Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17: The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

MINUTES

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Tuesday, January 12, 1937.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninety-eighth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 12, 1937, at 9:30 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop assisted by Bishop Maxon and the Cathedral Clergy.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Dean Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-seven who were entitled to vote, twenty-three were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 13.)

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty-four Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from seventeen were present.

A quorum being present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the Rules of Order and the Order of Business of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention, and that the Order of Business be amended by adding, immediately preceding the last item of paragraph 17 on Elections, the following item:

Deputies and Provisional Deputies to the General Convention.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 2, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

RESOLVED, That St. Andrew's Mission, St. Louis Hills, St. Louis, and Epiphany Mission, Woodbine Heights, Kirkwood, be admitted in union with this Convention.

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent was appointed a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

By authority of the Convention, the Bishop appointed the following named Nominating Committee:

The Rev. Hulbert A. Woolfall, the Rev. R. O. Kevin, Mr. Geo. M. Block, Mr. E. W. Broemmelsiek and Mr. John D'Arcy.

The Rev. Mr. Cobb presented his report as Chairman of the Department of Religious Education, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Dr. Block presented his report as Chairman of the Board of Examining Chaplains, which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins presented his report as Chairman of the Church Pension Fund Committee, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Woolfall, as Chairman of the Field Department, made an oral report.

Mrs. Fischel read the report of Mrs. John F. Shepley for the Episcopal City Mission Society, which was received and filed.

Canon George presented his report as Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to City Institutions, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

The Rev. Mr. Wilson made an oral report for St.Andrew's Mission, St. Louis Hills.

Mrs. Messick read her report as President of the Board of Managers of the Episcopal Home for Children, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Putney presented his report as Superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital, which was received and filed.

The Bishop led the Convention in Noonday Prayers.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

Mr. Eugene Thompson of the Laymen's League of the Episcopal Church addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolutions Nos. 3,4,5,&6, which were adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That this Convention endorses the Laymen's League and commends it to the Field Department with special thought in mind of the work which the Laymen's group at the Church of the Holy Apostles have been performing.

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That that portion of the Bishop's address which referred to the State administration of relief be adopted as the mind of this Convention.

Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That that part of the Bishop's address which has reference to a program for education in peace be adopted as the mind of this Convention.

Resolution No. 6.

RESOLVED, That that portion of the Bishop's address which referred to the invitation of the Pope to join in a war on Communism be adopted as the mind of this Convention.

The election for Deputies to the General Convention was made a special Order of Business for 2 p.m., to be followed by presentation of the budgets.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for Deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Dr. Block presented his report as Chairman of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, which was received and filed. The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Karl M. Block, and the Rev. Robert O. Kevin, duly elected deputies to the General Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley duly elected as lay deputy to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical and three lay deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy to the General Convention reported and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for three lay deputies to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared no election.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three lay deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. J. Manly Cobb duly elected.

Mrs. Campbell read the report of Mrs. Weed, President of the Girls' Friendly Society, which was received and filed. The Rev. Hulbert A. Woolfall, the Rev. Early W. Poindexter, the Rev. Stephen F. Bayne, Jr., and the Rev. L. H. Nugent were unanimously elected provisional clerical deputies to the General Convention.

Mrs. Mattick read the report of Mrs. Woodward, President of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Father Bayne made an oral report as Chairman of the Social Service Department.

The tellers of the pending election for three lay deputies to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared Mr. J. K. Stribling, Mr. C. D. Blake and Mr. John D'Arcy duly elected.

Mr. George M. Block, Mr. C. C. Pangman, Mr. W. L. Henry and Mr. Otto Weinrich were unanimously elected provisional lay deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolution No. 7, amending the Constitution of the Diocese, which was approved, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

Resolved, That Article III of the Constitution of the Diocese of Missouri be repealed, and in lieu thereof the following Article be enacted, to be entitled "Article III., Of the Annual Convention," viz.:

The Convention of the Church of this Diocese shall assemble annually, on the first Tuesday in February, at such place as shall have been appointed by the preceding Annual Convention; but for sufficient cause the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese shall have power to change the time or place, or both; provided, however, that at least ten days' notice of such change shall be given to every Vestry, and to the Minister in charge of every Parish and Mission in the Diocese.

The Rev. Father Bayne introduced Resolution No. 8, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

Whereas, the work of the City Mission is an integral part of the ministry of social service to which this Diocese is dedicated; and

Whereas, the Convention of this Diocese has placed its stamp of approval upon the formation of a City Mission Society, as a means to advance and foster the work of the Mission;

BE IT RESOLVED, That it is the will of this Convention that the Clergy and laity of the Diocese shall lay seriously to heart the needs of this Society and this Mission; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Clergy and laity shall extend every means of help in their power to further and to implement the work of the Society.

The Rev. Father Bayne introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

Whereas, the proper function of our Diocesan Department and ministry of Christian Social Service can only be truly expressed through the active participation of the Clergy and laity in the Parishes of the Diocese:

Be it Resolved, That in each Parish and Mission of the Diocese, the Clergy and laity shall devote their best attention to the formation of a Parish Social Service Committee, to help in the determination and advancement of the Diocesan Program of Christian Social Service.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 10, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Assessments for the Diocesan Fund (See Appendix 10-C) attached to the report of the Council, amounting to \$15,901.42, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Expense Budget for 1937, amounting to \$16,387.50. (See Appendix 10-A.)

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 11, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 11.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund (See Appendix 10-D) attached to the report of the Council, amounting to \$29,094.60, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Church Program Budget for 1937 (See Appendix 10-B), amounting to \$21,444.42, and to pay the amount that will be due the Treasurer of the National Council, in accordance with the recommendation of the Diocesan Council. (See Council Report, Appendix 10.)

In Memoriam

SISTER MIRIAM

(Susan Mary Ellis)

Born September 14, 1852

Died June 17, 1936

With deep respect, with a profound and confident sense of triumph, we chronicle here the death of SISTER MIRIAM, for fifty years a member of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd and its last surviving member. She is best described as "The Angel of Baden," a title given her by all the members of that community who knew her during the last twenty years of her life when she was in charge of the Prince of Peace Mission.

It is said that the consecrated spirit of the present nursing staff of St. Luke's Hospital is but a continuation of the great tradition created by the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, who served in the Hospital, and where, in 1886, Sister Miriam was a probationer. When the Sisterhood was invited to take charge of the Bishop Robertson Hall, a girls' school now no longer in existence, Sister Miriam became the teacher of mathematics. Former pupils tell how they never went unprepared to her class because of the high standards Sister Miriam expected not only of others but also of herself.

During the last twenty years of her life she gave all her time to the Prince of Peace Mission, which came into being because of her single-handed efforts. During this period she became the friend of all who needed her, and there matured in her life that rare spiritual grace and mellowness, which all who knew her can never forget.

A doctor, who served that community for years, said of her: "I have encountered her far from home at all seasons of the year, all hours of the night. Dark alleys, miserable hovels, lonely county roads, river front jungles, held no terrors for her. She was never afraid." Nor was she afraid of being imposed upon. Her trusting nature let some put too heavy demands on her, but she never refused when there was anything she could give of herself or of her slender resources. Her concern for all people in need grew out of her unfailing respect for human nature.

In her remarkable ministry to people, she will always be remembered, not simply as a humanitarian, but as one who was, above all else, consecrated to the spreading of Christ's Kingdom. It was this devotion to the best and her uncompromising service to that end that will make her influence live on and continuously bring forth fruit far into the future.

"We give Thee hearty thanks for the good examples of all those Thy servants, who, having finished their course in faith, do now rest from their labours."

APPENDIX No. 1.

The Address of the Bishop to the Ninety-eighth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

My friends of the Clergy and Laity:

This is the ninety-eighth occasion on which a Convention of the Diocese of Missouri has been convened. In three years we shall have completed one hundred years of service in this region. It was in 1819 that the first Episcopal Church west of the Mississippi was established, Christ Church, St. Louis, now the Cathedral so strongly grounded in the heart of this downtown area, "where cross the crowded ways of life." But it was not until twenty-one years later that our Churches in this state were organized as a Diocese—in 1840. Let us keep this coming anniversary in mind.

We would pause now for a moment to remember those whom, during the last year, we have lost. Familiar faces are missing in this Convention, men and women who have served this Church ably and devotedly: Jesse K. Brennan, for so many years a clergyman in this Diocese, a man of great intellectual gifts and splendid devotion; Sister Miriam, whose rare spirit will long linger in our memories, and whose loving kindness to many people will never be forgotten; men and women of the laity, on whose character and whose service we could count so surely, and whose friendship we cherished; there are vacant seats in the House of Bishops this year, vacant seats of men whom we remember with affection and gratitude. We are permanently enriched for having known them, and we would express our gratitude to Almighty God for them.

I am happy to record that there have been no changes in the clergy staff of the Diocese during the past year. If always we can maintain in this Diocese a group of Ministers as fine and able, and devoted as those who now serve here, we may look forward with great confidence to the future of the Diocese.

We would welcome most heartily to this Convention two young men who, during the year, have cast in their lot with us: Frederick Ward Kates, who, coming from the Theological Seminary in Virginia, is now Assistant Minister in the Church of St. Michael & St. George; and James Marcellus Lichliter, who, after completing his theological work in Union Theological Seminary, New York, and the Theological Seminary in Virginia, is now Canon of Christ Church Cathedral.

There have been three ordinations during the past year: Mr. Lichliter was ordained to the Diaconate in June, and to the Priesthood in December; Mr. Kates was ordained to the Priesthood in December.

Two new Postulants have been accepted: George F. Tittmann, whose home has been in St. Louis, and who graduated last year from Harvard University (baseball—Yale) and is now in his first year at the Theological Seminary in Virginia; and James R. Davidson, Jr., who, after some years in the business world, has entered the same Seminary.

We have advanced two men to the rank of Candidates: Ralph Bonacker, who, having graduated from the Yale Divinity School, is now taking post graduate work in the General Theological Seminary in New York, majoring in the field of applied psychology; and Darby

Betts of Grace Church, Kirkwood, who is now in his second year at Virginia. These are all first rate men. And one of the most hopeful things I know about the Church today is the number and quality of men who are seeking her Ministry. The Deans of our Seminaries tell us that never has the quality of Seminary students been so high, and never have there been so many of them.

I am glad to tell you of the appointment of an Historiographer for the Diocese. There is a vast quantity of most interesting historical material scattered throughout the Diocese, which should be gathered together, correlated, put in permanent form, and made available, especially in view of the fact that our Centennial approaches. We have been extremely fortunate in discovering an unusually well qualified scholar for this purpose, Mr. Manson M. Brien, Master of Country Day School. We shall look forward with interest to the results of his researches, and we express our gratitude that he is willing to undertake this work.

When we turn to the important missionary work of the Diocese, it is a source of gratification to record the formation and organization of two new Missions: Epiphany Mission, Woodbine Heights, Kirkwood, which has been developed under the devoted leadership of the Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, and his people; and St. Andrew's Mission, St. Louis Hills, which has been called into being through the efforts of the Rector of the Church of the Holy Innocents. This is indeed most encouraging. It is an earnest of what we hope can be accomplished on an ever widening scale. We welcome the delegates from these two Missions with enthusiasm and assure them of our pleasure and our support. At a later point in Convention I shall ask Dr. Kevin and Mr. Wilson if they will tell us of the work being done in these two Churches.

Turning briefly to our financial status, we close the year with our books balanced, and a small surplus. Also we have sent the full amount of our 'expectation' to the National Council—\$10,000.00. I should like to call your attention to the fact, however, as will appear in later discussion, that this has been accomplished only by taking the lapsed balance in one Fund to make up the deficit in another. We lapsed balance in one Fund to make up the deficit in another. faced at the end of the year a deficit in our missionary budgets, due in large measure to the failure of the Every Man's Offering to produce the results on which we had counted. The failure of this Offering we regard as a warning that we must not rely in the future on special collections in order to balance our budget. Nor can we indulge ourselves in the policy of using a balance in one Fund, which we struggle hard to create, in order to take care of deficits in our missionary work. The missionary work must stand on its own feet, and the importance of this work should make a deep enough appeal to our people to evoke complete support. This will be a matter for you to consider at a later period in Convention, for we shall present you with a missionary budget for the coming year, which, according to the pledged income for the coming year, will not balance by about two thousand dollars, if we are to maintain our work in this Diocese at its present level and continue our present support to the general missionary work of the whole Church. We shall have to find ways and means in Convention of securing added income in order to balance this budget, or else we shall have to cut it drastically. And Diocesan Council passed this unbalanced budget only on this condition. In preparing our missionary budget for this Convention, we already have cut it deeply: it will be a pity and a hardship if we are forced to cut it still more, especially in view of the fact that the work which is being done by our men throughout the Diocese is beyond all praise. There

is an encouraging financial outlook in many of the Parishes and it is our hope that some of them will feel they are able to do more than

they have pledged to date for the year 1937.

It is a great privilege to welcome to the Convention the Bishop of Tennessee, the Rt. Rev. James M. Maxon, D.D. Especially do I want him to speak to you of the general missionary work of the whole Church, and of the situation facing the National Council, which he can do as almost no one else.

Let us turn now, briefly, to other matters.

In view of the profound concern which the present international situation arouses in every mind, I would suggest that we undertake as one of our major objectives for the coming year, an intensive campaign of education for Peace in all our Churches, and as far and wide as possible, to the end that all our people may understand clearly the background and nature of the present crisis, the causes out of which wars arise, and which wars cannot cure, the major points at which they must be attacked, and the contribution which our own great Country must make to their solution. In this connection I would call your attention to the address delivered by that most admirable man, Secretary Hull, at the opening of the Inter-American Peace Conference, in which he said that it is now as plain as mathematical truth that each nation in any part of the world is concerned in peace in every part of world: that a policy leading to war anywhere may react on us; that there is no need for war, since there is a practical alternative policy at hand, complete and adequate, which is no exclusive policy aimed at the safety or supremacy of a few, leaving others to struggle with distressful situations; that it is the responsibility of each nation carefully to educate and organize its people in opposition to war and its underlying causes; that the forces of Peace everywhere are entitled to function both through governments and through public opinion, and the peoples of the world would be much wiser if they expended more of their hard-earned money in organizing the forces of Peace, and fewer of the present five billion dollars in educating and training their military forces; that therefore it is allimportant that every platform, every pulpit, and every forum should become constant and active agencies in the great work of education and organization that war is not an act of God but a crime of man, and we must destroy war or war will destroy us.

I hope we may accept his suggestion and pursue a thoroughgoing campaign of education for Peace in this Diocese. For modern war, with its terribly efficient machinery of destruction, is a process of international annihilation: a weapon as fatal to the victor as to the vanquished, since after modern war there are no victors, 'only those somewhat less vanquished than others': it creates more problems than it solves. Indeed many problems it cannot solve at all, since they can be settled only by reason and justice, and the temper in which war ends is not the temper of justice, as we well know. So the problems remain. Its evil results vastly outweigh any good: another general war will likely end in general collapse. Since we could probably achieve little good by entering such a war, we need to prepare ourselves to do everything in our power to stay out. I hope, therefore, if such an undertaking is the will of the Convention, that it be referred to the Departments of Religious Education and Social Service to co-operate in devising ways and means of furthering this

project.

Also I would call your attention to the report of the Governor's Commission on Social Security, which is now before the Legislature, with particular reference to the matter of relief. For this study makes clear that the present relief situation is intolerable. The relief load of

the State is estimated at about forty thousand cases, comprising about one hundred and fifty thousand individuals, which total, however, does not include all who are in need of assistance, but only the neediest cases. In some of the counties of the State, nothing is budgeted for relief, which consists only of inadequate and ill-balanced commodities: in fifteen counties there is budgeted from one to five dollars per year per family for relief. In the larger cities the load is staggering. Louis estimates a sum of between six and a half and seven million dollars for the next biennium for this purpose, in order to provide only minimum assistance to the needlest cases. In view of the shocking conditions of relief in many parts of the State, and the inadequacy of relief in all parts of the State, with resulting disaster in the lives of many people, the Committee is convinced that the State must come to the aid of the local units of government if even the minimum standards of relief are to be established. The problem will continue for some years. Not only cannot the local units of government, with their restricted source of revenue, support a relief load of the magnitude which confronts them during the next few years: it is not altogether just that they should be asked to do so. For the economic breakdown out of which wholesale destitution and unemployment has arisen, has been general, arising out of conditions which are in no sense the fault of local communities, but which are national in scope. It is therefore a corporate problem to be carried collectively. And National and State governments surely have as great an obligation to care for the less fortunate members of society as do cities and towns. And only through their help can the situation be dealt with adequately. The present pitiful condition should rest heavily on the consciences of all citizens. Many of these people are victims of a condition far beyond their own control and for which they are not responsible. If they cannot be given the opportunity to earn their own living, (and this a man surely has the right to ask of society—the opportunity by his own work to live with self-respect and to earn a larger share of the good things of life) they should be assured at least of the minimum essentials of health and decency. And this cannot be accomplished without State aid. The Federal government is carrying part of the load: there is every reason why the State should bear its part. It is greatly to be hoped, therefore, that the present State legislature will be moved to place the resources of the State under this relief need, that our less fortunate people may be cared for adequately.

Another matter: It has been suggested that the Protestant Churches co-operate in the campaign against Communism, initiated by His Holiness, the Pope. While we appreciate such an invitation, and usually are happy indeed to co-operate with our Roman Catholic brethren in any possible way, it does not seem to me that we can accept this invitation. For I do not believe that we shall overcome Communism by a direct frontal attack on Communism itself, but rather by a common attack on the evils out of which Communism so frequently arises—misery, poverty, injustice, and War, which intensifies misery on a huge scale; by matching their social passion with a passion for humanity and a concern for men just as intense and more universal; by confronting their atheism with a theism, a belief in God, which really has taken hold of us and gripped our minds and wills, which does not lead us off with vague aspirations after good, but infects us with an uneasy conscience and sets us the task of translating into the actual struggle of our common life the obvious social implications implicit in belief in a good God Who is concerned with the fate of His whole creation and in Whom we all are members

one of another, responsible one for the other.

Indeed here is the crux of the whole matter. The believing ages are the creative ages, as Goethe once said. And the time has come when we must make a choice, more explicit, more all-pervading, than ever before. Are we for God, and all that this Idea should mean in human society: or are we really against Him? While the crisis here is by no means as acute as it is in Germany, it is here nevertheless. And the words of those brave Churchmen, that they will obey God rather than man, is an inspiration to the world. Pure Religion is the Rock whence our liberties and our respect for man as man were These ideas themselves will not remain if they are divorced from the source of their origin. And for so long now the basic idea of High Religion has been sapping away at the base of our old habits of thought—that men are children of God, that men are therefore significant, that men consequently are entitled to the fullest opportunity for completest self-development; that men are free but men are bound (for High Religion, though promising to make men free, has never promised to make them independent); that men are free, but men are brothers; that men are free, but men are responsible one for the other; that men are free, but men are members one of another, and if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; that it is impos-sible to separate the 'spirit' of man from the social and economic conditions under which he lives, that they are intertwined and act and react upon each other, so that in serving one you also serve the other; that it is therefore absolutely unjust to ask any group or groups of our fellows to live under economic and social conditions which make the attainment of the Good Life impossible, or even exceedingly difficult; that our real objective is to change the untoward conditions themselves under which men live, and build a higher material base on which men can live sane and civilized lives, in justice, in fraternity, in peace, in which they have even greater opportunity to earn more and more of the good things of life. So long these ideas have been at work in our minds that perhaps now we are ready for a real advance.

Let us make this central in our thinking and in our action: Our Father, Thy Kingdom come, Thy Will be done on earth.

On Tuesday, May 19th, the Examining Chaplains examined Mr. James Lichliter for Deacon's Orders. These tests he passed with distinction. The Board of Examining Chaplains also reviewed the credits of Mr. Ralph Bonacker and Mr. Darby Wood Betts and certified them to the Bishop as having met the intellectual requirements necessary for their admission as Candidates for Holy Orders.

The record of examinations for the Priesthood passed by the Rev. Frederick Ward Kates, Deacon, in the Diocese of Rochester, was reviewed and Mr. Kates was examined in Ministration, the only subject omitted in those required for Ordination to the Priesthood. After a successful examination in this subject, he was recommended for Ordination.

The Rev. James Lichliter, Deacon, on December 16th was given his examinations for the Priesthood, and upon their successful completion, he was recommended to the Bishop and Standing Committee for Ordination to that office.

The Chairman has had conference with Mr. Ralph Bonacker with regard to examinations for Deacon's Orders at Spring vacation.

Tests for Deacon's and Priest's orders are both oral and written. The oral examination is given by the entire Board of Examining Chaplains and papers are set in all the subjects required.


