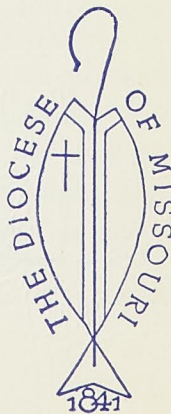

Rules of Order of the Convention

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admissions of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Dispatch of Business.
 - IV. On Resolutions.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

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13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions for order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Permanent Committees of Convention.

21. Except in cases where majority vote is required by the Constitution, all elections provided for by Canon shall be by plurality of all votes cast. When more than one is to be elected for a particular office, the number required by Canon receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

22. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the votes of each Order shall take their stand at stations indicated by the Chairman, the Tellers for the Laity in one area, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. Those casting their ballot shall pass by the Tellers as they deposit their ballots in the proper receptacle they speak out their names to the Teller with the list of names of Delegates to Convention. No persons whose names do not appear in their role shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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Minutes of the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

Florissant, Mo.
February 2, 1973

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred Thirty-Third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, Protestant Episcopal Church, assembled in the theater of the Florissant Civic Center, Florissant, at 3:07 p. m., Friday, February 2, 1973.

The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, D.D., was in the chair and opened the meeting with prayer.

The Bishop asked the host rector, the Rev. Roy A. Welke, St. Barnabas Church, Florissant, for a word of welcome. The Rev. Mr. Welke introduced the Mayor of Florissant, the Hon. James Egan, to welcome the Convention also.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the Roll of the Clergy of those entitled to seat and vote 53 responded.

The Secretary then called the Roll of Parishes and Missions. Of the 56 entitled to seat and vote Delegates from 50 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened and ready for business.

The Secretary of the Diocese introduced Resolution No. 1, which, following a second was adopted.

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 132nd Convention of this Diocese be adopted for this Convention and that Rule No. 29 which sets forth the Order of Business may be suspended by the Bishop at any time; and be it further

RESOLVED that all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, all licensed Lay Readers, full-time and professional Lay Church Workers, all clergy present but not canonically resident, and all Lay Members of the Standing Committee not otherwise members of the Convention be admitted to seats without votes in this Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Order of Business shall be substantially as follows: (see p. 25).

Bishop Cadigan, acting under authority given him by Canon 3, appointed the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf as Secretary of this Convention and of the Diocese.

The Bishop announced the formation and admission to Convention of an Ecumenical congregation known as Grace Church United, O'Fallon, and introduced its delegation: the Rev. William Schwab and Mr. Charles Arras. Grace Church is a project of the United Church of Christ, Disciples of Christ, the United Presbyterian Church and the Diocese of Missouri.

Acting under provisions of Canon 32 the Bishop then appointed the following committees to serve through this Convention:

There being no further nominations, upon motion, duly seconded, the nominations were closed and the Secretary ordered to prepare ballots for voting on Saturday.

Mrs. Milton McC. Gatch, President of the Standing Committee, presented the report of that body. The report was ordered received and printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 4)

The Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf, presented by title the report of the Trustees of Parochial Trust Fund. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 5)

Archdeacon Rehkopf presented by title his report as Registrar of the Diocese. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal.

(Appendix No. 6)

Archdeacon Rehkopf presented the report of the Committee on Clergy Stipends. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal.

(Appendix No. 10)

The following reports were received and ordered filed: Convocation Coordinator (The Rev. William M. Ripley), Music Commission (Bert Sterbenz), Commission on the Ministry (The Rev. Richard Tombaugh), University of the South (The Rev. Harry E. Maurer), Educational Center (The Rev. Elsom Eldridge), and the Liturgical Commission (The Rev. David P. Hegg, II).

The Rev. David Benson presented the report of the Long Range Planning Committee.

(Appendix 15)

The Rev. Charles Morris moved to amend the report of the Committee by deletion of paragraph 8 and substitution of a text that would have promised a report on metropolitan congregations by a certain date. During the discussion which followed the motion was withdrawn.

The Rev. Mr. Morris then moved that Long Range Planning Committee be directed to set a specific date in the early Fall for a full report on metropolitan area marginal congregations. Following a second the motion was passed.

The Report of the Long Range Planning Committee was then accepted and ordered printed in the Journal.

The Secretary of the Diocese presented the report of the Treasurer for the year 1973. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal.

(Appendix No. 7)

Mr. Charles C. Allen, Jr., treasurer of the Diocese, presented the Standing Committee's recommended Budget for 1973 in the amount of \$400,000 and moved its adoption. The motion received a second.

Mrs. Gatch then moved a Resolution from the Standing Committee. Following a second the Chair ruled that both motions might be considered as one and at the same time: (Resolution No. 2)

WHEREAS the projected income of the Diocese is approximately \$63,500 short of the minimum amount required for Diocesan purposes for 1973; and

WHEREAS budget cuts previously made leave no room for additional reductions without seriously impairing valuable Diocesan programs; and

WHEREAS the Bishop has offered approximately \$45,000 in funds from a bequest as a contribution to reduce the 1973 income shortfall; now therefore

THE STANDING COMMITTEE moves adoption of the 1973 Budget, as attached, with the following provisos:

I. The Standing Committee accept the funds offered by the Bishop and apply the same to the 1973 Budget; and

II. A special fund-raising committee be appointed by the Standing Committee, with the advice and consent of the Cabinet (as representatives of the Convocations), charged with raising the \$18,500 required to balance the 1973 Budget with the understandings (A) that the funds so raised will be applied to the City Ministries (CICM) budget and (B) that any amount less than \$18,500 so raised will be deducted from the City Ministries budget, (C) that Standing Committee will

make sure that fund raising efforts are conducted (1) so as to enhance the understanding of Diocesan program, (2) so as not to conflict with the Bishop's efforts to secure funds for Thompson House, nor (3) interfere with any congregational stewardship program.

Dean Blair moved an amendment: strike the second paragraph (II) and insert the following:

II. The Standing Committee, with the advice of the Cabinet and the Bishop, shall appoint a committee directed to work in cooperation with the Bishop to raise a sum of not less than \$37,000. The first \$18,500 raised shall be applied to CICM. The second \$18,500 raised shall be for the Bishop's Fund for the purpose designated by the Bishop, namely the expansion of the facilities of Thompson House. Any funds over and above the \$37,000 shall be divided equally between CICM and the Bishop's Fund. If less than \$37,000 is raised, the shortage shall first be taken from the Bishop's Fund. If less than \$18,500 shall be raised, the CICM budget allocation shall be reduced accordingly.

Dean Blair's motion received a second. The Bishop was given permission to speak to the issue, saying he hopes to raise a sum of money to increase the capacity of Thompson Retreat and Conference Center and thus make that institution more nearly self-supporting.

Dean Blair's amendment was passed. The two motions as amended were then put to a vote and passed, and the 1973 Budget for Diocesan program was adopted. (Appendix No. 16)

The Rev. Mr. Swift reported for the Committee on Constitution and Canons. In response to Resolution No. 7 of the 132nd Convention regarding the qualifications of clergy for seat, voice and vote in the Convention he presented the following Resolution: (No. 3)

RESOLVED that Article V, Section 2 and 3, of the Constitution of the Diocese be amended by deleting these sections and substituting therefor the following:

Section 2. Every Clergyman canonically resident and in regular standing shall be entitled to seat and voice in the Annual and Special Convention.

Section 3. Every canonically-resident Clergyman who shall at the time of the meeting of the Convention be a duly elected Rector of a Parish, a duly appointed Vicar of a Mission, a canonically-resident clergyman who shall have been for the previous year an Assistant Minister in a Congregation, or a canonically-resident Clergyman who shall have been for the previous year a full-time staff member of an institution of the Diocese shall be entitled to a seat, voice and vote.

Following a second, discussion ensued. The Rev. Mr. Skinner moved deletion of the requirement for a full-year's residence. This was seconded.

Upon motion, duly seconded the whole matter of amending the Constitution for the purpose of clarifying the qualifications of clergy for membership in the Convention was referred back to the Committee for a report on Saturday.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then responded for the Committee on Constitution and Canons to Resolution No. 5 of the 132nd Convention which directed the Committee to prepare constitutional and canonical changes to erase the division between Parish and Mission. He reported as follows:

This Committee to whom was referred Resolution No. 5 of the 132nd Convention concerning the removal of all distinction between Parish

and Mission reports that it has considered at great length the matter and is prepared to recommend amendments to Articles V and X of the Constitution and to Canons 2, 11, 12, 20, 21, 22, 24, 31 and 34. It is prepared also to propose a new Canon 11 which would authorize the Bishop to establish new congregations to provide for their proper progress to the status of a Parish.

However, the Committee wishes to raise certain questions which it is not prepared to answer. The matter of the ownership of the property is not an issue, since the approval of the sale or encumbering of Church-owned property must be had before such a transaction can become legal. The matter of incorporation of a Congregation is not an issue either, since incorporation under the laws of the State of Missouri is relatively simple.

The Committee does find important, however, the issue of the relationship of the Bishop to the Rector of a Parish. Historically, the Bishop is the Rector of a Mission and its Vicar serves at his pleasure. In actual practice the relationship has become a confused one, in that a number of Parishes receive financial aid from the Diocese, and a few Missions are financially independent. Removal of the distinction between Parish and Mission would seem to be a simple matter until the presence of Title III, Canon 22, section 4, of General Convention is discovered. This provides: "A Minister is settled . . . who has been engaged permanently, or for any term not less than one year, by any Parish, according to the rules of the Diocese in which such Parish is located." Since the Diocese of Missouri has not yet seen fit to provide any such rules, nor to provide any way in which the Bishop may supervise clergy in Parishes receiving Diocesan financial assistance, the Committee would beg to be discharged from further consideration of this subject, until such time as the responsibility of the Bishop is determined in relationship to Parishes.

The Rev. Mr. Swift added that the matter is not simply one of semantic change, that such a change would confer upon all parish clergy the right of tenure. He moved that the action of the 132nd Convention be rescinded and that the Committee be discharged from further consideration of the matter. Following a second discussion ensued.

Mr. Edmund Rogers moved the question be divided. Following a second his motion prevailed and the question was divided between rescinding of the action of the previous Convention and discharge of the Committee.

Following further discussion the Rev. Mr. Swift, with the consent of his second, withdrew his motion.

Upon motion by Dean Blair, duly seconded, the entire matter was referred to a special Committee which was instructed to report to the 134th Convention.

At 5:30 p. m. the Convention recessed.

At 5:45 p. m. the Holy Eucharist was celebrated at table in the multipurpose room of the Civic Center, by Bishop Cadigan assisted by the clergy of the Diocese. Trial Liturgy No. III was used, and Robert Mullgardt, organist-choir director of St. Mark's Church, St. Louis, was at the organ, assisted by two guitarists: Margi Crosby and Steve Ura. The offering was designated for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief and amounted to \$486.80.

Following the Service 450 persons attended a dinner in the same room.

Following the dinner Bishop Cadigan presented citations and engraved plaques to Charles K. Baker (All Saints Church, St. Louis), S. Keith Forn-

ey (St. Barnabas Church, Florissant), Gordon I. Herzog (St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson), Edward E. Kice, Jr. (Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves), Robert G. Plag (St. Mark's Church, St. Louis), and Mrs. Donovan Rhynsburger (Calvary Church, Columbia.)

The Bishop then delivered his annual Address to the Diocese.

(Appendix No. 1)

The Convention then recessed until 9 a. m., Saturday.

Florissant Civic Center

Saturday, February 3, 1973

At 9:12 a. m. the Convention convened in the Theater of the Civic Center. Bishop Cadigan was in the Chair and asked the Rev. W. Thomas Martin to open the session with prayer.

In accordance with Title I, Canon 1, Sec. 1. (e) of General Convention the Secretary read proposed Amendments to the Constitution of General Convention which are to be acted upon finally at the Convention in Louisville in 1973: These included amendments to Article I, Section 4, Article VII, and Article X. The Secretary was authorized to notify the Secretary of General Convention that this reading has been done.

Ballots were distributed and cast for members of the Standing Committee and the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral. All having cast their ballots, tellers were appointed and retired with the ballots.

Acting as Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business the Secretary moved that Rule of Order No. 9 be amended for this session to read: (Resolution No. 4)

A member, other than the Chairman of the Committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, no longer than two minutes at a time, without leave of the house.

Following a second the motion prevailed by a two-thirds vote.

The Rev. Mr. Swift, speaking for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, reported on the matter that had been re-referred to the Committee: the qualifications of clergy for seat, voice and vote in the Convention. He proposed the following Resolution (No. 5):

RESOLVED that Article V be amended by deleting sections 2 and 3, and substituting therefor the following:

Section 2. Every Clergyman, canonically resident and in regular standing, shall be entitled to seat and voice in the Annual and Special Conventions.

Section 3. Every Clergyman, canonically resident, who at the time of the meeting of the Convention is a duly elected Rector of a Parish, a duly appointed Vicar of a Mission, an Assistant Minister in a Congregation, or a full-time staff member of an institution of the Diocese shall be entitled to seat, voice and vote.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved the adoption of this Amendment on first reading. Following a second, the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved that Article X, section 1 of the Constitution be amended by inserting the words "voice and vote" after word "seats" in the first line so that the section shall read: (Resolution No. 6)

Section 1. One-third of the Clergy entitled to seats, voice and vote in the Convention, and Lay Delegates from one-fourth of the Parishes and Missions entitled to representation, when duly assembled, shall

constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn from time to time.

Following a second, the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved that Article XIV, section 2, be amended in the same fashion so that it will read: (Resolution No. 7)

Section 2. The Clerical members of the Standing Committee must be entitled to seats, voice and vote in the Convention of the Diocese, and Lay Members must be communicants.

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved that Article XV, section 1 of the Constitution be amended so that it shall read: (Resolution No. 8)

Section 1. An equal number of Presbyters, entitled to seats, voice and vote in the Convention, and Lay Communicants (no change in balance of the section which refers to qualifications of Deputies to General Convention).

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved that Article XX of the Constitution be amended in the same fashion so that the final sentence shall read: (Resolution No. 9)

To the choice of a Bishop, the concurrent vote, by ballot, of a majority of the Clergy and of the Laity entitled to seats, voice and vote in the Convention, voting separately, shall be necessary.

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then noted that on all the above Amendments final action must be taken at the 134th Convention before such Amendments can be added to the Constitution.

The Rev. Mr. Swift, speaking for the Committee on Constitution and canons in response to Resolution No. 4 of the 132nd Convention, reported as follows: (the Resolution directed the Committee to explore the feasibility of electing a Standing Committee from and by the Convocations.)

The Committee finds the proposal to be inconsistent with the spirit of General Convention Constitution Article IV which provides for a Standing Committee appointed by the Diocesan Convention. The term appointed first appears in 1789 when in the sixth canon of the General Convention of that year appeared a reference to a "Standing Committee of the Convention of the State", wherein the Candidate for Holy Orders resided, and that the Committee shall be appointed by the Convention. At that time the word would seem to be analogous with elected, and that the "Standing Committee" was to be a committee of the Convention. This Committee believes the two words to mean the same today. Despite the increased duties of the Standing Committee since 1789, and the increased number of duties assigned to the Standing Committee of Missouri in 1966, the Committee on Constitution and Canons is of the opinion that the proposal to elect a Standing Committee by any agency other than the Convention is unconstitutional, and therefore it recommends no change in Article IV.

However, the Committee takes note of the "Whereases" in Resolution No. 4 and of the hope and need for a greater amount of communication between and among the Convocations and various other units of the Diocese. It recommends that this matter of communication can be better served by amending Canon 9, and perhaps Canon 7. It will

recommend deletion of the present Canon 9 and insertion thereof of to a new text. It begs to be discharged from further consideration of the matter of a standing Committee to be elected from and by the Convocations.

Mr. Swift then said that after this report had been received in the Convocations and discussed there Metro IV wished to propose an amendment to Article XIV of the Constitution, that the Committee had had no time to render an opinion on this but that he personally saw nothing unconstitutional in it. He then presented the following amendments to Article XIV which were moved by the Rev. Mr. Miller, and seconded by Mr. John Rogers: (Resolution No. 10)

Section 1. The Convention shall elect, as specified by Canon, members of the Standing Committee to consist of seven Clergy and seven Lay persons, each elected for a term of four years so arranged that three, or four, members shall be elected each year; and so arranged that each Convocation is represented in the Standing Committee at all times by one Clergyman and one Lay Person whose terms do not expire at the same time. A member who has been elected for a full term shall not be eligible for re-election until after the lapse of one year after the expiration of the term for which the member was elected.

Section 3. The Committee shall elect a President and a Secretary from its own members. Seven members of the Committee shall be a quorum to transact business.

Discussion ensued, joined in by: Edmund Rogers, Richard Dunlop, the Rev. Richard Tombaugh, the Rev. Stephen Bergmann, the Rev. David Benson, the Rev. Robert Betts and the Rev. Frank Butler.

Mr. Edmund Rogers, moved, duly seconded, as a substitute an amendment to Article XIII, which would change the nomination procedure. Joining this debate were: Richard Dunlop, Rodney Weiss, John Rogers, Carroll Stribling, the Rev. Richard Tombaugh. The substitute motion was defeated on a voice vote.

Debate continued on the original motion to amend Article XIV. Joining in this were: the Rev. Andrew Kunz, Edmund Rogers, Robert Nellums, the Rev. James Paget, Rodney Weiss, John Adney.

The voice vote not being conclusive and a division being called for the motion was defeated by a vote of 76 for and 90 against.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then presented an amendment to Canon 9 "Of the Convocations". Upon motion, duly seconded, Canon 9, was amended by deleting the present text and substituting therefor the following: (Resolution No. 11)

Section 1. The Bishop shall, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, divide the Diocese into two or more districts to be known as Convocations. Each Convocation shall include all the Congregations within the district. Voting members of the Convocation shall be limited to elected members of the Convention from Congregations within the jurisdiction, or their elected Alternates, and the Clergy entitled to seats, voice and vote in Convention resident in those Congregations.

Section 2. Each Convocation shall determine its own structure and shall elect from its own members such officers as it shall need.

Section 3. Each Convocation shall report regularly to the Bishop and the Standing Committee as to the State of the Church in the Convocation, and shall also consider any matters referred to it by

Convention and/or the Standing Committee, and such other matters as the Convocation itself shall deem necessary. Copies of minutes of Convocation meetings shall be filed with the Secretary of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved the adoption of a proposed new Canon, numbered 32-A until a new edition of the Canons is published. Following a second the Canon was adopted. (Resolution No. 12)

Canon 32-A - Of Nominations and Election of Officers

Section 1. The President of each Annual Convention shall before the close thereof appoint a Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure to consist of not more than seven (7) persons, both Clergy and Laity, whose duty it shall be to actively seek from the entire Diocese qualified candidates for election to the several positions to be filled by the Convention.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall nominate not less than three (3) qualified candidates for each vacancy to be filled at the next annual Convention.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall forward its nominations together with the written consents of each nominee to the Standing Committee at least sixty (60) days prior to the assembling of the next annual Convention.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Ecclesiastical Authority upon receipt of the nominations from the Standing Committee to cause the names of those nominated together with relevant material concerning each of them to receive the widest distribution throughout the Diocese prior to the assembling of the Convention.

Section 5. Nominations for election to any office may also be made in the Convention by the presentation to the President of the Convention of a written petition therefor signed by at least five (5) members and accompanied by the written consent of the person so nominated. Upon receipt of such petition and consent the President shall cause the name or names of the persons so nominated to be added to the ballot.

Section 6. When the President of the Convention shall have declared the nominations closed the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure shall cause the necessary ballots to be prepared and distributed at the time determined by the Agenda and Order of Business. The Committee shall collect all ballots and when the President shall have declared the time for balloting to have been completed, the Committee shall count the ballots, reporting to the Convention at its earliest opportunity.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons, having completed its report, was discharged.

The Rev. Howard Park moved that the Long Range Planning Committee be directed to study the structure of the Diocese and specifically the election of the Standing Committee, and make a progress report and/or recommendations to the several Convocations and to the 134th Convention of the Diocese, should change be indicated. Following a second the motion prevailed.

Dr. Richard Gordon, chairman of the Committee on Nominations, and of the Tellers for the election, returned to announce the election of the following to serve as members of the Standing Committee through the 137th Convention:

The Rev. Jack Schweizer, reporting for the Commission on the Ministry, in response to Resolution No. 3 of the 132nd Convention, presented a statement on continuing education of the clergy. (Appendix No. 13)

Mr. Schweizer then moved Resolution No. 13:

WHEREAS, the Diocese of Missouri has been allocated by the Episcopal Church Foundation \$10,000.00 for the purpose of continuing education of the ministry during the year of 1973; and
WHEREAS, the Convocations of this Diocese have not had sufficient time to examine thoroughly the specific proposal made by the Commission on the Ministry concerning continuing education; and
WHEREAS, the 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri required that the Commission on the Ministry make a specific proposal for action on continuing education to be reported back to this convention; NOW, therefore, it is hereby resolved that the Standing Committee prepare a line item in the Diocesan Budget for 1974 for the purpose of funding continuing education of the ministry, and that the Commission on the Ministry's resolution previously submitted, a copy of which is attached hereto, be adequately considered at the 134th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

Mr. William Bascom, Chancellor of the Diocese, assumed the chair for the presentation of the report of the Resolutions Committee.

Dr. James Hood, chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, reported a number of resolutions had been submitted to the Committee for its recommendations. He presented these:

Resolution No. 14. Introduced by Archdeacon Rehkopf, as a member of the Convention and not in any of his official capacities:

RESOLVED that, in support of the Bishop's Address to Convention, February 4, 1972, and the action of the House of Bishops in its meeting in New Orleans, the 133rd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri expresses to the forth-coming 64th General Convention of the Episcopal Church its sense that there is no theological, sociological or psychological reason that women should not serve in any Order of the Ordained Ministry of this Church and therefore memorializes the General Convention to take the necessary canonical steps to authorize the ordination of women into the three-fold Ministry of the Church.

The proposed resolution had been preceded by a preamble including the statement adopted by the faculties of General Theological Seminary, Philadelphia Divinity School and Episcopal Theological School. Following a second and brief discussion the resolution was adopted by a voice vote.

Resolution No. 15 proposed by Metro II, was moved by a member of that Convocation, and duly seconded. The Committee recommended its passage. The Resolution was adopted.

WHEREAS proper long-range planning, allocation of funds, and intelligent understanding of diocesan programs cannot be effective when funding at each diocesan convention is on only a single-year basis, and recognizing that one convention can establish guidelines which future convention may change; be it

RESOLVED that:

1. The Diocesan budget be divided into two broad categories:
 - (a) on-going programs (such as the Bishop's office), and
 - (b) short-term projects that may terminate within one year;
2. That each budget include an estimate of how long each on-going project is expected to continue (i.e., indefinitely, or two or three years), and how much funding is expected to be required for it during each of the ensuing three years.

and be it further

RESOLVED that:

1. The broad category of on-going projects include also certain small allocations that are symbolic, and which if dropped would cut off our Church's financial connection with them.
2. That the short-term broad category include new programs that may become on-going but which require a period of prior trial and probation, that it be indicated that the program may become long-term, and that an estimate be given of the likely budget requests for years two and three if it does become on-going:
3. That where any on-going program has an absolute minimal requirement to be operative, such minimal requirement be stated in the budget.

Resolution No. 16 introduced by Mr. Martin Gardner, and seconded by Metro IV. The Committee recommended passage of this resolution.

Whereas war causes man to kill man;

Whereas God loves all men,

Whereas God wants all men to love each other,

Whereas men cannot love one another and simultaneously kill one another,

Whereas war always consists of contempt, hate, greed, lust, fear, none of which are love;

Whereas war may bring courage, unselfishness and ingenuity, but these are not love;

Whereas war causes man to destroy materials and beauty available for the living of man;

Therefore be it Resolved that The Diocese of Missouri declares that war is antithetical to God's will;

And be it further resolved that the Diocese of Missouri urges the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States in Convention in 1973 to adopt the same resolution.

And be it further resolved that the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States work for the abolition of war as a means to any end.

Dr. Hood announced that this resolution had not been sent to members of the Convention in advance because of a failure in communications. Dis-

cussion ensued, joined in by the Rev. W. Thomas Martin, Charles Kirgan, the Rev. Moss Armistead, Donald Knuckle, the Rev. Richard Tombaugh, the Rev. John Good, the Rev. Dorman Ball, Edmund Rogers, Mrs. Henry Jakobe, the Rev. Joseph Carlo, Miss Lynn Stahl, the Rev. Howard Park.

A motion to close the debate was put and passed. Division being called for, the Resolution was declared defeated by a vote of 72 for to 92 against.

Dr. Hood then presented a Memorial Resolution for the Rev. Daniel E. Weeks, the Rev. David Poynton and Mrs. Frederick A. Pope. Following a second the resolution was adopted.

Dr. Hood then presented resolutions of greeting to Bishop Scarlett, Mrs. Arthur Lichtenberger, and the Rt. Rev. John Hines. All were adopted.

The Rev. Arthur Steidemann spoke briefly of his visit to Natal in October, 1972, where he addressed the Diocesan Synod. He moved a resolution of greeting and gratitude to Bishop Inman and the Diocese of Natal. Following a second the resolution was adopted.

Dr. Hood moved a resolution of gratitude to St. Barnabas Church, Florissant, and to Metro I Convocation, for the arrangements for this Convention. Following a second the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Darrell Phillips moved a resolution of greeting to the Bishop of Puerto Rico who had visited in the Diocese of Missouri in October. Following a second the resolution was adopted.

Bishop Cadigan, at the request of the Standing Committee, asked the Committee on Resolutions to act as a Committee to Respond to the Bishop's Address. Mr. William Abernathy, speaking for the Committee, presented Resolution No. 17:

WHEREAS the Bishop of Missouri has addressed this Convention concerning the seriousness of the ongoing dearth of decent housing for the poor in the Metropolitan area of St. Louis, and
 WHEREAS the Bishop has, through his own resources and initiative, with the help of his Housing Committee and more recently the Metropolitan Housing Corporation, made seed monies available to communities seeking to improve their supply of decent housing; and
 WHEREAS we and the people of the entire metropolitan area of St. Louis are grateful for his timely leadership in promoting long needed cooperation between federal, state, municipal and private resources with respect to the continuing crisis in the St. Louis Public Housing Program; and

WHEREAS housing remains a critical issue in communities throughout this diocese: now therefore be it

RESOLVED that the 133rd Diocesan Convention, thanking Almighty God for our Bishop's leadership in all these matters, record its support of his course of action and make adequate provision to assist him in bringing into active participation the parishes within this diocese and of other ecumenical bodies in the area; and be it further
 RESOLVED that this convention instruct the Standing Committee to create a Diocesan Housing Commission to represent this Diocese in all matters pertaining to housing and to report its actions regularly to the Standing Committee and annually to the Diocesan Conventions.

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

Mrs. William Wiese, a member of the Committee to Respond to the Bishop's Address, presented the following statement from the Committee:

The Committee on Resolutions, responding to the comments of the

Bishop on the combined use of the Trial Liturgies and the suggestion that baptized young persons be admitted to communion at the discretion of clergy and parents, commends this to the attention of the parishes and their clergy for their prayerful consideration.

She moved that this be the sense of the Convention. Following a second, the motion was passed.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions, having completed its work was discharged.

Mrs. Beatte, Cape Girardeau, suggested that in light of the debate on the Resolution on Peace, the Convention not adjourn without expressing gratitude for the cessation of hostilities in Vietnam. The Bishop thanked her for the suggestion.

The delegation from Christ Church Cathedral invited the Convention to meet at the Cathedral at such time as the Bishop might determine. The invitation was accepted.

The Convention adjourned *sine die* at 12 noon, following a Litany for Peace and Benediction by the Bishop.

Appendix No. 1

MY BROTHERS IN CHRIST, CLERGY AND LAITY OF THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI:

This address will deal essentially with **Housing** and the **Trial Services**.

I. HOUSING

You will remember that, at the Diocesan Convention held three years ago, you gave me the responsibility and privilege of investing \$100,000 from the Thompson Trust Fund as seed or front money for low-cost housing and at zero interest. The problems of housing were more intricate than we knew, but, at long last, we are off the ground, with the splendid assistance of William Chapman, Margaret Bush Wilson, Charles Allen, George Guernsey and a gifted and generous person named Dan Sullivan.

Here are some of the projects which our seed money has generated: for the six months' use of \$42,500 we have helped provide good new housing for some 84 families in the Alta Sita Project in East St. Louis; \$21,000, together with funds from the Second Presbyterian Church and the Ralston Purina Company, has enabled a struggling community group known as Belle Neighbors Corporation to construct 90 units of high and low-rise town houses in the Central West End of the city. Twenty thousand dollars assisted a black businessman produce two of the single-family units in an otherwise deteriorating area. In this work, the producer trained young unskilled men, who, by this experience, are now able to enter the mainstream of the American economy. Fifteen thousand dollars has been committed to the Skinker-DeBalivere Community Corporation. This loan has generated \$30,000 from other Churches in our Diocese and from banks, who are following the leadership which has been provided. Nine thousand dollars in outright grants, over a period of three years, has been made to the Jeff-Vander-Lou Housing Corporation. In my opinion, one of our most exciting experiences has been the purchase of twenty excellent houses that were about to be demolished by the expansion of the Lambert Airport. Here our seed money of \$18,000 purchased twenty homes and will move them less than a mile, into that community known as Kinloch. These houses may be sold outright or purchased over a period of several years.

Your Housing Committee and myself have played no small part in securing substantial grants from the Danforth and Ford Foundations to set up what is known as The Metropolitan Housing Corporation. In addition to the Diocesan Housing Committee, we have had the help of our own Calvin Stuart, and recently we have been joined by Ethan Shepley, Sr. The Executive Director of The Metropolitan Housing Corporation is a very intelligent person, Mr. Duane Milam. The Metropolitan Housing Corporation offers a competent support system for the hopes and efforts of the neighborhood groups. It will provide the expertise, management and custodianship of our own investments and hopefully those of other Churches as well.

With the Metropolitan Housing Corporation, it seems to me that we are in an advantageous position to raise additional funds for low-cost housing. I have personally invited all religious denominations in the Metropolitan community to follow our Episcopal lead and contribute, at zero interest, sums amounting from \$750,000 to a million dollars. If we are successful, such would be an inspiring symbol and positive trust for the Churches of Almighty God to come together in this way. This kind of ecumenical action would say to St. Louis, in electric ways, that the Churches care for the poor and care about the city. It could turn around the apathy and despair which now grip this community. I challenge twenty-five Episcopal Churches to join in this movement. One hundred thousand dollars

costs the Thompson Fund annually perhaps \$7,000. There are many parishes that could contribute loans at a modest cost of \$300 or \$900. This movement would help in part to eliminate our anxiety about the Church's survival and find further reason or reasons for institutional existence. We must sow ourselves - sow ourselves deep in the furrows of life.

You are aware of the fact that there has been another great crisis in conventional public housing and that 25,000 people might have been without dwelling places unless the financial problems were met prior to 1 April, 1973. For some reason, unknown to myself, it has been my responsibility to serve as an ad hoc chairman to meet this crisis and to develop long-range plans that such crises might not be repetitive ones.

In thumbnail sketch, the problem is that public housing was built and financed originally to support the "working poor." Currently 85% of the occupants of public housing are on welfare and the Brooke Amendment says that only 25% of income may be charged for public housing. The difference between the annual rents and the costs of operation is 3.9 million dollars. The State of Missouri remains about 46th in welfare allocations. This compounds the problem and I pray that our new Governor and the Legislature will right this situation.

While I have spent many hours and intend to spend many more with this housing crisis, my chief contribution has been to serve as an enabler. We have been able to bring together, at varying times, tenants, housing authorities, Civic Progress members, and officials of the City of St. Louis. The major result of these efforts is that St. Louis has been able to say to the Federal Government that we, as concerned citizens, take seriously and responsibly the housing of poor people. This problem is the concern of citizens as well as that of municipal, State and Federal authorities. While the immediate crisis seems to be resolved - and there is not time to go into the "how," - the same groups which have been working so well together will somehow have to resolve the long-range problems. It is not a simple assignment.

It was near Christmas when some twenty of us met with the Mayor of this city. Following an hour's conference, we were invited to hear, in Mr. Cervantes' office, a group of Christmas Carollers. As they sang, very beautifully, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come," my stomach turned over, as I wondered what joy for 25,000 people who did not yet know if they would have even a stable to live in after the first four months of 1973. My friend, Richard Male, the young, sensitive, and gifted child of Judaism, and Director of the Missouri Delta Ecumenical Ministry, reminds me that "the question which we must all face in 1973 is not whether we possess the means to abolish hunger, suffering and poverty, but whether we possess the humanity to do so."

I can only express gratitude that God's helpers have sort of gently nudged me into the complex but so absolutely essential area of housing. It has given my life a new incentive, a new perspective, and I know that I cannot regard my ministry in the same way ever again.

II. THE TRIAL SERVICES

When I think upon Housing - rather the problems of the poor - when I try to pray about them, I cannot find myself particularly stirred by the hassling and the wrestling and the anxiety and the anger over the Trial Services. As Christians, Eucharist is the most important thing we do. The worship of God is our most essential privilege and it should be wrought as beautifully, and as sensitively, as we know how. The Church lives by Her worship and, if Her worship dies, She dies. Nevertheless, unless Eucharist

sends us into the world to preach the Gospel and to help every man stand upon his own feet, Christian and non-Christian will exclaim with the prophet Amos, "I hate, I despise your feast days . . . and your solemn assemblies . . . Take away from me the noise of your songs . . . but let judgment run down as waters and righteousness as a mighty stream."

Our own George Guernsey tells of the Presiding Bishop's report concerning the Trial Services, to a recent meeting of the Executive Council. Bishop Hines spoke of a letter from a dear little lady, which said in part:

"My dear Presiding Bishop:

"If Jesus Christ knew what you were doing to our Book of Common Prayer with your devilish Green Book . . . He would turn over in His grave."

"It made me wonder," the Presiding Bishop said, "What her theological position would be . . . come Easter!"

I am very grateful to the Reverend David Hegg and the Diocesan Liturgical Commission for their assistance with all aspects of interpreting the Trial Services. It was troubling to myself, and I'm sure to the Commission, that representatives from only a handful of parishes attended the excellent Conference on the Trial Services, which was held last spring.

The National Liturgical Commission is sincere when they ask for the response of the whole Church in regard to the so-called Green Book. It is for this reason especially that the publication of a new Prayer Book will be delayed. The projected chronology will go something like this: continued experimentation through 1976 or 1977, depending upon the date of the General Convention after Louisville; then the offering of a Revised Book of Common Prayer, which, if accepted by the General Convention of 1976 or 1977, must then be ratified or rejected by the General Convention of 1979 or 1980. This means that whatever the Episcopal Church does in regard to Her worship will not be done hastily, and, hopefully with that better judgment which reflects the mind of the Church.

There are some parishes in the Diocese which use only the Green Book and there are some parishes whose experimentation with the Trial Services has been altogether inadequate. My own observation - and there are many valid exceptions to this generalization - is that, where worship is alive, really alive, is in those congregations where there is good liturgical instruction and experimentation with the new services. I do have great understanding and sympathy for the bewilderment and frustration of older folk who have lived a lifetime with the Book of Common Prayer. Personally, I miss in the new services a poetry, a beauty of language that is comparable to that of the New English Bible. It is this kind of reflection or comment that the Liturgical Commission wants to have from the laity as well as from the clergy. Again, the Presiding Bishop reminds us that we must keep our eyes on the legitimacy of the process and not to shoot until you see "the red of their rubrics." "For idolatry is no less if it be for a book than for a person . . . and, if the Church is a creature of the Spirit, then we had better be sure that we do not abort the work of the Spirit by refusing to heed even the least likely of the Spirit's Children."

Long before most dioceses, Missouri welcomed to the Lord's Table the baptized of other persuasions. After much reflection, I have come to the conclusion that it is theologically sound to welcome the baptized of our own Church to the Holy Communion. However, I am not here issuing a directive, for there may be those who, for valid theological reasons, also, could not subscribe to this attitude. I cannot say at what age this should occur. One Canadian bishop has remarked that the Holy Communion should be administered to "all baptized children who are old enough to be taught

table manners and who are brought to the Altar by their parents." When a child wants to receive, when there are sensitive and cooperative parents, and when there is healthy pastoral oversight, my suggestion is that children be granted this privilege prior to the act of Confirmation. Certainly, once a child has been welcomed to the Lord's Supper, it should not be denied him if he moves to another parish, even though such may not be the practice of that parish.

It was the way of my own mother that has made it possible for me ever to remember a time in my life that I did not pray. Her practice perhaps began at my birth. To me, it seems now psychologically, emotionally and spiritually sound, to regard baptism as the status-conferring Sacrament. In all this, in no way do I mean to diminish the meaning and value of Confirmation. The Laying on of Hands is a confirming thing, a commitment that may well occur again and again in a person's life. Confirmation instruction for the grown child gives the parish priest a splendid opportunity to know and to teach the youth of the parish. Even more important than the academic illumination, which hopefully is supplied, is the possibility of the development of that significant pastoral relationship - perhaps needed more than ever, by youth and priest alike.

My suggestion is that we continue from time to time our discussion and use of the Trial Services. Again, the process is the important thing and I believe that it can take place without bitterness or rancor. The decisions that have been made and will be made take place after full and open debate in the General Convention, which is the most representative Church body that we have. Let us register our agreement or disagreement, and then abide by the ultimate decision of the General Convention. "We are a democratically organized Church and one of the obligations in a democracy is to recognize the right to be a 'loyal opposition,' remembering that the word 'loyal' is just as significant as the word 'opposition.'"* My hope is, and I believe it is the hope of our Diocesan Commission, that we deal in this matter with mutual forbearance and goodwill and with a willingness to live with honest differences of opinion. And it may just be that Almighty God will use this whole discussion to deepen our faith in Him and to demonstrate the reconciling and unifying power of His Holy Spirit.

III. CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I want to be personal for a few brief moments. In my college and theological school days, I was privileged to be a member of a group who called themselves "The Relations." These men were young clergy, perhaps five and ten years older than myself. If I mentioned them, many of their names would be familiar to you. "The Relations" met together for about five days each year. We talked and thought and prayed and played. Almost unconsciously, they were Franciscan-like, in their simplicity, love of their fellows and in the joy of serving our Lord. They had a simple rule of study, prayer and servanthood and reported monthly to one member who meted penance to those who had not fulfilled the rule of life. It was particularly their fun, their merriment and their humanness which spoke to my condition, and, perhaps more than any other influence, brought me into the ministry. It was some years later before I discovered that Christian joy was more than a superficial or metabolic thing - and was to be won, not because of, but in spite of, suffering and anguish.

There have been patches or glimpses of this all through my ministry - like the sun suddenly breaking through the lowering clouds.

This experience of joy, Christian joy, burst forth for myself during these latter days in the glorious theatrical called GODSPELL. It was merry,

it was joyous, it was moving, it was subtle and symbolic. Like the Christian experience, sadness and joy, tears and celebration were all intermingled. In my opinion GODSPELL was a great religious experience. The leaving-taking at the Last Supper was incomparable. And when the crucified Jesus was lifted out over the heads of the audience, rather congregation, you knew that Almighty God always has the last move and that He reigns forever.

Perhaps I would be less than frank if I did not admit to some anxiety as to what popular religious leaders or movements may offer. My suspicion is that such an introspective piety could prove to be an avoidance of reality. What we confront now, as Erich Fromm suggests, is the possibility that it is not God but man who is dead, transformed into a thing, a producer, a consumer, an idolater of things; and that what we see here is either a defacing or an erosion of the image of God in man. Yet the hunger to recover that image is manifest.

So often in our search, we fail to see the obvious. The Gospel is all that we need. As one of my friends in that group called "The Relations" once wrote, "We need the youthful spirit of the New Testament. We need the spirit that trusts and risks and takes chances, the spirit that loves the highest when it sees it, and that leaves all and follows where it loves. We shall never know the great sweep and drive and onrush of the Gospel . . . and the Pentecostal power of it while we are contented to 'play safe' and compromise with the world. . . . There is a buoyancy of spirit, there is a freedom from entanglements, there is a soaring happiness, which is only open to those who greatly venture upon the things which they believe." It is GOD'S Spell coming near to us - whoever we are - wherever we are - bringing peace and pardon and power and joy - who alone can work the miracle of conversion in stained hearts and troubled minds, and bring us into fellowship with Himself and with each other.

THE REGISTRAR — 1972

The Registrar (sometimes called the Historiographer) of a Diocese is required by the Constitution to record official acts (ordinations, receptions, admissions and dismissals of clergy, consecrations of churches, etc.) and to receive and protect books, documents and archives belonging to the Diocese and to Parishes and Missions. The official acts are recorded in a big book which I have received from my predecessors and will transmit to my successor some day. Our collections of archives amount to some 1,775 feet of solid materials and include the parochial registers of some 28 parishes, missions and institutions, some of them no longer in existence. We have the hand-written records of the first three Diocesan Conventions, the private registers of Bishops Robertson, Tuttle and Johnson; confirmation records of the Bishops since Robertson, and minutes of the Standing Committee, the old Diocesan Council, the various Departments and the Cabinet. The collection includes also some audiovisual records, motion pictures, slides, microfilm and tapes. If finances would permit I would choose to microfilm many of these old paper items, some of them more than a century old, for they grow brittle with age.

The Diocesan Archives now occupy two rooms on the sixth floor of Bishop Tuttle Memorial. While the space is limited we do have some breathing room, enough to permit qualified students to do research in some comfort. During the past year three students have used our Archives and have found them of great value. One wrote a term paper on missionary expansion in Missouri. Another researched the attitude of the Episcopal Church toward social concerns from 1840. He did this for a professor who was writing a book. The third student is a doctoral candidate in history and sociology who has found in our papers a treasure-trove of material for a book on social concerns of the Episcopal Church between 1880 and 1920. All three students have filed copies of their work with us.

The Diocesan Archives maintains membership in the Society of American Archivists a membership which gives this Registrar some status as a professional Archivist! More importantly, it places the Diocese of Missouri among a rather select group of agencies known world-wide to have important materials.

We continue to provide resource material for persons interested in parish and diocesan history. Other groups use our files from time to time and our correspondence, while not voluminous, is interesting.

The importance of maintaining Church records becomes very evident when one observes the requests for records of baptisms before 1911. Persons nearing 65 years of age who find themselves without birth certificates or proof of age look to the Church for that proof. Our collection of parochial registers is often in use and these requests come to us, as well as to the local parish which is still in operation. So, we urge every congregation to safe-guard its records, particularly its parochial registers.

Finally, it has been my pleasure to play an important role among Diocesan Historians in the annual conference and in the editing of an occasional sheet, The Historiographical Newsletter, published by Church Historical Society.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT
EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN
JUNE 1971 - MAY 1972

As President it is my responsibility to make an Annual Report to the women of the diocese. It is also a pleasure. In this day of many changes within the church it has been an honor to be the President of a board of women whose commitment is firm, stable and strong, yet flexible enough to welcome necessary changes.

October brought us a visit from Bishop and Mrs. Zulu, Zululand, S. Africa. The Zulu's were charming, gracious people, educating us in the ways of another land, another people, another culture but identifiable to us because of our common Christian faith. Following this the Rev. Martin Bell of Imaginal Systematics led a Fall Conference. With Mr. Bell's music and poetry as background we explored the Old Testament theology. Moving into the New Testament we examined our present day heritage and recommitted ourselves as Christians. Many visual techniques were used and the Conference closed with a meditation led by the Rev. Joseph Carlo.

Future Shock by Alvin Toffler provided the program for the annual meeting. Four panelists - Diana Thomas, Roberta Kice, Aletta Hudgins and Melanie Rogers - gave a stimulating panel discussion of the future; what we can expect, what we can do about it. As rector, the Rev. Howard Park pointed out the challenge facing the church and what it must do to survive future shock. At this, the largest ECW meeting in years, a vote was taken to incorporate ECW under "Not for Profit" laws of Missouri giving an identifiable legal existence for tax and endowment purposes.

Our gifts to Church Periodical Club and the National Book Fund for the Diocese of Missouri have been generous. Our United Thank Offering gift is down. It is the hope of the new UTO Chairman to have a workshop and program to encourage more use of blue boxes and to continue the support of the UTO Missouri has traditionally given. Our Nursing Scholarship student, Priscilla Powell has completed her first year of study successfully and will begin her second year July 1 at St. Luke's Hospital.

Our pledges and support from local parishes enabled the ECW board not only to pay pledges to World and Nation, Diocesan, and Community projects but to give an extra \$825.00 (see audit) above the Budget. The \$825.00 includes a \$500.00 pledge to Bishop Cadigan for the Central Baptist Church in St. Louis.

Convocation meetings were well attended by town and country parishes. The South Convocation will try a new method of participation in ECW. Because of distances in driving no woman was able to serve as South Convocation Chairman. Each parish of South Convocation will take the responsibility of sending two or more women to one ECW Board meeting a year. The hope is that we will retain the warm friendship and contacts of past years.

At the Bishop's request, the President and First Vice President attend the Bishop's Cabinet meetings once a month. It has been a privilege to work not only with the Bishop but with all of the people in the Diocese. I shall indeed treasure my many hours with the Episcopal Churchwomen.

The Convocation Coordinator's Report to the 133rd Convention

Last year's report closed with the indication of two areas of hope: (1) that we would feel that our work together was worth the effort; and (2) that we could recognize movement toward collaboration and cooperation in and among the several convocations. With some qualification, the first hope is being realized; the second is an accomplished fact.

There was some confusion and second thoughts about the legislative action taken in the 132nd Convention. I believe the confusion has been overcome. The second thoughts will likely be reflected in this year's action relative to the Parish-Mission issue.

The Cabinet has become an effective instrument for collaboration and cooperation. For the first time, concerns, issues and opinions are not only shared, but explored, expanded and debated. Delegates are visiting other convocations' meetings in an effort to facilitate the flow of information and opinion. These actions can only be commended and encouraged.

Such indications of a growing maturity in the System, however, are not to say that all of our problems are solved. We are still wrestling with the issue of accountability/responsibility. A first, tentative step was taken toward sharing our programs and budgets with one another - with some notable exceptions. But we have yet to ask the "hard questions" of each other: the effectiveness of the various programs; and how one measures said efficacy.

There are further aspects of the issue of accountability which need exploration: Standing Committee to Convocations and Congregations; Diocese to Congregations and Congregations to Diocese; Clergy to Congregations and Diocese, to mention a few. These aspects may seem academic at this time, but their resolution will directly effect the ways we organize ourselves to do our work.

Finally, the weak link in the Convocation System becomes more apparent: the relationship between the individual delegate and his parish/vestry. A more direct connection must be developed between those who evaluate and recommend the diocesan mission, and those who fund the mission. The mission is expanding while the funding is declining. We need to be either more directly involved in funding our joint mission; or we need to decide which portions of our mission we will eliminate.

Based on past performance, I have every confidence that we can cope with these problems with maturity and creativity.

THE COMMITTEE ON CLERGY STIPENDS

While this Committee has not met formally for a year, it has kept contact among its members by correspondence and conversation. What follows has been agreed to by the present membership as its report to the 133rd Convention.

A year ago the Convention directed that the 1972 Clergy Stipends be published. This was done and the list disseminated to members of the Convention and to Senior Wardens. It was also published in the Journal on pages 82-84. We presume a precedent has now been set and that the Convention will wish the same action in 1973.

The Committee's Report a year ago recommended a performance review and evaluation of the clergyman in a congregation, and suggested guidelines for such a review and evaluation. The Committee has no way of determining, and no authority for determining, whether such review and evaluation takes place. It does know of a number of instances where such has been accomplished, but has no report of the result.

In the meantime the Commission on the Ministry has been charged with development of a program of Continuing Education. That Commission is reporting to the Convention directly.

The Association of Clergy in the Diocese is undertaking a certain project having to do with establishment of categories and steps for advancement within the clerical profession. A considerable amount of work has been done in this area in the Diocese of Pennsylvania and it is hoped we can take advantage of this report.

A year ago the Committee reported concurrence with a policy for a minimum stipend which would be adjusted according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics Cost of Living Index factor using August 31, 1969, as a base. According to this policy the current minimum stipend should be increased by 3% from the \$7,400 figure in 1972. This means that the minimum cash salary should be now \$7,622 plus allowance for housing, Pension Fund, insurance, medical insurance and automobile expense.

Finally, the Committee would remind Vestries and Executive Committees that during the first five years of tenure there should be an annual increase of \$600 after an adequate and satisfactory performance review. No penalty is attached to failure to provide this increase, but it is expected that the Bishop and Standing Committee will be informed as to the reason for failure to reward performance.

The DCM met on 5 occasions during 1972.

During the year two members of the Commission, Dr. Lorenzo Green and Mrs. John Kydel, resigned. Mrs. Clyde Nelson and Mrs. George Roubush were appointed by the Bishop to fill the empty positions.

During the year the DCM performed the following functions:

1. Advised the Bishop on matters relating to the ecclesiastical functions of perpetual deacons within the Diocese of Missouri.
2. Advised the Bishop on the summer training programs for seminarians from the Diocese.
3. At the request of the Bishop, assigned members of the DCM to be liaison persons with the New York office and elsewhere in various areas of clergy support:

4. Interviewed six applicants for postulancy and made the following decisions:

7. In response to the direction of the 132nd Diocesan Convention, prepared a plan for Continuing Education of the Clergy of the Diocese.

9. Prepared guidelines for continuing education grant applications from clergy and distributed these to the clergy of the Diocese.
10. Endorsed The Rev. John Good as having satisfactorily completed his theological examinations as per Title III, Canon 5 of the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church.
11. Prepared a statement on the background, responsibilities and philosophy of the DCM for the Standing Committee (appended).

In years past a group of priests in each diocese was appointed by the Bishop to examine Candidates for the Diaconate and/or Priesthood as to their proficiency in certain theological areas designated by the Canons of the Episcopal Church. In recent years these Examining Chaplains, as they were called, have in many dioceses been replaced by another group, the DCM. Like the Examining Chaplains, the DCM is appointed by the Bishop and serves him in an advisory capacity. Unlike the Examining Chaplains, the DCM is composed of laity and priests, and has a much expanded responsibility. The purpose of this memo is to describe the DCM, its background, its membership, its responsibilities and its current philosophy.

Background of the DCM

Before DCM's became a national church institution, the Examining Chaplains of the Diocese of Missouri were moving, under the able leadership of The Rev. Perry Burton to have contact with postulants and candidates during their entire course of preparation for the ministry. Instead of meeting applicants for the first and last time at the end of their three years in seminary, The Examining Chaplains asked the Bishop if they could meet with postulants before they entered seminary and each year during their study. The concern of the Examining Chaplains was for total personal growth of men entering the ministry. In these years the Examining Chaplains monitored the academic performance of seminarians, made suggestions about types of summer training and field work, on occasion suggested to men that they seek professional help for personal problems, and sometimes advised the Bishop on the type of post-ordination placement that would be appropriate.

At the same time, the Examining Chaplains moved the canonical examinations from early June to the last of December in order to allow men who were weak in certain areas time to correct their deficiencies.

Within a year of this change a National Board of Examining Chaplains was formed. This group developed a General Ordination Examination for optional use by dioceses. The Diocese of Missouri used the GOE for the first time in 1972 and found it very satisfactory. The GOE examination is administered across the nation in late January each year. The three examination papers are assigned numbers and read anonymously by at least

two readers who mark the papers as satisfactory or unsatisfactory. In addition two members of the DCM also read copies of the papers of our candidates. If there is concurrence between the national and diocesan readers, the decision is final. If there is substantial disagreement, the entire DCM conducts an oral examination of the candidate in March or April and makes a final recommendation to the Bishop.

Membership of the DCM

The DCM is composed of ten persons, seven clergy and three laypersons, appointed by the Bishop annually at the Diocesan Convention. The current membership of the DCM is:

Responsibilities of the DCM

In addition to the certification of the theological competence of candidates, the DCM is charged with the following responsibilities:

1. To assist the Bishop in the selection of persons for the ministry.
2. To maintain liaison with the national church persons/groups charged with developing clergy support systems. Included in this are the pension fund, insurance programs, clergy deployment, pastoral seminars, and non-stipendiary ministries.
3. To make available information about continuing education for clergy and to develop and administer a diocesan program for continuing education.

Philosophy of the DCM

Currently the DCM is operating on certain assumptions. First, the Church seems to be in a prolonged period of transition and possible decline. Second, in addition to the obvious external factors, this decline is attributable to the leadership of clergy. Third, seminary training has in the past generally not equipped clergy to handle the work thrust upon them today. Fourth, despite all this the Episcopal Church has a bright future.

These assumptions lead the DCM to a position of looking for persons who are proud of themselves, their work and their church, persons who have determination, courage, and enthusiasm about the responsibility of the priesthood. Above all the DCM looks for persons who have the strength and training to handle the complexity and frustration of everyday situations.

The Church has always had a place for those with a simple and genuine commitment to Christ; but this place has seldom been one of leadership. Genuine devotion and intellectual competence are necessary elements for the priests of our Church, but in view of the DCM they are not themselves sufficient for the type of leadership we of the Church need now and in the near future.

Accordingly, the DCM accepts the challenge of assisting the Bishop in selecting postulants, realizing both that this is an impossible job and also that we must keep trying to do it.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON THE MINISTRY

In Response to Resolution No. 3 of the 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Diocese of Missouri has been allocated by the Episcopal Church Foundation \$10,000 for the purpose of continuing education of the ministry during the year of 1973; and

WHEREAS, the Convocations of this Diocese have not had sufficient time to examine thoroughly the specific proposal made by the Commission on the Ministry concerning continuing education; and

WHEREAS, the 132nd Convention of the Diocese of Missouri required that the Commission on the Ministry make a specific proposal for action on continuing education to be reported back to this convention;

NOW, therefore, it is hereby resolved that the Standing Committee prepare a line item in the Diocesan Budget for 1974 for the purpose of funding continuing education of the ministry, and that the Commission on the Ministry's resolution previously submitted, a copy of which is attached hereto, be adequately considered at the 134th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

RESOLUTION

(referred to in paragraph 4 above)

WHEREAS, the Clergy need ongoing, intellectual and spiritual refreshment and development along disciplined lines in order that they may obtain greater knowledge and increase their competency as members of the professional priesthood; and

WHEREAS, it is the belief of this assembly that such intellectual and spiritual refreshment and development can best be accompanied by a consistent program of continuing education for clergymen throughout the Diocese of Missouri;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the program for the Continuing Education of the Clergy in the Diocese of Missouri, in the form submitted to this meeting, is hereby approved and adopted and the Commission on Ministry is hereby directed to take such action as shall be necessary and appropriate to carry out said program beginning February, 1973, and a copy of said Program shall be attached hereto and made a part of these minutes; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the program shall be funded out of the general funds of the Diocese of Missouri as an item of high priority.

A Program for the Continuing Education of the Clergy in the Diocese of Missouri

The following are the principal elements of a program for the continuing education of the Clergy in the Diocese of Missouri, which will be administered by the Diocesan Commission on the Ministry:

1. Eligibility

- (a) A priest to be eligible for this program must have served in a parish of the Diocese of Missouri continuously for a minimum of two years. After such initial two year period he will then accrue leave of absence under the program at the rate of one month leave for each additional year served in the parish, up to a maximum of four months total accumulated leave time. (This is the usual amount of time necessary for a clergyman to complete one semester in a college of his choice away from his home area.) This accrued leave time shall not be counted as any part of his annual vacation. If at the end of six years a clergyman has not used his accumulated leave it shall be continued until he elects to use it, however, he shall not be eligible to accrue additional leave time under the program until he has used the original leave time or any part of it.
- (b) A clergyman may elect to begin his continuing education program under Diocesan sponsorship after two years in the diocese by taking courses in a degree program at a nearby educational institution. This work would be undertaken concurrently with his parish duties. During this period of on-the-job continuing education the clergyman shall not accrue any leave of absence time.
- (c) At the inception of this program, there may not be sufficient funds for all of the eligible clergymen seeking to participate, therefore, the selection of candidates for the program will be on the basis of seniority, ie., length of service in the Diocese of Missouri, with preference given to those who have not previously participated in the program. Not more than six priests per calendar year will be granted leave of absence under the program, although additional priests may participate in on-the-job educational programs as funds will allow.
- (b) If and when a clergyman leaves the Diocese of Missouri he thereby forfeits any right to participate in this program, including all unused leave time under the program.

2. Administration

The program will be administered by the Commission on the Ministry of the Diocese. The clergymen will have an option of either a leave of absence or on-the-job program of continuing education. All proposals from clergymen must be submitted in writing to this Commission and must describe in detail what the clergyman intends to do, where he intends to go and the estimated cost. In addition a letter from the Senior Warden must accompany the letter of application, indicating Vestry endorsement or disapproval of the clergyman's proposal. In general, those proposals requiring leaves should be for periods not less than one month. Applications may be made for domestic or foreign institutions, periods of personal research, clinical training, further seminary training, or any program which the Commission on the Ministry deems worthy of using Diocesan funds for continuing Education.

3. Financing

If a clergyman is doing on-the-job continuing education, his church will be expected to continue his salary at the regular rate to which he is en-

titled, and all educational expenses will be paid by the Diocese. If a clergyman elects leave time from the church, the church will be expected to maintain the clergyman's regular salary, and the Diocese will supply priests as necessary to keep the church program functioning. In addition, the Commission on the Ministry will allocate funds necessary or appropriate and available to help meet the clergyman's total expenses of education as estimated in his letter of application.

Funds for this program shall be obtained from the annual diocesan budget and shall be given high priority. It is estimated that initially the program will need \$15,000 for the first year to allow up to six priests to receive benefits under the program. Each church will be urged to increase its annual giving to the Diocese proportionally to cover the estimated costs of the program.

4. Within a reasonable length of time and after completion of a man's education he shall report, either in written or oral form, to the Diocese, his experience and learning process.

5. This program shall not limit or hinder in any respect a clergyman who may be able to make his own arrangements for continuing education with his church.

Appendix No. 14

Report of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission 133rd Convention, Diocese of Missouri

We have sent a complete evaluation of **The Services for Trial Use** to the Standing Liturgical Commission as the corporate response of the Diocese of Missouri. The report was too lengthy to economically reproduce it for all members of convention. However, a complete copy will be mailed to each clergyman in the diocese, and we hope its contents will be shared with the congregation.

There is no statement of the Diocese being "For" or "Against" the Trial Use. There was no plebiscite conducted, nor was that the intention of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission. We did include in the Diocesan Questionnaire a question to determine the attitude of the Diocese towards the present thrust of Liturgical renewal. The response included equally large positive, negative and neutral reactions.

There are 56 congregations in the diocese. Thirty-six of these submitted data that met the minimum expectations and guidelines your Liturgical Commission set for effective Trial Use. The reactions to the First and Second Services of The Holy Eucharist were plentiful and constructive. For those who did not want any change, there was enough to be annoying. For those who did want change, there was not enough. Unlike the Eucharistic Services, there was a general lack of positive feedback for the Services of The Daily Office.

The reactions to the language of Trial Services II (Contemporary) were mostly divided, but not along any discernible demographic lines. The more familiar the text, the greater the resistance to change. Already, The Lord's Prayer, in its traditional Episcopal form, as it appears in the Book of Common Prayer, may be substituted for the ecumenical form wherever, in Services for Trial Use, only the ICET text is provided.

We would hope that parish worship committees will study this report. We also urge that congregations keep using the authorized alternate Services for Trial Use until the 1973 General Convention. We welcome your continued feedback and will periodically communicate your support, disagreements and reservations to the Standing Liturgical Commission.

REPORT OF LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Long Range Planning Committee of the Diocese, which was organized by the convocations and the Bishop's Office in the fall of 1971 and began meeting in January, 1972, wishes to report its progress to the convocations as they prepare for the Diocesan Convention.

It is our understanding that the Long Range Planning Committee is an advisory body - commissioned to study, to examine alternatives and to make recommendations to the Bishop, Standing Committee and Convention. We have no authority to make decisions for the Diocese or any part of it.

We have been painfully aware that the last Diocesan Convention instructed us to bring to Convocation and Standing Committee a plan for dealing with aided congregations long before now. But, as we began our work it seemed clear to us that before we could plan strategy and criteria for action in any one area of Diocesan program it was essential that we understand as best we could both the present structure and operations of the Diocese, including all relevant and available statistical information, and such historical perspective as could help us to understand where we as a Diocese are today.

We, thus, began our work by attempting to gain a total picture of Diocesan life in order that, in looking at any one part of it, we might see that part in relationship to a whole. This task, frankly, took several months, but we believe was time well spent. It provided us with a common frame of reference and data base and allowed us to develop a working team.

When it became clear we could not meet the schedule imposed on us by Diocesan Resolution we informed the Standing Committee of our dilemma.

Beginning in the summer of 1972 we worked on an intensive study of the non-metropolitan parishes and, with the Bishop's assistance, have scheduled a conference on January 7th and 8th with representatives of non-metropolitan churches to help us in the completion of this study. At this same time we have begun work on the following priority concerns:

1. The metropolitan area congregations
2. New concepts in funding diocesan programs
3. Alternate plan for process in the election of a new Bishop within a foreseeable time.

Our target dates for final reports to the Standing Committee and Convocations are as follows:

February, 1973 - Planning strategy and criteria for funding in the non-metropolitan congregations

June, 1973 - Proposals for funding Diocesan Program

September, 1973 - Analysis and proposals for the Bishop's Office

We hope in the near future to set a target date in the fall of 1973 for a report on metropolitan congregations and to begin an early study of strategies for church extension.

In order to plan our work we need a clear understanding of membership and ask for your approval of the following procedure: Membership on Long Range Planning Committee is limited to eleven, one elected by each Convocation and four appointed by the Bishop. The terms will be staggered on a three year term, with two of the Bishop's appointees rotating off in 1974 and two in 1975, West, North, Metro III, and Metro IV rotating

off in 1974 and the South, Metro I and Metro II representatives rotating off in 1975. All members may be reappointed for one three year term. Members do not need to be diocesan delegates, but if a Convocation representative transfers membership outside that Convocation, the member will resign.

Rt. Rev. Sir and Members of Convention:

The written report of LRP has been in the hands of delegates since the first of the year.

With your permission I would like to expand on this report briefly.

In order that our accountability might be very clear, I would like to ask that with the acceptance of our report you would also accept our understanding that we are a staff committee, responsible to the Diocesan Convention, and along with other agencies and committees of the diocese, subject to the review of the Standing Committee. Since seven of our eleven members are chosen by and directly responsible to the several convocations, we are also obviously accountable through our membership to convocations.

Since the Convention of the Diocese one year ago directly charged our committee to bring in a report on marginal congregations in Resolution 8 of that Convention — I feel responsible to speak of our accountability in that regard.

It need hardly be said we did not meet your timetable — a timetable which asked us to report within six months —. We believe we have been and are responding to that resolution. But we did not believe it responsible to carry out the charges of that resolution without first developing an understanding of the Ministry and Mission in this Diocese as it has been carried out over the last number of years. This general task took us longer than we would have liked, but we believe our groundwork has been sound and will allow us to move to recommendations in the coming year that are both realistic and appropriate.

Our first report on the Non-Metropolitan congregations is nearing completion, and I can assure you will be in the hands of Standing Committee and convocations within the month. Our study and recommendations on Metropolitan congregations should be in your hands by the fall of 1973.

In our study it has become very clear to us that to make plans for the future of this Diocese, other than strategies for circling the wagons, we must deal with the budgetary squeeze in which we find ourselves. With the approval of the Standing Committee we plan in the next months to spend major efforts in studying alternative methods for new sources of funds for the Diocese, to replace the "patchwork quilt" budgets of the past several years.

Finally on behalf of the Long Range Planning Committee, let me say that we do not wish to be, nor do we see ourselves, as pundits or wise men speaking ex-cathedra to the Diocese. Rather, we are gatherers of fact and opinion who try to organize and interpret that information for you the decision makers. The more information and opinion that you put into our possession the more likely we shall be to serve you usefully. Not one recommendation we make can have any force until it is accepted and made policy by Convention. We are your servants — help us to serve you by giving us the tools of your thoughts and your goals. We believe we can be of use, but only if we can accurately respond to your direction.

BUDGET FOR 1973

January 25, 1972

To Delegates to the Convention:

In past years, Standing Committee received seven different budget and priority revisions from the Convocations plus an eighth from the Cabinet. This year there were no formal proposals to revise, reduce or increase the tentative budget and program sent to you on 5 December. At its meeting on 23 January, 1973, Standing Committee heard the latest forecast of diocesan income (now approximately \$256,000) which would lead to a deficit of somewhat over \$63,000. The Standing Committee also heard a proposal to make up the deficit by allocating, to each congregation, a percentage of the deficit based on 1972 giving or on their number of communicants. The rationale behind this proposal was that convocations have done fairly well in building their diocesan program, but have not yet really come to grips with the income side of the budget. While Standing Committee was sympathetic to the goal it rejected the idea because it felt that too many people would see such an approach as a return to the "assessment" mode of former years.

However, it is Standing Committee's responsibility to recommend a final budget to Convention and since Standing Committee feels that a deficit budget is not to be tolerated, it considered several options:

1. To reduce projected spending by \$64,000. This option was rejected since a cut of this magnitude would radically affect work that all believe in.
2. To canvass the Congregations: There is no great enthusiasm for this. In fact, several reported negatively.
3. The Bishop and interested members of the diocese secure the difference by combining the Bishop's Fund (which usually can raise about \$30,000) with the efforts of those with greatest concern for particular programs (see resolution from Metro 2). This also was rejected on the basis that securing funds of the magnitude required would smacks of the emergency appeal held three or four years ago, at which time it was agreed that such efforts would not be repeated. Further, over the past few months, Standing Committee has given consideration to the possibility of forming an Episcopal United Charities Appeal, which would undertake to raise funds for diocesan agencies and programs, particularly those not related to the work of formally organized congregations. As a result of these deliberations, Standing Committee has requested the Long Range Planning Committee to consider the matter in great detail, and if their detailed consideration indicates a united drive is feasible, to develop a plan that could be considered by convocations in time for action at the 1974 Convention. Therefore, a special diocesan-wide fund drive this year was seen as probably distracting to the effort to build or even consider a united appeal. On the other hand there is consensus that additional monies for certain crucial programs are available from persons (both within and without the diocese) if an appropriate approach could be devised.

In order to resolve the matter, the Bishop proposed using the principal of a small bequest which comes to the diocese in the Spring of 1973 to reduce the deficit. This is estimated to be approximately \$45,000. The Bishop wishes to use the Bishop's Fund this year to accelerate raising capital for the addition to Thompson House. He therefore felt the Standing Committee

and delegates must deal with the now-reduced deficit (estimated at \$18-\$19,000).

After considerable discussion, Standing Committee accepted the Bishop's proposal and also decided to harness the enthusiasm and interest of those who felt money was available for programs. However, Standing Committee was also mindful that it could not permit end runs or a drive that would compete with the Bishop's efforts in behalf of Thompson House. Standing Committee therefore decided to manage the fund raising itself. It decided to secure monies on behalf of CICM; since CICM had requested \$128,000 and Standing Committee had already reduced that request to \$112,000, if the fund raising is successful, CICM will receive the overage (if not, CICM will be further reduced from \$112,000).

Standing Committee feels it important to reestablish the option that the Bishop's Fund be used for major efforts away from support of general diocesan program. Therefore, Standing Committee will introduce the following resolution to Convention and move adoption of the attached budget, which you will note, shows two new major items of income:

\$45,000 from liquidation of the new Harris bequest and
\$18,500 from funds to be secured by the Standing Committee.

WHEREAS, the projected income of the Diocese is approximately \$63,500 short of the minimum amount required for Diocesan purpose for 1973, and

WHEREAS, budget cuts previously made leave no room for additional reductions without seriously impairing valuable Diocesan programs; and

WHEREAS, the Bishop has offered approximately \$45,000 in funds from a bequest as a contribution to reduce the 1973 income shortfall;

NOW, therefore, The Standing Committee Moves Adoption of the 1973 Budget, as attached, with the following provisos:

I - The Standing Committee accept the funds offered by the Bishop and apply the same to the 1973 budget;

II - A special fund raising committee be appointed by the Standing Committee, with the advice and consent of the Cabinet (as representatives of the Convocations), charged with raising the \$18,500 required to balance the 1973 budget with the understandings (A) that the funds so raised will be applied to the City Ministries (CICM) budget and (B) that any amount less than \$18,500 so raised will be deducted from the City Ministries budget, (C) that Standing Committee will make sure that fund raising efforts are conducted (1) so as to enhance the understanding of diocesan program, (2) so as not to conflict with the Bishop's efforts to secure funds for Thompson House, nor (3) interfere with any congregational stewardship program.
