

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Tuesday, May 17th, 1892.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention, by virtue of authority in said Article contained, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese having changed the date of holding the Convention from the fourth Tuesday to the third Tuesday in May.

At 10 o'clock A. M., the clergy, preceded by the choir of the Cathedral, entered the Cathedral singing as a processional, the 202d hymn, "The Church's One Foundation," when the regular service was held.

The opening sentences and services to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. F. E. Alleyne, of St. Mark's Church, Portland, Callaway County, Mo.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. Wm. Greer, of North Conway, N. H.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. F. E. McManus, of St. Paul's Church, St. Louis.

The Commandments were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. E. F. Berkley, D. D., of St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Very Rev. the Dean of the Cathedral.

The Rev. John Davis, of Trinity Church, Hannibal, Mo., then preached the Convention Sermon, taking for his text, the 46th and 47th verses of the 5th Chapter of St. John.

Offertory sentences were read, and notices delivered by the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Senior Assistant of the Cathedral.

The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

After the benediction, the clergy and choir retired to the Chapel singing, as a recessional, the hymn: "Guide me, oh thou Great Jehovah."

On reassembling in the Chapel of the Cathedral, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order, and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded, under the direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-three clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then appointed the Rev. Messrs. W. A. Hatch, K. M. Deane and F. E. McManus Committee on Lay Credentials.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that the Treasurer of the Diocese was present to receive and receipt for all moneys due and payable to him.

The Committee on Lay Credentials reported that Credentials in regular form had been presented from twenty-four Parishes, and Delegates from the same were duly entitled to seats; and, upon the call of the roll by the Secretary, Delegates from nineteen Parishes answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced a quorum of both Orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

On motion of the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., Mr. John R. Triplett, of St. Louis, was re-elected Secretary, with power to appoint his assistant.

The Secretary appointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, his assistant.

On motion of the Rev. B. E. Reed, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

The cards of Rev. John W. Birchmore, of Independence, Mo., and Rev. Wm. Greer, of North Conway, N. H., were handed to the Secretary.

On motion of the Rev. S. H. Green, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order for this Convention.

On motion of Mr. T. K. Skinker, of St. Louis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine worship, at 9 o'clock, and for business, from 10 to 12:30 P. M., when it will take a recess to 2 P. M., and continue until 5:30 P. M.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his Annual Address, which, with his list of Episcopal Acts, was laid upon the Secretary's table.

The Committee on Lay Credentials made a supplemental report to the effect that St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis; St. Matthew's Mission, St. Louis, and Epiphany Mission, St. Louis, were entitled to representation, and, upon the call of the roll, Messrs. T. W. Seymour and Henry Harrington answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee the Rev. C. M. Davis, Rev. Wm. Elmer and Mr. Henry Wood, of Rolla, Mo.

The Rev. R. A. Holland, S. T. D., asked the privilege of making a statement, waiting upon some one else to offer a resolution following his statement. Privilege being extended, the Rev. Dr. Holland expressed his wish that the Convention would take some action changing the assessment on St. George's Church, for the past year, from \$750 to \$500.

Whereupon, on motion of Mr. C. S. Freeborn, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That \$250 of the assessment of St. George's Church, St. Louis, made at the last Convention, be remitted.

On motion of the Rev. B. E. Reed, of Mt. Calvary Church, St. Louis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be given to the Rev. John Davis for his able and interesting sermon preached at the opening of this Convention.

The Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, appointed at the last Convention, to report to this Convention, presented their report, same laying over under the Canon for one day, and on motion same was made the special order for 11 o'clock, Wednesday.

The Rev. S. H. Green, Chairman of the Committee on Christian Education, announced that the Committee would be ready to make their report to-morrow morning.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes, the Rev. C. G. Davis, Rev. S. H. Green, and Mr. Harry C. Scheetz, stating that he would announce a full list of Standing Committees to-morrow morning.

"Section 2. Any Parish desiring to change the location of its Church building, or to establish a Mission, or a Chapel in connection with its Parish work, shall make written application to the Bishop for permission to do so, stating distinctly the object and location proposed."

That present Section 2 of said Canon X. be made Section 3, and that the word "application," in the first line of said section, be amended by making it plural. That after the word "application," in the first line, the following be inserted: "as are named in Sections 1 and 2." That the word "their," in the second line of said section, be changed to "the." That after the word "judgment," at the end of the second line, the following words be inserted: "of the Bishop and Standing Committee." That the word "they," in the

third line of said section, be stricken out and the following words be inserted in lieu thereof: "the Bishop and Standing Committee." That all of the section after the word "will," in the ninth line of said section, be stricken out, and in lieu thereof, insert the following: "proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable Church building, within two years from the date of such requirement."

That "Section 3 be changed to Section 4," and after the word "application," in the first line of said section, the following be inserted: "mentioned in Section 1 of this Canon."

That "Section 6 be amended to read Section 5," and that after the word "worship," in the fourth line on the sixteenth page, the following be inserted: "except under and subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Canon."

That "Section 4 be amended to read Section 6," and after the word "Bishop," at the end of the second line of said section, the following words be inserted: "at least twenty days before the meeting of the Convention." That the word "laid," in the sixth line of said section, be stricken out, and the word "referred" inserted in its stead. That after the word "Bishop," in the sixth line of said section, the following be inserted: "to the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," and that the words "before the next regular Convention," beginning in the sixth line and ending in the seventh line of said section, be stricken out. That the following words in the eighth and ninth lines of said section be stricken out: "The Convention shall then pass upon said application," and insert in lieu thereof the following: "said committee shall duly consider the same, and report their action thereon to the Bishop and Secretary of the Convention, at least five days before the next regular meeting thereof; said application, together with the report thereon, shall be submitted (for action) immediately after the organization of the Convention."

That "Section 5 be amended to read Section 7."

CANON XXIV.

Section 15 was amended as reported by the committee as follows: By inserting between the word "may," and the word "be," in the first line of said section, the following words: "be present in person and."

On vote of the House, the report of the committee was then adopted, and the Canons as amended, and adopted section by section, were then adopted as a whole.

On motion of the Rev. F. B. Scheetz, the Rules of Order were amended so as to make one Committee of the two Committees now known as Committee on Lay Credentials and Committee on Admission of New Parishes.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

FIFTY-THIRD CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

The Diocese is a family. In family reunion we gather, to report our doings, to plan our duties, to recount our losses, to tell our trials, to whisper our hopes and to renew our courage. Never unmindful, though, of the larger families to which we belong, the National Church, and the Catholic Church Militant; or of the other two to which we hope to belong, the Church Expectant and the Church Triumphant.

In our immediate household there has been no loss from the list of the Clergy by death. Though at the doors of many homes of their people, throughout the Diocese, he has knocked and entered and borne away loved and lamented ones. And in New Orleans, at the age of 84, on April 2d, died Rev. Chaplin S. Hedges, D. D., the last remaining of those who were members of the Primary Convention of this Diocese in 1840.

In our American Church four Bishops have been taken hence.

Bishop Bedell, of Ohio, served in an active Episcopate of thirty years. In zeal for the cause of Missions, in fervor as a preacher, and in loving earnestness as a shepherd of souls, he was unsurpassed. He retired in 1889, and for the last three years of his life had been patiently and prayerfully, in his sick room, awaiting the coming of his Lord.

Bishop Boone was born in China. His father, the elder Boone, was Bishop in China for twenty years from 1844. Four sons of Bishops have become themselves Bishops in our American history, Boone, Doane, Elliott and Potter. Our brother, the son, worked faithfully in China as Bishop for seven years. Then in the forenoon of his earthly life he sank to his rest in the interesting and wonderful land of his birth. May the Great Head of the

Church inspire our representatives of the approaching General Convention to fill promptly and to the full the ranks of our working Missionary Episcopate!

Bishop Knight, of Milwaukee, served but a short time,—as earth counts time,—two years. But into them he threw such diligence, warmth, fidelity and untiringness, as made his service, in other count than that of time and earth, great and successful.

Bishop Galleher, of Louisiana, had been a soldier in the field. His eleven years of a Bishop's active life were those of soldierly fidelity and courage, and his year of suffering towards the last was endured with a soldier's fortitude.

Taking the larger outlook, of the 145 Bishops who were in the Lambeth Conference of 1888, fourteen have died. During the last year our Mother Church of England has lost two of these, who were distinguished. Bishop Harold Browne, who in the Dioceses successively of Ely and Winchester ruled for twenty-six years, and then retiring rested for a year, ere at the age of four score he died; and Bishop Harvey Goodwin, of Carlisle, who was Bishop for twenty-three years. Both were active and interested chieftains in the Lambeth Conference, the Bishop of Winchester eminent for theological erudition, and the Bishop of Carlisle for logical power and masculine robustness of intellect.

Turning to our own Diocese, it may not be amiss to note our losses and wants.

And, first, I grieve to say that the necessity has been forced upon us to give up St. James' Military Academy, Macon, as a Church School. We found expenditures outrunning income, and were without resources to fall back upon, and so in honesty and prudence deemed it best to stop while we could fully meet all current obligations. Good work has been done for the Diocese and the Church in and by the School. For this let us be glad and grateful. The late Head Master, Col. Blees, with a local Board of Macon Trustees, still continues the School, and we heartily wish him success. The Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund and the Trustees of the Theological Education Fund of the Diocese of West Missouri hold the first mortgage upon the real estate, though, to avoid any difficulties that might arise, my "Bishop's Purse" has bought and holds a small prior claim of \$300.

In St. Louis, as I suppose in all great cities, the flux of population brings to the fore perplexing problems in the conduct of the evangelizing work of the Church. An important part of her mission, as Christ's visible representative on earth, animated and guided by God the Holy Spirit, is to the needy and neglected, the ignorant and wicked, the body sick and sin sick sons of men. Souls in poorhouses, workhouses, reformatories, refuges, penitentiaries, jails and asylums, she ought to look after. Souls and bodies in unfashionable quarters, in despised quarters, in unwholesomely crowded quarters of the city, she should also look after. Now "she" means, practically, the minister for the leader, the church building for shelter and center of ministrations, and the people for helpers. How, in such regions, shall these be had and kept and sustained? I can think of only three ways of sustentation. 1.

These and such like Churches are all in the unfashionable, the humble, the neglected, the poor regions for residence of their respective cities. If these and such like Churches are to be kept in their places and to their beneficent work, it is evident that they must be, partially at least, endowed. 3. That the strong take upon themselves to bear the infirmities of the weak. When conscience is aroused and duty is grappled with, this seems to be mainly the method in American cities. By Mission Churches supported by the stronger Parishes, or by City Missions organized and operating, the obligation recognized by all thoughtful Christians is attempted to be discharged. In St. Louis our St. Stephen's Mission indicates the outworking of this sense of obligation.

In this flux of population and these changes of desirability for residence in sections of our city, may I, as one who, from his vows of spiritual duty must look upon and look after the entire field, appeal for a large and loving forbearance towards each other amongst you all? Rectors and Vestries are harassed in keeping together enough of a band of financial supporters to meet the necessary responsibilities imposed by parochial life. It is no wonder that acute sensitiveness touching changes is engendered, and that the sore stress and strain of parochial needs weaken the heart and dull the vision toward important interests beyond. May I beg to put in a plea for lenient judgment upon such Rectors and Vestries? Put yourself in their place, where every turn is met by an assailing need, and every retreat discovers a failing supply, and bethink yourself how you would bear it, ere you call them selfish. narrow, congregationalists, unchurchlike, ungenerous. May I plead also with the Rectors and Vestries that God's way of spiritual finance is not the same with man's way of business finance? Look to your own business, and mind your own business, and do not meddle with other people's business, is man's way of business. And rightly so. But God's way of spiritual duty is, "Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others," and God's way means, holding as He does in His hand the hearts and consciences of men, that if any Parish, however harassed, steadfastly insists on praying and doing and giving for Missions and outside objects, He will touch springs and open sources unknown, to the happy sustentation of its own parochial life. Dear brethren, personally I sympathize from the heart with your parochial distractions, perplexities, anxieties. But as your Bishop I must humbly avouch that if you allow these to chill your love for others beyond, and to cloud your outlook of kindly interest, and to paralyze your

hand of outreaching helpfulness, you are wronging your own souls, and sapping the best life of your own spiritual household.

Our St. Stephen's Mission has manifested an earnest and vigorous life in the last twelve month. There is a most faithful pastor, a large Sunday School, an excellent Sewing School, frequent services, and twenty have been confirmed. But, I regret to say, our fund for a suitable building has not much grown. I have long been appealing for \$15,000. Only \$5,500 have been given, including the legacy of \$2,000, of the late Mr. Pye, which has been paid in. And yet the work sorely needs the good shelter, the wholesome ventilation, the promotion of order and the uplifting of reverence, that suitable housing would give it. The present stuffy rooms, old shops as they are, will, I fear, through the summer months, test the physical endurance of the workers to a distressing degree. I am constrained to cry aloud urgently for the remaining \$10,000 for building the Mission House that we need.

It grieves me to think that the gifts from the "Missionary Host" may fall off this year. The Treasurer tells me he is not receiving as large amounts as he has been accustomed to heretofore. I do earnestly hope that at the Annual Celebration next Sunday afternoon my forebodings may be falsified. The Missionary Host is the strong right arm on which I lean for keeping the work of St. Stephen's Mission in vigor. The current expenses, such as rent, sexton's wages, charity allowance, etc., are entirely met by the gifts of the children of the Missionary Host. There would be sore distress in trying to go on with St. Stephen's, without the help of the Missionary Host. And there would be greater sore distress in being obliged to give St. Stephen's up. O, Rectors and Superintendents and teachers and children, I beg you, do not let the gifts and help of the Missionary Host fail or falter, as you would not strike down the Bishop's right arm in doing his work.

The Sisters have been enabled to settle the difficulties besetting their property of the "School of the Good Shepherd," but only by borrowing \$30,000 to clear up all the engagements made touching payments on said property. Now, therefore, they must pay an interest charge of \$1,800 per year, besides taxes and insurance. Here again I most heartily wish that relief from the burden lying on their shoulders might come, for the Sisters' work is of great importance and value to the best interests of the Diocese and the Church.

We have not had enough in hand to help as we ought the Aged and Infirm Clergy. This matter will be brought by the Trustees to the notice of the Convention. In this connection I take occasion again to commend the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society as the best Association, in my judgment, for securing pensions to the Aged Clergy. The dues are one dollar per month, and every annuitant who has been a member for five years and is sixty years of age is paid a dividend. Two ladies of the Diocese through me are paying the dues for two of our Missionary Clergymen. I myself have for a long time been a member of the Society, and would be happy to know that many or all of the Clergy, through the kind help of friends to pay the dues, if necessary, are also members.

I desire to make a report about our Diocesan paper, the Church News, which is not altogether satisfactory. In managing the printing and publishing of the paper, the Rev. Mr. Miller and myself after much inquiry and examination decided to put these matters in the hands of the "Grocer Publishing Co." The Company demanded in the contract that we should guarantee from subscription receipts \$850 of income for the year from March 1, 1891; they to solicit advertisements and to receive \$100 per month for printing, publishing and mailing; any surplus of income over \$1,200 per year to be divided between them and us, one-half to each. At the end of the year they had paid out \$38.60 more than they had received. They met the deficiency and said nothing. We had received only \$712.26 for subscriptions. On March 1, 1892, I gave the Company my personal cheque for the \$137.74, due them on the terms of the contract. Knowing of no better course to pursue, we renewed the contract for another year. Of the last sum mentioned, \$37.74 have been repaid to me from various sources. Considering that the Church News is sent to the Clergy officially, and is the medium for Diocesan advertising and information, as, for instance, in the list of Bishop's appointments and the reports of the different Treasurers of the funds of the Diocese, I beg leave frankly to ask of the Convention, if on examination it is deemed just and right, to make good to the Bishop the remaining deficiency of \$100; and also to advise, if there be any more efficient way of adding to the subscription list of the paper, or any cheaper way of printing and publishing it.

The Confirmations this year have been only 431 against 514 for last year. I do not think this a gratifying statement, though I profess myself far from deeming the number of Confirmees to be the one test of the growth of a Diocese, or the faithfulness of a pastorship. Doubtless the interruption of regular parochial life in St. George's, St. Louis, forced by the calamity of fire, and the fact that the visitations of St. John's and the Church of the Good Shepherd did not fall within the Conventional year, account for the diminution in the numbers reported.

We have eleven young men preparing for the Holy Ministry. Two are at the General Theological Seminary, two at Hoffman Hall, Nashville, one at Nashotah, one at Faribault, one at Trinity College, one at Yale College, one at Lexington, Va., and two are studying privately in St. Louis. Seven of them are obliged to look to the Bishop as their friend and father for help. For these the sum of \$1,000 was needed this year. I am sorry to record that the collections on the Third Sunday in Advent brought little more than \$200. Besides, one person in the Diocese has generously given \$250. There seemed nothing left to do but to fall back upon the "Bishop's Purse," which has paid \$558.85.

We have lost one Parish out of Existence, the Church of the Advent, St. Louis. The fabric was sold to a colored congregation of Presbyterians. The sale was advised by the Rector and Vestry and reluctantly acquiesced in by the Bishop. The net proceeds of the sale have been applied to the help of the new St. Andrew's. This was a wise and good use of them, though it is a

sad thing to extinguish a Parish, for St. Louis, to judge by other cities, has in it too few rather than too many of our Churches.

But it is time to cease counting losses, and to call up thanks for gains.

The Orphans' Home is in healthy financial condition. This I can vouch for, having inspected the late Annual Report of its Treasurer. Under the direction of the zealous women who constitute its Board of Managers, it is prepared to extend its hand of helpfulness wherever there are orphan children needing it. In the Diocese of Missouri, and, I am allowed to add, in the Diocese of West Missouri, if the Clergy know of any orphans who need the care of the Home, let them advise with me or the Secretary, Mrs. Edwin Harrison.

The Woman's Auxiliary is delightfully alive. Its heart is warm, its aims are right, its feet and hands are busy, its benefactions are gratifyingly distributive and Catholic. It is a helper, it is a student, it is a teacher, it is a worker, it is a blessed right hand, in support of Missions. Its gifts sum up about \$6,100.00 this year, over \$2,500 in boxes, and \$3,500 in money; and the interest and love and sympathy accompanying multiply them four fold.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew of the United States and of Canada met with us last October. Its Convention stirred us to the depths as almost nothing else human has done, and it has left behind it in the local Brotherhood of St. Louis a strong current of bright hopes, good works and kind deeds outflowing in a way that makes me devoutly thankful.

The "Bishop's Purse" has received and disbursed \$3,600, one thousand dollars more than last year, and within four hundred dollars of the amount that was wont to be given when the Diocese comprised the whole State. I am warmly grateful to the givers, and I venture to assure them that if they could know the emergencies happily met and the urgent needs opportunely relieved by this "Purse," a glow of pleasure would fill their hearts for the evident good done.

Our vacant Rectorships and Pastorships are gratifyingly few. They are only Afton, Canton, Kirksville, La Plata, Macon, Shelbina and St. Charles. And even of these, Macon is taking active measures to fill its Rectorship, and St. Charles has a most faithful and efficient lay reader. Really, therefore, only five places in the Diocese are pastorless, and in two of these vigorous Sunday Schools are kept up. Never since I knew it has the Diocese been so near being completely supplied with active resident pastors.

Eighteen outside towns I have been enabled to visit during the year;—Bonne Terre, Centralia, Clarence, Dexter, Farmington, Fulton, Glenwood, Hunnewell, Huntsville, Jackson, Jefferson Barracks, La Belle, Poplar Bluff, Salem, Steelville, Sullivan, Vandalia and Wentzville. Scattered church folk are in these and many other such towns. It is a pleasure to me to meet them. It is a comfort and help to them to have the Prayer Book services.

A year ago I was appealing for help to build St Mary's, Shrewsbury. We built the Church, and a pretty one it is, at a cost of \$2,700. Generously \$1,500 were sent in to me, and I borrowed \$1,200, the interest upon which the

Mr. Sterling, of Old Orchard, kindly has charge of the new work, and its aspect is promising. With the Shrewsbury Church six other new churches are to be reported. St. George's, St. Louis, embodying in the new tasteful structure the stones and even some of the beams of the old fire-swept church; Trinity, St. James, cared for by the veteran missionary, Rev. Wm. Johnson, who has been in orders for more than fifty-six years; St. Stephen's, Ferguson, which in its developing strength sturdily gets on without any Missionary stipend; Grace, Crystal City, a beautiful stone church built by the "Crystal Plate Glass Co.," and turned over to the Bishop for use, and served by its own pastor, Rev. Samuel Mills, whom the St. Andrew's Brotherhood of St. Louis generously helped me to procure; St. Matthew's, St. Louis, the building having been just purchased from the Methodists by this growing Mission; and St. Andrew's, St. Louis, built under the self-denying leadership of the Rev. K. M. Deane, and under the guidance and favoring auspices of the Rector and people of the Church of the Holy Communion, and helped by the legacy bequeathed by the deceased Church of the Advent. This last new Church, St. Andrew's, just entered and occupied, is without one penny of debt upon it. I desire to pause to give opportunity to take in for relish the delicious flavor of that simple fact. Its total cost has been \$11,412.78, of which \$4,326.50 came from the sale of the Church of the Advent, so that over seven thousand dollars have been raised and paid by this new Parish. Ascension, St. Louis, in its vigorous youth has been compelled to enlarge its structure a second time because of its growing congregation. Epiphany, St. Louis, now worshipping in a hall, is busied with prospects and plans for building a church. St. Thomas', St. Louis, is the Mission of the Deaf Mutes, and a more faithful and loving pastor than their Deaf Mute Deacon, the Rev. J. H. Cloud, cannot, I think, anywhere be found. I have confirmed nineteen presented by him. St. Paul's, St. Louis, in a spirit of honorable cheerfulness has relinquished its missionary stipend and placed itself in the column of selfsupporting Parishes. All Saints', St. Louis, our colored Church, is bright and hopeful, for one reason because the Woman's Auxiliary, by the systematic gathering of subscriptions of fifty cents per month, has given it \$1,000 this year towards reducing its debt. That debt is now \$7,000, instead of the \$9,000, which existed when the Woman's Auxiliary generously organized its steady campaign against it. May that beneficent campaign be pushed unintermittingly on, is my fervent wish, till victory over that harassing debt is won! Two new Parishes of St. Louis, the Church of the Redeemer, and St. Andrew's, will doubtless apply for admission into union with this Convention. Besides this growth in organizations, the ordination of four deacons is a most substantial addition to our ministerial force. In their respective places they are doing steadfastly such good work as makes the heart of their Bishop profoundly glad and grateful; Brennan, at Louisiana; Arthur, at Cape Girardeau; Tudor, at Ferguson; and Alleyne, at Portland.

Now congratulations are in order. We are ready to extend them. We are ready to receive them. Money given, organizations forming, Churches building, men working, justify the readiness.

But after the huzzas are over I am sure you will pardon me if I indulge myself in saying somewhat supplementary about Missions. You will bear with the acute sensitiveness of an old Missionary Bishop in examining closely the escutcheon of the Diocese touching the honorable duty of giving and working for Missions.

The Great Missionary Society of the Church is the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society with its rented headquarters at present at 22 Bible House, N. Y., though with great thankfulness we note that it is soon to have a good Mission House of its own. It pays our Missionary Bishops, sustains our Missionary work in the Far West, and supports our Foreign Missions in China, and Japan, and Africa. In many of the feebler Dioceses it also helps. It makes a grant of \$500 per year to us of Missouri. Now, first and foremost, we ought to esteem it an honor to do each one something in sustentation of that work. What are the Parishes doing? We have 54 Parishes and Mission Stations. Looking through the acknowledgments in the Spirit of Missions for a year, I find that seven of our Parishes and Missions have not given to the great Missionary Society. Among the seven I regret to see Cuba, Prairieville and St. James. Scrutinizing closely I find that, in the case of many Parishes, it is the Sunday School which has generously given its Lenten offerings, and the Parish itself has not given anything more. This does not seem to me right. Each and every Parish ought every year, I think, to give at least one offering each to Domestic Missions and to Foreign Missions. How can we please the Lord if neglecting such plain duty? In the summing up for the year at 22 Bible House last Autumn I find that Missouri gave \$2,259.70, and stands in the order of amount given twenty-third in the list of fifty-two Dioceses. She is a little more than half way up the line. Minnesota gave \$2,276.19, and so was about sixteen dollars ahead of us. But if Parishes and men and women of Missouri, as well as the dear children, would think for help of the great Missionary Society, our Diocese would not see twenty-two others ahead of her, and among them Central Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Minnesota, New Hampshire, Oregon, Ohio and Southern Ohio. The work is grand. It needs enthusiasm. It needs supplies. It needs loving loyalty in the heart and staunch fidelity all along the line. Four Missionary Bishoprics are vacant. Alaska, Oklahoma, China and Japan. Again I say, may the coming General Convention, for which you prepare in this Convention by carefully selecting your deputies, take all pains to fill these Bishoprics full!

In addition I may be suffered to plead for Diocesan Missions. Practically the money pledged for our Diocesan Missions and put into the hands of the Board for Diocesan Missions makes quite the difference between Diocesan work healthfully promoted and Diocesan work disastrously falling to pieces. St. Stephen's Mission is the vicarious work for the poor that the West End of St. Louis wants to do in the East End; and St. Stephen's Mission draws \$1,200 per year from the Diocesan Board, and cannot live without it, not having in itself elements of self sustentation. The Cathedral is doing a deal of missionary work, and will always be called upon to do a deal of missionary work among the poor crowded around it. Recognizing this the Board has

appropriated \$250 per year towards the salary of one of its assistant ministers. The laymen of the Cathedral Chapter objected to receiving this grant. But the Bishop urged that it was right to make it and take it, for that the Cathedral represents the Diocese, and the Diocese wants to do missionary work among the neglected folk in the environs of the Cathedral. Then the laymen yielded and simply added the \$250, which they were voting for salary of the assistant to their pledge to the Convention for Diocesan Missions, making it \$1,250 from the Cathedral where otherwise it would have been as before, \$1,000. All Saints' draws \$500 from the Board. I am sure we all want to stand faithfully and generously by our colored brethren. One thousand dollars more are needed in St. Louis, City and County, where the strong will want to hold up the hands of the weak. Then in many a Country Parish the amount of stipend granted by the Board of Diocesan Missions is the only thing, humanly speaking, that saves it from a vacancy in the Pastorship and a disintegration of the Congregation. Is it a wonder that, charged as I am with the oversight of these varying interests and these urgent needs, I should implore you all, as with tears, Clergy and laymen and women, that you earnestly remember before God, in your prayers, with your love and sympathy, by your gifts and help, this important work of Diocesan Missions? Fortresses are manned; do not dismantle and desert them. The march is forward; do not command a halt. Souls outside your own pews and your own homes out reach beseechingly for succor; even in the pinching of your own parochial straitnesses do not turn your back on such pleading. Missionary work is eminently the Lord's. "Go ye," "go ye." Shrine it in your hearts. Take it into your hands. Make it the light of your eyes; and the aim of your wills; and the food of your life; and spiritual joy shall flow alongside in perennial waters of refreshment, and precious blessing from the Lord shall drop down like sweetest and softest dew.

Dear brethren of the Clergy, a Canon of the Diocese charges that "every Clergyman shall, on at least one Sunday in each year, hold a service in which the subject of Missions in the Diocese shall be distinctly set forth, and such information be given as may quicken the interest in this work." Are you all loyally obedient to that charge? Dear brethren of the laity, are you unselfish and quick and earnest to respond to those larger opportunities for doing good which your pastors unfold to you when pleading for Missions? If yes all around, may God's blessing fall on you, and under Him and through you we may not doubt but that we shall save our Missionary work from being forced to take sad steps backward.

The end of this address is reached. It would speak and savor of a cheery all hail more than of a farewell. For, a few days ago, in health vouchsafed of God, in strength continued of Him, in faculties preserved save a slow creeping of dullness into the hearing of the ear, in a home blest as with the sheen of heaven's own comforting light, and among a people who have been kindness itself ever since I came among them, I passed the twenty-fifth birthday of my Bishop's life. A strain of plaint and sadness was not wanting in the music of its joy. On the same day, six years agone, he whose mantle I

wear, your Bishop before me, fell on sleep. To lose him was sad. To remember the loss also saddens. To enter into the work which he wisely and faithfully planned and promoted, and to reflect that after his many earlier years of extremest care and toil these later years to witness of fruit and growth were denied him, evoke sorrow and regret. And, for that in the twenty-five years I had left undone so many of those things which I ought to have done, and had done so many of those things which I ought not to have done, the "Miserere" was well nigh dominant. But not for long. I had too much to thank God for, to tarry dolefully "in profundis." That I had been spared, while forty-six Bishops since my consecration have died. That I had been appointed to be a worker, and not elected to be a sufferer. That in laying foundations I had been saved from stupendous mistakes, and that accretions of steady growth had covered and made of none effect multitudes of sad imperfections in my work. That the growth has been so marked that four other Bishops now rule over fields once mine. That the people in all the four fields, to whom I have said good bye in tears which refused to hold themselves back, are true to the Church and are walking towards the Father's home where I hope in Christ's mercy to meet and be with them again.

And while all these bright things were borne inward upon my thoughts, some practical sunshine of the wholesomest sort from the outward burst in. The debt on St. Luke's Hospital, of \$15,000, long a distress, was paid. There before me I had the written assurance of the President of the Board of Directors. And there were the clear names of my Presbyter brother and the good women who had been successful in winding the matter up. How I rejoiced in heart. And was ready with the voice to utter "Laus Deo." And prepared all through and through to join humbly and cheerily and thankfully with you on Sunday night and Monday morning in the Anniversary services of prayer and praise and Holy Eucharist in yonder place.

Said Pharaoh of ancient Egypt to the Patriarch Job, "How old art thou?"

Repeat the question now, and we answer,—"No matter; God's years are not the years of the earth's heliocentric orbit. God's years are duties done, grace used, love quickened, trust deepened, and the comfortings laid hold upon of 'a reasonable, religious, and holy hope.' His years do not come and go. They come and stay and live infixed in experience and character. How old art thou? No matter."

But hearken, O disciple of the Lord, and with even the hearing of a dulled outer ear thou mayst almost discern a voice from above which says,—Count not up the years. Do duty. Grow in heart and love and good work. Look up. Reach forth. Stand steady. Keep step. Push on. Come home.

I have the pleasure of reporting that all Parishes except Hannibal, \$50.00; St. George's, St. Louis, \$250.00; Advent, St. Louis, \$7.50, and St. James', St. Louis, \$20.00, have paid assessments in full, and "Advent" has paid up to the time the Church was closed and property sold. I wish especially to acknowledge from St. Charles the amount said Parish was delinquent last year, notwithstanding, the Convention by its action last year, in remitting amounts due from all delinquent Parishes and Missions, included this Parish.

The wisdom of the Convention's action, regarding delinquents, has been proven by the prompt payment of this year's assessment by all of those excused at that time, as it lifted a burden which otherwise would have made them feel that they could not get relief from debt, and the *Interest* now shown to be in the front rank might not have been developed. By advice of Finance Committee I have borrowed money on two occasions, so as to be able to promptly meet our obligations, paying interest thereon, which would have been avoided had the Parishes paid their quarterly assessments promptly when due, in accordance with canonical obligations.

If a Parish wanted to call a Rector, would it take a pride in saying to him, that he might expect his salary whenever it was convenient for them to pay it, and that he could borrow money, and pay for it, so as to maintain his credit and standing in the community, thereby protecting the credit of the Church at his expense, or be annoyed by his inability to pay current expenses when bills are presented. This is the practical duty and work of the Vestry and Laity of each Parish, and probably they have not stopped to reflect seriously upon this subject.

I trust this suggestion will call their attention to the fact that the credit of the Diocese is also in their hands, and those that have not been prompt heretofore will make such arrangements in the future as will place the Treasurer, whoever he may be, in a position to pay all liabilities of the Diocese when due without expecting him to ask some responsible person to endorse a note without consideration, so as to enable him to meet obligations until such time as it may be convenient for the different Parishes to comply with canonical requirements.

The fact that the receipts have been less, together with the showing that there are only six vacant Missions, testify in eloquent language to the results of your free-will offerings in the past, and the efforts that have been made by struggling Missions to help themselves. Surely the Missionary helpers throughout the Diocese can find encouragement enough in this to stimulate them to renewed efforts to uphold the hands of their dear Bishop, near and dear to whose heart the cause of Missions lies. Shall we retrograde? Stand still? or advance? The questions are for you to consider, and your answers will be found in the pledges that are made.

APPENDIX NO. 9.

Report of Diocesan Missionary.

ST. LOUIS, May 1, 1892.

To the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Missouri:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir:—During the past year, under your direction, I have had four classes of duty: 1. Missionary work in the Diocese; 2. Official correspondence and writing up the records of the Bishop; 3. Editing the *Church News*; 4. The care of St. Augustine's and St. Matthew's Missions. By appointment of the Bishop, I have given one Sunday a month to the visitation of vacant Parishes and Missions. I have held twenty-nine services in sixteen different Parishes and Missions. On these visits I administer the Holy Communion, address the Sunday-school, usually hold a conference with the vestry or committee as to the condition and needs of the Parish or Mission, and visit as many of the Church families as possible. These services, supplementary to the annual visitation of the Bishop, in some cases, are apparently just the one thing that keeps a struggling Mission from collapsing and absorption into the religious denominations about.

I have done more work on the Church News than ever before, and have tried every method known to mortals, except offering plated jewelry as prizes, to increase the circulation, but, in spite of all, the end of the year found us financially under water. The chief cause of this was the expense incurred in the change of publishers, and the increased cost of better mechanical work on the paper, and promptness of issue. We have good hope that now the paper is on a basis, even with the present subscription list, that will meet at least the current expenses of the coming year. The present number of subscribers is 1,618, of which 1,422 are in Missouri. The number of communicants in the two Dioceses, as reported last year, is 8,957, and there ought to be at least 2,500 subscribers to the Church News, in order that it may be taken in every Church family, which would need an addition of 1,078 to our list. And this would mean a surplus at least of \$500 for Diocesan Missions. While we have nothing but gratitude for the generous sympathy and help of the clergy and many of the laity, yet if all the clergy would make the circulation of the Church News among their people a definite and systematic instrumentality of parish work, the full aim and purpose of the Diocesan paper would be attained. You will allow me to quote the words of a prominent Rector in the Western Diocese who has always been a loyal and steadfast friend of the Church News: "But, to my mind, the whole matter lies in a nutshell; if the Rector of a Parish wants his people to take the paper, they will; that is, the great part of them."

There is every reason to believe that if every Churchman and Churchwoman in the Diocese read the *Church News*, and so kept themselves informed of what is going on in the Diocese, and gave heed to and took to heart the counsels and suggestions of the Bishop, there would be a largely increased interest in that part of the work distinctly missionary, and a consequent increase in both the practical and spiritual activities of the Church.

Report of Yome of the Aniendless.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 18, 1892.

Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, Bishop of Missouri:

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir:—For the past four years I have, at your request, been officiating, as lay reader, in conducting services at the "Home of the Friendless," located on the Carondelet road in South St. Louis.

Services are held at three o'clock in the afternoon, on the fourth Sunday in each month, which is called "Episcopal Sunday" at the institution.

I read the order of Evening Prayer, and I also take the liberty of omitting the word "brethren," as we are never favored with the presence of any brethren, and I feel tempted to say "dearly beloved sisters."

We use the gospel hymns, with which the ladies are familiar, and they all join in the singing with earnestness and devotion, but in the low, sweet tones peculiar to very old people. There are seventy or eighty of these old ladies, all of whom I find seated in the Chapel on my arrival, except those who cannot leave their rooms, and many of these leave their doors open so as to catch what they can of the singing and service. A more attentive and appreciative congregation I am sure can nowhere be found, and my labor among them is no burden to me, but really a pleasure.

I always read a chapter from the New Testament and make the same the basis for an address of half an hour; then we have one or two more hymns—"Jesus Lover of My Soul," "Rock of Ages," "Nearer My God to Thee," "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," "There is a Fountain Filled With Blood," and kindred hymns being great favorites with the old people.

Then we close with the Evening Family Prayers, which seem singularly appropriate to such an occasion, for night is approaching and the old ladies will soon retire to rest, let us hope, with their hearts and minds filled with sweet thoughts of their risen Lord, and trusting themselves wholly to His gracious and loving protection.

APPENDIX NO. 11.

Report of Missaugi Lynnsh of the Moman's Auxitiary.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Looking backward is not always pleasant work. We would rather dream of the possibilities of the future than face the realities of the time that is gone. But as the New Year is the time for looking backward as well as forward, for seeing where we have failed as well as gained, and where the weak places are, which must be fortified with good resolutions, so the beginning of the diocesan year brings the time for looking backward upon what we have done and left undone, and forward, with strength and resolution for still greater things in the Church's work that we may make our own.

Upon the first reading, there seems a decided decrease in our work this year, that makes the looking backward a little painful, until we recollect that last year was an unusual one for us; that it is not every year we find a generous woman ready to give a rectory to a missionary; and then the lines have been drawn more closely upon what constitutes Auxiliary work, so, though the figures are smaller, the work has really increased, and that looking backward may be without regret.

The same demands and calls and interests of each year have come to us. Miss Mailes' visit was an inspiration to work for Japan, and we have \$100 ready for her to take back to her work in the autumn. Mr. Partridge would have converted any skeptic from an unbelief in Foreign Missions, and \$50 have been sent him for China. Missions have been helped in Arkansas and East Carolina, and the Mission of the Holy Cross in New York. But all these are new. We must have new work and life, or we shall not grow, and yet, when we look backward, we find our Mite Boxes have brought in just one-half of what we had last year, which means our scholarships must suffer. A little caution in looking to our regular pledges first, would make the looking backward brighter. Our great gain has been a more methodical way of working. Each year we report more money as having passed through the Treasurer's accounts, and again the sum given in money far exceeds the value of boxes.

As a diocesan officer, I cannot help wishing that we might do more of our work in connection with the General Board of Missions. We all enjoyed Miss Emery's visit last fall, and felt the good of it; and yet if all the dioceses worked as we do, who would keep Miss Emery at her post? We have rarely sent any money to the Bible House for general work, except the annual \$25 for Foreign Missions, and yet the Auxiliary has its pledges to fulfill, and looks to the diocesan branches to help it.

Next October the General Convention meets in Baltimore. At the same time the Auxiliary holds its triennial meeting. If any Churchwoman can see her way clear to attend that meeting, she will be amply repaid. The intelligence she will gain, the interest and inspiration that will be roused within her, will help her and her parish upon her return. It is proposed that there shall be a United Offering that day carried there by the officers from their several branches. The Enrollment Fund is the first object suggested, but it is now decided that the Diocesan Offering may go for any specified work.

Report of Trustees of Paroghial Trust Hund.

January 7, 1892-A general warranty deed and certificate of title were received from the Shrewsbury Park Land and Improvement Co. for lots Nos. 1 and 2, Block No. 19, third sub-division of Shrewsbury Park.

APPENDIX NO. 13.

Report of Registrar and Librarian.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Registrar and Librarian of the Diocese submits the following report:

As Registrar, Journals of the Conventions of the year 1891 have been received from nearly every Diocese of the United States. Bound volumes of the Journals of Conventions of the Diocese of Michigan, from 1834 to 1860, and of Western New York, from 1843 to 1848, were presented to the Diocese by the Rev. Dr. Schuyler. The Journals of the Conventions of this Diocese, for the years 1881 to 1891, have been bound in two volumes, uniformly with those of preceding years. A number of sermons and other pamphlets have been received from various sources and filed.

I have endeavored to collect a complete set of the "Church News" for the Diocese, and have succeeded, with the kind help of the Bishop and Mrs. Tuttle, the Revs. John Davis and G. D. B. Miller, in obtaining all but six numbers. It is very important that a complete set should be possessed by the Diocese, because of its valuable historical records, not to be found elsewhere. It is hoped that the Registrar will be able to report the set complete to the next Convention. The numbers lacking are, March and December, 1872; January and February, 1882; January and April, of 1884.

No book containing a record of the "Consecrations of Churches, ordinations, sentences, admissions and dismissals of Clergy into and from the Diocese, etc.," according to Canon V., Section 2, was turned over to me. But, considering it important that the Canon should be observed, I have recorded in such a book, as far as possible, all such Episcopal acts performed in the Diocese of Missouri from the time of the Primary Convention to the present day, gathering my information from the reports of the several Bishops, as contained in the Journals of the Annual Conventions.

As Librarian, I have made a thorough examination of the books of the Library and found that, upon my entrance into the office, eighty volumes of the books reported in the catalogue were missing, of which five have since been returned; a large number received since the catalogue was arranged were, of course, not contained in the catalogue, while still more, received during the past year, make a new catalogue necessary. But, owing to the fact that the Library will soon be removed to a larger, lighter, cleaner, and more commodious room, the Librarian thought it best to postpone the issuing of another catalogue till that happy time.

The Diocese is greatly indebted to the Rev. John Davis, of Trinity Church, Hannibal, for his valuable gift of books and periodicals to the Library; the box he sent contained 40 volumes of books, some very rare and valuable, 75 numbers of the *Church Eclectic*, 59 numbers of the *Church News*, 3½ volumes of "Christian Thought," and 4 Journals of General Conventions. Bound volumes of the *Spirit of Missions*, for 1890 and 1891, and of the *Church Review*, for 1889 and 1890, were received from Dr. Schuyler.

The books are in as good condition as can be expected, exposed as they are to the smoke and dust. Next year we hope to have suitable cases for them in the reading room of the new Parish building of the Cathedral, when they will be better protected.

Judging from the record of books loaned, the Library has been used by a larger number of readers than ever before, the *Spirit of Missions* being especially called for by members of the Missions Class.

In the opinion of the Librarian, it would add greatly to the usefulness of the Library if new books were added to it year by year. Most all the books are old. Those who use the Library want the thought of the age. I would, therefore, respectfully suggest that the Convention make a larger appropriation than hitherto for the use of the Registrar, and that the amount not used in necessary expenses be used for the purchase of new books for the Library.

APPENDIX NO. 14.

Report of the Committee on Chnistian Education.

Your Committee to whom was referred the subject of Christian Education respectfully present the following report:

There are at present in the Diocese two schools which are maintained as Church schools. These are:

The School of the Good Shepherd, for girls, under the charge of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, at 1613 South Compton avenue, and St. Mark's Intermediate School for boys, under the charge of Rev. F. E. Alleyne and Mr. Jas. H. Gill, at Portland, Mo.

The attendance at both schools have been good during the past year. Since the last Convention Mr. F. E. Alleyne has been ordered Deacon. The very valuable property occupied by the Sisters was presented by a generous-hearted man, the payments thereon to be made in annual installments. The sum of \$17,500 with interest on the remainder at five per cent, was paid, but business reverses prevented further payments, so that the Sisters have been compelled to borrow \$30,000 at six per cent interest. To meet this interest annually, with taxes and insurance, will be a serious, if not an impossible burden, but the school will be continued as long as the property can be held. A movement is now being made to secure gifts of \$1,000 each from thirty persons, or of smaller sums from a larger number, in order that the very valuable property (four acres, present value \$60,000) may be saved for the Church. Through no fault of internal management or needless incurring of debt has this burden fallen upon the Church.

St. James' School at Macon exists no longer as a Church school. It is still maintained as a private enterprise, but has ceased to be the Diocesan school for boys. Faithful work could not undo the mistakes of past management or pay debts incurred in years gone by. The Church was forced to abandon the effort and leave the school in charge of those who held mortgages on the property.

We sorely need greater advantages within our own Diocese for the youth of both sexes. If an educated and consecrated Ministry be a necessity, does the Church not also need an educated and consecrated Laity. Rome has made and is making mistakes in this country in the education of her children, and ultra-Protestantism is doing the same thing. The time has come when, as a pure branch of the one Catholic Church, we must uphold our principles and fix them in the hearts and heads of our children. We can have no sympathy with either extreme of Rome or ultra-Protestantism which would seek to entangle the affairs of the Church and State in this Republic. If we must educate our children away from home, let it be where the sweet influences of the Church, the Mother of us all, may be felt in all their power upon human life. If we entrust our youth to those "who care not for God, neither is God in all their thoughts," we must expect skepticism and a weakness of moral force and religious character.

If we entrust them to the care of the Church of Rome we must not be surprised if they yield to her seductive ways and give their allegiance to her authority and

power. If we send them to what are called "non-sectarian" institutions, let us not wonder if they return to us with vague and shadowy notions of religious truth, recognizing no authority save that of self-will, thus becoming disloyal to the faith and practice of their spiritual Mother.

Knowledge is power, but the training of the intellect alone is not sufficient. Man needs education for his spirit as well as his mind and his body. Ethical culture must be joined with intellectual, and systematic religious training cannot be safely neglected. "Education increases a man's power to commit sin as well as to do good." Religious influence must, therefore, be interwoven with mental training in institutions which become for so many months and years the dwelling-places of our children. And the power of that branch of the Church Catholic, to which we belong, is beginning to be everywhere realized. We have equal authority with the Church of Rome, but teach Catholic truth unmixed with Roman error and superstition.

We have equal "evangelical principles" with the rather disorganized army of Protestantism, but we hold to the faith as expressed in the Creed of the Ages, to the Sacramental system based upon Holy Scripture and to the "historic Episcopate" as essential to the organism of the Church. We must have, therefore, good schools, where the influence of the Church, alas! too often neglected in the home, may be impressed upon life and character, a definite faith may be taught, a definite responsibility felt, and eternal principles inculcated.

Your committee would recommend the establishing of Church schools, where it is possible within the Diocese, or, in case of inability to accomplish this, the establishing of Church halls in connection with our own University in this city and in Columbia, where the advantages of a Church Home and Church oversight can be combined with the excellent educational facilities afforded by these institutions.

This plan has already been attempted elsewhere and with success, and as it would not in the least interfere with the control, management, etc., of any institution, we believe that it would be favorably considered by any one of our institutions, if proposed in good faith.

We cannot have better educational advantages than are afforded already in our own State, and the erection or establishing of these Church halls might solve a problem so often presented to our people, as to the best way to secure, at moderate cost, the Church's oversight of our children, when Church schools are not within our reach.

We have not yet imber of teachers especially for missionary purposes, are unusually large. In a note from the Bishop we learn that the Lent offerings alone have come to above \$1,000.

Everything indicates a most healthy condition of the Sunday-schools in the Diocese. We learn that there is more uniform instruction as to text books, and that more importance is attached to teaching the *history of the Church* "as the pillar and the ground of the truth."

We ought indeed recommend, and, in behalf of all our Rectors, ask for an additional number of experienced teachers, and especially men. There also is greatly needed a course of systematic instruction for teachers, particularly in the Doctrines and History of the Church. Aside from what our Rectors find time and opportunity to teach, it seems to your committee that there is needed, once or twice in the year, in some central place, a series of lectures to teachers of Sunday-school classes, upon the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds. From the Bishop downward we have well instructed men who are "apt to teach," and who could give for a few Sunday or week-day afternoons, twice a year, a large amount of needed instruction to our teachers.

More and more does the so-called "religious world" about us need good, healthful and solid religious food. Food for the heart and food for the mind. And the Church can give it. And since we have Sunday-schools, the Church through her Pastors and their teachers, should carefully fill the minds and hearts of her children with the truths of God, although at first they must be fed with milk, the sincere "milk of the Word" which will become strong and healthful food. And this committee would recommend that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to arrange for the present year such a series of lectures or instructions upon the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—It is my privilege at the opening of this annual report to congratulate the Diocese on one of the most encouraging facts in the history of the hospital. For years the Association has been struggling under the burden of a bonded debt of \$15,000, necessitating an expenditure of \$900 annually for interest, thus crippling their income, and limiting their ability to do the charitable work of the hospital to the full extent of its capacity.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the consecration of our beloved Bishop was approaching, and it was desirable to signalize it by some marked act of beneficence known to be dear to his heart. Our good brother, the Rev. Mr. Sterling, of Old Orchard, conceived the idea that it was practicable to enlist the women of the Church in the enterprise of paying off this debt of \$15,000, and to insure its successful accomplishment, so as to greet the Bishop on the morning of the anniversary with such an announcement. The time was short, and the task one under all the circumstances not the most hopeful, demanding faith and unusual energy. But it is strange how often, most unexpectedly, Providence graciously interposes to aid us in our well-meant efforts. By the will of the late Robert A. Barnes, who had died after the inception of this effort, it was learned that \$5,000 had been left for the express purpose of paying off this debt; and it was also known that the last \$1,500 needed for the debt, had been provided for through the will of the late Mr. Geo. H. Gill.

With such help there was great encouragement to go forward, and on the evening of the *last* day before the anniversary, the Board felt themselves authorized to announce to the Bishop that full provision had been made by which the debt could be canceled.

I have said that this was a matter of congratulation to the *Diocese*, because St. Luke's belongs to the Diocese, and ought to be so regarded in every Parish, and by every member of the Church.

While the doors of the hospital are open to every suffering member of the human family, to minister without distinction of race or sect, according to its ability, it is but a just pride which Churchmen may entertain, that there exists such an institution, as an expression of the Church's spirit and her loving desire to follow the Master's example in ministering to the sick and needy.

And let me say here that the country Parishes may do a good work for the hospital, as some of them have already done, in following the example of the city Churches on "Giving Tuesday," by sending old linen, second-hand garments, fresh fruit, eggs and vegetables in their season, and preserves and delicacies which are known to be grateful to the sick. An occasional remembrance in this way would keep alive the interest of Church people outside the city, and at the same time contribute materially to its current expenses.

It gives me pleasure to bear testimony as heretofore to the acceptable services of the Superintendent, Mrs. Chambers, and her well trained corps of nurses. A very interesting service was held in the Memorial Chapel on the evening of the 3d of May,

when the first class of graduates among the trained nurses received their diplomas. There were seven members of this class, all of whom passed most satisfactory examinations.

It is with gratitude that the managers of the Home to-day avail themselves of this opportunity to thank the benefactors whose generosity has made the past year one of prosperity, such as has never before been known in the history of the institution

Having been so long familiar with the incessant struggle to provide necessities, we are all the better fitted to appreciate the comforts we have attained to, through the sweet charity, which, like mercy, is twice blessed, because "it blesseth him that gives and him that takes."

Until the past two years, any proposed measure for a needed change or improvement meant a tax upon the energies of the managers to raise the necessary funds, and the close of each year found them renewing their efforts, as their policy has always been to clear away at that time the existing indebtedness. These efforts did not accomplish the attainment of comforts in the Home, but did attain relief from debt unavoidably incurred in providing for the necessities of the institution.

When all that could be accomplished by direct methods failed, the indirect one of appealing to the public through the medium of excursions or entertainments, has been resorted to. This method is not one that commends itself to the favor either of the managers, the Bishop, or the Clergy of the Church, and we trust that it has now become a thing of the past.

The report of 1890 showed an improvement in the amount of our income. This was due partly to additional bequests, which materially added to our permanent fund, and partly to the advantageous renewal of the lease of our Olive street lot. This accession to our income enabled us to make some much needed and marked improvements in the interior of the building. But, notwithstanding these improvements so recently made, there remains much to be done both within and without the building, whenever we find that our means will justify the expenditure. New flooring in several rooms, and the renewal of the stairways are necessities that cannot long be postponed, and the terraces at the back of the building are in a rough and unfinished condition, for want of means to complete them.

Now that we have achieved, in some degree, relief from the burden of financial strain, we hope to use our prosperity to advantage, and to make it a means of extending our usefulness. We hope to train up in ways of truth and uprightness many an orphan child who else would find its only home in the House of Refuge or some less happy abode, which may furnish food and shelter for the body, it is true, and mayhap an occasional crumb for a hungry soul, but which does not undertake to furnish a home, and if it did, must necessarily fall far short in the requirements of a creditable one for the formation of character.

The deaths during the year have been confined to very young children, and all occurred during the summer months, when whooping cough was prevailing.

We have received during the year, sixty-five children. Three have been adopted; one has been indentured; employment has been found for five; three have been sent to hospitals for treatment; one was stolen by a relative; one was sent to the State Industrial Home, at Chillicothe, Mo.; four have been removed by death; thirty-two have been restored to parents and friends. Present number in the Home, sixty-nine.

In November, two houses bequeathed by Mrs. Moore, yielding a rental of \$12 per month were conveyed to the Home. We understand now this bequest will be contested by a relative of the deceased.

In January, a house and lot, 3123 Sheridan avenue, left by bequest of Mr. Henry Shaw, inured to the Home, through the death of his sister, Mrs. Morisse.

In February, the bequest of \$1,200 from the estate of Miss McCreery, together with accrued interest was paid over to the Treasurer.

Fifty shares of St. George's Church Society stock, which will yield nearly its par value, \$50 per share, inured to the Home as the gift of Mr. W. C. France.

In February, the sum of \$6,000, and in April, the sum of \$2,000 were loaned by the Home, both loans being made for a term of five years, at 6 per cent, on real estate as security.

The Treasurer's report shows a balance in the treasury of \$735.49.

It has been the will of Providence to remove from among us one who was sincerely beloved and esteemed by her co-workers. We feel that in the death of Mrs. Eugenia L. Allen, the Home has lost an earnest friend, whose interest in it was expressed in deeds of loving kindness and charity.

From Easter until August, we availed ourselves of the privilege of meeting on the third Thursday of each month in the guild room of the Cathedral. Since that time, as we have been prevented from meeting there on account of repairs in progress, we have been accorded the use of the guild room at the Church of the Holy Communion. For all of this kindly hospitality we desire to tender our cordial thanks.

We wish, also, to express our appreciation of the services held at the Home by the visiting Clergymen, who so promptly responded to the Bishop's request to officiate there. These services held in turn by these Clergymen, twice a month, have alternated with those held by our Chaplain, the Rev. B. E. Reed, to whom we owe our warmest thanks for long and faithful service.

We are grateful to the Church Guilds and others for assistance in sewing, and to many friends for gifts and donations.

We wish to express our obligations to the St. Louis Children's and Martha Parsons' Hospitals for their acceptance of the children who have been sent to them from the Home for medical treatment; to the Fresh Air Mission for remembering the children in their benevolent enterprise, and to the Board and Managers of the Exposition and Fair Grounds Association for admission free of charge.

We would express our gratitude to our physician in charge, Dr. Saunders, who has at all times been ready to respond to any call upon him, and to give us faithful and efficient aid. Also to our oculist, Dr. Wolfner.

We tender our cordial thanks to the Advisory Committee, and to our legal counselor, Mr. Thomas Skinker, all of whom have invariably given us their kind and courteous co-operation when appealed to.

APPENDIX NO. 21.1

Report of Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, hereby submit the following report on the resolutions and amendments to Canons that were offered at the last Convention, and referred to it:

First. In relation to the resolution of Mr. F. J. McMaster, referring to amendments to Canon X. (see pages 28 and 29 of Proceedings of 1891), your committee recommend the following alterations and amendments to Canon X.:

(1). "That the title of Canon X. be changed by adding the words, "and the erection of Church buildings."

That Section 1 be amended by inserting after the word "acquired," in the last line of said section, the words, "and held in good faith," and by also inserting after the word "worship," in the last line of said section, the following: "Under and subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Canon," so that said section, when amended, will read as follows:

SECTION 1. Wherever any number of persons not less than ten, of legal age, shall desire to organize a new Parish at any place within this Diocese, they shall make a written application to the Bishop for permission to organize. Such application shall state the facts material to the proposed organization, and shall especially show that the persons making the same are attached to the doctrines and worship of this Church, and that they will become members of said Parish. Said persons shall also state in said application that they do not propose to erect or have their place of worship at any point within five hundred yards in a direct line from the place of worship of any other Parish, or from land acquired and held in good faith for the erection of a place of worship, under and subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Canon.

(2). That a new section be added to said Canon, and known as Section 2 of the same, and that the same be in words and figures as follows:

SEC. 2. Any Parish desiring to change the location of its Church building, or to establish a Mission or a Chapel in connection with its Parish work, shall make written application to the Bishop for permission to do so, stating distinctly the object and location proposed.

(3). That Section 2 of Canon X. be amended as follows: The number of the section be changed to No. 3. That the word "application," in the first line of said section, be amended by making it plural. That after the word "application," in the first line, the following be inserted: "As are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon." That the word "their," in the second line of said section, be changed to

That all of the section after the word "will," in the ninth line of said section, be stricken out, and in lieu thereof, insert the following: "Proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable Church building, within two years from the date of such requirement." So that said section, when amended, shall read as follows:

SEC. 3. Such applications as are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon having been consented to by the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall consider the same, and if, in the judgment of the Bishop and Standing Committee, the interests of the Church will be promoted thereby. The Bishop and Standing Committee shall have power to grant the prayer of the petitioners; but they shall not deny such prayer on the ground that petitioners propose to erect or have their place of worship within the distance named in Section 1 from land acquired by another Parish for the erection of a place of worship, but upon which none shall have been built, unless the Parish holding said land, shall, when required, satisfy the Bishop and Standing Committee that it will proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable Church building, within two years from the date of such requirement.

- (4). That "Section 3" be changed to "Section 4," and after the word "application," in the first line of said section, the following be inserted: "Mentioned in Section 1 of this Canon."
- (5). That "Section 6" be amended to read as "Section 5", and that after the word "worship," in the fourth line on the 16th page, the following be inserted: "Except under and subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Canon."
- (6). That "Section 4" be amended as follows: To read as "Section 6." After the word "Bishop," at the end of the second line of said section, the following words be inserted: "At least twenty days before the meeting of the Convention." That the word "laid," in the sixth line of said section be stricken out, and the word "referred," inserted in its stead. That after the word "Bishop," in the sixth line of said section, the following be inserted: "To the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," and that the words, "Before the next regular Convention," beginning in the sixth line, and ending in the seventh line of said section, be stricken out. That the following words, in the eighth and ninth lines of said section, be stricken out: "The Convention shall then pass upon said application," and insert in lieu thereof, the following: "Said committee shall duly consider the same, and report their action thereon to the Bishop and Secretary of the Convention, at least five days before the next regular meeting thereof; said application, together with the report thereon, shall be submitted (for action) immediately after the organization of the Convention." So that the section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- SEC. 6. Its organization having been completed in the manner prescribed by the preceding sections hereof, the Parish shall submit to the Bishop, at least twenty days before the meeting of the Convention, its written application for admission into the union with the Convention. Such application shall show that the requirements of this Canon have been fully complied with, and shall be accompanied by copies of said certificates, and of said Articles of Association, and the whole shall be referred by the Bishop to the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, together with his endorsement of approval or disapproval of the same; said committee shall duly consider the same, and report their action thereon to the Bishop and Secretary of the Convention, at least five days before the next regular meeting thereof; said application, together with the report thereon, shall be submitted (for action) immediately after the organization of the Convention.

CANON X.

OF THE ORGANIZATION AND ADMISSION OF NEW PARISHES AND THE EREC-TION OF CHURCH BUILDINGS.

Section 1. Wherever any number of persons not less than ten, of legal age, shall desire to organize a new Parish at any place within this Diocese, they shall make a written application to the Bishop for permission to organize. Such application shall state the facts material to the proposed organization, and shall especially show that the persons making the same are attached to the doctrines and worship of this Church, and that they will become members of said Parish. Said persons shall also state in said application, that they do not propose to erect or have their place of worship at any point within five hundred yards, in a direct line, from the place of worship of any other Parish, or from land acquired and held in good faith for the erection of a place of worship, under and subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Canon.

SEC. 2. Any Parish desiring to change the location of its Church building, or to establish a Mission or Chapel in connection with its Parish work, shall make written application to the Bishop for permission to do so, stating distinctly the object and location proposed.

SEC. 3. Such applications as are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon, having been consented to by the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall consider the same, and if, in the judgment of the Bishop and Standing Committee, the interests of the Church will be promoted thereby, the Bishop and Standing Committee shall have power to grant the prayer of the petitioners. But they shall not deny such prayer on the ground that petitioners propose to erect or have their place of worship within the distance named in Section 1 from land acquired by another Parish for the erection of a place of worship, but upon which none shall have been built, unless the Parish holding said land shall, when required, satisfy the Bishop and Standing Committee that it will proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable Church building, within two years from the date of such requirement.

Sec. 4. If said application, mentioned in Section 1 of this Canon, be granted, the persons who signed the same, or a majority of them, together with such other persons of like qualifications with themselves as may unite with them, shall give notice of their intention to organize, specifying the time and place appointed for organization on two occasions of public worship, at least one week apart and within one month before said time. At such time and place the persons signing said application or a majority of them, shall immediately after Divine Service proceed to the public election of two Wardens, who shall be Communicants, and at least three Vestrymen. They shall also adopt and cause to be prepared and presented to the proper court, articles of Association, and shall procure from said court a certificate of incorporation and file the same in the office of the Secretary of State, and take any and all other steps necessary under the laws of this State for their consolidation into a religious corporation.

SEC. 5. In the organization of Missions and Parishes, the following forms and procedure shall be substantially adhered to, namely:

They therefore pray that permission be granted them to organize a Parish at the

The above application having been signed by at least ten persons of legal age, the Bishop and Standing Committee may grant the prayer thereof. Thereupon, the persons signing the same, or a majority of them, together with such other persons of like qualifications with themselves as may unite with them, shall give notice of their intention to organize, on at least two occasions of public worship, at least one week apart, and within one month of the proposed time of organization.

Following the reading of the notice, a resolution should be adopted to the effect that the persons assembled (whose names should be entered in the minutes as present) do proceed to organize a Parish under the Discipline and in accordance with the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church. Vestrymen shall then be elected, and a corporate or Church name selected. The following Articles of Association (substantially) must then, on motion, be adopted as the Articles of Association of the Parish. Parish:

(FORM C.)

Articles of Association of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the..... ing to the faith and under the Discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and under and subject to the Constitution and Canons of that Church in the Diocese of Missouri, and having heretofore formed a Congregation, Association or Parish at the. County of, State of Missouri, are desirous of becoming incorporated for the purposes hereinafter stated; now this witnesseth: That we do hereby declare the following to be our

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

ART. 2. This Association, called herein "Parish," is incorporated for the purpose only of holding the title to such real estate as is and may be prescribed by law for a Church edifice, parsonage and cemetery; to be used and held for the purposes, and to the use of those who are in communion with and under the authority of the Protestant Episcopal Church, as hereinafter set forth.

ART. 3. This Parish acknowledges its allegiance, in ecclesiastical affairs, to be due to the one Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church of Christ, and acknowledges itself to be a member of and to belong to the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and through that Church, to the Diocese thereof in Missouri, and as such accedes to, recognizes and accepts the Canons, Doctrines, Discipline and Form of Worship of that Church, and acknowledges its authority accordingly.

It is, therefore, declared that this Parish shall be forever incorporated under, and all property which belongs to it, or which shall hereafter be acquired by it, or which shall come under its control, is and forever shall be held by it (so long as it continues to own or control it) under the ecclesiastical authority of the Bishop of that Church in the Diocese of Missouri, or of that Diocese of said Church in Missouri in which it may be, and his successors in office, and shall be held under and subject to the use only of such persons as are or may hereafter become associated together in this Parish, under the Constitution and Canons aforesaid, and conduct religious worship according to the Ritual and Form of Worship, and under the Discipline of said Church.

No person who shall disclaim or refuse conformity to the above mentioned authority, shall be or become or continue a member of this Parish, or vote for, or be appointed or elected, a Warden, Vestryman, Rector, Minister or other officer thereof, or hold or exercise any office or function whatever in connection with this Parish or its property, or have any right or interest in or control thereof. The Parish may accept such devises, legacies, and gifts as may lawfully fall to it, and shall have power to impose such dues, and collect and raise such revenues as may be necessary to keep up and maintain its property, and to purchase, acquire or erect necessary buildings and improvements thereon, carry on services therein, and carry out any charitable or benevolent work in which it may engage, but it shall not engage, in any business for pecuniary profit.

ART. 4. The powers of this Association or Parish shall be vested in and exercised, and all its property controlled by a Vestry, the members of which shall be elected on such day in each year as shall be prescribed by Canon, and they shall hold office until their successors shall be duly elected.

Any vacancy happening in the Vestry shall be filled by the remaining Vestrymen. Voting for Vestrymen shall be by ballot. A majority vote of qualified votes cast at the Parish meeting shall be necessary to elect Vestrymen, and in case of a tie or a failure to elect, further ballots shall forthwith be taken until an election is had.

All cases of challenge of the qualifications of an elector, or of a disputed election (if not settled at the Parish meeting) shall be referred to the Bishop of the Diocese, whose decision shall be final; the vote of the challenged party or parties, and the returns of the election being in the meantime taken and transmitted, with the challenge or matter in dispute, to the Bishop, whose decision thereon shall be final and shall be entered on the Parish records.

ART. 5. The Rector of this Parish shall be elected by a majority of the Vestry present at a meeting duly convened for that purpose, or at a regular meeting of the Vestry; provided, that at least two-thirds of the members are present. He shall be ex-officio, and while he fills the office and is in discharge of the duties of the Rector, the presiding officer of the Parish and of the Vestry.

No person shall be Rector or Minister of this Parish, or allowed to exercise any of the functions of the same, unless he shall have had Episcopal ordination, and is in full and good standing with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and recognized as a Minister in good standing in the said Church, by the Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri, or, if there be no Bishop, by the Standing Committee of said Diocese.

ART. 7. The Vestry shall have power to choose their own officers and to perform all other duties usually appertaining to their body. They shall, after the first election by the Parish, choose one of their own number to be Church Warden and to be known as Junior Warden, and the Rector (for the time being) shall annually appoint from the said Vestry, another Church Warden, to be known as the Senior Warden. The Senior Warden shall be presiding officer of the Vestry in the absence of the Rector. In case of a vacancy in the office of Rector, or of the suspension of the Rector, or of his inability to act for any cause, save absence, or in case of a failure on the part of the Rector to appoint a Senior Warden, or in case of the absence or inability or failure of the Senior Warden to act, then the Junior Warden shall be the prosiding officer of the Vestry, and of the Parish.

If there be no Wardens present, then the Vestry or Parish shall elect its own presiding officer. The Vestry shall also have such powers, and perform such duties as are provided by the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, and be subject to the provisions thereof in the control and management of all the property of the Parish and may adopt a corporate seal. Both of the Church Wardens shall be communicants of the Church. The Vestry shall also elect a Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as they deem necessary, and may adopt such By-Laws for the government and support of this Association, or Parish, and the management and disposal of its property, as they shall deem fit, and as are in harmony with these Articles. The Rector shall have no vote in Vestry or Parish meetings, except in case of a tie, when he shall have power to cast the deciding vote.

ART. 8. The Vestry shall have power to mortgage, or otherwise encumber the property of the Parish, or any part of it, for Parish purposes, and to convey or lease the same; but no mortgage or conveyance of any lands or tenants belonging to said Parish shall be made without a vote of the Vestry, two-thirds thereof being present and concurring; nor shall such conveyance or incumbrance be made, unless in subjection to the Canons of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America.

ART. 10. Each person now subscribing to these Articles, and every other person, who, with the assent of the Rector, if there be one, and a majority of the Vestry herein named, shall, between this date and the opening of the first regular corporate meeting, subscribe thereto, shall be entitled to vote at the first regular corporate meeting, and shall be considered the qualified electors thereat. At all meetings thereafter, the electors shall possess the qualifications prescribed for Parish electors by the Constitution and Canons of the Church in this Diocese, and such other qualification as shall be prescribed in these Articles, or in By-Laws adopted by the Vestry; provided, such By-Laws shall not be inconsistent with said Constitution and Canons; nor shall the same be altered within three (3) months next preceding the meeting at which they are to be applicable.

The above Articles having been adopted, the blanks therein being first properly filled up, should then be signed by all those who participate in organizing the Parish.

The meeting should then proceed to the election of a Rector or Minister (if none has been previously elected), and shall elect Wardens, and transact any other business, and then adjourn.

The Rector or presiding officer, Treasurer and Secretary shall then draw up and sign the following:

The above must then be presented to the proper Circuit Court, and, upon a decree being granted, a copy thereof, and of the Articles of Association, must be filed in the office of the Recorder of Deeds of the city or county in which the Parish is located, and on being recorded there, a copy obtained from the Recorder, and sent to the Secretary of State, from whom a certificate of incorporation will be obtained. The Parish can not lawfully hold or buy property until this certificate is obtained from the Secretary of State.

Upon obtaining the certificate from the Secretary of State, such further proceedings must be taken as provided for in Section 6 of this Canon.

SEC. 6. Its organization having been completed in the manner prescribed by the preceding sections hereof, the Parish shall submit to the Bishop, at least twenty days before the meeting of the Convention, its written application for admission into union with the Convention. Such application shall show that the requirements of this Canon have been fully complied with, and shall be accompanied by copies of said certificate and of said Articles of Association, and the whole shall be referred by the Bishop to the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Gredentials, together with his endorsement of approval or disapproval of the same; said Committee shall duly consider the same and report their action thereon to the Bishop and Secretary of the Convention, at least five days before the next regular meeting thereof; said application, together with the report thereon shall be submitted (for action) immediately after the organization of the Convention.

SEC. 7. The articles above mentioned shall contain the solemn declaration and assurance that the Parish shall be forever incorporated, and the property thereof held under the ecclesiastical authority of the Bishop of Missouri, or the Bishop in whose Diocese said Parish may be, and of his successors in office, the Constitution and Canons of the Church known as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Missouri, or of the Diocese in which said Parish may be.

The evidence of the appointment of a Lay Delegate from an organized Parish shall be a written certificate from the Rector of the Parish, from one of the Wardens, or from the Secretary of the Vestry of such Parish. The evidence of the seat of a delegate from an organized Mission shall be a certificate from the Missionary, approved by the Bishop, and such certificates shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Convention before the 7th day of May in each year.

That Section 1 of Canon III. be amended as follows: That after the word "Vestry," in the eighth line of said section, insert the following: "and organized Mission;" and after the word "Convention," in the ninth line, the following be inserted: "He shall, before the 15th day of April in each year, transmit to the same, forms of parochial reports and of certificates of Lay Delegates, with instructions that they be returned to him before the 7th day of May. One week before the next meeting of the Convention, he shall place such certificates in the hands of the Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials; which Committee shall therefrom prepare the roll of Lay Delegates entitled to seats in the Convention, and return it to the Secretary before the opening of the Convention, for use therein," so that the section, when amended, will read as follows:

Section I. The Secretary shall be chosen upon the assembling of the Annual Convention, and shall remain in office until the meeting of the next Annual Convention. His duty shall be to take minutes of the proceedings of the Convention, to preserve its journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Convention, which may be in his possession. It shall also be his duty to give due notice to each Minister, Vestry and organized Mission of the time and place appointed for the meeting of the succeeding or of any special Convention. He shall, before the 15th day of April in each year, transmit to the same, forms of Parochial Reports and of Certificates of Lay Delegates, with instructions that they be returned to him before the 7th day of May. One week before the meeting of the Convention, he shall place such certificates in the hands of the Chairman of the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials; which committee shall therefrom prepare the roll of Lay Delegates entitled to seats in the Convention, and return it to the Secretary before the opening of the Convention, for use therein. He shall also transmit annually to each of the Bishops of this Church in the United States, and to the Secretary of every Diocesan Convention and Missionary Jurisdiction, a copy of the Journal of the Convention. He shall also transmit a copy to each clergyman in the Diocese, and to each delegate attending the Convention, and forward a copy or copies to each Parish or organized Mission in the Diocese, as they may request.

Third. In relation to the resolution of Rev. P. G. Robert, providing "A Canon for the calling of a Parish Meeting by the Congregation" (see page 28 of proceedings of 1891), your Committee recommend the following alteration and amendment to Section 9, Canon XII.: That after the word "Vestry," in the last line of said section, the following be inserted: "Or upon a written request, signed by one-third of the Electors of the Parish," so that the section, when amended, will read as follows:

SEC. 9. Special Parish Meetings may be called by the Rector or other person in charge, due notice of special meeting being given at two public services not less than fourteen days apart; and it shall be his duty to call such meeting, and to give-such notice, when requested by a majority of the Vestry, or upon a written request, signed by one-third of the Electors of the Parish.

Fourth. In relation to the resolution of Rev. W. A. Hatch "that the Secretary of the Convention, the Treasurer of the Diocese and members of the Board of Missions be ex-officio members of the Convention" (see page 29 of proceedings of 1891), your Committee finds that Section 1 of Article IX. of the Constitution, provides that the Secretary of the Convention and the Treasurer of the Diocese, when not members of the Convention, shall be entitled ex-officio to all the privileges of membership, except that of voting, and therefore only recommend the following alteration and amendment to Section 1 of Canon IX.

That Section 1 of Canon IX. be amended by inserting after the word "Diocese," in the last line of said section, the following: "The Lay members of said Board, if not members of the Convention, shall be entitled ex-officio, to all the privileges of membership, except that of voting," so that the section, as amended, will read:

SECTION 1. At each Annual Convention, three Clergymen and three Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of Missionary operations, and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries in the Diocese. The Lay members of said Board, if not members of the Convention, shall be entitled ex-officio to all the privileges of membership, except that of voting.

Fifth. In relation to the resolution of Rev. P. G. Robert, "that Canon XXIV. be amended, so as to provide for taking the testimony of witnesses in the presence of the accused" (see page 30 of the Proceedings of 1891), your committee recommend that Section 15, Canon XXIV., be amended by inserting between the word "may," and the word "be," in the first line of said section, the following words: "Be present in person and," so that the section, as amended, will read as follows:

SEC. 15. The accused and presenters may be present in person and be represented by Counsel before the Bishop, the Triers and Commissary at all steps of the proceedings, after the approval of the presentment by the Bishop; but no Counsel, not a communicant of the Church shall be heard, and the Bishop, Triers and Commissary may limit the time of argument, and shall have power to regulate all matters of detail in proceedings before them, so as to conduce to the orderly, decent and speedy hearing of the case. All trials for alleged immorality or viciousness of life, and hearing of testimony therein, shall be conducted in private, unless the Bishop otherwise orders.

APPENDIX NO. 23.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society.

ARTICLE I - NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II - OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who together, with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under directions of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI — FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII - FUNDS - DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within his parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX - AUXILIARY SOCIETIES - MEETINGS OF.

Section 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

APPENDIX A.

Rules of Order.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - 11. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Unfinished Business.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education.
 - VIII. On Sunday-School Work.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Travelling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
 - 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nayes.
- 11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more Pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course and without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

RT. REV. AND DEAR BISHOP:—December 1, 1890, my resignation of Trinity Mission, Kirksville, took place; and March 1, 1891, my resignation of Bevier, Mo. I have since done much work in various ways, having assisted, in a few instances, my brethren; and with few exceptions, been temporarily in supply of vacant Missions and Parishes. Have held two Missions; one of ten days, at Canton, Mo., the other in my old Parish at Calvert, Tex., of fifteen days. At Calvert, seven candidates for confirmation was the result. I have baptized eight infants, two adults, and married three couples—all in Texas—and performed the funeral service for two persons, the record of these are in their respective Churches.

I was in charge of St. Mark's, San Antonio, West Texas, during the sickness of Dean Richardson, but am now in charge, temporarily, of Emmanuel Church, San Angelo, West Texas. I can truly say that in all things God's blessing has abounded, and in my present field of labor, all things are moving along very pleasantly. "Put thy trust in the Lord, and be doing good, verily thou shalt be fed," has been verified to me.

FROM REV. J. GIERLOW, PH. D., ST. LOUIS.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri.

The Parish of "the Church of the Advent," was dissolved in November, 1891, the property sold, and the proceeds turned over to St. Andrew's Church.

I have continued to officiate at St. Luke's Chapel every Sunday afternoon since the dissolution of the Parish, and have been constantly at work ministering to the poor. In the "Advent" Parish, during the past year, my official acts have been:—Baptisms, infants, 9. Marriages, 2. Burials, 15. Public Services, on Sundays, 83. Holy Communion, public, 8; private, 4. \$7.50 has been paid to Diocesan Missions and \$7.50 on Convention Assessment.

REPORT OF REV. AUSTIN W. MANN, GENERAL MISSIONARY TO DEAF MUTES.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri.

Between May 1, 1891, and May 1, 1892, I held services for deaf mutes in St. Thomas' Mission, Christ Church Cathedral; Trinity Church, Hannibal; and the Missouri Institution for the Education of Deaf Mutes, located at Fulton, during the first reunion of the alumni. The Rev. James H. Cloud was associated with me in the dedication of the new Chapel belonging to this school; and a memorial service in honor of Prof. Kerr, recently deceased, who was superintendent many years. Nearly 200 graduates were present from all parts of the State. Mr. Cloud and I were hospitably entertained by Superintendent Tate.

The services at Hannibal were attended by the resident deaf mutes and several from outside, one coming twenty miles. He had not been to a service since graduation, nearly forty years ago. Mr. Cloud has also officiated here.

Attendance at the Cathedral Services increases steadily. Mr. Cloud's labors have been greatly blessed. He has organized a Sunday-school, of which Miss A. M. Roper is teacher. He reports a number of baptisms.

On Sunday, March 27th, a class of sixteen persons was confirmed by you at the Cathedral. I addressed them for you. On the following Palm Sunday, the Rev. Mr. Cloud presented three more silent candidates for the Apostolic Rite, making nineteen confirmed during the year. On the following Easter, the Rev. C. M. Davis held Communion Service for him, at which *all* the newly confirmed, and fourteen others—thirty-three in all—received.

I have administered Holy Communion several times, and baptized three persons at the Cathedral. I baptized one person at the reunion held in Fulton. Her home is at Beaman, near Sedalia.

During the year, the usual work was done in the other Dioceses of my Missionary field. Total baptisms, 44. Confirmations, 76. Baptisms in seventeen years, 596; Confirmations in seventeen years, 515.

I also attended "silent" reunions in Wisconsin and Michigan, and acted as Chaplain. Mr. Cloud performed like service at the Iowa reunion held at Council Bluffs.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the Fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent.
