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Journal of the Sixty-Third Convention,

BEING THE

SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL CONVENTION

DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, St. Louis,

Tuesday, May 27, 1902.

In accordance with Article III. of the Constitution of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, a number of the clergy and laity assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Convention.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Clergy, preceded by the choir, entered the Cathedral singing the three hundred and eighty-third hymn.

The opening sentences and services to the First Lesson were read by the Rev. B. S. McKenzie, of St. James' Church, Macon.

The First Lesson was read by the Rev. C. M. C. Mason, of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

The Second Lesson was read by the Rev. F. M. Weddell, of Christ Church, Rolla.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rev. L. F. Potter, of Grace Church, Kirkwood.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. C. F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Mission, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, D. D., of Grace Church, St. Louis.

The Convention Sermon was then preached by the Rev. Edmund Duckworth, of St. James' Memorial Church, St. Louis.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. C. M. Davis, Dean of the Cathedral.

Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

On re-assembling in the Schuyler Memorial House, the Rt. Rev. the Bishop, called the Convention to order.

The Secretary of the Standing Committee, acting as Secretary of the Convention, under the canon, on account of the vacancy in the office of Secretary caused by the death of Mr. John R. Triplett, late Secretary of the Convention, proceeded, under orders of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and thirty-one Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the "Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials," appointed at the last convention, whereupon Mr. I. Shreve Carter, on behalf of the Committee, presented the report, which was read by the acting Secretary, including the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in this Convention.

The acting Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats, and Delegates from twenty-two Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President announced a quorum of both orders present and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the first order of business the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D., nominated Mr. Charles R. Skinker as Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint

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his assistant. There being no other nominations, and unanimous consent being given, on motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the acting Secretary was requested to cast the ballot of the convention for Mr. Charles R. Skinker for Secretary, with power to appoint an assistant.

Mr. M. S. Snow, acting Secretary of the Convention, so cast the ballot.

The Secretary thereupon reappointed Mr. W. B. Coombe as his assistant.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Denison, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Convention.

On motion of the Rev. Wm. Elmer, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for divine worship at 9 o'clock in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 o'clock a. m., to 1 o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 p. m., and then continue to 5 p. m.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That visiting Clergy and students preparing for Holy Orders be invited to the sessions of this Convention and that they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

The hour for recess having arrived, the House took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

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The Convention reassembled after recess at 2:30 p.m.

On motion of the Rev. J. R. Winchester, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Delegates from Mount Calvary Parish have not presented to the Secretary satisfactory evidence that their Parish has paid in full the assessments standing against it; therefore, be it

Resolved, That such proof of payment of the assessment be dispensed with, and that the Delegates from Mount Calvary Parish be accorded their seats in this Convention.

The Secretary called the names of the Lay Delegates, and Messrs. H. H. Denison and James Fetherstonh answered to their names.

The Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials presented a supplemental report to the effect that Emmanuel Church, Shelbina, had paid its assessments in full, and was entitled to Lay representation in the Convention.

The Secretary called the name of the delegate from Emmanuel Church, and Mr. W. O. L. Jewett answered to his name.

On motion of Mr. F. J. McMaster, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Rev. Edmund Duckworth be requested to furnish a copy of the sermon preached at the opening of this Convention to the Church News for publication.

On motion of Mr. D. F. Leavitt, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay the editor of the Church News eight dollars (\$8.00), the cost of publishing the Rev. Mr. Duckworth's Convention sermon.

The hour for the order of the day having arrived,

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, then read his annual address, which, with his Episcopal Acts, was laid on the Secretary's table.

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The Very Rev. C. M. Davis moved that that portion of the Bishop's address referring to an ecclesiastical trial be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion of the Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a Committee of Three be appointed to which shall be referred that portion of the Bishop's address relating to the late Secretary, Mr. John R. Triplett.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee:

Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, Rev. Wm. Hatch, Judge T. T. Fauntleroy.

On motion of Rev. Wm. Short, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That that portion of the Bishop's address in regard to the Church Club, be referred to the following committee of three:

E. H. Lycett, J. A. Waterworth, C. C. Curtice. To report to this Convention.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as such committee: Messrs. E. H. Lycett, J. A. Waterworth, C. C. Curtice.

Mr. Walker Hill, Chairman of the Special Committee for Liquidation of the Debt of Bishop Robertson Hall, appointed at the last Convention, presented and read the following report:

Your Committee held several meetings, but, owing to the resignation of one of its members and numerous worthy funds conflicting with the raising of the fund, your Committee made small progress. We request further time and the reorganization and continuance of the Committee.

Mr. M. S. Snow, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund, presented and read the report of said Board, as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese of Missouri beg leave to report as follows for the Conventional Year 1901-1902:

June 18, 1901—Organized by the election of the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D., as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary and Treasurer, for the ensuing year.

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nnual ad-Secretary's October 31 1901—Granted permission to Epiphany Mission to borrow \$1,000 on their property in order that a building might be erected for church purposes, upon the condition that the further sum of \$1,000 be raised by the Mission.

November 15, 1901—Voted to amend the action of October 31, by making the amount authorized \$1,200, instead of \$1,000, upon the same condition as before.

December 26, 1901—Adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the President and Secretary of the Parochial Trust Fund be authorized to reconvey property held for the Epiphany Mission to the Rev. J. A. Dooris, Sr., the grantor of the property, the same conveyance being made at the request of the congregation of the Epiphany Mission for the purpose of enabling the necessary money to be raised for the building of the Mission House, with the understanding that Mr. Dooris will then reconvey the property to the Parochial Trust Fund subject to the mortgage.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Charles Sanford Olmsted, D. D., as Bishop Coadjutor of Colorado.

Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. Alexander Hamilton Vinton, D. D., as Bishop of Western Massachusetts.

Recommended the Rev. Thomas Andrew Haughton Burke to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the Priesthood, with such shortening of time of his candidacy as would make possible his ordination on or before Trinity Sunday, May 25, 1902.

May 12, 1902—Gave consent to the consecration of the Rev. James Heartt Van Buren as Bishop of the Missionary District of Porto Rico.

The motion of the Rev. R. E. L. Craig, at the last Convention, was referred to this Committee (see p. 22, 23, Journal). This Committee is of the opinion that it would be unwise to adopt or prescribe a uniform system of Sunday school instruction throughout the Diocese other than the Church Catechism.

The Committee would, however, strenuously urge upon the Clergy and their helpers in Sunday school work, the teaching of the *Church Catechism* most thoroughly, as the rubric and the canons direct, to the end, among other things, that this foundation of the intellectual part of the instruction of children for confirmation may not be left to their final class preparation for that apostolic rite.

Also, your Committee would advise that attendance upon the regular Church Services be made (when and as far as it can be) part of the duty of Sunday school scholars, and, if possible, with their families. And that effort be made at Sunday school, as part of its work, to train the children

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to take part in the Church Services, carefully teaching them the hymns, canticles and other appointed forms.

The Convention was opened with the usual religious services, after which the Rt. Rev. President took the chair, and called the Convention to order.

On motion of Rev. A. K. Smith, the calling of the roll was dispensed with.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the proceedings of the second day of the Convention, which, upon motion, were unanimously approved.

On motion of Mr. A. B. Ambler, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Finance Committee recommend the payment of \$58.50 on account of legal expenses incurred in a church trial;

Resolved, That the same be adopted and paid.

The Rev. G. D. B. Miller, Registrar, presented and read his report as Registrar, as follows:

During the year there have been received the Convention Journals of the Dioceses of the Church, the Report of the Registrar of the Diocese of Massachusetts, the Report of the National League for the Protection of the Family, the Official Magazine of the American Federation of Labor, and other printed documents.

There have also been presented to the diocesan library, by the Misses Alexander, of St. Louis, two ancient volumes of rare value. One of them is a Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, published one hundred and forty-two years ago, by B. Dod, Booksellere at the Bible and Key, Ave Mary Lane, near St. Paul's. The other is "Observations upon the Liturgy, with a Proposal for its Reform upon the Principles of Christianity as professed and taught by the Church of England, and an Attempt to reconcile the Doctrines of the Angels' Apostasy and Perpetual Punishment, Man's Fall and Redemption and the Incarnation of the Son of God to our Conceptions of the Divine Nature and Attributes," by a Layman of the Church of England, late Under-Secretary of State. To which is added the Journals

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by Bisho early ma foot astr the radia abode of Memorial to the late Secretary of the Convention, John Richards Triplett:

John Richards Triplett was born in Richmond, Va., December 26, 1831. He was educated at the Episcopal High School, in Fairfax County, Va., near Alexandria, and at the University of Virginia. January, 1853, he came to St. Louis, Mo., where he lived until his death, March 21, 1902.

In 1854 he married Miss Sallie Walker, daughter of Major Benjamin Walker, U. S. Army. He was confirmed by Bishop Johns in Christ Church, Alexandria, the old church where Washington worshiped, and when coming to St. Louis, became a communicant of Christ Church (now the Cathedral), and for forty-nine years his life and conduct illustrated the highest type of Christian character; and his intelligent, faithful, energetic and inestimable service to the Church of his devotion is attested by the official records of the Diocese of Missouri, and impressed upon the grateful hearts and memories of his clerical and lay brethren in Christ. He was for thirty years Secretary (and, indeed, parliamentary guide) to the annual councils of the Church, and Deputy from this Diocese to eight General Conventions.

He died, as he lived, sustained by an unfaltering faith in the atoning merit and mediation of his crucified and risen Redeemer, who, in his youth, spoke to him the words of eternal life, and in whose death, his sins were all dead.

In infancy he was consecrated in baptism to the service of his Saviour by Bishop Moore in the old Monumental Church in Richmond, and in his early manhood he chose that "Living Way" which leads no traveler's foot astray from the realms of love; and now we, to whom he has left the radiance of his spotless life upon earth, may follow him to the blest abode of peace above.

Mr. C. S. Freeborn, on behalf of the Committee on Assessments, presented the amended report of that committee, showing a total assessment of \$5,635.00.

The hour of noon having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President called the Convention to prayers, and after singing the two hundred and sixty-first hymn, the Rev. J. R. Winchester, D. D., read appropriate prayers for missions, after which the House resumed business.

Upon motion, the report of the Committee on Assessments, as amended, was adopted: (See Appendix No. 14.)

On motion of Rev. L. F. Potter, the following resolution was adopted:

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On motion of Rev. J. P. T. Ingraham, the following resolution was adopted:

The Secretary so cast the ballot.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared Mr. Francis J. McMaster duly elected Chancellor of the Diocese for a term of three years.

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The House then went into the election of Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate.

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese in favor of the choir of the Cathedral for the sum of \$25.00 for services rendered at the opening of this Convention.

On motion of Mr. G. M. Cadogan, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant for \$25.00 in favor of the sexton of the Cathedral and his assistants for their services during the sessions of this Convention.

On motion of Rev. J. W. Higson, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Rev. C. F. Collins has completed the fiftieth year of his work in the ministry;

Resolved, That we extend to him our hearty congratulations, and thank God for the many years of loving ministration He has vouchsafed to His servant, and pray that many years of health and strength be granted him.

On motion of Rev. G. D. B. Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to have five hundred copies of the Convention Journal printed for distribution.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

BISHOP OF MISSOURI

TO THE

SIXTY-THIRD CONVENTION.

Dear Brethren—The years glide by. They are freighted with responsibilities. They are filled full with the changes and chances of this mortal life. In one way or another we mark them off and speak of one of them as gone, and another of them as come. And the markings are times to count up the past, what we have done and what we have been and what we are, and to forecast the future, what we want to be and what we ought to do. It is in our very nature to need such times for marking and accounting. And the Church Militant in a world of responsibilities and changes could not well fight a good fight without them. A Diocesan Convention, therefore, is not an occasion gotten up for the cold and formal telling of facts and citing of figures. It is a philosophical entity. It is an outgrowth of church life, a marking of church progress, a celebration of church success. Or, if there be failure instead, it is a fit opportunity for wholesome church confession.

Four of my brethren in the House of Bishops have departed during our year of record.

Bishop Littlejohn preached the sermon at my ordination to the Diaconate, June 29, 1862, in the Church of the Transfiguration, New York City, since widely known as the "Little Church Around the Corner." He was then rector of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Brooklyn. He was learned and eloquent, and a wise Bishop for thirty years. It is understood that it was he who formulated the four principles as pre-requisites for Christian Unity which have become known as the Chicago Quadrilateral, and later as the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral.

Bishop Whipple was one of the most strikingly picturesque figures that have trodden the stage of our American church history. Earnestness, industry, intrepidity, godliness and zeal were his characteristics. Missionary enthusiasm spread a bright halo over the earlier part of his

forty-two years as Bishop; while the latter part, all through America and in England as well, was accompanied by "honor, love, obedience, troops of friends."

Bishop Burgess was a neighbor over our eponymous river. And he did neighborly things, helping our Diocese in its time of vacancy and visiting Bishop Robertson Hall on its commencement day. His expertness in parliamentary law made him a valuable member of the House of Bishops. Before being made Bishop he had been the presiding officer of the House of Deputies in the General Convention. The only other case that I know of, of such presiding officer becoming a Bishop, is that of Rev. Dr. Croes, who presided in the General Convention of 1814 and the year afterward became Bishop of New Jersey.

Bishop Spalding was my neighbor when I was Bishop of Utah. When he had charge of Wyoming I helped him to look after the Parish of Evanston in the extreme west of his field. For fourteen years he was a Missionary Bishop and for about the same length of time a Diocesan Bishop, and in either office was untiring in watchfulness and abounding in labors.

From the ranks of our own Clergy two have fallen out, Rev. William Bardens and Rev. Charles G. Davis.

Mr. Bardens, in Trinity, St. Louis, gave to the Diocese eleven years of service. And it was faithful, godly, zealous, self-denying service, as much so as any I have ever known. Devoted in his own immediate line of priestly duty, and disinclined to any interference with others in criticism or controversy, his was a career of singleness of aim, simplicity of life and strenuousness of endeavor. When rest came I am sure it was sweet.

Mr. Davis was very near and dear to me. For nearly fifteen years he was in this Diocese at Ironton, De Soto, Crystal City, Macon, Jefferson City and Ferguson. And for fifteen other years he was by my side in Utah, teacher, deacon, priest. I confirmed him. I ordered him deacon and priest. I buried him. These markings, in a sense, sum up a good man's life of fidelity and helpfulness and loyalty and love, and link in with it my past and my present most touchingly.

Deaths in the Diocese have been so many as to emphasize the truth that this earth is not the land of the living. It is the land of the dying. The other, not this, is the land of the living.

Mrs. Hugh Campbell, of St. Louis, fell asleep in advanced old age, but an old age which to the very last kept itself in touch with the cheerfulness of the young, and was sweetened and refreshed by its own sympathy and benevolence. Only a little less old, Mrs. Johnson, of Rolla, widow of our former faithful Missionary there and herself a most

faithful children amazed goodness Stewart, of St. Lo

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faithful Missionary, went away from a large mourning household of children and grandchildren. Miss Rebekah Parker left us sorrowful and amazed that God's wisdom should withdraw so much of sweet and efficient goodness from this needy world. Mrs. Worley, of Montgomery; Mrs. Stewart, of Louisiana; Sister Mary; Mrs. Staples and Mrs. Martin Collins, of St. Louis, were among the most zealous churchwomen of the Diocese.

Among the men summoned away are Mr. H. H. Curtis, of St. Louis, and Mr. Robinson, of Old Orchard, the latter a very Brother Cheeryble of hope and helpfulness. Mr. Wayman McCreery, almost from boyhood, had been zealously active in promoting the service of song in the Lord's sanctuary and he is greatly missed. While to-day a new voice at the Secretary's desk in this Convention, most acceptable though it be, reminds us sadly that we no longer have the presence and the guidance and the help of one who for twenty-nine years filled that important office. And Mr. Triplett filled the office completely, dutifully, untiringly, acceptably to men, faithfully for the Church, and, I do not hesitate to say, with a conscious, loving devotion to the Church's Divine Head. I will not anticipate aught of the tribute which I am sure the Convention will wish to render in grateful memory of his services. I only want to bear witness that the sixteen years in which he and I have stood side by side are one long record of such diligent, efficient, uncomplaining, unselfish, kindly helpfulness on his part as, I feel sure, no other Bishop or Diocese could overpass.

The recital of our diptychs sounds a warning. We are not always to be here for the marking of the year out and the year in. May God have us ready, each one, through the mercies of the Saviour, when the empty chair or the changed new face in it tells up the tale of our story. And with a sort of cheery readiness, too.

"For, lo, there breaks a yet more glorious day; The saints triumphant rise in bright array; The King of Glory passes on His way. Alleluia!"

In the Diocese, encouragement is the watchword. The number confirmed is five hundred and sixty-five, fifteen more than last year. Canton has added to its little church (which, by the way, was built by our own Rev. Mr. Scheetz) a modest recess chancel, and a vestry room, in which, as could not be done before, more than two persons can turn themselves about without disagreeable personal collision. Kirkwood is also enlarging its church, and, by the aid of one of our generous St. Louis laymen, has secured an assistant minister to stand by its faithful rector in the missionary work all around about which he has on his hands. Thayer has built of stone one of the prettiest churches in the Diocese and has paid for it. Under the wise pastoral guidance of the rector of St. Mark's, St. Louis, Epiphany

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d old age, the cheer tits own hnson, of elf a most has put up its own church. Ascension, St. Louis, and Macon are preparing to build new churches. St. Paul's, St. Louis, has added a guild room. Ironton has secured a rectory. Fredericktown and Poplar Bluff, two new mission stations, are planning to build churches. Palmyra, with its proposed new organ, and Moberly, with its aroused parish life under Rev. Mr. Burke, move cheerily on. Trinity, Hannibal, attacked fiercely more than once by the fire fiend, has driven him back and triumphs in repairs and betterments. All Saints', St. Louis, under its most faithful pastor, Rev. Mr. Mason, is even more than ever before a central hive of busy good work.

And the Diocese is well manned. Only three mission stations are vacant; Ironton, La Plata and Shelbina. Of these, only the first can, at present, think of sustaining a minister. I had hoped to report to the Convention one new mission, to-wit: St. John's. Washington. It was indeed pronounced an organized mission on December 23d. But habits of migration with which Americans are familiar have taken away from Washington quite all of those who were interested in the mission. Therefore, it is deemed best by all concerned that this mission should be considered de-organized and terminated.

This incident shows how difficult it is to forecast the future in the question of organizing and establishing new mission stations, and explains how it is that the Bishop has visited or visits with some regularity the following towns without yet deciding it to be a wise step to organize and establish a mission in each of them: Bonne Terre, Centralia, Clarence, Dexter, Roe Run, Edina, Farber, Farmington, Fulton, Glenwood, Grandin, Gregory Landing, Hermann, Hunnewell, Huntsville, Jackson, Jefferson Barracks, Jennings, LaBelle, Malden, Nadine, Paris, Piedmont, Salem, Sullivan, Troy, Vandalia, Wentzville.

Yet, it will not be denied that the yearly holding of services in these places does good. In one of them, Jennings, a member of our Diocesan Missionary Board and a lay reader, Mr. Charles Sparks, is the superintendent of a union Sunday school. He serves most acceptably to the entire community, and finds a way year by year for the blessed work of preparing two or three persons for confirmation.

I venture to report the mission of St. Chrysostom, St. Louis, as deorganized and terminated.

One of our missions is unique. I mean St. Thomas', St. Louis, consisting of deaf mutes, served by our deaf brother, Rev. Mr. Cloud. There are fifty-eight communicants. Look in the *Church News* and see how they paid the Diocesan Assessment and also gave \$38.00 for Diocesan Missions last year. The Cathedral with its Bofinger Chapel gives a church home to St. Thomas'. Mr. Cloud is a very valuable man for Church work among his people. He wants to cease from his teaching

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cretion. fort this in the public school, whereby now he supports his family, and to give himself up entirely to missionary work among his silent brethren of this and surrounding Dioceses. I am in correspondence with other Bishops about the plan. He must have \$1,500 per year. I hope Missouri can give \$400 to this sum. I shall be glad and grateful to be helped in any way prudently to carry out this plan.

The tone throughout the Diocese of unselfish loyalty towards missions makes me glad and proud.

1. There is St. Stephen's Mission, St. Louis. It does blessed work. Near half a thousand children are there to be looked after. The poor and the sick press in crowds. It is a center of light and help in the midst of a community otherwise largely churchless. Its doors are open all the time. Its work never lets up. One hundred and seventy-five communicants are there. With their nickels and pennies they gave about \$400 last year. Their needs have gathered the West End Parishes and people around about them in a union of benevolence and beneficence. The Woman's Auxiliary has steadily kept up its \$1,000. Other givers have furnished nearly \$2,000. And so this most valuable mission work has gone on. We can not be too grateful to Rev. Mr. Mizner or to those who are holding up his hands and cheering his heart. Specially I am thankful to the women collectors in the different Parishes for their steadiness of tread in walking by my side in securing the \$1,000 per year, which is an absolutely necessary foundation of wholesome supply. We owe a duty, do we not, to the lower and neglected part of our great City of St. Louis? In trying to discharge that duty, am I wrong in counting it a happy circumstance that the men and women of all the city Parishes can stand together in united and harmonious effort? Some cutside of the city help also, as Old Orchard, Ferguson, Kirkwood, De Soto, Ironton, Hannibal and Palmyra.

The Hospital Missions, under Rev. Mr. Cornell, are along the same line of effort. A noble band of voluntary workers, men and women, stand by him, and givers furnish supplies, and so blessed good is done to the sick and the poor and the stranded ones in our city institutions.

2. There are the children's efforts. Fifty-three Sunday schools have sent in their Lenten offerings for missions, amounting to \$1,592.47, a sum \$20.00 more than that of last year. Our great Missionary Society doing world-wide work is now counting on the children of the Church for \$100,000 this year, the same as last. I think the expectation is justified and will be fulfilled. Then our children give, besides, \$1,000 a year to their Bishop, through their Missionary Host, for him to use at his discretion. Bless their hearts all. They do not know what a cheery comfort this Missionary Purse is to him.

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- 3. There is the work of our women. Pledges here and gifts there and boxes everywhere; United Offering and Orphans' Home and Convalescent Home, and Rescue Home, and Giving Tuesdays and Woman's Auxiliary; cheering cheques to Missionary Bishops and a new church at Thayer and a rectory at Ironton and a guild room at Carondelet and a recess chancel at Canton. Figures can not begin to tell the preciousness of it all. Though the figures for last year, \$1,197.77 in boxes and \$5,654.88 in cash, are no mean ones, indeed.
- 4. There is our interest in Diocesan Missions. Last year we pledged for them \$4,300.75, and \$1,174.25 besides for Hospital Missions. And I am proud for Missouri to challenge you to make a strict examination to see how rare a thing it is for any pledge when made to be left unpaid. This year our Missions are more fully manned than I have ever known them to be. Therefore, we need more money for stipends to the increased number of Missionaries. We need your pledges, dear brethren, for \$5,575 for our Diocesan Missions and near \$2,000 besides for Hospital Missions.
- 5. There is our record for General Missions. The New York Board of Managers said they must have \$525,000 this year from the Dioceses, over and above the \$200,000 which they expect from the children and from the Woman's Auxiliary, for the needs of the great missionary work. They apportioned \$4,231.68 to Missouri. Then a committee of our own apportioned this sum to the different Parishes. I have been greatly pleased with the good spirit and kindly feeling with which this apportionment has been met everywhere. Our committee will make its own report. Though I can not restrain myself from stating that already from September 1, 1901, to April 1, 1902, Missouri has given \$1,655.59, this amount being more than it gave for the whole year previous from September 1, 1900, to September 1, 1901, viz., \$1,385.15. Of our fifty-two Parishes apportioned, seven have given more than they were asked for, eighteen have given each the amount asked for, nine have promised to give the amount asked for, twelve are busy raising what they can, four I have not heard from, and only two have said that they could not give anything. I can not think otherwise than that this record is a good one, and I am proud of it. Besides, the year of the Missionary Society does not close till September 1 next, and I am indulging a warm hope that Missouri will come to its full apportionment by that time. The interests of the American nation are intertwined more closely with the whole world than ever they were before. The duty of the American Church to the whole world is emphasized; and that duty can not be discharged along cheap lines or in careless fashion.

Our Church Club is again on its feet. I am glad. It gave a good dinner to some of us Missionary Bishops a while ago. And it talked right good sense after dinner. If our Churchmen can get in touch with each other in the Club and in the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and can keep in

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touch and can make the touch tell to the healing of some weaknesses and diseases which arise, what a blessed good it will be. It was the Church clubs of the country that aroused and promoted effectively the good work of securing Bishop Brent for the Philippine Islands.

Our rejoicing upon the good tokens of a missionary zeal all over the Diocese is tempered by the knowledge that one veteran soldier is to retire from active service. With energy unsurpassed and fidelity never questioned and zeal unquenchable, he has borne the burden of pastoral duty through the heat of the day and on into the shades of the evening time. Rev. Dr. Ingraham first appears on the records of the Diocese in the Convention of 1868. No other Clergyman of that year's list, save Mr. Scheetz, is now with us. And, I may add, no layman, either, except J. B. Gazzam, of St. Louis; H. W. Hough, of Kirkwood, and H. C. Lackland, of St. Charles. A whole generation of St. Louis people has grown up under Dr. Ingraham's eyes. A whole generation has faded out and fallen away from their seeing. We extend to him our loving greetings. We thank God for his past of fighting well fought and faith well kept. We pray God for his peaceful future of rest and reward.

During this year an ecclesiastical trial of one of the Clergy of the Diocese, at least through the first stages thereof, became necessary. Certain expenses were incurred. They were mainly for legal services in counsel for the presenters appointed. The Canon provides that necessary expenses shall be audited by the triers and "reported to the next Convention for payment as the Convention may direct." The proceedings ended before the stage of choosing the triers was reached. The Clergyman asked to be deposed. Therefore, it seems the duty of the Bishop to report, as I now do to the Convention, the bill which I have spoken of, which is for \$58.50.

There are two general institutions which I wish earnestly to commend to your favorable notice.

One is "The General Clergy Relief Fund." This is the general fund for Aged and Infirm Clergy with headquarters in Philadelphia. Its office and address and facts about it can be learned by looking at the inside of the cover of our Convention Journal. It does a great deal of wide-reaching good. I sincerely wish every Parish would send an offering to it on Quinquagesima Sunday, as the General Convention asks us to do.

The other is "The Clergyman's Retiring Fund Society." It pays a pension to any member who is sixty years old. If there be virtue in the old maxim, "Crede experto," you will be prepared on my testimony to consider it a right good institution. I have drawn my pension now for four years. And I do not pay any dues now, either. I became a member many years ago. I think any Clergyman would do a most wise thing to become a member and so get a little income laid by for himself against his

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the whole along cheap sexagenarian days. The dues are \$1.00 per month. The amount of the pension is graduated by the number of months that one has been a paying member. The income from the principal of the fund, which latter is now \$175,000, and one-half of all undesignated contributions, go to swell the annuities. The Financial Secretary is Rev. Henry Anstice, D. D., 1917 Waliace street, Philadelphia.

Two matters remain upon which I want to say something.

- 1. I am sensitively anxious that no slightest reproach may attach to the Diocese of Missouri or to any constituent part of it in the way of breach of trust in holding and directing funds entrusted. Does any Clergyman ever encourage the practice of taking money which was given for one purpose and using it for another purpose? And does he venture to say, "Well, I think that's the best way to use it and it will do the most good that way?" If yes, I venture to tell him that in the world of men, and in American communities pre-eminent for commercial activity and efficiency, his overruling of the plain law of business integrity by some higher law of his own creation will do him more harm than all his preached sermons will do him good. Does any vestry of a Parish or any treasurer thereof deflect or retain funds given for outside objects, missions or other, to meet grievously pressing inside needs? If they do, the act is a wrong and a hurt and a shame. It is better for a parish to die of inanition, going down honorably with flag unstained, than under a smirched flag flying, to wax and grow fat from what are really nothing more and nothing less than stolen supplies. I do not know any specific cases. But sometimes it comes to my ears that money pledged, promised, given for certain purposes, does not promptly and fully reach the proper custodians for use for such purposes. Then it makes me wince to think that there can be any such lack of wholesomeness of American honor and Church honesty and the stainless integrity which the Divine Master demands.
- 2. I am afraid that some Clergymen in their conduct of public services allow themselves to take more liberties than, it seems to me, they have the right to.

For example, they leave out the lesson from the Old Testament. Where do they get this right? The law requires two lessons. The only exception for the minister to avail himself of is laid down in the preface to the Prayer Book, in these words, "On days of fasting and thanksgiving, especially appointed, and on occasions of ecclesiastical conventions and of charitable collections, the minister may appoint such lessons as he shall think fit in his discretion." At the most solemn time of his being ordered priest he has plainly promised, with the help of the Lord, to give his "faithful diligence always so to minister the doctrine and sacraments, and the discipline of Christ, as the Lord hath commanded and as this

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Dear mighty p with her Church hath received the same." How does he find it in his conscience, then, to set aside or disregard the injunctions and directions of this Church? The Old Testament is the only part of Holy Scripture which our Blessed Lord personally sanctioned. Does it not savor of disloyalty to Him to omit it from its lawful place?

In some regular Parishes perhaps the rubric about the longer exhortation in the office for the Holy Communion is disregarded, which enjoins that it must be said once every month. The first Sunday of the month is the one usually chosen for the regular communion of the congregation. It would seem that on that Sunday the longer exhortation ought always to be said.

To rehearse the commandments once on a Sunday suffices to comply with the law. A habit with some is to limit this rehearsal to the early communion and to omit it at the mid-day service. I can not but deem this a mistake. It is reasonable to claim that it is your massed miscellaneous congregation, not your chosen few of the early service, who especially need the proclamation and the iteration of the divine moral law of the ten commandments. Who shall count the wholesomeness of good result in the constant solemn recital in the ears of busy and sometimes unthoughtful people of this sacred summary of human duty towards our neighbor? I am constrained to add that in the responses to the commandments it seems to me that a more unfit part for the choir to take could not be found. The people all, and not the few of the choir, should cry aloud, "Lord, have mercy upon us, and incline our hearts to keep this law."

There is a prayer for Congress, to be used during its session. Are all Clergymen careful to use it at that time? If the Church is protected and supported by the State in all her plain rights of property and privilege, and if the State evermore finds for reliance her purest and sturdiest citizenship in the soberness and righteousness and godliness of Christian believers, why should not pains be taken to manifest that the American wholesomeness of separation of Church and State does not mean severance of the unity of good will and mutual help? And the prayer for Congress faithfully used might make much in the line of such generous disclaimer.

Is the Litany in some churches used enough to escape the charge of disobedience to the prefatory rule which recites that "Morning Prayer, the Litany, and the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, are distinct services and may be used either separately or together; provided, that no one of these services be habitually disused?"

Dear brethren of the Clergy, our loyalty to the Church may be a mighty power for good. Let us not allow ourselves to play fast and loose with her laws, her directions, her rubrics. Edification evolved from the

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depths of our subjectivity is not likely to be as good spiritual nutriment for the souls of our people as the steady providing of what the Church furnishes for them.

Much liberty in arranging services is allowed us, specially since the last change in the Prayer Book of 1892. Grateful for the freedom, let us not spoil its goodness by running riot in unauthorized ways of our own personal likings. But let us keep steady ourselves, and so help to keep our people steady in an age and a time when law and order and loyalty and obedience and steadiness are by no means among the least valuable forces to aim at and to use in efforts to do the good to humanity which we want to do.

Dear Brethren all, after our mutual counsels are over, let us go back home to work and pray and love and hope. That's the sweet spot of earth, home. And the great center force for good. And the chosen seed plat out of which grows the Church. So growing, the Church needs to take and use much of the home's sweetness and considerateness and patience and moral force. So using, the Church can reach the world's heart and lift the world's life even while fighting the world's sin.

June 22.

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This was a wonderful day for me. I was in Morris, Otsego Co., New York. Zion Church, situated there, was celebrating the 100th anniversary of its existence as a Parish, it having been founded in May, 1801. A small frame building called Harmony Church, served for the first seventeen years. In 1818 the present noble structure of stone was built. In it I preached my first sermon as its deacon pastor, on July 20, 1862. In it I was ordered priest by Bishop Horatio Potter, July 19, 1863. In it, also, my dear wife and I were married, in the early morning of September 12, 1865. On the centennial I first preached, word for word, the sermon which I had preached in the same church near thirtynine years before, and then I added a reminiscent talk. During the day I also unveiled a tablet placed in the wall of the nave, and I laid the corner-stone of a new Parish house and made an address. Bishop Doane came and preached in the evening. The Rev. G. H. Sterling, our former pastor of Old Orchard, is now the rector of Morris and has been since he left Old Orchard. And his pastorship there is indeed a successful one. Adult baptisms and confirmations have been surprisingly numerous. I remained Communion, from Bishop e 4, dropped Georgia. Atri Botanical

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over Sunday, and, by permission of Bishop Doane, confirmed twenty-one presented by Mr. Sterling. Centennial day fifty communicants were present at the early celebration, and two hundred and fifty at noon-day. The offerings were \$185. Mr. Sterling, in his unfailing energy, is building a large parish house for the uses of the Sunday school and the guilds, and for social purposes. The cost is estimated at \$3,000. And Mr. Sterling has already in hand for it \$2,500. I pray God's guidance and blessing upon his efficient labors. I was rejoiced in heart to find the old country Parish which I served for five years, and which is the only Parish I ever served as pastor, in so healthful and vigorous a condition. The Clergy of the Archdeaconry (a convocation) of the Susquehanna had also gathered, so that a dozen or more of our brethren were present to rejoice with us in the centennial. I spent nearly a week in Morris, and shall long remember the kindly hospitality, as of my own old home, extended to me by dear Mr. and Mrs. Sterling and Edith. Mr. Sterling and I also drove over to Cooperstown, twenty-two miles, where I confirmed nineteen. Later, I went to Cohoes, and addressed the Woman's Auximary in a Diocesan meeting; and to my native Parish of Trinity, Windham, where I held services, and visited my younger sister and the graves of my dear father and mother. God's great goodness has spared me to visit, once more, old scenes and friends.

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APPENDIX No. 6.

Report of Committee on State of the Church.

Your Committee on the State of the Church begs leave to report as follows:

It cannot be questioned but that a great improvement in church life and feeling has been manifested in the Diocese during the past Convention year. This renewed life has shown itself in an increased number of baptisms and confirmations, and largely increased offerings for missionary work within and without the Diocese.

At the present time nearly every Mission in the Diocese is being supplied by regular ministrations of the word and sacraments; a better condition than has existed for some years.

The work in the Southern Convocation is being carried on with great success by its energetic Dean, who, having secured an assistant, is now able to devote more time and thought to the Missions already established, and for opening up new fields when good opportunities are presented. Judging by the past, we expect to hear of a further extension of missionary work in this great field.

It is very gratifying to learn that offerings to Domestic and Foreign Missions, under the apportionment plan, have been largely increased, and from present appearances every Parish and Mission seems determined to meet the demand made upon it; so that with increased offerings from Parishes, and an increased Lenten offering from the Sunday Schools, we feel that the Diocese of Missouri is realizing its duty to the General Missionary Board of the Church, and showing some gratitude for its fostering care in the past.

The Hospital Mission under the care of Rev. F. W. Cornell and his able assistants, has continued uninterruptedly its blessed work among the sick and the unfortunate. We cannot overestimate the importance of this work, reaching as it does a class who, in the wild swirl of the world, have been drawn from good homes and influences and submerged in its soul-destroying power. Through the efforts of your Missionary many have been placed upon their feet with their faces toward God and true manliness in life.

St. Mark's Memorial Church has succeeded in building a substantial Chapel for the Epiphany Mission, under its fostering care. A large Sunday School has been gathered, and the prospects are bright for the Church in that part of the city where the Mission is located.

The Mission of the Advent, under the care of the Church of the Ascension, is doing a good work, and great hopes are entertained that a permanent Mission will result from the effort now being made.

St. Philip's, notwithstanding heavy demands made upon it for street improvements, has met bravely and promptly paid its liabilities. And a large Sunday School, larger congregations and a deeper spiritual life, promise that this work seems destined to fulfill the hopes of its founders.

In view of these signs of improvement it may seem a little inconsistent for your Committee to point out how inadequate is the effort of the Diocese to meet the increased demands made upon it. Note this: Not a single new Mission or Parish has been started during the past year, and the

Bishop is confronted with the serious problem of trying-without meansto keep pace with the growth of population in his Diocese. North, South and West are counties-nearly forty in number-in which are held no regular services of the Church. Your Committee would quote again the report made by the Dean of the Southern Convocation last year: are dozens of towns in Southeastern Missouri alone where there are church people who hunger for the ministrations of the Church. Towns ranging in population from one thousand two hundred to five thousand, according to actual statistics. I have found them ready to respond financially toward procuring the services of the Church. The field is white for the harvest."

These words are also true of other portions of the Diocese, as witnessed

by the long list of towns which the Bishop mentioned in his address yester-

day as having been visited by him.

When we turn to this great and growing City of St. Louis, what a spectacle is presented! This city has grown from four hundred and fifty thousand to six hundred thousand or more, and what have we done as a Diocese to meet the religious needs of the new people? Those well-to-do, who live in the vicinity of well established parishes, are provided for; but what of the teeming populations driven by high rents to the new neighborhoods, built on what ten—yes, even five years ago, were common fields, and which are now well populated districts? Into these fields the denominations are pouring men and money, and our own people are forced to attend these churches and send their children to their Sunday Schools where they are speedily lost to the Church and its influences. In other Dioceses these people form the great body of the Church. Hundreds of young men -clerks, salesmen and mechanics—form the bulk of the population in these new districts, and hundreds—yes, thousands— have had Church training and are only waiting the coming of the Missionary to give him welcome and help.

In view of these facts is it not strange we fail to see the importance of Church extension in this city? The Bishop has only to ask for money to help China, or Japan, or a Western Jurisdiction, and a liberal response is made. Yet, when he pleads as he did yesterday, and has done for years, for his own shepherdless sheep, his words fall on dull ears. What are we to say when a Committee appointed by him at the order of this Convention, receives not a single response to the earnest appeal they made to sup-

port a Diocesan Missionary to go to these churchless fields?

How long, Oh Lord! How long is this apathy to last? How long are we going to see our Diocese in this growing state and city failing to keep pace with the increase of population-because we do not take the tide at its flood, and go with the population into the field of their new homes? The field is "white for the harvest." Soon the grain will fall and be lost to us forever. Your Committee feel that a crisis has come, and asks that the Bishop be no longer left to solve the problem alone and without means. In view of all these facts your Committee would offer the following reso-

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to raise a sum sufficient to secure a General Missionary, and that when this Committee shall report that the sum has been pledged the Missionary Board be directed, on nomination of the Bishop, to appoint a General Missionary.

APPENDIX No. 13.

Report of Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the report of the Committee on Legal and Uniform Methods of Trusteeships, after considering the matters submitted, beg leave to report that in their opinion it is unnecessary to resort to Canon to attain the ends desired.

The two points involved are trustees for the personal properties of Parishes, and of the Diocese. As to the former, while vestries have no power, by virue of their charters, to hold or manage personal property, yet by the Articles of Association, Canon X, and as agents and representatives of the congregation, they are empowered to receive, hold and manage such property, sufficient to meet all ordinary requirements.

Each Parish which so desires, is at liberty to provide for its own separate trustees to hold its personal property, so that it seems to the Committee unnecessary to order the duplication of organization by Canon.

In regard to a Board of Trustees for the Diocese, to hold and manage personal property, the only cases where such a Board could act would be for dormant Parishes or for organized Missions.

In the former case Canon X, Section 5, provides in No. 3 of the Articles of Association of a Parish that "all property which belongs to it, or which shall hereafter be acquired by it, or which shall come under its control, is and forever shall be held by it, so long as it continues to own or control it, under the ecclesiastical authority of the Bishop," etc.

This provides against the alienation of the property of a Parish so long as its organization is continued. Should a Parish, for any cause, fail to continue its organization, by not electing a Vestry, or by not making its annual report to the Convention, unless the reasons therefor are satisfactory to the Bishop, then Canon XVII authorizes the Bishop to take such steps as he may deem necessary to preserve the property of such Parishes for the benefit of the Church.

The Canons seem to regard the Bishop as trustee of the property of dormant and defunct Parishes, with power to take such steps as he may deem necessary to preserve their properties "for the benefit of the Church."

In the case of Organized Missions, Canons VIII and IX give ample power to the Bishop and the Missionary Board of the Diocese to make such provisions as may be necessary. Though these provisions may not meet the strict requirements of the law, yet they are sufficient for all ordinary cases.

Your Committee is therefore of the opinion that it is unnecessary to provide by Canon for the duplication of Boards of Trustees, and beg to be relieved from further consideration of the report referred to them.

This indicates a decrease of 1,496 days, or 15 per cent of the number of days of paid treatment, and an increase of 1,054 days, or 25 per cent of the number of days of free treatment, during the year ending April 30, 1902, as compared with the preceding year, thus showing that the charitable feature of the Hospital's work has shown a substantial gain, and represents a large increased percentage of the total results, that is very creditable to the institution.

Another gratifying result is the fact that during the year just closed special nursing, by the nurses of the Training School, yielded an income of \$3,723.75, while the total expenditures for the maintenance of the school, excluding the cost of subsistence and rental of nurses' home, amounted to \$2,377.99, or a surplus of \$1,345.76 in favor of the revenue of the hospital. This further demonstrates the growing value and usefulness of this important branch as a contributor to the needed funds for hospital work, aside from the great benefit accruing to the welfare of the hospital in other equally important respects, which continues to add largely to the efficiency and popularity of the institution.

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APPENDIX No. 18.

Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Openating Missionany Society

ARTICLE I-NAME.

Section 1. The name of the Society shall be the "Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society of the Diocese of Missouri."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

Section 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERS.

Section 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

Section I. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

ARTICLE V-MEETINGS.

Section I. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direction of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time, at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

Section I. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

Section 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

Section I. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each parish of the Diocese. Each parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

Section 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES-OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

Section I. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject of Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

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APPENDIX A.

Rules of Onden of the Convention.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
- 2. When the President takes the Chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
- 3. When the President shall have taken the Chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
- 4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - On the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - On Constitution and Canons.
 - On Unfinished Business. III.
 - On Finance.
 - V. On Assessments.
 - VI. On Missions.
 - VII. On Christian Education.
 - VIII. On Sunday School Work.
 - IX. X. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses. On the State of the Church.

 - On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- 5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
- 6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
- 7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
- 8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
- A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
 - Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
- II. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

- 12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
- 14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.
- 16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
- 17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
- 18. The reports of all committees shall be in writing, and shall be received of course without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
- 19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
- 20. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

The General Convention recommends Quinquagesima Sunday for an annual offering from every Church, and that a percentage of the Communion Alms be given to this fund.

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Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

Section 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the fund for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

Sec. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
