## Rules of Order of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
  - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - II. On Constitution and Canons.
  - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
  - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
  - V. On the State of the Church.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
- 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- 11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.
- 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundredth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri assembled in the Dean Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial on Tuesday, February 7, 1939, at 4 p.m., with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty who were entitled to vote, seventeen were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 13).

The Secretary called the roll of the forty Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-three were present.

A quorum being present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened.

## Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, In accordance with the recommendation of the Diocesan Council (Appendix 11), that the schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund (Appendix 10-C), amounting to \$31,081.83, be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Church Program Budget for 1939 (Appendix 10-D), amounting to \$20,505.32, and to pay the Expectancy of \$11,000.00 for 1939 to the Treasurer of the National Council.

#### Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, In accordance with the recommendation of the Diocesan Council (Appendix 11), that all income received from the Diocesan Extension and Maintenance Trust, together with all other money received for the same purpose, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Extension and Maintenance Expense Budget for 1939, amounting to \$8,755.75 (Appendix 11-E).

Dean Sweet introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 6.

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled records its sincere appreciation of the noble and unselfish Christian service rendered by Canon James H. George in the work of the Mission to the City Institutions during the past fourteen years, and expresses the hope that he may continue this useful ministry for many years.

The Convention took a recess until 7:30 p.m.

The Bishop delivered his annual address to the Convention. (Appendix 1.)

Mrs. Harold E. Woodward, Executive Secretary of the Young People in the Diocese made a short address.

The Rev. Kenneth E. Heim, Clergy Adviser of the Diocesan Christian Youth Movement, described in detail its objectives and methods.

Mr. Richard Wheatcroft, President of the Young Churchmen of the Diocese, and Mr. Owen Thompson, President of the Diocesan Christian Youth Movement, made short addresses.

The Rev. William H. Kirk gave a brief account of the Social Service work which is being done in connection with Grace Church Mission, St. Louis. As a matter of historical significance, Mr. Kirk explained that this Social Service Center, which has been known as Holy Cross House for many years, will be known hereafter as Grace Hill House, Grace Hill being the original name of that locality when the Church was organized in 1844.

The Rev. Wilbur D. Ruggles gave a short account of some of the new work being done in Grace Church Parish, Jefferson City.

Mr. F. R. Shaw, a Vestryman of Grace Church, Jefferson City, gave an interesting account of the developments of the work in that parish.

The Rev. James M. Lichliter gave a short account of his work in Calvary Parish, Columbia, especially in connection with the students.

The Convention was called to order at 9:30 a.m., in the Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

The Minutes of the First Day were read and approved.

Mrs. Dwight Currie presented her report as President of the Girls' Friendly Society, which was received and filed.

Mrs. Walter Fischel presented her report as President of the Board of Managers of the Episcopal Home for Children, which was received and filed.

Canon Putney presented his report as Superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital, which was received and filed.

The Commissions on Rural Work, Evangelism, and Lay Workers' Annuities were continued.

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a Committee on the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Diocese.

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a Commission on the Effect of Social and Economic Conditions on Family Life.

The Bishop gave notice that St. Andrew's, Holy Innocents' and Mount Calvary Missions, St. Louis, have ceased to function within the meaning of Section V, Canon 8, and therefore, have been deorganized and removed from the list of organized missions; and that the congregations of St. Andrew's and Holy Innocents' Missions have joined in organizing St. Mark's Mission.

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a Committee to prepare a memorial on the death of the Rev.J.J.Wilkins,S.T.D., to be printed on a page in the Journal.

The Rev. Mr. Fay introduced Resolution No. 7, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

Whereas, one of the basic elements in the Christian pattern always has been the conception of the unity of all mankind in God, a unity based not on race, or nationality, or class, but on our common humanity, and

Whereas, the persecution of the Jewish People cuts straight across and denies this fundamental Christian principle, therefore be it hereby

RESOLVED, That we, the members of the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled, do record our unreserved condemnation of the persecution of members of the Jewish Race, and be it further

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to help in all measures working toward a more just solution of this problem, and be it further

RESOLVED, That we set ourselves against the rise of any such spirit in our own land.

Canon Lock introduced Resolution No. 8, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

Whereas, a Concordat, proposed as a further step toward the union of the Presbyterian Church and the Episcopal Church, was adopted at a joint meeting of the Presbyterian Commission and the Episcopal Church's Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity, held in New York City on October 27-28, 1938, and

Whereas, a joint Declaration of Purpose of the governing bodies of the two churches concerned has stated that:

"The two Churches, one in the faith of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Incarnate Word of God, recognizing the Holy Scriptures as the supreme rule of faith, accepting the two Sacraments ordained by Christ, and believing that the visible unity of Christ's Church is the will of God, hereby solemnly declare their purpose to achieve organic union."

Therefore be it hereby

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled commends the progress already made toward church unity by endorsing the proposed Concordat, and be it further

Resolved, That the Diocese of Missouri urges the General Convention of the Episcopal Church to approve this Concordat at its next meeting.

The Rev. Mr. Kirk introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

Whereas, it is apparent that the present conditions existing in areas of cotton tenancy are such as to aggravate and accentuate the tragic plight of the share-croppers by resulting in severe economic and social dislocations among millions of workers both white and colored throughout the South, therefore be it hereby

Resolved, That the Diocese of Missouri records its approval of an immediate thorough and accurate investigation of this complex situation by a National Fact-finding Commission, and be it further

Resolved, That we urge all Christian people in these stricken areas to work toward an early solution of this desperate problem.

The Rev. Mr. Poindexter introduced Resolution No. 10, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

WHEREAS, crises in the Relief situation have recurred with distressing frequency in the State of Missouri, and

Whereas, adequate appropriations, for the fulfillment and administration of the three functions of the Social Security Commission, are of primary importance in caring for the relief needs in this state, and

Whereas, there exists a pressing need for improved standards of personnel administration in the public welfare field, therefore be it hereby

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled supports the recommendations and budgets presented by the State Social Security Commission with respect to the amount of appropriations needed over the next biennium, in order to promote economy and avoid unnecessary suffering due to inadequate funds, and be it further

Whereas, it is definitely established that inadequate housing in the blighted areas of urban life is an important factor in the problems of delinquency, prostitution, crime, and disease, and

Whereas, the creation of a Federal Housing Authority gives a city access to the financial aid necessary to meet this problem, provided that its state has passed the required Enabling Legislation, and

Whereas, Missouri has not as yet passed such Enabling Legislation which is a necessary precondition to the establishment of local Housing Authorities through which Federal Funds are utilized in housing projects for low-income groups, therefore be it hereby

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled requests the Legislature of this State to pass and ratify the present Enabling Legislation, now pending.

Dean Sweet introduced Resolution No. 12, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

Whereas, a recently published report in regard to the conditions which exist at City Hospital No. 1 in St. Louis brings out the information that there is a great need for more nurses at the hospital in order to give proper care to sick patients,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled expresses its opinion,

- 1. That a primary duty of the City of St. Louis is to provide the best possible medical service and care for all needy persons in sickness.
  - 2. That the conditions in the City Hospitals are deplorable, and
- 3. That the City should immediately make available the funds necessary to provide adequate nursing care for the sick persons in the City Hospitals.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolution No. 13, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 13.

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's address relating to the program that the Government of the United States might follow in the preservation of World Peace be adopted as the mind of this Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Heim introduced Resolution No. 14, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 14.

Whereas, a moral obligation is entailed upon the members of the Clergy of this Church to ascertain surely that persons whose marriages they witness are free from any venereal diseases, and,

Whereas, no general discharge of this obligation is possible where the State laws do not demand such examination, and,

Whereas, the General Convention of 1937 has recommended that the Convention of the several Dioceses shall urge the Legislatures of their respective States to pass laws requiring that before a marriage license can be issued both the man and the woman applying shall have presented to the proper civil authority duly certified negative reports for syphilis and gonorrhea from such microscopic and blood tests as shall be at that time approved by the recognized public health authorities, and,

Whereas, measures now before the State Legislature of Missouri embody provisions providing for pre-marital examination for venereal disease,

Resolver, That the Diocese of Missouri, in Convention assembled, does urge upon the Legislature the careful consideration of these measures, recommending the passage of a strong measure requiring the examination for syphilis, and,

Furthermore, that the Diocese of Missouri notes with approval, and asks careful consideration of legislation looking toward like provisions with regard to gonorrhea, so soon as medical authorities shall deem practicable tests to be available, and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the Metropolitan and to the State Public Health Authorities, and to the Governor of the State, without delay.

The Rev. Mr. Lichliter introduced Resolution No. 15, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 15.

RESOLVED, That an effort be made to plan for the payment of expenses of out of town delegates to the Diocesan Convention.

#### APPENDIX No. 1

## Address of the Bishop to the Convention.

To the Delegates of this Diocesan Convention:

It is indeed a rare privilege, which strange as it may seem comes but once, to welcome you to the One Hundredth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri. In another year we shall be celebrating a century of life as a Diocese. It will be a significant occasion, worth commemorating. For the years have been packed with interest and achievement. It so happens that General Convention will be meeting in Kansas City in the fall of our centenary year. And it would seem fitting and proper to set our celebration just before the meeting of General Convention, so that delegates en route to Kansas City may stop over in St. Louis. The Presiding Bishop already has promised to be present with us. And if this meets with the approval of Convention, we shall appoint a One Hundredth Anniversary Committee to prepare for this event.

We would pause now for a moment to recall those whom during the past year we have lost awhile. Familiar faces are missing in this Convention, men and women who have served this Church ably and devotedly. Let us remember them for a moment in silence. (Prayer.)

Of one of these I would speak. For many of us it will be a strange Convention without Dr. Wilkins. For ten years he was the beloved Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood. Prior to that he was one of those chiefly instrumental in preparing the way for the Church Pension Fund. He left a happy ministry as Dean of the Cathedral in Los Angeles to give his full time going up and down the country calling this matter to the attention of the Church. For this the clergy and their families are profoundly in his debt. The Board of Trustees of the Church Pension Fund has sent the following Resolution to Mrs. Wilkins:

"Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of The Church Pension Fund has learned with the deepest regret of the death on December 19, 1938, of the Reverend Jeremiah J. Wilkins, D.D., of the Diocese of Missouri, and hereby records its sincere appreciation of his untiring services beginning many years before the inception of the Fund, as a leader in the movement which culminated in the establishing of a sound and comprehensive pension system for the clergy and their families through the medium of The Church Pension Fund."

Kindly, scholarly, earnest, consecrated, Dr. Wilkins has left a warm and vivid memory. And he will not soon be forgotten in this Diocese.

It is necessary to record some changes in the Clergy staff of the Diocese. The Reverend Wayne S. Snoddy, Rector of St. Paul's Church, St. Louis, was called to the Church of Our Saviour in Cincinnati. The Reverend Frederick W. Kates, Assistant in the Church of St. Michael & St. George, has gone to New Haven, Connecticut, to become an associate in Trinity Church of that city. With profound regret, but also with a full measure of pride, we surrendered Dr. Karl Morgan Block, Rector of the Church of St. Michael & St. George, to the Diocese of California to be their Bishop Coadjutor. The Reverend Arthur H. Beardsley, Rector of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, has left to take up his duties as Rector of Emmanuel Church, Shawnee, Oklahoma. And now we are about to surrender to St. John's Church, Northampton, Massachusetts, the Reverend Stephen F. Bayne, Rector of Trinity

Church, St. Louis, who has endeared himself to innumerable people far beyond his own parish boundaries, and especially to the Clergy of this Diocese.

We part with these men with great reluctance.

There also have been additions to the ranks of the Clergy. The Reverend Darby Wood Betts, one of our own boys (and it is a source of particular pride to be able to produce our own clergy), comes to us from the Theological Seminary in Virginia to be Assistant Minister in the Church of the Ascension. The Reverend Gregory J. Lock, after completing his work in the same Seminary and, in addition, a year of post graduate work in Union Theological Seminary of New York City, is now Canon in Christ Church Cathedral. The Reverend Edward J. Day who, after graduating from Harvard and the Episcopal Theological Seminary, was Vicar of St. Andrew's Church, Ayer, Massachusetts, and Instructor in Religion in Groton School, has now taken up his work at St. Paul's Church, St. Louis. The Reverend Dr. Clifford L. Stanley who, after teaching for several years in the Theological Seminary in Virginia, received last June a Doctorate from the Union Theological Seminary, New York, and who is designated by so eminent a person as Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr as "one of the two most outstanding young theologians of America," is now Rector of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau. In a recent issue, the editor of The Witness says that if the Church is wise it will not leave him long in Missouri! But we hope to keep him here for a significant period, at least. And finally, the Reverend J. Frank Sant, Rector of Christ Church, Detroit, where he had done a notable work and deeply impressed his worth on the whole Diocese, is now become Rector of the Church of St. Michael & St. George. It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that we welcome these splendid men to this their first Convention of the Diocese.

I cannot turn from this section without recording our profound regret at having to lose Deaconess Affleck, who has done such a truly splendid and consecrated work in our Episcopal Home for Children. She is now in charge of the work at the House of the Good Shepherd in Utica, New York.

During the past year there has been considerable new building in the Diocese. Grace Church, Jefferson City, which a few years ago had touched rock bottom but is now a leading influence in many ways in Jefferson City, found it necessary to increase considerably the capacity of their parish house facilities. The Church of the Holy Communion for a number of years had been badly placed. Due to the truly heroic labors of the Rector, the Reverend William S. Hohenschild, enough money was subscribed to build an attractive parish house far out in University City, where the larger part of the congregation is now established, and drawing upon a wide territory. The people of St.Peter's, following the lead of their Rector, have added a beautiful wing to their parish house. Trinity Church has remodeled its parish house, making it a much more effective instrument for their work. And due to the generous gift of Mr. John A.Watkins, who left us a bequest of seventy-five thousand dollars to erect a Church in memory of his Mother, Mrs. Anna J. Watkins, beautiful St. Mark's Church, St. Louis Hills, has now been opened for Services and we expect rapid development in that new and growing neighborhood.

But there is so much to be done, especially in these days when we must be strengthening and extending the base of Religion in our communities. Through the gift of the Woman's Auxiliary (and no Diocese has a finer, more loyal and generous Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary than we), we shall be able to place a new man at Holy Cross Mission, Poplar Bluff, where we are convinced there is a real oppor-

tunity and need for our Church. Also we greatly need an expert, full time Secretary for Religious Education. Nothing is more important than implanting the religious idea firmly and intelligently in the minds of our children. And we should have a trained worker, giving full time to this work, who can help us to establish a model educational system in the Diocese and also go about the Diocese establishing Church Schools wherever there is need and opportunity. We need full time clergymen in the Lead Belt and in another of our college centers. And we need to strengthen and expand the work at St. Stephen's Church, St. Louis, located in one of the most depressed areas of the city, where the need is so obvious and the opportunity so great. The Diocese is in the fortunate position of being able to secure some of the ablest of the young men of our Seminaries for our new projects. But at the present moment we lack sufficient income to extend our work as we should.

Later on this evening you will hear the story of the development of our Diocesan Young People's Group, with particular reference to the Youth Movement which we have initiated here. The purpose of this Movement is, amid the confusion and bewilderment of modern life, to restore God to His proper place at the very center of life; to make sure that our young people really understand the Christian view of life, so that intelligently they may commit themselves wholly to it. For it is our contention not that we ought to follow the Christian path, not that we ought to mold life nearer to the Christian pattern, but that we must; that it is not so much a question of ethics as it is of necessity; that the insight of Christ penetrated to the Truth; that this Truth is as valid in human relationships as gravity is in physics; that to build life and society on any other ground is, in Christ's memorable words, like building a house on the sand. You will hear the story of the beginnings of this Movement. May it grow and deepen with the years.

One of the most hopeful events of the past year and a half has been the accelerated movement towards unity between the Presbyterian and the Episcopal Churches. It began at last General Convention when it was affirmed that "The two Churches, one in the faith of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Incarnate Word of God, recognizing the Holy Scriptures as the supreme rule of faith, accepting the two Sacraments ordained by Christ, and believing that the visible unity of Christ's Church is the will of God, hereby solemnly declare their purpose to achieve organic union." The same Resolution was adopted by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church and Commissions were appointed to work out the preliminary steps toward this goal. This has now been done and will come before the Conventions of the two Churches for ratification. This is not the first attempt of the two Churches to find a common ground. Such a step was considered as far back as 1888, but there was no agreement at that time on the principle of the Ministry. But the Lambeth Conference in 1920 took a great step forward by stressing the Principle of Inclusiveness, rather than exclusiveness, as the grounds of unity. Said Lambeth:

"The vision which rises before us is that of a Church, genuinely Catholic, loyal to all Truth, and gathering into its fellowship all who profess and call themselves Christians, within whose visible unity all the treasures of faith and order, bequeathed as a heritage by the past to the present, shall be possessed in common, and made serviceable to the whole Body of Christ. Within this unity Christian Communions now separated from one another would retain much that has long been distinctive in their methods of worship and service. It is through a rich diversity of life and devotion that the unity of the whole fellowship will be fulfilled."

In other words, the principle is: What can each Church contribute to the rich life of the Church that is to be, rather than how much must we surrender? Lambeth in 1930 cleared the ground further by declaring that it did not call in question the spiritual reality of the Ministry of other Churches. And now a formula solving the problem which stopped negotiations years ago has been worked out, and the first practical steps are before the Churches for study and action. The last issue of The Foreword (and may I here express the profound obligation we all feel to Dr. Kevin and his associates for this excellent journal, which has been hailed by Dr. Hobbs, the head of the Publicity Department of the National Council as 'the best Diocesan Journal of 1938, which well might serve as a model for all such publications') carried a summary of these proposals. And I urge our people to become familiar with them and, as far as possible, to carry out the suggestions made therein. We all feel the need of unity. It is not only a 'good' in itself: it is becoming a sheer necessity. And the purpose of these proposals is not to establish a Presbyterian-Episcopal bloc, but to take that first step toward the wider union of all like-minded Churches, all Churches which are willing and able to negotiate on the basis of equality, which we so ardently desire. There will be sincere but dissident groups in each Church; but we may confidently expect that these proposals will prevail.

And may we hope that in the coming years the Jewish and Christian people of this land will draw ever closer together. The conscience of the world has been shocked by the ruthless, merciless, and inhuman treatment of the Jews in some areas of the world. There are probably many factors in this pattern, but one we must keep in mind: namely, that Judaism and Christianity hold in common certain basic ideas. They, as we, believe in one Universal God Who is a God not of a tribe or a clan or a nation or a race, but of all mankind, in Whom all men live and move and have their being. They, as we, believe in the unity of all mankind in God, a unity based not on race or nationality or class, but on our common humanity: to put it in its very simplest terms, all children of one Father, brothers one of another. They, as we, believe in the significance, the permanent worth, the inalienable dignity, the ultimate sacredness of the individual human being. But it is precisely these ideas which are under severe attack today. The Jews are the easier victims, being a minority: and so become the vicarious sacrifice for the ideals which we have in common. And now the battle is broadened to other fronts. All the more reason, therefore, that we who have these principles as a common possession, should draw closer together, all the more reason that we should set our faces like a rock against the rise of the spirit of intolerance in our own land.

Year after year St. Louis has been faced by recurring crises in relief. On each occasion it was known well in advance that a crisis was inevitable. Nevertheless it has been allowed to hit us with full force, causing much unnecessary suffering, just resentments, and increased community tensions. Broadly speaking, the people who come within the circle of this problem are victims of conditions for which they are not responsible and over which they have had no control. And the problem itself is one with which we shall be faced for an indefinite period. It is therefore reasonable to ask that this question now be settled once and for all on a permanent basis, flesible enough so that unforseen but necessary deviations from a fixed pattern can be handled without injustice and without strain. The present needs have been clearly stated in the report of the Social Security Commission, a summary of which will be presented to Convention. The question is now

in the hands of the State Legislature. It would be helpful if many organizations and individuals would use their influence with the Legislature in support of the proposals of the Commission.

In these days of international tension and fear when so many seem to be settling down to the conviction that another war is inevitable, if not this year, then the next or the next, I commend to you all one disciplinary act: Read again some story of the days of the World War, such as the moving memoirs of Lord Esher, "The Captains and the Kings Depart." Live through those days once more, since memory pales so easily. Experience again the long drawn-out horror of those years, the endless grey days when all that men for years had built up with endless pains - - - their patient life-long work, their happy homes, were swept away by the rush of a tremendous catastrophic avalanche: the sense of outrage that all this sorrow and destruction could be let loose upon the vast masses of the people. Feel again the agony at this senseless slaughter of the world's youth, until you are like the father in the opera "Louise," who looks out of the window over Paris, which stretches below him, and curses the town for its malign influence over his girl. Think again of the fear of the future which dogged our steps: the jealousy and ambition of those in high places which sent many young lives to a needless slaughter: the loss of moral power experienced by the Christian Church which since the beginning had been blessing this iniquitous business in the name of Christ: the perversion of the minds of the peoples through a propaganda which had no concern for the Truth: the seeds of new wars embodied in the covenant of peace: the long endeavor to crush the soul of Germany, which was bound to produce a rebellion in time: the disaster to vanquished and victor alike which has followed the World War, and the economic dislocation and disruption and piled up human misery.

It seems incredible that there cannot be found some just and rational solution to our problems: that we have to pull down the house of civilization in seeking the cure of civilization, as they used to burn down houses, so goes the story, to get roast pig, since that was the way roast pork was discovered. We all are involved in the moral guilt of this tragic situation. For never was there a time when generosity would have done more good and had greater influence, when forbearance would have looked less like weakness than at the moment of overwhelming victory in 1918. But this opportunity of a thousand years was lost.

All the more reason, therefore, that calm voices should now prevail, that the goal of justice to all should be made the primary consideration, that the whole incalculable power of our own Government should be brought to bear on this end and offer bold leadership in such an enterprise. For whatever the sacrifices which nations may be called upon to make for the sake of establishing a just basis for an enduring peace, they are slight indeed compared to the disruption and the collapse which most certainly will follow another world war. Suppose the leaders of the authoritarian states repel such advances. At least an appeal then would have been made, over their heads, to the fine peoples of their country (who want war no more than we) to co-operate in laying the spectre of war and enmity between nations --- an appeal which would have its own effects.

And certainly the whole power of the Christian Church must be exerted in the endeavor to find a rational solution for these problems. The Church is not a coercive agency, but an instrument of reconciliation, the reconciliation of man to God and therefore of man to man.

Whatever position individuals may feel called upon to take should a crisis devolve upon us (and no one can tell in an unrehearsed contingency what line of action will seem best, since he cannot know beforehand into what pattern the factors will fall), at least we should be able to agree on this: that the Church should not be counted upon again to march in the van of the war movement, and plead the case for War in the name of God, the All-merciful, the Father of all mankind, Who Himself is a persuasive, not a coercive agency, so all-inclusive in His good will that He makes His sun to shine on the evil and on the good and sends His rain on the just and on the unjust.

And one last word, my Brethren. Sir Walter Moberly, in a recent speech, has said that mankind is now faced by three alternatives: either the collapse of present day civilization; or the acceptance of one of the new faiths and the gradual return to paganism with all that this implies; or the revival of Christianity on a scale and at an intensity far beyond anything we have achieved today. And we have no doubt which path we must take. There is no question in our minds in which direction lies the best hope of the world. We think we know where is the only solid ground which will support the structure of a just society. But we are under no illusion that this will prove an easy task in the days that lie ahead, especially in the face of the severe challenge which meets Christianity today. It will call for hard and painful thinking on our part, both layman and clergyman, to see how best the principles of Christ can be applied to concrete situations. It will call for a depth of conviction and consecration and courage and willingness for sacrifice, which will force us all to draw heavily on that Power in the Universe which will back up the man who is brave enough to trust Him. Jesus left no rules, no pattern, no blue print of an ideal society. But He made His purpose clear, the direction unmistakable. He expressed it with a moving and an exceeding simplicity which lifts us above the turmoil of life to a plane where, in the Presence of the Holy One Who inhabiteth Eternity, we can see life steadily, and see it whole. "Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those who trespass against us. Amen." In the spirit of this prayer let us drive deeper the roots of our consecration to GOD and the service of our fellows.
