

Journal of the Fifty-Ninth Convention,

BEING THE

FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Tuesday, May 24, 1898.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the Clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock A. M. the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Cathedral singing the 249th Hymn.

The Convention Sermon was preached by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dean of the Cathedral, who took for his text 2d Timothy, 4th Chapter, and 5th Verse.

The Rev. G. B. D. Miller then presented to the Bishop the Rev. Frederick Norman Chapman for ordination to the Priesthood.

The Litany was then said by the Rev. E. P. Little, of Trinity Church, Hannibal.

After singing the 288th hymn, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese began the Communion Office. The Epistle was read by the Rev. Wm. Short, of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, and the Gospel by the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The ordination was then proceeded with, after which the Offertory sentences and notices were read by the Dean. The Communion Office was then concluded by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese as celebrant.

On re-assembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop, called the Convention to order, and the Secretary of the last Convention proceeded under the order of the Bishop to call the roll of Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-seven clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the "'Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials' appointed at the last Convention, whereupon the Rev. Charles Trotman presented the report, which was read by the Secretary, including the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention.

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The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from fifteen Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced a quorum of both orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., nominated Mr. J. R. Triplett for Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, unanimous consent being given, the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., was instructed to cast the ballot of this Convention for Mr. John R. Triplett for Secretary.

The Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., so cast the ballot, and the Secretary appointed Mr. W. B. Coombe, of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, his assistant.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting Clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention, and they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

On motion of Mr. C. S. Freeborn, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9 o'clock in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 o'clock A. M. to 1 o'clock P. M., when it will take a recess to 2.30, and continue to 5 P. M.

On motion of Mr. Jas. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Convention.

On motion of the Rev. Wm. Short, the Convention took a recess until 2.30 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled after recess at 2.30 P. M.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials submitted a supplemental report to the effect that Trinity Church, St. Louis, St. Judes' Church, Monroe City, St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis, St. Mark's Mission, Portland, and St. Chrysostom's Mission, St. Louis, had paid their assessments, and their Lay Delegates were entitled to seats in this Convention.

On motion the report was adopted, and the Secretary called the names of the Lay Delegates.

The Rev. P. G. Robert, Chairman of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred matter at the last Con-

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND CANONS.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was recommitted the motion of the Rev. P. G. Robert, on page 17 of the Journal, to substitute "The Monday after Advent Sunday," for the words "Monday in Easter Week," in Canon XII., respectfully recommend "that the proposed amendment be not adopted."

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the motion of the Rev. G. A. Ottmann, on page 33 of the Journal, requiring the Bishop and Standing Committee, before consenting to the creation of a new Parish, to consult with the "Rectors and Wardens of the Parishes next adjoining" the proposed location of said new Parish, respectfully recommend that the motion of Mr. Ottmann be not adopted.

But the Committee propose the following amendment:

Resolved, That after the words "Bishop and Standing Committee," in lines three and four of Section 3 of Canon X., the following words be inserted: "After having consulted the Rectors and Wardens of the Parishes whose Church Buildings are within two thousand yards of the proposed location," so that the Section will read: Such applications as are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon, having been consented to by the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall consider the same, and if, in the judgment of the Bishop and Standing Committee, after having consulted the Rectors and Wardens of the Parishes whose Church Buildings are within two thousand yards of the proposed location, the interests of the Church will be promoted thereby, etc.

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On motion, the recommendations contained in the above report were considered, and voted on *seriatim*.

On motion, the first recommendation was declared adopted.

On motion, the second recommendation was declared adopted.

On motion, the third recommendation amending Section 3, of Canon X., was declared adopted.

The hour of 3 P. M. having arrived, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his Annual Address, which, with his Episcopal Acts, was laid upon the Secretary's table.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth the Convention adjourned until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

SECOND DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,

Wednesday, May 25, 1898.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the Chair, and called the Convention to order.

The Secretary then called the roll.

The minutes of the previous day's proceedings were read and approved.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented a supplemental report to the effect that St. James' Church, Macon, and Christ Church, Rolla, had paid their assessments in full, and their Delegates were entitled to seats in this Convention.

On motion the report was adopted.

The Secretary then called the roll of the Delegates.

The Very Rev. C. M. Davis presented and read the report of the Special Committee appointed at the last Convention as follows:

Your Committee appointed to consider the systematic plan of procuring offerings for General Missions, respectfully recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved—(1) That the Diocese endeavor to follow whatever plan may be adopted by the Board of Managers.

- (2) That the Missionary Board be requested to appoint one of its members whose duty it shall be to further such plan.
- (3) That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Secretary of the Board of Managers.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn, Chairman, presented and read the annual report of the Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate.

Same was received and referred to the Committee on Finance. [See Appendix No. 4.]

Mr. M. S. Snow presented and read the report of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese. [See Appendix No. 5.]

Mr. M. S. Snow, Secretary, presented and read the report of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, as follows:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, for the Conventional Year 1897–98, are herewith respectfully submitted:

May 19, 1897—Organized by the election of the Rev. P. G. Robert as President, the Rev. Wm. Short as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary, for the ensuing year.

June 7, 1897—Gave consent to the establishment of a Mission of the Church of the Ascension, to be located in that part of St. Louis known as De Hodiamont.

Received notice from the Bishop of the Diocese that the Standing Committee was authorized to act as the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese of Missouri, in accordance with the provisions of Canon 19, Section 12, Title I. of the Digest.

June 24, 1897—Acting as the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese, appointed Mr. Geo. H. Morton a Lay Reader.

July 16, 1897—Consented to the consecration of the Rev. Robert Atkinson Gibson as Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of Virginia.

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September 20, 1897—Consented to the consecration of the Rev. Chauncy Bunce Brewster, D. D., as Bishop-Coadjutor of Connecticut.

Gave consent to the shortening of the time for the ordination to the Priesthood of the Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, and recommended him to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

FIFTY-NINTH CONVENTION.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

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The Nation is engaged in war. Upon her requisition life and treasure are offered unstintedly to the supply of all her need. It is well. God be thanked. Order is Heaven's first law. It is earth's great need. To secure it there are "powers that be." And they are ordained of God. Christian men may, therefore, not count the Nation as outside of the Divine Institutions. Loyalty to God and love and devotion to the Savior may well include, and should never be thought of as excluding, loyalty to the flag, and love and devotion to the country. The message of peace, with which the Church is charged, may not be counted as opposed to the message of war when the Nation lifts the sword for order and justice, in unselfishness and mercy, for the protection of human rights and lives.

But there must be no room for any such utterance as "inter arma silet ecclesia." Shall not love and life, devotion and treasure, be poured out for God's work for souls in the Church, as well as for God's work for order and justice in the Nation? Christian men and women, what kind of soldiers of Christ are we, when His calls come for enlistment and for giving and for self-sacrifice, if we get tired of them or resent them and are ready to cry out—When will these tiresome calls cease? What shall put an end to their leech-like demands? Why, in decency, are they not stopped?

Ah, if we Christians are made of stuff worth anything, we, too, are enlisted in a war. War against self, sin, Satan; against heathenism, ignorance, rebellion. And it is a war that does not let up. The Church here, by her name Militant, proclaims, it is not to let up. Calls for love, toil, life,—for giving, treasure, self-sacrifice—will not cease. They are always to con-

tinue. When one requisition is met, another is sure to come on. If we are warmly alive, and if we realize that the Church is actively alive in working and fighting, we will try to respond loyally and cheerily, without resentment, and without getting tired, counting it honor and joy to stand by the Master, to suffer with the Master, to give for the Master, to tread, though afar off, in the footsteps of the Master in endurance of hardness and unflinching practice of self-sacrifice.

Gathering together annually to grasp hands and look in each other's faces, we cannot but note how the years come and go. And men come and go. And, as Bishop, I may well consider thoughtfully, Bishops come and go. Four have gone throughout the past year.

Bishop Newton, the Bishop Coadjutor of Virginia, I did not know well. I met him only in the House of Bishops. He seemed to me a rare combination of gentleness and firmness, of holiness and practical sense, of sweetness of character and efficiency of executive action in the difficult labors given into his hands during his three years of a Bishop's life.

Bishop Rulison, of Central Pennsylvania, was my immediate successor, in 1867, in the pastorship of the country Parish of Morris, Oteego Co., N. Y., from which I went to be Bishop of Montana. On my home-coming as Missionary Bishop, I visited him there. All of us felt, when he was summoned forth from the hamlet nestling among the hills, that he was going for fuller, larger, and higher duties in the Church. So it proved, in his Rectorship in Jersey City and in Cleveland, and then in his call to the Episcopate. A good scholar, a true gentleman, a superior preacher, a loyal, yet always loving, Churchman, a wise administrator, a most helpful member of the House of Bishops, he stood up, uncomplainingly, for thirteen years under the hard service entailed by the missionary character of his large Diocese; and with the same uncomplainingness, though worn and weary, met death and rest, when in quest of restoration to health, in a foreign land.

Bishop Quintard, of Tennessee, was not unknown to us. He had visited Missouri. Soldierly boldness, the tenderest loving heartedness, and a bright and sunny temper of inextinguishable hopefulness were his characteristics. He was Bishop for more than thirty-three years. Of all our one hundred and eighty-five Bishops, only seventeen, besides him, have been spared for an Episcopal service of that duration.

Bishop Perry, of Iowa, died in the harness only a few days since. On Sunday he preached most earnestly and forcibly in Dubuque. On Monday he visited a Mission Station in the country near for confirmation. Returning to his host's house in Dubuque on Tuesday, he was prostrated there on Wednesday and died on Friday. His was a quick translation. He was the most eminent historian among the Bishops. His industry in delving for and acquiring historic knowledge, especially touching American Church History, was prodigious. His library is one of the richest in Americana anywhere to be found. He was a Bishop for twenty-two years. To few men has the day of rest come after more years of unceasing and fruitful activity.

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Since I was consecrated, sixty-three Bishops of our American Church have died. The counting of those fallen out of the ranks year by year is as tolling bells to me. Sweet, harmonious, restful; but also suggestive, exhorting, warning. The Master is coming. He saith to thee and to all—Watch.

The Rev. Dr. Wm. S. Langford has been called from the Church Militant to the Church Expectant. Suddenly his summons came. For more than eleven years he had faithfully carried the burden of the direction of the work of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church. Such burdens wear and weary. But they must be borne. And for Christ's sake, and for the sake of souls, they are cheerfully borne. This cheerful burdenbearing was a marked characteristic of Dr. Langford's official career. It is sad to lose so true a soldier and servant out from our ranks. But we are glad for the inspiring influence of his courageous life.

In the Diocese death has made vacant places. Not among the Clergy, but among the faithful men and women, soldiers in the Church Militant. Mr. W. H. Glasgow, of St. Louis; Capt. James H. Rollins, of Columbia; John Percival and S. H. Hewlett, of Old Orchard; Capt. J. W. Bankhead, of Prairieville, of illustrious Virginia birth; Mrs. E. D. Ake, of Ironton, and Mrs. W. H. Woodward, of St. Louis; the loss to the Diocese in the going away of these is a severe one; the gain to them is blessed, and we thank God that they lived for Him among us.

It seems not unfit to acknowledge, with the warm gratefulness of my heart to all the kind friends concerned, the generous gift of \$1,820.00, placed in my hands last summer, that I might go over the Atlantic to attend the Lambeth Conference. To be there was most instructive and helpful to me; and afterwards I was enabled to add an interesting and educating sojourn in the City of Rome and other parts of Continental Europe.

Our own American Bishops were only forty-eight of the one hundred and ninety-four present at the Lambeth Conference. But I beg leave to state that I cannot imagine any gathered body of men in which one-fourth of the assembly could be treated more fairly and kindly by the other three-fourths than we were by our English and Colonial Brethren.

Plain words were uttered. It was put beyond a doubt that any thought of placing the American Church in the slightest degree under the controlling direction of the See of Canterbury could not be entertained. It was interesting to note that the Colonial Bishops, as well as the Irish Bishops and the Scotch Bishops, were quite in line with us in resisting suggestions looking to the aggrandizement of the See of Canterbury at the expense of other Sees. And it was quite as interesting to note how the present Archbishop of Canterbury, though sturdy to maintain all his just rights and ancient prerogatives, evidently is free from any ambition to form plans or push claims for extension of deference to his official primacy. We may possess our souls in peace. There is no plot brewing, I think, for making another pope of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Church of England entertains, it seems to me, the heartiest sort of respect and good will for our own Church, yet not coupled

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Wise, then, it is for us, I submit, to bethink ourselves where we are and what we are set to do. We are in America. We want to win the American people. Not for selfish aggrandizement. But because we honestly think we have the best, and the most ancient and tried, of rounded, balanced, Christian truth to give to them. In commending our rounded truth to Americans, is it not altogether wise to avail ourselves of the love of home ways and the loyalty of home things, which are characteristic of our people? In terms of nomenclature, and in usages of Church worship, there is, I sometimes fear, an overeagerness for imitation of what is English. It is practical wisdom for us, I feel deeply convinced, to keep to the American spirit, to preserve the American flavor, to take on the American investiture, in our ways of doing Church work. Simply because we want to win and do good to the American people.

The time is at hand for our Prayer Book Church to cease to consider herself, or to allow herself to be considered by others, an exotic. Welcomed, housed, homed, let her be, as an American plant—deeply rooted and robustly growing. The American Church for the American people. But let her be the thing first, and let the name come naturally afterward. If we grasp for the name first and assume it, while English in air and habit and make up, and outreaching, Americans will be quick to mark the futility and laugh at the incongruity of the assumption. I long for the day when this Prayer Book Church of ours, rooted and grounded as she is in truth and stability, shall, with the widest charity and readiest flexibility, commend herself to all who love the Lord Jesus Christ; shall give herself leave with warm zeal to follow in the wake of the first and greatest Missionary Bishop, St. Paul, to be made all things to all men that she may by all means save some; specially to be made an American thing that she might win and save Americans.

With all her splendid powers of organization and self-sacrifice, the Roman Catholic Church of America finds herself greatly handicapped in work among Americans, by the deference demanded of her to the sovereignty of a foreign ecclesiastic; and the seriousness of the handicap presses more and more as the years go on. Shall we not take pains, then, to keep our own Church free from any such sort of burdening drag? And in the important work of commending her to Americans, is it not plain, practical wisdom to avoid whatever in her talk or dress or ways of worship may be reasonably styled anti-American or un-American?

The State is making history in these days. And great and fast are her strides in the making. On the chess-board of the world's movements the American nation is set down by the logic of events to be a more important piece than ever she has been before. By her side, at her back—nay, in her heart and in close touch to her conscience—we humbly, not arrogantly, want the Church to be, to guide her in the right and inspire her for duty. But the Church must be American to do much of that sort of work, wide in her welcome, deep in her love, generous in her allowance making, robust in

her methods, patriotic in her efforts, patient in her temper, not permitting herself to think of herself, or others to think of her, as an exotic plant, a Pharisaic sect, a nice, genteel, exclusive, self-satisfied club of excellent, æsthetic religionists.

In the outlook upon the allotted work of the Church Militant which we, in this Diocese, are set to do, I venture to think we need not lose heart or courage. The prospect is one of shadows as well as lights, I know. But this is true of all things of earth, and must be expected in the case of the Church Militant, which is on earth and has to do with the things of earth.

Here are some of the shadows. Sickness severe, prostrating, protracted, has seized upon more than one of our faithful pastors, laying them more or less aside from active prosecution of their work, and plunging their parishes and flocks into the depths of anxious discouragement. The Diocese is a family. The Parishes are members. If one member suffers, all suffer. Hence there has come to the Diocese loss of hope and vigor, and somewhat of doubt and embarrassment, touching healthy finances and earnest forward movements. So close is the interdependence of the Diocese and its constituency of Parishes, that if the life blood of either is attenuated or spilled, the other grows faint at once from the grievous loss.

At Columbia, the Church has been burned. At St. Mark's, St. Louis, the Church has been torn down to make room for the encroachments of business. Six Parishes are vacant, and two of them seem not to be able to gather themselves together in strength enough to secure pastors. St. Timothy's, St. Louis, has died out of existence and is stricken from our list. St. Mark's School, Portland, has experienced to the full the sore difficulties besetting the maintenance of schools, and has decided it wise to close its doors. The women of our Auxiliary find it pinchingly hard work to secure enough subscriptions of fifty cents per month, or six dollars per year, to meet the \$1,000.00 of necessary expenses at St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis, for janitor, fuel, light, water tax, etc. The amount pledged for Diocesan Missions this last year was only \$3,293.00, being \$437.00 less than for the preceding year, while the Missionary needs of the Diocese are many and urgent. Nine Parishes of the Diocese, six of them in St. Louis, and three in the country, failed either to pledge anything or to give anything for Diocesan Missions for this last year.

May I be permitted to say, that this is a kind of failure that I find myself at a loss to understand? In Canon XX., of the Canons of the Diocese, occur these words, "Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the Congregations of this Diocese * * * * in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August and September."

This law is obeyed in spirit, I take it, when a Parish makes its pledge in Convention and pays the pledge during the year. But if it does not do this, what other way has it to clear itself from the charge of disobedience, than to make its offerings for Domestic Missions on the four specified months of the year? How is the fact that *nine* Parishes neither make pledges nor send in offerings for the year to be explained? We may not, I think, charge upon them that wilfully and determinedly they mean flatly to disobey the plain

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st are her ments the important ay, in her rrogantly, for duty, k, wide in robust in law of the Diocese which they themselves helped to enact. Probably they do not think about it. Perhaps they have not had their attention called to it. Therefore, I may be allowed to put before the Clergy and Parishes this plain statement, that whatever Parish does not either make its pledge for Diocesan Missions, or send its offerings four times a year for the same, is disobeying the law.

At a time when in civil and military affairs, loyalty and obedience and self-sacrifice warm our hearts and fire our zeal and nerve our wills, it is not possible, I hope, for us in Church affairs to be disloyal, indifferent, disobedient,

self-indulgent.

To keep up the present Missionary work in the Diocese in a decent and healthy condition for the coming year will require \$4,775.00. Besides, \$350.00 are likely to be needed for places not now occupied. If the Board of Managers in New York kindly continue their allowance of \$1,000.00 to us, we still urgently need \$4,125.00 in pledges at this Convention for the support of our Diocesan Board of Missions.

But there are lights as well as shadows, and some of the shadows are

themselves quite effaced by the light shining through them.

Calvary, Columbia, means to rebuild in a better location and a nobler fashion. St. Mark's, St. Louis, is rebuilding near its former site, and when finished will have the debt resting upon it a good deal diminished from what it was before. St. Peter's, St. Louis, is making a praiseworthy effort to clear itself, and even if it do not entirely succeed, will, at any rate, get a considerable portion of its debt sunk out of sight. It is a pleasure to recite that St. James', St. Louis, and the Cathedral, and Emmanuel, Old Orchard, have freed themselves this year.

Of the *fifty* Parishes of the Diocese which have property or belongings, twenty-eight are in the country, and twenty-two in St. Louis. Of the twenty-eight in the country, three only are in debt. Of the twenty-two in St. Louis, twelve are in debt. The sombreness of shadow seems to fall upon the city.

Cheerful predominance of light shines in from the country.

Holy Innocents', St. Louis, has appended the very desirable addition of a Guild room, at a cost of \$700.00, and has paid for it. Jefferson City is moving to build a new edifice which shall serve to present the Church in a decent and reverent way in the important Capital City of our Commonwealth. Our cordial congratulations and best wishes go with the pastor and people, though one cannot but be thoughtful and sad that the historic Church of Jefferson City, the oldest in the Diocese, erected in 1842, is to be abandoned. Clarksville is preparing to change the location of its Church. It has been situated on the outskirts of the town, and now the people are going to move into the centre. Mt. Calvary and St. John's, in St. Louis, though hard smitten by the cyclone, have never thought of succumbing, and are here in force, cheerily ready to meet the greetings of us all. St. Philip's, St. Louis, though yet an infant, is sturdily growing, and at the present rate bids fair soon to outgrow swathing bands. Under the wise and unselfish care of the Rev. Mr. Elmer, St. Paul's, St. Louis, is getting on its feet for a healthy

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parochial life. In the important town, Kirksville, the seat of one Normal School, after a vacancy of several years, we have now an earnest pastor at work. In Cape Girardeau, the seat of another Normal School, the people have generously subscribed a salary and are now on the lookout for a faithful clergyman. St. Luke's Hospital has been quite filled to the full with patients; and in healings, and charities, and her Training School for Nurses, has trodden steadily her path of beneficent activity. Bishop Robertson Hall has registered a larger list of pupils than usual this last year. Though handicapped by a burdensome debt, it has met its interest and, under the care of the faithful Sisters, does not bate one jot of its efficient and loving work. The women of the Church have the management of the Orphans' Home, and they keep it out of debt and are taking care of nearly a hundred little waifs. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew, in a multitude of ways known and unknown, is injecting virility and evoking spiritual earnestness in the work which men are doing for the Church. The number of Confirmations in the Diocese has been much larger than that of last year-594 as against 387. Such an aggregate may be taken, I think, as a sound indication of honest, widespread, deepening, spiritual growth.

When we turn to Missions, there is so much light to cheer that the shadows cannot be permitted to have their way in making discouragement.

In the year we have had twenty-one Diocesan Missionaries in service, and have never failed to pay them their stipends in full every quarter day. We have given \$2,712.48 for Domestic and Foreign Missions; and of the fifty-eight Dioceses only twenty are ahead of us in this line of giving. Most of these twenty are the New York, the New Jersey, the Pennsylvania, and the New England Dioceses. Of others, only Chicago, Georgia, Michigan, Minnesota, and Southern Ohio are ahead of us. We have fifty-six Parishes and Mission Stations, all told. All of these, except four (one in St. Louis and three in the country), gave for General Missions. Our percentage of giving Parishes is the largest of all the Dioceses except Easton and Oregon. The children of our Sunday Schools, in their Lenten Offerings for Missions, gave this year over \$1,500.00; an increase of nearly thirty-three per cent above the amount of last year. The Woman's Auxiliary have given \$3,386.07 in money, and \$1,364.28 in garments, total, \$4,750.35. This is somewhat of an advance for the year, spite of the pressure of adverse circumstances, many and great. More than \$1,000.00 has been provided for the Christ-like care of the sick and poor in the City Hospital. St. Stephen's House, Memorial, for St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis, a most suitable and useful spiritual power house has been erected at an expense of \$15,916.89 for building, and \$3,760.73 for furnishing, total, \$19,677.62, and the means are in hand to ensure that no debt is left upon it.

I want to stop to voice my special thanks for all that has been done and is doing for St. Stephen's.

Soon after I came among you as Bishop, the members of a former "City Missions" organization conferred with me. Out of the conference grew the

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resolve to call to the work the Rev. R. W. E. Greene. He came and started it faithfully and well. When we were casting about concerning the housing of the work, we thought a suitable plant would cost about \$15,000.00. A generous man said, I will give \$1,000.00 when my gift will make up the \$15,000.00. (Lately he paid in his pledge with expressions of pleasure at the gratifying result secured.) So, with pastoral care of a clergyman and with efforts to get funds for building, we went on. It was found wise to disband the old "City Missions" organization, and to give up efforts to secure special gifts for the sustentation of St. Stephen's. All agreed that it was better to have St. Stephen's, like other missionary enterprises, under the one authoritative Board of Diocesan Missions. So we changed; and of late years the Diocesan Board has had full control, and there has been no special department of effort for securing sustentation of St. Stephen's. But, for several years, the \$1,000.00 for the necessary current expenses of St. Stephen's, other than the salary of the pastor, have been kindly provided by the Woman's Auxiliary. My heart has been warmly grateful for this most timely aid. Such provision is a wonderful relief to me from anxiety. The Diocesan Board cannot furnish the \$1,000.00. The St. Stephen's people are not able to furnish it. Their total offerings last year amounted only to \$578.03; and that, to one who knows them and their circumstances, seems, indeed, a generous amount. Any one can see special reason for my thankful heart. If the Woman's Auxiliary were not to provide this \$1,000.00, as burdens in last resort fall back on the shoulders of the Bishop, that amount would necessarily be added to my anxieties, already not a few. It has been a great comfort to be thus helped by the Auxiliary. The women and I have tried to distribute the burden and privilege of this standing by the work of St. Stephen's, so that all, at least all in and near the city, might feel a loving interest in it. We thought if each Parish would be responsible to us for a certain sum, and would make effort to secure that sum by asking individuals for fifty cents per month, or six dollars per year, for this special object, the desired distribution would be secured. But we would gladly adopt any other better method that may be suggested to us. Of course no solicitors or Parish representatives should permit themselves to enter any Parish to ask for such subscriptions without the cordial consent and approval of the Rector. not enter the earnest plea with the city and suburban Rectors, that they will, unless they have grave reason to withhold it, give their consent and concurrent good will and help towards such a distribution and provision of the \$1,000.00 as I have outlined. I cannot but think, dear brethren of the Clergy, and dear friends all, that if you will visit St. Stephen's and see the members of the congregation, four hundred Sunday School and Sewing School children, and learn of the thirty-five confirmed, and of the hundred and more communicants, and of the blessed Christian work going on there all the days of the week, not the least of which is that led and promoted by Miss Skinker, who makes her home in the midst of it, you would say from the heart, this is God's work, this is Christ's work, put into the hands of the Diocese of Missouri and its Bishop and the City of St. Louis to do. I want to help it. I must help it. Count me in, steadily, I pray you, in the helping.

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The children of the "Missionary Host" unflaggingly keep step in their line of soldierly duty. They are to have their day of Parade and Inspection at Exposition Hall next Sunday. Come and see them. My heart never ceases to be warmly and lovingly grateful to them. It is they who are helping to put St Philip's Mission on its feet; and to succor and sustain All Saint's Church on its march; and to supply rations for other portions of the Diocesan army which, without them, would be left in a weak and unsupported condition.

The Church News is getting venerable. It is the oldest Diocesan paper in our American Church. Yet, though a veteran in years, it is vigorous in freshness of life and hope. This year—extraordinary recital this for a Diocesan paper—it almost paid its own way. It did supplicate from the Clergy a small portion of alms; but on receiving it, pursed itself up proud, presenting a clean balance and a shining face. Of the *impedimenta* of the Diocesan army the Church News must, I think, be counted in as a necessary part. The Diocese without it would be a quartermaster without his journal and ledger; an adjutant without statutes and orders; a regiment without a chaplain's helpful and hortatory exercises.

The "Bishop's Purse" has received \$3,934.16, and disbursed \$4,028.19. All machinery needs to be oiled. The better the machine for doing skilled and delicate work, the more care needs be taken for its oiling. Else, neglected, it becomes hot, dry, clogged, creaking, friction-wearing, out of gear, smashed. The Diocese is a machine. The Bishop's Purse is oil. I thank you all most heartily that the engineer's supply can holds out.

With all these lights turned on, where are the shadows now? Gone as if before a rising May sun.

In a valuable Report of a Committee on Church Halls, rendered to the last Convention, a resolution was embodied, which was adopted by the Convention, requesting the Bishop "to give the matter his careful consideration, and to take such steps as may, in his judgment, be expedient to further this plan." In compliance with this request, I have been in communication with President Jesse, of the State University at Columbia. The President and Curators say they will heartily welcome the erection of a Church Hall near the University. We think a suitable structure could be built for \$10,000.00. We think, also, an endowment of \$15,000.00 would permanently suffice for heat, light, insurance, repairs, etc. In providing a learned ministry—I think all will agree that our ministry must be learned—I do not know how \$25,000.00 could be put to better use than in furnishing a Church Hall, which, as an adjunct to a University, could place its occupants in a way to avail themselves for training of all the concentrated and stored intellectual forces of that University. Just now I see nothing for it but to wait for some one to give the \$25,000.00.

It is a general Canon of the Church which obliges me and my brother Bishops to present Addresses to our Annual Diocesan Conventions. If we marshall facts and count out figures to you, it is not for the purpose of finding ground for boasting, and by no means for making and welcoming reasons for fault-finding. It is, to furnish plain information; and information among thinking people is ever the fit and wise precursor to intelligent action. I can not but wonder why the Rector of every Parish does not do-because it is wise to do it—what the Bishop of every Diocese does, because he is obliged to do it. Experience and observation convince me that if every Rector would fix on one Sunday of the year as an Annual Sunday-I think in this Diocese the first Sunday in May would be the best one to choose—and on that Sunday in his Annual Sermon would plainly sum up before his flock the facts and figures about pastoral work, and Parish finances, and missionary gifts, the practice would have a delightfully direct and appreciable influence in clearing away fogs of wonderment, and promoting healthy parochial vigor. In such a sermon, too, hints and directions, somewhat beneath the dignity, perhaps, of the set theological discourse, and warm-forged and light-winged to strike home better than even the Church News could shoot them, might be wisely emitted and would be kindly received.

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If an Annual Address in each Diocese is worth anything, why should not an Annual Sermon in each Parish be worth something? It is a counting up of experiences. It is a laying by for history. It is taking stock of goods on hand. It is marking off losses endured. It is closing the record of a year's work done, honest and busy work may be, yet much blotted and soiled in the doing. It is opening a new book of entry for the new year come.

Dear brethren all, the Diocese is to us a mother. May I not say for us all, we want to be loyal to her and to love her? Her honor is in our keeping. Her weakness, wheresoever or in whatsoever it may appear, is an appeal to us for succor. We are gathered to listen to the story of her annals, and to take counsel for her future. To try to amend what may be amiss. To rouse up and urge onward, if aught is laggard and loitering. To keep her good name untarnished. To preserve her Militant life in vigor and efficiency. To greet her with pride. To hold her up with strength. To hand her on to the front with chivalrous devotion. She is our mother.

God mercifully guide us and lovingly help us in the doing of our filial duty to her!

This, with cash on hand (\$207.41), makes available \$1,669.41 if all can be collected, with which to meet liabilities due June 1st, amounting to \$1,700. The most of this indebtedness is due from three city Parishes.

With this condition confronting us, your Committee begs to suggest that an effort be made to increase the Permanent Fund, for support of the Episcopate, from its present account (\$6,100), to say \$20,000; this accomplished, we would have an income from that source of at least \$1,000, which would annually more than meet the above deficiency, leaving a balance, which would enable the Committee on Assessments to render relief in quarters where the present assessments are considered onerous.

In conclusion, your Committee would offer the following:

Resolved, That the Committee on Assessments be instructed to make an equitable assessment on the several Parishes and Missions of the Diocese amounting to the total sum of \$6,675, to meet the requirements above enumerated.

It is with pleasure that the Board reports the completion of St. Stephen's Mission House.

At its meeting on June 2, 1897, a Building Committee was appointed, consisting of Mr. J. B. Gazzam, Chairman; Mr. Geo. D. Barnard, Mr. Anthony Furniss, Rev. G. Tuckerman, and Rev. Edmund Duckworth, who were given authority to proceed with the erection of the building, at a cost, when completed, not to exceed \$16,000. The faithful and energetic work of this committee is worthy of much praise, and is certainly greatly appreciated. Notwithstanding an unexpecied expenditure of \$1,598.50, the committee completed the building at a cost of \$15,916.89, and in addition to this sum (which was paid from the Treasury of the Board), raised from sources other than those from which the Board received its gifts, the sum of \$3,360.73, which it used in fitting and furnishing the house, and the committee is still prepared to spend \$400 more.

Nor can the Board leave this subject without extending its grateful thanks to those, who, actuated by a love for their Master and His poor, enriched the Treasury with their free will offerings, so that this work could be accomplished.

In relation to the resolution offered by Rev. Mr. Miller, at the last Convention, "that the pledges and funds for the salary of the minister of St. Stephen's Mission be kept separate from the pledge and funds for Diocesan Missions," which was referred to the Board by the Convention, the Board respectfully reports, that after a careful examination of the questions involved in such a resolution, it would, in its opinion, be inexpedient to adopt the same at this time.

Finally, the Board is constrained to remind the Convention that it will require the sum of \$4,125 to keep in operation for the next year, the missionary work of the

Diocese; and begs pardon for calling its attention, and especially the attention of the Clergy of those Parishes and Missions that make no pledge in the Convention, to Section 11, of Canon IX., which says:

"Every Clergyman shall, on at least on one Sunday in each year, hold a service in which the subject of Missions in the Diocese shall be distinctly set forth, and such information be given as may quicken the interest in this work."

Report of Secretary of Totoman's Auxiliary.

To the Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, S. T. D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Another year I have the honor to report to you the Missionary work of the Diocese of Missouri.

For seventeen years the women of Missouri have carried on the organized work in our Diocese. The growth has been slow, perhaps, but steady. There has never been a backward step. Once or twice some special gift has augmented our treasury, but the Parish work has been a steady, quiet growth. We had misgivings this year

that the peculiar trials that sickness has brought to many of our Parishes would lessen our gifts, and there have been no large gifts, \$100 being the largest, but the success of systematic effort has been proved. Aside from the cyclone fund, for which we made a special report, our gifts are about \$100 in excess of last year.

Three general Missions Classes have been held this year. We aim now to keep abreast with Missionary and Church intelligence through this channel.

Thirty visits have been made and talks given at Missionary Teas by those who had papers at the classes.

In January last we saw our cherished hope realized in the permanent home for St. Stephen's Mission. Our mid-winter meeting was held there, and we had a little glimpse of what its usefulness can be in its enlarged quarters; but it will take much money to carry it on, and our \$1,000 is needed more to-day, than when St. Stephen's was in small rented rooms.

At the request of the Rural Dean, the Secretary attended the Convocation at Hannibal, in April, and continued her Missionary journey to Palmyra, Monroe, and Louisiana. Each of these places is bravely working for the Auxiliary, in spite of home needs pressing heavily.

We have made many hearts happy in repairing the little Church of the Holy Comforter at Montgomery City, which, after being closed two years, is now to be reopened. We have aided also the good work at Oak Hill, by contributing \$186 towards building a much needed Guild room.

It is with deep regret that we record for the last time the Bishop Robertson Scholarship, which was begun twelve years ago by a graduate of Bishop Robertson Hall, our former Vice-President, Mrs. Cushing, and has been sustained by the Alumnae for some years. It has given five young women the opportunity to make themselves self-supporting, and it has kept a name before us, which should be dear to every Church woman in Missouri. We earnestly hope that the Alumnae may see fit to take up this work again.

Our gifts have gone into every branch of Auxiliary work. Alaska, Mexico, the Indian, the Negro, our Missionary Jurisdictions, our own Diocese, as well as the lands beyond the sea, have been aided by the women of Missouri.

Much of this has come from the intelligence born of Auxiliary teaching; much more from the prayers which our women offer daily for the coming of the Kingdom. To our individual prayers we may trust that an added blessing is given in the intercessions for Missions which are offered daily at noon at the Cathedral.

APPENDIX No. 14 A.

Report of the Chaptain of St. Luke's Yospital.

It is a great privilege to me to present to this Convention of representative Churchmen of the Diocese, a report of some of the things that indicate the value of St. Luke's Hospital to this community in particular, and, as a great charitable work with underlying Christian foundations, to all Christian people in Missouri and the Southwest. It has no name except that of the apostle-physician who followed Christ. It knows no creed when suffering is to be lessened. It is here—if God wills—to save the body as much as may be; and to bring strength out of weakness, and hope out of despair. It will always stand as a protest against the selfishness that calls no man neighbor, except as he ministers to his wants or desires; and puts aside the wounded and stricken with the cruel plea of the "survival of the fittest."

This report will present unto you certain statistics gathered from the Hospital records; but they cannot tell you of the countless little things that make poor and rich alike go out with blessings on their lips for the sweet ministry of care and nursing which they found within the walls of old St. Luke's.

Nor will it tell you of commendation wrung from unwilling lips, and the acknowledgment of a very high standing in all that makes for the saving of human life. If you could only look behind the figures, if you could daily watch the work itself, if you could see the care, the watchfulness, the scientific cleanly dressings, the sympathetic nursing, the absolute faithfulness from the chief of the staff to the newest nurse—you would begin to value St. Luke's, and begin, perhaps, to help it extend its work.

The year just gone by has exceeded its predecessor in good works. It has been a good year, so far as service is concerned, in the Hospital annals, and I am glad to tell the story.

The total number of patients was 490, with a total number of days of 11,558 beginning with 851 days in May, 1897, and ending with 1,123 days in April, 1898. There were 117 free patients, 3,897 days in the Hospital, with 54 free operations, and enjoying the privilege of 292½ special nursing days. All of these figures exceed those of last year.

The religious creeds, as given on entrance, were as follows:

Churchmen, 97; Roman Catholics, 54; Presbyterians, 71; Baptists, 24; Methodists, 55; Congregationalists, 15; Lutherans, 27; Unitarians, 3; Evangelical, 9; Jews, 12; Salvation Army, 2; "Christians," 25; no professed faith, 96.

The seventh annual graduating exercises of the Training School were held in St. Luke's Chapel, May 4, 1898, and nine nurses received diplomas at the hands of the Bishop. In this connection I desire to say that there is no training school in this city that stands so well with the best surgeons and physicians as St. Luke's; and it is to be hoped that Church people will appreciate this fact in the future, as they do not appear to have done in the past, judging by their employment of graduates of other schools.

The ladies of the Giving Tuesday Association have continued their good work, and hopefully look forward to a large extension of it.

The Chaplain has always had his way made smooth in his work, by the courtesy and kindness of those associated with the Hospital, and especially by the Superintendent, Mrs. G. M. Gibson, who not only governs the household well, but by her Christian example helps to form the character of those specially committed to her charge.

In conclusion, I desire to state that the Hospital has been full nearly all the year; but as it has only fifty beds, its opportunities for usefulness are limited; and, further, that dozens of patients have been turned away because there was no room for them, or because their nervous condition prevented them from being brought into such a noisy neighborhood as that of St. Luke's.

Why not make this a greater work than ever? Why shall not St. Luke's have a new and larger home, a quiet location, and added means of usefulness?

Why shall it not be the greatest and best Hospital in the Mississippi Valley, doing its grand work when we have passed away, and standing ever as a monument of Christian love for the wounded and the sick? I leave you, dear brethren, to help us answer these questions.

APPENDIX No. 16.

Report of Standing Committee on Missions.

Your Standing Committee on Missions submit their Annual Report:

In looking over the magnificent mission field of this Diocese, the magnitude of the work and the smallness of the provision made for carrying it on, we are led to wonder whether this Church is to be honored with any visible share in the conquest of Missouri for Christ. If we dared take a pessimistic view of the prospects of the kingdom in any place at any time, there might appear to be reason for doing so here and at this time, did we not recognize that the effort, the battle, the defense of the post is ours; the results are the King's, who has assured us of the victory. The chief question is, are we in earnest in the fight, are we using our intelligence, our means, as we ought to do in this campaign? We fear that, from one cause or another, some of them our own fault, some of them possibly the fault of circumstances for which we are more or less responsible, our efforts are not as earnest, our provision for the campaign not as liberal, nor our management as effective, as might be.

It may be well for us to look at the conditions under which the great part of our missionary effort in this Diocese is carried on. Shortly stated, it may be said, that it is by the individual efforts of the isolated clergyman, working alone, in a district usually too large for any one man to care for. Such efforts are necessarily feeble, and when spread over so much ground the fruits of the missionary's labors cannot always be gathered in and saved for the Church. There is little or no growth. The lonely toiler becomes discouraged, and anxious for a change. The personnel of our missionary staff is, in consequence, in a constant state of change. We meet our missionary at an annual convention and hardly dare hope to meet him again. Such

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ters of Conver methods do not inspire confidence in, much less enthusiasm for, missionary work; and it may be the highest wisdom to return to the old ways—ways which have been tried and approved. From the days of the apostles and other early missionaries, men have been sent out two and two, or in companies. The strength and re-enforcement to be gained from companionship, mutual incitement to good works, mutual help, counsel, sustainment and cheer, are recognized by such an arrangement. Such a system might be profitably tried in the Diocese of Missouri.

There are, for instance, strong, well-ordered and self-sustaining parishes situated in the center of promising mission districts. The priests in charge of such parishes can not give regular services to outlying mission stations in such districts to the neglect of their own parishes. But, give such clergymen one or more helpers, deacons, theological students or lay readers, and they can maintain the services of the Church in several mission stations convenient to their parishes. There are, again, towns which, although not strong enough to maintain a clergyman, yet, by reason of their central position on railroads, are natural centers for missionary work, not only in these but in important towns in adjoining counties. It might be advantageous to establish a mission house in such a place in charge of an experienced priest, with one or two assistants of the kind suggested above, with whose aid the Church may be firmly established in the central town and planted in many adjacent towns and villages, and the services and offices of the Church regularly and systematically maintained through a wide district. There are several such parishes and railroad towns in Missouri that naturally suggest themselves as such missionary centers, and, in your Committee's opinion, work could be more systematically and continuously and effectively done from such mission centers than by scattering a few clergy in isolated spots and leave them to sink or swim alone. Perhaps we do well to be chary of experiments, but the application of well-tried methods is not experimental in any dangerous

It is true we are somewhat hampered by a lack of resources; but it is not certain that the system proposed would require larger resources than the present system, and it is also true that we do not know the full measure of our resources, until we draw upon them for the actual necessities of the work. The recent history of this very Cathedral shows that when there is any real work going on, there is forthcoming the means to carry it on.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that, as soon as possible, strong centers of missionary work be established outside of the City of St. Louis, under the care of tried and faithful priests, with such helpers, clerical or lay, as may be obtainable; and that this work be amply sustained by the Missionary Board. In this way the missionary work of the Church would be greatly strengthened, and some men whose energies and abilities would be of special value in the work of the Diocese may probably be assisted into the ranks of the ministry. In conformity with this recommendation, your Committee offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the recommendation of this report for the strengthening of centers of missionary work in this Diocese outside of St. Louis have the approval of this Convention, and are commended to the Missionary Board of the Diocese for their consideration, and for carrying same into effect if found practicable.

Report of the Secnetary of the Orphans' Yome.

EASTER TUESDAY, 1898.

To the Rt. Rev. Bishop of the Diocese, clergy, managers, friends and patrons of the Protestant Episcopal Orphans' Home, I herewith beg to submit the following report for the past year:

The resignations of Mrs. Needham as Treasurer, and Mrs. Harrison as Secretary, were tendered to take effect at a called meeting of the Association, the second of September, 1897. Resolutions expressing the esteem and appreciation of the Board for eleven years of faithful and efficient service as Treasurer were signed by all present and presented to Mrs. Needham.

On September 23, 1897, at a called meeting of the Association, Mrs. Edwin Harrison was elected Treasurer, and Mrs. Henry G. Isaacs, Secretary.

There has been a change of Matrons; our present Matron, Mrs. Ford, being installed on June 15, 1897. Miss Thompson continues her services as teacher.

During the winter the Board met with a sad loss in the death of Mrs. W. H. Woodward, one of our most devoted managers.

There has been an amendment of the By-Laws. In Article II., Section 2, it is now provided that there shall be five members of the Clothing Committee instead of three.

I am happy to announce the establishment of a kindergarten in the Home, which has met with unbounded success. There are sixteen little ones receiving its benefit and enjoying its delights. It is an imperative necessity to make an appeal to the friends of the orphans to furnish a fund sufficiently large to erect additional accommodations for the kindergarten and nursery, the present quarters being lamentably deficient. Can we not rouse enough enthusiasm among our friends to obtain this great need of our institution?

During the past year the bequest of Mr. Dwight Durkee of \$500 was paid over to the treasurer and has been invested in reliable security. Prayer books and hymnals were received from the Bible House in New York, as a gift, through the goodness of Mrs. Robert. Through the kindness of Mrs. Marshall, vehicles were furnished to take all the children for a drive through the parks last mid-summer.

During the entire existence of the Home there has been no year in which the children have enjoyed themselves during Christmastide as they have during the one just past. In addition to their usual Christmas tree at their own home they were invited and entertained by the Sunday School of St. Peter's Church, and also enjoyed the hospitality of Mrs. Thomson. On Christmas Eve the Home was visited by a former inmate, who brought his wife and children to see his former happy home. They did not leave empty-handed. The evident appreciation of this former inmate ought to be a subject of encouragement to the management, and to spur us on to do all we can for the future.

It is with deep regret that I have to announce to you the decrease in number and amount of subscriptions during the past year. Hard times have no doubt to account for this. We have, however, to thank our very many and generous friends for their continued and unvaried support.

A conference, consisting of managers and officers of eight Orphan Asylums of this city, was held February 15, 1898, its object being to compare the position of each home with that of its neighbor. Our Home received much benefit.

Washington's birthday was most loyally observed at the Home. A very beautiful entertainment was arranged by Mrs. Ford, the matron, and Miss Thompson, the teacher, the children evincing much enthusiasm. We may, in the near future, be the possessor of a flag to be raised and unfurled on the building, to commemorate events of importance such as the above. A subscription to the flag fund has been started. We hope by the Fourth of July to see our flag unfurled to the breeze.

For two months, last July and August, during the teacher's absence on her vacation, one of our girls filled the position of teacher very creditably.

Some of our children go to the public school, and a few to the high school, in order to fit themselves for teachers.

It is with great pleasure that I have to announce the exceptionally good health of the children during the past year. Measles broke out just two weeks ago, nothing of a serious character.

One of our boys was sent to the De Veaux College, Niagara Falls, last September, through the influence of our Bishop, who obtained a scholarship for him.

Three and a half dozen trees were given to the Home from Shaw's Garden, through the courtesy of Mr. Guerney.

Last summer garden patches were started for the children, but on account of the poorness of the soil, did not thrive.

We must again tender our hearty and sincere thanks to Dr. E. W. Saunders, to Dr. Green, to Dr. Ewing for their assiduous attention to the bodily ailments of the children, and also to Marion-Sims Dental Pharmacy for their free dispensary; also to the Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy, Chaplain, and Mr. James Fetherstonh, for their care of the spiritual wants of the children; also to Mr. Thos. K. Skinker, our legal counselor, and to the gentlemen of the Advisory Committee.

We have received during the year thirty-one children, nineteen have been returned to friends, six sent to homes. There are at present seventy-five children in the Home.

At the monthly meeting of our Board of Managers, May 5th, our "Nursery Fund" was started with the small sum of \$25. We are looking forward to the day when the beautiful nursery, or kindergarten room, for our many little ones, will be an accomplished fact.

APPENDIX No. 20.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Sogiety.

ARTICLE I - NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

ARTICLE II - OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to three delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who together, with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under directions of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI - FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII-FUNDS-DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE - DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within his parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX - AUXILIARY SOCIETIES - MEETINGS OF.

SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

 $^{\circ}$ Sec. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

APPENDIX A.

Rules of Order.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Unfinished Business.
 - IV. On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.

 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education.
 - VIII. On Sunday-School Work.
 - IX. On Missionaries' Travelling Expenses.
 - X. On the State of the Church.
 - 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- 9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - 10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nayes.
- 11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

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- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more Pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course and without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.
 - 21. The following Order of Business shall be observed:

The old Church lot at Jefferson and Lafayette Avenues, has been sold, and the debt of \$5,000 which had so grievously burdened the Parish for over ten years, has been paid off, and the Parish is now entirely free from debt.

The Parish has suffered greatly ever since the cyclone by reason of its utterly inadequate Church quarters in the old building at Grand and Lafayette Avenues, the building of a new Church having been delayed owing to the prospect of the opening up of Lafayette Avenue through its present property.

The Parish has, however, notwithstanding these hindrances, met all its obligations and done its full share towards the support of the Diocese; and we confidently hope the next Convention will find us housed in a new Church, and enabled to do much more for the advancement and spread of Christ's kingdom on earth.

The Woman's Sewing Guild has, during the year, raised and contributed towards the expenses of the Parish upwards of \$200, besides a valuable gift to the Rector, and other work for St. Stephen's Mission, the Orphans' Home, etc.

St. Mary's Guild has contributed a handsome set of Altar Books, a valuable gift to the Rector, and has entered upon renewed activity and usefulness.

The outlook of this Mission is becoming brighter and more hopeful. A deeper interest is being manifested in the services; a genuine love and respect for the teaching and laws of the Church. Through the kindness of the Superintendent of the Glass Works in Crystal City, and the Superintendent of the M. R. & B. T. Railroad, the Missionary is able to hold services regularly at Bonne Terre, and as soon as a place can be secured, services will be held at Flat Rivers and at Farmington.

I find, moreover, that peculiar conditions exist in this field. The schools of learning bring Church members from every State to this town. They are here for a short stay, perhaps a year or two; they bring no letters of transfer, and consequently are not canonically residents of this Mission. Reports are, therefore, meagre, and perhaps show no material growth, but there is a healthful tendency to increase; our average attendance is good, and at the next visitation of the Bishop, we hope to have a good class for confirmation.

Since the interruption caused by the cyclone, the attendance has at no time been as good as it was. There is generally a difficulty of getting a congregation in a hall on a third floor. On resuming services after the cyclone, I endeavored to be present every Sunday P. M. and evening, although at the expense of the work in St. Charles. But an opening offering in the latter for evening services I availed myself of it. Almost immediately on my doing this, the Sunday School was given up. The only relief for the Mission will be the erection of a modest house on the lot purchased and held in trust by the Trustees Parochial Trust Fund and recorded in name of "The Congregation of Epiphany Mission of St. Louis." Services and Sunday School have been given up for the present, and my resignation accepted.

Have held services each month at the Home of the Friendless, and at stated intervals have administered Holy Communion. Many of the inmates, not of our Communion, have availed themselves very gratefully of this blessed opportunity, as none of the religious bodies there represented and holding services, have at any time given their members such a privilege.

Mann, of the Mid-Western Deaf-Mute Mission, gave three Sundays of 2 services each, and 1 week-day lecture to St. Thomas', with the efficient assistance of Miss Pearl Herdman as interpreter. Our Mission has had 1 sermon by the Bishop; 1 by the Dean; 2 services by the Canon; 1 by the Rev. Mr. Duckworth and 1 by the Rev. Mr. Hunt; also 2 lectures by the Rev.

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ed, 33. Mar-Services—On Public, 108. Mr. Duckworth, and 1 by Ex-Gov. Stone. Miss A. M. Roper retired from the office of Treasurer at the end of the year, after having rendered most satisfactory service since the organization of the Mission on May 30th, 1891. My appointment as Diocesan Missionary to the Deaf-Mutes dates from May 15th, 1897. Since then, I have officiated at Rolla 3 times, where I also baptized 2 infants, 2 adults. and arranged for the confirmation of 3 persons; at Hannibal 3 times and baptized 1 infant; at Moberly 1 time; and solemnized a wedding at Annapolis. Twelfth Trinity offerings were received for the first time, but too late in the year for much Diocesan work.

The following churches contributed: Trinity, DeSoto, \$1.91; St. Augustine's, St. Louis, \$3.53; Emmanuel, Old Orchard, \$2.25; and the Cathedral, \$28.73; offerings at services amounted to \$6.15. Expenses to date have been \$11.50. In addition to the above, I officiated 5 times in the chapel of the Missouri School for the Deaf at Fulton (360 pupils); 1 time in the chapel of the Illinois School for the Deaf (500 pupils); and 7 times in Trinity Church at Jacksonville; 1 time in the chapel of the Kansas School for the Deaf (260 pupils) at Olathe; 20 times in Kansas City, Mo., and 1 time at Decatur, Ill. I also took part in the Convention of the Illinois Gallandet Union (200 in attendance) and officiated 2 times in Chicago. Prior to my appointment as minister of St. Thomas', Nov. 1st, 1890, there had been 13 baptisms and 13 confirmations in the Mission. Since then there have been 38 baptisms and 83 confirmations. All of those confirmed have come from without the church. Few had as much as a nominal connection with any religious organization. The Mission may justly claim to be the mental as well as the spiritual home of the adult deaf in the city.

Aside from the religious services, there were given 18 lectures, 8 literary meetings, and 6 socials, all of which were also well attended by Sectarians, Romanists, and Jews. These meetings indirectly benefit the Mission by bringing about a better understanding of the Church among people otherwise difficult to reach. I sincerely regret to say that aside from school duties, study, services and travel, I have not time to visit my people at their homes, except when they "send for the minister." If I could give Church work my undivided attention, I believe it would be very much better for all concerned. Personally, and in behalf of the Mission, I thank the Cathedral Chapter, Clergy, and others, for various privileges and assistance.

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REPORT OF REV. AUSTIN W. MANN, GENERAL MISSIONARY TO DEAF-MUTES.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri:

I have not held as many services for deaf-mutes in this Diocese this year owing to the fact that the work east of the Mississippi engages my attention more and more. Another reason is my absence abroad last summer.

Be-ides the services held at St. Thomas' Mission, Christ Church Cathedral, in the absence of the Minister in charge, the Rev. Mr. Cloud, I have lectured before the members of the same and others at the Schuyler Memorial House. I have also addressed the pupils of the Deaf-Mute Day School in St. Louis.

I held the first service in St. Louis in the summer of 1877; afterwards visiting a number of places, including Hannibal, Louisiana, Macon, Fulton, Jefferson City, Rolla, St. Charles, and Mexico. The places visited in Western Missouri before the division were Kansas City, St. Joseph, Springfield, Sedalia, Boonville, and others.

During the twenty-five years of Missionary labor in the Middle Western Dioceses and occasionally outside, I have held services in 357 different churches. Nearly 800 deaf-mutes and their children have been brought to baptism, and nearly 700 to confirmation. Not far from a million of miles have been traveled. According to records kept, I have written in that time over 40,000 letters and postal cards, and made fully 300 annual reports to the Bishops in whose Dioceses the work has been carried on. These reports are to be found in the Appendixes of Convention Journals.

FROM REV. HUGO RADAU.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of Missouri:

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—During the last conventional year I held services in different churches 14 times; preached 14 times; administered Holy Communion 11 times; married 3 couples; said burial services on 3 occasions, and baptized 2 infants and 2 adults.

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REV. W. A. HATCH, Dean of Hannibal Convocation. " J. D. RITCHEY, Dean of the Southern Convocation. Amendment to Constitution and Canons.

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ADOPTED BY FIFTY-NINTH CONVENTION, MAY, 1898.

Amend Section 3, Canon X., as follows: After the words "Bishop and Standing Committee" in lines 3 and 4 of Section 3 of Canon X., the following words be inserted: "After having consulted the Rectors and Wardens of the Parishes whose Church Buildings are within two thousand yards of the proposed location."

So that the Section will read: Such applications as are named in Sections 1 and 2 of this Canon, having been consented to by the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall consider the same, and if, in the judgment of the Bishop and Standing Committee, after having consulted the Rectors and Wardens of the Parishes whose Church Buildings are within two thousand yards of the proposed location, the interests of the Church will be promoted thereby, etc.

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TREASURER OF THE CONVENTION,

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special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese, for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
