

Rules of Order of Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Assessments.
 - III. On Christian Education.
 - IV. On Constitution and Canons.
 - V. On Finance.
 - VI. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - VII. On Missions.
 - VIII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IX. On State of the Church.
 - X. On Sunday School Work.
 - XI. Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the services of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the house may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote to the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Seventy-third Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, on May 28th, 1912, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in St. Peter's Church by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. C. M. C. Mason read the Epistle, and the Rev. B. E. Reed read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention Sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix No. 1.)

After the service, the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the William Short Memorial House, with the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Thirty-six were present, thirty of whom were entitled to vote.

The Rev. Mr. Dooris, for the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, presented its report. (See page 19.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary called the roll of Lay Delegates to the Convention. Delegates from twenty-four parishes and missions were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Bishop announced the election of a Secretary in order.

Mr. Denison nominated Mr. C. Hunt Turner as Secretary of the Convention.

Mr. Denison moved that the nominations be closed, and that Mr. Remick cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. Turner.

Motion carried, Mr. Remick cast the ballot as instructed and the Bishop declared Mr. C. Hunt Turner elected Secretary of the Convention.

On motion, the Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

Mr. McMaster offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9:30 o'clock in St. Peter's Church, and for business in the William Short Memorial House at 10 a.m. to 1 o'clock p.m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 o'clock p.m., and continue to 5 o'clock p.m.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. McMaster, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, offered the following amendment to the Constitution:

Amend Section 1, Article V. of the Constitution by adding to that Section the following: "The Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall have a seat and vote in the Convention, except as hereinafter specified", so that the Section as amended will read as follows:

"Section 1. The Convention shall be composed of Clergymen and Laymen. The Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall have a seat and vote in the Convention, except as hereinafter specified."

Amendment referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. McMaster, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, offered the following amendment to the Constitution:

Amend Section 2 of Article VII. of the Constitution, by inserting after the word "direction" in the third line of said Section the words "of the

Bishop Coadjutor, or should there be none", so that the Section when amended shall read as follows:

"Section 2. The direction of Divine Service during the sessions of the Convention shall rest with the Bishop alone. In the absence of the Bishop, all services shall be under the direction of the Bishop Coadjutor, or should there be none, of the President of the Standing Committee."

Amendment referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. McMaster, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, offered the following amendment to the Constitution:

Amend Section 1, Article VIII. of the Constitution, by inserting after the word "Convention" in the third line of said Section the words "the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside, or should there be none", so that the Section as amended shall read as follows:

"Section 1. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be, *ex-officio*, President of the Convention, but in case of his absence at the time and place appointed for any session of the Convention, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside, or should there be none, the President or other clerical member of the Standing Committee shall call the Convention to order, and if a quorum be present, a presiding officer shall be chosen, ad interim, from among the Presbyters in attendance; and if the Bishop shall at any time leave the chair he may appoint a Presbyter to preside in his stead."

Amendment referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. McMaster gave notice that on the next day he would offer the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Section 1 of Canon IX. by inserting after the word "Bishop" in the second line of said Section the words "the Bishop Coadjutor", so that the Section as amended shall read as follows:

"Section 1. At each Annual Convention, three Clergymen and five Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, and the Deans of Convocation of the Diocese, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of Missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries and for Mission purposes in the Diocese."

Mr. McMaster gave notice that on the next day he would offer the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Section 3, Canon IX. by inserting before the words "The Board" at the beginning of said Section, the words "In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside; if both be absent", and by striking out the words "in the absence of the Bishop" in the second line of said Section, so that the section when amended will read as follows:

"In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside; if both be absent, the Board shall have the power to elect from its members a Chairman pro tem; to appoint its own Secretary and Treasurer; to fill vacancies during the recess of the Convention; to make by-laws and rules; and to do all such other acts as may be needful to carry out the office and trust conferred upon it."

The Rev. Mr. Brittain moved that a committee of three be appointed to consider the petition of the Rev. J. H. Cloud, made known in the Bishop's Address.

Motion carried, and the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

The Rev. Arthur Brittain, Dean Davis, and Mr. W. C. Stith.

The Rev. Mr. Wise introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That that part of the Bishop's Address referring to the Duplex Envelope plan for the Diocese of Missouri be referred to the Committee on Missions.

Resolution adopted.

Convention took a recess until 2:30 p.m.

Convention re-assembled at 2:30 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee of Three be appointed to consider that portion of the Bishop's Address relating to St. Paul's Church, Carondelet, and that they report to this Convention.

Resolution adopted, and the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. B. T. Kemerer, and Judge John A. Harrison.

The Bishop appointed the following named Committee on Assessments:

E. J. Thomas, C. S. Freeborn, E. H. Boehnken, A. S. Pidding, E. H. Lycett, C. B. Rollins and F. C. Thompson.

The Rev. Mr. Wise introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Assessments be made a permanent Board of Equalization to sit throughout the year, and that they be given authority to hear appeals regarding assessments and apportionments, and power to act.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. McMaster, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, reported as follows:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, which was instructed at the last Convention to have 500 copies of the Constitution and Canons printed with amendments made since the last revision thereof, respectfully report that when it began its work it discovered that there would probably be quite a number of amendments to the Constitution and Canons approved and adopted at this Convention, to meet the conditions arising from there being a Bishop Coadjutor, and, as it would probably be several years before another edition was printed, deemed it wise to postpone the printing thereof until after the adjournment of this Convention.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the action of this Committee be approved, and that it be continued with direction to have 1,000 copies of the Constitution and Canons printed, with the amendments made since the last revision thereof.

While your Committee regrets that it cannot report any net increase in the subscription list, it is, nevertheless, encouraged to be able to report that, through considerable labor and duly absorbed extra expense, it has succeeded in placing the subscription list upon an absolutely sound basis of approximately 1,100 copies per month, about 90 per cent. of which are *regularly paid* subscriptions. This has involved the dropping from the list of a large number of delinquent subscribers and adding new *paid* subscriptions to take their place.

Amend Section 2 of Article VII. of the Constitution, by inserting after the word "direction" in the third line of said Section the words "of the Bishop Coadjutor, or should there be none," so that the Section, when amended, shall read as follows:

"Section 2. The direction of Divine Service during the sessions of the Convention shall rest with the Bishop alone. In the absence of the Bishop, all services shall be under the direction of the Bishop Coadjutor, or should there be none, of the President of the Standing Committee."

On motion, this amendment was approved and laid over for final action until the next Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Constitution:

Amend Section 1, Article VIII. of the Constitution, by inserting after the word "Convention" in the third line of said Section the words "the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside, or should there be none"; and by inserting the words "the Bishop Coadjutor or" between the words "appoint" and "a" in the tenth line; so that the Section as amended shall read as follows:

"Section 1. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be, *ex-officio*, President of the Convention, but in case of his absence at the time and place appointed for any session of the Convention, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside, or should there be none, the President or other Clerical member of the Standing Committee shall call the Convention to order, and if a quorum be present, a presiding officer shall be chosen, ad interim, from among the Presbyters in attendance; and if the Bishop shall at any time leave the chair he may appoint the Bishop Coadjutor or a Presbyter to preside in his stead."

On motion, this amendment was approved and laid over for final action until the next Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Section 1 of Canon IX. by inserting after the word "Bishop" in the second line of said Section the words "the Bishop Coadjutor," so that the Section as amended shall read as follows:

"Section 1. At each Annual Convention, three Clergymen and five Laymen shall be chosen by ballot, who, with the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, and the Deans of Convocation of the Diocese, shall form the Missionary Board of the Diocese. Said Board shall have the management of Missionary operations and the distribution of all funds raised for the support of Missionaries and for Mission purposes in the Diocese."

Recommendation adopted, and amendment to Canon duly passed.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Section 3, Canon IX. by inserting before the words "The Board" at the beginning of said Section, the words "In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside; if both be absent," and by striking out the words "in the absence of the Bishop" in the second line of said Section, so that the Section when amended will read as follows:

"In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside; if both be absent, the Board shall have the power to elect from its members a Chairman pro tem; to appoint its own Secretary and Treasurer; to fill vacancies during the recess of the Convention; to make by-laws and rules, and to do all such other acts as may be needful to carry out the office and trust conferred upon it."

Recommendation adopted, and amendment to Canon duly passed.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Canon XIX. by adding to Section 2 the following words: "This Committee shall sit as a Board of Equalization during the year, and report in detail to the next Convention all action taken during vacation."

Recommendation adopted, and amendment to Canon duly passed.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommended the adoption of the following amendment to the Canons:

Resolved, That the following be substituted for Section 10 of Canon IX.:

"The Missionary interests of the Diocese shall be the order of the day at the afternoon session of the second day of each Convention."

Recommendation adopted, and amendment to Canon duly passed.

Judge Harrison offered the following amendment to the Canons:

Amend Section two (2) of Canon two (2) by adding at the end thereof the following: "But before the filling of any such vacancy shall become operative the Convention shall be satisfied of the existence of a vacancy and report shall be made thereon by a Committee on Credentials."

Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

By invitation of the Convention, the Rev. W. S. Claiborne, of Sewanee, made an address.

The Bishop announced the election of three trustees of the University of the South in order.

By nomination of the Rev. Mr. Johnston, and on motion, the Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for The Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Mr. Fayette C. Ewing, and Mr. James A. Waterworth as Trustees for the University of the South, and the Bishop declared them duly elected.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth presented a report for the Committee on Missions as follows:

Your Standing Committee on Missions to whom was referred that part of the Bishop's Address regarding "a personal convass for Missions, and the use of Duplex Envelope System," beg leave to report that they greatly value both of the above methods, and urge their adoption in all the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

They would recommend the appointment of a Committee to carry on an educational campaign throughout the Diocese upon these definite lines, that we may meet all our Missionary obligations promptly by the use of these up-to-date and equitable methods. The system is being adopted throughout the whole Church, and has been proven highly successful. By its use "in the gathering up of the littles" the local Treasurer is enabled to send money regularly throughout the year to the Treasurer of the General Board.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth, for the Committee on Missions, introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Convention urgently requests the Treasurers of all funds for General Missions to forward the same to the Treasurer of the Board of Missions at the earliest possible moment, and not to wait until the end of the fiscal year.

Resolution adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth presented a report for the Committee on Missions as follows:

Your Committee, to whom was referred matters relating to the condition of St. Paul's Church, Carondelet, St. Louis, beg leave to report they recognize the absolute necessity of completing their church edifice now in course of erection. The Parish owes \$4,000, and also owes \$3,000 which has been borrowed through the kindness of certain friends of the Parish, who have become personally responsible for that amount, by endorsement of the church's notes. It will require \$4,000 more to complete the structure. Toward this amount \$750 is now in the hands of the Parish Treasurer. It is imperative therefore that \$3,250 be raised at once to finish the building. The local congregation can do little more than pay the interest on the amounts borrowed, and their current expenses.

Your Committee therefore recommend the appointment of a special committee from this Convention to work in cooperation with the Executive Committee of the Associated Vestries to help in raising the amount necessary, and thus complete the building this summer.

We would also suggest that the committee appointed consist of three clergymen and four laymen.

The Rev. Mr. Reed reported for the Committee on Sunday School Work as follows:

Report of the Committee on Sunday School Work.

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Sunday School Work of the Diocese herewith report.

At last Convention, the number of Sunday School teachers reported was 409, of scholars, 3,632; total, 4,041. The offerings, \$3,014.81. The statistics have not been given for this Convention. It is worth mentioning the Confirmations for this year are about 150 less than last year. In looking over the report of the Sunday Schools we find, the highest number reported from a Parish (the Cathedral) is 350 pupils, and no other Parish reaches the 300 mark. St. Stephen's Mission numbers 355. Comparisons are odious only when made in an odious spirit. When we look at the reports of Sunday Schools of other religious bodies in our city, they provoke us to larger effort. In one school, situated not in a poor or thickly settled neighborhood, it is not unusual to have present 1,150 scholars, and a correspondingly large corps of teachers. These religious bodies uniformly have larger attendance than have our schools, and the numbers attending their services are greater than our own. In the natural course of events they must outdistance us in the race. Such facts should not depress nor vex, but stimulate to greater effort.

A Latin poet of 2,000 years ago, said: "it is lawful to learn from an enemy." How much more from friends! What is the secret of the larger numbers? What of the permanence in attendance in other Sunday Schools? They are glad to tell us that it is mainly in the use of modern methods in the work. They fall in with the genius of the day, and the child nature; and seek to develop the last under the spirit of the first. Punctuality of all, animated and lively service, much singing of hymns, with tunes adapted to

child taste, suitable lessons, prepared with care by teachers, make the school go with a swing from start to finish—but perhaps the most efficient work is through the teachers outside of school hours hunting up new children, visiting when absent or sick, writing to them when away from home, keeping in contact with them in many ways. Nor is the superintendent less wide awake. But a new feature is being introduced which in itself is almost a guarantee of large success: a paid visitor is employed on a strictly business basis. Her business is to diligently hunt up new scholars, to visit when absent, to report fully and statedly her work. She is not lightly chosen, but care is taken in the selection and good wages paid. Our report must be brief. To be of use we could not say less. We leave these suggestions to the Convention, hoping it will take time to consider the subject of Sunday School work—more because of its importance even than of its interest.

The Bishop announced the election of three Trustees of the Theological Education Fund in order.

By nomination of Mr. Pidding, and on motion, the Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for the Rev. William A. Hatch, Mr. Edmond J. Thomas, and Mr. Henry H. Denison as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, and the Bishop declared them duly elected.

The Bishop announced the election of three Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund in order.

By nomination of the Rev. Mr. Coxe, and on motion, the Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Mr. Henry H. Denison, and Mr. William P. Nelson as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Bishop declared them duly elected.

The Rev. Mr. Johnston introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the next Convention of the Diocese shall be held at Christ Church Cathedral.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Ambler introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have 600 copies of the Journal printed.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. von Renthal introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant for \$25.00, payable to the sexton of St. Peter's Church.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Denison introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Bishop shall have authority to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the third day of this Convention.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Denison introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention be tendered to the rector and ladies of St. Peter's Church for their hospitality.

Resolution adopted by rising vote.

The Bishop gave his benediction, and declared the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX No. 1.

Annual Address
OF THE
Bishop of Missouri,
TO THE
Seventy-third Convention.

I have been the Bishop of Missouri twenty-five years and nine months. And a Bishop in the Church of God forty-five years and one month. And a Minister in Holy Orders fifty years lacking one month.

This is my twenty-sixth Annual Address to the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri. Forty-two clergymen heard the first one in St. John's Church on Hickory street. Only four of the forty-two hear this of to-day,—Reed, Dr. Davis, Hatch and Mason. Some laymen, perhaps a dozen, who were there then are here now.

The arithmetical enumerations are cold things. Not so the personal memories and associations. God has been pleased to spare me long. I humbly give Him thanks. He has been pleased to spare some good friends to the Diocese long. I humbly give Him more thanks. And we have grown some. At that Convention in May, 1887, all of the State of Missouri had only 6,944 communicants. Now the half of the State, constituting the present Diocese of Missouri, has 8,483 communicants. I humbly give yet more thanks. May thanks over the past and faith in the present and hope for the future and love interfusing all be ours.

Two Bishops have died. In the House of Bishops when the death of a Bishop is announced the announcement must be without note or comment and stating only the name and title, with the fact and date of death. Such announcement is always simple, solemn, soberingly suggestive to those who hear.

Bishop Kendrick was the senior of our Missionary Bishops. Modest without weakness, with a holy other-worldliness of heart and aim which never excluded a practical this-worldliness of earnest devotion to his work, he served most faithfully and self-sacrificingly on the southwestern frontier for twenty-three years.

Bishop Mackay-Smith for eight years or more was the Coadjutor of Bishop Whitaker, and then for a year was the Bishop of Pennsylvania. In helping his chief, and afterwards in administering the large Diocese as its head, he was called on to contend with no little of weakness of body, but he bravely, cheerily, generously and devotedly met and did duty, dying in the harness.

No one from the ranks of our clergy has been summoned.

But many men and women of our congregations have fallen by the wayside. Among them four Wardens, Charles Clark, of Holy Communion, St. Louis; Paul Schweitzer, of Columbia; John Winn Davis, of Clarksville, and W. I. Biggs, of La Plata; two vestrymen, Chauncey C. Shaw, of Mexico, and E. C. Cronk, of St. John's, St. Louis; and two who had served on the vestry of Macon, Ed. S. Smith and G. M. Cadogan; besides faithful women not a few, as Mrs. Louisa A. Smith, of Macon; Mrs. Conover, of Bonne Terre; Mrs. Rogers, of Monroe, and Mrs. Clopton, of Clarksville.

Year by year the diptychs present a lengthening roll; which is as soberingly and solemnly suggestive as are the announcements in the House of Bishops of which I spoke. God mercifully through Christ have us also ready, each one, for such enrollment by and by!

On the near front of my address I want to place the expression of my thanks for the Bishop Coadjutor who has come to give care to you and help to me. Under God's kind Providence and by the generous provision of the men and women of the Diocese, the last Convention in a most satisfying and harmonious way brought it about that one who some years since was a candidate for Holy Orders in this Diocese and one who is personally near and dear to me was chosen to be the Coadjutor. His coming is a sweet bene-

diction to the afternoon and evening days of my own earthly life, and will be also, I am persuaded, of great benefit and growing profit to you. And so my thanks are deep and full.

As we three move on together, the Bishop, the Coadjutor and the Diocese, things to be adjusted will naturally present themselves and they can be taken up as they come. One is, the relation of the Bishop Coadjutor to the Missionary Board. By original assignment all the Mission Stations of the Diocese save one are under his jurisdiction. Therefore it is highly proper that he should be an official member of the Missionary Board. I suggest to the Convention the propriety of adopting an amendment to Canon IX. providing for such membership.

It is strikingly noticeable that parishes which I am to look after and the Mission Stations all of which save one the Bishop Coadjutor is to look after are exactly equal in number. The Parishes listed in the Journal are thirty-two, St. George's Chapel not being one of them. Of these, Affton has but a name to live, and Clarksville by the deaths of the Warden and of the generous supporter, Mrs. Clopton, seemed moribund. The organized Missions listed are twenty-seven. I advise that La Plata be dropped from the list. The death of Mr. Biggs seems to make this necessary; and I venture hereby to pronounce, at the suggestion of the Bishop Coadjutor, in whose judgment I concur, St. Mary's Mission, La Plata, de-organized and discontinued. To the published list of the twenty-six organized Missions add the two which are newly organized, St. Timothy's and St. Michael and All Angels', St. Louis, and the un-organized Missions, Holy Cross, St. Louis, and St. Mary's, Shrewsbury, and the two Missions attached to Parishes, St. Alban's and Epiphany, St. Louis, and we have thirty-two, a number exactly equal to that of the Parishes.

There are besides the Hospital Missions of St. Louis, other names such as Doniphan, Eureka, Farmington, Glenwood, Jennings, Nadine and New Madrid, which may seem only names to list and yet which may be also starting points of future develop-

ment and usefulness. I think I can answer for both Bishops that we shall not let up our watchfulness and care of any and all points that may have promise in them of fruitfulness responsive to Church tillage and culture.

The Bishop Coadjutor prefers to make at this Convention no formal Convention address, deeming it better to wait till he has more personal knowledge of his field and of its aptitudes, encouragements and hindrances.

With half an eye I can see that new life is starting forth from the coming of the Bishop Coadjutor among us. Through him Rolla has already secured a pastor. Poplar Bluff and Doniphan are on the way to secure one. St. Mary's, St. Louis, and St. Timothy's, St. Louis, are each developing wholesome local strength. There remains the De Soto group with Ironton and Fredericktown to be looked after; and Moberly, and the important town of Kirksville. If six more pastors could be gotten for these enumerated places our anxieties would be greatly relieved. Then Canton could be served, perhaps, from Keokuk, Iowa, and Fulton from Mexico, and Cuba from St. James; and only Affton, Montgomery, Portland, Shelbina, and Sherman would be left.

Only 513 have been confirmed. This is against 657 confirmed last year. I do not quite understand such a falling off, though I am aware that several Parishes for much of the time have been without pastors. The outward, personal act of fealty to the Master is worth a great deal to the individual making it and to the congregation witnessing it. Pastors should urge people to be confirmed, not only from the pulpit and in classes for instruction, but privately and individually. Clergymen not seldom make a mistake in underestimating the willingness of persons to be approached and talked to concerning their souls and their religious duties.

In looking over the Diocese and thinking about it, it comes home to one that it is a struggle to keep all the work well a-going. So it is. But where is there a good thing anyway that goes ahead without a struggle. Perhaps bad things start up of themselves and

so grow and thrive. But good things—mustn't they be always thought out and kept up and pushed on and stored by through a struggle? Are the Church and missionary work good things? Good for man's life, good for his faith, good for his hope, good for his love, good against his day of death? If they are good things and if they are worth while then it is only natural that there must be a struggle to keep them up and to make them go. And there is a zest in struggling and a glow in struggling and not seldom a joy in struggling; a strength comes out of struggling if only we stick to it and never give up. It is a world of struggling, and I have not lived this long time in it without learning that there is and must be struggling on all sides. Struggles to keep homes protected, to keep business a-going, to keep debts and duties and responsibilities met. I ask that church dues and missionary givings may have their fair chance among the debts and duties and responsibilities. Do not, as you would be faithful,—do not, as you would be honorable,—do not, as you would be dutiful and helpful, count these out. All honor to you for care of your homes and families. All respect to you for being square in your dealings and sagacious in foresighted plans for your business on which so much depends. But I ask for the same square deal and the same sagacious foresight in setting aside your portion for the Church and Missions; for these, Church and Missions, are, if you will think it out, wonderful supporters, in their turn, of your homes, your business and the high life of your better selves. Nay, it is not gifts we give, it is dues we owe, to the Church, to Missions, to the Blessed Master. Count them gifts we may, in the freeness of will and warmth of heart wherewith we proffer them. But account them dues we ought, when we consider our all around relations to God, to our fellow men and to our own higher and better selves. The setting apart of something, steadily and systematically, for God and the Church and Missions, by the rich and by those of moderate income and by those of scanty and impoverished and almost no income, I can not be really and fully content with anything less than that.

I am not complaining. Missouri has been good and steadfast and generous. I only want to get for myself, and I want others to

get the right idea, viz.—that the support of religion is a due rather than a gift. And I want it to get its right place and its fair chance among other dues, and not to be seated back or crowded out from them. And I want the right perspective to be had in an all-around look,—looking up to God in faith, looking ahead to the path of duty, looking out and away unselfishly to Missions,—and, lending a hand. Our Diocese gave to General Missions last year \$10,201.67 and met and more than met her full apportionment. I was proud. This year she is apportioned \$12,330.00. I earnestly hope that she will meet this greater apportionment this year and make me proud again.

Besides the \$10,201.67 mentioned, our Sunday Schools gave for general Missions \$2,477.04 and for the Missionary Host \$1,286.24. And our Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Auxiliary,—bless their hearts, one and all, a more steady and generous band of workers and givers than they are I know not of anywhere,—our Woman's Auxiliary gave, besides the missionary boxes which they filled, \$6,272.39. And we gave for Diocesan Missions \$6,648.43. In all, \$26,885.77. And a good many specials have been given besides. It is not a bad showing. In view of the pressing and piteous calls from the Mission Field, we will not say that we are proud over it. But we will say, we are thankful for it.

An important missionary work has been carried on in our midst for several years by the Rev. Mr. Cloud among his fellow Deaf Mutes with services held steadily in Bofinger Chapel, kindly loaned to them by the Cathedral. There are 600 Deaf Mutes in and about St. Louis. Mr. Cloud has 86 of them gathered as communicants of St. Thomas' Mission. Mr. Cloud supports himself and family by his work as a teacher in the public school. He is very desirous, if an annual income of \$1,600.00 could be provided for him, to give himself up entirely to the spiritual care of his afflicted brethren in St. Louis and vicinity. He thinks, possibly a committee might wisely be appointed by this Convention to consider the desirability and practicability of establishing a commission for the care of the Deaf, such as exists in some of our Dioceses. I re-

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spectfully ask that a committee on this matter be appointed to report to this Convention.

The two newly organized Missions reported this year will, I feel sure, give good account of themselves hereafter. I understand a goodly sum has been proffered for help to one of them, St. Timothy's, St. Louis. And \$40,000.00 have been given to the other, St. Michael and All Angels', St. Louis, wherewith to build its church.

These are things which speak cheer and courage quite all along the line.

The Cathedral with its tower and porch and exceedingly beautiful reredos; St. Philip's and Mt. Calvary with their new church buildings and growing congregations; St. Paul's with its rising walls, towards making which necessary improvement I hope Church folk generally in the city will kindly help; Trinity moved and rehabilitated in its new fabric on Washington avenue; Holy Communion provided with its new and useful chapel; St. James', Macon, visited with fire but not entirely burned and now by the energy and generosity of the Macon people nearly restored and renovated, and even welcoming to its side a newly built rectory; Christ, Moberly, uplifted and improved by the resolute efforts mainly of its self-sacrificing women; St. Mary's, Shrewsbury, reopened and served by the faithful Rector of Old Orchard; Epiphany, St. Louis, improved and brightened in environment and services under the fostering care of St. Peter's; with our two most remarkable Missions, Holy Cross House and its new dispensary building provided for, and St. Stephen's House with its increasing beneficent activities,—make up altogether a wonderful story of the cheer and courage which I have claimed.

In looking after and serving vacant places the Diocesan League of Lay Readers has been a most cheering and efficient help. Its unselfishness of service is indicated by the fact that when in beginning its work it borrowed somewhat of funds from the Diocesan Missionary Board it lately paid back the whole loan and added a substantial gift over and above to the Treasury of the Board.

Then, the Hospital Missions with the blessed work done in them day by day by the Rev. Mr. Jones and his helpers; the Orphans' Home; the Home for Convalescent Women; St. Luke's Hospital; Bishop Robertson Hall; St. Andrew's Brotherhood; The Church Club; The Church Woman's Club; The Girls' Friendly; The St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses; The Missionary Host,—all these raise the cheer and courage to the second power.

Our thanks are due, I think, to the Rev. Mr. Richards for his admirable editorship of THE CHURCH NEWS, and to the excellent and most efficient committee which has co-operated with him. If you will look on the first page of THE CHURCH NEWS of to-day you will find it labeled Vol. XLIII. It is no little thing that it has sustained its continuous life as steadfast as the sun,—or, perhaps we had better say as it is a monthly publication, as steadfast as the moon,—for forty-three years.

I deem it most suitable to call the attention of the Convention to the fact that Professor Snow, who has served on our Standing Committee for twenty-two years and has been its Secretary for twenty-one years, is about to resign as Dean of the College and Professor of History in Washington University after a distinguished term of valuable service therein for forty-two years. It gives me much pleasure and great satisfaction to add that he will remain on the roll as professor emeritus and reside on the grounds of the University; and so, we hope and trust, we shall not lose his presence and help in the Diocese and the Church.

Our Diocese is affiliated with other Dioceses of the South for the management of the University of the South at Sewanee. I attend the meetings of its Trustees and I feel assured that it is most wholesome and helpful work which it is doing for higher education and for the Church. I shall be glad and grateful for all reasonable efforts made by this Diocese for the support and upbuilding of the University.

It was a Missionary Bishop that you summoned to be your Diocesan twenty-six years ago. He is now the President of our

great Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society which disburses more than a million and a third of dollars yearly for missionary work. It was a Missionary Bishop that you summoned to be your Bishop Coadjutor a year ago. It is very natural that a missionary strain should be inwoven firmly into our Diocesan life. It would be strange if Missouri were not among the leading Dioceses in thinking about Missions and in paying dues for Missions. Scrutinizing the figures you will find she does stand just so,—among the leaders. She is accounted as one of the leaders. She is apportioned as one of the leaders. We ought to be glad of it and a bit proud over it. She is asked for 89 cents per communicant for General Missions. Of our sixty-eight Dioceses only seven, New York, Pennsylvania, Long Island, Pittsburgh, Colorado, Massachusetts, and Los Angeles are asked for more.

The ideal to be striven for in missionary work is to get every one busy in interest and helpfulness. In many Dioceses and Parishes systematic giving and the every member canvass and the duplex envelopes have wrought striking changes of progress and profit. I cannot but hope that more and more of our own Parishes will avail themselves of such helps which the Forward Movement has brought to our notice. It is found, universally, I think, that the stirring of the depths of interest and zeal in the Parish by these methods redounds not only to the benefit of General Missions but also to the help of Diocesan Missions, and amazingly to the increase of parochial supply and parochial support. I throw out the suggestion, whether it would not be wise and well for this Convention to endorse and recommend the adoption of the methods among ourselves.

At any rate, by whatever methods, let us be in earnest to work up to the ideal. Let us acknowledge and accept, each one, his or her dues to the Church and to Missions. Let us meet and give, each one, our dues to the Church and to Missions.

Before our eyes to-day is a conspicuous example of the good resultant from Missions. In China, the greatest empire in population on earth, an almost bloodless revolution is going on and seem-

ingly is in a fair way to succeed. Its success spells progress in civilization and happiness to the Oriental races. In its guidance, if perhaps not in its inception, this uprising is in the hands of natives trained by Christian missionaries. It is seemingly getting ready to give striking proof that the godliness of Christ's gospel "is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is, and of that which is to come."

But with the wholesome influence of Missions of the past there is abounding need for enlightenment from Christian Missions of the present and for guidance from Christian Missions of the future. And China's need is our opportunity. Opportunity to stand by the Master and to help on the cause of the Master as almost never before. The door is open, widely open. It may seem to a Christian that in this wonderful crisis in China the Master cometh and that we should go forth to meet Him. God grant it may be with such replenishment of oil and trimming of the lamps in the cause of Missions as the Master shall deem acceptably fit. Opportunity goes as well as comes. And there is a shutting of the door.

It would be strange, and yet not more strange than are other dispensations of God's Providence, if from China herself lessons in Christian truth and polity should be proffered for us of the West to give heed to and to learn from. Just the other day there was organized there the Holy Catholic Church of China with its eleven Bishops (seven from England, three from the United States and one from Canada) and its many faithful Chinese priests and laymen. If China, please God and pray God so, be converted it is not impossible that the Holy Catholic Church of China shall have valuable aspects of Christian truth wherewith to enlighten us and wholesome developments of Christian practice wherewith to instruct us. And who can tell how much she may perhaps contribute to the solution, so ardently desired, of the great problem of Christian unity.

Dear brethren all, it surely is a bugle call in this our day. Stand by Missions, hold up Missions, push on Missions. God help

us to pray and give and work while lasts the day of life, for the night cometh in which no man can work, and that coming night shall cut us off from the precious sharing, now granted to us, with the Blessed Master in "the travail of His soul" wherewith He, and we also in the light of the great last day, "shall be satisfied."

Authorized the sending to Bishops and Standing Committees of all other Dioceses duly certified evidence of the election of the Right Reverend Frederick Foote Johnson as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri, asking their consent thereto.

October 4, 1911—

Granted a petition signed by the Minister and members of Christ Church, Rolla, a mission, asking that they might organize as a parish, and authorized the Secretary to notify the Bishop of the Diocese of this action.

The President of the Committee having reported that a majority of the Dioceses and of the Bishops had given consent to the election of the Right Reverend Frederick Foote Johnson as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri, the Committee then by vote instructed the President and Secretary to send notices of the election of Bishop Johnson to the ecclesiastical authorities of the several Dioceses.

The Bishop of the Diocese having asked the consent of the Standing Committee that the Bishop Coadjutor spend some weeks in the spring in assisting the Bishop of Connecticut, it was voted that the desired consent be given and that the Secretary be requested to notify the Bishop of this action.

Gave consent to the ordination and consecration of the Reverend William Edward Toll, B.D., as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Chicago.

Voted to approve and confirm the election by the House of Bishops of the Reverend Daniel Trumbull Huntington to be a Bishop in the Missionary District of Wuhu.

Granted the petition of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, to be allowed to borrow of the Mississippi Valley Trust Company the sum of \$25,000 for three years at 5 per cent. with 2 per cent. commission, said sum to be used to renew a note for that amount, then due, on the property of the Cathedral known as St. George's Chapel.

January 29, 1912—

Gave authority to the Treasurer of the Diocese to pay the travelling expenses of the Bishop Coadjutor quarterly upon presentation of a statement of the amount due.

Upon adjournment the Committee met as a Council of Advice to the Bishop of the Diocese.

May 3, 1912—

Approved and confirmed the election of the Reverend George Biller, Jr., as Missionary Bishop of the Diocese of South Dakota and the Reverend Herman Page, D.D., as Missionary Bishop of the Diocese of New Mexico.

Approved the report of the Secretary of the Acts of the Committee for the Conventional Year 1911-12 for submission to the Diocesan Convention.

Authorized the President to certify to the record of this meeting.

In consideration of, and upon the condition that St. Mary's, St. Louis, raise \$960.00 per year for the salary of a minister, who would devote his entire time to the work, the Board agreed to make an appropriation of \$240.00 per year, when the Minister began work.

In consideration of, and upon the condition that Christ Church, Rolla, raise \$950.00 per year, for the salary of a Minister, who would devote his

entire time to the work, the Board agreed to make an appropriation of \$150.00 per year for the same purpose, the appropriation to begin when the minister commenced work. The Board expects, however, this appropriation to be reduced to at least \$75.00 at the expiration of one year.

The following Parishes receiving aid from the Board are vacant: Affton, De Soto, Moberly and Palmyra.

The following Missions are vacant: Cuba, Fredericktown, Fulton, Ironton, Kirksville, Poplar Bluff, Portland, Shelbina, Sherman, St. Mary's, St. Louis, and St. Timothy's, St. Louis.

On March 14th, 1912, the Board gave its permission for the organization of St. Michael and All Angels', St. Louis, and St. Timothy's, St. Louis, as Missions of the Diocese.

The Board invited the Bishop Coadjutor to attend all its meetings and granted him all the privileges of membership except the right to vote.

The Board finds that to continue the Missionary work as it is at present, will require the sum of \$8,145.00, and to supply the vacancies it will need \$900.00 more, making a total of \$9,045.00. In view of the fact that vacancies occur, during each year, the Board takes the liberty of recommending that out of the balance now in the hands of the Treasurer, there be set aside as a reserve fund, with which to pay the salaries of the missionaries during the summer months, the sum of \$2,500.00, and that \$9,045.00 be apportioned among the Parishes and Missions, treating the remaining balance in the hands of the Treasurer as a part thereof.

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APPENDIX No. 17.

Hospital Missions—Annual Report.

1911-1912.

In making report of the work done in the Hospital Missions, I desire first of all to express my sincere appreciation of the assistance I have received from those associated with me in that work. First, I would mention especially the volunteer helpers, who meet the missionaries on Sundays and other days when services are held to assist in bringing the inmates to the services, finding the places for them in the Prayer Book, playing the organ, leading in the singing and doing such other things as conduce to making of the services attractive and interesting to the inmates. Many of them precede the missionaries and go through the wards inviting and persuading the inmates to attend the church services, aiding the halt, the lame and the blind to the chapels. To me one of the most beautiful acts of Christian service I have ever witnessed is that of young girls of culture and refinement escorting a poor blind colored woman Sunday after Sunday down three flights of steps and across the campus to the chapel and back, oftentimes coming in the most inclement weather both winter and summer. I desire also to bear testimony to the efficient work done by the lay members of the staff. Mr. Fanning, Miss Hofman and Mrs. Holmes. Through the loving and loyal assistance of these co-laborers I am glad to report a most successful year's work. I have also been aided by the Rev. Mr. Hatch, of Holy Innocents', who gives two Sunday afternoons to the Infirmary each month, and the Rev. Mr. Coxe, who gives the same time to the City Hospital. The following is a summary of the work:

Persons baptized, 25; persons confirmed, 21; funerals, 6; services held—Infirmary 168, Sanitarium 52, City Hospital 54, City Jail 40, Work House 52, Convalescent Home 53. Regular weekly visits (and often more frequently) are made by your missionaries to each institution, besides visits to individuals outside the institutions in the way of follow-up work. Twelve celebrations of Holy Communion have been held at the Infirmary, two at the City Hospital, and two at the Sanitarium. Besides these I have administered this sacrament six times in private. Necessarily this work has little or no financial side, as no offerings are taken, nor effort made to raise money in this mission proper. All money and material aid comes from the outside—and is known as the Hospital Mission Contingent Fund—a detailed account of which is made monthly to the Board of Missions. I beg therefore to submit the following sum totals of receipts and disbursements:

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D.D., S.T.D., LL.D., Bishop of Missouri, and
Members of the Convention:

If figures are to be the measure, we have less to report than for several years past. The re-adjustment to the Board of Missions' new plans may partly account for this. Large personal gifts to Missionary Bishops last year brought our figures a little beyond normal growth. The new plan of the Woman's Auxiliary offerings counting in the parish apportionment should greatly strengthen the relations between rector, vestries and the Auxiliary. The every member canvass was undertaken in one parish by 10 Auxiliary women with good results and was credited to the parish and not to the Auxiliary. All our pledges have been paid. At our last Annual Meeting we increased our pledge to Diocesan Missions from \$150.00 to \$250.00. The subscription list to the *Spirit of Missions* has been doubled and more carefully read, and in spite of what figures show, it has been an admirable year of work with united purpose and united effort.

Before leaving Kirksville, I persuaded Mr. C. D. McCullough to take license as lay reader and lead the people on Sunday mornings in the service of prayer and praise. Mr. McCullough had previously done efficient and dignified and devoted duty here as a lay reader, but gave it up about a year ago, since which time the church has been practically closed. There is need of a banding together of the women here in some sort of social and religious activity within the Church. I hope I have persuaded Mrs. H. L. Rushmore to take the leadership in this band.

Report of the Bishop Coadjutor.

By reference to the address of the Bishop of Missouri printed elsewhere in this Journal, it will be seen that it was arranged between us that I should not make a formal address this year.

My acceptance of the office of Bishop Coadjutor found me in the position of having promised the Bishop of my old home diocese, Connecticut, that I would assist him in his spring visitations. The Bishop of Missouri and the Standing Committee gave consent that I should quit the Missouri field for such time as was necessary to keep my engagement with the Bishop of Connecticut. On this duty I was absent from the diocese from Easter Monday to the twenty-eighth of May.

My coming to Missouri left the Missionary District of South Dakota in the charge of the Presiding Bishop. It was of the utmost importance that some episcopal acts should be performed in South Dakota during the period of vacancy in the Episcopate there; and my knowledge of the field suggested me as the logical man to give the needed help. I have, therefore, by request of the Presiding Bishop and under his commission, been across the line from my Missouri field for ordination and confirmation and other official acts in South Dakota. I entered on my duties as Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri on the first Sunday in January last. At the date of this Diocesan Convention, taking out the weeks required for the duty to which I had pledged myself in Connecticut, and the duty to which the Presiding Bishop commissioned me in South Dakota, just twelve weeks have been at my disposal for duty in Missouri.

During that time I have confirmed 98 persons; administered the sacrament of the Supper of the Lord on 10 occasions; officiated at one burial. Not including Sunday School addresses and addresses to confirmation classes, I have delivered sermons and addresses to the number of 63. I have licensed two Lay Readers. I have consecrated one church.

I desire to make grateful acknowledgement of money which has come into my hands for assisting in the work of missions under my care as follows:

This amount is still in bank; not because there are no needs apparent in the rural field, but because it has seemed to me that I ought to acquire a more accurate understanding of the whole field before I begin to dispense the generous gifts of our people. Unintelligent and indiscriminate out-handing of money often weakens local effort and in the long run does more harm than good.

When I came to Missouri in January, there were given into my charge 27 "organized missions." Five of these I found to be in the city of St. Louis and enjoying a good, steady, wholesome pulse-beat. Twenty-two of the "organized missions" committed to my care were outside of the city of St. Louis. Of these 22 rural "organized missions," I find by referring to the Journal of 1911 that 13 were a year ago so unorganized, or disorganized, or unofficered, that they made no statistical or financial report whatever to the Annual Convention of the Diocese; 13 out of 22 made no report. (See Journal of the Seventy-second Convention, 1911, Appendix B.) I call attention to this fact not by way of rebuke and not for the purpose of criticism. I call attention to the fact in order that all who are interested may realize that there appeared to be a condition of very seriously defective circulation in the case of many of the "organized" rural missions of the diocese at the moment when the Convention of 1911 elected a Bishop Coadjutor for Missouri. It is good for us to realize the weak condition in which we find our rural work at the start. I think I sense the problem which is before us—to stimulate the blood currents in those portions of our diocesan organism which are more or less remote from the diocesan heart. I hope to do my best to help to try to put some glow into our rural missions. If the people will co-operate with me, their best and mine with the aid of the Holy Spirit will accomplish what God wills.

The important group of De Soto, Ironton and Fredericktown is too long vacant. Two months ago I had good reason to believe that a man who would be acceptable and helpful would listen to a call. But at the last moment another field invited and attracted him.

Poplar Bluff and Doniphan should have a man at once. The committee does not seem able to recommend a candidate to me; and two whom I had hoped to be able to recommend to the committee have disappointed me.

I am glad to report that Rolla, vacant since September, 1911, has secured for its Minister, Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, for 14 years a most faithful and efficient missionary in South Dakota. I am sorry for South Dakota, but I rejoice for Missouri and Rolla. Mr. Tragitt is expected to take charge the first of July.

I have a right to be anxious about Trinity, Kirksville, vacant since July, 1910. The city claims 6,000 residents and 1,200 students. The longing of a few people there for the constant ministrations of the Church is almost pathetic. The apathy of many there who bear the name of Episcopalians

is almost tragic. If "town and gown" would join hands in Kirksville, Trinity Church could be splendidly maintained. Mr. McCullough has with great fidelity kept up the lay services since January. And Mrs. H. L. Rushmore has put us greatly in her debt by organizing a Woman's Guild and efficiently directing it.

In St. Louis, St. Timothy's Mission has recently been organized, and has just come into the possession of \$7,500, the liberal gift of a generous Churchwoman of the city. Lots have been bought for St. Timothy's at the corner of Perry and Euclid. We hope soon to have an attractive chapel there and, in due time, a parish and a church. I am praying that there may be such an heart in the people of St. Timothy's that their constancy in good works for the Saviour's sake may in some real measure express their thanks to their generous benefactress. And for her my prayer is, As she has been mindful of us, may the Father be ever mindful of her. As she has freely given, may she at the Father's hand freely receive abundant mercies and blessings.

St. Timothy's is greatly in debt to Rev. B. T. Kemerer, Vicar of St. George's, who has supplied frequent spiritual ministrations and has also well and wisely guided the people in steps toward organization of a mission; and to Mr. A. P. Rein, a layman of St. George's, who with self-denying constancy has supplied lay services for many months in the temporary chapel.

There is much well-ballasted enthusiasm among the lay people of St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis. Rev. F. C. O'Meara finds that he cannot do full justice to the mission and to his business enterprises, too, and he has resigned the charge of St. Mary's. The opportunity looks bright for St. Mary's so soon as we can place in charge a man in holy orders who will apply himself wholly to this one thing, and draw all his cares and studies this way. At my request, during the past three months, the committee has made a personal canvas of the neighborhood and has reported to me an increase of $33\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. in pledges for stipend.

I hope that all who are interested in our mission work will give me their moral support (and financial, too, when possible) in an effort to see to it that no mission or group of missions shall seek the services of a married man in priests' orders for less than \$1,000 and a house to live in. If there are in the second order of the ministry men of sound bodies who are so lacking in energy or in moral, intellectual, or spiritual fiber as not to be worth \$1,000, this diocese ought to be so zealous for the cause of the Lord God of Hosts as to say that we don't want such men on our clergy staff at any price. If, on the other hand, a man is physically and mentally and morally and spiritually fit, we of this diocese are too self-respecting to study at how slender a stipend that man's services may be secured to build us up and strengthen us in our most holy faith. This is as it seems to me.

I give warm thanks to the members of the League of Lay Readers who

have helpfully and faithfully given of their efforts to keep the cobwebs off the doors of many of our mission churches which are without immediate pastoral care. The League of Lay Readers has, very wisely, I think, determined that the services of its members shall not for a term of long continuance be available in any parish or mission which might by reasonable effort secure the services of a man in holy orders. Wisely, I think, the League has stipulated that one condition on which vacant parishes and missions may have the services of its members is that each place so served shall provide for the coming of a presbyter once a month for the administration of the Holy Communion. I appreciate the privilege of calling on these lay readers to serve as stop-gaps where occasion may require; and I am grateful to them for the readiness of their response and for the efficiency of their service.

On coming to the diocese I was much impressed by the fact that the elected members of the Board of Missions, clerical and lay, seemed to take their duty seriously. They are busy men, all of them; but not too busy to give time and thought to the business of the Board. That is good. I thank them for their readiness to help. We cannot do our missionary duty to this Diocese of Missouri in a fit of absent-mindedness. We must pray reasonably, and study thoughtfully, and work zealously.

I thank the people for their cordial reception of me as a fellow-laborer. As soon as I can, consistently with my own duties and the readiness of the people to receive me, I want to get to all our mission stations. And among scattered folk, where there is no reason to organize any work, I want to minister as helpfully as I can.

I thank the dear Bishop of Missouri for his constant kindness to me. He has been to me a father and a brother, too. And I am glad that he seems glad to have me by his side.

Both ladies have rendered acceptable and loyal service, for which the minister is most grateful. The faithful and efficient Lay Reader, Mr. A. O. Steidemann, officiated on fourteen Sundays in the absence of the minister, making it possible to have weekly Sunday services the year round. Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
