Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
 - V. On the State of the Church.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

**Journal of the Ninety-fifth Convention
of the
Church in the Diocese of Missouri.**

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,
Tuesday, January 23, 1934.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninety-fifth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 23, 1934, at 10 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Lee W. Heaton and the Rev. J. Presley Pound.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-seven who were entitled to vote, twenty-three were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 16.)

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from seventeen were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention after striking out the reference to the Bishop Coadjutor's Address.

The Bishop led the Convention in Prayer in memory of those who had died since the last Convention.

The privilege of the floor and a vote was extended to the Rev. Robert W. Fay and the Rev. John E. Hines.

By more than a two-thirds vote of the Convention, delegates from parishes and missions not entitled to representation in the Convention, owing to their delinquency in the payments of assessments and Church Pension Fund premiums, were given seats and votes with the recommendation to the next Convention that this action be not repeated.

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent was appointed a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

By authority of the Convention, the Bishop appointed the following named Nominating Committee:

Mr. F. G. Williamson, the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, Mr. George M. Block, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and Mr. C. C. Pangman.

Judge Davis Biggs presented the reports of the Standing Committee and Parochial Trust Fund, which were received and filed. (Appendix 2.)

The Secretary announced that the following named reports had been received and filed:

Diocesan Expense Fund. (Appendix 3.)

Diocesan Church Program Fund. (Appendix 4.)

Theological Education Fund. (Appendix 5.)

Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 6.)

Permanent Episcopate Fund. (Appendix 7.)

Trust Funds held by the Bishops. (Appendix 8.)

Diocesan Council, to be completed by reports of the Chairmen of Departments. (Appendix 9.)

Mr. Pangman presented the report of the Finance Department, with list of Assessments and Apportionments, which was received and filed. (Appendix 9a.)

The Rev. Dr. Block presented the report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, which was received and filed.

The Bishop led the Convention in Noonday Prayers.

Dean Sweet presented the report of the Department of the Field, which was received and filed.

The question of deciding the percentage of Church Program receipts to be sent to the National Council was referred to the Diocesan Council with power to act.

The Rev. Mr. Walters presented the report of the Department of Religious Education, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 1, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That Canon 27 be and is hereby repealed, and that a new Canon, to be known as Canon 27, be and is hereby enacted in lieu thereof, as follows:

CANON 27

Of Alterations and Additions.

SECTION 1. No proposed alteration or addition to the Canons shall be considered by the Convention unless such proposed alteration or addition shall have been referred to and reported upon by the Committee on Constitution and Canons, or unless such reference shall have been dispensed with by unanimous consent.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 2, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

RESOLVED, That Canon 7, "Of Convocations", be and is hereby repealed.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 3, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That Canon 21 be and is hereby repealed, and that a new Canon be and is hereby enacted in lieu thereof, to read as follows:

CANON 21

Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

SECTION 1. All properties now held, or hereafter acquired for the Fund for the relief of clergymen canonically resident in the Diocese of Missouri disabled by age, disease or otherwise, and of the widows and orphans of clergymen, shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees composed of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Treasurer of the Diocese, two clergymen and three lay communicants of the Diocese. In the absence of the Bishop from the Diocese, and during his disability to attend its meetings, the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be a Coadjutor) shall serve as a member of the Board. The Secretary of the Diocese shall be Secretary of said Board.

SECTION 2. The clergymen and lay communicants aforesaid shall be elected by the Convention, and shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected. Vacancies occurring between sessions of the Convention shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board. The Bishop, and in his absence the Bishop Coadjutor (if there be one) shall be Chairman of the Board. They may elect a Vice-Chairman. Three members of the Board, one of whom shall be a clergyman, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECTION 3. The Board shall invest such funds as are not needed for current use, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee of the Diocese. They shall receive and consider applications for relief under this canon and, in their discretion, may grant or refuse the same. They shall administer said Fund under the direction of the Convention. On the written request of the Diocesan Council they may use a part of the income of the Fund, not exceeding five hundred dollars in any one year, for the payment of Church Pension Fund premiums of Missionaries of this Diocese.

SECTION 4. The Treasurer of the Board shall be custodian of the properties belonging to the Fund. He shall report annually to the Convention, and also to the Board as they may require, the condition of the Fund and of any investment therein, and shall comply with the orders of the Board in the premises.

SECTION 5. The Board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in February. They shall adopt a code of rules for their guidance, and submit the same to the next Annual Convention for ratification or modification.

SECTION 6. The Secretary of the Board shall report annually to the Convention the proceedings of the Board for the preceding year.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

Mr. Pangman introduced Resolution No. 4, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Assessments for the Diocesan Fund, contained in the report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$18,450.27 be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with additional special funds received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Expense Budget for 1934.

Mr. Pangman introduced Resolution No. 5, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund, contained in the report of the Finance Department, amounting to \$32,315.94 be adopted for 1934.

Further, that the Finance Department with the approval of the Council be authorized to prepare the Church Program Budget for 1934, based upon the pledges received from the Parishes and Missions. (See page 62.)

The Rev. Mr. George presented his report as Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to City Institutions, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor presented the report of the Department of Christian Social Service, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins presented the report of the Church Pension Fund, which was received and filed.

The bill for expenses contained in the above report amounting to \$22.09 was ordered paid out of the Diocesan Expense Fund.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin presented the following report for the Committee on the State of the Church:

RESOLUTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE
STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Adopted by the Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri
January 23-24.

1. RESOLVED, That the delegates of the Diocese of Missouri to the General Convention, in their representative capacity, should be guided by the expressed mind of the Diocesan Convention in so far as their wise judgment permits.

2. RESOLVED, That we approve the proposal before the General Convention which would permit the translation of Diocesans.

3. RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri, in convention assembled, approve such steps as may be initiated by the General Convention to bring the Protestant Episcopal Church in full membership with the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

4. RESOLVED, That the sliding-scale method now used for determining apportionments be applied to assessments and be regarded as a norm of obligation.

(a) That parishes and missions, however, which believe there are special reasons why these assessments and apportionments ought to be adjusted, should have the right to appeal to a committee on adjustment, which shall hear their case, try to arrive at an adjusted apportionment and assessment, and present the facts to the Diocesan Council; Whereupon the Diocesan Council shall have the authority to adjust the assessments and apportionments accordingly.

(b) That the same principle be extended through the Church to arrive at a sense of the responsibility of the separate dioceses to the National Council.

5. RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in convention assembled go on record as:

(a) Denouncing as a menace to the continued peace of the world, the international traffic in war munitions, and their private manufacture; and stating it our conviction that the making of private profit from the munitions of war runs contrary to every Christian principle.

(b) Proclaiming our further conviction that violence breeds violence, that war breeds war; we pledge ourselves to set our faces resolutely against war as being utterly incompatible with the spirit and teaching of Christ.

(c) Proposing, in the Diocese, the organization of a Youth Movement, to co-operate with similar organizations elsewhere, to educate youth with regard to the futility and un-Christian character of war.

6. We are committed to the conviction that as members of the Church of Christ, we ought to seek the growth and development in the United States of a social order in which all men shall co-operate for the common good, and in which none shall make excessive profits at the expense of his fellow man. And we are resolved to further such a social order by whatever consistent means are within our power.

7. With regard to the "Goodwin Plan", we feel impelled to call to the attention of the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, the following possible objections to the Plan which should be weighed in any consideration of it—objections which have caused your committee to feel altogether bounden to disapprove of it.

(a) That it is an exploitation of the women of the Church, more to the interest of the Goodwin Corporation than to the Churches.

(b) That it would work a hardship to other manufacturers who might want to participate in the market monopoly which would be created by the Plan's establishment, but are prevented from doing so because of the restriction by the Goodwin Corp. to a single favored manufacturer, in a given area.

(c) That the Plan advances insufficient guarantees of the application of the principles of social justice within the industries which shall market the favored products.

(d) That it is unworthy of the highest and finest ways in which the women of the Christian Churches, in all denominations, could unite in a nation-wide campaign.

(e) That it is a substitution of commercialization in the Churches for the Christian responsibility of sharing and giving.

(f) That it would hinder the advancement of a co-operative commonwealth in the nation, in place of the present profit-motivated order.

8. In Canon 41, of the solemnization of Holy Matrimony in the General Canons of the Church, we propose:

(a) The insertion of the following provision at one time recommended by the commission on divorce and remarriage to the General Convention. "Any person to whom a divorce from a former marriage has been granted for any cause by a civil court may after the expiration of one year from the granting of the divorce apply to his Bishop or to the ecclesiastical marital court of his domicile for permission to marry another person. The Bishop or court shall thereupon inquire into the characters and personalities of the parties to the previous and to the proposed marriage, and determine whether the purposes of Christian marriage will be best served by the proposed marriage. If the Bishop or court permits the proposed marriage, a minister of the Church may solemnize the marriage; *provided*, however, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage."

(b) That paragraph 5 of the present canon be rewritten to permit the contingency suggested by the above insertion. And that Section II., paragraph 7 of the present canon be stricken out as containing the assumption that "persons who have been married otherwise than as this Church provides" are ipso facto excommunicant.

Resolutions Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, in the foregoing report were adopted.

Mr. Shepley introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 6:

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this Convention that the present system of making financial provision for the extension and missionary work carried on through the National Council has proven itself to be unsatisfactory, and that this system should be changed so that in the future funds required for the work of the National Council should be provided through a separate canvass to be held each year at the same time throughout every Diocese and Parish in the country, which canvass would have for its sole purpose the raising of funds for the above work.

And be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the General Convention, accompanied by a petition urging the submission of this question for discussion and decision on the occasion of the next session of the General Convention.

The vote by which the foregoing resolution No. 6 was adopted was reconsidered, and consideration of the resolution was postponed until the following day.

Resolutions Nos. 5, 6, 7, and 8, in the foregoing report on the State of the Church, were adopted.

On motion the vote by which Resolution No. 6 in the foregoing report on the State of the Church was adopted was reconsidered, and further consideration of this resolution was postponed until the following day.

The consideration of Resolution No. 6 introduced by Mr. Shepley, and Resolution No. 6, in the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, was made a special order of the day for Wednesday at 9:30 a.m., to be followed by the election of Deputies to the General Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Woolfall made an oral report for the Committee on the Bishop's Pence Organization.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 7, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That Section 2 of Canon 9 be and is hereby amended by striking out the following words:

"and four clergymen and four laymen, elected by the Convention. At the first election, two of each order shall be elected by the Convention for one year, and two of each order shall be elected by the Convention for two years."

said words beginning in line six of Section 2 of the printed copy of the Edition of 1926, and ending in line nine of said printed copy; and by inserting in lieu thereof the following words:

“and six clergymen and six laymen, elected by the Convention. At the Diocesan Convention of January, 1934, one of each order shall be elected by the Convention for one year, and three of each order shall be elected by the Convention for two years.”;

And, Further, That said Section 2 be and is hereby amended by striking out the word “two” in line ten of said printed copy, and by inserting in lieu thereof the word “three”;

And, Further by striking out the words and phrases relating and referring to the Convocations, wherever said words and phrases may occur in Sections 2 and 4 of said Canon 9, so that said Sections 2 and 4 when so amended shall read as follows:

SECTION 2. The Council shall consist of the following members: The Bishop, who shall be its President; the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, who shall be its Vice-President; the Secretary of the Diocese; the Treasurer of the Diocese, who shall be Treasurer of the Diocesan Council; three clergymen and three laymen, appointed by the Bishop; and six clergymen and six laymen, elected by the Convention. At the Diocesan Convention of January, 1934, one of each order shall be elected by the Convention for one year, and three of each order shall be elected by the Convention for two years, and thereafter at the annual Convention in each year, three of each order shall be elected for two years, in succession to the members whose terms shall expire. The three clergymen and three laymen appointed by the Bishop shall be appointed annually during the month of January, and shall hold office for a period of one year.

In the event there be no Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor, or if both Bishops be absent from the Diocese, or if both the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor be disqualified for any reason from acting, the President of the Standing Committee shall act as President of the Council until a Bishop shall have been elected and consecrated, or until the Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor shall return to the Diocese, or, if any disqualification exists as to either the Bishop or the Bishop Coadjutor, until such disqualification shall have been removed.

SECTION 4. Members of the Council, whether elected by the Convention or appointed by the Bishop, shall remain in office until their successors are elected or appointed, but the Council shall have the power to fill all vacancies that may occur through the death, resignation, disqualification or removal from the Diocese of any member elected by the Convention for his unexpired term, and the Bishop shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur through the death, resignation, disqualification or removal from the Diocese of any member appointed by him for his unexpired term. If any member of the Council elected by the Convention or appointed by the Bishop be elected Treasurer of the Diocese, such election shall be deemed to have created a vacancy as hereinabove specified, and such vacancy shall thereupon be filled in the manner and form as hereinabove set forth.

The Convention adjourned to meet at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday.

SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,
Wednesday, January 24, 1934.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 8 a.m. by the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, assisted by the Rev. Roy S. Rawson.

The Convention was called to order in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial at 9:30 a.m., with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the previous day, which were approved.

Under the Order of the Day, the Rev. Dr. Kevin called up for consideration Resolution No. 6, in the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, which, after being amended in the original copy, with his approval, was adopted.

Resolution No. 6 was called up for consideration, and was not adopted.

The Bishop declared the election for Deputies to the General Convention in order.

The Convention ordered that the Rev. Mr. Woolfall, owing to his enforced absence, be allowed to vote by proxy in elections during this session. The same privilege was extended to the Rev. Mr. Clarke.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Dr. Jones reported that the Committee on Constitution and Canons approved the adoption of Resolution No. 1 to amend Canon 27, Of Alterations and Amendments. Resolution No. 1 was adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders.

The Rev. Dr. Jones reported that the Committee on Constitution and Canons returned Resolution No. 2, to repeal Canon 7, Of Convocations, without recommendation.

Resolution No. 2 was adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders.

The Rev. Dr. Jones reported that the Committee on Constitution and Canons approved the adoption of Resolution No. 7, to amend Canon 9, Of the Diocesan Council.

Resolution No. 7 was adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders.

The Rev. Dr. Jones reported that the Committee on Constitution and Canons approved the adoption of Resolution No. 3, to repeal Canon 21, and to enact in lieu thereof a new Canon 21, Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

Resolution No. 3, to repeal Canon 21, and to enact Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, of a new Canon 21, Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, was adopted by the unanimous vote of both orders on all said sections.

The Rev. Dr. Block introduced Resolution No. 8, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

WHEREAS, 32 lynchings have been recorded in the United States in the year 1933, and

WHEREAS, some official cognizance has been unfortunately given to the invocation of so-called Lynch Law, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled express its condemnation of lynching as inhuman and indefensible and we call upon our citizens to safeguard in every possible way, the right of every man to security from punishment except by due process of law.

Mr. George M. Block read a telegram from Mr. Warren Kearney urging the appointment of a Committee to form parish and diocesan branches of the Laymen's League.

The Bishop was authorized to appoint a Committee on the Laymen's League in this Diocese, and appointed the following named Committee: Mr. Geo. M. Block, Mr. F. G. Williamson, Mr. L. F. Jones, Jr., Mr. Eldred Tarry, Mr. J. G. Fleck, and Mr. Geo. T. Peckham.

Mr. Williamson reported the following nominations by the Nominating Committee:

Treasurer: Mr. Stephen B. Sheldon.

Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate: Mr. Frank C. Thompson, Mr. Judson S. Bemis and Mr. Charles J. Miller.

Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund: the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Mr. John T. Hicks, and Mr. C. H. Poin-dexter.

Trustees of the Theological Education Fund: the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor, Mr. H. D. Condie and Mr. J. Willard Wright.

Trustee of the University of the South: the Rev. John E. Hines.

Registrar: the Rev. C. E. Remick.

Finance Committee of the Diocese: Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock and Mr. John R. Shepley.

The above named candidates were elected by the unanimous vote of the Convention.

By the unanimous vote of the Convention, the Rev. Frank Maples and Mr. A. Blair Ridington were elected Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

The Bishop announced that the election for members of the Diocesan Council was in order.

The Convention ordered that the three candidates in each order receiving the highest number of votes should be elected for a term of two years, and the one clerical and one lay candidate receiving the next highest votes should be elected for a term of one year.

The Nominating Committee reported the following nominations for the Diocesan Council:

The Rev. David Coombs, the Rev. D. R. Clarke, Mr. C. R. McDonald, the Rev. J. Manly Cobb, the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Sumner Walters, the Rev. Hulbert Woolfall, Mr. John D'Arcy, Mr. H. E. Mack, Mr. C. C. Pangman and Mr. J. E. Taussig.

The Bishop announced the election for members of the Standing Committee in order.

The Nominating Committee reported the following nominations for the Standing Committee of the Diocese:

The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., the Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. L. H. Nugent, Judge Davis Biggs, Mr. George M. Block and Mr. James M. Bull.

The Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., was nominated from the floor as a candidate for the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for members of the Council and for the Standing Committee and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the election for Deputies to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared these elected on the first ballot in the following order:

The Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., the Rev. Hulbert Woolfall, Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley, Mr. George M. Block and Mr. C. C. Pangman.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical and one lay deputy to the General Convention.

Mrs. Messick presented the report of the Episcopal Home for Children, which was received and filed.

Mrs. Shepley presented the report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, which was received and filed.

The Bishop led the Convention in Noonday Prayers.

The tellers of the election for one clerical and one lay deputy to the General Convention reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. R. O. Kevin, Jr., Ph.D., and Judge Davis Biggs elected on the second ballot.

It was ordered that the Bishop be authorized to appoint as provisional Deputies to the General Convention, candidates who had received the number of votes next highest to those candidates who were elected Deputies to the General Convention.

Under this order, the Bishop announced the appointment of the following named Provisional Deputies:

The Rev. Sumner Walters, the Rev. L. H. Nugent, the Rev. D. R. Clarke, the Rev. David Coombs, Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. W. L. Henry, and Mr. John T. Hicks.

Mr. Watling presented the report of the League of Lay Readers, which was received and filed.

Mrs. Weed presented the report of the Girls' Friendly Society, which was received and filed.

The Convention endorsed the plan of the Bishop's Pence Organization for this Diocese, as presented by Mr. J. K. Stribling, Chairman.

The tellers of the election for members of the Diocesan Council, and for members of the Standing Committee reported, and the Bishop declared elected members of the Diocesan Council for a term of two years the following named candidates:

The Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Sumner Walters, the Rev. Hulbert Woolfall, Mr. H. E. Mack, Mr. C. C. Pangman, and Mr. John D'Arcy.

The Bishop further declared elected members of the Diocesan Council for a term of one year the following named candidates:

The Rev. J. Manly Cobb and Mr. J. E. Taussig.

The Bishop further declared elected members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese the following named candidates:

The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., the Rev. John S. Bunting, Judge Davis Biggs, Mr. George M. Block and Mr. James M. Bull.

The Ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical member of the Standing Committee and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Bishop made the following appointments:

The tellers of the election for a member of the Standing Committee reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. L. H. Nugent elected.

MR. LEE ORCUTT

We desire to express our sense of the great loss which the death of Mr. Lee Orcutt has brought to us. For years he has been one of the most active of our laymen. His interest in his Church and in its affairs was profound. He gave time and thought and active assistance without reserve, and always he could be counted on.

Mr. Orcutt was the Chairman of the Nation Wide Campaign Committee from 1921 to 1924; he was a charter member of the Diocesan Council and remained a member of this body until his death; he became a member of the old Missionary Board in 1922, and when this Committee became the Department of Missions and Church Extension, he was elected its Secretary and continued so until the end; he was a member of the Field Department since 1925; he was a deputy to General Convention in 1922 and also in 1931 and took an active part in the deliberations; since 1930 he has been a member of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral.

It is with deep regret that we record his death on January 6th, 1934.

'He Was Faithful.'

In response to a communication from the Presiding Bishop, the Bishop announced the appointment of the following named Committee on the "Church Wide Endeavor":

The Rev. John S. Bunting, the Rev. Robert W. Fay, the Rev. Lee W. Heaton, and the Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild.

It was ordered that the next Convention meet in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the second day of this Convention.

The Bishop was requested to appoint a Committee to present a memorial on the death of Mr. R. L. Orcutt, to be spread upon the minutes of the Convention and a copy to be sent to Mrs. Orcutt.

After the benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

**The Address of the Bishop to the Ninety-fifth
Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.**

To the Ninety-fifth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

My dear Friends,

I should like to submit a brief report. Three of our clergy have been transferred to other Dioceses: the Reverend George A. Wilson, Rector of St. Alban's, St. Louis, has been transferred to the Diocese of West Texas; the Reverend Donald Veale, Minister of St. Paul's Church, Overland, has been transferred to the Diocese of Michigan; and the Reverend Philip E. Anthes, Deacon, has been transferred to the Diocese of Massachusetts.


On the other hand, four new clergymen have been added to the diocesan staff: from the Diocese of Connecticut came the Reverend Robert Charles Batchelder, Jr., to be Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson; from the Diocese of Pennsylvania, the Reverend John L. Hady, to be Rector of Calvary Church, Columbia, Missouri; from the Diocese of Upper South Carolina, the Reverend John Eldridge Hines, to be Assistant Minister at the Church of St. Michael & St. George; from the Diocese of Massachusetts, the Reverend Robert Wolcott Fay, to be Minister of St. Paul's Church, Overland. It is a very great pleasure to welcome these new friends to this Convention. And the response which each has met in his parish is most gratifying.

During the past year there have been three ordinations in the Diocese. On May 25, 1933, Mr. Andrew E. F. Anderson was ordained to the Diaconate by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri in the Chapel of Western Theological Seminary, Evanston, Illinois; and on April 29, 1933, the Reverend J. Presley Pound was ordained to the Priesthood by the Bishop Coadjutor in St. James' Church, Macon. On July 9, 1933, Mr. Philip E. Anthes was ordained to the Diaconate by Bishop Johnson in the Church of the Holy Innocents, St. Louis.

It is encouraging to note that the confirmations for the past year have increased from 417 in 1932 to 596 in 1933. Of these, 233 were confirmed by Bishop Johnson, 362 by myself, and one by the Bishop of Connecticut in the Chapel of Salisbury School.

Other statistics regarding my work, and the report of the Trust Funds held by the Bishop for the past year, are filed with the Secretary of the Diocese.

Consent given to the ordination of Andrew E. F. Anderson to the Diaconate and to the shortening of the time of his Candidateship to one year from the date of his admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders, which was July 20, 1932.

June 24:

Resignation of Rt. Reverend Frederick F. Johnson, Bishop of Missouri, submitted to the Committee and consent given thereto, with deep regret and appreciation of his service. Resolution of appreciation and affection adopted and ordered sent to the House of Bishops and the Church papers for publication.

The application of Philip E. Anthes for ordination to the Diaconate recommended to the Bishop.

The Committee caused to be sent to Bishop Johnson the following letter:

July 8, 1933.

"To our beloved Bishop Johnson:

"The Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri have received from the Presiding Bishop notice of your request that you be relieved of your duties in this Diocese on August 1st. We have sent

our formal consent to your resignation at that date, solely on the ground of your impaired health, and in the hope that freedom from responsibility may restore you to normal strength and vigor.

"This is to us far more than a formal matter of routine. There is not a man of us who has not had personal experience of your kindness and friendship during the twenty-one years that you have been our leader. This kindness has extended far beyond our small circle; many a household among both clergy and laity has known the comfort of your sympathetic presence in time of illness and death. Many a man coming from a distance to take up his work in this Diocese has been taken by you and Mrs. Johnson into your hospitable home and made to feel among strangers that his bishop was truly his friend. Your sympathy has been shown in countless ways, not only to your clergy, but to innumerable men, women, and children among the laity and throughout the Diocese, all of whom will always be your devoted friends.

"Beside our feeling of personal devotion to you for your nobility of character, is a deep respect for the ability, industry and thoroughness you have shown in organizing and conducting the affairs of the Diocese. You have been instrumental in bringing to Missouri men of high caliber who are now justifying your judgment of them. Always you have proved yourself a faithful and untiring Shepherd of the Flock of Christ and Bishop of their souls.

"Your influence in the general Church has always been sane and conservative. You have stood as firm as a rock against the forces of narrow partisanship and ultra liberalism. Your voice will be missed in the quiet counsels of the Church.

"No word of appreciation to you would be complete without mention also of the gracious lady who has made your home a center of diocesan life and light. Mrs. Johnson is universally beloved; and there are many of us who are saddened at the thought that you and she will be no longer here among us. We take comfort, however, in believing that your health will be fully restored by rest and a return to your boyhood home; and we pray God's richest blessings upon you and your dear wife, whose love and friendship we can never forget.

July 21, 1933.

"The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D.,
President of the Standing Committee,
Webster Groves, Missouri.

Dear Dr. Jones:

"I have received your very kind letter of July 8, in which you send me a record of action taken by the Standing Committee in connection with my resignation of my office as Bishop of Missouri.

"I have tried to be kind and helpful and friendly toward all with whom I have come in contact during these past twenty-one years. And I have tried to be just as kind to those outside of the Episcopal Church as to those who have their membership in the Episcopal Church. I learned long years ago not to treat slightly or with disrespect those who belong to other faiths than mine.

"You are in a position to know that the work of the Diocese of Missouri has been rather difficult during these years that I have been trying to carry on. But I have not complained. And I have tried in every way to be faithful to the trust that was committed to me. In many places our salaries have had to be so small that it was difficult to get men of real capacity to fill them. But I think that we have, as a general rule, succeeded in bringing to Missouri, as your letter says, men of high calibre who are justifying my judgment of them. And I have really tried to be, as your letter says, 'a faithful and untiring Shepherd of the Flock of Christ and Bishop of their souls.'

"I thank you, too, for the kind things that you say in your letter about Mrs. Johnson. Yes, it is true that she has helped much to make our home 'a center of diocesan life and light.' She has been a great help to me during all the years that she has been my devoted wife. I look forward with great joy to the years that we may yet spend together in the old Connecticut home until the shadows lengthen and the evening comes.

"I shall be glad if you will, when you have opportunity, read this letter to the other members of the Standing Committee. Or, if you cannot do that, I shall be glad if you will make copies of it and send to them.

APPENDIX No. 9a.

Report of the Department of Finance.

The operations of the Department of Finance during the year 1933 were but a faithful reflection of the problems with which every Parish and Mission in the Diocese was confronted; namely, steadily diminishing revenues caused by the inevitable shrinkage in pledged expectancies which was due to unprecedentedly severe financial conditions among our people. While the requirements of our Diocese and the National Church are just as much an obligation on each Parish, in due proportion to its resources, as those of its own budget, it is perfectly natural that home needs should be attended to first. We hasten to add, however, that we know heroic efforts and real sacrifices were made to adjust all Parish expenses so as to provide as much money as could safely be released to pay on the Assessment and Apportionment,—but even this generous recognition could not produce the full sum of the pledges given to us by the Parishes at the outset of the year. The result has been another deficit in the Diocesan Expense Budget, although it was revised downward several times in the course of the year in the endeavor to meet this situation, to add to the accumulated deficit of several years past, as well as a further decrease in the amount of our annual payment on the Church's Program. We did, however, keep faith with the National Council and have sent to New York their forty percent of the total sum raised in this Diocese for the Apportionment.

In order to reduce the threatened deficit in the Diocesan Expense Budget the Department secured the co-operation of the Bishop in sending out a special Advent appeal to all communicants of the Diocese to make a contribution of any sum up to one dollar, from which offering a total of \$500.33 was realized. This from a communicant roll in excess of 5,000 people.

The Finance Department feels very strongly that a closer correlation must be established between the Diocesan Expense Budget and the Church's Program Pledge on the one hand, and our actual cash receipts on the other. In pursuance of this objective and with the authority of the Council, the Bishop appointed a special committee which has already surveyed the financial situation of many of our weaker Parishes and Missions and worked out a plan to adjust the Assessment and Apportionment levied on them to such amounts as can safely and surely be remitted to the Treasurer of the Diocese. To this absolute minimum the 1934 Diocesan Budget and the Church's Program apportionment have been made to conform and, barring unforeseen business calamity or accidents, these disturbing deficits will, we trust, end from henceforward.

The Finance Department wishes again to emphasize the importance of each Parish and Mission paying on the Assessment and Apportionment monthly. The expenses of our Bishop and of the Diocese must be met monthly and the operations of the National Council are conducted in the same way. We appeal to Parish Vestries and Treasurers to keep this obligation ever before them. It will simplify their own accounting and eliminate being confronted with a large overdue payment to meet at the end of the year. May we counsel you to drive this program through of regular monthly payments from your Parish pledges and you will greatly minimize the trouble we have in keeping the Diocese and National Council financed. Our thanks are due to those Parishes who have helped us in this fashion in the past.

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We feel this coming year shows promise of a lightening pressure upon us all. Let us tighten our belts, determined to meet the obligations incurred in our names and thus uphold the hands of our Bishop in making the Diocese of Missouri known as a striving, thriving, inspiring unit of the National Church.
