# Rules of Order of the Convention

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:

I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.

II. On Constitution and Canons.

III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.

IV. On Dispatch of Business.

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V. On the State of the Church.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.

8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgement of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

#### RULE OF ORDER

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's Table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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# MINUTES

Christ Church Cathedral Tuesday, May 2, 1950

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The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred-Eleventh Annual Convention of the Diocese assembled in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 12 noon on Tuesday, May 2, 1950.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. William Scarlett, D.D., assisted by the Rt. Rev. Beverley D. Tucker, Bishop of Ohio, the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, and the Rev. Early W. Poindexter, Jr.

During the service the Bishop read his Annual Address.

Luncheon was served at 1:15 in Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

At 2 p.m. the Clergy and Delegates assembled in Dean Schuyler Auditorium to witness a television interview of Bishop Scarlett, Bishop Tucker, The Rev. Reinhold Niebuhr and Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley conducted by Mr. Frank Eschen over KSD-TV.

The Business Session opened at 2:30 p.m. with Bishop Scarlett presiding.

The Secretary called the roll of the Clergy. Of the forty-five entitled to vote thirty five were present.

The Secretary then called the roll of the Parishes and Missions entitled to representation in this Convention. Of the forty-two entitled to representation, thirty-nine responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rev. Charles F. Rehkopf was re-elected Secretary of the Convention and of the Diocese.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 1:

RESOLVED, that the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention and that Rule No. 22, which sets forth the Order of Business, may be suspended at the discretion of the Bishop at any time.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Resolution was adopted.

The Bishop introduced the clergy new in the Diocese since last Convention: The Rev. G. Ernest Lynch, the Rev. Joseph W. Nicholson, Ph.D., the Rev. Alban Richey, the Rev. A. Malcolm MacMillan, the Rev. S. G. Parrigin.

The Bishop appointed the Secretary to act as the Committee on Dispatch of Business.

By authority of the Convention the Bishop appointed the following to act as a Nominating Committee: the Rev. Messrs. Hohenschild, Poindexter and Cole, and Messrs. Leach, Lasar, and J. K. Stribling.

#### JOURNAL OF THE

The Rev. Mr. Kean, speaking for the Committee on Constitution and Canons, moved that the Amendment to Article VI of the Constitution, passed on first reading in 1949, be ratified by this Convention. After a second the motion was passed.

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The Report of the Standing Committee and the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund was presented and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 1, 2, 2A).

The Treasurer's Reports were received as follows and ordered printed in the Journal.

Diocesan Expense Fund. (Appendix No. 3, 3A).

Church Program Fund. (Appendix No. 4, 4A).

Frank C. and Mattie H. Thompson Fund. (Appendix No. 5).

Theological Education Fund. (Appendix No. 6).

Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate. (Appendix No. 8).

The Secretary, acting as Recording Secretary of the Diocesan Council, presented the 1950 Budget for the Diocesan Expense Fund and the Schedule of Assessments on Parishes and Missions. These were received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 9, 9A).

The Secretary presented the 1950 Budget for the Church Program Fund and the Schedule of Apportionments on Parishes and Missions. These were received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 10, 10A).

The Secretary then presented the Schedule of Quotas on Parishes and Missions necessary to meet the increased asking of the National Council for 1950. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 11).

The Secretary, speaking in the absence of Mr. Charles Belknap, Chairman of the Department of Finance, introduced the 1951 Budget for the Diocesan Expense Fund together with the Tentative Schedule of Assessments on Parishes and Missions. These were accepted as submitted and referred to the Diocesan Council for revision if a Bishop Coadjutor is to be elected. (Appendix No. 12, 12A).

The Secretary then introduced the 1951 Budget for the Church Program Fund and the Tentative Schedule of Apportionments for Parishes and Missions. This was approved subject to revisions by the Council later in the year. (Appendix No. 13, 13A).

Upon motion by Mr. Brewer, duly seconded, the Diocesan Council was asked to report dates of any special campaigns in the next year before the Every Member Canvasses are held this Fall.

The Bishop presented the Report of Trust Funds Held by the Bishop. This was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 14).

Dean Sweet presented the report of the Department of Christian Social Relations. (Appendix No. 15).

The Rev. Dr. Sant presented the report of the Department of Christian Education. (Appendix No. 16).

The Rev. Mr. Kean presented the report of the Department of Promotion. (Appendix No. 17).

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The Rev. Dr. Laird presented the report of the Department of Missions and Strategy. (Appendix No. 18).

The Report of the Woman's Auxiliary was presented by its President, Mrs. Clark C. Bland. (Appendix No. 19).

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented by the Rev. Mr. Hohenschild. The Rev. Mr. Lichliter and Mr. Louis Thym were nominated for three-year terms on the Standing Committee. The Rev. Dr. Penniman was placed in nomination from the floor. Tellers were appointed and ballots cast. The ballot resulted in the election of Mr. Lichliter. There being no further nominations for the Lay member of the Standing Committee the Secretary was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for Mr. Thym.

For Finance Committee of the Diocese-Mr. P. Taylor Bryan, Jr., Mr. Stephen B. Sheldon, Mr. John R. Shepley, and Mr. Charles Belknap.

For members of the Diocesan Council for two years—the Rev. Messrs., Nicholson, Laird and Cole. Messrs. Leach, Brewer, and Attree.

For member of the Diocesan Council for one year to fill the unexpired term of the Rev. Mr. Blanchard—the Rev. Mr. MacMillan.

For Members of the Cathedral Chapter—The Rev. Messrs. Rehkopf, Hohenschild and Coombs, Messrs. Lasar, Sieber and Hyde.

For Trustees of the University of the South—The Rev. Mr. MacMillan, Mr. A. E. Honey, Mr. George B. Scott.

The Secretary of the Convention was instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the above named persons.

The Secretary presented the suggestion of the Diocesan Council for the composition of the Committee on Nominations for a Bishop Coadjutor. — The members of the Standing Committee, one clergyman and one layman from outside St. Louis and St. Louis County, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary and one other woman. Upon motion, duly seconded, this suggestion was approved.

The following names were placed in nomination: Clerical—The Rev. Messrs. Cole, Coombs and Bassage; Messrs. Hyde, Brewer and Hawkins; Mesdames William H. Sinkler, Harold Woodward, E. G. Lasar, Irvin Mattick, E. M. Harford, K. M. Hudson. Tellers were appointed and ballots cast for these persons.

Mrs. John F. Shepley presented the report of the City Mission Society. (Appendix No. 20).

Mr. Alvan Goodbar presented an oral report as Chancellor of the Diocese and called attention to nominations for the Episcopal members of the Board of Directors of St. Luke's Hospital. Mr. Goodbar also presented the report of the Episcopal Bishop's Residence Co., which was ordered filed.

The Secretary announced that he had received the Annual Report of St. Luke's Hospital, and that the Board of Directors had nominated the following, whose terms expire this year, for terms which will run until April, 1953.

Upon motion duly seconded the above names were approved and the Directors declared elected.

Mrs. Harold H. Woodward presented the report of the Girls Friendly Society. (Appendix No. 21).

Mrs. Irvin Mattick presented the report of the Episcopal Home for Children.

Mrs. Irvin Mattick further reported that Dr. Penniman's Report as Director of the Educational Center had been mimeographed and would be available upon request.

Speaking for the Committee on Constitution and Canons the Rev. Mr. Kean introduced Resolution No. 2:

RESOLVED: That Canon 21, "Of the Permanent Fund," be amended as follows:

Strike out the entire Canon, and substitute the following:

Section 1. All money and other property now held or hereafter acquired for the Permanent Fund for the support of the Episcopate shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees composed of the Bishop of the Diocese and the members of the Diocesan Council. The officers of the Diocesan Council shall be officers of said Board, and a quorum of the Diocesan Council shall be a quorum of said Board.

Upon motion, duly seconded, this Resolution was adopted.

Mr. Kean then introduced Resolution No. 3:

RESOLVED: That Canon 6 be amended as follows:

1. That it be renamed "Of the Standing Committee and the Parochial Trust Fund Trustees."

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2. That new sections, to be numbered Section 2, 3, and 4, be enacted as follows:

Section 2. The members of the Standing Committee shall serve as the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund, a Corporation, incorporated under the laws of the State of Missouri. In this capacity they shall receive and hold such property, both real and personal of whatsoever nature, as shall be entrusted to them in conformance with the provisions of this Diocese, and the Articles of Association of said Corporation."

Section 3. The Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund shall hold title, on behalf of the Diocese of Missouri and for the use of the missionary congregations of this Diocese, of all property, both real and personal of whatsoever nature, as shall be acquired by and for the use of any missionary congregation through purchase, bequest or gift, and shall administer the same subject to the resolutions of the Diocesan Council.

Section 4. The Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund may receive and hold such property, both real and personal of whatsover nature, as shall be entrusted to them by any parish in union with the Convention of this Diocese, and shall administer the same in conformance with the offocial action of the vestry of such parish, as certified to the Trustees by the Rector or Secretary of said vestry.

Upon motion, duly seconded this Resolution was adopted.

The tellers returned with the tally of the votes for members of the Committee on Nominations. Mr. Brewer with a majority of votes in both orders was declared elected. Ballots were then cast for the second time for the clerical and woman members of the Committee.

Miss Francis Ellis was introduced to Convention as the Associate Director of the Educational Center.

Mr. Edward Dentzer, assistant at Grace Church, Kirkwood, was introduced as a newly admitted Candidate for the Ministry.

Mr. Roy Schaffer, Lay Reader-in-Charge of Trinity Church, St. Charles, was introduced as a newly admitted Postulant for the Ministry.

Mr. M. A. Browne, Lay-Reader-in-Charge of St. Luke's Mission, Valley Park, was introduced. It was announced that Mr. Brown would be leaving the Diocese shortly for Clarksburg, West Virginia, where he has been transferred by the Veterans Administration.

Upon motion, by Dean Sweet, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to convey to the Rev. James H. George the sympathy of the Convention in his illness and its intercession with God for his recovery.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was instructed to convey to Mrs. Arthur O. Steidemann the sympathy of the Convention on the death of her husband.

The Secretary reported on the matter of bonding of Parish and Mission Treasurers by the Diocese, an item that had been referred from the Council. Upon motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred back to the Council for study.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the day's Minutes.

The Convention approved the holding of an adjourned session on Wednesday, November 1, 1950, for the purpose of electing a Bishop Coadjutor.

The Tellers returned with the tally of the second ballot. The Rev. Mr. Cole was declared elected by both orders. Ballots were thereupon cast for the woman representative. By unanimous consent it was agreed that a simple plurality would suffice after all had withdrawn except Mrs. Sinkler, Mrs. Lasar and Mrs. Hudson.

When the tellers returned with the tally Mrs. Sinkler was declared elected.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the following committees to serve through the 1951 Convention:

Following dinner which was served at 6 p.m., Bishop Scarlett was honored by the laity and the clergy of the Diocese. Mr. C. C. Pangman spoke for the Vestrymen and presented the Bishop with a bound volume of Resolutions prepared by all the Vestries of the Diocese. Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley spoke for the laity and presented the Bishop with a wrist watch from the Vestries, representing the lay people. The Rev. Mr. Hohenchild spoke for the clergy and presented the Bishop with a television set and artist kit. The Rt. Rev. Beverley D. Tucker spoke for the Episcopal Church at large.

At 8:30 p.m. the Cathedral was filled with worshippers who assembled to honor the Bishop on the twentieth anniversary of his consecration. The service was read by the Rev. Messrs. Coombs, Maples, Sant, and Sweet. The Choirs, from the various parishes, sang. Addresses were made by Bishop Tucker and the Rev. Reinhold Niebuhr. The offering was added to the Fund for the Cathedral Foundation.

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# Convention Address - 1950

To the Delegates of the One Hundred-Eleventh Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The Diocese has suffered a severe loss in the death of the Rev. Arthur O. Steidemann, at the age of sixty-six years. For twenty-two years he has been the Minister of St. Thomas' Mission. Himself handicapped, as his people, though not wholly so, he has moved among them with immense sympathy and understanding and with Christ-like spirit. It will be difficult indeed to replace him.

Also I have to announce with regret that during the year the Rev. David T. Eaton, Rector of Grace Church, Jefferson City, has had to retire because of ill health.

Since last Convention the Rev. W. Chave McCracken, who for several years had been Assistant Minister of Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, accepted a call to Christ Church, Oberlin, Ohio. The Rev. Marc A. Nocerino, who had come to us from the Virginia Theological Seminary, was transferred to the Diocese of New Hampshire. The Rev. Roger W. Blanchard, who for seven years had been Rector of Calvary Church, Columbia, doing a magnificent work not only in the Parish but among the thousands of students who throng that educational center, was elected National Secretary for College Work under the National Council of our Church, and transferred to New York. The Rev. Arthur Geeson, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Cardonelet, which he was rapidly retoring to its former strength, reluctantly resigned because of ill health and was transferred to the Diocese of West Texas. The Rev. Robert L. Miller, Assistant Minister at Grace Church, Kirkwood, and in charge of the work at Epiphany Mission, left us to become Rector of Trinity Church, Flushing, Michigan. We are sorry indeed to lose these fine and able men.

Since last Convention we have had new accessions to the ranks of the Clergy. The Rev. A. Malcolm MacMillan came to us from Memphis, Tennessee, to be Rector of the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, which already has shown great response to his leadership. The Rev. Dr. Joseph W. Nicholson, a Professor at the Bishop Payne Divinity School, was elected Rector of All Saints' Church, St. Louis. Not only is All Saints' moving ahead rapidly under his leadership, seventy-three having been confirmed since his arrival last fall, but also he is making a great impression on the community. The Rev. G. Ernest Lynch, successor in the Second Church in Boston to Cotton Mather and Ralph Waldo Emerson, has been ordained to the Ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church and became Rector of Trinity Church, Hannibal, opening, I believe, a new day for our Church in that community. The Rev. Alban Richey, formerly Headmaster of Holderness School, has come to us from the Diocese of New Hampshire to be Rector of St. Jude's Church, Monroe City, and St. Paul's Church, Palmyra. Another door of opportunity swings open to us with his coming. And I might add that each of these men also has brought with him a superb wife, which is most important. I have often felt in ordaining men to the Ministry that the Wife should be part of the Ordination Service. For it is her Ministry as much as his. We are happy to welcome these splendid people to this Diocese.

Within the Diocese there have been several changes. The Rev. Ned Cole, Jr., Assistant Minister in Calvary Church, Columbia, where he had

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sembled on. The Sweet. ade by added done a fine work and was greatly loved, has become Rector of our Church in Jefferson City. He had been a Candidate for the Ministry from Grace Church in Jefferson City and the demand for his return to his own Church was unanimous. The Rev. Harold Bassage, Rector of St. Stephen's, Ferguson, has gone to Columbia as Rector of Calvary Church, succeeding Roger Blanchard in that most important work.

Early in June there will be three new arrivals. The Rev. Gordon S. Price, who for three years has been associated with our old friend, the Rev. Robert W. Fay, in the remarkable piece of work going on at Trinity Church, Columbus, Ohio, comes to us as Rector of St. Stephen's Church in Ferguson. The Rev. Lon M. Prunty, one of our own Candidates who graduates from the Virginia Theological Seminary early in June, comes to St. Louis to be Rector of St. Paul's Church. And Russell Murphy, another of our Candidates who graduates from the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge in June, will be ordained to the Diaconate the first Sunday in June and become a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral.

At this point I wish to express my gratitude to two men particularly. Missouri is not California, nor is it Florida. And retired Clergy do not come to this Diocese to enjoy the climate and to settle down for the rest of their lives! And, therefore, we are sometimes put to it through shortage of Clergy to maintain our work in the intervals between Rectors. But when the Rev. Mr. Geeson resigned at St. Paul's, Carondelet, the Rev. Dr. Charles Penniman, Director of our Educational Center, stepped into the breach and has been carrying on the Services ever since and will continue to do so until the new Rector arrives. And at Ferguson since the departure of Mr. Bassage the Rev. Dr. Edgar C. Taylor has been preaching every Sunday to large congregations and will continue there until the arrival of the new Rector. Not only are the Churches deeply indebted to these two men for this extra service which has meant so much to so many people, but I should like also to express great appreciation for the splendid service which they have rendered the whole Diocese by their willingness to take on this added burden.

There have been eight Ordinations, five to the Diaconate and three to the Priesthood. We have at the present moment five Candidates for Holy Orders and eight Postulants. There are nine of our men in the various Seminaries of our Church. There are twenty-four lay readers who are performing many useful services in their own Parishes, but special gratitude goes to Mr. Roy Schaffer for really heroic work at Trinity Church, St. Charles, and to Mr. Maitland A. Browne for similar service in Valley Park.. The Rev. Mr. Hohenschild is performing a valiant service in the leadership of this Lay Readers' League.

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Since last Convention there has been considerable building in the Diocese. In October Emmanuel Church dedicated the large addition to its Parish House; in the same month was dedicated the lovely St. Peter's Church in Ladue, and in November the new Parish House of St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson, was completed and dedicated. Only a few weeks ago we dedicated the handsome Gymnasium and Parish Hall for Grace Church and Grace Hill House, St. Louis. Also last summer All Saint's Church purchased a Rectory. St. Mark's Church, St. Louis, has begun the construction of a rectory which will be ready for occupation before the end of the summer. And within a matter of days now Christ Church, Rolla, will begin the construction of a new Church, and Holy Cross Church, in Popular Bluff the erection of a Parish House. The Diocesan Council has now committed itself to establishing a Mission in the Normandy area of St. Louis.

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At the last Convention I had something to say about the deterioration of the fabric of Christ Church Cathedral, suggesting that the Diocese commit itself to the creation of a Cathedral Foundation and that we raise the sum of \$15,000 a year for some years to come. This proposal was adopted by Diocesan Convention. I am glad to say that at the present moment for this year the sum totals \$11,260. The offering at the Convention Service this evening in the Cathedral is asked for this purpose in order that we may complete the fund for this year. I should like to express my gratitude to the people of the Diocese for their generous response to this proposal.

Also at the last Convention we were notified that there would be a considerable demand made upon us for increased giving to the missionary work of the whole Church. I am glad to say that 81% of this amount has already been subscribed in the Diocese to date and we hope that by the end of the year the full goal will have been achieved. Again I should like to express our gratitude to our people for their loyalty to this important program.

I come now to another matter, Last year Convention gave me permission, at any time it might seem wise, to call a special meeting of Convention for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor of this Diocese. While under the Canon Law of the Church a Bishop is required to resign when he reaches the age of seventy-two, it has never seemed to me quite fair in a Diocese of this sort, largely missionary in character, where a Bishop, if he is adequately able to do his work, should be moving constantly about the State, to remain in office for the full period. It seems to me only fair that the Diocese should have a younger man to serve its needs.

Consequently I am asking that this Convention reconvene on the first day of November, Wednesday, All Saints' Day, 1950, to elect a Bishop Coadjutor of this Diocese. I propose, as I said last year, to offer my resignation to the House of Bishops at next General Convention, meeting in the fall of 1952, to take effect on the first day of November that year. This would give the new Bishop and myself almost two years in which to work together while he is becoming familiar with the whole task of the Diocese. This would seem to be good diocesan strategy. It will be necessary, therefore, for this Convention to elect a Nominating Committee to canvass the field and to be prepared to place before the fall meeting of Convention the names of men who might be considered as possible candidates for this office. Of course the fact that the Nominating Committee will present names for the consideration of Convention will not preclude the nomination from the floor of Convention of some other person.

I shall be willing to divide the work of the Diocese with the new Bishop almost in any way agreeable to him. But as Canon Law requires me to be specific I would make the following proposals: first, I would propose that the new Bishop be responsible for the securing of all new men to fill vacancies which may occur in the Diocese where Canon Law gives him such responsibility. This selection of new men is one of the most important functions of a Bishop. Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church may not have much power when compared with Bishops of some other Churches. But in the selection of men he can change in a short while the whole complexion of a Diocese. As the new Bishop will have to work with the new man for many years, as I will not, he should have the responsibility and the privilege of making such nominations. I would except only my responsibility under Canon Law in the Cathedral of the Diocese.

Two, I would turn over to him the responsibility for all the missionary work of the Diocese, all advance work, and all assisted **Parishes**.

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Three, I would divide the Confirmation Services with him in any way agreeable to him, perhaps he taking half the Parishes and Missions one year and the other half the next year, subject to adjustment between him and myself. 01

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Fourth, I would expect him to assume, increasingly and rapidly, responsibility for the whole work of the Diocese as he becomes familiar with it. And I would express the hope, from the point of view of Diocesan strategy, that while he is Bishop Coadjutor he live somewhere outside of St. Louis County, first, in order that he may be identified with the rest of the Diocese in the minds of the rest of the Diocese and be not simply regarded by them as a St. Louis man, and second, in order that from this point of vantage cutstate he may be able to canvass more thoroughly the needs and the opportunities outside St. Louis County. This, however, is only a suggestion.

I should like to express three other hopes. First, this Diocese has established, I believe, a tradition within the whole Church. It stands for something quite real and quite specific. If I were to select a word for this Diocese, expressing what I hope we stand for, I would choose the words from St. Paul, "Stand fast, therefore, in the freedom wherewith Christ has made you free." I like to hope that this expresses the spirit of this Diocese. and that it has been in the freedom of Christ that we have approached such problems, for example, as Church Unity, the Marriage Question, and the social problems of the day. The Diocese also has stood, I believe, for personal religion and social action, believing that Christianity is the Truth and society will "work" only if based solidly on Christian principles and that we cannot evade the responsibility vigorously to try to apply these principles to the human situations we face. In a world such as this it is otfen necessary to compromise the great Christian ideals, but at least we can set ourselves to see to it that, if it is necessary to compromise, the compromise gives us a push in the direction of our goal, and not in the other direction. Many of us would like to see the tradition which this Diocese has established maintained, for we believe it means something particularly to many of the younger Clergy of the Church at large.

Second, this has been on the whole an exceptionally united Diocese, an unusually united body of Clergy. I have never known a group of men of whom it could be said more earnestly, more honestly, that the spirit was that of "all for each and each for all". I should like, therefore, to express the sincere hope that this new election will serve to strengthen and continue this unity. It would be a pity indeed if it were to become a divisive factor. I hope, therefore, that we shall be able to find some man, either within or without the Diocese, on whom there can be general agreement by the time Convention meets.

Third, I hope we will give the new Bishop adequate tools with which to work. There is great need for new advance work in the Diocese, and he should have sufficient funds with which to pursue these opportunities. We have done an immense amount of building in the last eight or nine years, but the money for this purpose has come largely from endowment funds. And I am afraid that our Parishes have rested too largely on the endowment funds and not assumed their full share of responsibility for the advance work of the Diocese. These endowment funds are now committed for some years ahead as fully as is safe. I hope, therefore, that as last year we called together a body of laymen to train them in the missionary needs of the whole Church in order that they might go out as missionaries for this purpose to our many Parishes, so this fall we may train men to perform a similar service for the Diocese, in order to make

our Parishes aware of the needs and opportunities in the Diocese — indeed, to make our Parishes aware of the Diocese! And I hope that in this way, by one of several methods, we will be prepared to give to the new Bishop funds by means of which he could pursue whatever opportunities open up before him.

I ask, therefore, that this important matter of the new Bishop, who will be responsible for the work of this Diocese for years to come, will be on your hearts and minds during the next few months. And that God may direct us to a wise choice. To this end I ask your earnest prayers.

Let me speak of one other matter. It is a curious day in which we live, a day in which this great and powerful Nation seems to have a very bad case of nerves. And to peoples abroad it might seem to indicate a loss of faith over here, a loss of faith in ourselves, in our principles, in our institutions. And just in a day when we have every reason in the world to have the greatest confidence in ourselves, in the basic principles which underlie this Democracy, especially when we consider the alternative which Russian imperialism offers to the world. But Democracy needs defense in depth, someone has said. And apparently that is what we lack. And it is this which Religion can supply. For the great principles by which this Democracy was created stem from the great Jewish-Christian tradition. These principles are kept alive by this tradition. But severed from their roots they wither. Much has crept into our American life which is not in accord with these principles. Perhaps our shakiness, our nerves, stem from those contradictions between our profession and our deeds. We are strong only as we are just, only as equal justice undergirds our institutions, only as we recognize that we are members one of another and that if one group, one class, suffers from injustice sooner or later we shall all suffer with them. It is to be hoped that we can quickly recover our peace of mind, close our ranks and get on with our main business which is the creation in this country of a richer, fuller life of equal opportunity, as far as is humanly possible, for all our people and the assisting of underdeveloped peoples abroad to achieve a better life. We now live in a world where anyone should be able to see clearly that in order to save ourselves we shall have to save others also, and that this great and prosperous nation must lead the way toward a better world for all peoples if we ourselves would live. Stephen Spender, in his chapter in "The God That Failed", says: "Let the peoples and nations who love liberty lead a movement throughout the world to improve the conditions of the millions of people who care more for bread than for freedom; thus raising them to a level of existence where they can care for freedom. The interests of the very few people in the world who care for the values of freedom must be identified with the many who need bread, or freedom will be lost."

During the past year the Church has talked much about One World in Christ and we were asked greatly to increase our giving for this purpose. But we know it will take much more than money if we are to have One World in Christ. Nor can it be built by the diluted Christianity of which most, if not all, of us are guilty — we 'gentle people of prejudice', to use Processor Overstreet's phrase, who take Christianity lightly, except as it touches the fringes of life, the beginning and ending of life but not as it applies to the whole of life, not the main business of life, for which Christianity really was intended; we, for example, who consciously or unconsciously violate the very basic principle of Christianity in our own minds by "drawing a line at a class", whether the class be Jewish people, or our people of Negro descent. or some other group. One World in Christ will not be won by that type of Christianity.

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Something much more profound is required of us in these days, a conviction, a depth of conviction, that Christianity is the Truth and that only as human society reflects Christian principles will society "work." It will take an utter commitment to the Will of God if we are to win this world. There are evidences of this new spirit — this is our hope — as seen, for example, in the revival of heroic missionary spirit in our Theological Seminaries — more men than can be accepted volunteering to go preferably to the most dangerous mission fields today, China, for example. And if we are to win the world, Religion will have to be the most central thing in our lives, as perhaps it has never been before. Christ, through whom God's purpose for man was made clear, must be the object of our highest devotion, our deepest loyalty. So that we take our stand at this Center; interpret life and events from this Center; make our decisions from this Center; act from this Center; draw our strength from this Center, which is Christ.

There are others who are trying to win this world, but not for Christ. It would be ironic if it were toward this group and not toward Christ that, for example, the colored peoples of the world were to look for the hope of the dawn of an age when they will be able to stand on their own feet, the equals of the white man. That would be ironic, and tragic: Christ, who two thousand years ago, not a hundred years ago, would gather the whole human family into one Brotherhood solidly grounded in the Fatherhood of God (and as a great modern historian says, "If the divine Father is left out of account it is quite impossible to devise or forge any other bond capable of holding the human race together"); Christ, in whom barriers between groups and classes were broken down; Christ, who identified Himself even with the least of mankind, with the most despised and rejected of groups, saying, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me"; Christ to whom every human person was sacred just as a human being, and because he is as such an object of God's concern; Christ, who offered men freedom, but freedom directed toward a goal which was the very antithesis of selfseeking - "Our Father, Thy Kingdom come, Thy Will be done on Earth." Christianity, we Christians, if we are to win the world, will have to take our stand here and then tolerate nothing, accept nothing as final in our human situations, which cuts across and denies His principles. Original Christianity as embodied in Christ was not a story of worldly success. It ended in a Cross; and someone saying, "He saved others; Himself He cannot save.'

This is the direction we must travel. Let us, Christian men and women, take renewed devotion to the Cause for which Christ paid the last full measure of devotion. For it will take a profound depth of conviction and integrity and courage and adventure which outmatches that which any other group can show, if we are to have One World in Christ.

And so let us conclude: May God in His great mercy grant us a peace on a foundation of Justice, and may the whole fellowship of Christ's disciples be so guided by His spirit that we may declare together the Christian principles for the ordering of human life and recall our suffering world to that obedience to God's Will in which alone can be found deliverance from the evils which afflict mankind.

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#### APPENDIX No. 15

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# Report of the Department of Christian Social Relations

The Department of Christian Social Relations has met regularly during the past year. It has taken action in behalf of legislation which seemed to your Department to be in accord with the mind of the Diocese as expressed in resolutions adopted at previous Diocesan Conventions. It has represented the Diocese at legislative hearings in behalf of adequate appropriations for relief, equal opportunities for all citizens irrespective of race, nationality or religion, and in behalf of the minimum wage in Missouri.

It has cooperated with the Metropolitan Federation of Churches of Greater St. Louis in a program of assistance for foreign students at Washington University, in helping to solve problems relating to the policy which shall be followed in St. Louis with regard to the adoption of children, and in a Conference on the Church and Economic Life.

It has assisted in the plan of our National Church for bringing Displaced Persons to this country but cannot report much success. As far as we know, there have been only three or four applications sent from the churches in this Diocese with the agreement to accept Displaced Persons.

Your Department is not presenting any resolutions on social issues for the consideration of this convention. It believes that the action of previous conventions has made it clear as to the general principles upon which the Diocese desires to have the Department proceed. It will therefore continue to take action against racial discrimination, in behalf of adequate relief appropriations, in behalf of more adequate and efficient treatment of patients in mental hospitals and in behalf of child welfare. In regard to any controversial matters upon which the Diocese has not already spoken, it will not act without the consent of the Diocesan Council.

The Department of Christian Social Relations desires adequately to represent the Christian convictions of this Diocese in social matters and urges either the Diocesan Council or parishes to appoint additional members who will take an active part in the work of the Department. The Department believes it should be the sole Diocesan agency in the Diocese, under the authority of the Diocese, to give leadership and information to the members of our churches in regard to social questions and to take action on these questions when the Diocese has taken a definite stand.

It is of course understood that nothing here stated in any way infringes upon the responsibility of parishes to be informed about and active in social matters.

### APPENDIX No. 16

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# Report of the Department of Christian Education

The Department of Christian Education submits this report to the Convention of the Diocese of its activity since our last Diocesan Convention held in May, 1949.

Our Department operates through five Commissions: Children's Commission — chairman, Mrs. J. Maver Feehan; Youth — chairman, The Rev. C. George Widdifield; Adult — chairman, The Rev. Edward Adkins; Leadership Training and Methods — chairman, The Rev. A. Malcolm MacMillan; Visual Aids — chairman, not yet selected. The Commission on Visual Aids has been added to our Department in place of the Commission on Parish Relations.

That which follows is, in large part, the reports of the Chairmen of these Commissions to the Department Chairman. Much credit is due to them for the tasks accomplished.

Members of the Children's Commission of the Department of Christian Education, as well as its Chairman, Mrs. J. Maver Feehan, participated in the following events since last May:

The annual Mite Box Presentation Service at the Cathedral was the big project for the year.

A project committee has been working on ways and means for presenting the Birthday Thank Offering and Christmas Box projects to the parishes so that they may become a more vital part of their church school program.

Two Bible Quiz programs, conducted by radio station KMOX, were participated in by several church schools.

The Children's Commission cooperated with the leadership Training Commission in planning and executing the annual dinner meeting for church school teachers and the clergy.

Mr. Widdifield reports that since the last Diocesan Convention the Youth Commission undertook three major activities on a Diocesan level:

1. The Summer Youth Conference. Departing from the tradition of holding a five day conference at Christian College, Columbia, our 1949 conference was held at the F. F. A. Camp in the Lake of the Ozarks State Park at Kaiser for a period of ten days. The setting of the State Park and the consequent necessity of a very different kind of conference life from what we had been used to at Columbia made this conference a much greater undertaking. At the Lake of the Ozarks we were living in a camping situation where we were entirely responsible for our living conditions. We found the experiment of living together in this kind of conference so much more valuable than previous conferences that the decision to continue with this in 1950 received the unanimous approval of the Youth Commission. Plans are now being made to hold the conference this year at the same location for the last ten days of August. The Rev. W. Murray Kenney has been appointed Dean of the 1950 Conference.

2. On the evening of Youth Sunday, October 16, a Diocesan Wide Service and Rally was held at St. Paul's Church, Overland. The program

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began with a service of worship at 5:00 p.m. conducted by the young people themselves, followed by supper, and reports from the delegates to the National Youth Convention in San Francisco. The rest of the program was an effort to help various parish groups in the organizing of their own youth work.

3. The Mid-Winter Youth Conference was held at the Church of the Ascension and at the Church of the Holy Communion over the weekend of February 10-12. The theme for the conference was "One World in Christ". The Rev. John DeForest Pettus from the Diocese of Arkansas was our headline speaker. During the conference Mr. Pettus made four addresses on the missionary motif of the Christian Church. Each address was followed by discussion sessions. The conference closed with a Festival Service at the Church of the Ascension on Sunday morning conducted by members of the Youth Commission.

In addition to these major activities, the Youth Commission sent two elected representatives, Joan Markmann and Marlowe Keller, and the Chairman of the Department to the National Youth Convention at San Francisco in October. Inasmuch as it was the first time our Diocese had been represented in this Triennial Convention, we found it extremely interesting and helpful in evaluating our work in the Diocese of Missouri as compared with other youth work throughout the church. We are happy to report that though much more needs to be done in our own Diocese, our work compares most favorably with the work of other Departments of Youth.

We have continued to be active in the Provincial Youth work being represented at all Provincial Conferences by our full quota of delegates and this year Norman Hoffman from the Church of the Holy Communion was elected the Provincial Treasurer.

For several years now we have been working under the experiment of having the Youth Commission made up of one youth representative from every parish of the Diocese, chosen by the parish, plus clergy advisors appointed by the Chairman. A commission thus composed seems to be the most adequate vehicle for reaching the greatest number of young people and keeping in close touch with the activities in the various parishes.

The Chairman of the Adult Commission, Mr. J. Maver Feehan, reports that his Commission lent its moral support to the new program being offered in adult education by the National Council and commends this program to the clergy and laity of this Diocese. Mr. Feehan's resignation was regretfully accepted by the Diocesan Department and the Rev. Edward Adkins has been appointed as the Chairman of this Commission. Mr. Adkins will act as a liaison person between the clergy of this Diocese and the Conferences on the new educational program of the National Church being held at the College of Preachers in Washington.

The Commission on Leadership Training and Methods sponsored the Annual Institute for Leadership Training. Upon the suggestion of the Metropolitan Church Federation, the Institute this year was held in January and February, rather than in the Autumn as had been done in recent years. This year's Institute met on six successive Tuesday evenings beginning January 10, at Eden-Immanuel Evangelical Church. The Institute was again conducted in collaboration with the Evangelical-Reformed Churches of greater St. Louis. The Rev. Arthur Geeson served as Dean and the Rev. Ernest Nolte, Minister of Education of the Missouri Valley Synod of the Evangelical-Reformed Church, served as Registrar. A total enrollement of 265 attended seven courses taught by an exceptionally capable staff.

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Mr. J. Maver Feehan and the Rev. Charles Rehkopf gave valuable assistance in planning and conducting the Institute, with the Rev. Charles Penniman as adviser.

Late in January the Commission cooperated with the Commission for Children in holding a dinner for Church School teachers and officers at the Church of the Ascension. Plans for the annual Lenten mission study and mite box offering program were presented at the dinner.

In February the Rev. A. M. MacMillan succeeded the Rev. Harold Bassage as chairman of the Commission on Leadership Training and Methods.

The Parish Relations Commission has had no formal meetings since last Fall. A recommendation was made to the Department to reorganize the Diocesan Department in line with the Department of Christian Education of the National Church, and we wish to say that we concur and heartily endorse this recommendation. The reorganization does not call for a Parish Relations Commission. Consequently, the Department accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Harold Woodward as Chairman of the Parish Relations Commission. Mrs. Woodward has done an excellent job for us and we will miss her as a Commission Chairman. She still remains a member of the Department of Christian Education.

We believe that our new Commission, that on Visual Aids, will be a valuable one for our Department. There is a great deal of material on visual aids and we hope to correlate it and make it available to the clergy of this Diocese. As yet we have been unable to select a person to have charge of this Commission.

Your Department is anxious to be of service to this Diocese and we urge that the outstate parishes take advantage of the help that this Department may be able to give them.

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### APPENDIX No. 17

# Report of the Department of Promotion

The primary responsibility of the Department of Promotion during the past year was the developing of the "One World in Christ" campaign in the Diocese. This project was carried through with excellent co-operation on the part of nearly every parish and mission. In spite of ice and sleet on Sunday, March 12, the response of the Diocese was surprisingly good.

The Department of Promotion was represented through Mr. John H. Leach on the level of national planning and training. Mr. Leach conducted training sessions for three other dioceses similar to the session which was held in Missouri in December for our own laymen. The Chairman of the Department attended the Provincial planning meeting at Oklahoma City in November.

Within the Diocese, the Department arranged two special meetings for the purpose of interpreting "One World in Christ". One was held at Christ Church Cathedral for the clergy and parish chairmen from greater St. Louis and one at Calvary Church, Columbia, for a similar group from the out-state parishes. The Department co-operated with Bishop Scarlett in setting up the training session for the lay spokesmen which was held at the Bishop's House in December under the leadership of Stewart Cushman.

The Department co-operated with the Bishop's office in arranging the training sessions for vestries and lay leaders which were held in nearly every parish and mission in the diocese during January. The response at these meetings was excellent. The Department, through Mr. Leach, assisted the National Council Department in lining up the radio facilities for March 12.

During the year the Department continued the publication of Missouri FORTH which is becoming established as a diocesan institution. There is much greater co-operation throughout the diocese when it comes to sending in news items, pictures and special articles. Through the capable assistance of Mr. Rehkopf and Miss Probert the expenses have been kept down and parishes and missions have been kept up to date on matters of subscription.

The Department was handicapped in co-operating with the parishes and missions as regards last fall's Every-Member Canvass because of the type of material prepared by the National Council. There was no good way by which diocesan needs and plans could be geared into the published literature the way it had been in previous years. The nature of the National Council literature did not commend itself for practicality.

The Department hopes to be of much greater service in next year's Every Member Canvass particularly in view of the enlarged missionary askings. The Chairman will attend a Provincial meeting on plans for next fall's Canvass at Kansas City on May 10.

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#### APPENDIX No. 18

# Report of the Department of Missions and Strategy

During the past year the old Department of Missions and the old Strategy Commission were discharged and were re-organized into a single body to be known hence forth as the Department of Missions and Strategy.

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This Department will be a Department of the Diocesan Council, and will serve a function similar to that of a congressional committee. In other words it will have no authority to make appropriations or financial decisions, but will have as its purpose the preparation of material for action by the Council, and the working out in detail the general instructions given it by the Council.

The Department shall consist of the Bishop as Ex-officio Chairman, an Executive Chairman, two Ex-officio members, the President of the Womans' Auxiliary and the Secretary of the Diocese, and five committees which shall be limited to four men each unless permission for additional members is granted by the Council. The five Committees composing the Department shall be as follows:

1. The Finance Committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to make a thorough study of the financial resources of the Diocese available for Missionary and Extension work in the Diocese, and to keep a current picture of the financial condition of the Diocese so that the Council of the Diocese may make its decisions and appropriations intelligently. It shall be the further duty of this committee to consider ways and means of increasing the resources available when the needs of the Diocese demand.

2. Committee on Clergy Salaries.

It shall be the duty of this committee to make list of all the clergy in the Diocese whose salaries are paid in whole or in part by the Diocese. They shall analyze the salary needs of each clergyman and shall appraise the capacity of his congregation or congregations to meet his salary requirements in order that the Diocesan grants may be used to achieve a wholesome salary standard for our clergy with a minimum of cost to the Diocese.

3. Committee on Church Property.

It shall be the duty of this committee to prepare and maintain a portfolio on all the real property for which the Diocese is responsible in whole or in part, and to study this portfolio with a view to making recommendations to the Council of the Diocese as to repairs, maintenance, debt retirement, etc.

4. Committee on Existing Work.

It shall be the duty of this committee to make a continuous study of all work now being assisted by the Diocese (other than Clergy salaries) with a view to making recommendations to the Council.

- a. For the improvement and advancement of the best Diocesan projects.
- b. For means of increasing self support on the part of Parishes and Institutions which are being aided by the Diocese.
- c. For the curtailment, discontinuance or alteration of work which is no longer needed, or which for any reason seems not to be fulfilling its intended purpose.

5. Committee on New Work.

It shall be the duty of this committee to make a constant search for opportunities for opening new fields of work within the Diocese, and to recommend to the Council each year those opportunities which appear to be most urgent.

The following Committee appointments were made by the Bishop and approved by the Diocesan Council: Executive Secretary-Rev. William H. Laird

- 2. Chairman of Clergy Salaries-Dean Sidney Sweet
- 3. Chairman of Committee on Church Property-Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild
- 4. Chairman of Existing Work-Rev. J. Francis Sant
- 5. Chairman of New Work-Rev. Charles D. Kran.
- Other members appointed to the Department were Mr. Ethan A. Shepley and Mr. C. R. Culling to the Finance Committee.
- Mr. Chester L. Brewer, Committee on Clergy Salaries.
- Mr. James E. Crawford and Rev. Harold Bassage to the Committee on Existing Work.
- Mr. William Moore and Rev. Joseph W. Nicholson, to the Committee on New Work.

Mr. Louis Thym, Committee on Church property.

Rev. Charles Rehkopf and Mrs. Clark C. Bland were appointed to the Department as Ex-officio members as secretary of the Diocese and President of the Woman's Auxiliary, respectively.

The Department of Missions and Strategy does not present this year a detailed report of all the work falling under the Department as the work was thoroughly reported at the last Convention and is printed in the journal, and as there have been only minor changes in the schedule of assistance. These can be noted by examining the report of the Diocesan Treasurer. There are however, five specific undertakings which should be made a matter of record as they represent definite advancement in the life and strength of the Diocese.

A grant of \$10,000.00 was made to Grace Hill House in 1948 toward the erection of a Gymnasium, which was completed this year.

- 1. A grant of \$10,000.00 was made to St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson, Missouri, toward the erection of a much needed Parish House. This Parish House was completed in the fall of 1949 and represents a great advancement in the work in Ferguson.
- 2. The sum of \$10,000.00 was appropriated by the Council of the Diocese upon recommendation of the Department of Christ Church, Rolla, Missouri, to be paid in two installments, \$5,000.00 in 1950 and \$5,000.00 in 1951, to be used in the building of a new church.
- 3. The sum of \$10,000.00 payable in two installments, \$5,000.00 in 1950 and \$5,000.00 in 1951, was appropriated to Holy Cross Church, Popular Bluff, Missouri, to be used in the building of a new Parish House.
- 4. The sum of \$6,500.00 was appropriated for the salary, rental allowance, and transportation for a minister to be secured for the development of a Mission Church in the Normandy area of Metropolitan Saint Louis.

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In addition to this the Department of Missions and Strategy was given power to act, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee of the Diocese, to purchase property and to erect a small building in the Normandy area. It is the intention of the Council that development in this area should begin this summer. The Mission in Normandy will be the first new Mission begun by the Diocese in ten years. For the past ten years the resources of the Diocese have been expended for the development of existing work, but a great need has been manifested to open new work in rapidly expanding areas.

5. A grant of \$8,000.00 was made to All Saints Parish, Saint Louis, to assist in the purchasing of a Rectory. This grant was originally in the form of a loan, but the great need for the expansion of the program for which All Saints Church is responsible lead the Department of Missions to recommend to the Council that this loan be cancelled and changed to an out right grant.

The reorganized Department of Missions and Strategy is so new that it is too early to claim beneficial results; but it is hoped by the members of the Diocesan Council that the efficiency of the Council's administration will be greatly enhanced under the new system.

# Report of the Woman's Auxiliary

To the Bishop of Missouri and the members of the Diocesan Convention, the Woman's Auxiliary submits the following report:

Our chief concern this year has been to bring to the women of every parish an understanding of the program of the Church, as it was presented at General Convention.

Five delegates and three alternates, in addition to the president of the 7th Province, represented the Diocese of Missouri at the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in San Francisco.

Last Summer four of the delegates attended a two day regional conference at Camp Mitchell in the Diocese of Arkansas. Three of these conferences were set up in this Province for the purpose of training delegates. We feel the 7th Province, pioneering in this type of educational work, has taken a forward step which will be followed in a great many Provinces before the next Triennial Meeting.

Two hundred forty-three women attended the Fall Diocesan meeting in Kirkwood, at which time "Highlights" of the Triennial Meeting were given by the delegates and alternates.

The Southwest, the Northwest and the Northeast districts each held meetings last Fall — to hear reports of the Convention. Four delegates attended a special meeting of the women of Calvary Church, Columbia this Spring, for the same purpose. Seventeen of the twenty-one Woman's Auxiliary groups in the St. Louis district had from two to five delegates come to their parish meetings with talks, bulletin boards of photographs and pictures of the Convention. So it is with a feeling of satisfaction that we come to the close of the year, knowing we have almost reached the "last woman in the last pew" with at least a glimpse of that great gathering of the Church from all over the world.

The unselfish service and devotion of the entire Executive Board has been responsible the past year for the opportunities the women of this Diocese have had for training in leadership, and general knowledge of our Church.

The Second Monday in September was devoted to a Leaders Conference — at which time parish officers and chairman — met with their corresponding Diocesan officers and chairman, to talk over plans, and how best to put those plans to work in the individual groups.

The Winter Diocesan Meeting at the Cathedral, with the theme of its program "One World in Christ" — gave the two hundred sixty women present, a clear picture of the great need the Church is facing, and the necessity of attaining the advanced budget adopted by General Convention.

In the middle of the Winter, the Presidents, Educational chairmen, Christian Social Relations chairmen and the United Thank Offering treasurers, met in the homes of their respective Diocesan chairmen to evaluate work accomplished, and to receive additional materials and inspiration in their departments. Specific study material was furnished relative to the advanced budget, and every parish auxiliary was urged

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to use this in discussion groups during the months of January, February and March.

One new branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was formed last Summer, in the Northeast district. The women of St. Jonn's Church, Prairieville, elected officers and chairman, and are co-operating in the program.

We continue to work in close co-operation with the Board of Religious Organizations and the St. Louis Council of Church Women.

The Diocesan Christian Social Relations chairman of the Woman's Auxiliary, is a member of the Christian Social Relations committee of the Diocese.

The President of the Woman's Auxiliary has this year been appointed an ex-officio member of the Diocesan Council.

The culmination of our year's work was the Spring Institute held at Emmanuel Church in Webster Groves, April 27th and 28th. The overall topic of this meeting was the theme of the Triennial -- "Called Unto His Holy Fellowship." This in turn was divided into three study groups, - Why a Christian Family? Why the Holy Scriptures? Why Missions? Three present, and one former member of the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary were here to participate in the leadership of the study groups. We feel that the way in which these three study groups were conducted was an interesting example of group planning. Visual aid, panel discussions, the huddle method and group discussions made the two days most stimulating and profitable. The planning of the entire program was an example of Group Dynamics, which we hear so much discussed at present. Last January the planning committee met with no very definite ideas of how the Institute should be set up, or what might be accomplished. Gradually, after long discussions of what is needed in personal lives and in parishes, the thoughts began to form. Soon concrete plans were laid, with an enthusiasm and inspiration which, after months of study and work, resulted in an outstanding Institute.

To Bishop Scarlett and to the Clergy for their co-operation and support, we express our sincere thanks.

We are deeply grateful to the Cathedral staff, and to those Churches that have so graciously held Diocesan Meetings.

Through the coming triennium we hope to make felt throughout the Diocese the message which came to us at Triennial — that we are all one in Christ, and are Called Unto His Holy Fellowship.

# Report of the City Mission Society

A Report to the Diocesan Convention held at the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, 1210 Locust Street on May 2, 1950— Only Canon George can give the "human-side" of the story of the

Episcopal City Mission, and I would not venture to make his report for him, but he has asked me to give you his greetings and to say how terribly disappointed he is not to be here today. He thought you might be interested to see this painting by one of his young colored friends at the Work House and this is the letter that came with it —

Father George,

I am sending you a get well present of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus our Lord — this present of which I hope you will keep in remembrance of me, M. W. J. G., City Work House. God will help you to be of His service again, and up and around. I have never met a nicer gentleman than the one that is here in your place. You and him are about the nicest persons I have met, here. Hope to see you soon, M. G.

At Canon George's request I will endeavor to give you an idea of what we are trying to do during his absence from the office since February 24th. But with this period of enforced rest and with expert medical advice we trust he will before long be back at his post again.

Canon George was at the Baptist Hospital — St. Luke's having no vacant bed at the time — where they were trying to find out what his trouble was. A friend in the East wrote him that it served him right for going to a Baptist Hospital. That if he had gone to a Presbyterian Hospital they would have been sure to find something the matter with him even if it was only "original sin." The Canon has not lost his sense of humor and laughed as he told me this.

Canon George's efficient Staff workers, Deaconess Brainerd, Mrs. Bernice Dunn, and his fine Lay Reader, Mr. David Kopplin, are carrying on under his direction. Members of the clergy have offered and are giving their help and Canon George is most appreciative of everything being done for him, but he does worry a great deal because he cannot, for the moment, be on the job himself.

We wish to pay tribute to a group of Lay Readers, who under the organization of the Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild, have been of great assistance to Canon George with his Sunday Services. They have taken entire charge of those Services at Koch Hospital during his illness, and Mr. Kopplin has carried out the Canon's full Sunday schedule at the Sanitarium. the Jail and the Workhouse.

We want you to know that an Evangelical friend, the wife of a Professor at Eden Seminary, has been playing for Canon George for the past three years, at these Services, and, we should add, without any remuneration. A beautiful contribution on her part.

The Deaconess carries on her fine work at Meramec Hills with both the white and colored girls, and her services are greatly appreciated by the City Officials in charge there. She also holds a service every Sunday morning at the Training School for about a hundred children.

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Deaconess Brainerd also spends much of her time at Koch Hospital ministering to both the spiritual and physical needs of the patients. That is an interesting story and we wish you could hear more about how the money you provide is used.

Mrs. Dunn, the Social Service Director, visits our own people at the City Hospital makes home calls on the families of the men in Jail and Workhouse, sees that the men have clean clothes when they appear in court, has their spectacles mended and their shoes repaired. She also looks after the laundry and baggage of the prisoners and has been helping sell things made in leather, by one of Canon George's clients at Jefferson City. And she attends to the Canon's correspondence. Meal tickets, instead of money, are given to those who need food and an arrangement has been made at two down town hotels to furnish food, the bill for which is sent to the office, thus safe guarding the men themselves who might be tempted to use the money for other purposes than food.

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One story will be of interest. I think, in connection with the Alcoholics Anonymous, part of our program. A man who asked for help was taken over by his sponsor, and for six months has been holding a job at the Jewish Hospital. His loan of \$15.00 from the City Mission Society was paid back promptly, and we are hoping for permanent results in this case.

The new Constitution of the City Mission Society is working well. Bishop Scarlett, as Bishop of Missouri, is the President of the Board. Other elected officers, with three Directors and the Chairmen of special Committees, conduct the business of the Society between meetings of the Board which are held less often. This Board is composed, in addition to the officers and directors, of the Rectors and two appointed, or elected Representatives from every Parish in Metropolitan St. Louis. Also, there are a number of Members at Large and Representatives from the Thrift Shop Board.

The Budget for 1950 is \$6,434.00, and is raised through a pledge from the Thrift Shop, a donation from the Diocese and individual and group Memberships. Anything from \$1.00 to \$100.00 a year makes one a Member. We are greatly indebted to Mr. John H. Leach for helping again with our publicity, and we are delighted to report more than a hundred new Members, and a satisfactory response from a second letter sent out to former Members, not heard from as yet in 1950. We have not raised our entire Budget, and our goal is still a City Mission Society Membership in every Episcopal Family in our Diocese.

The Thrift Shop has been, since 1937, a most valuable contributor, but the Board felt it necessary to reduce their pledge for 1950. Mrs. Edward Mallinckrodt opened her home for a delightful "bundle Tea" in November, and an entertainment is being planned in May on Mrs. Meredith Jones' terrace. But it is the constant bringing in of salable articles of all kinds to the Shop, such as bric-a-brac, silver-ware, vases, furniture, etc., besides clothing which is always needed, that keeps the Thrift Shop running and this is where we need help from all right now. Please carry this message back to your Parishes and remember we never ask for money, but just good articles for the Shop.

We want to thank Mrs. Peirce for the delicious luncheons she gives the Board, and we appreciate the services of all connected with the Cathedral who help us in many ways in our work.

Acting under Doctor's orders, Mrs. Gerhard was obliged to resign as Treasurer of the City Mission Society and her resignation was accepted with very sincere regret, and an expression of great gratitude for her invaluable services for so many years.

Miss Ada Probert, already our efficient Bookkeeper, has most graciously added to her duties the listing and depositing of the money from all sources, and we are very appreciative of what she is doing.

Mr. John D'Arcy is now the Treasurer, as well as the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

Miss Edna Kelley was obliged to resign and her resignation was very reluctantly accepted by both Canon George and the Board. In spite of her own full schedule, she finds time to drop in at the Infirmary and Sanitarium. The following postal pleased Canon George very much—

Dear Rev. George:

We have all been missing you and hope you are getting along fine. We are going to Church every Sunday, but we miss your not being there. Miss Kelley stopped in to tell us how you are. We are praying for you.

# Report of the Girls' Friendly Society

### Branches

The past year has seen an increase not only in new members in organized branches but also in three new branches—and four potential groups. All of these groups are Junior groups which is the age between seven and fourteen. And I think you would be interested to know that not only on the diocesan level but the national level also the percentage of juniors represents 59% of the total membership; the teenage group 29% and the balance or 12%, the over 21 year old member.

Branches are making a substantial contribution to their parishes both in a volunteer capacity and in actual dollars.

### Leadership Training

Leadership training courses have been held for new leaders, as refresher courses for older leaders, and for potential leaders.

#### Missions

The Program of the GFS always includes study and giving to the missionary program of the Church. This is over and above anything else that is done in the parishes and is part of a project which the national society adopts every year after consultation with the Overseas Department of National Council.

#### Cooperation

We make every effort to promote and share in any project which the Woman's Auxiliary is working on and also to do whatever we can to cooperate with the Diocesan Youth Council.

We have collected countless garments for Church World Service and some of the older members have done packing at the headquarters of CWS.

#### Camp

As always the entire membership looks forward to camp and thanks to Father Washburn we had one of the most successful camps we have ever had last Summer and full to capacity.

About half the money we need for camp comes from the interest on investments, the other half we raise and the appeal is always a popular one as people like to feel they are sending a little girl to camp for ten days.

#### Objectives

We are striving to spread the interest and give girls an opportunity to belong to the only group work agency there is for girls in the Church.

To develop deeper child-parent relationships within the group and

To help girls develop, through a well planned program, strong bodies, alert minds, creative relationships and spiritual strength.
