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

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Journal of the Sixty-first Convention,

BEING THE

SIXTIETH ANNUAL CONVENTION

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis, Tuesday, May 15th, 1900.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention; and by virtue of authority in him vested by the said Article III. of the Constitution, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese changed the date of holding this Convention from the fourth Tuesday in May, the 22d inst., to the third Tuesday in May, the 15th inst., to avoid any interruption in the services in the parishes and missions throughout the Diocese on Ascension Day, which falls this year on the 24th inst.

At 10 o'clock a. m., the Clergy, preceded by the choir, entered the Cathedral singing the 311th hymn, "Ancient of Days."

The opening sentences and service to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. L. F. Potter, of Grace Church, Kirkwood.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. Gustavus Tuckerman, of St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. Arthur Brittain, of Trinity Church, De Soto.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, of Mt. Calvary Church, St. Louis.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Mission, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The Convention Sermon was then preached by the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, of St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis.

The Offertory sentences and notices were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dean of the Cathedral.

The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On reassembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop called the Convention to order, and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded, under orders of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-nine Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," appointed at the last Convention; whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report, which was read by the Secretary, including the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention.

The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from nineteen Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President announced a quorum of both orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., nominated Mr. John R. Triplett for re-election as Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

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There being no other nomination, and unanimous consent being given, on motion of Mr. E. H. Lycett, the Rev. Dr. Ingraham was requested to cast the ballot for Mr. Jno. R. Triplett for Secretary.

The Rev. Dr. Ingraham so cast the ballot.

The Secretary reappointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, his assistant.

On motion of Mr. M. S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting Clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

On motion of the Rev. C. G. Davis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Convention.

On motion of Mr. Henry Wood, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9 o'clock, in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 o'clock a. m. to 1 o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 p. m. and continue to 5 p. m.

The hour for recess having arrived, the House took recess till 2:30 p.m.

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The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 p.m.

The Committee on "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials" presented a supplemental report to the effect that the Church of the Redeemer had paid its assessments in full, and were entitled to Lay Representation in the Convention.

On motion the report was adopted, and the roll of delegates from the above parish was read by the Secretary, and the following delegates answered to their names:

Mr. B. G. Chapman and Mr. C. A. Ekstromer.

The Very Rev. C. M. Davis presented and read the following memorial from a Committee of the Clericus, and asked that it be made the order of the day for II o'clock Wednesday. By vote of the house it was so ordered:

To the Members of the Sixty-first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

Gentlemen—The undersigned, Committee of the Clericus of St. Louis, beg leave to present the following memorial:

Whereas, the fund for the Endowment of the Episcopate is altogether inadequate; and, whereas, the increase of said Endowment Fund under the present plan is exceedingly slow; therefore,

Resolved, That the Diocesan Convention appoint an agent to solicit subscriptions for the increase of the Endowment Fund of the Episcopate.

Resolved, That the proof of payment of all assessments against Calvary Church, Columbia, be dispensed with, and the Lay Delegates from said Parish invited to seats in this Convention.

The hour for the order of the day having arrived,

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his annual address, which, with his Episcopal Acts, were laid on the Secretary's table.

On motion of the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the portion of the Bishop's address, relating to the \$1,000 received by this Diocese from the Board of Managers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, be referred to a Special Committee for consideration, to report to this Convention.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such Committee, the Very Rev. C. M. Davis, Rev. Wm. Short, Rev. G. D. B. Miller, Mr. F. J. McMaster and Mr. F. C. Hicks.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's address which recommends an amendment of the phraseology of the title of Article IX. of the Constitution, entitled "Of the Secretary of the Convention and Treasurer of the Diocese," be referred to the Standing Committee on Constitutional Canons, to report an amendment in conformity with the recommendation.

The Chancellor of the Diocese submitted his interpretation of Section 4, Article V. of the Constitution, as required by resolution of last Convention. Same was read by the Secretary. See Appendix No. 15.

Mr. T. K. Skinker, Chairman of the Special Committee, appointed at the last Convention on the paper of the Rev. P. G. Robert, on "The Parochial Trust Fund," together with the resolution of Mr. T. K. Skinker, referring to the same, presented and read the report of the Committee. See Appendix No. 16.

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The Rev. G. D. B. Miller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That in the parochial report blanks the word "lapsed" and the words "restored to the Communion" be erased, and that a new item be added to the blanks entitled "Number of Confirmed Persons."

The Rev. A. K. Smith moved that the resolution be referred to a Committee to report Wednesday morning; vote being taken, the same was declared lost.

On motion of the Rev. F. M. Weddell, the resolution was laid on the table.

On motion of Mr. Jas. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a Committee of three persons, learned in the law, be appointed to recommend and report to the next Convention a uniform legal method of creating a Trusteeship or other instrumentality for taking and holding real and personal property in trust, for the uses and purposes of the Diocese or Parishes thereof.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such Committee:

On motion of Mr. T. K. Skinker, the proof of the payment of the assessment against Grace Church, Jefferson City, was dispensed with by a two-thirds vote, and the delegates invited to seats in this Convention.

The Secretary called the name of the delegate, Mr. T. O. Towles, who answered to his name.

On motion of Mr. Charlie Thaw, the Convention adjourned until 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

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SECOND DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis, Wednesday, May 16th, 1900.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The Secretary then called the roll.

The minutes of the previous day were read by the Secretary, and before action was taken thereon, the house gave permission for a change in the resolution embodied in the Memorial from a Committee of the Clericus, after which the minutes as amended were unanimously approved.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced the Standing Committees as follows:

The Treasurer of the Diocese not being in the house, the report of the Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate was called for, and same was presented and read by the Treasurer, Mr. C. S. Freeborn.

Same was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. See Appendix No. 4.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund was presented and read by Mr. M. S. Snow, Secretary. See Appendix No. 5.

Mr. M. S. Snow, Secretary, presented and read the report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, for the Conventional Years 1899-1900, are herewith respectfully submitted:

June 16, 1899—Organized by the election of the Rev. P. G. Robert as President, the Rev. William Short as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

Gave consent to the admission of Mr. Charles F. Blaisdell as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Joseph Marshall Francis as Bishop of the Diocese of Indiana.

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August 25, 1899—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Arthur L. Williams as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of Nebraska.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. William Loyal Gravatt as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of West Virginia.

Adopted a memorial tribute to the late Mrs. Harriet M. Tuttle.

October 13, 1899—Gave consent to the admission of Mr. Ross Parke Cuddy to the Sacred Order of Deacons.

November 20, 1899—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Sidney Catlin Partridge as Bishop of the Missionary District of Kioto, Japan.

December 6, 1899—Declined to grant the request of Mr. J. C. Ingham, Postulant, desiring a dispensation from the knowledge of the Greek and Latin languages and other branches of learning not strictly ecclesiastical.

January 5, 1900—Gave consent to the admission of Mr. Halsey Werlein, Jr., as a candidate for Holy Orders, the certificate to be dated as of October 13, 1899.

January 16, 1900—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Robert Codman, Jr., as Bishop of the Diocese of Maine.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of Chicago.

May 10, 1900—Approved the report of the official acts of the Standing Committee for the Conventional Year 1899-1900, prepared by the Secretary for submission to the Annual Diocesan Convention.

On motion of Mr. E. H. Lycett, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The delegates from St. George's Church, St. Louis, and Calvary Church, Louisiana, have not presented to the Secretary satisfactory evidence that their respective parishes have paid all assessments standing against them, although having paid the assessments for the year ending May 1, 1900; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such proof of payment of all assessments be dispensed with.

The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates from these parishes, and Mr. J. N. Kennedy of Calvary Church, Louisiana, answered to his name.

The Rt. Rev. President then read a letter from the Rev. P. G. Robert, as follows:

My Dear Bishop—If I am nominated for the Standing Committee tomorrow, please withdraw my name, absolutely and positively, because of my increasing weakness. Please thank the Convention for the numberless positions with which it has so highly honored me, and assure it of my perpetual gratitude and full appreciation of its kindness.

On motion of the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D., the following resolution was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That this Convention recognizing the years of faithful service of the Rev. P. G. Robert in the Diocese of Missouri, and lamenting his withdrawal from the active work of the Diocese, extends to him loving sympathy at this time of his physical suffering, and assures him of its heartfelt prayers on his behalf, that the God of all comfort may comfort him with that same comfort with which he has comforted many souls during his Holy Ministry.

The House then went into the election of the Standing Committee.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as tellers the following: To receive the Clerical vote, Rev. F. N. Chapman and Mr. J. R. Mosby; to receive the Lay vote, Rev. G. Tuckerman and Mr. F. C. Thompson.

The Secretary called the roll, and tellers retired.

The order of the day was then called for.

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After so Brennan v The Secretary then read the order of the day, being the Memorial of the Committee from the Clericus, presented first day by the Very Rev. C. M. Davis, in regard to the increase of the Fund for the Endowment of the Episcopate."

The Rt. Rev. President stated that the question before the house was action on the resolution embodied in the Memorial, reading as follows: "Resolved, That the Diocesan Convention appoint an agent to solicit subscriptions for the increase of the Endowment Fund of the Episcopate."

Pending the discussion, the tellers entered, and the Secretary read their report for the election of the Standing Committee, whereupon the Rt. Rev. President declared the following duly elected members of the Standing Committee:

The Convention then united in singing a hymn, and the Very Rev. C. M. Davis read appropriate prayers, after which the house resumed business.

Mr. W. R. Donaldson offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the question of the Endowment of the Episcopate be referred to a Committee of five to devise a plan or plans for the raising of an endowment fund, and report their action to the next Convention.

The Rev. J. K. Brennan moved as an amendment to strike out the words "to report to the next Convention," and insert instead the words "with power to act."

After some discussion, with consent of the House, the Rev. J. K. Brennan was permitted to withdraw his amendment.

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Mr. J. A. Waterworth moved as an amendment to the resolution of Mr. Donaldson, to strike out the words "report to the next Convention," and insert instead the words and "report to this Convention to-morrow morning."

Mr. Fauntleroy moved to lay the original resolution in the Memorial of the Committee from the Clericus, the resolution of Mr. Donaldson, and the amendment of Mr. Waterworth on the table.

On vote being taken, same was declared lost.

Rev. Mr. Duckworth moved to lay the amendment of Mr. Waterworth on the table.

On vote being taken, same was declared lost.

Vote being taken on the amendment of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, same was declared adopted, by a vote of 51 ayes to 21 noes.

The resolution as amended, reading as follows:

Resolved, That the question of the endowment of the Episcopate be referred to a Committee of five to devise a plan or plans for the raising of an endowment fund and report their action to this Convention to-morrow (Thursday) morning.

Rev. Wm. Short raised the point of order that the resolution of Mr. Donaldson and the amendment of Mr. Waterworth were both out of order, as the only question properly before the House was the resolution embraced in the Memorial of the Committee of the Clericus.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the point of order not well taken. Appeal was taken from the decision of the Chair, and on vote the decision of the Rt. Rev. President was sustained.

Vote being taken on the resolution as amended, the same was declared adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as the Special Committee under the above resolution:

The Treasurer of the Diocese then presented and read his report of funds for general purposes.

Same was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. See Appendix No. 1.

The Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund presented and read his report.

Same was received and referred to Committee on Finance. See Appendix No. 2.

The Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund presented and read his report.

Same was on motion referred to Committee on Finance. See Appendix No. 3.

At the request of the Rt. Rev. President, the Secretary read the following telegram:

Mr. C. S. Freeborn presented and read the report of the Committee on Finance, which was on motion referred to the Committee on Assessments, and the following resolution, embraced in the report, adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on Assessments be directed to make an equitable assessment on the several Parishes and Missions for \$5,700, to meet the current expenses of the Diocese for the coming year.

On motion of Rev. R. E. Lee Craig the Rules of Order were further suspended to receive the report of the Standing Committee "On the State of the Church."

The Rev. Wm. Elmer presented and read the report of the Standing Committee "On the State of the Church," and the following resolution contained therein, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Missionary Board send, if possible, a general Missionary into the field, and carry the Church and its Prayer Book into neglected districts. See Appendix No. 7.

- Mr. F. J. McMaster, Secretary of the Missionary Board, presented and read the report of the Board. See Appendix No. 9.
- Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer, presented and read his report as Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society. See Appendix No. 8B.
- Mr. D. F. Leavitt, Treasurer of the Missionary Board, presented and read the financial report of the Board. See Appendix No. 10.

Tuttle, do herewith desire to assure our dear Bishop of our love and sympathy, and pledge ourselves to renewed zeal in the efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Diocese over which God has given him Apostolic authority, and to which her mind and heart and soul were consecrated, until the evening shadows fell upon her labors, and the Master gave His Beloved sleep.

Resolved, That this Convention request the Bishop to relinquish the \$1,000 received annually from the Board of Managers, provided, that the increase in pledges for Diocesan Missions shall warrant it.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, the calling of the roll was dispensed with, owing to the number of delegates serving on Committees.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the second day's proceedings.

At the request of the Rt. Rev. President, and on motion of the Rev. R. E. Lee Craig, action on the adoption of the minutes was temporarily deferred, in order to have the additions to the pledges for Diocesan Missions made last evening at the Missionary Meeting at St. Mark's Memorial Church, as well as those made this morning included and the list completed.

The Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy offered the following resolution:

The Rev. R. E. Lee Craig then called up the resolution of the Rev. Dr. Winchester in regard to the proposed alliance of this Diocese with the University of the South.

After a general discussion of the same, on motion of the Very Rev. C. M. Davis, it was resolved that a vote be taken on the resolution at 12:30 p. m.

Pending the discussion, on motion time was extended for a few minutes to enable Mr. M. S. Snow to finish his remarks.

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Vote was then taken on the resolutions of the Rev. Dr. Winchester, with the following result:

First resolution adopted—ayes, 35; nays, 29. Second resolution lost—ayes, 19; nays, 43.

On motion of Prof. F. C. Hicks, the consideration of the 3d and 4th resolutions were indefinitely postponed.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted be communicated to the University of the South, with the statement that this Convention does not deem it expedient at this time to form the alliance proposed.

The Rev. Wm. Short, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, submitted the following report:

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's address referring to a change in the title of Article IX. of the Constitution, in order to settle the status of the Secretary of the Convention as the Secretary of the Diocese, would respectfully report that they have considered the same and beg leave to report that in their opinion no amendment is necessary, since the terms are used interchangeably.

In Article VI., Section 2 of the Constitution, the Secretary of the Convention is referred to as Secretary of the Diocese. In the Canons, the officer who is called Treasurer of the Diocese, in Section 4, Canon 3, is also called the Treasurer of the Convention. The terms, therefore, are used interchangeably, and in the judgment of the Committee no change is necessary in order to settle the status of the Secretary of the Convention, as the Secretary of the Diocese. The Committee ask to be discharged from further consideration of this amendment. On motion the report was adopted and the Committee discharged.

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The Rev. G. D. B. Miller, Registrar and Librarian of the Diocese, presented and read his report, which was received, and the resolutions contained therein adopted, as follows:

- (1) Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed by the Chair to examine the Library and sift out the books and matter not worth preserving, or present a plan for enlarging the accommodations, with the expense therefor.
- (2) Resolved, That an appropriation of \$25 be made for library expenses. See Appendix No. 19.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as the Committee under the first resolution:

Rev. G. D. B. Miller,

Rev. A. K. Smith,

Rev. F. W. Cornell.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison the resignation of the Registrar was not accepted.

On motion of Rev. D. S. Webster, the thanks of the Convention were extended to the Registrar for his valuable services.

The Convention took a recess to 2:30 p.m.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p.m.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the rule of order No. 4 be amended by adding to the Standing Committees to be appointed the following as Rule XI.: "On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate."

The Rt. Rev. President gave notice that it had been decided not to have the usual celebration of the Missionary Host on Sunday afternoon next, owing to the condition of the strike now existing. Mr. E. J the Commit

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Mr. E. J. Thomas, Chairman, presented and read the report of the Committee on Assessments.

On motion of Mr. Thomas the same was adopted unanimously. See Appendix No. 20.

The election of Missionary Board was declared next in order.

Mr. M. S. Snow moved that the three clerical members of the Standing Committee be appointed a Committee to present names as nominees for members of the Missionary Board.

Rev. R. E. Lee Craig offered as an amendment that the whole Standing Committee be appointed a Committee to present names in nomination for membership of the Missionary Board.

Same was adopted and the resolution of Mr. M. S. Snow as amended was adopted.

The Rev. G. D. B. Miller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That in the election of the Missionary Board two clerical members be elected for three years, two for two years, and two for one year, and three lay members for three years, three for two years, and three for one year.

On motion of Rev. W. A. Hatch same was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to report to the next Convention.

The Rev. Wm. Elmer presented and read the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, With the close of this Convention, Mr. David F. Leavitt has completed his twentieth consecutive year of service as Treasurer of the Missionary Board of the Diocese of Missouri, be it therefore

Resolved, That the hearty thanks of this Convention are hereby extended to him for the exact and faithful performance of all the duties of that office, and for the uniform kindness which he has shown to all Missionaries and Parishes in the discharge of his duties.

Resolved, That these resolutions be printed in the Journal of this Convention upon a page specially set apart for that purpose.

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The Rev. W. A. Hatch, Chairman, presented and read the report of the Standing Committee on Missions. See Appendix No. 21.

The Rev. Wm. Short, Chairman of Committee to nominate members for Missionary Board, presented and read the following names as their report:

On motion of the Rev. Wm. Short, unanimous consent being given, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the above named gentlemen as members of the Missionary Board.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The House then went into the election of delegates to the Missionary Council.

The Chair appointed as tellers to receive the Clerical vote Rev. K. M. Deane, and Mr. B. O. Wood; to receive the Lay vote, Rev. Wm. Bardens, Mr. E. H. Bickley.

The Secretary called the roll, and tellers retired.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, unanimous consent being given, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. I. Shreve Carter for Treasurer of the Diocese.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, unanimous consent being given, the Secretary was instructed to east the ballot of the Convention for the following named gentlemen for Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate: Messrs. C. S. Freeborn, I. Shreve Carter and F. N. Judson.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

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On motion of Rev. Wm. Short, unanimous consent being given, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the following named gentlemen as Trustees of the Theological Education Fund: Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., Mr. Jno. R. Triplett, Mr. E. J. Thomas.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

On motion of Mr. C. S. Freeborn, unanimous consent being given, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the following gentlemen as Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund: Rev. Edmund Duckworth, Mr. W. R. Donaldson, Mr. W. P. Nelson.

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rev. G. Tuckerman, Chairman, presented and read the report of the Committee on Missionaries' Traveling Expenses. See Appendix No. 22.

The Rev. F. N. Chapman, by consent of the House, added \$10 to the pledges for Diocesan Missions from Trinity Church, Kirksville.

Rev. E. Duckworth presented and read a petition from St. James' Church, St. Louis. See Appendix No. 23.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the following resolution was adopted:

- Resolved, That the petition of the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestrymen, of St. James' Church, St. Louis, be granted, and permission is hereby given them to change their corporate name to "The Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of St. James' Memorial Protestant Episcopal Church, St. Louis, of the Diocese of Missouri."
- On motion of the Rev. Wm. Short, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese for \$25, in favor of the Sexton and his assistants of the Cathedral for their services during the sessions of this Convention.

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On motion of the Rev. R. E. Lee Craig, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention expresses regret that the Rev. J. D. Ritchey, Rector of Emmanuel Church, Old Orchard, will shortly sever his connection with the Diocese; and they assure him of their hearty good wishes for his future success in his new field of work.

On motion of the Rev. F. N. Chapman, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention tender its thanks to the Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Convention, for the faithful discharge and efficient performance of the duties committed to them.

On motion of the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention extends to Mrs. Trowbridge and the ladies associated with her, who provided and served such a bountiful and delectable lunch for the Convention, their most hearty thanks and appreciation therefor.

On motion of the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have the usual number of copies of the Journal printed for distribution.

Tellers for election of delegates to the Missionary Council entered, and the Secretary read their report.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the election of Col. F. W. Blees as Lay Delegate, and ordered the Secretary to call the roll for the election of one Clerical Delegate.

The Secretary called the roll and the tellers retired.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rt. Rev. President be authorized to certify to the record of this day's proceedings.

The Rev. F. M. Weddell offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolution of the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, which was laid on the table the second day, be now taken up from the table.

Mr. H. H. Denison raised a point of order that such motion was out of order.

The Rt. Rev. President decided the point of order not well taken.

The Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy appealed from the decision of the Chair.

Upon a vote of the House the Chair was sustained in his decision.

On motion of the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, the resolution of the Rev. F. M. Weddell was then laid upon the table.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, Christ Church Cathedral was selected by vote of the Convention as the place for holding the next Convention.

Tellers entered, and the Secretary read their report on the election of one Clerical Delegate to the Missionary Council.

The Rt. Rev. President declared no election and ordered the Secretary to call the roll for election of one Clerical Delegate.

On motion of the Rev. R. E. Lee Craig, unanimous consent was given, and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the House for the Rev. E. P. Little as Clerical Delegate to Missionary Council.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, the delegates as elected being Rev. E. P. Little, of Hannibal, and Col. F. W. Blees, of Macon.

There being no further business before the House, the Rt. Rev. President announced that after the reading of appropriate collects by the Very Rev. C. M. Davis, Dean of the Cathedral, he declared this Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-FIRST CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN:

In this Annual Convention the figures are greatly changed for us in the computation of the years, whatever may be counted as the time of the technical transit from century to century. The eighteen hundreds by title are gone forever. How solemn the thought that we cannot live them over again to live them better. The nineteen hundreds of name are upon us. That they are filled to the full with important happenings to be devolved as quick and heavy responsibilities upon us both in Church and State, who that is thoughtful can doubt?

During the last twelve month I have attended two meetings of the House of Bishops. One was held here in St. Louis last October, at which was announced the death of Bishop Pierce of Arkansas. A little more than a month previous I had gone to Little Rock to be present at the funeral services. Learned, devoted, and of rugged independence, he had served faithfully as Missionary Bishop in a hard field for nearly thirty years.

The other meeting was in New York last month, and at it there fell upon my saddened ears the official announcement of the deaths of the late Bishop of Maine and the late Bishop Coadjutor of Minnesota.

Bishop Neely was the last survivor of the six Bishops who laid their hands on my head. He had been consecrated only about three months before me. He won and wore for six years the honor of the Chairmanship of the House of Bishops. To me he stood in the place of a loving and loved elder brother.

Bishop Gilbert was my own son in the Gospel. I taught him the Catechism. I presented him for Confirmation. I planned and guided his education. He was with me in Utah, a parish school teacher. I admitted

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him to Holy Orders. He was with me in Montana, a fellow missionary. The same year that I became Bishop of Missouri he became Bishop coadjutor of Minnesota. I preached the sermon at his consecration. I buried him—and thirty-eight years of the closest, dearest personal association ended for a while. I cannot speak of him for I cannot be judicially impartial. God be thanked for thy faithful earthly life in and for His Church, thou noble, cheery, self-effacing, helpful son and brother of the days and the years now past and gone!

In our own diocese vacancies cry aloud for faithful and loving workers who once filled them. Hannibal has been greatly afflicted in the deaths of Mr. J. H. Garth, and of the sweet gentlewoman who was the rector's wife and best assistant. The steadfast fidelity of Mr. George W. Tracy, of Kirkwood, was as that of the sun's daily beneficence, and Mr. F. H. Packard, of St. Augustine's, St. Louis, was treading along the same blessed path. Mrs. Parker, of Holy Innocents', St. Louis, in her saint-like unselfishness, and Mrs. Bembow, of Canton, in her vigorous usefulness, and Mrs. Young whose days so long as strength was left her were full of loving ministrations in the Cathedral, have gone home, leaving their parishes to miss and mourn them sorely. Since I sat down to prepare this address two others have been called away. The one is Mrs. Lockwood, of Holy Communion Parish in the city, and of Old Orchard Parish in her country home. No woman of all I have ever known was more devoted to the Christ-like life of doing good. Her departure is a personal affliction; so kind and dear as a neighbor and friend had she been to me and mine in all my St. Louis life. The other is Mr. Charles U. Holmes. He was a postulant for Holy Orders, and, before he was so listed, had by his godly zeal, founded the blessed work of our Hospital Missions.

The Woman's Auxiliary has sustained a loss. That loss is linked with quickened memories of thirty-five years of my own life and with all I have thought and all I have done and all I have been throughout those years. One cannot begin to tell the tale of the help and cheer and guidance and inspiration given in the journeying companionship of those precious years. Please God, faith and hope and thanks shall keep the linking of the vanishing past and the dutiful present and the brightening future strong and firm and sweet.

"The graves grow thicker and life's ways more bare
As years on years go by;
Nay! Thou hast more green gardens in thy care
And more stars in thy sky.
Behind, hopes turned to griefs and joys to memories
Are fading out of sight;
Before, pains changed to peace and dreams to certainties
Are glowing in God's light."

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We have noted how in the count of the years the eighteens have gone and the nineteens have come. In considering the present it may not be unprofitable to take thought of the happenings of a century ago. Let us, then, look in on the General Convention held in Philadelphia in June, 1799. Washington is still alive, busy on his farm at Mt. Vernon. The center of the Federal Government is not quite yet moved from Philadelphia to the District of Columbia. In the House of Bishops there are only three members, Bishop White of Pennsylvania, Bishop Provoost of New York, and Bishop Bass of Massachusetts. There are in the country, however, four other Bishops, though not present in the Convention, Madison of Virginia, Claggett of Maryland, Smith of South Carolina, and Jarvis of Connecticut. With three Bishops composing the House of Bishops it was very natural for them to sit in a room privately, probably around a table, without attendants or spectators. And it is quite as natural that such habit has continued, making an unwritten law of private session for that House, even though its numbers be now ninety. The House of Clerical and Lay Deputies counts up, all told, exactly twenty-nine; nineteen clergymen and ten laymen from the eight States of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Virginia. The word Diocese never occurs in the Journal. It is always State. Indeed it was not till 1835, when the movement set in to make two dioceses in the State of New York, that the word State was changed to Diocese in the Constitution and Canons. It is a day of small things. There have been American Bishops for the American Church for only fifteen years, though American history is near two hundred years old. The small things of the day have been made small and are kept small for the Church by the working of three forces: 1. The deep-rooted dislike for prelacy on the part of most Americans. A Church without a bishop and a State without a king were the yoke-fellows they approved. Not a few of our own Church people shared in the prejudice. Living, working, sympathizing, loving bishops had not long been among them to disabuse their minds of prejudice against the mitred lords over God's heritage. 2. There had been an ill wind in the Revolution and after the Revolution industriously blowing its evil report that prayerbook people were all tories and not patriots. Though the roster of the army and the roll call in civic halls of government counsel, if scrutinized, would have quashed that charge. 3. There were two lines of Episcopal succession. Seabury received his orders from the Scottish Church. White and Provoost from the English Church. And differences, already well nigh irreconcilable between Seabury and Provoost, took threatening shapes of disorder and disunity. The fear was great that we could not have a united American Church. The risk was imminent that divided aims and warring factions would pulverize it into speedy dissolution. That, in the day of small things and out of the day of small things, there did come forth the American Church in harmony and robustness, is due under God's providence to the unceasing faithfulness and watchfulness of three men: Seabury,

the soundest of theologians, though happily free from the odium theologicum usually attendant; White, the ecclesiastical statesman quick to discern the signs of the times and the demands of American habitudes of thought and feeling; and Dr. Samuel Parker, the wise and patient rector of Trinity Church, Boston, afterwards, for the briefest period, Bishop of Massachusetts.

We entering on the nineteens cannot be too heartily thankful for the good work done for the Church by those entering on the eighteens a century ago. They did their good work by keeping to two aims. I. That of preserving the primitive faith and apostolic order absolutely unchanged, and the well tried Prayer Book essentially unchanged. 2. That of putting an American spirit into their methods of teaching the faith and of exercising the power of order and of using the Prayer Book.

The example they set, it appears to me, we may wisely follow. Some things should be kept absolutely unchanged, and held to be utterly unchangeable. Such are the Christian Faith as summed in the Nicene Creed, and the Apostolic Order as preserved in the Historic Episcopate. If in the air round about among excellent Christian brethren not numbering themselves with us there are whisperings of the desirableness of changing the Creed, we hope the meaning is for them, as certainly it would be for us churchmen, changing some formulated articles of theological instruction not yet three hundred years old, rather than changing the vital principles of the Christian Faith contained in the two short forms of the Creed, the one near sixteen hundred years old and the other near nineteen hundred. God mercifully speed the day when all earnest believers in the Lord Jesus Christ will see that they have no call to consider perplexing questions of changing or simplifying the Creed, and will be led to revert to the old paths and to claim their heritage in loyal and loving share of the one unchanging and unchangeable Christian Creed in its two forms, as short as words can put and as simple as the subject matter will allow.

I have said our Centenary fathers kept the Prayer Book essentially unchanged. And you will agree with me that in the review of eight years ago our Church still kept it essentially unchanged. Brethren of the Clergy, suffer my word of exhortation that true and cordial loyalty to the rubrics and scrupulous adherence to the *ipsissima verba* of the Prayer Book are for you and me things not out of place. It grieves me when sometimes I witness deviation from the lines of direction plainly laid down. It does not seem to me to be brave, cheerful, soldierly fidelity. Individual self-will displacing obedient, loving discipleship is not a thing of sweet savor.

So far, too, brethren all, as we can follow our fathers of a hundred years ago in imparting an American spirit to our methods of using the Prayer Book and of exercising the power of Apostolic Order, it will be well, it seems to me, so to do. Narrowness is not American. Nor suspiciousness, nor self-sufficiency. South European or Oriental demonstrativeness of external ceremonialism is not American. Breadth is American.

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So is brotherly good will. And the respecting of others' rights and feelings. And the winning by love rather than the ruling by prerogative. And simplicity and quiet dignity. If, with love in our hearts and breadth in our minds and kindness in our manners and faithfulness in our lives, Americans among Americans with whom we live and move and have our being, we commend to them the Prayer Book and the Church, we shall accomplish vastly more, I can not but think, in making ready for the Prayer Book Church to be really the American Church, than ever we could do by piling up polemic canons, high sounding and far-reaching and deeply resented, about the "American Church" and the "Catholic Church."

In our diocese we may not be puffed up with pride nor cast down in despair.

By the reports of 1898 and 1899 our increase in number of communicants was only 171. This, it must be confessed, is small. The number of communicants by the last report is 6,578. By the old law of the ratio of one to ten there ought to have been 657 confirmed this year, but there were only 549. However, this number is encouraging in that it is 125 more than that of last year—424. Our missionary work has not pushed out into any new towns, except it be in Edina, where we are feeling for an entrance. Our pledges for Diocesan Missions were in 1899 some ninety-three dollars less than the year before, while missionary needs were greater. The pledges last year were \$3,490.00, besides the \$1,000.00 given us by the General Board of Managers. This year we need \$4,525.00, besides that \$1,000.00, and besides also \$2,000.00 needed for the Hospital Missions. Yet, on the other hand, looking through the tables in the "Church News" we find that some parishes have given this year more than they pledged. The deputations of clergymen and laymen who visited churches to speak for missions helped to this good result. And we recognize that in case of some of our largest and strongest parishes it is parochial adversities, and not disinclination, that has kept them from pledging. We gave last year, I am sorry to say, \$107.00 less than the year before to Domestic and Foreign Missions; and I am sorry to say also that among our 6,578 Communicants, there are only 64 subscribers to our General Missionary periodical, "The Spirit of Missions."

In my general survey of the Diocese there is not much call for criticism. Clergy and people seem attentive to the discharge of duty. I might mention that I do not think the Clergymen and vestries in the country make effort enough to have regular monthly vestry meetings, at which at least the treasurer's report may be presented and scrutinized. Nor are all of the Clergy of the Diocese careful to preach an Annual Sermon to their people, giving in that sermon valuable information and proffering hints and directions of a serviceable nature which they could better present in no other way. And once in a while, though rarely I am happy to say, I hear of a treasurer who neglects to pay over the trust funds in his hands to the proper parties, or even uses them for other purposes than those for

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nundred sing the will be lor susnonstranerican. which they were given. I have not words strong enough to express the disapprobation justly attaching to such a course of conduct on the part of any treasurer. Common business integrity, let alone honest Christian faithfulness, admonishes him that he should hold as a sacred trust monies given, and turn them over only and promptly to the purposes for which they were given, not allowing himself to use them in any other way whatsoever. We are going to lose not a little by the departure from among us to Kansas of the earnest and faithful Rector of Emmanuel, Old Orchard.

Turning to things to give thanks for, I have consecrated four churches. I have never reported so many in a year since the Diocese was divided. These are in Columbia, Ferguson, and the Good Shepherd and St. James', St. Louis. Calvary, Columbia and St. James', St. Louis, are Memorials. The blessed peace of the dead and the munificent generosity of the living have combined to make them beautiful temples of the Lord to stand for generations for the ingathering and regenerating and uplifting of human souls. St. Stephen's, Ferguson, is a monument in large part of the zealous work of the women, and the Good Shepherd, St. Louis, a like monument of the faithfulness of one of the oldest in service of our clergymen, the Rev. Mr. Newton, and of the helpful men and women who rallied to his side.

The sum of \$3,000.00 has been given and is in the hands of the Treasurer, Mr. J. B. Gazzam, to provide a Rectory for the faithful and every way deserving pastor of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

Bishop Robertson Hall has had more pupils and been in more prosperous condition than in any year before. I have admitted two Sisters, one to the full Sisterhood and one in preparation.

St. Luke's Hospital, though losing grievously by the lamented death of Dr. H. H. Mudd, is crowded with patients, and its directors are actively and, I trust, successfully canvassing for funds to enable them to move to a new and more fit situation. Ten graduated this year from its excellent School for Trained Nurses.

The Sunday Schools have kept in the ranks of missionary helpers sending me \$1,352.08 as Lenten offerings for General Missions, besides keeping up their steady subsidies to the Missionary Host.

The Church Mission House has moved into larger and better quarters, and the benevolent women in charge offer it as a home to convalescent women, especially those coming out weak, and as yet unfitted for work, from the Female Hospital.

One of our most efficient and devoted Clergymen, the Rev. Mr. Cornell, has been deputed to the care of our Hospital Missions. One cannot estimate the blessed good done by him and the young men of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and the young women who help him, in their visits to the City Hospital and the Female Hospital and the Insane Asylum and the Poor House.

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There is no let up to the steady stream of beneficence guided and controlled by the women managers of the Orphans' Home.

The Parish of the Redeemer, St. Louis, has relieved itself entirely from the debt upon its church and breathes happily in its freedom.

Our Parishes are all under pastoral supervision, except Canton, La Plata, Shelbina, and St. Paul's, St. Louis. And Canton and St. Paul's, St. Louis, hope to have pastors soon.

The "Church News" breathes easier and takes on courage. It went behind a little last year in its expenditures over its income, but it hopes this year to change the balance to the other side.

The "Bishop's Purse," if it did receive \$1,000 less than last year, yet is thankful to say it has had enough to lubricate such parts of the Diocesan machinery as really threatened creaking.

The Woman's Auxiliary—I name it for loving thanks and praise—has stood steady and true. Its gifts have been \$6,151.56, of which \$1,426.79 were in garments and \$4,724.77 were in cash; and they are scattered wide in generous distribution. In the maintenance of the humanizing, civilizing, Christianizing and altogether admirable work of St. Stephen's, St. Louis, it has had the laboring oar and has plied it with a will and cheerily.

I am proud and happy over the outcome of the meeting of the Missionary Council in St. Louis last October. The arrangements of our Committee of Preparation were excellent. The hospitable courtesies extended by our St. Louis homes were delightful. Comments of satisfaction and tributes of appreciation from all over the American land have poured in upon us in showers of refreshment. Our people through the committee cheerfully met all demands of expenditure, and then sent a goodly sum remaining over in their hands to New York to be applied to the needs of missionaries. It has not been my lot to witness a cleaner, brighter, nobler record of good management anywhere. And by it all and through it all and under it all and over it all there was given, in union of hearts and minds, valuable help to the guidance and promotion of our great, united missionary work.

Two matters I want to bring before the Convention definitely.

I. Article IX of the Constitution speaks of "the Secretary of the Convention and the Treasurer of the Diocese." Canons III and IV adopt a like phraseology. I do not understand the reason for difference in terms in describing the two officers. The Secretary is a permanent officer. That is, his office and duties continue by express statement of the Canon during the interval between the sessions of the Convention. Moreover, in his relations with the Church at large he is regarded and addressed as "Secretary of the Diocese." Sometimes in the help he renders to the Bishop of the Diocese the limitation of his office to the Secretaryship of the Convention works hindrance. It seems to me, therefore, to be desirable to change

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ot estierhood to the Article IX of the Constitution so that its title shall read "Of the Secretary of the Convention who shall be also the Secretary of the Diocese, and the Treasurer of the Diocese."

II. Substantially, since 1890, when Missouri was divided, the Board of Managers of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society have appropriated for us \$1,000.00 per year to help our missionary work in this Diocese. For over seventy years the General Society has extended its generous aid. The first record of this is in the General Convention of 1829. "At the last meeting of the Society, the only stations to which Missionaries had been appointed were St. Louis, in Missouri; Detroit, in Michigan, and Green Bay, in the same Territory. At St. Louis the Rev. Mr. Horrel was at that time in the employ of the Society, and was allowed a salary of \$300.00 per annum." Curiously enough, in the Appendix, Mr. Horrel is put down as a missionary in "Missouri Territory," though Missouri had been a State since 1820; and furthermore, as stationed at "St. Louis, Cape Geradeaux Co." For all the seventy years there has been no break in the generous flow into Missouri of the help of the unselfish givers throughout the American Church. And these givers have been little children and working men and women, rather than persons of abounding wealth. Now, when the nation under God's Providence is taking on increased responsibilities, the Society is also facing needs growing out of the same responsibilities which are likely to be urgently clamorous. Thinking it over, I am impelled to ask the question, Ought not Missouri to take occasion now to say to this Society, "We thank you warmly for these almost fourscore years of kind, nursing care. We see how needs press upon you. You took us up when our chief city had less than 5,000 inhabitants. It now has more than one hundred times as many, and is the fourth greatest city of the nation. We want to return help to you who have been so helpful to us, and in the best way possible. That best way now, as it looks to us, is for us to relinquish the \$1,000.00 of your kind annual grant. We hereby do relinquish it, with loving thanks for the past, and with earnest prayers for God's blessing on your great work of the future."

No step that we could take would be a more warmly generous contribution to the pressing needs of the Society than that would be. Milwaukee relinquished its grant a few years ago. Chicago has relinquished. So have Ohio with its Cleveland, and Southern Ohio with its Cincinnati, and Michigan with its Detroit. Cannot Missouri with its St. Louis take up the same unselfish line of march?

Brethren of the Convention, I ask consideration of this matter at your hands. If you find that we can agree to take the step, my heart will bound with honest pride and swell in earnest thanks. But we must not hide that it will demand deeper zeal in us and larger gifts from us for Diocesan Missions. If you find that we cannot wisely take the step, I will try cheerfully to submit. Even then, may I suggest that we might plan to give

In 1835, two years before I was born, the great missionary wave swept over the American Church. Jackson Kemper was chosen Missionary Bishop of the States of Missouri and Indiana, and came and, under Christ's banner, conquered. Francis L. Hawks, elder brother of my honored predecessor, was chosen Missionary Bishop of the State of Louisiana and the Territories of Arkansas and Florida, but was not able to see his way to accept the appointment. A generation after, an inexperienced country pastor I was sent out the fourteenth in the line of the Missionary Bishops. The people of the field were kind to me. Gifts flowed in upon me. Helpers stood by me. The same Society we have been talking about steadily sustained me. Almighty God—blessed be His Name forever through Jesus Christ our Lord—strengthened my weakness and bore with my unfaithfulness and transmuted my foolishness into His wisdom; and now after another generation four Bishops and thirty-seven Clergymen are working in the distant mountains, where when I entered I found not one.

How can it be otherwise than that it enters, not as iron, but as the sweetest strength of uttermost conviction, into my soul that the missionary spirit is the true life blood of the Church? The living Church must in the nature of things be a missionary Church, and a missionary Church under God's good blessing can never be a dead Church.

APPENDIX No. 7.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

It is with great pleasure your Committee reports that the past year reveals an improvement in the spiritual life of the Diocese, as evidenced by a larger number of candidates for confirmation, the Consecration of four Churches, and an increase in contributions for Diocesan Missions, resulting from the efforts of the Board of Missions to bring before the Parishes and Missions the great need of larger contributions for its work

Missions the great need of larger contributions for its work.

In furtherance of this object, the Board of Missions prepared and printed a report which ought to be in the hands of every Churchman and Churchwoman of the Diocese, and your Committee believe that the following extracts from it ought to be made a part of this report. The first extract shows the great need of extending our work.

tract shows the great need of extending our work.

"In 1890 it was divided, and the Diocese of Missouri now comprises St. Louis and fifty-iour counties in the eastern half of the State. In 1890 the population of these counties was 838,973. It is now undoubtedly over one million. St. Louis in 1890 was credited with a population of 425,000. Many believe it is now twice as large. In 1891 there were thirty-two parishes and nineteen missions in the Diocese of Missouri. In 1899 there were reported thirty-four parishes and twenty-one missions. St. Andrew's and the Church of the Redeemer are the two new parishes, and St. Phillip's and St. Matthew's are the two new missions. Outside of the city there is not in existence to-day a single parish or mission station that has been added in ten years. Crystal City has come and gone. To-day in thirty-three counties out of fifty-four counties comprising the Diocese of Missouri, we have no church service. The whole southeastern part of the State is without service of our church, except Ironton, De Soto and Cape Girardeau. There are towns, such as Bonne Terre, Poplar Bluff, Fulton, and possibly twenty others, having a population of over 1,000, where we never have a church service. There are church people in all these towns, but as nothing is ever done to help them start and keep up regular church services, many of them drop out and join other religious bodies."

The report then gives the following statistics in regard to the amounts pledged for Missions since 1891:

"At the Convention of 1891, the parishes that were then in this Diocese paid \$5,015.00 for Diocesan Missions. The General Board of Missions in New York gave us \$800, which, together with personal pledges made by the members of the Convention, placed at the disposal of the Missionary Board \$6,868.00. At the Convention in May, 1890, the different parishes paid only \$2,948.00 on account of Diocesan Missions. The grant of the General Missionary Board, together with the personal pledges, brought the total amount of working money for the Board to \$4,660.00, or over

\$2,200.00 less than it was nine years ago. Under these conditions, it is quite evident that the work must necessarily decline or drag. We have not been in a position to extend our work in Missouri, but have been put to the painful necessity of reducing the stipends paid to the missionaries. It has been the hope of the Board that whenever it became necessary to reduce the amount paid to any missionary, that the shortage would be made up by the parish or mission under his charge. Unfortunately, however, this has not always been done, and the missionary was made to suffer. The cutting off of \$25.00 or \$50.00 per year from the salary of a missionary, often works great hardships in his family, and it certainly must hamper his work in the church."

In these extracts are revealed the terrible need of a revival of the missionary spirit in the Diocese. They reveal the fact we are merely existing—

not growing-going backward and not forward.

Your Committee feel that this is deplorable. Our Bishop has told us in his address that the Church's real life is in the missionary spirit. Judged by this standard, we are found wanting, and unless God in His Infinite mercy puts His spirit into our hearts, and leads us to see in thirty-three Churchless counties, and the gradual decrease in our missionary funds, a deadly peril to our Church's life, the fate of the Church of Sardis awaits us.

We close our report with thanks to Almighty God for the good work of the Hospital Mission. This is the ray of light which reveals that we are not entirely dark. It rejoices our hearts to know that three thousand five hundred of the poor and unfortunate and afflicted are reached by our Missionary for this work, and his able corps of assistants. It is purely missionary work, and under God's blessing cannot fail to do much good to the poor who are always with us.

We also have heard with pleasure the suggestion of the Bishop, that the strength of the Diocese warrants the relinquishment of the appropriation of \$1,000.00 from the Board of Managers of the Domestic and Foreign

Missionary Society.

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But while we are thus talking of relinquishing this \$1,000.00, we must not forget the need of carrying the Church to the neglected districts, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Missionary Board send, if possible, a general Missionary into the field and carry the Church and Prayer Book into neglected districts.

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The Board having taken under its direction the missions to the institutions in the City of St. Louis on condition that the money for carrying on same was provided outside of the regular pledges for Diocesan Missions in general, and it appearing to be rather a difficult matter to raise the funds for this work, the Board, on September 14th, 1899, appointed the Rev. Mr. Duckworth as a committee to take charge of this work, under the Board, with power and authority to call to his aid one clergyman and one layman, who with him should have authority to raise the necessary funds and disburse same, making full report to the Board from time to time.

Rev. Mr. Duckworth called to his aid Rev. C. M. Davis and Mr. C. S. Freeborn, and these gentlemen called the Rev. Fredk. W. Cornell, Missionary at Holy Innocents', St. Louis, to take charge of the missionary work in the city institutions, and assume the responsibility therefor. Rev. Mr. Cornell began his work on the first of January, 1900, and is still in charge, and receives a salary therefor of \$800 per year; all of which action on the part of the committee was unanimously approved by the Board.

The Board further reports that it has undertaken, during the past year, to create an increased interest in Diocesan Missions, and the Missions to the City Institutions. In furtherance of this, it, under the direction of the Bishop, secured the services of some of the clergymen and laymen, and had a clergyman and a layman visit each parish and mission in the City of St. Louis, on the 10th December, 1899, and 21st of January, 1900, and make addresses to the congregations on the subjects of Diocesan Missions, and Missions to the City Institutions, and had some of the city clergy go to the parishes and missions in the country, and some of the clergy in the country come to the city on the 13th of May, 1900, and deliver addresses

in the various parishes and missions in the city and country, upon the same

The result of this undertaking is unknown to the Board, but it trusts that it has aroused the church people to fuller realization of the importance and necessity for more aggressive work, and may be the cause of an increase in the pledges to be taken at this Convention.

The Board finds that it needs \$4,525.00 to keep the present missionary work in the Diocese in operation, independent of what may be necessary for the work in the City Institutions.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri:

The Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary presents its Nineteenth Annual Report.

Our work has been more extended than in any previous year. The Missionary Council brought us face to face with many of our missionaries, and made the work a more living reality than ever before.

For work outside the Diocese we have given \$100.00 each to China, Japan, the Philippine Islands, St. Augustine's Colored School, Raleigh, N. C.; Western Texas and Iowa, \$150.00 to Mexico, and \$50.00 to Indian Work at Birch Coulie, Minn., \$113.00 to General Missions and \$276.00 for the United Offering.

Within the Diocese: \$1,000.00 for St. Stephen's Current Expenses, \$1,000.00 for the Church Mission House for Convalescents, \$200.00 for Bishop

Robertson Scholarship, \$130.00 Ironton, \$87.00 Clifton Heights, \$162.00 Epiphany Mission, and \$100 auxiliary pledge for Diocesan Missions. Smaller sums have been given elsewhere. The Mite Boxes have brought in \$215.58, the largest sum ever gathered from them.

Forty-two Missionary Boxes have been sent out.

APPENDIX No. 15.

Report of Changellon's Interpretation of Seq. 4, Art. 5, Constitution.

To the President and Members of the Convention:

According to the Journal of the last Convention, the Chancellor of the Diocese was asked for his interpretation of Section 4, Article 5, of the Constitution.

I take it that this enquiry is intended to call for an interpretation of only that portion of Section 4 which provides, "that no Lay Delegate shall take his seat until he shall have presented to the Secretary satisfactory evidence that his Parish has paid all assessments to the Treasurer in full; but the Convention may, by two-thirds vote, dispense with such proof of payment."

Canon XIX provides that each Parish and Mission shall be assessed annually for Diocesan purposes, and the funds raised under it are to be called "The Diocesan Fund of the Diocese of Missouri."

This assessment is made at each stated meeting of the Convention, by a committee appointed for that purpose. It is made for the purpose of raising the amount of money necessary to be paid for the support of the Episcopate, and such other sums as the committee may deem necessary, to meet the contingent expenses of the Convention and Diocese which also includes the expenses of the deputies to the General Convention. This was the usage and practice of the Convention at the time and prior to the adoption of the Constitution. This sum is to be paid quarterly, in advance, by each Parish and Mission, and is to be charged by the Treasurer of the Diocese on his books against the Parishes and Missions, and all payments made by them to be credited, and the Treasurer is to make full report thereof annually to each Convention.

This is the assessment referred to by Section 4. Article 5 of the Constitution.

There can be but one meaning to that portion of said Section 4, which requires "satisfactory evidence" to be produced to the Secretary of the Convention, of the payment of all assessments by a Parish or Mission, before the Lay Delegates from that Parish or Mission can take their seats in the Convention, and that is definite proof that the assessments required by Canon XIX, and made by the Convention in pursuance thereof, have been paid in full.

It is clear that the payments must be made, and proof thereof given the Secretary before the Lay Delegates can take their seats, except as otherwise provided. It is also clear that the Convention, by a two-thirds vote, may dispense with the proof of such payment, but what would be the result of a dispensation of the proof by a two-thirds vote of the Convention, is what the Convention doubtless wants to know. The condition precedent to the Lay Delegates taking their seats, is the presentation of "satisfactory evidence" or proof, of the payment of the assessments. The presentation of the proof of payment involves of necessity the payment of the assessment, because the proof cannot be made unless the payment has been made. The Constitution, however, does not restrict the Convention to the requirement of the payment of the assessment as a condition precedent to the Lay Delegates taking their seats, but only to the proof of payment, and as it allows the Convention to dispense with the proof of payment, it is, therefore, clear to my mind that the Constitution intended to, and did, provide a means whereby the Convention could admit Lay Delegates of Parishes and Missions which had not paid their assessments, without dispensing with the payment of the assessments.

The Constitution in this section is dealing with the qualifications and eligibility of the members of the Convention, and not with the payment of assessments, and has given to the Convention the right to pass upon their eligibility, irrespective of the payment of the assessment, by a two-thirds vote. One Convention may admit Delegates from a Parish or Mission that is delinquent, and another Convention may refuse to admit them for the same delinquency. The admission of Delegates whose Parish or Mission is delinquent without the payment of the assessment, does not operate to

release a Parish or Mission from the indebtedness to the Diocese.

APPENDIX No. 16.

Beyont of Committee on Panochial Trust Fund.

To the Diocesan Convention:

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Your Committee, to whom were referred, at the last session, the resolution of Mr. T. K. Skinker and the historical statement of Rev. P. G. Robert, touching the charter of the Parochial Trust Fund, beg leave to report as follows:

The Parochial Trust Fund was incorporated in the year 1879. It consists of the Bishop of the Diocese and the six members of the Standing Committee, elected from year to year. The purposes of the corporation, as defined by the second section of the articles of association, were: "To take title to real and personal property which shall be, from time to time, conveyed, transferred, devised or given to it, in aid of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Missouri; to hold the same in trust for the purposes of such

conveyance, transfer, devise or gift; to sell, convey and transfer the same, in accordance with the terms of such trust, and to execute any trusts connected therewith, and any other trusts not inconsistent with the purposes of said church that shall be devolved upon it.'

The Constitution of Missouri at that time provided, and still provides "that no religious corporation can be established in this State, except such as may be created under a general law for the purpose only of holding the title to such real estate as may be prescribed by law for church edifices, parsonages and cemeteries." Article 2, Section 8.

Doubt seems to have arisen as to the validity of the Charter of the Parochial Trust Fund very soon after it was incorporated. It was considered that inasmuch as this was a religious corporation the attempt to confer upon it power to hold personal property contravened the Constitution. Accordingly, in the year 1883, an amendment to the charter, so framed as to eliminate this power, was presented by the corporation to the Circuit Court, and was allowed, and the order of the court allowing it was duly recorded in the office of the Recorder of the City of St. Louis, on the 19th of October, 1883, and in the office of the Secretary of State on the 25th of the same month, and the Secretary forthwith issued a proper certificate to the corporation. These are the steps required by law to be taken in such cases, and when the certificate was issued the amendment became, and it now is, a part of the charter. It is a substitute for Section 2, above set forth, and reads as follows:

"The purposes of this organization are and shall be the holding of the title to such real estate as may be prescribed by law for church edifices, parsonages and cemeteries, and which shall, from time to time, be conveyed, transferred or devised to it in aid of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the

Diocese of Missouri.

In the meantime the matter had been brought up in the Convention of 1882 by Rev. Mr. Robert, upon whose motion a committee had been appointed "to take steps to test the legality of the charter." This Committee never took any such steps, but, instead, reported to the Convention of 1884 the steps taken by the corporation itself, as above set out, together with the reason therefor, and recommended that the Committee do nothing until a case then pending in the Supreme Court of Missouri should have been decided. It was supposed that the decision of this case would throw light on the subject of the powers of religious corporations in respect to taking and holding property, real and personal. In the Convention of 1885 this Committee made a further report, showing that the case referred to had been decided, and stating, in substance, that the Committee felt so well assured of the legality of the charter that they could not, in good faith, bring any proceeding to test its legality. And so none was ever brought. Here the matter rested until brought to the attention of the Convention fourteen years later, by a resolution presented by Rev. Mr. Robert, in 1899, which resolution was not adopted, but led to the adoption of the one first hereinabove mentioned.

Your Committee are of opinion that this long acquiescence in the action of the former Committee was an effectual ratification by the diocese, which closes all question as to the authority of that Committee, and as to the obligatory force of their action. Furthermore, we are of opinion, in the absence of a definite ruling by the Supreme Court, construing the above-mentioned provision of the Constitution, that the amendment was necessary to make the

charter conform to the State Constitution.

It may not be improper for us to add a word in relation to the personal

property appurtenant to our churches.

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communicate and to the Ch board of trustees, was sometimes appointed. It is only since the corporate idea has taken such a hold on the people of this country, that is within the last fifty or sixty years, that religious corporations have been heard of at all.

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In the Constitution of Missouri of 1865 there were very stringent limitations put upon gifts, legacies and devises for religious purposes. These limitations were, for the most part, eliminated when the Constitution was reframed in 1875. But it is evident that some of the spirit of the framers of the Constitution of 1865 remained among those who, ten years later, went over their work. One result is that the same corporation which holds the realty is not allowed also to hold the personalty of a Parish or Diocese. That can only be held now, as it was in former times, that is, by the several congregations, or by trustees for them.

The Committee to whom was referred the action of our last Diocesan Convention, as embodied in resolution on page 32 of the Journal of the Diocese of Missouri for 1899, regarding the propriety of this Diocese allying itself with the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., beg leave to report that they communicated said action to the Board of Trustees of the University of the South, and received the following response from said Board, which met July 31, 1899:

"Whereas, The Bishop and Convention of the Diocese of Missouri have expressed their willingness to unite with this Board in the control and support of the University of the South; therefore, be it

- "Resolved, That the Bishops, Clergy and Laity comprising this Board of Trustees, convey to the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese of Missouri their most cordial welcome and their hearty desire for their interest and cooperation;

"Resolved, That the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri be, and is hereby requested, to elect three representatives, one Clergyman and two Laymen, to take their seats in this Board at its next meeting, in August, 1900.

"Resolved, That the Vice-Chancellor of the University be requested to communicate this action of the Board to the Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri, and to the Chairman of the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, and to fur-

nish them with such documents and other information as may enable them to complete all their arrangements for meeting with the Board next year.

APPENDIX No. 18.

Report of Speqial Committee on Endowment of Episcopate.

Your Committee to whom was referred Mr. Donaldson's resolution as amended, viz.:

"Resolved, That the question of the endowment of the Episcopate be referred to a committee to devise a plan or plans for the raising of the Endowment Fund, and report their action to this Convention," beg leave to report that they have met and considered the said resolution and beg to report thereon as follows:

Your Committee are unanimous in their belief that it is very desirable and necessary to increase the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, at once, to such an amount that the interest derived from said fund will enable the Committee on Assessments to reduce the assessments on all Parishes, and more especially to reduce the amount of the assessments on such Parishes as by withdrawal of people of means or other causes are unable to pay assessments, based on numbers of communicants or members; and they recommend that steps should immediately be taken to increase the Permanent Fund, as requested by the Clericus in its memorial to this Convention, as the most available way of accomplishing the purpose of this resolution. Your Committee recommend as a first step thereto that a new Standing Committee be appointed by the President of the Convention to raise funds for the endowment of the Episcopate, to be composed of five members from the city and two from the country, seven in all, and that said Committee be appointed annually thereafter, and the work continued until a sufficient endowment shall be secured. That the Committee so appointed be requested to take steps in conjunction with the Rector of each Parish, to invite subscriptions in every Parish and organized Mission in the Diocese, by a personal canvas of the parishioners, or otherwise, as may be arranged with the Rectors thereof, during the coming year, and use every effort to secure a substantial increase

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to the Permanent Fund before the next Convention, and that the Committee reports its action hereunder to the next Convention.

Your Committee do not recommend holding out to any contributor the inducement that the interest on the contributions from his Parish will be credited on the assessment on his Parish, believing that a more generous response will be made to an appeal for subscriptions without conditions for the general benefit.

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APPENDIX No. 20.

Report of Committee on Assessments.

To the Diocesan Convention:

Your Committee on Assessments beg leave to report that they have considered the matter of the apportionment of the assessment against the several Parishes and Missions in the Diocese, and as the basis of apportionment have taken the amount paid by the several Parishes and Missions for parochial expenses and salaries, organist, choir and music during the past year. No other items of expenditure have been considered.

We find that for the purposes named the Parishes and Missions have paid in the aggregate about \$67,000.00.

The whole amount to be assessed is about \$5,800.00, and is obtained by an assessment against each Parish and Mission of 8 per cent on the amount expended by it for the above-named items.

The Committee, however, report that they have not in all cases been able to follow out this basis absolutely. Owing to exceptional circumstances we

have been obliged to depart from it in the following cases:

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APPENDIX No. 24 A.

Report of Chaptain St. Luke's Yospital.

Since November, 1899, when the present Chaplain was appointed, 65 services have been held at the Hospital, including one administration of the Holy Communion, and numerous visits have been made in the wards and rooms.

During the year ending April 30, 1900, 582 cases have been treated. Of these 449 have been pay patients, and 133 beneficiaries.

This means that 582 patients were in the hospital a total of 13,441½ days, or an average of 23 days each. This, as Dr. Tuttle says, is an evidence of a rather acute service, and an acute service means an expensive one to the Hospital. Of the above patients there were of our own communion 98, Roman Catholics 74, Presbyterians 60, Methodists 49, Baptists 25, Lutherans 27, Christian 30, Congregational 5, Unitarian 3, Evangelical 6, Jewish faith 22, no professed faith 142.

The religious belief of the beneficiaries is as follows: Of our own communion 55, Roman Catholic 14, Presbyterian 8, Lutheran 5, Baptist 3, Christian 5, Methodist 6, Jewish 4, Congregational 3, Evangelical 1, no professed faith 22

It will be seen from the record that St. Luke's Hospital has an open door for the sick and suffering, and welcomes all who need her ministrations, regardless of sect or creed.

This charitable work of ours should be better known and appreciated, and justify the churchmen of the Diocese in being honestly proud of and thankful for this beneficent charity.

On April 28 the graduating exercises of the Training School of Nurses were held at the Schuyler Memorial House, when 10 nurses received their diplomas at the hands of the Bishop of the Diocese, acting for the Trustees. the President of the Board, Mr. Wm. H. Thomson, making an address, and Mr. F. J. McMaster delivering the valedictory. The exercises were followed by a reception of the Superintendent, nurses and others, and was participated in by an interested and large assemblage of visitors and friends

in by an interested and large assemblage of visitors and friends.

Since the inauguration of this school, in 1889, 64 graduates have received their diplomas, and are now exercising their calling satisfactorily to the hospital in various parts of the country.

The clergy and others are always welcomed as visitors to the hospital, and may satisfy themselves of the beneficence and thoroughness of the work done. Since November, six of the clergy have been in the hospital as patients, and are thus qualified to bear testimony to its worth.

While not wishing the brethren any harm the management would be pleased to welcome all the clergy as patients, if they can not or will not come as interested visitors. It is very desirable that the clergy and others may see

Report of the Secretary of the Orphan's Home.

To the Rt. Rev. Bishop of the Diocese and the other members of the Orphans' Home Association, your Board begs leave to present the following report:

Some one has said the thing to be most thankful for in any life is its monotonous days. The times when nothing extraordinary happens are apt to be the times of greatest peace and contentment. While a year of such days may make an uninteresting report, it has made a good year, and one full of

blessings for our Home, for which we are all most grateful.

After the long illness of last year, and the anxiety and expenses attending them we are able to report the health of the children as most excellent, not a

serious case of sickness occurring for a whole year in a family of eighty.

There has been a change of matrons during the year, Mrs. Henrietta
Bronson coming to us in October, 1899, from "The Deaconess Training
School" of Philadelphia. The Home has gotten in Mrs. Bronson a woman
consecrated to her work, filled with a deep love for the children, and an
earnest desire for their highest good. Her presence in the Home has in many ways raised and spiritualized the standards of the entire household.

Both the kindergarten and school have had a successful year. The

teacher finds the children coming into the school from the kindergarten in

every way better able to go on understandingly with their new work.

We have been able to introduce into the Home during the winter some classes in domestic science. The children have had lessons in cooking once a week for about eight months with most satisfactory results. There have been sent into the Board on meeting days some very nice looking and palatable dishes prepared by the children themselves. Their teacher finds them interested and ambitious; her best results so far have been among the boys. Through the kindness of a friend we have had each week during the winter a teacher come to the Home and instruct the children rightly how to sew. The class is doing well. Our boys, as well as our girls, were obliged to take these lessons. At the very first they gave the teacher a good deal of trouble and were stubborn and rebellious. Now they have come to like their lessons exceedingly, and are learning quite nicely. Mr. Gurney, Superintendent Shaw's Garden, came to the Home on Arbor Day and gave the children a beautiful and interesting talk on the day and on flowers and plants generally. We take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Gurney for this kindness, and for other courtesies shown us through the year.

The Christmas festivities were especially numerous and pleasant. It seems new friends are constantly remembering our children, and generous donations of all kinds are sent in to them from many different sources.

We wish to make special mention of the "treat" given during the holidays to the children of the Home Sunday School by Miss Hawthorne and Mr. Fetherstonh of Mt. Calvary Parish, and to thank them for their faithful work and untiring interest in our children. St. Peter's Sunday School this year again entertained the Home children on the evening of Holy Innocents' Day in its usual delightful manner. The fact of being invited to go away from home to spend the evening is in itself to them a special and peculiar pleasure.

Some members of the Board and other friends gave to the Home in January a beautifully executed photograph of the late Bishop Hawks, during whose episcopate the Orphans' Home was begun. It is of like size and style as the ones already there of Bishop Robertson and Bishop Tuttle. As a memorial of Dr. Griswold, the founder of the Home, the children are taken down to St. John's Church, his old Parish, on the last Sunday in the year to a special service.

The new addition we so much long for, containing a bright sunny day nursery and kindergarten rooms, has not yet gotten above the foundation stone of hope, laid several years ago. We are not discouraged, only exceedingly anxious to see it a reality, it is so sorely needed.

The Home received during the year a legacy of \$2,000.00 from Mrs. Rebecca L. Dozier, which was added to the permanent endowment fund.

We ask the continued interest and money of our yearly subscribers, as by their help we are enabled to care for many more children than would be possible without it.

We wish to express our sincere gratitude to Dr. Saunders and his assistants, to Dr. Green and Dr. Fayette Ewing, for their great kindness at all times to our children. The Board wishes also to thank the Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, our Chaplain, and the gentlemen of the Advisory Committee.

We have received into the Home during the year thirty-eight children. Twenty-one have been restored to friends, six adopted, and four indentured. Present number in the Home, seventy-three.

The Board of Managers having been compelled during the year to buy in the property 4059 West Belle Place, that investment, \$5,200, is now transferred from the class of "securities," and is included among the real estate holdings of the Home, which accounts for the apparent reduction in the amount of "securities" held by the Home.

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APPENDIX No. 26.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionany Society.

ARTICLE I-NAME.

Section I. The name of the Society shall be the "Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

SECTION I. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

SECTION I. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to three delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

SECTION I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office. SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society,

and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society

and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section I. The annual meeeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three

members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION I. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

Section I. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

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APPENDIX A.

Rules of Order.

- I. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - On Constitution and Canons. II.

- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nayes.
- II. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had

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previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

I raised \$200 to add to the \$600, leaving a debt in the Building and Loan Association of \$545. This I assumed, and pay the monthly dues instead of rent. This debt therefore represents an increase in the value of our property, the more so from the fact that the rectory, which we bought for \$1,345, by reason of the rapid growth of our town is now worth \$2,000.

During the year I have officiated regularly each month at the Old Ladies' Home, and also at stated periods administered Holy Communion. There are about a dozen of our communicants as inmates, but whenever I celebrate communion there are about two-thirds of the inmates who most gladly and gratefully accept and avail themselves of the privilege thus accorded them. I ought to state that the services of the church are the only services regularly held each month, notwithstanding the fact that all religious bodies are represented, and the interest taken in the services by the inmates is always very marked and the attendance large.

During the year the work of the Parish Aid has been most marked and successful. The very successful President and workers have accomplished under God, great things for the Parish in liquidating long standing debts, and without resort to questionable methods in making money for the maintenance and help of the Parish.
