

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## Journal of the Fifty-Fifth Convention,

BEING THE

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONVENTION,

## DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS.

Tuesday, May 22d, 1894.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock A. M. the clergy, proceeding from the Schuyler Memorial House, entered the Cathedral, where they were met by the choir of the Cathedral singing the 232d hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," when the regular service was held.

The opening sentences and services to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. E. P. Little, of Trinity Church, Hannibal.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. W. H. Tomlins, of St. Mary's Church, East St. Louis.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. J. L. Gay, of St. George's Church, Bevier.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. J. D. Ritchey, of Emmanuel Church, Old Orchard.

The Commandments were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. John Gierlow, Ph. D., of St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., Dean of the Cathedral.

The Rev. C. G. Davis, of Grace Church, Jefferson City, then preached the Convention Sermon, taking for his text the 12th verse of the 15th Chapter of the Gospel of St. John.

The Offertory sentences and notices were read by the Rev. W. W. Love, of the Cathedral.

The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop, called the Convention to order, and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded, under the direction of the Bishop, to call the roll of the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-eight Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President called for the report of the Committee on the "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials" appointed at the last Convention; whereupon the Rev. S. H. Green, Chairman, presented the report which was read by the Secretary including the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention.

On motion the report was adopted.

The Secretary then, under the order of the Rt. Rev. President, called the roll of Lay Delegates, reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from nineteen Parishes answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced a quorum of both orders present and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

On motion of the Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., the rules of order were suspended, and the Assistant Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Jno. R. Triplett, of St. Louis,

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for Secretary, with power to appoint his assistant. The Assistant Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Secretary appointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of the Church of the Redeemer, his assistant.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the Treasurer of the Diocese and, also, the Treasurer of the Board of Missions were present to receive all moneys due and payable to them.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the Convention then took a recess until 2.30 o'clock.

Convention reassembled, after recess, at 2.30 P. M.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials submitted a supplemental report to the effect that the certificate of election of W. A. Luther, of Trinity Church, St. James, had been presented, and that the Mission was entitled to representation in this Convention.

The Secretary then called the name of the delegate, Mr. W. A. Luther.

Mr. M. S. Snow offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

Card of Rev. W. H. Tomlins, of East St. Louis, was handed to the Secretary.

Rev. J. W. Higson offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the rules of order of the last Convention be adopted as the rules of order of this Convention.

Mr. J. A. Waterworth offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine worship at nine o'clock in the Cathedral, and for business from 10 A. M. to 1 P. M., when it will take a recess to 2.30 and continue until 5.30 P. M.

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of order to cast Louis, Mr. W. R. Donaldson moved to amend by making the hour for closing five o'clock instead of 5.30.

Same was adopted, and the resolution, as amended, adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that he would announce the standing committees at the opening of the business session, on Wednesday morning.

The Rt. Rev., the Bishop of the Diocese, then read his Annual Address, which, with his Episcopal Acts, was laid upon the Secretary's table.

The Rt. Rev. President called upon the Committee on Constitution and Canons for a report of matters referred to said committee by the last Convention.

In behalf of said committee, Mr. F. J. McMaster, presented and read the report of said committee. [See Appendix No. 16.]

On motion of Mr. McMaster, seconded by Rev. P. G. Robert, the request of the committee to be relieved of further consideration of the matter, was unanimously adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President called for the report of the Standing Committee on Missions.

Rev. W. A. Hatch, Chairman of said committee, stated that the Committee on Missions would only give a minority report, as three of the five members of the committee are at present outside of the Diocese and could not be reached for a meeting of the committee.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, Rev. Mr. Hatch was requested to present the minority report.

The Rev. W. A. Hatch presented and read the minority report of the Standing Committee on Missions. [See Appendix No. 17.]

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, in the absence of any other report, the minority report was received as the report of the committee.

Mr. F. J. McMaster further moved the adoption of the report.

On motion of the Rev. G. H. Hunt, seconded by the Rev. J. K. Brennan, further action on the report of the committee was deferred till Wednesday afternoon, the time specially set apart for Missions.

The Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., presented and read his report as Chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital. [See Appendix No. 13 A.]

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Fent take Chea On motion of the Rev. J. Wilkinson, that portion of the Bishop's Address referring to Missions was made special order for Wednesday afternoon, the time devoted to Missions.

Mr. M. S. Snow presented and read the report of the Standing Committee, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, for the Conventional Year 1893-94, are herewith respectfully submitted:

May 24, 1893—Organized by the election of the Rev. Montgomery Schuyler, D.D., as President, the Rev. P. G. Robert as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

June 10, 1893—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Ellison Capers, D. D., as Assistant Bishop of South Carolina.

September 11, 1893—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., D. D., as Assistant Bishop of North Carolina.

September 21, 1893—Consented to the consecration to the Priesthood of the Rev. Jefferson Davis Ritchey.

October 27, 1893—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Arthur C. A. Hall, as Bishop of Vermont.

November 3, 1893—Granted the petition of Philip Williams Fauntleroy, asking that the knowledge of the Latin and Greek languages be dispensed with in his examination.

December 18, 1893—Granted the request of Philip Williams Fauntleroy that he be recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Diaconate. Consented to the ordination to the Diaconate of George Washington Cobb.

February 23, 1894—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. John Brockenborough Newton, D. D., as Assistant Bishop of Virginia.

March 21, 1894—Consented to the admission of Hugo Radau as a candidate for Holy Orders.

March 27, 1894—Gave consent to such shortening of time as would allow the ordination of Philip Schuyler to the Diaconate to take place on Trinity Sunday, 1894, and consented to the ordination.

Consented to the restoration to the ministry of Edward John Peake Bell Williams, deposed at his own request, March 2, 1892, for causes not affecting his moral character.

April 18, 1894—Gave consent to such shortening of the time of Clarence D. Frankel as would allow his ordination to the Diaconate on Trinity Sunday, 1894, and consented to the ordination. Consented to the ordination to the Dioconate of Leslie Fenton Potter, and to such shortening of the time as would allow his ordination to take place in May or June, 1894. Consented to the admission of Adolphus Whitefield Cheatham as a candidate for Holy Orders.

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Approved the Secretary's Report of the official acts of the Committee during the Fifty-fourth Conventional Year, prepared for submission to the Annual Diocesan Convention.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn, Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, presented and read his report.

Same was received, and on motion referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 4.]

On motion of Mr. Thos. K. Skinker, the Convention adjourned until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

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#### SECOND DAY.

After calling the roll, the first day's proceedings were read, and, on motion, the same were approved.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials made a supplemental report to the effect that the certificate of election of Mr. W. O. L. Jewett, of Emmanuel Mission, Shelbina, had been presented, and that the Mission was entitled to representation in the Convention.

The Secretary then called the name of the delegate.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced the standing committees as follows:

Mr. Wallace Delafield, Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, presented and read his report. Same was received, and, on motion, referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 3.]

Mr. Wallace Delafield, Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund, presented and read his report. Same was received, and, on motion, referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 2.]

Mr. W. B. Potter presented and read the annual report of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund. [See Appendix No. 5.]

The Convention then went into the election of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as Tellers to receive the clerical vote, Rev. R. A. Holland, Jr., and Mr. W. O. L. Jewett; the lay vote, the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, and Mr. Fred. C. Hicks.

The Secretary then called the roll and the Tellers retired.

The Rev. K. M. Deane, Registrar and Librarian of the Diocese, presented and read his report. [See Appendix No. 14.]

On motion of the Rev. J. W. Higson, the sum of \$25 was appropriated for the use of the Librarian for the ensuing year, and the Secretary was instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese in favor of the Librarian for said amount.

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The Convention went into the election of one Clergyman and one layman as delegates to the Missionary Council to be held at Hartford, Conn., in October next. The Rt. Rev. President appointed as Tellers to receive the clerical vote, the Rev. W. W. Love, and Mr. R. G. Jordan, and to receive the lay vote, the Rev. S. Mills, and Mr. H. C. Scheetz.

The Secretary called the roll and the Tellers retired.

On motion of the Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be extended to the Rev. C. G. Davis, for his sermon delivered at the present session, and for the lucid interpretation of the words of the text, and its practical application to the pressing needs of the times.

The Tellers on election of the Standing Committee entered, and the Secretary read the report of the same.

The Rt. Rev. President announced the following duly elected as the Standing Committee:

Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D. Rev. S. H. Green. Rev. P. G. Robert. Mr. M. S. Snow. Mr. W. B. Potter. Mr. T. K. Skinker.

The Secretary then read the notification received from the Secretary of the House of Clerical and Lay Deputies of the General Convention as to proposed changes in the Constitution of the General Church. Action on same was deferred to the next Diocesan Convention.

Tellers on ballot for election of Delegates to Missionary Council entered. Secretary read the report.

The Rt. Rev. President announced no election and ordered Secretary to call the roll for second ballot.

The Secretary called the roll and Tellers retired.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn, Chairman, presented and read the report of the Committee on Finance. Same was received, and, on motion, referred to the Committee on Assessments, and the following resolution embraced therein was adopted:

Resolved, That an assessment be made upon the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese to the amount of \$6,000. [See Appendix No. 6.]

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The Rt. Rev. President announced that Mr. W. B. Potter was duly elected a Delegate to the Missionary Council, but there being no election of a Clerical Delegate, the Secretary was ordered to call the roll for the election of one Clerical Delegate.

The Secretary then called the roll, and Tellers retired.

The Rev. G. D. B. Miller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee be appointed, with authority to gather from the Sunday-schools of the Diocese the following information, and report to the next Convention:

First. What, and from what sources are the opening and closing services of the Sunday-schools.

Second. Methods and text books of instruction used.

Third. Such other facts as may enable the Convention, if so disposed, to suggest general directions for more uniformity in the conduct of Sunday-schools.

On motion the same was adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee: Rev. G. D. B. Miller, Rev. C. G. Davis, Mr. W. Delafield.

Tellers on ballot for one Clerical Delegate to the Missionary Council entered. The Secretary read their report.

The Rt. Rev. President announced the Rev. W. H. Watts, of Columbia, duly elected as a Delegate to the Missionary Council to be held in Hartford in October next.

On motion of the Rev. S. H. Green the Convention took a recess till 2:30 P. M.

Convention reassembled, after recess, at 2:30 P. M.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that under Canon the business of this afternoon would be missionary business.

The Rt. Rev. President called on the Treasurer of the Missionary Board for his report.

Mr. D. F. Leavitt presented and read his annual report as Treasurer. [See Appendix No. 8.]

Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer, presented and read his annual report of General Expenses of St. Stephen's Mission. [See Appendix No. 9 A.]

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s annual Appendix Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer of St. Stephen's Mission Building Fund, presented and read his report. [See Appendix No. 9 B.]

The Secretary of the Convention read the report of the Secretary of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. [See Appendix No. 10.]

The Rev. G. D. B. Miller presented and read his annual report as Diocesan Missionary. [See Appendix No. 11.]

Mr. F. J. McMaster, Secretary of the Missionary Board, submitted and read the annual report of the Missionary Board. [See Appendix No. 7.]

The Rev. J. L. Gay moved that the receiving of pledges for Missions be now proceeded with. Secretary called the roll of Parishes and Missions and the following pledges were made, amounting, with subsequent additions, to \$4,480.00, as follows:

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#### THIRD DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis.

Thursday, May 24th, 1894.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order.

After the call of the roll, the proceedings of the second day were read, and, on motion, same were approved.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that he would give opportunity for additional pledges for Missions.

The Rev. S. Mills pledged Grace Church, Crystal City, for \$10. The Rev. Wm. Bardens pledged St. Chrysostom's Mission for \$5. The Rev. J. D. Ritchey pledged personally \$5. The Rev. J. M. McBride, of De Soto, personally pledged \$5. Rev. J. H. Cloud pledged \$25 for St. Thomas' Mission.

Mr. W. Delafield presented his report as Treasurer of the Diocese, amended by permission of the House. Same was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 1.]

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the Rules of Order be suspended, and the Secretary instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Wallace Delafield, for Treasurer of the Diocese.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The election of Trustees for the "Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate," was then had.

On motion of the Rev. Wm Elmer, the Rules of Order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Messrs. C. S. Freeborn, Frank Carter, and F. N. Judson, for Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate.

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The House went into the election of Trustees of the "Theological Education Fund."

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the Assistant Secretary was instructed to east the ballot for Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., Mr. E. J. Thomas, and Mr. Jno. R. Triplett.

The Assistant Secretary so cast the ballot.

The House went into the election of Trustees of the "Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund."

On motion of Rev. S. H. Green, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Rev. K. M. Deane, Mr. Geo. M. Maverick, and Mr. W. R. Donaldson, for Trustees of the "Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund."

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Rev. K. M. Deane, Christ Church Cathedral was selected as the place for holding the next annual Convention.

The hour having arrived (11 o'clock) for the special order of business, viz.: the election of the Missionary Board of the Diocese,

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the House would now proceed with the election, and appointed as Tellers to receive the clerical vote, the Rev. J. K. Brennan, and Mr. B. F. Gray, Jr., to receive the lay vote, Rev. E. P. Little, and Mr. G. M. Block.

The Secretary then called the roll and the tellers retired.

On motion of the Very Rev. M. Schuyler, D. D., the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered to the ladies of the several Parishes of St. Louis for their generous hospitality in providing for the Clergy and Lay Delegates of this Convention, and for their cordial and luxurious entertainment during its session.

On motion of Mr. W. R. Donaldson, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese for twenty dollars in favor of the Sexton of the Cathedral for his services during the sessions of this Convention.

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On motion of the Rev. S. H. Green, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That the sum of twenty dollars be appropriated to the Choir of the Cathedral for their services at the opening of the Convention, and that the Secretary be authorized to draw his warrant on the Treasurer therefor.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rt. Rev. President be authorized to certify to the record of this day's proceedings.

On motion of Mr. W. R. Donaldson, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies of the Journal printed for distribution.

Mr. J. A. Waterworth presented and read a notice of action of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society as follows:

At a meeting of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, held on Wednesday, May 23d, the following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: E. H. Lycett, President; F. J. McMaster, Secretary; D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer.

On motion, the same was ordered printed in the journal.

Mr. E. J. Thomas, Chairman, presented and read the report of the Committee on Assessments.

The Rev. J. W. Higson moved to amend by making the assessment of St. Andrew's, Cuba, \$10 instead of \$15; same was adopted.

On motion of the Rev. J. W. Higson the action of the House on his motion was reconsidered; and on further request of the Rev. J. W. Higson, permission was granted for the withdrawal of his motion for reduction of the assessment of St. Andrew's, Cuba.

On motion, the report of the Committee on Assessment was adopted. [See Appendix No. 12.]

The Rev. G. H. Hunt called up the report of the Committee on Missions, which was to have been considered in the afternoon of Wednesday.

The Rt. Rev. President then called up the report of said committee. The report was placed before the House.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster the report was adopted. [See Appendix No. 17.]

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The Rev. G. D. B. Miller stated that as his title was misleading, he would be glad if the Convention would fix his title; his preference would be Bishop's Chaplain or Bishop's Secretary.

The Rev. P. G. Robert moved that the Rev. G. D. B. Miller receive the title of "Arch Deacon."

The Rev. Wm. Short raised the point of order, that Section 7 of Canon IX. placed the appointment of Arch Deacon in the hands of the Bishop, subject to the approval of the Missionary Board.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the point of order well taken.

On motion of Mr. W. R. Donaldson the title of "Bishop's Secretary" was given the Rev. G. D. B. Miller instead of Diocesan Missionary as heretofore.

Tellers of ballot for Missionary Board entered and the Secretary read their report.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the following duly elected as Lay members of the Missionary Board:

Mr. W. C. Stith, Mr. E. H. Lycett, Mr. Wm. Bagnell, Mr. F. J. McMaster, Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Mr. C. M. Jennings, Mr. Jno. A. Harrison.

but no election of clerical members.

Mr. Geo. M. Block offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the voting on the second ballot for the election of clerical members of the Missionary Board be limited to the names of those seven nominees who received the majority of the Clerical and Lay votes on the first ballot, and that all other nominees be dropped.

On motion same was declared lost. Division being called for, the Rt. Rev. President called for a rising vote. The same being taken, the Rt. Rev. President declared the same lost. Ayes, 24; Noes, 35.

The hour of recess having arrived, on motion of Mr. M. S. Snow the convention took a recess till 2:30 P. M.

Convention reassembled, after recess, 2:30 P. M.

The Rt. Rev. President stated that the regular business would be suspended to admit reports.

The Rev. S. H. Green made a supplemental report of Committee on "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Delegates," as follows:

That the certificate of election of Rudolph Bahn, delegate from Christ Church Mission, at Cape Girardeau, had been presented, and that the Mission was entitled to representation in this Convention.

The Secretary then called the name of the delegate.

The Rev. K. M. Deane, Chairman, presented and read the report of Committee on "Missionaries' Travelling Expenses," and, on motion, same was adopted. [See Appendix No. 15.]

The Rev. John Wilkinson offered the following amendment to the Rules of Order:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order be amended as follows: "In the case of an election by ballot, requiring a concurrent majority of both orders, whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected."

Same was, on motion, adopted.

The House went into the election of six clergymen, and two laymen, for members of the Missionary Board.

The Secretary then called the roll and the Tellers retired.

The Rev. Churchill Eastin, Chairman, offered the following recommendation on behalf of the Standing Committee on Sunday-schools:

The Standing Committee on Sunday-school Work, would respectfully beg leave to offer to this Convention the following recommendation:

That it is desirable to organize an association of the Sunday-school workers of the Diocese; and for that purpose a Convention of Sunday-school workers throughout the Diocese be called in this city at as early a date as the Bishop may deem expedient.

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Pending the discussion of the recommendations the Tellers entered and the Rt. Rev. President declared the following duly elected members of the Missionary Board:

And ordered roll called for another ballot for one lay member.

The Secretary called the roll, and Tellers retired.

Tellers entered and the Secretary read their report and the Rt. Rev. President declared no election and ordered the Secretary to call the roll for another ballot for one lay member.

On motion of Mr. J. L. Ford the rules of order were suspended, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. H. B. Denison as a lay member of the Missionary Board. The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The full Missionary Board elected this day being as follows:

The Rev. W. A. Hatch, Dean of the Hannibal Convocation. The Rev. J. D. Ritchey, Dean of the Southern Convocation.

The Rev. S. H. Green offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention has heard with regret of the illness of the Rev. B. E. Reed, Rector of Mt. Calvary Church, which illness has prevented his attendance upon the sessions of this Convention.

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We are sorry also to learn, that, after twenty-two years of active and useful services, Mr. Reed has decided to leave the Diocese for work in another field. We shall miss him greatly from our midst. We say heartily, "God be with him," as he takes his departure to his new home in Paducah, Ky.

After closing remarks by the Rt. Rev., the Bishop of the Diocese, the singing of the "Gloria in Excelsis," and a few appropriate collects by the Rev. W. W. Love, the Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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#### ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

## BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

#### FIFTY-FIFTH CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE DIOCESE:

Every wise business house dealing in commodities takes a yearly account of stock. Doubtless the paramount aim of the managers is to buy and sell and make profit. But they well know that book keeping and account taking and statement making are necessary to the successful accomplishment of their aim. The Divine Master has entrusted us in the Church with goods. We are to buy and sell and make gain that we may return them to Him with increase,—with usury, as the parable puts it. And the account taking and statement making of the Annual Convention are quite in the line of a right and wise management of the spiritual merchandise which we hold in stewardship. Besides, to get together is a comfort and an inspiration. To see each other's faces, to grasp each other's hands, to think thoughts and feel impulses and speak words of brotherly love and fidelity, may be accounted things of much worth while we, as disciples, soldiers, stewards, are passing through and out from our earthly life.

In the march, four of my brethren in the Episcopate have gone away.

Bishop Southgate was eighty-two years old when he died, and was the Senior Bishop of the American Church, having been consecrated in 1844, six days after our own Bishop Hawks, and seven years before Bishop Williams, our present Presiding Bishop. It was in 1844 that we sent forth our first Foreign Missionary Bishops, Bishop Boone to heathen China and Bishop Southgate to Mohammedan Turkey. Bishop Southgate labored for six years in his field, making his headquarters at Constantinople. In that field were

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branches of the Oriental Catholic Church, Greek, Armenian, Syrian and others. His plan was "to cultivate brotherly relations with these Christians; scrupulously to avoid all offensive intrusion within the jurisdiction of his Episcopal brethren; to promote a friendly intercourse between the two branches, Eastern and Western, of the One, Catholic and Apostolic Church; to impart to the brethren in that country any knowledge of the Scriptures and of the doctrine of Christ which through the Lord's goodness we may have obtained, and gladly to receive any such light from them." The American Church charged him to go forth to the prosecution of his work in this spirit, and with this aim. But in the Board of Managers of Foreign Missions in New York demands voiced themselves that the Bishop at Constantinople should bring converts of the Oriental Churches out from the errors of Greek Catholicity, and make them, equally with regenerated Mohammedans, to be fixed and formal members of the Protestant Episcopal Church. So, dissensions waxing loud as to the true and wise line of direction of his Missionary work, Bishop Southgate resigned in 1850. Subsequently he served two or three Parishes as Rector, though for the last score of years he has lived in retirement near New York. I remember seeing and hearing him when he was Rector of Zion Church, New York City. He was a native of Portland, Maine, a graduate of Bowdoin College, of handsome face and form, a man of ardent spirit and erudite scholarship.

Bishop Gregg, dying at seventy-three, had been Bishop of Texas for thirtyfour years. Texas was admitted as a State in the Union in 1845. In 1844 some presbyters, laboring as missionaries in the Republic of Texas, petitioned our General Convention for "such Episcopal supervision as is enjoyed by missionary districts in the United States." Bishop Freeman, consecrated October 26, 1844, at the same time and place with our own Bishop Hawks, was made Missionary Bishop of Arkansas and the Southwest, and given jurisdiction over Texas. In 1849 Texas was organized as a Diocese. In 1856 it elected Rev. Arthur Cleveland Coxe, of Maryland, for its Bishop. In 1857, Rev. Alexander H. Vinton, of Massachusetts. In 1858, Rev. Sullivan H. Weston, of New York. All these declined. Finally, in 1859, Rev. Alexander Gregg, of South Carolina, was chosen. He had an immense empire for a Diocese, and served it in patience, prudence, and devoted fidelity for fourteen years. I well remember how, when Bishop Gregg came to the House of Bishops to ask, in his gentle and earnest way, for relief from the crushing burden of his stupendously great field, all our hearts went out to him in deep and warm sympathy. But objections were loud that it was unconstitutional and incompetent for the General Convention to abstract any of its area from a sovereign Diocese. It was only the unremitting zeal for his brother of Texas on the part of that wonderful leader, Bishop Whittingham, and his consummate sagacity in insisting that it was competent for General Convention to give leave to a Diocese to shrink itself into limits of smaller area if it wished to, that won the victory in the General Conventions of 1871 and 1874. So in the autumn of 1874 the two Missionary Districts of Western Texas and Northern Texas received their Bishops, Elliott and Garrett.

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Bishop Lyman served North Carolina for twenty years. Clergy and friends and neighbors had gathered to celebrate his twentieth anniversary. But he was on his sick bed and could not join them. Two days after he died. Though seventy-nine years old he was vigorous and energetic. Those who heard him speak at the Missionary Council in Chicago last October can bear witness to that vigor and energy.

Bishop Paddock was made the Missionary Bishop of Washington when

Bishop Paddock was made the Missionary Bishop of Washington when fifty-six years of age. He did his duty manfully for near fourteen years. A holy life of personal religion, and consecrated devotion to the service of his Master and the Church, were eminently his. Toward the last, bodily infirmity assailed him, and his spirit was grieved that he could not do what he felt he ought. Men of younger years should generally be appointed for the rugged activities which face a Missionary Bishop.

Our clergy have all been spared unto the steady continuance of their work. But into their Parishes once and again death has entered and removed useful workers. Hannibal, Kirkwood, Old Orchard, Palmyra, and St. George's, St. Louis, have particularly suffered. God be thanked for the good examples of all those who have departed this life in His faith and fear! God mercifully help us to be ready, waiting, watching, working; for the summons hence will surely come, and will soon come to one and another and yet another of us.

The Diocese seems to be in a healthful condition. The only places vacant are Afton, Canton, Ferguson, Kirksville, and LaPlata. Of these, Ferguson will soon supply itself with a pastor. And I am not without hope that Kirksville and LaPlata will do the same. The Confirmations, 510 in number, exceed those of last year by 62. In meeting salaries of their pastors, assessments for the Diocese, and pledges for Missions, the Parishes have done wonderfully well. For this has been a hard year financially for everybody. It would be a natural thing to expect to hear of the cutting down of salaries, the repudiation of assessments, and of failure in meeting pledges. But I have yet to know of one single instance of this sort of thing in the whole Diocese. Natural such a course might be. Thank God that spiritual zeal and spiritual earnestness have overtopped the natural and put it clean out of sight. If the tables in the Church News be scrutinized, not one assessment of the whole Diocese is found in arrears, and only two pledges for Missions. And I feel persuaded that the new lists which the accounts of this Convention shall furnish will make almost as good a showing. Seven clergymen more than last year are working in the Diocese. Two new Church buildings are added and occupied; Trinity, at St. James, and St. Peter's, St. Louis. Trinity, St. Louis, was plunged into the depths of seeming financial submergement by the call of its creditor for the loan which had come due. But in a spirit of energetic loyalty and splendid self-reliance it extricated itself from the impending disaster; and with considerable of its debt paid off it is in better condition than ever. There are ten young men studying for the holy ministry. Towards their support \$870.50 have been paid.

The record of gifts to General Missions is good. Every Parish has contributed except Afton, Kirksville, Prairieville, Shrewsbury, Shelbina and Thayer.

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And every Sunday-school except two gave Lenten offerings for Missions. The amount given by the children was \$1,100.09, against \$1,346.18, last year. The falling off can be charged to the account of "hard times."

Yet in scrutinizing, I seem to see a putting of the children forward as soldiers, and a putting of ourselves behind them, which is not manly nor praiseworthy. There are fifty-four Parishes and Missions in the Diocese. Only sixteen of these have contributed, other than what the children gave, to General Missions. Suffer me to name the sixteen. Clarksville, Cuba, Hannibal, Moberly, Rolla, St. James, and the following Parishes in St. Louis: All Saints, Ascension, Cathedral, Grace, Holy Communion, St. Andrew's, St. John's, St. Mark's, St. Peter's, and Trinity.

Flooding memories come over me of missionary work and missionary sustentation belonging to my first twenty years of a Bishop's life. Can I be blamed if my heart specially warms towards those sixteen Parishes who loyally remember the needed sustentation? May I not be pardoned if in deep earnestness I ask the clergy of the other thirty-eight Parishes,—Why do you so let slip the privilege, and neglect the duty of asking your people to help the General Missions of the Church? Long ago the Master said,—"Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." Sixty years ago the American Church said that every baptized person is a member of the great Missionary Society and is bound to help it on. Why will you then, dear brethren, so neglect and forget? How is it that in loyalty to the Master, in love for souls, in duty to your own great Church, you can allow any Advent season to go by without asking your people for gifts to Domestic Missions; or any Epiphany season, without asking for Foreign Missions? The children are indeed learning to think about Missions and to give for Missions. God bless them all! But men, women, brothers, sisters, if you are not also thinking of and giving for General Missions, you are losing one of the greatest blessings, and shirking one of the plainest duties of Christianity.

For Diocesan Missions, too, the record is good. In my address of 1893, I pleaded for pledges to the amount of \$4,300.00. My heart had many glad beats in it when the pledging list was found to foot up \$4,630.00. But twenty-one missionaries have been employed this year against seventeen of last year, and the Board felt obliged to appropriate \$4,750.00. Fortunately we had a surplus of \$500.00 in the Treasury over and above the reserve of \$1,500.00 which we must always carry. I may be allowed to express my anxious hope that \$4,750.00 will be pledged this year.

Diocesan Missions, translated into the imperative mood, mean,—"Forward with the work of the Church in Missouri!" I take it, brethren, we are ready to join in the cry. Let us be equally ready to join in the work and the giving needed. Your Bishop is a General, commanding forces in the field. The enemy is at the front, on the flank, everywhere. If the chief cannot have and order reinforcements here and there, where the line is weak and the strain is heavy, from centres where supplies are massed, then you may be sure the

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fighting cannot be of the most hopeful sort. Blessings manifold God bestows upon us as we are Missourians. The Church in her organization, discipline, and doctrine, has that to give which is of value to Missouri. For the sake of the Church, then, and for the sake of Missouri, let us faithfully and generously stand by Diocesan Missions.

The increase of the membership of the Missionary Board from six to eighteen has worked well. Information about missionary matters has been disseminated and interest in them has been deepened; power for action has been extended and wisdom of counsel has been increased.

The City of St. Louis is undeniably a most important portion of the Diocese. Missionary work in it presents itself under two aspects.

- I. Caring for the poor and neglected.
- II. Helping the beginnings of Mission Stations until they grow into self-supporting Parishes.

Under the first head would fall the aid rendered to our colored brethren in All Saints' Church, and to our deaf-mute brethren in St. Thomas' Church. For unwearied devotion to duty and unflagging zeal in its discharge, I do not know of any more faithful brethren in the ranks of the clergy than are the Rev. Mr. Mason and the Rev. Mr. Cloud.

In the care of the poor and neglected in what may be called the East End, several of our Parishes are called upon to render incessant service, notably, the Cathedral, St. John's, Holy Communion, and Grace. But the two special organized efforts for this care of the poor and neglected of the East End, in which all the Parishes are engaged and interested, are Sister Eliza's work, and St. Stephen's Mission.

Sister Eliza makes the Church Mission House at 1531 Washington Avenue to be as a city of refuge to the sorrow and the want crowding all round about. Her's is sagacious, discriminating, wholesome help, which relieves and sustains and uplifts, and never pauperizes. I do not know of as much good done anywhere else at as little money cost. My loving thanks go forth to the good ladies, who form the sustentation Committees, which stand by the sister in her self-sacrificing earnestness. Sister Eliza's greatest need is for some other one to come by her side as a personal helper. The strain of service is making inroads upon her physical strength. She greatly needs and earnestly calls for some one to come to share her work, its blessings, and its burdens.

St. Stephen's Mission, under the Rev. Mr. Tuckerman, on Seventh Street, is at the East End indeed. My hope and prayers are that it may be steadily and generously sustained. My loving thanks go forth to the clergymen and laymen who, at my request, went, two and two, in the autumn and early winter, before the Churches to plead its cause. How can we, with good con-

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sciences, sleep peacefully in our West End houses and worship reverently in our West End Churches if we do nothing for the East End needs? The Missionary Board of the Diocese have purchased and paid for a lot at cost of \$5,000.00. They have about \$5,000.00 more in hand or in sight. But they really need \$20,000.00 or \$30,000.00 for erecting suitable buildings to house this valuable Mission work. May the Holy Spirit put it into hearts to give us what we need! To push on and accomplish the good work which St. Stephen's aims to do, would be a blessing to the whole Church in St. Louis, a protection to the commerce and wealth of St. Louis, and a contribution, not only to the peace and prosperity, but to the better and nobler life, of St. Louis.

Under the second head would fall the work done at the Church of the Good Shepherd, under the faithful pastorship of many years of the Rev. Mr. Newton; and that of Holy Innocent's, Oak Hill; and St. Augustine's, Benton; and St. Matthew's, Clifton Heights; and St. Paul's, Carondelet; and St. James' Elleardsville. Missionary aid extended to these is to help them upon their feet, and to sustain them in steadiness awhile on their feet, until the strength comes to go alone. This is the Church Extension idea. Along the same line Rev. Mr. Wilkinson, of St. Mark's, is building up Epiphany Mission on Clayton Road; and Rev. Mr. Bardens, of Trinity, St. Chrysostonis Mission in the North of the City; and Rev. Dr. Ingraham, Grace Mission, also in the North; and Rev. Mr. Deane, of St. Andrew's, Holy Cross Mission in the West. I am glad and thankful for all these efforts. Yet whoso will take a map of the city and observe the large portions of it unoccupied by our Church, especially in the North and Northwest, and I may add also the Southwest, will be grieved to think that we are not at all making the growth of the Church in this great city keep pace with the growth of its inhabitants. I understand that a report from the Committee on Missions will lay before you some facts in this relation. And I reiterate my entreaty that Diocesan Missions, and that great part of Diocesan Missions which City Missions constitute, may claim and have the thoughts and prayers, the loving interest and generous gifts of you all.

Next Sunday will be the 25th anniversary of the "Missionary Host." God's blessings go with its Silver Day! The "Missionary Host" was a comfort and a source of sweet relief to my hard-working and oft-perplexed predecessor, I know. As for myself, I cannot say out enough my loving gratitude to it. It has gone right on, quite like the steady breathing of my lungs. I have not noticed it much. I have not been called on to notice it. I have not been bothered by it. When I have noticed it, it is quite like the lung-breathing again. It gives a sense of strength and power and deliciousness of living. Others have watched it. Others have worked it. Others have taken the trouble of it. And the blessed children have kept loyal and faithful to it. So when I have reached out my hand for help in sore need, with no call of proclamation and no fuss of demonstration the help has been ready and has been put into it. Only to God's good Providence and a Bishop's anxious heart is it known how help of that sort has made my sleep sounder and my heart

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stronger and saved me from much strain, and practically conserved and protected my working powers.

In like manner the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese has been a foremost helper for Missions. Not quite as unnoticed or unspeaking. Not to notice it would be impossible. To be unspeaking, perhaps, wouldn't be woman's way. But its speaking counts, and counts for sturdy help. With \$1,000.00 more paid off for All Saints' Church reducing to \$5,000.00 the debt which was \$9,000.00 when the Auxiliary took hold of it. With hundreds of dollars given to the Missionary Bishops of Oklahoma and Western Colorado, who came to visit us. With \$150.00 of help specially to St. Stephen's in a severe emergency; and with promisings to try hereafter to raise \$1,000.00 per year for St. Stephen's; with \$75.00 per year given steadily in subscription for Diocesan Missions; and with errands of merciful and generous succor sent to so many missionaries at every point of the compass, that I would need mathematical computation and nautical phraseology to recount them. The money value of this year's doing, let alone the sweet story of affection and sympathy and prayer, and intelligent interest aroused and quickened through the "Missions Class,"-the money value of their doing is \$5,491.88, of which the cash gifts are \$3,486.51. Two members of the auxiliary give me twelve dollars per year each to pay the dues of two clergymen in the "Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society." One earnest member, Mrs. J. J. Mitchell, laid by to sweet rest, left \$6,500.00 for God's work, in various bequests.

Bishop Robertson Hall, spite of the hard times, has had a right successful year. There has been a larger attendance of pupils, and all the operations of the School have gone on well. The Sisters have been graciously relieved from the burden of interest which pressed sorely, by eighteen friends who subscribed \$100.00 per year each for meeting the interest. I think the syndicate will generously stand by for the same relief for a year longer. It is a great comfort to see the school in its present healthful and hopeful condition.

In St. Mark's School, Portland, Rev. Mr. Alleyne and Mr. Gill have succeeded in founding a good boarding school for boys, with very moderate cost for board and tuition. The air of the school, physical, mental, moral and spiritual is wholesome and manly.

The Orphans' Home continues its beneficent operations. Scarlet fever has assailed its inmates. Consequently the lady Managers are striving to accumulate funds for the erection of a detached building for an infirmary, of the urgent need of which they are strongly convinced. The children are grieved to know that they are soon to lose out of their sight their faithful chaplain who has given them loving care for many years. The Orphans' Home, with Mt. Calvary Church, and with the entire Diocese, will mourn the departure of the Rev. Mr. Reed who has done untiring duty among us for more than a score of years.

St. Luke's Hospital, I feel sure, grows in the esteem of the people of St. Louis. Medical and nursing care of the best can be secured there, and cases of charity where succor is given to stranded ones without money and without

price are very considerable. The "Giving Tuesdays," instituted and managed by ladies of the different Parishes, bring in excellent results of help. The "Training School for Nurses" is in a soundly established and well organized condition. Seven young women graduated from it this year.

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The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is a blessing to the Diocese. I am glad for its members and proud of them. In their Sunday-school work and Bible Class work; in their duties as ushers and their duties as lay readers; in their efforts in social life to keep young brothers from yielding to temptation, and in their efforts of positive influence to bring such brothers to Church and to Holy Communion, I recognize in them a power for good altogether and conspicuously valuable. This year in an emergency they are concurring to extend important financial aid to the Building Fund of St. Stephen's Mission.

Some laymen of St. Louis have united together in a Church Club. I am glad to tell out the fact. I do not know where the Saxon word Club in its well-known meaning comes from. Sometimes the word and the thing signified by it are not pleasant. For a Parish congregation to think itself a religious club, and to act out the thought, sends a chill to my heart. But this Church Club and its membership, joining in prayer, learning about the Church, deepening sympathy, broadening fellowship, clasping hands across parochial lines, alive and earnest to be the visible hands and feet and voice of the invisible Christ to win souls to Him, and to defend and promote the interests of His kingdom,—my warm thanks to it, my best wishes with it!

Unless one be grossly stupid, revolving years bring grave thoughtfulness. How is American life to be kept true to duty, and strong for righteousness, and sweet in brotherly affection? What shall bring classes and masses alike to walk in ways of love and loyalty to the flag, and of obedience and reverence to law and order? Are Socialism and Paternalism on the one hand, or Individualism and Anarchy on the other, to sap the blood of all that is sweet and strong and wholesome for both the Individual and the Community? Shall self-will and pride, or self-assertion and unbelief or self-indulgence and sense gratification crowd out and sink from sight trusting faith in the Divine Master and child-like love of His dear Person? How shall the great commonwealth of Missouri, blest in wonderful resources of wealth by God's bounty, and this mighty City, destined, if the world be spared and our nation remain one, to be the home of busied millions, be kept beating time and standing steady to righteousness and Christianity? What shall be the life and growth of our own Church here? How can our Parishes, under the fever of change and chill of depletion, remain healthy and vigorous? How can the down-town ones of the City survive at all? In the turmoil and strife, in the straining and out reaching, in the gain and growth, in the din and confusion, will any room be found or time be given for still, small voices of conscience, and the Church, and the Holy Spirit?

One is almost inclined to answer;—God knoweth. We fear not. But that would be a faithless answer. And faithlessness is not only unwisdom and weakness, but, for us Christians, treachery and sin.

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It may be said, it seems as if true, that materialism is the faith and worldliness the practice of the day; that selfishness and sin in dominant force work discordant wrangling and one can see no end thereof. But, "when the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him." We may not forget that we live under the dispensation of God the Holy Ghost. These Sundays of the latter half of the Christian year on which we just have entered are, in the old Service Books, Sundays after Pentecost, taking their source and inspiration from Whit Sunday. With God the Holy Ghost the guide and leader, the personal inspirer and worker for good on the earth, how shall Christians lose heart and faith, however self and Satan, sin and death, may seem to have the high hand?

Besides representing the Blessed Saviour by lighting the reason and conscience and hope of every man that cometh into the world, He, God the Holy Ghost, has the three Divine Institutions, the Family, the State, and the Church, for the channels of His grace and the instruments of His beneficent activity. Let the world intensify its seductions. Let pride swell, and gain grow, and sense tyrannize, and self claim imperial rule; and Satan shout cries of victory. Yet set against them is an opposing host. And God the Holy Ghost is the Commander-in-Chief. And the Home, the State, and the Church are the powerful intrenchments. These three are not settings up of our own for defence; the sharpened stakes of an improvised stockade protection. No, they are walls of adamant and strong towers heaven reaching furnished by the Almighty Himself for refuge and succor to the souls whom He hath made.

Clanging discord shall not bring disintegration and dissolution. Arrogant selfishness cannot choke to the death brotherly kindness and love. The perplexing questions of practical economics touching the making of wealth and the distributing of wealth shall not run on to ruinous distraction of men's thoughts and aims. Because God the Holy Ghost is the Divine personal worker on earth for good. And because the three Divine Institutions, the Family, the State, and the Church, are the everlasting embodiments for earth of His beneficent activities. If pessimism be loud-voiced to-day it is because it does not so much as know whether there be any Holy Ghost; and it does not realize the tremendous and enduring strength of protection to the better in man afforded by the Divine Institutions which God's goodness hath set up on the earth.

Onsets shall be met, then, and problems will be solved, as they come. In the beginning God's merciful goodness made the Family. It is a survival of Eden. It is a prophecy of heaven. Blessings center in it and flow out of it that are mightiest forces to keep the world sweet and strong. Love, purity, reverence, self-sacrifice, fidelity, personal honor, consideration for others, patriotism. Let pessimism take note of all this.

The State is an aggregate of families. It erects thrones, and seats upon them law and order. There is some sternness in its beneficence. It sets fixedness of restraint over against the Home's winningness of love. But it is God's good servant for the preservation and promotion of righteousness. "The

powers that be are ordained of God." If the service be not complete or good, ours is the fault. God means it to be complete and good. Out from the Family the State gets its best things of fidelity, honor, consideration for others, patriotism.

The Church is a nourishing mother. She is not as old as the Family. She does not lay direct hands of restraint and influence upon all, as the State does. Because choice, freewill, love are primal principles with her as they are not with the State. But her's is the domain of the highest hopes and deepest faiths which human beings can experience. And home love, and the righteousness of law and order, are intrinsically precious to her, and she is unceasingly their promoter. She is not to die from off the earth while man is left upon it, any more than the Family and the State. "The Gates of Hades shall not prevail against" her, said the Master. In her ministry and sacraments, her discipleship and brotherhood, her prayers and praises, her faith and life, she is in special sense inhabited, inspired, and guided by God the Holy Ghost.

Let there be no loss of heart or courage to us, dear brethren. With feet set in the way of duty stand we steady shoulder to shoulder. Our Commander-inchief on earth is God the Holy Ghost. Shall we not trust Him and obey Him and follow Him? Things may seem to be out of joint. Then work we manfully to set them right. But stop with work. Go not on to worry. God the Holy Ghost is the Director. He sees the things. To Him they are not what they seem to us. Leave them to Him. The world is not to go to pieces under Him. Society is not to be thrust down into an abyss of ruin. Governments are not to be put back into the confusing chaos of anarchy. "The Lord is King, be the people never so impatient; He sitteth between the cherubim, be the earth never so unquiet."

We may go on to take our annual account of spiritual stock, to reason together, to ask and receive counsel, and to lay plans and march on to execute them, though we well know how soon one or another of us is to fall out from among the workers, and leave to others to do the work.

But though,

"The world is very evil,"

and,

"The times are waxing late,"

we decline to make company with the pessimist or to think with him. Our hearts are hopeful. Our eyes are upward. We refuse to be cast down or dismayed. Our trust in God the Holy Ghost is unshaken. "O Lord in Thee,—in Thee, have I trusted, let me never be confounded."

The Board held its first meeting on June 2d, 1893, and organized by electing Mr. F. J. McMaster, Secretary, and Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer, for the ensuing year, and fixed a quorum of the Board to consist of eight members, four of whom were to be clergymen and four laymen.

The following Missions are reported vacant: Afton, Canton, Kirksville, and La Plata.

The amendments to the Canon relating to the Missionary Board, adopted at the last Convention, clearly drew a distinction between Missionary work and Church Extension, and commissioned the enlarged Board to go forth with renewed energy and zeal to execute these two branches of the Church's work. The Board, recognizing the duty devolved upon it, at once sent out its investigating committees, and discovered that there were Missions already established that stood in urgent need of assistance, while there was also a large territory of the city, west of Grand avenue, extending north and south, thickly populated, into which the Church should be extended. Before it had determined how it would execute the commission from the Convention, or whether or not it would concentrate its energies for the first year upon one branch of the work it had to do, there came a proposition from that noble band of workers, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, that left no alternative for the Board, but to accept it, and devote its first labors to the building up of St. Stephen's Mission. This proposition was, that if the Missionary Board would agree to raise \$5,000, for the securing of ground, and erecting building thereon for St. Stephen's, during the year, that the Brotherhood would pledge itself to raise the sum of \$3,000 for the same purpose. This opened up the pathway of duty. This proposition was at once accepted, and a campaign organized for the purpose of raising the \$5,000. A clergyman and a layman were selected by the Bishop, and, under his direction, visited every Parish and Mission in the city, with the consent of the Rector and Missionary in charge thereof, and laid before the congregation the needs of St. Stephen's, and asked for pledges and offerings for it. Notwithstanding the financial stress resting upon the country, there were cash and pledges obtained amounting to over \$3,800. The Board commends this work to the Convention and the church people of the city, and trusts that their generosity will enable it to secure the remainder of the \$5,000 before the first of October, next.

In furtherance of its fond purpose to permanently anchor St. Stephen's in the midst of a careless and indifferent people whom the Church was passing by in the westward moving of its temples, the Board proceeded to purchase a lot of ground upon which to erect the buildings. The property is located on the southeast corner of 6th and Rutger streets, and contains a front of 86 feet, 6 inches, on 6th street, and a front of 82 feet, 6 inches on Rutger street. The price paid for it was the sum of \$5,000, but the vendor, Mrs. Thomas, kindly donated \$100 to the good cause. The Board is now securing plans and estimates for a building, and hopes soon to commence the erection thereof.

While the Board takes pleasure in reporting the results of its efforts in this direction, it does not desire to divert, and it trusts that it has not diverted, your attention, your interest and your sympathy from the general cause of Missions in the Diocese. We have twenty-two Missionaries, and twenty-six Missions, organized and unorganized, and fourteen Parishes, that need, and must have, our help and aid. They must be taken care of, or we are faithless to the cause we espouse. To meet these demands, pledges are annually taken in the Convention. The stipends that these faithful and self-sacrificing Missionaries are receiving, as you have heard, are disgracefully small. To lessen them, means not only hardship and distress to the Missionary, which so many of them uncomplainingly endure, but it means a serious crippling of Missionary operations. Further encroachment has been made on what we have been pleased to term the surplus fund, until it is nearly exhausted. It is a serious and delicate matter for the Board to make contracts with these faithful servants of God, without knowing beforehand, the amount that will be in its hands to expend. \$4,750 is the minimum sum needed for this purpose. The Diocese of Missouri has never yet failed to provide for those of its own household, and the Board feels that the pledges this day made will not allow the stamp of "worse than an infidel" to be placed upon it.

#### APPENDIX No. 10.

## Report of Missouri Branch of the Idoman's Auxiliany.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D. Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

While the figures in our report this year are not as encouraging as usual in the aggregate, it is because we had two unusual gifts last year. Our chief joy is that we have completed one line of general work, our part of the payment of All Saints' Debt. Not only have we given \$4,000 in four years to the colored work here in our midst, but a feeling of sympathy and kindly interest has been engendered between the members of that Parish and the others working for it. At the request of the Bishop we are to turn our energies to St. Stephen's, and have pledged \$1,000 for the coming year. We can readily raise it, and it is hoped that every name on the list of All Saints' subscribers will be transferred to St. Stephen's, and much the same method of contributing will probably be adopted.

Our President has made two Missionary journeys in the Diocese, and established a branch in Jefferson City and reorganized the work at Hannibal, which heretofore had been largely individual, and which promises work in the coming year. Another valuable adjunct to our work has been found in the Cathedral Guild of St. Mary for Ecclesiastical Embroidery.

All of our regular obligations have been met, the Scholarships, Diocesan Missionary Pledge, and we had a part in the great Thanksoffering made by the women for the Mission House. We have had visits from the Archbishop of Zante, Bishop Hale, Bishop Brooke and Bishop Barker, and practically showed our appreciation of each one. The United Offering is increasing. There is a decided decrease in the Mite Boxes, which implies a temptation to forsake the old lines for the new.

The Missions Class held its regular meetings at the Schuyler House. There was some variation from our old methods, in having two afternoons conducted by Bishops. The work in Oklahoma was the subject of Bishop Brooke's talk, and Bishop Hale spoke on the Greek Church and our Mission work in Greece. The class is a distinctive feature of the work in Missouri, and has proved a source of education and inspiration to us all.

The great loss of this year is the resignation of our faithful Treasurer. It is only a keen sense of the undue tax it would be upon her already much occupied time, that reconciles us to giving her up. Her careful reports and well kept books tell better than any words, how great the loss will be.

To the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Missouri:

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—During the past year, under your direction, I have had four classes of duty: 1. Missionary work in the Diocese; 2. Official correspondence of the Bishop, and writing up the records of the Diocese; 3. Editorial care of the Church News; 4. The charge of St. Augustine's and St. Matthew's Missions. By your appointment I have given one Sunday each month to outside Missionary work, and have held thirty-two services in seventeen different Parishes

and Missions. On these visits I administer the Holy Communion, catechise the Sunday-school, confer with the Vestry or Committee as to the needs of the Parish or Mission, and visit as many of the Church families as possible.

I am happy to report that the income of the Church News for the last year was slightly above the cost of publication. With the change of form to the magazine style with better paper and type, together with some changes in management, the publishers hold out flattering encouragement for future financial success. We have reason to be proud of our Diocesan paper, now in its twenty-fifth year, in the fact that it is the oldest one in existence, and that its life has been uninterrupted from the beginning. While we shall endeavor to keep the Church News before the people, giving everyone an opportunity to subscribe, yet we cherish the hopeful dream that the happy time will come when the Diocesan paper will not go begging for subscribers, but will be a felt want for its own sake, and become a necessity in every Church family in the Diocese.

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### APPENDIX No. 13 A.

## Report of the Chaplain of St. Luke's Yospital.

It always seems incumbent on me in presenting a report of St. Luke's Hospital to the Convention, that it should embrace more than a presentation of dry statistics, as to the number of services and the amount contributed by the Churches, or otherwise, to its current expenses. The main design of a report to the Convention would seem to be, that the claims of the Hospital may be brought before the Church throughout the Diocese.

By a by-law of the Association, every Clergyman in charge of a Parish in the Diocese is "ex-officio" a member of the Association, and is entitled at any meeting of its members to give expression to his opinions and to vote upon any measure that may be proposed. The annual meeting, by provision of the by-laws, is held on the last day of the Convention, when the Board of Managers for the ensuing year are elected and any other business connected with the interests of the Hospital may be transacted. While this is an important meeting, yet it has never been attended with any manifestation of special interest. Any measures bearing upon the management of the Hospital, or matters affecting its well-being, may there be proposed and discussed. It is by no means a close corporation, but invites the active co-operation of every Clergyman, and of every Layman who is willing to pay \$10 annually towards its support. There has been a gradually increasing interest in the parishes outside the city in their contributions on Hospital Sunday, and in sending their gifts of fruits, vegetables, canned provisions, old linen, etc., on Giving Tuesday, and on other days suiting their convenience.

There are now eight endowed beds, the income from which, will enable the Hospital, the debt being fully provided for, to increase, materially, the number of their charity patients. As I have said before, the Hospital is a great charity in itself, as furnishing a home where the transient sick may be cared for with a comfort and a skill never found in any private residence. As a matter of economy also, whether in the ward or a private room, board, medical care, and nursing, can be procured at a much less cost, and as a rule, with far more comfort and better attention.

As to the strictly charitable work of the Hospital, it has been extended to the limit of its means, without reference to the *religious* views of the applicant, creed or no creed. I quote from the annual report of the Superintendent, Mrs. Mary Chambers:

"The Hospital has cared for 78 cases, to whom 1,928 days of treatment, 111 days of special nursing, i. e., constant attendance day and night by a specially appointed nurse, were given absolutely free of charge. These figures, to any one unfamiliar with hospital life, convey but faintly the amount of work done and benefit received. The

patients were of both sexes, all ages, and all classes and creeds. They suffered from various ailments, and in some cases underwent serious surgical operations. These were performed by our surgeons, without counting cost, time or skill; they simply saw a chance to relieve suffering humanity and took it whenever it was prudent. The free cases are treated side by side with those who pay and it is not known outside the office who they are, to any save themselves and the friends sending them. It is possibly due to this fact that we so often hear that we take no charity patients; but if any one will take the time and trouble to make inquiries at the office, or of the friends of the Hospital, a very different state of things can be proven, and a worthy charity shown to be doing a good work, though quietly and unostentatiously."

A word as to the "Training School for Nurses," which has become an important feature in the present management of the Hospital.

The third annual graduating exercises for the class of this year, took place at the Memorial Chapel (St. Luke's), on Friday evening, May 4th. The Bishop conferred the diploma of the institution upon seven young ladies who had devoted two years of faithful study and practice to the acquisition of the needful skill and knowledge to fit them for their life work, in ministering to the sick, whether in the Hospital or in the private house.

There are now eighteen students pursuing this course, and it is presumed there will be a growing interest and increasing numbers as the years go by; and also enlarged and more comfortable quarters for those who *deserve* the highest consideration at the hands of the friends of the Hospital.

The *Church News*, for the present month, contains two interesting addresses delivered by the President of the Hospital, W. H. Thomson, Esq., and Dr. M. H. Post, of the medical staff, on the occasion to which I have referred. I bespeak for these addresses your careful perusal.

The Rev. W. W. Love has assisted at times in the celebration of the Holy Communion, and has had entire charge of the services in the wards, assisted occasionally by the Rev. A. K. Smith. Rev. W. W. Love has also acted as Chaplain of St. Barnabas' Guild for Trained Nurses, which is, no doubt, an organization of great merit and usefulness, and will be a bond of union for its members wherever their lot may be cast. The Bishop delivered a most interesting sermon to them during the winter in the Cathedral.

The Altar Department has been under the care of Miss Triplett, assisted by Miss Cousland, together with an occasional service from one of the nurses. To these ladies we owe the special acknowledgment of a grateful recognition. It is no inconsiderable service to attend sixty-seven times during the year, in all weathers, through heat and cold, rain and sunshine, and occasionally at an early hour, to keep the linen and sacred vessels in order and attend many other calls upon their care and attention. Like the attending Priests they have a higher reward than any earthly compensation, through loving ministry in His service, who has left the blessed assurance.

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#### APPENDIX No. 14.

### Report of Registran and Libranian.

The Registrar and Librarian submits the following report:

In November of last year, the Library was removed from its cramped and dismal quarters in the Cathedral, to the beautiful and commodious room provided for it in the Schuyler Memorial House. The books were thoroughly cleaned and sorted and placed on the shelves. Had it not been for the intelligent labors of my predecessor, the Rev. Mr. Higson, to whom so much credit for painstaking care is due, my labors would have been much more arduous.

It is found, on examination, that there are about 1,270 volumes on hand, under the various heads of theology, biography, history, education, etc. The old catalogue is now useless, and a new one is in course of preparation. It is gratifying to state that there appears to be a revived interest in the Library, as manifested in the number of

volumes withdrawn for reference during the six months it has been in its new location. The Librarian is to be found in the room between 11 and 12 o'clock, daily, except Sundays, and esteems it a privilege to assist any one desiring to make use of the books. Copies of the Church News, keeping the files complete, have been received from the editor, the Rev. Mr. Miller; the Very Rev. Dr. Schuyler has supplied numbers of the Spirit of Missions, and Mr. Jos. P. Gazzam has kindly contributed the following named works: Sermons, Newman, 2 volumes; sermons, Onderdonk, 2 volumes; Ecclesiastical History of England, Ven. Bede, 1 volume; Law of the Church, Hoffman, 1 volume; Church Documents, Connecticut, Volume 2; General Convention Journals, 1785 to 1853, Volume 1. Journals of the Conventions have been received, through the Secretary of the Diocese, from nearly all the Dioceses, and copies of the Journals of Missouri have been furnished the Diocese of Colorado, on application of the Registrar of that Diocese.

May not this Library have a larger future? The books are old, but the Librarian is new. The contempt or indifference for the Library may be largely overcome, if the clergy will manifest a more decided interest in it. Contributions of desirable books are asked for, and will be acknowledged in the annual report. When times become easier, and money more plentiful, the Convention will be asked to do something annually, for the intelligent increase of the Library. In the meantime your Librarian proposes to do his best to keep it and its interests and advantages before

the Diocese.

He has received \$50 from the Treasurer of the Diocese, and has expended \$35.25 for the moving and cleaning of the books, and the incidental expenses of his office, leaving a balance on hand of \$14.75. A record of the various Episcopal Acts have been kept as required of the Registrar, by Canon.

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#### APPENDIX No. 16.

### Report of Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to which was referred the proposed new Canon XXIV., of the Rev. Mr. Robert, to be considered during recess of Convention, respectfully report that they have examined the same, comparing it carefully with the present Canon XXIV., and agree that the present is preferable to the proposed: they also ask to be relieved from further consideration of the same.

It is due to the Rev. Mr. Robert to add that a very large part of his Canon agrees word for word with the present. The important changes proposed are:

First—In Section 2, Sub-Section third, and also in Section 3, to change, "three Communicants, two of whom shall be Presbyters," to "three Presbyters."

Second—To omit such parts of Sections 12, 13, 14 and 15, as refer to the appointment and duties of the Commissary; the latter to be performed by the judges for triers as they are called in the present Canon.

Third—Section 27, last clause, after the word "trial" (8th line), to omit the words, "it shall be at his option to perform the remaining duties prescribed for him in this Canon, or to delegate them to the clerical members of the Standing Committee," and insert, "then one of the Bishops of the Dioceses adjoining that of Missouri, shall be invited to perform the duties prescribed in Sections 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 of this Canon."

No one of these changes was regarded as desirable by any member of your committee, but may, by a majority of the Convention, and hence the reason for this statement.

## Report of Standing Committee on Missions.

The past year is signalized by a new departure in Missionary activity.

The beginning of this was shown in the last Convention in the new Canon provid-

ing for an increase in the membership of the Missionary Board.

The report of the Secretary of the Board will show what has been accomplished, and while the results may not have been all that were hoped for, there is enough to show at least the dawn of a brighter day.

What has been done even in a time of unparalleled financial disturbance, is an

incentive and encouragement for doing more.

Your committee recognizes the fact that the sustentation of the work already instituted in the city and in the country, is something that must be provided for, and

the regular Missionary Pledges may surely be depended upon for that.

Beyond this the cause of Church Extension comes to us now appealing with mighty force. The opportunity is especially an open one in the rapidly growing city of St. Louis. In the last ten years a growth of from 250,000 to nearly 600,000, means possibly, we may say probably, in the next ten, a million inhabitants. This shows already a great many changes of habitable districts, much disturbance of Church and Parish affiliations. How many of our weak and wayward ones we are losing, and how many of the disturbed inquiring ones we might bring safely into the fold, if we could only make provisions for more pastoral oversight and establish new centers of aggressive work in new neighborhoods.

Between St. George's Church on Pendleton and Olive, and the Church of the Ascension in Cabanne, there is no Church or Mission station, although there is a population of 40,000 between those points. On the north side there is substantially the same situation. Grace Church almost alone bravely ministering to a large population, bound to be increasing. On the south side St. John's Church and St. Stephen's are doing heroic work among the poor, and such work is so blessed that there ought

to be a great deal more of it.

In the face of so much to be done, in the face of such an opportunity as we have to-day, what can we do? What shall we do? Shall we fold our arms and say, we are too feeble, too few and too poor, to keep up with this immense increase of population?

Shall we confess ourselves an insignificant poverty stricken sect of mighty respectable people, content to stay where we are and keep our own lovely little Parishes agoing, or shall we be true to ourselves, true to our rich Catholic heritage, our noble Prayer Book, our Episcopal order, and say to the people we have something for you, something we wish you to have, something which we are glad to give.

If we take the right course, the manly course, we must seize opportunities, we must reach out for good locations, corner lots; we must build temporary Chapels or hire rooms, and send out live preachers, establish Sunday-schools, visit from house to house, and gather in our own and all the others who will come with them.

This means effort, this calls for money, this means larger and more liberal giving.

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TZ, airman. Your committee has not a word of reproach for the Church people of this Diocese in the matter of giving. They have learned to give and to give generously, and are the richer for it; but in the face of an immense need when worldly wisdom and spiritual aspiration point in the same direction, we appeal to you most earnestly to give more, to do more, to pray more, and we can assure you all, that your individual Parish and corporate life will be quickened thereby, and instead of a hopeless indifference, we shall have a healthy activity in the grand work that the Master has given us to do.

## Report of Secretary of Orphans' Yome.

EASTER TUESDAY, March 27th, 1894.

Our home has again been invaded by infection and disease. A siege of scarlet fever has been its Lenten cross. The epidemic has been complicated and malignant, proving fatal to the life of one of its victims. Through a long and trying period of care and anxiety, ten children have been nursed back to health and strength.

Last year the Secretary's report called attention to the inconvenient and necessarily ineffectual method of quarantining the sick in the main building, and to the great need of a detached infirmary. This need has become more pressing. It is urgent. We feel that we would be culpable longer to shirk or postpone the responsibility resting upon us. Two successive seasons of epidemic, continuing in each case through a period of several months, convince us that we must take some steps toward accomplishing our purpose of erecting an infirmary. We have too much heart in our cause, and too much faith in our friends to entertain any thought of failure.

There is another importunate consideration which urges prompt action. It is that, aside from the disadvantage and labor of caring for the sick under our present conditions, our charity is hampered during the whole period of these epidemics; for at such times, as there is no certain method of protecting those who are in health, from the infection, we dare not assume the risk of admitting applicants, be they never so needy and deserving of help.

Thus, in this present case, our doors have been closed and our hands tied since November, and this during a period of financial stringency when the distress of the poor has been unusual and extreme. Such long suspensions of the work which is the chief object of our institution, would be obviated by erecting a separate and independent house of isolation. So equipped we could proceed with our regular work without interruption. For this purpose we have set aside from funds in hand the sum of \$1,000, a bequest of Mrs. John J. Mitchell; the sum of \$150, being the proceeds of the sale of a portion of the land left to the Home as a legacy, by Mr. Theodore Betts; \$1,350 being the proceeds of the sale of the right to use the partition wall of the Olive street property, and finally several contributions amounting to \$50, making a

sum total of \$2,550. We hope that our friends will not be slow in adding to our

We feel sure that fathers and mothers, who are grateful for the gifts of life and health to their own precious treasures, will aid us in building an asylum for the care of our sick children. Bereaved parents, in memory of those who are gone, will surely not slight their opportunity to help us to help others or fail to show their love of the Master by feeding His lambs.

No precaution has been omitted, or effort spared to secure proper sanitation in the building through the inspection by the officers of the City Board of Health and

the thorough fumigation of the building after the epidemics.

The needs of the sick have largely increased the demands upon the time and skill of Dr. Saunders and others of our medical staff. We have, therefore, been placed under renewed obligations for their disinterested labors. Of this staff Dr. Todd, always ready to respond to our call in behalf of the sick, has recently passed to his reward.

No appeal to our legal counselor, Mr. Thomas K. Skinker, has ever failed to elicit his prompt response and secure for us his cordial and valuable advice. The Church guilds have come to our assistance in making up clothing for the children. The visiting clergy, whenever called upon, have responded to our invitation to conduct services at the Home. The use of the Schuyler Memorial House, during the time of infection and for special occasions, has been extended to the Board for its meetings. Mr. Fetherstone has continued his military training at the Home. For all of these services, and for the continued and earnest work of our faithful chaplain, the Rev. B. E. Reed, we desire to express our cordial and hearty appreciation.

We are fortunate to have retained the services of our matron and our teacher, who have been doing painstaking and efficient work, especially through the long and

trying epidemic.

Christmas, Thanksgiving and Fourth of July have been celebrated according to our custom. The Exposition, Fresh Air Mission, and visits to the parks during the summer have all contributed to break the monotony of the daily routine. We have received during the year twenty children. The number is small, because of the epidemic. There has been one death from scarlet fever; twenty-five children have been restored to parents or friends; one has run away; six have been adopted, and two have been indentured. Present number in the Home, fifty-four.

Notwithstanding the hard times we have been obliged to have unusual repairs made on the building and some painting done, in order to preserve the woodwork; so that we are able to announce that at present the Home is, throughout, in a satis-

factory condition of repair.

In behalf of the Board of Managers this report is respectfully submitted.

#### APPENDIX No. 20.

## Constitution of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Soqiety.

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#### ARTICLE I - NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

#### ARTICLE II - OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

#### ARTICLE III - MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

#### ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who together, with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

#### ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under directions of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE VI — FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

#### ARTICLE VII - FUNDS - DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

#### ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within his parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

#### ARTICLE IX - AUXILIARY SOCIETIES - MEETINGS OF.

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SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

#### ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

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APPENDIX A.

## Rules of Order.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
  - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - 11. On Constitution and Canons.
  - III. On Unfinished Business.
  - IV. On Finance.
  - V. On Assessments.
  - VI. On Missions.
  - VII. On Christian Education
  - VIII. On Sunday-School Work.
  - IX. On Missionaries' Travelling Expenses.
  - X. On the State of the Church.
  - 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
  - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nayes.
- 11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

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13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more Pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course and without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the Canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

21. The following Order of Business shall be observed:

## FROM REV. GEO. H. HUNT.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri.

Rt. Rev. and Dear Sir:—During the past year I have exercised the functions of my ministry whenever possible, I have only to regret that the occasions afforded me have been so infrequent and rare, notwithstanding the abundant field all around me. It seems hard that I must remain idle when there is so much to do, and where so much might be done; but I can only avail myself of such opportunities as are afforded me, and strive patiently to await the opening of some door to more abundant usefulness. Why the Church should leave any of her clergy unemployed who are eager and anxious to work, is a problem which I cannot solve; but so it is, and I must even submit. The responsibility for this must rest somewhere, and I only am anxious myself to escape it by using all due diligence and making every proper effort in my own behalf.

I have held services since May 2, 1893, upon one or more occasions, in Trinity Church, De Soto; Grace Church, Crystal City; St. Paul's, St. Louis; celebrating Holy Communion six times and preaching sixteen sermons. Besides I have assisted several of the city clergy, more or less, frequently, and have baptized one infant, officiated at one burial and solemnized one marriage.

REPORT OF REV. A. W. MANN, GENERAL MISSIONARY TO DEAF MUTES.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri.

Most of what has been reported by me in past years regarding the work among the deaf of St. Louis and vicinity will now be reported by my co-worker, the Rev. James H. Cloud, Minister in charge of St. Thomas Mission. I may, however, be allowed to report having taken services for him during his absence in Kansas City; and having assisted him at a confirmation at the Cathedral on last Palm Sunday.

Outside of St. Louis I have officiated twice, and administered holy baptism in Christ Church, Rolla. In the first service, which was "combined," the Rev. Mr. Higson read the service and sermon and I interpreted. A deaf-mute man came twenty miles on horseback to this service. Twenty-five years had passed since he had attended religious ministrations at the school at Fulton. Many like him are isolated from these blessed privileges. The Church should have a larger force of Missionaries versed in sign language in order to meet their needs.

Prayer Books and Tracts on the Church have been distributed, as in past years, with very good results. For donations of books the Mission in St. Louis is indebted to the generosity of the Bishop White Prayer Book Society, of Philadelphia.

In July, 1893, a conference of Church workers among the deaf was held in All Angels' Mission, Chicago. The presence of workers from England and Ireland gave it an international character. Mr. Cloud and I participated in the proceedings. We also attended a congress of deaf-mutes the following week. I opened the first session with prayer and afterwards presented a paper on Church work among the deaf in the United States.

The Mid-Western Deaf-Mute Mission covers the Dioceses of Pittsburgh, Ohio, Southern Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Western Michigan, Chicago, Quincy, Springfield, Missouri, West Missouri, Iowa, Minnesota, Milwaukee and Fond du Lac, so that my sphere of travel is quite large. Three-fourths of my time since the beginning of the work in 1875 has been spent away from home.

The expenses of the work are met out of twelfth Sunday after Trinity offerings, and the small offerings taken up at deaf-mute services.

# Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent.

Sec. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

Sec. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
