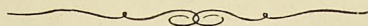

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# Journal of the Convention.

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ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, ST. LOUIS,

*Wednesday, May 28, 1873.*

In accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the Clergy and Laity assembled this day (Wednesday, May 28, 1873), in St. John's Church, St. Louis, the place designated for the meeting of the Convention.

Morning Prayer commenced at 10 o'clock.

The Choir, Lay Delegates and Clergy entered the church in procession, singing the 72d hymn. The Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. G. C. Betts, Rector of St. Luke's Church, Kansas City. The first lesson was read by the Rev. J. G. Armstrong, Rector of Trinity Church, Hannibal, and the second lesson by the Rev. E. F. Berkley, D.D., Rector of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis. The Creed and Prayers were said by Rev. O. H. Staples, Missionary in the Iron Mountain District. The Litany was said by Rev. F. B. Scheetz, Rector of St. Jude's Church, Monroe. The Ante-Communion Service was said by Rt. Rev. J. G. Auer, D.D., Missionary Bishop of Cape Palmas, Africa. The Rev. James Runcie, Rector of Christ Church of St. Joseph, read the Epistle, and Rev. Dr. Schuyler, Rector of Christ Church, St. Louis, the Gospel. The hymn "Strain Upraise" was then sung by the choir, the clergy, and the congregation, antiphonally. Rev. Geo. H. Ward, Rector of Christ Church, Boonville, then delivered the Convention sermon, taking for his text the 26th and 27th verses of the 12th chapter of First Corinthians. The Offertory sentences were said by Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, Rector of St. John's Church, St. Louis. The offertory was taken up for Diocesan missions. The prayer for the Church Militant was read by the Rev. George K. Dunlop, Rector of Grace Church of Kirkwood. The Communion was then celebrated by Bishop Robertson, and after the Post-Communion Service, said by the Rev. R. A. Holland, the Clergy retired, the choir singing a recessional.



After Service the Secretary proceeded, under the direction of the Bishop, to read the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and twenty-eight Clergymen answered to their names.

The Right Reverend the President then appointed Rev. Messrs. A. Batte, O. H. Staples, and T. O'Connell, the Committee on Lay Credentials, to report at the afternoon session.

Recess till 3 o'clock, for lunch, which was kindly provided in the basement of the Church.

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*Three o'clock, P. M.*

The Convention assembled after a recess of one hour.

The Committee on Credentials reported that thirty Parishes and their Delegates were entitled to seats in this Convention. The Bishop then announced that the Convention was duly organized and ready for business, and, upon the calling of the roll, Delegates from thirty Parishes answered to their names.

The Convention then went into the election for Secretary; and the rules of order having been dispensed with, on motion of J. T. Douglass, Esq., John R. Triplett, of Christ Church, St. Louis, was elected, with authority to appoint an assistant.

On motion of J. T. Douglass, Esq., and seconded by Wells Hender-shott, Esq., it was voted that the thanks of the Convention are eminently due and are hereby tendered Col. J. R. Shaler, for the very efficient and highly satisfactory manner in which he has discharged the duty of Secretary for the last four years.

The Secretary appointed for his assistant W. H. Cheetham.

The following Standing Committees were appointed by the President:

*Committee on Lay Credentials*—Rev. Messrs. Batte, Staples, and O'Connell.

*On Admission of New Parishes*—Rev. Messrs. Ingraham, Dunn, and Mr. L. E. Alexander.

*On Unfinished Business*—Rev. Mr. Webbe, Charles Miller, and Jesse Armstrong.

*On Finance*—Messrs. Douglass, Gill, and Bent.

*On Assessments*—M. W. Alexander, Alex. Hamilton, John Wickham, F. Carter, N. Lackland, M. Claggett, and C. Aehle.

*On Missionary Travelling Expenses*—Mr. H. I. Bodley, Col. Hull, and R. Kellett.

*On Constitution and Canons*—Rev. Drs. Schuyler and Runcie, and Judge W. F. Ferguson.



*On Missions*—Rev. Messrs. Scheetz, J. G. Armstrong, C. P. Jennings, Mr. Harding, and B. N. Tracey, Jr.

*On Christian Education*—Rev. Messrs. Dunlop, Holland, Wainwright, Mr. Comings, and General Minor.

On motion of J. T. Douglass :

*Resolved*, We welcome to our sessions the Right Reverend the Missionary Bishop of Cape Palmas, Africa, and invite him to a seat at the right hand of the Right Reverend the President, whenever it will suit his convenience to occupy it."

On motion of Rev. M. Schuyler, D.D.:

*Resolved*, That the Right Rev. J. G. Auer, Bishop of Cape Palmas, Africa, be invited to address this Convention, immediately after the opening of the session to-morrow morning, on the subject of his great work in that benighted region."

Judge Alexander Hamilton offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

*Resolved*, That all Clergymen canonically resident in the Diocese, all visiting Clergy and candidates for Holy Orders here present, be invited to seats in this Convention."

The Rt. Rev. the President then proceeded to read his Annual Address, concluding with a summary of the Episcopal acts of the past year.

[Both will be found at the close of the proceedings.]

Mr. H. H. Harding offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

*Resolved*, That the various matters mentioned in the Bishop's address be referred to the appropriate standing committees of the Convention."

On motion of Mr. H. H. Harding, the following resolution was adopted :

*Resolved*, That section fifteen of the rules of order of the Convention be so amended as to add a Standing Committee on Sunday School work."

The Rev. Mr. Reed offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

*Resolved*, That a special Committee of five Laymen be appointed to consider that portion of the Bishop's address referring to assessments upon Parishes for meeting contingent expenses of the Diocese."

Messrs. Douglass, Hendershott, Hunt, Robinson, and Barclay, were appointed said committee. Rev. Mr. Reed was added to the committee.



The Bishop announced as the standing committee on Sunday School Work, as follows: Rev. Messrs. Betts, Ingraham and O'Connell.

Mr. J. T. Douglass then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That this House has heard with feelings of grateful joy the announcement of the munificent gift of Mr. Benj. O'Fallon, to the Orphan's Home, and that, in the name and in behalf of the Church of this Diocese, we return him our hearty thanks for the same."

On motion of Mr. Hendershott, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That a special committee of five be appointed to whom shall be referred that portion of the Bishop's address relating to Confirmations, and that they report at the next annual Convention."

Rev. Messrs. Dunlop, Batte, and Woodruff, and Messrs. Hendershott and Carter were appointed said committee.

Mr. Douglass then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That that portion of the Bishop's address relating to Hymnal be referred to a committee of three Clergymen and two Laymen, who shall report at the next Convention."

The following gentlemen were appointed on said committee, Rev. Messrs. Robert, Coan and Ward, Messrs. Morgan and Triplett.

Mr. H. H. Harding then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That a committee of three Clergymen be appointed to report to the Convention resolutions expressive of the sense of this Convention on the decease of the Rt. Rev. Bishops Upfold, Eastman, and Mellvaine."

And, on motion of Rev. Mr. Holland, the preparation of an obituary on Rev. Mr. Peake, late of this Diocese, was referred to the same committee. Rev. Messrs. Berkley, Runcie, and Gregson—committee.

On motion of Mr. Douglass, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the business sessions of this Convention be from 10 o'clock A. M., until 5 o'clock P. M., with a recess of one hour at 1 o'clock P. M."

Mr. Morgan offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That all assessments against St. Paul's, South St. Louis, be remitted, and that no assessments be made against said Parish for the ensuing year. Referred to Committee of Finance."

Mr. Hendershott offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That that portion of the Bishop's address referring to the appointment of a Chancellor, be referred to Committee on Constitution and Canons."



Rev. Mr. Holland offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

*Resolved*, That so much of the Bishop's address as treats of the indebtedness of the Diocese to the Permanent Episcopal Fund, be referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to report some equitable plan of dividing the amount among all the Parishes of the Diocese."

Rev. Mr. Ingraham, from the Committee on New Parishes, reported St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, as entitled to admission into union with the Convention :

Your Committee on Admission of New Parishes report that the documents received from St. Peter's Parish, St. Louis, Mo., are in proper form, and that they recommend the admission of said Parish into union with the Convention.

Whereupon, on motion, the report of the Committee on New Parishes was adopted, and the Parish was admitted into union with the Convention.

The Committee on Lay Delegates reported that the credentials were in proper form, and that the Delegates from St. Peter's Parish take their seats. The Delegates are Charlie Thaw, W. H. Cheetham, R. H. Spencer, and Ed. J. Thomas.

Adjourned at half-past five P. M.

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## SECOND DAY.

*Thursday, May 29, 1873.*

The Convention was opened with the usual prayers by the Rev. Messrs. J. G. Armstrong and G. C. Betts.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order, and introduced the Rt. Rev. J. G. Auer, Missionary Bishop of Cape Palmas, Africa, who addressed the Convention upon his work in that benighted region.

The minutes of the first day's proceedings were read and approved.

Mr. H. H. Harding offered the following resolutions, which were adopted :

*Resolved*, That Rule 11 be so amended as to read as follows :

"No. 11. No motion shall be considered as before the House unless it be seconded, and all resolutions shall be in writing, and shall be sent to the Secretary's desk to be read.



"*Resolved*, That rule now numbered 16 be numbered 17, and that a new rule be adopted, to be numbered 16, which shall read as follows:

"16. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention."

The Secretary of the Standing Committee then presented his report of the proceedings during the past year, which was received. (See Appendix No. 1.)

The following resolutions were offered by the Rev. Mr. Holland, which were adopted:

"*Resolved*, That a special committee of five be appointed to consider and report upon that part of the Bishop's address which refers to the Missionary work of the Church in this city.

"*Resolved*, That a special committee of five be appointed, to consider and report upon that part of the Bishop's address which refers to Church charities in this city."

Rev. Messrs. Holland and Reed, and Messrs. Ferguson, O'Fallon, and Garnett, were appointed the committee under the first resolution; and Rev. Messrs. Ingraham, Coan, and Staples, and Messrs. Parker and Hendershott, were appointed the committee under the second resolution.

Mr. H. I. Bodley, of Kirkwood, presented the following, which was made the special order for 2.30 P. M.:

"*Whereas* serious and vexatious questions arise at almost every Convention, as to the basis, manner and mode of assessments; *and whereas* it is improper that our Diocesan should be hampered and annoyed by such differences and the uncertainty of support; *and whereas* the creation of a permanent fund for the support of the Episcopate would cure these difficulties and at once relieve all the Parishes of heavy assessments annually: Therefore, be it

"*Resolved*, by this Convention, that a committee of five Laymen be now appointed to raise by subscription, a permanent fund for the support of the Episcopate, if practicable during the present year, to the amount of fifty thousand dollars.

"*Resolved*, That subscriptions to said fund shall be received, payable one-fourth on demand, and the remainder in one, two and three years thereafter, in equal portions, said subscriptions to be void unless the sum of thirty thousand dollars is subscribed.

"*Resolved*, That when not less than thirty thousand dollars shall be so subscribed, the committee shall proceed to collect the first instalment and take notes for the balance, and hand the same over to the trustees of said fund. Said committee may have the power to call to their aid and assistance such other Laymen from the Parishes as they may choose, and who may be willing to assist them."



Mr. Joseph Franklin, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented his report, which was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 2.)

The report of Mr. Joseph Franklin, Treasurer of the Fund for the Aged, Infirm and Disabled Clergymen, was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 3.)

The report of Mr. Joseph Franklin, Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund, was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 4.)

The following resolution, offered by the Rev. C. P. Jennings, was adopted:

*“Whereas* Grace Church, Clarksville, is reported delinquent upon the assessment of 1872, whilst said Parish claims to have paid its full quota; therefore,

*“Resolved,* That the claim of said Parish be referred to the Finance Committee.”

On motion, the rules of order were suspended, and Mr. Joseph Franklin was re-elected the Treasurer of the Diocese.

Mr. A. M. Drake offered the following resolution, which was received and referred to the Finance Committee:

*“Resolved,* That the balance due from the Parish of Grace Church, Carthage, be and the same is hereby remitted.”

The alleged error in the assessment of 1872, upon the Parish of Calvary Church, Louisiana, was, on motion, referred to the Finance Committee.

The Registrar of the Diocese, Judge W. F. Ferguson, presented his report for the year, which was read and received. (See Appendix No. 5.)

On motion, the rules of order were suspended, and Judge W. F. Ferguson was re-elected Registrar.

On motion of the Rev. Jno. Gregson, the rules of order were suspended, and the Convention passed to the consideration of the reports of committees appointed by the last Convention.

The Rev. W. N. Webbe, chairman of the Committee on Unfinished Business, presented his report, which was received.

The Committee on Unfinished Business respectfully report that they find the following matters in the Journal of the 32d Annual Convention requiring the attention of the present Convention:

Report of Committee (John T. Douglass and Wm. H. Thomson), appointed under resolution offered by J. T. Douglass, as follows:

*“Resolved,* That the portion of the Bishop's address referring to Education and Scholarship, be referred to a committee of three (p. 25), which committee presented a partial report to the last Convention, and said committee was continued with the understanding that a 'fuller plan' would be submitted to next Convention.



“Consideration of the amendment to Art. V. of the Constitution, by adding after the word ‘Delegates,’ ‘who shall be communicants of the Church’ (p. 26).

Consideration of the amendment to change the word ‘Convention’ to ‘Council’ wherever it may occur in the Constitution or Canons (p. 32).

“Consideration of the amendment to Art. V. of the Constitution by adding after the word ‘Delegates,’ ‘who shall be baptized members of the Parish they represent’ (p. 32).”

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BASIS OF ASSESSMENT.

The committee to which was referred that portion of the Bishop's address relating to assessments, beg leave to report that, after careful consideration, they would unanimously recommend that after the present year the basis of assessment be changed from the amount of Rector's salary to the amount paid as actual expenses of the parish, and that it be left to the Finance Committee to report to this Convention the items constituting the necessary expenses of the parish.

Report received and recommendation adopted.

The Convention took a recess till 2 o'clock P. M.

*Two o'clock P. M.*

The Secretary of the General Convention made known to this Convention, by the annexed circular, the proposed changes in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

*To the Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.*

SIR:—

In compliance with the requirements of Article IX. of the Constitution of the Church, I would hereby officially make known, through you, to the Diocesan Convention of Missouri the following proposed changes in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, recommended by the General Convention of 1871, and to be finally acted upon by the General Convention of 1874, to wit:

I. It was by concurrent action (*vide* Journal of Conv. 1871, pp. 160, 161, 340, 357) of the two Houses of the General Convention of 1871,

*Resolved.* That Article IV. of the Constitution be amended by omitting the last seven words, viz., “by any Church destitute of a Bishop,” and substituting the words, “in another Diocese by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof,” so that the Article shall read as follows:

“ARTICLE IV.

“The Bishop or Bishops in every Diocese shall be chosen agreeably to such rules as shall be fixed by the Convention of that Diocese: and every Bishop of this Church shall confine the exercise of his Episcopal Office to his proper Diocese, unless requested to ordain or confirm, or perform any other act of the Episcopal Office, in another Diocese by the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof.”



II. The following resolution was adopted by the House of Deputies of said General Convention (*vide* Journal, p. 201), and information of the adoption thereof was duly transmitted to the House of Bishops (*vide* Journal, pp. 360, 381), and the said House of Bishops having failed to signify to the Convention their approbation or disapprobation within three days after the said resolution had been reported to them for concurrence—agreeably to Article III. of the Constitution—the said proposed act has “the operation of a law,” to wit:

*Resolved*, That it be recommended and proposed that the following alteration be made in Article V. of the Constitution, to wit: Insert at the end of the Article the words:

“The General Convention may upon the application of the Bishop and Convention of an organized Diocese, setting forth that the territory of the Diocese is too large for due Episcopal supervision by the Bishop of such Diocese, set off a portion of such Diocesan territory, which shall thereupon be placed within, or constitute, a Missionary jurisdiction, as the House of Bishops may determine.”

Mr. H. H. Harding offered the following resolution:

“*Resolved*, That the forms for the Organization, Incorporation, and Admission into Union with the Diocese, of New Parishes, found in Appendix No. 16, on pp. 120 to 124 inclusive of the Journal of the 32nd Annual Convention, be and the same are hereby adopted and prescribed”

Made special order for 2 o'clock on the 30th.

On motion, the amendment to Art. II. of the Constitution of the Diocese, approved at the last Convention, was taken up and the day appointed for holding the Convention was changed from the fourth Wednesday to the fourth Tuesday in May, of each year.

2.30 P.M.—The hour set for special business having arrived, the preamble and resolutions introduced by Mr. Bodley, in regard to the creation of a permanent fund for the support of the Episcopate, then came up as the regular order of business.

The same were unanimously adopted, and the following gentlemen were appointed under the first resolution: Messrs. H. I. Bodley, Joseph Franklin, Silas Bent, W. F. Ferguson, Frank Carter.

The seventh annual report of the Executive Committee of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society was presented, received, and referred to Committee on Missions. (See Appendix No. 6.)

The Missionary Board, through its Secretary, Mr. Alexander, presented their report for the year 1872, which was read, received, and referred to the Committee on Missions. (See Appendix No. 7.)

The Convention then went into election of Missionary Board by



ballot, with the following result: Rev. Messrs. J. P. T. Ingraham, R. A. Holland, and G. K. Dunlop.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop presented his account with Trust Funds, which was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 8.)

Mr. H. H. Harding offered the following resolution:

“That the thanks of this Convention are due and the same are hereby tendered to the Hon. Erastus Wells for his donation to the Orphan’s Home.”

On motion, it was further resolved, “That the gentleman from Carthage who offered the above resolution be allowed to withdraw the same, as the Managers of the Orphan’s Home had already rendered proper acknowledgments to the Hon. E. Wells.”

The Reports of the Secretary, Treasurer, and Advisory Committee of the Orphan’s Home were presented, read, and referred to the Committee on Church Institutions of the City. (See Appendix No. 9.)

The standing Committee on Constitution and Canons presented a partial report, which was read and laid over till the 30th, under the Canon.

The Committee on Missions were excused from reporting in writing.

Rev. Mr. Holland moved the adoption of the amendment to the Constitution of this Diocese, approved at the last Convention, changing the word “Convention” to “Council” wherever it occurs in the Constitution or Canons.

After discussion, the same was, on motion, laid on the table.

The Committee on Christian Education then presented their report, as follows:

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Without wasting words on what may be theoretically true, your committee would direct the attention of the Convention to what seems to them practically feasible at the present time in this Diocese.

While, therefore, we would ask from the Church in Missouri, not only its continued support of St. Paul’s College, but also a deeper interest and a livelier appreciation of its usefulness, yet we cannot leave the subject of Christian Education without urging upon the Convention the importance—nay, the necessity—of establishing an institution for the education of females.

The amount of good which has accrued to the Church already from a few such institutions in our older Dioceses can hardly be over-estimated, and will not be fully known till that day when the secrets of all hearts shall be disclosed.

We are deeply impressed with the belief that no other instrumentality will yield half the fruit from a given outlay; that the Christian training of the mothers of the next generation secures the Christianity of that generation, and, moreover, that means will be forthcoming, if we only enter upon the work with faith and enthusiasm.

We would therefore ask your adoption of the following resolution:



"*Resolved*, That a committee of two Clergymen and two Laymen be appointed, of which the Rt. Rev. the Bishop shall be chairman, whose duty it shall be to carry out the objects recommended in the above report."

The same was received, and the resolution embodied therein adopted.

Rev. R. A. Holland, Rev. G. K. Dunlop, Messrs. D. Robt. Barclay and W. A. Ross, were appointed said committee.

The Rev. Dr. Wainwright presented and read a minority report, which, on motion, was laid on the table until the report of St. Paul's College be presented.

The Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, through its President, Mr. J. T. Douglass, presented their report, which was received, and referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 10.)

Adjourned 5.45 P. M.

### THIRD DAY.

*Friday, May 30, 1873.*

Convention was opened with the Litany and appropriate Collects, by the Rev. Messrs. R. A. Holland and F. B. Scheetz.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop then took the chair and called the Convention to order. The minutes of the second day's proceedings were read and approved.

The following preamble and resolution was offered by the Rev. A. Batte of Kansas City:

"*Whereas*, at a regular Parish meeting, on Easter Monday, 1873, the name of St. Paul's Church, Kansas City, was changed to that of Grace Church, Kansas City; therefore,

"*Resolved*, That the said change be accepted, and the Secretary ordered to register accordingly."

The report of the Trustees of St. Paul's College was presented, together with the report of the Treasurer and Warden, and received; also, the minority report on Christian Education was presented, as follows:

#### MINORITY REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The minority of the Committee on Christian Education would respectfully offer the following report, viz:



*Whereas*, St. Paul's College, being a Diocesan institution, lays claim to the full and hearty support of the entire Church in the Diocese; and,

*Whereas*, the friends of the College, who have given their money and time for its advancement, are at this time endeavoring to awaken a fresh interest throughout the Diocese in its behalf;—We venture, therefore, respectfully to recommend that the Laity and the Clergy give their thoughts and energies to the raising of St. Paul's College to that degree of prominence which it deserves, thus making it in reality, what it is nominally, a Diocesan Institution. It is further recommended that at each annual Convention one or more Examiners be appointed to visit that institution, and report to the next ensuing Convention. All of which is respectfully submitted.

J. A. WAINWRIGHT.

On motion of Rev. C. P. Jennings, it was

*Resolved*, That the report of the Board of Trustees of St. Paul's College, and the minority report of Dr. Wainwright, be referred to a committee of two."

The Rt. Rev. the President appointed the Rev. C. P. Jennings and Mr. J. Q. DeGarmo said committee. (See Appendix No. 11.)

The Committee on Constitution and Canons reported as follows :

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the communication of the Rev. Dr. Perry, Secretary of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies of the General Convention, would respectfully report that by the IX. Article of the Constitution of the General Convention, no action of the Diocesan Convention is required; but inasmuch as heretofore an expression of the opinion of this Diocesan Convention has been made on similar occasions, the committee recommend the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That this Convention approve of the proposed amendments to the Constitution, as contained in the communication of the Rev. Dr. Perry hereto appended.

On motion, the same was adopted.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons also recommend that Sec. 1 of Canon XII. be so amended as to read in the last line: "The *Treasurer* shall report such parish to the Convention in his annual statement;" also, that the following Canon be entitled "Of the Chancellor of the Diocese," and numbered XXIII.:

"CANON XXIII.

*"Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.*

"There shall be elected by the Convention an officer learned in the law, under the title of 'Chancellor of the Diocese,' whose duty it shall be to act as the legal counsellor of the Bishop and of the Standing Committee, in matters affecting the interest of the Church, as his professional counsel may be asked or required. The Chancellor of the Diocese shall be a communicant of the Church, and hold his office for the term of three years; and in the event of a vacancy, the Bishop and Standing Committee shall fill the vacancy until the annual Convention next ensuing, when it shall elect a successor for the full term of three years."

Also, recommend to transpose in the Rules of order of business, Rule 6 to 5, and so 5 to 6.



Also, recommend to make No. 18 the Report of Trustees of St. Paul's College; No. 19. Orphan's Home; No. 20, St. Luke's Hopital, and change the numbers that follow.

The proposed amendments to the Canons and Rules of Order were then adopted.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Schuyler, the change in Article XI. of the Constitution, recommended by the last Convention, to read, "three laymen," instead of two "laymen," was adopted by a concurrent vote of orders.

The Rev. Dr. Schuyler then presented his report as chairman of the Committee on Woman's Work, which was read and adopted:

At the last Convention the following resolution was passed, appended to the report on Woman's Work:

*Resolved*, That in the judgment of this Convention it is expedient to establish a Sisterhood in the city of St. Louis, and that a commission of three clergymen be appointed to determine, by correspondence and otherwise, the most practicable way of carrying out this object, with authority to act in conjunction with the Bishop."

In accordance with this resolution, the Rev. Mr. Robert, Drs. Cross and Schuyler, were appointed such commission. They proceeded to act in conjunction with the Bishop and to carry on correspondence, the result of which has been the transfer of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd from Baltimore to St. Louis. They are now in charge of St. Luke's Hospital and of the Orphan's Home, and have a home of their own in a hired house. It is unnecessary to speak of the good already accomplished by these sisters in the improved management of both the institutions named.

We anticipate the time as not far distant when a permanent Home shall be provided for them by the liberality of the churchmen of this city. It is no longer a problem in the Church, whether it is expedient to encourage such Sisterhoods. They have won their own way to sympathy and confidence, and henceforth they are to become more and more preëminently useful and honored.

The Rev. Dr. Berkley, chairman of the committee appointed to prepare a letter, giving an expression of sympathy of this Convention on the decease of the Rt. Revs. the Bishops of Indiana, Massachusetts, and Ohio, and also of the Rev. Edwin Peake of this Diocese, presented the following report, which was rdopted by a rising vote:

The committee appointed to consider that part of the Bishop's Address which refers to the death of the late Bishops of Indiana, Massachusetts, and Ohio, and one of our own clergy, since the meeting of the last Convention of this Diocese, beg leave to report the strong expressions of sympathy which this Convention feels with those Dioceses that have been thus afflicted.

The late Bishop of Indiana—the Rt. Rev. George Upfold, D.D. In the death of this honored Prelate, who was for many years withheld from active duty by great personal suffering and infirmity, we give expression to our sorrow, because



he was a man of great personal worth and goodness, of fine abilities and power, who used his office well to the glory of God and the good of his fellow-men.

The late Bishop of Massachusetts—the Rt. Rev. M. Eastburn, D.D. We record our deep sense of the value to the Church of the example of this worthy Master in Israel, as a strong and manly Christian, and a learned and laborious Bishop.

The late Bishop of Ohio—the Rt. Rev. C. P. Melvaine, D.D., D.C.L., LL.D. In the death of the Bishop of Ohio, truly a great man has fallen in Israel. In our sorrow that he is taken away, we write down our thankfulness to God for the good example of this faithful servant, who, having finished his course, now rests from his labors; who, in the possession of a long Episcopate, proved himself a wise and diligent and most useful servant of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The late Edwin Peake, Rector of All-Saints' Church, Nevada City. Death has touched the next order of the ministry among us in the removal, from his sphere of earthly duty, of the Rev. Mr. Peake. He was a laborious, self-sacrificing and efficient minister, and we heartily sympathize with his parish and his family in the bereavement they have sustained.

*Resolved*, That this Convention does hereby tender to the clergy and laity of the Dioceses of Indiana, Massachusetts, and Ohio, the assurance of its earnest sympathy with them respectively in the loss they have sustained; and that the Secretary of this Convention be instructed to transmit to these Dioceses, and to the families of the deceased Bishops and of Mr. Peake, a copy of these recorded statements of its sympathy.

The Rev. G. C. Betts, chairman of the Standing Committee on Sunday Schools, presented and read his report, as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

*To the 33d Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:*

The standing committee, to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address relating to the management and instruction of Sunday Schools, beg leave to report, that they have given as careful attention to the subject as the time at their disposal permitted, and herewith present such views and recommendations as appear to them of greatest importance.

The whole matter naturally divides itself into the following parts:

- I. THE SERVICES, including the *Liturgy* and *Hymn Books* used.
- II. THE INSTRUCTION, including the *Subjects*, *Text-Books*, and *Methods* employed.
- III. THE OFFICERS, including their *qualifications* and *appointment*.
- IV. THE DIOCESAN AGENCIES for enlisting interest in Sunday School work.

1. Your committee are of the opinion that every means should be used for making the children of the Church acquainted, at the earliest possible moment, with the Standards of the Church, for which reason the Opening and Closing Services should be chosen from the Prayer Book, and should be short and simple.

They have examined the various Liturgies published from time to time, and find them defective in ease, language, and adaptedness, in proportion as they vary from the order of our Common Prayer.

Your committee have also noticed, with regret, the doctrinally erroneous and unchurchly character of a large number of the Hymns in use in our Sunday Schools; in too many of which, it would seem, that true teaching and common



sense appear to be sacrificed to a rollicking (we cannot better express it) chorus of song, or to a pretty jingle of words, in which the Sacred Name of JESUS is so shockingly desecrated.

They offer some recommendations under this head which will appear hereafter.

2. Your committee cannot fail to be impressed with the haphazard and fitful nature of the instruction given, as the result partly of the number and kind of text-books used, the constant changing of them, and the lack of properly instructed and faithful teachers.

They are of the opinion that no better scheme of instruction can be devised than that already laid down in the Office for Baptism, and that no better means can be employed than the voice of the diligent teacher, more especially the Pastor, who should, on every occasion possible, be foremost in a duty so plainly indicated in the Rubrics and Canons of the Church; and this seems of such vital importance, that, where the service required conflicts with Evening Prayer, this last should give way to the former, or the former be made, as it *can* be made, a very effective part of the latter.

There seems to be a too great reliance upon text-book instruction, and the parrot-like repetition of verses and collects, which, rewarded by the questionable distribution of prize-tickets, encourages a fictitious standard of excellence that the actual results do not justify.

In this connection, your committee believe that the Library and other books of the Sunday School should strictly conform to the authorized standards, and be selected by the Pastor *only*; and that no Superintendent, Teacher, or Committee, be intrusted with that most important work. Recommendations under this head are here appended.

3. Your committee are of the opinion that, whenever practicable, the Pastor should be the Superintendent of the Sunday School; but that, in any event, the sole power of appointing or removing Superintendent and Teachers should reside in him, and that none such should be appointed who is not qualified by proper knowledge and training for so weighty and responsible a trust.

4. Your committee recognize in the S. S. Missionary Host of the Diocese a valuable auxiliary in promoting the interests here had in view, and venture to express the hope, that in its workings and public services, it may set forth and develop in a churchly way the resources we possess for the nurture and culture of Church children.

They heartily commend this whole matter to the attention of the Convention, and herewith offer the following recommendations, which they trust may be adopted, and the means devised for carrying them into successful operation.

Your committee recommend—

1. That the opening and closing services of the Sunday Schools be taken from the book of Common Prayer, and in the following order:

*The Salutation.*

*The Lord's Prayer and Versicles.*

*A Canticle (The Venite or Cantate).*

*A Bible Lesson (selected with regard to the season).*

*A Hymn (from the Authorized Hymnal).*

*The Apostles' or Nicene Creed.*

*The Versicles.*

*The Collect for the Day—For Holy Innocents' Day—For the 2d Sunday in Advent, and The Grace of Our Lord.*

*A Hymn.*



Then follows the Instruction for the day ; after which, to close,

*A Hymn, a Collect, and The Benediction.*

2. Your committee recommend that the following order of Instruction be observed.

With the younger and uninstructed children, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments.

The 2d Grade should be taught, and Orally, an exposition of the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments.

The 3d Grade should be taught those "other things which a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health," viz., *Of the Sacraments of the Church*, and these as preparatory to Confirmation. Such instructions should include the History of the Beginning, Continuity, and Polity of the Church—Patriarchal, Levitical, and Christian; strongly advocating herein the study of Ecclesiastical History among the older scholars.

3. Your committee recommend that the only Hymns used shall be taken from those duly approved by the General Convention, and that the Pastor select all such other books as are to be used in his school.

4. Your committee recommend the publication, for use in this Diocese, of a very simple Scheme of Instruction, including an outline of Biblical and Ecclesiastical History, with reference to text-books of easy access; and, until such be accomplished, they recommend the use of the leaflets known as *The Children's Paper*, now published in Toronto, if the Bishop approves. They recommend, also, the preparation of a Table of Scripture Lessons, for the several Sundays of the Church's year.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Rev. W. N. Webbe offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

"*Resolved*, That the report of the Standing Committee on Sunday Schools, with the recommendations thereto appended, be adopted and published in the *Church News*."

A communication was read from the Secretary of the Missionary Host of Missouri, extending an invitation to the Convention to attend their annual Celebration on Whit-Sunday P. M., at Christ Church.

The following resolution, offered by Mr. H. H. Harding, was read and adopted:

"*Resolved*, That there shall be annually appointed by the Bishop a committee of three laymen, to be a permanent committee of the Diocese, who shall act in connection with the Secretary in the revision and publication of the *Journal of the Convention*."

The Rt. Rev. the President appointed W. F. Ferguson, Wells Hendershott, and W. H. Cheetham, said committee.

On motion of J. Q. DeGarmo, the Rev. P. G. Robert, Messrs. Charlie Thaw and D. H. Naylor were elected trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund for the ensuing year.



Rev. W. N. Webbe, and Messrs. J. R. Triplett and Wallace Delafield were elected trustees of the Theological Educational Fund.

On motion of Judge Ferguson, John Wickham, Esq., of Trinity Church, St. Louis, was elected *Chancellor of the Diocese*.

On motion of Rev. W. N. Webbe, it was

“*Resolved*, That it be referred to the Standing Committee on Sunday-schools, to prepare a System of Instruction for use in Sunday Schools of the Diocese, said system to include an outline of Biblical and Ecclesiastial History, and also a Table of Scripture Lessons suited to the various Sundays of the Church year, and that the clergy throughout the Diocese forward to said committee the results of their experience in the matter, said committee to report to next Convention.”

Adopted.

The following preamble and resolutions, offered by the Rev. Dr. Berkley, were read and adopted :

“*Whereas* a resolution was offered in this Convention yesterday, returning thanks to the Hon. E. Wells for a gift of money to the Orphan’s Home, an institution under the patronage of this Convention and of this Church; *and whereas* that resolution seemed not to have been courteously received by the Convention; therefore,

“*Resolved*, That the seeming discourtesy arose entirely from the conviction that the Managers of the Orphan’s Home had already rendered their thanks to Mr. Wells for his kindness, to which Board this recognition properly belonged, and not from any want of thankfulness on the part of the Convention that one of its charities had been so kindly assisted.”

Rev. Mr. Holland then offered the following protest :

“We, the undersigned, do solemnly protest against the action of the Convention in practically endorsing the reception by the Orphan’s Home of a gift of money from Hon. Erastus Wells; said money being a part of back-pay he took as a member of the Forty-second Congress, from funds which that Congress voted itself;—not that we design hereby to express any opinion upon the conduct of Hon. Mr. Wells or of the Orphan’s Home, but that we cannot commit ourselves to an approval of an Act of Congress which, to say the least, was of questionable propriety. And we most respectfully request that this protest be allowed record in the minutes of the Convention.

3. That Examiners be appointed by the Convention each year to visit St. Paul's College, and report to the Diocesan Convention next ensuing.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH CHARITIES IN ST. LOUIS.

The committee to whom was referred the subject of Church Charities in the city of St. Louis, beg leave to report that there are now two great public Church charities in this city, towards which the attention of the Church in the whole Diocese should be directed. These are the *Orphan's Home* and *St. Luke's Hospital*. Of the former, so often brought to your notice by its good works, we need only now to say that we believe it has never before appeared in a more prosperous and hopeful condition. During the year past its business affairs have been conducted in a very systematic and satisfactory manner. Its internal affairs have within a few months been placed in the charge of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, who have conducted them in a manner not only entirely satisfactory to the Board of Managers, but in a way that has already gained the growing confidence of the public. As to the financial condition of the Home, we find it very satisfactory; the amount of available funds being, at Easter, about \$30,000 towards a new building; and since that time the Bishop has announced the donation of land at once available to the amount of \$50,000.

The committee would express their heart-felt encouragement at the general state of things with reference to the Home, while they commend it to the earnest attention and prayers of all throughout the Diocese.

Your committee would also express their gratification at the hopeful condition of affairs with regard to *St. Luke's Hospital*. This also is, as is well-known, under the management of the *Sisters of the Good Shepherd*. And on every side, both within and without the Hospital, are heard warm expressions of satisfaction and confidence in their kindly ministrations and general management.

That which is now greatly needed, not only for the comfort, health and convenience of these angels of mercy in their daily labors, but in order to the greater comfort of the patients, as well as for the more widely extended influence of the Hospital, is a more commodious, indeed, a *properly constructed Hospital Building* in a central location. And this we have now strong hopes will be accomplished at an early day.

Never has more enthusiasm appeared in any undertaking connected with St. Luke's than manifested itself on the evening of the 29th May at Christ Church Chapel, when, with comparatively few of its friends present, some \$1,600



were pledged toward the purchase of a lot—and the hearts of all present burned with the hope and faith that the whole amount would soon be pledged.

When the lot is secured and paid for, we have reason to believe the building will at once be erected, as it is already partially provided for.

We heartily commend to Churchmen throughout the Diocese, this truly Christian work, as one which directly interests every member of Christ's body the Church.

Rev. Dr. Runcie was elected Trustee to General Theological Seminary, in place of Rev. Dr. Easter removed from the Diocese.

Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham offered the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That Sec. 1, Article V. of the Constitution of the Church in this Diocese, be amended by adding thereto, after the word 'Church,' 'who shall be communicants of the Church.'

The Rev. C. P. Jennings then proposed an amendment, substituting the word "members" for "communicants." The amendment was, on motion, adopted, and the resolution as amended was lost by a vote of 30 to 19.

The Convention went into election for Standing Committee for the ensuing year. Rev. W. N. Webbe and Col. Hull were appointed tellers. The following were elected: Rev. M. Schuyler, D.D., Rev. P. G. Robert, Rev. Ed. F. Berkley, D.D., Messrs. H. I. Bodley, W. F. Ferguson, Silas Bent.

The Clerical and Lay Delegates from St. Jude's Church, Monroe City, were excused from further attendance.

The chairman of Committee on City Missions submitted the following report, which was read, and the resolutions embodied therein adopted :

The Committee on City Missions beg to report the following as the result of their most careful consideration of the subject.

The condition of our Church, as regards its extension in this city, is a matter of deep concern and anxiety to your committee; and no words that we can find can adequately express the deep importance we attach to this subject.

From the facts before us, we are driven to the painful confession that our Church, in this direction, is losing ground. Though resolutions were drafted and adopted at the last Convention with reference to Church extension in this city, no satisfactory results have followed; and in pressing this subject upon the mind of the Church, we most earnestly desire that immediate and vigorous action shall follow this report. The committee is not ignorant of one cause that has doubtless had much to do with the inactivity—the lethargy of our city churches touching City Missions. The paralyzing effects of the large indebtedness of our churches, has extended of necessity to this branch of their work. But by God's blessing upon the conquering faith and energy of our clergy, and by the noble gifts of our laity, this cause is removed, and our city Churches



stand unshackled, and are able to stretch forth strong arms to the relief of weak struggling sister parishes, and to plant the seed of life in desolate places. Still, we dare not indulge extravagant hopes. Though conquerors, they are weary from the conflict; though victorious, they are not so without a mighty effort. And yet we may not suffer our weapons to rust, nor our Master's cause to stand still. The glowing zeal and practical energy of our Bishop must inspire us; above all, the salvation of souls and the glory of God must drive us on to new victories and continued exertion.

The Churches of this city have no Missionary, though we are neither few nor weak. The question before us is: Can nothing be done for the extension of the Church in the city limits, by the churches of the city? Your committee are persuaded that by immediate, vigorous, united action we can do something. We do not propose much; the churches here are not yet equal—from the many demands upon them, and the recent struggle—to great things. But we do propose that something shall be done, and we are unanimous in the conviction that if, at once, upon closing this report, the subjoined resolutions are adopted and acted upon, another Convention will find our City Missions in an improved condition, fully commensurate with our expectations: Therefore,

*Resolved*, That the Bishop be requested to nominate to the Missionary Board for their election, a City Missionary to be supported by contribution from the parishes of St. Louis.

*Resolved*, That the Convention most earnestly recommend to the Chapter of St. Louis to adopt such a plan for the obtainment of necessary funds as shall enable the Bishop to make an early selection of the proper laborer, and to send him forth to the whitening harvest field at hand.

The following changes and amendments to Prescribed Canonical Forms, offered by Mr. Wells Hendershott, were authorized and prescribed:

1. That on page 120, first paragraph, "III." be stricken out and "XI." be inserted instead.
2. That to Art. 8 be added, "nor shall such conveyance be made unless in subjection to the second and third sections of Canon XXI. of Title I. of the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America."
3. That in Form C. 122d page, after the word "Church" be added the words "of the United States."
4. That after the word "Rev." in form D, a blank space be left, and omit the word "the" following.
5. That Form E be amended by erasing the words "An Act of the General Assembly of said State, entitled 'An Act concerning Corporations,' approved



March 19th, 1866," and that there be inserted instead the words "Laws of the State of Missouri."

6. That in the first article of the Articles of Association, 4th line, the word "church" be erased, and the words "house of public worship" be inserted instead, and that the words "parish school" be stricken out.

7. That in the 5th article, 2d line, page 123, the word "church" be stricken out, and "house of public worship" inserted instead; and all that enclosed in ( ) of said 5th article be stricken out.

8. That at bottom of page 123, "XI." be substituted for "III."

Rev. E. Coan, from the Committee on Hymnal, invited suggestions from the clergy and churchmen of the Diocese on the subjects relating to their commission, and said that committee would be happy to correspond with any who might desire to make suggestions during the ensuing Convention year.

The reports of the Board of Trustees and Treasurer of St. Luke's Hospital were read and received. (See Appendix No. 12.)

"*Resolved,* That the thanks of this Convention are hereby tendered to the Rev. Geo. H. Ward for his pointed and able sermon at the opening of this Convention."

"*Resolved,* That seven hundred copies of the Journal of this Convention be printed."

H. I. Bodley, Esq., chairman of Committee on Expenses of the Missionaries to and from the Convention, submitted his report, which was received. (See Appendix No. 13.)

The Committee on Finance submitted the following

REPORT.

The Committee on Finance beg leave to report that each of the various matters referred to said committee have received that attention their importance demands, and the committee ask the adoption of the various recommendations herewith submitted.

Report of Treasurer of Diocese. We find the additions and footing of this report correct. The receipts to the General Fund during the past year aggregate \$5,411.51; which amount has been expended less \$43.95; balance reported as cash on hand. The amount due this fund is \$2,324.40, and the debt of the Diocese is about the same sum.

The notes and deed of trust were exhibited to your committee.



The Treasurer of the Fund for Infirm and Aged Clergy, reports receipts during the past year from interest \$220.91; from parishes \$412.40; balance reported last time \$556.72. The fund has now invested in real estate some \$2,000; balance of cash on hand \$164.03. Total assets \$2164.03.

The Treasurer of the Theological Fund reports receipts from collections returned from different parishes \$232.75; from bills receivable \$600; from interest \$46.80; total \$879.55. Expenditures \$176.86. Loaned on real estate security \$500; cash on hand \$202.75. The Trust Fund administered by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop, shows a balance on hand at the date of last report of \$416.42; receipts \$1,707.28; expenditures, which appear to the committee to have been eminently judicious, \$1,528.25; balance on hand \$595.45. The committee have examined the report of the Treasurer of Board of Trustees of Permanent Fund, and find it correct.

The following named Parishes have applied for relief from present liability, either by remission in whole or in part, or by an extension of time within which they will pay.

Mt. Calvary, St. Louis, stands on the Treasurer's books as delinquent \$216.32 upon the assessment of 1871. The Parish claims that the assessment of that year was made upon a wrong impression as to the amount pledged the Rector; but as the Parish was represented in that Convention, and no objection was raised when the Assessment Committee reported, the committee think that it would establish a bad precedent to remit the amount.

Christ Church, Boonville, ask for time. Granted.

Grace Church, Carthage, is reported delinquent \$54.45. The committee recommend an extension, and that the Parish be allowed to give notes, payable in one or two years.

Calvary Church, Louisiana. Nothing before the committee to warrant a recommendation of remission or reduction.

Grace Church, Clarksville, \$200; should be \$28 instead of \$35. Have paid \$44 for \$42 receipts in full. Money paid by Mr. W. A. Luther, \$4.

Christ Church, Waverly. Mr. DeGarmo states that the Parish was assessed under the idea that the Parish was pledged to raise three or four hundred dollars, when in fact nothing was pledged; therefore, we recommend a remission of all but \$30, due on old account.

St. Luke's, Kansas City, \$474.70; do not ask a cent to be remitted, but that time be granted, and it will all be paid with interest at the rate of eight per cent. per annum, good security; note of Parish endorsed by good party.

St. Paul's, South St. Louis. The church is mortgaged, and it will be all the Parish can do to raise enough to prevent sale of church. There is no Rector; dependent upon Mr. Staples for service. Remit the whole \$216.32.

All-Saints', Nevada, delinquent \$154.75. Assessment of last year was made under a misapprehension of the facts as to the salary of Rector. We recommend the remission of the assessment of last year, \$98.

Calvary Church, Sedalia, is reported in arrears \$198.25. This Church was assessed two or three years before it was a Parish in union with this Convention, and paid at one time \$50. We recommend a remission of all but the assessment of last year, \$140; and that the \$50 paid while it was a Mission Station, be credited on the assessment of last year.

Grace Church, Clarksville, was assessed \$7 too much last year. We recommend it be remitted.

The Convention on yesterday adopted the recommendation of a special committee that the basis of assessment, after this year, be the sum expended as ne-



cessary expenses of the Parish, instead of an amount paid as Rector's salary, and that it be left to the Committee on Finance to say what items constitute the necessary expenses of the Parish. The committee, therefore, report the following as constituting the necessary expenses of a Parish, to-wit: Rector's salary, and if a parsonage is furnished, the rental value of the parsonage, sexton, fuel, light, taxes, and insurance.

Bill of Expenses for reporting the Ecclesiastical trial held last year. This bill was referred to this committee at the request of the Standing Committee, after full discussion with Messrs. Walbridge & Co. The committee is authorized to say that \$400 will be accepted in full payment, and we recommend that sum be allowed.

The recommendations as to the following Parishes in the above report were adopted:

Christ Church, Carthage; Calvary Church, Louisiana; Christ Church, Warrensburg; St. Paul's Church, South St. Louis; All-Saints, Nevada City, and Calvary Church, Sedalia. The indebtedness of St. Luke's Church, Kansas City, was reduced to \$400, payable by notes one, two, and three years. The indebtedness of Mount Calvary Church, St. Louis, was remitted one-half, upon the said church paying the remaining half during the ensuing year. The expenses of organist and choir were added to the necessary expenses of a Parish for establishing the basis of assessment. The recommendation for the payment for bill of expenses of Ecclesiastical trial, held last year, was adopted. The report of Finance Committee was then adopted as a whole.

The thanks of the Convention were tendered to Mr. John R. Triplett, Secretary, and Mr. W. H. Cheetham, Assistant Secretary, for their efficient services during the sessions of this Convention.

The Committee on Assessments made the following report, which was adopted:

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Annual Address  
OF  
THE BISHOP OF MISSOURI.

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MY DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND THE LAITY:

At the end of another year of opportunity and duty, I welcome you to our annual assemblage for retrospect and fraternal counsels. It has been a year abounding in mercies, and one not by any means the least interesting in the history of the Diocese. While we may use the present opportunity to digest results and improve our methods, we may also recount the sum of our deliverances, which may have come to us singly, and at the time called forth from us but little heed. A year counts for very much in our quickly moving Western land, and only the utmost alertness in recognizing and improving our opportunities, can keep the Church at all abreast of the other interests astir here. Somewhat has been done, and yet so much is still before us in the future to be accomplished, that there cannot be a single moment's abatement of vigilance for the indulgence of self-congratulation.

I have again to thank God for having been enabled, without interruption, to continue my official duty throughout the year, and to meet all the numerous appointments which the Diocesan work requires. As usual, I have gone into all the parts of the State, and have held services, often alone, in a great many new places where our services have never before been celebrated. Over one-tenth of the Confirmations of the year have been held in communities where the service had never been administered before. I can only repeat the testimony which I have hitherto borne, that I have witnessed on all sides the greatest readiness to receive with candor the worship and the principles of the Church.

Our growth will be hampered by no influence half so potent as our own inability to enter upon the fields inviting our advance, and to sustain missionaries during the earlier stages of the work. The services which I have held in the newer places have been very largely attended; the interest in learning about the distinctive features of our Church, shown by an eager absorption of the smaller works explanatory of its principles, as also in other ways, is most marked; and wherever services have been commenced there are found in considerable numbers those who seem to have been long waiting for that which, in the spirit of its nurture and teaching, and in the



solemnizing tone of its religious services, satisfies their desires and wants as does the Church. There is a very strong and growing disposition in many communities, as they become larger and more intelligent, to revolt at the low conceptions of the Christian life presented in the revival systems which have prevailed so extensively in the interior for many years. And the Church is doing its healing work in rescuing from indifference and despair those who had been thrown out of all hope by these periodical upheavals. It is most delightful to witness the dawning of a better life in those who could not be induced to pretend to a depth of feeling which they had not, and who were hopeless of reaching a standard of Christian development at the start, which seemed to be demanded of them; and who, for this reason, conceived that there was no place or hope for them. To them the Church, in its encouragement of the first faint longings for better things, and in its provision for their development and growth, was a revelation of what they had longed for, but had not known of the existence of. Under a better spiritual tillage such persons are now among the most useful members of our parishes.

As may readily be supposed, the year has witnessed a very large increase in the work of the Diocese. It has not been a year in which the State (outside of this city) has gained by immigration largely in population; and in all sections it has been a period of almost unexampled financial stringency. That our work, in spite of all this, has moved on as it has, is a matter of devout thankfulness. Four churches in the interior have been consecrated during the year; and five others, at Utica, DeSoto, Carrollton, and Moberly, have recently been finished for use; and several other churches erected within the last few years are kept back from consecration because of the remainders of debt from which they have not as yet been able to get free. Parsonages have been completed this year in Laeledge and Jefferson City, and are in contemplation in several of the other parishes; and there is, I am glad to say, an awakening sense of the great importance of this means of permanence and comfort of the pastoral relation.

Just so soon as breath has been recovered from the erection of the church, and this should not be of so costly a design as to exhaust the strength for an indefinite period, the work should be taken in hand of providing a home for the clergyman. I cannot overstate the importance of this matter in its bearing upon the happiness of the minister, and then in a reflex, but by no means indirect or remote manner upon the success of the parish.

I contemplate the numerous churches and the occasional parsonages which have been secured during these troublous times with a peculiar satisfaction, because they have been the fruits of sacrifices and labors made gladly by those who could ill bear them, for the sake of Christ and the Church. Some of these buildings—if I might particularize, I would name specially the churches in Utica, DeSoto and Ironton—are beautiful in themselves; but all of them, to those who have watched their progress, have an attractiveness by reason of all the labors and self-denials and prayers of which they are the embodiment.

The stringency of the times has had its accustomed effect in rendering difficult the fulfillment of parochial engagements. Some of the churches



were only able to pledge a portion of the salary which they had previously given, and from some of the parishes I have been unable to secure any pledge for clerical support at all. The immediate and necessary result of this was to bring about a number of resignations and vacant parishes. And as the same cause was diminishing the receipts of the Missionary Board, it was manifestly impossible to increase the appropriation, and so several of the parishes have been suffering from an interruption in their clerical services. The number of clergymen in the Diocese has fallen from this cause below our number for last year, and we have lost several valuable helpers. The Confirmations of the year have amounted to 449, a gratifying advance upon the number reported last year, especially considering the fact of the diminished number of clergymen. But for this, I do not doubt that we would have surpassed the results of any former years.

I am glad, however, to say that most of the parishes, which have no longer resident pastors, have joined with other places, and have regular, though less frequent, services. Or, where this is not the case, lay readers have been licensed, and do all that is possible to keep the Sunday Schools together, and the Church people in heart. Of course this is not all that we might wish, and I am often saddened at the letters which I receive from stations which sorely need and long for the services to which they have been accustomed.

The fact is, however, that these places would not remain so long uncared for if there were a larger number of clergymen available who were ready and fitted for such work as ours. I do not mean that there is anything peculiar in the work of this Diocese; our needs are the same as those of all frontier and aggressive fields. Large parishes, with settled and compacted work, can always and quickly be filled. There are plenty of applications for such positions. But the more difficult and critical places are those in which our Church work is just beginning, where three or more stations must be united under one minister in order to secure a support. This duty requires for success that the person shall give a fair share of his time to each place; shall be willing to accommodate himself to the circumstances and needs of the work. This almost necessarily requires an unmarried person, or, at any rate, one who is ready to subordinate his domestic desires to the evident requirements of his duty. It ought not to seem unreasonable that deacons after their ordination should be willing to give to the Church, which they profess to be ready to make sacrifices for, two or three years before their marriage, in order that they may do this work so essential to the Church's growth, and which only persons who can labor at little cost can perform. Here is the Church's crucial testing place; with our inability as things now are to find in sufficient numbers those who are ready to submit to the conditions for the performance of this work, our smaller places must remain vacant, and we must continue to neglect the promising openings which are on all sides inviting our approach. Business, with its mastering motives, can command and hold its votaries to the frontiers, and induce them to accept gladly, in the hope of its rewards, the conditions of modesty and devotion which it imposes in order to success. Too often it is only in the ministry that it is demanded that a home and a comfortable settlement must be provided for its young men from the start. If I speak



earnestly, it is only because, through our scores of places, infant parishes, feeble struggling stations plead piteously for ministers, who can only, so far as I can see, be sustained at the start under the conditions which I have indicated.

I should not however be stating all the truth if I did not add what I may have adverted to before, but cannot urge too often, that, while the clergy are far from being faultless, and while there are often hasty and unwise connections formed, from which the best extrication is a dissolution of the tie, still that a great many parishes are made vacant, and Church work brought to a stand still, by petty jealousies and evil surmisings, and a withholding of kindly co-operation and candid construction. The Bishop is very often appealed to to assist in filling a parish vacancy, when he is thoroughly aware that the incoming clergyman will have no greater guarantees for success than his predecessor, and that he is likely also to be immolated on the altar of prejudice and captious self-will. When the work at best is one of self-sacrifice, when less can be offered in the way of pecuniary support than would naturally attract the clergyman, then it is alike the dictate of kindness and self-interest to attach the clergyman to his work by offices of help, and consideration, and promptness, so far as possible, in all financial engagements. We have had a larger number of changes among the clergy in the Diocese than usual during the past year; and it has sometimes seemed, in the loneliness which I have felt in going from place to place, and missing the faces which I had associated with the work, as though all ties with the past were being sundered and lost. Doubtless some of the changes were necessary; but I am persuaded that we are losing much of influence, and experience, and local knowledge, and the respect of the communities, in the rapid and generally causeless changes which too often break up the pastoral relation. The vague idea that a fresh face will be an improvement is found to be false; in the necessity for enduring more it is seen that it was ourselves who were at fault; and in chasing the fancy, valuable time and opportunities have been lost.

One clerical face which was here last year will be seen by us no more in the flesh. The worth of Mr. Peake's character was only fully known to the few who were permitted to witness the quiet devotion, the exhausting labors, and untiring faithfulness of his life. His ministrations in his parish were most acceptable; with his own hands he labored to finish and adorn the church which he loved; his anxieties consumed him and wore him out before his time; and only when he was gone did his parish become fully conscious of all that they had lost; and the whole town united in its tribute of sorrow and affection.

I am glad to say that, while the ordinations have been more than ordinarily numerous this year, the number of candidates for Holy Orders has been so replenished by additions that it has gone up to a point which we have never reached before. We have now fourteen candidates in the Diocese, and within a few weeks three of them will be ordained, and take up important duties in the interior. A larger number of the candidates than usual had been ministers in other communions; and thus the resources at my command have been taxed to the utmost in sustaining those who needed help during their period of preparation. The Churches, in the midst of



other calls, have given more freely than ever in different ways to the important matter of Theological Education. I trust that it will continue to receive an increasing share of liberality at the Thanksgiving-day offertory; for, besides the numbers whom I know of as preparing to become candidates, I have reason to think that we shall continue to hear of more and more of those who, having become dissatisfied with the authority of the ministry in which they are serving, and the methods employed, will have their attention turned to the old historical Church.

I am glad to report that I have made very satisfactory business arrangements with the Society for the Increase of the Ministry, by which it returns to us for our candidates the entire amount which we give to it, with ten per cent. additional. Any surplus also not called for during one year is credited on the next year. I hope that all the parishes will be incited to liberal contributions for the Society, to the treasury of which, for aid to those who are studying, I have constant need to recur.

That which will make the past year luminous in our annals is the fact that so many of the Churches in this city have, in spite of the stringency of the times, rid themselves of the fearful incubus of debt which was stifling them. That more than one hundred thousand dollars have within three months been solidly pledged, and in part paid, by three or four congregations, is its own witness as to how deeply, after all, the spiritual privileges conveyed by the Church are appreciated and loved. For all this was not accomplished without sacrifices which will continue to be felt until the notes of subscription are all finally paid. I need here tell you how it was all done—how the immense task of grappling with the large debt of Christ Church was undertaken by a single faithful woman—how the Rector, vestry and congregation, by wise counsels, and united, liberal action, accomplished what had been laughed at a little while before as an impossible scheme, of securing \$50,000, the whole amount of the bonded debt of the church—how, in a strange way, the minds of St. John's gradually opened to the feasibility of doing what was a still harder work for them; and yet how the gladness of Easter was still further brightened by the announcement of success in securing the entire amount of the debt, \$38,000, which had so seriously threatened the safety of the church—how the liberal impulse seized upon the congregation of Trinity, and caused them with one strong effort to lift the debt of \$15,000, which had vexed them for years, and which many had supposed never would be paid; and then how the brave Parish of the Holy Communion, not to be outdone, determined to wipe out the last traces of its indebtedness, and anticipated the maturity of its obligations by paying down \$2,500 in cash, in order to add another to the roll of honor of parishes in this city out of debt.

The blessed effects of all this will continue to be felt, and will show themselves on all sides. The clergy will be more free now to attend to their proper spiritual work without embarrassment. It might naturally have been inferred, what I have noticed in the past as an actual fact, that spiritual results, in the way of confirmations and the drawing of persons into the congregations, have decreased from the paralyzing anxiety caused by indebtedness. But now already many persons are allying themselves with the several parishes, who would not do so while the churches were al-



lowing themselves to remain so long in debt. The standard of liberality has been vastly raised; the presumption that it is a natural condition of things for a church to be in debt has been changed over to the other side; and I trust that hereafter there will be only an honorable rivalry to keep free from the fearful incubus of debt. I shall be disappointed if such a splendid example does not communicate itself far and near, furnishing an incentive to the smaller parishes in the Diocese to go and do likewise. In Kansas City and St. Joseph, particularly, I am persuaded that only a strong and systematic effort is needed in order to clear away the floating debts which have annoyed them.

I trust, also, that the hopeful prospects in this city, indicated by the removal of debts, will open the way to a better coping with the crowding aggressive work in this Diocese generally, as well as here in this thronging metropolis. Our plans in the past have resulted in very little, because the strong churches, from which such work should start, and by which for a time be nurtured, have been too uncertain of their own existence to render any efficient help. The Chapter of St. Louis has in other ways been a valuable agency for good; the Church Brotherhood, at any rate, proved that there were lay helpers ready, so soon as we could command the means to undertake strongly any distinct work. But as, to be useful, they needed to do something more than talk, while the anxieties of the parishes were centered upon their own home work, there was little chance of anything practical being done. You may remember that at the last Convention the urgency of aggressive Church work in the city was recognized, a distinct organization to attend to it, a Board of Church extension in the city of St. Louis was established. I am sorry to have to report that I have tried again and again to have a meeting of that body, and was on no occasion able to secure a quorum for business, and so nothing has been done in that way. I think that I can put my finger on the cause—the half-heartedness caused by parochial indebtedness, which ought now to cease.

In the meantime we have, in the happy establishment of the Mission of the Good Shepherd, with its neat church free from debt, and in the (so far as it goes) prosperous work of the Advent Mission through two years, the proof of the certain and marked results which await any action undertaken by us with a rapidity perfectly marvellous, the city is stretching itself on all sides; we have only to begin a work in any quarter to find that scores of Church people, before unheard of because of the distance to any of our churches, start forth and attach themselves to the enterprise. And still, in the lack of such efforts, in our failure to follow up the population in its growth and removals, the same condition of things which I indicated last year still continues. The number of confirmations in the city and county, which has been falling from year to year, has dropped this year also from 182 to 167, the lowest point which it has touched.

This, in a city growing as ours is doing, certainly is not as it should be. Something is wanting in our methods and appliances to retain our hold for Christ and the Church upon the life and growth of this community. I commend the subject in all its bearings to your anxious consideration, and hope that it will call forth such discussion and action as will enable us to get at the causes and apply the remedy. If a committee should be appointed on



the subject, I would suggest that they would indicate how the means could best be raised for the prosecution of this department of Church work, so as little as possible, to interfere with the prosecution of missionary work already in hand. Whatever else is proposed—and much more is needed I am persuaded—as I said last year, that a most natural and hopeful way of undertaking aggressive work in several of the destitute quarters of the city is for the older parishes with assistant ministers to start and maintain missions, with Sunday schools, and partial services at first. This would give employment to the lay helpers in the parish, and in the parish *esprit du corps* perhaps more enthusiasm could be elicited than if the duty were undertaken in a general way by those little acquainted, and not accustomed to work together. With these suggestions, I bespeak for this important matter your earnest attention. We must continue to be strong at the centre in order that we may radiate influences to the extremities.

There is an offsetting feature to the diminished confirmations in this city which we may take comfort in, more especially as it illustrates the efficiency of the missionary work of the Diocese. The confirmations this year in the interior have been very much in excess of those of any previous year. This is partly occasioned by the growth of the interior cities, and the strong position which the Church is taking in them; but it is mainly caused by the energy with which the work is being pushed in the small communities. In spite of the fearful business depression of the past year, you will be glad to notice that the missionary receipts have fully kept up with those of last year, and that the proportion of the whole received from the country is quite as large as at that time. Some of the parishes have not kept up to their ability, and the evidence of what may be done in this direction by system and promptness may be seen in the large offerings in Christ Church in this city, Grace Church, Kirkwood, and St. Jude's, Monroe; this last, in proportion to ability, not a whit behind the others. Appointments and appropriations have recently been made by the Missionary Board which will more than exhaust all of our present balance and receipts. As we have always thus far been able to honor the drafts made by the missionaries on our treasury so soon as due, I shall look to the Diocese to increase its offerings as our work enlarges, as it is constantly doing. The suggestions for systematizing and increasing our missionary offerings through the Diocese, made in the report of the Laymen's Missionary Society, are well worthy of attention, as they have been found to work well in the parishes which have tried them.

I suppose that as fair results have been reached as could have been expected from the appointment of the corresponding members of the Missionary Board, considering that they, being the Rectors of large parishes, could command but little time for personal inspection. While I have not received from them formal reports, I have had much valuable assistance in their several districts from suggestions and information. The vacancy in the Sedalia district caused by Dr. Thrall's removal from the Diocese has not yet been filled, and I have divided the too extensive Hannibal district and set apart the counties of Lincoln, Pike, St. Charles, Warren, Montgomery, Callaway, Boone, Andraine and Howard into another district, the Mexico



District, and have appointed the Rev. C. P. Jemmings, M.D., as its head. I am prepared, so soon as I can see my way clear to find the proper persons who might undertake the work, and to the money needed for its prosecution, to recommend in the Diocese, perhaps in several of these districts, an increased use of the itinerant or Evangelist system. I wish very much that the clergy would push more thoroughly the use of the Diocesan Missionary mite chests, distribute those which are lying uselessly in their vestry rooms, if necessary apply for more, and explain freely the manner in which they may be used. I am sure that in this way we will promote thoughtfulness and systematic giving among our young people, and will considerably increase our missionary receipts.

In this connexion I am glad to make cordial mention of the useful work doing by the Sunday School Missionary Host of the Diocese, whose anniversary will be celebrated as usual on next Sunday afternoon, at Christ Church. The Society, along with the other objects, had gathered the children's mites with such good result, that I have placed one of our most interesting missions under its fostering care, being assured that the means will not be wanting for its maintenance. I hope that its operations during the coming year will be still further extended.

Two of our city parishes have been engaged, at my suggestion, in making up several boxes of valuable clothing for our missionaries. The gifts were most timely and acceptable, and have done very much to add to the comfort of the faithful missionaries.

I suggest that Sec. 5 of Canon XI. be made into a new Canon, on the very important subject to us of organized Mission stations, and that it provide for the appointment of a warden, treasurer and church committee, beyond which point it would not be necessary that the organization should go until it had become stronger and gained more property. As Canon V. now stands, the Assessment Committee can only lay its quota upon the parishes of the Diocese. As, however, some of the organized stations are larger and stronger than some of the parishes, and as they share the benefits, it would perhaps not be unjust to assess upon them a just share of the common burden. To have this done legally, however, it will be necessary to amend Canon V., so as to include organized Mission stations as well as parishes. Such stations, then, as pay assessments, should have a vote as well as seat in Convention; and so Sec. 5 of Canon XI. should be amended accordingly. By Sec. 1 of Canon XII. the Bishop is required to report to the Convention the parishes which have been delinquent for two years in paying their Convention assessment; but the Bishop does not have this knowledge in his possession, while the Treasurer has. I suggest, therefore, that this Canon be changed so as to provide that this information be communicated by the Treasurer in his annual report. There is a discrepancy, also, between this Canon and Article IV. of the Constitution, which ought to be corrected. In Sec. 6 of Canon XI., the Articles of Association, spoken of as authorized by the Convention, allude to the very useful forms prepared, and found on page 120 of the last Convention Journal, but which have not yet been authorized. I suggest that this be looked to.

The question of making a thoroughly equitable assessment upon the



parishes of the sums needed by the Diocese for its work, will always be very difficult of settlement. No method will be entirely free from objections; and to parishes, crowded with their own local wants, the assessment will often appear burdensome. Still, the basis on which the committee proceeds has appeared, after a trial of other means, to be on the whole the best; and parishes will generally see that the considerations which they urge for reduction, might, with the same justice, be named by all the others. At any rate they should state their desires to the committee before they have made their report, or to the Convention immediately after; so that, if there is occasion shown, modification may be made, instead of going home and doing nothing in the matter through the year, on the expectation of appealing for reduction to the next Convention. The Treasurer's report will show that the greater part of the assessments have been paid within a few weeks of Convention, instead of quarterly as due. This is altogether wrong, and has caused the Treasurer, the Committee on Finance, as well as others, anxiety from which they might have been relieved, if considerate and systematic efforts in this matter had been made.

Doubtless we shall only get clear from this difficulty as well as from others when we can put the Permanent Episcopal Fund on a more satisfactory basis, and when, by a larger income from this, relief may be given to the parishes from their present heavy assessments. You will be glad to hear that the offerings to this fund during the past year have been considerably in excess of those of any former year. Still the fund remains far below what it should be in order that it may become an efficient means of relief. At the earliest moment special attention should be drawn to it and fixed upon it, that it may receive large gifts and bequests. In the meantime the Convention has been drifting lately into an indifference about a matter which amounts almost to a breach of trust. By strong efforts and appeals made by special agent, the fund had been increased so that about ten years ago six hundred acres of land in St. Clair and Henry counties were bought for the fund for \$500. These lands are still held, although the Convention two years ago authorized their sale. It also, besides the cash in hand, held securities reported in 1870 by the Treasurer to be worth \$2,697.60. These securities were turned over to liquidate in part the debt due from the Diocese to the estate of Bishop Hawks, on the distinct understanding that the amount should be returned by the Diocese to the fund in a period now one year passed. In spite of this pledge not one dollar of this amount has thus far been returned to the fund. So far from this, the fund has had to stand charges upon it for a matter for which it is not at all accountable to the amount of \$315.36. So that there is now due from the Diocese to the Permanent Fund, and to the individuals and parishes who have contributed in good faith to the purposes of that fund, over \$3,000, besides interest, which ought to be paid to it.

And yet so large does the composition of the Convention change year by year, that I dare say not ten persons in this body to-day have knowledge of or given thought to the very serious breach of trust into which we are calmly drifting, in a threatened repudiation of our express pledges.

I should be justified in saying all that I have now done because of the



principle involved in it, of the sanctity which should mark our administration of trusts. But beyond this, in order that we may materially increase the fund, it should be of a size which will secure for it attention. I think, therefore, that we should immediately replace in the fund what has so long been withheld from it, and should thus hasten to relieve ourselves of the stigma which otherwise must attach to the Diocese. If we had thus in the fund all that it is entitled to, and also succeed in selling the land, we should have an amount which would, by its income, materially relieve the assessments now levied, and attract materially other gifts.

There are occasions frequently arising in which the Bishop and the Standing Committee need competent legal advice. There is an abundance of skill which, I have no doubt, would be gladly placed at our disposal if it was called for. I recommend, therefore, the creation of the office of Chancellor for the Diocese, and that a communicant learned in the law be elected to the position.

Our Church charities in this city were never in as prosperous a condition as they are at this time. The Orphan's Home has been deprived during the past year of its beloved First Directress, Mrs. Walker R. Carter, who for more than twenty years had given her time and labor ungrudgingly and lovingly to the work which had become almost a part of her life. No one who was present on the occasion will ever forget that new grave covered with the flowers scattered there by those who had so constantly watched over them. The needs of the Home have compelled the undertaking of the new building on Grand avenue, at a cost not to exceed \$30,000. It is hoped that it may be in a condition so that it may be occupied by Christmas next.

I am indeed gratified to be able to report a gift to the Orphan's Home, of this city, for its permanent endowment, which largely exceeds in amount any previous gift, for Church purposes, in this Diocese, and which would be remarkable anywhere. It is by Mr. Benjamin O'Fallon, of land, to the value of \$50,000. I am sure that you must be stirred as deeply as I am by this noble benefaction. It will, when realized, place the home in a position to vastly increase its usefulness; will enable us to give our thoughts more to the care of St. Luke's Hospital; and it will, I dare believe, be but the beginning of better days for the remembering of Christ's work in the Church and its cognate charities by gift and bequest. You will be forward in marking your recognition of this signal act.

Both the Home and St. Luke's Hospital have, by the unanimous request of their respective boards of managers, been placed in the charge of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, lately of Baltimore. The Sisterhood came to this city last fall, and I think that I only state, in measured language, the judgment of all those who have become acquainted with them or their work, that they have put a new spirit into the internal management of our charities; that, by their quiet devotion and disinterested labors for others, they have secured for themselves the love and the confidence of all. Thus practically, at least in part, has been realized the hopes expressed by a committee of the last Convention, that we might secure for ourselves here the help of this mighty agency for good. It is to be hoped that this may



be but the nucleus, to which shall resort devout women, before whom God may open the path to a nearer service of Himself, through which other methods of employing the services of godly and trained women may be made possible. I trust that all this may be attained by a substantial recognition of the worth of this agency in the form of a Home secured, which may relieve the Sisterhood of the heavy burden of rent.

This, too, is a form of relief which St. Luke's Hospital urgently needs. Its present accommodations are crowded; it suffers under the inconvenience of a building not built for the purpose; it has never vindicated the necessity and value of its own existence as it has done in the last twelve-month; there never has been such a demonstration of interest in the institution as is now seen; it never has shown such spiritual results as now. All that it needs is a building for its use adapted for its purposes. I hope that by another year such a building may be fairly under way.

Whenever new departments of Church work appear, and we have to apply new methods to untried circumstances, we cannot do otherwise than hesitate and ponder over probable results. The growth of the Church's influence may be seen in the fact that both among the colored people and among the Germans there are indications that we shall very shortly be called upon to press our work. We have one very excellent colored person Candidate for Orders, and another is studying with that object in view; and, within the year, one German Roman Catholic priest has been admitted to our ministry, and two German Evangelical Lutheran ministers have applied to become Candidates for Orders. We must go forward when the time comes, and pray that wisdom may be given to us to do such things as are right. This marked tendency showing itself in a portion of the Evangelical Lutheran body within our own borders is but symptomatic of a still wider and deeper movement displaying itself further East in Ohio, and seems to be animated by the essential principles involved in the necessity felt for securing a place in the Church, with the authority for ministrations which only can be derived therefrom. You all are aware of the widely signed memorial from these German ministers recently presented to our Bishops, in which they ask for a Bishop for their own nationality. It is a movement of no little meaning, and one which we shall mark the issue of with anxious prayerful attention.

That other profoundly interesting religious movement, starting from other antecedents wholly, and involving those of other nations, but still largely marked by the German cast of thought—I mean the movement of the Old Catholics in Europe—is one the importance of which we cannot overestimate. They are feeling their way back to questions which have long been familiar to us, and our solicitude in their behalf, that they may be guided aright, and lose none of the guarantees of future security—especially in the critical business about which they will in a few days be engaged, of electing Bishops for their work—will be the deeper as they have in their keeping the future religious interests largely of the vast German race, and as they are travelling over the road along which we so painfully travelled ourselves.

There seems to be quite a disposition shown through the Church to con-



sider carefully the Hymnal adopted by the last General Convention, with a view, if possible, of suggesting improvements. Certainly while this is an advance on our previous collection of hymnody, it is itself open to many changes for the better. And as after all the best test is the actual use of the book, and the best judgments are those which are formed from a constant dealing with it, I recommend that it might not be unwise for you to appoint a committee who might receive suggestions and the results of experience in the actual use of the work from the clergy and others in the Diocese, which they could digest and report to us next year, and then, if thought advisable, to the Hymnal Committee of the General Convention before its next session. In the matter of editions with music, I recommend for use in the Diocese the Rev. Dr. Tucker's collection as in my judgment the best.

While the general subject of Sunday schools widens out in too many ways for me to dilate upon, there is one feature about the instruction to be imparted which seems to deserve mention. There is a constant multiplication of our instruction books, and in many schools there is an utter uncertainty as to the course of study which had better be pursued. Money is wasted on many books; time is not used to the best advantage; and there is an utter confusion in the child's mind when it passes from one school to another. Attempts are being made within and without our Church to reduce this matter more to a system. The need is palpable enough to justify such attempts. I do not know that any essay at the solution of the difficulty can be wholly satisfactory, nor would I have a cast-iron uniformity enjoined upon all. But I am sure that an essential service will be rendered, especially to those places where Sunday schools are being conducted by those who are not thoroughly acquainted with the Church's principles, if we could suggest some course of instruction which could be followed regularly through the year. In several of our schools a series of lessons is used for the year, including catechism, collect, hymn, recitation of verses, Bible questions, with instruction as to the seasons and services, and so divided that the several grades of proficiency can take more or less of these parts as they are able; and these are printed inexpensively on slips of paper and mailed regularly. They cause a saving in books and an increase by their system of the amount of instruction gained. I would suggest that a committee be appointed to look into this subject and report what action they think advisable in the premises. I have been much interested also in studying the statistics of our Sunday schools gathered by the officers of the Missionary Host. They mark a gratifying growth and life; but they point out with a significant uniformity that their hindrance, outside of the lack of more adequate funds, is mainly the want and irregular attendance of the teachers. The remark is very correctly made that almost any thing would be possible with a higher faithfulness, but that indifference among the teachers instantly communicates itself to the scholars.

I wish that I could say a word that would be effectual in advising personal, and continued and systematic attention in behalf of our Diocesan paper, the *Church News*. We could not do without it; its usefulness in



many ways is simply incalculable; and still it does not have half the support or circulation which it might have, because the clergy and others will not give the matter practical attention. If the paper has to be dropped, it will die because of the neglect of its friends. It is not pleasant to hear a clergyman say that he could get a long list of subscribers, if he only said one word to them, and then refraining to say that word. Money is often handed me in parishes for subscriptions, because the minister has done nothing. Will you not, on returning home, make the slight effort needed to give every one within your reach the opportunity of taking the paper, and thus becoming acquainted with Church progress within our borders?

I lay upon your table herewith the report of the Trustees of St. Paul's College, Palmyra, which, together with the report of the Warden, will show that while the attendance at the school has not been all that we could desire, still the instruction has been thorough and satisfactory, and that institution is maintaining itself without running into debt. At a recent visit I confirmed several of the students. I am by no means satisfied with what we are doing in the matter of Christian Education in the Diocese. The strongest terms employed do not overstate the importance of the issues dependent upon our faithful performance of this duty. Money spent upon the Christian education of our children, at the age in life when they readily receive and hold impressions, will return us larger spiritual results than money spent in any other way. What we have done in this direction is only, I trust, the beginning of what we shall do. The call upon us to provide for the higher training of our girls, under our own principles, is most emphatic, and I must expect that when the beginning is made in this matter it will receive such substantial recognition as will enable the work to enlarge. What is done will only be undertaken with deliberate consideration, but with a purpose, if possible, to succeed. I shall be disappointed if this fall, under the care of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, a modest beginning may be had for a thoroughly good Church school for girls.

I also transmit herewith an account of the trust funds which have been placed in my hands, and the disposition which has been made of them.

During the past winter the Vestry of Trinity Church, in this city, waited upon me with the statement that their affairs were in such an exceedingly depressed condition that they would be constrained to close the church and sell the lease of the property, unless I would consent to take charge of it and carry it through. I was pressed with duty, and could ill afford to assume new cares; but as I could not assent without an effort to the sacrifice of so valuable a position for usefulness in the city, nor to the scattering of a congregation that had so many noble elements in it, nor to the mortification which would attach to all our work for years, at the loss of another old parish, I consented to assume the charge, and rendered personal duty for three months, when the Rev. Mr. Coan came in as my assistant, and assumed the virtual pastoral charge. The result has been, I am glad to say, that the congregation has become quite large, and the prospect is altogether encouraging, with its debt paid, for a strong and useful



work in a part of the city rendered the more needy because of the departure of St. George's Church to the western end of town.

During the past year several of our older Bishops have departed to their rest. The first, Bishop Upfold, of Indiana, whose funeral services I was able to take part in; then Bishop Eastburn, of Massachusetts, and recently Bishop McIlvaine, of Ohio. We have all been watching with a sad pleasure the distinguished honors paid in this country and abroad to the wide learning and abilities, and the exalted piety of the lamented Bishop, who was only second in seniority in this Church.

In the meantime, Drs. Hare and Auer have been elected as Missionary Bishops to the Indians, and to Cape Palmas, Africa, and have been consecrated to their high office; and within a few days the Rev. Dr. B. H. Pad-dock has been elected to the Episcopate of Massachusetts. All of these clergymen have peculiar and distinguished qualifications for their respective duties, and will, with God's blessing, achieve large results in their several fields.

I transmit, herewith, for your consideration, two proposed amendments to the Constitution of the General Church.

Though since June last this parish has received no aid from the Missionary Board, we have been enabled, through the liberality of the few who are able to give, to complete the work of church renovation begun two years ago, by putting in chancel furniture and in other ways fitting the church for the worthy celebration of Divine worship. The chancel furniture has been put in mostly through special offerings. Though the vestry, on account of the indebtedness of the parish and the pressing want of money to make needful repairs to the parsonage, were unable to increase the amount of salary pledged the Rector, yet, owing to the generosity of different individuals of the parish, he has been relieved from all pecuniary embarrassment, and so far has been able to balance profit and loss.

The church at Brunswick has been completed during the past year, and was recently consecrated. The building, with the lot on which it stands, is valued at \$4000. It is one of the neatest and most substantial of its kind in the State, and the faithful few who have labored so zealously for its erection may well be proud of the success which has at length crowned their efforts. The parish is in a very healthy condition, and promises good results in the future.

In addition to the above charge, to which I give one Sunday in the month, I also hold monthly services at Dalton, Moberly, Salisbury, Carrollton, Norborne and Richmond, and during the past three months I have undertaken temporary charge of the churches at Chillietho and Utica. The following is a summary of the results in my sphere of labor during the past year: Two churches have been



built, one at Moberly and the other at Carrollton, and the church at Brunswick has been completed; 11 adults and 63 children have been baptized; 39 persons have been confirmed, and 1 has been reclaimed from the Baptists.

The salary last year was \$500 per annum, but some of the subscribers neglected to make good their obligations. The present rate of salary came into operation October 1st, 1872. With but two exceptions the present subscribers have paid their subscriptions, and no doubt when the times are less stringent they will meet their obligations. The Rector feels that the stipend is too small to meet his necessities; but, owing to the great Christian kindness of several persons not connected with the parish, and also to the kind aid of a few of his parishioners, he has so far been able to pay his expenses. The parish has suffered much financially by the removal of able and influential persons, and especially of Mr. and Mrs. D. McM. Gregg, who, since my last report, presented the church with handsome chancel windows, a Bishop's chair, and matting for the aisle. Besides a falling off in subscriptions, the attendance has not been as good as it was last year; this is owing to opposing causes outside, the want of good and regular music, and to the very dull times. The Rector finds it very difficult to persuade persons who are in financial difficulties to attend the services. Although there have been but few baptisms, and none confirmed, the parish might otherwise be said to be *numerically* stronger than last year.

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The present Rector entered upon his duty on the 18th July, 1872, at a time when the unsatisfactory state of the parish threatened a speedy dissolution. It is now, however, assuming a more prosperous appearance, though still harassed by old debts. The Sunday School, which was almost extinct, has been reconstructed, and, by its own efforts, properly supplied with books; a mission in the southwestern part of the town maintained; a parish school opened and in successful operation; an associate mission, formed under the Bishop's direction, with two priests and a lay reader, to take charge of missions in the district.

The Church Aid Society maintains an insurance on the Rector's life of \$3,000. Only 125 communicants can be accounted for out of the 150 reported last year. The extreme difficulty of collecting, and the dislike to pay old and unpleasant debts, prevent a better financial report. We hope to do better next year.

Trinity Parish, at St. Charles, Missouri, has been vacant since Oct. 1, 1872.

An ill-advised effort to build a church, larger and more expensive than the means of the parish would justify, involved us in some embarrassment, which, after the expenditure of all our means in buying and grading a very good lot, and laying a deep and solid foundation, had, of necessity, to be abandoned, and we should probably have been without a building in which to hold services but for the zeal, devotion, energy and perseverance of the ladies of the parish. They organized a Sewing Circle to aid in furnishing means to build a modest, but comfortable chapel, and arranged with a building society for \$1,000 loan, payable in monthly instalments, until the entire debt shall have been liquidated. They have had no difficulty in meeting their payments, and have a surplus on hand largely over \$1,000. Nearly one-half their debt has already been paid. The vestry lent their efforts to the cause, and we now have a very neat and comfortable chapel, sufficient for our present need, at a cost of \$2,000—with a debt secured by mortgage of \$635 on the adjoining portion of the lot, not a lien on the building. We have lost nearly one-half our strength in numbers and means by the removal of the railroad machine shops and the employees of the bridge company, and, therefore, have now more difficulty in raising means for Church purposes than heretofore; but we are hopeful, and determined to use all efforts to pay off our indebtedness gradually, and think we shall succeed. We hope to have the services of a Rector for half his time, if we cannot pay for more; but we are unable to pledge for his support more than the amount suggested to the Bishop as the utmost limit of our present ability—say \$400 per annum.

There are two facts connected with the history of the parish for the past year to which it seems proper to allude. The one calling for a special tribute of gratitude, that a little over \$50,000 has been pledged for the payment of the debt of the church. This whole sum is to be paid by the 1st April next. It is unnecessary to speak of the great value of such a blessing. The other is one of a peculiarly saddening character. A number of communicants heretofore reported have been transferred to the Mission of the Good Shepherd, and are now reported among their communicants. The provision for our church debt is so generally known that it need only be alluded to here, but this with grateful thanks to Him who has enabled us to do this much in the way of money and pledges, and who will, we have no doubt, enable us to perfect the work begun.

The present looseness of ties between members of a parish and the parish itself is such, that the exact number of parishioners, even of communicants, is not easy to be obtained. Because of a change of residence, or for some other and perhaps very slight cause, sometimes a whole family, sometimes a single member of the family, will withdraw from their own parish, without a word of explanation or notice to their own Rector, unite with another parish, be received, admitted to confirmation, the holy communion, even receive the rite of marriage, without one word of enquiry or admonition as to leaving their own parish, and with no word of apology to the former Rector. This condition of things—for which we of the clergy are to blame—encourages lawlessness, independence and contempt for all authority, places the Rector of a parish in a weak and uncertain position, keeps the record of a parish imperfect, and utterly destroys all discipline.

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At the solicitation of a number of his friends, the Rev. Dr. Berkley began holding Divine service and preaching at Hart's Hall on Sunday, the 23d of June, 1872. Preliminary steps having been duly taken, a parish was organized on the 28th of October, with the above title, and he was elected to the Rectorship of the church. The vestry have purchased an eligible lot at the northeast corner of Grand avenue and Olive street, and have commenced the erection of a chapel, to be built of stone, and which we hope to occupy in August, or early in September next. We have very fair congregations, but are in a transition state, the chapel of the parish being built half a mile away. For this reason I have made no enumeration of families or communicants. We shall show our full strength only when we are permanently established.

The Sunday School is held on Olive street, above Compton avenue, and was known as St. Peter's Mission when transferred to me by the Rev. Dr. Schuyler, of Christ Church, who had initiated Church work in that part of the city, and hence the name of our parish. We have enrolled about seventy scholars, with an average attendance probably of fifty, and ten teachers. The building in



which the school is held, and its location, are drawbacks to its prosperity. We hope to realize a change for the better when we shall come to occupy the chapel.

We have adopted the "free church" system, and propose to run the parish from the beginning on that line.

Upon the resignation of the Rectorship by the Rev. Dr. Cross, in November last, the parish being in an extremely depressed condition, the vestry asked the Bishop to take charge. RT. REV. FATHER—My report is brief for the reason that only the short space of a month intervened between the date of my appointment and the sittings of the Convention. I have endeavored to visit the inmates of the hospital regularly twice a week, and, by conference and other offices of the Church, minister to their spiritual needs, and find that the kind co-operation of the Sisterhood and the gentle and Christian atmosphere which pervades the institution highly favorable to efficiency in performing the pastoral duties of my position. Regular services also have been held in the chapel of the hospital on Sunday and Friday afternoons, which are attended by the convalescents of the institution as well as by a goodly number of persons from the city. The Sunday afternoon services have been especially interesting, from the fact that the musical parts of the service are rendered by a choir of young men and boys habited in choral vestments. I have conducted two funerals from the hospital during the past month, and will close by saying that a longer period of incumbency will enable me to give a much fuller and more detailed report.

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### SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

OF THE

## Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society of Missouri.

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The operations of this Society for the fiscal year now closed has been mainly confined to the work in progress heretofore. The active churchman can see in the vast extent of territory comprising this diocese, a field for labor so immense as almost dishearten him from making battle against odds so vast. But our Bishop, and the missionaries who have labored so arduously in the work, come to the rescue with words of cheer, and tell us that our efforts have not been wasted. They testify to grand results already accomplished, and assure us that this organization is making a record and building an influence for good that can scarcely be estimated.

Our city parishes within a few weeks have relieved themselves of the accumulated debt of years, and now represent a body of churchmen full of conscious vigor, ready to engage heartily in the work peculiar to this Society. Notwithstanding the vast amount required to elevate our city parishes to their present proud position, they have not been unmindful of their duties in other directions. Their subscriptions show a gratifying increase over the previous year.

The total amount of collections received from all sources, as exhibited in report of Treasurer, is \$3,242.52. Adding balance on hand at commencement of fiscal year, \$346.20, show a total of \$3,588.72. The total disbursements has



been \$2,558.92, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$1,029.80 with which to pay the stipends falling due in July next.

A more generous use of mite-boxes, especially in country parishes, is recommended, and they will be furnished free on application to the Secretary.

In view of the increased vigor reputed in this diocese in formation of auxiliary societies, etc., the Executive Committee have recommended a uniform plan or system for collections, and for the benefit of all concerned it is herewith submitted, each subscriber to have a number given them, and to be known by that number and not by name. A box to be placed in the vestibule with envelopes convenient, in which can be deposited subscriptions as they become due. When delinquent their number will appear on a card posted over the box. This plan has been found to work well in such of our city parishes as have given it a trial, and is far more agreeable to the Treasurer, as it avoids the necessity of personal appeals. The Secretary will gladly explain the system more fully if applied to either in person or by letter.

Your former Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. F. W. Southack, a veteran in church work in this city, whose genial face and kindly words assured him a welcome everywhere, withdrew from this association and diocese in February last. Mr. Southack has labored with us long and faithfully, and in parting with him this Society loses an able and efficient officer.

In conclusion, the executive committee congratulate you upon the results of the past year and the auspicious opening of the present. As no harassing debt flaunts its gloomy pall about us, we invite our city parishes to bestow upon this Society increased zeal, and thus continue the good work so grandly inaugurated. And to such of our sister parishes as have not already established an auxiliary society we urge speedy organization, and thus acknowledge and proclaim by their works an appreciation of the efforts being made in their behalf.

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Report of Missionary Board.

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The Missionary Board respectfully submit their fourth annual report.

June 13, 1872—The regular meeting of the Board was held this day at the office of the Church Book Store. The Bishop gave notice that the Convention had elected the Rev. G. K. Dunlop, Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, and the Rev. R. A. Holland as the clerical members of this Board; and the Executive Committee of the Laymen’s Co-operating Missionary Society had elected Messrs. J. T. Douglass and M. W. Alexander as lay members; all of whom were present, except M. W. Alexander.

On motion, M. W. Alexander was elected Secretary and F. W. Southack Treasurer.

Application was received from Neosho pledging the sum of \$144 per annum for services of a missionary.

The Rev. R. S. Locke was elected Missionary to Neosho, Carthage and Pierce City, with stipend at the rate of \$100 per annum.

Rev. T. O’Connell was elected Missionary to Brunswick, Moberly, Salisbury and Carrollton, with stipend at the rate \$250 per annum. Rev. A. F. Samuels was elected Missionary to Saline county.



On motion, it was resolved that the travelling expenses of missionaries doing service in places beyond their stations (when appointed by the Bishop and corresponding member of the district), shall be paid by this Board.

August 31, 1872—The Board met this day. Present, the Rt. Rev. C. F. Robertson, Rev. J. P. Ingraham, Rev. R. A. Holland, and Messrs. Douglass and Alexander. The Rev. A. F. Samuels was voted a stipend at the rate of \$250 per annum from August 8. Applications from the following places were received:

The Rev. J. A. Wainwright was elected Missionary at Palmyra and a stipend voted to him at the rate of \$200 per annum, upon condition that the people proceed at once to the erection of a building for the Church.

The Rev. G. C. Betts was made a corresponding member of this Board for the Kansas City district. Rev. Dr. Thrall was voted \$16.67 to make up deficiency in the pledge of Clinton to July 1, 1872.

November 8, 1872—The Board met this day. Present, the Bishop, Rev. Mr. Ingraham, Rev. Mr. Holland, and Messrs. Douglass and Alexander.

The Rev. S. C. Blackiston was elected Missionary to Marysville, Savannah and Empire Prairie, and a stipend voted to him at the rate of \$300 per annum from August 7, 1872.

The following resignations were received and accepted: Rev. M. S. Woodruff, South St. Louis; Rev. Francis Moore, Chillicothe; Rev. D. Jennings, Pleasant Hill; Rev. A. F. Samuels, Miami and Saline county.

The Rev. M. S. Woodruff was elected Missionary to Miami, Marshall and Waverly, with stipend at the rate of \$200 per annum from October 1, 1872.

The Bishop gave notice that he had nominated the Rev. Wm. Charles to the Domestic Committee, New York, for a stipend in place of the Rev. Mr. Peake, deceased. On motion, \$12 was appropriated to the Rev. Messrs. Charles and Armstrong for travelling expenses in the Hannibal district. A communication was received from Christ Church, Lexington, asking missionary aid for the coming year. Communication laid over.

The Rev. Dr. Thrall was voted an additional stipend at the rate of \$100 per annum from July 1 for services at Clinton.

January 20, 1873—There being no quorum present, the Board adjourned to February 14th.

February 14, 1873—The Board met this day pursuant to adjournment. Present, the Bishop, Rev. Mr. Dunlop, Rev. Mr. Ingraham, and Messrs. Douglass and Alexander.

Mr. H. H. Gillum was elected to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Mr. Southack.

April 19, 1873—The Board met this day. Present, the Bishop, Rev. Mr. Ingraham, Rev. Mr. Holland, Rev. G. K. Dunlop, and M. W. Alexander. Resignations from the following Missionaries were received and accepted: Rev. C. J. Hendley, from April 1st; Rev. S. C. Thrall, from February 15th; Mr. W. H. Hopkins, as lay reader at Elleardsville, from February 17, 1873. The Bishop withdrew the name of the Rev. C. J. Hendley from the list of stipendiaries to the Domestic Committee, New York, and increased the stipend of Rev. M. S. Woodruff from that Committee to \$300 in place of \$250 per annum; also placed the Rev. J. A. Wainwright on the list of Domestic Committee, New York, for stipend of \$200, and withdrew his stipend from our Board.

Rev. W. H. Hopkins was nominated and confirmed Missionary at Columbia, with stipend at the rate \$300 per annum from March 5, 1873. Mr. Joseph E. Martin was nominated and confirmed Missionary Lay Reader at Mexico, with stipend at the rate \$300 per annum from February 23, 1873. The Rev. P. A. Johnson's (Missionary at Nevada) stipend increased to \$200 per annum. Rev. M. A. Hyde was nominated and confirmed as Missionary at the Mission of the Good Shepherd, with stipend at the rate \$300 per annum from April 20, 1873. Travelling expenses of Rev. O. H. Staples for missionary work performed beyond the limits of his station allowed to amount \$18. Rev. T. O'Connell was nominated and confirmed as Missionary at Brunswick, Carrollton, Utica and Moberly, with stipend at the rate \$50 per annum.

May 24, 1873—Board met this day. Present, the Bishop, Rev. Mr. Ingraham, and Messrs. Douglass and Alexander.

Applications were received from the following places: Fayette, pledging the sum of \$386 per annum and parsonage, and from Warrensburg, pledging the sum of \$400 per annum.

Rev. A. Batte, Missionary at Kansas City and parts adjacent, was withdrawn from the Domestic Committee, New York, and placed on the Diocesan Board for a stipend at the rate \$250 per annum from April 1 to May 15, 1873. Rev. Mr. Locke's stipend from Diocesan Board was decreased from \$350 to \$250 from April 1st, and was nominated for a stipend of \$250 to the Domestic Committee, New York.



Rev. W. H. Hopkins was voted an additional stipend of \$50 from March 5 to May 14, 1873.

Mr. John Steindle and Mr. Duncan Converse were nominated and confirmed as Missionaries for an associate mission at Kansas City, Liberty, Independence and Clay county, under the direction of the Rev. Geo. C. Betts, and a joint stipend voted to them at the rate of \$350 per annum.

The Rev. Thos. Betts was nominated and confirmed as Missionary at Weston and parts adjacent, with stipend at the rate \$250 per annum.

Rev. Jno. N. Chesnutt was nominated and confirmed as Missionary at St. Charles, Florence and Bridgton, with stipend at the rate \$200 per annum.

Rev. F. B. Scheetz was nominated and confirmed as an Itinerant in the north-east part of the State, with stipend at the rate \$500 per annum, and travelling expenses, to commence from June 15, 1873.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary, in behalf of the Board of Managers, respectfully submits to the Bishop of the Diocese and the friends of the institution our 30th annual report.

With the close of another year that has passed away from us burdened with many changes and a great sorrow, we find ourselves at last entering upon a reality and a substance, whose shadow has been eluding our grasp for the last two years. I mean the commencement of the erection of our new Orphan's Home. After due deliberation of both Building and Advisory Committees, the original plan has been modified in a manner to lessen the expense of the first



estimated cost, in order to make it practicable to present the new church institution without debt, an offering acceptable to God. The architect has been instructed to prepare his plans and specifications so that bids may be offered at once for the work, and we are promised that the house will be finished and ready to be occupied by next Christmas.

We have every assurance from many friends who have pledged their interest and help, that the treasury shall never give forth an empty sound until the last stone is placed and the voice of prayer and praise has consecrated the good work. Of course we shall extend to all who are interested in the cause of the orphans the privilege of assisting us according to their ability. The fruits of toil and self-denial have already enriched our store, and shall not those who have only to enjoy the good things of this life give freely of their abundance? Intimately associated with our hope for the future is our deep sorrow for the great loss we have sustained in the recent death of our beloved and honored First Directress, Mrs. Walker R. Carter. She was called away without seeing with bodily eyes the cherished wish of her life carried out. For this she worked, for this she prayed, never sparing either time or strength. She rests from her labors, but her work will surely follow her. For twenty-six years, identified with the Orphan's Home, the best interest of the institution was a problem that she never ceased trying to work out. Presiding always at all official meetings with a gentle dignity and a refined judgment, her cultured and well balanced mind never failed to arrive at once at the best conclusion of the question under discussion, and inspired the utmost confidence in her decision. Her place will be occupied; it can never be filled. We can only hope that her mantle, falling upon her successor, may inspire her with a portion at least of her true and faithful spirit.

In accordance with the wish of the Bishop, and the unanimous desire of the Board, the internal management of the affairs of the Home have been placed in the charge of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd, an Order lately come among us, to infuse, we hope, renewed vitality in much of our Church work. Constant change of ministration must necessarily cause more or less injury to any institution, and we trust that we have at last secured a permanent influence that may result in the spiritual welfare and discipline of the charge committed to their care. Already a marked change for the better has been noticed in the deportment of the children. They have been well advanced in their studies by their former teacher, Mrs. Keck. To that lady and her sister, Mrs. Smith, we are indebted for their best wishes in our behalf. The children greatly deplored the loss of their chaplain, Rev. W. L. Githens. He had endeared himself to every childish heart by his rare gift of interesting the younger members of his flock, and the scene of his departure was a very sad one. We shall not soon forget the warm loving heart whose best sympathies were engaged in his labor of love among us.

At Christmas every child in the Home rejoiced in a distribution of gifts made from donations of toys sent from William Barr & Co., Scruggs, Vandervort & Barney, and Cheever & Burchard.

The Christmas dinner was truly a feast of good things, the generous supply provided lasting through several days. The Bishop and several of the clergy accepted our invitation to be present on that occasion, and witness the enjoyment of the children.

The unusual severity of the winter, with our present accommodations, taxed heavily both our means and ingenuity to keep the inmates comfortable, but we have comparatively little sickness and only two deaths, both infants, taken in from the Sheltering Arms.

#### REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

Since Easter, 1872, the period of our last report, the business of the Home has been conducted in so systematic a manner that the services of your committee have been very seldom needed.

The plan proposed last year for the safer keeping of your bonds, mortgages, certificates of deposit, and other valuable papers, was immediately carried into effect, and with most satisfactory results. All these valuables are placed in the vaults of the Safe Deposit Company, where they are kept securely and conveniently under the control of your officers.

Under the judicious management of Messrs. Seaman & Carter, the debt incurred for repairing your property on Morgan street was paid, and the house has been for a long time in the possession of a careful tenant, who pays a monthly rent of twenty-five dollars. The income from this source is applied to the building fund for the new Home.

The rent of your Grand avenue property has been secured. The rent now accruing from that source is fifty dollars every three months. The premises will be vacated by the tenant on notice that you need them for building purposes, or occupancy.

In December, a deed of trust you held for five thousand dollars matured and was paid. The money was reinvested by Messrs. Seaman & Carter, for a period of two years, bearing ten per cent. interest, with ample real estate security.

The funds for the building of the new Home have been kept apart from those intended for the current expenses of the institution. The Building Fund has been paid from time to time, as it has accumulated, into the hands of our Secretary, who deposited the amounts in bank, taking therefor certificates of deposit, payable to the Episcopal Orphan's Home, and bearing six per cent. interest. These certificates of deposit were duly placed with your other valuable papers in the Safe Deposit Bank. It will be seen by the statement rendered by our Secretary that the amount of interest received on deposits of the Building Fund is six hundred and twenty-four 11-100 dollars, and that the entire amount of gifts and interest now held in certificates of deposit is nine thousand seven



hundred and one 59-100 dollars. The statement further shows *every item* of the Building Fund received in cash, with the names and dates of persons and sources whence received.

At the request of the Building Committee, and after due notice given, a joint meeting of the Building and Advisory Committees was held on the 19th of last month, for the purpose of considering the project of building the new Home this year. There were present on the occasion: Bishop Robertson, Messrs. Garrison, Thomson and Fife of the Advisory Committee, and Messrs. Hart, Pye and Naylor of the Building Committee. Bishop Robertson was appointed chairman, and Mr. M. S. Fife secretary.

On inquiry by the Building Committee what amount of funds and property was available for the new Home, Mr. Fife made the following

Mr. Fife added that it was the opinion of the lady Managers that they could, by their own efforts, obtain other subscriptions, so as to bring the sum up to thirty thousand dollars. Thereupon, on motion of Mr. Thomson, it was

*Resolved*, That the Advisory Committee, acting on the information furnished by the secretary, to the effect that we have in sight about \$30,000 for the purpose of building a new Home, do hereby recommend that the Building Committee immediately proceed to take steps for the erection of a building, not to exceed in cost \$30,000, on the lot on Grand avenue given to the orphans by Henry Shaw, Esq.

Mr. Naylor said he would call a special meeting of the Building Committee and take measures to have the resolution executed without delay.

The meeting then adjourned.

Your committee have but to add that they think the present a propitious time for the execution of this long cherished and much needed project. The remarkable prosperity which abounds in our city at this time must have the effect of opening the hearts of all good citizens towards an institution which will be in the future—as it has been for more than a quarter of a century—an ornament and a blessing to the entire community. We have no doubt that large gifts will be added to the munificent ones already paid and promised. Such being the condition of things, we feel assured that the New Home will be speedily built, without incurring a single debt, and in a style worthy of St. Louis, and of the Church and people to whose liberality it will owe its existence.

## APPENDIX No. 10.

Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate beg leave to report that they met June 7th, 1872. and organized as a Board by the election of Jno. T. Douglass as President, and Geo. H. Loker as Secretary and Treasurer.

At this meeting the President was authorized to sell the lands in St. Clair and Henry counties. Subsequently an offer was had for the land. The offer was accepted, and the original Trustees, at request of the Board, executed a deed to the purchaser. Unexpected and unavoidable circumstances compelled the purchaser to relinquish his purchase, and the lands, by proper deed duly recorded, were conveyed by him to your Board of Trustees; and as yet no purchaser has been found. It is hoped that at the meeting of the next Convention the Board will be able to announce that the lands have been disposed of.

From the Treasurer's report, herewith submitted, you will find that the receipts to the fund during the past year have been canonical collections reported by fifty-seven Parishes and Missionary Stations, \$539.59. From J. H. Robertson, Esq., \$50; and from J. Robertson, Esq., \$100. The two last named sums were donations to the Rt. Rev. the Bishop, and by him turned over to the Permanent Fund; and for interest \$36. Total receipts, as per Treasurer's report, \$725.59; to which is to be added \$303.00, received since his report was made out; also from J. H. Franklin, Treasurer, on account of debt due from Diocese to this fund, \$300, and from St. Paul's Church, Palmyra, \$3; aggregating a total receipts of \$1,028.59.

## APPENDIX No. 11.

## St. Paul’s College.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

The undersigned Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of St. Paul’s College respectfully submits his third annual report of said Trustees.

The financial affairs of the Board of Trustees are in a fair condition. By referring to the last report (see page 107, Journal of 1872, and the account of the Treasurer, page 113) you will see that there was a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$219.65. Assets have come to his hands amounting to \$866.06, and he has paid out \$500, leaving a balance in favor of the Trustees of \$585.71. This balance consists in a due bill of Dr. Wainwright’s (without interest), which was advanced to him to purchase apparatus necessary to be used in the College, amounting to \$250, and in cash \$335.71. There is yet due on subscriptions \$225, nearly all of which will be collected.

The buildings are insured in this city to the amount of \$4,000.

The present year of the College has been an improvement on the last as respects the number of scholars during the year as well as in the remuneration received for the same.

But it does not, by any means, reach the number of pupils desired, and who could, with the facilities at hand, be easily instructed and well cared for in the family of the President.



The President can comfortably provide for at least thirty boarders, and say seventy day scholars who may find good board and at fair rates in the city of Palmyra. The average of pupils the present year is about twenty-five. It is apparent that too little interest is taken both by clergy and laity in this our only institution for the instruction of the young men of the rising generation—instruction very much needed in this day and generation, especially the religious instruction, which is here paternal, and believed to be thorough. We therefore recommend this institution as well worthy of the confidence and good will of our own people and of all who desire to have their sons thoroughly taught and well grounded in all that goes to make a Christian gentleman and scholar.

In view of the fact that a few individuals in this city have given liberally towards recovering this fine property after it was lost to the Diocese, and are still laboring to make this an institution worthy of the Diocese, we hope that it is not asking too much of the clergy of the Diocese to bring this College and its advantages prominently before their congregation, and to solicit the patronage that is its due, and of the laity of their good offices in bringing it so prominently before the public as to secure a full attendance the ensuing year.

Accompanying this is the Treasurer's report; all of which is respectfully submitted.

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

*To the Board of Trustees of St. Paul's College:*

I beg leave to offer the following report, in relation to St. Paul's College, viz:

1. *The Farm.*—Last year the farm was rented. From various causes it failed to produce any considerable results. This year it is under a management somewhat different, and will give forth good returns.

On repairs of the house and fences I have expended about \$50. The house needs reshingling—the fences will stand well enough for a year or two longer.

In regard to the slaughter-house, of which I spoke at the last meeting of this Board, nothing has been done towards the removal of the same, or towards making it less offensive. Whatever is done in that direction ought to be done in the name of the Board.

2. *Pupils.*—Thirty-two different pupils have entered St. Paul's since the opening of same September 11, 1872. On account of sickness, removal, and, in one or two cases, disaffection, several of this number discontinued their connection with the school at the close of the first term. The number thirty-two includes both boarding and day scholars. The average number of boarders has been for the year eight.

In Palmyra there are three private schools besides St. Paul's College, and one public school. Each of these has absorbed a goodly number of school attending children.

Just at the present time the Baptist and Methodist colleges are laboring under considerable reverses, and it is doubtful whether much, or even anything, will be done to revive them.

In view, therefore, not only of town patronage, but also and especially of the influence which might be brought to bear in favor of St. Paul's College from abroad, it appears to be a time more propitious for the Church to take special measures in behalf of that institution.

3. *Discipline.*—Having presented to this Board last year my views, considerably drawn out, in relation to the matter of discipline, it is not necessary that I should discuss that subject in this report. I will mention, however, that I find boys in Missouri pretty much like boys elsewhere, and that the theory of discipline advanced by me in that report is showing itself in St. Paul's College, as in other institutions of the country, to be the true one. Great severity of discipline is occasionally demanded. But nevertheless it is better, and more in accordance with his moral nature, to throw a boy as early as possible upon his own responsibility—to make him feel his manhood, though he is yet but a boy. The correctness of this principle has so impressed itself upon the minds of a goodly number of the best educators of the country as to bid fair entirely to revolutionize the matter of discipline in all of our best colleges. Almost everything in connection with a boy's duties in college is to be *optional*. This strikes directly at his pride, and so at his manhood.

It is to be hoped that the Convention, which is to assemble to-morrow, will take some action by which St. Paul's may be brought prominently before the Diocese, thereby awakening a new and more vigorous interest in behalf of same, All which is respectfully submitted.

## APPENDIX No. 12.

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*St. Luke's Hospital.*

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## REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Your Board of Trustees having submitted the Treasurer's report showing the present financial condition of the Hospital, have a brief explanation to make with reference to it:

In our last annual report, the indebtedness of the Hospital was shown to be \$2,763.48; in this report the present debt is \$2,998.26. This showing of an increase of debt during the past year instead of a reduction of at least \$1,200, which we hoped to show, may be accounted for, we think, satisfactorily to you.

We had supposed that when we had secured comparatively convenient quarters, at a reasonable rent, on the corner of Elm and Sixth streets, that we should remain there until we could procure a permanent home of our own. But, during last year, the surroundings of that location became of such a character that we were compelled to seek a home elsewhere, and after considerable time and labor had been spent in search of another house, we leased the building now in our possession for a term of two years. It is in a central location, at No. 913 Pine street, and was the most convenient and best suited building for our purpose that we could procure; but, as change of residence is, at any time, an expensive operation, it was much more so with a Hospital, and especially when it had to be undertaken during the coldest part of a winter unparalleled for many years in its severity. This not only added to the expense of fitting up new quarters, but delayed us some weeks in effecting a removal, not only entailing the additional expense, but also a diminished income during that time, so that we can safely estimate the extra cost consequent upon change of location at \$1,500. The change of location, though it involves a higher rent, is, in many other respects, particularly favorable, and we hope that the imperative necessity and expense will ultimately prove a benefit to us.

In addition to the change of location, some other changes have been made during the past year, the advantages of which we have, no doubt, will increase from year to year. Among these we include the having the Hospital incorporated under the general Statutes of the State, in accordance with the articles of association presented and adopted at your last annual meeting. This gives the Hospital a personal existence; it will make its organization more effective for business, and will be the means of accomplishing the benevolent designs of those who may be disposed to bequeath money or other property to it. We have felt the want of this during several years past, as some such bequests have been rendered null and void, and the wishes of donors have been frustrated because the Hospital had no legal name.

Another change consists in placing all the internal management of the Hospital in charge of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd. This change was for some time in contemplation, being contingent upon the Sisterhood finding sufficient encouragement in the prospective work of the Hospital and other Church enterprises to induce them to remove from Baltimore and establish themselves



here personally. In furtherance of this object, your Board agreed to contribute to the fund requisite for the support of the Sisterhood \$500 per annum, and, as soon as they arrived here, we placed the management of the Hospital under the supervision of Sister Catharine, their Superior.

The good effect of this movement has, no doubt, been apparent to those friends of the Hospital who have visited it during the past six months. Patients express themselves as highly pleased with the comfort and attention they receive, and we believe that its finances, short as the period of probation has as yet been, will, after making due allowance for the extraordinary expenses before alluded to, compare favorably with any previous year, and, in the future, fully justify the most sanguine expectations entertained by us in advocating this change.

Whilst such is the case from a pecuniary standpoint, in its moral and religious aspect the change made is so perceptible that it requires no comment from us. For the information of those who might not know it, we will state that Divine Services are held at the Hospital on every Sunday and Friday afternoon, and the Rev. M. A. Hyde, the Chaplain, attends there daily to minister to the needs of the inmates.

With the change thus noted, we were enabled to dispense with the office of Resident Physician, Superintendent, which had been for several years filled by Dr. E. A. Roberts. We parted with Dr. R. with mutual regrets—he had been so long identified with the Hospital, and by his zeal and energy inspired us with hope when its prospects were most gloomy. We take this opportunity to thank Dr. Roberts and his excellent wife for their unceasing efforts to make the Hospital a success.

Dr. R. continued to act as Visiting Physician until we tendered the appointment to Dr. J. H. Pottenger, who is now our Visiting Physician, with Dr. Chas. A. Todd, assistant. To them we are indebted for their daily attention to the patients who require their services.

Dr. John T. Hodgen, always the fast friend of the Hospital, is our Surgeon in Chief, and his well known skill is always at our service, freely and cheerfully given.

Dr. Montrose A. Pallen is the Genechologist of our Institution. No words of ours would add to his well earned reputation; we have only our heart-felt thanks to return to Drs. Hodgen and Pallen for unceasing friendship and professional assistance.

There is an increasing interest in the Hospital manifested by the ladies of the different Parishes in both city and county, and when such is the case with any institution it contributes largely to its success. To them, and to other friends, we are indebted for many donations of clothing and other useful articles, which have been regularly acknowledged in the columns of the *Church News*. One recently sent in will be highly appreciated; it is an organ for the use of the chapel, valued at about \$300, the gift of a lady whose name is by request to remain unknown.

The number of patients admitted during the year was 250, of which 223 were discharged. Of these, fifty-six were full charity patients, and twenty-one part charity. Nineteen deaths occurred during the same period of time. There have also been ten baptisms, two confirmations, two administrations of the holy communion, one marriage, and four burial services.

With this retrospect of the affairs of the Hospital during the year past, we should be glad to close this report with hopeful prospects for the future, but there is one subject which calls for earnest attention, and we believe it to be of

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vital importance to the institution. We cannot expect, in works of charity, to examine treasurers' reports as we would those of a business corporation, only regarding the surface on which would be mapped out columns of accounts to find out if there is a balance to the credit of profit and loss; we must go deeper to find the real assets—the good that we are doing for the physical and spiritual welfare of our fellow-beings, and with this view the question will present itself, are we doing as much good as we ought to be able to do with the means and labor bestowed on the Hospital? If not, what is the reason? It is a serious question, and should be fairly met. If it is answered in the negative, we have the experience of several years to justify us in saying that we are doing all that is possible, so long as we are compelled to pay even a moderate rent for buildings not suitable for our uses, with contingencies likely to happen at any time of having to give up our inconvenient building for another, and to undergo more extra expense in removing. The present house is as good a one as we could probably ever find, but it is very inadequate to our wants. If we had one properly constructed—not a dwelling house, with rooms too large for single patients and too small for wards, but specially adapted for a Hospital,\*with the necessary appliances for saving labor in cooking, washing, and the general routine of household work—we could, with the same expense incurred in our present house, accommodate twice as many patients, and be able to increase our charities in equal proportion. Such a building we cannot have unless we build it ourselves. The reduction of expense in the item of rent would be a material point, and, with sufficient means to do so, would increase the dimensions of a building, and in the same ratio add to our charities.

It has been with the constant hope of soon having such a building and additional facilities, that the friends of the Hospital with the Board of Managers have persevered from year to year in their efforts to keep the Hospital alive, and it is time now to ask if it is to be allowed to struggle along as it has been doing, till its warmest friends become discouraged and give it up in despair. There never was a time when a Protestant Hospital, centrally located, was more needed than at present. With the wonderful increase of population in our city, hospital accommodations have not kept pace. The removal of the Sisters' Hospital, which has been of such service in years past, will leave a large field for us in that portion of the city adjacent to our present location. The necessity for an institution like ours, of sufficient capacity, is felt by the medical fraternity, who, we are satisfied, will give us all the aid in their power. The public will commend such an institution, and means will not be wanting from those not of our Church. But we must first show them what we are willing to do ourselves, and, if there is a tide in the affairs of men, that tide is now waiting our movements. You ask what should be done? and we reply that the main thing requisite is to secure suitable ground for a building—not on a credit, but to be paid for within six months with cash and reliable subscriptions. It will take \$12,000 for that purpose. Give us this ground, and we will, before another year is out, submit to you plans of a building to be erected on such a basis of payment that it will be as good as paid for when completed. The building is a matter that we have had in contemplation for some time past, but the question has been how to get the ground. If that can be had, the Hospital will soon come up to a full measure of usefulness, and be a prominent feature among the charities of our city—a help to the sick and needy, and one that will give to the world some assurance of our faith by our works.

## APPENDIX No. 14.

## Sunday School Missionary Host of Missouri.

*To the Bishop, the President and Members of the S. S. Missionary Host of Missouri:*

We have assembled on this, the fourth anniversary of the Host, and amid all the disadvantages that we have labored under during the past year, we have prospered fully as well as we anticipated, and much better, financially, than we expected.

The interest felt in our efforts is increasing, and many schools would be added to our membership were they not prevented by more pressing and urgent needs. As it is our membership is steadily increasing, and we now report sixteen schools, with a membership of eight hundred and eighty-nine, an increase of one hundred and twenty-three over last year's report.

The difficulty of obtaining reports from the various schools has been a serious obstacle to the efforts of the Secretary, as well as preventing in carrying out the objects of the Host. By making the Host the headquarters for the needs of the Sunday Schools, more especially those remote from the city, wants can be supplied and suggestions made that would be of possible benefit, and the ultimate intention of the Host obtained.

The Secretary has succeeded in obtaining more reports from the schools than last year, and by means of these reports has opened a correspondence in regard to the exchange of books with several schools; and has also represented the condition of the schools to the Bishop for his action in regard to the affairs as reported.

The Secretary has been in correspondence with fifty-two schools—fifteen in the city and thirty-seven throughout the State—and of these, reports have been received in detail from thirty-seven, showing a total attendance of 3,218, and an average attendance of 2,435—about 75 per cent.

The complaints and wants are classified as follows: Want of teachers, 4; want of books, 5; want of funds, 4; irregular attendance, 2. Amount of money raised for Sunday School and other purposes, \$3,160.

Many of the schools are newly organized, some in portions of the State where the helpers are few, and these are the schools that report "want of funds." We hope (and it is one of our objects) to be able to extend a helping hand to these schools, and to cheer them on in their good work.

We are now working with a more definite object in view, and our missionary character has now assumed a reality, and from the Christian qualities of our standard-bearer we look for good results. We refer to the Rev. F. B. Scheetz, who is now in the field as the Missionary sent by the Sunday School Missionary Host of Missouri.

The annual meeting for the election of officers for the ensuing year, and transaction of other business, was held in Christ Church Chapel on the 12th of May; and though the election was conducted with considerable spirit, yet harmony and good feeling prevailed. The election resulted as follows:

- Wallace Delafield, of St. George's Church, *President*.
- Robert Eagle, of Christ Church, *Vice-President*.
- Charles J. Wise, of Trinity Church, *Secretary*.
- John H. Simmons, of St. John's Church, *Assistant Secretary*.
- O. J. Owen, of St. George's Church, *Treasurer*.



The Executive Committee have been called together frequently during the past year and as circumstances required, and it is with much pleasure we report that a very harmonious feeling exists among the members, the only object being a common one to further the interests of the Host.

We have now finished our labors for the past year, and have rendered an account of our stewardship. If we have benefitted the Church or any individual by our efforts to God belongs the praise, as we are only the humble instruments in His hands.

## APPENDIX No. 15.

## Prescribed Canonical Forms.

### ORGANIZATION OF NEW PARISHES.

To organize a new Parish, ten individuals of full age must make an application to the Bishop, who has, by Canon XI., power to grant the application. The application should be in the following form:

(Form A.)

*To the Rt. Rev. ...., Bishop of Missouri.*

The petition of the undersigned respectfully represents, that they are each of the age of twenty-one years, attached to the doctrines and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church; that they are residents of ....., county of ....., and State of Missouri; that they are desirous of organizing a new Parish at ....., county and State aforesaid, distant .... from ..... Church. They therefore pray that permission be granted them to organize a new Parish at the above designated place, and that their limits may be defined.

The next step to be taken is, the persons signing the application for authority to organize must prepare and sign Canonical Articles of Association, which articles must be in the following form:

(Form B.)

#### ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION FOR ORGANIZING A PARISH

*In connection with the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Missouri.*

WHEREAS, The subscribers, citizens of ....., county of ....., and State of Missouri, having associated for the purpose of worshipping Almighty GOD according to the faith and discipline of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Missouri, and of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, have formed a congregation at ....., in this Diocese; they, therefore, declare the following to be their Articles of Association, viz.:

ARTICLE 1. The name of this Association shall be "The Rector, Church Wardens and Vestrymen of ....."

ART. 2. This Parish acknowledges itself to be a member of, and to belong to, the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America; and, as such, it accedes to, recognizes and adopts the canons, doctrines, discipline and worship of the Church, and acknowledges its authority accordingly. Any member who shall disclaim or refuse conformity to said authority shall not be elected, or vote in the election of, Vestrymen, Rector or Minister, or exercise any office or function in, concerning, or connected with the said Parish or Association.

ART. 3. Provision for the compensation of the Rector and the expenses of the said Association shall be made by the Vestry in such way as they may deem advisable to the best interests of the Church.



ART. 4. The Vestry of this Parish shall consist of not less than three nor more than thirteen persons, who shall continue in office until others be chosen; and the annual election of such Vestry shall be held on Easter Monday of each year. The electors shall consist of the communicants of full age who have been communicants for not less than six months prior to the time of the election, and such other persons of full age as may have regularly contributed to the support of the Parish for the six months next preceding such election, according to such rules as the Parish may have adopted. The right of challenge shall be admitted; the Secretary of the Parish meeting shall make record of such challenge and cause; and reference may be made to the Bishop, whose decision shall be final.

ART. 5. The Rector of this Church shall be elected by a majority of two-thirds of the Wardens and Vestrymen, at a meeting duly convened.

ART. 6. No person shall be Rector or Minister of this Church, or allowed to execute any of the functions of the same, unless he shall have had Episcopal ordination, and be in full standing with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and recognized as a Minister in good standing, of the said Church, by the Bishop of the Diocese, or, if there be no Bishop, by the Standing Committee.

ART. 7. The Vestry shall have power to choose their own officers, fill vacancies in their own body, and to perform all other duties usually appertaining to their body. They shall choose one of their own number to be Church Warden, and the Rector (for the time being) may appoint another of the said Vestry to be the other Church Warden, and the Warden appointed by the Rector shall be the presiding officer of the Vestry in the absence of the Rector; and in case of a vacancy in the office of Rector at the time of an election, or a failure on his part to appoint, then the other Church Warden shall be appointed by the Vestry; and both of the Church Wardens shall be communicants of the Church.

ART. 8. No conveyance of any land or tenements belonging to said Parish or Association shall be made without a vote of the Vestry, two-thirds being present and concurring; nor shall such conveyance be made unless in subjection to the second and third sections of Canon XXI. of Title I. of the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America.

ART. 9. Amendments to these Articles of Association shall be submitted, in writing, to the congregation, at the annual meeting for the election of the Vestry, and shall lie over for consideration until the next annual meeting. But no alteration shall be made except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

ART. 10. The first election of a Vestry under these Articles shall be held at . . . . ., on Sunday, . . . . ., 18 . . . . ., immediately after Divine Service.

ART. 11. Each subscriber to these Articles shall be entitled to a vote, and the persons receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.

*(Signatures.)*

After permission is granted and the Canonical Articles signed, it is necessary to give notice on two occasions of public worship, of the intention to organize, and of the public election of the Wardens and Vestrymen. The notices must be given at least one week apart, and within the month before the time of organizing. The following is the form of notice:

Notice is hereby given that the organization of a new Parish, in union with the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States, and a public election of two Wardens and at least three Vestrymen will take place at . . . . ., on the . . . . day of . . . . ., 18 . . . . ., immediately after Divine Service.

It is necessary, however, that at least six of the persons signing the application and Articles be present to unite in the organization. The organization having taken place, and the election held, the Wardens and Vestrymen elected must notify the Bishop as follows:

Upon receipt of the approval of the organization by the ecclesiastical authority, it is necessary that a legal incorporation be perfected. Forms "E." and "F." following are to be used for that purpose, and which are to be signed by the ten or more persons who signed the Canonical Articles:

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

For the purpose of forming a religious corporation, with the powers conferred by the Constitution of the State of Missouri, and under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Missouri, the undersigned, members of the congregation worshipping at the church known as ..... Church, of ....., hereby adopt the following

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

First—The name of the corporation shall be, "The Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestrymen of ..... Church, of .....,," and shall have the power of acquiring, holding, using and disposing of so much land as may be required for a house of public worship, parsonage, chapel, and burial ground, and of managing the same, and contracting in relation thereto; and may have a common seal, and change the same at pleasure.

Second—The powers and duties of said corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Trustees, who shall be elected on Easter Monday of each year, on the same ticket, and be the same persons who are elected as Wardens and Vestrymen of said Church, and shall hold their offices until their successors shall be duly elected. Any vacancy happening in said Board, from any cause, may be filled by said Board.

Third—The present Vestry of ..... Church, of ....., to wit, ..... shall be the first Board of Trustees of said corporation, and shall hold their offices until Easter Monday, A. D. 18...., and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Fourth—The Board of Trustees shall have the right to designate one of their number as presiding officer, and to appoint such officers and agents, from time to time, as they may deem proper; and are authorized to sell, lease, mortgage, convey, in trust or in fee, or otherwise dispose of, any leasehold or real estate belonging to said corporation.

Fifth—The said Board of Trustees shall have the power to issue bonds or notes of said corporation for the purpose of raising money to erect a house of public worship, chapel, or parsonage, or any building for religious purposes, on the lands they may own or acquire, and may secure the payment thereof upon any real estate owned by said corporation, by way of mortgage or deed of trust; and may make such regulations touching the rent, use or occupation of said property, or any part thereof or interest therein, as they may deem proper.

Sixth—The first meeting of said corporation may be called by the Rector reading a notice thereof during Divine Service, held upon any Sunday, at their accustomed place of worship—said notice specifying that said meeting will be held the succeeding Monday evening.

Seventh—The Board of Trustees shall have power to make such By-Laws as they may deem expedient, and alter the same—not, however, inconsistent with the foregoing Articles of Association.

## APPENDIX, No. 16.

## Rules of Order.

1. That the business of the day shall be introduced with prayers.
2. The minutes of the Journal for the day preceding shall be read every morning at the opening of the Convention.
3. The President shall appoint the several committees unless the Convention shall otherwise order.
4. When the President takes the chair no member shall continue standing, or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
5. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
6. No member shall absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave, or be unable to attend.
7. No member shall speak more than twice in the same debate without leave from the House.
8. When a question has been once determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority.
9. When a motion is under consideration, no other motion shall be made except to amend, to divide, to commit, to postpone, or to lay it upon the table; but a motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided before the original motion.
10. Every member who shall be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.



11. No motion shall be considered as before the House unless it be seconded, and all resolutions shall be in writing, and shall be sent to the Secretary's desk to be read.

12. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

13. The President shall, in his discretion, select within the limits of those pews allotted for the use of the members, pews for the accommodation of visiting clergymen and students of Theology, who may be invited to the same by the President without any special application to the Convention.

14. None of the Rules of Order shall be suspended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

15. Immediately after the organization of the Convention the following standing committees shall be appointed, each to be composed of three members except the Committee on Assessments, which shall be composed of seven members, viz.: A committee on the Admission of New Parishes; a committee on Constitution and Canons; a committee on Unfinished Business; a committee on Finance; a committee on Assessments; a committee on Missions; a committee on Christian Education; a committee on Sunday School work.

16. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

17. The following order of business shall be observed:

1. Calling roll of Ministers.
2. Appointing Committee on Credentials.
3. Report of same.
4. Calling roll of Lay Delegates.
5. Appointing of standing committees.
6. Election of Secretary.
7. Bishop's Address.
8. Resolutions pertinent to said Address.
9. Report of Committee on the Admission of New Parishes.
10. Report of Standing Committee.
11. Resolutions in regard to the same.
12. Report of Treasurer of Diocese.
13. Election of Treasurer of Diocese.
14. Report of Treasurer of Permanent Fund for Support of Episcopate.
15. Election of Treasurer of Permanent Fund.
16. Report of Registrar.
17. Election of Registrar.
18. Report of Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society.
19. Report of Missionary Board.
20. Election of Missionary Board.

## APPENDIX No. 17.

## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

## Protestant Episcopal Church

IN THE

## DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

## ARTICLE I.

This Church acknowledges the authority of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

## ARTICLE II.

There shall be a Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri on the fourth Tuesday in May in each year, in such place as shall be determined by the Convention. In the event of the prevalence of any epidemic disease, or for other sufficient cause, occurring after the designation of the place of meeting of the Annual Convention, the Bishop (or, in case of his inability to act or of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee) may appoint another place for the meeting of the Convention.

## ARTICLE III.

The Bishop shall have power to call special Conventions when he may deem it important for the good of the Church, or when applied to for that purpose by the Standing Committee hereinafter provided for; or, in the case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the Standing Committee shall have power to call a Special Convention, and shall do so if applied to for the purpose by a majority of the clergy entitled to seats in the Convention.

## ARTICLE IV.

Any parish may be suspended from the right of representation in the Convention, or its connection with the Diocese wholly dissolved, by a vote of two-thirds of each order, when the same shall be deemed conducive to the interests of the Church.



## ARTICLE V.

SECTION 1. The Convention shall be composed of the Bishop, Assistant Bishop, and of the officiating Ministers, being regularly admitted and settled in some church within this Diocese which is in union with this Convention; and of lay members, consisting of one or more Delegates, not exceeding four, from each church.

SEC. 2. Clergymen who shall have been employed as Missionaries of the Church within this Diocese for six months preceding a Convention, and clergymen engaged as Professors and instructors of youth in any college, academy, or general seminary of learning, duly incorporated, and under the control of the Protestant Episcopal Church, may be members of the Convention.

SEC. 3. The Lay Delegates shall be chosen by the Vestry when one is in legal existence; when the Vestry is from vacancy or otherwise incompetent to act, they shall be chosen by the congregation.

## ARTICLE VI.

Every Convention shall be opened with Divine Service, including the Holy Communion; and the preacher shall be appointed by the Bishop, or, in case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, by the Standing Committee.

## ARTICLE VII.

The Bishop of the Diocese shall be, *ex officio*, President of the Convention; and in case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, or in the absence of the Bishop, the Convention shall be called to order by the President of the Standing Committee; after which the Convention shall elect a President from among the clergy.

## ARTICLE VIII.

In all matters which shall come before the Convention, the clergy and laity shall deliberate and vote in one body; but if, in any case, it be required by five votes, the two orders shall vote separately, the Lay Delegates of each Parish casting one vote, and a majority of both orders shall be necessary to constitute a decision. In the case of electing a Bishop, the two orders shall always vote separately, agreeably to the mode as prescribed.

## ARTICLE IX.

A Secretary shall be chosen upon the assembling of the Annual Convention, and shall remain in office until the meeting of the next Annual Convention, and until a successor be appointed. His duty shall be to take minutes of their proceedings, to preserve their journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Convention which may be in his possession. It shall also be his duty to give due notice to each Minister and Vestry of the time and place appointed for the meeting of the succeeding or of any Special Convention.



## ARTICLE X.

The Bishop, if he be present, and at least ten clergymen, and the lay delegates from ten parishes, shall be necessary as a quorum for the transaction of business: *Provided, however,* that a less number shall have power to adjourn from day to day.

## ARTICLE XI.

There shall be chosen, by concurrent ballot of the two orders, at each Annual Convention, a committee, consisting of three presbyters and three laymen, which shall be called the Standing Committee; three of whom, two being clergymen, shall constitute a quorum; and they shall have power to fill vacancies in their number.

## ARTICLE XII.

The election of a Bishop of the Diocese shall be made in a stated Annual Convention, or in a Convention called by the Standing Committee, and stated by them to be for that purpose, and not to meet before the expiration of sixty days from the date of their resolution to call said Convention; which resolution shall, on the day following its passage, be communicated by them to every clergyman and parish in the Diocese by letter, by mail, and published in three or more public papers. In the choice of a Bishop, no person shall be elected until he shall have received the votes of a majority of the clergy and of the parishes entitled to seats in the Convention.

## ARTICLE XIII.

The mode of altering the Constitution shall be as follows: A proposition for an amendment shall be introduced in writing, and considered in the Convention, and, if approved of, shall lie over to the next stated Convention; and if again approved of in the next ensuing Convention by a majority of the two orders voting thereon separately and concurring, the change shall take place, and the Constitution so altered shall be valid and obligatory.

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## APPENDIX No. 18.

## AMENDED CANONS

OF THE

## Protestant Episcopal Church

IN THE

## DIOCESE OF MISSOURI,

As Adopted by the 33d Annual Convention.

## CANON I.

*Of a List of the Clergy.*

SECTION 1. Within one week before the meeting of every Convention of this Diocese, the Bishop (or, in his absence, the Standing Committee) shall cause to be prepared a list of all ministers canonically resident in the Diocese, annexing the name of their respective cures, parishes, or stations, or of the institutions of learning, duly incorporated, in which they are engaged—and in regard to such as are not engaged in parishes, missions, or institutions of learning, as above, their places of residence only—specifying, at the same time, who, of any class, are deacons; but no clergyman while suspended from the ministry shall have a place on such list. And such list shall be laid before the Convention immediately after it shall have been called to order, and the names of the clerical members called therefrom; and those entitled by the fifth article of the Constitution shall thereupon take their seats. The same shall be prefixed to the Journal and form a part thereof.

## CANON II.

*Of Members of the Convention.*

SECTION 1. The evidence of the regular admission of a clergyman into the Diocese, and the evidence of settlement in a parish thereof, shall consist in proof satisfactory to the Convention of a compliance with the Canons of this Diocese, and the Canons of the General Convention in that behalf for the time being. In all cases of a contested right to a seat, the evidence of employment as a Missionary, and of the connection of a clergyman with a seminary of learning duly incorporated, and under the control of the Protestant Episcopal Church, shall consist in the certificate of



the Bishop; or, in case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, of the President of the Standing Committee. The evidence of the seat of a Delegate from an organized Mission shall be a certificate of the Missionary of the station, approved by the Bishop. When the right of any clergyman to a seat in this Convention is disputed, it shall be determined by the Convention itself, whether his name be inserted in the list aforesaid or omitted.

SEC. 2. (1) The appointment of Lay Delegates to the Convention, if they be chosen by the Vestry, shall be made at a regular meeting of such Vestry. If they be chosen by the congregation, the electors must have the same qualifications, and the election shall be conducted in like manner as prescribed by Canon for the election of Wardens and Vestrymen.

(2) The evidence of the appointment of a Lay Delegate shall consist in a written certificate of the Rector of the parish of which he is a representative, or by one of the Wardens, or by the Secretary of the Vestry of such parish; and no Lay Delegate shall be entitled to a seat in this Convention unless he be entitled to vote for Vestrymen of the parish which he is appointed to represent; and no candidate for Holy Orders in the Church shall be entitled to a seat as a Lay Delegate to this Convention.

(3) Whereas the regular attendance of the clergy and laity at the meetings of the Convention is of essential consequence to the interests of the Church, this duty is hereby enjoined upon them.

(4) And whereas it is often necessary to travel a considerable distance to the place of meeting of the Convention, it is hereby made the duty of the different parishes to make provision for the expenses of their clergy in attending the Convention.

(5) No member of this Convention shall leave the same during its session without having applied for and obtained leave of absence.

SEC. 3. All officers of this Convention shall be elected by ballot and shall continue in office until others shall be chosen: *Provided*, that, by common consent, elections by ballot may be dispensed with. Whenever an election is by ballot, a majority of votes in each order shall be necessary.

#### CANON III.

##### *Of the Treasurer.*

SECTION 1. At every stated Convention, there shall be chosen a Treasurer of the Convention. It shall be his duty to receive and disburse all moneys collected under the authority of the Convention, and of which the collection and distribution shall not be otherwise regulated. He shall be subject to the direction of the Standing Committee in relation to the mode and place of depositing the funds received by him, and the manner of paying them out; and his accounts and books shall be at all times subject to the inspection of the Standing Committee, or any member thereof. Before entering on the duties of his office, he shall give a bond to the Standing Committee, in such penalty and with such security as they shall direct, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties, and for the delivery over to his successor of all funds, securities, books and papers pertaining to his office.

SEC. 2. His accounts shall be rendered annually to the Convention, and



shall be examined by a committee appointed for the purpose, who shall report upon the same to the Convention.

SEC. 3. In case of vacancy in the office of Treasurer, it shall be supplied by an appointment, to be made by the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the person so appointed shall continue to act until an appointment is made by the Convention. The Treasurer may be removed at any time from his office, by the Standing Committee, for any neglect or misconduct, of which they shall be judges.

## CANON IV.

*Of the Secretary of the Convention.*

SECTION 1. In addition to the duties of the Secretary prescribed in the eighth article of the Constitution, he shall transmit, annually, to each of the Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, and to the Secretary of the last House of Clerical and Lay Delegates in the General Convention, and to the Secretary of every Diocesan Convention, a copy of the Journal of the Convention; and shall request the last to send copies of their respective Journals in exchange. He shall also transmit a copy to each clergyman in the Diocese, and to each Lay Deputy attending the Convention; and forward by mail, unless otherwise directed, ten copies to each parish in the Diocese.

SEC. 2. He shall also transmit to every General Convention, in addition to the documents called for by the Canons of the General Convention, a certificate, to be signed by himself, containing a list of clergymen in this Diocese, and the amount of funds paid or secured to be paid (distinguishing them) to the General Theological Seminary, together with the nomination of Trustees of that Seminary; and also a like certificate of the appointment of Clerical and Lay Deputies.

SEC. 3. Any expense incurred by a compliance with the sections of this Canon shall be paid out of the Diocesan Fund.

SEC. 4. Immediately upon the close of each Convention, the Secretary is to transmit to the Treasurer of the Convention a certified copy of all the action of the Convention bearing upon the duties of said Treasurer.

SEC. 5. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of Secretary of the Convention, the duty thereof shall devolve upon the Secretary of the Standing Committee.

## CANON V.

*Of Assessments.*

SECTION 1. At each stated meeting of the Convention a committee shall be appointed for the purpose of assessing upon the several parishes in the Diocese the amount to be paid for the support of the Bishop, together with a sum sufficient to defray the contingent expenses of the Convention and Diocese, which amount shall be collected by the Vestries of the parishes, and paid quarterly, in advance, to the Treasurer of the Convention.

SEC. 2. A reduction of the annual assessment shall be allowed in abatement of such assessment to all parishes contributing to the Permanent



Fund; and such reduction shall be equivalent to the interest at eight per cent. per annum on the aggregate of such amounts as shall be contributed by such parish from year to year to this fund. Said allowance to be made by the Committee on Assessments at the beginning of each Convention year, predicated upon the contributions up to the time of such assessment.

SEC. 3. The Treasurer shall regularly charge the said assessment upon his books against each Vestry, crediting the same with payment when made, and shall report annually to the Convention the state of his accounts with each parish, which report shall be entered upon the Journal of the Convention.

CANON VI.

*Of Election of Vestries and their Duties.*

SECTION 1. On Monday in Easter week in every year, after due notice publicly given on an occasion of Divine worship, the parishioners of each parish shall assemble in annual meeting to elect a Vestry, and transact such other business as shall be brought before them. At such meeting the Rector or Minister in charge, if he be present, shall preside, and the polls shall be kept open for the space of two hours. The right of challenge shall be admitted; the Secretary of the Parish meeting shall make record of such challenge and cause; and reference may be made to the Bishop, whose decision shall be final. The Vestry shall consist of not less than three nor more than thirteen members.

SEC. 2. The electors shall consist of the communicants, of full age, who have been such for not less than six months prior to the time of the election, and such other persons of full age as may have contributed to the support of the parish for the three months next preceding such election, according to such rules as the parish may have adopted.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the Rector, or Minister in charge, or, in case of his absence, of the Secretary of the parish meeting, to call the Vestry together as soon thereafter as practicable, at which meeting, as at all other meetings of the Vestry, the Rector, or Minister in charge, shall preside.

SEC. 4. From their number the Rector or Minister in charge may appoint a Senior Warden, and the Vestry shall elect a Junior Warden, both of whom shall be communicants, one of whom shall preside in the absence of the Rector or Minister in charge; but should the Rector, or Minister in charge, desire at any time to commit the appointment of the Senior Warden to the Vestry, he may do so, and the Vestry shall then elect one. They shall also elect a Secretary, whose duty it shall be to take minutes of the proceedings of the Vestry, and to perform such other duties as shall be legally assigned him, and faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Church, which may be in his possession.

SEC. 5. The Vestry shall continue in office until their successors shall be appointed.

SEC. 6. The duties of the Vestry shall be to take charge of the property of the parish; attend to and regulate all its temporal concerns; to provide for the support of the Rector, and, in case of his death, resignation, or



removal, with the advice and consent of the Bishop, to supply his place as soon as possible; and in general to act as helpers to the Minister, in whatever is appropriate to laymen, for the furtherance of the Gospel; it being understood always that the spiritual concerns of the church are under the exclusive direction of the Minister, in subordination to the ecclesiastical authority and laws of the Diocese.

## CANON VII.

*Of Deputies to the General Convention.*

SECTION 1. The Convention shall, at each regular annual meeting next preceding a stated meeting of the General Convention, elect, by concurrent ballot of the clerical and lay members, four clergymen and four laymen, to act as Deputies from this Diocese in the General Convention. It shall also, in like manner, elect four clergymen and four laymen as Provisional Deputies, who shall act in case of the failure of the regular Deputies.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Deputies elect to signify to the Bishop, at least one month before the meeting of the General Convention, their acceptance of the appointment, and their intention to discharge its duties; in default of which, the Bishop shall designate from the list of Provisional Deputies so many as may be necessary to insure, as far as practicable, a full representation of the Diocese. And in case the representation should still not be full, the vacancies may be filled by the Bishop, with the consent of the Standing Committee.

## CANON VIII.

*Of the Standing Committee.*

SECTION 1. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the powers and duties to be performed by the Bishop, in matters of discipline, shall be performed by the Standing Committee, except those cases where such powers and duties are, or may be, especially delegated to, or enjoined upon, the clerical members of said committee; in which cases such powers and duties shall be exercised by said clerical members alone: *Provided*, that no sentence shall be pronounced upon a clergyman but by a Bishop.

SEC. 2. At their first meeting, they shall appoint one of the presbyters of their body to be their president, and another of their number to be their secretary, whose duty it shall be to keep regular minutes of all proceedings and business of the Standing Committee; to preserve them carefully recorded in a book to be provided for that purpose alone; to preserve the originals of all letters and papers addressed to the Standing Committee; to attest their public acts; to perform such other duties as they require; and faithfully deliver into the hands of his successor all books, papers and letters relative to the concerns of the Standing Committee which may have been entrusted to him.

The Standing Committee may make such regulations for the promotion of business as they may think proper, provided such regulations be not at variance with the Constitution and Canons of this Church.

The minutes of the proceedings of the Standing Committee, and all pa-



pers and letters in their hands relating to the concerns of the Church, shall always be subject to the inspection and examination of the Bishop and the Convention.

The Standing Committee shall have power to fill vacancies in their number, and it shall be their duty to do so as soon as practicable after a vacancy shall occur.

SEC. 3. In addition to the usual duties of the Standing Committee, they shall have power to make drafts upon the Treasurer for all moneys appropriated by the Convention, and these drafts shall always be signed by the president or secretary of the committee.

CANON IX.

*Of Vacant Parishes.*

SECTION 1. Whenever a parish becomes vacant, it shall be the duty of the Vestry to give immediate notice thereof to the Bishop.

SEC. 2. The Bishop shall appoint those of the clergy of the Diocese who can with the most convenience discharge the duty to supply such vacant parishes as have been reported to him, at such times as may be deemed convenient and proper. It shall be the duty of such vacant parishes thus supplied to defray all the expenses incident to such occasional services.

SEC. 3. No clergyman shall take charge of any parish in this Diocese, or be a Minister or Assistant Minister in any parish, without having first obtained the written consent of the Bishop, or, in case there be no Bishop, of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

CANON X.

*Of Parish Registers and Parochial Reports.*

SECTION 1. The Parish Register, required by the Canon of the General Convention, shall specify the name and time of the birth of the child baptized, with the names of the parents and sponsors; the name of the adult baptized; the names of the parties married, and the place where the marriage was solemnized; the names of the persons buried; and also the time when each rite was performed. These registries shall be kept by the Minister in a book, to be provided for that purpose, belonging to the Vestry of each parish; which book shall be the Parish Register, and shall be preserved by the Vestry as a part of the records of the parish. The list of communicants shall embrace all within his cure, as nearly as can be ascertained; and, in his annual parochial report, he shall distinguish the additions, removals, and deaths, since the last report. He shall also keep a list of the families and adult persons in his cure, so far as practicable, and also an accurate list of persons confirmed from time to time by the Bishop.

SEC. 2. In every case where a parish is destitute of a Minister, the register contemplated by this Canon shall be kept by the Wardens, or by some person appointed by the Vestry for that purpose.

SEC. 3. Whenever a clergyman shall perform any service in a parish of which he has not charge, the records required by the Canons of the General Convention shall be made in the register of that parish; but if the acts performed be beyond the limits of any parish where there is a book of rec-



ords, then they shall be recorded in the register of the parish of which he has charge, and the record shall state where the acts were performed: and if the acts be performed by a Minister who has no regular cure, and beyond the limits of any parish, then, in addition to the private registry required by the General Convention, he shall report all ministerial acts so performed, in writing, to this Convention, which report shall be a complete copy of the record, and contain the name of the place where each act was performed; and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of this Convention to copy the same into a book to be kept for that purpose.

## CANON XI.

*Of Organization and Admission of New Parishes into Union with the Diocese, and of Parochial Limits in Cities and Towns.*

SECTION 1. Whenever any number of persons not less than ten, of the age of twenty-one years or more, and attached to the doctrines and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church, residing in any city or town of this Diocese wherein a parish or parishes have already been organized, shall desire to organize a new parish in said city or town, it shall be their duty to make a written application to the Bishop for permission to organize, who, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, shall have power to grant the prayer of the petitioners.

SEC. 2. The limits within which such new organization shall be effected, and have power to acquire ground on which to erect a church or chapel, by purchase, lease, or gift, shall be not less than five hundred yards in a direct line from the place of worship of any other parish, or land acquired for such purpose: *Provided*, no such prohibition be interposed unless a satisfactory certificate be lodged with the Bishop, that the parish will proceed within two years to the erection of a suitable building.

SEC. 3. To organize a new parish in this Diocese, at least ten individuals of full age shall sign canonical articles of association (as adopted by the Convention), and give notice of the intention to organize on two occasions of public worship, at least one week apart and within one month before the time of organization; that a majority of said ten individuals shall be present to unite in such organization, and, immediately after Divine Service held within the month aforesaid, proceed to a public election of two Wardens, who shall be communicants, and at least three Vestrymen; they may also prepare, or cause to be prepared, legal articles of association, sign the same, present them to the Circuit Court of the county, and procure from said court a certificate of incorporation.

SEC. 4. To enable a parish or congregation to be received into union with the Church in this Diocese, it shall be necessary that the Vestry submit to the Convention canonical and legal articles of association, together with a copy of their certificate of incorporation; and also a certificate from the Bishop (or, in case of his absence, or of a vacancy in the Episcopate, from a majority of the Standing Committee) that notice has been given him (or them) of the organization having taken place, and of his (or their) approval of the same; also their written application for admission into



union with the Convention, showing that the requirements of this Canon have been fully complied with.

SEC. 5. Mission stations may be organized and received into union with this Convention, and allowed a representation therein, when such Mission stations are reported by the ecclesiastical authority, at the opening of the Convention, as in good standing; the Delegate shall be the Warden of the Mission, appointed by the Missionary and approved by the Bishop: he shall have a seat but no vote.

SEC. 6. The Articles of Association, as authorized by the Convention, shall have the force and effect of a Canon of the Diocese.

CANON XII.

*Of Forfeiture of Representation of Parishes in Convention.*

SECTION 1. Whenever any parish in union with this Convention shall neglect for two years in succession to meet the assessments made upon it by the Convention, such refusal not having been excused, or to make a parochial report, no missionary report being made on its behalf; or shall not during the same period have been under the care of a parish Minister, nor requested of the ecclesiastical authority to have the services of a Missionary, such parish shall no longer have a right to representation in Convention. The Treasurer shall report such parish to the Convention in his annual statement.

SEC. 2. Such parish, however, may be readmitted upon application to the Convention, accompanied by a report of its condition, and on such terms as may appear just; such readmission to take effect from and after the rising of the Convention consenting to such admission.

CANON XIII.

*Of the Trial of a Clergyman, not being a Bishop.*

Whenever any Minister of this Diocese, not being a Bishop thereof, shall become "liable to presentment and trial" under the provisions of any Canon of the General or Diocesan Convention, the mode of proceeding in this Diocese shall be as follows, viz.:

SECTION 1. The trial shall be on a presentment in writing, addressed to the Bishop of the Diocese, specifying the offenses of which the accused is alleged to be guilty, with reasonable certainty as to time, place and circumstances.

SEC. 2. If three clergymen, or three lay communicants of full age, in either case in good standing, shall allege, in writing, to the Bishop, with sufficient particularity, that any clergyman of this Diocese is guilty of any offense which renders him liable to trial under the Canons of the Church or of this Diocese, the Bishop shall appoint five persons, of whom at least three shall be Presbyters, to examine the case, a majority of whom shall make such examination; and if there is, in their opinion, sufficient ground for presentment, they shall present the clergyman accordingly.

SEC. 3. Whenever from public rumor, or otherwise, the Bishop shall have reason to believe that any clergyman is under imputation of having been guilty of any offense or misconduct for which he is liable to be tried, and



that the interest of the Church requires an investigation, it shall be his duty to appoint five persons, of whom three shall be Presbyters and two lay communicants, to examine the case, a majority of whom may make such investigation; and if there is, in their opinion, sufficient ground for presentment, shall present the clergyman accordingly.

SEC. 4. A presentment being made the Bishop, if the facts charged shall not appear to him to be such as constitute an offense, may dismiss it; or if it allege facts, some of which do, and some of which do not, constitute an offense, he may allow it in part and dismiss the residue, or he may permit it to be amended. When it shall be allowed in whole or in part, the Bishop shall cause a copy of it to be served on the accused; and shall also nominate twelve Presbyters of this Diocese, "who shall not be near of kin to either presenter or the accused, and no person shall serve on said Court who shall have formed or expressed an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the accused," and cause a list of their names to be served on the accused, who shall, within thirty days after such service, select five of them, and notify their names in writing to the Bishop; and if he shall not give such notification to the Bishop within the said thirty days, the Bishop shall select five, and the Presbyters so selected shall form a Court for the trial of the accused, and shall meet at such time and place as the Bishop shall direct, and shall have power to adjourn from time to time, and from place to place (but always within this Diocese) as they shall think necessary. "And in case of failure to attend, or any disability or other cause, said Court shall fall below the number of three, the Bishop shall summon other Presbyters to fill up the vacancies, who shall have the like qualifications as above set out."

SEC. 5. A written notice of the time and place of their first meeting shall be served, at least thirty days before such meeting, on the accused, together with a copy of the charges or presentment, and also on one of the persons making the presentment.

SEC. 6. The Bishop may, if he deem it proper, prohibit the accused from the exercise of the ministry during the period between the entertaining the presentment and the acquittal certified or the sentence pronounced by him after judgment of the Court upon the trial; but such prohibition shall not, during the time of its continuance, affect the rectorial relations of the accused if he be settled in a parish, except in acts ministerial and pastoral.

SEC. 7. The Court shall be organized by the election of one of its members as President, and the appointment of a clerk, who may or may not be a member of said Court, who shall take accurate notes of all testimony, and make careful record of all the proceedings, which notes and record shall be authenticated by the Court, and they shall, before they proceed to the trial of the accused, adopt and declare the rules by which said trial shall be conducted.

SEC. 8. If at the time appointed for the first meeting of the Court of Presbyters, the whole number of five shall not attend, then those who do attend may adjourn from time to time; and if, after one adjournment or more, it shall appear to them improbable that the whole number will at-



tend within a reasonable time, then those who do attend, not being less than three, shall constitute the Court, and proceed to the trial, and a majority of them shall decide all questions.

SEC. 9. If a clergyman presented shall confess the truth of the facts alleged in the presentment, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to proceed to pass sentence; and if he shall not confess them before the appointment of a Court for his trial, he shall be considered as denying them.

SEC. 10. If a clergyman presented, after having had due notice, shall not appear before the Court of Presbyters appointed for his trial, the Court may nevertheless proceed as if he were present, unless for good cause they shall see fit to adjourn till another day.

SEC. 11. When the Court proceed to the trial, they shall hear such evidence as shall be produced, which evidence shall be reduced to writing and signed by the witnesses respectively; and some officer authorized by law to administer oaths, may, at the desire of the party, be requested to administer an oath or affirmation to the witnesses, that they will testify the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, concerning the facts charged in the presentment. If, on ordering the trial, the accused shall confess the truth of the charges, as stated in the presentment, the Court may dispense with hearing further evidence, and may proceed at once to state their opinion to the Bishop as to the sentence that ought to be pronounced.

SEC. 12. Upon the application of either party to the Bishop, and it being made satisfactorily to appear to him that any material witness cannot be procured upon the trial, the Bishop may appoint a commissary to take the testimony of any such witness. Such commissary may be either a clergyman or a layman, and the party so applying shall give to the other at least six days' notice of the time and place of taking the testimony. And both parties may attend and examine the witnesses, and the questions and answers shall be reduced to writing and signed by the witness, and shall be certified by the commissary, and endorsed under his seal, and transmitted to the Court, and shall be received by them as evidence. A witness examined before such commissary, may be sworn or affirmed in manner aforesaid.

SEC. 13. The Court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall declare in a writing, signed by them, or a majority of them, their decision on the charges contained in the presentment, distinctly stating whether the accused is guilty or not guilty of such charges respectively, and also stating the sentence which, in their opinion, should be pronounced; and a copy of such decision shall be, without delay, communicated to the accused; and the original decision, together with the evidence, shall be delivered to the Bishop, who shall pronounce such canonical sentence as shall appear to him proper, provided the same shall not exceed in severity the sentence recommended by the Court; and such sentence shall be final.

Before pronouncing any sentence, the Bishop shall summon the accused and any three or more of the clergy to meet him at such time as may, in his opinion, be most convenient, in some church to be designated by him, which shall for that purpose be open at the time to all persons who may choose to attend, and the sentence shall then and there be publicly pro-



nounced by the Bishop. In all cases of suspension of any clergyman, such suspension is understood to be from the exercise of the functions of the ministry, and be for a limited period, or until the offender gives to the Bishop satisfactory evidence of contrition and reformation, or it may include both these conditions. The pronouncing of a sentence of suspension or of admonition for moral delinquency against any clergyman shall *ipso facto* sever the connection between the clergyman so sentenced and his parish. But the Bishop, if he shall be satisfied that justice requires it, may grant a new trial to the accused, in which case a new Court of Presbyters shall be appointed, the proceedings before whom shall be conducted as before mentioned.

SEC. 14. All notices and papers contemplated in this Canon may be issued by a summoner or summoners, to be appointed for the purpose by the Bishop, and whose certificate of such service shall be evidence thereof. In case of service by any other person, the facts shall be proved by the affidavit of such person. A written notice or paper delivered to a party, or left at his last place of residence, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper.

SEC. 15. The defendant may have the privilege of appearing by counsel, who shall be communicants; in case of the exercise of which privilege, and not otherwise, those who present shall also have the like privilege.

## CANON XIV.

*Lay Discipline.*

Persons in connection with this Church by baptism, who are habitually neglectful of the duty of public worship and of other Christian obligations, shall be kindly admonished by the Minister. The confirmed who have never been communicants, shall be earnestly urged to prepare themselves for that bounden duty and service of the followers of Christ. Communicants absenting themselves from Divine Service or from the Lord's Supper for six months, without reasonable excuse, shall be seriously exhorted to return to this duty; and if they still so absent themselves, may, after one year, be suspended or repelled from the Holy Communion.

## CANON XV.

*Of Appointments under the Canons.*

Whenever a clergyman shall refuse or neglect to discharge any duties growing out of an appointment under the Canons, without assigning to the ecclesiastical authority sufficient and satisfactory reasons for such neglect, he shall be liable to ecclesiastical proceedings or censure.

## CANON XVI.

*Of Special Collections.*

It shall be the duty of the Minister of every congregation in this Diocese to make the following collections annually: 1st. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate; 2d. For the increase of the Fund for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease; 3d. For the Fund for support of Theological Students in the Diocese, which



shall be made on the day of the annual Thanksgiving. Quarterly collections shall be made by all the congregations of the Diocese in behalf of Diocesan Missions which do not contribute through the Laymen's Coöperating Missionary Society;—and it is recommended that such quarterly collections shall be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Missionary Board in the months of March, June, September, and December.

## CANON XVII.

*Of the Fund for disabled and infirm Clergymen.*

SECTION 1. An offertory shall be made annually in every congregation in this Diocese, to be applied to the relief of clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen. It is recommended that such offertory be made on Christmas day.

SEC. 2. Two lay trustees shall be appointed by the Convention, and hold their office during the pleasure of the Convention, who, with the Bishop and one clergyman to be chosen in like manner, and the Treasurer of the Convention, shall constitute a Board, to be called the Trustees of the Fund for aged and infirm Clergymen; whose duty it shall be to receive applications for relief, and to apply the fund according to such rules and principles as said trustees shall adopt, to be submitted to the Convention for its revision and approval.

SEC. 3. Vacancies occurring in the number of the trustees during recess of Convention may be supplied by the remaining trustees.

SEC. 4. All contributions or donations for this object shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Convention, and funds not needed for current use shall be invested and held in trust by such trustees.

## CANON XVIII.

*Permanent Fund.*

SECTION 1. The Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate in this Diocese, now provided, together with what may hereafter be contributed or acquired, and any accumulation from the investment thereof, shall be entrusted to the Trustees of the Permanent Fund.

SEC. 2. Such trustees shall be three in number, and shall be appointed by, and hold their offices during the pleasure of, the Convention, which shall fill up all vacancies; vacancies, however, during a recess of the Convention, may be filled by the remaining trustees, to be reported to and approved by the Convention.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of every Rector or Minister having charge of a parish or congregation in this Diocese, to cause an annual collection or contribution to be made in aid of the Permanent Fund; and in case of a vacant parish, the duty shall devolve upon the Wardens and Vestrymen.

SEC. 4. The amount received shall be paid to the treasurer of the said trustees, and, together with a statement exhibiting the condition of the said Fund and securities, shall be reported by them to the next regular Convention, and shall be entered on its Journal.

SEC. 5. Said trustees shall have charge of all real estate belonging to said Fund, including the Episcopal residence; and it shall be their duty to pay



the taxes assessed on said property, and make such repairs on the Episcopal residence as may from time to time be found necessary.

## CANON XIX.

*Of the Registrar.*

SECTION 1. There shall be elected annually by the Convention an officer to be called the Registrar of the Diocese, who shall hold his office until a successor is chosen. In case of any vacancy in the office arising during the recess of the Convention, it may be filled by appointment by the Bishop and Standing Committee, or by the Standing Committee in case there is no Bishop, or in case the Bishop is absent from the Diocese.

SEC. 2. The duty of the Registrar shall be to receive and safely keep all books, documents and manuscripts belonging to the Diocese, and not required to be kept by any other person or officer. He shall also collect and preserve such materials as can be obtained relative to the history of the Diocese and of particular parishes, and shall catalogue and classify all books, documents and papers so as to make their contents accessible for reference.

SEC. 3. He shall also keep a book containing a record of all consecrations of churches; of all ordinations; of all sentences and acts of deposition for offenses in the Diocese; of all admissions and dismissals of clergy into or from the Diocese, and of all deaths of clergy belonging thereto.

SEC. 4. He shall annually report to the Convention, showing, with such details as may seem expedient, the condition of the collection in his hands, and the additions made to them from time to time, with such suggestions as he may deem proper concerning their preservation, arrangement and increase, and concerning the best method of securing to the Church a knowledge of all matters of importance contained therein.

SEC. 5. The Registrar, under direction of the Bishop, shall prepare and cause to be printed forms for certificates of baptism, confirmation, and matrimony, and also letters commendatory.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the Vestry of each Parish, and of the Clerk of each Mission Station, to procure for the use of the Minister a sufficient number of the same, paying for them at such rates as shall be fixed by the Registrar.

SEC. 7. It shall be the duty of all Ministers in this Diocese to use such forms and no other, and to furnish them to parties entitled to the same immediately after the performance of the Rite.

## CANON XX.

*Fund for Theological Education.*

A Board of Trustees, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Treasurer of the Diocese, one Presbyter, and two laymen, shall be elected by and hold their office through the pleasure of the Convention, to hold, invest and manage all funds now held for the purposes of Theological Education, or which may hereafter come to their hands; they shall have power to make rules and regulations for the proper disbursement of said funds, and report annually to the Convention.



## CANON XXI.

*Legacies and Donations.*

SECTION 1. A Board of Trustees, to consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, two Presbyters, and three laymen, shall be elected by and shall hold their office during the pleasure of the Convention, to take charge of, invest and manage all bequests and donations made to this Diocese or for its use.

SEC. 2. Said Board shall have power to make all needful rules and regulations as to the disbursement of any funds in their hands, and they shall annually report their proceedings to this Convention.

## CANON XXII.

*Missionary Board of the Diocese.*

SECTION 1. At each Annual Convention three clergymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop or Bishops of the Diocese, and two laymen elected by the Laymen's Coöperating Missionary Society, shall form a Board to be called the Missionary Board of the Diocese of Missouri, which shall have the management of Missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries in the Diocese.

SEC. 2. The Bishop may appoint four or more corresponding members of said Board resident in different parts of the Diocese, who shall be agents of the Board in their respective districts; such corresponding members shall be entitled to seats and be present at the meetings of the Board.

SEC. 3. The Bishop shall be *ex officio* President, and he shall have the sole power of nominating Missionaries for appointment by the Board. Upon a vacancy in the Episcopate, or inability of the Bishop to act, any member shall have the right to nominate.

SEC. 4. The Board shall have power to elect from its members a Chairman *pro tem.* in the absence of the Bishop to appoint its own Secretary and Treasurer; to fill vacancies during the recess of the Convention; to make by-laws and rules, and to do all such other acts as may be needful to carry out the office and trust conferred upon it.

SEC. 5. It shall be the duty of the Board to make an annual report of its proceedings to the Convention, containing the names of the stations and Missionaries, a statement of its receipts and disbursements, and of the churches contributing and of the sums contributed, and whatever else may be deemed advisable to bring before the Convention.

SEC. 6. It is hereby declared the duty of every congregation in the Diocese, by collections or otherwise, to contribute to the treasury of the Missionary Fund.

## CANON XXIII.

*Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.*

There shall be elected by the Convention an officer learned in the law, under the title of Chancellor of the Diocese, whose duty it shall be to act as the legal counsellor of the Bishop and of the Standing Committee, in matters affecting the interest of the Church, as his professional counsel may be asked or required. The Chancellor of the Diocese shall be a communicant of the Church, and hold his office for the term of three years;



and in the event of a vacancy, the Bishop and Standing Committee shall fill the vacancy until the annual Convention next ensuing, when it shall elect a successor for the full term of three years.

## CANON XXIV.

*Of Alterations and Amendments.*

No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall hereafter be considered by the Convention unless at least one day's previous notice be given thereof in open Convention, and unless, by unanimous consent, until such alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by a committee on Constitution and Canons.

## TITLE II. CANON XII. OF GENERAL CONVENTION.

A communicant removing from one parish to another, shall procure from the Rector (if any) of the parish of his last residence, or, if there be no Rector, from one of the Wardens, a certificate stating that he or she is a communicant in good standing; and the Rector of the parish or congregation to which he or she removes shall not be required to receive him or her as a communicant until such letter be produced.

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Committee of Revision and Publication.

*“Resolved, That there shall be annually appointed by the Bishop a committee of three laymen, to be a permanent committee of the Diocese, who shall act in connection with the Secretary in the revision and publication of the Journal of the Convention.”*

Quarterly collections shall be made, by all the congregations in the Diocese, in behalf of Diocesan Missions, who do not contribute through the Laymen’s Co-Operating Missionary Society.”

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
