Rules of Order of the Convention

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admissions of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Dispatch of Business.
 - IV. On Resolutions.

- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions for order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Permanent Committees of Convention.
- 21. Except in cases where majority vote is required by the Constitution, all elections provided for by Canon shall be by plurality of all votes cast. When more than one is to be elected for a particular office, the number required by Canon receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.
- 22. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the votes of each Order shall take their stand at stations indicated by the Chairman, the Tellers for the Laity in one area, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. Minutes of the 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

St. Louis, Missouri February 4, 1972

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred Thirty-Second Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, Protestant Episcopal Church, assembled in the nave and transepts of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 3:05 P. M., Friday, February 4, 1972.

The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, D.D., was in the chair and asked the Rev. David Johnson to open the meeting with prayer.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the Roll of the Clergy. Of the 63 entitled to seat and vote 43 responded.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the Roll of Parishes and Missions. Of the 56 entitled to representation Lay Delegates from 49 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened and ready for business.

The Secretary of the Diocese introduced Resolution No. 1 which, following a second, was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 131st Convention of this Diocese be adopted for this Convention and that Rule No. 23 which sets forth the Order of Business may be suspended by the Bishop at any time; and be it further

RESOLVED that all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, all licensed Lay Readers, full-time and professional Lay Church Workers, all clergy present but not canonically resident, and all Lay Members of the Standing Committee not otherwise members of the Convention be admitted to seats without votes in this Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Order of Business shall be substantially as follows: (see p. 25)

The Rev. Mr. Steidemann reported for the Committee on Lay Credentials and Admission of New Parishes:

WHEREAS the application of St. Barnabas Church, Florissant, St. Louis County, has been received and has followed the required canonical procedure; be it

RESOLVED that St. Barabas Church, Florissant, be admitted to the Convention of the Diocese as a Parish.

Mr. Steidemann's report was adopted unanimously and St. Barnabas Church, Florissant, was admitted as a Parish under Canon 12.

The Rev. Roy Welke and the Lay Delegation from St. Barnabas Church were welcomed with applause.

The Rev. Mr. Swift reported for the Committee on Constitution and Canons. He moved that the amendment to Article XIV, Section 4, of the Constitution be ratified on second reading. By unanimous consent the rules were suspended and the amendment adding to the section the following words was adopted: "Lay Members of the Standing Committee, while still in office, not otherwise members of the Convention, shall be entitled, ex-officio, to a seat in the Convention, with all the privileges of membership except the right to vote."

Mr. Swift then presented a proposed amendment to Canon 2, section 2, adding the words: "A vacany shall have occurred upon the resignation, removal from the congregation, death or failure to attend two consecutive meetings of Convocation upon the part of a duly elected or appointed Lay Delegate." The Committee did not recommend adoption of this amendment.

Miss Sue Valle, President of Metro Convocation III, proposed an amendment to Canon 9 as a substitute to the above proposal, but failed to receive the required two-thirds majority for consideration.

The proposed amendment to Canon 2 was by motion duly seconded laid on the table.

The Rev. Mr. Swift announced that a proposed Cannon "Of Episcopal Churchwomen had been withdrawn, as not being needed.

The President of the Standing Committee, Dr. Gordon, presented the report of the Committee, and discussed a number of items in it.

The Report of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund was presented by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 5)

The report of the Registrar of the Diocese was presented by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 6)

The Report of Episcopal Churchwomen was presented by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 8)

The Report of the Treasurer of the Diocese was presented by title and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 7)

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The Rev. Mr. Ripley presented his report as Convocation Coordinator which was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 9)

The Rev. Mr. Hegg presented the report of the Diocesan Commission on Liturgy which was received and ordered filed.

The Report of the Clergy Stipend Committee was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 10)

In connection with the last report the Rev. Mr. Ripley added the information that in the period August, 1969-August, 1971, the Cost of Living has risen 10.74% and therefore the minimum "entering level" cash salary should now be \$7,420.

The Rev. Mr. Kirk asked leave to introduce a resolution in connection with the above report. This was admitted by the two-thirds required vote and placed on the calendar.

Mr. Bert Sterbenz presented the report of the Diocesan Music Commission which was ordered filed.

The Rev. Mr. Chapman presented the report of the Bishop's Commission on Housing. This was received and ordered filed.

The Rev. Dr. Tombaugh presented the report of the activities of the Commission on the Ministry which was received and ordered filed.

The Rev. Mr. Morris presented the report of the Diocesan Commission on World Mission which was received and order printed in the Journal.

(Appendix No. 11) The Rev. Mr. Maurer, a Trustee of the University of the South, asked permission to introduce Mr. Sollace Freeman of the University. Mr. Freeman addressed the Convention in behalf of the University.

There being no further nominations the nominations were declared closed and ballots prepared.

The Rev. William Stickney spoke of the activities of the local office of National Welfare Rights Organization, which has headquarters space in St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis.

Mr. Charles C. Allen, Jr., treasurer of the Diocese, presented the proposed Budget for 1972 in the amount of \$382,020, which included \$31,000 of funds to be raised by the Bishop. He moved its adoption, and following a second, discussion ensued.

Mr. Robert Sundermeyer, treasurer of St. Francis Church, St. Louis County, moved to amend the budget by inserting an item of \$5,500 for support of that Mission. Following a second discussion ensued on the amendment. Joining in the discussion were many members of Convention including: the Rev. Messrs. Blair, Denkinger, Morris, Paget, Bauer, Kunz and Park, and Messrs. Crane, Gordon, Van Cleve, Knuckle, Weich, Keydel, Ferguson, Herzog and Wagner. The amendment was defeated by voice vote.

Upon being put to a vote the Budget was adopted without the amendment.

The Rev. Mr. Park moved that the Standing Committee be directed to continue to consider St. Francis request and along with it any congregation in financial difficulty. The motion received a second.

Dr. Hood, president of Metro III said his Convocation asked permission to introduce a resolution on this matter and begged leave to distribute it. He was given permission. Mr. Park, upon reading the proposed Resolution withdrew his motion.

The Rev. Mr. Ripley was asked to report upon the matter referred to the Convocations for study: the matter of Parish-Aided Parish-Mission. He said the Convocation process had produced no consensus, and that he had been informed by the Chancellor that application of St. James Church, St. Clair, for admission as a parish had died with the adjournment of the 132nd Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Armstrong said he had understood the matter was simply neld over.

Mr. Bascom said the 132nd Convention had discussed the matter but had not acted upon it. It did ask the Convocations to study the matter. As a result the petition withered.

The Rev. Mr. Benson said he remembered having moved in the 132nd convention that the matter be studied, but had only intended for the application to be delayed pending the result of the study.

Mr. Bascom opined that in view of the Rev. Mr. Benson's statement a notion for nunc pro tunc consideration of St. James' application would be n order, and if adopted that it would be proper to bring the application to he floor at this time.

The Rev. Mr. Ripley moved that the Convention now consider the aplication of St. James Church, St. Clair for admission as a Parish. Followng a second the motion prevailed.

The Rev. Mr. Benson moved that the application of St. James Church, it. Clair be acted upon and that the Mission be admitted to Convention as a Parish.

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Election various During discussion a number of persons asked questions or other wise joined in discussion. These included: the Rev. Messrs. Armstrong, Park, Miller, Tombaugh, Benson, Hunt and Ripley, and Messrs. E. Rogers, Weiss and Knuckle.

Upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Hern, duly seconded, the matter was tabled by a vote of 99 to 64.

Mr. Guernsey reported orally for the Committee on Social Criteria for Investments.

There being a small amount of time remaining before the scheduled adjournment time of 6:00 P.M., Resolution No. 2 was considered. This was the resolution admitted earlier having been offered by the Rev. Mr. Kirk:

WHEREAS the issue of clergy compensation and evaluation is one of concern to both priest and congregation and is also an issue involving a number of complex factors which the Clergy Stipend Committee has begun to isolate; and

WHEREAS the information necessary for an informed consideration

of this issue is frequently not available; therefore be it

RESOLVED: 1. That the issue of clergy compensation and evaluation be placed on the agenda of convocations for the coming year.

2. That a uniform list of clergy salaries and perquisites

for 1972 be published within two months.

3. That the above list be sent to all clerical and lay delegates to Convention and all Senior Wardens.

4. That the same list be published in the Journal of

4. That the same list be published in the Journal of Convention. (Appendix No. 12)

The Rev. Paget moved that No. 2 be amended by adding the words: "as well as a brief description of the evaluation process." Following a second the motion was defeated.

Further discussion ensued. Since the hour of 6:00 P. M. had been nearly reached upon motion the previous question was voted and the Resolution put to a vote.

By a vote of 93 to 39 Resolution No. 2 was adopted.

The Convention recessed at 6:00 P.M. for dinner which was served in the Schuyler Memorial Dining Room of Bishop Tuttle Memorial by members of the Cathedral. During the dinner hour Bishop Cadigan introduced clergy new to the Diocese since the last Convention. He then presented citations and engraved medallions to a number of lay persons whose work in behalf of church and community had been distinctive: Mrs. Lewis Booker. Gerald K. Braznell, James E. Hurt, Jr., Charles G. Kirgan, Mrs. Richard Pier and Mrs. Paul M. Vandivort. He presented also an award to Mrs. Linda Beaty of Portland who was unable to be present. Mr. Beaty's son accepted this for her.

During the presentation of the awards the program was interrupted by members of a group calling itself ACTION who made the same demands upon the Bishop and Diocese as in pervious years. After a time they were quietly escorted from the hall.

The Convention Service, using the Second Trial Rite for the Holy Eucharist, was held in the Cathedral. The Bishop officiated and delivered his Annual Address. Assisting him were the Cathedral Choir, Dean Blair, Archdeacon Rehkopf, Canon Feehan, the Rev. W. K. Cresap, the Rev. David

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Johnson, Mrs. Margaret Bush Wilson and John Keydel, Jr. The offering was taken for the Bishop's FUND and amounted to \$377.10.

Following the Service the Convention recessed until Saturday morning.

Saturday, February 5, 1972

The Convention reconvened in the Cathedral at 9:10 A.M., on Friday, February 5, 1972. The Bishop was in the chair and opened the meeting with prayer.

Dean Blair made an oral report concerning the demonstration during the Convention Dinner.

Ballots were cast for the various offices to be filled.

Mr. Bascom assumed the chair to preside during the consideration of the many Resolutions.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger reported for the Committee on Resolutions, saying that the Committee doubts its effectiveness or need, that its role seems only to receive and recommend, that anyone may introduce resolutions either under the thirty-day rule or by consent of the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 3, which had been submitted by the Rev. Mr. Schweizer on behalf of the Association of Clergy in the Diocese. The Committee recommended "do pass". Following a second the resolution was adopted.

WHEREAS it is taken for granted that continuing education of professional people in American society is necessary; therefore be it RESOLVED that the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri initiate steps to explore and to insure that its clergy will be encouraged and provided resources for their continuing education; and be further RESOLVED that the matter be laid before the Commission on the Ministry to make specific proposals for a program and its implementation for action at the next Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, and that these proposals be disseminated to the Convocations

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 4 with the recommendation "do pass." Following a second the resolution was considered by the Convention.

WHEREAS Convocations have proven to be important units of the Diocese; and

WHEREAS Convocations must be in communication with each other and with all other units of the Diocese; therefore be it

RESOLVED that each of the seven Convocations shall have representation on the Standing Committee in order that the communications between the parishes and the Office of the Bishop are maintained as well as possible; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Constitution and Canons be amended to provide for a Standing Committee to consist of fourteen members, with one clergyman and one lay person elected from each Convocation.

It was announced that this resolution was one of several proposed by Metro IV Convocation.

During the discussion the Rev. Mr. Swift noted that Article IV of the Constitution of General Convention provides for the appointment by the

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an Blai ev. Davi Convention of a Standing Committee in each Diocese with certain duties assigned to it. The Chancellor opined this observation to be out of order until the adoption of the resolution, that the Committee on Constitution and Canons would have to deal with the matter of constitutionality only if the resolution is adopted.

Mrs. Goodson, writer of the resolution, said it is the intention of Metro IV to have the Convocations nominate to the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Park moved the insertion of the words "and by" between "from" and "each" in the final sentence. Following a second the motion was passed.

Dr. Gordon moved an amendment to precede the Resolved clauses:

RESOLVED that the Committee on Constitution and Canons explore the feasibility of the Following RESOLVES:

Dr. Gordon's amendment was adopted.

Resolution No. 4 was adopted as amended.

The Convention recessed for ten minutes.

Following the recess the Secretary acting for the Committee on Dispatch of Business moved that Rule No. 9 be amended at this time to limit debate during the discussion of the balance of the Resolutions to two minutes per person and that no person speak more than once on each issue. Following a second the motion prevailed.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 5, also submitted by Metro IV Convocation. The Committee recommended that it "not pass."

WHEREAS present distinctions between Parishes and Missions have proved to be irrelevant because:

1. There is no sound theological rationale

 It is no longer an effective growth incentive
 There are congregations doing real work with little hope of becoming self-supporting.

Therefore, be it

RESOLVED that there be no canonical distinction between Parishes and Missions, i.e. all Missions shall be called Parishes; and be it further

RESOLVED that all canons relating to Missions be eliminated to remove present distinctions between Missions and Parishes; and be it further

RESOLVED that all Parishes and Special Ministries shall submit an annual report to their respective Convocations for appropriate recommendations to be passed on to Standing Committee; and be it further

RESOLVED that the reports shall follow guidelines reflecting the diversity of congregational setting in the Diocese as follows:

Rural, Suburban, Inner City, etc.
 Eventual size and plant required

3. Prospect for growth

4. Nature of on-going core, "base" operations or "worship" program

5. Support of full-time, part-time or non-stipendiary clergy.

6. Community mission, trust and purpose

7. Lon and be it RESOLV with appropriate on to the RESOLV presented

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7. Long-term need for worshipping congregation at that location, and be it further

RESOLVED that an annual budget shall be included in this report with appropriate recommendation by the Convocation being passed on to the Standing Committee; and be it further

RESOLVED that all major financial decisions by Parishes shall be presented to their respective Convocations for recommendations to be passed on to the Standing Committee.

Mr. William Orr moved that the Resolution be divided after the second Resolve. Following a second the motion prevailed and the Resolution was divided.

During discussion Mr. Stribling moved that the matter be referred to the Committee studying the matter of Parish-Aided Parish Mission. Upon being informed that this had been referred to the Convocations a year ago and that the study had resulted in no consensus, and that the Resolution was an attempt by Metro IV to find a solution Mr. Stribling withdrew his motion.

Mr. Stribling thereupon moved that the matter be laid on the table. Following a second his motion was defeated.

Mr. Edmund Rogers moved an amendment to the Resolution, removing the first paragraph and the second Resolved, and inserting a new paragraph, so that Resolution No. 5 would read:

RESOLVED that there be no canonial distinction between Parishes and Mission, i.e. all Missions shall be called Parishes; and be it further

RESOLVED that the matter be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons to make necessary revisions in the Canons and to report the revisions to the 133rd Convention.

Following a second Mr. Rogers amendment was adopted and Resolution No. 5 was adopted.

Discussion then turned to the balance of Resolution No. 5, which thereupon became Resolution No. 6:

Mr. Orr then moved a substitute for the text of Resolution No. 6:

RESOLVED that all Parishes and Missions to be asked to submit an annual report to their respective Convocations by September 30 of each year for review and recommendations; and be it further

RESOLVED that the reports follow guidelines to be developed by the Long Range Planning Committee and approved by the Standing Committee; and be it further

RESOLVED that the proposals for capital expenditures requiring Standing Committee approval shall be presented to their respective Convocations for review and recommendations to the Standing Committee: and be it further

RESOLVED that the Standing Committee shall not recommend funding of parishes and missions which have not submitted a report as provided in the procedure.

Following a second Mr. Orr's substitute was adopted and thus became Resolution No. 6 which was adopted.

The Secretary moved that the Convention continue in session without interruption until its business is concluded, but that it adjourn not later than 1:30 P. M. Following a second the motion prevailed.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 7, prepared by Metro IV Convocation with the Committee's recommendation "do pass.":

WHEREAS question has been raised on the floor of Convocation as to the eligibility of certain non-parochial or non-cure clergy to seats and votes; be it

RESOLVED that clergy entitled to seats and votes shall be those canonically resident clergy who are:

1. Duly elected rectors of Parishes 2. Duly appointed vicars of Missions 3. Full-time assistants in congregations

4. Full-time clergy employed in institutions of the Diocese

and be it further

RESOLVED that when a vote is taken by Orders all clergy cananically resident and otherwise qualified to vote shall be entitled to vote with their Order; and be it further

RESOLVED that all pertinent Articles in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Missouri, 1971, be amended to reflect above resolutions.

Upon motion by Dean Blair, duly seconded the Resolution was amended by removing the words "full-time" from No. 3.

Resolution No. 7 as amended was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 8, which has been introduced by permission of the Convention on Friday, and recommended "do pass.":

WHEREAS, of the fifty-six congregations in the Diocese, there are thirty-seven that might be considered financially "marginal", at best (with less than \$20,000 in the "Current Expense" item for local expenditures in 1970) and

WHEREAS, a number of these have received significant amounts of diocesan funding for many years, representing an enormous, continuous drain on diocesan resources*, and

WHEREA cially self able to ha of the Dic WHEREA services (. 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WHEREAS, a number of these are independent congregations, financially self-supporting, each with a full-time Rector or Vicar, yet unable to have a very full program or to give significantly to the work of the Diocese or National Church*, and

WHEREAS, in a number of others there are only minimal priestly services (Perhaps an hour a week) and minimal programming, and WHEREAS, in many cases these congregations are almost overwhelmed by indebtedness, and with little hope of significant future growth in numbers of families, and

WHEREAS, the morale of such marginal congregations as well as their effective programming and outreach are adversely affected by such year-to-year financial conditions, and

WHEREAS, there needs to be comprehensive diocesan planning, guidance, direction and action in this whole matter in order to bring new strength and vitality to the whole Diocese as well as to each congregational unit; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri directs the Long-range Planning Committee (or a Special Committee appointed by the Bishop) to make its first order of business the consideration of the nature, duration, and type of support that the Diocese will give to Parishes and Missions and that said Committee will within three months present its recommendations to the Standing Committee and Convocations for their further consideration and will see to it that a comprehensive plan of action, with concrete, specific proposals, such as funding, mergers, yoking, regional and team ministries, and closings, is described and supported by an enabling resolution in time for action by the next, 133rd, Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

*In 1970, aided parishes and missions received a total of \$55,862.96 from the diocesan program budget alone. (There were also other sources of outside funding.) This total does not include C.I.C.M. churches, receiving an additional \$83,642.99.)

*In 1970, the 37 gave an average of \$908.05 each to all "Work Outside", for a total of \$33,598.00.

The Rev. Mr. Benson, speaking as Convenor of the newly-appointed Long Range Planning Committee, asked that the Committee be not asked to report within the three months. Dr. Hood proposer of the Resolution agreed to change the term to "six months". Resolution No. 8, as amended, was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 9, also submitted by Metro IV, with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass":

WHEREAS the position of Convocation Coordinator as it has developed since October, 1970, has proven to be an important and valuable position; be it

RESOLVED that there shall be one man in the Diocese who shall be a Coordinator-Communicator; and be it further

RESOLVED that whatever is necessary to have money appropriated for this position shall be done.

The Resolution was defeated by a voice vote.

The Rev. Denkinger presented Resolution No. 10, prepared by Metro Convocation with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass":

RESOLVED that it is the sense of this Convention that the Consti-

tution and Canons shall be amended to provide for membership in the Convention to be composed of:

- A. All duly elected rectors of Parishes
- B. All duly appointed vicars of Missions
- C. All full-time assistants in Congregations
- D. All full-time clergy employed in institutions of the Diocese
- E. One hundred eighty other Delegates divided proportionately according to the number of active communicants in the several organized Parishes and Missions in the Diocese;

and be it further

RESOLVED that the one hundred eighty delegates be chosen from among the active communicants of the Congregations they represent; and be it further

RESOLVED that each Congregation in the Diocese shall be entitled to at least one delegate among the one hundred eighty, and the remaining delegates are to be apportioned among the Congregations in proportion to the number of communicants listed in the latest available annual Parochial Report; and be it further

RESOLVED that it shall be the responsibility of the Standing Committee to effect annually the distribution of the one hundred eighty delegates among the congregations of the Diocese; and be it further RESOLVED that the Standing Committee shall receive challenges to the validity of the number of active communicants recorded by any congregation, and upon due examination, shall present recommendations to the Convention for its action, which recommendation may include exclusion from an annual Convention of the Diocese.

Following some discussion as to the non-availability of statistics to support the proposal, the resolution was defeated by a voice vote.

By unanimous consent the Committee on Resolutions was given permission to introduce a number of resolutions of courtesy, all of which were adopted without dissent:

Resolution No. 11:

WHEREAS The Rt. Rev. William Scarlett, with the vigor which characterized his Episcopate in Missouri, continues in good health; and

WHEREAS both our fond memory of him and the products of his labors continue to bear fruit in this portion of the Lord's Vineyard; Therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri does send cordial greetings to Bishop Scarlett, best wishes for continued good health, and ask that we may continue in his prayers as he does in ours.

Resolution No. 12:

WHEREAS the Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, Presiding Bishop of our Episcopal Church, has continued to exercise firm and excellent leadership in these trying times in both a prophetic role and a reconciling one; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri send to our Presiding Bishop our heartfelt support, best wishes and prayers for his personal strength as he continues to lead our Church in genuine renewal.

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Resolution No. 13:

WHEREAS one of the treasured opportunities for renewal through contact from without for the Diocese of Missouri continues to be our companion relationship with the Diocese of Natal; and

WHEREAS during this past year the beloved and respected Bishop of that Diocese, the Rt. Rev. T. G. Vernon Inman has recently remarried; be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri sends to Bishop and Mrs. Inman its warmest regards and prayers for a continued mutual relationship of growth in Christ.

Resolution No. 14:

WHEREAS the memory of our beloved former Bishop and former Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, Arthur C. Lichtenberger, remains alive and dear to use; and

WHEREAS the gracious example of Mrs. Lichtenberger remains present despite the miles that separate us; be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri convey to Mrs. Lichtenberger our esteem and affection.

Resolution No. 15:

WHEREAS it has pleased Almighty God to call into the invisible Church his faithful servant Barney Maclean; and

WHEREAS Barney Maclean for a decade served as the Executive Director of the Episcopal-Presbyterian Foundation for the Aging; and WHEREAS his joyful and continuing concern for the older citizens of the St. Louis community was an outward and visible sign of his inwrd devotion to our Lord and Saviour; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that this Convention on behalf of the Diocese of Missouri expresses the deep sorrow of all Episcopalians within the Diocese in the loss of this good and faithful servant and extends its deepest sympathy to his family; and be it further

RESOLVED that the secretary of this Convention be and hereby is directed to send an appropriate copy of this to Mrs. Maclean.

Resolution No. 16:

WHEREAS the Dean, Chapter and people of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis were good enough to invite the 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri to meet in its buildings; and

WHEREAS within the compass of resolutions passed by the 130th Convention of the Diocese these arrangements have been spartan but gracious and accommodating; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri does hereby express its appreciation and gratitude to Dean Blair, Canon Feehan, the staff, the women and all the members of Christ Church Cathedral for their hospitality.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger announced that a proposed Resolution (numbered "G" in the pre-Convention materials) from the South Convocation had been withdrawn.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger read the text of a proposed Resolution submitted too late for consideration, which would require all votes on matters before the Convention to be taken by written ballot. Such a resolution would require two-thirds vote of the Convention to be considered. That vote not being had the Resolution was not considered.

Bishop Cadigan resumed the Chair at 12:28 P.M.

The Rev. Mr. Armstrong moved that the matter of the application of St. James Church, St. Clair, for admission to Parish status be taken from the table. Following a second the motion prevailed.

The Rev. Mr. Armstrong then moved that the application be considered favorably and that St. James Church, St. Clair, be admitted to this Convention as a Parish. Following a second the motion prevailed and Mr. Armstrong was welcomed as the Rector of the new Parish.

As required by Article XIII of the Constitution Bishop Cadigan named the following persons to constitute the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure for the 133rd Convention:

Dean Blair invited the Convention to meet again in the Cathedral at the time and date to be named by the Bishop. Upon motion, duly seconded, the invitation was accepted.

DIOCESAN CONVENTION ADDRESS OF THE RT. REV. GEORGE L. CADIGAN, BISHOP OF MISSOURI

MY BROTHERS IN CHRIST, CLERGY AND LAITY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI:

This Convention address will deal with Ministry and Mission.

During the last few years we have witnessed the development of a sound and beneficial Clergy Support System. Many of our own clergy have been the leaders of this movement. For some, the Association of Clergy in the Diocese, familiarly known as ACID, has been a healthy and restorative fellowship. From this group have come such sound achievements as the minimum stipend which, however yet modest, is among the better arrangements in the Episcopal Church. Missouri has been a Pilot Diocese in the Pastoral Seminars. Under the admirable direction of the Reverend Edward Stevens and Dr. George Benson, the participating clergy have gained deeper understandings of their vocations and certainly of themselves as well. The annual Traveling Fellowship, provided by contributions from the Thompson Fund and the Parish of the selected Fellow, is a kind of symbol of what might be offered to all clergy for further post-ordination training. I believe that a Resolution in regard to sabbatical leaves for clergy will be introduced in the business of the Convention. My own hope would be for a regularized sabbatical, perhaps on a national level rather than a spotty or chance system. I have addressed the Church Pension Fund and asked it to take this under consideration. The Regional Ministries, which are now operative in the River Area Parishes and the Mineral Area Parishes, are strengthening - I believe for the related clergy, as well as for the cures which they serve. The bi-vocational experiment at Trinity Church in St. Louis is another example of a good Clergy Support System. I hope that there may be more of these experiments. The Ecumenical Ministries in South County, Missouri Delta Ecumenical Ministry, and now one in O'Fallon, appear to be as both helpful to the involved clergy as well as to the significant ministries which they provide. I have requested that the Diocesan Commission on the Ministry concern itself not only with the evaluation of candidates for the ministry of this Church, but with post-ordination training and education as well. The Group Medical Insurance Plan and the new benefits of the Church Pension Fund are further important methods of support. The new Clergy Deployment System should provide encouragement to clergy who hitherto have been victimized by a bungling and unjust process. The New York office informs me that there are more than a few of our clergy who have not yet completed and returned the Deployment forms. When there are parish vacancies in the Diocese, I encourage vestries to examine first the eligible Missouri men before searching beyond the Diocese. This is important to clergy morale. I want to encourage clergy to discover dignity and conviction in applying personally for posts that are open within the Diocese and beyond and I want vestries and calling committees to respond with understanding to supplications. We clergy need the assistance of the laity to help us help ourselves to stand upon our feet.

It is my belief that the next General Convention, which will meet in Louisville in 1973, will authorize the ordination of women to the priesthood.

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And it will be high time. There is no earthly or heavenly reason why women should not be ordained. There is no theological, sociological, psychological or biological reason why women cannot serve the Church of God in this way. William J. Wolf, distinguished Professor of Theology at the Episcopal Theological School, in a recent paper, writes that the ordination of women to the priesthood is "- - not just a response to Women's Liberation but more deeply as obedience to the Christian understanding of creation, the gospel of redemption and of ordained ministry of reconciliation that draws its strength from Jesus Christ, the Liberator of all people. We need both men and women in the ordained ministry to help us discover more and more what it really means to be human. Men cannot any longer exclusively represent Christ's ministry of reconciliation of all humanity. We need the complementary role of the woman priest in order to discover through mutuality the fully human and humane expression of Christ's complete reconciliation." The Apostle Paul reminds us in his letter to the Galatians, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

Perhaps, parenthetically, I must add that I am concerned to ordain women to the priesthood and not to the perpetual diaconate It has not been my policy to ordain deacons perpetually. With the opportunity for laity to serve in every function permitted deacons - while not diminishing the splendid contributions of perpetual deacons - I cannot appreciate this particular role. In support of this policy and in fairness to the many excellent men whom I have refused to ordain to the perpetual diaconate, I will not ordain women as deacons until the Episcopal Church permits me to ordain them priests.

As the Clergy Support System develops, there must grow with it a lay support system. Missouri has been something of a pioneer in our use of Convocations. I quote from the Rev. William Ripley: "In these, the assumption is that a constituency will support a program it knows something about and has some voice in determining. - - - The thrust is toward a more democratic structure, with decisions made and programs administered on the local level rather than the diocesan level. Admittedly, the process is slow and cumbersome, and delegates reflect a wide range of attitudes and opinions about the process, ranging from distrust and confusion to eager acceptance of the responsibility and time demands." It also seems clear that better communication or reporting must be developed between delegates and the parishes which they represent. A brief monthly report by the lay representatives at a principal service of the church, and to Vestries as well, might prove helpful. There are two Convocations which, as of now, have not found themselves. I bid them hasten. The emergence of lay leadership in the Convocation System is one proof of its worth and from it will come great benefits, particularly in the shape of the Church yet to come. In it, there is awkwardness for the clergy and laity as images are being changed - not to something new, but, rather, as ancient as the early Church where everyone is a minister of Christ. One clergyman has said that, "the only use for power and authority - is to give them away." And with more clergy moving into non-stipendiary roles, the role of the laity becomes even more important.

The Council for Inner City Ministries is a splendid agency, clerical and lay, concerned with the Church's Mission to the Inner City. I bid the Town and Country Ministries, perhaps on a Convocational level, to bind themselves together in a comparable way, not just to compete for power and dollars, but the more responsibly and creatively to serve our Lord. Your Bishop and your Standing Committee are not your father figures. You must stand upon your own feet for program, for goal setting, for account-

The gospel means that we are set free to serve and not be hindered by tradition and history.

There is some complaint about the Trial Services. I understand this. My life has been nurtured by the language of the Book of Common Prayer, and I am not yet altogether comfortable with the experiments in Liturgy. But, here again, the Church seeks the counsel and the wisdom of the laity. Each person will be given an opportunity to express, after adequate trial, his reactions. And what the laity will say will be taken into account. One of the gladsome notes about the Trial Services is the expanded opportunity for lay participation. In the reading of lessons, prayers and litanies by the laity, the worship becomes the more alive. Some of the parishes I have visited these past six months have become filled with enthusiasm and vigor through their use of the new Liturgies. There is no competent or successful, professional, business man or housewife who is not continuously changing procedures, methods and manner of work. David Babin suggests that good liturgy offers the totality of our life, bad as well as good, grief and joy, performance and aspiration. It honestly answers the questions: "What are we for? Why are we here?" It will challenge the Body to fulfill that purpose, to be about the Mission and thereby to become what it is.

I bid the laity - to help Missouri to forge ahead in what is called Stewardship. I believe in the total program of the Diocese and the General Church. I ask the clergy to inform their congregations more fully about the whole Mission of the Church. Some clergy have testified that they never teach or preach of the Church's Mission beyond their parochial boundaries. We are not a Congregational Church. We are one Church and an important member of the whole Body of Christ. It is a sad and grievous thing to see jobs terminated and the Mission of the Church attenuated because there are no funds. Two years ago, through the Bishop's Fund and other funds available to the Bishop's Office, \$150,000 was added to the Program Budget. Last year, I did this with about \$80,000. This is not sound stewardship. Such is not fair to my eventual successor and it is not encouraging the Diocese to assume her own responsibilities! Not new ways to raise money, but new ways to communicate that your gifts and yourselves are being wisely and hopefully used in the ways our Lord intends.

The Church, I believe has not lost her soul. To the laity of Missouri I call, "Rise up O men of God", and provide us with your leadership and vision and dash of soul.

The bewilderment of the Church during the past dozen years has been due in part to a loss of faith and confusion about Her Mission. But there are clear signs that the Church stands on the threshold of a genuine revival. We are discovering almost anew the social meaning of conversion. Gregory Baum said it this way: "Conversion is the critical self-awareness of society, the readiness of men to discern the dehumanizing in their associations, and to seek more truly human forms of social life." In his address to the House of Bishops last autumn, the Presiding Bishop said, "God's saving action includes the conversion of individual men and women. - - The personal liberation induced by a man's encounter with God in Christ Jesus makes that man a more responsible person in society. At a time when man's power over his environment, and therefore his responsibility for the future, were quite limited, the Church conceived of Mission mainly - - though not exclusively - - in terms of personal salvation and eternal life. Today - - when man holds the power to destroy himself and his world - - it is essential that the Church perceive the salvation brought by Christ - - and operative through the Church - - in a wider social and political sense.

You account"This means that - - overseas - - the main thrust of mission will not be to draw people of other religions into Christianity. But rather to help them to see God's redemptive Presence in their own history, past and present. It means that Christians will bear the burden along with the people in their own cultures, will search with them for the power and means to liberate themselves and arrive with them at the meaning of life in new situations."

Barbara Tuchman's splendid book, "Stillwell and the American Experience in China," leads me to observe that if such had been the concept of Mission in 19th century China, Asia would be a different world than that which we now confront. Similarly, on the American scene, mission is so much more than personal piety. Here we must seek through dialogue, and cooperation, and confrontation, and the General Convention's Special Program, to which Missouri has been too lame in her giving, to effect the consciousness both of individuals and society as regards the threats to human life - - - and the bringing into being of greater humanization, personal and social.

If this understanding of Mission raises for some of us the question of the Church's survival, I commend Father Baum's observation, "If the Church is dedicated to the service of others and proclaims a message that sheds light on human existence, then many, following the impulse of Grace, will want to join her. People will become Christians not because they fear that divine salvation is not available to them where they are, but because they believe that the Christian message is the key for the understanding and transformation of human life. In Jesus Christ is available to the Church a divine principle of judgment and renewal, which becomes effective in her engagement in society. Jesus Christ is the divine critique that indicates the direction of her action with others and brings to light God's healing presence." The church's Mission in every situation is to sow the seed. It is not for us to be anxious about the harvest. In His time and in his way, Almighty God will do the reaping.

In the contemporary theatre of the absurd, the clown is the symbol of man's reduced virility.

Samuel Becket's play, "Waiting for Godot," is a good example of this.

In watching the revealing distortions of men's lives, the audience is invited to ask the basic questions, "What is the appearance of my personality? What do my actions reflect about me? How do I communicate myself?" The answers are impossible, but they do lie in directions of despair.

The Holy Spirit today is bursting out, sometimes in strange ways, over the whole land. The Holy Spirit is summoning you and me from our slough of despond and our despair. Sophisticated college students, grown up men and women, members of monastic orders are in search of the mystical, the deepest in human experience. Will they find it in the Church or will they settle with a guru, fortune-teller, schismatic sect, alcohol or the drug culture? Every new movement in history by which people find release and sometimes renewal is always a judgment on the Church. The poet asks, "Must a Christ perish in every generation to save those who have no imagination?" I hope that you feel my sense of hope and that, together, we will have the courage to follow the Sipirt whithersoever He leads us. What we shall become lies in the Providence of God Who gives to us better things than we can desire or pray for. Will you rise in sure and certain hope of the Resurrection and affirm with me our faith as expressed in the words of the Nicene Creed: - -

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT TO CONVENTION

I. 1972 Budget and Program

The Standing Committee commends to Convention a budget reflecting a program which has been chewed and reviewed fairly intensively over the last year. The issue this Convention faces is how to deal with retrenchments in high priority programs if additional funds are not forthcoming. While parochial giving is up, the convocations, cabinet and Standing Committee initially made no provision for a "Bishop's Fund". Most do not want a second every-member canvas run by the Diocese. On the other hand, the Bishop of the Diocese, particularly this Bishop in this Diocese should be supported in attempts to secure a certain amount of funds privately for programs of high priority; yet he should not be expected to work alone but key clergy and lay persons should collaborate, particularly as there can be sensitivities as to when and how persons are approached for support. As discussed below, the Diocese also needs some "free" or discretionary monies. Finally, if funding sources, in addition to the regular parochial pledges are available, the Diocese should adopt as a goal having less dependence on the Thompson Fund in order to have such available to meet unexpected crises and opportunities.

Therefore, Standing Committee placed \$31,000 in the income budget, as "funds to be secured". The Bishop has agreed to Standing Committee request to organize the campaign to raise this amount of money. Standing Committee adjusted the budget to fit congregational giving and income from the several trusts. It then divided the \$31,000 to be raised amongst the highest priority items as reported by convocations, honoring the Bishop's feelings of what he would like to do. It is to be noted that the final amount is open-ended to be divided equally between CICM and projects the Bishop may select.

The diocesan review that took place prior to the preparation of program and budget raised old issues, such as accountability to the diocese of programs and congregations which use diocesan funds. There are new issues such as the aforementioned need to have discretionary monies available sooner than will become available from the present convocational, Cabinet, Standing Committee, Convention process. At any rate, the Standing Committee feels that there are very few programs in the Diocese that are not documented or have not been discussed, whose goals and objectives have not been placed before delegates. In contrast, the situation with congregations both in the city and outstate is more mixed. As part of its review of the Diocese, Standing Committee, therefore, is moved to make the following remarks.

II. General Matters and Future Directions

A. Planning

The lack of a body officially responsible for planning is now being sorely felt; an increasing number of issues "all-of-a-sudden-arise", or proposals for new works "suddenly" appear. When such issues or proposals are brought to Standing Committee, it has usually turned out that there has not been either adequate staff work or adequate communication as to purposes and intent to make sure the proposals are both well developed, well thought through, and a reasonable process started within the Diocese to make recommendations to lay before

Convention. Thereafter, no matter what actions the Office of Bishop and Standing Committee take, they tend to be caught in the middle. The proponents of an idea fear that they have been rebuffed if the Standing Committee says "no" (or proposes short-term measures to buy time) in order to allow fuller discussion and staff work; if the Standing Committee agrees with the proponent of claimant for need, then there is either no money or more importantly, no understanding within Convention, parishes and missions, as to what might represent a significant change in direction of a program or operation.

At the time the Diocese was reorganized, we abolished all the old commissions and councils, including the Council on Mission and Strategy. We moved to voluntarism, and within two years decided we could not raise sufficient monies to support "officers" to be responsible for planning, analysis and direction of operations, review of missions, communications, etc. In fact we find ourselves unable to do many tasks that the former, unwieldy structure of the Diocese did, somewhat

clumsily, accomplish.

The convocational process, a legislative conciliar style is not one that easily lends itself to staff and executive functions. Our convocations have become a forum to discuss specific issues, to develop common strategies and to reflect concerns of one area or region. It has been suggested that each convocation ought to have a staff person; however, throughout the country a new style of sharing executive, programmatic and planning responsibilities has been developing. In fact, several examples exist within our own Diocese.

B. Clustering: Communities of Concern

An increasing number of congregations, either of one denomination or several, are forming regional or community clusters to make common cause. The strength of these clusters appears in their ability to mobilize lay people to take on responsible positions within the clusters rather than using the joined congregations as a funding device for hiring "professionals" to do what communicants themselves ought to be able to do. Clustering creates new problems; instead of a few, dedicated professionals wearing a large number of hats in Church missions and councils, many more people become involved and much of this involvement relates to each individual's basic interest and skills: planners, planning; educators, educating: trainers, training development developing; etc. Another characteristic of these clusters is that the ordained minister, in fact even lay persons employed by the Church, take on more of a role of facilitator, enabler, as well as serving as a part-time "traffic cop". Therefore, if this Diocese is to have neither staff nor central bureaucracy, and is to continue its "permissive" style while conserving its monies, how much more consciously can we work to enlist lay persons to undertake responsibilities that formerly we paid a person to undertake in our behalf.

CICM, college work, team ministry, some of the newer planning and potential clustering in the South and North convocations, suggest a direction or style which reflects our past traditions, our present needs, and accommodates to the future as we perceive it at this time. The concept of teams of persons, some ordained some not, coming together to build a particular community of concern seems to be something we should build on positively rather than fall back on because

wo do not have money.

Somehow, we must develop without destroying what is solid. A structure that evolves to fit emerging purposes is one thing, change for change sake is sterile and inward looking. The point remains we re-

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quire staff work, but have trouble organizing it. We need planning, and we cannot afford such. We need more and better understanding of modern mission and its evolution from our historic understanding of our faith, but we cannot afford the Christian education persons, and on, and on, and on.

C. Delegation: To Communities of Concern--Councils, Commissions, etc.

With the Commission on College Work becoming an effective working group, the Diocese now has two strong forces (the other being CICM) dedicated to planning, operating, and arranging for evaluation of diocesan funded programs.

Both CICM and Commission for College Work believe that if they take their time to set priorities, to demand well-formulated goals, and to require well-monitored operations which stay within budget, then they should determine the allocations of monies to the several members and/or stations within their purview. While Convention always has the right to change any specific program, the attitude of CICM and the Commission for College Work is that if Convention wants to direct their internal process, there is not need for CICM or the Commission to invest their time and effort.

Standing Committee agrees with this attitude; the Diocese must learn to delegate in trust without abdicating its requirement for constructive evaluation of programs it supports.

D. Review and Evaluation

The diocesan review held in the fall was quite favorably received. It struck some of us that our new programs do build on our older commitments, and our ministries more and more reflect the spirit of facilitation, of empowerment, and highlight what the independent sector can do when it integrates concerns for families and communities. While to some it might be a fine line, most of Standing Committee felt that our programs are neither social welfare nor old-fashioned "do-good". We would like to propose as guidelines, not as hard and fast rules, the following.

a. The Church should be there, i.e. with people and their concerns no matter what they be.

b. The Church should take the first step knowing that there is risk.

c. The Church when deciding whether or not it should adopt a particular course might raise a question concerning possible outcomes and if the answer to one or more of the following is positive, proceed. This might be seen as tests for commitment. Does the proposed action or program lead to

(1) Wholeness

(2) Integrated concerns

(3) Freedom, autonomy, self-sufficiency(4) Amplification, i.e. the Church's investment of time or manpower or money is joined by contributions of time, manpower and money by many others

(5) Return, i.e. as a result, the Church gains new members or new sources of income to continue its evolution and strengthen its

commitment,

(6) New life, i.e. does it "break through" the veil of understanding, does it transform, does it lead to insight, and groupings that are just not straight forwardly derived from what went before.

The above are not offered as more than a study guide, but were derived originally in searching for general qualities that seemed appropriate to much of our diocesan commitment.

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E. Specific Problems

Yet troubles appear and we always hear "why does not the Diocese do something about troble "X" or "Y". There are some pressing problems which might be discussed.

Accountability to the Diocese for the use of Diocesan Monies. This year Standing Committee required that all operations in the Diocese, whether congregational or programs using diocesan monies submit up-to-date financial reports of 1971 including indebtedness, make financial projections for 1972, and make a brief statement of what that congregation or program hopes to accomplish in 1972. Whatever their reasons, several congregations chose not to do this on the first round. As you all know, Standing Committee in December, therefore, did not consider the pledges or needs of such congregations. After the convocations reviewed this, the Standing Committee at its January meeting took the following action: Inasmuch as these congregations had now submitted what was required, Standing Committee made appropriate changes in the budget.

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Obviously this is not the last we will hear of this issue or of the problem in general, but as Standing Committee understands its responsibilities, and as it has heard the resolutions of past conventions, there is no question in Standing Committee's mind that if the model of CICM, or a cluster of congregations, or a shared ministry, or a non-stipendiary ministry, or the possibility of making common cause among people of like concerns are not explored seriously and tested to see how workable, Standing Committee will no longer recommend funding whether the items considered are for congregational support or for programs, whether or not they are located in the city, the suburbs, or outstate. On the other hand, the style of this Diocese is to expect that congregations, or those with a common interest, will develop new programs and a life style that they find appropriate. In a Diocese with a "grassroots" or egalitarian tradition the grass-roots must take the initiative with the Diocese playing an integrative, supportive, and in some case a facilitating role. In no case, at least, can the Standing Committee continue to be moved by those who would complain rather than develop their own forward course.. In other words, Standing Committee, in fulfilling its canonical responsibility, looks to users of diocesan monies to propose their own course.

2. The matter of St. Francis

The North County area of St. Louis has been particularly hard hit by recession, inflation, and a general lowering of business activity. For the record, the Standing Committee would like to have it known that when St. Francis made its specific appeal, it did not rebuff the congregation, rather it proposed some short-term financing in order to buy time, to explore the various options open for shared ministry, and to take a longer term look at financial options, so that some of Standing Committee members could get right to work to see what could be done. Standing Committee did not want to see yet another operation be cut off. On the other hand, Standing Committee, nor Bishop, nor Arch-Deacon, nor convocations can move unless the congregation in trouble can apprise the the Diocese of oncoming problems without always moving in a crisis way. Yet, it is empty piety to say that everything must move through our structured process. A reality of our age is that crises appear, usually when we are least able to deal with them.

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We must expect continuing crises no matter what our demands for notification, communication and engagement in our process are. Furthermore, we must respond and not let matters drag over months and years as we did with Ascension parish. On the other hand, a higher reality is that for the last few years we have earmarked all our funds so that, for all its cash flow, the Diocese does not even have 2 per cent of the monies it uses available, for discretionary purposes. Any monies that would now suddenly be added for St. Francis will have to be taken from some other program or congregation in the Diocese. Clearly we are in an untenable situation and this is another reflection of our new voluntarism. Trying to get everybody involved in every decision, in short, creates such a cumbersome system that we are unable to move, and this is in an age when great flexibility and movement are much more the order of the day.

3. The Bishop's Fund — Funds to be Secured

The Standing Committee's decision reflects the fact that the Bishop has the ability to raise monies and should, but that some of these monies as well as some other diocesan funds should be earmarked for discretionary purposes. However, the Standing Committee feels that when the Bishop raises money, the use of such monies and priorities be expressly earmarked by convention (including for discretionary purposes). Much more important, however, is that as time goes on, the monies the Bishop now pledges to the Diocese from the Thompson Fund should slowly be returned to the Bishop for discretionary use which, if they are not for personal benefactions, the Bishop may turn to the Standing Committee or convocations to establish priorities or to review the choices open to him. In fact, the terms of the Thompson Trust are that the Bishop may use the funds as he sees fit after notifying the Standing Committee.

4. The O'Fallon Cluster

The Standing Committee reviewed in November and again in December a proposed ecumenical congregation to be built around Grace United Church of Christ, O'Fallon, St. Charles County. One of the key factors in the development of this congregation is the rector of Trinity Church, St. Charles and a member of the Standing Committee, Reverend Mr. Betts. The opinion of those in that region is that one cluster congregation formed from the so called "liberal" Protestant denominations (Episcopal, United Church of Christ, Presbyterian) is viable. It is the opinion of most persons that three separate congregations in that area would have no long term future, and they propose organizing, starting with equal contributions of money from the three denominations concerned. By the time the planning for the cluster congregation had been completed as in the case of St. Francis Mission, there was just no money available without cutting something of priority and known to the convocations. This means the Episcopal Church had no money to help develop this important work or to make a preliminary commitment if all of us could agree that it was important to proceed. The Bishop informed the Standing Committee that he could use some Thompson-Fund Money in 1972 to underwrite a one year commitment to the New O'Fallon congregation, but that 1973 and 1974 monies for this purpose would have to come from convention. Therefore, he would see to it that this matter was brought before convocations for review and decision for the fiscal

year after this one. Of course, the general question this raises is how the Diocese will start new work. Presumably, new work will always be called for. Presumably also, this venture is representative of many ventures that should be forthcoming for the future but such raise profound problems. Does one always have to start new ventures at the expense of old ones? And if so, how do we phase out of old commitments? Should certain operations always depend on the Diocese continuously, such as the Episcopal City Mission? How will we handle such long term? With delegates to diocesan convention elected for three years, and Standing Committee serving staggered terms, what is it going to take to signify priority of support over a longer period of time than one budget year so that agencies may be free to know the extent to which they can, and should, depend on the Diocese, or whether they will need to develop their own independent funding approaches. In short, while convocational system has brought issues into prominence, it has not yet raised giving substantially nor generated major new support or suggested major new program.

The Parochial Trust Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri 1971

February 18, 1971 - Approved a request from St. Francis Mission, St. Louis County, to refinance its present loan at Tower Grove Bank in the amount of \$41,500 for ten years at a twenty-year pay-off schedule with interest at 734% per annum.

February 27, 1972 - Note and Deed of Trust on St. Paul's Church property in Sikeston, paid and cancelled as of this date. Originally filed for record October 16, 1957.

May 14, 1971 - Loan on St. Francis Mission property, St. Louis County refinanced in the amount of \$41,500, for ten years at 73/4% per annum. Monthly payments of \$340.70 on a twenty-year amortization schedule.

September 23, 1971 - Authority given to St. Francis Mission, St. Louis County, to reduce the asking price on portions of its property from \$12,000 to \$10,000 per acre.

Appendix No. 6

THE REGISTRAR - 1971

The Registrar of a Diocese is required to record official acts (ordinations, receptions, admissions, and dismissions of clergy, consecrations of churches, etc.) and receive and protect books, documents and archives belonging to the Diocese and to parishes and missions. Our collections include the parochial registers of some 28 parishes, missions and institutions, some of them no longer in existence. Here are also the hand-written records of the first three diocesan conventions; the private registers of Bishops Robertson, Tuttle and Johnson; confirmation records of the Bishops since the beginning, and minutes of the Standing Committee and the Council. The collection includes also audio visual records, motion pictures, slides, microfilm and tapes. If finances permitted many of the archives should be microfilmed, for old registers, some of them more than a century old, grow brittle and faint.

During the past year the Diocesan Archives has acquired two collections of notable import. The Registers, Vestry records and other papers of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, are now on deposit here. During the Fall the records of the Metropolitan Church Federation of Greater St. Louis, and its successor organization, the Inter Church Association, are now on file in Bishop Tuttle Memorial, also.

The Diocesan Archives maintains membership in the Society of American Archivists, a membership which gives this Regstrar some status as an Archivist! More importantly, it places the Diocese of Missouri among a select number of agencies known world-wide to have important materials. Statistically: I have reported to the Society of American Archivists that our Archives occupy, 1,775 cubic feet of space.

We continue to provide resource material for persons interested in parish and diocesan history. Other groups use our files from time to time and our correspondence, while not voluminous, is interesting.

The importance of maintaining Church records becomes very evident when one observes the requests for records of baptisms before 1911. Persons nearing 65 who find themselves without birth certificates look to the Church for certification of age. Our collection of parochial registers is often in use and these requests come to us, as well as to the local parish which is still in operation.

We urge our every local congregation to safeguard its records, especially its parochial registers.

Finally, for some three years I have edited an occasional publication, a Newsletter, which Church Historical Society sends to Diocesan Historiographers. Many of these persons attend, also, an annual conference-workshop, the next of which is scheduled for August in Sewanee, Tennessee.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN 1970 - 1971

With the visit of Arleen Rucker, United Thank Offering Associate, the Episcopal Churchwomen began their year. A mid-morning coffee was held at the home of Jane Cadigan. UTO custodians and ECW parish presidents were invited to meet with Mrs. Rucker and spend a morning discussing in depth the strength and weaknesses of the UTO. Many misunderstandings were clarified, and a great deal of enthusiasm for the UTO has manifested itself in the generosity of women in the use of their blue boxes. The total ingathering for 1970-71 amounted to \$10,582.57. Several churches that had not participated for many years, participated. Some churches participated for the first time. We need these churches and hope their support will continue. A certificate in the amount of \$33,468.00 was presented at the opening service of the Houston General Convention. This represented the gift of the ECW of the diocese of Missouri over a three year period to the United Thank Offering. Grace Hill Settlement House received a grant of \$8500.00 to enable them to adapt and demonstrate a community based method for developing programs that meet social needs in rural towns.

Because of diocesan budget cuts in 1970-71, the ECW Board agreed to set priorities for extra budgetary giving — College work and CICM. This meant that the ECW Board would ask parish women's groups, especially those with fund raising events, to give and give generously to the above two priorities. In 1970 nearly \$6,000 was raised and given to CICM. This money was used as seed money to enable Ascension, Trinity, and St. Stephen's to receive federal and local aid for summer programs. The request for 1971, \$5,000 to College work, and \$5,000 to Episcopal Neighborhood School, has been subscribed to as follows: \$4,500 to college work and \$4,625 to Episcopal Neighborhood School. We still hope to fulfill our obligations. All of this fund raising has been undertaken at the request of the diocesan commissions. Because of the many difficulties involved, the ECW Board has decided to undertake no more diocesan fund raising, but we shall encourage parish groups to consider diocesan priorities in their extra budgetary giving. We have had to say no to a \$5,000 request from St. Stephen's for their parish case aid worker program (a program begun with a 1969 UTO grant), a \$1,500 MDEM request for salary for an agricultural expert, a request for money for the Diocesan Youth Conference, and a request for a gift over and above the \$150 budgeted item for the Neighborhood Health Center.

Because of the pledges and gifts from parish women's groups directly to the ECW budget we have been able to pay our budget items and finish the year in the black. All obligations of the 1970-71 budget have been paid and a number of parishes have paid 1971-72 pledges. We are indeed grateful, since the ECW voted to pay for a full nursing scholarship at St. Luke's Hospital for another three year period. The tuition is due in September.

Most parishes send us a report listing their new officers and chairmen. While this is important, one item could go unnoticed, and that is the Treasurer's reports. Parish Women's groups contribute approximately \$47,000 (not including UTO) to the work of the Episcopal Church. Often much of this money must remain in the parish for needed church repairs and

Five women served as delegates to the Triennial and General Conventions in Houston, Texas in October, 1970. Many visits to parish groups were made to report to the women about these events. Women for the first time were officially seated as convention deputies. After such an historical event, Triennial began to take stock of itself as a separate meeting parelleling the General Convention. It was agreed that Triennial would continue, although a new national department was set up, called The Committee on the Laity. Diocesan ECW groups per-se apparently wish to continue, perhaps with changes, but with the underlying feeling that fellowship, the give and take of other Christian women adds stability in a very mobile life.

The Church Periodical Club and The National Book Fund are another project of the ECW. Missouri seminarians are equipped with sets of Interpreters Bibles and Dictionaries. Paper backs are sent to Viet Nam and military hospitals. Money gifts to the National Book Fund supply Bibles, Prayer Books, Hymnals, textbooks, church school material, reference and medical books wherever needed without cost to the recipient.

With the Convocation and Annual Meetings, we constantly strive to keep in touch with the women of the diocese. Kirksville and Sikeston seem different from St. Louis County, yet all serve the same Lord and all are equally important to the ECW Board.

Many newer parishes have asked for help in organizing women's groups. By-laws from established groups have been supplied as guide lines for these new organizations. Diocesan participation in meetings, UTO, and CPC has been encouraged.

On October 12-14 at Trout Lodge, Martin Bell and Associates, from Ann Arbor, Mich., will conduct a conference sponsored by the ECW but open to everyone in the diocese. Mr. Bell has a consulting agency specializing in imaginative education for the church in the twentieth century, and dealing rigorously with the contemporary setting, using a biblical approach. Income from the estate of Louise Rumsey enables the ECW to pay for Martin Bell and we are anxious to share him with as many people as possible.

Continuous support of Grace Hill House and the Episcopal Neighborhood School by women volunteers from individual parishes have enabled these agencies to do an excellent job. A great deal should be said about the devotion of the ECW Board members, who do more than their share in their service to the church.

The Episcopal Churchwomen are not an official part of the diocesan structure. Because this seems to be an oversight, the ECW has asked that a canon be written that will give ECW official status in a diocese they have served so well. This is needed to clarify the ECW tax free position and to give us more stature when ECW represents the Episcopal Church in community and ecumenical endeavors.

The Convocation Coordinator's Report to the 132nd Convention

After one full year of operation, there is some variance of opinion about the Convocation System, its work and worth. In the absence of information to the contrary, I must assume that those of you who have not participated in it this year do not consider it worth your time and effort. Some of you have been overt in your criticism. Others of you believe that the system and its process have created the most positive atmosphere that has existed in the Diocese for years, and that it provides a vehicle for actualizing mutual responsibility and interdependence in this portion of the Body of Christ.

Granted, it is cumbersome. Yet there is considerable evidence that it is beginning to provide a means for self-actualization in parishes and area ministries. Some of the constituencies probably need to be realigned. But with all its shortcomings, we undertook a significantly different phase of work this year: researching and developing legislative matters, seeking to establish principles and guidelines for our mutual involvement, the scope of which we will be dealing with in this meeting.

That this undertaking is often frustrating, and that consensus has not been reached on some issues is not surprising. When the power of decision-making is shifted, as it has been in the Diocese, there is a moral ambivalence that is transferred along with it. That ambivalence has been very much in evidence this past year.

Ambivalence is difficult to live with, and especially so in the Church, since many of us look to the Church to provide a degree of stability in an otherwise unstable world. But it is a sign of increasing maturity to recognize and accept our petential for power and to stand in the midst of the ambivalence it creates for us.

On the positive side, there is no denying that more people know more about what is happening in the Diocese than ever before. This in itself is sufficient justification for the System's existence. If it served no other purpose than the exchange of information, it would have proved its worth as a stabilizing factor.

From this beginning, if we are willing, we can continue to move toward fulfilling the function for which the System was originally conceived: providing coordination, cooperation and oversight for the work of the Church in a given geographical area. We have begun to see the need for this function, expressing it in our desire for accountability. We have the resources and the power to fulfill that need; and I am encouraged by the numbers of you who are willing to undertake the responsibility for determining your own future and the future of the Diocese. I pledge my efforts to assist in this endeavor.

Less rhetorically, we charged ourselves with two responsibilities this past year: to explore the dimensions of the "Black Experience," and to make some decisions about the status of Aided Parishes and Missions. You have indicated your willingness to cooperate with our black brothers whenever they are ready to share their experience with us.

There is no such commonality, however, regarding Aided Parishes and Missions. Using terms like "second-class Christians" and "the equality of

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all in the sight of God," some of you feel that there should be no distinction between aided and self-supporting congregations. Others, having gone through the process to self-support and finding validity in it, want the distinction to remain. Still others would preserve the distinction but define it in different terms; while some recommend the enforcement of the existing canons, their vagueness to the contrary notwithstanding. Here is a case in point of the ambivalence I mentioned earlier.

With no common agreement on criteria for membership in the Diocese, we are obliged to respond "aye" or "nay" to the request of St. James' Church, St. Clair for admission to parish status; and respond we must, even if we decide to continue working on those criteria while seeking consensus.

One other issue has emerged more informally but with considerable concern: that of communications. Your request for more and better communication has been referred to the Advisory Committee on Communications, and they have accepted a two-fold charge: to upgrade the content of the diocesan newspaper "INTERIM," and — with the Bishop's help — to raise sufficient funds to provide ten issues a year.

As we move on to take action on the issues that have concerned us this past year, I have two areas of aspiration: (1) that we leave here with visible evidence — in the form of a budget and resolutions — that will justify the effort expended in our work; and (2) that we leave with the feeling that we are moving toward a more collaborative, cooperative attitude toward one another, even though we may not always agree with one another.

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THE COMMITTEE ON CLERGY STIPENDS

The Committee understands its charge from the 131st Convention was to develop a method of evaluating clergy performance for use by the parishes and missions of the Diocese.

The Committee met monthly after its inception in March 1971. It has reviewed the work of previous committees and studied the stipend situation in some depth.

Its first conclusion is that there is considerable confusion about diocesan policy in the matter. The policy adopted in 1970 is as follows:

- 1. The minimum cash stipend for clergy employed by the Diocese shall be \$6,700 per annum. This amount is not to include allowances for housing or for housing provided, utilities, hospital or medical insurance in the Church Insurance plan, Church Pension Fund assessments, or automobile allowances.
- 2. The minimum stipend for a new position shall be adjusted according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics Cost of Living Index factor using 31 August 1969 as a base.
- 3. For the first five years of tenure, adequate and satisfactory performance shall be acknowledged by a minimum increment of \$600 per annum.
- 4. If, in any year during the first five years, an increase is not granted for reasons of performance, such shall be communicated in writing to the Bishop and the clergyman involved.
- 5. If no increase is provided in a three year period, the matter shall be reviewed by the Standing Committee.
- 6. For the second five years of tenure, performance shall be reviewed annually, and increases granted as may be appropriate. In any case, said increase shall not be less than \$600 per annum.
- 7. Should not increase be granted during the second five year period, the matter shall be reviewed by the Standing Committee.

The Committee's research indicates that the Diocese is complying with this policy.

The Committee is of the opinion that any system of evaluation should include the following elements:

- 1. A methodology for upgrading or demotion based on performance;
- 2. A clear understanding between employer and employee of the work required;
- 3. Generally accepted norms for entering, median, and upper-level stipends;
- 4. Guidelines for determining career expectations;
- 5. Means for developing and encouraging excellence in performance. It recognizes, however, that the largest single obstacle to the establishment of these elements in the Diocese is the Canon of the National Church having to do with tenure.

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Although tenure is an obstacle, it does not preclude the development of performance standards. Therefore, the Committee recommends that every parish and mission in the Diocese adopt the discipline of formulating annual statements of objectives, entering into a clear understanding with its clerical leadership regarding performance expectations, and reviewing that performance on a regularly scheduled basis.

Guidelines for implementing such a discipline are herewith provided:

1. Parish Identity Study

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- What is the history of our congregation? What kind of congregation has it been traditionally?
- What is the present status of the congregations? What are its vital statistics? Its strengths and weaknesses?
- 2. Statement of Purpose
 - What is the total long-range purpose of this congregation? Why does it exist? What difference would it make if it were not here?
- 3. Statement of Issues
 - What are the primary concerns and issues of this congregation and our community?
 - 4. Statement of Objectives
 - What do we want to accomplish realistically, both long and short range, in order to deal effectively with the above concerns and issues? Who is to do what, when; and how much will it cost?
 - 5. Statement of Policy and Plan for Action
 - What policies and action-plans shall we adopt in order to meet each of our objectives?
 - 6. Review and Evaluation
 - Are we doing what we set out to do? Have our issues and objectives changed? Should changes be made in our policies and/or plans of action?

Progress on Goal-attainment

While our goal of informing "clergy, lay delegates to Convention, and vestries" of the worldwide mission of the Episcopal Church may not have been achieved in glorious fullness in 1971, we feel great progress was made.

In the spring we had an informative session with many Parish Communicators and clergy (and wives or husbands). Father Carlo spoke on his Natal experiences. A film on our National Church was viewed. We hope those congregations without lay Parish Communicators on World Mission will soon appoint them.

In September the visits of Bishops Blanchard of the Executive Council and Zulu of Zululand assisted immeasurably in helping us fulfill our stated objectives. (See pages 04 and 95 of last year's Journal.) Bishop Zulu had an especially effective impact upon the youth of the Diocese.

The 150th Anniversary of the Foreign and Domestic Missionary Society of our Church was celebrated Oct. 31, 1971. This also helped promote valuable information about our Church's mission, especially its history. (See p. 15 of last year's Journal report). It was hoped that all congregations would participate in the observance. Those who have not may still do so. A desired offering of \$10 per communicant fell far short of realization, with some \$600 going from throughout our Diocese (from seven of thirteen congregations observing the "Birthday Celebration"). Thus we averaged about 4c per communicant! Looking Ahead

In 1972 the Lenten Offering ("Mite Boxes") will again be for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief (unless a congregation chooses otherwise). There is enormous and urgent need at this time especially because of the refugee problem in Bangladesh.

Another pressing matter the Council would lay before you is the War in Southeast Asia. It is hoped that an ecumenical study-action conference will be held in mid-April in this metropolitan area. This would be patterned after the "Ecumenical Witness" held Jan. 13-16 in Kansas City, which the chairman attended. (The "Message and Action Strategies" pamphlet detailing the results of that Conference is available from Robert S. Bilheimer, 475 Riverside Dr., Room 576, New York, N. Y. 10027. Price: 25c for 1-10 copies.)

Later in the spring we plan to get together again with all the Parish Communicators for mutual support, hopefully with an overseas guest speaker.

Finally, there are opportunities for involvement in world mission by

CLERGY STIPENDS, 1972

It is understood that all professionally-employed clergy are included in the Church Pension Fund and in the Group Life and Health insurance plans. Cost of this is \$75.60 for \$10,000 of life insurance, and \$578.76 for family health coverage. Coverage for a single person is \$201.96. The Pension Fund assessment is an amount equal to 18% of the cash salary plus utilities plus housing at actual cash value or 25% of the cash plus utilities (whichever is the higher amount).

Where a cash amount is listed for housing, this is the actual amount paid to the clergyman as a housing allowance. Where a \$ value is listed beside the word "house" the amount is an estimate of the rental value.
