Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First: For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

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Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Third: For the support of St. Luke's Hospital, which shall be made on St. Luke's Day or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Fourth: For the support of the University of the South, which shall be made on the Second Sunday after the Ephiphany.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

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1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:

I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.

II. On Constitution and Canons.

III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.

IV. On Unfinished Business.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

RULES OF ORDER

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

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nd all en, or 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward

at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Tuesday, January 22, 1929.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninetieth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 22, 1929, at 9:30 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese assisted by the Very Rev.William Scarlett, LL.D., the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, LL.D., the Rev. A. E. Woodward and Archdeacon H. H. Marsden.

The Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in business session in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-eight who were entitled to vote, twenty-nine were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 16).

The Secretary called the roll of the forty-six Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese. for

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NINETIETH CONVENTION

The Rev. Mr. Nugent was elected a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

The following named Nominating Committee was elected:

The Very Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., the Rev. David Coombs, the Rev. E. S. White, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock, and Mr. Kent Jarvis.

It was ordered that the seats in the Auditorium west of the north and south aisle be reserved for Clergy and Lay Delegates entitled to seats and votes in the Convention, and visitors be requested to sit in the section of seats east of this aisle.

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It was ordered that Clergy not entitled to vote be given seats and a vote in the Convention.

It was ordered that the Convention assemble each morning at 9 o'clock, opening with Morning Prayer; that a recess be taken from 12:45 until 2 p.m. for luncheon; and that it adjourn each day at 5 p.m.

It was ordered that the matter of the Church Program be made an Order of the Day at 2 p.m.

The Treasurer's reports of the following named funds were received and filed:

The General Expense Fund. (Appendix 2.)

The Church Program Fund. (Appendix 3.)

The Theological Education Fund. (Appendix 4.)

The Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 5.)

The Secretary presented the report of the Permanent Episcopate Fund which was received and filed. (Appendix 6.)

The Rev. Mr. White led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers.

The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan Council which was received and filed. (Appendix 7.)

The recommendations concerning the Church News contained in the Diocesan Council report were referred to the Department of Finance.

The recommendation contained in the Diocesan Council report concerning an Executive Secretary was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Judge Hitchcock, Chairman of a Committee appointed under Resolution No. 18 of the Convention of 1928, presented a report which was received and filed. (Appendix 8.)

The proposed new Canon recommended in the foregoing report was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

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The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

The Bishop called for the Order of the Day at 2 p.m.

Mr. Gatch, Vice-Chairman of the Department of Finance presented his report concerning the Church Program Budget and apportionments and General Expense Fund Budget and assessments, which was received and filed. (Appendix 9.)

Under suspension of the Rules the Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted as follows, by rising vote, and the Bishop led the Convention in Prayer invoking for Dean Scarlett the guidance of God in making his decision:

Resolution No. 1.

While the Convention of our Diocese is in session, news has come of the election of Dean Scarlett to the office of Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania. The Dean must be fully conscious of the deep love which is felt for him among all sort of people, both in this city and throughout the Diocese. We think it no strange thing that another Diocese, knowing what manner of man he is, seeks to secure him to be its present Coadjutor and eventually its Bishop. We realize the honor that is conferred upon our Dean by the Diocese of Pennsyvania. We realize also that the decision rests with him. Yet we cannot forbear to express the earnest hope that it may seem to him to be his duty to remain in the position which he has filled with such singular success, where he seems to us to be so greatly needed now, and where his opportunity for increasing usefulness is well assured.

Resolutions No. 2 and 3 in the foregoing report presented by Mr. Gatch were adopted.

Resolutions Nos. 4, 5 and 6 in the foregoing report were adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Travers presented the report of the Secretary of the Standing Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 10.)

NINETIETH CONVENTION

The Rev. Dr. Travers presented the report of the Secretary of the Parochial Trust Fund which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

The Secretary, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, introduced Resolution No. 7, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That Section 5 of Canon 9 be amended by inserting between the words "power" and "to" in the first line of said Section 5, as printed in the 1926 edition of the Canons of the Diocese, the words, "on nomination of the Bishop;" and that after the words "Executive Secretary," at the end of said Section 5, the following sentence be inserted, "The Executive Secretary shall be under the direction of the Bishop;" so that said Section 5, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Section 5. The Council shall have power, on nomination of the Bishop, to employ an Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall be under the direction of the Bishop.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 8, as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, In accordance with Resolution No. 15 of the Convention of 1928, that Article VII of the Constitution be finally repealed, and that in lieu thereof a new Article be finally adopted, to be known as Article VII, to read as follows:

Article VII.

Section 1. The first morning session of every meeting of the Convention shall be preceded by a Celebration of the Holy Communion. All Divine Services immediately preceding each day's session and during the sessions of the Convention shall be under the direction of the Bishop. If the Bishop be unable to act, or if there be a vacancy in the office of Bishop, then such services shall be under the direction of the Presiding Officer of the Convention.

The foregoing Resolution No. 8 was adopted by a rising vote of Clergy and Lay Delegates, voting separately.

The Rev. Dr. Block introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

WHEREAS, The parish of St. George has officially merged with the parish of St. Michael and All Angels, and

WHEREAS, The parish of St. Michael and All Angels at a congregational meeting voted to change its name in recognition of the merger,

BE IT RESOLVED, In conformity with the Diocesan Canons, that permission of this Convention be granted to the parish of St. Michael and All Angels, to change its official name to that of the parish of St. Michael and St. George.

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The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, Chairman of the Church Pension Fund, presented his report, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

The Rev. Mr. Bloy introduced Resolution No. 10, which was adopted by rising vote, as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

WHEREAS, This 90th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri misses from its deliberations Mrs. E.F.Cushing who has been present in years past as a delegate, and who has been again elected this year to represent her parish, but is absent because of detention in the hospital;

BE IT RESOLVED, This Convention assembled sends to Mrs. E. F. Cushing its loving greetings, assures her that her presence is missed, and prays that God in His own good time may restore her to health.

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent introduced Resolution No. 12 which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Treasurer of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial the sum of \$25.00 towards extra maintenance expense.

Archdeacon Marsden presented his report which was received and filed. (Appendix 15.)

The Rev. Canon George presented his report as Superintendent of the Mission to City Institutions. (Appendix 16.)

The Rev. Mr. Coombs, for the Nominating Committee, presented a report as follows:

Mrs. W. C. Rumsey presented her report as President of the Woman's Auxiliary which was received and filed. (Appendix 17.)

Mrs. Rumsey was given a rising vote of thanks by the Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., and the Rev. John Bunting elected members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, each candidate having received a majority of the votes in each order.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical member of the Standing Committee and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., elected a member of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, he having received a majority of votes in each order.

The Secretary read the report of the League of Lay Readers which was received and filed. (Appendix 18.)

The Rev. Dr. Block read Noon Day Prayers.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 13 which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 13.

RESOLVED, That the item of \$900.00 for the Church News in the General Expense Budget be increased to \$2,000.00; and that the Church News be published four times a year, a copy of each issue to be sent to every family in the Diocese; the details and time of each issue to be determined by the Church News Committee under the general direction of the Bishop acting with the Diocesan Council.

Mr. John C. Watling presented his report as Secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew which was received and filed. (Appendix 19.)

The Rev. Mr. Rawson read the report of the Church School Service Program Council which was received and filed. (Appendix 20.)

The Rev. Mr. Haupt introduced Resolution No. 14 which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this Convention that payments on the Church's Program from each parish or mission ought to be mailed to the Treasurer of the Diocese monthly, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to every parish and mission in the Diocese.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

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NINETIETH CONVENTION

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The Bishop called for the Order of the Day at 2 p.m.

It was ordered that the Diocesan Council be authorized to raise generally in the Diocese through a Special Gifts Committee from selected lists of contributors, sufficient funds to provide whatever difference there may be between the amount of money raised through apportionments for 1929 and the Church Program Budget of \$72,000.00.

It was ordered that the Secretary be instructed to notify the National Council that the Diocese of Missouri expects to pay towards the General Church Program for 1929 the sum of \$27,404.00, and that in addition to this amount the Diocese will send to the National Council one-half of all money received on the apportionment in excess of \$54,807.00.

The Rev. Mr. Clarke introduced Resolution No. 15 as follows:

Resolution No. 15.

RESOLVED, That this Convention respectfully disclaims responsibility in the matter of the delinquencies mentioned in the report of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund; but will, in the future, use greater diligence in following up the payment of pension premiums as required by Canon 22, Sec. 4.

Resolution No. 15 was laid on the table and the question of delinquent Church Pension Fund premiums was referred to the Diocesan Council.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons recommended that Resolution No. 7 providing for an amendment to Section 5 of Canon 9 be adopted.

Resolution No. 7 was adopted.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons to which was referred a new canon to be known as Canon 9-a, embodied in the report of the Chancellor of the Diocese, pursuant to Resolution No. 18 of 1928, reported with a recommendation that instead of Section 1 in said proposed Canon 9-a, a new Section 1 be adopted as follows:

Section 1. The Finance Department of the Diocesan Council shall be ex-officio the Finance Committee of the Diocese.

The foregoing report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons was not adopted.

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The Committee on Constitution and Canons further reported in regard to the foregoing report of the Chancellor, with a recommendation that Section 4 in the proposed Canon 9-a be amended by striking out the last twenty-three words in Section 4, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words: Com

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"Purposes in harmony with the manifest spirit and intention of the creators of the Fund, and all investments thereof shall be made as provided in this Canon."

The foregoing recommendation of the Committee on Constitution and Canons was not adopted.

The original proposed Canon 9-a as recommended in the foregoing report of the Chancellor, (Appendix 8) was adopted, without amendment.

Judge Hitchcock introduced Resolution No. 16 which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 16.

RESOLVED, That the Bishop be and he is hereby authorized to appoint three persons of financial experience who shall constitute the first Finance Committee under the provisions of the Canon entitled "Of the Finance Committee;" provided, however, this authority shall not extend to subsequent annual appointments under said Canon unless so ordered by the Convention.

Judge Hitchcock introduced Resolution No. 17 which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 17.

RESOLVED, That the Finance Committee of the Diocese examine into the soundness of the securities constituting the principal or corpus of any and all trust funds which are held by the Bishop of the Diocese or any board, fund, committee or corporation reporting to the Annual Convention. Said Committee shall report in writing to the trustee, or other fiduciary of such securities, respectively, its opinion in respect of the soundness of such securities and what ones, if any, should be sold or held.

In the event said Committee recommends the sale of any security it shall also recommend the purchase of some other security to be held in lieu of the security so recommended to be sold. The recommendations of such Committee shall be mandatory except as to investments held by a trustee acting under powers conferred by will or otherwise.

The Bishop appointed the following named Committees:

Committee on Church Pension Fund.

The Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., Mr. C. H. Middleton, Mr. James A. Waterworth, and Mr. Harry Sprague.

The Rev. F. J. F. Bloy, Editor, Mr. Roy Campbell, Business Manager, and the Rev. L. H. Nugent.

It was ordered that the Diocesan Council take immediate steps towards employing an Executive Secretary and devise ways and means to raise the necessary funds to pay his salary and other expenses.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the Minutes of the last day of the Convention.

It was ordered that the Convention meet next year at Christ Church Cathedral.

The Rev. Dr. Armstrong of the Church Federation addressed the Convention.

The following letter was received from the Rev. B. E. Reed :

Webster Groves, Jan. 22, 1929.

My dear Bishop and Brethren of the Diocese of Missouri,

Physical disability prevents my attendance at the Convention. The Diocese for many years has been, and still is a good, kind friend to me. I can now give it only my prayers and love. It is a family that permits its members to know no want if it can relieve. God bless our family home, the Diocese.

APPENDIX NO. 1.

Bishop's Address to the Ninetieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

34

Widely separated as we are, and spread across more than 32,000 square miles of this Missouri state, the annual Convention is practically the only opportunity we have to come together in a whole twelve months in any kind of corporate capacity. I devoutly wish that we would value the opportunity more than it sometimes appears that we do. While we are here, we shall have some discussion of the past, of course. I hope that we shall also have wise planning and generous planning for the future. To that end it is most desirable that those who have come will make every effort to tarry until the work is done. Really we ought not to think that two days of six or seven hours each is too much time for us to give each year for consideration of the Father's business!

Eight of our Bishops have joined the Church Expectant since a year ago:

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Ethelbert Talbot, at the age of 80 years, third Bishop of Bethlehem since 1887.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Henry Beard Delany, at the age of 70 years, Suffragan Bishop of North Carolina since 1918.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Josepha Sakunoshin Motoda, Bishop of (the city of) Tokyo, Japan.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Charles Minnegerode Beckwith, at the age of 76 years, fourth Bishop of Alabama since 1902.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Joseph Horsfall Johnson, at the age of 80 years, first Bishop of Los Angeles since 1896.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. William Alexander Guerry, at the age of 67 years, eighth Bishop of South Carolina since 1907.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. George Herbert Kinsolving, at the age of 79 years, second Bishop of Texas since 1892.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. John Dominique La Mothe, at the age of 60 years, second (American) Bishop of Honolulu since 1921.

The Rev. Benjamin Horton, who went from our Diocese into the work of the ministry, died in Chicago last July.

News has come that the Rev. William Elmer, a former rector of St. Philip's, St. Louis, finished his course in England, where he was living in semi-retirement, more than a year ago.

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most beloved of the members of the legal profession in St. Louis; Mr. L.W. Day, Junior Warden of St. Stephen's, Ferguson; Mrs. David Kingsland of De Soto; Mr. R. H. Holden of Bonne Terre; Mrs. Maria Lewis of Hannibal; Mr. John D. Marshall of Maplewood; Mrs. John Good of Kirkwood; Mrs. Sarah Freeman of Palmyra; Miss Christie Pattee of Canton; Dorothy Blondin, member of the choir of St. Paul's, Overland; Mr. William L. Chambers of Rolla; Mrs. Henry Leuer of Poplar Bluff; Mr. Maning Walker and Mrs. Susan McClintic of Monroe City; Mr. George L. Meng of Herculaneum; Mr. F. T. Meriwether of Louisiana; Mrs. Mary E. Fullerton of St. James; Mrs. Irene B. Hurd of Webster Groves.

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Thirteen years ago, Bishop Tuttle reported the closing of Bishop Robertson Hall which for more than forty years was carried on under the direction of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd. Sister Rutger had been among the teachers. After a brief sojourn in Louisville she returned to St. Louis. About ten years ago she became identified with the parish work of the Church of the Redeemer. In February of 1928 the Master came and called her. She is missed in many neighborhoods in St. Louis which have been made fragant with her footsteps and brightened by her cheery and always helpful presence.

"Grandma" Miriam Sparks Banister died in April in her 112th year. One of the most vivid recollections of her childhood was that of the death of Queen Victoria's father, the Duke of Kent, in Devonshire, where she was born.

Stuart Sutherland of Ascension parish was that fine young man who wouldn't accept a decoration for bravery in the war because a like recognition was not bestowed upon the buddy who shared with him the danger of the situation.

Many who never knew Dr. Greenfield Sluder are debtors to him for developments and discoveries in certain departments of surgery by which he greatly diminished the total of the physical sufferings of human kind.

The mother of Mr. George M. Block, who with her husband during many years dispensed rare hospitality to hosts of friends at their country home in Prairieville, died in Pasadena.

Mr. Cecil W. Thomas was Mayor of Jefferson City six consecutive terms, enjoying to a remarkable degree the esteem and confidence of his fellowmen.

Everybody says it, that Harry Hurd was one of the kindliest, most lovable men in all St. Louis. He made friends and kept friends. I don't mean that he consciously put forth the effort. It didn't seem that way to me. He was a dear fellow. And we just naturally wanted to be friends with him. He was formerly the Treasurer of the Diocese and he discharged the duties of that office with great fidelity.

Mr. Thomas K. Jones was appointed Warden of the newly organized mission of St. Paul's, Overland, in 1907. Twenty-one years he was a good and faithful servant. He saw St. Paul's grow from three communicants to 100. Early in November God's finger touched him and he slept.

At Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, where Miss Hattie Glenn spent her summers, no day was properly begun or ended until she had taken her friends to walk in the garden. She absorbed and radiated the

shining sun, the songs of birds, the fragrance of the flowers. It is most natural, now that she is gone from us, to think of her in a happy place where bright fields stand dressed in living green and springtime reigns and flowers bloom. And we think she knows how much we miss her here.

We who so much love the George Robinsons of Kirkwood gathered close beside them with such poor comfort as we could for their loneliness when messages from over seas told that dear Virginia Robinson, in a hospital in Paris, had suddenly reached the end of her young life's "beautiful voyage." And sorrowing with them for their loneliness, we joyed with them in the sure confidence that the end of the "beautiful voyage" was the ocean of God's love.

Mr. Edward Mallinckrodt, Sr., was a rare combination of gentleness and strength. I knew him intimately in his office of Chairman of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Hospital. I think I've never known a sweeter-dispositioned man. He built up a big fortune during fourscore years, and bestowed it generously during his lifetime and by will, largely for the comfort of the sick and for the promotion of such sciences as have chiefly for their object the searching out of the causes of disease and the providing of a remedy.

By the will of the late Mrs. John Fowler, who died during the year, St. Luke's Hospital, as residuary legatee, will come into possession of a fund of approximately \$1,500,000.00 The will provides that the money shall be used partly to build a John Fowler Memorial in connection with St. Luke's and partly for endowment. Mr. Fowler was for many years President of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's. Mrs. Fowler's benefaction will enable the Hospital to greatly improve the hospital facilities and also to enlarge our field of usefulness in behalf of those who are not financially able to pay full cost of hospital care.

When news came in September that Rabbi Leon Harrison had accidently fallen under a train in a New York subway, it seemed as if the life of this entire metropolis stopped still. He was a noble man. Scarcely more than a youth, he came to Temple Israel as Rabbi in 1891 at the age of 25. The whole social and moral and intellectual and spiritual life of St. Louis is richer and better and stronger and sweeter and truer because he lived and worked here almost 40 years.

Our Bishop Tuttle Memorial, or what we choose to call the first unit of it, was formally opened and dedicated on the evening of All Saints Day. Dr. John Mac Ivor, pastor of Second Presbyterian Church, graciously accepted our invitation to deliver the dedicatory address, a message splendidly suited to the occasion. Every day we ask ourselves how we carried on as many years as we did without a building such as this. Standing in the midst of what seems destined to be for years to come the central section of the city, our opportunity to minister to the social, moral and spiritual needs of the people is almost unlimited and our responsibility is correspondingly great. In addition, we hope that diocesan activities will more and more find shelter here. We believe that we have such a Memorial to Bishop Tuttle as his soul delights in. Jamieson and Spurl, the architects, have given us a building which combines beauty and utility to a remarkable degree. The beautiful auditorium in which we meet today is built and furnished as a memorial to Dean Montgomery Schuyler of blessed memory, rector of Christ Church, St. Louis, 1854 to 1888, Dean of Christ Church Cathedral from 1888 until he fell on sleep, given memC

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sleep, the 19th of March, 1896. The seats in the auditorium were given by Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Thompson of Webster Groves, in memory of Dean Schuyler.

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Twenty-three years ago I went to South Dakota as a Missionary Bishop. There I heard of the excellent work done in an early day in South Dakota by a young man named Weddell. When I came to Missouri in 1912, the Rev. Mr. Weddell was connected with the Diocese of West Missouri. Before going to West Missouri he had been pastor of Rolla, St. James and Cuba from 1896 to 1910. I invited him to "come back home," and he came in October, 1912. Faithfully, steadily, devotedly, he has gone in and out in loving ministry to scattered groups of people here and there as Special Missionary. Mr. Weddell retired early in this month of January. I give him affectionate thanks for being to me the loving helper that he has been during more than sixteen years. I know that he has an enduring memorial in the lives of many men and women who have learned to be friends of the Master by reason of his gentle, constant shepherding. He will continue to make his home in University City. His name will stand among the top names on our clergy list. His place in the affections of the Bishop and other Clergy of the Diocese is secure.

Five years ago last October the Rev. Thomas L. Small began his work as pastor of St. Luke's mission in St. Louis. In the autumn of 1925, St. Timothy's, St. Louis, was added to his cure. Spiritually and in a material way, the work prospered steadily and securely under Mr. Small's wise and kindly leadership. It was no easy matter for St. Luke's and St. Timothy's to let him go when he was called a few months ago to be a Canon-in-residence of the Cathedral. His promotion was well earned. His new opportunity of usefulness is big. We wish him good success. The Rev. Mr. Rein is taking care of St. Luke's and St. Timothy's with great acceptance while we are hunting for a permanent pastor.

The Rev. Phillips B. Warner came into the ministry as one of my candidates, his home being my old home state, Connecticut. I ordained him deacon there in May, 1923, and he came to St. Louis and took charge of St. Paul's, Carondelet. Five good years he gave in faithful ministry to St. Paul's, much beloved by the people, and did what was really an unusual piece of work. The spiritual life of the parish was greatly renewed and strengthened by his ministrations. A \$4,000.00 debt of long standing was cancelled. The church fabric was repaired and its interior was decorated. A new furnace was installed. Just before Mr. Warner left last May, Mrs. Guido Doering pledged the money for a beautiful stone-mullioned memorial window, which is now installed. I am grateful to Mr. Warner for what he did for us. On my nomination, the Vestry elected the Rev. George S. Gresham to be the rector of St. Paul's in succession to Mr. Warner. Mr. Gresham came in late November and we are glad to give him welcome to our diocesan family.

Just before Christmas I visited Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, and was delighted with the spirit which I saw and felt. The work there and in parts adjacent is prospering under the leadership of the Rev. Carleton D. Lathrop. Mr. Lathrop whirls himself at 50 miles an hour over a big part of southeast Missouri in a new Ford car. He is a community-spirited man. To many persons whom I met on my recent visit I remarked, "Mr. Lathrop seems pretty well suited to his job." And without exception the reply was, "I'll say he is," or something that meant just that.

I should have understood it if the people who comprise the Poplar Bluff-Ironton-De Soto group had refused to forgive me for taking the Rev. Frank Maples away; for he was doing a very valuable work. But the people are forgiving and, though they know what they have lost, they rejoice in Mr. Maples' larger opportunity. Mr. Maples came to St. Augustine's, St. Louis, in October, to take the post made vacant when the Rev. W. G. Harter went away. In the past ten years, and chiefly in the past five years, a whole new community has grown up in that part of the city. St. Augustine's was on the ground when the neighborhood was scarcely more than a village. There seems to be no valid reason why the Church should not both contribute to and reap a benefit from the community expansion. Just that thing is happening. Mr. Maples would say that he couldn't do it without the co-operation of his people. And the people say that the leader is pretty much responsible. That's as it should be. "As the string unto the bow is; useless each without the other." I am prepared not to be surprised if I hear that some provision must soon be made for a larger place of worship for St. Augustine's congregation.

The Rev. Hayward S. Ablewhite, rector of St. Philip's, St. Louis, was elected Dean of the Cathedral of the Diocese of Marquette and left us for his new post in the early summer. Mr. Ablewhite easily made himself at home in our staff of Clergy and we all regretted his decision to go away. The Rev. Bradner J. Moore accepted election to the post made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Ablewhite, his rectorship dating from October 25, 1928.

Eleven fruitful years the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor has been in charge at Grace—Holy Cross, St. Louis. He leads quietly and with gentleness. But he leads. And I am surprised and delighted at the progress which the people there have made in self-help. So often it appears that the more the Diocese does to help a congregation, the more the congregation expects the Diocese to do. It's not so at Grace —Holy Cross. The help which the Diocese has given has spurred the people on to better and bigger doing for themselves. And we give them our thanks.

On a visit to Calvary Church, Louisiana, a few weeks ago, I found the choir largely recruited and the music completely made over by reason of the trained management of Dr. Goodman, the new choir leader. Added to the many unexpected things which have been done in Calvary parish, in the five years that the Rev. David Coombs has been there—a new furnace, an addition to the rectory, a longstanding debt removed—comes now the news that \$4,500 is in hand for the purchase of a new organ. Contributions to this fund were made by many who have no connection with our church. They admire Mr. Coombs. Yes, they love him. He has the community vision. The work in the Louisiana—Prairieville—Clarksville group is as good a demonstration as I know of the truth of Leslie Glenn's statement, "It is not a program but a person that is needed."

I understand that a new organ has also been installed in Trinity church, Hannibal, adding greatly to the beauty of the music there.

For whatever causes, the discussion of which it seems to me must be unprofitable, St. George's parish in St. Louis has decided to quit the field in which during many years it made a noble struggle to survive. Last autumn the Rector and Vestry of St. Michael & All Angels' parish assured the people of St. George's of a whole-hearted welcome if it should seem to them desirable to enter into a partner-

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ship. With due deliberation, each party to the proposed merger manifesting great consideration of the other party, the necessary adjustments were effected and I understand that request will be made of this Convention to give recognition to the newly-named parish of St. Michael & St. George. I have been here long enough to have learned the important part which St. George's has played in the religious life of this city and state. Many of you know this much better than I can tell it to you. Some of the most potent spiritual messages spoken to this community were spoken in former years by men who had understanding of the times, preaching in St. George's pulpit. We bless God's holy name for the faith and virtue which St. George's church, through worship and sacraments and prophecy and pastoral care built into the lives of men and women who had sweet fellowship together there. And we pray God to bless the union of these two congreations into one and to use the parish of St. Michael & St. George to His greater glory. Under the kind and wise leadership of the Rev. Dr. Block the parish is growing healthily, and church and parish house are being expanded into a plant which promises to be beautiful and practical and well suited to the larger needs of the growing community. The Rev. Raymond E. Brock, who had been rector of St. George's for two and a half years previous to the merger, has taken letters dimissory to the Diocese of Springfield as rector of St. Matthew's, Bloomington.

By vote of Convention a year ago, \$12,000.00 was appropriated out of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Missionary Fund for Student Work at Columbia. During the summer of 1928, the rectory which adjoins Calvary church was built over into a Student Center. I had the privilege of being present at the "opening" on the evening of November 9. The Diocese of Missouri and the Parish of Calvary, Columbia, are alike represented in the personnel of the Student Center Corporation. It is our eager hope that, with this quite considerable financial aid from the Diocese, the Church's influence in Columbia may be greatly strengthened and extended. The Rev. David R. Haupt is genuinely interested in his responsible job. The work deserves a good leader. The leader, to be successful, deserves and must have the co-operation of the Diocese and of the local parish.

The quarterly meeting of the Diocesan Auxiliary will be held in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Friday of this week. I have often wondered why many of the Clergy do not attend these stated meetings of the Auxiliary. Yes; I know the reason that we give. We are too busy. But that's the reason why we ought to come. We need to climb more Mounts of Transfiguration than we do, where we may have more such experiences as those first disciples had who, when they got above the clouds, "saw Jesus only with themselves." I frankly confess to you that I have often found in these Auxiliary meetings, not one of which I ever miss unless I must, a transfigurating experience for my jaded soul. I do not know just what it is. But it is not the less real because I cannot analyze it or define it.

Our whole Diocese owes a debt of gratitude to Mrs. Arthur J. Gammack, National Field Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, who spent eleven weeks here in the early summer, chiefly in visits to parishes and missions outside of the city of St. Louis. Mrs. Gammack was busy at the task assigned her in all sorts of weather. No situation, however difficult, seemed to discourage her. I followed Mrs. Gammack on my own official duty in many places and women everywhere spoke to me personally of the spiritual blessing which she

brought. I hope very much that the Auxiliary has found a way to act upon some of the valuable suggestions which Mrs. Gammack made as a result of her acquaintance with the field.

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Mrs. Jean Barron Hurlbut came to St. Louis as Matron of the Episcopal Orphans' Home, in October, 1927. I want to express my admiration of the work which Mrs. Hurlbut has done and of the splendid spirit of devotion which she has put into it. I have long felt that the time has come when the Orphans' Home should be reorganized. I am glad to discover that the mind of the Board is hospitably inclined to consider suggestions looking toward a quite complete change in the conduct of the Home. The contemplated changes should not be made without careful study of the situation as it is and careful planning for the future. The Home is almost ninety years old. It would be strange if the time had not arrived when different methods should be carefully considered.

"New occasions teach new duties, Time makes ancient good uncouth."

The Diocesan Council at its meeting June 12 ordered "that the Department of Missions and Church Extension be authorized to sell the mission property at Kirksville.....after the mission had been declared dormant by the Bishop according to canonical provisions." Regretfully, for it seems to me that there should have been manifested a more eager desire among the Kirksville people to co-operate with the Diocese to continue the work at that important center, I give notice that Trinity Mission, Kirksville, is dormant.

I confirmed 546 persons in 1928. The average for the seventeen years that I have been here, during eleven of which years the Diocese had two bishops, is 537.7.

January 8, I advanced the Rev. Frank Maples, of Poplar Bluff, to the Priesthood at Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, Mo.

May 20, I ordained Mr. Arthur O. Steidemann, Deacon in the Bofinger Memorial Chapel. Mr. Steidemann, who had served many years as lay reader at St. Thomas' Mission for the Deaf, is now the pastor of St. Thomas' congregation. I am looking forward to advancing him to the Priesthood so soon as he is prepared for that further step. It will be good to have a man in full orders to take the place made vacant by the death of St. Thomas' beloved pastor, the Rev. Dr. Cloud.

June 17, I ordained Mr. C. Avery Mason, Mr. Francis Eric Irving Bloy, and Mr. Marshall E. Jones to the office of Deacon in the Cathedral. Bloy and Mason are completing their course at the Theological Seminary in Virginia, and Jones is continuing his studies at the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, and Harvard University.

We have one Candidate for Holy Orders and three Postulants.

I received one Presbyter into the Diocese in 1928 and gave letters dimissory to four.

The above item brings out the fact that there are more vacancies than there were a year ago. I could not have carried on except for the constant and always willingly performed duties which have been done by Archdeacon Marsden. I owe him many thanks. I am eager to fill the vacant places. But they must be filled, if possible, with men worthy of the trust and capable of leadership.

It is easy for me to understand why many persons feel a special spiritual joy in coming together "to eat the Lord's Supper" on the anniversary of "the night in which He was betrayed." It seems to me, however, that a daylight opportunity for receiving the Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday ought to be given to those who for one reason or another do not wish to or cannot attend an evening service. I understand, too, why it is that many persons love to come for a celebration of the Holy Communion at midnight of the night before Christmas; for

"It came upon the midnight clear That glorious song of old."

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Yes. I understand. But it has come to my attention that there are parishes where there is no Christmas day service except a celebration of the Holy Communion at midnight. This I do not understand. There must be in every parish aged men and women who cannot come at midnight, and semi-invalids who cannot come at midnight. And there may be those who do not wish to come at midnight. Let us provide an opportunity for these to gather round the Holy Table of the Prince of Peace on the day on which the Prince of Peace was born.

In November, in a wonderfully vivid address, Dr. Rudolf B. Teusler brought us the story of the Church's Mission, illustrating it largely by that portion of the field which he knows so well, St. Luke's Hospital in Tokyo, Japan. In that far-away corner of the map, this man who stands among the foremost surgeons of the world is actually laying down his life to demonstrate his faith. Dr. Teusler and his fellow-workers are busy raising the funds for a great St. Luke's International Hospital plant in Tokyo. The General Convention last October pledged \$1,000,000 to be raised toward the project by the General Church before Easter. The Diocese of Missouri ought to want to undertake its proper share of that grand total.

I have the promise of Mr. Lewis B. Franklin, Vice-President and Treasurer of the National Council, that he will come to us in March. Mr. Franklin was one of New York's big banking men. He is consecrating the whole of his business ability to help meet the great need of the Church in this day of her great opportunity.

I respectfully urge that consideration of the Church's Program, with such questions as are implied in it and grow out of it, be made a special order at whatever hour this afternoon or tomorrow morning is likely to secure a full attendance of Clergy and elected Delegates. I believe that this Convention is unwilling to put the Bishop of Missouri another twelve months in the unhappy situation of not knowing from month to month whether the funds will be available to pay financial obligations within the Diocese and outside of the Diocese which the Convention alone has power to authorize. I believe that this Convention is unwilling to put the Bishop another twelve months on the defensive to give answer to the question, "Why does the outgo steadily exceed the income?" Surely the Convention, and not the Bishop, should solve the question of why the funds are not sufficient to finance a Budget which the Bishop has no power to determine, but which is determined by vote of the Convention. I also believe that this Diocese is unwilling to be satisfied any longer with an annual diocesan deficit which results because individual congregations which are component parts of the Diocese, beg to be excused (for whatever cause or reason) from paying the amounts which are

their proper proportion of the total Budget. I believe that we must come to grips with this question. The place to take hold is here and the time to take hold is now. The questions seem to me to be:

- (1) What Budget will this Convention authorize for 1929?
- (2) Will the Convention assume the responsibility of providing the funds to pay the Budget which the Convention authorizes,—so much for Missionary Work in Missouri and so much to the General Church?

The amount needed for Missionary Work in Missouri is \$36,000.00. (Included in this figure is \$4,500.00 for the Departments of Finance, Religious Education, the Field, Publicity, Christian Social Service, and a Contingent item of \$6,000.00 to be applied toward the payment of a debt brought over from previous years.) You will observe that this figure, \$36,000.00, provides not a dollar for expansion. And if the amount is not raised, the missionary operations already set up in the Diocese must be curtailed.

Missouri's equitable share in the operating expense of the General Church, in 1929 is \$38,000.00. If we pay less than that amount, one of two things must result:

- (1) The world-wide mission of the Church must be retarded; or
- (2) Other Dioceses must pay the bills, because the Diocese of Missouri has said, "I pray thee have me excused."

For whatever it may be worth in discussing the Church's Program, I have assembled a few statistics. The Nation Wide Campaign began to function here January 1, 1920. The average annual current expense account of our parishes and missions, including salaries and other parochial expenditures, during the triennium 1920-21-22 was \$234,803.00 Our average annual Nation Wide receipts during that triennium were \$64,223.00. In 1927 the current expense account, including salaries and other parochial expenditures, had increased from \$234,803.00 to \$304,216.00. But in 1928 the total givings on account of Church's Program had fallen to \$52,859.00. In other words, (assuming, as I think we may, that the current expense account for 1928 will be practically the same as for 1927,---the 1928 figures being not yet available,) since the first triennium of the Nation Wide movement, our spendings on ourselves under head of current expenses and other parochial expenses have increased 29 per cent, and our givings to the Church's Program have decreased 17.7 per cent. In 1919, the year before the Nation Wide Movement began, the official report of Clergy salaries, current expenses and other parochial expenses gives a total of \$209,164.00. In 1927 the total of Clergy salaries, current expenses and other parochial expenses was \$304,217.00. Under the stimulus of this great forward movement our congregations benefitted enormously. In 1927 we spent 45.4 per cent more on ourselves in the matter of parochial expenses than we spent in 1919. The salaries of Clergy and Lay Assistants jumped from \$58,827.00 in 1919 to \$103,909.00 in 1927, a gain in salaries alone of almost 100 per cent. These figures give some indication of the extent to which this Diocese has benefitted under the impulse of the Nation Wide Campaign and other stirrings-up which followed it. And I am humiliated to confess that we are proving that we are unwilling to share with others the blessings with which we have been favored.

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In the light of these comparisons, have we any right to plead financial inability as our excuse for failure to reach the Church's Program goal? Is it "diocesanism," "parochialism," that holds us back—the specious plea that "charity begins at home," and ends there! Is it selfishness? I am not saying that it is. But I feel compelled to raise the question, Is it selfishness? If it is, let us in God's sight be honest and call the thing that we are doing by its unattractive name. I say to you in all love and kindness, dear people, most of us are not making sacrifices to spread abroad the good news that has come to us, else the figures printed above would tell a different tale. How many of us are giving till it hurts?

> "What can I spare?" we say. "Ah, this and this From mine array I am not like to miss.

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And here are crumbs to feed some hungry one; They do but grow a cumbrance on my shelf." And yet Our Father gave His Son, Our Master gave Himself.

Never in seventeen years have I asked the people of Missouri to give more generously to Missionary Work as proof of loyalty to me. I do not ask it now. I ask it as proof of love and loyalty to Him who, though He was rich, yet for our sakes became poor. What shall we do in love and loyalty to Him? Shall we do something which really costs?

> What is it we'll be bringing To lay before our King? A precious alabaster box, Or some uncared-for thing?

I ask that the Church's Program be made the special order for some suitable hour this afternoon or tomorrow morning, and I beg that the Clergy and Lay Delegates will make every effort to attend. The whole question of how much shall be budgeted for the work of the General Church in 1929, and how much shall be spent in the Diocese of Missouri, is the business of this Convention; also to adopt a method of apportionment to produce the necessary funds. The time to take hold is now. The place to take hold is here. There is no need that we take counsel of our failures and our fears. There is no need that we think in terms of Japan or China or Alaska or the Philippine Islands and say to ourselves that these are geographical divisions so far away that we have never seen them and are, therefore, in no way responsible for them. There is need that we look our Blessed Master in the face as men and women who understand what they say and who mean what they say when they say, "Here we offer and present unto Thee, O Lord, ourselves, to be a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice UNTO THEE!"

Within a week our President and our Secretary of State have signed the ratification of the general treaty for the renunciation of war, "and every article and clause thereof." The rulers signatory to

the document declare in the names of their respective peoples not only that they **renounce** war as an instrument of national policy in their relations with one another; but they also declare that they "condemn recourse to war for the solution of international controversies." This does not bring peace. It does prepare an atmosphere in which the peace idea may have an opportunity to grow. It does put upon all of us, I think, the responsibility of definitely laboring for peace. It does provide that, when disagreements between nations threaten, we shall not, as in the ages gone,

"....imitate the action of the tiger, Stiffen the sinews, summon up the blood."

Like rational human beings, we shall try to talk over our differences with a view to finding a way out. The Peace Pact is a long step forward. For this we may be devoutly thankful. A long step forward toward the time that shall surely be, when nation shall not lift up sword against nation neither shall they learn war any more!

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APPENDIX NO. 7

Report of the Diocesan Council For the Year 1928.

To the Ninetieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Council submits as its recommendations a report of a special committee on the Church News, and a report of a committee on an Executive Secretary, both of which reports are attached hereto and made a part of this report.

Also, the Council submits with its approval the report of a committee composed of the Rev. Dr. Jones, Dean Scarlett, and Mr. Lee Orcutt, which recommends, after conference with the Bishop, that the present arrangement of renting a residence for the Bishop be continued. This report is in response to Resolution No. 14 of the Convention of 1928.

A complete history of the financial operations of the Diocese during the year will be found in the Diocesan Treasurer's reports.

Reports of Departments of the Council are herewith attached, and will be presented in detail by the Vice-Chairmen.

Recommendations, which have been approved by the Council, for budgets for General Diocesan Expenses and for the Church Program, together with assessments and apportionments against the parishes and missions, will be presented in detail in the report of the Department of Finance.

Report on Church News.

To the Diocesan Council:

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Your Committee appointed to consider the matter of the Church News reports as follows:

This Committee was appointed to consider whether or not the publication of the Church News should be continued, and to make such recommendations to the Council as it deemed wise.

On account of the lack of support on the part of the communicants and clergy of the Diocese, the Church News Committee, composed of the Rev. F. J. F. Bloy, Rev. L. H. Nugent and Mr. R. A. Campbell, recommended to the Council that publication of the Church News be discontinued after the December 1928 issue.

(1) Your Committee strongly recommends that the Church News be continued as the Diocesan paper.

(2) Your Committee recommends that the sum of 6,000.00 be appropriated to defray the cost of publishing the Church News for the year 1929, and that a copy be sent to each family of communicants in the Diocese, ten times during the year.

(3) If the financial condition of the Diocese will not permit the expenditure of \$6,000.00 for this purpose during 1929, then your Committee recommends that the Church News be issued quarterly during 1929, and a copy sent to each family of communicants in the Diocese, at a cost of approximately \$500.00 per issue or \$2,000.00 for the year, and that the Council request the Diocesan Convention to set aside \$2,000.00 for this purpose.

(4) Your Committee recommends that the Church News Committee be given authority to print suitable advertising in the Church News, the proceeds from same to be applied on the cost of publishing the paper.

Report on Executive Secretary.

January 7, 1929.

To the Diocesan Council of the Diocese of Missouri,

Gentlemen:

Your Committee, appointed at the December 1928 meeting of the Diocesan Council to consider the advisability of securing an Executive Secretary for the Diocese of Missouri, after full and careful consideration of the matter from various angles, desires to make the following recommendation:

That an Executive Secretary be secured at the earliest possible time. Such director, to be appointed by the Council on the nomination of the Bishop, shall be in full charge under the direction of the Bishop, of all work connected with the Church's Program, and such other duties as may be hereafter determined, with the following objectives in mind:

a. Educating the minds of the people in the Diocese to the needs and privilege of taking a more vital interest in the Church's Program, "in order that the support given to the mission work of the Church may proceed from the highest motive."

b. To develop to a greater degree the consciousness of the "people to recognize the principles of Christian stewardship as expressed in regular, proportionate, and sacrificial giving, to the end that the objective of the Church shall not appear to be the raising of a financial quota, but the consecration of the giver to the fulfillment of our Lord's will in the extension and establishment of the Kingdom of God upon earth."

c. To coordinate the various Departments of the Council for greater service and usefulness.

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APPENDIX NO. 8.

Report of Committee Appointed by the Bishop To Examine into the Legal Status of Trust Funds, Etc., and To Make Recommendations to the Next Convention as to the Use Thereof, Pursuant to Resolution No. 18 of the Convention of 1928.

"RESOLVED, That a committee of three lawyers, of which the chancellor shall be one and be chairman, be appointed by the Bishop to examine into the legal status of each trust fund, to determine the powers and duties of the trustees and to make recommendations to the next convention as to the use which may be legally made of said funds or the income therefrom."

To the Diocesan Convention of 1929:

Pursuant to the provisions of the above resolution your committee begs to submit the following report:

TRUST FUNDS REPORTED ON HEREIN.

As Resolution No. 18 did not specifically identify the trust funds which the Convention desired the committee to examine and report on, your committee has followed the interpretation placed upon the words "each trust fund" by Rev. C. E. Remick, Assistant Treasurer of the Diocese, namely that the "trust funds" referred to therein include only the following:

Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund (54). Theological Education Fund (53). Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate (56). Episcopal Bishop's Residence Co. (84). Parochial Trust Fund (71). Trust Funds held by the Bishop (58).

All of the funds and trusts above listed appear in the Diocesan Journal for 1928 on the several pages indicated by the numbers in parenthesis. Funds or trusts established or declared by wills or otherwise for the benefit of any particular parish or other beneficiary are not included in this report.

Origin.

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The "funds," listed above, are of various origin. Three were created by canons of the Diocese, namely, the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, the Theological Education Fund and the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate. Two were incorporated by pro forma decree of the Circuit Court, City of St. Louis, namely, the Parochial Trust Fund and the Episcopal Bishop's Residence Co.; and six of the seven trust funds held by the Bishop were created by wills and the remaining one by declaration signed by Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle.

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AGED AND INFIRM CLERGY FUND, and THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION FUND.

Funds Created by Canon.

The Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, (See Canon 21, 1926 Edition "Of the Fund for Disabled and Infirm Clergymen") and the Theological Education Fund (See Canon 23, 1926 Edition, "Of the Fund for Theological Education) may be considered together herein.

In each case the title denotes the purpose of the fund. The powers and duties of the trustees are defined and they report annually to the convention. As no specific question in reference to the interpretation of either canon has been submitted to your committee further comment seems unnecessary.

(3) PERMANENT FUND FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE EPISCOPATE.

This fund was likewise created by canon. (See Canon 20, 1926 Edition, "Of the Permanent Fund.") The powers and duties of the Board, consisting of three lay communicants, are set out, and the Board reports annually to the Convention. Extended comment seems unnecessary except to state that while Section 2 of said Canon provides, among other things, that the "Board shall have charge of all real estate belonging to said Fund, including the Episcopal residence," yet as a matter of fact the legal title to such residence, when there was one, was conveyed and vested in the "Episcopal Bishop's Residence Co. of the Protestant Episcopal Church in St. Louis," which is separately reported on below.

(1) EPISCOPAL BISHOP'S RESIDENCE CO.

"Funds" Incorporated By Pro Forma Decree.

This company was incorporated by pro forma decree of the Circuit Court, City of St. Louis, under the corporate name of "Episcopal Bishop's Residence Company of the Protestant Episcopal Church in St. Louis," and a certificate of incorporation was issued by the Secretary of State on April 18, 1888. The corporation was formed for the following purposes:

"To acquire the title to, and to hold, support, and maintain as a residence for the bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church now or hereafter residing in St. Louis, free of rent, a house and lot situated on Chestnut Street in the City of St. Louis, heretofore bought for that purpose by voluntary charitable subscriptions of members of said church.

"The title to the property to be acquired for the purposes aforesaid shall be conveyed to said corporation direct, in its corporate name, in trust that said premises shall be held, kept up, and maintained as a place of residence for the use and occupancy of the Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church who may now or hereafter reside in the City of St. Louis, subject to the usages, and discipline of said church, with power to sell or exchange the same for money or property, the proceeds to be reinvested in property to be held and used for the same purposes as aforesaid."

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The company is managed by a board of trustees who hold office for one year and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

This company has held different pieces of property from time to time as a residence for the Bishop, premises No. 74 Vandeventer Place, being the last property so held. It was sold in January, 1925 for \$8,041.87, and the proceeds have been invested and reinvested in securities from time to time. The income, formerly paid to the Bishop, is now being accumulated with the principal for the purchase of a residence for the Bishop at such time in the future as may be determined.

In connection with this matter attention is called to Section 2 of Canon 20 "Of the Permanent Fund," which reads as follows:

"Sec. 2. Said Board shall have charge of all real estate belonging to said Fund, including the Episcopal residence, and shall pay the insurance and taxes assessed on said property and make all necessary repairs on the Episcopal residence. They shall report their proceedings to each regular Convention. (Edition 1926 p. 32)."

The Committee is of the opinion that Section 2 should be construed in connection with the purposes for which the Bishop's Residence Co. was incorporated, somewhat as follows: When property is again acquired for the purpose of a residence for the Bishop the title thereto should be conveyed to the Bishop's Residence Co. and the upkeep therefor, such as the payment of insurance, taxes, repairs, etc. should be paid from the Permanent Fund. In other words, the sole function of this corporation is to hold the legal title to property which is acquired for the purpose of a residence for the Bishop.

The company reported to the Convention in 1928. (See Journal of Convention 1928, Appendix No. 16, page 84.)

(2) PAROCHIAL TRUST FUND.

The Parochial Trust Fund was incorporated by pro forma decree of the Circuit Court, City of St. Louis, and on December 6th, 1879, a certificate of incorporation was issued by the Secretary of the State of Missouri in the corporate name,—"The Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese of Missouri."

The purposes for which the corporation was organized are stated in Article "Second" of the Articles of Association. In 1883 this article was amended so as to read as follows:

"Second. The purposes of this organization are, and shall be the holding of the title to such real estate as may be prescribed by law for Church edifices, Parsonages, and Cemeteries, and which shall, from time to time, be conveyed, transferred, or devised to it in aid of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri; and this organization shall continue for the term of one hundred years. (Corporation Record 3/2 382 Fi. Oct. 19, 1883)."

The members of the Board of Trustees are all ex-officio members, being the Bishop of the Diocese and the several members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. It reports annually to the Diocesan Convention, the last report appearing in the Journal of the 89th Convention, 1928, as "Appendix No. 10," on page 71 thereof. If the rep pears t it for t

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If it now holds title to any real estate it does not so appear in the report it filed with the Convention of 1928. In that report it appears that only personal property such as bonds, etc. were held by it for the benefit of certain funds and missions of the Church.

Trust Funds Held by the Bishop.

In respect of the trust funds held by the Bishop of the Diocese the committee finds that there are seven (7) in number, reported under the following names in Appendix 7 of the Journal of the 89th Convention, 1928, on page 58 thereof as follows:

The Gill Legacy (See Appendix—page 1 thereof).

The O'Dell Legacy (See Appendix—page 3 thereof).

The DeVinney Legacy (See Appendix—page 5 thereof).

Bishop Tuttle Trust Fund (See Appendix—page 7 thereof).

Helen K. Garth Bequest (See Appendix—page 9 thereof).

The Maffitt Bequest (See Appendix—page 10 thereof).

The Sallie A. Stephens Legacy (See Appendix-page 11 thereof).

The committee has examined into the legal status of each of the foregoing trust funds and submits herewith, as an "Appendix" to this report, a detailed statement in respect of each fund or trust, in which the following facts appear:

(1) The name by which such trust or fund is known and under which it is reported in the Journal of the Diocesan Convention.

(2) The origin thereof—whether by will or otherwise.

(3) A copy of the provision declaring such trust.

(4) The name of the trustee.

(5) The uses to which the trust fund may be applied—both principal and income.

(6) The original amount of the trust fund.

The Bishop reports annually to the Convention what securities he holds as the corpus or principal of each trust. Information in reference thereto may be obtained by referring to the Bishop's reports in the Journal.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

(1) Creation of Finance Committee.

In 1916 the General Convention enacted Canon 53. By Section 5 thereof each diocese is directed to appoint at its next regular convention and annually thereafter a Finance Committee for the purpose —among other things—of maintaining general supervision of the financial affairs of the diocese, to act as financial adviser to the Bishop and also, upon request, to the parishes. No canon has ever been enacted by the Diocese of Missouri in conformity with the above direction of the General Convention.

The committee recommends the passage by the Convention of a canon creating a Finance Committee not only because of the mandatory direction of the General Convention but because of its vital importance to the financial welfare of the Diocese, and in order that the matter may have the consideration of this Convention the committee submits herewith in draft form a proposed canon entitled "Of the Finance Committee," as follows:

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OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Draft of Proposed Canon.

Section 1. The Convention shall annually appoint a Committee of three persons of financial experience who shall constitute the Finance Committee of the Diocese. If, for any reason, a vacancy should occur in said Committee the Bishop shall appoint a qualified person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 2. The duties of said Committee shall be as follows:

(i) To maintain general supervision of the financial affairs of the Diocese; to secure simplicity and accuracy in collection and disbursements of all funds, and co-operation between the various officers, trusts and boards of the Convention or Diocese; for which purpose it shall establish its own rules and keep a record of its meetings, all of which shall be submitted annually to the Convention.

(ii) To act as advisor of the Bishop in financial matters; and upon request, as advisor to individual parishes within the Diocese.

(iii) To see to it that adequate insurance is maintained upon all Church property and that the budget system be introduced into all Parishes.

(iv) To perform such other duties relating to the business affairs of the Diocese as may be referred to it by the Bishop or the Diocesan Council.

Section 3. All investments or reinvestments, which may hereafter be made by the Treasurer of the Diocese, or by any person or officer for or on behalf of any of the various Funds, Boards, or corporations now or hereafter created by or under the jurisdiction of the Diocesan Convention and reporting thereto, shall be made in securities selected and approved by the Finance Committee. Whenever the Treasurer of the Diocese or the person or officer, charged with making investments for any such Fund, Board or corporation has on hand money for investment he shall notify the Finance Committee of the amount thereof, and upon receipt of such notice and in response thereto the Finance Committee shall select and submit one or more securities suitable for such investment.

The recommendations of the Finance Committee in respect of investments shall be advisory only in the cases of trustees acting under powers conferred by will or deed.

Section 4. No money constituting any part of the assets either principal or income—of any trust, fund, board or corporation, which reports to the Convention, shall be loaned or pledged to any other such trust, fund, board or corporation reporting to the Convention. All money or other assets belonging to any such trust, fund, board or corporation shall be held and used only for the specific purpose, for which it was given or is held, and all investments thereof shall be made as provided in this Canon.

Comment.

The first two sections of the proposed canon are practically a copy of Section 5 of Canon 53 of the General Convention. The Third section has been added by the committee and provides that the recommendations of the Finance Committee shall be advisory only in respec manda and co ventio

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respect of the investment of trust funds held by the Bishop; but mandatory in respect of investments to be made by Funds, Boards and corporations under the jurisdiction of and reporting to the Convention.

The committee notes that by Section 6 of Canon 9, "Of the Diocesan Council" the organization of a "Department of Finance" is enjoined upon the Diocesan Council. The duties and powers of this department are not specifically prescribed by canon, so the committee is not advised thereof. However, the committee is of the opinion that any powers, delegated by the Council to the Department of Finance, which are in conflict with the provisions of the proposed canon, "Of the Finance Committee," will be superseded and repealed by the proposed canon, if adopted, and that the Diocesan Council should take notice thereof and be guided accordingly.

(2) Finance Committee to Examine Present Investments.

The proposed Canon ("Of the Finance Committee), if enacted will safeguard, as far as may be, the making of investments in the future, but it does not provide for the checking up on the desirability of the investments now held by the various Funds, Boards, trusts and corporations reporting to the Convention. The committee recommend that this be done by the Finance Committee and to that end submits a proposed Resolution for consideration of the Convention as follows:

Proposed Resolution.

RESOLVED, That the Finance Committee of the Diocese examine into the soundness of the securities constituting the principal or corpus of any and all trust funds which are held by the Bishop of the Diocese or any board, fund, committee or corporation reporting to the Annual Convention. Said committee shall report in writing to the trustee, or other fiduciary of such securities, respectively, its opinion in respect of the soundness of such securities and what ones, if any, should be sold or held.

In the event said committee recommends the sale of any security it shall also recommend the purchase of some other security to be held in lieu of the security so recommended to be sold. The recommendations of such committee shall be mandatory except as to investments held by a trustee acting under powers conferred by will or otherwise.

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Bishop Tuttle's "Record" Book is mentioned in the "Appendix" in connection with several trust funds reported therein.

The "Record" book of Bishop Tuttle referred to was one kept in his own handwriting, and on page 3 thereof appears the following:

"This Book contains in its pages hereinafter following a complete Record of all the Funds held by me 'in trust,' and of the securities in which they are invested; with designation of the terms and purposes for which the Trusts were created, and direction to whom their particular properties are severally to be turned over or to be paid.

Securities Now Held in Trust by the Bishop.

GILL LEGACY.

Namo of Fund.

The Gill Legacy. (Journal of the 89th Diocesan Convention 1928, page 58).

Origin.

My desire is that said sum be placed at interest, and only the gains used for the purpose named."

Bishop Charles F. Robertson and his successor in office.

(a) **PRINCIPAL**

Uses of Trust Fund

Principal and Income.

The principal of this fund is not subject to distribution, but is to be "placed at interest."

(b) INCOME.

The income is to be used "to insure the lives of indigent clergymen in the Diocese of Missouri in the 'Clergymen's Insurance League' or otherwise, as the trustee may determine."

NOTE: While the word "otherwise" might be construed to include the expenditure of the income in the discretion of the trustee for any purpose, yet the opinion of the committee is that the testator intended the income to be applied in payment of insurance premiums rather than anything else.

Amount of Trust Fund Bequeathed.

According to Bishop Tuttle's "Record" book he received in satisfaction of the above legacy only the sum of 1,158.30, instead of 2,500.00. The records in the Probate Court disclose the fact that Mr. Gill's estate was not sufficient to pay this legacy in full, but only in part, which accounts for the difference between the sum above mentioned (2,500.00) in clause "Fifth" and the amount actually received by Bishop Tuttle.

O'DELL LEGACY.

Name of Fund.

The O'Dell Legacy. (Journal of 89th Diocesan Convention 1928, page 60.)

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Origin.

Clause "Second," "Fifth" and "Sixth" of the will of Mary E. O'Dell. Filed and probated December 1st, 1905, Probate Court, St. Louis, Missouri. Estate No. 32126.

Four separate trusts were created under the will by clauses "Second," "Fifth," "Sixth," and "Tenth." Two clauses in the will have the same numerical designation, namely "Sixth." The first one numbered "Sixth" is set out below.

NOTE: According to the "Record" book kept by Bishop Tuttle the funds received by him under clause "Tenth" have all been expended for the purpose mentioned therein, so there is now no trust fund under clause "Tenth."

Copy of Provisions of Will.

"SECOND: I give, devise and bequeath to Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Missouri, and his successor, or successors in office, the sum of Two thousand dollars (2,000.00) to be held by him or them in trust, as a permanent fund, and to be securely invested, and the income thereof to be used for expenses in burying the dead bodies of poor persons connected with Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, Missouri."

"FIFTH: I give devise and bequeath to Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Missouri, and his successor, or successors in office, the sum of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in trust to be held by him or them as permanent fund, and to be securely invested, and the income thereof to be used for the general purposes of St. Stephen's Mission, now located at Sixth and Rutger Streets, City of St. Louis, Missouri.

"SIXTH: I give devise and bequeath to Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, Diocese of Missouri, and to his successor, or successors in office, the sum of Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be held by him or them in trust, as a permanent fund, and to be securely invested, and the income thereof to be used for the general purposes of All Saints, Protestant Episcopal Church, now located at Twenty-Second Street and Washington Avenue, in the City of St. Louis, Missouri.

Trustee.

Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle and his successor in office is named as trustee in each of the four clauses.

(a) PRINCIPAL.

Uses of Trust Funds

Principal and Income.

Under Clauses "Second," "Fifth" and "Sixth" the principal is bequeathed "as permanent fund and to be securely invested." Un in bur, Church

NOTE: Since the will took effect St. Stephen's has changed its form of organization from a mission to a parish, so St. Stephen's Parish is now entitled to the income instead of St. Stephen's Mission. The change in form of organization does not deprive the parish of the income.

"NINTH. I give and bequeath unto Daniel S. Tuttle the Episcopal Bishop for the Diocese of St. Louis and Eastern Missouri, or to his successor in office the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), in Trust However; for the use and benefit of worn out and enfeebled Episcopal Ministers, residents of said diocese and whose services have been rendered in said diocese, I desire that the fund be invested in some permanent and safe manner and that the usufruct only be used for said purpose."

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Trustee.

Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle and his successor in office.

(a) PRINCIPAL.

Uses of Trust Fund

Principal and Income.

The principal is to be invested "in some permanent and safe manner" and is not subject to distribution.

(b) INCOME.

The income is to be expended in the discretion of the trustee "for the use and benefit of worn out and enfeebled Episcopal ministers, residents of said diocese (of Missouri) and whose services have been rendered in said diocese."

Amount of Trust Fund Bequeathed.

According to Bishop Tuttle's "Record" book he received Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars in payment of this bequest, and on November 26th, 1910 he purchased five bonds of the Joplin and Pittsburgh Railway Co. for \$4,859.03, investing the balance, \$140.97, in a certificate of deposit with the Mercantile Trust Co. Under date of April 8th, 1922 appears the entry "The above c/d has increased to \$752.28."

The five bonds above mentioned, together with a certificate of deposit, No. 20,683, due December 20th, 1923, for \$634.18, were delivered to Bishop Johnson in June 1923 by the executor of the will of Bishop Tuttle.

Johnson of the Episcopal Church, or his successor or successors, the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), to be used toward establishing or maintaining a church home where old women may be cared for or boarded. In the event such a home is not in existence at the time of my death, the said sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) shall be held by Bishop Frederick F. Johnson, or his successor or successors, and the income derived therefrom accumulated until such time as such home is established. In the event such a home is not established within a period of twenty-one (21) years from the date of my death, then the said Bishop Johnson, or his successor or successors, shall use the said Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), together with all accumulations thereto, for such charitable purposes as he or his successors may elect."

"Item 11. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate of whatsoever kind, real and personal, and wherever situated, at the time of my death, I give, bequeath and devise unto Bishop Frederick F. Johnson of the Episcopal Church, now residing in St. Louis, Missouri, or unto his successor or successors, to be divided by him as follows:

"(a) One-third (¹/₃) thereof unto St. Luke's Hospital, located at No. 5535 Delmar Boulevard, St. Louis, Missouri;

"(b) One-third (½) thereof unto the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, St. Louis, Missouri, for the endowment of said church;

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"(c) The remaining one-third $(\frac{1}{3})$ thereof to be used toward the establishment of a church home where old women may be cared for or boarded, and which I have mentioned in Item Six of this my will. In the event said home shall not have been established at the time of my death, I direct that the said Bishop Frederick F. Johnson, or his successor or successors, shall hold said portion of my estate, and invest and re-invest same, and accumulate the income, until such time as a home may be established. In the event said home is not established within a period of twenty-one (21) years from the date of my death, I direct that the said Bishop Frederick F. Johnson, or his successor or successors, shall use said fund, together with all accumulations thereto, for such charitable purposes as he or his successor or successors may elect.

Trustee.

Bishop Frederick F. Johnson and his successor in office.

Uses of Trust Fund

Principal and Income.

Principal and income are "to be used toward establishing or maintaining a church home where old women may be cared for or boarded." If such home is not in existence at the time of testatrix' death, the income is to be accumulated "until such time as such a home is established." If such home is not established within twentyone (21) years from date of testatrix' death then principal and accumulated income shall be used "for such charitable purposes" as trustee may elect.

NOTE: There is no practical difference between Item 6 and Item 11 in respect of the objects of the trusts and disposition of the funds mentioned in each item. There is a difference between the amounts which accrue under each item. In Item 6 the amount is definitely specified as \$2,000.00. In Item 11 the amount depends upon the value of testatrix' residuary estate and will be one-third thereof. For the purposes of bookkeeping and accounting the amount received by the trustee may be treated as one amount, indicating at the start what cash and securities were received under each item, respectively.

March 16th:

Organized for the year by election of Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Vice-Chairman, Davis Biggs, Secretary and Treasurer.

George M. Block and Davis Biggs appointed a Committee to invest the surplus funds of the Trust at their discretion.

Deed to church property at Kirksville, Mo., accepted, with the provision that there are no restrictions against, or defects in title outside of Deed of Trust for \$1,850.00 held by Kirksville Bank.

September 24th:

In accordance with the directions of the Diocesan Council and the Department of Missions and Church Extension, the Treasurer was ordered to pay, from the funds of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Missionary Fund, the sum of \$5,000.00 to the Treasurer of the Students Center Corporation, Columbia, Missouri.

November 9th:

In accordance with the request of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, the Treasurer was directed to pay to said Department the sum of \$2,087.79 for the purpose of paying Deed of Trust and interest thereon on the church property at Kirksville, Missouri.

At the request of the Treasurer an auditing committee, consisting of Vice-Chairman Rev. J. Courtney Jones and James M. Bull, was appointed to examine and audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

January 22, 1929:

The Auditing Committee reported that they had examined and approved the accounts of the Treasurer, and checked all securities, which securities are on deposit in the Safe Deposit Box of The National Bank of Commerce in St. Louis, in the joint control of the Vice-Chairman, the Treasurer and Mr. James M. Bull, any two of whom have access to said box.

The Committee reported they had checked funds on hand, deposited in the Savings Account in the National Bank of Commerce in St. Louis.

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APPENDIX NO. 12.

Report of the Diocesan Pension Fund Committee

January 22, 1929.

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It is the happy privilege of this Committee to report some impressive facts concerning the progressive development of the work of the Church Pension Fund for clergy security and welfare.

1. The Pension Fund has already accumulated and set up as a reserve the great sum of twenty million dollars as a positive guarantee that its contractural agreements will certainly be fulfilled. Positive, because this is the one single purpose for which this reserve exists. Nothing can divert it from, depreciate or disqualify it for this protective service. If the Fund should go into liquidation tomorrow, no loss would accrue to the Church or clergy thereby. In such an event, The Insurance Department of New York would seize and hold this reserve in trust for the redemption of the pensions now in force and of those promised to the clergy who still are strong for service, and unimpaired.

2. The pensions already granted by the Fund amounted, January 1, 1929, to the striking sum of seven hundred and seventy-seven thousand dollars: which means that it is now disbursing to retired clergymen and the widows of deceased clergymen throughout the Church, more than two thousand dollars every day in the year, including holy days and holidays. No such pension disbursement had ever before even been dreamed of in the Church; and it is not yet approached, the Executive Vice-President of the Fund assures us, by any national organization of any Church.

In this disbursement, the Diocese of Missouri enjoys its rightful share under the thirteen grants now in force, as follows:

Truly, he who walks the pension way is not cast off in the time of his age, nor forsaken when his strength faileth.

3. But while this unmatched pension disbursement is impressive, the rising scale of individual pensions is equally impressive. Of the 368 age allowances in force December 31, 1928, two hundred and twenty-nine had been advanced to \$750. a year, 89 to \$900. a year, and 30 to \$1,000. a year. That is, ninety-four and one-half per cent of the age allowances have been substantially raised beyond the \$600. a year promised by the pension rules. Only twenty such remain; and it is believed that the Fund will soon be able to raise these to a higher level.

And what is true, in this respect, of clergy pensions, is equally true of widows' pensions. Of the 579 in force December 31, 1928, **two hundred and forty-three** are at \$400. a year; 51 at \$450. a year, and 49 at \$500. a year. Thus 58 per cent of these pensions are importantly higher than the \$300. originally allowed. And this does not include the cases where the widow receives an additional allowance for minor children.

4. Another impressive fact is that the pension assessments actually collected during the year 1928, amounted to the great sum of one million, one hundred and forty thousand dollars—thirty-six thousand dollars higher than the previous amount.

And to this great total, the Diocese of Missouri, we rejoice to report, made an impressive contribution and established a record of which both clergy and laity may well be proud. We have been compelled heretofore to report a considerable number of pension assessment delinquencies every year. But not so for 1928. All of our current pension premiums, amounting to \$10,368.67, were promptly met, save only the small sum of \$169.60, the most of which has since been paid, and all of which will be honored, we believe, during this present month.

A worthy record, but we are not yet perfect. We are clear on the pension books for the year 1928, but not for certain prior years. Humiliating delinquencies still are charged against us. One of our parishes is delinquent for the years 1919-1924, inclusive, in the sum, including interest, of \$511.16. Another, 1919-1923, inclusive, \$284.33. Another, 1917-1918, inclusive, \$60.80, and a mission station, 1922, \$5.02. Making a total of \$561.30, upon which the Pension Fund asks this Convention to take some action, and which deprives certain clergy of a portion of their canonical pension rights.

Regarding this, the secretary of the Fund wrote to this Committee, under date of January 14th, 1929, as follows:

"So that you may have it prior to your Convention, I am enclosing herewith a schedule of all arrears for the first eleven years of the operation of the Fund due from any parish, mission or other ecclesiastical organization within the Diocese of Missouri. Could these be cleared up, it would place the Diocese of Missouri in the growing group of Dioceses which have the record of 100%. These old arrears are the ones that are difficult. The current assessments are now being paid throughout the Church with practical unanimity. It would be very gratifying if your Convention could take some action that would clear these unpaid assessments off our record."

"I would appreciate it if this matter could be presented to your Convention for consideration."

Concluding, this Committee makes grateful thanks and assurances of appreciation to Mr. C. H. Middleton, a co-member, for the conspicuous diligence, fidelity and skill with which he conducted the work of Committee during the absence of its chairman from duty.

APPENDIX NO. 15.

Archdeacon's Report to the Ninetieth Convention of the

Diocese of Missouri.

I have each year since I have been Archdeacon presented somewhat in detail, a brief outline of the character of the places in which I have ministered, their problems and possibilities. I do not think it is necessary again to tell you of them for there has been little or no change in any particular, since my last report.

I do want to say this however regarding these places which an Evaluation committee has called static, and by static they mean those missions and supported parishes which have not reported any baptisms or confirmations or growth with any degree of regularity, for it is with such missions and parishes that I am spending my time and energy.

I do not believe we can call any Christian work, static, if we have any vision at all of the future. The success of any work cannot be measured in numbers. If numbers were the chief concern of our work, then I am frank to say that many of the points where I minister would have to close the doors. But we who are putting forth efforts in the Rural sections are not working solely for the present. We appreciate the fact that we may not gather the fruit in our day because it is impossible to uproot teachings that have their roots in other generations. But realising that we are working for the uplift of humanity, intellectually, socially, spiritually and this process takes time. It is the work of a life time. We cannot look on it as a matter of investing \$100 today and getting a return of \$200 tomorrow.

Bishop Rogers in an address delivered at the Rural Conference last summer said, "What gives me hope is we have changed our whole frontal attack. Old methods changed and change has swung our way. There is the change of looking upon religion as a community instead of an individual matter. I recommend this change; it gives us an unusual opportunity. The present attitude is most favorable toward the Episcopal church. Have you found that people are saying that there is something we have that they do not get elsewhere? I am taking it as a challenge, as a problem of responsibility. Divisified ministry makes us better able to cope with problems. Our insistence upon education, our acceptance of the fine things that come out of psychology, science, art, have ministered to us so that we are able to give to a community things of that sort along with religion and soul development."

It is interesting to note how men undertake their problems in other fields. The Metropolitan Life Ins. Co. guarantees security. It was the first company to insist that every precaution be taken to safeguard the interest of the people. They were humane in it. They were the first to undertake the matter of group insurance, industrial insurance, low prices. They took vast sums of money and invested them in every community that had policies, invested the money for the good of that town. There is a suggestion in that. Facing our rural problem is something like this. We have something to give that is worthwhile. Worthwhile now as well as later. Worthwhile in reverence to God and love of our kind. We are bringing into the community something that they do not have. There is a humane element. We are not simply present in numbers. We are interested in home and in folks.

"The city shifts every way, but in the rural sections it is different. Leaders go and we have to build all up again. The rural problem, just because of its youth and its childhood, needs more of continual ministerial care than the city does. A humane interest is continued. We put our own investment into it. We are leading folks in all that we are in. We are not deserting folks who need us."

That is the problem and the responsibility of this diocese and of the whole church. I do not recommend the ill-advised investment of money and men all over the diocese but I do believe that where we have a neucleus of people, and the opportunity to minister in a community, we ought to supply or rather make the investment, of an adequate stipend for the clergy and such equipment as they need for carrying on the work.

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Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Right Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Convention:

I bring you greetings from the Woman's Auxiliary and a brief report of some of their 1928 year's work.

1928 will long be remembered as the year of the great Washington Triennial. Inevitably it influenced all our work. Beforehand we were striving to do our uttermost; in Washington we put our hand to even bigger undertakings believing that their very bigness will be our inspiration. We were officially represented at the Triennial by five delegates (our full number) one alternate and many visitors.

One of Missouri's proud moments was when the Presiding Bishop publicly thanked our former President, Mrs. Robert Burkham, for her splendid work as National Chairman of the Corporate Gift Committee. This Committee pledged itself to raise \$100,000.00 during the Triennium period and instead went over the top with \$121,000. You have probably guessed that Missouri was one of the States that oversubscribed to this fund.

Another proud and happy moment was when our United Thank Offering Treasurer, Miss Lizzie Dyer, presented Missouri's offering at the great Corporate Communion in the Washington Cathedral. She collected \$18,023.00 which was the thankful offering of **many** women instead of large offerings from a few women. At the United Thank Offering Treasurer's meeting in Washington Miss Dyer's method of gathering our offering was commended and other dioceses are now using the 'Missouri plan' as it is called.

For about three months we had in our Diocese Mrs. Arthur Gammack, a United Thank Offering Field Secretary, who visited most of our parishes and missions bringing us encouraging and some discouraging reports about our work.

Our Quarterly Meetings have been largely attended. In January we had an "All Diocesan" program with Bishop Johnson telling us of our Diocese. Archdeacon Marsden—Rural Work in Missouri. Rev. J. H. George—Mission Work in City Institutions. Miss Shipps—Some Phases of Social Service Work.

We have been told repeatedly that this January Meeting was the most interesting and helpful and asked to have another all Diocesan program in the near future.

For May we learned much about Work Among Tennessee Mountaineers from our magnetic speaker, Rev. W. E. Mellischampe.

In November we had the Story of the Triennial, given in nine chapters by our delegates and alternates.

In December our Board of Managers met to transact routine business and adopt a budget for 1929. Our 1929 year's budget carries an incrase of \$600.00 for the Church's Program making the total amount the Auxiliary will give for 1929 \$3,600.00. (Our Bishop was most appreciative of this action of the Auxiliary.)

Our Endowment and Memorial Gifts Fund which we started last January has not had a phenomenal growth because of the increasing demands sent from the Church Missions House, but it now amounts to \$1,235.00. Only the interest can be used for Auxiliary purposes. Previously to its establishment there had never been a fund which could be used for "specials" needs.

No department of the Auxiilary has done more splendid work than the Supply Department. Our hospital box valued at \$1,161.82 was sent to San Juan Mission Hospital. One of our two personal boxes went to the Diocese of Spokane and the other to an Indian Missionary of South Dakota. Xmas gifts were sent to three women workers, one in U.S. another in Havana and the third to Honolulu. Five boxes of clothing were sent to Bishop Colmore for Porto Rico hurricane sufferers. We received his most grateful acknowledgement. Besides this the Altar Section made altar linens and vestments valued at \$345.00. These were sent into six Dioceses.

Many garments were supplied for Deaconess Brainerd's work. Garments were made for the Orphan's Home and socks and scarfs knitted for Koch Hospital. Total value of Supply Work \$2,281.25.

The Social Service work of the Woman's Auxiliary was created for the purpose of reaching out a helping hand and bringing brightness to many whose lives would otherwise be cheerless. The surprisingly large total of \$4,793.04 is the accumulation of very many gifts.

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Report of Southern Convocation.

January 22, 1929.

As Dean of the Southern Convocation of the Diocese of Missouri, I beg leave to submit the following report for the year 1928.

Within the limits of our Convocation there are seven parishes and sixteen missions. Of the parishes, three are at this time without rectors,—namely, Ferguson, De Soto, and St. Charles. They are now under the care of Archdeacon Marsden. Of the missions in our field, three are under the charge of Rev. C. D. Lathrop,—namely, Bloomfield, Illmo, and Chaffee. Three are under the charge of Rev. H. N. Tragitt,—namely, Rolla, Cuba, and Salem. St. James has been until recently under the joint care of Mr. Tragitt and Rev. F. M. Weddell. The missions at Poplar Bluff, De Soto, and Ironton were in charge of Rev. Frank Maples until his removal to St. Augustine's, St. Louis, shortly before the end of the year. The missions at Ironton, Poplar Bluff, Herculaneum, Fredericktown, Bonne Terre, and Overland, are now ministered to by Archdeacon Marsden.

The church at Valley Park has been kept open every Sunday in the year by the energetic and faithful work of Mr. Richard Kopplin, under the supervision of Mr. Weddell. Mr. Kopplin is well known as one of the most valuable laymen in the Diocese, and his work at Valley Park has been productive of incalculable good to the people in that difficult field. His success is largely due to the fine assistance given him by his wife and son, and by other lay workers from Emmanuel Parish. The church building has been wonderfully improved during the past year.

The efficient service of Rev. F. M. Weddell in the Diocese came to an end at the close of 1928, as he is retiring from the active work of the ministry. He is greatly beloved throughout our Diocese, especially in the missions which he has been visiting for about eighteen years. Our grateful appreciation and loving wishes follow him as he enters upon the enjoyment of his well-earned vacation.

The spring meeting of our Convocation was held at St. James, where we were most hospitably entertained by the people of that mission. Nine of the clergy participated in an interesting program of services and discussions. On account of the meeting of the General Convention in October, there was no meeting of the Convocation in the fall of 1928.

In compliance with the requirements of Canon 51, Section I (iv.) notice is hereby given to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Church in every Diocese and Missionary District, as well as to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese that the following alterations of the Constitution, proposed in the Convention of 1928, are to be finally acted upon in the General Convention of 1931, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution.

Furthermore, each Diocesan Secretary is hereby notified that it is his duty to make known such proposed alterations of the Constitution to the Convention of his Diocese at its next meeting, and to certify to the Secretary of the House of Deputies that such action

has been taken by him.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE CONVENTION OF 1928, AND TO BE FINALLY ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1931.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article I., Section 3, by adding after the words "entitled to vote in the House of Bishops," at line 7 of the Article, the following words "except that whenever two-thirds of the House of Bishops are present a majority vote shall suffice."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

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Amend Article I., Section 3, of the Constitution so that the third sentence thereof shall read as follows:

"His term and tenure of office and duties, and particulars of his election not inconsistent with the preceding provisions, shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend Article I., Section 4, fourth paragraph, the last sentence so that the same shall read as follows:

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"In all cases of a vote by Orders, the two Orders shall vote separately, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical and one vote in the Lay Order, and each Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical Order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay Order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two Orders shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House. No action of either Order shall pass in the affirmative unless it receives the majority of all votes cast, and unless the sum of all the affirmative votes shall exceed the sum of other votes by at least one whole vote."

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

Amend the second and third sentences of Article X. of the Constitution to read:

"No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the same shall be first proposed in one Triennial meeting of the General Convention and by a resolve thereof be sent within six months to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese and of the Convocation of every Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention or Missionary District Convocation at its next meeting, and be adopted by the General Convention at its next succeeding Triennial Meeting by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies and all the Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States, voting by Orders, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical Order and one vote in the Lay Order, and each Missionary District having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical Order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay Order. Provided, however, that the General Convention at any meeting shall have power to amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the use of the Psalms by a majority of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, and all the Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States, voting by Orders as previously laid down in this Article.
