SPECIAL COLLECTIONS ENJOINED BY CANON XIX

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Third: For the support of St. Luke's Hospital, which shall be made on St. Luke's Day or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Fourth: For the support of the University of the South, which shall be made on the Second Sunday after the Epiphany.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommended by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward

at the calling of their names and deposit their ballot. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

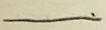

Journal of the Eighty-Ninth Convention

OF THE

Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

FIRST DAY

St. Peter's Church, St. Louis,
Tuesday, January 24, 1928.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Eighty-ninth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 24, 1928, at 9:00 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Rev. Dr. Edward S. Travers read the Gospel and the Rev. Frank Maples read the Epistle. The Rev. H. S. Ablewhite and the Rev. R. M. Wilcox assisted in the ministrations.

The Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in business session in St. Peter's Church with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-nine who were entitled to vote, twenty-six were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 16.)

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the forty-eight Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-five were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

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The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent was elected a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

It was ordered that a committee be appointed to consider the Bishop's Address, delivered during the service which immediately preceded the opening of the Convention, to report to this Convention.

By unanimous consent Grace Church, Jefferson City, was given representation in the Convention.

The following named Nominating Committee was elected:

The Rev. George E. Wharton, the Rev. Dr. J. J. Wilkins, the Rev. R. M. Wilcox, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, and Mr. George M. Block.

The Treasurer's reports of the following named funds were received and filed:

The General Expense Fund. (Appendix 2.)

The Church Program Fund. (Appendix 3.)

Mr. Block introduced Resolution No. 1.

The Rev. Mr. White read Noon Day Prayers.

Resolution No. 1 was amended and adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That no money shall be hereafter borrowed from any Trust Fund for any Diocesan purpose. All Trust Funds shall be held and used only for the specific purpose for which the trust was created.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 2, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

RESOLVED, That all clergy connected with the Diocese of Missouri for a period less than six months be given seats and voice in this Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 3, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That the Convention assemble each morning at 9 o'clock, opening with Morning Prayer; that a recess be taken from 12:45 until 2 p.m. for luncheon; and that it adjourn each day at 5 p.m.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

By unanimous consent the Order of Business was suspended while the Rev. Mr. Trelease of the National Department of Publicity addressed the Convention.

The Treasurer's reports of the Theological Education Fund (Appendix 4) and the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund (Appendix 5) were received and filed.

The Secretary read the report of the Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, which was received and filed. (Appendix 6.)

The Bishop read a report of various funds of which he is trustee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 7.)

The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan Council (Appendix 8), with attached reports from the following named Departments:

Missions and Church Extension.

Finance.

Religious Education.

Field.

Resolution No. 4 in the Diocesan Council Report was adopted.

Resolution No. 5 in the Diocesan Council Report was adopted.

Resolution No. 6 in the Diocesan Council Report was adopted.

Resolution No. 7 in the Diocesan Council Report was adopted.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted as follows:

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Resolution No. 9.

RESOLVED, That the Missionary Host apportionment of \$2,000.00 be stricken out of the proposed total apportionment of \$74,128.00, in Resolution No. 8 in the Diocesan Council Report, and that the apportionment of each Parish and Mission be reduced accordingly.

Resolution No. 8 in the Diocesan Council Report, as amended by Resolution No. 9, was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That the apportionments for the Church Program Fund amounting to a total of \$72,128.00 be adopted, and that the apportionment of each Parish and Mission in the attached schedule be reduced accordingly.

The Rev. Mr. Wharton, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the following report:

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Vincent L. Price as Treasurer of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Bishop announced that the election for two clerical and two lay members of the Diocesan Council was in order.

The following named candidates for the Diocesan Council were nominated from the floor:

Mr. E. E. Earle, the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. Francis Bloy, Mr. F. T. Hodgdon, and Mr. Albert Burgess.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 10, which was adopted, by the unanimous vote of both orders voting separately, as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

RESOLVED, that a new Section of Article X of the Constitution, to be known as Section 8, which was approved in Resolution No. 12 at the Convention of 1927, be finally adopted, as follows:

Section 8. Whenever a vote by Orders shall be required under any provisions of the Constitution or Canons of this Diocese, a rising vote of the Clergy and Lay Delegates, voting separately, may be taken, instead of a vote by roll call, by unanimous consent of the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Jones read the report of the Standing Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 9.)

The Rev. Dr. Jones read the report of the Parochial Trust Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 10.)

It was ordered that election of Deputies to the General Convention be made the Order of the Day for Wednesday at 10:30 a.m., and that forty minutes following this election be given representatives of the Student Center at Columbia.

Mr. Campbell read the report of the Church News Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins read the report of the Church Pension Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. H. S. Ablewhite, the Rev. Francis Bloy, and Mr. Elias S. Gatch elected members of the Diocesan Council.

The pending election was continued, the ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay member of the Diocesan Council, and given into the hands of the tellers.

It was ordered that the report of the Church Pension Fund Committee be printed in the March issue of the Church News.

The tellers of the pending election reported no election.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. F. T. Hodgdon as a member of the Diocesan Council, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Frank C. Thompson, Mr. Charles J. Miller, and Mr. John G. Lonsdale, as Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Mr. F. G. Sutherland, and Mr. W. L. Henry, as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Benjamin E. Reed, Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, and Mr. George C. Mackay, as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Registrar, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Judge Davis Biggs, Mr. James M. Bull, and Mr. George M. Block, as members of the Standing Committee, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Mr. Bloy introduced Resolution No. 11, as follows:

Resolution No. 11.

RESOLVED, That this Convention direct the Diocesan Council to authorize the Treasurer of the Diocese to reimburse the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Chairman of the Church Pension Fund Committee, for all accumulated expenses on account of the Church Pension Fund during the years 1926 and 1927, for which he has not been paid, to be charged at the discretion of the Diocesan Council to an appropriate fund.

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

SECOND DAY

St. Peter's Church, St. Louis,
Wednesday, January 25, 1928.

Morning Prayer was read by the Rev. Walter G. Harter at 9:00 o'clock.

In the absence of the Bishop, the Convention was called to order after the service by the President of the Standing Committee.

The Rev. Dr. Jones was elected President pro tem.

The minutes of the first day were read and approved.

The election of three clerical members of the Standing Committee was declared in order. The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., were nominated from the floor.

At the request of the President pro tem, the Rev. Mr. Ablewhite took the Chair.

It was ordered that the candidates receiving the lowest vote in each order during the next ballot be dropped.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Bunting introduced Resolution No. 12.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Chairman declared the following named candidates elected members of the Standing Committee:

The Very Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D.

Resolution No. 12 was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

Believing that the Gospel of the Life and Love of Christ is the Church's supreme responsibility, and that she must seek to proclaim and propagate this Gospel with all boldness in this time when crime and violence are increasing and unbelief is organized and arrogant;

Believing, furthermore, that the whole body of the Church needs to be aroused from lethargy and urged to rededication of themselves and to the bringing of others to a knowledge of Christ and therefore that the great work of Evangelism should be placed at the very front of our interests and activities; therefore,

RESOLVED, That a committee of two clergymen and one layman be appointed to arrange for a series of Evangelistic Services or preaching Missions to be held some time in the autumn, the dates to be fixed by the committee, covering as large a portion of the entire Diocese as possible and that the committee be asked especially to see that their plan carry some definite suggestion as to personal Evangelism or individual work on the part of laymen.

The Rev. Dr. Jones took the Chair.

The Rev. Canon George read his report of the Mission to the City Institutions, which was received and filed. (Appendix 13.)

The question of endowing the Mission to the City Institutions was referred to the Diocesan Council.

The hour of 10:30 having arrived, the election of deputies to the General Convention was declared in order.

The Bishop took the Chair.

The following named candidates for deputies to the General Convention were nominated:

The Rev. John S. Bunting, the Very Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. Edward S. White, the Rev. J. C. Jones, D.D., the Rev. Francis Bloy, the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, the Rev. L. H. Nugent, the Rev. David Coombs, the Rev. R. M. Wilcox, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., Mr. George M. Block, Mr. E. A. Logan, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. Vertrees Young, Mr. V. L. Price, Mr. George C. Mackay, Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. Kent Jarvis, Mr. F. T. Hodgdon, Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, Mr. Henry K. Craft, and Mr. F. G. Williamson.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Haupt, Mr. Rollins, and Mr. Logan of Columbia, and the Rev. Canon George made addresses in relation to the Student Work at Columbia.

The Rev. Canon George and Mr. George M. Block jointly introduced Resolution No. 13.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Very Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., and Mr. James M. Bull elected deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Coombs read Noon Day Prayers.

The election was continued for three clerical and three lay deputies to the General Convention, the ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

Resolution No. 13 was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 13.

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$12,000 be appropriated out of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Missionary Fund, now in the hands of the Parochial Trust Fund, for the Student Work at Columbia, provided the Diocesan Council approve the details in relation to the use of this money.

Mrs. Rumsey read her report as President of the Woman's Auxiliary, which was received and filed. (Appendix 14.)

It was ordered that the Bishop have authority to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the last day.

Mr. Watling read the report of the League of Lay Readers, which was received and filed. (Appendix 15.)

The Rev. Mr. Nugent read the report of the Episcopal Bishop's Residence Company, which was received and filed. (Appendix 16.)

Judge Hitchcock introduced Resolution No. 14, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Council be requested to appoint a committee to consider ways and means and the advisability of providing a permanent residence, either by lease or purchase, for the Bishop of the Diocese. Said committee shall report its recommendations to the Diocesan Convention of 1929.

Mr. Henry read his report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, which was received and filed. (Appendix 17.)

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 15, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 15.

RESOLVED, That Article VII of the Constitution be repealed, and that in lieu thereof a new Article be adopted, to be known as Article VII, to read as follows:

Article VII.

Section 1. The first morning session of every meeting of the Convention shall be preceded by a Celebration of the Holy Communion. All Divine Services immediately preceding each day's session and during the sessions of the Convention shall be under the direction of the Bishop. If the Bishop be unable to act, or if there be a vacancy in the office of Bishop, then such services shall be under the direction of the Presiding Officer of the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 16, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 16.

RESOLVED, That the Convention express its appreciation to the Rector and Vestry of St. Peter's Church for their generous hospitality in housing the Convention, and to the Committee on Convention Hospitality for their excellent luncheons served to the Clergy and Delegates to the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 17, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 17.

RESOLVED, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Sexton of St. Peter's Church the sum of \$25.00 for extra janitor work during the Convention.

It was ordered that the Convention meet next year in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

It was ordered that the three candidates receiving the lowest aggregate vote on the next ballot be asked to withdraw their names.

The election was continued for three clerical and three lay deputies to the General Convention, the ballots were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

Archdeacon Marsden read a report, which was received and filed. (Appendix 18.)

The Bishop appointed the following named committees and Deans of Convocations:

Committee on Constitution and Canons:

The election was continued for three clerical and two lay deputies to the General Convention, the ballots were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

Dr. Travers introduced Resolution No. 20.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., and the Rev. F. J. Bloy elected deputies to the General Convention.

The election was continued for one clerical and two lay deputies to the General Convention, the ballots were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

Resolution No. 20 was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 20.

RESOLVED, That a Commission of Conference of five, of whom the Bishop shall be one, be appointed by the Chair to survey the District of the City of St. Louis and St. Louis County, with a twofold end in view. First, if possible, re-location or merging of parishes; and, Second, the establishing of parishes or missions in territory not now occupied.

It was ordered that a Commission of Conference of three members be appointed to consider the rural work of the Diocese, and report to the next Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. Vincent L. Price elected a deputy to the General Convention.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., and Mr. F. T.

Hodgdon, as deputies to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The election for clerical provisional deputies to the General Convention was declared in order.

The following named candidates were nominated:

The Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. L. H. Nugent, the Rev. E. S. White, the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., and the Rev. R. M. Wilcox.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. Thomas Q. Dix, Mr. George C. Mackay, and Mr. E. A. Logan, as provisional lay deputies to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Bishop appointed the following named members on the Pension Fund Committee:

The Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., Mr. C. H. Middleton, and Mr. James A. Waterworth.

It was ordered that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Rev. L. H. Nugent for his efficient work as a Committee on the Dispatch of Business.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. E. S. White, the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. L. H. Nugent, and the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., elected provisional clerical deputies to the General Convention.

After the singing of the Gloria in Excelsis, the Bishop gave the benediction, and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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APPENDIX NO. 1

**Bishop's Address to the Eighty-Ninth Convention
of the Diocese of Missouri.**

Dear Brethren:

Our grateful thanks are due to the Rev. Dr. Travers and to the Vestry of St. Peter's Parish who, when it was evident that the Bishop Tuttle Memorial would not be completed in season for the Annual Convention, graciously invited us to meet here and to make use of all the facilities of St. Peter's Church and Parish House. I cordially welcome the Clergy and the Lay Delegates from the various Congregations.

Our hearts will stir with recollection of longer or shorter periods of communion and fellowship with some or many of those whose names I mention now, who during the past year have finished their earthly pilgrimage and have entered on the life beyond the bridge.

The Rt. Rev. William Cabell Brown, D.D., seventh Bishop of Virginia since 1914, died July 25, at the age of 65.

The Rt. Rev. Edwin Stevens Lines, D.D., third Bishop of Newark since 1903, died October 25, at the age of 81.

The Rev. Dr. Thomas H. V. Appleby, a retired Presbyterian of the Diocese of Missouri, died in Tacoma, Washington, May 3, in his 84th year; and the Rev. William A. Masker, formerly curate of our Christ Church Cathedral, pastor once of St. Alban's Church in this city, died in the City of Washington, September 4, in his 58th year.

Out of Ascension parish in St. Louis, Mrs. Ada C. Seaman, Mrs. Mary Manny Wyman, Miss Alice Brown, Mrs. J. W. Williamson, Mr. R. E. Funsten and Miss Georgia Hough are gone; Mrs. Emma Lane, among the oldest of the Cathedral members, and Mrs. Ada Raboteau, and Mr. Alfred Clifford, and Mr. Walter Condie from Christ Church Cathedral; from Mount Calvary, Mrs. A. T. Cotsworth, wife of our faithful Lay Reader there; Mr. T. P. Pettus of Trinity; Miss Wilhelmina Mitchell of the Church of the Holy Communion; Mrs. Katherine Stein and Mrs. Frieda Jost of St. Paul's; Mr. Willard Gibbs of Hannibal; Mrs. Florence Ewing Towles and Mrs. L. W. Moore of Jefferson City; Mrs. Samuel Robert Johnson of St. Charles; Mrs. Cherbonnier of Ferguson; Mrs. M. A. Shaw of Rolla; Mrs. Helen Rost of Cuba; Miss Mary Utica Reagan, organist and teacher in the Sunday School and helpful member of St. Paul's, Ironton, for many years,—these all are gone. Mr. L. H. Niederluck, Warden formerly of St. Mary's, St. Louis, lost his daughter, long a patient invalid, in July; and Mrs. Wolfe, also of St. Mary's, died in the summer in her 102nd year. Mr. George R. Barclay, fifteen years faithful Treasurer and twenty years faithful Warden; Mr. Edwin G. Merriam, long years a Vestryman; Mrs. Laura V. Elliott; and Miss Jane Frances Winn, journalist, poet, and literary critic, have dropped out of the ranks of St. George's, St. Louis; Dr. Edward H. Higbee and Mr. Seymour Stewart out of St. Michael and All Angels'; Mrs. Lina B. Chandler, a long-time devoted member, out of Grace, Kirkwood. The first class confirmed in what is now Old St. John's, Prairieville; (1856) was a

class of two persons, Mr. Walker Davis and Miss Lou Miller Meriwether. "Miss Lou" had been baptized by Bishop Jackson Kemper about the year 1844. She married Mr. George Winn, and they moved away from Prairieville. Later, a widow, "Mamma Lou," as she was affectionately called, returned to St. John's and was for many years member of the Vestry and superintendent of the Sunday School. She died in Pasadena, California, in July, at the age of 87, and her body lies in the churchyard adjoining Old St. John's. Mrs. Mary C. Hitchcock lived a life of unusual helpfulness and happiness, young in spirit, keenly interested in books and persons and places until, just as the sound of bells ringing out the Old Year died away, she entered into realms of larger life. She was a member of the Cathedral parish and in her 97th year. We share with our dear fellow-worker, the Rev. John S. Bunting, the sorrow that is his in the recent death of a beloved brother, Mr. Chambers L. Bunting of Macon, Georgia, a business man of lofty standards of integrity, Treasurer for many years of the Diocese of Atlanta and Deputy to the General Convention. With wonderful courage Mr. and Mrs. Moseby of Webster Groves have suffered the loss out of the earthly home of their firstborn, Richard, a promising lad of eleven years; and Mr. and Mrs. Lon Mackey in Palmyra are bravely facing the road on which, a few months since, their sweet child, Marjorie, was by their side. The mother of Archdeacon Marsden died in Massachusetts in April; and the mother of Miss Amy Kimmel died in Cape Girardeau in June.

Dr. Edward Watt Saunders was brother to our Walter H. Saunders of Ascension Church. The announcement printed in the city papers when he died, that he had requested that all who might have wished to send flowers for his burial would instead please send the money to Bethesda Hospital, shows what manner of man he was. Have we any of us anywhere seen a more beautiful demonstration of the saying of Jesus, "He that would be greatest among you, let him be the servant of all," than in the forty years which Dr. Saunders spent in providing for the sick and the needy who looked to him for help! Though not a member of our communion, for forty years, without recompense for his services, Dr. Saunders cared for the children of the Episcopal Orphans' Home.

I was accustomed to regard Mr. Festus J. Wade as one of the most loyal lay members of the Roman Catholic Church in this part of the country. The day that he was buried from the New Cathedral, I heard the Archbishop say that it was Mr. Wade's almost daily habit to stop at the Cathedral for worship on his way to work. Devoted as he was to his own church, Mr. Wade was a thoroughly catholic-minded man, in the true meaning of that word. When the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund was established, he was one of the incorporators and until the day of his death he was a member of the Executive Committee. In official matters he was always an adviser of unusual quickness of perception and accuracy of judgment. In all personal relations he was an affectionate friend. Much of the success of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial thus far is due to the push that Mr. Wade put into it because of a deep devotion to Bishop Tuttle's memory.

Herbert Spencer Hadley, former Governor of Missouri, Chancellor of Washington University, was one of God's good noblemen. The voice of a courageous advocate of every high cause and of every holy purpose was silenced when at the comparatively early age of 56 he went beyond the limit of our sight, to those rewards which wait

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News came only a few days ago, of the sudden death in Southern California of Mr. Jay Herndon Smith, Senior Warden of St. Michael and All Angels' in St. Louis. The Diocese has lost in Mr. Smith a man who I am in a position to know had his eye on broad fields of parochial and diocesan opportunity which he hoped might in the near future be occupied; in which contemplated undertakings I know he was eager to be generously used. A sweet-spirited, dear, kind, gentle, lovable friend of sixteen years, his death brings great personal sorrow to me.

One army of the living God,
To His command we bow;
Part of the host have crossed the flood,
And part are crossing now.

Judged by such measurements as can be applied to work like ours, I think that we can honestly say that the year 1927 was a year whose blessings move us to thank God, and whose successes justify us in taking courage.

All of us who care ought to be grateful to the fine group of Clergy in the mission field of the Diocese (both urban and rural) who have stuck at their posts and have served the Lord Christ; not because they were not wanted elsewhere, but because they wanted to stay here. I know that several of the Clergy who are on the roll of missionaries in Missouri have received tempting calls to go to other Dioceses, and have declined to go. Some of these calls have promised salaries and creature comforts and perquisites of one sort and another quite in excess of what we are providing here. And yet the men stick. And they work on, not only cheerfully, but enthusiastically. And the Diocese of Missouri is stronger and better by reason of their spirit of joyful eagerness to make a sacrifice. It is right that our laity should know this fact. And, knowing it, I believe that they will show their appreciation of it by standing by the missionary endeavors in this Diocese with increasingly generous support.

Only one man has gone off our mission staff since a year ago, the Rev. John Hanckel Taylor. He gave us seven good years. His place at Overland was fortunately filled without the long interval of waiting which so frequently disintegrates a congregation, by the coming of the Rev. Bradner J. Moore from Mississippi. Mr. Moore soon made us know that he is a man with an eye on nothing else than the Ministry of the Gospel of Christ, eager to relate the gospel message to every phase of social and family and educational and political life. He comes to Overland at a time when St. Paul's Mission is at the threshold of the year of the best opportunity that it has ever had. I am confident that both Mr. Moore and his people are prepared to enter in and occupy.

The Rev. David Coombs to the north of us and the Rev. Frank Maples and the Rev. Carleton D. Lathrop to the south of us are demonstrating how possible it is for our Church to successfully develop the "group method" in rural Missouri and to create a spirit of friendly co-operation rather than of unfriendly rivalry among the units which constitute the group. In my address a year ago, I spoke at length of the success of Mr. Coomb's work in Pike County. During the past year, the Rev. Frank Maples has shown splendid ability to

strengthen and inspire the Poplar Bluff-Ironton-De Soto group, (Mr. Maples, coming to us from the Congregational ministry, was ordained Deacon last June); and the Rev. Carleton D. Lathrop, formerly curate at Ascension, St. Louis, whom I recommended to Cape Girardeau in September, has put a wonderful amount of new enthusiasm into the Cape Girardeau-Chaffee-Bloomfield-Illmo group. He and the people are working helpfully together "as happy as a basket of chips." I shall leave it to the Archdeacon to report more in detail on these fields, for they were peculiarly his responsibility for a long stretch of time. Neither of these two groups would now be able to carry on, were it not for the wise way in which the Archdeacon strengthened and developed them until Mr. Maples and Mr. Lathrop were available.

What is our duty to Rural Missouri? Our Diocese comprises fifty-four counties. Into twenty-seven of these counties the ministrations of our Church are never carried. Twenty years hence, thousands of men and women will be living in St. Louis who today are young girls and boys on Missouri farms and in Missouri villages and towns. Do you know the story of what happened in Richmond in old Virginia? Shortly after the Civil War, the Baptists made a survey of the city with a view to organizing mission work in Richmond. The report of the survey was that Richmond was "an Episcopal city." From colonial days, Episcopal churches had been established there. These were rich in the traditions of great and revered men who had been communicants, and members of the congregations. The F.F.V.'s belonged to the Episcopal churches. Those who wanted to be F.F.V.'s would want to belong to the Episcopal churches. So the Baptists concluded that they would leave Richmond to the Episcopal Church. And the Baptist missionaries went out among the tenant farmers of the neighboring counties—out into the rural section of Virginia. That was sixty years ago. During those sixty years the city of Richmond has grown from 30,000 to 250,000 population. The Baptists have today in Richmond a membership of 40,000. The Episcopal Church has 8,000, which is only six times as many as were there 60 years ago. What happened was that the people from out in the country moved into Richmond and built up the city of Richmond. And when they arrived in Richmond they were Baptists. What else could they be?

Specialists in rural, social and religious problems tell us that 3,000,000 people have moved from farms to cities in seven years. If this is happening everywhere, it is happening in Missouri. And what are we doing to carry this Church of our affections to Rural Missouri? In 1927 we reported 8,837 communicants in our Diocese. Of this number, 7,633 were reported as enrolled in St. Louis, Webster Groves, Kirkwood and Ferguson. Only 1,204 were reported outside of St. Louis and St. Louis County. This convention address is not the proper place to present a program of rural work. It is the proper place to remind ourselves that we have greatly neglected rural work, and that we still are neglecting it. It seems to me that a Committee ought to be set up, of persons really interested in this problem; who will study into it, and put hard work into it; and report at the Convention to be held a year from now.

Turning our eyes from the country to the city, it is clear that we are doing practically nothing to bring this Church into contact with new "additions" which are being opened and promoted in St. Louis. Oughtn't we to be on the lookout for locations which future generations will thank us for having occupied in the name of the Church while yet there was opportunity? We who are here today

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are enjoying the fruits of the labors of others. Are we so laboring that others in turn may enjoy the fruits of our labors? To secure building locations requires money. One distressing feature of the Missouri situation is that we absorb all our income every year in **maintaining** work, and we have no fund available for **expanding** and **extending** work. Have we interpreted that to mean that God intends us not to expand or extend? Ought we not rather to interpret it to mean that we must find a way to build up a special extension fund for extension purposes? If we enquire, perhaps we shall discover that we have a goodly nucleus already in what accrued to us from the sale of St. Mary's church property in St. Louis, segregated by order of the Diocesan Council in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Missionary Fund for maintaining and extending missionary work. Wouldn't it be well to have a Committee to look into this matter of securing desirable city lots; and to report to the Convention a year from now? And if such Committee were appointed and should report favorably on making purchases here and there, do you agree with me that our people will respond to a new challenge of The Glorious Opportunity That is Ours, more gladly and more generously than they ever will respond to the old challenge of How Much Money Will You Give? Have we never noticed that the Rector who keeps dinging at his people to increase their pledges often gets little, and that the Rector who keeps informing his people of opportunities of extending and enlarging the Kingdom often gets much? Isn't the psychology of our method all out of line when we approach people on the basis of How Much Money Can We Raise, rather than on the basis of How Much Extension Work Can We Do?

Due chiefly to the Diocesan Department of Religious Education and its chairman, the Rev. Dr. Block, the Diocese has developed a new interest in conference and institute plans. Though the registration at none of the gatherings was what it should have been, yet we are certain that great good was accomplished. Miss Dorothy Fisher of the Province of the Southwest was here in the spring conducting 15 group meetings to arouse interest in the Federation of Episcopal Young People. In January, Miss Mabel Lee Cooper held a five-day institute in St. Louis, a two-day conference in Hannibal, and a two-day conference in Columbia; sent to us by the Religious Education Department of the National Council, in which she is Supervisor of Teacher Training.

In addition to the customary gatherings of Northern and Southern Convocations, a Summer Conference at Columbia in June, the first of its kind in the Diocese, gathered 50 delegates, clerical and lay, men and women, for five helpful and happy days. In October, again, 20 of our Clergy met in Columbia for two days of fellowship and conference and especially for instruction by the Rev. Arthur M. Sherman of Boone University, Wuchang, on social, political and religious conditions in China. The Rev. David R. Haupt and Mrs. Haupt and the good people of Calvary parish graciously added to the natural attractions of a charming community. Are we in danger of forming a "Columbia habit?" Perhaps we are. But experience thus far would indicate that there's no element of danger in it!

In preparation for the Every-Member Canvass in the autumn, more than 50 laymen good and true were organized under the name of The Enlarged Department of the Field. It was and is hoped that such a group can provide key men for contacts from time to time between diocesan officers and parochial officers, so that the Diocese may better understand the problems of the Parishes and the Parishes

may better realize the problems of the Diocese.

Two successive summers, the Rev. James H. George has been Chaplain of Camp Tuttle, near Springfield, Mo., under the direction of the National St. Andrew's Brotherhood. I am not authorized to say that Mr. George is going as Chaplain again next summer. But whether he is there or not, I've heard things that make me sure that the lads who go to Camp Tuttle have a profitable time, playing and praying and studying and working together. Missouri's enrollment last summer at Camp Tuttle was very small. The Clergy could make it larger if they should determine to interest themselves in it and to urge the lads to go.

Betterments in physical properties I have observed in many places in the Diocese. The new Rectory is finished and paid for at Grace Church, Marion Place, St. Louis; and the people of Grace Church have overpaid their Church Program quota. Mr. Richard Kopplin built an addition to the chapel in Valley Park a year ago and made a cellar under it and put a furnace in. The whole job cost \$2,000.00 And it's paid for! How? I don't know. But it's paid for, that's all. No; it isn't all. Valley Park overpaid its quota by 20 per cent. And the Kopplins and their helpers have built up a Sunday School from nothing to 140 in nine years. And the Kopplins are lay workers, not Clergy. Just faithful, persistent, devoted lay workers. There's many a place in Missouri, far more promising than Valley Park in available material, where a Clergyman is in charge, and there's no Sunday School. "Can't get the children," is the excuse. And congregations are dying off at the top and are not recruited from below; and it requires no prophet to predict! Rolla's new parish house is a hive of industry, a convenient meeting-place for guilds and clubs and societies connected with the work of the church, and sometimes for community gatherings not connected with the church. Students of the School of Mines drop in any time to get a word of guidance from Pastor Tragitt; and whole bunches of them now and then for an evening of wholesome fun. There's a parish house debt. But it is steadily disappearing. A Christmas gift of \$500.00 from Mr. and Mrs. Will Rucker of St. James, and Charlottesville, Va., and \$100.00 from the family of the late Mrs. M. A. Shaw are among recent helpful contributions. Calvary rectory, Louisiana, has been enlarged and made more comfortable by adding several new rooms; and the bill is paid. The tidy chapel at Cuba and the attractive stone church at Palmyra have new roofs. Seven years ago St. Augustine's in St. Louis built the commodious Miller Memorial Hall alongside of St. Augustine's Church. It cost \$9,000.00. Somehow—I never knew how—the people managed to raise \$6,000.00 Then they went to the money-lenders and borrowed the other \$3,000.00. Somehow, during these seven years—I don't know how—the St. Augustine's people have gone right along increasing the volume of their givings and at the same time whittling down their debt; until now they have the debt almost entirely whittled away, only about \$700.00 remaining to be paid. In view of the satisfaction that they have got out of the Memorial Hall venture, I am wondering whether the fine group of team-workers who compose the St. Augustine's Church Committee may not undertake a Rectory project as their next venture of faith. For the comfort of the Rev. Mr. Harter and his family, and for the well-being of St. Augustine's in the future, whoever the Pastor may be, I should like soon to see definite plans looking toward the buying or the building of a Rectory. It is quite remarkable that St. Augustine's paid their quota of \$744.00, with all the "extras" that

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came piling on them in 1927. Prince of Peace on the other extreme edge of the city, where Sister Miriam has had a new retaining wall built and where she is all the while introducing improvements which I never can keep track of, have overpaid their quota 25 per cent. St. Luke's, Harney Heights, had the faith three years ago to build an \$8,000.00 church, though they had to borrow \$5,000.00 to complete the job. In three years the St. Luke's people have paid almost one-third of the debt. And while they are working at their church debt, they keep busy at the Church's Program—so busy that they over-shot their quota for 1927 by more than 71 percent. St. Timothy's, St. Louis, under the same leadership as St. Luke's, (the Rev. Mr. Small) improved its property last year and overpaid its quota by a tidy sum. Trinity Church, St. Louis, suffered a considerable property damage from the tornado which tore through the city, last October. A few gifts from friends, added to the amount of insurance collected, have enabled the Vestry to put the building in good shape again. You will be glad to know that the Rector of Trinity, the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, who was given six months' leave of absence by the Vestry last autumn because much below par physically, writes me that he is happy in the sunshine of New Mexico and that he is steadily building up his strength.

August 16, the Vestry of Trinity, Hannibal, unanimously elected the Rev. Jesse K. Brennan as Rector, succeeding the Rev. W. S. W. Raymond. The call was accepted four days later, effective November 1, 1927. Mr. Brennan had previously been rector of Trinity, Hannibal, from 1910 to 1913. It is a pleasure to learn that Mr. Robert Robinson, Senior Warden of the parish, and Mrs. Robinson, have recently made a gift of \$500.00 to be added to the parish endowment.

On a recent official visit to St. Michael and All Angels' in St. Louis, I realized anew how steadily and substantially that important parish is developing. The congregation has entirely outgrown the Church's seating capacity. I asked Dr. Block about a beautiful sketch which I saw in the rectory; and he told me that it was the architect's design for proposed enlargement of church and parish house. It is an ambitious ideal, and I predict that it will be realized. The Church of the Holy Communion was greatly beautified during last summer by interior decorations and the parish buildings much improved by repairs. The new organ at the Cathedral, with Mr. Daniel Philippi, so absolutely devoted to his profession and so thoroughly equipped for it, at the keyboard, adds great beauty to the Cathedral worship.

I ordained the Rev. Augustus P. Rein in St. Louis when he offered himself for the ministry from a business office a dozen years ago. For that and other very personal reasons, and for the nine good years of work which he did here before he went to New Hampshire in 1924, I welcome him back to St. Louis as a brother beloved. Temporarily Mr. Rein is appointed to serve occasionally in Mt. Calvary and St. Thomas' missions and in Good Shepherd parish; and he is available for supply work at other points as need may require.

June 24, I ordained the Rev. Frank Maples, Deacon. September 25, I ordained the Rev. Vincent Franks, Deacon. If our plan does not miscarry, we shall ordain four Deacons in 1928. This will make a total of six in two years; exactly the total for the ten years from 1917 to 1926, inclusive. The Rev. Mr. Maples is doing genuine missionary work in this Diocese. The Rev. Mr. Franks wrote me several times before he was ordained to tell me that he was the recipient of "flattering offers" in "delightful parishes" in other Dioceses; and at

his request I transferred him immediately upon ordination to the Diocese of his choice. The Canons give me jurisdiction over all Deacons during the entire term of their Diaconate. But I am not keen to have jurisdiction over the head and feet and corpus in Missouri of any Priest or Deacon whose heart and will are somewhere else.

I received three Presbyters into the Diocese in 1927. I transferred two Presyters and one Deacon to other dioceses.

We have five Candidates and four Postulants.

Licenses have been issued to twenty-two Lay Readers for 1928.

I officiated at six burials last year.

I performed one marriage.

I baptized one child.

I confirmed 494 persons.

I think it is truth to say that Trinity, Hannibal, had never been in better shape than it was when the Rev. Mr. Raymond offered his resignation last March. A modest man and a quiet man; a man of finest personal character and of the highest integrity; a kindly, diligent, persistent pastor, he kept abreast of the best thinking of the day and earnestly and lovingly spoke his convictions in regard to spiritual and moral matters, both in private and in public, to the people committed to his charge. Outside of his immediate congregation, he was highly regarded as a citizen by all good people in Hannibal. He came to us from the State of Washington; and thither he returned after more than eight years of faithful work in Hannibal. The things that I am saying here, and many more besides, I wrote in a letter commending Mr. Raymond to the Bishop of Olympia; to which the Bishop of Olympia replied, "Raymond is everything that you say he is. He is at work here and I am delighted to have him in my Diocese." Mrs. Raymond, specially skilled in music, played the organ and trained a choir which gave Trinity, Hannibal, the best church music in the diocese outside of St. Louis.

I have been distressed because of inability thus far to provide a pastor for St. Thomas' (deaf mute) mission in St. Louis. In the nature of things, Clergy equipped to minister effectively among the deaf are few. Since the Rev. Dr. Cloud's lamented death more than a year ago, none have been available in this general neighborhood. However, I have a good hope that we can give St. Thomas' its own pastor in the near future. Meanwhile the Rev. Mr. Rein and the Rev. Mr. George are providing monthly celebrations of the Holy Communion; and Mr. A. O. Steidemann, long associated with Dr. Cloud as a lay helper, is acting as Lay Reader.

Many of the congregations of the Diocese would have been deprived of opportunities of Sunday worship during much of the year had not the Lay Readers' League stood ready with volunteers to meet emergencies. And Mr. A. T. Cotsworth has put a lot of love and labor into an effort to weld together the scattered fragments of what was once Mount Calvary parish in St. Louis.

The Rev. Mr. George will make his own report to the Convention. When you hear it, you will realize something of the variety and scope of the work that he and his staff are doing in the City Institutions. Miss Helen K. Shipps, with a wide experience in family welfare organizations and in social service in institutions, notably in

Hull House, Chicago, and in the Massachusetts General Hospital, is a recent addition to this important department of our diocesan missionary work.

We lost a valuable helper in the resignation at Christmas time of Deaconess Alice Reynolds of Grace Church and Holy Cross House. The smoke and dust of St. Louis seriously aggravated a condition of irritated sinuses which had troubled her for several years, and she has accepted a call which permits her to work out in the open spaces of Oklahoma. We thank her for the six splendid years of service that she gave us, and we pray God's blessing on her in her new endeavor.

Church News achieved a success in 1927 of which Church News Committee have a right to be proud and for which they are entitled to the thanks of all of us who care. And our thanks ought to register in more substantial ways than the passing of sweet-sounding resolutions of appreciation to be buried in the printed pages of a Journal of the Diocese of Missouri. We Clergy ought to include the sending of items of interest to Church News regularly each month among the things to be done. And every family in our diocese ought to give Church News its heart and its Dollar. The Committee worked like hired men, all of them, all last year, to produce a real paper. And they succeeded. But how? The Business Manager is Roy Campbell, a business man. He employs a stenographer and secretary in his business office, for his own business. And, in addition, he gives her Church News business to take care of, and pays her with his own money for taking care of it. That's not fair treatment of Roy Campbell by this Diocese of Missouri. And Mr. Nugent is putting time into Church News. And Mr. Bloy is giving not hours of work, or days of work, but weeks of work; time which he might properly employ in reading, or in study, or in parish visiting, or even in a game of golf now and then. And we are doing less than we ought to want to do to give Bloy and Nugent and Campbell the assurance that we care. Yes; perhaps kindness has in our bosoms swelled a little freer than the year before, towards those who do the work of Church News for the Diocese. But can't we be even kinder and thoughtfuller and helpfuller in 1928 than we were in 1927? By the way, what became of that good resolution that a group of the Clergy made in the last week of December of a year ago that they would secure a bunch of new subscribers for Church News in 1927? Such a promise was made; and I heard it. What became of it? Was it forgotten because of a multitude of other duties to be done? Another year of opportunity is here. Can't we give in 1928 the help that we expressed a good desire to give in 1927? There's no one who can solve this perennial Church News problem but ourselves.

The report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council will be made by the proper officer at the appointed time. I wish to express grateful thanks to Mrs. W. C. Rumsey, President of the Auxiliary, and her associates, for their earnest and intelligent devotion to this vital department of our diocesan activities. And in this connection it is permitted to say thankfully that Missouri's United Thank Offering in 1928 will probably be larger than ever before; and that Missouri's contributions to the Corporate Gift will probably be in excess of the amount which has been promised.

The Episcopal Orphans' Home revised its By-Laws over a year ago in such fashion as to give the Bishop some responsibility in the

choosing of a Matron. A vacancy occurred in that office in the summer, and I nominated Mrs. Jean Barron Hurlbut, whom I found in Maryland. Mrs. Hurlbut was duly appointed and came to the Home in October. She has already evidenced an intelligent understanding of and affection for the children of the Home, and she seems well suited to her new responsibilities and happy in her work.

May 20, 1917, Bishop Tuttle ordained Charles F. Bourscheidt, Deacon. About Christmas time, 1920, Mr. Bourscheidt suddenly disappeared from the diocese. In the issue of Church News for March, 1921, Bishop Tuttle wrote, "We do not know whether he has gone or where he is." Several official letters which I mailed to Mr. Bourscheidt shortly after his disappearance in 1920 were returned to me by the Post Office authorities, unopened. In view of the fact that seven years have passed since I have had any news of Mr. Bourscheidt, I now enter the removal of his name from the roll of Clergy of the Diocese of Missouri, effective January 24, 1928.

Acting under Canon 6 of the General Convention, I nominate the Rev. Dr. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. David Coombs, and the Rev. James H. George as a Board of Examining Chaplains for the Diocese, the nomination to be confirmed by this Convention if it is your pleasure to do so.

Having studied into the situation at Fulton, and having learned the condition of our physical property there and that our few remaining people have little desire that the work should be maintained, I hereby give notice that Trinity mission, Fulton, is deorganized and dormant.

Thursday of this week marks ninety-one years since the day of Bishop Tuttle's birth. The Bishop Tuttle Memorial is steadily nearing completion. The money which is building it was given by affectionate personal friends of every creed, chiefly in the City of St. Louis, and almost wholly within the State of Missouri. The gifts of men and women of large incomes and of men and women of small means mingled in the Building Fund. Our present resources enable us to erect a building which will be finished and yet incomplete. We are justified in hoping that other gifts will be available in the near future, and legacies in the course of time, which will enable us to raise a loftier and nobler structure on the sufficient foundation which we have already laid—a Memorial which will carry forward to future generations the beneficent influence of this good man, zealous patriot, useful citizen, wise counsellor, faithful friend, and lover of his fellow-men. I am sure that the Board of Trustees of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial would wish me to put into this address grateful thanks to all who have provided the funds with which to build.

The business outlook in the Diocese, by comparison with former years, is encouraging. For one thing, the Diocesan Treasurer's report shows that we paid a note for \$1,500.00 which our General Expense Fund had owed at least for 34 years. That's good news. Our thanks to Mr. Vincent Price. It is true that we closed the year with a current deficit of about \$1,200 on account of Church Program Fund. But that current deficit is accounted for by the fact that we sent the National Council over \$33,000.00 in 1927, which is more than we have sent in any year since 1921. Our givings to the National Council have been as follows since the first year of our participation in the new National Council organization:

In the year just ended, we paid the National Council nearly \$12,000.00 in excess of our average payments to the National Council for the previous five years. Special thanks are due to the following parishes for additional payments made through individuals toward the threatened deficit of 1927:

Cathedral gave \$1,000.00, overpaying its quota 30 per cent.

Kirkwood gave \$450.00, overpaying its quota 13 per cent.

Webster Groves gave \$500.00, overpaying its quota 9 per cent.

Holy Communion gave \$100.00, overpaying its quota 2 ¼ per cent.

St. Peter's gave \$1,300.00.

The remark is sometimes heard that St. Luke's Hospital must be growing rich. It is a guess hazarded by those who do not know. The Board of Directors and the Superintendent of St. Luke's are providing hospital care and professional services which are not excelled in any similar institution in this part of the country. To do this and keep out of debt, with the small endowment which St. Luke's has, is a difficult mathematical calculation. If you should sit in the meetings of the Board of Directors as I do, you would know that this is true. St. Luke's is a diocesan institution. We ought to commend it to our friends and to advertise it among our friends. It merits our moral and financial support; not simply because it is an Episcopal Church Hospital, but because it is a Hospital of superior excellence.

The Forty-ninth General Convention of the Church will assemble at the Nation's Capital in October of this year. Washington is a beautiful city. There are things there worth traveling long journeys to see. But this Diocese of Missouri has a right to expect that its Bishop will be in his seat in the General Convention at every session, unless prevented by what seems to be at the moment a more compelling duty. And may I be pardoned for saying that our Clerical and Lay Deputies ought to be in their seats at all sessions, unless reasonably hindered? Neither they nor I are sent just for the railroad trip; nor to attend the sessions of Congress; nor to climb the Washington Monument; nor to inspect Mount Vernon; nor to visit the Grave of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington; nor the beautiful Lincoln Memorial, nor the White House, nor the Congressional Library, nor any other thing. There will doubtless be much time in Washington for sight-seeing and for calling on old friends. I hope so. But these are secondary to General Convention. The thing to be remembered is that we are to go to Washington to exercise the right of franchise on behalf of the people of the Diocese of Missouri whose representatives we are. I have a right to express the hope that those who accept election as delegates will make the business of General

Convention primary, and pleasure secondary, from the General Convention's opening sermon to its closing prayer. Two important matters on which those who are elected ought to inform themselves before they go are

1. The amendments to the Book of Common Prayer which are finally to be acted upon; and
2. The question of increasing or diminishing the amount of money to be budgeted by the National Council for maintaining and expanding the Church's missionary work another three years at home and abroad.

I have deposited with the Secretary of the Diocese a statement of receipts and disbursements on account of Bishop's Missionary Purse; also a statement of securities held by me as Trustee; also a statement of receipts and disbursements of principal accounts for 1927; all these for printing in the Journal.

We will now organize for business. I hope that the whole time of the Convention will prove to have been profitably spent. And I hope that we may be conscious that the Lord is really using us to help to make His kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven!

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Report of the Department of Finance.

Early in the year, the Department of Finance recommended to the Diocesan Council that a Special Gifts Campaign be authorized in order to make up the deficit of \$10,000.00 between the amount of the Budget and of the Apportionments for the Church's Program, so that the Diocese could meet its obligations to the National Council and to the missionary interests in the Diocese.

During the year, the Vice-Chairman sent out, regularly, letters to the rectors and treasurers of the various parishes and missions, congratulating them on raising their apportionments or encouraging them in their efforts to do so.

Tentative apportionments and assessments for 1928 were prepared by the Department and approved by the Council, and submitted to the parishes and missions for approval or adjustment.

Budgets for the General Diocesan expenses and Church Program expenses were carefully considered and prepared, and were submitted to the Council for approval.

Report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

The members of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, for the year 1927, were the following: The Right Reverend Frederick F. Johnson, D.D., ex officio Chairman; Very Reverend William Scarlett, LL.D., Vice-Chairman; Mr. R. L. Orcutt, Secretary and Treasurer; the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., Archdeacon H. H. Marsden, Messrs. C. R. McDonald, Ethan A. H. Shepley, E. P. Griffin and C. J. Miller. Mr. McDonald resigned early in the year.

Regular meetings have been held the second Tuesdays in February, March, April, May, June, September, October, November, December 1927, and January 1928. Special meetings were held in February and March.

The Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor resigned as Minister-in-charge at Overland on August 31.

The following appointments were made by the Bishop during the year:

The Rev. Frank Maples at Poplar Bluff, January 1;

The Rev. D. R. Haupt at Columbia, January 1;

The Rev. Bradner J. Moore at Overland, September 1;

The Rev. C. D. Lathrop at Cape Girardeau, September 1.

The Department, on authorization of the Council, sold St. Mary's Mission for \$32,000.00, and the proceeds of the sale were placed in a special Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund for Extension Work in the Diocese.

The Department sent \$300.00 to the Rev. Frank Maples at Poplar Bluff, as a contribution to relieve the flood sufferers at that place, \$100.00 of the amount having been contributed by a friend of the Department.

The Archdeacon having reported the church property at Fulton not being properly located and the building in bad condition, the Department was authorized by the Council to sell the property.

The Department was authorized by the Council to make a ten per cent reduction of the amounts given to the missions, wherever feasible, for the year 1928, the mission itself being asked to make up the ten per cent reduction.

The Department turned back to the Church Program Fund \$600.00 of the balance in the treasury of the Department, as reported in the Treasurer's annual statement for 1927, to apply on the deficit of the Church Program account.

Department of Religious Education.

During the last fiscal year, the Department of Religious Education has had monthly meetings, with absolute regularity, except during the Summer, and these meetings have been attended by more than eighty percent of the full Department enrollment.

The questionnaire sent out in the Fall of last year, in the hope of discovering the situation in our Church Schools throughout the Diocese, revealed an immediate need for teacher training. Miss Mabel Lee Cooper came at the request of the Department and conducted an Institute for five days at St. George's Church. Her course of addresses dealt with the Principles of Teaching and Child Psychology. The lectures were admirable and the Institute was fairly well attended. Many of our people did not appreciate the unusual equipment of Miss Cooper and the great privilege afforded the Diocese in her coming.

The survey also disclosed the fact that Young People's Work in the Diocese was either unorganized or in need of stimulation, so that, through the generosity of the Province, we were able to have Miss Dorothy M. Fischer, of the Diocese of Texas, come to us for a month. Miss Fischer met with groups all over the Diocesan area,

organized some, gave to others the benefit of her rich experience and interested our Young People in attendance at her Provincial Conference held at Winslow, Arkansas.

The outstanding work of the Department during the year was the Summer School conducted at the Oak Hill Hotel, Columbia, Missouri, in the month of June. This was largely made possible by the efficient cooperation of Rev. and Mrs. David R. Haupt. There again, the enrollment was not as great as it should have been in consideration of the cost of the School, the assistance rendered by the Department in the matter of traveling expense and the unusually gifted and qualified members of the Faculty from without the Diocese—Mrs. John R. Loman, of Philadelphia; the Rev. Charles E. McAllister, of Newark, and the Rev. J. Lawrence Ware, of Warren, Pa., as well as the Professors from the University of Missouri, who lectured in the evenings. Those who attended the Summer School are best able to evaluate it. It is not too much to say that the School brought mental and spiritual refreshment to many of our Diocesan leaders and laid foundations for a larger and more helpful School to be held in Columbia this June.

The Department has also endeavored, by correspondence and the circulation of literature, to stimulate the work of our Church Schools in the matter of a more Christian observance of the two central Feasts of the Church year—Christmas and Easter. The excellent pamphlets written by Miss Charlotte Forsyth, formerly of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, were distributed, without cost, to those parishes and missions of the Diocese requesting them. A suggested Service called the Feast of Lights, was similarly distributed.

The work hitherto done by the Church Service League was continued under a new arrangement, whereby this organization was taken over bodily, as a Committee, under the Department of Religious Education, its President being Chairman of the Church School Service Program of the Department. A supplementary report outlining the work of this Committee in detail, is appended hereto.

The final achievement of the year was the institution of a Circulating Library for the Clergy. Thirty-four books were purchased and distributed to the thirty-four men in the Diocese whose names were available and by a rotating system, at least that number of books will be available for every clergyman, for a period of about a week each. It is planned to add to this list from time to time, from the best new books in the theological field and in others intimately related to it. The men in the extra-urban territory have expressed special gratitude for this Library.

In addition to the items heretofore recounted, it is to be noted that the Executive Secretary, the Rev. J. Bradner Moore, is now teaching in the Central School conducted by the Federated Churches of the city, and the Chairman has attended various conferences on Religious Education, including the meeting of Diocesan Executives in Religious Education held at Detroit. He also taught at the Dallas Summer School, the Provincial School for Young People at Winslow, Ark., and the Diocesan School at Columbia. With an enlarged budget, the Department hopes to increase the scope of its activities during the ensuing year. Arrangements were made for a visit by Miss Forsyth in the month of January for the conduct of an Institute. The acceptance of a new field of endeavor made it necessary for Miss Forsyth to withdraw, and plans are now in process for a similar Institute to be held in Lent.

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The week of June 12th has been set apart for the second session of the Diocesan Summer School at Columbia, and a Book of Family Prayers is in process of compilation. Plans are also being made to release the Rev. Mr. J. Bradner Moore for the conduct of Institutes in the rural areas and for visits to parishes and missions in or near the city where his experience can be used in stimulating the work of Religious Education.

Aside from the need of trained teachers, the Department would like to press home to our Clergy the need of Adult Bible Classes, the use of daily Bible Readings, the institution of Vacation Bible Schools and the care of scattered communicants in rural areas.

The Chairman wishes to express his gratitude to the Clergy of the Diocese for their cooperation in the efforts of the Department during the past year.

Report of the Parochial Trust Fund for 1927.

The Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese of Missouri beg to submit their official acts for 1927:

January 19th:

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer for the year 1926 was approved.

In the matter of the sale of the Mission property at Sherman, Mo., the Secretary was given authority to negotiate sale of said property at a price of \$1,250.00.

March 16th:

Committee organized for the year by the election of Rev. J. Courtney Jones as Vice-Chairman, and Davis Biggs as Secretary and Treasurer.

May 11th:

The Treasurer was authorized to negotiate the sale of the Mission property at Eureka, Missouri, at a price of \$200.00.

It appearing that the Mission property at Sherman, Missouri, had been destroyed by fire the Treasurer was authorized to negotiate settlement with the Insurance Company on a basis of receiving \$2,506.92 to cover the loss of the building and contents, the Secretary and Treasurer being authorized to reimburse Grace Church, Kirkwood, Missouri, for the payment made by it of \$42.00 to cover insurance premium.

June 20th:

Mr. Frank C. Thompson and the Treasurer, as a Committee, were authorized to invest the funds of the Committee on deposit in savings account, in Municipal Bonds.

The Treasurer reported that in accordance with authority he had sold the plat of ground at Eureka, Missouri, belonging to the Eureka Mission, for the sum of \$250.00.

In accordance with request of the Diocesan Council, the Parochial Trust Fund created from funds held by it on account of St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis, a fund to be known as The Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, for sustaining and extending missionary work of the Diocese of Missouri, which fund shall be subject to the orders of the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

November 3rd:

The Treasurer reported that in accordance with authority given, the Committee, composed of Mr. Frank C. Thompson and the Treasurer, had invested the funds of the Committee in bonds of the State of Arkansas, State of North Carolina, and City and County of San Francisco, as will appear from the financial statement.

APPENDIX NO. 12.

Report of the Diocesan Pension Fund Committee.

The story of the Church Pension Fund is the story of a constant progress and steady gains to clergy comfort and welfare. These gains are:

First, The increase during 1927 of available assets by the sum of \$1,492,783.47, making the total resources of the Fund something more than \$22,000,000, accumulated, for the most part, since March 1, 1917.

This is a large sum of money, and there seems to be an impression that, because of it, the Trustees could safely depart from their established rules and make the age allowance correspond with "the high cost of living." We have evidence, indeed, that such an impression does somewhat obtain, and we warn against it. Nothing could be more irrational. Nothing would be more certain to wreck the hopes of our clergy for succour in the time of their age or when their strength faileth. The treasury of the Pension Fund is not an alms-box; it is a trust that must be administered according to established actuarial findings in order to fulfill the definite contracts which the Fund has made not only for this present, but for far away futures. These large assets mean, in short, correspondingly large liabilities, and are simply the reserve, less a comparatively small surplus, which The Insurance Department of New York requires as a pledge that those liabilities shall certainly be fully discharged.

2. The gain to present day pensioners and their dependents by the Trustees' wise and judicious use of surplus income.

Of the 333 age allowances in force January 1, 1928, ninety-five had been increased from \$600. to \$750. a year, 76 to \$900. a year, and 17 to \$1000 a year. Thus more than one-half of all age allowances are now on the increased basis. On the same date there were 536 widows' pensions in force. Of this number 53 had been increased to \$400. a year, 42 to \$450. a year, and 29 to \$500. a year. Also 18 orphans' allowances have been raised to the full amount which previously were possible only for the orphaned children of clergymen ordained after March 1, 1917.

Furthermore, the resolution of the Trustees, Dec. 20, 1921, providing for the immediate payment of \$1000. to the widow of any clergyman whose pension assessments have all been paid and who dies in the active service of the Church or within six months of relinquishing his last active cure, providing that he has not already become a beneficiary of the Fund, has been renewed for the year 1928. Two such payments, we are able to report, have been made within this Diocese during the two years last past. Thus surplus income of the Fund is being wisely and providently used.

In all these benefits, we ask you to note, the Diocese of Missouri is enjoying its rightful share in the thirteen grants now in force. They are as follows:

To Clergy, 4	\$1,861.02
To widows, 9	2,800.00
Total annual payment	\$4,661.02

3. Is the gain of about \$1,000,000 in paid pension assessments, making a total of slightly more than \$1,100,000 for the year. And we rejoice to report that our Diocese contributed its full quota to

this amount and, consequently, is clear for 1927 on the pension books. There are assessment arrearages within the Diocese, however, that, we cannot but think, should somehow be paid. One parish, for example, is in arrearage, 1921-1924 inclusive, in the sum of \$479.27. Another, 1921-1923 inclusive, \$265.87. Another, 1917-1918, \$57.82. Another, 1922, \$4.70. A total of \$807.56 which constitutes a reproach to this great Diocese for which there seems to be no valid excuse, and which a proper regard for canonical obligation, not to speak of the obligation of debtor to creditor, on the part of the clergy and laity immediately concerned, would have avoided. Thus the pension status of five clergymen has been seriously affected—an affect that will follow them in their old age and be inherited by their dependents. We are constrained, therefore, to urge both our clergy and laity to recognize the pension obligation to the full and to honor it with due diligence and care. There is no reason, so far as we know, why every parish and mission should not give the pension assessment a foremost place in its budget and make remittance to us not later than the 25th of each month. Nor is there any reason why the clergy should not insist upon this as strictly as upon the prompt payment of their agreed upon respective salaries. It is a sorry thing to deprive old age of its rightful due, much more to dispossess widows and children of their lawful economic support. The pension is a game in which we all must play our respective necessary parts. An arrearage is a menace not only to the interests of the individual clergyman and the good name of his work, but to the integrity of the Fund. It is a group system, this Pension Fund, a whole of which our respective parishes are essential parts and in which we all stand or fall together. We are members one of another in every sense, but especially so in this. The withdrawal from, or the delinquency of any considerable number of parishes in the payment of assessments would wreck the whole structure and compel the Fund to liquidation.

Changes in the diocesan clergy personnel and salaries are frequent and require in every case an adjustment of the pension assessment thereto. We therefore ask that all such changes shall be promptly communicated to this Committee that the necessary adjustments may immediately be made. There is no reason why any other officer of the Diocese should be troubled with any pension interest that has been committed to our care.

We congratulate you, clergy and laity, even as we felicitate ourselves, upon the membership of this Diocese in the great Church Pension Fund. It is a great privilege and advantage. The accomplishments of this Fund are quite phenomenal. Its management is of unquestioned ability, probity and devotion to the Church's best interests, and is now generally accepted as the highest example of a true pension organization and efficiency. He who rides with our Pension Fund rides high.

The work of this Committee, we remind Convention, is "for our brethren and companions' sake." No reward, save that of being helpful, attaches thereto. It does involve, however, some expense for postage and stationery: \$16.35 for 1926-1927.

Concluding, we make grateful thanks to the Bishop, other clergy, and laity of the Diocese for their sympathetic co-operation, and especially to Mr. C. H. Middleton, a co-member, for his ever ready valuable service and support.

APPENDIX NO. 13.

Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to City Institutions for 1927.

Attached to this report will be found the statistical and financial summaries of the activities of the Mission for the year 1927. By far the largest item is salaries and represents the largest offering made to the community, which is personal service. Automobile expense makes a large total, but consultation of the speedometer proves it very reasonable. On a recent computation of expense covering thirty thousand miles the cost per mile worked out \$.0467. This included all expenses, taxes, insurance, fuel, etc., but did not include depreciation. Twelve thousand five hundred dollars of the income for the year was received from the Department of Missions, the rest was sums, generally for specific purposes, from the Christmas Appeal, the Woman's Auxiliary, Churches, and individuals, in the order named.

The statistics included in the report are related to our work in the city institutions only. What has been done by the various members of the staff in work that is not strictly within the scope of our labors would make a very respectable showing. Work with cooperating agencies, calls about town, distribution of gifts and contributions, talks, extra services, provision for special medical attention and clinical help, consultation with superintendents and wardens in regard to our people and equipment, and continual running around making collections of clothes and other commodities simply mean that to go one mile is only half of our Christian duty. We must go twain.

During the year several changes have been made in our staff. We have lost the services of Rev. J. Malcolm Taylor who did excellent work as assistant with a personal field in the City Hospital and Jail. Some relief in carrying the burden of Sunday services has come through adding as associate the Rev. P. B. Warner, who takes two Sunday morning services at Koch Hospital a month. The greatest aid, however, has come through the splendid and unselfish cooperation of the League of Lay Readers and several laymen not in the League, notably Mr. Cotsworth of Mt. Calvary, without whose help it would be impossible for us to hold the schedule of Sunday services we have at last obtained. It would be ungracious not to acknowledge in this connection the continued support of the two devoted laymen already on the staff, Mr. G. B. Jones of All Saints' Church and Mr. A. D. Pomeroy of St. John's.

The loss of Mr. Taylor made possible a change which accumulating experience began to dictate. A trained social worker was needed to give permanence and real helpfulness to our contacts, to assure the cooperation of secular agencies and city officials, and to suggest methods of work to diocesan and parochial organizations. A skillful case worker who had had considerable executive experience was what was needed. The need was generously met by the addition of Miss Helen K. Shipps to the City Mission Staff on the fifteenth of October. There is not space to tell of the many ways in which this step has justified itself, of the efficiency it has added to our work or of the added respect it has brought to the Mission in the city.

Deaconess Brainerd has continued her unique work among female delinquents. It is a task of peculiar difficulty, full of bitter disappointment, contrasted with splendid triumphs. The incident that stands out most clearly from her labors in the year was when, after many months of careful and prayerful preparation, she brought to Baptism six girls at the Meramec Hills Training School. It was a wonderfully solemn and beautiful occasion. There is much of her work that can never be told, because in the nature of the case in penal institutions advertisement is not in order.

The work of Miss Pearce, particularly at Koch Hospital, continues to be done with the same tireless energy, common sense and intense personal interest that has characterized all these years. When I think of this part of our wide field I do not think so much of Confirmation and Baptisms, though that would make an impressive story, as I do of an extraordinary appreciation of the function of a clergyman as a minister and servant of God and her alertness to find opportunities to do His work. I know my time will be well spent at Koch, because, before I begin my rounds, the ground has been thoroughly surveyed with wise and loving interest. I feel our mutual mastery of team play has been one of the finest achievements of the year, and the credit belongs to her.

In the colored field Miss Lorick has had a busy and profitable year. She prepared during the year twenty-one candidates for Confirmation whom Mr. Small duly presented. She has brought to Baptism the usual quota of new born babies at Hospital No. 2 and prepared a woman one hundred and six years old for Confirmation among her candidates. I deeply regret that I have not more time to spend among the gentle and kindly people who look so constantly to her for the things that make the sick-bed or declining years tolerable.

There are a number of institutions where the Superintendent is sole representative of the Mission. The Isolation Hospital with its multitude of little children is a regular playground. During the year my opportunities here have been vastly extended through the courtesy of Dr. Lohr and his fine staff. Bellefontaine Farms with its crowds of little boys always welcomes me with the eagerness that is never dissembled. The Workhouse and the Jail authorities have given us most flattering tokens of their confidence and good will. Since Miss Shipp's has come to us we have doubled our influence among the prisoners and their families, and the pastoral work among them has taken a definite character that without this trained cooperation it would completely lack. The great Sanitarium is always full of eager friends who are slowly learning that I am not there to help them to go home but to make tolerable and bright their world. There is no city institution which I do not visit on a regular schedule supplementing the work of the staff. There is no room to go into particulars and individual cases, but it is an exasperating, intriguing, driving, impossible, unutterably blessed work to which no man could ever be equal. What more can a man ask?

Mr. Small has been taking the pastoral work and the Communion for the white members of the Infirmary for several years. Of course they all love him and his work is beyond praise. Our old friend Mrs. O'Bannon still ministers here and a recent article in the Globe-Democrat proves that her kindness is recognized beyond our Church.

There is one institution where the work of the Episcopal City Mission is unsatisfactory. This is the City Hospital. Here we have

a constantly fluctuating body of patients. It is so big that somebody ought to go into it every day, because if visits are not frequently made a large percentage of the patients will not come in contact with the representative of the Church. As long as I retained Mr. Taylor on the staff we had a man there peculiarly adapted to this sort of work who divided all his time between the City Hospital and the Jail. During December and part of January I was able to obtain the services of Rev. Dwight Benton. The rest of the past year I have tried to carry this work in addition to the rest of the pastoral work in my field. I have given it a fair trial and find it is a task far beyond my strength. I can do a lot more work, but I cannot do any more work of this kind. I find that if I devote a half day to this institution in a week that the most that I can satisfactorily cover is a little over five divisions. This means I will get around to where I started in a little less than a month. By that time I am practically a stranger to the members of that division. New contacts have to be made and the temptation is, instead of bringing the warm personal interest of a servant of Jesus Christ, to make a meaningless parade out of the visitation. I, for one, cannot give myself out in one institution during the day and then go and face a situation like that without taking it out on myself and my family. It is not a question of time or physical energy, with which God has most graciously endowed me to a moderate degree, it is a question of nerves. I know myself well enough to realize that if I try indefinitely I will soon be looking for a parish. No man with my meagre equipment can stand it and I doubt if any man the Diocese is likely to get ought to try it.

In looking around to see how I could take on more work of a different character and so save money to put into the City Hospital, the only point I can see at present is Mr. Small's work at the Infirmary. Mr. Small has done such splendid work in this institution that only a pressing necessity would justify a change. However, it would be practicable for me to add his services and pastoral work to my schedule, because we have an efficient institutional worker there and because the membership of the Infirmary does not fluctuate greatly, so that a visit there a week would be satisfactory. My plan is now to release Mr. Small and to add a part-time worker to the staff for the City Hospital. She would look after our work there and report where the ministrations of a clergyman would be most needed. It is unsatisfactory, but it is the best plan I can think of without losing ground elsewhere. To give up the work of our social worker would be a loss too great to contemplate.

The next great step in the service of this community is to add to the staff a colored priest. I am more convinced than I was last year at this time that we have an opportunity here that is unique. Supposing him to be an intelligent energetic man with vision, he could relieve me of all the work in Hospital No. 2, the colored section of the Infirmary and about a third of the Jail work, and still have time to develop Bethany Mission, set up a Christian home where it would be much appreciated, and draw to himself many of those who come temporarily under our care and are then lost to the Christian Church. That would mean more time and care for City Hospital No. 1 and other points where my attention is sorely needed. I hope to go East in February for two weeks to learn something more of the methods of our Church in my line of work. And I hope that I can find a young man who will be attracted by this opportunity and will prepare himself for it until this generous Diocese can see its way to make it possible for him to come.

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I make not a word of complaint over the fact that it has seemed wise to cut our appropriation for this year. My experience has taught me that to spend money when we have every reason to believe somebody will sweat for it does not tend to recommend the missionary work of the Church to any one, especially a Church executive. I believe the Diocese of Missouri will give the City Mission all that pressing calls in other fields than ours justify, and I do not believe if we play the game in the City Mission you will refuse to do by us as well as you can. I am going to do the best I can to give the Church in the City the most efficient City Mission you feel you can afford to pay for. I do think, however, that it would tend to relieve the situation a great deal if the Diocese would authorize the starting of an endowment fund for this work. I believe that it would eventually attract the gifts of generous Church people who wanted to do something that would leave a blessing in the lives of the people in this great city. I know it would do so if they had any idea of the nature of our work.

This brings to my mind how beautifully and unselfishly we have been aided during the year by individuals and churches and cooperating organizations. I am afraid to begin to enumerate instances for fear I may seem to neglect others. Money and clothes and other comforts and personal services generous and free, parties and magazines and the great outpouring of our people at Christmas! How could I begin to enumerate what the Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew, the Girls' Friendly, the parishes, the Sunday Schools, the Needlework Guild and hundreds of individuals have done? That would be a larger report than this in itself. I will, however, just single out one thing as typical. When people like Miss Eleanor Schwarzer and Miss Williamson unselfishly put their talents at the Mission's disposal without fail every Sunday at some city institution organ, for the love of it, we have an example of devotion. This year has been very rich in instances of the sort. The Mission is offering wider opportunity for lay cooperation as instanced especially in the Lay Readers League, and more and more our splendid people respond. That it is good to be near the great heart of St. Louis I know is something that every member of the City Mission Staff would unite in saying, and we thank you for our privilege.

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APPENDIX NO. 14.

Woman's Auxiliary.

January 25th, 1928.

To the Rt. Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Convention:

I bring you greetings from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Missouri.

This past year, as in former years, The Woman's Auxiliary has actively increased the interest and united the efforts of all women of the Diocese in the Church's Mission in the Parish, in the Community, in the Diocese, in the Nation and in the World.

The Message with its eight objectives has strengthened spiritual understanding and through prayer and consecration there has been closer union in Parish effort.

Our Quarterly Meetings have been well attended. The May meeting was reported as having the largest attendance on record.

Our speakers coming from the five fields of work have been inspiring and helpful.

In January Rev. Elwood Haines, a missionary from Liberia gave us a most encouraging word picture of "Darkest Africa" growing lighter through Missionary efforts.

Bishop Johnson told us of the needs of St. Luke's, Valley Park, where Mr. and Mrs. Kopplin for years have been doing such splendid and persistent work. Our response was a Special pledge of seven hundred dollars for Valley Park.

In May we were privileged to hear the Rev. W. H. Zeigler, an Alaskan missionary, tell of the eagerness with which his ministrations were received—that the little meeting house was more than crowded by the Eskimos and Indians who faced a trip of many miles, with weather 40 degrees below zero, to receive the sacraments of the Church, especially those of marriage and baptism.

Our Diocesan speaker was Mr. Lester Martin from Missouri University who talked on The Student Work at Columbia, Mo. Wishing we could give thousands to this cause, we did what we could and gave a Special pledge of \$700.

In October we again had a speaker from the field of the Nation, Rev. Chas. W. Baker from the San Juan Hospital, Farmington, New Mexico. He showed us the Navajo Indian not only as superstitious, but also as industrious—a cunning worker in metals and textiles— anxious to improve his opportunities for his own and his people's betterment. Part of our Synod pledge goes to San Juan Mission.

In December the Board of Managers met for business and revision of the By-Law enabling the Woman's Auxiliary to acquire an Endowment Fund, only the interest of which may be used for Auxiliary purposes. Individuals or Branches giving one hundred dollars, may name their gift.

The Educational Department has had a busy and successful year. Beginning with a survey of Parishes, then a Speakers' Bureau

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was established. A central educational class meets the fourth Monday of the month at ten o'clock at St. George's Church for the study of "A Church Awake," Class leader Rev. B. J. Moore. The National Educational Conference was held in Racine, Wisconsin, late in September. It was a thrilling and happy experience to the President, the Diocesan Educational Secretary and the two Parish Secretaries who attended. The setting was ideal. There was a quiet calm and remoteness from the usual bustle of life. In these surroundings, the Church women who gathered from the Atlantic, the Pacific and the Gulf received inspiration and instruction from the trained leaders of the Auxiliary. This culminated in the outstanding event of the year's work, The Educational Institute, held for two days at St. George's Church by Miss Laura F. Boyer, Assistant National Educational Secretary. 190 women attended—17 Parishes were represented. Under the direction of the Devotional Secretary a Quiet Day was conducted in February at St. Michael and All Angels by the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D.D., Bishop of Eastern Carolina. It was a spiritual privilege long to be remembered.

No department of the Auxiliary has done more splendid work than The Supply Department. The very attractive dresses and other garments made by the proficient needle-women, with the hospital articles that are purchased and the personal boxes sent would be a joy for any one to receive. The boxes to Alaska merit special mention for the beauty of the work and their completeness. In all nine boxes were sent—5 personal, 3 hospital and the splendid one to Alaska. Garments have been made for the Orphan's Home, for the Workhouse, Jail and Meramec Hills. Besides this the Altar Section made Altar linens and vestments valued at \$285. These have been sent to a number of the clergy within and without the Diocese.

The Social Service work of the Woman's Auxiliary was created for the purpose of reaching out a helping hand and bringing brightness to many whose lives would otherwise be cheerless. The surprisingly large total of \$6,067. is the accumulation of many gifts. I wish it were possible to give an inkling of the splendid accomplishment of this Department. How faithful women gathering at St. Luke's Hospital every Thursday have made \$2,000 worth of surgical dressings for the hospital. How Prince of Peace has been aided. How all the Institutions under our City Missionary are helped not only at Christmas but throughout the year.

United Thank Offering Treasurer reports more women giving than ever before. Every parish in the Diocese with one exception has increased its offering compared with the corresponding time three years ago.

The aim for the United Thank Offering is **every woman giving** instead of a few giving largely. We have \$1,264.27 increase now over the 1925 offering.

The Church Periodical Club has sent regularly 148 magazines—distributed 442 books and about 10,000 magazines and cards.

It has a Traveling Library much appreciated in the out of town missions.

Our Corporate Gift is more than double the amount of last year. Mrs. Cushing, Custodian of the Corporate Gift Fund, has been throughout the Diocese working and making known its objects. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Missouri is proud to have Mrs. Burkham as their National Chairman, and it is through her work

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and Mrs. Cushing's that the Corporate Gift has reached the large amount that they have in hand.

APPENDIX NO. 17.

Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

January 2nd, 1928.

Reverend Father in God, Clergy and Lay Delegates to the 89th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

We believe the majority of the Church people of the Diocese have come to look upon the sponsoring of the Lenten noonday meetings as Brotherhood work, and we greatly appreciate their willing response to our requests for finances, etc., but there is another very important piece of work, which the Brotherhood has undertaken, and which does not seem to have been properly recognized by the average Church person. We refer to the summer camps, for the spiritual training and development of the boys and young men, so that they may become leaders in their respective parishes, and in the Diocese. The Philadelphia office of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew has established a permanent site, near Springfield, Missouri, known as Camp Tuttle, and this is equipped with the necessary paraphernalia for the conduct of the camp. Some of the Clergy have been to this camp and are conversant with it and are enthusiastic regarding its purpose, and we hope they will make a special effort to assist in the spreading of this information, so that everyone may know that this is really something worth while, and that the attendance may be up to capacity, each year.

The speakers at the noonday meetings, next Lent, are Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, D.D., Rev. Robert Norwood, D.D., Rev. Granville N. Williams, Rev. W. Russell Bowie, D.D., Rt. Rev. Wm. F. Faber, D.D., Rt. Rev. F. B. Howden, D.D., and the Very Rev. Wm. Scarlett, LL.D.

The various chapters of the Brotherhood are still assisting the City Missioner, on Sunday Afternoons, in the distribution of magazines, and getting the men down to the services, in the chapel.

We have made arrangements, at the St. Louis Lunchroom, 411 North Tenth Street, in the Kinloch Building, for a table, each Tuesday, at 12:15 P.M., as a meeting place for the men of the Church, regardless of whether or not they are members of the Brotherhood, so that they may have an opportunity of becoming better acquainted. No business of the Brotherhood is transacted at this table, and it is purely a social meeting place for men of the Church. All are welcome.

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APPENDIX NO. 18.

**Archdeacon's Report to the Eighty-Ninth Convention of the
Diocese of Missouri.**

The question is frequently asked me, "what do you do and what is your field of activity"? Perhaps the better to answer that question and to acquaint the members of this convention with the condition of the Parishes and Mission stations which from time to time come under my charge and observation, I am going to try to give you a picture of each point and leave it for you to draw your own conclusions.

For two years, practically the whole southeastern section of the Diocese was without a resident clergyman. We were faced with a critical situation, but the loyalty of the laymen and women at the points in this section, with the ministrations that I was able to give and with the assistance of a very efficient Lay Reader at Cape Girardeau, we held the field without any appreciable drift or loss of interest.

When we had the opportunity to appoint resident pastors at Poplar Bluff and Cape Girardeau, there was a ready response on the part of the congregations to shoulder a large part of the financial burden, thus relieving the diocese of responsibilities which it had hitherto carried.

Mr. Maples who was appointed Lay Reader in charge of Poplar Bluff, Ironton and De Soto in January of 1927, found a responsive group of people and the records of the past year will show that under his able leadership there has been advancement in all phases of church life in that group. Mr. Maples told me just after the Annual meetings at these places that the budgets for 1928 were assured. Each member of this group returned 100% on the Church Program for 1927. Now that Mr. Maples has been advanced to the Priesthood we look forward to a healthy growth in numbers and community interest and leadership.

Rev. Mr. Lathrop who became resident pastor of the group centering at Cape Girardeau, with mission stations at Illmo, Chaffee and Bloomfield, found in my judgment, one of the most loyal and devoted groups of Church folk in Rural Missouri. I say this not in disparagement of any other group, but because during all the time they were without a rector, I never heard one note of complaint or pessimism. On the coming of Mr. Lathrop a goodly sum of money was expended to put the rectory into comfortable shape, for his living quarters on the second floor and accommodations for parish activities on the ground floor. In the face of this heavy expenditure, 100% was returned for the Church Program. This section of Missouri will in the future be one of the great agricultural sections of the State and our Church is ready to meet the needs with its program of community interest and welfare.

In the Lead Belt, we are ministering at only two points, Herculaneum and Bonne Terre.

Herculaneum has been served by Miss Lucy Pepoon who came to us after Deaconess Sniffen was compelled to resign on account of

illness. Services have been held regularly by the General Missionary and the Archdeacon. The Sunday School was held each week and a general service rendered during the week by the worker as opportunity presented. Miss Pepon was obliged to resign her work at the close of the year. We wonder sometimes whether we ought to continue with a resident worker at Herculaneum, in view of the movement from the town, which is due to the uncertainty of employment at the smelter, which is the only means of livelihood for the people of the community. Row upon row of vacant houses are seen and the young people are moving to the city in numbers. Perhaps more responsibility placed in the hands of the people with such assistance as the Archdeacon and General Missionary may render might be the next step here.

Bonne Terre is the official centre of the St. Joe Lead Co. We have a very devoted and enthusiastic group here. We tried to conduct a Church school for the children of foreign group of Lead employees and were successful for a time but the coming of a Priest of their own Church, removed the opportunity for us to minister to them. However they show a friendly attitude toward us.

St. Charles, Trinity, which at one time had a flourishing congregation, has decreased to almost a handful of people. Lindenwood College is located in this city and a limited opportunity is given to minister to the young women of our own Church and others who have no church affiliation. Services are held regularly by Lay Readers and the Archdeacon.

Mexico has been without a rector for over a year. We were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. William Decker, Jr. who conducts Lay Services each Sunday. I cannot speak too highly of the service which Mr. Decker has rendered the past year. I have been going once each month to Mexico for the service of Holy Communion and have been gratified at the response from the students at the two schools in the city. There are more students attending our services than any other held in Mexico. Last Sunday by actual count there were 71 boys from the Military School and 22 young women from Hardin College. This is not an exceptional Sunday but an average one. Surely it is a great privilege for the Church to minister to these students. I wish we had more devout Laymen of Mr. Decker's ability and enthusiasm who would offer their services for such opportunities.

I have gone occasionally for the service of Holy Communion to Fulton and Fredericktown. These two points are perhaps the most difficult in the whole mission field because we have so few communicants and are out of the way to such an extent that there are no other points with which they might be grouped. The situation at Fulton is such that those communicants who are there have recommended that we dispose of the property and give them such ministration as is possible and with such facilities as they may place at our disposal.

It is almost impossible to visualize for you the Diocese of Missouri outside of the city of St. Louis so that I might make plain to you that we have in effect a missionary problem that is just as pressing as any missionary jurisdiction in the Church. There is no longer virgin soil in Missouri to attract any large increase in population; every small town and city is competing with one another for industry and a pay roll. I think we must realize that we cannot expect the same degree of growth in the small towns and cities as we have in the See City. We must also realize that every movement cityward

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takes a toll from the smaller places and increases the strength of the city parish. Therefore, it seems to me that the interest of our city parishes ought to increase rather than decrease in what we call our Rural work. As the State is giving more of its interest and financial backing to the building up of those things that make for better living in the out of the way places, so it seems to me, should the Church whose sole interest is the building up of manhood and womanhood, support the leadership and loyalty of those her servants who are serving her in her Mission field.

APPENDIX NO. 19.

Report of the President of the Orphans' Home

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1927.

The Episcopal Orphans' Home has 72 children in it. This represents the capacity of the Home for intelligent care. There are 12 babies, 24 little boys, and 36 girls which are divided into two more groups.

It is the aim of the Home to help neglected children, thus providing care and shelter and affording an opportunity to go to school which is the all important factor. In doing this it often gives a Mother or in some cases a Mother and Father the opportunity of working and bringing about the reunion of the family. This is of prime importance.

We have very few "whole orphans;" they seem to have nearly passed out of existence. In fact a recent survey showed only 5% of the children cared for in institutions were "whole orphans." A larger percentage of half orphans but most of our cases are children of deserted mothers.

When these applications for admittance are made they are cleared through the Social Service Exchange. Thus we get all the

available information as to any other institutions to which they may have applied for admission, and anything else they may know of the case. Then our own Admission Committee investigates as far as it can and the case is brought before the Board unless it is an emergency.

When the child is accepted he has to pass a physical examination before he enters. But right here I would like to say that we encounter great difficulty for many of these children are under-nourished and have other physical disabilities that do not manifest themselves until later, when they become a serious problem and often a menace to the Home.

In December a little boy died who was taken into the Home very much neglected and under-nourished. The doctor said his tonsils would have to come out but that he would have to be built up first. The little fellow couldn't throw off the poison he was absorbing fast enough and he died of septic pneumonia.

We are very appreciative and very grateful to Dr. Riley of the Bethesda Hospital and to St. Luke's Clinic for all they have done for us.

It seems to me that our greatest need just now is to have a full-time paid Social Service worker. There is some very interesting data on that subject to be found based upon the experience of other institutions. Such a worker could follow up all of our cases, keep in touch with their families, make all investigations, and take the children to the clinic for treatments and examinations. But it would cost \$125.00 per month. This would be a fine piece of Social Service work.

During the year we have instituted a budget which, of course, is only a tentative one until a year's existence proves it to be a working one. It will certainly prevent "leaks" or at least show us where they are.

We also had a survey made by the Child Welfare League of America, because they included us, along with 85 other Child Placing Agencies and Institutions, in a request for one. This survey was financed largely by the Community Council. Our report together with the recommendations has not come to us as yet.

We have a new Superintendent, Mrs. Jean Barron Hurlbut, who came to us in October, and we feel that she is going to make a splendid head for the Home. Mrs. Hurlbut has shown a keener and a more intelligent love and understanding of the children than anyone who has been connected with the Home for some time.

This is not a financial report but I thought it would be interesting to know that our per capita cost is \$0.837 a day for both Homes. This includes all overhead expense but not depreciation on the property.

We are greatly indebted to the Episcopal Churches of this Diocese for the help they have given us in making some of our children's clothes.

Arthur Brittain Hall, the adjunct Home for boys from the ages of 12 to 18 years, cares for an average of 17 boys. It is under the able direction of Miss Julia M. Upshaw; and they are living within their budget.
