Second: For the support of the theological students in the Diocese, which shall be made on the third Sunday in Advent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Third: For the support of St. Luke's Hospital, which shall be made on St. Luke's Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Section 2. Offerings may be made on Christmas Day, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto, for the maintenance and increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of this Diocese, for the relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen.

Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. Immediately after the Convention is called to order on the morning of the second day, the following named Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz:

- I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
- II. On Assessments.
- III. On Constitution and Canons.
- IV. On Finance.
- V. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
- VI. On Missions.
- VII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
- VIII. On State of the Church.
- IX. Unfinished Business.
- X. On Social Service.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. Any member shall not absent himself from the services of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.
13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.
14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.
16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.
17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.
18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.
19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.
20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

FIRST DAY.

CALVARY CHURCH, COLUMBIA, MO.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 24, 1922.

The clergy and lay delegates to the Eighty-third Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Calvary Church, Columbia, on January 24th, 1922, at 9:30 a. m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. J. H. George, the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, and the Rev. A. E. Woodward. The Rev. H. P. Manning of Jefferson City read the Epistle, and the Rev. Chas. F. Edwards of Macon read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention sermon, the Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the clergy and lay delegates assembled in Calvary Church, with the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the clergy of the Diocese. Of the forty-nine who were entitled to vote, thirty-three were present.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See page 16).

Report received by the Bishop.

The Secretary called the roll of the lay delegates to the Convention.

Forty-five parishes and missions were entitled to representation in the Convention, and delegates from twenty-two were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rev. Mr. Stimpson cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary of the Convention and Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Dr. Wilkins, the Rev. Dr. Phillips, the Rev. Mr. Duckworth, Mr. James M. Bull and Mr. Geo. K. Warner as members of the Nominating Committee, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Nominating Committee was directed to omit deputies to the General Convention from their list of nominations.

The Rules of Order of the last Convention were adopted for this Convention.

Mr. Curtice read his report as Secretary of the Standing Committee. (Appendix 3.)

Report received.

Mr. Curtice read his report as Secretary and Treasurer of the Parochial Trust Fund. (Appendix 4.)

Report received.

Mr. Curtice read the report of the Trust Funds held by the Bishop. (Appendix 5.)

Report received.

The visiting clergy and candidates for Holy Orders were invited to seats upon the floor with the privilege of speaking.

The Treasurer was authorized to pay the traveling expenses of missionaries to the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Atwill presented the report of the Church News Committee. (Appendix 6.)

Report received and Resolution No. 1 contained therein was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Bishop Johnson read his report as chairman of the Committee on a Service Building for Columbia. (Appendix 7.)

Report received and the committee was continued.

The Rev. Carroll M. Davis, Secretary of Domestic Missions and Church Extension, addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 2, proposing a new Canon 29, relative to the Bishop and Council.

Resolution No. 2 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p. m.

The Bishop Coadjutor read his annual address. (Appendix No. 2.)

The Rev. Mr. Putney introduced Resolution No. 3, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 3—

Resolved, That this Convention endorse the program of the Bishop Coadjutor in relation to a suitable place of worship for St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights, both from the point of moral and financial support.

Resolution No. 3 was adopted.

Mr. Mackay introduced Resolution No. 4, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 4—

Resolved, That Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution be amended by adding to the end of said section the following words: "or shall be engaged in an active capacity under the direction of the General Church."

Resolution No. 4 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor introduced Resolution No. 5, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 5—

Resolved, That this Convention recommends to the diocesan authorities that the building of a Church House at the State University be given first consideration in any new undertakings made possible through funds received from the Presiding Bishop and Council.

Resolution No. 5 was laid on the table.

Mr. Mackay introduced Resolution No. 6, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 6—

Amend Canon XIII by adding a new section 4, as follows:

"When any Mission or Parish organization expends any money (except for operating expenses), such expenditures shall be made through the Treasurer of the Mission or Parish in which such organization is located, who shall thereupon credit the organization with the money received, and expend it for the designated purpose.

Resolved, That this Convention approve that part of the address of the Bishop Coadjutor referring to increased budget for stipends of missionaries amounting to more than \$23,000.00 for the year 1922, and ask that the Diocesan Executive Committee approve the budget as made up by the Bishop Coadjutor and also the additional amount asked for by Bishop Tuttle.

Resolution No. 8 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. George introduced Resolution No. 9, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 9—

Resolved, That the presentation of the building plans suggested as adequate for the Church's work at Columbia by the vestry of Calvary Parish be made the order of the day at the convening of Convention for the evening session, 7:30 Wednesday, and for this purpose Mr. H. S. Bill, architect, and Dean J. P. McBaine, representing the vestry, be granted the privilege of the floor.

Resolution No. 9 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Bunting introduced Resolution No. 10, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 10—

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons be made the order of the day immediately after the opening of the session Wednesday morning.

Resolution No. 10 was adopted.

Mr. Bull read his report as Treasurer of the Diocese. (Appendix 10.)

Report received and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Bull read his report as Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 11.)

Report received and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Bull read his report as Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund. (Appendix 12.)

Report received and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Bull read the report of Mr. Walker Hill as Treasurer of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate. (Appendix 13.)

Report received and referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Warner read his report as Diocesan Treasurer of the Nation-Wide Campaign. (Appendix 14.)

Report received.

The addenda to the foregoing report, read by Mr. Warner, was made a part of the minutes.

The Convention expressed its grateful appreciation for the faithful and efficient services of Mr. Warner as Treasurer of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The Rev. Mr. Norton was given the privilege of the floor on the subject of the Nation-Wide Campaign report.

The addenda to the foregoing report of the Treasurer of the Nation-Wide Campaign was referred to the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee with authority to have it printed for distribution.

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

SECOND DAY.

CALVARY CHURCH, COLUMBIA, MO.,

Wednesday, January 25, 1922.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in Calvary Church at 7:30 a. m. by the Rev. James H. George.

Morning prayer was read in Calvary Church at 9:00 a. m. by the Rev. Carroll M. Davis. The Rev. H. H. Marsden and the Rev. L. C. Sherburne read the lessons.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 9:30 a. m.

The roll was called of those who did not answer on the first day.

The minutes of the first day were read and approved.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the following committee report:

Your Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 2, relating to a new Canon 29 introduced by the Rev. Mr. Jones, has examined it and respectfully recommend that it be adopted as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 2—
OF THE BISHOP AND COUNCIL

Resolved, That a new canon, to be numbered Canon 29, be adopted, as follows:

Section 1. The Bishop and Council of the Diocese as hereinafter constituted shall unify, develop and prosecute all the activities of the Diocese with full power to take charge of, consolidate and administer all diocesan funds or trusts however the same may be held or in whomsoever the titles thereto may be vested.

Section 2. The Council shall consist of the following members: the Bishop, who shall be ex-officio its president; the Bishop Coadjutor, if there

be one, who shall be ex-officio the vice-president; and nine clergymen and nine laymen. At the first election three of each order shall be elected for one year, three of each order for two years, and three of each order for three years, and thereafter three of each order for three years. In the event that there be no Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor, or if both Bishops be absent from the Diocese, the President of the Standing Committee shall act as President of the Council until a Bishop shall be elected or until the Bishop or the Bishop Coadjutor shall return to the Diocese.

Section 3. The Council shall meet at stated periods, at least four times a year, or at the call of the Bishop whenever it shall be deemed necessary by the Bishop or whenever the Bishop shall be requested so to do by at least five members of the Council.

Section 4. Members of the Council shall remain in office until their successors are elected; but the Council shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur through the death, resignation or removal from the Diocese of any member elected by the Convention for his unexpired term.

Section 5. The Council shall also elect a Secretary.

Section 6. The Council shall submit to each annual Convention for its consideration a budget for all the work committed to it and for such other work as it may have undertaken or purposes to undertake. Such budget and estimate shall be considered by the Convention and appropriate action taken.

Section 7. The Council shall have power to expend all funds provided for in the budget of that year. It shall also have power to expend any other funds actually received by it over and above the amount required for the budget.

Section 8. Five elected members of each order together with the President or Vice-President shall constitute a quorum.

Section 9. The Council shall elect a Treasurer who shall hold office at the pleasure of the Council and shall be ex-officio a member thereof. He shall be in charge of all funds collected and administered by the Council.

Section 10. The Treasurer may nominate such assistant treasurer or assistant treasurers as may be necessary, for election by the Council; the accounts of the Treasurer and of his assistants shall be audited annually by certified public accountants. The Treasurer and his assistants shall give bonds to be approved by the Council.

Section 11. The Council shall have power to employ salaried secretaries and treasurers if in the prosecution of its work this shall be found necessary.

Section 12. The Council shall publish and submit to the Diocese one month before each annual Convention a full report of all its work.

Section 13. For the year 1922, the budget submitted by the Finance Committee of the Diocese shall be the official budget of the Council.

Section 14. All diocesan agencies shall continue to function as heretofore until such time as the Council shall take over their work.

Section 15. This canon shall take effect immediately.

Section 16. All other canons so far as the same are inconsistent with the provisions of this canon are hereby repealed.

J. Boyd Coxé and Mr. S. A. Douglas as members of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Bishop appointed Mrs. C. R. McDonald, Miss Carrie B. Jackson, and Miss Fannie Griffith members of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

Noon day prayers were read by the Bishop.

The Bishop declared the election of deputies to the General Convention in order.

Nominations were made, and the rule requiring the calling of the roll for balloting was suspended.

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. C. R. Taylor introduced Resolution No. 12, as follows:
RESOLUTION NO. 12.

Resolved, That all alterations to the Constitution and Canons to be proposed for action by diocesan conventions shall be given to the Committee on Constitution and Canons at least two weeks prior to the meeting of said Convention, and that such alterations be printed and sent to delegates of the Convention at least one week before the time such alterations are under consideration.

Resolution No. 12 was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Convention took a recess until 2:00 p. m.

The Convention reassembled at 2:00 p. m., and went into a session of the Committee of the Whole to consider Resolution No. 2.

The following amendments to Canon 29 were adopted by sections:

Amend the printed copy of Section 2 by inserting between the words "Vice-President" and "and," in the 3d line, the following words: "The Treasurer of the Diocese, who shall be ex-officio Treasurer of the Council"; also by substituting the word "six" for the word "nine" where it occurs in the third and fourth lines; and inserting after the word "laymen," in the fourth line, the following words: "elected by the Convention on the nomination of the Bishop".

And further amend Section 2 by substituting the word "two" for the word "three" in the fourth line, and for the word "three" where it occurs the first two times in the fifth line and for the word "three" where it occurs the first time in the sixth line; and by striking out the word "be" between the words "shall" and "elected" in the ninth line, and substituting therefor the words, "have been"; and by inserting between the words "elected" and "or," in the ninth line, the words "and consecrated". Section 2 as amended was adopted.

Amend the printed copy of Section 3 by striking out the word "four" in line one of the printed copy and substituting therefor the word "nine". Section 3 as amended was adopted.

Amend the printed copy of Section 4 by inserting the words "on nomination of the Bishop" between the words "shall" and "have" in the second line. Section 4 as amended was adopted.

Section 5 was adopted.

Section 6 was adopted.

Section 7 was adopted.

Amend the printed copy of Section 8 by substituting the word "three" for the word "five" at the beginning of the section.

Section 8 as amended was adopted.

Section 9 was stricken out and the following sections were re-numbered accordingly.

Amend the printed copy of new Section 9 by striking out the words "The Treasurer" at the beginning of said section, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "the Treasurer shall be in charge of all funds collected and administered by the Bishop and Council. He".

Section 9 as amended was adopted.

Section 10 was adopted.

Section 11 was stricken out, and the following new section enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as Section 11:

Section 11. The Council shall publish and submit to each annual Convention a full report of all its work for the preceding fiscal year.

Section 12 was adopted.

Section 13 was adopted.

A new section to be known as Section 14 was adopted as follows:

Section 14. The Council shall not delegate its powers and duties to any Executive Committee.

Sections 14 and 15 were advanced one number each.

Section 15 was adopted.

Section 16 was adopted.

Canon 29 as amended was adopted by the Committee of the Whole.

The Committee of the Whole arose, and the Convention re-assembled.

Owing to lack of time the Convention was regretfully unable to accept the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce for an automobile ride.

The tellers for the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. Z. B. T. Phillips, D. D., the Rev. James H. George, Mr. James M. Bull, Mr. Geo. M. Block, and Mr. Geo. K. Warner elected deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical and two lay deputies to the General Convention, and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Committee of the Whole submitted its recommendation that Canon 29 with amendments be adopted as follows:

CANON 29.

Report received.

The order of the day for adjournment was suspended.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the Rev. H. W. Mizner and the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D. D., elected deputies to the General Convention.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. R. L. Orcutt as deputy to the General Convention, and the Bishop declared him elected.

It was ordered that the candidates for deputies to the General Convention who received the vote next highest to those who were elected should be declared elected alternate deputies to the General Convention.

The following named candidates were elected alternates under the above order :

Clerical: The Rev. J. Courtney Jones, the Rev. Geo. E. Norton, the Rev. R. D. S. Putney, and the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe. Lay: Mr. Geo. C. Mackay, Mr. Geo. A. Randolph, Mr. Thos. Q. Dix, and Mr. Thos. K. Skinner.

The nominations of the Nominating Committee for members of the Missionary Board were changed by withdrawing the name of the Rev. Z. B. T. Phillips, D. D., and substituting therefor the name of the Rev. R. L. Atchison, and by withdrawing the name of Mr. W. E. Bryan and substituting therefor the name of Mr. A. Blair Ridington.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the candidates for election as members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese, as presented by the Nominating Committee, with the above described changes, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. C. E. Remick as Registrar of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. James M. Bull as Treasurer of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Bishop nominated the following named candidates for election as members of the Bishop and Council for the terms of years indicated :

Rev. H. W. Mizner, one year ; Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D. D., one year ; Rev. J. S. Bunting, two years ; Rev. Z. B. T. Phillipps, D. D., two years ; Rev. E. S. White, three years ; Rev. R. D. S. Putney, three years ; Mr. J. R. Barroll, one year ; Mr. R. W. Shapleigh, one year ; Mr. R. L. Orcutt, two years ; Mr. F. C. Thompson, two years ; Mr. Geo. M. Block, three years ; Mr. Geo. K. Warner, three years.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the above named candidates, as nominated by the Bishop, as members of the Bishop and Council, and the Bishop declared them elected.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the following committee report :

We, the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 4 have considered and approved the same and respectfully recommend that it be brought before the Convention for adoption.

Report received and Resolution No. 4 was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the following committee report :

We, the Committee on Constitution and Canons, to whom was referred Resolution No. 6, proposing a new section as an addition to Canon 13, have carefully considered said resolution and recommend that the proposed addition to Canon 13 be adopted and be numbered Section 4.

Report received and Resolution No. 6 was adopted.

The committee appointed under Resolution No. 16 of 1921 was continued, with the substitution of the Rev. H. W. Mizner for the Rev. Carroll M. Davis.

It was ordered that the next Convention shall meet at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis.

The Secretary was instructed to draw his warrant on the Treasurer for \$25.00, payable to Calvary Church, Columbia, for extra expenses on account of the Convention.

The Convention took a recess until 7:30 p. m.

The Convention reassembled at 7:30 p. m.

Mr. Orcutt presented his report as chairman of the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee. (Appendix 26.)

Report received.

The Rev. Mr. Beach introduced Resolution No. 14, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 14—

Resolved, That the Eighty-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri expresses its thanks to the Rector and people of Calvary Church, Columbia, for their kind hospitality which has been so generously shown to the members of this Convention, and that the members of this Convention shall go away with deep gratitude and pleasant memories which will remain with them throughout the year.

Resolution No. 14 was adopted by a rising vote.

The Rev. Mr. Atchison introduced Resolution No. 15, as follows:

RESOLUTION No. 15—

Resolved, By this Convention that the Sterling-Towner Education Bill now before Congress is hereby approved, and that the United States Senators from Missouri and the members of the National House of Representatives in districts embraced by this diocese are urged to support this bill until it becomes a law, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to such Senators and Representatives.

Resolution No. 15 was adopted.

Addresses were made by Dean J. P. McBaine, representing the Vestry of Calvary Parish, Columbia, and Mr. H. S. Bill, architect, concerning the proposed Parish House at Columbia.

The Secretary was authorized to have six hundred copies of the Journal of the Convention printed.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of the second day of the Convention.

After the Benediction by the Bishop the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

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APPENDIX No. 1.

Annual Address of the Bishop of Missouri
TO THE
Eighty-third Annual Convention.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Associated life in course of expansion calls for adjustments and readjustments. Our American Church has sixty-nine Dioceses. In its infancy, in 1785, it had only eight. For the sake of clearness and accuracy it is desirable that the yearly reports of the sixty-nine Dioceses concerning acts and facts and figures and persons should be for each calendar year exactly, from January 1 to January 1. All of the sixty-nine Dioceses are, I think, undertaking to comply with this desideratum. So our reports, this year, are for the exact year, from January 1, 1921, to January 1, 1922.

During this calendar year of 1921 there has been no death of a Bishop. We now have one hundred and thirty-nine Bishops. At the beginning, in 1785, we had but one. It is remarkable that among the one hundred and thirty-nine there has not been one death. Usually I have reported from two to five deaths each year. Since I became a member of the House, in 1867, one hundred and forty-three Bishops have died. May God mercifully have us all in His holy keeping!

Nor has any one from the list of the Clergy of the Diocese died. But Mr. Curtis M. Jennings, a lay member of the Standing Committee, has been taken away. In late years Mr. Jennings has been the Secretary of the Standing Committee. In my thirty-five years as Bishop of Missouri, there have been, I think, only four Secretaries of the Standing Committee,—Charles Hofman, M. S. Snow, C. M. Jennings, and the present incumbent, C. C. Curtice. All of them faithful, painstaking, efficient men.

From our homes and congregations death has gathered his harvest. Among them, Mrs. Baker of St. Philip's and Mrs. Baker of St. John's; Mrs. Palmer of St. Michael and All Angels and Mrs. Stubblefield of Chaffee and Mrs. Gowenlock; Mr. George B. Reynolds and Dexter Tiffany and C. M. Seaman; Mr. Hesser of Webster Groves, Mr. C. H. Fauntleroy and Miss Jennie E. Little of Sullivan, Judge Lawson of Columbia, and James Y. Lockwood of Webster Groves. Besides losses by death, the Diocese has bidden goodby to two of its most faithful Church workers, Dean Davis and Mr. E. H. Lycett. Dean Davis was in harness with me for thirty-four years. Mr. Lycett served the Diocese for forty-seven years. No two men more than they have contributed for an entire generation to the stability and symmetry and strength and success of the Diocese of Missouri. Verbs and adverbs and adjectives may not have power enough to tell it out, but grateful and loving hearts here will treasure in depths within warm and unforgetting memories of their comradeship in association and their unflinching devotion to duty. May God's guidance and guardianship and grace continue to be their never-failing investiture until the home coming time!

In the world things seem out of joint. Not only is there not settled peace, but there is not enough basic equilibrium to furnish substantial steadiness. Russia and its hundred million is a seething pot, China and

its hundreds of millions more is a drifting derelict. India is uneasy. Ireland is unsteadily rebellious, and Germany is bankrupt. If Noah's dove could now be sent over human wastes to find a rest for the sole of her foot she would hardly be able to find it.

Yet, the Lord reigneth. He sitteth above the water floods and in His mercy seat.

The out-of-jointedness of things, though of His permission, is not of His will. And he wants us, and all with us who count Him ruler and king, to be agents of His to help reduce the out-of-jointedness to right mindedness of order and stability and peace.

The adjustments of diplomacy may accomplish something, and commercial requirements something, and every day necessities something, but to secure strong and enduring order and stability and peace, nothing but the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ taught and valued and applied and preached will avail.

So it comes to pass that the seemingly little things of home and church, of parish and diocese, of prayer and communion, of faith and hope and love are really things of might to hold the world steady and strong, and to keep it sane and sweet.

It is no unimportant thing, therefore,—this Church Convention held once a year to report of the past, to consider of the present and to provide for the future.

The Church activities in the Diocese have, for the most part, gone steadily on. Though there is one exception. The Home for Convalescent Women has been closed. It seemed to be drifting hopelessly into unwelcome and dishonorable debt; and its directors thought the only honest thing to do was to close its doors. The other institutions, such as St. Luke's Hospital, the Orphan's Home, Brittain Hall, the Girl's Friendly, the Daughters of the King, the Guild of Nurses, St. Andrew's Brotherhood, the Churchmen's Club and the Churchwomen's Club and the ever active and helpful Woman's Auxiliary, have sustained and continued their benevolent and beneficent work. I pause to remark that the figures for Confirmation are not as good as those of last year. Last year, 619. This year 557, a falling off of 62.

The intensive missionary work done at St. Stephen's and at Grace-Holy Cross, and at St. Thomas' for the Deaf, and through our ministering services to the City Institutions, is such as to give joy to every earnest disciple of the Master, and such as helps to bring that Master's love and grace near to the hungry souls that need Him. All Saints' Church has caught the vision, and her Rector and people are earnestly busy in planting a Sunday School and sustaining services in a "Bethany Mission", located in a region where neglected colored people abound.

In North St. Louis, the Rev. Mr. Weddell and Sister Miriam have gathered a goodly congregation, naming it the "Prince of Peace."

And the Bishop Coadjutor will tell you how, in the same region, destined to be a real Industrial Centre, St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights, offers a golden opportunity for laying the foundation of a Parish, strong and sure, if only the man and the money may be forthcoming to make the start.

Epiphany, under the nursing care of St. Peter's is flourishing. And St. Paul's, Carondelet, under the Rev. Mr. Beach, is taking on new life and fresh growth. Twenty-two have been confirmed there this year.

St. Michael and All Angels' with its new parish house and splendid Sunday School reaches out widely to gather in successfully.

And Calvary, Columbia, realizing her strategic advantage in having

the State University for a parishioner, is playing the host to this Convention to demonstrate that she is alive and alert and hopeful, and planning for future expansion.

As to my own personal comfort, it is so satisfying that I must report it. The motor car comes and goes and brings unspeakable comfort. It does not bring any bill of costs,—of chauffeur or upkeep or repairs. It is a car for me simply to employ and enjoy. I don't understand it at all, but I appreciate it immensely. And right here I set down my warm thanks.

Looking away from ourselves we are proud of what the Church at large is doing. It has put three Bishops at work in the great Diocese of New York, and will keep them at work. All three are hard working men. It is putting two Bishops in Liberia; and the heathen region there will be more zealously evangelized than hitherto it has been. It is celebrating the twenty-fifth year of the magnificent work done by Bishop Rowe in Alaska. And it has made its Centennial year of the great Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church to ring, from Alaska to Florida, and from Maine to Texas, with calls to Nation-wide Campaigns and to Every Man Canvassings, and with arousings to zeal and love and effort and sympathy of the thoughts and aims and lives of all the men and women and children of the Church.

All aims are not won. All friction is not smoothed out. We may remember that one way to get light is by friction.

But call up all the disappointments and discouragements if you will,—there is a big heap of them I know,—yet, viewing the heap, no one will hesitate to grant, I think, that the campaigns and canvassings and arousings have stirred the Church from center to circumference, have led her to realize her nationality, and to value her Catholicity, and have brought her to see how wide is the work, and how far flung the workers, and how immense the results of the activities of her great missionary field.

Dear Brethren all, let us stand by the Church in her great missionary work. And stand steady. In love and loyalty. With prayers and sympathy For gifts and work. Stand steady.

APPENDIX No. 2.

**Address of the Bishop Coadjutor,
Eighty-third Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.**

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

During the year 1921, I confirmed in the Diocese of Missouri 163 persons. I baptized one child and one adult. I solemnized three marriages. I officiated at three burials. I celebrated the Holy Communion 24 times, and twice assisted in its celebration. I preached and delivered addresses within the Diocese 108 times; also 17 times in Lenten Services, and 6 times in colleges and seminaries. I gave a letter dimissory in favor of the Rev. L. H. White, Presbyter, to the Ecclesiastical authority of Massachusetts. Received letters dimissory from: The Bishop of Connecticut in favor of the Rev. Chas. B. Carpenter, Presbyter.

The Bishop of Bethlehem in favor of the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer, Presbyter.

The Bishop of Maryland in favor of the Rev. H. H. Marsden, Presbyter.

The Bishop of Lexington in favor of the Rev. H. P. Manning, Presbyter.

The Bishop of Arkansas in favor of the Rev. A. E. Woodward, Presbyter.

The Bishop of Connecticut in favor of Mr. Phillips Brooks Warner, Candidate for Holy Orders.

From old St. Jude's parish, Monroe City, which reported a total of 70 communicants a year ago, five communicants have been called by death: Mr. B. O. Wood, Junior Warden, in his 86th year; Mrs. Amy Green Hanley; Mrs. Catherine S. Lear; Mrs. Annie Catherine Anderson; Mr. William Shanklin McClintic, aged 83, uncomplainingly blind during a long term of years. Mrs. J. H. Bowen, one of the best of our people at Rolla, died in June. Grace-Holy Cross, St. Louis, has lost Mrs. Robyna Smart, who died in the house where she was born, in North St. Louis, at 74, a life-long member of Grace Church; and Mrs. Sarah Ann Kirby, aged 70, a life-long member. Mrs. Ollie Ingham Stubblefield, a dear, sweet Christian soul, was the mainstay of our mission in Chaffee from its very beginning. On July 6 she finished her course. In this parish of Columbia, Dr. J. D. Lawson, formerly Dean of the Law School of the University, a recognized authority on International Law, and Major Samuel A. Smoke, both greatly interested in the welfare of Calvary church, are missed. Miss Jennie Little, longer a communicant in Sullivan than any person now living there, and Mr. W. H. Quarles of Cape Girardeau, an intelligent and devoted churchman, are gone. Mr. Curtis M. Jennings of St. Louis, who died on December 30, had been a close friend to me for ten years. In the business committee of Grace-Holy Cross, we who were his associates admired his splendid qualities of honor and fairness and gentleness and relied on his sound business judgment.

"For these passed on before us,
Saviour, we Thee adore!"

I shall ask you, as I usually do in my annual address, to look with me at some of that portion of the rural field of which I am placed in charge; also to look at some portions of the city of St. Louis.

No parish in the Diocese, I think, has better justified its right to have

the Diocesan Convention as its guest this year, than this parish of Calvary church, Columbia. Speaking in terms of dollars and cents, this parish has a remarkable record for 1921 both in the matter of the Diocesan Assessment and of the Nation-Wide Campaign. In the Nation-Wide Campaign, eleven congregations of the Diocese are reported to have paid their entire quotas in addition to their entire Diocesan Assessments. Columbia is one of the eleven. In addition, Columbia has made generous provision to meet all the expenses which are usually met by the congregation which entertains the annual Diocesan Convention. Columbia Parish did a plucky thing in inviting this Convention to be its guest. Not in forty years have we met in any place outside of St. Louis. We thank Columbia for the things that it is doing for us; and we are glad to be here in the opening days of a year that follows the best year that this parish has ever had.

While we are here, we can do no better than to impress ourselves with the meagerness of the equipment of the Church at this seat of a great University which is rated among the first rank State Universities in the United States of America. This church building is too small to seat those who are desiring to worship here during the collegiate year. As though that fact alone were not a sufficient handicap, there is no place whatever for sessions of the Church School, there are no club rooms, there are no guild rooms, there is no place to which young men and young women of the student body can be invited for social intercourse. In an entirely new world, in which it has been demonstrated that the Church must make an entirely new approach to the whole problem of the young and the student class, this church in Columbia lacks tools of every kind to do its work. I feel that it is wholesome that the Convention should assemble here at this time, if for no other reason, in order that we may the more fully realize how limited is the Church's equipment here to grasp a great opportunity and to discharge a tremendous responsibility. I am deliberately putting in the forefront of my annual address the problem presented to the Church by this State University. This church building is almost at the edge of the University campus. The work which a rector can accomplish with no other equipment than a beautiful house of worship, is being done, and excellently done, and effectually done, and adequately done. But the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri recorded its conviction that the building in which we are now assembled is not sufficient to the task, when, two years ago, is passed a resolution creating "a Committee of the Diocese of Missouri to raise funds for the erection of a Service Building in Columbia." In the same resolution the Diocese asserts "that the responsibility for maintaining and strengthening spiritual contacts at the State University is not parochial, but diocese-wide, and state-wide, and nation-wide." The Diocese of Missouri has confessed its responsibility for standing alongside of Calvary Parish in the student work. The Bishop of West Missouri seems to have accepted the principle that the Diocese of West Missouri "is equally interested in the spiritual welfare of the students" of the University; for he has appointed the Rev. R. N. Spencer, Rector of Grace and Holy Trinity, Kansas City; the Rev. E. J. Craft, rector of St. George's, Kansas City; and the Rev. B. M. Washburn, Rector of St. Paul's, Kansas City; and Mr. A. C. Stowell, a layman of Kansas City, as a Committee of the West Missouri Diocese to meet with the Committee of the Missouri Diocese in this matter. The West Missouri members met with the Missouri members on September 20 1921, and organized as a Joint Committee. Among other business transacted was the unanimous adoption of a measure offered by the Rev. Robert N. Spencer of Kansas City; Resolved: That it is the sense of this Committee that the two Dioceses of Missouri and West Missouri should provide a Service Building for the University students at Columbia. It would seem, therefore, that we have it on record that the responsibility for this work has been acknowledged in some sense jointly by

the two Dioceses which form the State. We eagerly hope that each of the two Dioceses will, in due time, discharge its quota of the entire responsibility.

It seems to me that our next step should be a definite approach to the General Church; for we have affirmed that responsibility for religious work, under the auspices of the Church, among students, at this center, is nationwide as well as state-wide.

Is not the time here when the whole Church should be told, through some Department of the Presiding Bishop and Council, that there is a situation at Columbia, Missouri, which is just as much the business of the General Church as other similar situations in whose development, as I understand it, the General Church is bearing some share? May not this Diocese ask its representative on the Presiding Bishop and Council to inform this Service Building Committee as soon as possible whether there be a way in which the raising of some portion of the funds for the proposed Service Building can be got into what the Presiding Bishop and Council calls "the General Church budget" for the next triennium?

The Vestry of the parish has given substantial expression of its interest in the project by voting on May 16, 1921, a lot on which the Service Building may be erected, and the sum of Three Thousand Dollars. The tide which is not taken at the opportune time, binds in shallows those who fail to take it. I believe that now is the accepted time to bring in a new day in the Church's life here at the seat of one of the leading State Universities in America.

The Missionary Board of 1921, which took counsel in regard to matters of importance for the future, did three things of which I wish especially to speak.

1. The Board unanimously voted to increase the salary of the Rev. Charles B. Carpenter from \$2400 to \$3600. This new figure is no index of our measure of Mr. Carpenter's worth to the extremely difficult and exacting work to which we have appointed him. We want Mr. Carpenter to regard it as a testimonial of the very loving regard in which he is held by all who have the privilege of knowing him, and as an effort on the part of the Diocese to share more equitably with him the cost of maintaining his family and educating his two sons while he is representing the Church in Missouri among the City Institutions in a way which makes us proud that he is on our staff.

2. The second thing, was action taken putting the approval of the Diocese on the efforts which St. Luke's, Harney Heights, is making to develop its parochial life and to secure a more suitable place for worship and more suitable housing for its social activities. The development here during the past year has been remarkable. Deaconess Sniffen is chiefly responsible. I do not mean to speak slightly of the faithful Sunday ministrations of the Rev. Mr. Weddell and the Rev. Mr. Harvey. But the various guilds and clubs and societies and the Church School and the better congregations and the increased financial support all are what they are because of Deaconess Sniffen's constant attention to them. In addition to very worthy givings for self-support and for diocesan and missionary purposes, the people of St. Luke's put in the bank in 1921 toward a Building Fund the neat sum of \$563.00. There are also pledges of the people toward a new church amounting to about \$750.00. We hope that 1922 will see the beginnings of a better place of worship and also a resident pastor for St. Luke's. Some interested Church women of St. Louis have given me \$500.00 for certain comforts and conveniences in the proposed new building.

A Committee consisting of the Rev. R. D. S. Putney, and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Mr. Frank C. Thompson and Mr. George K. Warner, with the Bishop Coadjutor as Chairman, is in the field for the purpose of assisting

St. Luke's to secure a reasonable sum of money (not to exceed \$20,000) to begin these necessary building operations. The congregation pledges \$650 per year for pastor's salary.

Nearly seven years ago Miss Sarah H. Sniffen listened to my call and came from Ohio and took charge as woman worker of an important work which we were just beginning in the lead smelting town of Herculanum. She presently manifested that she was "a woman of devout character and proved fitness;" and, because the people of Herculanum wished it, and because I felt that it would enlarge her usefulness, I appointed her deaconess on November 21, 1915. Deaconess Sniffen did a notable work at Herculanum and seriously impaired her health in the doing of it. I took her out of Herculanum in 1919 and appointed her to duty in St. Luke's Mission, Harney Heights, and asked her not to work so hard. But because there were things to be done that would not be done unless she did them, she has gone during these past two years quite beyond the limit of any one woman's strength. She several times asked me to release her, but I asked her to stay. Finally, on December 30, I accepted her resignation. She tells me that she is going to her mother's home in Ohio for a needed rest. She also tells me that she hopes she may come back some time to help us further in our Missouri missionary work. We thank God for these seven best years of her life which Deaconess Sniffen has given us here. We hope we have not permitted her to overwork to such an extent that she will not speedily react to needed physical rest.

MISSIONARY STIPENDS.

3. The third thing which the Missionary Board did was to recommend an increased budget for providing more generous support for the workers in what is called the mission field of the Diocese. The budget of the Bishop Coadjutor at the end of 1921, for salaries of clergy and deaconesses and women workers to whom the diocese entrusts the doing of the diocesan missionary work, was about \$15,000. The Bishop Coadjutor is requesting of the Missionary Board for 1922 a total budget of \$23,265.00; and the Missionary Board has stamped with its approval the request. In this connection I do not wish to stress the point that it is difficult to get good men in these days, for the small salaries which were the vogue 25 years ago. I should like to put my plea on higher ground than that. I should like to emphasize the point that the Church is not *morally justified* in accepting the services of good men and devoted women at a figure so far out of proportion to the actual cost of the actual necessities of life. On that ground, I earnestly ask the Diocese of Missouri to ask its Finance Committee to ask this Convention to vote to approve and appropriate for the work of the Missionary Board of 1922 the amount of \$23,265.00 for the budget of the Bishop Coadjutor. (I understand that Bishop Tuttle desires a total of \$850 for four or five congregations, not entirely self-supporting, which he keeps in his own charge.)

In making this request, I must remind the Convention that you brought me here and gave me the entire oversight of the missionary work of Missouri. I have just finished my sixteenth year as a bishop. I have been ten years Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri. I have made it a part of my business to acquire a rather wide acquaintance with the clergy of this Church. I want to bear testimony at the beginning of my eleventh year as your Bishop Coadjutor, that no bishop is privileged to have as partners with him in this work a more loyal band of clergy and other workers whose average, in those qualities that really matter most, is higher than the average of my present staff. I want to put it in the record that the Diocese has a right to be proud of them.

In the field which is given me to care for there were, 10 years ago, 16 clergy actively engaged in the work of the Church. The average residence in the Diocese of these 16 men was at that time 3.80 years. Today, in the same area, we have 20 active clergy, and the average residence in the Diocese of these 20 is thus far 5.30 years. This is a gain of 25 per cent in the number of clergy; and a gain of 39.5 per cent in length of service. Considering the upset and the restlessness caused by the war, and the uncertainty and anxiety caused by the soaring prices of the necessities of life, it is remarkable, I think, that we have made such good gains.

There was in my part of the Diocese, 10 years ago, one deaconess who had been in the work seven years. At the close of 1921, we have one deaconess who has been here seven years; one who has been here 10 years; one who has been here a few months. We have also Sister Miriam now in her ninth year on my staff who has built up the wonderful work at Prince of Peace, St. Louis, and Miss Emma Luther, who is in her third year in the work at Herculeum.

CLARKSVILLE. Late in February, Bishop Tuttle sent me word: "Clarksville is dead as a parish." To which he added the further word: "Automatically it falls to your care." I visited the place several times in the spring. I found a number of persons eager that the Church should not abandon Clarksville. We have now built up a living mission on the ruin of the dead parish. The Rev. Jesse K. Brennan is the pastor since June 12, supplying a Sunday service twice each month. Plans are on foot for adding two more Sunday services to the monthly schedule. I think there are but 10 confirmed persons. But the attendance at the services has run from 35 to 60 for the past six months, only twice dropping below the 50 mark. There is a very small Sunday School. There is a lively guild of a dozen members which meets every week and accomplishes much good. Mr. Brennan writes me at the end of six months, "Altogether I consider the work in Clarksville most encouraging." The beautiful building has been painted, windows have been repaired, furnace put in order, electric wiring done and fixtures installed. I am glad for the good record of "dead" Clarksville.

OVERLAND. A single confirmation class of 20 persons presented this year by the Rev. A. P. Rein added fifty per cent to the communicant list here. Four Thousand Dollars has been pledged for building a much needed addition to the church. This work will be taken up soon.

PALMYRA. The vestry here had asked me to help them find a rector, and at Bishop Tuttle's request, I did so. On my nomination the Rev. Arthur E. Woodward came from Arkansas in early April. We know Mr. and Mrs. Woodward. They were with me in Southeast Missouri a lot of good years. We are delighted to have them back. Bishop Tuttle has now transferred the parish to me. Friends have presented the parish with a beautiful rectory near the church.

JEFFERSON CITY. On the first day of the year, Bishop Tuttle transferred to me the jurisdiction of Grace Parish. I nominated as Rector the Rev. H. P. Manning, rector of Trinity Church, Danville, Ky. Mr. Manning was called, accepted, moved into the nice rectory with his good wife and little lad in April and is doing the quality of work that we wanted done in Jefferson City as a follow-up of the four faithful years of the Rev. George L. Barnes. PORTLAND and FULTON are carefully shepherded by Mr. Manning, in addition to his Jefferson City work.

MOBERLY. In November the Northern Convocation met in Moberly. The fabric of the church is in splendid condition now and the Moberly people tell me that they are as happy as can be under the affectionate and watchful care of the Rev. Charles F. Edwards, the rector, who is also rector of Macon.

CAPE GIRARDEAU. The Southern Convocation met in November as guests of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau. There is a new spirit in the wheels as a result of fifteen months' duty faithfully done by the Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor, the rector. BLOOMFIELD has organized a Mission of St. John the Evangelist; and this, with the unorganized missions at CHAFFEE and ILLMO, are a part of the Rev. J. H. Taylor's wide field.

POPLAR BLUFF. The congregation has during the year paid the last of a debt that was incurred when the church was built, some 18 or 20 years ago. The people have kindly invited the Southern Convocation to meet here in the spring, at which time the church will be consecrated. The Rev. W. L. R. Witmer is in charge and the outlook for 1922 is better than for any previous year. Our five communicants at DONIPHAN have pastoral visits and a celebration of the Holy Communion every month, supplied by the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer, 35 miles away at Poplar Bluff.

In October I helped the people at IRONTON celebrate the fiftieth Anniversary of the building of St. Paul's Church. The communicants, who are only about a dozen, had nicely repaired and beautifully painted the church, during the summer, at a cost of nearly \$500.00, and had paid the bill. The Rev. W. L. R. Witmer is pastor, living 80 miles away, in Poplar Bluff, visiting Ironton one Sunday each month for services, and going between whiles, now and then, for pastoral work.

ROLLA. Quite out of proportion to our communicant list of 55 persons is the number of those in Rolla, especially among young men, who do or do not do this, that, or the other thing, according as the Rev. Mr. Tragitt sets the example and leads the way. The Missouri State School of Mines is here, making it an altogether important center. Mr. Tragitt lives in the comfortable rectory; does duty at Rolla every Sunday; goes twice each month on Sunday to Cuba, 15 miles distant, and twice each month on Sunday to St. James, 10 miles distant; co-operating with the Rev. Mr. Weddell in the care of St. James.

SPECIAL MISSIONARY, the Rev. F. M. Weddell. Outside of St. Louis, Mr. Weddell is pastor of St. James, Sullivan, Sherman, Valley Park. In St. Louis he is pastor of St. Luke's, Harney Heights, and of Prine of Peace, Baden. He demands of himself most careful attention to all of these six mission stations, ministering to each according to a regularly arranged schedule. He is also ready at any time to respond to any emergency call that I may send him. Six years he has been doing this important work.

Mr. Richard Kopplin, a member of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, is lay missionary at Valley Park. He is a business man in St. Louis every week-day. Every Sunday he conducts a Sunday School and the morning worship in the chapel at Valley Park. Last month I ministered the Holy Communion to the largest number that have ever come for this sacrament at any time during the last ten years. It is Mr. Kopplin's faithfulness that keeps them faithful.

PRINCE OF PEACE, ST. LOUIS. Sister Miriam gathered the first beginnings of a Sunday School in the neighborhood in 1913, while she was yet a teacher at the Bishop Robertson Hall. Up to May, 1915, two baptisms were reported and three confirmations. The report this year shows 30 communicants. I have often said that Sister Miriam began her work here in a box car in a railway yard. That is pretty near to the truth. Then she got the use of a chapel which the Presbyterians had abandoned. Then she bought the chapel and paid for it. Our plant is now valued at \$3,500. During the year Sister Miriam has added a play-yard, with swings, teter-board, and other

recreational features, for the little people of the neighborhood. One of the best pieces of work done in Missouri in ten years has been the influence of Prince of Peace Mission in Baden; and Sister Miriam is almost alone responsible for it.

The Rev. Joseph H. Harvey continues his blessed work as Assisstant to the Missionary to the CITY INSTITUTIONS. Other members of the staff are Deaconess Brainerd, Miss Cora Pearce, Mrs. M. A. Holmes, Miss Daisy M. Lorick, the Rev. D. H. Atwill and (volunteers) Mr. Allan D. Pomeroy and Mr. George B. Jones. We are glad to see Mrs. O'Bannon take her place again among those who go to the Infirmary to assist in the Sunday services, having recovered from the cruel accident that crippled her three years ago.

Deaconess Effie M. Brainerd came to my field from the Diocese of New York nine years ago. She has twice been offered an attractive work in another Diocese this past year, at a salary of twice what we are paying her. Because her work is so fine, and her devotion to it so splendid, and her worth to it so great, I have asked the Missionary Board to make a substantial increase of salary to Deaconess Brainerd from January 1, 1922, and I want to here put on record the great debt which the Diocese, and especially the Mission to the City Institutions, owes to her.

GRACE-HOLY CROSS. The ancient Hebrew Scriptures, in the second verse of the Book Genesis, speaks of a time when the earth was "tohu wah vohu"; "waste and void," the Revised Version translates it. "Tohu wah vohu" crowds into my mind every time I come in sight of Grace-Holy Cross at Marion Place in North St. Louis. If the property was left in this condition by reason of the indifference of Pastor or Committee, the situation would be intolerable. But this is not the case. Adequate funds for the erection of a building suited to our needs have been left us by will. Part of the bequest is in mortgages on real estate in the east which mature in 1922. Cautious business men very properly say that they will not build until all the money is out of mortgages and in the bank. When that time comes, we are sure that no time will be lost in beginning to rehabilitate the property. At present, under the greatest difficulty, the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and Mrs. Taylor are doing a noble work. Deaconess Thompson asked leave to resign last spring. A year ago I reported to you that Mr. Gatch had said it was "one of the best years in our history." At the meeting which closed up our 1921 business, one of the Business Committee remarked, "We have had in many ways the best year ever." So we go on, "Building better up to best," as Browning puts it. We have added Deaconess Alice Reynolds to our staff, with the most happy result of cheering all the workers and strengthening all the work. We hope that the condition of her health will warrant her acceptance of permanent appointment. We are under great obligation to volunteers, especially from Ascension and St. Philip's, who help in the guilds, etc. St. Mary's Guild of St. Peter's parish gave us valuable financial aid in 1921 and has pledged to continue it in 1922. We give them our grateful thanks. The high water mark in Church School attendance during the twelve years' history of Grace-Holy Cross was reached in the last months of 1921.

ST. ALBAN'S PARISH, ST. LOUIS, has been transferred to me by Bishop Tuttle. The Rev. S. E. Arthur is rector. There is hope that the temporary roof may be taken off the chapel and the walls carried to completion. We shall be most happy in the realization of the hope.

ST. AUGUSTINE'S, ST. LOUIS. The work has developed and strengthened amazingly since the Miller Memorial Hall was opened as a parish house a little over a year ago. The congregation make all payments

of principal and interest on the debt which they assumed for this building, just as fast as they fall due. The Rev. Mr. Atwill and his people are taking their full share in making things go, and go right, in this rapidly growing section of the city, Benton.

ST. MARY'S, ST. LOUIS. The Rev. Henry H. Marsden, formerly curate in St. Paul's, Baltimore, came to this work the first of October. A new life is already evident among the people. From reports covering the last three months of 1921, I know that we may safely prophesy that St. Mary's will write the best volume thus far in its history in 1922.

EPIPHANY, ST. LOUIS, has suffered much for want of a local pastor, "as nobody can deny," since the Rev. J. G. Seacord left it a year ago. He had made his home right among the people. The Rev. Leighton H. Nugent came late in 1921, and he and his family will make their home right among the people. I am sure that good results will follow. Epiphany is a mission attached to St. Peter's parish. To the St. Peter's members of the Advisory Committee much credit is due for holding Epiphany steady the past year.

KIRKSVILLE, MONROE CITY, CANTON. The ministrations of the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom during the entire year have been faithful and have brought encouraging results. He lives in Monroe City. He visits Kirksville, 70 miles away, one Sunday in each month. The people are fond of him. Church attendance is excellent. Mr. Lindstrom keeps in touch by occasional letters to all the membership and other interested persons; and that helps. The givings of the people have, under the circumstances, been exceptionally good. Monroe has lost seven by death, out of a communicant list of 70, in the past 14 months. Services here are morning and evening on two Sundays of each month. At Canton a Sunday School of 25 members is a most encouraging feature.

MEXICO sent me word in the autumn that it was doubtful if the annual pledge for rector's salary and local support could be maintained. I had a meeting with the vestry shortly after, and they eagerly devised ways and means to continue the work. The Rev. Mr. Wharton has declined more than one tempting offer during the past six years at a higher salary. He likes Mexico and Mexico likes him. Quite apart from his numerically small parish, he has a strong influence for good in the life of the city.

DE SOTO'S rector, the Rev. V. Owen Penley, has been asked by Bonne Terre to minister there on one Sunday of each month. De Soto has no large enrollment of communicants. The Church life is far from vigorous. I do not give up hope that the Lord will revive the work in the midst of the years. But His way of accomplishing this, if it is to be accomplished, must be by the use of men and women who have a mind to work. We have one of our most beautiful rural church buildings at De Soto, and it has been repaired and rejuvenated. It would seem as if the city was large enough to supply more recruits to the membership.

HERCULANEUM continues to return excellent reports, especially in Sunday School and Sewing School and Guild. The Guild has recently improved the property of the Deaconess House by new concrete steps and sidewalk. Miss Emma A. Luther is faithful in her work which is practically that of a deaconess.

CRYSTAL CITY. The church has a new furnace, greatly needed, for which we are indebted to the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Co. and to Mr. Oaks, the local Superintendent. The Rev. L. C. Sherburne has Crystal City and Herculanum as his cure.

I want to thank the League of Lay Readers for the help which its members have given me in many places. The report is made each year by the League Secretary to the Convention. Mr. Cornelius H. Fauntleroy was a charter member of the League, and always most eager to be of service in it. His death occurred in September after a long illness which he bore with great patience.

The Woman's Auxiliary has generously assisted me in my missionary work. I want especially to mention a remittance of \$5.00 per month for 12 months, and a special check for \$100.00 which was given me for conducting a Quiet Day at the Cathedral. This I spent toward the purchase of a Ford car for the Rev. J. Hanckel Taylor, who covers a big mission field from Cape Girardeau as his base.

The Rev. Dr. Cloud is at the top of the list of the clergy actively engaged in the Diocese, in the order of canonical residence. In that part of the United States west of the Mississippi, there are but two Church clergy working among the deaf: one in Los Angeles, and Dr. Cloud in St. Louis. Dr. Cloud is pastor of St. Thomas' Mission to the deaf, Bofinger Chapel. He is also an instructor in the St. Louis public schools. He is often requisitioned for addresses, and for consultations with the deaf, as far away as Chicago or Denver. I wish we could take Dr. Cloud out of his secular employ and set him free to carry the Church's ministrations to the deaf wherever desired, from St. Louis to the Rockies, and from Omaha to the Gulf. Within that territory there are eight State Schools for the Deaf.

THE NATION-WIDE CAMPAIGN FOR THE CHURCH'S MISSION. Jesus said to one of the first of the spiritual pastors of the people, "When thou art converted, strengthen thy brethren." I think it may be affirmed that the entire conversion of a Rector or other Minister to the Nation-Wide Campaign idea has usually meant the payment by the congregation of a large measure of the quota assigned. There are abnormal situations. But this rule, I think, for the most part, holds good. In 1920 our Nation-Wide endeavors in Missouri brought from our people for extra-parochial purposes a total of \$78,201.02. In 1921, if I read the figures correctly, our extra-parochial givings have been \$75,407.09 (of which \$58,203.26 is in the "quota" and \$17,203.83 is in the "Diocesan Assessment"). This means, doesn't it, that we have fallen short of last year's achievement by nearly \$3,000. Some are accounting for this on the ground that 1921 was a hard year, financially. Perhaps so. But many of the congregations whose N. W. C. payments have been the highest, are congregations whose Bradstreet ratings are the lowest! Isn't the trouble traceable to a weak pulse, rather than to a weak purse? With two years of experience and of education back of us, surely we shall come somewhere near the goal in 1922. In this connection I hear a good deal of mention of the need of leaders. Leaders are generally just ordinary persons with extraordinary determination. Are you, brethren, lay folk, by such a definition, leaders in your several parishes? Picks, shovels, backbone, concrete, a sixteen-hour day are more needed than words, drives, more drives and more words, to put this Nation-Wide Campaign over in 1922. Won't you try to furnish more of the picks, shovels, etc., than you did last year—most of you? And, if you haven't paid your thanks to Mr Lee Orcutt for what he did to put us as far along as we went, you owe him something. And Mr. G. K. Warner went without his dinner and stayed till 10 o'clock at his office many a night to keep this business somewhere near where it belonged.

Fourteen parishes and missions paid or overpaid their quotas in 1921. Of these fourteen, Columbia, Bonne Terre, Cuba, Poplar Bluff, Portland, Sherman, Valley Park, Prince of Peace, St. Louis, and St. Thomas', St.

Louis, are in the field of the Bishop Coadjutor. Ten parishes and missions which paid their entire quotas paid also their diocesan assessments. Of these ten, I gladly report from my field the following: Columbia, Cuba, Sherman, Valley Park, St. Thomas', St. Louis. Bloomfield had no N. W. C. quota, but paid \$45.00. St. Luke's, St. Louis, had no quota, but paid \$77.59.

OUR AUTOMOBILE. Two kind friends invited me one day to meet them at the Club and told me that they had been appointed a committee to hand to Mrs. Johnson and me the certificate of a sum of money immediately available for the purchase of an automobile for our use; also the assurance of a sufficient additional sum each year for five years to maintain the automobile; also the assurance of pledges covering a term of five years toward the annual rental of a "suitable house"; all this, so the committee told me, "expressive of the good wishes and good will of many friends." A certain annual pledge was also guaranteed me for five years for use in religious and charitable work at my discretion. Our thanks, in such sort as we have been able to formulate them, have been written and spoken to those givers whose names are known to us. We would like here to record our deep appreciation of this concrete illustration of the thoughtful kindness of friends, which impresses us beyond what any words that we are able to summon can express. The automobile, a most comfortable car, has been in use three months. The cost of maintenance is requisitioned each month of Mr. James M. Bull, treasurer of these special funds.

THE MINISTRY. "Strength and beauty are in His sanctuary." And I feel sure that there is a real distinction between "prettiness" and "beauty." I cannot at all bring myself to believe that there is anything gained by pressing impressionable lads with no maturity of judgment into the doing of certain things in connection with the Church services which add neither strength nor real beauty to the worship, on the plea that we may lure young lads through this path into a preparation for the sacred ministry. What seems to me much more worth while in times like these is that picked young fellows, already a bit serious in their way of thinking, who have already evidenced some of the qualities of leadership, should have the ministry presented to them as a heroic adventure at that period of their lives, the upper grades of high school, which experts consider the age of vocational decision. Just the other day, in New York City, a meeting of some 60 clergymen and laymen was held to discuss the worth-whileness of a Conference on the Ministry. The Rev. Dr. Drury, rector of St. Paul's School, was the leader in summoning the meeting; and on his invitation the Bishop Coadjutor and the Rev. D. H. Atwill, Chairman of a Missouri Committee on Recruiting for the Ministry, attended. After long and helpful discussion, participated in by many men of many minds, it was voted without dissent that such a Conference should be held the last week in June. It will probably be held at St. Paul's School. It is distinctly understood and agreed by those who have in preparation the plans for the Conference that no young man who attends will at that time be *solicited* to decide for the ministry, or *permitted* to pledge himself for the ministry. All that is hoped for is that the thought of the ministry as a high and holy work, calling out all the heroic qualities of strongest and finest manhood, may have opportunity to sink down into the hearts and minds of a company—perhaps a small company—of picked young men. I wish it might be possible for one or two fitting the proposed specifications to go to this conference from this Diocese.

EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT. What I believe to be a pernicious propaganda is on to try to make it appear that enforcement of the provisions of the Eighteenth Amendment is everywhere a failure and that conditions in our country since the amendment are worse than they were before.

Several persons have asked me in the last few months to tell them what I thought their duty was in the matter of lending their names and their influence to an endeavor which, as I regard it, is a thin edge of a wedge driven in to get this country back to some form of the open saloon. Because you have put me in a position which must be one of responsibility for moral and spiritual leadership, and because several of you have asked me what I think, let me tell you how I feel. But first let me remark that a "wet" parade which was staged in New York City last summer was, I think, an absolute failure; that New Jersey, which was one of the three states which declined to ratify the Eighteenth Amendment, has recently made some sort of a state-wide canvass, and has, I think, reversed its attitude; that many of the wise statesmen of England (and we were told at the Lambeth Conference that England was viewing the social and economic experiment in the United States in the matter of the liquor business with deep interest), are saying that "liberty" which means the overflowing bowl, in the midst of crushing burdens and responsibilities, is simply license and the purest folly.

Last week, in the City of New York, I made it my business to spend a whole day visiting great institutions and organizations which are maintained for the correction of vice and for alleviating the conditions of penury and paupery and disease and crime which vice brings in its train. My quest brought me eventually to the private office of the General Director of the Russell Sage Foundation for the Betterment of Social and Living Conditions, with its endowment of \$10,000,000.00 for research and its great administration building in Twenty-second street. Here, in reply to a series of direct questions, I was told what I was entirely prepared to hear, that it is too soon yet to construct the curve which shows the relation of the closed saloon to better social and living conditions. I was told (as I had supposed was the case), that wise men were on this side and other wise men on that side, and that it was too early to speak dogmatically on the subject. But I was assured that investigators of repute are telling us in newspapers and magazines which are not muck-rakers, that there is plenty of evidence that women and children are not beaten up by drunken husbands and drunken fathers as they used to be; that the effect of the new conditions upon child welfare is indicated by the statement of the largest manufacturer of milk bottles in the United States, that, under the amendment, his business promptly increased by 35 per cent; that crimes of violence and passion and crimes against sex have greatly diminished; that soliciting for prostitution in one large city was reported to have fallen off by more than half; that labor is more alert and more efficient, and that improvement in this regard is especially noted on Monday mornings; that savings bank deposits are apparently growing rapidly and that the number of depositors is increasing. Allowing that the evidence is not all in, there is, I am positive, sufficient testimony to compel me to decline to use any influence toward bringing back any such condition in this country as was here five years ago. And so I counsel those who ask me what I think. I am willing to believe that God has yet new light to break forth to America on this whole subject. It is not possible for me to think that the revelation will be of a sort to lead us into another tyranny of the saloon.

APPENDIX No. 7

**Report of Committee on Service Building
for Columbia.**

On January 28, 1920, at the Diocesan Convention, there was created a Committee of the Diocese of Missouri, to raise funds for the erection of a Service Building in Columbia. (See page 31, Journal, 1920.) It is firmly believed by those who are on the ground that such a building is necessary if the Church is to use her opportunity and meet her responsibility with reference to the student life in the State University.

The resolution referred to made the Bishop Coadjutor chairman, and empowered him to appoint other members.

The Rev. James H. George, Rector of Columbia; Dean Davis of St. Louis, the Rev. Dr. Phillips, Rector of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, Mr. L. W. Berry of Calvary Parish, Columbia, accepted membership on the committee.

At a meeting held in St. Louis, May 20, 1921, the committee organized with Bishop Johnson in the chair and the Rev. James H. George, secretary. Other members present were Dean Davis and the Rev. Dr. Phillips.

A second meeting was held on June 20, in Columbia. At this meeting it was announced that Messrs. R. L. Orcutt, Linton C. Block and George Mackay had been suggested for membership by a nominating committee, had been approved by the committee, and had accepted appointment.

The resolution which created our committee, provided that the Convention of West Missouri be invited to join in the Service Building proposition, "inasmuch as the Diocese of West Missouri is equally interested in the spiritual welfare of the students." A letter received by me in May from Bishop Partridge assures me that he is "deeply interested in the project." Subsequently our committee requested Bishop Partridge to appoint the Rev. E. J. Craft, the Rev. R. M. Spencer, and the Rev. B. M. Washburn, all of Kansas City, together with certain laymen who might be nominated by these clergy, to constitute the West Missouri membership of the Committee on Service Building for Columbia. At a meeting held in Kansas City, Sept. 20, 1921, the Rev. Messrs. Craft, Spencer and Washburn, with Mr. A. C. Stowell, a layman of Kansas City, took their places as members of the committee.

At this meeting, ten members being present and voting, the following resolution was adopted without dissent:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this committee that the two dioceses of Missouri and West Missouri should provide a Service Building for the University students at Columbia.

The question as to the type of building and probable cost has, of course, been the topic of much of our discussion. Before the West Missouri members of the committee were added, the committee had considered certain tentative plans proposed by Mr. Harry S. Bill, an architect, and a member of the faculty of the University of Columbia, and had put itself on record as approving these plans or the equivalent "as a minimum requirement for the successful prosecution of the student work at Columbia."

So far as our discussions have carried us, I think it is the feeling of the committee that an investment of approximately \$100,000 will be needed for

the purpose mentioned, if a work at all suited to the needs of the situation and the opportunity presented is to be carried on. No plan has yet been formulated for the raising of the funds. A committee, however, has been appointed to confer with a man who has had good success in such matters, as to the way in which a campaign for funds might be inaugurated when the time should come.

At a meeting of the Service Building Committee held in Kansas City, September 20, 1921, the Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri and the Rector and vestry of Calvary Church, Columbia, were designated a special committee to lay before the Diocesan Conventions of Missouri and West Missouri information as to the type of building they would recommend and the estimated cost. This special committee has had no opportunity as yet to study and present other plans than those which the whole committee had previously considered. The special committee is not at present in a position to report anything else than the fact that, so far as the special committee is aware, it is still the desire of those who have expressed the greatest amount of interest in the Service Building enterprise, both in the Missouri Diocese and in the West Missouri Diocese, that the plans submitted last May by Mr. Harry S. Bill, or their equivalent, represent "a minimum requirement for the successful prosecution of the student work at Columbia."

It is not the expectation of your committee that this work can be accomplished this year. Perhaps it may not be accomplished in two or three or four years. But it is clear to us all that there is a duty here which we cannot shirk and which we ought not to wish to shirk. And it is further clear to us all that, when the plan of raising funds is taken in hand, the appeal should be made not only to the members of the Episcopal Church in the two dioceses in the state of Missouri, but to the general church through its officers, and to all persons interested in the spiritual welfare of young men and young women during their university years.

The presence of the Convention of the Diocese here in Columbia at this time will, we doubt not, bring to many for the first time the vastness of the church's opportunity at this point. May we not hope that many will be moved to eagerly help in every way possible the accomplishing in due time of the Columbia Service Building project?

The vestry of Calvary parish (and it is not Calvary parish's problem any more than it is the problem of the whole church), have taken the first step, and a right generous one, by voting as an initial gift a site on which the Service Building may be erected and the sum of not less than \$3,000.

I make this report as Chairman of the Committee. It has not been presented to the members of the committee for their approval.

APPENDIX No. 8

Report of the Associated Vestries.

There were three regular meetings held during the year 1921-22.

Mr. Walter Robbins, the retiring president, in his report stated that there were two relatively unimportant matters which he tried to inaugurate, namely: the co-ordination of vacations, and a joint advertising plan for the churches and missions in the diocese, which contemplated a notice in the St. Louis papers each week, giving the services of all the churches, etc. Mr. Robbins stated that he was unable to secure the co-operation of the clergy in either of these matters, and cited that in one instance he sent out twenty-six letters requesting answers on one of these propositions, and received only two replies from clergymen. He also stated that the laymen exhibited a keener interest in these matters than did the clergy.

Mr. Robbins also strongly advised the centralization of all diocesan affairs under the management of one diocesan body, headed by the Bishop.

At the annual dinner and election, held Friday, January 20, 1922, at St. George's Parish House, after the reading of Mr. Robbins' report, the matter of a central organization to handle all the business of the church in the diocese was discussed fully, and it was the consensus of opinion that in order to secure the co-operation of the laymen, which was vitally necessary to the advancement of the work in the diocese, it was imperative that some action be taken at the Diocesan Convention, January 24, 25 and 26. The following resolution was unanimously adopted, to be addressed to the convention:

WHEREAS, There has been in the past great confusion as to the management of various funds and trusteeships, and a seeming lack of cohesion in executive management of the business affairs of this diocese; therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Associated Vestries, as expressed at their annual meeting in St. Louis, January 20, 1922, that some movement toward the formation of some body, to whom all business and financial questions can be referred with hope of immediate definite action, is essential and necessary.

The Associated Vestries of Missouri earnestly request the Convention to consider this matter, and to authorize the formation of some body, with full authority to administer the business affairs of the diocese.

APPENDIX No. 9

Report of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education

The Diocesan Board of Religious Education, having a strong sense of the futility of reports, has expended no effort on the collecting of the usual data found in reports; no effort is necessary to find out that extremely little is being done in the field of Religious Education, very little that is worth while. Sunday School work, now called Church School work, was exhaustively investigated and reported by this board three years ago. Some small improvement could be reported since then, but hardly marked enough to be worthy of your attention, and, too, Church School work is only one phase of Religious Education and probably the easier with which this board should be concerned. Your board was organized for work in September. We decided that the most effective way of getting the whole matter of Religious Education before the people of the diocese would be to begin some definite program for betterment of education, even if on a very small scale. We chose, therefore, one feature of Church School work and decided to concentrate on that for the season's effort. The Christian Nurture Series is a system of Church School instruction put forth by the Presiding Bishop and Council, and while other systems are not disallowed, this is the only system authorized by the General Church. This series of instruction is in use in some half dozen city parishes and to back it up where being used and to do what we can to make it known, your board reopened the Church Institute of Religious Instruction for the special purpose this winter of teaching teachers the Christian Nurture Series. For the opening of the Institute we brought to St. Louis from Toledo the Rev. R. S. Chalmers, recognized as the leader in R. E. in the American Church. Three days of three sessions each made the intensive period under Mr. Chalmers and attended by 343 adults, registered as regular pupils, gave impetus to the following Monday night sessions up to Christmas. A pre-lenten course of the Institute was opened Jan. 23, with two sessions and with a preliminary meeting on Sunday by the Rev. F. E. Wilson of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, brought to Missouri by your board for this short intensive start of the course. Rev. Mr. Wilson is the specialist on the Christian Nurture Series, specially commended to us by the General Board in New York. Eighty grown persons—nearly all teachers—carefully followed his instructions. The Institute will continue its meetings until Ash Wednesday.

For the expenses of our work last year we asked for \$500; you gave us \$100, and we have expended \$471. This year we are asking \$300 and are insisting that that amount is the very least upon which we may hope to go on doing the little that we are doing.

RESOLUTION No. 7:

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to place the sum of \$300 at the disposal of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

ADDENDA TO THE FOREGOING REPORT.

The apathy of some parishes and missions is distressing. They appear to look upon the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission as something apart from the parish or mission, a cause for which the parish or mission will do what it can when it can without prejudice to the local interests of the parish or mission, failing to realize that each parish and mission, as an integral part of the Church, is responsible, to the utmost extent of its ability, for the success of this splendid plan of our Church. The Treasurer of a St. Louis parish, in response to a letter I wrote him, told me he was sorry that he had nothing to contribute to my cause. The quota of our Diocese was competently imposed upon it, and the Diocese should fully measure up to its responsibility to the Church by meeting its quota. To do this it is dependent upon its parishes and missions. Because of parochialism, the vision of the Larger Church has escaped many of our Church people and prevented many parishes and missions from giving the Diocese the protection and support they owe to it. In the year 1921, the obligations of parishes and missions represented prior to the year 1920 by the Diocesan Missions Apportionment and the General Missions Apportionment were merged into the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission. It is a sad fact that the payments by some parishes on their quotas in the year 1921 did not equal the obligation they would have had for Diocesan Missions Apportionment and General Missions Apportionment in the year 1919, notwithstanding the fact that they received credit on 1921 quota for Missionary Host offerings, which offerings they did not get credit for on Diocesan Missions and General Missions Apportionments in the year 1919. The most notable instance of this falling off is afforded by some of the St. Louis parishes. And so, in despite of the larger opportunity afforded by the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission, the contributive value of those parishes to the Church diminished lamentably in the year 1921. I am convinced that the parish that fully meets its obligation to the Church beyond the borders of the parish, refusing to permit parochial considerations to prevent its doing so, is the parish that will flourish within its own borders. God does not approve a selfish parish any more than a selfish individual and will not, I think, give it His blessing. The prevalence of disposition to look upon the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission merely as a campaign to raise money is unfortunate, and a grievous error. The purpose of the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission is service to God. By the act of service will Church people visualize the Church's opportunities and its needs. Money given to the Church should not be considered as money only. Such a gift, to be of value to the giver, must have no sordid association, it must be spiritual. The giving of one's self, whether in personal service or by the giving of one's money, is alike measurable in terms of service. There should be no differentiation between the one service and the other. In both cases, it is the giving of one's self, the consecrating of one's self, whether it be by dedicating to God one's personal service or one's money. The giving of one's money to the Church is as truly service to God as is the giving of anything else. If Church people would visualize the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission as it really is, they would heartily espouse it and see to it that the Diocese fully meets its quota; the parochialism, so costly to the Church, and so costly to the parish, would be broken down, and the present situation of struggling parishes and struggling General Church would give way to a situation of prosperous parishes and prosperous General Church, doing the Master's work as He would have it done.

I have perfect respect for the clergy and would be the last one to criticize them, but, as Diocesan Treasurer, Nation-Wide Campaign for the

Church's Mission, I have painfully learned that there are some clergy in the Diocese who have not visualized the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission. Some of them I have in mind are apathetic about it, some of them appear to be antagonistic. After experience of two years, I am convinced that while the fault is only partly theirs, the remedy of the situation is up to the clergy; that they should be militant in their advocacy of the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission, in the pulpit and out of it, unceasing, until their people are brought to see the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission, not as a drive for money, but as an offering to God, and the wonderful opportunity of service to Him that the Church is pointing them to.

**Report of Secretary
of the Diocesan Missionary Board.**

To the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Board organized February 3, 1921, by electing Mr. Thomas Q. Dix Secretary and Mr. E. H. Lycett Treasurer.

The Board approved the budget presented by the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor covering the stipends and expenses for Missionaries and workers in the Diocese receiving help from the Board, and payment of same has been made regularly each month by the Treasurer.

The meetings of the Board, held each month during the year with the exception of July, August and September, have been well attended, and a goodly amount of work done and plans laid for still greater missionary activity in the Diocese.

During the year, the Board received from the Parochial Trust Fund the sum of \$1,513.22, being the amount remaining in the hands of the Treasurer of the Parochial Trust Fund from the deorganization of Missions of St. Matthew's, St. Louis,—Holy Comforter, Montgomery City,—and the Mission at Shrewsbury Park. By resolution of the Board, the following payments were ordered:

On account of his removal from St. Louis, Mr. E. H. Lycett, Treasurer of the Board since 1903, tendered his resignation in July last. Mr. Lycett had been a member of the Board since 1873. A committee was appointed by Bishop Tuttle to draft a resolution to be sent to Mr. Lycett, expressing the regret of the Board at his leaving, and its thanks for his long years of service, and affectionate good wishes for his health and happiness in his new home. Mr. Thomas Q. Dix was elected Treasurer to succeed Mr. Lycett.

APPENDIX No. 19

Report of Episcopal Missionary to City Institutions.

To the Bishops and Members of the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

This field of work is peculiarly one in which much gain comes from the heritage of the past. For more than thirty years this Mission has served the City Institutions of St. Louis. The spirit of its founder has remained in the changing groups of those who have composed its staff from time to time, enabling the Mission to establish itself years ago as an asset in Institutional Life in the City of St. Louis. New workers as they come into its service need not strive for co-operation upon the part of authorities; the heads of institutions vouchsafe this co-operation because of the Mission's faithful work of many years and its readiness for development and expansion as opportunity may permit.

An office at 813 Chestnut St. is the central base of operation. Here is a desk telephone, moving picture machine, shelves for books and magazines, large cabinet for clothes, and from this office reading matter, clothing, shoes, toys, and a variety of other things are distributed among the several thousand patients and inmates of the institutions in our city. The staff meets once a month for report and conference; office hours are kept daily and many interviews take place at 813 Chestnut St.

For the invaluable means of meeting supply and demand an automobile is provided for the City Missionary. The average monthly mileage falls not far short of a thousand miles.

Seven paid workers, three giving full time and four part time, with two volunteer helpers, compose the staff. Several volunteers assist in certain Sunday ministrations. The Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor come into contact with the people in the institutions through occasional services which are eagerly welcomed.

The following institutions are under the care of the City Mission Staff:

City Hospital No. 1, with an average of 700 patients, daily visiting by the Rev. Mr. Harvey, Assistant City Missionary. Mr. Harvey never fails. He rates service always as privilege. There is administration of the Sacrament of the Church as needs arise. Always giving attention with the note of cheer which makes him ever a welcome visitor and friend.

Investigation of and attention to needs of patients, with follow-up work in homes of discharged patients by Mrs. Holmes. Delicacies are dispensed, necessary things provided, much is done in the course of a year. Mrs. Holmes has devoted over thirty years of interest and helpfulness in this work originated and established through the labors of Mr. Charles U. Holmes.

Deaconess Brainerd, in Hospital No. 1, serves a special department in caring for mothers and babies, dealing with considerable tragedy, securing positions and homes for them upon dismissal from the hospital, referring patients to certain agencies. A report covering a month's work was read at the Convention of the Diocese, showing the wide range of her labors.

Each Sunday, services are held in the Chapel at 3:30 p. m., Mr. Harvey officiating on three Sundays of the month and the City Missionary on the fourth Sunday. Volunteer helpers assist patients from the wards to the Chapel in wheeled chairs, or otherwise, and distribute literature after the services. The Holy Communion is celebrated each second Tuesday of the month.

In Hospital No. 2 (Colored), with an average of 400 patients, Miss Lorick devotes much time visiting the wards and infirmary. Much the same plan of work is carried on as in Hospital No. 1. A deal of follow-up work in homes of discharged patients is done. I cannot speak too highly of Miss Lorick's work; with the ability to do this work extremely well and with a love for human souls. You would understand the good results if you were directly associated with this field of labor in Hospital No. 2. Mr. Jones, a colored lawyer, has for years held Sunday services in all of the wards and in the infirmary. His work is entirely voluntary. He is a speaker of force and power and the helpful message he brings to sick and old folk is deeply appreciated. Once a month the City Missionary holds a Communion Service in the infirmary and, whenever desired, Sacraments are administered in the wards.

At the Infirmary, Kingshighway and Easton Ave. (400 patients), the Rev. Mr. Atwill conducts services on the third Sunday of each month, first in the ward, followed by a service in the Chapel. Each week he visits the patients and has a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion,

both in ward and Chapel. Last month he presented six for Confirmation. Mr. Pomeroy, as a volunteer worker, has held services each month on the second and fourth Sundays for the past nine years. I wonder if there is a better record for faithful volunteer service among the laymen of the Diocese of Missouri? Miss Pearce visits the Infirmary each Thursday, and is organist at the Sunday services. Everyone here, as at Koch Hospital and at the Sanitarium, anticipates her visiting days. On the first Sunday of each month the City Missionary officiates at the Infirmary services.

Deaconess Brainerd visits each week the Jail and Infirmary, holding Bible Classes for women at both institutions; at the House of Detention the Deaconess has a Song Service and instruction every Sunday afternoon. One Sunday each month the City Missionary is present and holds a service. Recently, when visiting the Workhouse, one young woman with a record overshadowed with criminal experience tending to destroy all semblance of self-respect and everything suggestive of fine sentiment said to me, "It seems strange to confess that I am glad to have come here; had I not come I would never have met the Deaconess and perhaps never have set straight."

Every Saturday at 1:30 p. m., services are held in the Jail. Mr. Harvey is in charge of this work, conducting the service, except on the fourth Saturday, on which occasion the City Missionary is in attendance. Reading matter is distributed as the men leave Chapel. It is a place where encouragement along the line of large congregations has not the usual stress, but since large numbers are there, it is gratifying to find large numbers attending these services, which of course is entirely voluntary.

At Koch Tubercular Hospital (230 patients), the City Missionary holds service in the Chapel each Friday morning. Here, too, a celebration of the Holy Communion is held once a month, and oftener in the wards with the very sick patients. Miss Pearce gives much comfort in visiting Koch Hospital every Wednesday and again on Friday, playing the organ at the Chapel service. Clothing is distributed generously. Many patients are here for a period of years and resources are very small. There is constant need for clothing and books, also toys and games for the children.

Occasional visits are made to the leper—this little bit of contact is appreciated; brief services are held; almost intolerable is the loneliness.

At the City Sanitarium for the Insane, the City Missionary holds services each Sunday morning at nine o'clock, and once a month the Holy Communion. The congregation fills the Chapel and I could speak at length regarding the hearty singing and the helpful influence of this Sunday morning worship in calming and refreshing mentally sick people. Miss Pearce is the organist, and also a visitor each Friday afternoon. Occasional entertainments, chiefly of a musical kind, are held.

On Monday evening at Bellefontaine Industrial Farms, the City Missionary has an half-hour service, followed by a moving picture entertainment. This is a really stimulating field of work, because of the good potential stuff in these lads who have found their way into difficulties of various kinds. I believe the management of Bellefontaine Farms is working out with considerable success a good grade of future citizenship. The happy feature of Bellefontaine Farms is the absence of institutionalism. There is the right sort of interest taken in the wayward lad and he responds nicely to it.

The explanation of the City Mission work is made in detail in order that you may see in the fuller report our great desire to expand interest on the part of parishes and organizations and individuals, and to give all the emphasis possible to the fact that this work, which lies at our very door, seeks support from many smaller contributions, rather than from a

few of the larger sort alone. We are anxious to have the upkeep of the work maintained by general interest. There is so much to be done in a thorough way in this big field that such a plan and purpose calls earnestly for a wide interest. To place before you a scope of this City Mission work I am setting forth the figures of the past twelve months, representing the statistics of the Mission Staff, which do not measure the work by any means:

It would be a long process to enumerate the list of gifts and givers. Among the many things which have passed through the Office at 813 Chestnut St. and found place in the various institutions are: Books (more than a thousand), magazines of all kinds (constant supply), clothing, shoes, quilting frames, patchwork material, jellies, toys, silk chalice, veils and complete and beautiful sets of altar linen for use in several chapels, four surplices, boxes of oranges, work-bags, cigars, bed-slippers, games, candy, all sorts of comfortable needs for patients from many parishes, individuals, organizations, including a wonderful donation from the Needlework Guild.

Christmas services were held in all the Institutions. Carol singing in wards and chapels by an excellent quartette, also by choruses from our Church Schools, arranged by the Church School Service League. 2600 people were remembered at Christmas time with some gift. We can assure the many parishes, Church Schools, individuals, organizations contributing in this wide and happy way, of the gratefulness of a large number of people, of the real pleasure which all your interest gave to so many knowing adversity and trouble.

The Receipts and Expenses cover the dates from Jan. 26, 1921, to Jan. 21, 1922, in order to include the payment of Christmas bills sent in after January 1, 1922.

APPENDIX No. 20

Report of the Diocesan Committee on Social Service.

The Diocesan Committee and Commission on Social Service has held one meeting this year when it was decided to send a delegate or delegates to the Social Service Conference at Milwaukee, in June, 1921, to learn what the national program of the Church for Social Service was to be and to co-operate.

It was also voted at this meeting to try to co-ordinate the Social Service work of the Diocese, and as far as possible get aid in the way of volunteer workers and clothing for our City Missionary in his work; and as far as it was in the power of the commission to aid first our own church institutions in the diocese, and the program of the Social Service Department of the Presiding Bishop and Council.

The Milwaukee Convention of the Church Convention for Social Service was attended by over one hundred delegates; every province was represented, and 43 dioceses and missionary districts had one or more delegates in attendance. Missouri had four, and your chairman was appointed the representative for this province.

The meeting was an evidence of a great awakening on the part of the church to her duty to her own needy and to the community through Social Service. It was by far the most harmonious convention I have ever attended, and it did not savor of the quality of "talk and talk," that so often characterizes conventions.

Your commission in the first mentioned duty has tried in the diocese by co-operation with the Church Service League, the Church School Service League, the Girls' Friendly, and the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, to further the cause of Social Service and we have been able to bring some aid to our City Missionary in workers and in clothing.

We have also requested the giving of boxes at Christmas and other times to our various institutions, but there is at the present a great overlapping of such effort in the diocese and your commission has not under the existing canons authority to co-ordinate this work, in compliance with the request of the General Church through its Department of Social Service.

We are, however, co-operating in the educational work on Social Service as set forth by the National Department, through the help of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, in that we will have a class each Friday night in Lent, when the book issued by the Department, "The Church's Opportunity in the Community," will be studied by men of the diocese, who are willing to become teachers in their own parishes on the subject.

We must not close our eyes to the fact that Jesus while he remained true to his traditions and observed to the last the practices of those traditions, founded his new church, by going about and doing good, and if the church of today is to speak to a troubled world, she must go out as did the Christ with a sympathy that will bring the world back to the church, for they no longer come to the call of the bell, or preaching behind quartered oak doors.

Let the Diocese of Missouri speak and be heard on this most vital subject. If the Bishop and his Council is inaugurated in the diocese such co-ordination of effort can be made as will be worthy of the diocese, and only by such action can real results be accomplished.

APPENDIX No. 21

Report of the Girls' Friendly Society of Missouri.

The Girls' Friendly Society in the Diocese of Missouri was organized in St. Louis by the National President of the Society in 1915, with five branches. Since then there has been a slow but steady growth, until now we have fourteen branches in this diocese and ten candidate classes for the little girls from four to fourteen, with a membership of about six hundred. These branches and classes are a living, working part of the Church, though not all members of the Church. They contribute in a most generous way to the Parishes, Missions and Diocese, and the social service of the community. Our greatest problem has been to gain the co-operation and interest of the women of the church as leaders in this great character building organization, in order to make it what it should be—a training school for leaders in the churches, a body of women and girls, ready for any and every call or burden they can bear for others. In many of the dioceses the great expressions of service that the society has been to the community are the Lodge and the Holiday House, rest rooms, and lunch rooms which are working and active centers. In this diocese a plan is now well under way for a Holiday House, and there is every hope that it will be successfully put through. With such a center, we hope to interest the girls and women of the outlying towns in the work, and establish branches in their Parishes. Talks have been given in a number of the large churches in St. Louis, with the most encouraging results, as a number of women have offered their services to work in the several small City Missions, the Orphans' Home, and St. Stephen's and Good Shepherd Parishes. The service we gain in this way is a real factor in the church, and in instances it has developed a constructive interest in the church's work, an advancement and desire to feel that the church stands for something in the community. The National G. F. S. is in active co-operation with the Students Council, the Girl Scouts, The National Child Labor Committee and the National Council for the Limitation of Armaments. In every Parish there is someone who could be of service in the G. F. S.; we would like a branch or associates in all Parishes to help in forming and uplifting the character of the Girl, her ideals and aspirations. If we could gain constructive work and a loving sympathy for her, instead of carping criticism we so often hear, what victory it would be for us and gain for her. We need for our work all the gifts of culture and intellect that can be poured into it. Only as we grasp a spiritual and national ideal shall the G. F. S. be the factor it should be in the life of the women of our country and the Church.

APPENDIX No. 22

Annual Report of the Church Service League.

A meeting to organize the Diocesan Church Service League was held at the Schuyler House at 10 a. m., Feb. 8, 1921, after a corporate communion in the chapel. There were present Bishop Tuttle, Dean Davis and ten members, heads of departments of work appointed by the Bishop, with Mrs. Capen in the chair. Miss Annie S. Cousland was elected secretary-treasurer. Later Mrs. C. R. McDonald was appointed vice-chairman. At the first meeting, Mrs. McDonald was appointed chairman of a committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws. It was decided that the C. S. L. in this Diocese should be organized on the plan of the National League, with departments for Church Extension, Social Service, Religious Education, Publicity and Finance.

Two meetings of the Diocesan Council were to be held during the year, one of which should be the annual meeting in January. The other meeting was held in connection with the Provincial Synod last October.

Monthly meetings of the Executive Council were to be held on the third Wednesday of each month, omitting June, July, August and September—each meeting to begin with a corporate communion in the Chapel. At these meetings, progress of the work is reported, the pressing needs of the various departments are brought to the attention of the board and ways and means devised for lending practical help.

The number of the Executive Council has gradually been enlarged to 25—18 representing departments of work or organizations, and seven representing parish units. Reports have been sent in from all departments represented. The constitution as drafted by Mrs. McDonald, was adopted at the November meeting and is published in the December Church News. This number of the Church News was decided upon as our method of publicity for this year. We have endeavored to present the call to service, and to set forth the aim and purpose of the C. S. L., which pledges its support to the parish, the community, the Diocese, the nation and the world, and the practical application of this pledge made in our own diocese through its various departments. The committee spent time and effort to make it comprehensive, useful and practical, and now wish to see it distributed and read all through the Diocese.

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APPENDIX No. 23

Grace Church-Holy Cross House.

About a year ago, to be exact, on the evening of the 30th of January, the old church building on Grace Hill caught fire and was completely riddled. After a settlement of the insurance question and the storing of what was left of the memorial windows, and the placing of various other articles of church furniture in the guild hall, the building was torn down in the spring. The passing of this landmark was of moment to the old inhabitants and it brought to mind the memory of the people and events that had been associated with it. To the workers at our institution the loss is impressed upon us daily by the cramped condition in which we are placed. Such of our members as were identified with the parish, are hoping that the new church will come soon. We echo that hope because we see no great forward movement until our facilities are enlarged and the confidence of the neighborhood in our financial ability and permanence is strengthened. It has seemed wise to be careful and gain all the information that we could so that what is built shall be in line with the probable development of our work. To this end we endeavored to secure the presence and personal advice of Dr. Graham Taylor, of Chicago Commons, and failing in this, we are promised the presence of Dr. J. W. F. Davies, of Winnetka, whom Dr. Taylor recommended to us. Dr. Davies informs me that he will be with us on the 8th of February and we hope to be able to go ahead with our plans very soon.

Most of the record of the year is that of the performing of regular duty in which there has been the interested support of our friends.

There was no summer school this past year because of the uncertainty of the building plans.

The work this season is developing greater activity for work among our girls and women and we have enlarged the number of clubs working for the girls and added a regular mothers' meeting.

Outings were had this past summer and a regular old-fashioned Sunday school picnic was held in O'Fallon Park in July. The boys have taken an interest in base ball and basket ball leagues and we have a good percentage of them in Sunday school, in a class taught by Mr. V. Young.

The interest and generosity shown by our friends at Thanksgiving and Christmas was very great. The unemployment problem has given us some heartaches, but so far no one has been unrelieved, thanks to the way in which you hold up our hands.

Mrs. Mary Wanless, prominent in G. A. R. circles and a trustee of the soldiers' home at St. James, has been in charge of the store since spring as a volunteer worker. It is a marvel to me that she continues so steadfast in it. We have just given our store quarters by itself and we hope to have a better record as to sales and also as to usefulness.

The milk station is the best outstation that the St. Louis Pure Milk Commission has.

The children of the kindergarten have their certified milk and crackers, thanks to the friends that help the Corporation to buy them.

We hope that the time will soon be here when we can invite you to come and inspect our new Day Nursery. Support is being sought for it now and the demand for it is very great.

With our new buildings and with our increase in departments, it will be necessary to enlarge our budget. Our support is too small for the work that we must do. Come and see how we are striving and how much is needing to be done and resolve that Grace-Holy Cross shall have a larger support than ever before.

The Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

While there has been no new Senior Chapter of the Brotherhood organized within the Diocese during the past year, we find the major portion of the old chapters are functioning and are rendering effective assistance to the Rectors of the Parishes, in various lines of work.

During this year, the Diocesan Assembly, on Palm Sunday, held a Service of Intercession, for the purpose of interesting young men and boys in the Church's Ministry, and we are arranging for another Service of this character on Sunday afternoon, April 2nd, and we ask your co-operation and prayers, that God's blessing may attend our efforts and that fit persons may be influenced to give themselves to the Church, at this time.

Also, we are perfecting our plans for the Lenten noon-day services of the Episcopal Church, under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and arrangements have been made for very able Preachers at those meetings, and we expect to have a more appropriate musical program, as well as more careful attention to other details, than in the past.

Last summer, five boys from St. Louis and vicinity attended Camp Tuttle, in Southwestern Missouri, conducted by the Brotherhood. At these camps provision is made for certain recreational features, but the spiritual development is the real object. Our Assembly has a Committee appointed to secure thirty boys for next year, this being the maximum number that we are permitted to send. In arranging for these boys, it is the intention to interest only those who have shown that they will derive the most possible benefit from the spiritual side, and not go merely to have a good time.

Our officers for 1922 are Rt. Rev. D. S. Tuttle, D. D., Honorary President, Fred Surridge, President, Fred W. Burford, William Eckman and E. C. Rinearson, Vice-Presidents, Charles J. Miller, Treasurer, Rev. Robert H. Atchison, Chaplain, W. L. Henry, Secretary, and Arthur J. Watling, National Council Member, representing this Province.

We have, also, established General Headquarters at 1210 Locust Street, so that anyone may know where to reach the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, should he not know the address of any of the officers.

Please pray daily for the success of the Lenten noon-day meetings, and the Service of Intercession on April 2nd.

APPENDIX No. 26

Report of Chairman Nation-Wide Campaign.

During the year 1921, the Nation-Wide Campaign has taken on the aspect of a campaign of education. We find a widespread interest in the Campaign and a response to it, especially on the part of most of the smaller parishes and missions.

It grieves me to report that the largest parishes in the diocese did not respond to the Nation-Wide Campaign in 1921 as they did in 1920. The attitude of a large number of the clergy in the diocese, in ignoring the campaign and refusing to take part in it, as is shown by the report of the Treasurer, is nothing less, in the opinion of the Chairman, than treason to the Episcopal Church.

The Church and its mission, during the past year, has needed the co-operation and intensive labor of every clergyman, particularly, and the

refusal on the part of the clergy to respond to the appeal and do all that they could do to further the cause of the Nation-Wide Campaign, in the face of the needs of the Church, would, if this were a business proposition handled by any of our great business organizations, result in the instant dismissal of their servants on a charge of insubordination, disloyalty or incompetency.

I sincerely trust that the incoming Chairman of the Nation-Wide Campaign Committee will be accorded the full support and hearty co-operation of not only the clergy but the laymen of the Diocese, to the end that the work of Christ's Kingdom is advanced.

At the 82nd Convention, held January 25, 26 and 27, 1921, the following were appointed by Bishop Tuttle to serve on the Executive Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign for the Church's Mission, with Bishop Tuttle and Bishop Johnson ex-officio: R. L. Orcutt, Chairman; Geo. K. Warner, Treasurer; Very Rev. C. M. Davis, Standing Committee of the Diocese; Rev. R. D. S. Putney, Social Service Committee; Rev. H. W. Mizner, Educational Committee; Rev. John S. Bunting, Publication Committee; Mrs. Geo. H. Capen, Chairman, Woman's Church Service League; Mrs. C. R. McDonald, Educational Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary; Mr. Thos. Q. Dix, Department of Missions. Later Dr. Z. B. T. Phillips, D. D., W. L. Henry and Rev. J. Boyd Coxe were added to the Committee.

At a meeting held January 31, Mr. H. H. Short was appointed Executive Secretary to act in that capacity until the Campaign was well under way. The Executive Secretary, together with the Chairman, visited various parishes and missions throughout the diocese, reporting the conditions at these parishes to the Committee at the regular meetings, the purpose being to gather data of a survey nature to be used later in co-operating with the Bishop and Bishop-Coadjutor.

At the request of the Executive Committee, Nation-Wide Campaign Parish Committees were appointed by the rectors in the various parishes and missions of the diocese, which Parish Committees were to act with the Diocesan Committee. On the evening of April 13, the Parish Committees met with the Diocesan Committee at a supper-meeting held at Schuyler House, and reported conditions as to the Nation-Wide Campaign in each particular parish and stated plans for the future work. The meeting was well-attended and was productive of much enthusiasm and desire for co-operation.

The Executive Committee authorized the purchase of a stereoptican lantern, which could be used by any parish in the diocese desiring it. Slides were secured from Rev. Mr. Bunting and also from New York, showing the work of the General Church in all our mission fields, and these slides were used extensively in many parishes, and particularly in connection with the classes on the study of the Survey conducted by Mrs. C. R. McDonald, Educational Secretary. We wish to say here that no one has done more for the educational work of the Church in this diocese, in the Missionary field, than Mrs. McDonald. Last spring she conducted a normal class of twenty women in the study of the Survey, and these women in turn have

led classes in nearly every parish in the city. The work of Mrs. McDonald was one of unflagging interest and enthusiasm, and created a more intelligent knowledge of what the Church was doing in her various fields. For her work in this as well as other activities of the Committee, our grateful thanks are due her.

From April 28 to May 6 inclusive, the Rt. Rev. F. B. Howden, D. D., Missionary Bishop of New Mexico, made a trip through the diocese, being accompanied by the Executive Secretary, and at the various parishes designated by the Committee meetings were held, at which addresses were made by the Bishop giving the splendid results of the Campaign in the work of the missionary bishops. The last meeting of his itinerary was held at Schuyler House, where Bishop Howden spoke before a splendid representation of the Associated Vestries of Missouri.

An outline of a sermon, defining and explaining the work of the Campaign, was prepared by Rev. Messrs. Bunting and Mizner, and on Whitsunday, May 15, a sermon on this subject was preached from every pulpit in the diocese.

The Fall campaign was opened with a dinner at Schuyler House, September 30, with about 150 representatives from parishes and missions meeting the Diocesan Executive Committee. At this time plans for group formations in the various parishes were discussed, and the subject, "Religion in the Home" was made the keynote for the Fall campaign. For the inspiration given in the spiritual work of the campaign, the Committee is deeply indebted to Mrs. Geo. H. Capen.

The culminating point in the work of the Committee for the year 1921 was reached in the service of intercession and inspiration, held at Christ Church Cathedral the evening of November 22nd. Rev. J. Boyd Coxe was Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements, and much of the success of the meeting was due to his personal work. The service was opened with an impressive processional of choir, followed by the vested clergy and Bishops Tuttle and Johnson, and vestrymen to the number of about 200 in line, with every seat in the Cathedral filled with representatives from every parish and mission in the city and county. Rev. B. T. Kemerer, Field Secretary, gave one of the most illuminating and inspiring addresses on the Nation-Wide Campaign, showing the methods to be educational, the end stewardship, the keynote being unity, "with the whole Church united upon her whole task."

28—Louisville. Preached at theatre in Lenten course.

28-March 1, inclusive—I was preaching in the Lenten Theatre course in Louisville. Also preached in night services at Christ Church Cathedral and Calvary Church.

1—Bishop Tuttle sent me word that Grace Church, Clarksville, which for many years had had a parochial organization and as such was in Bishop Tuttle's care, had "died a natural death."

4—In Louisville, had a conference with the Rev. Henry P. Manning, of Danville, Ky., whom I had nominated to the vestry of Grace Parish, Jefferson City.

6—Sunday. Morning. Ministered the Holy Communion and preached at St. Mary's, St. Louis. Evening, assisted the Rev. L. C. Sherburne in the service and preached, Herculaneum.

7—St. Louis. Conference with members of the Committee, Grace-Holy Cross.

8—Accepted invitation to take supper with the Men's Club of Emmanuel Parish, Webster Groves, in the evening, and to make an address on England and the Lambeth Conference.

9—Evening. Assisted the Rev. A. P. Rein in evening service at Overland, and preached.

10—St. Louis. Afternoon, monthly meeting of the Committee of Grace-Holy Cross. Evening, monthly meeting of Missionary Board.

11—Evening. Conducted service in St. Paul's Ironton, and made an address. It was a stormy night, but the church was well filled.

March 13—St. Louis. The Rev. Carl Reed Taylor being ill, I conducted the worship at Grace-Holy Cross and preached. Also addressed the Sunday School. Left in the Evening for Cincinnati.

14-18, inclusive—Preached in the Noonday Lenten Theatre course in Cincinnati. Also preached in night services at the Church of Our Saviour and at Epiphany Church. On the afternoon of March 16, made an address at an Auxiliary meeting at the Church of the Advent.

19—Deaconess Thompson, who has been associated with the work of Grace-Holy Cross, asks to be relieved of duty here and I have today accepted her resignation with warm thanks to her for the help that she has given us.

20—Sunday. St. Louis, 11 a. m., with the Rev. J. H. Harvey; assisted in the service at St. Luke's, Motor City, and confirmed 4. Addressed the candidates and preached. 3 p. m., St. Thomas', Bofinger Chapel, with the Rev. Dr. Cloud, preached, confirmed a class of 15, and addressed the candidates. Evening, Ascension Parish house, by invitation of the Rev. J. S. Bunting, gave an illustrated lecture on the Church's work among the Sioux Indians of South Dakota.

21—St. Louis, evening; attended meeting of Chapter of Cathedral.

22—St. Louis. Met with the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor and members of Grace-Holy Cross to discuss building plans.

23—St. Louis, afternoon. Met with Special Committee of Cathedral Chapter. Evening, conducted the service and preached, St. Mary's church.

24—St. Louis, morning; celebrated the Holy Communion, St. Mary's. Evening, conducted the worship and preached, Prince of Peace.

25—Good Friday. St. Louis, morning; participated with the Rev. D. H. Atwill and his people in the worship at St. Augustine's. Afternoon, with the Rev. J. H. Harvey, confirmed 1, a sick person, City Hospital.

27—Easter. In the morning I celebrated the Holy Communion and preached, Trinity Church, Kirksville. The church was filled, though the weather conditions were miserable. There were 35 at the Holy Communion. The "oldest inhabitants" told me that they had never before seen so many persons in our church at Kirksville. I baptized 1 adult and confirmed 5, presented by Mr. H. A. Kellogg, the Warden of Trinity. These were prepared by the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom who gives one Sunday a month to Kirksville. Afternoon, Moberly, with the Rev. C. F. Edwards, celebrated the Holy Communion, preached, confirmed 1 person. The church was well filled.

28—Clarksville. Visited this point to try to learn whether there were any considerable number of persons interested in trying to resuscitate the church life where the parish had "died a natural death." By courtesy of the Disciples of Christ, we had service in their church. The place was packed. The Rev. Mr. Brennan, of Eolia, assisted in the service. I preached. After service we asked those who were interested to remain for conference. There was an earnest interest on the part of several persons. I asked that pledges be secured and reported to me before I could determine whether we should try to organize a Mission on the remnant of the defunct Parish. I have a hope that this can be done. There is an attractive church building here. It seems too bad to leave it to the owls and the bats.

30—St. Louis, afternoon; meeting of Special Committee Cathedral Chapter.

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April 5—Received word from the Vestry of Jefferson City that the Rev. H. P. Manning of Danville, Ky., had accepted call as Rector and gave my consent. Evening, Calvary Church, Columbia, opening of joint Northern and Southern Convocation meeting, made address in response to the Rector's welcoming word.

6—Columbia, Convocation; celebrated the Holy Communion in the morning, assisted by the Rev. J. Courtney Jones and the Rev. G. E. Wharton. In the evening, introduced the speakers; participated in the discussions of the day.

7—Columbia. Participated in the sessions of the Convocation. At the evening service in Calvary Church, in the name of the Convocation, said thanks to the people for the delightful way in which they had made us their guests for three days. All but three of the Clergy composing the two Convocations were present. Of these three, one was detained at home by a funeral, another is not now in the active work of the Ministry.

10—Sunday. Morning. St. James. Addressed the nice Sunday School. Later, assisted by the Rev. F. M. Weddell, ministered the Holy Communion. I preached, confirmed 3, presented by Mr. Weddell, and addressed them. Afternoon, with the Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, assisted in service at St. Andrew's, Cuba, and preached. Evening, with the Rev. Mr. Weddell, assisted in service at St. John's, Sullivan, preached, confirmed 3, presented by Mr. Weddell, and addressed them. I doubt if there are to be found in the whole Diocese three churches as neatly kept as those at St. James, Cuba, and Sullivan.

11—St. Louis, Morning, met with Clericus. Later, met with an important Committee on Church matters. Evening, Overland, met with Building Committee of St. Paul's Church to discuss building plans.

12—Evening. Monroe City. Assisted in evening service, preached, confirmed 4 presented by the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, and addressed them.

13—Palmyra. Lunched with the Rev. A. E. Woodward and Mrs. Woodward, who have just lately come back to us from the Diocese of Arkansas. Evening, St. Louis, attended meeting of the Nation-Wide Campaign at Schuyler Memorial House.

14—St. Louis. Officiated with Dean Davis in the Cathedral at the burial of Daniel, son of Dr. and Mrs. George M. Tuttle, and in Bellefontaine Cemetery committed his body to the ground.

17—Sunday. Morning, celebrated the Holy Communion, Christ Church, Cape Girardeau. Delivered the Baccalaureate Sermon, State Teachers' College, Cape Girardeau. Evening, Christ Church, assisted the Rev. J. H. Taylor in the service; preached, confirmed five, and for the Mission at Chaffee, two. Addressed the Candidates.

18—With the Rev. J. H. Taylor visited our Mission at Illmo, assisted in the service and preached.

19—With the Rev. J. H. Taylor visited our Mission at Chaffee, assisted in evening prayer and preached.

20—With the Rev. J. H. Taylor visited our Mission at Bloomfield, confirmed three, addressed the candidates and preached. Mr. Taylor officiated at a number of baptisms.

22—At the request of Bishop Tuttle accepted from him the spiritual care of St. Alban's Parish, St. Louis, and St. Paul's Parish, Palmyra.

April 24—Sunday, morning, with the Rev. D. H. Atwill assisted in the service at St. Augustine's, St. Louis, preached, confirmed 18, addressed the candidates. Evening, Canton, with the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom assisted in evening service and preached.

25-28—Mrs. Johnson and I had a happy visit in the homes of Mrs. Helen K. Garth and Mrs. Robert Robinson at Hannibal. They took us for many delightful drives in the neighborhood.

27—The rector and people of Trinity Parish, Hannibal, arranged a delightful reception for Mrs. Johnson and me in the Parish House. There was music and other entertaining features and toothsome refreshments were served. I made an address of appreciation. We visited the Woodwards in Palmyra during the week and spent a day with the Lindstroms at Monroe City.

29—Spent the night with Dr. and Mrs. Robert at Clarksville, Mrs. Johnson and I, and I further discussed with Clarksville people plans for opening the Mission there.

30—Morning. Met with the people interested in renewing the Church's activities at Clarksville and they requested me to take steps looking to having occasional Sunday services.

May 1—Morning. With the Rev. G. E. Wharton at Mexico, celebrated the Holy Communion, preached, confirmed three and addressed the candidates. Also baptized Edith Ann, infant daughter of the Rev. George E. and Mrs. Wharton. Evening. St. Louis, Prince of Peace. Held evening service, preached, confirmed five and addressed the candidates. Later, in private, confirmed a lad on his sick bed, who entered into rest on the third day following. These all presented by Sister Miriam.

3—Evening. Palmyra, had a meeting with the vestry of St. Paul's Church.

4—St. Louis. Afternoon, meeting of Special Committee of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral. Evening, meeting of the Missionary Board.

6—St. Louis. Afternoon, read prayers at a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at St. Peter's Church, Bishop Tuttle and Bishop Howden being the speakers. Evening, attended supper Schuyler Memorial House under the auspices of the Associated Vestries, and business meeting following.

8—Sunday. Celebrated the Holy Communion at 7:30 o'clock, St. Peter's Church, St. Louis. Later assisted the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor in service at Grace-Holy Cross, preached, confirmed six and addressed the candidates. Evening, assisted the Rev. Arthur E. Woodward in the service at St. Paul's Church, Palmyra and preached. Had an informal gathering of the church people after service to consider the opportunity for missionary work in the neighborhood. Left Palmyra on midnight train for New York for the consecration of Bishop Manning.

15—Whitsunday. In the morning, Overland, assisted by the Rev. A. P. Rein, ministered the Holy Communion, confirmed 20, addressed the candidates and preached. This, I suppose, is the largest class ever confirmed at Overland. It adds fifty per cent of the communicant list of St. Paul's Mission. The faithful pastoral work of Mr. Rein and the devoted attention of many of the elders to the work of the Sunday

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School have borne abundant fruit in Overland. Afternoon, at the Odeon, participated in the annual gathering of the Missionary Host, a beautiful pageant arranged by Mrs. Anne Branch Cushing of Webster Groves, and made a short address. Evening, Trinity Church, De Soto, the Rev. V. O. Penley conducting the service. I confirmed two, addressed the candidates and preached.

May 16—St. Louis. Meeting of the Clericus. Luncheon with officers of the Lay Readers' League discussing plans. Evening, at Schuyler Memorial House, a meeting of the Chapter of the Cathedral.

17—Received Letter Dimissory of the Bishop of Lexington in favor of the Rev. H. P. Manning, rector-elect of Jefferson City, and accepted same. Afternoon, St. Louis, meeting of a special committee of Cathedral Chapter. Evening, St. Louis Club, meeting of the Corporation of Grace-Holy Cross.

19—St. Louis. Afternoon, City Club, meeting of program committee of the Provincial Synod, of which I am Chairman. Evening, St. Luke's Hospital, annual graduation of the Training School for Nurses, conducted the devotional service. The class numbered 32, the largest ever graduated from the school.

20—St. Louis, morning, meeting of Committee in the Matter of Service Building at Columbia. Evening, meeting of Nation-Wide Campaign Committee.

21—St. Louis. Sent letter dimissory in behalf of the Rev. L. H. White, Presbyter, to the Diocese of Massachusetts.

22—Trinity Sunday, morning. Assisted by the Rev. L. C. Sherburne, Crystal City, ministered the Holy Communion, confirmed 4 and preached. Evening, Herculeum, with the Rev. L. C. Sherburne, had service of evening prayer, confirmed 8 and preached.

23—St. Louis, morning, City Hospital. With the Rev. J. H. Harvey, confirmed 1 and made an address. Afternoon, meeting with a Committee considering informally the question of Church Union Lenten Services, Old Colony Club.

29—Washington, D. C. Preached in connection with the commencement of St. Alban's School.

June 1—Evening, Poplar Bluff. Assisted in the service by the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer. I preached, confirmed 5 and addressed them.

2—St. Louis. Appointed the Rev. D. H. Atwill, Chairman, and the Revs. J. H. George, C. B. Carpenter, George E. Norton, other members, to constitute a Diocesan Committee on Recruiting, Training and Admitting Men to the Ministry. This done at request of the Presiding Bishop and Council that a Diocesan Committee be appointed. Evening, attended monthly meeting of Missionary Board and presided. Mrs. Johnson and I had the privilege of entertaining in our home the Rev. H. P. Manning and Mrs. Manning and the lad over night, as they were on their way from Kentucky to their new home in Jefferson City.

3—Koch Tubercular Hospital. Joined with the Rev. C. B. Carpenter in the service and confirmed 4 in the chapel and preached. In a ward of the hospital, confirmed 1.

5—Morning. Conducted the service in the chapel of Monticello Seminary and preached the Baccalaureate Sermon. In the evening, Holy Inno-

cents, St. Louis, by invitation of the Rector preached at the closing service commemorating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Parish.

June 6—St. Louis. In continuation of the anniversary celebration of Holy Innocents Parish, met with the Clericus as guests of the Parish and had a delightful luncheon served by the ladies. Attended meeting of Nation-Wide Committee. Attended meeting of Cathedral Chapter in evening, Schuyler House.

7—Morning, Monticello Seminary, with other Trustees, joined in commencement exercises and conducted religious service. Afternoon, St. Louis, meeting of Committee Grace-Holy Cross. Night, left for Sewanee.

8, 9, 10—At Sewanee, the guest of the Vice Chancellor of the University and in attendance on meeting of the Trustees.

12—Sunday. Conducted the worship and preached the Baccalaureate Sermon at State Normal School, Terre Haute, Indiana.

13-16—Mrs. Johnson and I were the happy guests of Mrs. E. C. Simons at Idlewild, Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, and had beautiful drives everywhere and wonderful refreshment on the lawn beneath the trees beside the quiet lake.

17—Portland, evening. Assisted by the Rev. H. P. Manning, service in St. Mark's Church and preached. This is the first service had here since the Rev. George L. Barnes went away in December. Nearly every sitting in the church was occupied, in spite of the fact that it was a week-day night right in the midst of wheat harvest. We hope that Mr. Manning, the new rector of Jefferson City, will be able to make monthly visits here.

18—From Portland went with the Rev. Mr. Manning to his home in Jefferson City for dinner; then to St. Louis at night.

19—Sunday morning, went with Mr. Richard Kopplin in his car to Valley Park. We had a good congregation, in spite of the fact that the day was hot as fury. Mr. Kopplin continues to do a splendid work here as lay reader every week. I confirmed 2 presented by Mr. Koppin. I ministered the Holy Communion and preached. We got back to St. Louis in time for me to keep an appointment at a meeting in the late afternoon of the Special Committee of the Cathedral Chapter. In the evening, at St. Timothy's the Rev. A. P. Rein conducting the service, I preached, confirmed a class of 9, and spoke to the class. Just before the hour of service we had almost a cloudburst in that part of the city. The large congregation which gathered in the storm seemed to me an evidence that there is real earnestness and desire to "carry on" at St. Timothy's.

20—Went to Columbia on matters connected with the Committee on the Service Building for University student work. The Rev. Dr. Phillips and Dean Davis, members of the Committee, went with me. We had a meeting at the Rectory, the Columbia contingent joining us there, and had considerable discussion which seemed worth while. At night, at the home of Mr. P. B. Dorsey, the Rector and the members of the Vestry met with the Committee and we were all hospitably entertained and refreshed by Mr. and Mrs. Dorsey and Mrs. Greene. We felt that it had been good to be together and that one step forward, at least, had been taken.

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June 21—Returned to St. Louis. Had the Rev. Mr. Carpenter with me at dinner and we went over many matters related to the work in the City Institutions which he is doing with such sweet sympathy and real affection.

22—St. Louis. Conference in the afternoon with one who wishes to join our working staff. In the evening, at Epiphany mission, the Rev. Dr. Phillips and the Rev. Mr. Harvey conducting the service, I preached and confirmed a class of 9 boys and 5 girls.

23—St. Louis, evening, met with League of Lay Readers for dinner, discussed various business matters and arranged a schedule of services for the members during the next few months.

24—Received notice from Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts of his acceptance of Letter Dimissory of the Rev. L. H. White; the date of record being June 18, 1921.

26—Sunday morning, Palmyra. Instituted the Rev. Arthur E. Woodward, Rector of St. Paul's Church. Assisted Mr. Woodward in the ministrations of the Holy Communion. Confirmed 3 and preached.

28—St. Louis, City Hospital. Confirmed 1 presented by the Rev. J. H. Harvey and made an address. Acting under Canon provided, gave permission to Rev. J. D. Randolph, Pastor of M. E. Church, South, to speak in Calvary Church, Columbia, at special service, Sunday, July 10; also to Rev. J. M. Williams, Presbyterian pastor, to speak in St. Paul's Church, Palmyra, at a special service, July 31. In each case the Rector requested the permission.

29—St. Louis. In the evening solemnized a marriage.

July 3—Sunday, Newtown, Conn. In the morning celebrated the Holy Communion in the church in which I was baptized in my old home town.

18—Received notice from Bishop Manning of the Diocese of New York of the deposition by him from the ministry of the Church of the Rev. Harvey Officer, Presbyter.

August 2—Gave consent to the election of the Rt. Rev. Bishop Lloyd to be Suffragan Bishop of New York.

September 1—Having had conference with the lay officers of St. Mary's, St. Louis, in the matter, I appointed the Rev. Henry H. Marsden, curate of St. Paul's Baltimore, to the charge of St. Mary's. It is hoped that he will take up the duties there early in October.

1-10—In various places in the East seeking helpers for the work in the Diocese of Missouri.

11—Sunday. I spent the day in the work of the mountains of Virginia, the work that has been built up around the personality of Archdeacon Neve. In the early morning I celebrated the Holy Communion and made an address to the workers at Mountain Home. In the afternoon I visited Simmons Gap and addressed the Sunday school and preached. At night I climbed Lost Mountain (or Frazer Mountain, as it is sometimes called), assisted in the service and preached. The day was a full one and the experiences which I had were valuable. I was delightfully at home with the missionary in charge and his wife. I entered the mountains by a 30-mile drive from Charlottesville, and went out on Monday the same way.

14—St. Louis. Desk work.

September 15—Meeting of Cathedral Chapter. Meeting of Program Committee for Synod.

18—Sunday. Attended service of Holy Communion, early. 10. Called on Deaconess Sniffen who had just left St. Luke's Hospital after a long illness there. Glad to find her improving. 10:30. St. Luke's, Harney Heights, met with Sunday school and talked to the children. 30 present, which was very good. 11. St. Luke's, Harney Heights. Conducted the worship and preached. A congregation of more than 30 was good for that place on a hot Sunday morning. 2:30 p. m. Confirmed a patient at St. Luke's Hospital, presented by the Chaplain. This is a direct fruit, I think, of the illness of Deaconess Sniffen in this hospital. The bed of the girl whom I confirmed was alongside that of the Deaconess. (While your eye is on this item, read Acts 16:25-33.) 5 p. m. House of Detention, with Deaconess Brainerd, talked to the children and joined with them in singing, which was better and more hearty than I have before heard it there.

19—St. Louis. 10 a. m. Meeting of Chairmen of Committees in preparation for Synod. Noon. Luncheon with Clericus as guests of the Rev. J. Boyd Coxé at Trinity Church. 2:15. Took train for Kansas City.

20—Kansas City. Meeting of the Committee in the matter of a proposed Service Building at Columbia. Dean Davis and Dr. Phillips and Mr. Orcutt went over from this Diocese; also the rector of Columbia, the Rev. Mr. George, and Mr. Logan Berry of Columbia. Three busy Kansas City rectors and one busy Kansas City layman joined with us in the conference which we all believed to have been worth while. Returned on night train from Kansas City.

22—St. Louis. Conference with Mrs. Thomas Q. Dix, President of Auxiliary, on the program for Synod.

23—St. Louis. Conference with the Rev. W. L. R. Witmer of Poplar Bluff in the matter of our work in his section of the map. Mr. Witmer took lunch and dinner in my home and returned to Poplar Bluff at night. 8 p. m. Meeting Chapter Christ Church Cathedral.

24—October 4—Was absent from the diocese on business of the diocese, on which errand I went by request of the Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral.

5—St. Louis. Meeting of Chapter of Cathedral. Meeting of Program Committee for Synod of the Seventh Province. Gave canonical consent to consecration of the Rev. Dr. Herbert Shipman, Suffragan Bishop-elect of the diocese of New York, to be a Bishop in the Church of God.

6—St. Louis. Meeting of the Missionary Board.

7—St. Louis. Luncheon of the Chapter of Cathedral at Noonday Club, all members being present. Meeting of Special Committee of the Chapter, of which I am Chairman.

8—St. Louis. Appointed Mr. R. L. Orcutt to serve with Dean Davis on an important committee in connection with Service Building for Columbia.

9—Sunday. Crystal City, morning. Assisted the Rev. L. C. Sherburne in morning prayer and preached. Herculanum, took dinner with the Rev. L. C. and Mrs. Sherburne in their new home here. Took supper

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with Miss Emma A. Luther, our faithful parish visitor, at the Deaconess House. Evening, Herculeaneum, assisted the Rev. Mr. Sherburne in evening prayer and preached. Spent the night at the pro-rectory.

October 10—St. Louis. Meeting of Special Committee of Chapter.

11—St. Louis. Special meeting of Chapter of Cathedral. Conference with Mr. Charles K. Hitchcock, Junior Warden of St. Peter's, Bonne Terre.

12—St. Louis. Morning, confirmed in private a sick person presented by the Rev. D. H. Atwill of St. Augustine's. Appointed the Rev. Vincent Owen Penley minister in charge of St. Peter's, Bonne Terre. Evening, at Schuyler Memorial House, opened with prayer the Institute for Church School Workers conducted by the Rev. R. S. Chalmers. Attended meeting of Church School Service League.

13—Evening. Took supper at Schuyler House, attended session of Institute for Church School Workers, and gave the benediction at close of session.

14—St. Louis. 10 a. m. Celebrated the Holy Communion in St. George's Church for the Quarterly Meeting of the Auxiliary, the Rev. R. H. Atchison, assisting. Attended the all-day meeting of the Auxiliary.

15—St. Louis. 5 p. m. With Mrs. Johnson attended a wedding at St. Peter's Church and reception following at St. Louis Club. Later, met with the members of the League of Lay Readers at the hospitable home of one of our members, Mr. Allen D. Pomeroy. Mrs. Pomeroy presided as hostess at a delightful dinner. A business session followed. I made an address with reference to the work in the field. Took late train for Ironton.

16—Sunday, Ironton. Ministered the Holy Communion in St. Paul's Church in the morning and preached. We celebrated together today the fiftieth anniversary of the building of this church. In the afternoon I met with those who are chiefly interested and planned for a continuance of the services, if possible, during the winter. I spent the night as guest of Mrs. William H. Thomson and daughters at Valley Home, Arcadia. The valley was fairly aflame with blazing autumn foliage.

17—St. Louis. Received from the Bishop of Maryland Letter Dimissory in favor of the Rev. Henry H. Marsden, presbyter, recently removed to St. Louis as pastor of St. Mary's Church. Issued license to Mr. W. J. W. Russell to serve as Lay Reader under the direction and at the request of the Rev. Oscar Lindstrom, rector of Monroe City and minister in charge of Kirksville.

18—St. Louis. Afternoon, meeting of Special Committee of Chapter of Cathedral.

19, 20, 21—St. Louis. Duties as Chairman of Committee of Arrangements and of Program at the Synod of the Province of the Southwest. In attendance at the sessions of the Synod.

19—Evening. St. Peter's Church, presided at evening session and introduced the speakers, Mr. J. H. Pershing, of Denver, and Dr. John W. Wood, of New York.

20—Mrs. Johnson and I had with us as our guest today and tonight, the Rev. S. Harrington Littell of Hankow, China, a speaker who did much for us in making the Synod sessions spiritually helpful. Mr. Littell and I were classmates at Trinity College in—not so very long ago.

October 21—St. Louis. Celebrated the Holy Communion in connection with the Synod in the early morning at St. Peter's Church. Received from the Bishop of Connecticut, Letter Dimissory in favor of Mr. Philip B. Warner, a candidate for Holy Orders. Mr. Warner becomes now a candidate in the Diocese of Missouri.

23—Sunday. St. Louis. Early, attended celebration of Holy Communion, St. Philip's Church. 9. a. m., City Sanitarium. Assisted the Rev. Charles B. Carpenter in the services and preached. 3:30 p. m. (iv.), I hereby officially make known the following alterations in the Constitution of the Church proposed and adopted in the General Convention of 1919, to wit, those comprised in the subjoined resolutions, and to be acted upon by the General Convention of 1922.

Also the alterations and additions in the Book of Common Prayer, proposed and adopted in the General Convention of 1919, to wit, those comprised in the subjoined resolutions, and to be acted upon by the General Convention of 1922.

AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED AT THE
CONVENTION OF 1919, AND TO BE FINALLY ACTED
UPON AT THE CONVENTION OF 1922

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution:

(The foregoing Resolution is to be understood to be prefixed to each of the "proposed alterations" here following).

Amend Article I., Section 2, of the Constitution by inserting in the second line of said Section after the words "every Bishop Coadjutor" the words "every Suffragan Bishop".

Amend Article II., Section 3, of the Constitution by canceling the words "or in a vacant Missionary District by the Presiding Bishop of this Church", at lines 5 and 6.

Amend Article II., Section 4, of the Constitution by striking out the word "without" in the fourth line, so that the said line shall read "and with seat and vote in the House of Bishops".

Amend Article II., Section 5, of the Constitution so that it shall read as follows: "A Bishop may not resign his jurisdiction without the consent of the House of Bishops or without the consent of the Bishops of the Province in which his jurisdiction has been exercised, in either case under conditions provided by the Canons of the General Convention."

Amend Article III. of the Constitution by the addition of these words, "If a Bishop so consecrated shall be subsequently duly elected as a Missionary Bishop of this Church, he shall then enjoy all the rights and privileges given in the Canons to Missionary Bishops."

Amend Article VII. of the Constitution by changing the word "may" in line one to "shall", and by striking out the proviso, "Provided, however, that no Diocese shall be included in a Province without its own consent" so that Article VII. shall read: "Dioceses and Missionary Districts shall be united into Provinces in such manner, under such conditions, and with such powers, as shall be provided by Canons of the General Convention."

Amend Article VIII. of the Constitution by inserting after the word "Deacon" in line one the words "to minister in this Church".

Amend Article VIII. of the Constitution by inserting after the word "Deacon" in line six the words "to minister in this Church".

Amend Article X. of the Constitution by inserting the words "and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the use of the Psalms" after the words "Tables of Lessons".

Amend Article II., Section 3, of the Constitution by adding at the end of Section 3 the words "or to act in otherwise exceptional cases."

AMENDMENTS TO THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER
PROPOSED AT THE CONVENTION OF 1919, AND
TO BE FINALLY ACTED UPON AT THE
CONVENTION OF 1922

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Order for Daily Morning Prayer, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses in order that it may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with the provisions of Article X. of the Constitution.

(Each Resolution is printed once for the sake of brevity, but is to be understood as repeated before each item immediately following.)

(6) In the Absolution on page 5, begin a new paragraph with "Wherefore," and insert an "Amen" in Italics, at the end of this absolution, omitting the rubric which follows.

(9) In the second rubric on page 6 of the Prayer Book, omit all after the word "appointed" substituting in place thereof the words "and except also that Psalm 95 may be used in this place: but Note, That on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday the Venite may be omitted."

(15) Print as the Gloria at the end of the Benedicite the following: "Let us bless the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Ghost: praise him and magnify him for ever."

(15b) Amend the second sentence of the third rubric on page 6 by omitting the word "Benedicite."

(20) In the rubric, following the Creed, on page 12 of the Prayer Book, substitute for the word "all" before "devoutly" the words "the people".

(21) Substitute for the Versicles and Responses, now on pages 12 and 13, following the second rubric on page 12, the Versicles and Responses from Evening Prayer, now standing on page 26 of the Prayer Book.

(22) Add to the rubric on page 14, at the end, these words: And Note that the Minister may here end the Morning Prayer with such general intercessions taken out of this book, as he shall think fit.

After the Prayer for the President on page 13 of the Prayer Book, insert the following:

Or this.

O Lord our Governor, whose glory is in all the world; We commend this nation to thy merciful care, that being guided by thy Providence we may dwell secure in thy peace. Grant to The President of the United States, and to all in Authority, wisdom and strength to know and to do thy will. Fill them with the love of truth and righteousness; and make

them ever mindful of their calling to serve this people in thy fear; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Order for Daily Evening Prayer, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses in order that it may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with the provisions of Article X. of the Constitution.

(5) Omit in the Gloria in excelsis, page 21 of the Prayer Book, in the second paragraph, the sentence, "Thou that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy upon us."

(9) In the rubric following the Creed, on page 26 of the Prayer Book, substitute for the word "all" before "devoutly" the words "the people."

(11) Omit in the Prayer for the President, page 27 of the Prayer Book, line 11, the words "in thee and for thee."

Resolved, That the following change be made in Prayers and Thanksgivings, and that the proposed alteration, be made known to the several Dioceses in order that it may be adopted by the next General Convention in accordance with the provisions of Article X. of the Constitution.

(2) Substitute for the rubric at the top of page 37 the following:

To be used before the Prayer for all Conditions of Men, or, when that is not said, before 2 Cor. xiii. 14; also, at the end of the Litany; and in the Order for Holy Communion, as there appointed.

(31) Omit the Thanksgiving for Deliverance from great Sickness, page 46.

(33a) Place the title For Unity before the prayer "O Lord Jesus Christ who saidst, etc."
