

## Rules of Order of Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
  - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - II. On Constitution and Canons.
  - III. On Unfinished Business.
  - IV. On Finance.
  - V. On Assessments.
  - VI. On Missions.
  - VII. On Christian Education.
  - VIII. On Sunday School Work.
  - IX. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
  - X. On the State of the Church.
  - XI. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

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# Journal of the Sixty-Sixth Convention

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### FIRST DAY.

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ST. PETER'S CHURCH, ST. LOUIS,  
*Tuesday, May 23, 1905.*

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the Clergy and Laity assembled in St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Church singing the two hundred and forty-ninth hymn.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. B. E. Reed, of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, of St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis.

The Convention sermon was preached by the Rev. Jesse K. Brennan, of St. Mark's Memorial Church, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Rev. S. E. Arthur, of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in St. Peter's Parish House the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Secretary of the Convention proceeded, under direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, appointed at the last Convention, whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report of the Committee containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then called the roll of the Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats in the Convention, and Delegates from twenty-two Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced a quorum of both orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the election of a Secretary of the Convention was the first order of business.

Mr. E. H. Lycett nominated Mr. Henry H. Denison to be Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

There being no other nominations, on motion of Rev. E. Duckworth the rules were suspended, and Rev. Mr. Potter was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Henry H. Denison as Secretary of the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Potter thereupon cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Denison, and Mr. Denison was declared duly elected Secretary of the Convention.

On motion of Mr. Jas. A. Waterworth, it was

*Resolved*, That visiting Clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and that they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

The following cards were laid on the Secretary's table:

Rev. H. M. Chittenden, Alton, Ill.; Rev. L. B. Richards, St. George's, Belleville, Ill.; Rev. Dr. E. P. Chittenden, Diocese of Kansas City, Mo.

On motion of Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the rules of order of the last Convention be adopted as the rules of order of this Convention.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Convention meet each morning for divine worship at 9 o'clock in St. Peter's Church, and for business in the St. Peter's Parish House at 10 a. m., to 1 o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 o'clock p. m., and continue to 5 o'clock p. m.

The hour of recess having arrived, on motion of Rev. Dr. Winchester the House took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

Miscellaneous business being in order.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Delegates from St. James', Macon, have not presented to the Secretary evidence that their Parish has paid in full the assessments standing against it; therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That such proof of payment of the assessments be dispensed with, and that the Delegates from St. James', Macon, be accorded their seats in the Convention.

Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy announced that while according to the printed report of the Treasurer Mt. Calvary owed \$90, that amount had been paid this morning, making \$450 paid into the Treasury this year.

Good Shepherd announced the amount owing paid in this morning.

The report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese was then presented and read by Mr. M. S. Snow, the Secretary of the Committee, as follows:

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri for the Conventional Year 1904-1905 are herewith respectfully submitted:

*June 14, 1904*—Organized by the election of the Rev. Wm. Short, D. D., as President, the Very Rev. C. M. Davis as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

Recommended Mr. Lincoln Russell Vercoe to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Diaconate.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Robert Strange, D. D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of East Carolina.

*June 23, 1904*—Recommended Mr. Emil Sherwood Harper to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Diaconate.

Recommended Mr. Frank E. Patrick to the Bishop of the Diocese as a candidate for Holy Orders.

Denied the request of the Bishop of the Diocese for unanimous consent to the restoration as a Presbyterian of Mr. Derrick Samuel Webster.

Declined to grant the request of the Rev. Benjamin T. Kemerer that he be recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood on or soon after June 29, 1904.

*September 12, 1904*—Gave consent to the appointment by the Bishop of the Diocese of Mr. Wm. R. Donaldson to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. T. K. Skinker in the representation of the Lay Deputies of Missouri for the coming General Convention.

*September 26, 1904*—Gave consent to such shortening of the time of candidacy of the Rev. B. T. Kemerer, Deacon, as to admit of his ordination to the Priesthood at the pleasure of the Bishop of the Diocese.

*November 15, 1904*—Gave consent to such shortening of the time of candidacy of the Rev. J. C. Ingham, Deacon, as to admit of his ordination to the Priesthood at the discretion of the Bishop of the Diocese.

*December 23, 1904*—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Charles Edward Woodcock, D. D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Kentucky.

Granted to the Rev. Lincoln Russell Vercoe a dispensation from the study of the Greek language.

*February 27, 1905*—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. James Henry Darlington, D. D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Harrisburg.

*May 17, 1905*—Recommended Mr. Clayton Earl Wheat to the Bishop of the Diocese as a candidate for Holy Orders.

Recommended Rev. George Lloyd, Deacon, to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Priesthood at the Discretion of the Bishop.

Granted to the Rev. Lincoln Russell Vercoe, Deacon, a dispensation from the study of the Latin language.

Approved the report of the official acts of the Standing Committee for the Conventional Year 1904-5, prepared by the Secretary for submission to the Annual Diocesan Convention.

Authorized the Vice-President of the Standing Committee to certify to the correctness of the minutes of this meeting.

*Resolved*, That that portion of the Bishop's address which refers to the Diocese's apportionment for Domestic and Foreign Missions be referred to a special committee of three, with direction to report to this Convention to-morrow some plan for securing the payment of the full amount of this year's apportionment.

The Chair appointed as said Committee, Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, Mr. E. H. Lycett, and Mr. S. M. Phelan, with instructions to report to-morrow.

The annual report of the Treasurer of the Diocese was presented and read by Mr. I. Shreve Carter, the Treasurer of the Diocese. (See Appendix No. 2.)

On motion the foregoing report was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The report of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund was presented and read by Mr. I. Shreve Carter, the Treasurer of the Fund. (See Appendix No. 3.)

On motion the report was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The report of the Treasurer of the Theological Educational Fund was presented and read by the Treasurer, Mr. I. Shreve Carter. (See Appendix No. 4.)

On motion the report was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The report of the Diocesan Trustees of the University of the South was presented and read by Rev. Dr. Winchester, the Clerical Trustee, as follows:

Two years ago the Diocese of Missouri accepted the articles of affiliation put forth by the Trustees of the University of the South, and the Trustees of this Diocese are now in cordial co-operation with the band of devoted workers laboring for the upbuilding of Christian and Theological Education in our country.

The University is growing year by year in influence. Every department is striving through professors and students to attain somewhat of the high ideals set by its founders and for which every building there erected through heroic sacrifice, stands.

The number of students steadily increases and new professors of scholarly attainments are yearly added to the faculty staff.

Governed, as the University is, by the Bishop, one clerical and two lay Trustees from the eighteen Dioceses and Missionary Jurisdictions, with a most enthusiastic body of alumni scattered especially in the South, with friends in every section of the country and in our mission fields, we predict a glorious future for this already great University of the Church. Last year your Clerical Trustee reported \$120 paid by Missouri into the Theological Department. This year he has sent \$140. May we not ask our people to remember the University of the South when they can spare gifts for the uplifting of their fellow men? Missouri has two students in the Theological Departments. One of our Cathedral staff in St. Louis is an alumnus of last year, and two of our Clergy last year attended the summer school—a school that invites our Clergy to enjoy the privileges of the most scholarly lecturers of the Church.

The visit of the Vice-Chancellor and the Chaplain of the University last winter and the cordial reception by the alumni at the Bishop's hospitable home awakened much interest, and as a material result I understand about \$1,000 were contributed towards the new Chapel about to be erected in the quadrangle of buildings.

As Clerical Trustee I can only ask the sympathetic co-operation of the Clergy and laity of Missouri in behalf of the Theological Department in particular, believing that the investment will yield a spiritual dividend that will outlast material things.

The motion was adopted.

Thereupon the Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Dr. J. R. Winchester, Rev. Dr. William Short, Dean Carroll M. Davis, Messrs. T. K. Skinker, M. S. Snow, and James L. Ford, and the Rt. Rev. President then declared these gentlemen to be duly elected as the Standing Committee for the ensuing year.

The Rev. Mr. Miller, Registrar, made a verbal report, concluding with remarks concerning the Diocesan library.

The Librarian, Rev. Claude E. Remick, then read the following report :

During the past year the library has been recatalogued, and we have received about four hundred volumes from the late Dean Schuyler's library. The Diocesan library now contains about twelve hundred volumes. The Journals of the Diocese, the Church News and the Spirit of Missions have been bound up to date. We have not a complete file of the Journals of the General Convention, but it is hoped that this may be remedied during the coming year. Over three hundred volumes are in open shelves, without any protection from the dust, and these shelves are borrowed. An appropriation of \$25 is needed for new book cases. Only eight volumes have been borrowed from the library during the past year. This small number is caused by the fact that we have no printed catalogues for distribution, consequently those who would like to borrow books have no means of knowing what the library contains.

Rev. Mr. Miller moved that the Convention appropriate \$50, to be used for library purposes, during the ensuing year.

After considerable discussion, this motion was carried.

The next order of business being the reports of Committees, the Rev. Mr. Elmer presented the report of the Committee on State of the Church, as follows:

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

The work during the past year has not been as prosperous as we had hoped it would be. There seems to have been a lull in spiritual work all along the line. The only new works started in the Diocese are three Missions in St. Louis—the first fruits of our new City Missionary. Without doubt most of our Parishes and Missions have held their own, and some perhaps have increased in power. While we are thankful to Almighty God for these blessings we are not satisfied. This is not progress; it is merely marking time, and it behooves us to try and find out the cause which is holding back our work.

Our present Missionary Canon was framed about fourteen years ago. It gave to the Missionary Board very large powers. They were empowered not simply to vote funds, but to do aggressive work, and carry this Church of ours into every county of the Diocese. They have the power to buy building lots, to build churches, to start new missions, and to raise the funds necessary for these purposes. So far these powers have not been used. Not a single lot has been purchased, not a mission church built,

not a new mission started on the initiative of the Missionary Board. All the work done has been largely, if not altogether, by special personal effort. Meanwhile the population of the Diocese has been increased by hundreds of thousands, and the ratio of church members has decreased in proportion to population. In plain words, the Church is losing ground in the Diocese. Why is this so?

Your committee believes it is largely caused by the Missionary Board having no representative in the field. This Board is composed of busy men, both clerical and lay. These men can not leave their churches and their business in order to investigate actual conditions and the needs of new fields.

Again this work can not be done by the Bishop. His duties are very heavy, and he can speak only for the fields actually occupied. He can not go into the new field and investigate its possibilities, so we believe that the only way in which the work in the Diocese can be done is for the Board to have its representative in the field—a Diocesan Missionary who shall be its eyes and ears and tongue. This Missionary must give his whole time to the work, and lay before Bishop and Board the needs of the field. This we believe to be the only way in which our work may be extended. Therefore, your committee offer the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Missionary Board be instructed to raise the funds for the support of an Archdeacon and that the Bishop be requested thereupon to make appointment in accordance with Canon IX."

The noonday services having been concluded, Professor Snow suggested that the report of the Committee on State of the Church being so intimately connected with the work laid down for the afternoon session, discussion of same be postponed.

The following report and resolution was presented by the Rev. Mr. Jones for the Special Committee on United Thank Offering:

*Resolved*, That it be the sense of this Convention that the movement for raising a layman's united thank offering for Missions to be presented at the General Convention in Richmond, Va., in 1907, deserves our endorsement and our hearty co-operation.

Much, however, as we approve of this measure we consider that it would be unwise to endorse it if it should in any way divert interest or funds from the apportionment which we consider to be of paramount importance.

Mr. E. Freegard moved the postponement of action in this matter until the next convention, which motion was lost, after considerable discussion.

Upon motion, the report of the Special Committee on Men's United Thank Offering for 1907 was adopted.

Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy read the following notice of proposed amendment to Canon 12:

Notice is hereby given of the following proposed amendment to Canon XII:

Canon XII, Section 1, is hereby amended by striking out of said section the words, "unless closed earlier by the unanimous consent of the electors present," and inserting in lieu thereof the following words, "provided, however, that after the polls have been kept open for one hour, they may be closed at any time thereafter by the unanimous consent of the presiding officer and the electors present."

And moved that this amendment be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, which motion was carried.

Rev. B. T. Kemerer offered the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, It seems necessary to the welfare of the Diocese that a means of communication be established between all the families and Parishes of the Diocese; and

WHEREAS, It seems impossible to secure a general circulation of the Church News under the present subscription plan; therefore, be it

*Resolved*, That the Diocese publish the Church News circulate a sufficient number of copies free of charge, to reach every family of the Diocese, and pay all expenses above the amount derived from the advertising.

*Resolved*, That this Convention elect a committee of three laymen, who shall have charge of all matters pertaining to the publication.

On motion it was ordered that this matter be made the order of the day Thursday morning at 10:30.

Recess was then taken until 2:30.

The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 p. m.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn presented and read the report of the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 5.)

The resolution offered by the Committee regarding the assessment of \$6,000 for expenses, was, on motion, carried and referred to the Committee on Assessments, which was instructed accordingly.

The following resolution was offered by the Rev. Dr. Winchester:

WHEREAS, The proceedings of the first four Conventions of the Diocese of Missouri exist only in manuscript form,

*Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Diocese be authorized to have printed the proceedings of the first, second, third and fourth Conventions of the Diocese of Missouri, provided the proceedings of the first Convention can be procured; otherwise that the proceedings of the other three Conventions above named be printed and bound in one volume—one hundred copies.

On motion the resolution was adopted.

Rev. Dr. Winchester presented the following report of the Committee appointed to take into consideration that part of the Bishop's Address referring to the Rev. Dr. Robert, and moved that same be adopted by a rising vote of the convention.

The report was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Mr. F. J. McMaster then moved that a separate page of the Journal be set aside for the printing of these resolutions, which motion was carried. (See Resolutions opposite.)

Mr. F. J. McMaster next presented and read the report on St. Stephen's Chimes account. (See Appendix No. 9.)

Mr. E. H. Lycett, Treasurer of the Missionary Board, presented and read the Treasurer's report. (See Appendix No. 10.)

Mr. E. H. Lycett read the report of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society. (See Appendix No. 11.)

Mr. E. H. Lycett next presented and read the Treasurer's report of St. Stephen's Mission. (See Appendix No. 12.)

Mr. Denison, Secretary of the Convention, read the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. (See Appendix No. 13.)

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After a life of faithful service to his Lord and the Church, the **Rev. D. G. Robert**, Doctor of Divinity, fell asleep on Sept. 26th, 1904, in the seventy-seventh year of his age.

Dr. Robert's striking personality had impressed itself upon Diocesan and General Conventions. Three times he served as deputy in the General Convention. For many years he was President of the Standing Committee, and Examining Chaplain of this Diocese.

The Church of the Holy Communion, St. Louis, is a monument to his labor; but his memory is enshrined in many hearts, as we, his co-workers, find in our pastoral rounds of duty in this great city.

**BE IT Resolved:** That in the courage of his ministerial life we have been stimulated to greater activity; that in the resignation of seven long years of physical suffering he has taught us the beautiful lesson of patience; and that in his triumph over death he has bequeathed to us an example of heroic faith, illustrative of the inspired words, "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even your faith."

**Resolved,** that the Church Militant, in his death has lost an able defender of the faith, a devoted pastor and a loyal priest; that we thank God for his good works, and extend our sympathy to the family, where he was the affable host, the companionable father, and loving husband.

May our last end be like his, filled with "the peace of God which passeth all understanding."

The Rt. Rev. President then declared the order of business to be nominations for election of members of the Missionary Board.

On motion, the rules were ordered suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the re-election of the fifteen gentlemen, six clergymen and nine laymen, constituting the present Missionary Board, as follows:

Dean Davis moved that the Convention proceed to the election of five Clerical and five Lay Delegates to attend the Missionary Conference of the Sixth Missionary Department, which is to meet in Denver, Colo., on October 18th, 1905.

Rev. Mr. Brennan moved that a committee of three be appointed to make nominations.

This motion was duly seconded and carried.

The Chair thereupon appointed as such committee Rev. Mr. Davis, Rev. Mr. Blaisdell, and Mr. W. B. Shields, with instructions to report Thursday morning to the Convention.

Rev. Mr. Miller presented a paper referring to the *Church News*.

Dean Davis then presented and read report on the Church Building Fund.

Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy then offered to present report of Committee on Constitution and Canons, recommending passage of a proposed amendment.

The Chair ruled that one day's notice should be given; thereupon, the matter was laid over until Thursday.

The usual hour of adjournment having arrived, on motion, the Convention adjourned until 10 o'clock a. m. Thursday, May 25th, 1905.

## THIRD DAY.

ST. PETER'S PARISH HOUSE,  
*St. Louis, May 25, 1905.*

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order.

On motion, the calling of the roll was dispensed with, owing to the fact that many of the delegates were engaged in committee meetings.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the proceedings of the second day of the Convention, which were approved.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that the Reports of Committees were in order.

Thereupon the report of the Committee on Sunday School Work was presented and read by Rev. B. E. Reed, as follows:

Your Committee on Sunday Schools herewith reports:

Your committee, in common with the entire Convention, deeply feel the profound importance, even the necessity of the Sunday School, as one of the largest factors in the building up of the Church on a solid and lasting foundation. We hardly hope in a brief report to deepen this conviction, but we may bring somewhat more forcibly to mind the important part the Sunday School plays in Church efficiency by recalling the fact that last year the gifts of the Sunday Schools of this Diocese amounted to over \$2,700, and there is good reason for reckoning that the gifts, in the reports this year of the Lenten offerings and the Missionary Host, will come nearer \$3,000, making probably gifts to Missionary work of the Church over \$5,700 in two years.

There are other considerations that deepen the obligation of the Church to the Sunday School. In the report of Confirmations, it is found in most churches that many, if not the larger number of confirmees, are from the Sunday School. Among the active and efficient workers and generous givers, whether among men or women in the Church, it is found that the larger number have been Sunday School children. This is so natural that it is inevitable.

Taking note of the value that the religious denominations of our country place upon Sunday Schools we are impressed with the carefully thought-

out plans, the activities, the incessant efforts they make to build up large and efficient schools. In fact, they seem to say give us the children and we thank you for the adults.

So often has this Convention pondered and so thoroughly discussed this subject that your committee does not hope to present any new thought, but does venture to make a suggestion for holding the children in the Sunday School till they pass over into active service into the Church; for increasing the attendance; and giving a traditional tie even from earliest years to the Church through the School. The suggestion is, the free, full use of all the agencies that go with what is termed in our day, the Institutional Church.

One further word we must add. The Supreme power of all Church life is the indwelling Spirit of God. With His presence the humblest mission house is the temple of God; without His presence the largest, most progressive and prosperous School is but a secular institution, and whatever it may be building up, is not building up the Church of God.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, duly seconded, all consideration of this matter was deferred until Mr. Miller could be upon the floor, he being at this time engaged upon committee work.

The Chair directed that the report be laid upon the table for the present.

Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy, Chairman of the Committee on the Transferring of the Fund for the Support of the Aged and Infirm Clergy, reported that the Committee had no report to make.

The Chair referred the matter to the Committee on Unfinished Business.

The Chair then called upon the Secretary to read the list of pledges made the previous day, in order that any additions, changes or corrections might be made. The Secretary read the list of pledges.

(All additional pledges are included in Appendix No. 14.)

The Chair announced that at 8 o'clock Thursday evening there would be a meeting at St. Luke's Hospital of the Association of St. Luke's Hospital.

Also, that after the final adjournment of the Convention there would be a meeting of an electoral body, consisting of the members of the Standing Committee, Missionary Board and Deputies to the General Convention to elect three members of the Cathedral Chapter.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn then read the report of the St. Luke's Hospital Association, with request that it be printed in the Journal. (See Appendix No. 15.)

Rev. Mr. Duckworth presented and read the report of the Chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital. (See Appendix No. 16.)

The time having arrived for the noonday service, by direction of the Bishop the Convention joined in the singing of the 254th hymn, and Rev. Dr. Winchester conducted the services.

The services being concluded, the Committee appointed for that purpose reported to the Convention the name of Mr. C. C. Curtice as Financial Manager of the *Church News*.

On motion of Mr. Kemerer the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Curtice.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared Mr. C. C. Curtice elected as Financial Manager of the *Church News*.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that he appointed as Editor of the *Church News* the Rev. G. D. B. Miller.

The report of the Committee on Assessments was read by the Secretary, and on motion, adopted. (Appendix No. 17.)

Rev. Mr. Duckworth announced that in behalf of St. James, St. Louis, he wished to add the \$10 reduction in its assessment to the Hospital Mission Fund. (Included in Appendix No. 14.)

Mr. Condie, of Ferguson, asked for a reduction of the assessment against that church to \$65. A motion to that effect was made, and the ayes and noes being called for, the same were taken. The vote resulted, ayes, 18; noes, 32, and the motion was declared lost.

Rev. Mr. Brown, of the Church of the Redeemer, announced that in view of the moderate assessment laid upon the parish by the Committee, the Church of the Redeemer would add \$50 to the pledge for the support of an Archdeacon. (Included in Appendix No. 14.)

Being called upon by the Chair to explain why the full amount of \$6,000 was not assessed, Mr. Lycett, Chairman of the Committee on Assessments, reported that the committee had conference with and the consent of the Finance Committee.

Rev. Dr. Winchester, calling for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, the Secretary read the report relating to change of name of the Diocese.

Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy, rising to a point of order, stated that the report of the Standing Committee called for was made by a committee out of existence.

The Chair ruled that the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred a matter, has a right at the succeeding convention to report on the subject matter referred to them. The report is in order, and the Chair decides the point of order not well taken.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Duckworth the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the thanks of this Convention be given to the Rev. J. K. Brennan for his clear and strong sermon at the opening of the Convention; and be it further

*Resolved*, That he be requested to furnish a copy of the same to be published in the Church News

Rev. G. D. B. Miller offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the following amendments be made in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, viz.:

- (1) Wherever the name Diocese of Missouri occurs, said name be changed to Diocese of St. Louis.
- (2) That in the Application for Organizing a Mission, under Section 1, of Canon VIII, Bishop of Missouri be changed to Bishop of St. Louis.
- (3) The same change to be made in Form A, under Canon X.
- (4) In the "Articles of Association," Article 3, line 6, Missouri be changed to St. Louis.

Discussion followed.

Mr. F. J. McMaster made a motion that the matter be recommitted to the present Committee on Constitution and Canons, to report immediately after recess, which motion was duly seconded and carried.

Recess was then taken until 2:30 p. m.

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The Convention reassembled after recess, at 2:30 p. m.

Rev. Mr. Reed then spoke in behalf of Bishop Robertson Hall.

Rev. Dr. Winchester then read the following report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, brought over from the morning session, on account of the absence of the Rev. Mr. Miller:

The Committee on Constitutions and Canons, to whom was referred the proposed amendments to the Canons, offered by Rev. G. D. B. Miller, as printed on the thirty-fourth page of the Journal of 1904, beg leave to report that they see no satisfactory reason why said proposed amendments should be adopted, and therefor offer the following resolutions:

*Resolved*, That said proposed amendments to the Canons be not adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President then nominated as Chancellor for the ensuing three years Mr. F. J. McMaster, and on motion of Dean

Davis the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. F. J. McMaster.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that Mr. F. J. McMaster had been elected Chancellor of the Diocese for the ensuing three years.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Elmer, the Rev. Mr. C. E. Remick was nominated as Librarian. There being no other nominations, upon motion, the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Rev. C. E. Remick.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that the Rev. C. E. Remick was duly elected Librarian for the ensuing year.

On motion of Dean Davis, seconded by Rev. Mr. Potter, Mr. I. Shreve Carter was nominated as Treasurer.

There being no other nominations, on motion, the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. I. Shreve Carter, as Treasurer of the Diocese.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that Mr. I. Shreve Carter was duly elected Treasurer of the Diocese.

On motion, Mr. C. S. Freeborn, Mr. I. Shreve Carter, and Mr. F. N. Judson were duly nominated as Trustees for the Permanent Episcopate Fund, and there being no other nominations, on motion, the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for these gentlemen.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President then declared Messrs. C. S. Freeborn, I. S. Carter and F. N. Judson duly elected as Trustees of the Permanent Episcopate Fund.

On motion of Prof. Snow the following gentlemen were nominated as Trustees of the Theological Educational Fund :

Rev. W. A. Hatch.

Mr. Henry H. Denison.

Mr. E. J. Thomas.

There being no other nominations, on motion, the rules were suspended and Rev. Mr. Potter was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the above-named gentlemen.

Rev. Mr. Potter cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that Rev. Mr. Hatch and Messrs. Henry H. Denison and E. J. Thomas were duly elected Trustees of the Theological Educational Fund.

On motion of Prof. Snow the following were nominated Trustees of the Fund for the support of Aged and Infirm Clergy :

Rev. J. C. Jones.

Mr. W. R. Donaldson.

Mr. W. P. Nelson.

There being no other nominations the Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for these gentlemen.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Chair then declared the Rev. J. C. Jones, Messrs. W. R. Donaldson and W. P. Nelson duly elected as Trustees of the Fund for the Support of Aged and Infirm Clergy.

On motion, Rev. C. M. Davis, Messrs. James L. Ford and Wm. Bagnell were nominated as Diocesan Committee for the Apportionment on General Missions. There being no other nominations, on motion, the rules were suspended and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the above named gentlemen.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President declared that Rev. C. M. Davis and Messrs. James L. Ford and Wm. Bagnell were duly elected as Diocesan Committee for the Apportionment on General Missions.

Prof. M. S. Snow offered the following resolution, which was, on motion, adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese for \$25 in favor of the Sexton of St. Peter's Church, for his services during the sessions of the Convention.

Dean Davis offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the hearty thanks of the Convention be extended to Mrs. O'Fallon, and the ladies associated with her, for the delightful luncheons served during the sessions of the Convention.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Harper, and at the suggestion of the Bishop, a rising vote was taken on the same, and it was unanimously adopted.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Harper the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese in favor of the Choir of St. Peter's Church for the sum of \$25 for services rendered at the opening of the Convention.

On motion of Mr. T. Ewing White the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Secretary be instructed to have five hundred copies of the Journal printed and distributed.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Brennan the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the thanks of this Convention be extended to the Rector, Assistant Rector and Vestry of St. Peter's Church for their kind and generous hospitality to the Convention this year.

Rev. Mr. Kemerer presented and read report of Committee on Missionaries' Traveling Expenses. (See Appendix No. 18.)

Dean Davis made a motion that the \$2.75 surplus shown by the report be appropriated for the Archdeacon Fund.

Rev. Mr. Lloyd offered an amendment that this surplus be devoted to the repairing of an old piano in use in one of the Missions under his charge.

Which amendment, being accepted by Dean Davis, was adopted unanimously.

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Prof. M. S. Snow offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Rt. Rev. President be authorized to certify to the correctness of this day's proceedings.

Rev. Mr. Winchester offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That we extend our loving sympathy to Rev. Geo. H. Hunt, an esteemed priest of this Diocese, in his trying illness, and assure him of our prayers that the same power which so long has blessed will still lead him on.

The next order of business being selection of the place for holding the next Convention, Mr. F. N. Judson, in behalf of St. Peter's Church, extended an invitation to hold the next Convention at St. Peter's Parish House.

Dean Davis then extended the same invitation on behalf of Christ Church Cathedral, and on motion of Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy, Christ Church Cathedral was selected as the place in which to hold the next Convention.

Rev. Dr. Winchester then offered the following resolution, which was carried:

*Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Diocese be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer for the sum of \$50 for the Diocesan Library.

After some closing remarks by the Chair, the Convention joined in singing "Gloria in Excelsis."

There being no further business before the house, the Rt. Rev. President announced that after pronouncing of the benediction this Convention would stand adjourned.

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DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY—There is one minor strain in the melody of cheering welcome which I would extend to you as we gather for our annual consideration of the interests of the Church in this Diocese. That is, the knowledge that the Rector of the Church where we meet cannot be with us in full activity. He and his people last year gave us a cordial invitation to be their guests in this Church for this annual Convention. And we are here with thanks for the kind invitation, and to note how wisely and well, how thoughtfully and generously he and his have provided here a home for all parochial activities. He is not actively with us, because in God's providence his strength is not firm enough to bear great demands upon it. Our thanks to him, our love for him, our sympathy with him, go forth from all our hearts, not without prayers that God's merciful goodness will restore him to health and active work.

I cannot forbear to say out my deep appreciation and unqualified admiration of the conduct of the people of St. Peter's Parish under the trying ordeal of the sickness and prolonged absence of their Rector. Not only have they remained steadily loyal and generously loving to him, but I am profoundly impressed with the way in which, under the faithful assistant minister and the watchful and efficient and unselfish vestry, they have gone steadily on to do, and to do cheerily, their parish duty. I may mention as an indication of their loyalty and dutifulness and unselfishness that they appropriated for Missions all their large and generous Easter offerings. Dark, gathering clouds furnish once and again the waters of refreshment. Sickness, absence, disappointment, deprivation, are lowering earth clouds indeed. But God's heavenly blessings may come out of them, love and loyalty and sympathy and generous devotion and union and brotherhood and self-sacrifice.

Three of my brethren in the House of Bishops have departed this life. All were aged men.

Bishop Huntington had been Bishop for thirty-five years. He came to us from the Unitarians when forty years old. Having found the Master to a satisfying certainty, the remaining forty-five years of his life were

ruled by the fervent devotion of a Thomas, exclaiming, "My Lord and my God." He disliked parliamentary technicalities, and was too impatient of the verbiages of debate and the violences of discussion to become a leader in the assemblies of men. But his pen was one of power, endowed with an unusual combination of vigor and grace; and his character and learning gave him weight of influence in whatever line he chose to exercise it.

Bishop McLaren was younger, not quite seventy-four. He came to us from the Presbyterians, and had all their strength and solidity of theological acquirement. He was Bishop for near thirty years. His intellectual ability, his clear and strong grasp upon problems to be solved, his profound and accurate knowledge of Canon law, and his industrious devotion to duty made him a valuable and influential member of the House of Bishops, until in the last few years physical infirmities obliged him to leave vacant his seat therein.

Bishop Watson was a very embodiment of faithfulness and unselfish devotion. He was greatly beloved in his own Diocese, and, bred as a lawyer as he had been, and a painstaking student of Canon law, he was of great value as counselor in the House of Bishops. He was the oldest living Bishop of us all, dying in his eighty-seventh year. He was elected to be the first Bishop of East Carolina when he was nearly sixty-six years old. But the people among whom he had spent his life—though he was northern born, a native of New York City—so esteemed and loved him that no one else was thought of for their first Bishop. Affectionately, devotedly, uncomplainingly, he ministered for twenty-one years to one of the poorest, in material means, of all our Dioceses. But growths and fruitages sprang up unceasingly around the life and labors of God's humble, faithful servant.

The oldest Bishop left among us living is Bishop Morris of Oregon. He has gone on doing his Episcopal and missionary work till into his eighty-sixth year, and is only just now calling for a Bishop Coadjutor.

From the ranks of the clergy of our own Diocese a striking and distinguished figure has passed away. The name of the Rev. Dr. Robert appears first in the Diocesan Journal of 1870. For more than thirty-five years his home was here. The Church of the Holy Communion was his own child. As Deputy to the General Convention, and upon our own Standing Committee, he had done faithful and frequent service. And he was one of the most diligent and painstaking and able of Examining Chaplains. His life and work were interwoven into the life and growth of the Diocese for more than an entire generation. The remembrance of his patient cheerfulness, when in his last year he was obliged to lay by active work, blends with our abiding gratitude for his loving service in the Church Militant.

Judge Holladay, our Warden at Fredericktown, was an instance of how integrity of character and purity of soul and resoluteness of will not only commend themselves in the sight of the Lord, but how that

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also, triumphing over physical infirmities, they work helpfulness and usefulness to fellowmen. Sadly crippled in limbs and back, he yet did duty as lawyer, citizen, Christian and churchman, and so sturdily did it, as to command the confidence and win the affectionate esteem of all the community where he lived, and to draw forth their reverent and sorrowful tears when he was carried forth to his burial.

Mr. Ashley W. Ewing, Senior Warden at Jefferson City, was an humble soul and a faithful Christian and a much-loved man. Faith, hope and love were blended in him in a way, we reverently think, that St. Paul would have approved. Love was the greatest. And so a legion of friends were his, for all who knew him were friends.

Mr. W. H. Woodward was not only a prominent citizen and business man of St. Louis, but had been for many years a faithful and generous vestryman of Grace Church, where once his father was the Rector.

Mr. Edwin Harrison had been for many years identified with St. George's, St. Louis, as vestryman and wise counselor and generous supporter. The Church and the city also, which has long known and honored him, deplore his death.

Mrs. Percival, of Old Orchard, and Miss Lee, of Palmyra, were, each in her own sphere, earnest and devoted servants and helpers of the Church.

The Diocese is much the poorer for the departure of all these, and of many more whom it is impossible to enumerate in detail. May God, in His merciful goodness, warm the love and deepen the loyalty and quicken the active duty of one and another and yet another who may come forward to fill the vacant places, that the ranks of the Militant Church may be kept full and the work may not fail or weaken!

The outlook upon the Diocese in some respects is not as bright as we could wish.

The vacancies in number and continuance have been unusually disquieting. Among the Parishes, Jefferson City and Moberly have been for a considerable time vacant. And Ferguson looks to lose its Rector soon. And the Mission Stations vacant are Bevier, Canton, Crystal City, Kirksville, La Plata, Oakside, Portland, Shelbina and Thayer. Of these nine we reasonably expect three to remain vacant. The problem is to fill the other six. Yet I am hoping that Canton will be looked after from Hannibal, and Crystal City from De Soto; and that Thayer will perhaps be able to call its own Pastor. So the six vacancies may be really reduced to three.

This year the Confirmations have been only 517, nineteen less than last year. On the old suggested base of estimating one confirnee for each ten Communicants, we ought to have 741. The vacancies are answerable, to some degree, for our smaller number. So very much indeed depends upon the Pastor. If there be no shepherd of the flock, the older ones are not admonished and the younger ones are not trained for Confirmation. I hope every clergyman will bear in mind and put in

practice an excellent suggestion, which doubtless you all have seen, namely, that at once, so soon as the Bishop has made his visit and confirmed one class, the Pastor should begin to enter in his diary or visiting book the names of one and another and yet another whom he hopes to have and, please God, means to have, and whom he intends to aim and work to have, in the next class for Confirmation.

May I talk of the great national Missionary Society of the Church for Domestic and Foreign Missions, of which I am the President?

It must have \$850,000 for its needs this year. It has asked us of Missouri to give \$5,500 of this sum. Up to April 1 we had given only \$1,585.85; and this is \$100 less than the amount given at the same date last year. And the year ends August 31, 1905. There are only four months left for working; three of them, too, are usually the most unfruitful for giving of all the year. It is not a record of which we can be proud. I am sorry for it. This great Missionary Society supports twenty-six Missionary Bishops and hundreds and hundreds of Missionaries. Yet we seem not steadily and lovingly loyal enough to it to furnish our \$5,500.

But after all I refuse to be utterly cast down. Of our *fifty-six* Parishes to whom our own Committee, consisting of Dean Davis and Messrs. Ford and Bagnell, have apportioned the \$5,500, *eleven* have already paid in full the amount asked of them; and *twenty-three* have paid in part. And I feel quite sure that the remaining twenty-two are not going to leave the space opposite their names in the list ingloriously vacant. I am sure there is a spirit abroad in the Diocese to stand by the great Society and to do more and more for it. I point for proof to the unselfish action of St. Peter's, St. Louis, to which I have already alluded. And I know from what others have said and have done in various parts of the Diocese that love for, and loyalty to, and pride in our great work of General Missions is on the increase. Thank God! I earnestly hope we may reach our \$5,500 this year. But if we do not, I shall not be daunted, for I am convinced that interest in Missions and generousness towards Missions are on the increase.

The children of the Church and the women of the Church have led in Special Auxiliary gifts for the great Missionary work. And now the men are specially organizing themselves to try to do their part. The plan is this: For the men of the entire Church of the nation to send or carry down to Richmond in October, 1907, for the General Convention, a United Thank-Offering for Missions. A Central Committee in Philadelphia and Diocesan Committees in the eighty-eight Dioceses and Missionary Districts are now forming, having before them these two objects to accomplish: 1. To get a registered list of all the men throughout America who are Communicants of, or cordially connected with, this Church. 2. To provide that every one of these men, between now and October 1, 1907, shall be approached personally by some man, who shall speak of Missions and afford to the man spoken to an opportunity to give some-

thing, whether much or little, to swell this United Thank-Offering. I venture to think it an excellent plan for extending intelligent interest and for increasing faithful zeal. But I also venture to think, from some experience now spread over a considerable number of years, that no formulated plan, even if never so admirable, will work itself. Willing minds and hands masculine, and united hearts and sympathies masculine, must be enlisted for the outworking. It is evident that the women's example has stirred the men to this effort. It was wonderful at the General Convention of Boston to witness the women of the country bringing upwards of \$150,000 for their United Offering for Missions. Our Diocesan Committee for the Men's United Offering consists of the Rev. Dr. Winchester and Rev. Messrs. Potter, Elmer and Jones, and Messrs. McMaster, Phelan, Edwards and McBride. The Bishop, as President of the Society, and the Dean, as the Secretary of the Sixth Missionary Department, hope to co-work actively with this Committee.

Conferences in the different Missionary Departments are now provided to take the place of the former Missionary Councils. Our Department is the Sixth, and consists of the Dioceses of Missouri, Kansas City, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado and Montana, and the Missionary Districts of Duluth, North Dakota, South Dakota, Laramie and Salina. The next Conference of our Department is to meet in Denver, October 18, next. I hope a goodly delegation of clergymen and laymen who can and will attend may be chosen by this Convention.

Missions are the same in essence, whatever be the qualifying adjective prefixed. They are tellings out of Christ's mercy and love, and profferings of Christ's grace and help to perishing souls.

Our Diocesan Missionary Board steadily appropriates the sums entrusted to it to sustain services in the poorer Parishes and Mission Stations of the Diocese. Just as steadily, as for instance on to-morrow afternoon, you pledge to the Board the amounts necessary to keep this Missionary work in heathful flow. Always, since I have known anything of it, the Board has carried a working surplus of \$1,500. And so, a Missionary has never been obliged to wait one hour for his quarterly stipend when due. Last year the pledges were \$4,417. This year we need them to be \$4,600 to keep the work of the Board in sound and healthful condition.

Of St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis, I cannot speak too highly. Its reverent worship, its large Sunday-school of 500 or more—the largest in the Diocese—its class of twenty-eight confirmed, and its unceasing activities of guilds and clubs and meetings make it a very shining sun of benevolence and beneficence for all the region round about. And there is now an outcry for more room needed. Among many other good things which the Woman's Auxiliary does it furnishes \$100 per month to help St. Stephen's. In all, the Auxiliary has gathered and distributed \$5,850.11 this year. What would we do, what could we do, without the Woman's Auxiliary of Missouri?

Hospital Missions, under Rev. M. Kemerer and his faithful and unselfish corps of men and women workers, have been steadily and helpfully visiting the sick, and those in prison, throughout the year. For the sustentation of these \$1,800 are needed. Last year only \$1,142 were pledged. I cannot think that any one of us wants this truly Christ-like work to be stopped or hindered.

Last year was launched a new departure by putting a City Missionary into the field, Rev. William Cochran. For visible results we have three new Missions started, St. Barnabas', St. Timothy's and Holy Cross. In these, *thirty-two* have been confirmed. For invisible results, Church truth and Church worship have been laid hold of gratefully and appreciatively in centers and among people who knew absolutely nothing about them before. I am convinced that the wisdom and kindness of providing a special City Missionary have been abundantly justified by the outcome.

Several of our Parishes are sustaining Missions of their own. The Cathedral has the Cathedral Mission. St. Mark's has Epiphany. Ascension has Advent. St. James' has St. Luke's.

And the children! What a loyal and reliable set of helpers they are! Bless their steadfast hearts, every one! From them the gifts flow into the "Missionary Host," and then out to the Bishop for Missionary work, as quietly and unceasingly as falling dew. Their *one thousand* dollars for the "Missionary Host," and their more than *fifteen hundred* dollars of Lenten offerings for Missions, work precious, untold blessings to them who give and them who receive.

Therefore, if we did begin with an outlook not very bright, we have reached in the survey a larger room of sunshine and cheeriness.

Casting our eyes into the country, we find the Macon people occupying with joy and thanks their new and handsome Church, which has cost them nearly \$15,000 and which is almost fully paid for. At Jackson, under the wise guidance of Rev. Mr. Potter, Dean of the Southern Convocation, a pretty new Church has been built. And the building, placed on an excellent large lot given in the will of the late Mrs. Russell, is, I think, free from debt. In Mr. Weddell's field—and his field is like a Diocese of all Phelps and Crawford and Dent Counties—the people of St. James have purchased and paid for a lot situate by the side of their Church; and the people of Sullivan are moving to build a Church. At Columbia, the people of Calvary have just gratefully celebrated the semi-centennial of their existence. It was at the Diocesan Convention of 1855, held in Boonville, that Calvary, Columbia, was admitted. Its first Pastor was that eminent Missouri Missionary, Rev. J. W. Dunn. Only four of our Parishes in the city then existed, Christ, St. John's, Grace and St. George's. In the country towns of our present Diocese were only five: Palmyra, St. Charles, Jefferson City, Hannibal and Prairieville.

Looking at closer quarters upon the city, we find Mt. Calvary improved by renovation and enlargement, including the addition of an

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admirable Sunday-school room; and that St. James has secured and paid for a lot contiguous to its structure, on which an enlargement of room imperatively needed can be secured; and that the Church of the Redeemer, refreshed and invigorated, is arraying its forces for a decided forward movement; and that St. Luke's Hospital is at home in its own magnificent new quarters admirably fitted for strengthening and perpetuating its preciously helpful work. Nor may we forget how the two institutions managed exclusively by women—the Orphans' Home and the Home for Convalescent Women—steadily and successfully continue the proffering of their mercies and benefits.

The University of the South, with which our Diocese is now affiliated, is doing as excellent service as any School I know for the future men of the South. Its atmosphere is altogether wholesome, patriotic, Christian. I am glad and grateful that on a visit to us by the Vice-Chancellor and the Chaplain last winter our people were interested and gave some gifts. Two of our young men preparing for the ministry are students there. One of our former clergy, Rev. Walter Mitchell, was a popular and valued teacher there; and only left because Missions in the field of Porto Rico beckoned his zealous soul away. Two of our clergy attended the Summer School there last year. This Summer School is an excellent provision under the guidance of the Rev. Mr. Bishop for giving theological instruction to any and all who can spare a month or two of summer time for receiving it. I hope that Rev. Dr. Winchester, who is one of the Trustees of the University, will tell us about it and its work in this Convention.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew has laid the Church in St. Louis, and indeed the inhabitants in general of St. Louis, under obligations by the wise and successful way in which its members introduced and sustained the Lenten noon-day services of this last year. The next annual Convention of the Brotherhood is to be held in Chicago from September 21 to 24 next. I hope Missouri will be largely represented.

I could wish that more of our Parishes would remember with a gift on Quinquagesima Sunday that excellent institution, the "General Clergy Relief Fund." Last year only six Parishes seem to have sent on their gifts to Mr. McClure in Philadelphia. And yet his Society is making grants to two clergymen and three widows of our Diocese.

On April 1 the report from the *Church News* showed income for the year, from subscriptions, \$478.25; and from advertisements, \$100.57. Total, \$578.82. The expenditures were \$645.42, leaving a deficit of \$66.60. But the Convention last year appropriated \$50 to our help and so the sixteen dollars of the behindhand account trouble us not a bit.

Well, we have scanned the horizon all around. We are not proud, still less boastful, over the scrutiny. But neither are we cast down or despairful. If "God is on His throne" and therefore "all's right with the world," we may also believe that "*Christo duce ecclesia praevalēbit.*" And under Christ the Leader we can each and all, can we not, try to do faithful and cheerful soldierly duty in the ranks of the Church

Militant. On the firing line or on the sentry beat or in garrison watch we can try to stand steady and to strike true. It is not what we do, so much as how we do it, keeping hold of the Savior's hand in faith and hope and love in doing it, that matters.

May I strengthen a bit the concluding strain of hopefulness by alluding to two things?

1. To the General Convention of last October in Boston. The presence of the Archbishop of Canterbury gave to it unwonted interest and shed upon it a gracious light. But specially I want to mention the setting apart of the Missionary Districts of Mexico and Cuba, and the election of the two Bishops to have charge over them. In the House of Bishops it came as a delightful surprise to me that no one objected to these acts. Mexico had been such a storm center of trouble for years that I had no hope beforehand that the plan to give it a Missionary Bishop would go through without a struggle. And, though the apportionment plan was winning steadily in favor and in practical results, yet so laggard seemed the general and generous loyalty in meeting apportionments that I feared the cry of "No Funds" would be raised against the suggestion to give a Bishop to Cuba. Yet, as I have said, in the way of a most delightful surprise to me, not one word was raised in the House of Bishops against either proposition. Nor, so far as I know, were objections uttered in the House of Deputies. And now I am quite sure the whole Church is rejoiced at the good work of those two Bishops, and means to stand by them firmly and help them steadily.

2. To the fact that next month Bishop Brewer of Montana is to celebrate the Silver Anniversary of his consecration as Bishop. I was Bishop of Montana for nearly fourteen years. Bishop Brewer has been Bishop of Montana for nearly twenty-five years. Before my entering as Missionary Bishop that great State—the third largest in area in the Union—no clergyman of this Church had ever set foot upon it. I entered it July 18, 1867. From absolutely nothing of that day note the Church growth. Now Montana is a sovereign Diocese with its own Bishop and twenty-five other clergymen and fifty Parishes and 2,855 Communicants. Will any one say, can any one say, after that showing that Church Missionary work is impractical or unfruitful?

I am going, please God, next month to be with Bishop Brewer at his Anniversary. I could not think it right or kind to decline his invitation. Thanksgiving shall fill my heart for all that God hath done for Montana, and for all that the present noble Bishop has been permitted to accomplish.

And, in loving and grateful association with dear old friends, humble supplications shall not be wanting for forgiveness for what a former Bishop did amiss or left undone in the days that are no more, the remembrance of which never cease to touch tenderly the deepest recesses of my heart.

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## Episcopal Acts.

1904.

The Board appointed Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. C. M. Davis, and Mr. Charles S. Freeborn as a committee to take charge of, and manage Hospital Missions for the ensuing year.

On November 1, 1904, the Rev. F. W. Cornell, Missionary in charge of Hospital Missions, resigned, and the committee in charge selected the Rev. B. T. Kemerer, as Missionary for that work. The Bishop thereupon nominated him as such Missionary, which was confirmed by the Board.

The Board reports the following correspondence and its action thereon:

At the meeting of the Board, March 6, 1905, a communication from the Southern Convocation, containing the following resolutions, adopted by it at its meeting held at St. Charles on November 4, 1904, was presented and read:

“The members of the Southern Convocation do hereby request the Right Reverend the Bishop of the Diocese to consider the practicability of appointing the Deans of Convocations to be Archdeacons of their respective district.

“The members of the Southern Convocation do hereby request the Missionary Board to make such appropriations as will enable the Archdeacons of the Diocese, when appointed, to obtain such assistance as may be necessary in their work.”

The Bishop announced that he had made answer to the first proposition contained in the foregoing resolutions, and his answer was as follows:

"The Bishop conceives that, as the Convention of the Diocese has laid plans for the appointment of 'an Archdeacon,' it would hardly be within the Bishop's prerogative to appoint 'Archdeacons.' Though he supposes he might, if it were desired, request the Deans of the Convocation to exercise some of the functions which, perhaps, the members of the Convocation have in view."

As to the second proposition contained in the resolutions, the Board made answer, that, "in the present condition of the finances of the Board, it has no funds it can appropriate for the work designated by the resolution."

The Board further reports that, in its judgment, the time has come for the placing of an Archdeacon, or General Missionary, in the field; and it hereby requests the Convention to secure pledges for the support of such an Archdeacon, or General Missionary, and that such pledges be taken on the afternoon of the second day's session, at the same time they are taken for Diocesan and Hospital Missions.

The Board herewith presents the reports of the Committee on Church Extension, and Hospital Missions. Both of these committees were appointed by, and have been acting for, the Board. The Board respectfully asks that these reports be printed in the Journal in connection with this report.

It also herewith presents the report of the current receipts and expenditures of St. Stephen's House, and asks that it also be printed in the Journal.

The Board reports that it will need the sum of forty-six hundred (\$4,600.00) dollars to keep the present Diocesan Missionary work in operation, and at least sixteen hundred (\$1,600.00) dollars for Hospital Missions.

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## APPENDIX No. 7.

**Report of Committee on Church Extension.**

ST. LOUIS, May 11, 1905.

*To the Missionary Board of the Diocese of Missouri—Greeting:*

Your Committee on Church Extension beg leave to report as follows:

Soon after appointment the Committee met and organized by the election of the Rev. Mr. Duckworth as Chairman, and Dean Davis as Secretary and Treasurer. It was decided to ask for contributions for the support of a City Missionary, and the Rev. William Cochran was appointed to serve as such, beginning June 1, 1904, at a salary of \$1,200 per year.

During the year Missions have been started at Lincoln Heights, under the name of St. Barnabas', and at the corner of Greer and Marcus Avenues, under the name of St. Timothy's. The former began with services on August 1, and the latter with regular services on January 1. Also, from the 1st of July, Advent Mission has been under the care of the City Missionary. Along with this has been the work near the corner of Cass Avenue and Twelfth Street, under the name of the Holy Cross Mission.

With gifts from the field and appropriations by the Missionary Board and from the Bishop, the Rev. Geo. Lloyd has been at work in the territory covered by the City Missionary.

At St. Barnabas' a lot has been purchased and a building erected, for which provision has been made by monthly payments. The current expenses have been met, and five dollars per month is being raised towards the stipend of the Missionary.

At St. Timothy's a room has been rented and neatly fitted up, and the outlook is encouraging.

At St. Barnabas' there is a Sunday School of thirty, at St. Timothy's twenty, and at Advent forty, average attendance. In this district there have been during the year nine adult baptisms, thirteen infant baptisms, thirty-six confirmations and two burials.

Hearty thanks are due those who so generously responded to the needs of the Mission. There have been many gifts of clothing, shoes, delicacies, spectacles and money. An optician has honored, free of charge, every request of the Missionary for spectacles. These have made possible the practical relief which the Missionary has been able to extend. We take this occasion, while extending our thanks, to commend these things to your generous consideration another year.

A word of appreciation is due the lay workers for their efficient and untiring assistance. At the four institutions which this work covers

they have by their presence and help made possible, in a large measure, the success of Sunday services, and contributed greatly to the success of the whole work.

The World's Fair seemed to press new duties upon Mrs. Holmes. It was her blessed privilege to foil several attempts on the part of moral vultures to get possession of innocent girls for immoral purposes, during the Fair. If her work has done nothing more than this it would be worthy of the highest commendation. But, as usual, she has been very active in providing clothes and delicacies for the sick, and in helping in the services at the City Hospital.

In the matter of transportation since the first of the year one man was sent to Niles, Ohio. His brother writes: "My dear sir: My brother arrived this morning. I am very thankful to you for what you have done for him and will repay you the money part in a short time. The balance is more than I can pay. God will do that in His own good time and way. Kindly thank the friends who helped you for me. For while it has been a great help to my brother, I believe it has been a greater help to me. This is not as cold a world as some think it is." One young man the Missionary took to Cleveland. One was sent to Bloomington, Ill., and one to Van Buren, Ark. Recent information from all but one of these young men indicate that they are much better and are doing comparatively well.

As ever, since the beginning of the work, the St. Louis Provident Association and the Salvation Army have been most helpful to the Mission, and we are thankful to them.

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## APPENDIX No. 19.

## Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

## ARTICLE I.—NAME.

SECTION I. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

## ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

SECTION I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

## ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

SECTION I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

## ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

SECTION I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

## ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS.

SECTION I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

SECTION 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

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## Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

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SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

*First.* For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

*Second.* For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

*Third.* For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.

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
