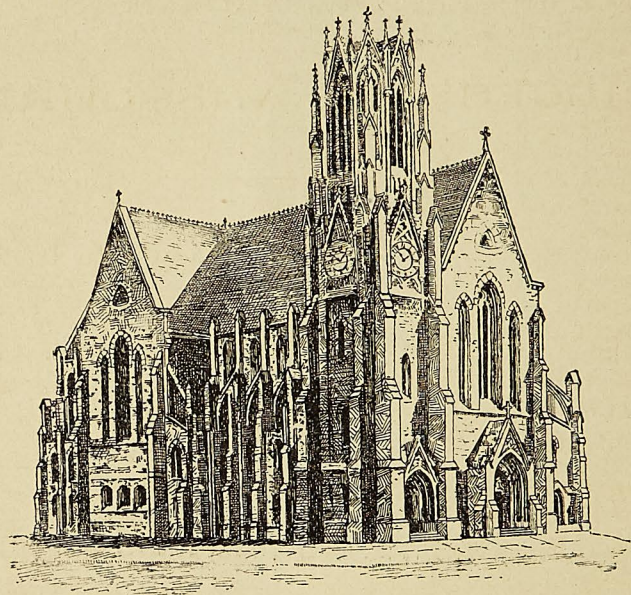

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Journal of the Fifty-Second Convention,

BEING THE

FIFTY FIRST ANNUAL CONVENTION

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Tuesday, May 26, 1891.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock A. M. the clergy, preceded by the choir of the Cathedral, entered the Cathedral, singing as a processional the 138th hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy," when the regular service was held.

The opening sentences and service to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. F. E. McManus, of St. Paul's Church, St. Louis.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. Henry L. Foote, of Christ Church, St. Joseph.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. Charles F. Collins, of Trinity Church, DeSoto.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. E. J. P. B. Williams, of St. George's Church, Bevier.

The Commandments were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Gospel was read by the Very Rev. the Dean of the Cathedral.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. E. F. Berkley, D. D., of St. Louis.

The Rev. Wm. Short, of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, then preached the Convention Sermon.

Offertory sentences were read, and notices delivered, by the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Senior Assistant of the Cathedral.

The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

After the Benediction, the clergy and choir retired to the Chapel, singing as a recessional the 145th hymn, "Holy Father, great Creator."

On reassembling in the Chapel of the Cathedral, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order, and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded, under the direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and twenty-seven clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then appointed the Rev. Messrs. W. A. Hatch, B. F. Newton and F. E. McManus, Committee on Lay Credentials.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that the Treasurer of the Diocese was present to receive and receipt for all moneys due and payable to him.

On motion of Rev. Carroll M. Davis, the Convention took a recess until 2:30 P. M.

Convention re-assembled after recess at 2:30 P. M.

The Committee on Lay Credentials reported that credentials in regular form had been presented from twenty-nine parishes, and upon calling the roll, delegates from eighteen parishes answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced a quorum of both orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

On motion of the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Mr. Jno. R. Triplett, of St. Louis, was re-elected Secretary, with power to appoint an assistant.

The Secretary appointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of St. George's Church, St. Louis, his assistant.

On motion of Mr. C. S. Freeborn, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

Cards of Rev. R. G. Hamilton and Rev. J. G. Wright, of the Diocese of Springfield; Rev. H. L. Foote, of St. Joseph, Diocese of West Missouri; and Mr. Allen K. Smith, were handed to the Secretary.

On motion of Rev. Benj. E. Reed, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order for this Convention.

On motion of Mr. W. G. McCarty, of Jefferson City, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine worship at 9 o'clock, and for business from 10 to 12:30 P. M., when it will take a recess to 2 P. M., and continue until 5:30 P. M.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that he would announce the Standing Committees at the opening of the Convention to-morrow (Wednesday) morning.

The Rt. Rev. President suggested that if the Convention could expedite the business of this afternoon's session, he would be glad to have the Convention accept the invitation to visit St. Luke's Hospital.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his annual address.

Mr. M. S. Snow offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's address referring to Canon X. be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, when appointed.

Rev. Wm. Short moved, as an amendment, that same be referred to a Special Committee of five, to be appointed by the Chair. Same was carried and resolution adopted as amended.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee—Rev. Wm. Short, Rev. F. B. Scheetz, Rev. P. G. Robert, and Messrs. Thos. K. Skinker and F. J. McMaster.

On motion of Mr. W. G. McCarty, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's address referring to the amendment to Canon XIX., adopted at the last Convention, be referred to a committee of five laymen.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee—Messrs. W. G. McCarty, J. B. Gazzam, E. J. Thomas, Frank Carter and Charlie Thaw.

The Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., Chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital, by permission of the house, presented and read his annual report. [See Appendix No. 7 A.]

On motion of Hon. J. W. Emerson, it was resolved that when this Convention adjourns, it adjourn to accept the kind invitation to visit St. Luke's Hospital.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the Convention adjourned to 10 o'clock, Wednesday morning.

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SECOND DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Wednesday, May 27th, 1891.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the Chair and called the Convention to order.

After calling the roll, the first day's proceedings were read and, on motion, approved; and the House, by request of the Rt. Rev. President, permitted the minutes to be changed by substituting the name of Mr. J. B. Gazzam in place of that of Mr. C. S. Freeborn, on Special Committee on Canon XIX.

The Rt. Rev. President then read the list of Standing Committees, as follows:

MISSIONARIES' TRAVELLING EXPENSES—Rev. Wm. Elmer, Rev. R. A. Holland, Jr., and Mr. John E. Stonebreaker, Jr.

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., Registrar of the Diocese, presented and read his report. [See Appendix No. 6.]

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., then tendered his resignation as Registrar and Librarian, on account of his residence being so remote from the Diocesan Library.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Dennison the resignation was accepted, and a vote of thanks was unanimously extended to the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., for his faithful and efficient services as Registrar and Librarian.

Cards of the Rev. M. M. Moore, of the Diocese of West Missouri, of Dean Chesnutt, of the Diocese of Springfield, of Rev. G. Tuckerman, of the Diocese of Chicago, and of Mr. Owen Meredith Waller, candidate for Holy Orders, were handed to the Secretary.

Rev. W. A. Hatch presented a supplemental report of Committee on Lay Credentials reporting St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis and Trinity Mission, St. James, entitled to representation. The Secretary called the names of the Delegates and Mr. Ludwell L. Johnson of Trinity Mission, St. James, answered to his name.

Mr. Wallace Delafield, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented and read his report. Same was on motion received and referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 1.]

Mr. Wallace Delafield, Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund, presented and read his report; same was on motion received and referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 2.]

Mr. Wallace Delafield, Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, submitted and read his report; same was on motion received and referred to Committee on Finance [See Appendix No. 3.]

Mr. C. S. Freeborn, Treasurer, presented and read the report of the Permanent Episcopal Fund; same was received and referred to Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 4.]

The Secretary of the Convention presented and read the report of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund; same was on motion received and referred to Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 5.]

Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., President, presented and read the report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, for the Conventional year 1890—91 are herewith respectfully submitted,

May 29, 1890—Organized by the election of the Rev. Montgomery Schuyler, D. D., as President, and Mr. Chas. Hofman, as Secretary, for the ensuing year; gave consent to shorten the time of candidacy of Mr. Benjamin I. Jacks, for Deacons Orders.

September 18, 1890—Approved the Consecration of the Rev. Edward R. Atwill, D. D., Rector of Trinity Church, Toledo, Ohio, to be Bishop of the Diocese West Missouri.

Recommended Messrs. Thomas J. Brown and Allen K. Smith as candidates for Holy Orders.

Instructed the Secretary to procure a new Record Book for use of the Standing Committee. Appointed a Committee of two, to ascertain the cost of an Iron Safe, for use of the Diocese.

October 23, 1890—Recommended Mr. Archer Boogher as a Candidate for Holy Orders. Allowed an order to be drawn on the Treasurer of the Diocese for seven dollars and twenty five cents, it being the cost of a Record Book and some printed matter. Empowered the Committee on Iron Safe investigation, to make a purchase.

December 6, 1890—Gave consent to the Consecration of the Rev. Henry Melville Jackson, to be Assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Alabama. Deferred action on papers laid before us by the Presiding Bishop asking approval for the Consecration of the Rev. John Wright Chapman, as Bishop of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Alaska.

December 20, 1890—Further postponed action on the case of Rev. John W. Chapman.

February 2, 1891—Recommended Mr. Francis Edward Alleyne as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Passed a Memorial Resolution on the Death of Mr. Geo. H. Gill.

March 6, 1891—Recommended Rev. Quincy K. Ewing for the Sacred Order of Priests.

Declined to take action on a request to shorten the time of Candidacy of Rev. D. L. V. Moffett for Priest's Orders.

The purchase of an Iron Safe by the Committee appointed was approved, and allowed an order to be drawn on the Treasurer of the Diocese, for fifty-five dollars, it being the cost of same.

April 1, 1891 — Recommended Mr. Samuel E. Arthur for the Sacred Order of Deacons. Papers from Mr. J. K. Brennan were read, but not acted on for reason of informality.

Postponed action on the application of Rev. D. L. V. Moffett to shorten the time of his candidacy.

April 9, 1891 — Recommended Rev. D. L. V. Moffett for the Sacred Order of Priests, and gave consent to shorten his time as a candidate.

Recommended Mr. J. K. Brennan for the Sacred Order of Deacons.

April 23, 1891 — Consented to the Consecration of the Rev. David Sessums, M. A., as Assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Louisiana.

April 28, 1891 — Met with the Rt. Rev. the Bishop as a Council of advice.

Read the Secretary's Report of the Official acts of the Committee during the Fifty-first Conventional Year, prepared for submission to the Annual Diocesan Convention.

Rev. P. G. Robert, Chairman of Special Committee appointed at the last Convention on proposed changes in the Prayer Book, passed by the General Convention of 1889, presented and read its report. On motion same was received and ordered printed in the Journal. [See Appendix No. 18.]

Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., presented and read the following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, on the Amendment to Article II. of the Constitution referred to said Committee, said amendment having received the approval of the last Convention :

"The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred by the last Convention the Amendment to Article II. of the Constitution, would report in favor of the adoption of the Amendment, with the addition after the words "State of Missouri," in last line "according to their boundaries as at present by law established, namely," as approved by the Convention of 1890, as per pages 24 and 27 of the Journal of 1890.

The adoption of same requiring the majority vote of both orders voting separately, under order of the Rt. Rev. President, the Secretary then called the roll, with the following result :

Clerical vote—ayes, 18; noes, none.

Lay vote—ayes, 22; noes, none.

The Rt. Rev. President then declared that the amendment to Article II. of the Constitution, having received a majority vote of both orders, voting separately, duly adopted, said Article II. reading as follows :

ARTICLE II. OF THE CONSTITUTION.

The Diocese of Missouri consists of the territory embraced within the City of St. Louis, and the following fifty-four Counties of the State of Missouri, according to their boundaries as at present by law established, namely :

The Secretary then called the roll, and the tellers retired.

Mr. W. G. McCarty, Chairman of Special Committee, appointed first day of this session, on amendment to Canon XIX., made the following report :

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address referring to an Amendment to Canon XIX., as adopted at the last convention, recommend that no change be made in said Canon.

Pending discussion of same, the Rt. Rev. President announced that the hour for recess had arrived.

Convention took recess till 2 P. M.

Convention reassembled at 2 P. M.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Dennison the regular order of business was temporarily suspended.

Tellers on election of Standing Committee entered and made their report.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the following members duly elected:

Rev. F. B. Scheetz presented and read the report of the Special Committee appointed at the last Convention on Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society as follows:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, reports in reference to the Resolution of the House of Deputies, as to the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society; that while convinced that it is not well, at least now, to increase the number of canonical collections, would still

desire to press the claims made on the liberality of each member of the Church, by St. Luke's Hospital, St. Louis, and the Retiring Fund for Clergymen.

On motion same was adopted.

The order of business was then resumed and the Rt. Rev. President called for Report of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society. — The Secretary not responding, Mr. F. J. McMaster, Secretary of the Missionary Board, presented and read the Annual report of the Missionary Board. [See Appendix No. 9.]

Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer of the Missionary Board, presented and read the annual report of the Missionary Board. [See Appendix No. 10.]

Rev. G. D. B. Miller, the Diocesan Missionary, presented his report. [See Appendix No. 10½.]

Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer of St. Stephen's Mission, submitted and read his report of said Mission. [See Appendix No. 11.]

Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer of the Bishop Robertson Memorial Mission Fund, presented and read his report. [See Appendix No. 12.]

Tellers for election of Standing Committee entered, and Secretary read their report. The Rt. Rev. President announced that there was no election, and Secretary was instructed to call roll for another ballot. The Secretary called the roll, and the tellers retired.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the election of the Missionary Board was next in order.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the Rules of Order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the following persons, as members of the Missionary Board:

Tellers entered on the election of Standing Committee. The Secretary read their report. The Rt. Rev. the President announced no election, and instructed the Secretary to call the roll for another ballot.

The Secretary then called the roll, and the tellers retired.

The Rev. John Davis, Dean of the Hannibal Convocation, submitted his report, which was on motion received and referred to Standing Committee on Missions. [See Appendix No. 21½.]

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the house voted to at once receive the pledges for Missions for the ensuing year.

Tellers entered on election of one Clerical member of the Standing Committee. The Secretary read the report, and the Rt. Rev. President announced no election and instructed the Secretary to call the roll for another ballot. The Secretary called the roll and the tellers retired.

Rev J P. T. Ingraham, D. D., presented and read the report of the Committee on Sunday-Schools. [See Appendix No. 16.]

Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Orphans' Home were submitted. [See Appendix 17 A and 17 B.]

On motion of the Rev. C. M. Davis the report of the Special Committee on that portion of the Bishop's Address referring to Canon XIX. fixing the fiscal year of the Diocese, together with the amendment offered by the Rev. P. G. Robert, were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Tellers entered on the election of one Clerical member of the Standing Committee. The Secretary read their report and the Rt. Rev. President announced that the Rev. P. G. Robert was duly elected, and declared the Standing Committee of the Diocese to be as follows:

Rev. C. M. Davis, as Clerical Commissioner for the "American Church Building Fund," submitted and read the report of the Commissioners for Missouri for this fund, and requested that the Rt. Rev. President appoint a Lay Commissioner, as by the division of our Diocese the Commission had been left without a lay representative. The Rt. Rev. President appointed Mr. Frank Carter as the Lay Commissioner for this Fund for this Diocese. [See Appendix No. 20.]

On motion of Mr. Chas. A. Robinson the Convention adjourned till 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

THIRD DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Thursday, May 28th, 1891.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order.

After calling the roll, the second day's proceedings were read, and on motion, approved.

The Rev. M. Schuyler, D.D., presented and read the following memorial:

"In the Bishop's address to the Convention, the death of Mr. Geo. H. Gill, late of Kirkwood, was brought to our notice in a few words of truthful eulogy, It seems eminently proper that the Convention should respond in sympathy with this notice of one, who for thirty years or more, was an active Churchman in the Diocese, and for a large portion of the time a Delegate to the Diocesan Convention. Mr. Gill was a Churchman of the old school; loyal to the Church in her doctrine, discipline and worship; having the broadest sympathy with men of different schools of thought, and yet firm and steadfast to his own well-defined principles. There has not been in the history of the Diocese a man more thoughtfully liberal, according to his means, or more wisely discriminating in his distribution. His example is one that may well be commended to us all for imitation; therefore,

Resolved, That this tribute to his memory be entered upon our minutes, with an expression of our deep sympathy with the afflicted family and the assurance of our earnest prayers in their sad bereavement."

After some appropriate remarks by Rev. F. B. Scheetz, on motion of Rev. S. H. Green, the memorial and resolution contained therein were, by a rising vote, unanimously adopted.

Rev. F. B. Scheetz, on behalf of Committee on Constitution and Canons, made the following report, on the report of the Special Com-

mittee on that portion of the Bishop's address referring to Canon XIX., together with the amendment offered by Rev. P. G. Robert, referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, on second day:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons respectfully reports that they recommend that Canon XIX. be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 5. The fiscal year of this Diocese shall be from the first day of May to the thirtieth day of April inclusive; and all Diocesan reports and all Parochial and Financial reports of Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall conform thereto.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation contained therein adopted, and the Rt. Rev. President declared Section 5 to Canon XIX. to be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The fiscal year of this Diocese shall be from the 1st day of May to the 30th day of April, inclusive; and all Diocesan reports and all Parochial and Financial reports of Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall conform thereto."

Mr. W. G. McCarty expressed his desire to pledge Grace Church, Jefferson City, for \$20 for Diocesan Missions.

Mr. W. B. Potter expressed his desire to pledge Trinity Church, St. Louis, for \$100 for Diocesan Missions.

Rev. Wm. Elmer, Chairman of Committee on Missionary Travelling Expenses, presented and read his report; same was received, and the resolution therein turning over the balance of \$1.15 to the Bishop's Purse, adopted. [See Appendix No. 21.]

On motion of Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., the rules of order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of this Convention for the Rev. John W. Higson for Registrar and Librarian of the Diocese.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the rules of order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of this Convention for Mr. Wallace Delafield, as Treasurer of the Diocese.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Dennison, the regular order of business was suspended.

Rev. P. G. Robert offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the title of the Constitution be changed and the Diocese of Missouri be known as "The Diocese of St. Louis."

Mr. W. G. McCarty offered the following amendment: Strike out "St. Louis," and insert "East Missouri."

The vote being taken on the amendment, the Rt. Rev. President declared the amendment lost.

The order of the day being called, the house gave consent to temporary suspension of the order of the day.

Mr. H. H. Dennison moved that this Convention give its approval to the original resolution of Rev. P. G. Robert.

The vote being taken, the Rt. Rev. President declared the approval to the original resolution lost. Division being called, a rising vote was taken, resulting as follows:

Ayes, 23; noes, 32.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the resolution lost.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn presented and read the report of the Committee on Assessments. [See Appendix No. 14.]

Rev. Wm. Elmer moved that the report of the Committee on Assessments as to the assessment on the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, be amended by reducing the amount assessed against said Parish to \$60.

On motion, same was lost.

Mr. Thaw moved as an amendment that the assessment of \$200 on St. Mark's Memorial be reduced to \$150.

On motion, the same was lost.

On motion, the report of Committee on Assessments was adopted. [See Appendix 14.]

The order of the day was then called, being the report of the Special Committee to which was referred that portion of the Bishop's address referring to Canon X.

Mr. F. J. McMaster presented and read said report.

The Rt. Rev. President declared that action should be taken section by section.

Mr. F. J. McMaster then moved that the first section be approved.

Pending the discussion the Rt. Rev. President announced that the hour for recess had arrived.

The Convention then took a recess till 2 P. M.

Convention reassembled after recess, at 2 P. M. Subject before the house being the report of the Special Committee on Canon X.

Mr. H. H. Dennison moved, as an amendment, that the whole report be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, same being adopted by a rising vote.

Ayes, 23; nays, 16.

Rev. P. G. Robert offered the following resolution, and asked that the same be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons sitting during recess.

Resolved, That the Committee on Constitution and Canons provide a canon for the calling of a Parish Meeting by the Congregation, as well as by the Rector and a majority of the Vestry.

On motion, the same was referred to said Committee to report to the next Convention.

Mr. F. J. McMaster offered the following amendment to Canon X., and asked its reference to the Committee on Constitution and Canons sitting during recess, to report to the next Convention:

Resolved, Canon X., add to title the words, "and of the erection of Church Buildings."

Section 2 (new)—Any Parish desiring to change the location of the Church Buildings, or to establish a Misson or a Chapel in connection with its Parish work, shall make written application to the Bishop for permission to do so, stating distinctly the object and location proposed.

Section 3—Such applications as are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon having been consented to by the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall consider the same, and, if in their several judgments the interests of the Church will be promoted thereby, they shall have power to grant the prayer of the petitioners. But they shall not deny such prayer on the ground that petitioners propose to erect or have their place of worship within said distance of five hundred yards from land acquired by another Parish for the erection of a place of worship, but upon which none shall have then been built, unless the party holding said land shall, when required, satisfy the Bishop and Standing Committee that it will proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable Church building, within two years from the date of such requirement.

Section 4—If such application as is specified in Section 1 of this Canon be granted, etc.

On motion, the same was referred to Committee on Constitution and Canons, to report to the next Convention.

On motion of the Secretary, the Committee on Constitution and Canons were empowered to sit during recess, and report to the next Convention.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed Mr. M. S. Snow, Mr. F. J. McMaster, Mr. J. A. Seddon and Mr. H. H. Dennison additional members of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Rev. W. A. Hatch offered the following, and asked its reference to the Committee on Constitution and Canons sitting during recess, to report to the next Convention :

Proposed Canon :

That the Secretary of the Convention, the Treasurer of the Diocese and the members of the Board of Missions be ex-officio members of the Convention.

On motion, same was referred.

Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., offered the following Resolution and asked its reference to the Committee on Constitution and Canons sitting during recess :

Resolved, That the subject of New Parishes and Delegates be referred to the Committee on Constitution of Canons.

On motion, same was referred.

On motion of Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., the rules of order were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Messrs. C. S. Freeborn, Frank Carter and F. N. Judson, as Trustees of the Permanent Episcopal Fund.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. J. B. Gazzam, the rules of order were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., Mr. J. R. Triplett and Mr. E. J. Thomas, as Trustees of the "Theological Education Fund".

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. M. J. Snow, the rules of order were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention

for Rev. B. E. Reed, Mr. H. W. Hough and Mr. M. W. Alexander, as Trustees of the "Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund."

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that two clerical and two lay vacancies now existed in the Deputies to the General Convention by reason of the Division of the Diocese of Missouri, and ordered an election to fill such vacancies and appointed as tellers the following: to receive the clerical vote, Rev. R. A. Holland, Jr., Mr. Chas. A. Robinson; to receive the lay vote, Rev. John Davis, Mr. E. J. Thomas.

The Secretary called the roll, and tellers retired.

Rev. P. G. Robert offered the following Resolution, and asked its reference to the Committee on Constitution and Canons sitting during recess:

Resolved, That the Committee on Constitution and Canons consider and amend Sections 9 to 16, Canon XXIV., so as to provide for taking the testimony of witnesses in the presence of the accused.

On motion, same was referred.

Rev. P. G. Robert presented and read the report of the Standing Committee on Missions. [See Appendix No. 22 B.]

On motion of Rev. C. G. Davis, the following Resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a page of the Convention Journal be devoted to that part of the Bishop's address referring to the death of Rev. J. A. Matthews, late Rector of St. Paul's Parish, Mexico.

Mr. M. S. Snow presented and read the report of the Committee on Christian Education. [See Appendix No. 15.]

Mr. C. S. Freeborn offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Standing Committees on Christian Education, State of the Church, Missions and Sunday-Schools, be instructed to report to the next Convention.

The Rev. W. A. Hatch moved, as an amendment, that *all standing committees* be empowered to sit during recess, with instruction to report to the next Convention.

On motion, the amendment was declared carried, and the resolution as amended adopted.

Tellers entered on election to fill vacancies in list of Deputies to General Convention. The Secretary read the report. The Rt. Rev. President announced no election. The Secretary was instructed to call the roll for a new ballot. The Secretary called the roll, and the tellers retired.

On motion of Rev. Wm. Elmer, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized and instructed to pay the Registrar of the Diocese the sum of twenty-five dollars to meet the incidental expenses of his office.

On motion of Rev. W. A. Hatch, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese for twenty-five dollars in favor of the choir of Christ Church Cathedral for their services at the religious services of this Convention.

On motion of Rev. F. E. McManus the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered the ladies of Christ Church Cathedral, and of the several other Parishes of St. Louis, for their generous hospitality in providing for the Clergy and Lay Delegates of this Convention, and for their cordial and delightful entertainment during its session.

On motion of Mr. Jas. Bull, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese for twenty dollars in favor of the Sexton of Christ Church Cathedral for his services during the sessions of this Convention.

On motion of Mr. Jas. Bull, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Christ Church Cathedral be selected as the place for holding the next Annual Convention.

On motion of Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D.D., the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are hereby expressed to Mr. John R. Triplett, our faithful Secretary, and Mr. W. B. Coombe, his assistant, for their valuable services during the session of this Convention.

On motion of Rev. C. M. Davis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies of the Journal printed for distribution.

Tellers entered on election to fill vacancies in list of Deputies to the General Convention. The Secretary read the report. The right Rev. President declared the Rev. Carroll M. Davis and Rev. P. G. Robert duly elected, and two vacancies in the lay representation still unfilled, and ordered the Secretary to call the roll for another ballot.

Secretary called the roll, and tellers retired.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rt. Rev. President be authorized to certify to the records of this day's proceedings.

Tellers entered on election to fill two lay vacancies of Deputies to General Convention.

The Secretary read the report: The Rt. Rev. President declared Mr. F. J. McMaster duly elected. One vacancy still remaining, the Secretary was ordered to call the roll for another ballot. Secretary called the roll, and the tellers retired.

Tellers entered.

The Secretary read the report. The Rt. Rev. President declared M. H. W. Hough duly elected a lay Deputy to the General Convention to fill vacancy.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, it was resolved that after appropriate religious services the Convention adjourn.

After a few closing remarks by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, the singing of the "Gloria in Excelsis", and a few appropriate collects by the Rev. C. M. Davis, the Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

ANNUAL ADDRESS
OF THE
BISHOP OF MISSOURI
TO THE
FIFTY-SECOND CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Our Convention is an instrument for recounting facts, and recording growth or failure. Its Sessions for us Churchmen are mile-stones passed in our earthly journeying. I may remind you that it is the second half century of the life of the Diocese that we have entered upon. Advancing age brings to us as a family a like experience with other families. A daughter has been married and gone off to housekeeping. We are sorry for our loss and do not deny that we are afflicted with a sense of loneliness. But we are glad for her happy settlement in her own domicile, and proud of the cheery vigor of her home life. She held the first Anniversary of her new relation two weeks ago, and if you will read the story in the Journal of the Diocese of West Missouri you will find, I venture to say, no call for shame or sadness over her whom, with your love and blessing, a year since, you sent forth to a new home.

Death has removed two of our Bishops from their earthly usefulness. Bishop Beckwith, of Georgia, was eminently distinguished by force and eloquence in the pulpit, and went in and out among his people in a faithful rulership of twenty-two years.

Bishop Paddock, of Massachusetts, was the head of a Diocese which, now that Missouri is divided, comprises within its Territory the largest number of souls of any in America. And a Diocese that is marked by leaps and bounds of growth and increase in Church activity during the last twenty years. To the growth of seventeen of those years Bishop Paddock, in devoted faithfulness before God, by industry, systematic diligence, righteous fair dealing, and unwearying courtesy, mightily contributed. Few men more than he have been true to duty and kind in the doing of it.

Our mother Church of England has buried two Archbishops of York. Both were active and distinguished members in the last Lambeth Conference. Archbishop Thomson was sturdy, strong, of commanding intellect and much learning, never shrinking in the least from the responsibilities and antagonisms entailed by a post of leadership. Archbishop Magee, who wore his Archiepiscopal robes for a few weeks only, was preeminent for shrewd good sense as a man and an administrator, and for the brilliancy and power of his sermons and his speeches.

One of our own Clergy has died, — the Rev. J. A. Matthews, Rector of St. Paul's, Mexico. He came to us from Ohio in 1888, and served with us for nearly three years. I knew him in my seminary days of thirty years ago. He endured hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. His heart was full of tender charity, and in the line of a loving unselfishness he lived his daily life of priestly fidelity. I was with him in his dying hours. His one personal request to me was to care for his people, and see that they have another Pastor to keep up the integrity and efficiency of the Church among them.

I ask leave to allude to the death of another Clergyman, an aged saint, the Rev. Olcott Bulkley; although by the division his place fell in the other Diocese, of West Missouri. Much of his eighty years of life had been given to faithful missionary service in the State of Missouri. Infirmities in health and reverses of fortune came to cloud his later days. But his trustful faith of soul and peaceful serenity of mind never forsook him while God was leading him home.

When the mouth speaks of saintliness, the mind and memory readily recall an example in our distinguished layman lost to the Militant Church this year. The death of Mr. George H. Gill, of Kirkwood, has taken to his rest one of the truest sons and staunchest supporters this Diocese has ever had. He had represented her in many a General Convention, and to her several Bishops, in ways unnoted and unknown by the world, he had been a strong right arm of sustentation and a loving heart of encouragement. Missions, Aged and Infirm Clergymen, Schools, Hospitals, and Students needing help had in him an intelligent, interested, and generous friend; while the simplicity of his Christian faith, the gentleness of his ways, and the sweet humility of his personal character were fitting him, in earlier days of activity and in later days of patient waiting, for entrance into the peaceful mansions whither his heart was outreaching and his treasures were sent before.

I have parted company in practical business association with another esteemed layman.

In the report of the Standing Committee to the Convention of 1867 will be found in the Journal these two items; —

“February 6, 1867, met and signed the testimonial of consent to the consecration of the Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle as Missionary Bishop for the Territory of Montana, with Idaho and Utah.

April 9., met and unanimously elected Mr. Joseph Franklin as Treasurer of the Diocese, in the place of Mr. John F. Madison, resigned.”

Thus the services of Mr. Franklin and myself to the wider interests of the Church began about the same time; he putting on the harness a month before me. His twenty years of Stewardship as Treasurer of the Diocese is an open book and an honorable, known and read by all men. Warm thanks were outspoken to him in the resolution adopted at the last Convention. But I have ventured to ask leave to give expression to my personal sadness when so much warmth of kindness and sunshine of courtesy withdrew themselves from the busy practical side of me in the resignation of Mr. Franklin.

A practical survey of the Diocese discloses some untoward things.

The burning of St. George's Church, St. Louis, in March, was a great calamity. The interruption of parochial activities at what, to City Parishes, is a most important time of the year for work, the disturbance of the Sunday-School, the distraction of the thoughts and energies of the people, and the increased stress of care and toil laid upon the Rector, in so prominent and leading a congregation, make the whole Diocese sharers in their loss and sympathizers with their sorrow. Besides, the extreme and protracted illness of the excellent assistant minister, Mr. Ewing, has been an added grief.

Shipwreck in this world's goods has overtaken the generous man, a citizen of Kansas City, who undertook to provide for the Sisters of the Good Shepherd the beautiful home which they occupy on Compton Avenue. He was to pay \$47,500 for the property; \$5,000 down, and the rest in ten yearly installments. Three of these installments he has met; paying in all, \$17,750 of principal, and \$5,737.50 of interest; total, \$23,487.50. Our warm thanks for his generous goodness and our no less warm sympathy in his distress are due to him. It is a beautiful property, this I speak of, and admirably suited for the purposes of a large boarding school. There are still \$30,000 due upon it. I cannot but hope that God will put it into the heart of some generous friend or friends to come to the help of the Sisters and myself and save the property for its good use to them and to the Diocese.

St. Luke's Hospital still labors under its debt of \$15,000. The Hospital is a priceless blessing to the sick and suffering, an honor to the City, a valuable help to medical science, and an institution of sweetness and strength to the Church. How heartily I wish it might be relieved from its incubus of debt!

Our Diocese is not a strong one. In area we have fifty-four Counties besides the City of St. Louis. But, outside of St. Louis, City and County, we have only three self supporting Parishes, viz.: Hannibal, Monroe, and Macon. Almost a third part of it, in the southeast, is absolutely unoccupied by our Church, save in the outposts of Cape Girardeau and Ironton. I have made, this year, missionary visits to unoccupied towns, such as Troy, Fredericktown, Potosi, Wentzville and Centralia. It is melancholy for me as Bishop, in finding some Church folk in them all, to note that not a few of them, out of despair of ever being able to establish regular Church services in their midst, have fallen out of line and joined, as it is called, other religious bodies. My hope is, with the smaller Diocese now to look after, and with the help of the Diocesan Missionary, to get into some of the

neglected towns and at least persuade our own Church folk to keep up heart and not let go their hold on Church loyalty and principle.

Several important places are Pastorless, — Mexico, Jefferson City, Ferguson, Louisiana, Kirksville, Cape Girardeau, St. Stephen's, St. Louis. But we are busy in outlook after Clergymen to supply them and there is no giving way to discouragement anywhere. Faithful and godly laymen are meanwhile caring for St. Stephen's, and I beg to give them warm thanks for their help. The sore need for St. Stephen's, next to a Pastor, is a suitable building down town wherein to house the whole round of its beneficent activities. Appeal has long been made for \$15,000 for this purpose. So far responses amount only to about \$5,300. During the vacancy in St. Stephen's the Cathedral Clergy will supply the need where a Clergyman's services are required.

I am happy to report that another Assistant has been added to the Staff of Clergy at the Cathedral. With the help of the Diocesan Missionary Board provision was made for such addition, that the immediate missionary needs pressing upon the Cathedral, because of its location, may be met, and that a ministerial supply may be furnished for emergencies, as in this vacancy of St. Stephen's, or in cases where other Clergymen are sick or incapacitated. The Cathedral thus provided is in shape to lend help all around when unforeseen exigencies press upon brethren of the Clergy the need for it, as well as to furnish her constant care to such institutions as St. Luke's Hospital, and the Church Mission House where Sister Eliza is doing her excellent work.

But there is another side to the picture, which is lighted up with brightness and hopefulness.

We may be a Diocese not strong, but what there are of us are united and are pulling cheerily together. There are few or no debts in the country Parishes. All I can think of are, a small one on the Church at Bevier, an installment one on the Church at Old Orchard, and two on the Mexico and Jefferson City Rectories.

Missouri Church people do not make promises that they do not fulfill. It is courage to my heart, and it is godly pride enthroned in my Bishop's mind, that our people are true and honorable in Church business matters. Dickering with a Clergyman on mean lines of parsimonious particularity; cutting short his pay before the end of the fiscal year and declining to make it good because they do not like him; repudiating assessments and playing fast and loose with promises and pledges; — these are things unknown among the Church people of this Diocese, in Country places as well as in the City, and I am warmly thankful for it and as proud of it as I can be.

Missions have not been forgotten. The twenty and more missionaries of the Diocese have been sustained, and have never been compelled to wait an hour for their regular quarterly stipends. The Children of the Missionary Host, crowding themselves out of the Cathedral, because they have grown too many, now meet annually in Exposition Hall in an Anniversary that is perfectly delightful to all who come to witness it; and by their steady gifts

throughout the year provide the Bishop with a thousand dollars for use in Missions at his discretion. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, alive, intelligent, energetic, has not only given generously for Missions but has held monthly meetings for the study of Missions this year, and has specially taken up the blessed work of paying \$500 every six months upon the grievous debt of All Saints' Church, St. Louis, now, or at least in two or three weeks to be reduced to \$7,500. And two ladies of the Woman's Auxiliary are paying steadily the dues for two Clergymen in the Clergyman's Retiring Fund Society, the best plan I know of for a Pension Fund for the Clergy.

The Children's Lenten Offerings for Domestic and Foreign Missions were one thousand dollars. They were only eleven hundred from the undivided Diocese in 1890. Their present sum is therefore most gratifying. And out of the forty-seven Parishes and Missions of the Diocese I am glad to find, on examination of the acknowledgments in the *Spirit of Missions*, that thirty-seven have given this year to Domestic and Foreign Missions. My happiness is somewhat clouded to find that ten have not given, and among them such Parishes as, Advent and St. James', St. Louis, and Cuba, Ferguson and Moberly. It is a longing of my heart that every Parish and every Mission Station of the Diocese should every year give something to the precious work of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

To my "Bishop's Purse" have been given \$2,500, and much of that has gone for Missions.

So the Missionary record is a good one. You will excuse me for reiterating how nothing touches my heart more closely than gifts and work for Missions. I know, with an intimate personal knowledge of twenty years, what blessed good, gifts for Missions do. I earnestly desire that all who love me, and all with whom I have to do, would grave in their hearts and stamp on their lives, love and work for Missions.

In Church Extension the record is encouraging. In Thayer, just over the line from Arkansas, a Mission has been organized and Bishop Pierce has there confirmed four for me. At Clifton Heights, St. Louis, another Mission has been organized and placed in charge of the Rev. Mr. Miller. At Portland, Callaway County, under the leadership of two zealous young laymen, still another Mission has been organized. One of the two young men, who has charge as Lay Reader, has applied to be admitted a Candidate for Holy Orders. The earnest work done at Portland, in the St. Mark's School which the young men have started, and the St. Mark's Parish which they are fostering, is astonishingly successful. St. Andrew's Chapel, St. Louis, under the kind care of the Church of the Holy Communion, has its lot paid for and is going on soon to build its Church. A new Mission in the City, with Sunday-School and Services on Sunday afternoons, has been opened at the Corner of Chouteau Avenue and Manchester Road. This Tower Grove Mission is now organized with the name of "The Epiphany", and is under the fostering charge of the Rector of St. Mark's Memorial Church. At Shrewsbury, a suburb near Old Orchard, a large corner lot has been given for a Church on condition of our building upon it. There is no Church structure of any sort or name there.

So in faith I am accepting the offer and am appealing for help to erect a modest building. The Rector of Old Orchard will have this Mission under his care. The Deaf Mute Mission in St. Louis is also growing to considerable proportions. It has now nineteen Communicants. The Rev. Mr. Cloud, Deacon, lives in the City and looks after it. Its members hold their regular services in the Cathedral. The Rev. Mr. Mann of Cleveland, Ohio, Missionary over a vast scope of country, comes to visit for the Holy Communion. Both these Clergymen are deaf mutes. Mr. Mann asks the brethren of the Clergy outside St. Louis if they will kindly look up Deaf Mutes and have Church people show them the places in the Prayer Book as a means of drawing them permanently to the regular services. And, he adds, it would help if the Clergy would gather the hearing children into the Sunday-School and bring them to Confirmation.

St. James' Military Academy, Macon, is in better condition than I have ever known it. The wise and faithful care bestowed by its excellent Rector, the Rev. Mr. Davis, is telling in most successful results. I ask leave to vouch in behalf of this School that parents sending their boys there will have no cause to regret their choice; and I beg the Clergy to help all they can to procure the sending of boys there. They can safely promise that the training they will receive physically, mentally and morally, will be admirable.

The Orphans' Home, St. Louis, is also prosperous. I beg to say to the Clergy of the Diocese, and indeed of the two Dioceses in the State, that if it fall to them to provide for any orphans in their cure, by sending to me or to Mrs. Edwin Harrison, the Secretary of the Orphans' Home, they will find that we can and will promptly furnish protection and support.

St. Augustine's, St. Louis, has been built. Ascension, St. Louis, has been enlarged. St. Paul's, St. Louis, has been removed to a better location and much improved. The same thing has been done for Holy Innocents, St. Louis. Columbia has enlarged and beautified its edifice, and put in an excellent Memorial Organ, and raised and expended in the Parish this year over \$7,000. Ferguson is building a Church. St. James is getting quite ready to do the same. Jefferson City has bought for itself a Rectory. St. Peter's, St. Louis, has paid off its entire debt.

The number of Confirmations this year has been 514 — by me, 510; by Bishop Pierce, 4. In the same area they were, last year, 470, a gratifying increase of 44. We are credited with 5,080 Communicants. We are accustomed to regard one-tenth as the normal percentage of Confirmees to Communicants. So this year we have passed beyond the rate.

All these facts may be recounted in the glad tone of thanksgiving; and if our Diocese be one not strong, yet her sparseness and her poverty are writ all over with life, love, work, hope, and we are not ashamed of her any way.

In October next the Convention of the members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew for all the United States is to be held in St. Louis. We are honored by this choice of our City and shall take pleasure in extending a most cordial welcome. But we all, Bishop and Clergy and young men and

women, have much to do between now and then to make the gathering a pleasant, profitable and helpful one. I need only remind you that we must not be wanting in zeal of preparation, or warmth of welcome, or loyalty of Church Spirit, or hospitality.

In matters of Church Extension I have an efficient helper in the Diocesan Missionary. In more ways than one that help avails. In records and correspondence, in visiting vacant Parishes, in getting Mission Stations into shape for calling a Pastor, in conference and counsel, and, last not least, in his painstaking Editorship of *The Church News*, my brother and old time helper in many years now past stands by me for strength and comforting. My heart is filled with loving thanks. I beg leave frankly to state that Mr. Miller and I were obliged, in order to perfect better arrangements for the printing of *The Church News*, to guarantee personally that the subscriptions from March 1st 1891, to March 1st 1892, should sum up eight hundred and fifty dollars. For this reason, to help us out with our pledge and keep us from loss, and also for the added reason that I do believe *The Church News* taken and read throughout the Diocese would deepen Church Spirit and push Church Extension, I frankly ask that the Clergy and Churchmen and Churchwomen will do what they can earnestly and practically to sustain and increase the subscription list of our Diocesan paper.

Thirteen young men of this Diocese are studying for the Holy Ministry. To me as a father all of them look for guidance, and six of them for help in necessary expenses of education. To respond as I ought I need larger supplies for this purpose than I get. I do trust that the Clergy and people on the Third Sunday in Advent, when all the services of the day speak of the Holy Ministry, will take thoughtful and generous heed to the Canonical requirement to send in Offerings for the Theological Education Fund.

The facts of the late United States census point out how steadily, decade by decade, the urban population of the country in its proportion of the whole gains upon the rural. Where souls are to be dealt with, therefore, Cities become places of eminent importance. If real estate activities may be taken as indicative, St. Louis, within its own limits and in its suburbs, is taking on a vigorous growth of buildings to be occupied as homes. May I be permitted to call your attention to the City map to show that there is much area in the West of it before you reach Cabanne that ought to be looked after in the matter of starting new Parishes or Missions; and that the whole northeast of the City, with the exception of what Grace Church is doing, is all unoccupied by us? In the immediate suburbs of the City also we ought to plant the Church. With a keen anxiety I appreciate how St. Louis is growing, and houses are building, and homes are forming, and that here, there, and everywhere, in half a dozen points that I can now think of, the Church ought to be started in their very midst. I beg the Laity to think of it, that we ought to provide these Church centres and to believe that increasing growth and immigration will sustain them. And I beg the Clergy not to be too timid of heart in counting the losses to them parochially in the going forth of one and another good man and woman from their own Congregations for the

precious and blessed work of an opportune City colonization for the Church. In the Shrewsbury venture, to which I have alluded, I earnestly hope that Church folk will thoughtfully and generously cooperate.

Within the City area the Canons provide that a Parish may not erect its Church building at a point nearer to another Church Building, or to a lot to be used for such building, than five hundred yards. And the same restriction is to be applied to a Parish desiring to change its location. The question has been asked, have the Bishop and Standing Committee as custodians of the interests of the Church the right, under Canon X., to give and withhold consents in the matter of the location of a Church building for other reasons than that the proposed building is not, or is, within the prohibited distance of five hundred yards? The Bishop and Standing Committee are of opinion that they have not the right. But differences of opinion are expressed. I submit that it might be well for the Canon in question to be considered by the Convention with the object of making its meaning clear by declaration or amendment. An opportunity would be afforded also to consider how long, under the terms of Canon X., one Parish can hold by occupancy its old location, and at the same time by intention its proposed new location, for the purpose of warning off new comers from the area of five hundred yards from each centre. This question has been asked. And, once more, in Mission Halls or Chapels, or Extension Chapels, built or projected, can the mother Parish claim, and if so how long, the power of warning off from the Mission or Chapel centres?

In the problems of City growth and Church extension therein it is of grave importance that there be no room left for practical differences of opinion, or serious misunderstandings, in the meaning of Canonical law.

Another matter of reference to the Canons is to be suggested. At the last Convention it was ordered that Section 5 be added to Canon XIX. to read as follows: — "The fiscal year of this Diocese shall be from the 1st day of April to the 31st day of March inclusive; and all Diocesan reports and all Parochial and Financial reports of the Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall conform thereto." The custom of the Diocese for a long time has been, I think, to make the statistics and reports in the Journal cover the exact year from May 1st to May 1st. Accordingly in 1887 a standing order was made by the Convention, instructing the Secretary to send out the forms for Parochial reports by April 15, and to ask that they be returned to him before May 7. When, therefore, a few weeks ago my attention was called by the Secretary to the Section added to Canon XIX., by the vote of last year, it occurred to me that perhaps the vote had been taken under a misapprehension, and that it was not considered how awkward it would be, with a Convention held near the 1st of June, to have reports brought down only to April 1st. I ventured therefore to instruct the Secretary to have the reports for this year made as usual from May 1st to May 1st. I apologize for giving such instruction for it is in the teeth of the plain command of the law. With the apology I heartily promise hereafter to obey fully if the Convention decide that it prefers the year from April 1st to April 1st, to the one from May 1st to May 1st.

I may be pardoned for asking your attention to some thoughts about systematic offerings. The simplest idea of them I can give is, — they are offerings thoughtfully made, steadily made, made upon knowledge, made from principle and not without gratitude. They are not offerings merely from good nature, or from spasmodic generosity, or from pride satisfying itself by giving, or from shame feeling its own meanness in withholding. They are offerings which recognize that God giveth us constantly all things to enjoy and asks us as constantly to return His dues in Church Expenses, Missionary gifts and Charity helps. Some men, I know, keep the account with God's purse on their books, charging themselves up promptly with a tenth of their income to be put into it. Some women, I know, thoughtfully study how much, not how little, they may allow themselves to give. Systematic offerings are outgrowths in one shape or another of some such thoughtfulness and steadiness and principle. And then it comes to pass that a generous supply to Missions and Charities does not become dependent, for Christians and Church folk, upon whether the day be pleasant or raining, and whether the pocket purse happen to have a dime or a dollar coin in it, at the time of the Sunday Collection.

Suffer me an object lesson in the matter. There are two Parishes in the Diocese whom I may, I trust, without doing anything invidious, call into the witness box for my purpose. One of them is Kirkwood. Behold her! Modestly she will bear the scrutiny of the steadiest gaze fixed upon her. Her Canonically required Collections are always made, and six hundred dollars and more year by year are poured out for Missions. The other is Monroe, a littler Sister, but clad in the same vesture of modesty and faithfulness. In a town of something over one thousand people, the cheery Spirit in which she pays her own way and the generous glow with which she goes out of her way to give for Missions are tonics of the heroic sort in my Episcopal Materia Medica. Let me call up one more, a babe in the Diocese, but a right sturdy creature. The Parish of the Ascension, St. Louis, scan her report this year. Like other growing children she needs a good lot of food for herself, but you shall find that she has sent a surprisingly large amount of supplies away from her own table for feeding and blessing others. Take time to look into these cases and you will discover that it is systematic offerings that do it; offerings steady, regular, business-like though with the business-likeness of Spiritual zeal, from week to week or month to month or quarter to quarter.

I might call out two more summonses to the witness box to show what system, and faithfulness in little things, will accomplish. The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese with its mite boxes steadily kept on the family mantel pieces. How much have you this year? Over \$200, is the answer. The Children's Lenten Offerings for Missions through the mite chests which very many of them used. How much, Children? One thousand dollars, Sir, and more. Pardon me if I cannot help adding, among those giving Sunday-Schools were Rolla, and Jefferson City, and Old Orchard, with \$50, and \$65, and \$87, respectively.

In Almsgiving in Church Services there are two things that are in my mind to speak of. The first is, I do not understand how one coming to the Holy Communion can feel that he is coming entirely in the right way unless he or she be careful to bring an individual offering. The offering, including the technical oblation of the elements of bread and wine, is an essential part of the Eucharistic Service. The offerings in gifts by the Communicants may be claimed to be an integral part. I am of the opinion that the Clergyman himself should not omit his gift. As for the people, not only every man but every wife and daughter and every boy and girl who is a Communicant should at the time of the Holy Communion see that his or her own individual offering is put in the Almsbasin to be laid upon the Altar.

The second is, in the case of our vested Choirs it looks to me as if the Choir men and Choir boys are in danger of being entirely deprived of their duty and privilege of giving in Church. The habit of utilizing vested Choirs is growing. In those Choirs, thank God, are not a few Communicants of the Church. In only one Church of the Diocese, so far as my observation serves me, is an opportunity given to the men and boys of the Choir, by means of an open velvet burse passed among them and then placed in the basin, to make their offerings in Church. By such failure Communicants are trained in a way of neglect of duty, and one and another of the Choir who sometimes desire to give for a special purpose are unable to do so. If the ladies of the Altar Guild in every Parish would see to the providing of two suitable burses that could be quietly passed throughout the Choir from one member to another during the Offertory and then be placed in the Almsbasin, the defect could be cured.

Brethren of the Clergy, the days of the years in which our lot is cast, are those of congested activity and disturbing unrest. We are not fitted for the age we live in if we be not active also; active in guidance of Vestries, Guilds and Committees, of Sunday-School work and Confirmation classes; active in watchfulness over the Congregation and its growth, in Pastoral calls and cares and pleadings, and in Priestly duties. But an insidious danger lurks in the activity. We may be swept off our feet into its noisy current, and cease to be students and readers and thinkers and writers. Let us not deceive ourselves. Sermons thought out and not extemporaneously vociferated are things yet of value. Thinking is a power. Reading is a duty. Writing is a training in robustness. Study is such needed replenishment of capital as, neglected, will stunt and dwarf the growth of the business we have in hand. Alas, I know how the daily little duties press like clans of stinging insects settling upon us hapless victims. And I grant the little duties must be done, faithfully and God fearingly done. Nor do I forget that the Master saith, "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much." And I know that God regardeth adverbs more than verbs. So, do the things of active duty, day by day, little and great; and may God give you time and strength for the doing. But fix your will, systematize your time, beg your friends, beseech your Parishioners, so that you may set apart some hours for the study. Shut yourself in there and read and pray and think and write.

Your library den and its books may be a mine of golden riches to you, if you will work in it, and work at it, and work out of it, the current coin which you need as the world's clearing house calls for your daily balances of Ministerial responsibility. O, brethren, in the interchanges of activity with which the nineteenth century is all alive, let us not suffer other forces of daily interest so to ride over our heads as to crush down and crowd out of us those that should be our own, the mental, the studious, the reflecting, the prayerful.

In personal humility, but in the painstaking thoroughness of intellectual labor, be it ours to claim that in the Priest's lips there is still a wholesome keeping of knowledge, whatever be the abundant supplies flung out from the news editor's pen, and the platform's talk, and the reformer's visions.

As for the sad unrest of the age, what better thing can you and I do than stand fast in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and in the steady unchanging fixedness wherein Church faith and Church history, Church principle and Church habits and Church worship, have anchored us.

In some quarters a desire manifests itself of playing fast and loose with the dogmatic faith of the undivided Catholic Church of the first four General Councils. Argument with that sort of looseness is not in order. Primitive testimony, clear and unequivocal, certifies us what Christ bequeathed and the Holy Ghost taught and the Apostles held to as the faith. The dogmatic certainties, such as the Incarnation and the Resurrection, were and are fixed. If any one nowadays come to us to open up questioning on any such fundamental matters of the Catholic Creed, let him not think strange if we give him as slight heed as would the mathematician before whom questioning should be made whether the sum of the three angles of a triangle be exactly two right angles. We tell him, you waste your breath. To open closed questions up to questioning is quite absurd. And as for argument, in deepest ways, and clearest ways, and completest ways, intellectual and spiritual, the truth was threshed out fifteen hundred years ago, and it is the veriest chaff on which you are bringing your flail down now.

If there be abroad a Spirit of unrest and disintegration and playing fast and loose with Catholic truth, my own watchword for protection and battle cry of defense would be the Prayer Book. Loyalty to the Prayer Book sums up loyalty to Church faith and to Church history, to Church principle and Church habits and Church worship. The Prayer Book to us in America I am accustomed to regard as the bulwark. Its powers for conservation of truth and neutralization of error seem to me immense. And when I know of a Clergyman allowing himself in habits of inexactness to play fast and loose with the Prayer Book, even in little things, in its rubrics and directions, in its additions, permissions and abbreviations, I confess to experiencing a shock of sensitive dread. Does not my brother know that *Anomia* is the disease of the age, and the demon that America needs most to cast out as by fasting and prayer? Will he not, therefore, for truth's sake, and for patriotism's sake, set his face as a flint against wilful disobediences and careless inexactnesses in his use of the Prayer Book in the line of its laws and prescriptions?

Dear brethren all, it's the old banner of Primitive Truth that we march under. It's the four-square line of battle upon the Bible, the Creed, the Sacraments, and the Episcopate, that we are drawn upon before the eyes of Him our Commander-in-Chief. Let us stand steady. Trustful in Him, hopeful of our cause, true to duty. Bereft of outward strength you and I may seem in this Diocese by our late division. A feeble folk and an unimportant Church we may be counted alongside of the thousands of other religious names here in Missouri. Yet we bate not one jot of hope, nor lose one heartbeat of courage; for, our weakness may be doing best service before God in upholding the Divine Standard, and perpetuating fixed dogma, and preserving the true proportion of the faith, while, in all personal lowliness of mind but with a swelling sense of honorable fidelity that may not be suppressed, we proclaim ourselves the loyal disciples of the Church of the ages, the stout anvil on which many and many a contending hammer has worn itself out by pounding.

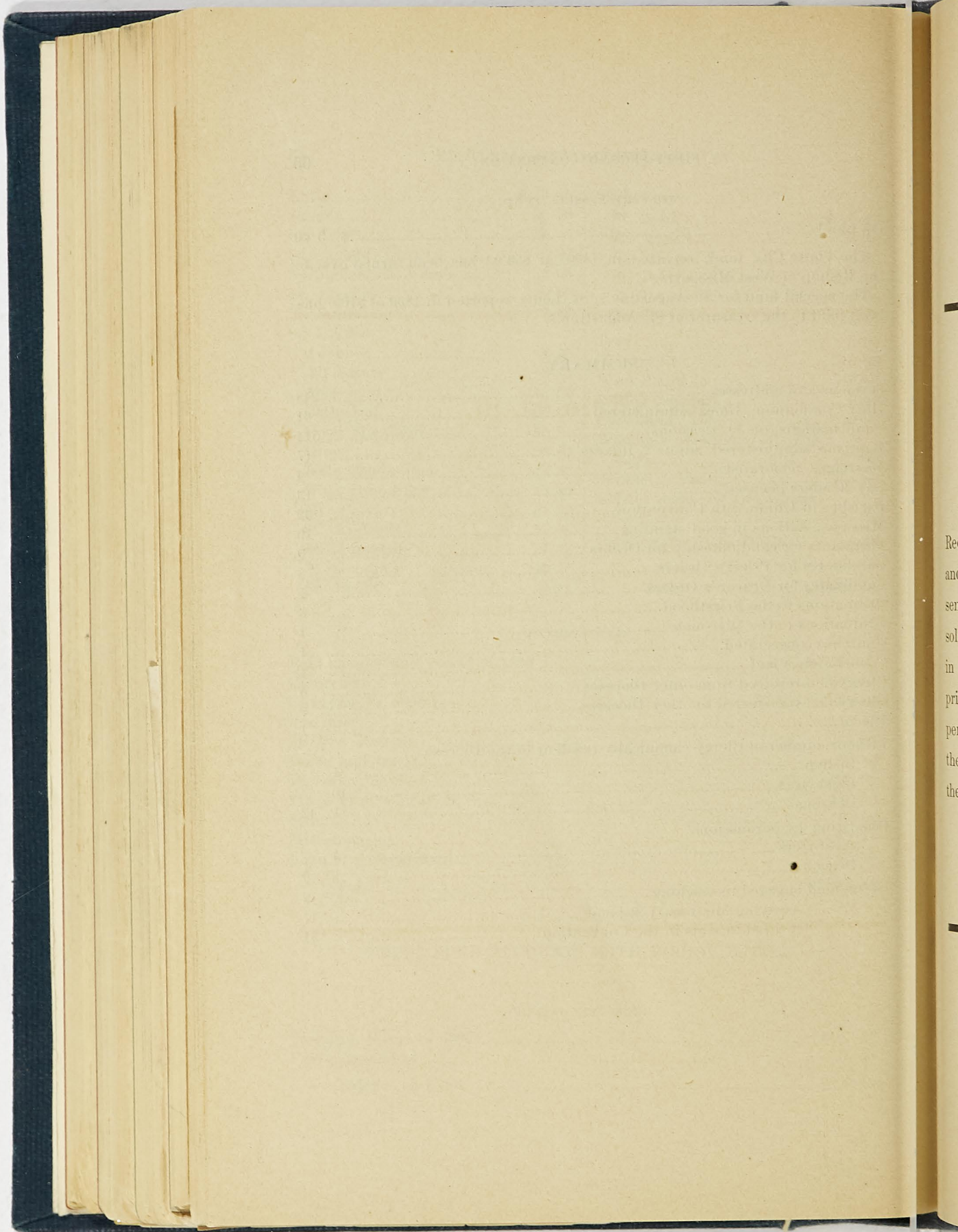

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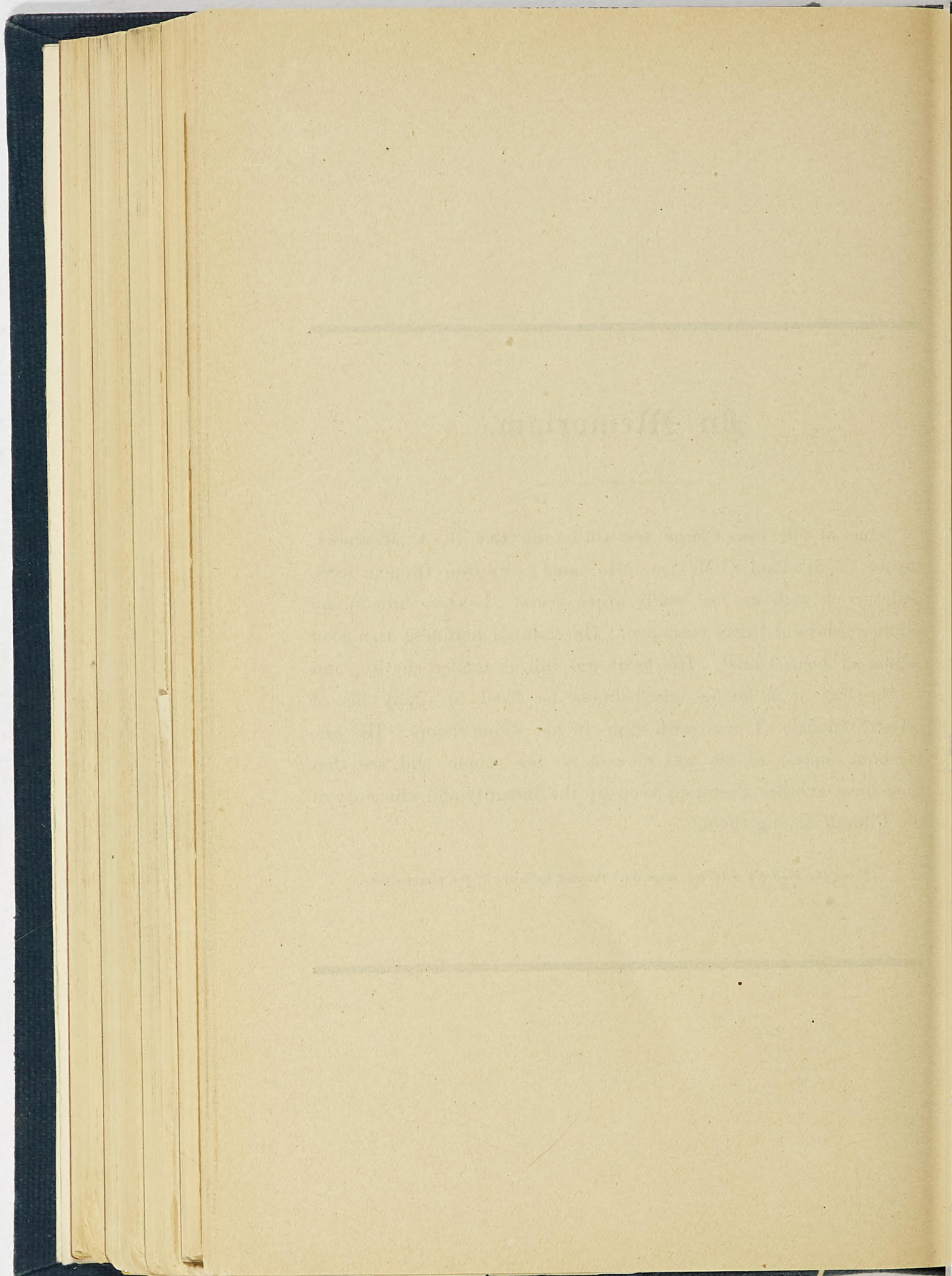


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In Memoriam.

Report of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust
Fund of the Diocese of Missouri.

ST. LOUIS, MO., May, 1890.

The Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund would respectfully report that on

October 23, 1890—A request, presented from the officers of St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis county, to encumber the property specified as "a part of lot 9 of subdivision of Geo. W. Campbell, known as Blendon Place," to the amount of \$550, for purposes connected with the Church building, was granted and the proper officers were instructed to execute a deed of trust and five promissory notes for \$110 each, dated September 1st, 1890, and payable one, two, three, four and five years respectively, with interest from date at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable annually.

At the request of Albert G. Wells, of Greenfield, Dade county, Mo., the Board instructed the proper officers to make a deed reconveying the title to lots 1, 2 and 3, block 4, in Albert G. Wells' Addition to the town of Greenfield, Dade county, Mo., to said Albert G. Wells, it having been shown that, since the date of original conveyance, December 25th, 1870, no Church building had been erected in Greenfield and no Church organization of the Protestant Episcopal Church had ever existed.

A request of All Saints' Church, Nevada, Mo., to encumber their Church property to the amount of \$1,000 for Church building purposes, was granted and the proper officers were instructed to execute and deliver to the American Church Building Fund Association of New York City a deed of trust and five promissory notes, dated September 15th, 1890, and payable at one, two, three, four and five years respectively, for \$200 each, with interest from date at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable annually.

A request from Committee on behalf of St. Phillip's Church, Joplin Mo., for permission to sell lot 81, of Porter's Addition to Murphysborough, now in the city of Joplin, in order to procure two lots more favorably located, was granted and the proper officers were instructed to prepare and execute the necessary deed.

May 21, 1891.—Information having been received by the Board that a Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese of West Missouri has been incorporated and is now prepared to receive conveyances of titles to property within the jurisdiction of the Diocese of West Missouri, the necessary deeds for the conveyance of such titles are being prepared, in accordance with the recommendations of this Board to, and the instructions of, the last convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

The Registrar and Librarian of the Diocese would respectfully report that during the past year there has been added to the Library 18 bound volumes of Theology and Church history, from the Rev. William Short, and 4 bound volumes of the Church Review for 1890 have been given by the Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D. From every Diocese copies of Convention Journals have been received chiefly through the hands of our Diocesan Secretary. A number of books have been loaned during the year. The Librarian would repeat, that it is quite impossible to keep the books in decent condition in their present locality. The cost of dusting and cleaning during the year has been about \$10.00. Again the Librarian asks that the entire care of the Librarian and the duties of Registrar be placed in the hands of some member of the Cathedral staff, and to this end he now respectfully resigns the honorable office to which you have repeatedly called him.

APPENDIX NO. 7 A.

Report of Chaplain—St. Luke's Hospital.

TO THE RT. REV. DANIEL S. TUTTLE, D. D.:—

It becomes my duty again, as the year rolls round, to report to the Convention as the Chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital, what has been the work for the past year, and what the prospect for the future.

In speaking of my work, so far as spiritual results are concerned, very little can be ascertained by bald statistics. Great good may be achieved in the secret and steady growth of spiritual life, by the ministrations to the patient in the sick room from day to day, of which no report, save that which the angels bear, can find a record. It can only be known to the Searcher of all hearts, how many go out from the private room, or the ward, better instructed, and strengthened for the fierce warfare with the world, the flesh, and the devil. The seed is being sown day by day, which may spring up and give early signs of life and growth; or lie concealed for months or years, to be developed into fuller strength and a more tenacious life.

There is a weekly celebration of the Holy Communion in the Chapel, on every Thursday, at 11 A. M., and also on all the Holy Days of the Church. This service is designed, not only for the inmates of the House who are convalescent, and able to attend, but also for any communicant of the Church in the City, without regard to

Parish lines. And it is encouraging to know that an increasing number are availing themselves of this privilege, and especially persons of infirm health, whose feebleness would not justify attendance upon a full morning service.

The Sunday afternoon service, at 3:30 P. M., has been continued without intermission throughout the year; though attended usually by a very small number. It would seem, since this service is entirely free, that Church men, and especially Church women, who cannot attend at night, would gladly avail themselves of this privilege. Notice of this service is hereby repeated, and all are heartily invited.

The Rev. Mr. Davis has a short service and instruction every week, on Tuesday evening, in one of the wards. A Guild of St. Barnabas, for Nurses in the Hospital, has been organized, of which he is the Chaplain. He has a special service and instruction for them once a month, with a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion. Eight of their number are communicants. It has been arranged that one of the Clerical Staff shall be at the Hospital at some hour during every day to supply, as far as possible, the need of a Resident Chaplain.

The Hospital has reason to be congratulated on the continuance of the devotion and watchful care of Mrs. Chambers, as its present head; and, also, of an increasing number of well-trained and efficient nurses. Sister Eliza, as heretofore, has cared for the Chapel, the Altar, and sacred vessels; and, also, kept account of the receipts and expenditure of the offerings for the year past, which have been devoted to current expenses, and which have availed to this end, without drawing upon any other source of income.

In the death of Rev. James A. Matthews, which occurred at Mexico on the 8th of March, 1891, the Board lost a faithful, devoted, ardent and zealous Missionary, to whom no sacrifice in his Master's cause was too great, and whose life and works stand forth as the best monument that can be erected to his memory.

The Board paid his widow the amount that would have been due him on the 31st of May.

The Board extends its hearty congratulations on the manner in which the pledges made at the last Convention have been met and paid. Doubtless it may be surprising to learn, that the Diocese has contributed to Diocesan Missions in the past year within \$1,100 of what it did before it was divided. Truly then, too much praise can not be given to the system of pledges, and the liberality of those who have esteemed it a blessed privilege to give. But the Board takes occasion to remind the Convention that it is purely a business Board; that it is compelled to make its appropriations at the beginning of the Missionary year, and unless it has some idea of the amount of money to be raised for the great work, can not intelligently enter into contracts with its Missionaries.

Outside of the City of St. Louis and its suburbs, there are only three Parishes that are self-supporting Does not this statement give you some idea of what a great Mis-

sionary Diocese this is, and convey to your minds the fact that the main support and life of the work in the Diocese rests with the Board? The Bishop is powerless without the assistance of the Board, and the Board is helpless without your aid. It is left with you, therefore, to say whether or not this great work shall go on with renewed efforts and the Gospel of Christ be spread. Your ability and willingness has been proven in the past, and the Board is confident that when you are called upon to renew your pledges, you will place your standard still higher, with the comforting assurance that God will help you reach it.

Report of Diocesan Missionary.

ST. LOUIS, May 1, 1891.

To the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Missouri.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—During the past year, under your direction, I have had four classes of duty:—1. Missionary work in the Diocese. 2. Official correspondence and writing up the records of the Bishop. 3. Editing the *Church News*. 4. The care of St. Augustine's and St. Matthew's missions. The work in these two missions has been directly in line with the duties of the Diocesan Missionary, and the details will be found in the usual parochial reports. Outside of these I have officiated eighty-two times in twenty-six different parishes and missions. I have administered the Holy Communion thirty-one times, delivered forty-eight sermons and addresses, baptized one adult and three infants, and attended four burials. The cold skeleton of a report gives no idea of the good resulting from a few services at a vacant parish or mission. The Church and Christian life is quickened, the earnest workers encouraged and strengthened, and many shepherdless ones retained loyal to the Church of their love.

The *Church News* demands considerable time and attention. During the year we have changed our publisher. Mr. Geo. W. Matthews, who has published the *News* nearly from its first issue, deserves honorable mention for his loyalty to the

paper and warm interest in its welfare. On the first of March it was decided to place the publication of the *News* in the hands of the Grocer Publishing Company. For this reason the report below covers the period from May 1, 1890, to March 1, 1891. The receipts from subscriptions are \$670.43, from advertising, \$172.10. Total, \$842.53. Expenditures:—Printer's bills, postage, stationery, etc., \$804.62. Leaving a balance of \$37.91. Number of subscribers, 1,602. The income from subscriptions is steadily increasing. The falling off has been in advertising receipts, resulting chiefly from the fact that we relinquished the contract with an advertising firm who had previously farmed out the whole paper, imposing a class of advertisements that were thought unsuitable. The advertising is now entirely in the hands of our new publishing firm, with more favorable prospects for the future. At the last meeting of the Council of the Diocese of West Missouri, the *Church News* was adopted as the official paper of the Bishop and Diocese, and with a continuance of the cordial help and sympathy of the Clergy and Laity of both Dioceses, we have good hope that the *News* will become a familiar friend in every Church home in Missouri.

APPENDIX NO. 13.

Report of Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

*To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the
Woman's Auxiliary:*

So fast the days come and go and one Auxiliary year succeeds another, that it is only by a close reading that we find that with the same box packing, the same missionary pledges and missionary interests that these years are not all alike, that each one has its special interests that gives it a place of its own. But when we look over the ten years which to-day sound an epoch in our history, as we have recently done in the Missions Class, we can see that these years have wrought such changes in the interest, in the spirit of our work, that by no member of the Auxiliary could our tenth year and our first or our fifth be mistaken for each other.

Since our report a year ago our Branch has been divided, and the Woman's Auxiliary in West Missouri has sprung forth grown into existence. Through your kindness I attended its first meeting with Miss Emery and assisted in its organization last June. The greatest interest was manifested throughout, and I realized more fully how much more could be done and how much more might have been done, if the officers could go about the Diocese and give a more personal interest to the work. It seems to be the only way now for us to look for a greater growth, and I have you to thank for the pleasure and privilege you gave me.

The figures in this report are flattering as they have been before from year to year, and we have gone forward in spite of our division, but in one way we have over-

estimated our strength. Last May we pledged \$250 for the Church Missions House in New York. Pledges for \$145 were made at our meeting and it was expected that the remainder would be forthcoming during the year, but we seem to have forgotten that and taken up other specials, and now while we have given more money, much more than ever before, we find our first pledge unfinished. In every other way we see progress. The Mite Boxes have brought in more, so that we have a balance in the treasury of \$15 from them after paying \$200 for our scholarship at the school of the Good Shepherd. The Bishop Robertson scholarship has been met by the Alumnae of the school and two or three special gifts, two notes of \$500 each have been paid on the debt on All Saints' Church, \$100 has gone to Japan for a new school, a scholarship taken in St. Mary's Orphanage, China; \$100 sent to Nashotah, \$100 to the Diocese of the Platte, our pledge of \$50 paid for Diocesan Missions and \$25 sent to the Bible House for Foreign Missions. Holy Innocents', Oak Hill and St. Paul's, South St. Louis, have been helped in renovating their Church buildings, and that best gift of a rectory has gone to one of our Missionaries. These have been the specials this year and all our former work and pledges have been kept up. At our meeting last fall, Miss Carter praised us for the one thing wherein we differed from any Auxiliary she had ever known, the praise was deserved, and may we go on to claim it more and more, "that we are the only Auxiliary that gives more in money than in boxes." Yet there are some feeble parishes that would gladly work for boxes but have no money to buy materials, and perhaps another year we can solve the problem of providing materials when they can be procured in no other way.

APPENDIX NO. 15.

Report of Committee on Christian Education.

Your Committee on Christian Education submit the following report:

There are three schools in the Diocese under the care of those who have the interests of the Church at heart. These three are as follows:

The School of the Good Shepherd for girls, under the charge of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd, situated at 1613 South Compton avenue, St. Louis.

St. James' Military Academy for boys, at Macon, under the care of the Rev. C. G. Davis.

St. Mark's Intermediate School for boys, at Portland, Mo., under the charge of Messrs. F. E. Alleyne and Jas. H. Gill.

Encouraging reports are received from these institutions.

The School of the Good Shepherd has in actual attendance eighty-three pupils, of whom twenty-seven are boarders.

St. James' School has fifty pupils, of whom thirty-eight are boarders.

St. Mark's has fifteen scholars, of whom four are boarders.

The reports received indicate encouraging prospects. The Bishop in his address has called attention to the present condition of the property of the School of the Good Shepherd. The school will be continued, as arrangements are being made to borrow a sufficient amount to make the remaining payments on the property, and the school will be opened as usual in September.

St. James' School should receive a larger recognition from the clergy and laymen of the Diocese. The rector asks for contributions to a library, which is much needed.

Can we ever estimate the importance of Christian education, especially in this age? To train the spirit, the body and the mind is to develop the entire manhood or womanhood, and to instil into our boys and girls the eternal verities of the faith, as well as to teach them the facts of history, the beauties of literature and the intricacies of science, is the special work of our Church schools. Let our people give them their most cordial support.

APPENDIX NO. 16.

Report of Committee on Sunday-Schools.

Your Committee on Sunday-Schools would respectfully report:

We find in the summary of Sunday-School Scholars, as reported and published in the Journal of the Diocese one year ago (the Diocese then undivided), a sum total of 6,034 scholars. If we equally divide this number with the new Diocese, we may estimate as having in the Diocese of Missouri, at the present time, at least 4,000 scholars. These children are under the care and oversight of faithful pastors, under whom are faithful teachers. The number of teachers to these 3,017 scholars is, as reported, 364, or about an average of 11 to a class. These children are, as we all know, carefully instructed in the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, "and all other things which a Christian ought to know and believe to his soul's health."

There is reason to believe that not quite all of these children were baptized in infancy, but, by the care and faithfulness of their teachers, many received baptism as members of the Sunday-School, so that in answer to the question, "Who gave you your name?" all can truthfully answer, "My Sponsors in Baptism."

During the year 1890 there were, in the undivided Diocese, 763 infant Baptisms. Making in 10 years, if all should live, an army of 7,630 children in Missouri, sealed with the sign of the Crucified One, and growing up to be true soldiers of Christ. And looking at the confirmation column of the same year, 1890, we find 793 confirmed; just 30 more confirmed in that year than the number of infants baptized in that year. This is merely a curious coincidence. But it points in the direction of our Sunday-School instruction, and to the outcome of what our Sunday-School instruction should be. We do not know the proportion in our Confirmation Classes of those baptized in infancy or childhood; but, from statements of a number of the Clergy, possibly 75 per

cent. In the year 1890 there were 266 *adult* baptisms and 793 confirmations. The adult baptisms being but one-third of the number confirmed. It certainly seems very desirable, that in our returns to the Bishop of persons confirmed, we should add whether baptized in the Church or elsewhere, that we may distinguish our own children who come to confirmation.

But the object of these remarks is to impress more deeply upon the minds of our Churchmen the blessed fruit of the careful nurture of *her own baptized children*. While it is our duty to lengthen our cords, it is a more important duty in regard to Sunday-Schools to strengthen our stakes. To this end the Church should carefully and conscientiously train her own children, as members of Christ, children of God and inheritors of the Kingdom of Heaven. They should be thoroughly and carefully taught *every doctrine* of the Church as they can receive it. They should be taught the Services of the Prayer Book. They should be taught to unite with the great congregation in the Worship of the Church. They should be made to feel their position and responsibility as members of the Church. In this day, when in all directions the walls and fences are being broken down, we must bind our own children with cords of instruction to the very horns of the Altar.

We, as pastors, parents and teachers, have great reason for encouragement; let us be more and more careful and faithful to carry out in our Church children the vows and pledges of baptism, that the Church everywhere may send forth companies of strong men and women as teachers of the Holy Catholic and Apostolic truths of Christ.

APPENDIX NO. 17 A.

Report of Secretary of Orphans' Home.

EASTER TUESDAY, March 31, 1891.

Another Easter season brings to us the duty of presenting to our friends and the public the condition and needs of our Home, as well as the privilege of expressing our gratitude for their continued favor and patronage.

Last year it was only through the especial exertions of the managers that we were enabled to obtain a much needed repair fund. This year we are able to say with sincere gratitude that our improvements and comforts are the results of gifts and bequests, and that for the first time in the history of the Home the managers have not felt the necessity of resorting to entertainments or special pleas for special objects.

The Virginia Christy Endowment Fund from Mrs. Smith's estate, mentioned in last year's report, has been received.

The sum of \$3,000 has been added to our permanent fund, the gift of Mr. Charles Parsons, in fulfillment of the wish of his deceased wife. These sums have been loaned at six per cent interest on real estate. These investments and other items of inter-

est pertaining to the finances of the institution may be found by referring to the Treasurer's report, which shows a balance in the treasury of \$1,440.70. This surplus is what we depend upon to liquidate this month's indebtedness and to meet the expenses of the Home until next autumn, as there will be few collections made until that time.

Our present income, as will be seen upon examination of the Treasurer's report, amounts to about \$4,000; our annual expenditure to about \$7,000. This deficit is made good by annual collections. Our heartiest thanks are due to our annual subscribers, for it is upon them that we largely depend for our support.

By vote of the Board of Managers it was resolved to apply the Christmas donations each year to some definite purpose rather than to general expenses.

This provision has enabled us this year to refurnish the nursery dormitory, which is now a matter of pride to the institution. Owing to the generous gift of \$100 from a friend, a new floor has been laid in the girls' dormitory, and other conveniences supplied. Through the generosity of a manager the reception room has been refurnished. The kitchen and laundry have been kalsomined through the kind consideration of another member of the Board.

The children's bath room and lavatories have been rearranged and refitted, and we feel that we have cause for congratulation upon the present creditable condition of the institution.

There are other needful changes in the interior of the building, as well as on the grounds, which are desirable. A portion of the ground in the rear might be paved and made to serve a useful purpose, as a playground, and in other ways. The outer buildings and general surroundings are demanding attention and improvement, which would add to the appearance as well as to the comfort and convenience of the Home; but we must wait until the means are at hand.

Christmas eve was a time of rejoicing. Two large trees, contributed by Professor Trelease, of the Botanical Gardens, were beautifully decorated for the pleasure of the children, not one of whom was forgotten in this celebration of the natal day of our Saviour, who came into the world a little child to save it, and who said: "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of God."

The annual Christmas dinner was attended by the Bishop and Rectors of Christ Church Cathedral, St. George's, St. John's, St. Paul's, Trinity, Grace and Ascension Churches. It gladdens and encourages the hearts of the managers to have the clergy manifest their interest in the Home by their presence on this annual occasion. Other friends are gladly welcomed.

We have received during the year forty-nine children; one has been adopted; four have been indentured; fifty restored to parents and friends; two have been stolen by relatives; and one has been removed by death. Present number in the Home, fifty-four.

There has been little sickness, and no serious illness in the Home. The children have been afflicted, though not seriously, with sore eyes. On the recommendation of Dr. Saunders, the Board of Managers recently elected Dr. Henry Wolfner, oculist, which position he obligingly accepted. Before this was done one of the children, Avery Frost, was sent to St. Luke's Hospital for treatment, and this child was the first to occupy the Bishop Robertson free cot.

Grateful mention may here be made for the care and kindness shown to those of the children who have needed treatment by the St. Louis Children's, Martha Parsons' and St. Luke's Hospitals.

In October we were called upon to part with our kind matron, who served in the Home for sixteen years, fourteen years having been spent in charge of the nursery

and two years in the capacity of matron. She felt that the time had come when her own family, raised in the Home, were entitled to the care so long and patiently exercised in the interest of the larger family of the institution. It is with the heartiest feelings of appreciation and esteem that we recall her long and faithful service. Her place is not yet filled, but we trust we may soon find a worthy successor.

For the purpose of conveying information to its friends and patrons, as well as to those in need of its care and protection, the Home has, during the past year, for the first time, distributed a catalogue, together with a prospectus and Bishop's leaflet.

Thanks are due to the Chouteau Transportation Company for their invitation to the children to participate in their boat excursions; to President Green for a ticket of free admission to the Zoological Gardens of the Fair Grounds; and to Mrs. Levi Joy for tickets of admission to the Exposition.

We desire to express our thanks to Misses Frances Markham and Annie Shepley for introducing into the Home their admirable kitchen-garden system. If education consists in training all of one's faculties so as to make them most available, it would seem a start in the right direction for the children of the Home. Their lessons in washing, and scrubbing, and sweeping, table setting, and dish washing are carried on to an accompaniment of appropriate songs, which they sing with a gusto that fully testifies their enjoyment. When we hear their cheery voices proclaim:

"We should know how to wash, we should know how to scrub,
And to do all our work without any hubbub,"

We feel, as their song goes on to say, that they are indeed being fitted to fill a useful place in the great world they live in, and that the lesson is one which is wholesome and of practical value.

Thus neatness and order are inculcated, and they are taught that "there is a best way" to do even the simplest things, and that cheerfulness and work may be made to go hand in hand.

We wish to thank those who have remembered us in sending gifts of provisions and clothing to the Home, and those who have been ready, heart and hand, to render assistance in church guilds and at other times when called upon. In this way the kind thoughts and good will of many kind friends have been made effective by deeds of active charity and love.

We wish cordially to express our gratitude for the kindly services of our chaplain, the Rev. B. E. Reed; for the gratuitous services of our physician-in-charge, Dr. Saunders; for the assistance rendered by the Advisory Committee; and for the valuable legal counsel of Mr. Thos. Skinker.

APPENDIX NO. 18.

Report of Special Committee on Changes in the Prayer Book.

The Committee appointed at the last Diocesan Convention to consider the changes in the Prayer Book proposed in the General Convention of 1889, respectfully report: That they recommend the approval of Resolutions I. to III. inclusive.

They recommend the disapproval of Resolution IV. changing the ninth petition in the Litany to make it read: "From fire and flood; from earthquake, lightning, and tempest; from plague, pestilence, and famine; from battle and murder, and from sudden death"; — because (1) the present form sufficiently includes the additional evils enumerated, and therefore the change proposed is unnecessary; that (2) if it is proposed to make these additions, they do not go far enough, or include a sufficient number of disturbances of a similar character; and (3) the rhythm of the sentence as at present constructed, is utterly destroyed, and the petition overweighted.

They recommend the approval of Resolutions V. to XX. inclusive.

They recommend the disapproval of Resolution XXI., changing the sentence in the Prayer of Consecration in the Order for the Administration of the Holy Communion, from, "He may dwell in them, and they in Him", to, "He may dwell in us, and we in Him." In the phrase as it reads at present, we pray for everybody except ourselves — the proposed change would make us pray for no one but ourselves. The present construction is ungrammatical, and can only be corrected by a return to the exact form of the Scottish office — "Whosoever shall be partakers etc." We recommend to this Convention to respectfully pray the General Convention to restore the word "Whosoever" to its proper place, deleting the uncouth phrase which has been substituted for it; with a request to refer to the Committee on Constitution and Canons the question, whether a grammatical error cannot be corrected without sending the proposition down to the Dioceses; and, therefore, whether the Convention of 1892 would not have authority to take final action in this case. That was done when an error in the General Thanksgiving was corrected, making the sentence to read, "that we shew forth Thy praise", instead of, "that we *may* shew forth Thy praise." The precedent was then established of removing such evident blunders by the Convention in session; and the suggestion is made to deal with this one in the same way, as the mind of the Church is evidently set against any further delay in establishing the Standard Book. But we ought not to permit a stubborn conservatism, to compel us to continue rubrically ungrammatical.

They recommend the approval of Resolutions XXII. to XXXIII. inclusive.

They recommend the disapproval of Resolution XXXIV., inserting St. Luke xviii. 16; and Revelation vii. 16, 17, after the three opening sentences in the Order for the Burial of the Dead. It is presumed that these additions are intended for use at the burial of a child—but they are not only unnecessary; they destroy the force and cloud the meaning of the present arrangement. The Minister now meets the body at the door of the Church with a message of Christ to the dead—"I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord; he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me, shall never die." To which the dead, whether child or adult, responds at the mouth of the pall-bearers—"I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that He shall stand at the latter day upon the earth. And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God. Whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another." Then the Minister and people, together with the pall-bearers as the sponsors for the dead, say all together, as expressive of their faith in the very face of death—"We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the Name of the Lord." While it is true this order is not observed at the burial of the dead, yet it is evident that the three opening sentences are framed upon this theory; and to add other texts now, would destroy the beautiful significance of the whole.

While the Committee gratefully receive the morsel of comfort given in Resolution XXXV., which divides into two the piece of scriptural breccia called a Psalm, in this Office for the Burial of the Dead, yet they desire to express regret that the whole of the Thirty-ninth and Nintieth Psalms have not been restored. We should then be completely provided with the means of distinguishing between the burial of the young and the old, for which there seems to have been a desire on the part of many in the Church, since the Nintieth Psalm might then be used only for middle aged and old. Your Committee therefore recommend the approval of this resolution, with another question to be proposed to the General Convention—Whether it would be unconstitutional for the American Church to substitute these Psalms as the Holy Ghost inspired them, for the human improvements which have been put in their place?

Resolution XL. may be approved, but we think the old form the better.

The Committee ask permission to suggest that the General Convention be urged to add St. Luke ix. 37 to the Gospel for Transfiguration Day. The Gospel as at present appointed, omits the promise to those Apostles by which the Transfiguration is the fulfillment—thereby obscuring the revelation which our Blessed Lord makes of the origin and nature of His Church. The Committee ask to have the question decided whether it is constitutional to correct an error in the treatment of the Word of God; and to pray them to deal with this one, before it becomes crystalized by habit and use.

APPENDIX NO. 19.

*Report of Special Committee on Part of Bishop's Address
Referring to Canon X.*

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's address relating to the interpretation of Canon X., beg leave to report:

1. That in the opinion of this Committee, under Canon X., there is no restriction upon the power of the Bishop as to giving or refusing his consent to a petition, either for the organization of a new parish, or for a change in location of the church building of a parish already in union with the Convention. This opinion was arrived at by a vote of four to one.

2. That in the opinion of the Committee, the Standing Committee, under Canon X., in passing upon a petition for the organization and the location of the church building of a new parish, are bound to consider whether or not the interest of the Church will be promoted thereby. This opinion was reached unanimously.

3. The majority of your Committee are of the opinion that the Standing Committee, under Canon X., in the matter of the location of the church building of a parish already in union with the Convention, are bound to consider other reasons than that the proposed building is not, or is, within the prohibited distance of five hundred yards, to wit.: whether or not the best interest of the Church will be promoted thereby. This opinion was arrived at by a vote of three to two.

4. The minority of your Committee are of the opinion that the Standing Committee, under Canon X., in passing upon the removal of the church building of a parish already in union with the Convention, are to consider only the question of distance.

5. Your Committee are of the unanimous opinion that one parish can hold by occupancy its old location and at the same time its proposed new location, for the purpose of warning off new comers from the area of five hundred yards, for the period of two years from the date it shall be required by the Bishop, to satisfy him and the Standing Committee, that it will proceed in good faith to the erection of a suitable church building.

The Committee find several discrepancies in the Canon and recommend its revision.

APPENDIX NO. 22 A.

Report of Standing Committee on Missions.

Your Standing Committee on "Missions of 1890," beg leave to report as follows:

Though the past year has not seen the progress in establishing missions in unoccupied fields which was hoped last year, we are still grateful for what has been done. There are still in this Diocese thirty-three counties in which the services of the Church are never heard. This is a reduction of two since last year. From what your Committee can learn, the missions of the Church in the Diocese, have, in the main, been strengthened, still there has not been that great ingathering, for which we have all hoped and prayed.

In St. Louis the work has made some progress—St. Andrew's fund for building is still growing, but it seems a sad thing, that in this great city, when a fully qualified man stands ready for the work, and has been laboring as best he can, for many months is compelled to seek his support in a secular calling, that, from among all the wealth of the Church in St. Louis, a competency cannot be given to a priest, so that untrameled he may pursue his sacred calling.

St. Augustine's at Benton is not only being firmly rooted and grounded, but its missionary has reached across the valley intervening and has started a promising work at Clifton Heights. The Shrewsbury Park Co. kindly offered the Church a corner lot with 100 feet front, in their beautiful sub-division, and other substantial help. Plans have been drawn; at least \$1,000 is needed at once in order to comply with the Company's liberal conditions.

The Rector of St. Mark's Memorial has also in charge a mission of great interest and promise, and seems destined to supply a long needed want in the vicinity of Tower Grove Park. Beyond these your Committee know of no new work.

Is not this the time to call attention and to arouse a deep and profound interest in Church work in this great city? It is not too much to say, that there is progress, a tidal wave of the population Westward—a movement which is bound to effect existing parishes, for it is simply impossible for those who move into many of these new neighborhoods, to attend services in their old homes. Some have tried it, their attachment to their Rectors, to the familiar pews they have known so long is beautiful to see, and often most touching, but at last they find attending Church five or six miles off, and perhaps compelled to take two or three lines of cars, is simply a physical impossibility. What then are these people to do? Are they to stay at home and lose interest in their Church life, and let it wither? Are their children to drift into the Sunday-school of other religious bodies which seem to be everywhere, and so lost to the Church? We answer an emphatic, No! and say without a moment's hesitation that such a course is criminal and destructive of Church growth. What we need and must have at once is a number of missions established. Such, for instance, as the Ascension in Cabanne Place, where from fifteen communicants less than three years ago, there is now a parish of eighty-five, and a splendid property all paid for, and before it a magnificent future.

It is impossible in a report of this kind to notice places where strong missions might be started. Neither ought we to confine our efforts to the west of Grand avenue, for east of it there is room for a great work to be done.

In view of these facts your committee would suggest that to use these opportunities money is needed. \$10,000 placed in the hands of the Bishop to help good men minister to those who help themselves would be a start in the right direction; pay a good man while the mission is erecting a modest building, is one of the best ways to help along this work, of retaining our own for the Church and gathering others into our fold. May God stir up some souls to consecrate some of their wealth to Church extension of this kind; and further your committee would add, that this is no time to draw back, but to press forward to the enlarging of the missionary work in every direction.

APPENDIX NO. 22 B.

Report of Committee on Missions.

The Committee on Missions respectfully report:

That they have received from the Rt. Rev. the Bishop an application from eleven persons, the Rev. A. W. Mann, Priest, and the Rev. Jas. H. Cloud, Deacon, asking for the organization of a Deaf-mute Mission in this Diocese. It is presumed that the request will certainly be granted; and it presents an occasion of great gratitude to Almighty God, that His Church can minister as acceptably as she does, to these children of the Father, who, though locked out from the world of sound, yet use her services without difficulty, and find them suitable to their needs. The Rev. Mr. Mann has been ministering for many years now to this class of parishioners most acceptably, and it is a pleasure to learn that he has an assistant to take from his shoulders a part of the great burden he has borne so long alone. It ought to be made a matter of record, that Mrs. Bailey, the mother of one of the signatories, has by her indomitable energy, and a faithful persistence which would take no rebuff, made it possible for this Mission to exist, and that to her exertions it is due that a course of deaf-mute instruction has been introduced into the public schools. Her life has been quiet and humble; but her success in these directions has been amazing. Her faith has never wavered, and she has proved to be a true missionary.

The Committee has also been furnished with the report of the Dean of the Hannibal Convocation. His convocational jurisdiction covers nineteen (19) counties, with an estimated population of 350,000 souls. And yet the Church is only represented by seven actively engaged Clergymen. Three important parishes are vacant just now; so that a full corps would only number ten. What are these among so many? That Convocation is endeavoring to raise \$1,200.00 per annum to secure a missionary, who will give all his time to this region of the State. The resolution is a noble one, and your Committee can only hope that it may be successfully carried out.

Without trenching on the province of the Committee on the State of the Church, we may yet be permitted to put before the minds of this Convention the startling fact, that what we call "Missions" have so far yielded but little of that fruit of a spiritual sort for which they are presumed to be maintained. Much indeed has been done for which we thank God and take courage — but much too has been thrown away after it has been begun, due perhaps to the languor or spiritual indolence of those who have undertaken to continue the work. Bishop Robertson once made the statement that several Missions which were in a most flourishing condition, when it was thought necessary to organize them into Parishes, began to dwindle as soon as they had passed out of the hands of women into those of men: and for such wrecks who is responsible?

The plan suggested by the Dean of Hannibal is most practical, provided this general Missionary will be content to occupy positions which he will be able to hold, and cause to grow into firm and stable strongholds of the Church of God. But after all, the best and surest method for the Church's welfare, as well as for the spiritual development of the Parish, is for each Congregation to undertake at least one or more Missions on its own account, and build them up into Parishes. Each of these in turn

will become centres from which additional influence will issue: until the City or the County shall be overspread by those agencies which the Holy Ghost has created to make known the Saviour's Name to a world lying in wickedness.

It does not come within the compass of the duties of this Committee, to do more than refer to Church Schools as Mission agencies — yet so they prove to be, unless religion is made a part of school duty, and forced upon boys and girls as duty only. But it is hard to estimate the number of Parishes that have grown up in this land, as the consequence of the energy and fidelity of some Church girl or young man, who perhaps first of all heard of the Church and her blessed ways from the teacher he loved.

The Committee is not prepared to go with more minute detail into the parts of Mission work which have grown and strengthened in the past year: but they look forward with good heart to the future of the Church work in this Diocese; which, if it is diminished in area, offers opportunities for more concentrated effort. If the City Parishes would plant out roots and send up suckers here and there around their limits, more money would be available to build fortresses in the counties for the defence of the faith, the edification of the Church and the general Missionary operations of the Church.

APPENDIX NO. 23 B.

 Report of Hannibal Convocation.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri:

I herewith submit my annual report of the work of the Convocation of Hannibal for the year ending April 30, 1891:

During the Convention of 1890 an informal meeting was held to discuss some practical questions arising from the Division of the Diocese and the consequent adjustment of boundaries and transfer of Clergy. At this conference the Bishop of the Diocese, and Rev. F. B. Scheetz, Dean of the Convocation of Kirkwood, were present, and shared in the discussions. The present Dean was also recommended to the Bishop for reappointment for the ensuing year.

Following the adjournment of Convention the Diocesan issued this official notice:

MONROE, MO., JUNE 12, 1890.

In accordance with the wishes of the meeting of the Clergy held in St. Louis, May 29, 1890, I hereby declare the Diocese of Missouri to be divided into two Convocations — the Kirkwood and the Hannibal. The Hannibal Convocation embraces the following counties: Adair, Audrain, Boone, Clark, Knox, Lewis, Macon, Marion, Monroe, Pike, Ralls, Randolph, Schuyler, Scotland and Shelby (15). Of this Convocation I hereby appoint Rev. John Davis, Rector of Trinity, Hannibal, to be Dean. The Clergy embraced in it are: Revs. C. H. Canfield, C. G. Davis, John Davis, W. A. Hatch, J. A. Matthews, J. A. Wainright, E. J. B. Williams and W. H. Watts.

Our Fall Sessions were held in St. James' Parish, Macon, Oct. 10—12, 1890. All the Clergy were present except Rev. W. H. Watts, of Columbia, while our ranks were increased by the recent coming of Rev. L. M. Holden, of Mansfield, Ohio, to take the Head Mastership of St. James Academy, Macon. No lay delegates attended. All the assigned duties were faithfully performed, and the most encouraging feature of the business sessions was the hearty endeavor to place at an early day a Convocational Missionary in the field.

The Winter Sessions were held at St. Paul's Church, Mexico, January 27,—29. Except the rectors of Columbia and Boonville all the Clergy attended, but without any lay representation. At this meeting the Diocesan also kindly timed his appointments so as to be present, and preached the convocational sermon. Revs. D. L. V. Moffit of Jefferson City, and J. W. Higson of Marshall, West Missouri, were present as visiting Clergy and lent timely aid in the services and discussions. The subject of securing a Convocational Missionary was again pressed, and some practical and hopeful plans were suggested. The chief obstacle being that of the financial, the Dean

was asked to see what could be fairly and safely pledged by the Missions and Parishes of the Convocation and the rest should be asked of next Convention. It was unanimously agreed that a sum less than \$1,200 would fail to secure the proper Missionary for this arduous and important work.

Directly after this Convocation, under date of Feb. 12, the following official notice was received from the Bishop: "I this day detach from the territory of the Kirkwood Convocation the counties of Lincoln, Montgomery, Callaway and Cole, and transfer the same to the Hannibal Convocation".

The usual Spring Sessions were appointed for Grace Church, Jefferson City, in April last; but the resignation of the parish by Rev. D. L. V. Moffit, the Deacon in charge, and his consequent removal to the Diocese of Kentucky, prevented our assembling.

During the year Rev. L. M. Holden has been transferred to the Diocese of West Missouri; Rev. T. W. Doggett, to the Diocese of Virginia; Rev. D. L. V. Moffitt, to the Diocese of Kentucky; and Rev. E. J. P. B. Williams has resigned Calvary Church, Louisiana, and taken charge of St. George's Church, Bevier, and adjacent Missions; Rev. C. H. Canfield has resigned charge of Trinity Church, Kirksville.

Since our last session one of our number has been taken from the Church militant to the Church expectant. The Rector of St. Paul's, Mexico, REV. J. A. MATTHEWS, on the morning of Mid-Lent Sunday, was summoned to the refreshment of the Beatific Vision in Paradise. During his last hours the Dean was called to his bedside, heard his confession, and gave the consolations of Absolution and the Blessed Sacrament. With an unswerving faith in CHRIST, and with his last words dwelling among the parish and people he had served so long and well, he passed to his rest. "*Requiem aeternam dona ei, Domine.*"

In concluding this report, the Dean is profoundly conscious of the great task before this Convocation, and of our limited means in performing it. The Convocation has now nineteen (19) counties, with an estimated population of 350,000 souls. This is itself a large Diocese, and should have constant and efficient Episcopal supervision. To man this work we have at present only seven actively engaged Clergy. Three of our important parishes are vacant, and the struggling Missions are famishing for the Bread and Word of Life. Anything looking towards Church extension in this vast field with our present force of workers is of all things most hopeless. The Convocation has with one consent expressed the conviction that our only relief is in a special missionary, who, under the guidance of Bishop and Dean, shall go through the land seeking out the scattered children of the Church, baptizing, preaching, strengthening; forming missions where there are none, and encouraging the languishing ones to go forward. To do this we must have the man; to get the man the Convention must furnish the means. May GOD, the HOLY GHOST, whose Baptism of Fire the Church is once again commemorating, stir up the hearts of His faithful people to devise the things liberal enough for this pressing need!

APPENDIX NO. 24.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary
Society.

ARTICLE I—NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

ARTICLE II—OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who together, with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under directions of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within his parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

SECTION 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

APPENDIX A.

Rules of Order.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Unfinished Business.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education.
 - VIII. On Sunday-School Work.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Travelling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Naves.
11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more Pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course and without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

My Dear Bishop:

Grace Church Parish is in a transition state. The best and most able, financially, are steadily diminishing the Parish Roll, by removing into the western part of the city or into the suburbs, and there is no prospect of any change for years to come. Still, the field of labor is full of work to be done. Families of wage workers, who care for no Sect, but who with a little attention and instruction would come into the Church; and a countless number of English families everywhere abound. Grace Church with only one pair of "the feet of them that bring good tidings," and with every effort, cannot make much impression on the field. The whole of North St. Louis is a Mission field, and the work can only be at all accomplished—First, by making Grace Church a *strong centre*—by a strong corps of workers who shall extend cards in all directions, or else by establishing Lay Mission Schools at different points. But the first would cover the second, and keep Grace Church strong. Grace Church must not be allowed to go to decay. In my own heart I feel, and I have had a broad and varied experience, that if any active young man could be placed here with me, it would be a good paying investment spiritually—and financially for *the Church in the City*.

FROM REV. AUSTIN W. MANN, IN CHARGE OF DEAF-MUTE CONGREGATIONS.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—I respectfully submit the following report of Church work among deaf-mutes during the Conventional year just closed.

Services have been held at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, and Trinity Church, St. Charles. Holy Communion was celebrated five times at the former.

Baptisms—Christ Church, Cathedral, 4.

Confirmations—Christ Church, Cathedral, 7.

During the coming year I hope to serve Hannibal and other points, including Fulton, which is the seat of the State institution for the education of deaf-mutes.

I have served thirteen other Dioceses this year, besides Missouri. Missions planted by myself during the past sixteen years in the large cities have been served as frequently as possible. This year thirty persons have been received into the Church by holy baptism, and thirty-two presented for confirmation.

In sixteen years 553 deaf-mutes and their children have been received into the Church by holy baptism, and over 400 deaf-mutes brought to confirmation. Contrary to a somewhat general impression, these children can hear and speak like other children. They should be looked after by the Rectors and led through the Church services and Sunday-school to confirmation and the Holy Communion.

During the year just closed I attended the Twelfth National Convention of Educators of the Deaf, held in New York City, and the third re-union of the Pennsylvania Association of deaf-mutes at Pittsburgh. On invitation, I acted as chaplain of a re-union at Toronto, Ontario, where several persons were baptized, and a service held at St. James' Cathedral.

As St. Louis increases in population, it may be time to broach the subject of a Church for the deaf. New York and Philadelphia each have one, so has London, Liverpool, and other English cities. When one for St. Louis is to be had, it should have the accessories of rectory and parish house. It would be the centre of work for city and Diocese.

The Rev. James H. Cloud, M. A., who left last year to assist at All Souls' Church for the Deaf, Philadelphia, returned to St. Louis last September to take charge of the city school for deaf children. Since then he has assisted me in Church work at the Cathedral. He reports having performed the baptismal service three times, and prepared seven candidates for confirmation. In addition to services conducted in the afternoon in the Cathedral Sunday-school rooms, he has conducted a Bible Class of adult deaf persons. During my visits to St. Louis he has assisted at services morning and afternoon. I hope that the time is near when a comfortable support can be provided by the Dioceses west of the Mississippi which will enable him to give his whole attention to Church work. In his present work he depends for support mainly upon the salary paid him as principal of the school just described.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.—As in past two years so during the one just closed. I have been hospitably entertained at St. Luke's Hospital.

The New York and the Bishop White Prayer Book societies have again favored the Mid-Western Deaf-Mute Mission with prayer books and tracts.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—Since appointed by you as chaplain of the "Church Mission House" in September of last year, I have regularly attended to the duties of that position, by monthly services and otherwise.

I have also celebrated the Holy Eucharist in the Churches of St. John's, Trinity and St. George's, in this city, and in Emmanuel Church, Old Orchard, during the absence of the Rector, in all fifteen times; held entire, or taken part in, thirty-five services; preached seventeen times, and performed one funeral service.

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Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the Fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent.
