Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
 - V. On the State of the Church.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Tuesday, January 21, 1936.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninety-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 21, 1936, at 9:30 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Cathedral Staff.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Dean Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-three who were entitled to vote, seventeen were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 13.)

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty-six Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from eighteen were present.

A quorum being present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened.

It was ordered that the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention.

By the unanimous vote of the Convention, it was ordered that all Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, but not entitled to vote, be given seats and votes in this Convention.

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent was appointed a committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

By authority of the Convention, the Bishop appointed the following named Nominating Committee:

The Rev. Karl M. Block, the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. David Coombs, Mr. George M. Block, Mr. John D'Arcy and Mr. R. O. Kennard.

The Secretary read the report of the Standing Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 2.)

The Secretary read the report of the Parochial Trust Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 3.)

The Secretary announced that reports of the Treasurer of the Diocese for the following named Funds had been received and filed:

The Rev. Mr. Woolfall read his report as Chairman of the Department of the Field, which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

The Secretary read the report of the Finance Department, which was received and filed. (Appendix 13-A.)

The Secretary introduced Resolution No.1 for the Finance Department, which was unanimously adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

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Resolved, That the Schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund (See Appendix 13-B) attached to the report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$29,222.35, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Church Program Budget for 1936 (See Appendix 13-C), amounting to \$22,520.60, and to pay the amount due the Treasurer of the National Council, in accordance with the remommendation of the Diocesan Council. (See Council Report, Appendix 10.)

The Secretary introduced Resolution No.2, for the Finance Department, which was unanimously adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

Resolved, That the schedule of Assessments for the Diocesan Fund (See Appendix 13-D) attached to the report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$14,077.55, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Expense Budget for 1936, amounting to \$15,420.75. (See Appendix 13-E.)

The Bishop read a letter from Mr. Pangman, stating that he would not be able to serve on the Diocesan Council during the ensuing year.

Mr. Stribling made an oral report of the Church Pence Fund, and presented his report as Chairman of the Everyman's Offering Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 14.)

The suggestions and plans in the foregoing report were approved by the Convention, and it was ordered that the proceeds from the Everyman's Offering Fund be disbursed at the discretion of the Bishop and Council.

The Rev. Dr. Block read his report as Chairman of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, which was received and filed. (Appendix 15.)

The Bishop led the Convention in Noonday Prayers.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins read his report as Chairman of the Church Pension Fund Committee, in the form of a letter from the Executive Vice-President of the Church Pension Fund, which was received and filed. (See page 51.)

The Rev. Dr. Block read his report as Chairman of the Board of Examining Chaplains, which was received and filed. (Appendix 16.)

Mrs. Harold E. Woodward read the report of the Girls' Friendly Society, which was received and filed. (See page 51.)

Dean Sweet introduced Resolution No. 3, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That we, the Bishop, the Clergy, and Lay Delegates of the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled, express to Mrs. John F. Shepley our earnest and deep appreciation of the remarkable and invaluable service which she has rendered to the Diocese during the six years she has been President of the Woman's Auxiliary, and greatly regret that she is not able to be with us.

By the unanimous vote of the Convention the Parishes and Missions which had not paid their assessments in full were given representation in this Convention.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

After a prayer by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned until 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday.

SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, Wednesday, January 22, 1936.

The Convention was called to order in the Dean Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial at 9:45 a.m., with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous day, which were approved.

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That this Convention wishes to express its great appreciation of the able and devoted services of Mr. C. C. Pangman, as a member of the Diocesan Council during the last six years, and notably for his untiring labors in the Council as Chairman of the Finance Department, and deeply regrets that he has found it impossible to continue a connection with this particular work in the Diocese, which has been of outstanding value.

The Secretary was instructed to convey to the Rev. J. Presley Pound the great regret of the Convention that he has been unable to attend its sessions, and its deep appreciation of his very efficient, valuable and devoted service to the Diocese and the Church.

Mrs. L. H. P. Shaw, an assistant to Canon George, gave an outline of some of the work of the City Mission.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin, for the Department of Christian Social Service, introduced the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That we recommend to the Diocese of Missouri the organization of a City Mission Society, as an auxiliary to the City Mission, and that the Bishop be authorized to order its work.

Resolution No. 9.

RESOLVED, That we recommend to the Diocese the institution and organization of a Youth Program to co-ordinate the many isolated parish activities among young people, and as soon as practical the employment of a trained Diocesan worker to supervise and direct the program.

Resolution No. 10.

RESOLVED, That this Convention protests the inadequacy of relief expenditures, which have dropped below the minimum standards of decent living acknowledged even by the Relief Administration, in some cases falling to starvation levels. We appeal to the citizens of St. Louis and of the State of Missouri to recognize the tragic plight of their fellowmen and to make vocal their protest and concern.

The foregoing Resolutions Nos. 8, 9 and 10 were adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Block made an oral report on the Forward Movement.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin, for the Department of Christian Social Service, introduced the following resolutions.

Resolution No. 11.

Resolved, That this Convention calls upon the people to become aware and be prepared to resist the threatened encroachment upon their civil liberties by the "gag" legislation now before the national and state congresses (Specifically the McCormick-Tydings Military Disaffection Bill H. R. 5845 and the Kramer Sedition Bill H. R. 6427) which would invade our freedom in religion, in speech, and in public assembly, and violate the fundamental principles upon which our democracy was founded.

Resolution No. 12.

Resolved, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention endorses the campaign of various civic groups for the extension of Civil Service requirements in the personnel of nation, state and local governmental agencies.

Resolution No. 13.

Resolved, That we have deeply upon our conscience the inadequate opportunities in St. Louis for the higher education of Negroes, and we urge upon the city authorities the great need of a City College for Negroes.

Resolution No. 14.

Resolved, That the Department of Christian Social Service endorses the proposed plan of the Old Age Pension Board of St. Louis to administer the work of that department through trained social workers, and to recommend, in addition, that social workers of high Christian ideals be selected for this important work with the aged.

Resolution No. 15.

Resolved, That we endorse and support the national campaign for the abolition of slum sections and for increased Federal help to promote low-cost housing.

Resolution No. 16.

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri endorses the Federal Social Security Act now before the States for their acceptance, offering aid to dependent children and to the blind, and a planned economic security for others by means of public health work, unemployment compensation, and old age pensions.

The foregoing Resolutions Nos. 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 were adopted.

Mr. Morris introduced Resolution No. 17, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 17.

Resolved, That this Convention go on record of favoring free speech of all public officials, and likewise discredit the taking of any loyalty oaths by special groups.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of this day's session.

It was ordered that the next Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis.

The Rev. Father Bayne introduced Resolution No. 18, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 18.

RESOLVED, That this Convention affirms our gratitude and affection for the Bishop of this Diocese; and pledges the affectionate loyalty of our Parishes to him in this year, especially through the medium of the campaign for the Diocesan Endowment Fund.

The Rev. Father Bayne introduced Resolution No. 19, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 19.

Whereas, It is the opinion of many that the Convention of our Diocese should exert a primary claim upon our attention and concern;

Be it Resolved, That it is the sense of this Convention that during the two days appointed for the meeting of the Convention no other Diocesan or Parochial appointments be scheduled or held.

It was ordered that the Bishop's sermon delivered at the Mass Meeting of Tuesday evening of this Convention be printed and distributed to the various Parishes.

After a prayer and benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned, *sine die*.

APPENDIX No. 1.

The Address of the Bishop to the Ninety-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

To the Clergy and the Lay Delegates:

We come now to the Ninety-seventh Convention of the Diocese of Missouri. Will you join with me, as is our custom, in a moment of silence, recalling those of our friends, former delegates to this Convention, members of our Parishes and Missions, members of the House of Bishops whom we have lost during the past year, thanking God for their friendship and their good examples, beseeching Him to grant them continual growth in His love and service.

During the past year there have been changes in the clergy staff of the Diocese which I wish to record. The Reverend Robert C. Batchelder, Jr., who came to us two years ago from the Diocese of Connecticut to be Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson, left us last summer to return to his former Diocese as Assistant Minister in St. Paul's Church, at the gate of Yale University, New Haven.

The Reverend Lee W. Heaton, who for five years was our "doctor of sick churches," and who was so very great a factor in enabling the Church of the Holy Apostles and the Holy Innocents' Church to begin life anew, could not resist a challenge offered him by the Bishop of Western Nebraska to assist him in that Missionary District. He is now Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Grand Island.

The Reverend Sumner Walters, for five years Rector of the Church of the Redeemer, was called to one of the most important Churches in the Diocese of California. It was an unusual opportunity for very wide service and we all felt, as did he, that he ought to accept it. He is now rector of Christ Church, Alameda, California. With his departure a change was determined on in the status of the Church of the Redeemer. Our Churches in the city are badly bunched, having moved, broadly speaking, in a straight and narrow line west. The Church of the Redeemer was part of an over-churched neighborhood from the point of view of our Church, with the Church of the Ascension and the Church of the Holy Apostles not far distant. After canvassing the situation thoroughly, the members of the Parish felt that it would be better to abandon the Church of the Redeemer as an independent Parish and ally themselves with other Parishes. This was done, and the property was turned over to the Diocese. Arrangements were completed with Trinity Parish whereby it was to purchase the property of the Church of the Redeemer in time. Trinity Parish accordingly moved to its new location last summer.

We have had one change within the Diocese: The Reverend John E. Hines, who for two years was the very able Assistant to Dr. Block at the Church of St. Michael & St. George, last May became Rector of Trinity Church, Hannibal.

We have had four additions to the clergy staff during the past year. From the Diocese of New York, where he had been Assistant to Dr. Bowie at Grace Church, came the Reverend Charles C. Wilson to be Rector of the Church of the Holy Innocents, and in charge of Mt. Calvary Church and the new development in St. Louis Hills. From the Cathedral staff of the Diocese of Bethlehem came the Reverend

Kenneth E. Heim to be Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson. To be Rector of Grace Church, Jefferson City, we secured from St. John's Church, Waterbury, Connecticut, one of Dr. John Lewis' Assistants, (and he has such a very sure instinct for men) the Reverend Wilbur D. Ruggles. And the youngest member of the clergy staff was received from the Diocese of Massachusetts, straight out of the Senior Class of the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, to become Assistant Minister in St.Peter's Church, St.Louis, the Reverend William H. Kirk. We are more fortunate than we can say, in securing these four splendid men.

There have been two Ordinations in the Diocese during the past year: On September 30th the Reverend Charles C. Wilson was advanced to the Priesthood, and on January 5th the Reverend William H. Kirk was likewise advanced to the Priesthood.

Two Postulants were received during the past year. Mr. Ralph Daniel Bonacker, who is now a Senior in Yale Divinity School, was accepted as a Postulant on October 7th, and on the same day Mr. George F. Tittmann, now a Senior in Harvard University, was also received. Mr. Darby Wood Betts, another Postulant in this Diocese, is now in his first year at the Seminary in Virginia.

Mr. James Lichliter, now a Senior in the Theological Seminary at Alexandria, Virginia, became a Candidate for Holy Orders, and during the coming summer we hope to add him to the clergy staff of the Diocese. Again, these are excellent men.

As the reports from the Financial Department will show, we have come through the year very well, with all bills paid and a substantial balance in the bank for the work of the coming year. This has been accomplished, however, by cutting the budget at the beginning of last year and rigidly adhering to it.

Through the Apportionment, plus the money received from the Pence Plan and through some assistance from a surplus in the Diocesan Expense Budget, we were able to exceed slightly our Expectation to New York. We had pledged ninety-nine hundred dollars and we paid ten thousand. I should like to call the attention of the Convention, however, to this fact: we are advised by National Headquarters that if the Church is to continue to work on the basis of a budget of two million seven hundred thousand dollars, our fair and apportioned share would be \$17,500.00. Consequently we are falling short by a considerable amount. In order to try to close the gap somewhat, the Council has voted, subject to your ratification, that for the year 1936 we accept ten thousand dollars as our Expectation—but also set the sum of twelve thousand dollars as our objective and exert every possible effort to secure that full amount. I hope very much we shall be able to do this.

There is one matter which must come before this Convention for ratification. Let me tell you the story. Some years ago, as the depression deepened and the returns from the Parishes on the Apportionment were diminished, we were faced by the alternative of closing some of our Missions, or securing additional revenues. But we had adopted the policy in this Diocese of putting a period to any further retreat from cities or towns where our work was established and needed. To close any of our Missions even temporarily would be to imperil their future. Consequently, as you know, a friend of the Diocese established a Trust Fund of one hundred thousand dollars for a period of five years, giving us the income of five thousand dollars a year from this Fund provided it was matched by a similar amount from other individuals or organizations. This extra income of ten thou-

sand dollars a year, plus an average of one or two thousand dollars each year in addition, which was required by our budget, has literally saved the Diocese during this depression. A further condition of the gift was that at the end of five years the principal of this Fund, one hundred thousand dollars, must be matched by a similar amount, in order to establish an Endowment Fund of two hundred thousand dollars for Diocesan Extension and Maintenance Work. The date of expiration is May first, 1937. The Diocesan Council has therefore voted to undertake a campaign this spring, immediately after Easter, in order to match this one hundred thousand dollars. But as the necessary Budget of the Diocesan Extension and Maintenance Fund is now is the neighborhood of twelve thousand dollars a year, which the income from the two hundred thousand dollars would not be sufficient to cover, the Council voted to try to raise the sum of two hundred thousand dollars, making a total endowment of three hundred thousand dollars, the income from which would not only take care of our present budget but also would give us a margin with which we could undertake building operations from year to year at points where this has become a necessity.*

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Convention:

During the year the Department lost the services of three of its members: The Rev. Sumner Walters, former Chairman of the Department, who was transferred to the Diocese of California; the Rev. Robert Batchelder, who was transferred to the Diocese of Connecticut; the Rev. R. O. Kevin, Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, who, because of the pressure of work in other Diocesan activities, has resigned from the Department. The Department feels the loss of these former members, and appreciates the splendid service they have rendered. The activities are now being conducted by the following Committees: The Rev. John L. Hady, and the Rev. O. V. Jackson in charge of work in the college centers; Mrs. Irvin Mattick, work among the Isolated and Adult Education; the Rev. Leighton Nugent, Teacher Training School; Father Rawson, Church Schools; Mrs. O. H. Vornbrock, Secretary. The Rev. Frank Maples has just brought to a close his term of office as Chairman of the Church School Service League.

During the month of May, the annual presentation Service for the Lenten Mite Box Offering was held at Christ Church Cathedral with Bishop Parsons of California as speaker.

From June 16-21, the Missouri-West Missouri Summer Conference was held at Stephen's College, Columbia. The Rev. Richard M. Trelease of the Diocese of West Missouri was Dean, and the Rev. John L. Hady of Columbia was Associate Dean. The following subjects were offered: "Prayer," "New Testament," "Adjustments to Daily Life," "Girls' Friendly," "Review of Old Testament," "Youth Movements," "Religion and State," "How to Make the Parish Grow," "Aids to Worship," "Anti-Social Behaviour," "World Challenge to Christianity." There was a total enrollment of 165 with 55 enrolled from the Diocese of West Missouri, and 110 from the Diocese of Missouri. Twenty-seven scholarships at ten dollars each were allowed by the Diocese to Parishes and Missions of this Diocese.

In September, Father Rawson reported that those Churches, which had in previous years carried on Daily Vacation Bible Schools, had undertaken this work during the past summer.

During the last two weeks of October, and through the month of November on six Monday evenings, the Diocesan Teacher Training School was held, under the leadership of the Rev. Leighton Nugent. The following courses were given: "Principles of Teaching," "New Testament," "Outline of Church History," "The Prayer Book," There was an enrollment of 50 with an average attendance of 38. Credit will be given to 25, who have fulfilled the necessary requirements.

Mrs. Irvin Mattick, in visiting through the state, is gathering as complete a list as possible for her work among the Isolated. She is sending copies of the Daily Bible Readings, put out by the Forward Movement Commission, to such families as she feels would benefit through receiving them.

APPENDIX No. 13-A.

Report of the Finance Department for 1935.

In submitting the report of the Department of Finance for the year 1935 we are glad to point out that we have balanced Income with Expenditures. As was stated in this report last year, this has been brought about by applying the policy of reconciling projected budgets with expected revenue through the practice of the severest economy. This has meant, unfortunately, our having to continue the curtailment of some activities although we hope the time is not far off when the growing improvement in business conditions will be reflected in the finances of our Parishes and Missions, so that they may arrive at a position to assume greater obligations towards both the Diocesan Expense and Church Program Budgets, which will enable the Department to undertake their gradual re-instatement.

ment to undertake their gradual re-instatement.

The Diocesan Expense Budget (see Appendix 4), finishes the year with a surplus of \$2,535.73, and as all previous deficits in this Budget were wiped out last year, we may consider this a comfortable and encouraging situation. This condition enables us to extend a slight measure of relief to those Parishes who have borne the major part of the burden in financing this Budget in the past, by reducing their assessments from 11% to 10% of their expenses, for the year 1936.

The Church Program Budget (see Appendix 5), shows a deficit as of the date books were closed of \$2,876.95, part of which is the sum of \$2,566.61 due out of collections on our pledge to the National Church. Since closing, however, further collections have been received which, together with the money paid in through the Pence Fund and a transfer of a portion of the surplus in the Diocesan Expense Budget, have enabled us to remit \$10,000.00 to New York, which is \$100.00 more than our expectancy.

It might well be pointed out that the balancing of the Church Program Budget has only been achieved by reducing the payments of this Diocese to the National Church; but this is because of a very wise policy on the part of our Bishop to expend the necessary money to build up and strengthen our own weaker Parishes and Missions in order that they may be in a position to assume their own financial obligations and, in time, relieve the Diocese of contributing to their support. This consummation, devoutly to be wished, is already on the way.

The Bishop's Pence Fund instituted during 1934 has been carried on by some Parishes during the past year, from which the Diocesan office realized \$898.66. This entire sum, however, being ear-marked for the National Church as an extra pledge, does not appear in the Budget, but was a part of our expectancy.

As has always been the custom in this report, the Finance Department again expresses its appreciation of the support received from all Parishes and Missions in financing the obligations of the Diocese, up to the limit of their ability. We know it has meant sacrifices on their part, and we are most grateful.

APPENDIX No. 14.

Everyman's Offering Fund.

The suggestion of the Everyman's Offering Fund came from the members of the Church Council who had worked with Bishop Scarlett and realized the constant need of a fund to supplement the regular financial budget of the Diocese, and knew from actual experience the disappointments of budgets that did not work out as planned and the constant hardship of insufficient funds.

The women of this Diocese and many others have for years made their Thank Offering regularly, and only the Bishop and other heads of our Church can tell of the wonderful help this Fund has been in carrying on God's work. The loyalty of our women in this fine work is a challenge to the men of Missouri, which we believe they will accept in the same fine spirit, and carry on in a way that will make the Everyman's Offering Fund another real factor in our Church.

The collection of this Fund is to be within our Diocese, not of national scope, and the full amount so collected is to be turned over to the Bishop and the Council to be used at their discretion in the expansion of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

There is to be one Sunday set aside for the collection of this fund in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese of Missouri, and we earnestly ask in advance the full co-operation of the ministers and all other Church officers in making this new financial aid to our Church prove well worth while.

The Everyman's Offering is to be a free-will gift of one dollar or more from each man of the Episcopal Church of Missouri, and this gift is to be collected once each year on the Sunday so designated.

It shall be the duty of the committee to make all necessary preparations for collecting this Fund readily, to appoint a Churchman in each Parish or Mission to supervise this work, and the full amount collected is to be sent to the Chairman of the Committee at 1210 Locust St., no part of the Fund being retained by the Church or Mission in which it is collected.

This Committee welcomes now or at any future time helpful suggestions in establishing and carrying on this Fund and wishes to express in advance its appreciation of your co-operation.

APPENDIX No. 15.

Report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension for 1935.

The notable achievement of the past year has been the further strengthening of personnel in the Diocese by placing men of great promise in parishes and missions, some hitherto vacant. We note especially the advent of the Rev. John E. Hines to Hannibal, the Rev. Kenneth E. Heim to Ferguson, the Rev. Chas. C. Wilson to Holy Innocents, St. Louis, and the Rev. Wm. H. Kirk, added to the staff of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis.

During the year the parishes of Trinity Church and the Church of the Redeemer were merged and are now using the location at Washington and Euclid Avenues.

We again urge that those parishes that receive aid from the Diocesan Budget or from the Bishop's Extension Fund will feel increasingly their obligation to permit the Diocese to reduce these allocations in the amount of ten percent annually—none of this sum to be taken from the clergyman's salary. We note with appreciation that St. Paul's, Overland, is relieving the Diocese this next year of the sum of \$200.

The Church of the Holy Communion faces a serious problem because of drastic changes in population in the neighborhood. They hope to move into a location where the parish can more hopefully fulfill their parochial function. No decisions have been reached as by canonical order changes of location must be submitted to the Bishop and Standing Committee.

Efforts having been made to sell unused and unproductive Diocesan property so that the proceeds might be used for promising work elsewhere. Nothing definite has been achieved in this matter thus far.
