension Fund assessment will be paid by the congregation;
- 3. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that \$50,000 group life will be paid by the congregation;
- 4. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that medical coverage for clergy and eligible dependents, will be paid by the congregation;
- 5. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a standard of ten days per calendar year and \$500 will be provided for continuing education;
- 6. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the standard auto allowance will be \$2,000 per year; and
- 7. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all parishes and missions encourage their full-time clergy to set aside the equivalent of two days each week for personal time, 24 hours of which must be consecutive.

B-171 as amended by convention: Diocesan Policy on Serving Alcohol - Submitted by Episcopal Recovery Ministries

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri adopt the following policy on serving alcoholic beverages at church functions and that this policy remain in effect until changed at a subsequent Diocesan Convention:

Diocese of Missouri Policy on Alcohol at Church Functions

This policy applies to all groups hosting events on church premises.

- 1. All applicable federal, state, and local laws are to be obeyed. Under no circumstances may minors consume, sell, or distribute alcoholic beverages. Distributing alcoholic beverages to those who are intoxicated is prohibited.
- 2. Alcoholic beverages and food containing alcohol must be clearly labeled as such.
- 3. Whenever alcohol is served, non-alcoholic alternatives are always provided with equal attractiveness, accessibility, and quantity. Food is provided whenever alcohol is available.

- 4. The serving of alcoholic beverages should not be publicized as an attraction of the event.
- 5. No event will include alcohol without first consulting with and receiving the consent of the priest in charge of the congregation or his/her designee.
- 6. Responsible adults are to be in control of the serving of alcoholic beverages. Drunkenness is inappropriate and unacceptable at church events.
- 7. The furnishing of alcoholic beverages is limited to beer and wine.
- 8. The priest in charge and Vestry/Bishop's Committee of the congregation are responsible for ensuring that this policy is disseminated and observed.
- 9. Chemical distribution other than alcohol is clearly controlled under federal, state, and local laws and, as such, is forbidden at any function.
- 10. Alcoholic beverages stored on church premises are in locked storage, so that they are not accessible to unsupervised minors.
- 11. Alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed by adults who accompany minors off church property on a parishrelated activity.
- 12. Any outside group or group advertising to the public that hosts an event on church property and serves alcohol is required to obtain an event rider or certificate of insurance naming the church as loss payee and showing limits of liquor liability equal to the church's general liability.
- 13. The Episcopal Recovery Ministry shall develop nonbinding guidance for consideration by congregations and the diocese.

C-171: Diocesan Council - Submitted by Metro III

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri request that the Committee on Constitution & Canons evaluate the desirability of amending Canon III.6 to provide for the election of one lay and one clergy member of Diocesan Council each year for three year terms; and that the said committee report its findings back to the 172nd Convention or, if it so chooses, to submit such an amendment to that Convention for its consideration.

D-171: Health & Dental Insurance - Submitted by Metro III

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri encourages Diocesan Council in 2011 to consider how to assist congregations who pay their full assessment to the Diocese of Missouri

with the costs of providing health and dental insurance to the active clergy and their families, including but not limited to the possibility of using funds from the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

E-171: Amendments to Title V: Ecclesiastical Discipline - Submitted on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons

BE IT RESOLVED that, effective July 1, 2011, this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri amend Title V of the Canons of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri:

A. by amending Canon V.5 in its entirety to read as follows:

CANON V.5 Title IV of General Canons. Those provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church which are applicable to this Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Title. To the extent, if any, that any of the provisions of this Title are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church, the provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the National Church shall govern.

; and

B. by adding a new Canons V.6, V.7 and V.8 as follows:

CANON V.6 Discipline Structure.

Section 1. Disciplinary Board. The Board shall consist of not less than seven persons, four (4) of whom are members of the Clergy and three (3) of whom are Laity.

Sec. 2. Clergy Members. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically and geographically resident within the Diocese.

Sec. 3. Lay Members. The lay members of the Board shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing, and geographically resident in the Diocese.

Sec. 4. Election. The members of the Board shall be elected by the Convention. Each member shall be elected for a three (3)-year term; except, if a member is elected to fill a vacancy, the term of such member shall be the unexpired term of the member being replaced. The term of the member shall commence on the first (1st) day of the year following election. The terms of office of the Board shall be staggered and arranged into three classes.

Sec. 5. Vacancies. Until such time as a replacement Board member is duly elected pursuant to Canon V.6.4, vacancies on the Board shall be filled as follows:

(a) Upon the determination that a vacancy exists, the President of the Board shall notify the Bishop of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced.

- (b) The Bishop shall appoint a replacement Board member in consultation with the Standing Committee.
- (c) Persons appointed to fill vacancies on the Board shall meet the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Board members.
- (d) With respect to a vacancy created for any reason other than pursuant to a challenge as provided below, the term of any person appointed as a replacement Board member shall be until the next annual Convention. With respect to a vacancy resulting from a challenge, the replacement Board member shall serve only for the proceedings for which the elected Board member is not serving as a result of the challenge.

Sec. 6. Preserving Impartiality. In any proceeding under this Title, if any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel of the Board shall become aware of a personal conflict of interest or undue bias, that member shall immediately notify the President of the Board and request a replacement member of the Panel. Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The members of the Panel not the subjects of the challenge shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in that proceeding. Sec. 7. President. Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following calendar year. The Bishop shall establish the time and place for such meeting within such sixty (60) day period by written notice to the members of the Board. Such meeting shall be held within the geographic boundaries of this Diocese.

Sec. 8. Intake Officer. The Intake Officer shall be appointed from time to time by the Bishop after consultation with the Board. The Bishop may appoint one or more Intake Officers according to the needs of the Diocese. The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.

Sec. 9. Investigator. The Bishop shall appoint an Investigator in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may, but need not, be a Member of the Church

Sec. 10. Church Attorney. Within sixty (60) days following each annual Convention, the Standing Committee shall appoint an attorney to serve as Church Attorney to serve for the following calendar year. The person so selected must be a Member of the Church and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese.

Sec. 11. Pastoral Response Coordinator. The Bishop may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator, to serve at the will of the Bishop in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Title IV.8 of the General Canons and this Title. The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer, but shall not be a

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person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.

Sec. 12. Advisors. In each proceeding under this Title, the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant and an Advisor for the Respondent. Persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position provided for under this Title, and shall not include chancellors or vice chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding. Sec. 13. Clerk. The Board shall appoint a Board Clerk to assist the Board with records management and administrative support. The Clerk may be a member of the Board.

CANON V.7 Costs and Expenses.

Section 1. Costs Incurred by the Church. The reasonable costs and expenses of the Board, the Intake Officer, the Investigator, the Church Attorney, the Board Clerk and the Pastoral Response Coordinator shall be the obligation of the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

Sec. 2. Costs Incurred by the Respondent. In the event of a final Order dismissing the complaint, or by provisions of a Covenant approved by the Bishop, the reasonable defense fees and costs incurred by the Respondent may be paid or reimbursed by the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

CANON V.8 Records.

Section 1. Records of Proceedings. Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Office of the Bishop.

Sec. 2. Permanent Records. The Bishop shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title at the Office of the Bishop and the Archives of the National Church, as prescribed in Title IV of the Canons of the National Church.

F-171: Adjusted Term Limits for Wardens -Submitted on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons and the Church of St. Michael and St. George

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri amend Section 6 of Canon IV.5A of the Canons of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri its entirety to read as follows:

SEC. 6. The Rector shall appoint annually from the Vestry a Senior Warden, and the Vestry shall elect from its members a Junior Warden, both of whom shall be canoni-

cally qualified for office. The terms of the Senior Warden and Junior Warden shall be one year each. No person who has served three consecutive one-year terms as Senior Warden or Junior Warden shall be eligible for further service in such capacity until the expiration of one year; provided that, if warranted by extraordinary circumstances and at the special request of the Rector and Vestry (or if the Parish is without a Rector, at the special request of the Vestry), and subject to compliance with Section 2 of this Canon IV.5A, a Senior Warden or a Junior Warden may at the completion of his or her respective third consecutive one-year term as Senior Warden or Junior Warden be reappointed (in the case of the Senior Warden) or reelected (in the case of the Junior Warden) to the office of Senior Warden or Junior Warden, as the case may be, for one additional year. The Rector may at any time commit the appointment of the Senior Warden to the Vestry. If the Parish be without a Rector, the Vestry shall elect from its members a Senior Warden. In the absence or illness of the Rector, or during a vacancy in the Rectorship (except to the extent such power has been delegated to an Interim Pastor or Priest-in-Charge by written employment agreement) the Senior Warden shall preside at meetings of the Vestry and of the Parish. In the absence of the Senior Warden, or in case of his or her inability or failure to act, the Junior Warden shall be the presiding officer. If there be no Wardens present, the Vestry or Parish shall elect a person to preside at its meeting.

G-171 - Family Leave - Submitted by the Diocesan Resolutions Committee

BE IT RESOLVED that this 171st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri strongly encourages the Diocesan Council to develop a model Family Leave Policy for congregations, to be presented for consideration at the 172nd Convention, taking into consideration Resolution L-170 previously passed by this convention.

Bishop Wayne Smith's Address to Convention

November 20, 2010, St. Charles, Missouri

Grace to you, and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ.

I begin with one of the great, hope-filled passages from Revelation, as John continues to unfold the vision given him, here at the twenty-first chapter:

I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away."

Notice how this passage undermines a popular American imagination about the end of days, which talks about a rapture of believers into the sky, an escape from a doomed world. But that's not what Revelation tells us. The new Jerusalem comes down, renewing the earth. The home of God is among mortals. There is no escape in this picture.

This much beloved world is the context for God's working-out of salvation. It is the only context we have. The new Jerusalem, whose presence comes to us from above and from the future, provides a reference point for the Church, showing us where God is going.

Context. Text. Action. This is a simplified adaptation of an interpretive method familiar to theologians the world over. Context. Text. Action. Three words I hope you will take with you. Bishop Ian Douglas of Connecticut presented this framework in a very practical way at the House of Bishops meeting last September.

Context. The world where we live provides the venue for God's mission. There is none other.

The home of God is among mortals, says Revelation. Praise be to God for taking on flesh in Jesus of Nazareth, to live among us as one of us. The implications for us, who are heirs to the living religion of the

incarnation, require us to know our context well. If we take the flesh and this world as seriously as Jesus does. To walk the neighborhoods, to know the people, to recognize the flesh-and-blood joys and sorrows, and the fears. To know the lore, which stories give shape to how we live. And to study the hard data about where we live, available to anyone with an internet connection. Demographics, population trends, occupations, economics: These tell us about context.

There are various horizons of context, both nearby and far off. We do well to interpret the context of our neighborhoods—and the global neighborhood. It is my hope that we can understand that what we do in Lui Diocese in Sudan, and what we do at the Peace Meal at St. John's in Tower Grove in St. Louis, are of one piece. They simply lie on different horizons of our context.

A first step, then: Interpreting the context.

After context, then text. What in scripture helps make sense out of this situation? What comes to mind? Where are the links? Formal scripture studies, whether modern in shape or avant garde and postmodern, can interpret a passage of scripture to within an inch of its life. Part of the brilliance of the method which I am describing is that it allows the scriptures to do the interpreting. The scripture becomes free to make sense of us, and the situations which we face. They bring clarity into our understanding of what God is doing in our contexts.

Context. Text. Action. Once we begin to understand what God is doing in the context, then we can find the invitation to do the thing that God is doing. Remember: it is always God's mission, not ours, and we are accountable to and servants of that mission. And as we engage more deeply in the context, the interpretive loop begins again. Context. Text. Action. An ever-changing tableau.

I asked Robert Towner, rector of Christ Church in Cape Girardeau, if I might share some of the story about missional life in that congregation, and how this interpretive template fits. It fits pretty well.

In 2001 or 2002, at a conference for revitalizing older, established churches, which Bob attended with the senior warden of the parish, he came away with one important insight: serve the neighborhood where you have been planted, or else move. That's all about context.

Christ Church was faced with an important decision: to move to the growing edge of town, or stay put in a downtown neighborhood in decline. They ended up staying, not as a path of least resistance, but purposefully. That's when, Bob says, they started talking to their neighbors.

That is to say, Christ Church got more serious about its context.

And some texts emerged to help make sense out of that context, to show what God was and is doing there. Mark 6, Jesus' commissioning of the twelve, with his instructions to travel lightly and to stay put in one house within a locale until finished, spoke to the situation. Don't go flitting about looking for the best house with the best meals—but do the work where you are. The parable of the sower suggested that Christ is faithfully sowing the word already among neighbors, even before the missionaries show up. Jesus got there before Christ Church. Luke 14 tells about Jesus' imperative to invite guests to a banquet precisely because of their inability to repay. And here I use Bob's exact works: "Of course there's the parable of the last judgment in Matthew 25, full of ghosts of activism past (present and future), which haunts us all and offers us immense promise (Oh, that I might meet Him!!) even before the eschaton." Well put, Bob.

As far as action in these eight or nine years, there were plenty of efforts which failed. But Christ Church did not lose its sense of purpose, in staying put. "We have got to do it here, and if we cannot see the openings, we haven't finished exploring the context." Again, quoting Bob Towner.

So for now: they have a life-giving food ministry: A hot meal the last Sunday every month, when paychecks run low, and a food pantry open every week, for a neighborhood with hungry people. They have the Red Door Kids club—for the neighborhood.,

not for the Church. They are intentional about neighborhood connections, for a safe, walkable, beautiful neighborhood. Christ Church is very much connected with our Diocese's partnership in Sudan.

Christ Church would be missed if it were not there in Cape Girardeau.

By the way, the missional life I am describing does not require a lot of money. It resists programs and budgets. It is a way for the Church to organize and live its life. And it depends on people-power. Sweat equity. Yours. Mine.

There are stories like this all around the Diocese, and I encourage you to give words to them. Think about them in terms of Context. Text. Action. Practice telling them out loud. This is precisely the kind of work being done with the Mission Model Congregations, about whom I spoke in my address last year: Advent, Crestwood; Christ Church, Cape Girardeau; Grace, Kirkwood; St. Matthew's, Warson Woods; St. Paul's, Ironton; and Trinity, St. Charles are congregations of various sizes, in various locales, and representative of the breadth of this diocese.

I have asked them to do one main thing: To make the work of mission an organizing principle for their congregation's life. Not as an after-thought. But a main thing—if not the main thing. Their work has been an experiment of sorts: But I am confident enough now to ask all of you the same thing I have asked these congregations: To make the work of mission an organizing principle in your life together.

Here's what I notice as I travel about this diocese: To a place, the congregations who have chosen to look outward—rather than inward—are thriving. And doing so even in this crazy economy. The paradox is that to focus outward is to get well, in our internal goings-on. To give up our life is to save it. The way of the cross is the way of life and peace. These are not slogans to put in needle-point and hang on the wall. These are the bracing and life-giving truths at the heart of the gospel.

One hard truth about life in the eastern half of Missouri is the presence of racism. Which is simply

part of our context. Urban, town, rural—racism and its structures are present, and so much a part of the landscape that they are often invisible to us, particularly those of us in the dominant culture.

The Diocese of Missouri is blessed to have at our service an exemplary Commission on Dismantling Racism. I have been in conversation with that Commission, dreaming about what our next steps might be.

Two things I ask of you, the Clergy and Delegates at this convention: First, I ask you to join me in examining context around this issue and identifying texts to make sense of it. The Commission has to take a lead in this work, but I commend it to everyone in our Diocese. Context and text have some clarity for me, but action is less than clear. Study, listen, and dream with me.

Second, I ask you to begin work in your various communities of faith to identify any legacies of slavery and racism in your midst, and ours. The General Convention last year, by resolution, has asked us to do just that. This is heavy lifting, dear friends, and I stand ready to lend a hand. The Commission on Dismantling Racism plans to provide practical resources for all of us, next spring and summer.

We who are the Church, after all, are accountable to another vision from the Book of Revelation, that image of the saints of God in the age to come, praising God and Christ the Lamb, a royal priesthood from every family, language, people and nation. We do not inhabit that vision perfectly, and we will not so inhabit it of our own doing—but we remain accountable to it. That vision alone means that we must combat racism.

That vision also has everything to do with our vitality. Some data for you: The Diocesan growth trend in average Sunday attendance remains remarkably flat. Last reporting year I put before you the data from 2008, which showed a .4% increase in Sunday attendance over the previous year. Flat.

In reporting the data from 2009, I can tell you that we showed a .5% decrease in Sunday attendance, compared to the previous year. Statistically flat. Better than all but a hand full of dioceses but not sustainable.

For the sake of vitality, our congregations will do well to reflect the diversity in the communities around them. Another reason for attention to racism in our contexts.

Now to extend the horizons of Church to the Anglican Communion: I need first to report that amid the serious tensions which continue in the Communion, the Episcopal Church still has a place at the table. The table is taking on a different look, and there may be more than one table. So be it.

I believe that we will continue to have such a place, though with discomfort and ambiguity for us—and for others at the table. I have no need prematurely to resolve this discomfort and ambiguity.

My long-stated purpose has been to work toward the full inclusion of all the baptized, including our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters, while maintaining the highest degree of communion possible along the way. That is still my purpose. Note this: the Episcopal Church remains a constituent member of the Anglican Communion.

A related matter is the proposed Anglican Covenant, about which I have two points. First, by the end of January, I will appoint a Diocesan task force to study the Covenant, to gather data from the Diocese, and to distribute their learnings to us by the end of 2011.

Second, I need to let you know my own deep ambivalence toward the idea of a Covenant. The Covenant, as proposed, presents a different style of Anglicanism from that familiar to us. For example, it looks more to the Articles of Religion, a list, and less to the voluminous writings of Richard Hooker, with all his subtleties. This Church historically has paid precious little attention to the Articles.

The Covenant looks more to the English Book of Common Prayer of 1662, as if frozen in time, and less (if at all) to the liturgical renewal of the previous 150 years. This presents an odd feel to Episcopalians, since our Church abandoned the 1662 English book for a Scots-based book, in 1784.

The Covenant looks confessional in shape, despite denials to the contrary. It looks more juridical and less relational in its constructs. It suggests a centralizing authority in place of the more familiar dispersed authority.

With reservations, I could be convinced to support the Covenant, at least in its first three sections, if it could be shown to strengthen the bonds of affection. The fourth section, where the juridical aspects are focused, remains very problematic.

I say all this, not to shut down your own considerations about the Covenant, but simply to let you know where I stand.

I have written already to convey my gratitude to the Diocese and its bodies for making March and April of this years available as sabbatical time for me. I need to say my thanks in person to all of you who form the core deliberative body in the Diocese of Missouri. Sabbatical gave me much-needed rest and a time for reflection. About the only tangible outcome was that hymn-text we sang last night, and which I penned mostly on the beach in South Texas. The intangibles, though, have been plenty.

I do want to re-state some of the learnings which solidified during my sabbatical, since I think they are pertinent.

First: The ordained life is full of blessing and stress. This is hardly a new learning, but I took in through my body what I have known for a long time. I was not prepared for the degree of tiredness I discovered in myself, once I got to the beach and camped there for two weeks. I am grateful for the rest I found, and also for the time and space to uncover my own weariness. I say these words, not for the sake of selfpity, or eliciting pity from anyone else. I write them instead for purposes of consciousness-raising, and for the sake of the clergy of this Diocese. As recently as the 1960s, pastoral ministry was a high-status, lowstress vocation. A couple of generations later, those qualifiers have flipped, and most of the ordained now experience their vocation as high-stress, low-status. With the gradual demise of Christendom in recent decades, and the lower regard for religious institutions and even distrust of them, the culture no longer by default will see to the "care and feeding" of clergy. It is instead up to the people of our parishes to take up this task—and to do so intentionally, and with understanding. Deal compassionately and gently with your clergy.

And clergy: pay attention to your own well-being.

Second: We may be living through an epochal shift. Phyllis Tickle and Diana Butler Bass, both scholars of some note, addressed the March House of Bishops meeting on the matter of "the great emergence." As Tickle writes to make this claim, "Every 500 years or so, the church—and the world—experience huge social, political, economic, and cultural shifts." And both she and Butler Bass argue that we are just at the tipping point of such a shift.

Now, they may over-state the matter, but I do think that they are onto something nonetheless. Be very sure about this: We cannot recreate the Church or the world of the 1950s. That Church and world are gone. Over and done with. More to the point, we cannot even recreate the Church and world of the 1990s.

A more tangible and verifiable shift lies in the fact of global climate change. The beautiful fragility of Padre Island, one of the low-lying barrier islands of the Gulf Coast, provided the backdrop for my reading and reflection on this matter. The closing line in the first verse of my hymn-text we sang comes directly from this experience of being on a threatened beach: The prayer to God, the Holy Spirit: Brood o'er the earth, renew its life, and cleanse it from our sin.

Moreover, the research and consultation I have done as part of the House of Bishops Theology Committee's work around climate change suggest that the Church has been largely silent on a crucial matter of the Christian moral life. This must change. If all the data are truth, how then shall we live?

The vision of the new Jerusalem is to the point. For God loves this world and works toward its renewal and salvation. There is not another world for refuge, but this one, holy and blessed but wounded. There is no escape.

Over the past months, I have delighted to see a ministry calling itself *Sustain a Faith* emerge in our Diocese. This is a group of people devoted to making our Church buildings greener, and encouraging all of us believers to live more sustainable lives. It is an organization built grass-roots up, rather than top down. Much to like about it!

Finally, and by no means least, I came to know more deeply how much I treasure the ministry entrusted to me. Toward the end of this brief sabbatical, when I found myself turning toward my return to my work and ministry, I found a sort of unexpected anticipation. The work of Bishop of Missouri is endlessly fascinating. I find it both satisfying—and often indescribably difficult. They qualities are not mutually exclusive and, in fact, encompass the sort of language which many theologians use to describe vocation.

I realize that there is no other work about which I pine away. And it is not being a bishop in the abstract which makes this ministry such a sweet spot in my life. It is the specifics inherent in being Bishop of Missouri: this geography, these congregations, these people, these challenges and opportunities.

I realize that I do not crave some theoretically perfect diocese, as if such a thing were possible. I am deeply, deeply content with the diocese where I am blessed to live and serve.

It is my joy to have all of you as partners as we seek to engage the mission of God in our neighborhoods. Making Disciples. Building Congregations. For the Life of the World.

Adoption of Endowment Investment Policy: Tom Hedrick introduced a general policy for the governance and oversight of endowments. The following policy was moved and seconded:

INTRODUCTION:

The purpose of this Investment Policy is to state the objectives and assign responsibilities for oversight of the endowed investments of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri. The overall objective of the Diocese is to seek a balance in the management of the funds by providing a

predictable stream of funding for the general or specified programs for which the funds were granted, while preserving the long-term purchasing power of the endowment assets. The return objectives of the assets, measured over a full market cycle, shall be to maximize the actual return against appropriate investment benchmarks for the various classes of assets. This long-term investment horizon has been adopted in order to weigh the risks and duration of possible investment losses with the potential for asset appreciation over these market cycles. However, the markets for investments can be volatile, and there are no assurances that investment yield objectives can be achieved. OVERSIGHT AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

Each endowment fund is managed by professional investment managers pursuant to the respective grantor trust agreement. The investment managers, acting in their fiduciary capacity, generally have broad discretion in investment selection and asset allocation strategies. The Diocese, through the Bishop (or his designee), Diocesan Treasurer, and Diocesan Chief Financial Officer, provides general oversight of the investment managers. General responsibilities include annual reviews of investment returns against appropriate benchmarks and review of general asset allocations in light of overall economic conditions. INVESTMENT GUIDELINES:

Following are general investment guidelines for the funds. Equity: Equity exposure may be comprised of individually managed stocks, mutual funds, and exchange traded funds. Investment strategies may include active and indexed management. Equity strategies may include large, mid and small capitalization investments. International equity strategies may include developed markets and emerging markets investments.

Fixed Income: Fixed Income exposure may be comprised of individually managed bonds, mutual funds and exchange traded funds. Fixed income investments may also consist of U.S. Treasury, Government Agencies, Corporate, Mortgage Backed, Taxable Municipal, and Asset Backed Securities. Any individual holdings should have a minimum credit rating of BBB at the time of purchase and all aggregations of fixed income securities (e.g., fixed income mutual funds) purchased shall have an average rating that is investment grade i.e., rated in one of the four highest rating categories by an NRSRO at the time of purchase.

Performance measurements for investments shall include:

- Standard and Poor's Composite Index
- Barclays Aggregate Bond Index
- Total International Composite Index

DISTRIBUTION POLICIES:

Distribution policies for each endowment fund are set and governed by the respective trust document and specific purpose of the fund. Investment managers are advised of these distribution objectives and seek to manage the portfolio to achieve the necessary return with the appropriate level of market and investment risk. When the distribution rate is silent in the governing document, a general policy is followed which calculates the annual distribution by multiplying the average market value over the preceding three-year period by a range of 3.5% to 5%.

DIOCESAN INVESTMENT TRUST (DIT):

The DIT is managed by an advisory committee and has a separate investment policy governing the operations of equity and fixed income portfolios.

Archivist and Registrar

The Archives is the repository for all the official and historical records of the diocese. Our collection includes a library, extensive document and photograph collections and a growing collection of three-dimensional items from our closed churches—memorial plaques, processional and altar crosses, alms basins, chalices, patens and at present, a hand carved altar, pulpit and lectern, along with five stained glass windows. Christ Church Cathedral provides storage for our larger items.

The sixth floor of Bishop Tuttle Memorial is our home. What was originally space arranged for three 2-room apartments for Cathedral clergy at the time the building was constructed, now provides space for our library with room for reading and research, and for our collection of materials on clergy, Standing Committee, Diocesan Council, Parochial Trust Fund and COEDMO, congregations, committees, commissions, task forces, organizations and institutions, and the records of our bishops. The Archives of Christ Church Cathedral also have a room reserved for their collections.

In June I attended the Tri-History Conference in Raleigh, North Carolina, sponsored by the Historical Society of the Episcopal Church, the Episcopal Women's History Project and the National Episcopal Historians and Archivists. Attending this Conference, as well as the annual NEHA Conference is always rewarding, providing not only educational opportunities, but also time to meet other church and diocesan archivists and historians and to share experiences and resources. I hope in the future to see others from Missouri at these events.

The range of requests we receive for historical information continues to amaze me. Because of our long history in the State of Missouri we receive requests for far more than just church information. The search through journals, registers, church newspapers and old records is often as rewarding as finding the needed answer. I continue to receive requests for letters of transfer from closed churches, and for birth, marriage and burial records as family genealogy continues to be a popular pastime for many. I am happy to provide assistance for any congregation needing help establishing or maintaining their archives. And if your congregation is working on writing your congregation's history, resources in the Archives are available to you.

I am always happy to provide information relating to the history of the Diocese and of any of our congregations, organizations and institutions that have been part of the Diocese during the past 169 years.

Canon to the Ordinary

Under the supervision of the Rev. Canon Dan Smith, the office of the Canon to the Ordinary continues to supervise the Business, Legal, Property, and Congregational matters that make up the day to day work of a portion of the Bishop's staff. Ms. Desiree Viliocco continues to lead the daily work with the financial affairs of the Diocese. She is ably assisted by Ms. Emily McNeil who also handles the technology needs of the Bishop's staff. Ms. Robin Weisenborn continues as Canon Smith's administrative assistant.

Financial: Ms. Viliocco's work with the financial concerns of the Diocese continues to be exemplary. You will see in the convention journal for last year and this year the auditors continue to praise the work of Ms. Viliocco and her assistant Ms. McNeil. Both give a great deal of time to the insurance concerns of both our active and retired clergy. They continue to give significant support to the mission trips to Lui. Ms. Viliocco continues to give primary support to the treasurer of the Diocese and to the Diocesan Investment Trust.

Canon Smith continues to have primary responsibility for the Business and Legal affairs of the Diocese. The chancellor, Hal Burroughs, continues to provide much needed counsel in this area. There were fewer property matters in 2010 than in previous years, however the sale of the Bruno Street Property and the Park Ave. property were completed during this year.

Congregational Development: Canon Smith continued his work in the area of Congregational Development. In 2010 this took on two primary areas of interest: Mission and Congregations in Transition. Teams from six congregations (St. Paul's, Ironton; Christ Church, Cape Girardeau; Advent, Crestwood; Grace, Kirkwood; Trinity, St. Charles and St. Matthew's, Warson Woods) have been meeting with Bishop Smith, Canon Smith and a consultant for the work in the area of mission. They will report at this convention on their progress towards being mission minded and will serve as models for other congregations in the diocese to become more focused on the world outside of our buildings. Canon Smith helped lead several vestry retreats during the year and led four congregational meetings.

Congregations in Transition are a priority in this office. Searches ending in a call of new clergy leadership were completed at St. Martin's, Ellisville; Calvary, Columbia; St. Barnabas, Florissant; Trinity, Kirksville; St. Paul's, St. Louis; St. Francis, Eureka; Washington University Campus Ministry, Trinity, Hannibal; All Saints, St. Louis; as well as assisting in Emmanuel, Webster Grove call an curate and Christ Church Cathedral call a new canon. Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff is interviewing a finalist as we meet. Ms. Weisenborn is of particular help in the area of searches, maintaining calendars, the current status of searches and most of the paperwork that surrounds a search and a new call.

During the course of the year, this office sponsored the Leadership Conference in March, the Spring

Convention Reports

Clergy Day and the Fall Clergy Conference. Church Safety: 2010 saw the continuation of the risk assessment work instituted by the Church Insurance Corporation. Mr. Rob Viliocco has been contracted by the diocese to complete the risk evaluations. Canon Smith continues to work with the training towards the prevention of sexual abuse, exploitation and harassment in the work environment. New materials from the Church Pension Group were rolled out this year to update and improve this training. Also added during 2010 was an online component to the prevention of child sexual abuse.

The Diocese rolled out the Safeguarding Online format to congregations, providing database training to administrators. We currently have 18 congregations participating. Canon Smith continued, as a part of his work, the regular consultation with peers around the country. Attending Transitional Officer's meetings and the Conference of Diocesan Executives was a part of this regular consultation. Ms. Viliocco attended the Episcopal Business Administrators Conference and The Conference of Diocesan Executives.

Canon Smith continues to provide the primary staff support to the Standing Committee and to the Diocesan Council/COEDMO, assisted by Ms. Weisenborn and Ms. Tracy Grigsby.

On a personal note Canon Smith greatly appreciates the support and prayers received during the recent election process in the Diocese of West Missouri.

Commission on Dismantling Racism

The Commission on Dismantling Racism is charged by the National Church and the Diocese of Missouri to promote racial justice in the Episcopal Church. The Commission expects to realize this result by working toward the above stated vision and mission statements.

The Commission has divided its work into four major goals areas.

Goal 1: Increase the presence of the Commission in Diocesan and Congregational activities.

Goal 3: Educate and inform so to empower others to dismantle racism in the Diocese.

Goal 4: Increase the active membership of the Commission on Dismantling Racism.

The Commission utilizes these goals to guide and direct its work on an ongoing basis. Activities are developed, planned, organized and implemented to assist the Commission in realizing its annual goals.

Less than 20% of the parishes of the Diocese participate on an ongoing basis in delivering the programs and services of the Commission to our church family and

community. The Commission on Dismantling Racism seeks to have 100% participation by having at least one representative from each congregation active in the work of the Commission. For congregations located outside the immediate geographic location of the St. Louis Metropolitan area the Commission encourages participation by serving as the point of contact for your congregation. Dismantling Racism

Commission on Ministry

The Commission on Ministry, as outlined in national church canons, is charged with assisting the bishop "in determining present and future needs for ministry in the diocese" and "in enlisting and selecting persons for Holy Orders." This charge includes guiding and examining aspirants, postulants, and candidates; assisting with

ministry enrichment for deacons and priests; and helping to explore and implement ways in which the diocese may live out its baptismal ministries.

COM is charged with very specific tasks related to the ordination process and larger, less defined tasks related to overall ministry in the diocese. Year to year, the emphasis tends to shift between these two responsibilities. Much of this year focused on the technical aspects of our work with an eye beyond to the broader work of visioning.

Part of the reason for this in 2010 has been the increasing number of non-"normative," less traditional discernment processes and the questions and issues that arise as a result.

Among its actions for 2010 were: the annual Discernment Retreat for aspirants, postulants, and candidates; continued fine-tuning of the Discernment Process Handbook to include comprehensive baptismal ministry resources (new handbook will be completed by the end of December 2010 and will be available online only); parish discernment committee trainings as a shared responsibility of the entire COM; continuing education grant approvals for clergy and laity; updating of interview questions for postulants; postulant and candidate interviews and reports; and liaison relationships with postulants and candidates.

The COM has also begun conversations around the restoration and utilization of the Diocesan Board of Examining Chaplains (DBEC).

In 2010 the COM recommended one person for postulancy for the priesthood, one person for candidacy for the permanent diaconate, and one person for candidacy for the transitional diaconate. There are currently three postulants for the priesthood, one postulant for the permanent diaconate, one candidate for the permanent diaconate, and one candidate for the priesthood. The Rev. Pamela Dolan was ordained priest in June 2010, the Rev. Eric Lobsinger was ordained permanent deacon in May 2010, and the Rev. Robert Ard was ordained transitional deacon in May 2010.

Community of Deacons

The Community of Deacons, is comprised of twelve deacons serving nine congregations in the diocese. We also have two persons in the process for ordination to the diaconate, one candidate and one postulant.

The Community led by the Archdeacon, meets routinely to encourage each other in our ministries, and to allow for educational and renewal periods of our lives.

This summer we held a mission work day to assist the parishioners of St. Paul's Carondelet in renovating their rectory for the arrival of their new clergy person, the Reverend Robert Ard, and his wife Sharol. We also had a chanting workshop where we learned a simple chanting style to assist the deacons in chanting the gospel for high feast days. And then we retreated to Cuba, Missouri, to the farm home of Deacon Schelly Reid-Levy where we had a relaxing day of food and fun, and visiting with the various resident animals on the Reid-Levy Ranch.

This coming year, we look forward to a Lenten retreat, in Washington, Missouri, as well as time together with our spouses and family to gather in support of one another. We will be looking for another Deacon Mission day activity, and welcome any suggestions from parishes in the diocese.

As Archdeacon I have also taken upon myself the task of traveling to parishes that do not yet have deacons to lead an adult forum on the diaconate, and to serve as a deacon for worship, and I often am asked to preach for the day. The hope is to encourage the local congregation to assess the gifts of their members and discern if any are called to the life and ministry of a deacon. I have visited 3 parishes since my appointment, and have other visits scheduled through June of 2011. I invite all parishes and missions to take advantage of this outreach.

Community of Hope

The Community of Hope (COH) is a religious community of training and support for lay pastoral care ministry grounded in Benedictine Spirituality. The four-teenweek, 42-hour training is designed to awaken participants to God's call in their lives, and to help them discover their spiritual gifts for ministry. Within this context of Benedictine Spirituality, trainees explore a personal "rule of life."

Each of the fourteen modules features a guest lecturer with expertise in a particular area of pastoral ministry. The training includes two supervised "practice visits." Confidentiality and accountability are emphasized. After each series of classes, the new lay chaplains are commissioned during a Sunday morning Eucharist service at their training center.

After commissioning, chaplains gather monthly in small groups. These Circle of Care meetings provide opportunity for prayer, debriefing, ongoing support, and continuing education. The diocesan COH community meets one morning each quarter to live into the Rule of Benedict through prayer, work, and study together. A full-day annual retreat is additionally scheduled.

Opportunities for ministry are many and varied, for COH is designed to enhance existing ministries. Our lay chaplains provide a "ministry of presence" visiting people in homes, hospitals (including ER, Intensive Care, and Hospice settings), nursing facilities, shelters, and jails; and lead Morning Prayer on Saturdays at the Cathedral's homeless program. Some serve, with additional training, as Eucharistic Visitors. Miriam Jenkins and Gretchen Logue are currently facilitating the ninth class since COH began in this diocese in 2001. At the initiative of The Rev. Emily Hillquist Davis, Grace Church in Kirkwood has joined The Church of St. Michael and St. George and Christ Church Cathedral as an official COH Training

Center in our diocese. The Rev. Mike Wheeler, The Rev. Dr. John Kilgore, and The Rev. Todd McDowell serve as clergy advisors. Our diocesan Community of Hope is part of Community of Hope International (http://www.cohinternational.com). COH has trained over 70 lay chaplains from nine Episcopal parishes and other congregations in the St. Louis area since 2001. In the past year (9/1/09-8/31/10) COH chaplains made over 3600 pastoral contacts and gave more than 2800 hours to COH activities, including pastoral visits, Circle of Care meetings, retreats, planning, and preparation. Episcopal Campus Ministry at Rockwell House, Washington University

In conjunction with the ECM Advisory Committee, in May, 2010, Bishop Smith called the Rev. Joseph Chambers to be the next chaplain at Rockwell House. Prior to that time, Dawn Gibson served as the interim chaplain for roughly one school year after the Rev. Andrew Benko left after serving as chaplain for two years. During the last 5 years Rockwell House has suffered from a lack of consistent leadership. The student group that was once a prominent fixture on the Wash. U. campus had shrunk considerably, the house had been neglected, and the spirit of the ministry had dipped to a new low.

The power of campus ministry and especially the power of Rockwell House have a great history in this diocese. It was only a few years ago that Rockwell House was a fully active community of at least 40 students, sending seven of those members to be ordained in the church, and countless lay leaders into the world with incredible energy for the Gospel and the church.

With a chaplain in place with the experience of restarting the Episcopal Campus Ministry in Columbia, and his knowledge of what it takes to build a campus ministry, there are high hopes and big plans for Rockwell House and its members. It's an exciting time filled with great anticipation and promise.

To restart the community, the first step was to reinstate the Holy Eucharist as the principle gathering and to ensure that the Rockwell House was in shape to be hospitable to all its guests. The Sunday evening worship at the Rockwell House serves as the main get together during the week. The aim is to connect to as many students as possible through the broad and simple worship. After the Eucharist the community shares a meal together. It's an exciting time for everyone to get to know each other and for friendships to ignite.

In the short time with the new chaplain the community has experimented with different types of events. Some fun and some service oriented, but always aimed

at attracting newcomers and building community. As the chaplain comes to understand the community's needs and gets to know the students and members on a deeper level, there is little doubt that the community will grow and once again become vibrant.

Also, working with the Rev. Teresa Danieley, rector of Saint John's, the decision has been made to once again merge campus ministry at Washington University and Saint Louis University. We believe it is in the best interest of Rockwell House, the chaplain, and the students from both schools to be in one community together.

Episcopal Church Women in the Diocese of Missouri

Our Mission: To offer every woman in the Diocese of Missouri an environment of support and encouragement, education and opportunity for ministry by providing: Fellowship; Communication; Resource Materials; and Outreach to the Diocese, Nation and World.

In my fifth year as the Diocese of Missouri Episcopal Church Women President, it has been a pleasure to serve the Diocese, alongside our Board.

The Board hosted its final installment of last year's speaker series on November 14, 2009, at Grace Episcopal Church, Kirkwood with the late Rev. Irene Jones. She shared with us "How Do We as Women Balance the Christmas Season to Make it Meaningful for Family and for Ourselves." This was also our first Board meeting with newly-elected officers. We hired a bookkeeper to help the newly-elected treasurer. We discussed continuing the speaker series, but it did not come to fruition.

We met (formally as a board) in January, May, and July, 2010, and had a retreat in March. We met informally in August, September and October. This year's meetings were held at parishes and board members' homes. Thanks to Cheryl Ward, Vice President, and Lana Maggart, Secretary, for opening up their homes for meetings. As a Board we sadly attended the funeral of Scott Daniels, son of Carolyn and Bob Daniels and happily attended the Flower Festival in May at Christ Church Cathedral. The Board attended a one-day retreat at the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet Motherhouse on March 12, 2010. Cheryl Ward led this retreat, which helped us be able to work together in harmony this entire year. Another retreat is planned for April 15, 2011.

Five women from our diocese (Rosemary Bagin, Margaret (Peg) Cooper, Carolyn Daniels, Annie Rayman, and myself) attended the Province V Episcopal Church Women's 39th Annual Meeting hosted by the Diocese of Michigan in Dearborn. During the meeting, we were reminded that "gratitude" is the basic foundation of the United Thank Offering (UTO). In 2009, the total grant money was \$195,482.29. This was down from the previous

year. Our diocesan "Fall Ingathering" totaled \$6,918.13 and the total for the 2009 was \$12,406.66 from 17 congregations out of 45.

We were also reminded of the good works of the Church Periodical Club (CPC). The CPC began as the "missionary" arm of the Episcopal Church. It has been around for 122 yrs. It began in the East for those living in the West. It is the only organization of the Episcopal Church dedicated solely to providing both religious and secular literature and related materials without charge to those who need and request them and who cannot obtain them otherwise. There are two primary functions of the CPC – the National Book Fund (NBF) for literature and Miles of Pennies (MOP) for children items birth to grade 12. The first Sunday of May has been established as "CPC Sunday".

Social Justice Director, The Rev. Irene Miller-Radcliff encouraged us to donate to the "Women to Women" projects. She attended the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York City, February 25-March 13, 2010. Seven resolutions were adopted by the "The Commission on the Status of Women." Go to the national website at www.ecwnational.org for more information on these resolutions.

The 40th Province V Meeting will be held in Columbus, Ohio, May 13-15, 2011. Hosted by the Diocese of Southern Ohio, the theme will be "Lifting Our Voices in Prayer, Love and Service." The Diocese of Missouri will host the 42nd Province V Meeting in spring of 2013.

Episcopal Recovery Ministry

The Episcopal Recovery Ministry (ERM) Committee's mission is to educate clergy and lay leaders about the severity of and presence of addiction diseases within our communities.

We encourage clergy to access resource information and become aware of addiction behaviors and the damage to family/personal relations caused by these diseases.

A resolution regarding a policy about the serving of alcoholic beverages at church or church sponsored functions will be voted on at the 171st diocesan convention. The ERM Committee endorses this resolution. A resolution requiring all parishes to offer an addiction educational opportunity once a year was passed a few years ago. Clergy are responsible for planning a special sermon, or presenting an adult education class, or including a hand-out or article in their newsletter about with addiction information in order to assist parishioners to recognize addictions and to discover recovery resources.

The Rev. Howard Park recently contacted our priests with a letter expressing our shock at the severity of failed recoveries and deaths due to untreated addictions. We have a web page that is www.missouriepiscopalrecovery. org. Our site is a work in progress.

ERM has literature available. We can recommend speakers and resources or give you a leaflet about conduction a 12-step Holy Communion. Also, we can help select leaflets for your parish literature table.

We would like to establish a liaison person with each parish to assist our clergy when a fellow parishioner needs information, a referral resource, or guidance. We are here to help. Addictions are the only diseases that have a spiritual recovery.

Episcopal School for Ministry

Due to the cutback in staffing at the Offices of the Bishop, in 2010 the Episcopal School for Ministry had to say good bye to its Dean, The Rev. Dr. Ralph McMichael. The Rev. Beverly Van Horne was appointed Interim Dean, effective July 1, 2010 for a period of approximately one year. During this interim period, the regular monthly Program for Theological Formation continues with thirteen students, meeting monthly for prayer, learning, and mutual support.

What ESM essentially is, and the direction it is going, is stated as follows: The Episcopal School for Ministry is a community of faith forming disciples of Jesus for all the ministries of the baptized. Through a variety of programs, workshops, and conferences, there are a myriad of opportunities for a deeper exploration of the Christian faith and life and for the discernment and equipping of one's place in the mission of the Church for the life of the world. This is a school in the ancient Christian sense: a place, a gathering of the faithful, where Christ continues to teach his disciples. The School provides ways for the baptized to learn whom they follow, how to follow, and their ministries as followers.

The life of the Episcopal School for Ministry is a comprised of worship, fellowship, and study. We gather for prayer, learning, and mutual support. Each weekend that the School meets is structured by Morning and Evening Prayer, the Eucharist, and Compline. We share meals together, and we share our journeys of discipleship with each other. The learning is challenging but accessible to all types of students. We have students with advanced academic backgrounds and others with very little educational experience after high school.

This program for theological formation comprises all of the basic subjects of theology: Old and New Testaments; Tradition, including Anglican tradition; Theology; Sacraments; Spirituality; Liturgy; and Preaching. It takes three years to take all of these courses, which is the usual time it took for basic Christian formation in the ancient Church.

From time to time the School offers a program for Congregational Development and Eucharistic Discipleship. In the Fall of 2011 the School hopes to offer a Diocesan wide conference on Making Disciples. Beginning in January 2011 the School will partner with the Lutheran

School of Theology and offer adult learning opportunities held on weekday evenings.

In addition, throughout the year, the School can provide workshops that form and equip all the ministries of the baptized. These ministries include: vestry members, lay readers, Eucharistic visitors, choir members, ushers, altar guild members, acolytes, missioners, and teachers.

Sustain A Faith: Diocesan Environmental Stewardship Group

Last December a group of Episcopalians met at St Peter's Episcopal Church to start a new environmental committee within the Diocese of Missouri. The initial meeting of Sustain a Faith had representation from Grace, St Michael's/ St George's, St Peter's, Emmanuel, and Christ Church Cathedral. Support for parishes and parishioners to help protect the environment through education and activities is the main mission of this new committee.

At our first meeting, Sustain a Faith was asked to participate in the "green" Flower Festival at Christ Church Cathedral in May. We offered information about energy efficiency at home and in our parishes. Energy Star information was available, as well as an energy expert, to answer questions. We also provided a display on the benefits of buying our food locally.

During 2010 both Grace Episcopal Church and Christ Church Cathedral had energy audits performed on their facilities. The Cathedral qualified for a free energy audit through AmerenUE and currently is working on ways to implement the audit's suggestions. Grace in now in the middle of a capital campaign based on their audit's recommendation to replace the oldest HVAC system and windows. Grace's estimated energy savings at completion being 30%. Realizing the importance of sharing energy successes with other parishes, our committee decided to have a table at the Diocesan Convention in November, 2010. At our convention, there will be information on how every parish in the diocese can take steps to be better stewards of our environment. Also available will be information about GreenFaith, our new partner with the National Episcopal Church, and their programs that help improve the environment. Sustain a Faith also had two committee members speak at a Metro 4 meeting about their parishes' environmental activities.

Sustain a Faith sponsored the first diocesan wide "Walk, Bike, Carpool to Church" on Labor Day Sunday. Congregations were encouraged to take a more environmentally friendly way to church. October 24, Grace Episcopal Church hosted the first film, The National Geographic film "The Human Footprint." The next film, "Renewal," will be shown at Emmanuel Episcopal Church on 1/30/11 at 6:30 p.m. "Renewal" is documentary about the environmental movement within the interfaith community.

Task Force for the Hungry

The Diocesan Task Force for the Hungry consists of seven members from various parishes and met five times in 2010.

We have continued to provide much needed funding to those with little to eat in 2010. We support six places within the diocese that serve the hungry: Trinity Food Pantry in the St. Louis Central West End; All Saints Food Pantry in north St. Louis; St. Stephen's Food Pantry in Ferguson; Ascension Food Pantry in north St. Louis County; Holy Cross Food Pantry in Poplar Bluff; and the St. John's Peace Meal Project in south St. Louis. These organizations served a total of 28,517 people in 2009, over 5,000 more than were served as recently as 2007.

While the number of hungry continue to increase, the economy has made it more difficult to get funding. In 2009 we were able to donate over \$18,000. The total for 2010 will not be as high.

We encourage those parishes in the diocese who are looking for avenues in which to help serve the hungry to consider donating to the Task Force. We make sure that the money donated is being used properly. All of the organizations to which we donate must provide a detailed financial statement and other information every year in

order to continue to receive funding.

United Thank Offering

For at least the last three years there had been a steady decline in the number of congregations in this diocese who were participating in the United Thank Offering Ingatherings. Also in the fall of 2009, we did not receive one grant application from within our diocese. So I began in January of 2010 with the goal of getting more congregations re-involved in the concept of thankfulness and expressing that thankfulness by using the UTO Blue Boxes.

In January a Thank You post card was sent to the seventeen congregations that participated in 2009. In addition to the usual two large mailings reminding parish/mission UTO Coordinators of the Spring and Fall Ingatherings, I sent out three additional mailings. Total mailings were: January 29th and again on March 15th a mailing to all 45 congregations.

Late March, Spring Ingathering reminder letter. Early Summer, small mailing to a select group of churches that I thought might start participating if given some encouragement. I ordered UTO promotional items and sent them to these congregations.

Late August the Fall Ingathering letter went out. Over all I am very pleased with the response. As of September 7, 2010, I had received \$7,845.84 since the beginning of this year. This was \$2,357.31 more than what came in last year at this time. Also, twenty churches did have Ingatherings and of these twenty, eight were congregations that did not participate in 2009. I am hopeful that when the Fall Ingatherings are over, we will have even more churches involved this year.

In July, I attended what is called a Face to Face, held in Columbia, Illinois. The purpose of this training is to educate new diocesan coordinators on how to do the job. It was a very worthwhile experience.

In conclusion, I would like to thank all the people who helped and encouraged me along the way. They include Beth Felice, our diocesan communications director, previous diocesan UTO coordinator Peg Cooper, the ladies on the ECW Board, Caroline & Bob Daniels, my rector, the Rev. Jason Samuel, and our Province V United Thank Offering Coordinator, Carol Gottard.

Episcopal City Mission

Overview. Episcopal City Mission's mission is "chaplaincy providing support, hope, and healing to children in detention." Episcopal City Mission currently funds the presence of a chaplain to 3 juvenile centers in the St. Louis metropolitan area: St. Louis City Detention, St. Louis County Detention, and Lakeside Center. Episcopal

City Mission is the only funded Episcopal chaplaincy program to children in detention in the United States, and we provide pastoral care to approximately 3,500 children each year.

2010. The new Board Chair, Mark Jordan, began the year with the message that all programs inside the detention centers would be funded despite the economic realities. We made adjustments to our budget so we would be sure to have chaplains present for the children in detention. We were thrilled to have Mr. Jeff Fabbiano join us in late June as the third ECM chaplain. Jeff has many years of ministering to youth and he is very busy serving in the County, City and the Innovative Concepts Academy for ECM. ECM is very proud to have been invited to place a chaplain in this new alternative school in the city.

The directors at each center have reaffirmed to us how valuable our work is to the children. We know that the monthly birthday parties which are hosted by different churches are important and the weekly chapel services are valuable for delivering the message of a loving and forgiving God.

We partnered with the staff from St. Louis County Family Court and offered eight sessions of a grief and loss program. The court was highly satisfied with the outcomes for the children who attended and they also felt that their staff learned new ways of dealing with the families of these troubled children.

Fundraising Events. In 2010 Episcopal City Mission held two special events to heighten awareness of our mission and to raise funds. On June 18, Summer Solstice took place inside the new building of Emmanuel Church in Webster Groves. On September 24, "Moment in Time" was held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Clayton. The two events were very successful with almost 300 people in total attending them.

Thank you very much for the continued support from the Diocese of Missouri. We are very appreciative of your belief in the value of our work for the children.

Grace Hill

History. Grace Hill was established by the Episcopal Diocese (Grace Church and Holy Cross Church) in 1903 to provide a comprehensive and coordinated complement of services and resources to immigrant populations, helping them "settle" into their new community with the goal of supporting their integration into American society both socially and economically. Today, that spirit of support — of neighbors helping neighbors—in geographically-bound communities is working to improve lives. Grace Hill enables healthy, productive lives by bringing together a full range of resources through two sister agencies: Grace Hill Settlement House and Grace Hill Neighborhood Health Centers, Inc. Collectively Grace Hill reaches in excess of 50,000 individuals through a comprehensive continuum of resources and services.

2010 Accomplishments

New Projects and Endeavors

• Rush Senior Gardens, a 54-unit retirement apartment community for limited-income seniors in East St. Louis, opened in February. It is St. Andrew's 12th HUD-subsidized senior community in Missouri and Illinois.

- The Person-Centered Care philosophy is in full bloom at Brooking Park in Chesterfield. This concept re-emphasizes the importance, dignity and preferences of the individual resident, from both care and environmental standpoints. Environmental person-centered care includes remodeling in Brooking Park's Avalon area where Medicare- certified rehabilitation services are provided, and in resident areas.

tions continues to provide costefficient care and innovative services to older adults, as well as counsel and supportive services to their family member caregivers. More than 3,000 older adults and their families are being served this year. Its Caring Workplace provides assistance and services to the employed family caregivers of older adults through the caregivers' workplaces.

St. Luke's Hospital

As an Episcopal–Presbyterian hospital in name and practice, St. Luke's Hospital partners in ministry with the Episcopal and Presbyterian USA churches in the greater St. Louis metropolitan area. The Rev. Mari Chollet is the Episcopal Priest and Associate Director of Pastoral Care. The Rev. Renita Heinzl is the Presbyterian Minister and Director. Both serve as Clinical Pastoral Educators in St. Luke's CPE Learning Center.

The following report provides an overview of how St. Luke's Hospital serves alongside you in living out a mission and ministry of healing in the community.

Improving the Quality of Life

In keeping with a commitment to improve the quality of life for patients and the community, every year St. Luke's strives to meet community needs by expanding services, developing new programs and embracing the latest technology. For example, within the past year, St. Luke's added Hospice Care to its continuum of care, built a state-of-the-art hybrid operating room, opened a sixth Urgent Care Center and a second Women's Center, and was selected the first facility in Missouri to offer the latest breast ultrasound to detect breast cancer sooner. In 2010, St. Luke's also was named an America's 50 Best Hospital by HealthGrades® for the fourth consecutive year, an accomplishment no other area hospital has achieved.

Expanding the Healthcare Mission: The Episcopal-Presbyterian Medical Charitable Trust

Another way St. Luke's lives out its Episcopal-Presbyterian heritage and healthcare mission is through the Episcopal- Presbyterian Medical Charitable Trust. The nonprofit, grant-making foundation was established twenty years ago as a joint healthcare mission of the Episcopal Church, the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. and St. Luke's Hospital.

The Trust has made more than \$5 million in grants to nonprofit healthcare organizations serving the needs of our region's most vulnerable residents.

The Trust's Board of Directors includes members of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri, the Presbytery of Giddings-Lovejoy of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. and two representatives of St. Luke's Hospital. Recently, the Board made a significant leadership investment of \$950,000 in four grants under the "Responding to A Crisis of Care" initiative, which played a key role in advancing the St. Louis Regional Health Commission's

effort to stabilize the healthcare safety net in St. Louis. The Trust also partners directly with St. Luke's Hospital through grants to enable the hospital to expand the scope of healthcare services made available to the greater St. Louis area.

Providing a Ministry of Presence: Pastoral Care and Clinical Pastoral Education

As part of the interdisciplinary healthcare team providing holistic care in body, mind and spirit for patients and their families, visitors, physicians and employees of all faiths, St. Luke's Pastoral Care Department offers an important ministry of presence. Chaplains are a companioning presence at St. Luke's Hospital, Surrey Place (St. Luke's skilled nursing facility) and the Rehabilitation Hospital 24 hours per day, seven days a week, to provide visitation and companionship; spiritual, religious and emotional support; diverse worship services; and ritual sacramental practices and prayer. St. Luke's Hospice Services include a chaplain as a member of the interdisciplinary care team to provide spiritual and religious support.

St. Luke's also has a long tradition of providing Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) for persons of diverse faith traditions in preparation for serving as future clergy and CPE Supervisors for ministry. St. Luke's CPE Learning Center is accredited by ACPE, Inc.* for CPE Level I/ Level II and Supervisory CPE. During 2010, the Center underwent a reaccreditation process and site visit, as required every ten years. The Site Team Reviewers identified eleven areas of strength in the Center and educational program. The Center offers the following CPE programs: a 1 to 2-year Residency Program; a 2 to 3-year Supervisory Education Program; an 11-week Summer Program; and a 16-week Extended Program.

A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Organized in 1841, the Diocese of Missouri is a not-for-profit organization, comprised of forty-five Episcopal congregations in the eastern half of Missouri. The Bishop is the president, Chief Executive Officer and ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese. The Episcopal Church in this Diocese acknowledges its allegiance to the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and submits to the authority of the General Convention. Part of the worldwide Anglican Communion, the Episcopal Church seeks to fulfill Christ's Mission of redemption through active participation in the world through Christ in the Church.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Diocese reports its information regarding financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets depending upon the existence or nature of any donor-imposed restrictions. The following is a description of these classes of net assets:

<u>Unrestricted</u> — Those resources over which the Diocese has discretionary control. Designated amounts represent those resources that the Diocese has set aside for a particular purpose.

<u>Temporarily Restricted</u> – Those resources subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be satisfied by actions of the Diocese or the passage of time.

<u>Permanently Restricted</u> – Those resources subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be maintained permanently by the Diocese. The donors of these resources permit the Diocese to use all or part of the income earned, including capital appreciation, on related investments for unrestricted or temporarily restricted purposes.

Investments

Investments, which include those belonging to the Diocese as well as those held on behalf of others, are stated at year-end market values. The realized and unrealized gains or losses on investments have been reflected in the Statement of Activities and Changes in Net Assets, except for those realized on custodial assets held on behalf of others. (See Note I).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, the Diocese considers all highly liquid investments purchased with a maturity date of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Land and Buildings

Management has recorded the investment in land and buildings at estimated original cost and states equipment at cost. Depreciation is computed on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. The Diocese has ultimate ownership of all property in the Diocese; therefore if a large majority of the members of a congregation choose to leave the Diocese, ownership of the property would revert back to the Diocese.

Income Taxes

The Diocese qualifies as a not-for-profit religious organization under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and as a non-private foundation under Section 509(a)(3) of the Code and, therefore, is exempt from federal, state, and local income taxes.

Reclassifications

Certain prior year amounts have been reclassified to conform with the current year presentation.

Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, the Diocese has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through June 4, 2011, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

The amounts reported as investment gains (losses) in the accompanying financial statements are a result of the following:

- a) The difference in the market values of investments on hand at the beginning of the year as compared to the end of the year.
- b) The difference between the proceeds of sale of investments and the related market values of those investments at December 31 of the previous year.
- c) The difference between the cost of investments purchased during the year and related market value of those investments at December 31, or between the proceeds of the sale of those investments if sold during the respective year.

Realized and unrealized gains and losses on the underlying investments remain in the trusts pursuant to the terms of the trusts and as such are reflected as permanently restricted within the financial statements.

Investment management and other fees were approximately \$139,000 and \$130,000 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

C. ENDOWMENT

The endowments consist of twenty individual donor-restricted funds established for a variety of purposes. In accordance with U.S Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Endowment balances are included in investments in the Statements of Financial Position. Permanently restricted endowment balances include the original value at the date of gift.

D. DISTRIBUTION POLICY

The Diocese follows the distribution policy for each endowment fund as set and governed by the respective trust document and specific purpose of the fund. When the distribution rate is silent in the governing document, the Diocese follows a general policy to calculate the annual distribution by multiplying the average market value over the preceding three-year period by a percentage which is calculated to both preserve the value of the endowment fund and to meet the community outreach purpose of the endowment fund. The percentage is currently 4%.

Financial assets valued using Level 1 inputs are based on quoted market prices within active markets, such as exchange-traded securities. Financial assets valued using Level 2 inputs are based primarily on quoted prices for similar assets in active or inactive markets. Examples of Level 2 include U.S. Treasury securities, corporate and municipal bonds, and mortgage backed securities. Financial assets valued using Level 3 inputs are based primarily on assumptions about the marketability of the assets and can include corporate loans, mortgage loans, distressed debt, and investments in real estate funds. The Diocese has no Level 3 assets.

F. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT AND MARKET RISK

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Diocese to concentrations of credit and market risk consist principally of cash and investments. The Diocese places substantially all of its cash with major financial institutions whose accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") up to \$250,000. The Diocese maintains cash deposits in bank accounts which at times may exceed the federally insured limits. The Diocese has not experienced any losses in such accounts.

The Diocese has a significant amount of investments subject to market risk. Market risk is the possibility future changes in market price may make a financial instrument less valuable.

G. RETIREMENT PLANS

The Diocese has adopted a 403(b) defined contribution plan for its non-clergy employees and a defined benefit church pension fund for its clergy employees. For the non-clergy employees, the Diocese contributes 10% of the participant's salary to the plan if the participant has at least one year of service and is 21 years of age or older. For the clergy employees, the Diocese contributes 18% of the participant's salary to the pension fund if the participant is 21 years of age or older. During 2010 and 2009, the total amount of retirement expense was \$86,690 and \$109,312, respectively.

H. NOTES RECEIVABLE

Notes receivable from parishes and missions for loans from the Kelton E. White and Alma Mayland White Loan Fund ("Kelton White Loan Fund"), with interest ranging from 4% to 5%, due at various dates through 2031 and secured by the church properties, consist of the following at December 31,:

An allowance for loan losses is not deemed necessary because of the close affiliation and relationship in faith between borrowers (parishes) and the Diocese. The Diocese chooses to recognize interest income earned from certain parish loans on the cash basis.

I. CUSTODIAL ASSETS

The Diocese acts as custodian of cash and investments for several of its mission congregations and various organizations within the Diocese. As such, the Diocese records the cash and investments and a corresponding liability. A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Diocesan Investment Trust of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri (the "Trust") was organized on April 15, 1959, under the laws of the State of Missouri by a trust agreement. The Trust was established to invest funds in various marketable securities for the Diocese of Missouri – The Episcopal Church (the "Diocese") and its parishes, missions, and other organizations formed under the Diocese. The Trust is held in one or more common Funds, as determined by the Trustees, and is managed by professional investment managers, who are subject to the Trustees' investment policies. "Shares" are purchased and/or redeemed in such numbers as the parishes, missions, and other organizations, in their discretion, may determine.

Investments

Marketable securities are purchased and maintained in two separate funds (bond and equity funds) as applicable. Investments are carried at fair value which is the last reported closing bid price on the last day of the year. The difference between cost and fair value is reflected as unrealized appreciation (depreciation) of investments. The Trust records investment transactions on the settlement date.

Realized gains (losses) from such transactions are determined for financial reporting purposes on the identified cost basis. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is recognized on the accrual basis. Premiums and discounts, if any, on debt instruments purchased are amortized over the lives of the respective securities.

Income Taxes

Pursuant to the terms of the Trust documents and the requisite qualifications of its participants, the Trust is covered by the group exemption from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) provided to the Diocese of Missouri – The Episcopal Church by the Internal Revenue Service on February 24, 1971. Accordingly, no provision for federal income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events

In preparing these financial statements, management has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through April 28, 2011, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

B. DISTRIBUTIONS OF INCOME AND REDEMPTIONS

The Trust agreement requires the net operating income and net realized capital gains (if any) of the Trust, as well as proceeds from the sale, redemption, or maturity of securities (to the extent the proceeds are not used to redeem interests) be credited to trust participants monthly as cash or additional investments. The agreement also requires the Trust to redeem interests tendered for redemption on the fifth day following the end of the month at a price determined to be the net asset value of each interest as of the last day of the month. The net asset value of each interest shall be determined by ascertaining the market value of the fund on the last day of the month allocated by each pro-rata investment share outstanding on the date of determination.

D. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

Financial assets valued using Level 1 inputs are based on quoted market prices within active markets, such as exchange-traded securities. Financial assets valued using Level 2 inputs are based primarily on quoted prices for similar assets in active or inactive markets. Examples of Level 2 include U.S. Treasury securities, corporate and municipal bonds, and mortgage backed securities. Financial assets valued using Level 3 inputs are based primarily on assumptions about the marketability of the assets and can include corporate loans, mortgage loans, distressed debt, and investments in real estate funds. The Trust has no Level 3 assets.

E. FEES AND OTHER TRANSACTIONS WITH AFFILIATES

The Trust pays custody fees to TIAA-CREF. The accrued fees charged to the Bond Fund and to the Equity Fund are reflected as a reduction of market value.

F. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT AND MARKET RISK

Financial instruments potentially subjecting the Trust to concentrations of credit and market risk consist principally of cash and investments. The Trust has significant amounts of investments subject to market risk. Market risk is the possibility that future changes in market price may make a financial instrument less valuable.

Bond Fund investments at December 31, 2010 of \$12,115,383 (with a cost basis of \$11,593,925) consist principally of Vanguard Total Bond Market Index Fund. Equity Fund investments at December 31, 2010 consist of \$11,449,396 of TIAA-CREF Social Choice Equity Institutional Class with a cost basis of \$11,940,227.
