## Rules of Order of Convention.

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1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
  - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - II. On Assessments.
  - III. On Christian Education.
  - IV. On Constitution and Canons.
  - V. On Finance.
  - VI. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
  - VII. On Missions.
  - VIII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
  - IX. On State of the Church.
  - X. On Sunday-School Work.
  - XI. On Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the service of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee, or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, on a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

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21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders: Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

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# Journal of the Seventieth Convention

## DIOCESE OF MISSOURI.

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### FIRST DAY.

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CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS,  
*Tuesday, May 25, 1909.*

In accordance with notice thereof, duly given, a number of the Clergy of the Diocese and of the Laity chosen as delegates from their respective Parishes, assembled this day in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, the place selected by the last Diocesan Convention, for the purpose of holding the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

At 10 o'clock a. m. the Rt. Rev., the Bishop, and the Clergy, preceded by the Choir, entered the Cathedral singing the one hundred and twenty-sixth hymn.

The Creed and Prayers were read by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Epistle was read by the Rev. Charles F. Collins, of St. Matthew's Church, St. Louis.

The Gospel was read by the Rev. Beverly E. Warner, D. D., of Trinity Church, New Orleans.

The Convention Sermon was preached by the Rev. Franklin M. Weddell, of Christ Church, Rolla.

The Offertory Sentences were read by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis and the Rev. Beverly E. Warner, D. D., of New Orleans, and the Rev. Cassius M. C. Mason, of All Saints' Church, St. Louis.

The Convention reassembled in the Schuyler Memorial House, immediately upon the close of the service, and the Rt. Rev. President called the Convention to order, at 12:15 o'clock.

The Secretary proceeded, under directions of the Bishop, to call the roll of the Clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and forty-three Clergymen answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President then called for the report of the Standing Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, appointed at the last Convention. The Rt. Rev. President stated that the Convention had been kept waiting half an hour for this report, through no fault of the Committee, but simply because all of the Parishes had not sent in their reports, with credentials, before May 7, in accordance with canon law.

Rev. J. A. Dooris, on behalf of the Committee, then presented the report of the Committee, containing the names of the Lay Delegates entitled to seats in the Convention, stating that all of the Parishes and Missions had paid up their assessments and were entitled to representation in the Convention, which report was thereupon read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then called the roll of Lay Delegates reported by the Committee as entitled to seats in the Convention, and Delegates from twenty-five Parishes and Missions answered to their names.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced a quorum of both Orders present, and the Convention ready for business.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that the election of a Secretary was the first order of business.

Mr. E. H. Lycett nominated Mr. Henry H. Denison to be Secretary of the Convention, with authority to appoint his assistant.

There being no other nominations, Rev. J. A. Dooris moved that nominations close, and that Rev. Mr. Potter be instructed to cast the ballot for Mr. Denison.

This motion being duly seconded, and carried, the Rev. Mr. Potter thereupon cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. Henry H. Denison, and he was declared duly elected Secretary of the Convention and of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

Rev. Mr. Duckworth requested the privilege of presenting a "very distinguished stranger," Rev. Beverly E. Warner, D. D., of New Orleans, President of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Louisiana. Upon request of the Rt. Rev. President, Mr. Duckworth escorted Dr. Warner to the platform, and the Rt. Rev. President expressed to Dr. Warner the cordial feelings of all upon the Convention floor.

Dr. Warner replied, thanking the Rt. Rev. President and the Convention for his warm welcome to St. Louis; pointing out also the close relation, historically, which exists between the Diocese of Missouri and the Diocese of Louisiana.

On motion of Prof. Marshall S. Snow, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That visiting Clergy and Candidates for Holy Orders be invited to seats in the Convention.

On motion of Mr. Francis J. McMaster, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Convention meet each morning for divine worship at 9 o'clock in Bofinger Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial House at 10 a. m. to 1 o'clock p. m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 o'clock p. m., and continue to 5 o'clock p. m.

The hour of recess having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that a recess was taken until 2:30 p. m.

After recess, on Tuesday, May 25, 1909, the Convention re-assembled at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

Rev. John A. Dooris, on behalf of the Standing Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, presented a supplementary report, stating that the Mission of Overland Park should be added to the list, and that all the Parishes of the Diocese were now entitled to representation in the Convention.

On motion of Mr. James A. Waterworth, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the rules of order of the last Convention be adopted as the rules of order of this Convention.

Rev. Mr. Potter gave notice that on the following day he would offer an amendment to the Canons, as follows:

*Resolved*, That in the Canons of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri, the following amendments be made:

That Section 1 of Canon III. be amended by striking out, in the twelfth line thereof the figure "7" and inserting in lieu thereof the figure "9."

That Section 1 of Canon XII. be amended by striking out in the first line thereof, the words "on Monday of Easter Week of every year," and substituting the following: "On the first Monday in May of each year."

Mr. Charles S. Freeborn, Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, presented and read the Treasurer's report. (See Appendix, No. 1, page 99.)

On motion, this report was referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion of Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the courtesy of seats in the Convention be extended to the licensed Lay Readers of the Diocese.

The following card was laid upon the Secretary's desk:  
Charles R. Greene, Lay Reader, St. Louis, Mo.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, on behalf of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom were referred the necessary changes in making the transfer and merging of the Fund for Disabled and Infirm Clergy of the Diocese into the General Clergy Relief Fund, in order that said transfer might harmonize with the Constitution and Canons, read the following report of the Committee:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons to whom was referred by the last Diocesan Convention, the resolution offered by the Rev. Mr. Reed (see Journal 1908, page 49), concerning the merger of the Diocesan Fund for the relief of Clergymen, their widows and orphans into the General Clergy Relief Fund; beg leave to report that the changes necessary to carry out the purpose of said resolution are as follows, to-wit:

Repeal Canon XXII. and enact in lieu thereof Canon XXII., as follows:

#### CANON XXII.

Of Funds for the Relief of Clergymen, their Widows and Orphans.

SECTION 1. All money or other property now held or hereafter acquired for the fund for the relief of Clergymen, their Widows and Orphans, shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees, composed of the Bishop, the Treasurer of the Diocese, and of one Clergyman and two Lay Communicants of the Diocese.

The Clergyman and Lay Communicants aforesaid shall be elected by, and hold their office during the pleasure of the Convention, but any vacancies in their number, occurring during recess of the Convention, may be filled by the remaining Trustees, subject to the approval of the next regular Convention.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of said Board, where they lawfully can do so, to cause all money or property heretofore received, or hereafter to be received, for the relief of Clergymen, their Widows and Orphans, to be paid over and delivered promptly to the Treasurer of the General Clergy Relief Fund; and as respects all other money or property heretofore or hereafter received for said purpose, said Board shall consider applications for relief and shall administer said last mentioned money or property according to such rules and principles as it shall adopt, all such rules to be reported to the Convention for revision and approval.

SEC. 3. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be the Treasurer of said Board, and funds not needed for current use shall be invested by the Board, except as is hereinbefore otherwise provided.

SEC. 4. Said Board shall annually report to the Convention.

And amend Canon XX. by striking out all the words contained in lines 6, 7 and 8 thereof, and substituting for said words the following, to-wit:

"Second. For the General Clergy Relief Fund, which shall be made on Christmas Day or the nearest Sunday thereto."

Rev. B. E. Reed gave notice that on the following day he would offer an amendment to the Canons, making such changes as were proposed in the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rt. Rev. the Bishop of the Diocese then read his Annual Address, which, with the record of his Episcopal acts, was laid on the Secretary's table.

On motion of the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the portion of the Bishop's Address referring to the Assessment of \$15 by the Department of the Southwest be referred to the Finance Committee.

Rev. B. E. Reed then presented and read the report of the Sunday-School Commission, as follows:

Your Committee on Sunday-School Work, appointed at the last Convention, herewith respectfully report:

In examining the tabulated record of the Journal of 1908, we find that the Communicants of the Diocese number 8,290, while the Sunday-School scholars number but 4,099. This is a large disproportion, the Communicants being twice as many as the children of the Sunday-School. The Confirmations reported, in the Journal of 1908, were 585; we venture to say, the number is made largely from additions through the Sunday School. We are quite confident that many more trees would have been planted in the House of the Lord, if more care had been given to the nursery of the Church.

Your Committee has thought seriously over the question: Can the Church of the Diocese do more than she is doing for the increase of the Sunday School? Evidently the increase and efficiency of the Sunday School is a personal work. The personal interest of the Rector, Superintendent and teachers is a necessity. A vigorous administration here will, as in every department of work, produce large results. Resolutions will show an interest; but results are the fruit of personal effort. And this must grow out of the realization of the gravity of the situation.

The children of today are tempted by mammonism as never before in the history of Christendom. Moneyed wealth is set before their sensitive young minds as the supreme thing. The slogan of the day is "Put money in thy purse; if by fair means, well; if not—put money in thy purse." The Church says, "You can not serve God and mammon." The age answers, "We know it; as for me and my house, we will serve mammon." In this great peril to the very foundations of the faith, the Church must do more than she is doing.

In view of these and many other grave considerations, we, your Committee, present these resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That it be the sense of this Convention that the clergy of the Diocese shall preach at morning service on "The Sunday School" once in the year.

2. *Resolved*, That the Sunday for the sermon shall be the Sunday nearest to September 15.

After discussion by Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. J. Courtney Jones and others, Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis moved to change the second resolution of the Committee's report, to read:

2. *Resolved*, That the Sunday for the sermon shall be the Sunday appointed by the Joint Diocesan Committee.

This change was accepted by the Committee, and on motion duly made and seconded the report was received and its recommendations adopted with this alteration.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, on behalf of the Committee on Preamble to the Constitutional Amendment proposed by the General Convention, reported progress, and asked that the Committee be continued; also that the name of Mr. Henry L. Chase, of Ferguson, be added thereto.

On motion, the Committee was continued, and the name of Mr. Henry L. Chase added.

The Rt. Rev. President announced that he would appoint the several Standing Committees at tomorrow morning's session.

On motion of Rev. D. C. Garrett, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That a committee of three be appointed to take into consideration the improvement of the form of parochial reports, and report at the next Convention.

Mr. Marshall S. Snow, Secretary of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, thereupon presented and read the report of the Standing Committee, as follows:

The official acts of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri for the Conventional Year 1908-9 are herewith respectfully submitted:

October 1, 1908.—Organized by the election of the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis as President, the Rev. Leslie Fenton Potter as Vice-President, and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary for the ensuing year.

Granted the request of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Virginia and gave consent to the election of a Coadjutor Bishop for that Diocese, on the ground of the extent of diocesan work and for the more vigorous prosecution of the same.

Gave consent to the ordination and the consecration of the Rev. Frederick Joseph Kinsman as Bishop of the Diocese of Delaware.

December 15, 1908.—Gave consent to the ordination and consecration of the Rev. Alfred Harding, D.D., as Bishop of the Diocese of Washington.

March 2, 1909.—Approved the election of the Rev. Benjamin Brewster as Missionary Bishop of Western Colorado.

Approved the election of the Rev. Nathaniel Seymour Thomas as Missionary Bishop of Wyoming.

Recommended the Rev. Edward D. Johnston, deacon, to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the priesthood, with such shortening of time as to allow his ordination to take place before Easter, at the convenience of the Bishop.

May 6, 1909.—Recommended Mr. James Steedman Holland to the Bishop of the Diocese for ordination to the diaconate.

Approved the report of the Secretary of the acts of the Committee during the years 1908-9 for submission to the Diocesan Convention.

Authorized the President of the Committee to certify to the records of this meeting.

Mr. Marshall S. Snow, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund, presented and read the report of the Board of Trustees, as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund submit the following report of the official acts of the Board during the Conventional Year, 1908-9.

November 5, 1908.—Organized by the election of the Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis as Vice-President and Mr. Marshall S. Snow as Secretary and Treasurer for the ensuing year.

February 18, 1909.—The Secretary reported that deeds to Church property had been received and filed since the last meeting of the Board as follows:

1. From the Bonne Terre Land and Cattle Co.
2. From Daniel M. Tucker, Fulton, Mo.
3. From Francis B. Jones, et al, conveying land in Valley Park, Mo.
4. From the Valley Park Land Company conveying certain land in Valley Park, Mo.

Authorized the sale of certain Church property in Shelbina, Mo., for the sum of \$600, and instructed the officers of the Board to sign the deed of transfer.

Granted the petition of St. Philip's Church, St. Louis, to place an additional mortgage of \$3,000 upon the property on Union and Maple Avenues.

Instructed the Secretary of the Board to take proper steps to secure certified copies of all deeds to Church property the titles of which are in this Board in cases where the original deeds are not already in the possession of the Board.

March 20, 1909.—The President having reported that he had received from Mr. W. O. L. Jewett, of Shelbina, Mo., a draft for \$585, being the proceeds of the sale of the Church property at Shelbina, previously authorized by the Board, the Secretary was instructed to make a time deposit of said sum of \$585 in a reputable trust company in St. Louis in the name of the Parochial Trust Company for the use of the members of Emmanuel Church of Shelbina, Mo.

The Rt. Rev. President announced the next order of business to be the report of the Treasurer of the Diocese.

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Diocese, presented and read the report of the Treasurer.

The Rt. Rev. President called special attention to two facts in this report—first, that there is nothing unpaid of the assessments of the last year; secondly, that the liabilities are \$700 more than the assets. The Rt. Rev. President accounted for this difference by the fact that \$700 had been paid for the *Church News* in the last year.

There being no objection, it was ordered that the report be referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 2, page 100.)

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund, presented and read the report of the Treasurer. There being no objection, this report was referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 4, page 106.)

Mr. I. Shreve Carter, Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, presented and read the report of the Treasurer. There being no objection, this report was referred to the Committee on Finance. (See Appendix No. 3, page 103.)

The Rt. Rev. President announced the next order of business to be the election of the Standing Committee, consisting of three Clergymen and three Laymen, and nominations were declared to be in order.

The following Clergymen were nominated: Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Rev. Leslie F. Potter, Rev. D. Claiborne Garrett, Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Rev. J. Hollister Lynch, D. D.

The following Laymen were nominated: Messrs. Marshall S. Snow, James L. Ford, Francis J. McMaster, Charles C. Curtice, Heusted T. Young, Maj. Alexander M. Davis, Curtis M. Jennings, Capt. Isaac M. Mason.

Mr. McMaster asked that his name be withdrawn, on the ground that he was not eligible, as Chancellor of the Diocese. The Rt. Rev. President declared the point well taken, and Mr. McMaster's name was withdrawn.

On motion, the nominations were closed.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon appointed the following tellers:

Rev. J. C. Ingham and Mr. Henry Wood, tellers for the Clergy.

Rev. Stephen F. Sherman and Mr. Wilber F. Knowlton, tellers for the Laity.

A ballot was then taken for the election of the Standing Committee, and the tellers retired.

In accordance with a notice given on the preceding day, Rev. Leslie F. Potter thereupon asked the unanimous consent of the Convention to put upon its passage the resolution to amend Canons III and XII, as follows:

*Resolved*, That the following changes be made in the Diocesan Canons:

That Section 1 of Canon III. be amended by striking out, in the twelfth line thereof, the figure "7" and substituting the figure "9."

That Section 1 of Canon XII. be amended by striking out in the first line the words, "on Monday of Easter Week in every year," and substituting the following: "on the first Monday in May of each year."

There being no objection, the question was declared before the house.

Inquiry was made by Mr. James A. Waterworth as to whether the adoption of this resolution would necessitate a change in the Charter of Christ Church Cathedral. Reply to this was made by Rev. Leslie F. Potter, by reading from the Constitution and Canons, to the effect that no action taken will interfere with any existing constitution or acts of incorporation of a parish.

Rev. D. Claiborne Garrett said that the difficulty could be overcome, when articles of incorporation provided for a meeting on Easter Monday, by holding a postponed meeting on the first Monday in May.

After further discussion by Rev. J. Hollister Lynch, D. D., Mr. Edwin Fregard, Rev. Philip W. Fauntleroy, Mr. James Fetherstonh, Mr. Edward H. Lycett, and the Rt. Rev. President, it was moved by Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, and duly seconded, that this resolution be referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to report tomorrow.

The question being submitted, a division was called for, and the roll being called, the Secretary announced the result to be thirty-two affirmative and thirty-seven negative votes.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared the motion was lost, and announced that the question recurred upon the adoption of the resolution presented by Rev. Mr. Potter.

The question was submitted and carried.

Rev. Henry P. Horton thereupon offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Chair appoint a committee of five to consider whether the method of procedure of the Convention can not be so changed as to make possible the shortening of the duration of the Convention.

The motion was duly seconded, and after discussion was carried.

Thereupon a third ballot was taken, and the tellers retired.

Rev. Benjamin E. Reed thereupon asked the unanimous consent of the Convention to put upon its passage the resolutions to amend Canons XX and XXII, of which notice was given yesterday, as follows:

*Resolved*, That Canon XX be amended by striking out all the words contained in lines six, seven and eight thereof, and substituting for said words the following, to-wit:

"Second. For the General Clergy Relief Fund, which shall be made on Christmas Day or the Sunday nearest thereto."

*Resolved*, To repeal Canon XXII and to enact in lieu thereof Canon XXII, as follows:

"CANON XXII.

"Of the Fund for the Relief of Clergymen, their Widows and Orphans.

"Section 1. All money or other property now held or hereafter acquired for the Fund for the Relief of Clergymen, their Widows or Orphans shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees, composed of the Bishop, the Treasurer of the Diocese and of one Clergyman and two Lay Communicants of the Diocese.

"The Clergyman and Lay Communicants aforesaid shall be elected by, and hold their office during the pleasure of, the Convention, but any vacancies in their number, occurring during a recess of the Convention, may be filled by the remaining Trustees, subject to the approval of the next regular Convention.

"Section 2. It shall be the duty of said Board, where they lawfully can do so, to cause all money or property heretofore received, or hereafter to be received, for the relief of Clergymen, their widows and orphans, to be paid over and delivered promptly to the Treasurer of the General Clergy Relief Fund; and, as respects all other money or property heretofore or hereafter received for said purpose, said Board shall consider applications for relief and shall administer said last mentioned money or property according to such rules and principles as it shall adopt, all such rules to be reported to the Convention for revision and approval.

"Section 3. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be the Treasurer of said Board, and funds not needed for current use shall be invested by the Board, except as is hereinbefore otherwise provided.

"Section 4. Said Board shall annually report to the Convention."

Objection to immediate consideration was offered by Rev. William A. Hatch. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the resolutions were referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to report tomorrow, if possible.

Rev. Philip W. Fauntleroy called the attention of the Convention to the fact that in the printed copies of the Constitution and Canons, a clause does not appear which has been added by the Convention to Canon X, which takes away the provision that the Bishop and the Standing Committee cannot locate any church within 1,000 yards of another church.

The tellers appointed to take the ballot for the election of the third Lay member of the Standing Committee having returned and made their report, the result was declared as follows:

There being no objection, the question was declared before the House.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Thomas A. Buckland offered the following resolution, which was duly seconded and unanimously adopted:

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Convention be extended to the Rev. Mr. Weddell, of Rolla, Mo., for the sermon preached at the opening of this Convention.

This resolution being duly seconded, the Rt. Rev. President asked if there be any objections, and objection was offered by Rev. George Lloyd, whereupon the Rt. Rev. President announced that the election would be by ballot, and that nominations were in order for three Clergymen and five Laymen to serve upon the Diocesan Missionary Board.

The Trustees of the University of the South for Missouri beg leave to report that the University is closing its most successful year.

The change in the Academic Year to accord with that of other educational institutions is meeting with universal approval.

This Diocese was asked for \$300 towards the support of St. Luke's Theological Department, and the amount has been raised chiefly through letters to individuals.

We are convinced that the future of the University is assured as a power for the Church, and we hope that Missouri may have a larger share in its work. We therefore propose the following:

*Resolved*, That this Convention hears with gratitude of the growth of the University of the South at Sewanee, and earnestly commends it to the interest and support of the Church people of Missouri.

This amendment was accepted by Rev. Mr. Elmer, and the motion being duly seconded and carried, the Secretary thereupon cast the ballot of the Convention for Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Dr. Fayette C. Ewing and Mr. James A. Waterworth as Trustees for the University of the South.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared that the gentlemen nominated were duly elected Trustees for the University of the South.

Upon motion, duly seconded and carried, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That a committee of three be appointed to consider and report this afternoon upon the statement of the committee concerning the *Church News*.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon appointed as members of this Committee:

Rev. Leslie F. Potter. Rev. William Elmer. Mr. Arthur J. Watling.

Rev. E. Duckworth, Chairman of the Committee on the Dinner at the Mercantile Club, Monday evening, May 24th, at which Rev. Beverly E. Warner, D. D., was guest of honor, presented a financial report of the dinner, showing a balance to the Committee's credit of \$60.69, which the Committee turned over to Dean Davis for the traveling expenses and the entertainment of the Delegates who have come from the country. Mr. Duckworth said that he wished to express his personal thanks and the thanks of the Committee to Dr. Warner for his great courtesy and kindness in coming to us at this time.

Mr. James A. Waterworth said that the "hearty thanks of every member of this Convention are due to the Committee who conceived and carried out so admirably the splendid programme which has marked this Convention as one of the most pleasant that has ever assembled in this place," and added that if there were more leadership of the Clergy in these matters which tend to unify Clergy and Laity, this Diocese would be better served than by giving so many matters to the Laity.

Mr. Waterworth thereupon offered the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Convention and its guests extend sincere thanks to the committee who carried out this banquet and its programme.

Upon being duly seconded, this resolution was passed unanimously.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon invited the Rev. Beverly E. Warner, D. D., to the platform, and addressed him as follows:

Our hearts are full of gratitude to you for coming from the far Southland, to stay with us two or three days, and the only uncomfortable, unrejoicing moment we have had in our association with you since you came here, is this one, when we know that within ten minutes you must say good-bye.

Dr. Warner, in response, said that the very height of hospitality had been reached in the treatment which he had received in St. Louis, from the moment he landed in the city until now; that he saw in the Diocesan Convention of Missouri the Delegates meeting the same difficulties and the same anxieties with "the same fine optimisms about them that we try to cultivate down in Louisiana;" and that he greatly desired to return to St. Louis at some future time.

Rev. William Elmer then presented and read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, as follows:

Your Committee on the State of the Church beg leave to report as follows:

In looking over the work of the Diocese during the past year, your committee sees many signs of growth. While the confirmations were a few less than in the year preceding, this may be easily accounted for by the vacancies in several of the important Parishes and Missions of the Diocese. Most of these vacancies have now been filled, and the prospects are that all of them will soon be occupied, and that next year very substantial growth may be effected under God's blessing along the whole line.

In the establishment by the Archdeacon of four new Missions in country towns, some very important centers have now the Church's services, and in this virgin soil we look for a rich harvest, and we, with our Bishop, congratulate the Diocese on these results.

In St. Louis we would again call attention to the beneficent work being done by those Missionaries of the Missionary Board who labor in our city institutions, and also to the work being done at St. Stephen's House and Holy Cross House; and as it is impossible for the Missionary Board, owing to its lack of funds, to provide all the means necessary for all these good works, we appeal to the Clergy and Laity and urge them ever to have this work in mind and contribute liberally, that the many demands made upon these Missionaries may be met in a liberal spirit.

Your Committee would also commend the work of our City Missionary. He has a difficult field of labor in gathering together the scattered children of the Church who are without parochial attachment. We would especially call attention to his appeal for the Advent Mission. The payment of the debt on its property would give it a great impetus, and encourage a struggling band to more effective work for the Church in their locality.

In conclusion, your Committee would say that the growth of the Church in the Diocese depends, after God's blessing, upon our upholding the hands of our Bishop and the Missionary Board, by more liberal contribu-

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tions, to extend the Church in new fields and enlarge the work in fields already established. The opportunities are unlimited, the field is "white for the harvest," and upon us has God placed the responsibility. We are not living up to this responsibility as we should. For this reason your Committee beg leave to offer the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The results of missionary work in this Diocese are not commensurate with the wealth and number of its people; and,

WHEREAS, The increase in number of communicants in the Diocese is not keeping pace with the growth of population; be it therefore

*Resolved*, That a committee of three Clergy and three Laity be appointed by the Bishop to consider missionary conditions and methods in the Diocese and report at the next Convention.

This substitute was duly seconded.

The hour of recess having arrived, the Rt. Rev. President announced that a recess would be taken until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

After recess on Thursday, May 27, 1909, the Convention re-assembled at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

Mr. Edmond J. Thomas presented and read the report of the Committee on Assessments. (See Appendix No. 14, page 127.)

On motion, duly made and seconded, the report, as read, was adopted by the Convention.

Upon a call being made by Rev. Benjamin E. Reed for the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, touching the

special matter of the Merging of the Funds of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund with the General Clergy Relief Fund, Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy thereupon presented this report, as follows:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred the motion of Rev. Mr. Reed to amend Canons XX and XXII, in order to effect the merger of the Funds for Relief of Clergymen, etc. recommend that the amendment specified in said motion be made.

Rev. Leslie F. Potter offered as a substitute the following:

*Resolved*, That the words contained in lines six, seven and eight in Canon XX be stricken out and the following substituted: "2. For the General Clergy Relief Fund, which shall be made on Christmas Day, or the Sunday nearest thereto."

The Rt. Rev. President ruled the substitute out of order, on the ground that it was directed to the report of the Committee, with which the Convention was not now dealing, but only with a specific recommendation appended to that report.

Thereupon Rev. Mr. Potter withdrew his resolution.

Mr. Henry H. Denison then moved:

That the whole matter be laid upon the table, which motion was duly seconded.

The question being submitted, a division was called for, and the roll being called, the Secretary announced the result to be thirty-six affirmative and thirty-one negative votes.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon declared the subject-matter to be laid upon the table.

The Rt. Rev. President declared the election of a Treasurer to be in order.

Rev. Mr. Potter nominated Mr. I. Shreve Carter as Treasurer, and there being no other nominations, on motion, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Mr. I. Shreve Carter.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President declared Mr. I. Shreve Carter elected as Treasurer of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

The Rt. Rev. President then announced that Rev. William Elmer is entitled to the floor, as Chairman of the Committee on the State of the Church, and that the business before the house is Rev. Mr. Elmer's resolution that three Clergymen and three Laymen be invited to look into affairs; with the subsequent resolution that this be referred to the Standing Committee on Missions.

Mr. Marshall S. Snow offered the following as a substitute for previous motions:

*Resolved*, That the report of the Committee on the State of the Church, and the resolution appended to the same, be referred to the Missionary Board.

As a substitute for the whole matter, the following resolution was offered by Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy:

*Resolved*, That it is the sense of this Convention that it is within the power and province of the Standing Committee on the State of the Church to inquire into and report upon the missionary business and affairs of the Diocese, and the Convention does not deem it necessary to take any special action at this time in relation thereto.

Rev. Mr. Elmer inquired, Would the Committee on the State of the Church have power to make investigation?

The Rt. Rev. President replied, It is so stated.

The question of substituting Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy's resolution for Rev. Mr. Elmer's resolution and all substitutes preceding, having been duly seconded, was submitted and adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President thereupon announced that the resolution offered by Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy, having been duly substituted, was before the Convention for its action.

Upon motion, duly made and seconded, the resolution of Rev. Mr. Fauntleroy was adopted.

Rev. Leslie F. Potter then offered the following report:

Your Committee to whom was referred the business policy of the *Church News* beg leave to report that they have agreed to offer to the Convention the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Diocese of Missouri subscribe for a sufficient number of copies of the *Church News* to enable us to place it in the hands of every family in the Diocese.

*Resolved, further*, That this Convention appropriate the sum of \$580 for this purpose.

Upon motion, duly seconded, this resolution was adopted.

The Rt. Rev. President announced as the Committee on the *Church News*:

The Rt. Rev. President announced that this Committee was empowered to obligate the Convention to the extent of \$25 a month for the ensuing year.

Rev. Henry P. Horton thereupon presented the following report:

Your Committee, appointed to consider the advisability of shortening the duration of the Convention, report that they find further time needed to investigate the procedure of other conventions, and to consider methods, and request permission to present their final report to the next convention.

Upon motion, duly made and seconded, the report was adopted, and the Committee continued.

Upon motion of Very Rev. Carroll M. Davis, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Treasurer be authorized to draw his warrant for the sum of fifteen dollars assessed by the Missionary Council of the Department of the Southwest, and recommended by the Finance Committee.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy offered the following resolution:

This Convention having learned with deep regret through the Bishop's Annual Address of the retirement of the Rev. G. D. B. Miller from the Rectorship of St. Augustine's Parish, desires hereby to put on record its high esteem of him as a man and as a Priest of the Church, and its hearty appreciation of his long and useful work in the past, and to express the hope that many years of continued usefulness may be vouchsafed to him.

The motion was duly seconded, and unanimously adopted.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Constantin L. von Renthal, was duly seconded and adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Rt. Rev. President be authorized to certify to the correctness of this day's proceedings.

Upon motion of Mr. Arthur B. Ambler, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That a special committee of three be appointed to make arrangements for the missionary meeting at the next Annual Convention of the Diocese.

The Rt. Rev. President appointed as this Committee the following:

Mr. Arthur B. Ambler.

Upon motion of Mr. Constantin L. von Renthal, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the Secretary be instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the Diocese in favor of H. H. Darby for \$20 for services of the Choir of Christ Church Cathedral at the opening session of the Convention.



Mr. Constantin L. von Renthall offered the following resolution, which was read by the Secretary, and was duly seconded and unanimously adopted:

*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Convention be returned to Mrs. Darby and her corps of assistants for the most excellent lunches furnished the Convention the past three days.

Mr. Constantin L. von Renthall nominated the following-named gentlemen Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate:

Mr. I. Shreve Carter.

Mr. Frederick N. Judson.

There being no other nominations, on motion of Rev. Mr. Potter, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the above-named gentlemen.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President announced that Mr. Charles S. Freeborn, Mr. I. Shreve Carter and Mr. Frederick N. Judson were elected as Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate.

Rev. G. D. B. Miller nominated Rev. Claude E. Remick as Librarian, and there being no further nominations, on motion, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for Rev. Claude E. Remick.

The Secretary so cast the ballot, and the Rt. Rev. President declared Rev. Claude E. Remick elected as Librarian of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

Rev. P. W. Fauntleroy, on behalf of the Special Committee on Amendment to Constitution, proposed by General Convention, reported progress, and asked that the Committee be continued to the next Convention.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was granted.

Rev. C. E. Wheat presented the report of the Committee on Missionaries' Traveling Expenses. (See Appendix No. 15, page 129.)

On motion, duly made and seconded, the report, as read, was adopted by the Convention.

There being no further business before the Convention, a motion to adjourn was made by Rev. Mr. Duckworth, duly seconded and carried.

After a few words by the Rt. Rev. President, thanking the Delegates for their attendance, their faithfulness and their diligence, and expressing his wishes for divine guidance in the future, the Benediction was pronounced, and the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS  
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TO THE  
SEVENTIETH CONVENTION.

*Dear Brethren:*

When sitting down to pen my Annual Address it is my custom first to recount the names of my brethren in the House of Bishops who have departed this life during the year last past. You may well believe that soberness and solemnity stand close-waiting attendants on that recount. When I entered the House of Bishops its total membership summed up forty-three. Today it numbers one hundred and three. And since my entering ninety-seven have departed from that house in death. God mercifully have us all in His holy keeping! During the last year three have died.

Bishop Henry C. Potter, of New York, was Bishop in the leading Diocese of our American Church for nearly twenty-five years. For four of these he was Bishop Coadjutor to his uncle, Bishop Horatio Potter. He was the son of Bishop Alonzo Potter of Pennsylvania. He was secretary of the House of Bishops at the time when he was made Bishop, and had been such officer for seventeen years. So was he eminently equipped for service as a Bishop in the Church of God. That service he rendered faithfully, and untiringly. Quick of discernment, wise of judgment, prompt in action and devoted to duty, he met with courage and success the responsibilities devolved upon him by the incessant activities of his great Diocese; while his accomplished skill and prolonged experience made him a helpful and most valued guide in the deliberations of the House of Bishops.

Bishop Knight, of Western Colorado, died in his early manhood. He was Bishop for less than one year. This is a shorter term of service than that of any other Bishop of the American Church, except in the case of Bishop Parker, the second Bishop of Massachusetts, who served less than three months. But so earnest was the work of Bishop Knight, so loving his heart, so tactful his ways, so unselfishly devoted his life that his short career in Western Colorado was a benediction to the district, and his sweet service there was indeed an effective preaching to the people of Christ's blessed Gospel.

Bishop Gillespie, of Western Michigan, was the Nestor of the House of Bishops. He was nearly ninety when he died and he had been Bishop for over thirty-four years. A whole generation grew up under him and were guided by him in Western Michigan. A clear head, a kindly heart and a

holy life made that guidance most beneficent. As the chairman for many years of the Michigan Board of Charities and Corrections, he was a widely known and deeply respected citizen of the State, uncompromisingly loyal to the Church, a very John Baptist for bold rebuke, his daily walk was that of sweet Christian humility. I have been thrown with him not a little in late years. I shall miss his helpful counsel and his holy example. God's peace is his.

And Mr. George C. Thomas, of Philadelphia, has been taken away. His death is a staggering blow to our great missionary work. That work has been guided and steadied and promoted by him more than by any other one man, Bishop, Priest or Layman, for the last ten years. The thoughts of his days and the visions of his nights were given to it. There was no more faithful and diligent and unselfish a soldier and servant of the Lord Jesus Christ in our American life than was he. Surely the rest of Paradise is sweet to one who worked so hard. May God mercifully raise up leaders and helpers that the stricken missionary work of Christ's Militant Church here on earth may not suffer!

Death has demanded much in its yearly tribute from the members of our own Diocese.

One from our Clergy list, the Rev. W. H. D. Hatton, at an advanced age. Mr. Hatton came to the Diocese in 1865 and remained at Jefferson City as Rector of the Parish and manager of a school for about three years. Then he went to Warrensburg and remained there and near there, but without parochial charge, for eighteen years. In 1866 and just about the time of my coming to the Diocese he removed to Harrisburg, Pa., where the last years of his life were spent and where he died. I met him only once when, some years since, he called upon me in St. Louis.

Many departures of men and women of the Diocese from the Church Militant to the Church Expectant have taken place, entailing much loss. Among them Mr. Covington, of Salem; Mr. Russell, the Warden of St. John's, Sullivan; Mr. Kemp, the Senior Warden of St. Paul's, Palmyra, and Mr. S. S. Hutchins, the most painstaking and useful Secretary of St. Luke's Hospital. Mr. Martin Collins was steady in service and generous of help in St. Mark's and Ascension, St. Louis. Mr. William Barr, though of late a non-resident, was a steadfast friend to the Diocese and a giver to its needs for many long years. Col. Ellerbe was the very founder of the Parish at Ferguson, Mr. Lackland, of St. Charles, was a combined embodiment of holiness of life and devotion to the Church and sagacious practical sense. James B. Gazzam, lately fallen on sleep, made proof of his loyalty and fidelity by giving to Christ Church his unstinted and efficient services as its Treasurer for forty-three years. Mr. C. R. Gregory, though of late residing in France, never forgot his privileges or wavered in his generous duties to the home Church of his earlier years. From

among the women, Mrs. Lowe, of Cuba, and Mrs. Tracy, of Kirkwood, and in St. Louis, Mrs. Hall, of St. Augustine's, and Mrs. Rebecca Lewis, of St. George's, and Mrs. Clark, of Holy Communion, are gone. Mrs. De Vinney, of Old Orchard, in going away left behind help for the Diocese and the Church. Mrs. William James, of St. James', a gentle saint, though herself a Presbyterian, loved our Church and gave constant and generous aid to not a few of our charities and missions. And Mrs. Wm. R. Donaldson, a communicant of St. Stephen's, whose bounteous but almost hidden generosity has been of the greatest help to St. Stephen's and missions, and who gave a splendid tract of land for a country outing place to that mission, died in March.

Ah, me! life and the work of life and the good in life were strengthened and sweetened by all these. Their deaths are loss to us but gain unspeakable of peace and rest and love to them.

Under the accumulation of gathering years the Rev. Mr. Miller, of St. Augustine's, St. Louis, has felt constrained to resign his cure. His retirement comes to me as a personal sorrow. We have kept step together, fellow soldiers, for nearly half a century. The grief is abated somewhat from knowledge that he will remain a resident in his old Parish, and will continue to serve the Diocese as Bishop's Secretary and the Editor of the *Church News*.

In the pastorships of the Diocese there have been many and protracted vacancies. Yet we have been able to fill some of them. Those that exist now are DeSoto, Jefferson City, Cuba, Fredericktown, LaPlata, Montgomery, Portland, Shelbina, Sullivan, and in St. Louis, Holy Communion and St. Augustine's. Five additional Clergymen are needed for these places.

Improvements are by no means lacking. At Clarksville a generous parishioner has provided a recess chancel and furniture as a memorial gift. At Bonne Terre, a Parish house has been given, and a site for a future Church has been secured. In St. Louis the Ascension is building a large and substantial new Church. St. John's Parish, since moving to Tower Grove Park, has wonderfully expanded. St. Alban's has removed to a site which it owns. Epiphany has a pastor for itself in one who presided over its infant beginnings and who has now come back to give it paternal care. St. Philip's has wisely secured an adjoining piece of land, making its plant an excellent one. As regards indebtedness, St. Peter's, St. Louis, and Rolla have cleared theirs all off. In St. Louis, the Redeemer and Holy Innocents' have reduced theirs. Holy Cross Mission, St. Louis, has been so fortunate as to secure for its supervision the expertness and discretion of the Rev. Mr. Mizner; while under that same expertness and discretion St. Stephen's Mission has gone on in what I esteem to be an eminently successful work.

Four new missions have been organized—St. Luke's, Bonne Terre; Trinity, Fulton; St. John's, Salem, and Holy Cross, Sherman. In organ-

izing these, and in caring for vacant pastorship, and in securing pastors, and in instituting new and important work in University City, and in reducing confusion and irritation at Cape Girardeau to sane and healthy and harmonious conditions, the Archdeacon has done untiring duty and given most valuable help, and I am his grateful debtor.

It may not be denied that the unselfishness which is embodied in missionary work is a reliable measure of the real life of a Diocese. Well, the Archdeacon's work is this, and so is Mr. Cochran's in his City Missions, and so is Mr. Brittain's in Hospital Missions, and so is Mr. Cloud's in his Mission among deaf mutes, and so preeminently are St. Stephen's and Holy Cross Missions; let alone such genuinely unselfish work as is done by St. Luke's Hospital and the School of the Sisterhood of the Good Shepherd and the Orphans' Home and the Home for Convalescent Women.

Then there is the constant help extended by our Board of Diocesan Missions to the more feeble congregations scattered throughout our field. The pledges for Diocesan Missions of the last year, including the generous gift of \$1,000 from Mr. E. G. Lewis, amounted to \$8,592.50; and it is a great comfort to know that we can reasonably count them all as paid. Add to this sum what the Parishes gave last year for General Missions, \$4,184.36; and what the Sunday Schools gave, \$1,800; and what the Sunday Schools gave for the Missionary Host, \$1,000; and what was given for the Convalescent Home, \$1,921; and for the Orphans' Home, \$669.20; and what the band of young church women gave for Holy Cross, \$600; and what the Brotherhood of St. Andrew gave for help to Hospital Missions, \$300; and what the Woman's Auxiliary has given, \$5,474.96, and we have in dollars and cents that I know of and can count up as given really for missions the sum of \$24,542.02.

That all this is so my heart is warmly thankful. But my happiness in it is marred, I confess, by knowing that we of Missouri did not give the \$5,800 asked of us for Domestic and Foreign Missions. We gave only \$4,184.36, and so fell short \$1,615.64. A crumb of comfort is that we gave \$57 more than the year before. Some day I earnestly hope we shall reach up to our \$5,800. I long for that day to come.

I feel obliged to say that in order to keep our Diocesan missionary work in steady and healthful condition we need \$9,450 this coming year. As our last year's pledges were \$8,600, we see that there needs to be a little increase all along the line in our pledges for this year.

I may mention that our Southwest Missionary Department (we have given this name to our Seventh Department) has assessed each Diocese and Missionary District within its borders \$15 to meet necessary expenses of the organization. I shall be glad to have this matter referred by motion to our Committee on Finance.

I am sorry to learn that in some instances Treasurers or Accounting Officers of Vestries or Parishes allow themselves to be less strict than they

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ought to be in their custodianship of funds. To hold funds for fixed purposes is a sacred trust anyway. Surely to hold church funds for fixed purposes should not be less sacred. To deflect or divert or to use for other purposes funds given for a specified purpose, save by the consent of the givers after a plain request and clear permission, is reprehensible. And to keep hold of funds when they ought to be forwarded without delay to the credit of the object for which they were given is most objectionable. I earnestly ask for straight methods of business and honest ways of trusteeship in all affairs of the Diocese and its Parishes. And let the strict and clean methods manifest themselves in a scrupulously careful holding, and a no less scrupulously prompt turning over to the owners, of funds entrusted.

We are assembled in our Seventieth Convention. The Primary Convention of this Diocese met in Christ Church, St. Louis, November 17, 1840. The Bishop and eight Clergymen and ten Laymen seem to have gotten together to organize the Diocese of Missouri. The Bishop was Jackson Kemper, Missionary Bishop of Missouri and Indiana, who had now been in the field for five years. Boonville, Jefferson City, Palmyra and St. Charles sent each its Clergymen. St. Louis had two Parishes—Christ and St. Paul's, the latter of which has long ceased to exist. A President of Kemper College and a Chaplain at Jefferson Barracks filled out the clerical list. There were in all the United States 1,052 Clergymen and 19 Bishops. The youngest of these last was Bishop Whittingham, of Maryland, then a Bishop of only two months. The Senior and Presiding Bishop was Bishop Griswold, who had been chosen in 1811 Bishop of the Eastern Diocese, which comprised all of New England, except Connecticut, and who in 1832 had been relieved of the care of Vermont by the election of Bishop Hopkins. Bishop Polk had been consecrated in 1838 to be Missionary Bishop of the Southwest.

From the first organization of the Diocese of Missouri, admitted as it was in the General Convention held in New York City in 1841, effort was made to secure a Bishop of its own, because of the immense missionary field, which taxed the energies of Bishop Kemper. Success was reached in 1844 when Cicero S. Hawks was chosen to be concurrently Rector of Christ Church, St. Louis, and Bishop of Missouri.

God's merciful hand of guidance and help has been upon our Diocese; we have entered into our inheritance provided by earnest and godly and able men who labored much in those early days for the Church's welfare.

God help us, in our day and generation, to stand steady as they did, that we may hand on the inheritance undiminished and unencumbered to our children and our children's children. Surely it is worth while to stand steady for God's cause, to lose self in Christ's service, and through his merits and mercies to add a bit of strength and hope to His Militant Church here on earth ere we are called to pass away out of it.

## Archdeacon's Annual Report.

ST. LOUIS, MO., MAY 25, 1909.

*To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., and Members of the Convention:*

About 1899, the Missouri Journals reveal a great missionary awakening in the Diocese. At every Convention since the subject of Church Extension and Ways and Means has been agitated until, at last, in 1907, a new method was inaugurated, which led to renewed interest and energy in the labor of the Diocese at large.

The last year (1908-9) has been a period memorable through its numerous Parochial vacancies. An epidemic of clerical resignation has prevailed, without adequate cause. While this is to be deplored, yet a vacancy from time to time is not without its point of advantage, as during such vacancy, the Archdeacon has the privilege of visiting the vacant Mission, making the acquaintance of the people individually, ascertaining their peculiar situation and necessities, and making such alterations in detail as his experience may indicate are necessary.

Referring to methods now in vogue, it is often said that no man can do practical work by visiting a station once a month and holding one service. Especially, it is asserted, is this true of the spiritual part of Church Extension. In answer to this, it may be remarked, that notwithstanding the numerous vacancies in the rural field for the year just passed, the actual number of confirmations has averaged *higher* than in previous years. Under the blessing of God, more persons have been presented for confirmation than is recorded in any of the Parishes of the Diocese, the largest number of confirmations in any Parish being 49, while the Archdeacon presented 52. This, also, is more than half the number presented by the Missions and smallest Parishes of the rural field collectively. The above is intended to illustrate the possibilities of "the method" and not the capabilities of any man.

(Here the Archdeacon was reminded by the Bishop of the limited time, and was compelled to omit the explanation of the work indicated by the maps provided for the Convention.)

Briefly, I am building at Salem, and will combine St. James, Sullivan and Cuba with this point, thus creating a strong group, almost self-supporting.

Immediate work is proposed at Washington, although the Archdeacon has done nothing as yet at that point. This will strengthen the Valley Park and Sherman group.

At Bonne Terre we have not only a lot, one of the best in town, but a Parish House, which we will move to the back of this lot and will place the Chapel on the front.

At Portland, we are going to exchange the proprietary Chapel, belonging to Mr. Gill, for a stone Church of our own. We have a lot and the money to build.

Fulton is the possessor of a \$2,000 lot and will build as soon as the contractor gets started. Jefferson City is quite weak, but when the buildings are complete at Portland and Fulton, they can be combined with Jefferson City, increasing quite largely the income at that point. We thus create another strong group, Jefferson City as a center.

The above are samples of the way in which the work is conducted and effectually disposes of the assertion that the Archdeacon is "creating weak points" and "increasing the obligations" of an already overburdened Diocese. Every point created is a source of *strength*—in combination with the points adjacent.

The whole southern portion of the State below Cape Girardeau is without Church representation. Some work *must be done* there as soon as the Archdeacon can unload a portion of his present burden. Along the whole line of the Rock Island R. R. there is not a single Mission of the Church from St. Louis to the border. At Eldon, where there is a nucleus, I may create a Mission, provided I can get reinforcement from the surrounding towns. Nothing will be done at Eldon if this can not be done, as it would be a violation of my rule, *i. e.* (under the present circumstances), *not to create* a weak, isolated Mission.

Valley Park and Sherman are being worked together, with good results. The Valley Park Church was completed and paid for this year. It has an unusually large Guild, with an average regular attendance of 16 members.

A faithful band of Lay Readers still continue their work systematically. For the steady, self-denying devotion of these good men, the whole Diocese should be grateful.

At present the various denominations of the State have institutions of learning scattered from one end of the Diocese to the other. All recognize how valuable these institutions are as centers for propagating the views of the denominations which they represent. Within the limits of our own Diocese we have only Bishop Robertson Hall, situated in the City of St. Louis.

I propose, as soon as practicable, to suggest to the authorities of the Diocese two institutions of learning, male and female, well capitalized, and located in University City. The time is not yet ripe for the statement of the plan, although it is already formulated in my own mind.

In conclusion, allow me to say that the large unoccupied field before us should be a source of inspiration. The work is not impossible if vigorously and effectively pushed. I must ask, however, of my brethren of the Clergy, and the Diocese at large, not only some financial reinforcement, but words of hope and cheer. Thus reinforced, we will soon be able to plant our flag in many of the unoccupied towns of the Diocese of Missouri.

## APPENDIX No. 5.

### Report of Committee on Finance.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows, viz.:

We have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Diocese, the Theological Education Fund, Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, and the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate; also the Trust Fund in the hands of the Bishop of the Diocese. The accounts were found to be correct, and the securities and cash balances as stated in the several reports.

The Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate amounts to \$21,600.58, a net increase of \$855.10 for the year. We would urge the importance of increasing this fund to at least \$50,000.00, so that the income could be used to materially reduce the assessment which has to be made on the several Parishes and Missions for the expenses of the Diocese.

## APPENDIX No. 6.

## Report of the Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

The Board held its first meeting after the Convention on May 25, 1908, and organized by electing Mr. F. J. McMaster as Secretary and Mr. E. H. Lycett as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

At this meeting the Bishop presented the certified check of Mr. E. G. Lewis for the sum of \$1,000. The Board accepted the check, passed it to its credit, and ordered that owing to a deficiency in the pledges for the ensuing year that the \$1,000 be applied to the salary of the Archdeacon, commencing June 1, 1908.

In accordance with the action of the Convention in amending Canon IX, so as to require the Board to appoint a Finance Committee to raise funds for missionary purposes in the Diocese, the Board at its first meeting appointed as such committee Rev. D. C. Garrett, Rev. J. H. Lynch and Mr. A. M. Davis. The Board also appointed at this meeting a committee consisting of Rev. E. Duckworth, Rev. J. H. Lynch and Mr. C. C. Curtice, to supervise the work of the City Missionary and his assistants, the Hospital Missionary and his assistants, and the work at Holy Cross Mission, and to be a council of advice to them between the meetings of the Board, and also to secure from them reports of their work, to be submitted to the Board.

On December 1, 1908, the Board placed Holy Cross Mission under the charge of Rev. H. W. Mizner, upon the same basis that he had charge of St. Stephen's, and also with the understanding he was to have a Curate to assist him. This entailed an expenditure of about \$1,500, which was to be raised in the following manner: Appropriation from the Board for a Curate for St. Stephen's, \$500, to be secured by Mr. Mizner, together with the sum he had on hand, \$250; contributed by Miss Skinker, \$100; contributed by St. Peter's Parish, \$300; to be raised by Rev. Mr. Duckworth, \$250, and the continuation of the stipend being paid by the Board to a Lay Reader at Holy Cross of \$120.

**Hospital Missions.**

REPORT FOR 1908-9.

The members of the staff of this branch of the Church's work in St. Louis have pleasure in presenting their report for the year just closed to the Right Reverend, the Bishop of the Diocese and the Missionary Board.

The official staff has continued without any change during the year, and the work in all the City Institutions has been conducted with unabated zeal and with ever-increasing signs of appreciation and usefulness, and with the most hearty, unflinching co-operation and support from the City Parishes. We owe much to the officials in the City Hall and Institutions themselves for many privileges and unhindered free access to those to whom we endeavored to minister, and for a very distinct recognition of the sincerity of our aims and purposes. Since October 1st, our Lay Missionary, Mr. Fanning, has given us the whole of his time, and certain members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew have very generously continued their help in providing a portion of his salary. The Rev. Mr. Clark, of St. Paul's, Carondelet, gave up the service at the Work House shortly before leaving that Parish, in January, and since then it has been taken by the regular staff. The Rev. Mr. Johnston, of the Cathedral staff, has looked after the City Hospital service on Sunday afternoons with great acceptance. The regular Sunday services now maintained in the Institution are seven in number, and there are two others held during the week. Occasional services are given, as called for, at any time in all of them. Our band of voluntary workers have in no degree lessened their faithfulness and interest, and is now larger than at any time previous, many new valuable friends having joined us this year. To them all the Mission, and therefore the whole Diocese, owes unbounded gratitude for manifesting the Church's care so lovingly in all directions.

In the Institutions themselves, there have been but few official changes, and nothing has occurred to mar the harmony always existing in our relationship. A notable feature has been the erection at the Poor House of the first building definitely planned for religious services. Elsewhere all services are held in rooms more or less fittingly adapted to the purpose. The plans for the large extension to the Insane Asylum make provision for such a building, and we sincerely hope that the 2,000 inmates and 300 attendants who will be gathered there may have opportunities given to them for common worship. The conditions at the Work House are at

last to be improved, and we anticipate with pleasure the time when our services may be held amid less unpleasant and unseemly surroundings.

A survey of the whole year leads us naturally to some sort of answer to the two questions frequently brought before us: Is there still so great a need, with the increasing activity generally in philanthropic work, for our missions, and does the response met with signify any satisfying of the need? The first question is answered by the simple statement that we are the only organization working all the City Institutions on a systematic, wide, liberal basis, knowing no distinctions of faith, nation or color. In all of them we have and do work which no others could do. The response met with is in no degree uncertain, while we can not hope to do all that might be done. Our workers really have to bear the burdens and meet the cares of six or seven large Parishes of only the poorest people, and the tribute to our usefulness is ungrudgingly and unmistakably given.

The great problem before us is the adequate after-care of our people. The convalescent, the homeless, the friendless, the resourceless and the clothesless are on our hands continually, and care in the Institution is often only wasted effort unless some end is in sight for something of a permanent settlement. Our Contingent Fund has enabled us to meet some needs of great urgency, and some Parishes have nobly held up our hands in this direction. The field for social service is widening all the time and large developments may be looked for in the future. The head of the staff has the honor of being the chairman of a joint committee representing the Social Service Conference and the Humanity Club of this city, brought together to consider such questions in connection with the City Hospital.

The various tables accompanying this report will explain themselves.

We render thanks to all who have made possible the "joy of service," both in those who serve and those who are served. We make our humble acknowledgments to our blessed Lord and Master of the many blessings given to us during the year, and we pray and beg the prayers of others for a continuance of them in the future.

## APPENDIX No. 18.

## Constitution of the Laymen's Co-Operating Missionary Society

## ARTICLE I—NAME.

SECTION 1. The name of the Society shall be the "LAYMEN'S CO-OPERATING MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI."

## ARTICLE II—OBJECT.

SECTION 1. The object of the Society is to devise ways and means for the collection of funds on a systematic plan for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

## ARTICLE III—MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The Society shall be composed of Lay Delegates appointed by the several Auxiliary Societies; each Society being entitled to *three* delegates, and also an additional delegate for every twenty paying members thereof.

## ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who, together with one representative each from at least nine Parishes, to be chosen annually by the Diocesan Convention, shall constitute an *Executive Committee*.

SEC. 2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings, and perform such other duties as are required by the office.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall keep the records and papers of the Society, and perform such other duties as his position may require.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all moneys of the Society and pay them out by direction of the Executive Committee.

SEC. 5. The Executive Committee shall have direct supervision of the affairs of the Society, adopt such By-Laws as it may deem proper, and have the power to fill vacancies which may occur in its body.

## ARTICLE V—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on Wednesday evening of Convention week, at the place appointed for Convention purposes. Said meeting shall be preceded by Divine Service under direc-

tion of the Bishop, or, if he be absent, of the Rector of the Parish in which the meeting is held, or of the senior Presbyter present. After this the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, or next senior officer, shall call the meeting to order for dispatch of such business as may come regularly before it.

SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Society shall be called from time to time at the discretion of the presiding officer, or upon the written request of three members of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI—FEES FOR MEMBERSHIP AND COLLECTION THEREOF.

SECTION 1. The fee for membership in the Society shall be such sum as may be agreed upon by each Auxiliary Society for itself, to be paid in such manner as it may direct, and the several Auxiliary Societies shall provide for the prompt collection of all dues, and their remittance to the Treasurer of this Society. Other contributions shall be solicited and disposed of in the same manner.

ARTICLE VII—FUNDS—DISPOSITION OF.

SECTION 1. All moneys, after paying expenses, of this Society, shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board.

ARTICLE VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—DUTY OF, ETC.

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to use its best endeavors to have an Auxiliary Society formed in each Parish of the Diocese. Each Parochial Clergyman is recognized as an adviser of the local Society within its Parish, and as such he has the right to be present and take part in all its deliberations.

ARTICLE IX—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—MEETINGS OF.

SECTION 1. The meetings of the Auxiliary Societies shall be held in the Parish Church or place of worship, wherever practicable, and shall always be preceded by prayer.

ARTICLE X—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES—OFFICERS AND DUTIES OF.

SECTION 1. Each Auxiliary Society shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and elect such other officers and enact such other regulations as it may deem proper, and shall hold either monthly or quarterly meetings, as it may elect, at which there shall be addresses on the subject or Missions, report of Parish Society read, endeavors to arouse a missionary spirit, collections for the purposes of the Society, names of new members announced, and such other things done as may be deemed conducive to attain the end in view.

SEC. 2. After such meeting a report thereof shall be sent to the Secretary of the parent Society.

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### Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

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SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

*First.* For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

*Second.* For the increase of "The General Clergy Relief Fund" for the Pension and Relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

*Third.* For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August, and November; but note, that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.

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
