

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Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of

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their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Tuesday, January 26, 1932.

The Ninety-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri met in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, Saint Louis, at 8 p.m., on Tuesday, January 26, 1932, with the Bishop Coadjutor in the Chair.

The Convention was opened with prayer.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-three who were entitled to vote, twenty-six were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 17.)

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty-one Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-one were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention; and that said Rules of Order be amended by striking out the Committee on Unfinished Business and inserting in lieu thereof the Committee on the Dispatch of Business in Section 4; and by adding to Section 18 the following: "All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention."

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent was appointed a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

The Nominating Committee was unanimously elected as follows:

The Secretary read the following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

Your Committee, to whom was referred proposed Canon 10a by the last Convention, recommends the following substitute:

Resolution No. 2.

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RESOLVED, That Canon 17, Of Dormant Parishes, be and is hereby repealed; and that in lieu thereof the following Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 17, to-wit:

CANON 17.

Of Changing a Parish into a Mission.

Section 1. Any Parish may become a Mission by resolution adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the electors at a regular annual Parish meeting, or at a special Parish meeting called by the Rector or Vestry to consider such change, notice of such proposed change having been given at two public services not less than fourteen days apart; provided, that said resolution for changing a Parish into a Mission shall receive the approval of the Bishop or of the Bishop Coadjutor and of the Diocesan Council prior to submission to such Parish meeting.

Section 2. Any Parish that shall fail for a period of two successive years to make its annual report to the Diocesan Convention and pay its annual Diocesan Assessment as required by Canon 18, or fail for two successive years to elect a Vestry as required by Canon 12, may be changed to a Mission by the Bishop or by the Bishop Coadjutor, with the approval of the Diocesan Convention by resolution adopted at any annual meeting.

Section 3. In the event any Parish shall be changed to a Mission, according to the provisions of this Canon, the resolution of the Parish meeting proposing or of the Diocesan Convention approving such change shall authorize and direct the Rector, Wardens, and Vestry of such Parish, or the person or persons, trustee or trustees holding title to any real estate or personal property for the benefit of such Parish, to convey, forthwith, all such real estate and personal property to the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund of this Diocese, to be held and disposed of for the use and benefit of such Mission under the Direction of the Diocesan Council.

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The foregoing report was laid over for consideration on Wednesday.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 3, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That Canon 19 be and is hereby repealed, and that in lieu thereof the following Canon be adopted, to be known as Canon 19, to-wit:

Of Special Offerings.

Section 1. Offerings may be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, on the Second Sunday in Lent;

Second. For the Theological Education Fund, on the Third Sunday in Advent;

Th'rd. For St. Luke's Hospital, on the Sunday nearest St. Luke's Day;

Fourth. For the University of the South, on the Second Sunday after the Epiphany;

Fifth. For the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, on Christmas

Day;
Sixth. For the Episcopal Home for Children, on the First Sunday in June.

Section 2. The Offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds or institutions.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 4, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That the last two paragraphs of Section 6, of Canon 9 be and are hereby repealed; and that in lieu thereof the following paragraphs be adopted, to-wit:

Each department may increase its membership, subject to confirmation by the Council, such additional members to have seats and votes in the department, but not in the Council. Women shall be eligible to membership in the departments, but not in the Council.

Each department shall elect a Chairman who shall have power to call all meetings, general and special, and shall preside at all meetings and shall exercise the initiative usually exercised by the chairman of a committee; subject, however, to the right of the Bishop at any time to notify said Chairman, in writing, of his intention to suggest any action by said department and to preside at any particular meeting of said department, and to exercise the duties of Chairman of any such meeting of the department; saving and excepting when so notified by the Bishop, the Chairman shall exercise all the duties herein above specified to be exercised by the Chairman.

It was ordered by the unanimous rising vote of the Convention that the Secretary send affectionate greetings to Bishop and Mrs. Johnson.

After a prayer and benediction by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Convention adjourned to meet immediately after the opening service Wednesday morning.

SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Wednesday, January 27, 1932.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 9:30 a.m., by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. David R. Haupt, the Rev. A. E. Woodward, the Rev. Dr. C. M. Davis, the Rev. John S. Bunting, and the Rev. Dr. Karl M. Block.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled for the business session of the Convention in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, with the Bishop Coadjutor in the Chair.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous day, which were approved.

The Bishop Coadjutor read a letter from Bishop Johnson.

It was ordered that each Clergyman who is working in the Diocese, but who has not as yet established a canonical residence, be given a seat and voice in the Convention.

Mr. Hicks introduced Resolution No. 5, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 5.

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RESOLVED, The Bishop consenting, that the Secretary be instructed to transmit to the metropolitan press of St. Louis that section of the Bishop's address pertaining to the forthcoming Disarma-

ment Conference at Geneva, Switzerland, and that section pertaining to unemployment, with request that they be published at length.

The Bishop Coadjutor called for the Order of the Day.

The Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet reported for the Field Department. (Appendix 9.)

The Rev. Dr. Karl M. Block reported for the Department of Missions. (Appendix 9.)

The Bishop Coadjutor led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers.

Mr. Mack, Chairman of the Finance Department, introduced Resolution No. 1, in the Diocesan Council report, which was adopted. (Appendix 9.)

Mr. George M. Block, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented Resolution No. 2, amending Canon 17, which was adopted by the unanimous vote of the Convention.

Mr. George M. Block presented Resolution No. 3, amending Canon 19, with recommendations from the Committee on Constitution and Canons that it be not adopted.

A motion to amend the resolution was lost.

Resolution No. 3 was adopted.

A notice from the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention was filed with the Secretary. (Appendix 18.)

After a prayer and bendiction by the Bishop Coadjutor, the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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The Bishop Coadjutor's Address to the Ninety-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese it is my privilege, my Friends of the Clergy and Laity, to address this Ninety-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri. May I bring you, first, good news of Bishop Johnson. As you know, he was given last June an extended leave of absence in the high hope that complete rest would restore him to health and strength. Apparently this expectation is being fulfilled, I am happy to say, and we are now looking forward to having him back with us about the first of April. We shall be thinking frequently with deep affection of him and Mrs. Johnson during these hours of the Convention.

It is customary in the Bishop's Address to call to mind those members of the American House of Bishops who during the past year have embarked on the last Great Adventure. I do so now. They are Thomas James Garland, eighth Bishop of Pennsylvania; Richard Henry Nelson, second Bishop of Albany; Theodore Irving Reese, sixth Bishop of Southern Ohio; John Poyntz Tyler, fourth Missionary Bishop of North Dakota.

There are also those among us, men and women of this Diocese, who in the year that is past have had unlocked for them the baffling riddle of existence. We remember them now with deep affection, and a prayer of gratitude to Almighty God for their good examples.

I must also record, that there have been during the past year subtractions and additions among the clergy of the Diocese. Francis J. Bloy, for seven years Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, has become Rector of St. James-by-the-Sea in La Jolla, California, and is transferred to the Diocese of Los Angeles. Edward S. Travers, for nine years Rector of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, is now Rector of the Church of the Messiah in Rhinebeck, New York, and is transferred to the Diocese of New York. Our affectionate good wishes follow them.

Two of our clergy have reached the age of retirement: J. Courtney Jones, who came to us from the Diocese of Virginia in 1903 and who for over twenty-eight years has been the beloved Rector of Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, who three times has been a Deputy from this Diocese to the General Convention of the Church and three times Alternate Deputy, who since 1906 has been one of the Examining Chaplains of the Diocese, a member of the Committee on Constitutions and Canons, a member of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and since 1923 its President, and since 1913 Dean of the Southern Convocation of the Diocese, who was honored by the Theological Seminary of Virginia with the richly deserved de-

gree of Doctor of Divinity, and has been one of the most loved, most faithful and influential men this Diocese has ever had; and Horatio Nelson Tragitt, who came to this Diocese from the Missionary District of South Dakota in 1912 and for over nineteen years has been Rector of Christ Church, Rolla, and minister to the surrounding towns and territory, working with great faithfulness and effectiveness in this rural section of the Diocese, loved by all who know him. We express to these two faithful servants of God our love, and the hope that for many years to come we shall enjoy their companionship and their counsel.

Into the Diocese during the past year have come five new friends: Sidney E. Sweet, now Dean of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, from the Diocese of Southern Ohio; Arthur H. Beardsley, now Rector of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, who was transferred to us from the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was ordained Deacon in Christ Church Cathedral on March 25, 1931, and Priest in Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, on November 1, 1931; Orvil V. Jackson, Minister in charge of our churches in Rolla, St. James, Sullivan, Cuba, and Salem, who also came to us from the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was ordained to the Diaconate in Christ Church Cathedral on December 16, 1931; J. Manly Cobb now Rector of Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, who came to us from the Diocese of Washington; George A. Wilson, Minister in charge of St. Alban's Church, St. Louis, who has been transferred to us from the Diocese of Chicago. These men have already made their influence felt, and their coming has greatly strengthened the staff of the Diocese.

I must also record with regret the fact that Deaconess H. Alice Nutter has been transferred at her own request to the Diocese of Louisiana, and that Miss Lois Phillips of the City Mission staff has become Secretary to the Church Mission of Help, with offices in New York City.

Turning now to the state of the Church, let me deal first with the financial situation. In view of the general depressed condition throughout the country, we have come through the year 1931 exceptionally well. In order to meet our obligations we have had to borrow from the bank five thousand dollars, but as our budget this past year called for the payment of a note of similar proportions at the bank because of a debt incurred the previous year, which was done, we can say that all in all we have come through without having to increase our indebtedness. This was made possible by a policy which has been adopted by the National Church. We had pledged to the National Council 40% of the diocesan Missionary income for the year 1931, or twenty-two thousand dollars. But our income fell below expectations and we were considerably behind in our payments to New York. The Diocesan Council had determined to borrow enough money to pay the twenty-two thousand due New York, in full, although that amount represented much more than the 40% of our income during the year 1931. The following letter, however, from the National Treasurer of the Church, Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, caused us to reconsider our decision:

My Dear Bishop Scarlett:

I have your letter of January 15th and note your decision as to borrowing money to make good what

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you told us to expect for 1931. While of course we need every cent we can get I do not feel that it would be helpful to cripple any diocese and that all we should ask is that the full percentage due to the National Church should be paid. We hope to share with you in your prosperity and therefore we expect to share with you in adversity. This is a real partnership and the full partnership spirit must be preserved.

With every good wish for you and the work in your diocese, I am,

Consequently it has been necessary for us to borrow only enough money to complete our payment to New York of 40% of our income, and this has enabled us to come through the year on a fairly even keel.

But as it now stands, our prospects for the coming year of 1932 are not so encouraging. The Departments have been ordered by the Council to prepare budgets for 1932 which come within the total amount already pledged by the parishes and missions for diocesan work. The pledges have been slow in coming in and many of them represent a decreased amount for the support of this work. Consequently the Departments have had to cut their budgets to the bone. The Department of Missions, for example, which had asked for twenty thousand dollars, eliminated all items which might be catalogued under the title of Advance Work, thereby cutting its budget to less than sixteen thousand dollars. But that is not sufficient to come within the total budget set by the pledges already made; and it faces a further reduction of three thousand dollars, which will make it very difficult indeed to carry on the work we have already established in this Diocese. All our men are willing to make personal sacrifices, and practically all of them have accepted such sacrifices, gladly. But we must find some way in the Convention now assembled to maintain without impairment the work which we have. We cannot retreat: we must go forward.

I cannot speak too highly, or too gratefully, of the Spirit of the Diocese. We are all working together as we should, and I have boundless confidence in what in good time we shall be able to accomplish in this Diocese. It is a high privilege and a great honor to be one of this fine body of clergymen and laymen.

There are two other matters to which I should like to call your attention. There will meet in Geneva next week the Disarmament Conference, the success or failure of which will mean much to the world. Its success will lighten the burden, economically and psychologically, under which we rest, and its failure will lessen our confidence as we look forward into the future. Therefore it must not be allowed to fail.

There is an explicit moral obligation to disarm which we dare no longer overlook. It is stated definitely in the Treaty of Versailles that Germany is disarmed "in order to render possible the initiation of a general limitation of the armaments of all nations". And before the German delegates signed the Treaty, in a formal communication the victorious Powers stated:

"The Allied and Associated Powers wish to make it clear that their requirements in regard to German armaments were not made solely with the object of rendering it impossible for Germany to resume her policy of military aggression. They are also the first steps toward that general reduction and limitation which they seek to bring about as one of the most fruitful preventives of war, and which it will be one of the first duties of the League of Nations to promote."

A pledge is a pledge even though given to a defeated foe, and a strict sense of honor is necessary among nations as among individuals if we are to live together in confidence and security. One can easily understand the immense psychological factor present in the existing crisis in Germany, the deep resentment which has come of facing impossible penalties of long duration imposed upon them by an unjust Treaty founded on untrue premises, and containing a moral pledge of mutual disarmament which has in no degree been fulfilled. And now in this eighteenth year of the World War it is time we faced up to this moral problem.

The economic case for drastic reduction in expenditures on armaments is urgent. The nations of the world are spending almost five billion dollars annually on armaments, seventy per cent more than during the pre-war period, while at the same time some of them are already bankrupt and others are standing on the brink of bankruptcy, with unemployment and human misery mounting ever higher. And our own great and beloved country, the most protected by nature in the whole world, with no traditional enemies, with a great and friendly Power to the north of us and a weak and increasingly friendly Power to the south, leads all other nations with an armament budget of seven hundred million dollars a year, while at the same time seven million men and women, eager and able to work walk our streets seeking through private and public charity the minimum means of subsistence.

The psychological case against armaments is complete. The only path to security through armaments for a nation is to completely outbuild any possible combination of powers, which is not only economically impossible, but psychologically also; for increase in armaments in any country stimulates through fear a similar increase among rival Powers. Above everything else in these days we need to do all in our power to remove as far as possible the causes of international rivalries and hostilities, and also thoroughly to undertake the moral disarmament of our own minds, realizing that we have reached a stage in the development of mankind where sheer necessity is forcing us to comprehend that we are all members one of another, and that if one member suffers from injustice the whole body suffers with it, the whole world is involved in the retribution which inevitably follows. We are all bound together now for better or for worse, and we must see to it therefore that it is for the better, not for the worse. This Conference therefore cannot be allowed to fail.

It would be tragic and more than tragic if the representatives of this mighty country were to follow a policy hinted at in high places, which would have them act as though this coming Conference were a "pu filled we ha Wash tially saying seems wreck tion of lived broug much finely

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atives of n places, nce were a "purely European Conference", with our duty in the matter fulfilled if we sit on the side lines and help, if we can. It is argued that we have nothing in this Conference with which to trade; that in the Washington Conference there was a great construction program partially completed which the Secretary of State could toss on the table saying, "I bargain with that", but that now we have nothing. It seems to a layman that we might try to save something out of the wreck of war debts, and if through war debts we could force a reduction of reparations and of armaments, then war debts will not have lived in vain. We have also incalculable moral power which could be brought to bear in this Conference. Much more truly American, much more fitting a role for us as a great Power is the policy so finely set forth by Ambassador Houghton:

"Any of you who have read the recent French note to the League of Nations disclosing the status of French armaments will know to what I refer. The note carries with it the very frank and definite statement that, under present conditions, France will not disarm further. What then, I ask, will be your attitude in face of that contingency? Does that action on the part of France end the matter? Is her refusal so all-inclusive that the other nations must, perforce, follow her example?

"So I, for one, venture to urge that, so far as we Americans can help it, the Disarmament Conference shall not be permitted to wreck itself on the rock of French dissent. That is merely a plausible excuse for doing nothing. This Western world of ours is in no condition to justify inaction when action will afford it needed relief. If the other great Powers, or indeed, only those closest to us by natural ties, can agree upon a definite and substantial percentage of reduction in their war budgets, I, for one, hope and pray that America will join them. Indeed, I go further. In view of the crushing burdens of taxation which the peoples are carrying, in view of the unprecedented industrial depression and world-wide unemployment and social unrest, and in view, even more, of the demonstrated folly of competitive armaments which do not afford security but endanger it, I plead that America shall take the lead, and entering the Conference, unhesitant, unafraid, and with her purpose clearly avowed, use her mighty and resistless strength to insure a definite measurement of disarmament, a greater assurance of peace, and a happier and more contented world."

One other matter. The most difficult part of our present domestic situation to bear is a wide-spread suffering which so many of our fellowmen must endure, a condition which surely has sunk deep into our hearts, and will keep wide open our minds and our purses. This problem of unemployment, which faces us today, is not simply a severe economic problem, it is our most searching moral problem, the test of our ethical principles. Beyond the economic distress of it, there are the human costs which it entails,—the breaking down of the workman's standard of life and that of his family, the loss of self-respect which comes from a sense of being useless and outside the economic system and dependent on charity, the undermining of his capacity for good work in the future, the breeding of resentments against society. The crux of the whole problem we face is this problem of insecurity, which dogs the steps of our people. Men can have no confidence in a system which guarantees them no fair security, nor fosters the feeling that they are essential factors in the social whole. "Men," says the Dean of the Harvard School of Business Administration, "are justified in believing that the community owes


them a chance, through work, to live with self-respect." And in order to combat this demoralizing insecurity, I believe that the four major hazards of life should be socialized—that is, made matters of community responsibility: unemployment, sickness, accident, old age.

Whatever may be the methods, to be determined by experts, by which security is to be attained, whether by unemployment reserves
—"Is it not a national scandal," asks one of our major economists today, "Is it not a national scandal that in the year (1930) when they were turning men by millions into our streets and cutting payrolls by several billions, that dividend disbursements reached a record breaking high? And is it not possible," he asks, "as by reserves they stabilized the dividend disbursement curve, so by the same method to stabilize the wage disbursement curve?"—whatever be the method, whether by employment reserves, employment insurance, shorter hours of labor, a planned governmental system of public works during depression, our industrial society (where the responsibility justly lies) must be able to guarantee to our workers the security which at present they are denied. And where social vision and a sense of social obligation lag, a measure of compulsion may be necessary. And we have a right to look to our Christian business men, many of whom are deeply troubled by the conflict between some of the methods of business in which they are caught and the principles of Christ in which they believe, to further the necessary readjustment of our economic system to these principles. And the measure of its adaptability will be the index of its permanence.

And one wishes to say to privileged people that without a fairly rapid evolutionary development toward greater social justice, the method of correction by violence becomes increasingly tempting. Philosophies of violence are best negated and disproved by an ethical spirit among our privileged groups which will prove violence to be unnecessary.

My friends, we hear it frequently said that what we need today is to replace fear with courage, and we also hear the suggestion that all we have to do is to smile. But we need something more, much more, than we need courage. And we need something else much more than we need false faces. We need good will, a good will so deep that it has its origin in a conviction of human unity—that we are all of us bound together for better, for worse. Hatred and fear, selfishness and self-interest brought about the war, and they continue to drive us deeper into the mire of depression. Somehow we must supplant that by a spirit of good will. But where shall we find the source of good will? Here is our deep disease. For the same disease has us in its clutches which has had many an Empire before us. The disease of Rome until Christianity breathed new life into it was that it had lost its soul, its sense of spiritual values; and we are in danger of losing our souls, our sense of spiritual values. Many men in all walks of life are troubled by this today. They have found, as Walter Lippman has suggested, that the absence of belief, profound belief, is vacancy: they have found by disillusionment that there is no freedom in mere freedom; they know they must find some principle which can again give coherence and direction to their lives. Where shall we find the source of good will? "You do not study the stars enough," George Tyrell, the great Roman Catholic priest, once said to a student. "You do not study the stars enough!"—by which he meant that the student was seeking for too easy solutions, seeking solutions along the surface of life when solutions, real solutions, are found in the depths. "You do not study the stars enough!" To give t ual fa the E sentia sentio God d Only i mind author mon S an att down men t

give the angels of our better natures a chance, to exercise our spiritual faculties, to drive the roots of our beings down until they touch the Eternal Being, that is the source of good will, the source of essential unity which we need. Only in God are the cleavages, the dissentions, the conflicts and the exclusions fully transcended. Only in God do we find that unity of the spirit which is the bond of peace. Only in the Spirit of Christ, the nearest approach which the human mind can conceive to the Eternal Spirit, do we find that principle of authority which can reconcile all men of good will, furnish us a common standard of judgment as we face our common problems, create an atmosphere in which apparently insoluble problems will break down and become capable of solution. And to build in the hearts of men this Spirit of Christ is our high privilege.

Report of the Diocesan Council.

To the Ninety-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Diocesan Council submits recommendations embodied in the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Assessments for the Diocesan Fund, contained in the attached report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$26,566.87, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with additional special funds received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the General Expense Budget of the Diocese for the year 1932.

Resolution No. 2.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund, contained in the attached report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$71,000.00, be adopted.

The Finance Department was instructed to present a Church Program Budget for 1932 to the Convention, based upon the pledges received from the Parishes and Missions.

The Council recommends to the Diocesan Convention the pay-as-

you-go policy in relation to all budgets.

The Council recommends that the Church Program Fund, based upon pledges actually received, be divided, 40% to the National Church, and 60% within the Diocese.

Reports of Departments for 1931 are attached hereto, as a part

of this report.

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Report of the Department of Religious Education.

Last year your Department of Religious Education reorganized itself, making distinct divisions of all the work that would come under its supervision. A member of the Department was put in charge of each division with the authorization to form a committee on that work with himself as chairman. The committees were to work outside, and independent of, the Department but their final actions were subject to the approval of the Department as a whole. The divisions of the work and the chairmen are as follows:

Church Schools Mr. S. R. Irish Teacher Training Rev. Sumner Walters Vacation Bible Schools and

Weekday Instruction Rev. Roy S. Rawson Young People's Work and

Recruiting for Ministry Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild College Work Rev. David Haupt Diocesan Library and Summer

Mention should be made also at this point of the invaluable work of the Treasurer, Mr. L. Guy Blackmer and of the Secretary, Mrs. O. H. Vornbrock, who, although not heads of committees, have been very faithful in their respective duties.

In the work of the Church Schools, a very comprehensive survey of the Church School situation in the Diocese was made by Canon Small. Through this survey a very graphic picture was presented to the Department, showing the high lights and the shadows in the work of the Church Schools. It is hoped from recommendations from the Department to the Church Schools, after a study of the Survey, that many of the shadows will be eliminated. Since the report shows the futility of work in some places in the Diocese it is hoped that the Diocesan Authorities will see the advisability of closing some places and opening others where the opportunity of advancing is great.

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Under the work of the Church Schools, the Church School Service Program Council, meeting once a month, has carried forward the four projects of the National Church, the Lenten Offering, the Birthday Offering, Christmas Box and the Little Helpers work. Miss Jessie B. Kelley, Secretary for the Lenten Offering, reports \$2,571.74, as having come through the Mite Boxes. The Birthday Thank Offering as reported by Miss Carrie B. Jackson for the past Triennium was \$392.14. The Church Schools have always accepted a generous quota for the Christmas Box from the National Office. This year, 720 persons in missions in North Carolina, Florida and Alaska were provided with gifts, and 50 seamen were given the regular Seamen's bags. Locally, too, Mrs. O. H. Vornbrock, Secretary for the Christmas Box Work, acted as a clearing agent for gifts from the more privileged children of some Sunday Schools to those less fortunate in others. She saw that gifts were provided for children of St. Thomas' Mission for the Deaf; Prince of Peace Mission; Holy Cross House; St. Luke's, Valley Park; Grace Mission, Herculaneum; the Episcopal Home; Kirkwood Welfare Association and the children of the Ozarks. The Church School Service Program also fostered a presentation service of the Lenten Offering from the children at Christ Church Cathedral some time after Easter at which time Rev. John W. Suter, the Chairman of the National Department of Religious Education spoke to the children.

Under the work of the Teacher Training, two Institutes were held in the Fall; one of these a two-day Institute was held by Dr. Chalmers of Baltimore. This was preliminary to a larger Institute conducted on six consecutive evenings in November and December. Rev. Mr. Walters who directed these, reported an attendance of over a hundred at classes embracing Principles of Teaching, Old Testment, Young People's Methods and Materials, New Testament, Story Telling, Church School Management, Philosophy of Christian Life, and Psychology of Adolescence.

For the Daily Vacation Bible Schools, Rev. Mr. Rawson reported that among our Churches, five such schools were conducted this summer,—at the Prince of Peace, Holy Communion, Redeemer, St. Stephen's and Holy Cross.

A great advance has been made in the Young People's work in the Diocese. We have been very fortunate in having Miss Dorothy May Fischer, Executive Secretary for the Young People's work in the Province of the Southwest, come into the Diocese for a month in the Spring to help organize the Young People's work, and for two months in the Fall to further this organization. Through her efforts in inspiring the Young People, twelve organizations are well established in the Churches in St. Louis, and ten outside St. Louis. Six hundred young people are now definitely identified with various groups. Contacts among these young people are established through bi-monthly rallies and a bulletin issued quarterly.

Work among college students is being carried on by the clergy at the following places,—Columbia, Rolla, Cape Girardeau and at the Church of St. Michael and St. George, St. Louis.

It has been very difficult to get someone to carry on the program of work outlined for Work among the Isolated which necessitates a considerable amount of correspondence. This is a very valuable project, and ought to be pushed forward.

The Annual Summer Conference and Training School for Young People and Other Church Workers, through steady growth over a period of several years, reached the place where it was felt that an invitation could be extended to the Diocese of West Missouri for an Interdiocesan Conference. This resulted in the most successful conference since its inception. Attractive courses of study offered by an outstanding faculty brought more than a hundred to Columbia to attend the sessions. We were fortunate in having both Bishop Spencer of West Missouri and Bishop Scarlett of Missouri lead courses at the conference. Others among the faculty were Dean Day of Grace Cathedral, Topeka, Kansas; Mr. Maurice Votaw of St. John's University, Shanghai, China; Miss Ducie Bloy and Miss Josephine Farrington of Kirkwood, Mo.; Miss Dorothy May Fischer of Houston, Texas; Rev. Thomas L. Small was Dean of the Conference, and Rev. David Haupt, host. Because of the great success of the joint undertaking, the Diocese of West Missouri is very eager to unite forces with us in the prospective conference for 1932. Plans are already under way.

The Department under its present plan of committee organization has done a great amount of work during the year, possibly more

than in any preceding year since its establishment.

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Report of the Secretary of the Lenten Offering for 1931.

Lenten Mite Boxes for 1931 were sent to the Church Schools of 25 parishes and 14 missions in the diocese, and offerings were received from 26 parishes and 9 missions. Christ Church at Affton made its first Mite Box offering, thus accounting for the extra parish.

There was a decrease of \$723.75 in the total amount of the offerings as compared with the year 1930. The Mite Boxes in 1930 amounted to \$3,295.49, and in 1931 to \$2,517.74. Considering the financial stress of the past two years, this decrease is not so bad.

The 1931 Offering was presented by the children of the diocese at a Mite Box Offering Presentation Service, held in Christ Church Cathedral on Sunday afternoon, May 3, at which there were present about 300 children, teachers and friends. As this was the first presentation service held in this diocese, the attendance was considered remarkably good. Special attention should be called to the attendance from St. Luke's Mission at Valley Park, and we were informed that if more automobiles had been available there would have been even more children present from that mission.

The service was one of great inspiration, and it is hoped that a similar service can be given each year. The Rev. Sumner Walters presided. Two splendid talks were given the children, one by the Rev. John W. Suter, Jr., Executive Secretary of the National Department of Religious Education, and one by Bishop Scarlett.

Report on the Christmas Box.

Church School Service Program.

The foreign assignment of joyful gifts to children covered St. John's-in-the-Wilderness and Circle City, Alaska, numbering two hundred forty-eight (248). The domestic field included Charlotte, Wilson and Durham, North Carolina, and Tampa, Florida, a total of four hundred four (404),—making a grand total of six hundred fifty-two (652) gifts.

At Thanksgiving, gifts of canned goods or money were sent to St. Stephen's, Prince of Peace, the Episcopal Home, Grace Church, Valley Park, Citizens' Relief, and the Community.

Gifts of toys or money at Christmas were received by Herculaneum, Valley Park, the Ozarks, Prince of Peace, Holy Communion, St. Stephen's, the Episcopal Home, Hospital No. 2, the Home for Delinquent Girls, and the hearing children of deaf parents of St. Thomas Mission. No data concerning the number of gifts were given by the contributing parishes. Seventeen parishes in St. Louis and environs, and three in the State participated.

Report of the Field Department.

The Rev. Francis Bloy served as Vice-Chairman of the Field Department during most of the year 1931, and was largely responsible for the program of the Department. We are indebted to him both for inspiration and efficient leadership. Though he removed from the diocese and will be missed greatly by the Field Department and his many friends here, nevertheless his constructive efforts in behalf of the work of the Field Department will continue for years to come.

The Department was organized with representatives from practically every parish and mission in the diocese. These representatives served as a close connecting link between the Diocesan Department and their own parochial organizations. At the close of the second year of this plan of organization, we feel that it has proved itself to be the most useful plan which we can adopt. The representatives from the parishes and missions have been conscientious, have attended the meetings well, have contributed many suggestions, and have rendered good service by carrying to their parishes the program and plans of the Diocesan Department.

Our program for extending information about, and building up loyalty to the work of the Diocese and National Church has included the following:

First: A meeting of the rectors, parish chairmen and canvassers, addressed and instructed by the Rev. Dr. B. H. Reinheimer, Executive Secretary of the Field Department of the National Church.

Second: A series of meetings in ten parishes and missions, addressed by the Rev. F. P. Houghton, one of the field secretaries of the National Church.

Third: A mass meeting, just before the opening of the Every Member Canvass period, with explanation of the program of the Diocese by Bishop William Scarlett, and of the National Church program by Bishop Hugh L. Burleson.

Fourth: The preparation of a most effective diocesan leaflet by Bishop Scarlett, assisted by the Rev. Lee W. Heaton, publicity representative of the Field Department. This leaflet was distributed throughout the parishes and missions of the diocese.

Fifth: Distribution of the literature of the National Church. About 20,000 pieces of literature were distributed in the diocese.

We desire to express our appreciation of the high quality of the publicity material which was furnished by the National Church. It seemed to us that the material was the best which has been provided for many years, and we are confident that wherever it was used intelligently it must have produced large results. Literature is of no value unless it is read, and it is not possible for the Field Department of the National Church or of the diocese to be certain that it is properly distributed or explained. We urge all clergy and parish representatives to recognize the value of this material and to do their utmost to see that it receives adequate consideration.

The amount received from parishes and missions for the work of the diocese and of the National Church, in 1931, was \$45,115.11, which was divided, \$28,811.02 for the diocese, and \$18,000.00 for the National Church, 60% of the total for the diocese and 40% for the National Church.

The pledges received to January 20th, for the year 1932, amount to \$40,000.00, which distributed in the same proportion as last year will yield \$24,000.00 to the diocese and \$16,000 to the National Church.

Plans for 1932: The Department recommends that the organization for 1932 shall be continued on the same basis as in the past, with representatives from parishes and missions. It also suggests the following additions to the program, and hopes that they will be carried out during the coming year:

1. Conferences with rectors and vestries by the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor or members of the Field Department. We urge the clergy to invite the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor or members of the Field Department to meet with them and their vestries to discuss the Diocesan and National Church programs.

2. That a conference for all of the clergy of the diocese be held early in the Fall, a part of the program to consist of a presentation of the Diocesan Program by the Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or members of the Field Department; a presentation of the National Church budget by a representative of the National Church; and a presentation of certain specific items of our Diocesan Program by those who are carrying on work in the diocese, which receives assistance from the diocesan budget. That a similar conference for

laymen be held to which selected laymen from every parish and mission shall be invited.

'3. We urge the larger use of diocesan missionaries and others working in diocesan enterprises, by the parishes and missions of the diocese. We are sure that there would be greater interest and support for the Diocesan Program if the clergy would arrange to have these diocesan representatives speak at men's clubs, church schools, women's guilds, parish dinners and church services.

Finally, we want to express our sincere appreciation of the fine spirit of co-operation which has been manifested during the past year, and to urge both clergy and laity to even greater effort in the cause of extending the Kingdom of Christ in this diocese and throughout the world.

Report of the Department of Publicity.

During the year 1931 two issues of the Church News were mailed to every family in the Diocese, and copies of the Church at Work have been mailed as the publication has been received from the Publicity Department of the National Council.

The Church News has suspended publication owing to the financial condition of the Diocese, and no program of publicity was undertaken for lack of funds. A tentative program has been submitted to the Department of Finance for the year 1932.

During the year the Editor and Business Manager of the Church News resigned; and upon the resignation of the Vice-Chairman of the Department of Publicity, the writer was requested to prepare and submit suggestions and a budget for publicity, which was done. No action has been taken pending authorization from the Council of the Diocese.

The Department of Publicity assisted in the preparation and mailing of material for the Every Member Canvass in the Diocese.

Report of the Social Service Department.

The Vice-Chairman was a delegate to the annual conference of the Social Service Department of the National Council held in June.

A very interesting and profitable gathering of the clergy of the Diocese was arranged by Bishop Scarlett and held at Clarksville in October. Spencer Miller, Jr., and the Rev. Dr. Paul S. Blanshard of New York City presented the topics and led in the discussions. The hospitality of the Reverend David Coombs and the parishioners of the church added greatly to the occasion.

Mrs. Pangman and Mrs. Corbett of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary were made members of the Department and through them a conference was arranged with the Social Service Secretaries of the Auxiliary with a view to making contacts throughout the Diocese. We had a joint meeting with the Auxiliary at which the Reverend Joseph Ware of Cincinnati addressed us.

We were asked to receive the Mission to City Institutions as a part of the field for our Department. The annual budget for this work in the immediate past has been over \$12,000.00. We were

A committee was organized to act as a Board of Directors for this work and to secure additional support to the amount of \$4,000.00 at least. Owing to other events on the year's program and the acuteness of the industrial depression, this committee has been unable to function and the Department has overdrawn its account \$2,606.90. The committee is a strong one. The cause is excellent and appealing to the popular

We hope they can secure \$6,000.00 for this year.

The Mission to City Institutions sustained a severe loss in the departure of Miss Phillips, who resigned December 31, 1931. She has accepted a position with the Church Mission of Help in New York City. At a farewell luncheon given her in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Building, ninety were present and a notable feature was the uniting of social service workers with church workers in the

expression of appreciation and regard.

We trust that this year will witness a better knowledge of our problems throughout the Diocese and a more effective presentation of that knowledge to all.

Of the \$498.93 there is owing Christ Church Cathedral \$130.00 for emergency aid and about \$200.00 for Christmas bills.

The City Mission has been generously aided during the past year by the Social Service Department of the Woman's Auxiliary. Indeed, our work would have been seriously crippled before the end of the year without this timely help. The Lay Readers League supplied many services; and several lay readers outside the League, notably Messrs. Pomeroy, Vernon, and Bailey, have made possible the maintenance of the regular Sunday services. Two chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the young people of various parochial organizations have aided our work in the City Hospital on Lafayette Ave. on Sunday afternoons. Others have generously given regularly of their time as stenographers, organists, and chauffeurs. We are indebted to All Saints Parish for many forms of ministering at Hospital No. 2, and particularly to Mr. G. B. Jones for conducting services in this institution every Sunday. The Church Periodical Club has supplied much literature. Various Sunday School classes have provided scrap books and gifts of money for special occasions. Mention should be made of the aid of the Cathedral Altar Chapter in providing a surplice and altar linens. The friends of the City Mission have contributed over \$700 to the Christmas discretionary fund.

The members of the staff have continued their faithful work. To review this work is to repeat the records of former years. Deaconess Brainerd of juvenile and women's penal institutions, Miss Cora Pearce in Koch Hospital, the Infirmary and the tuberculosis wards of Koch Hospital, Miss Lorick among the colored people in our institutions, still discharge their duties with unabated energy in their several fields. Mrs. O'Bannon is a prized link with the early history of the Mission with its long record of personal service. My colleague, Dr. Snoddy, has taken over the pastoral work in Koch Hospital, and he, Canon Small, Dean Sweet, and several other clergy have aided me in other places as requested. Bishop Johnson, whose love for the City Mission was always warm, has visited the institutions for confirmation and on other occasions to relieve the Superintendent.

It is with great regret that I record the resignation of Miss Lois Phillips who has accepted the position of Field Secretary for the

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Church Mission of Help. It appears that no funds will be available for a worker to take her place. Her constructive imagination, her extensive contacts throughout the city and throughout the whole country among workers in her profession, her willingness to aid the church outside her regular duties, and her charming personality added immensely in intangible ways to our effectiveness. But the loss of the skilled worker of such extraordinary gifts and training as an adviser and partner of the Superintendent in the puzzling situations that constantly confront him, especially in penal work, means incalulable damage to our work.

In order to ease the burden in the field Mrs. L. H. P. Shaw is now working at a nominal salary in City Hospital No. 1. She has already made a fine beginning, and I am expecting great things from her contribution of love and good works.

The most significant move in the year was the establishment of the St. Louis City Mission Society. I am leaving to Dr. Davis, the secretary of the organization, the task of outlining its history, purpose, and achievement. Owing to a number of causes the Society was not as far advanced as we all had hoped it would be by the end of the year. What we can say is, that at last this Society is organized and it appears that if the City Mission is to be supported so that it can function effectively in these days of direst need it must have the enthusiastic backing of the church people of our city.

I have never felt that it was decent as long as the maintenance of our men in hard and monotonous fields in the diocese was involved for the City Mission to fight too vigorously for its income. Since Mr. Bloy's time, however, the allotment to the City Mission has steadily declined. Last year the plan was adopted of cutting the appropriation further by over \$4,200. in the hope that by the organization of a City Mission Society we might largely make up the difference. This the new organization was unable to effect. Moreover, the gifts from outside have fallen off heavily on account of the depression. The Department of Finance came to our rescue at the end of the year and saved us from discharging two or three members of of the year and saved us from discharging two allot only \$8,000 from our staff. As I write this the proposition is to allot only \$8,000 from our staff. As I write this the proposition is to allot only \$8,000 from our staff. the diocesan funds for the work of the City Mission. falls short of what is needed to cover the item of salaries alone. Unless sufficient funds from other sources are available, I shall be obliged to cut salaries and even to let experienced and valuable workers go. I will not conceal from the Convention the anxiety with which I face the coming year. I look to the friends of the City Mission to prevent serious damage to our work through support of the City Mission Society and the Woman's Auxiliary.

The great argument against our work is that the Church profits nothing by it. It seems to add little to our communicant list, and the same resources put into other places might enlarge our borders and increase the number of those who glory in the name of Episcopalians. Such other work in time might increase our resources and add to our income. Certainly, we must see to it that our noble contribution to organized Christianity should not fail. No one realizes the peculiar value of that contribution as those who are engaged in City Mission work. For the one thing which the Episcopal Church seems equipped to do better than any other body in our country is this same City Mission work. In almost any other respect the other bodies of Christians seem to equal or outdistance us. We have a mission to fulfill here for the universal church in America, witnessed by the fact that wherever our church undertakes the work of a City Mission in any large city, by a kind of general consent we take

the lead, and in many cases we are left to do it alone, save by the Roman Catholics and the Lutherans.

I cannot adequately deal with suggestions of sharing the field with other bodies, the substitution of volunteers for paid workers, and so on. My experience simply has taught me that this work must be centralized and controlled as was not true many years ago, that volunteer workers in an age of endless diversions can neither be directed or relied upon, and that a field divided with others is soon deserted and neglected by those who attempt to share the work with us. In a word, if we do not prosecute the work it eventually will not be done. This conclusion is the result of my experience after six years and more in the field and against my desire that such should appear to be the case. It is not our function to take the place of Community Chest and Municipal Institutions, but it is our place to supply the witness of the love of Christ. This contact for the most part, in a time of specialization and training, can only be effectively supplied by experienced or trained workers or under their direction. And I confidently appeal to the judgment of any man in my position in the country to say if he has not, perhaps reluctantly, come to the same conclusion.

After all, what is our religion for? The City Mission is that arm of the church that goes out into this great city to do what Jesus, our Master, told us to do. That task is to bring the power of God immediately into the conflict of the human spirit with the physical, mental, and spiritual misery of the world. To a certain extent, in the assembling of ourselves together in our churches, we are doing this task through the forensic skill of our preachers, the sweet power of beautiful music, and the outpourings of inspired prayer. All of this holds for those who attend church. But let us not forget that the sick are not present, the imprisoned are not present, and not many of the hungry, the strangers, and the exposed are present. Moreover, the most desperately in need will never join you there. The insane can never come, the man or woman on his dying bed hungry for the assurance given by the body and blood of Christ will never come, the condemned man in the shadow of the gallows will never come. Just think of these when you are seated in your pews next Sunday morning, and then think over the words of Him who somehow, somewhere, is going to bring us face to face with the load of human misery and ask us what in His name we have done about it. "I was hungry and ye gave me meat, I was thirsty and ye gave me drink, I was a stranger and ye took me in, naked and ye clothed me, sick and in prison and ye visited me." In this day of specialization can you do these things yourselves; and if not whom will you delegate to do them?

I cannot think that this diocese, always so generous, so fair and so fine, is going to fail to support us to the extent of its ability. And when your ability leaves off, because of the extent of the harvest field and its many, pressing calls, I know we will have your very earnest sympathy and prayers.

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Report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

The official acts of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, for the year 1931, may be summarized as follows:

The Department voted to request the Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund to appropriate an additional sum of \$700.00 to the Department of Missions, to take care of the entire pension assessments of missionaries.

A survey of missions and assisted parishes was undertaken, in order that the Department might act intelligently with regard to financial assistance given to them, in addition to the clerical stipends.

The outstanding work of the year was the determination of the Department to recommend to the Diocesan Council the purchase of a piece of property in St. Louis Hills for the site of a future church. After a lengthy conference and a very complete analysis of the whole situation, the sale was consummated and an adequate and beautiful lot, well situated, was purchased in this attractive addition. As soon as funds become available and the exigencies justify it, the Department plans to recommend the inception of a work that should develop into one of the strongest parishes in the metropolitan area.

It was also necessary for the Department to assist the mission at Overland. The construction of this adequate plant, it is hoped, will go far to create a strong and vigorous parish. Because of unusual financial conditions, it has been necessary for the Department to assist the mission at Overland with an additional loan of \$2,500. We have every confidence in the ultimate success of the project in Overland.

The Department further ordered that each congregation receiving a stipend from the diocese should hereafter make a request for the same in writing, justifying the need for the amount requested, and giving a financial statement of such mission or assisted parish.

Hereafter, Bishop Scarlett will turn over to the Treasurer of the Department of Missions and Church Extension a sum sufficient to cover all the stipends and allowances of missions and assisted parishes given by the Bishop, in addition to the stipends of the Department, and the Department will send out checks for the full stipend.

One of the outstanding achievements of the diocese, within the past year, has been the action of the Church of the Holy Apostles. Under the leadership of the Rev. Lee W. Heaton, they have withdrawn request for any allowance from the diocese for the year 1932. This relieves the Department of something in excess of \$2,000.00 granted in former years.

It is our earnest desire to be able to do something to increase the accommodations of the church in Valley Park, where, under the leadership of Mr. David Kopplin, a remarkable and highly encouraging work is being done. Almost 200 children are crowded in a small building in the Sunday school, and the church building cannot accommodate those who seek to attend.

Report of the Department of Finance.

The Finance Department, on behalf of the Diocesan Council, extends its thanks to parishes and missions for their efforts, during 1931, to meet the financial requirements of the Diocesan and General Missionary work.

Five parishes and missions exceeded their apportionments, while fifteen paid in full or nearly so. (For particulars regarding apportionments and payments thereon, please refer to the Treas-

urer's report.) The total paid on the apportionments was \$45,115.11, a tribute to loyalty and effort during a period notable for declines and deficits in the present depression.

The Diocesan budget was kept within its income, aided by spe-

cial funds and economies.

While adjustments in the Church Program budget planned for the year did not work out fully, because of difficulties encountered, progress was made in the missionary work of the diocese, and the 60-40 ratio, acceptable to the National Council, was maintained by the borrowing of \$5,000.00. In addition, a loan of \$4,500.00 at the

bank was paid during the year.

Inasmuch as the Council is recommending to the Convention a "pay-as-you-go" policy, it will become necessary for parishes and missions not only to do their utmost in their total payments for 1932, but to make collections and remittances to the Diocesan Treas-

urer in regular monthly proportions.

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APPENDIX No. 10

Report of the Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Bishops of Missouri and the Members of the Ninety-third Diocesan Convention, we present the report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Missouri for the year 1931.

The work of the Auxiliary, during the past year, has gone on quietly and from a financial point of view can be said to have accomplished its task and completed its budget—but the real test is, has it fulfilled its mission as a vital force in the Church's work? Has it realized the vision received as the ultimate aim of its endeavors?

In our last report we quoted from Miss Emery, one of the first Secretaries of the Auxiliary, who stressed "that the things taken into account should be what was best for the work of the whole Church, since before we are members of the Auxiliary we are members of dioceses and parishes," and—to quote again, "she would ask both the Board and the Auxiliary to consider whether a real gain might be made if we would emphasize the Auxiliary less as an organization but rather as a reminder, a co-operator and a vehicle by and through which the missionary interests of the Church might be strengthened in any and every department of parish life."

The program for the Auxiliary, at the General Convention in Denver, went a step farther and by selecting such subjects as Family Life, Economic Conditions, International Relations, Interracial Contacts, and Religious Thinking Today, to be used in the Discussion groups in Denver, and as the foundation upon which the study classes, for the next three years, should be built, carried the women into the realm of world problems and accepted the larger thought of the Auxiliary as representing the Mission of the Church and not just its Missions, believing that the former includes not only the latter but also is concerned with all such questions as Church Unity, World Peace, Universal Disarmament, International Relations, and more Christian ideals in the relation between man and man in both the social and industrial world.

The spirit of the Convention, as far as the women were concerned, was one of deep conviction tempered by a broad tolerance, a courageous willingness to adventure along new lines of thought and action, and an earnest and fearless search for truth as revealed by God in the new discoveries of science and the more recent developments of history.

One hundred dioceses and missionary districts were represented by over 400 delegates, and about 2,000 women were present at the meetings.

For the details of the Missouri work we refer you to the printed reports, but we cannot refrain from an acknowledgement of the faithful, conscientious and efficient service rendered by each member of the Executive Board, and it is our sincere regret that the time of service has expired in the cases of a number of our Board members.

We are especially stressing the Educational features of the Auxiliary, and Mrs. James H. George is developing this program most effectively. We trust that you will read her appended report carefully.

We have missed at our Executive Meetings our Honorary Vice-President, Mrs. Frederick F. Johnson, who by her gentle graciousness and wise counsel has endeared herself to all the members of the Board.

When Mrs. George Tittmann found that she would be away from St. Louis for the winter, she resigned as Devotional Secretary, and we wish to express our deep appreciation of all that she did to emphasize the spiritual and devotional work in the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Rufus D. S. Putney has taken her place and those who heard Mrs. Putney conduct the Meditations and Intercessions for the women, in connection with the Every Member Canvass, realize what a contribution she has to make to the Auxiliary of an inspirational

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The work of the Supply Department has been handled so efficiently by our retiring Secretary, Mrs. W. S. Mason, that we have not only been able to meet our requirements from the National Office, but have been able to increase our apportionment and it is with real regret that we see her leave the Board.

The fine report of our United Thank Offering Treasurer has already been printed and we are happy to have had a share in that wonderful offering presented at the Triennial by the women of the

Church. \$1,059,575.27.

This offering is, as you know, a freewill thank-offering over and above the regular pledges made by the women. We are truly grateful to Mrs. Herbert M. Edmunds for her untiring and faithful service in

helping collect that offering.

Mrs. C. C. Pangman, our Social Service Secretary, has done much to increase the interest in the Social Service Department and we regret that she is unable to help complete and carry out some new plans for that department, which she has worked over and which we believe will greatly increase the efficiency and also the interest in that Department.

For personal reasons and not because her term of office has expired, we are most reluctantly obliged to accept the resignation of our Second Vice-President. She has rendered most valuable service in the planning of our programs and we shall miss Mrs. J. Arthur

Corbitt greatly at our Council table.

We feel that we cannot let Mrs. Burritt retire entirely from Auxiliary work and although the By-Laws call for a new Representative in her place, we are happy to say that she has agreed to serve as one of the Trustees of our Endowment and Memorial Gifts Fund.

We are pleased also to announce that Mrs. W. C. Rumsey, our

former President, has been made Chairman of this Fund.

The Diocesan Altar Section, with Miss Annie S. Cousland as Chairman, has given valuable service and assisted a number of our Clergy throughout the Diocese, in various ways which have been greatly appreciated.

We acknowledge with gratitude the kind interest and encouragement always given to the Auxiliary by Bishop Johnson and have

missed him at our meetings during his absence.

We are happy to report that our budget for 1932 calls for an increased pledge for Bishop Scarlett's work in the Diocese and we very greatly appreciate the assistance and co-operation he is giving the women in his Diocese.

Three women from our Church are members of the Women's Missionary Federation Board and our Auxiliary makes a small donation in money. Our Auxiliary President represents this Board on the St. Louis Council of Organizations for Promoting Peace.

We also have a representative on the Board of the Young Women's Christian Association. And we take part in the World's Day of Prayer, thus showing our desire to co-operate in the work and the services of the other Protestant bodies.

Our various parish auxiliaries and guilds are helping with the work being done by the Citizens' Relief and Unemployment Committee and a number of our Church women have individually volunteered for service with this committee and the Red Cross.

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The Second St. Louis Educational Week for the Blind organized by the American Foundation for the Blind, and under the auspices of the Missouri Commission for the Blind, was conducted in October, 1931.

Members from practically all of our St. Louis parish auxiliaries, together with the women from the Presbyterian and Evangelical Churches were in charge one day, and it proved a very successful occasion.

At our January meeting last year, we had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. John C. Tolman, who was then the Provincial Auxiliary President of the Seventh Province, tell about the Helen Dunlop School in Arkansas, to which our Synod pledge is given; and later in the year, Miss Edna B. Beardsley, Assistant Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, spent a few days in this Diocese. She gave informal but most helpful talks to a number of groups in St. Louis, and then visited the Auxiliaries in Columbia and Hannibal.

We received great inspiration from a Quiet Morning in the Cathedral, conducted by the Rev. John W. Suter, Jr., Executive Secretary of Education, and he also met and talked with those engaged in Religious Education in both the Church Schools and the Auxiliary.

In June some of the Auxiliary officers and other members, attended a most successful Summer Conference and Training School for Young People and those engaged in Church work, under the auspices of the Diocese of Missouri and the Diocese of Western Missouri, in Columbia, Missouri. The young people were lead by Miss Dorothy Fischer, Executive Secretary of the work for Young People in the Seventh Province, and this fall she spent two months in this Diocese. While this report comes under another department, the Auxiliary feel that Miss Fischer was not only a wonderful leader for the young people but that she gave inspiration and help to the women as well, and we are greatly indebted to her for her splendid achievements in the Diocese.

In reporting what has been accomplished, we feel we should tell of the aims and ambitions of the Auxiliary for the future and we have taken the liberty of quoting from a very fine paper delivered by Dr. Daniel A. McGregor to the women at the General Convention. His subject was "Christianity and International Relations." He says

in part:

"The Church has not sufficiently recognized her own high function. She has been content to be the Red Cross, giving relief in the battle of life. She must rise to her true calling as director of the destinies of man. If the Christian Church is to perform the great tasks which lie before her in the coming days, there are two preparations which she must make before those days come. The first is that of achieving unity, and the second is that of realizing her international character. The Christian Church began her life as a solution of the international problem. She claimed that the true and only abiding international unity was that of the family of God in Christ Jesus. Time has justified her claim, for while empires have fallen, she has stood. A distracted world looks for the secret of unity and a divided Church can give no guidance. Christian unity is not a mere economic device, it is the very heart of the Christian life. In this work every one of us is bearing a share. International politics

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e. In litics are complicated and confusing, plans and programs, and leagues and treaties are beyond the understanding of most of us, and many a person who would gladly serve in the cause of world-unity knows not where to begin nor how to serve wisely. But in the work of Missions the humblest and the most obscure can serve. For we are not making mere Episcopalians, we are creating the new family of humanity in Christ Jesus, which alone can stand through the storms of time.

"Centuries hence, when the history of these times comes to be written, when men are able to see in better perspective the world-movements of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, it will appear that here was being created in those days an international fellowship of humanity, the Christian Church, and that that work was the most important creation which those centuries gave to the future. Silently, quietly, the work goes on. On the surface we see the turmoil of the nations, from their struggles we hear the shouts of hatred and despair. But in the background and the shadow, where humble souls are witnessing for Jesus Christ, they are bringing into His fellowship men and women of every land, and some day this new fellowship shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea and will bring in the longed-for day, the day of human brotherhood in the Kingdom of God."

Report of the Educational Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary.

As a result of the North American Home Missions Congress held in Washington, D.C., Dec., 1930, all Communions planned to study the questions which face us in the United States as we attempt to build a Christian nation. As we had studied Africa, the World Mission of Christianity, and India in these past three years, we were forced to face the fact that if we would build a more Christian world we must be concerned with making Christian every area of life in our own land.

A splendid list of preliminary reading was sent out and reading groups were formed for summer reading that we might better understand the problems that confront us today.

An outstanding feature of the Educational Program has been a Diocesan Study Group, ably led by Mrs. Putney, on the subject for the year, "Building a Christian Nation." Mrs. Putney has talked at Grace-Holy Cross (twice); Emmanuel, Webster; St. Michael and St. George's; Bethesda Nurses; Business and Professional Women's Club, Cathedral; Holy Apostles; St. Augustine's; Ascension; Redeemer; and Grace Church, Kirkwood.

I have talked on some phase of Religious Education at the following places: Cathedral Branch (five times); St. Elizabeth's, Cathedral; St. Margaret's, Cathedral; Holy Apostles; Redeemer; St. Peter's (twice); St. Michael and St. George's (twice); Prince of Peace; Holy Communion (twice); Ascension; St. Paul's; St. Augustine's (twice); St. Stephen's, Ferguson; Christ Church, Cape Girardeau (three times); Palmyra (twice); Calvary, Columbia (twice); St. Luke's, Valley Park (twice); Trinity, Hannibal; St. James (twice); Rolla (twice); St. James, Macon (twice); Grace Church, Jefferson City; Calvary, Louisiana (district meeting); Emmanuel, Webster; Grace Church, Kirkwood and Poplar Bluff. I have visited and talked with Church people in Fredericktown (three times), Herculaneum and Moberly. On May 9th I led a discussion on Young People's Programs

at the Young People's first Convention; later I spoke to the Young People's group at Holy Communion and at St. Paul's and was asked to be on their list of speakers. Besides these I have talked on Gandhi to a club in Webster; on China to a Church School class in Kirkwood; on Gandhi to the Y.W.C.A. of St. Louis; to the Girls' Friendly at St. Peter's twice, and at St. Stephen's, once.

The monthly meetings of the Department of Religious Education and the Conference for Church workers held in June in Colum-

bia I found most helpful.

Three meetings of the Educational Secretaries have been held

where problems were discussed and future plans were made.

I have also attended the World Day of Prayer, three meetings of the Devotional Secretaries, and a Conference for Educational workers conducted by the Rev. John W. Suter, Jr.

I received much inspiration as well as information at the General Convention and was happy to be able to attend the Class on Religious Education for the Adult led by Miss Marston, our National Educational Secretary. The speeches on International Relations, Interracial Contacts, Property and Economic Conditions, Family Life and Religious Thinking Today, were most helpful as were also the Meditations led by Miss Lindley, conferences with educational leaders and the many personal contacts.

APPENDIX No. 11.

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Report of the Episcopal Home for Children.

The year 1931 has not been marked by any outstanding achievement but it has been characterized by a conscientious effort to promote the interest and welfare of the children in every way consistent with our means.

Systematic medical and dental care, daily training in health habits with attention to diet, rest and recreation have brought us to a high standard of physical health. Supervised home study and cooperation with teachers have resulted in better accomplishments in school. An attempt to understand the individual child, with help from Specialists when needed, is bringing about better personality adjustments. Disciplinary problems are very few and a wholesome atmosphere pervades the Home despite the gloom of our physical surroundings.

The Diocesan Convention has appointed the 1st Sunday in June as a time for special offerings for the Home and we hope that this work for children will become increasingly the prayerful responsibility of the Church. As a means of presenting our work to the Diocese we will publish at intervals a bulletin known as the "Home News" which will be as widely distributed as possible.

Owing to the reduction in our income and to the small number of applications for boys over 12 years of age, Brittain Hall was closed in June and the boys then in residence placed in private homes. This change involved the loss to us of the faithful services of Miss Julia Upshaw, who has managed Brittain Hall with such loyal devotion for the past 15 years.

In March a court decision gave us the right to sell our Grand Ave. property and to rebuild in a more suitable location but a State law prevents our giving a clear title for three years from that date. We are obliged, therefore, to carry on in the old building, making use of this delay in planning carefully for the future.

The old Infirmary has been fitted up for a cottage home for a group of girls who are enjoying a more home like atmosphere than is possible in the larger building.

After a year and a half of constructive work as Director of Social Service, Miss Teddy Hodgdon accepted another position in July and was succeeded September 15th by Mrs. E. M. Wentworth. The report which follows covers a period of ten months:

Thirty-seven applications for admission involving 62 children were received. The reasons for applying included separation or divorce of parents, death of one parent, illegitimacy, insufficient income, unemployment, illness of parent, behavior, desertion of parent, father in penitentiary. In some cases the children could not be admitted to the Home because they were not of suitable age, but in most cases they were refused because they could be cared for with greater benefit in other ways, as for example in the case of a family of four children whose father had died: help was obtained through another social agency in maintaining the mother with her children in their own home. Each application was investigated: five children were admitted. Six were dismissed. On December 31 there were 26 children—7 boys and 19 girls—in the Home, and 6 boys and 7 girls cared for outside. This included the 5 boys now in foster homes who

formerly resided at Arthur Brittain Hall, and makes a total of 45 children cared for during the year, with 39 under care at the present time. Four of the older boys are receiving vocational training, three in farm homes and one at the Rankin Trade School. The age range of the children under care in the Home and in foster homes is from six to eighteen years. With this somewhat reduced number of children in the Home more thorough study of the development, personality and requirements of each individual is possible.

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I wish to express my sincere thanks to our medical staff, Dr. W. H. Riley, Dr. Carl A. Hobart, Dr. R. H. Davis, Dr. A. H. Hamel, and Dr. Phil Hoffman, who have given such valuable service to the Home; to the Board of Directors of Bethesda for their generosity in admitting our children for hospital and clinic care; to our Advisory Committee for their advice in financial matters; to the Deaconess and her staff for their devotion to the work of the Home; and to the Board of Managers for their loyal co-operation and splendid service throughout the year

APPENDIX No. 12.

Report of the Girls' Friendly Society.

The year 1931 has been a year of growth in the Girls' Friendly Society. Three new branches have been added, one at Trinity, one at St. Augustine's and one at the Church of the Ascension. These branches are all made up of girls in their early 'teens. The formative stage of their development, and the age when such a character building organization as the Girls' Friendly Society can be of the utmost value.

The branch at St. Alban's is reported as inactive at present. A branch of Candidates at the Church of the Holy Communion has just been organized. This makes eleven active branches in the Diocese.

The Diocesan Council last year accepted the plan which the National Council of the Girls' Friendly Society had made for its support for the years 1930, '31 and '32. We have already paid in three fourths of our quota for the three years and the remainder is pledged and will be paid in shortly.

The Diocesan Council, following the example of the National Council, has also planned its budget for three years and by means of an entertainment last April raised enough money to augment its normal income for the three year period.

In February of last year Mrs. Roberts, the Girls' Friendly Society National Vice-President for Province VII, visited the diocese and conducted training classes for leaders. Another conference and training class will be held February 26 to 29 inclusive by Miss Newbold, National Executive Secretary for the Girls' Friendly Society.

APPENDIX No. 13.

Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

To the Rt. Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri; the Rt. Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri, and the clerical and lay delegates of the 93rd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

In making a report to your convention of the activities of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew for the year 1931, there is such a wealth of material that it is hard to tell where to begin.

The outstanding event of the year was the Triennial National Convention held Aug. 27 to Sept. 3 at Sewanee, Tenn. Those of you who have visited the University of the South can appreciate what an ideal setting it made for a church convention. The attendance numbered nearly 500—delegates and visitors—a large proportion of whom were under the age of 21 years. The Diocese of Missouri had a delegation numbering fifteen, registering from the following parishes: Redeemer; Ascension; Emmanuel, Webster Groves; St. Paul's, Overland and the Cathedral. A splendid program was arranged consisting of separate meetings for Juniors and Seniors, except in a few cases, such as the Corporate Communion and International Night, when the entire convention met as a body. The program for the Juniors consisted mostly of inspirational addresses and experience conferences. The Senior program was more in the nature of classroom studies led by such well known churchmen as Rev. H. H. Lumpkin, Ph.D., of Madison, Wis., who had as his subject "Intellectual Difficulties"; and Very Rev. Wm. H. Ness of New Orleans, whose topic was "Religious Experiences."

The next convention will be held in Japan, July and August of this year, preceded by a national young men's convention the early part of July, probably in Seattle, Wash.

On Dec. 2, a conference was held between the executive secretaries of the various departments of the National Church at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, and the General Secretary of the Brotherhood. This was to develop closer co-operation between these departmental executives and Brotherhood officials.

Another item of interest was the appointment of a committee by the Presiding Bishop to assist the Brotherhood. This committee consists of Rt. Rev. David L. Ferris, Bishop of Western New York; Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, Bishop of East Carolina; Rt. Rev. Philip Cook, Bishop of Delaware; Rt. Rev. W. B. Stevens, Bishop of Los Angeles; Rt. Rev. Henry Wise Hobson, Bishop Coadjutor of Southern Ohio; Rt. Rev. George Craig Stewart, Bishop of Chicago, and Rt. Rev. Frank A. Juhan, Bishop of Florida.

The names of the different divisions of the Brotherhood have been changed to Boys' Division, ages 10 to 15 (formerly Junior Department); Young Men's, ages 16 to 24 (formerly Advanced Division); Men's, ages 25 and over (formerly Senior Division).

You will be pleased to know that the Diocese of Missouri now has two council members, Mr. Lee Orcutt having been elected a member of the council in addition to the re-election of the present incumbent.

A few days ago the following cablegram was received from our Associate General Secretary Paul Rusch from far-away Tokio, Japan:

"Completed impressive St. Andrew's Week. Using Faith and Youth program translated. Hundreds reached, twenty will be baptized Saturday. Magnificent renewal service Monday. Founded national organization, six organized chapters, two dioceses, ten prospective chapters. Need funds to translate Brotherhood Handbook into Japanese."

Have just been advised that the required sum was cabled and the work is underway.

In our own diocese we have made considerable progress. New chapters have been organized and the work generally has been strengthened, especially is this true of the Young Men's Division.

APPENDIX No. 17.

Report of the Canonical Pension Fund Committee.

Two important things have marked the advancing operations of the Church Pension Fund for the year 1931.

First, the pension assessments for the year 1931 amounted to \$1,175,000, exceeding by \$15,000 the pension assessments received in any previous year of the Fund's operations. This certainly is a record which shows not only the devotion of the Church to its laws, but also its appreciation of the advantages of a scientifically regulated pension system, for its ministers.

Second, the Trustees felt justified, March 9, 1931, in practically raising all of the age allowances of the Fund then in force to the amount of \$1,000 a year. The only exceptions were such as very late ordinations, or natives in foreign missionary districts, less, all told, than a score in number. Moreover, the Trustees directed the officers of the Fund to make, so far as possible, all the age allowances granted by the Fund after March 9, 1931, of the same amount of \$1,000 a year. The Trustees reserve the right, however, of not placing a pension on this basis where there are circumstances that would seem to make it unjustifiable. They also reserve the right not to make a grant of such an amount if the number of such grants comes to be such as would in any way affect the general financial operations of the Fund. But they hope not only to be able to maintain the \$1,000 basis, but that, when they have to refuse such an amount, the clergyman in the case will not have long to wait for the full \$1.000 grant.

The full value of this action by the Trustees will be better appreciated when it is considered that, when the Pension Fund was established by the General Convention of 1913, the age allowance promised was only \$600 until such time as the pension assessments would entitle the clergy, respectively, to a larger amount. And it should be remembered that a long time must elapse before a pension fund can begin to pay pensions of any considerable amount out of the assessments alone. Only two cases so far have occurred where the clergyman upon retiring has been entitled to more than \$600 under the Rules. Nevertheless all but a very small number of the clergymen retired for age now receive a pension of \$1,000 a year. Thus the problem of the accrued liabilities is being solved and much more quickly than was contemplated at the first.

The total amount of pensions in force on January 1, 1932, was slightly over one million dollars a year. The expenditures in pensions alone since the Fund began to operate, March 1, 1917, through January 1, 1932, total \$8,177,954.48.

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In these Pension Expenditures the Diocese of Missouri shared for the year 1931 as follows:

Two severe losses came to the Fund during the year 1931: the death of Mr. Samuel Mather, and the resignation of Bishop Lawrence as President of the Fund.

Mr. Samuel Mather, of Cleveland, Ohio, financed the original pension movement for a period of six years, and was Vice President of the Fund from October 23, 1913, until his death, October 23, 1931.

Bishop Lawrence served as President from the same date, October 23, 1913, and resigned as such, October 23, 1931. The Trustees elected Mr. William Fellows Morgan, a long time member of the Executive Board, and identified with the Church and the City of New York in many important offices, to succeed Bishop Lawrence as President; and they bespeak the same strong support from the Church for Mr. Morgan as was given Bishop Lawrence in his effective administration of the Fund's interests and affairs.

Such a support the Diocese of Missouri has ever given to the Pension Fund, and especially during the year 1931. Parochial and diocesan pension assessments have been regularly and promptly paid, notwithstanding the prevailing economic depression, with only one exception, involving only about \$37.00, which will be paid, we are assured at an early day.

Your Committee deeply appreciates the aid we have received from the clergy and parochial treasurers of the Diocese, and begs to remind them that a report of assessment collections is made on the last day of each month, and that checks for their respective assessments must be received prior thereto or be carried over into the pension assessment charge of the next following month.

We beg also to suggest to the clergy and laity that to consult a member of this Committee upon any pension matter that may arise, rather than to write to the New York office of the Fund, might save delays, embarrassments, and possible loss.

The work of this Committee is purely a labor of love. It involves some expense, however, for postage, printed envelopes and other office supplies. We therefore present a bill with this report for Twenty-six and 68/100 Dollars, which covers such expense for the years 1928, 1929, 1930, and 1931.

Amendments to the Constitution Proposed at the Convention of 1931, and to Be Finally Acted
Upon at the Convention of 1934.

RESOLVED, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution

Amend Article I., Section 3, of the Constitution by inserting the words "the close of" after the word "until" so that the sentence shall read: "The Bishop so elected shall serve until the close of the next General Convention."

RESOLVED, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article II., Section 6, of the Constitution to read as follows:

"A Bishop may not resign his Episcopal charge without the consent either of the House of Bishops of the Church or of the House of Bishops of the Province in which his office has been exercised, in either case under conditions prescribed by the Canons of General Convention."

RESOLVED, That the following changes be made in the Constitution and that the proposed alterations be made known to the several Dioceses in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article II., Section 3, of the Constitution by adding the words, "A Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor shall be eligible as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of another Diocese, or he may be elected by the House of Bishops as a Missionary Bishop."

Amend Article II., Section 6, of the Constitution by adding to

the present Article the following:

"Provided that this Article shall not apply to a Bishop resigning to accept other Episcopal election."

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
