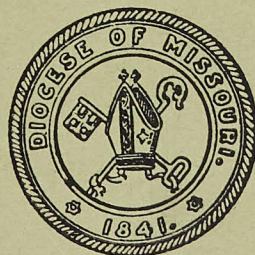

Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Constitution and Canons.
 - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
 - V. On the State of the Church.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for-reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,
Tuesday, January 24, 1933.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninety-fourth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 24, 1933, at 9:30 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Bishop Scarlett, the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D.

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Dean Schuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-four who were entitled to vote, twenty-four were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 17.)

The Secretary called the roll of the twenty-six Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from eleven were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted by more than a two-thirds vote of the Convention, as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That inasmuch as the duress of present economic conditions may have prevented the full payment of the Diocesan Assessment and the Church Pension Fund premiums, on the part of several parishes, that, under the provisions of Article 5, Sections 4 and 6, of the Constitution, all the parishes and missions of the Diocese be given seats and votes in this Convention.

It was ordered that the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention.

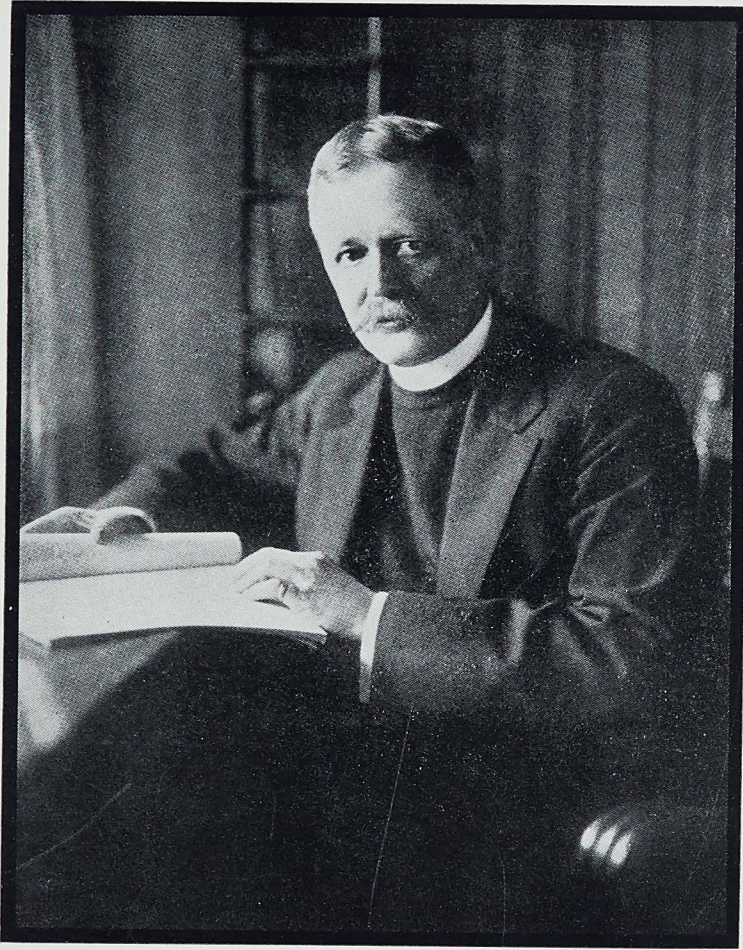
THE REVEREND CARROLL MELVIN DAVIS,
PRIEST AND DOCTOR

AN APPRECIATION

The Reverend Carroll M. Davis, suddenly "by the will of God, fell on sleep", while on sacred duty bent, as was his wont, on the second day of March, A.D. 1932. So quickly did eternal life come to him, he did but dream of heaven, and he was there. Wherefore we, The St. Louis Clericus, do hereby record our heartfelt appreciation of his nobility, modesty and unselfishness of character, of the greatness of the loss we have sustained, and of his distinguished services to us, to the Diocese, and to the Church at large. And do testify, with enthusiasm and love, to his unceasing devotion, fidelity and unvarying success in the several offices of dignity and trust which he held, and to the value of his ministry once again in our Cathedral and Diocese, on his happy return to the city of his home and love.

The life and ministry of the Reverend Carroll M. Davis were distinctly marked by two dominant characteristics — gentleness and strength. He knew God, the gentleness, the love and strength of God, and made them manifest in his walk and work. He was a God-conscious, a God-possessed man, and so obviously, that whether he ministered at the altar, in the pulpit, at the secretary's desk or to the man on the street, God's sorrowing troubled ones, lettered and unlettered, naturally turned to him for the sympathy, help, counsel and prayer, that only such a man of God could give; and never did they turn to him in vain. "Dean Davis," said a plain layman, "is one of God Almighty's gentlemen; he changed the whole course of my life for me." And it is not too much to say that the gentleness and strength of Carroll M. Davis changed the life of many people by inspiring the spiritless, heartening the discouraged, sealing avenues of ill, counseling the perplexed, and energizing the "faint and overborne", as by the dynamic of a godly purpose and will. Nor is it an exaggeration to say that parishes of this Church not a few, and at least one Diocese, are now being led by clergymen who have come under the quiet, vital-

izing power of this man of God, who combined in himself in an unusual degree, a teacher's knowledge with a Saviour's love, and whose spiritual gifts and executive ability made him to be universally respected, often almost revered, and always beloved.

Carroll M. Davis was a man of vision: not a visionary, but one practical and strong, with a vision splendid ever before him. He found, as its first Canon, a Cathedral in embryo, and a vision appeared—the vision of a Cathedral fully developed, worthy in every way, of this American Church and of its high mission to the gracious city that gave it birth. And not only this, but a spiritual home for the “forgotten of their fellow men”, and a true symbol of the divine heart of love that broods over us all with matchless sympathy and help. This was the Carroll M. Davis' vision, and he was steadfastly true to it with a compelling enthusiasm and a sweet reasonableness of plan and effort. But it was not quickly realized. There were doubters in the town in those days. Foundations must be laid for growth and support. He immediately struck out therefore for an adequate endowment. A Cathedral organization was effected. Little by little the Cathedral idea gripped the imagination of the Diocese. The Reredos and Bishop's Throne of almost transcendent beauty were erected. The impressive tower was completed. And the Diocese of Missouri is now the proud possessor of a Cathedral that is famed for its dignity, catholicity, spiritual atmosphere and vivid beauty throughout our land. The vision has been realized, and is a monument to the memory of the Reverend Carroll M. Davis that will instruct generations yet to come.

The Reverend Doctor Davis was a loyal Churchman no less than an obvious, ardent man of God. He was a champion of the Christian faith. He taught the gospel as this Church hath received the same and the Church as the Body of Christ, with all their major implications, and with no uncertain sound. Never could there be any doubt as to his theological or ecclesiastical position. He was affectionate and tolerant of men of all religious creeds and of men of none, but never a compromiser. He asked of others only what he required of himself: sincerity of conviction and frankness of expression. His religion was fundamentally simple withal. It was belief in God and belief in man. Diligence in duty's daily round and going about doing good marked his length of days. The “I am a man, and nothing that relates to man can be a matter of unconcern to me”, of Terrence, and Paul's “I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me” were, in the last analysis, the religion that Carroll M. Davis practised and professed.

We lovingly appreciate, thank God, and take courage from the inspiring example the life and ministry of Carroll M. Davis sets before us. It is the example of one of the most honorable and upright of men—of a man to whom old men hearkened and youth turned not away: of a friend whose loyalty knew no shadow of turning, and of a priest of God who set forth quietness, love and peace, and who, being “faithful in a very little”, was given “authority over much”. We accept and value this example as a challenge to our loyalty and following and as an inspiration in our work and social fellowships. Whatever our brother did, he did religiously and well. Yet his achievements, we hope to remember, were only a partial expression of the spirit within him. We sincerely mourn his passing, and assure the grief-stricken sister who lived most in the sunshine of his presence, of our loving sympathy in her irreparable loss, yet rejoice that the Reverend Carroll Melvin Davis, Priest and Doctor is in the unresting care of the Infinite One, who gave him to us, and to whom we have only given back his own,

Bishop Johnson, in behalf of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, read Resolution No. 8, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That this Convention enter in its minutes the following memorial which was adopted by the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Missouri:

THE REVEREND CARROLL M. DAVIS, LL.D.

The Reverend Carroll M. Davis was born at Campo Seco, California, September 9, 1857. He became a Deacon in the Episcopal Church in 1881, and was ordained a Priest in 1883. He was Rector of St. Paul's Church, Sacramento, California, from 1881 to 1887.

In 1887 Bishop Tuttle appointed the Reverend Carroll M. Davis General Missionary of the Diocese of Missouri. He was elected Senior Assistant of Christ Church Cathedral in 1889.

In 1896 he was elected Dean of the Cathedral to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Very Reverend Montgomery Schuyler, D.D.

In 1912 Dean Davis was elected Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Dallas, which office he declined to accept. After his declination, the members of the Cathedral Parish, to show their appreciation, raised a fund of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for improvements in connection with the Cathedral.

In 1917 he was made Chaplain of Base Hospital Unit Twenty-one, going with the Unit to France, where he served for a period of one year.

In 1921 he resigned as Dean of Christ Church Cathedral to accept the position of Secretary of the Department of Domestic Missions with the National Church, with headquarters in New York City. He served in this capacity until the close of 1930, when he retired and returned to St. Louis.

In 1925 Dean Davis received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Missouri.

Dean Davis not only served Christ Church Cathedral with great ability and devotion for twenty-five years, but he really made Christ Church a Cathedral Church for all St. Louis and the Diocese. He was quick to see that the rapid removal of its parish congregation westward created a crisis in its life, and at once applied his energies and organizing ability toward reaching the masses of people in the densely occupied commercial district of which this church is a center. He drew large numbers of young people to its various Social Service activities in the Parish House, and laboring men and women and employers of labor as well found him equally a friend and counselor and guide.

The Bishops of the Diocese have found in him a wise adviser and strong leader; the Clergy had in him a true friend and brother in Christ; the Conventions of the Diocese were always stimulated by his interest and guided by his keen insight in practical matters and by his ardent enthusiasm for the Kingdom of Christ throughout the world. Our Annual Diocesan Conventions will be the poorer for his going.

In addition to his devoted work at Christ Church Cathedral and in Missouri, he was one of the most capable and active Secretaries which the General Convention ever had, serving in such capacity for years. His clear voice, his eager and able handling of the Convention business, his quick and alert oversight over its proceedings were an unflinching help to its Presiding Officers, and few faces will be missed more than his from its triennial gatherings.

Dean Davis united within himself a wide variety of excellent capacities and gifts. Not only was he a man of scholarly habits of mind, a wise administrator, a good preacher, and a thorough organizer, but he tried to see things as Christ saw them. Above all else, he remembered that he served a Master who Himself was a Shepherd of souls, and called upon His followers to serve the souls for whom He died. No lovelier Priest ever knelt by the side of a sick bed, or commended the souls of dying men to God's mercy and love.

Dean Davis came to his death from a stroke which he received while driving to South St. Louis to keep a preaching engagement for a Lenten Service, Wednesday night, March 2, 1932, and was buried from Christ Church Cathedral, Saturday, March 5, 1932, the Bishop Coadjutor and the Dean officiating, and the entire Clergy body attending in vested processional.

We can never think of Christ Church Cathedral without thinking of him, whose fabric he did so much to adorn and beautify, and whose life and usefulness he so richly increased and enlarged. Nor can we think of our Diocesan Conventions without remembering his alert, able, and inspiring presence.

It was ordered that a portrait of the late Rev. Dr. Davis be printed on a full page in the Journal.

Dean Sweet led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers.

It was ordered that the Committee on the State of the Church make a report to the Clergy of the Diocese at least thirty days before the next Convention.

Dean Sweet introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

RESOLVED, That in the future, nominations for members of the Standing Committee and the Diocesan Council, and delegates to the Provincial Synod and General Convention shall be made from the floor of the convention by members thereof, and election shall be by ballot.

The Rev. Mr. George presented his report as Superintendent of the Episcopal Mission to City Institutions. (Appendix 14.)

The Rev. Mr. Taylor made an oral report for the Department of Social Service.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolution No. 10, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

RESOLVED, That the Ninety-fourth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri recommend to the presiding officer of the Province of the Southwest, and of the Provincial Council, the desirability of suspending the meeting of the Synod this year.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Eric M. Tasman of the National Council, addressed the Convention.

The Rev. Dr. Block introduced Resolution No. 11, which was adopted, by rising vote, as follows:

Resolution No. 11.

RESOLVED, That the Convention, conscious of his fine loyalty and devotion to the Cathedral, Diocese and Church through many years, sends its sympathy and affectionate greetings to Mr. Lee Orcutt in his illness, reminding him that we miss him in our deliberations and are remembering him in our prayers, eagerly hopeful for his steady improvement and ultimate recovery.

The Convention stood while Bishop Johnson offered a Prayer for Mr. Orcutt.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor introduced Resolution No. 12, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

RESOLVED, That that portion of the Bishop Coadjutor's address relating to industrial and social questions be endorsed as an expression of the mind of this Convention, and that the address be given to the public and Church press.

Mr. Mack called up for consideration the report of the Diocesan Council and the Finance Department. (Appendix 10 and 10a.)

It was ordered that the question of an appropriation for the University of the South and the relation of this Diocese to that institution be referred to a Committee to report to the next Convention.

Under the foregoing order, the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

The Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, the Rev. Donald Veale, and Mr. George C. Hitchcock.

Resolutions No. 1 and 2, in the Diocesan Council Report, were adopted.

Mr. Mack introduced Resolution No. 13, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 13.

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Council is hereby authorized to prepare and approve a Church Program Budget, based upon the pledges of parishes and missions for 1933; it being understood that all receipts from apportionments and contributions for the Church Program shall be divided in the proportion of 40% for the National Council and 60% for the Diocese.

Mrs. John F. Shepley presented her report as President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. (Appendix 15.)

The report of Mrs. Roy A. Campbell, Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary was filed with the Secretary. (Appendix 15a.)

The report of Mrs. James H. George, Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary was filed with the Secretary. (Appendix 15b.)

Mrs. Charlton Messick, President of the Board of Managers of the Episcopal Home for Children, presented her report. (Appendix 16.)

Mrs. Hugh H. C. Weed presented the report of the Girls' Friendly Society of the Diocese. (Appendix 17.)

The Rev. Mr. Heaton introduced Resolution No. 14 (which was adopted unanimously by the Clericus of the Diocese of Missouri, January 23, 1933), which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Council be requested to arrange for each Vestry or Bishop's Committee in the Diocese to be visited annually by a committee appointed by the Diocesan Council, with the object of obtaining from the Vestry or Bishop's Committee the acceptance of an apportionment to be mutually agreed upon by the two parties, said amounts to be thereafter regarded as the total apportionment of the parish or mission for the ensuing year; and that a plan similar to the one now used be employed by the Finance Department for making preliminary apportionments before discussion with the several Vestries and Bishop's Committees.

Mr. Williamson presented the report of the Department of Religious Education. (Appendix 18.)

The report of the Treasurer of the Department of Religious Education was filed with the Secretary. (Appendix 18a.)

Dean Sweet presented the report of the Field Department. (Appendix 19.)

The Rev. Dr. Block presented the report of the Department of Missions and Church Extension. (Appendix 20.)

The Rev. Mr. Coxe introduced Resolution No. 15, to amend Canon 27, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

It was ordered that the Bishop be requested to appoint a Committee to express the sympathy of the Convention to the family of the late Leslie F. Potter, a former Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood.

Under the foregoing order, the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

The Rev. Dr. Kevin and the Rev. Dr. Jones.

It was ordered that the next Convention meet in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the minutes of this Convention.

It was ordered that further consideration of the proposed amendments to Canons 20, 21 and 27 be postponed until the next Convention.

The Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX No. 1.

**The Address of the Bishop to the Ninety-fourth
Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.**

My address is brief, due to the fact that I was actively engaged in the work of the Diocese in 1932 less than seven months.

My first word is a word of warm appreciation and thanks to the Diocese of Missouri for the great kindness and courtesy extended to me in requesting me to take a vacation of several months last winter and early spring, in the hope that complete rest might restore me to health and strength. We went from the General Convention, Mrs. Johnson and I, to my former parish in Redlands, California, where I was Rector for five-and-a-half years, beginning in the month of January, 1899. It was, as a matter of fact, the only parish of which I was Rector until I was elected a Missionary Bishop to assist the Missionary Bishop of South Dakota, to which office I was consecrated, November 2, 1905. In Redlands I found many of my former parishioners and many old friends who were members of other communions than mine. And we greatly enjoyed our sojourn in Redlands. We had many beautiful automobile drives, including drives to San Diego and to Coronado Beach and to Los Angeles and Pasadena; also drives into the near-by mountains which were covered with snow. We returned to St. Louis early in April. Since then, with the exception of a few weeks spent in our old home in Connecticut, I have been busy at my work in the Diocese of Missouri. I want to express my very grateful thanks to Bishop Scarlett who was entirely responsible for all the work of the Diocese during my absence of six months, and who is taking such a helpful part of the work since my return.

Three Bishops of the Church have entered into the Life Beyond during the past year.

The Rt. Rev. Anson R. Graves, D.D., LL.D., retired Bishop of Laramie, died at his home in La Mesa, California, lacking only four months of being 90 years of age.

The Rt. Rev. Cameron Mann, D.D., LL.D., Second Bishop of South Florida, died at his home in Winter Park, Florida, February 8, 1932, being almost 81 years of age. Bishop Mann was at one time a Presbyter of the Diocese of Missouri, as Rector of Grace Church, Kansas City, in the days before the Diocese of West Missouri was set off from the Diocese of Missouri.

The Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., consecrated Bishop of North Carolina in 1893, died of blood poisoning in a Hospital in Charlotte, North Carolina, December 27, 1932, being 82 years of age.

With the close of the year 1932, I completed 21 years as Bishop Coadjutor and Bishop of Missouri. Among the first friends whom I made when I arrived in St. Louis in January, 1912, were Captain and

Mrs. Lorraine F. Jones, of Kirkwood. Captain Jones, a man greatly beloved, went to his well-earned reward several years ago. On Sunday, December 18, 1932, Mrs. Jones was called home. A deeply spiritual woman, she was also always full of joy and had an unusually keen sense of humor. She had been most generous in her friendship to me during all the twenty-one years. Many happy visits I have had at Ivy Lodge. I shall never forget how kind she was in coming for me and taking me out to her home and caring for me, three years ago last summer, when I was recovering from a severe illness which had kept me in St. Luke's Hospital nearly three months. I am glad that I was privileged to have prayers with Mrs. Jones in her home not many days before the Master came and called for her. And I am especially grateful to the Rev. Dr. Kevin for his courtesy in asking me to share with him in the service in Grace Church, Kirkwood, and in God's Acre where we laid her body down.

"The strife is o'er, the battle done;
The victory of life is won;
The song of triumph has begun.
Alleluia."

We all were made very happy when the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, LL.D., retired from his post as Secretary of the Department of Missions with the National Council and returned to St. Louis, two years ago. He at once entered into active participation in the affairs of the Diocese, and supplied services in various vacant parishes and missions as opportunity afforded. On the evening of Wednesday, March 2, 1932, as he was driving to South St. Louis to preach at a Lenten service, he was taken suddenly ill and died almost immediately. He was always busy, always kind, always friendly, always trying to be helpful to others. He went as he would have liked to go, with his harness on, in the service of the Master whom he so much loved and whom he so faithfully served. We miss him sadly from our gathering to-day.

"Jesus, Thy name we bless,
And humbly pray that we
May follow him in holiness,
Who lived and died for Thee."

Miss Emma Luther was a most devoted helper of the work of the Diocese during many years. She did valuable service at Herculaneum, also at the Prince of Peace and at Grace Holy Cross in St. Louis. On Christmas Eve, a year ago, as she was coming home from shopping in her native town, St. James, Missouri, she suddenly collapsed and fell to the sidewalk. The news of her passing reached me in California and was a great shock to me.

Mr. Robert Robinson, many years Senior Warden of Trinity Church, Hannibal, finished his earthly course early in the morning of Tuesday, September 6, in the Levering Hospital at Hannibal. Mr. Robinson was a native of Ireland, and 84 years old. He gave of his time and his ability for the upbuilding of the community in which he lived along moral, educational and religious lines, and enjoyed the esteem and affection of all with whom he came in contact.

I am informed that Trinity, Hannibal, also suffered the loss, in April, 1932, of Mrs. Tully Murphy Davis, a musician and composer of

ability, and widow of the Rev. John Davis, a former Rector of Trinity, Hannibal.

Miss Julia Upshaw was for years the faithful overseer of Brittain Hall in St. Louis, entirely devoted to the lads who were her special care. She fell on sleep in St. Luke's Hospital in the city of St. Louis early in the month of October. I greatly regretted that an appointment which I was compelled to keep, up in the northern part of the Diocese, made it impossible for me to stand beside her casket with her Rector and the members of her family in the solemn hour of her burial from St. John's Church. I was told that more than twenty of her "boys", as she liked to call them, were at her funeral. She was a dear, devoted, Christian woman, and she is greatly missed by all who knew her and loved her here.

Mr. Albert Burgess, the first Negro admitted to the practice of law in the city of St. Louis, died at his home in this city on the evening of November 30, in the 76th year of his age. More than 50 years ago, he was elected to serve on the first Vestry of the newly-organized parish of All Saints, St. Louis, and was appointed Senior Warden. During all the years that followed, Mr. Burgess was re-elected to the Vestry and appointed by the Rector to the office of Senior Warden. For half a century Mr. Burgess represented the parish of All Saints in the Diocesan Convention, and was constant in attendance at its sessions. We miss him to-day, and we shall miss him in the years that are to be. I was glad to be privileged to minister to him a few days before God's finger touched him and he slept; and also to have a part in the burial service at All Saints' Church and at the cemetery.

Mr. Brady S. Thompson, Senior Warden of Trinity, St. Louis, finished his earthly course in the month of October. The wife of Mr. William H. Wyatt, of St. Augustine's, St. Louis, died suddenly in September. Miss Anna Klug, associated with the work of St. Thomas' Mission for the Deaf, St. Louis, went to her reward December 11.

We all were shocked and saddened when we read in the newspapers that Edward Mallinckrodt, III., had come to his death in an airplane which plunged into the bay near Nahant on the Massachusetts coast during the Christmas holidays. Our loving sympathy goes out to the father and the mother in their sad and sudden bereavement.

I was greatly distressed in the summer to receive a telegram in my Connecticut home informing me of the death of Betty Small, as we always called her, in the new home to which she and her husband, the Rev. Thomas L. Small, had but recently moved, in Oil City, Pennsylvania. "Tommy" Small, as we called him while he was here, with his family, came to our Diocese from the Diocese of Washington, in October, 1923, and he did here a work which was worthy to be remembered. Our loving prayers are with him in his deep affliction.

I first knew Dr. Newman R. Donnell in Herculanum, many years ago, when he was a practicing physician there. I was greatly grieved to learn of his death here in the city of St. Louis a few months ago.

Not many weeks since, Mr. and Mrs. John G. Lonsdale were saddened by the going out from their home of a son of Mrs. Lonsdale, a young man by the name of Battle. I was glad to be able to call to offer sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Lonsdale and to the widow of Mr.

Battle; and I regretted that other duties made it impossible for me to stand with them all in their grief at the burial.

Bishop Scarlett has undertaken the task of finding and recommending Clergy to fill vacant parishes, and we have been extremely fortunate in those who have come into the Diocese in the past two years.

The Rev. Arthur H. Beardsley, living in Cape Girardeau, has charge of Christ Church in that city; also of Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff; St. John the Evangelist, Bloomfield; and the unorganized missions at Chaffee and Illmo. I was in Cape Girardeau a week ago last Sunday, and I found the work there going splendidly.

The Rev. Oral Virgil Jackson has charge of Christ Church, Rolla; Trinity Church, St. James; St. Andrew's, Cuba; Trinity, Salem; and St. John's, Sullivan. And all to whom he ministers are delighted with his ministrations.

The Rev. J. Presley Pound has charge of St. James', Macon; Trinity, Kirksville; and Christ Church, Moberly; and is putting new life into that part of the field.

The Rev. Robert O. Kevin, Jr., Ph.D., is Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood, and I hear from members of the congregation that he is doing a splendid piece of work.

The Rev. J. Manly Cobb is demonstrating fine leadership as Rector of Emmanuel, Webster Groves, and is commending himself to the members of the parish and to the people of the community.

The Rev. Hulbert A. Woolfall is putting new life into St. Peter's Parish in St. Louis, and is highly esteemed by all the members of his congregation.

The Rev. George A. Wilson is doing as well as any man can do with the rather difficult parish of St. Alban's in St. Louis, and he and his people are looking hopefully toward the future.

The Rev. Early W. Poindexter is carrying forward most successfully the work in the Church of the Holy Apostles, St. Louis, which is the former St. Philip's Parish united with St. Timothy's Mission and St. Luke's Mission under the leadership of the Rev. Lee W. Heaton.

Mr. Heaton is now building up Mount Calvary, St. Louis, and the Church of the Holy Innocents, St. Louis; and both of these congregations are enthusiastic because of his new leadership.

Calvary, Columbia, is still vacant, though the services are being supplied by a most efficient Lay Reader, and Bishop Scarlett tells me that he is hoping soon to be able to recommend a man who is specially fitted to carry on that work.

St. Stephen's, Ferguson, is being cared for by Mr. Fred G. Williamson, Lay Reader, and Bishop Scarlett informs me that he hopes soon to have a man whom he can nominate to fill the vacancy.

We have had a rather difficult year in the matter of raising funds to carry on the Missionary Work of the Diocese of Missouri and to pay our "expectations" to the National Council. The "expectations" which the Diocese of Missouri sent to the National Council a year ago for the year 1932 were \$18,000.00. The report of the Treasurer of the Diocese shows that we paid to the National Council in 1932 a total of \$14,721.02. I greatly hope that 1933 will be a better year than 1932. And I am exceedingly anxious that we pay to the National Council in 1933 the entire amount which we inform the National Council that we "expect to pay." There is no possible way that the Missionary Work of the Church can be carried into all the world if the Diocese of Missouri and other Dioceses of the Church default in the payments which the National Council is notified may be expected. The 1933 Budget of the National Council is \$4,500,000.00. There are 1,254,227 listed members of the Church in the United States. If each member of the Church should make himself or herself responsible for a pledge of **ten cents per week** during this year 1933, there would be available for the Budget fixed by General Convention for 1933, more than \$6,271,135.00; or more than \$1,771,135.00 in excess of the total Budget fixed by the General Convention for the year 1933. I earnestly and eagerly hope that the Diocese of Missouri will do her full share.

**The Bishop Coadjutor's Address to the Ninety-fourth
Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.**

To the Delegates to the Ninety-fourth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

My Friends,

May I this year submit a very brief report of the work in my field.

Two of our clergy have been transferred to other dioceses: the Reverend O. H. Glyn Lloyd, formerly Rector of St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson, has been transferred to the Diocese of Lexington; the Reverend David R. Haupt, formerly Rector of Calvary Church, Columbia, has been transferred to the Diocese of Minnesota.

On the other hand, the staff of the Diocese has been greatly strengthened by the accession of three new members: the Reverend Robert O. Kevin, Ph.D., formerly Assistant in St. Stephen's Church, Philadelphia, has become Rector of Grace Church, Kirkwood; the Reverend J. Presley Pound is now Minister in charge of our churches in Macon, Kirksville, and Moberly; the Reverend Hulbert A. Woolfall, formerly Rector of St. Mark's Church, Washington, D.C., has now become Rector of St. Peter's Church, St. Louis. We are very happy to welcome these new friends into this Diocese: in each instance the response of each parish to its new leader has exceeded even our highest expectations, and their coming into the Diocese adds new strength to the Church.

During the past year there have been in this Diocese three ordinations: on March 24th the Reverend George A. Wilson was ordained to the Priesthood; on June 14th the Reverend O. V. Jackson was ordained to the Priesthood; on October 27th the Reverend J. Presley Pound was ordained to the Diaconate.

On March 2nd, Mr. Andrew E. F. Anderson was admitted as a Postulant, and six months later was admitted as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

There have been two other clerical changes in the Diocese: the Reverend Lee W. Heaton, formerly Rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles, St. Louis, was nominated to take charge of Mt. Calvary Church and the Church of the Holy Innocents. On November 16th Holy Innocents Parish, by unanimous vote of the Parish Meeting, assumed the status of a mission. The Reverend Early W. Poindexter, formerly Assistant Minister in the Church of St. Michael and St. George, St. Louis, was elected Rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles.

The statistics of my official acts during the past year will be printed in their proper place in the Diocesan Journal.

May I add that there is every reason to be greatly encouraged regarding the work of the Church in this Diocese. In spite of the difficult times, we have been able, after a lapse of some years, to establish a Rector in Macon; to open our Church in Kirksville, which for many years has been closed, and where the people have welcomed

our coming with very great enthusiasm; and there is every hope that the Church in Moberly will shortly be revived. Also we have been able to give to Mt. Calvary Church, which for some years has been without a clergyman, its own Minister, who also is in charge of the work in Holy Innocents' Church. In each case the response has been more than encouraging. Furthermore, we expect within a few weeks to fill the vacancies at present in Calvary Church, Columbia, and St. Stephen's Church, Ferguson.

These are difficult days but the Church has always thrived on difficulties. The challenge which faces us today is greater than ever "to preach release to the captives, to set at liberty them that are bruised, and to proclaim the acceptable Year of the Lord." Judging all our modern problems so far as in us lies, by the Mind of Christ, in His Spirit let us go forward courageously and fearlessly.

When we turn to more general affairs we would agree that we are moving into a new era. What the changes are ahead of us we do not know. But we are faced now in America with the issue Thomas Huxley saw so clearly when over half a century ago he visited our shores, and in his speech at the opening of Johns Hopkins said he was often impressed by what American visitors in England told him of their satisfaction in visiting the streets of old cities and climbing the battlements of old towns whose names are part of our common inheritance. But, Huxley said, anticipation had its charm no less than retrospect, and what an Englishman felt on coming to our shores was the tremendous future of America. He was not at all impressed by our bigness. Size was not grandeur, and territory did not make a nation. The fateful question was what we were going to do with all these things. What was the end toward which we were striving. And we could be perfectly sure that our only safeguard, our only guarantee of success, was in *the development of the moral worth and the intellectual clearness of the average citizen*. And our own historian, Mr. Adams, in his "Epic of America", puts the same issue before us. He calls attention to the confusion which has existed for some years in the minds of the American people, the confusion of business and virtue, the feeling that "what is economically right is morally right"; so that, having accepted this principle, we could surrender our souls to the captains of industry, to the financiers, with the result that they have bankrupted us all. For we had forgotten the simple fundamental principle that nothing is more impractical than the *merely* "practical man", and that without Vision the people perish. And he tells us the time has now come when we must decide what the ends are which we have in view in America. What are the basic values in which we put our trust, the goals for which we will strive. If we are to continue giving ourselves to selfishness, physical comfort, and cheap amusements, if money and power are to be the only badges of success, if our object is to make the individual man primarily only *a larger consumer of economic goods*, if we are to continue our present maldistribution of wealth so that in a land of plenty millions face dire insecurity, then we shall never become a great Democracy. But if our object is to prepare a material base on which men can live sane and civilized lives, if we will cultivate and develop the American Dream of the fullest opportunity for every man to develop to the utmost of his capacity intellectually, morally, spiritually, if we will strive toward high spiritual goals, then we shall further the great American Epic. But the Epic without the Dream means nothing.

What do we want? What do we want here in America? What kind of America would we like to see? I begin with an apology, for in

the short time at my disposal I can select and sketch only two or three phases of the question.

I know we would all agree that we want a warless America. There is no question about that. When we think of the millions of men who in the World War gave up their lives for their countries; when we remember our pledge to those who went down in the storm to make that war end War; when we think of the millions more who perished through famine and pestilence as a direct result of war; when we think of the toll of shattered dreams and broken homes and fatherless children which followed in the wake of war; when we think of the loss of wealth piled up by human toil to the amount of hundreds of billions of dollars, much of which was simply blown up in war, put to no productive use whatsoever; when we think of the moral deterioration (to say nothing of the physical distress) which is entering into the lives of millions of people through unemployment (a situation which can be almost directly traced to the war); when we think of the destruction of all these simple human values, measured in human lives and hopes and fears, and place this against the background of the institution of War, then War stands a billion times condemned! And we can go further. If War is inherent in our present competitive economic system with its drive for markets and raw materials, if there is no way out under our present system, if that is the case, then the System stands a billion times condemned also! And it is the task of our industrial statesmen as well as our political statesmen to convince us, if possible, that there is a way out under our present social order. Otherwise we have no doubt as to what will happen. The Red Horseman of Communism will ride through the world. Because Humanity simply cannot stand the cost in human values of the institution of War. And we, as Christians, if we have in mind, and if we agree with it, the Lambeth Conference resolution to the effect that War is *utterly incompatible with the spirit and teachings of Jesus Christ*, then we must gird up our loins and be prepared to run the risks which that implies.

For Humanity is as subdivided as ever into hostile and competitive states. If Nationalism is to be the ultimate authority of states, if states are to be free to seek their own interests without respect to the rights and interests of others, then indeed we are doomed. We have to find some way of knitting together the torn and tattered garment of Humanity; we have to discover some method of integrating the peoples of the world; we have to find some common, civilizing conception, some universal principle, and, by accepting it, live together in peace and fraternity; we must needs find some major loyalty to which all the minor loyalties of life must conform, some ultimate loyalty to which even the state is obligated. And such a major loyalty, such a universal principle, is inherent in Christianity. Above all nations is Humanity, and above Humanity is the one God, Who is the ground of all existence, in Whom all men live and move and have their being, Whose relation to every individual is potentially identical with His relation to any individual, Whose Holy Will, Whose all-sustaining Beauty runs through us all and doth all unite.

But I quite agree with those who argue that if we are to wait for the slow advance from person to person of this conception and this spirit, we are lost; that not so shall we win the race against catastrophe; that we must find some way of translating our aspirations into political action, of opposing power with power. Privilege seldom gives up privilege except under social tension. Certainly we must do all in our power to strengthen any international organizations which would integrate the peoples of the world. We must think through the econ-

omic basis of modern war, and the relation to it of tariffs and war debts, and the like, and find the way of expressing our conclusions through political strategy. And certainly one of the first tasks is to take War Debts from the fore-front of the present world picture. For War Debts have been proven fatal to creditor and debtor alike and must be drastically revised. Delay only lengthens the period of our present distress and misery, in which all peoples share. And we ourselves must be ready to make whatever sacrifices are necessary to re-adjust our own system to the new world situation.

Second, I think we would all agree that we want an America in which our industrial system serves human values and in which human values are dominant. The greatest shock to confidence in our present system is the present army of unemployment. For beyond the economic distress of it is the moral deterioration which follows it, the loss of self-respect which comes from being useless, the undermining of a workman's capacity for good work in the future, the breeding of resentment against society. Furthermore, we are told today by our industrial engineers that one of the ways in which this depression differs from every other is through the immense technological development which has gone on in this country particularly during the last twenty-five years, through which the machine process has been vastly extended and accelerated with the consequent dislocation of the human factor in the industrial process. And they tell us that as this technological development continues, as it is bound to continue under our present system of free competition, there will be an ever larger army of *permanently unemployed and unemployable men and women in America*. Now when we stop to consider what that means not only in economic but also, more important, in moral terms, what that will do to the fiber of those people of ours who are permanently relegated to the category of useless beings, we begin to wonder what the future holds for us. And we are quite certain that somehow machine development must be *controlled or compensated* in the interests of the human factor in the equation, the men and women in industry, and the little children who are dependent upon them. Now, if under our present system of free competition this can be done, well and good. Personally I doubt that it can be done on this basis. But again, this is a task for our industrial statesmen, to discover whether through a planned economy and a planned social order the machine can be made to serve and not destroy precious human values; whether they can end the present national scandal, resulting from the fact that in the year 1930 when men were being turned by the millions into our streets and pay rolls cut by several billions, dividend disbursements reached a record-breaking high, and even today the dividend disbursement curve is still immensely higher relatively than the wage disbursement curve; whether they can find the way, through insurance or other methods, of giving our people some measure of protection against the four major hazards of life, unemployment, sickness, accident, old age; whether they can furnish our people with the fair sense of security which at present they are denied.

On no group does the present distressing situation bear quite so cruelly as on the Negro population, inadequately schooled, inadequately housed, lacking sufficient hospital care, so often dismissed from what jobs remain to make way for white labor. Certainly the most elementary Christian principle of respect for the significance and worth of every human being, regardless of race or color or creed, would demand of us that we ally ourselves in action with this minority group and assist it in achieving the respect, the rights, the opportunities, to which simple justice entitles them.

Third, we would like to see, would we not, an America in which moral and spiritual values once more are restored to their proper place. This is not the first time in history, my friends, when, as the idea of God grows dim, ethical values grow dim also. And the whole Insull affair in Chicago is only a symptom of the ethical situation in some areas of our business world. No nation, no person can escape the connection between *its faith and its deeds*, between what it believes and how it acts. If we believe, as John Adams said back in 1808, that there is 'one material which forms an aristocracy which controls and rules our country; that material is wealth; talents, virtue, services, sacrifices count very little with us', if that is our faith we shall act accordingly, and moral and spiritual values will be relegated to a position where they are paid polite, though ever decreasing, respect but given no obedience whatsoever. That the idea of God has grown dim is unquestionable. A college senior said not long ago that God to him was "a great oblong blur". Just what he meant by that no one knows, except you know that in his mind God was a blur! God is a blur in many minds. Some of the reasons for this are not far to seek. One reason is that an Ethical Religion cannot long survive in the mind of a man, if in major areas of his life he is forced into practices which in his heart he knows are unethical. Another reason has been the scientific materialism under which we have lived for the last few decades. For if the universe is only a machine, an aggregation of mechanical forces, if Intelligence, Purpose, Spirit, are to be ruled out, then there isn't much hope for spiritual aspiration or for God. But I call your attention to the fact that this picture is in the process of readjustment. Dr. Robert Millikan, who received the Roosevelt prize for the highest achievement in science, and was at that time described as "one who has explored both the infinitely vast and the infinitesimally minute, . . . a prophet of the new time bearing to bewildered man, alike from atom and from star, news of the presence and the goodness of God", said the other evening in his address to the Academy of Surgeons that his researches had forced him to the position of *indeterminism* and not *mechanism*, and ended by quoting Shakespeare: "There are more things in heaven and earth than are dreamed of in your philosophy". No, a change is coming over the picture. Sir Wilfred Grenfell, the beloved doctor of Labrador fame, came over to me after the address, his face shining, and said: "You see, that is the position of modern science; there is the loophole for Idealism; that's where you find God." Now, without pressing this too far, without generalizing unduly, without placing into the mouths of scientists conceptions which they may not be willing as yet to accept, one is content in passing merely to call attention to the fact that the picture is changing today and that the path intellectually is being opened once more for the spiritual aspirations of mankind.


And if, my friends, there is an objective Reality behind all spiritual experience, if there is a deeper Spirit in the universe which answers to the deepest needs of the spirit of man, coming to him "when he is bewildered as a light, when he is in terror as a strength, when he is in joy as a glory"; if it is possible for the spirit of man to make contact with the Holy Spirit of God whereby 'one's world becomes radiant and one's life a high romance', it is a vast pity to miss it. And we need this Absolute Background against which to test the relative problems of our day. We need such an Absolute Standard against which to judge our own relative standards. We need such an Absolute Ideal in order to achieve inner freedom from slavery to lower values and to lesser loyalties, in order to win that freedom of those men of old who, when faced by a king with the threat of death, could say,

"If you take away my goods, you only take my prayer book, and I have committed that to memory; if you take away my life, you only usher me the sooner into the presence of my Maker." Only in God are the lesser loyalties of men fully transcended.

A man returning to Europe from a trip to America was standing one noon in the fore part of the boat and the captain came to him and said: "Little bit homesick? If you stand on this spot tonight at a quarter to seven you will see home!" And at a quarter of seven the man standing there saw a faint stab of light ahead. It was Bishop's Light guarding the Channel. In this day when a society built on self interest is toppling, we begin to discern through the darkness the flashing of other principles, abiding spiritual values, which in the end are all determining; and perhaps at the centre of everything the ultimate principle is Love. Let us give ourselves to that, undertake 'the great experiment which ends in an experience', discover the 'most high glory which is within the reach of the most lowly'.

"Why do we follow, like a flock of sheep,
Tradition with a crook,
Or leave the vastness of the calling deep
To paddle in a brook,
When on the hills of sunrise stands the Lord
Triumphant, with a lifted flaming sword.

"Why when on our lips the great new Name
Waits eager to be said,
When cloven tongues of Pentecostal flame
Burn over every head,
Why do we build Babel towers to the sky
From bricks and mortar,
We who have wings to fly?"

Dean Sidney E. Sweet was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dean Davis.

March 23:

Consent given to the shortening of the time of the Candidateship of the Reverend George A. Wilson, Deacon, and that he may be ordained to the Priesthood on Thursday, March 24, 1932.

A memorial of Dean Davis prepared by Reverends John S. Bunting and J. Courtney Jones was approved by the Committee and ordered spread on the records.

April 21:

The Reverend James Presley Pound was recommended as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

June 8:

Consent given to the shortening of the time of the Candidateship of the Reverend Oral Virgil Jackson, Deacon, and that he be ordained to the Priesthood on Tuesday, June 14, 1932.

Consent given to the sale of St. Timothy's Mission now the property of the Church of the Holy Apostles at not less than \$6,500.00.

Consent given to the ordination and election of the Reverend Benjamin Martin Washburn, D.D. to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Newark, New Jersey.

Approval given to the application of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, to increase the loan upon the Church property to the sum of \$10,000.00.

July 20:

The application of Andrew E. F. Anderson to be a Candidate for Holy Orders was recommended to the Bishop.

Approval and consent was given to the ordination and consecration of the Very Reverend John Williamson to be Bishop of the Diocese of Arkansas.

October 3:

Consent given to the election of the Very Reverend Ralph Ernest Urban to be Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey.

October 26:

The Reverend James Presley Pound was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate and consent given to the shortening of the time of his Candidatship to not less than six months from the date of his admission as a Candidate for Holy Orders under provision of Section II. of General Canon 7.

June 27:

Approval was given to the sale of the property of the Church of the Holy Apostles (formerly St. Timothy's Mission) at a price not less than \$6,500.00 and the officers were authorized to sign the deed.

October 3:

Upon the recommendation and with the approval of the Diocesan Council and the Department of Missions and Church Extension, the Committee authorized the purchase of two notes, for \$1,000.00 each, of Mt. Calvary Mission, St. Louis, one of which notes is secured by mortgage on the Church property and the other being an unsecured note, proceeds of which was to be used to cover interest on the mortgage, pay certain taxes and certain items of repairs essential on the Church building.

Block, reported that they have examined and approved the accounts of the Treasurer, and have checked all cash in the savings account in the First National Bank, and all securities which are deposited in the safe deposit box in the First National Bank, in the name of the Parochial Trust Fund, which box is under the joint control of the Vice-Chairman, the Treasurer and Mr. James M. Bull, any two of whom have access to said box.

Report of the Department of Finance.

The Council has endeavored to operate within income and pay to the National Council assured amounts.

Considering the difficulty of the times, we realize the efforts that have been made throughout the Diocese, and are appreciative of the spirit of co-operation that has prevailed, yet, of course, the Council is limited to the funds paid to the Treasurer, with the added difficulty of attempting to anticipate such payments.

Twelve parishes and missions, however, have paid the apportionment in full.

The Finance Department has urged from time to time the importance of making monthly payments for the Diocesan Assessment and Church Program, which has been helpful, and for the year 1933 the Diocesan Council has made the assessment and apportionment specifically on that basis.

We are convinced that the parishes and diocese will be greatly benefited if Vestries, Finance Committees and Treasurers will definitely begin their efforts with January and keep actively at work from month to month throughout the year in making collections, thus keeping up currently and avoiding accumulating arrearages.

Getting at it in time and keeping at it in such manner as may be suitable and becoming the work of the Church will produce surprising and gratifying results.

In some instances, parishioners make their monthly payments in advance at the beginning of the month, and this is a very splendid and forward step, a great aid to those responsible for parish accounting.

Salaries and expenses, in parish, diocese and National Council are due monthly, hence the pressing need for monthly payments, regularly and promptly.

The National Council has asked particularly the Diocese to remit monthly.

We ask for effort on this line in 1933, and the co-operation of the membership in every parish and mission.

APPENDIX No. 11.

Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

To the Rt. Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, the Rt. Rev. William Scarlett, D.D., LL.D., Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri, and the Clerical and Lay Delegates of the 94th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

Notwithstanding a very serious reduction in our income, which necessitated dropping the entire field department, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is pleased to be able to report that they have made some progress during 1932. The outstanding event of the year was the Japan pilgrimage. This was under the direction of Paul Rusch, a layman who was in this Country in the interest of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo.

It was his vision and untiring energy that made the venture possible. They sailed from Seattle, July 13th. Paul Rusch in charge.

The Seattle convention, from July 10th to 12th.

A national young men's convention was held at Seattle composed of the delegates who went on the Japan pilgrimage together with young men from the Western Dioceses and the Pacific Coast. While this was a national convention and an invitation was extended to all, the larger number of those who attended came from dioceses west of the Rockies.

One of the most constructive pieces of work that the Brotherhood has undertaken is the St. Andrew's Japanese Scholarship Fund. Andrew Tokuji Ogawa through the first scholarship, is being prepared to take his place as a Christian teacher and leader at our Church's great university at Tokyo. He will probably complete his studies in this country in May.

On his return to Japan it is expected that he will be (in addition to his other duties) the National Secretary of the Japanese Brotherhood of St. Andrew which was organized last year.

Here in St. Louis the Missouri Diocesan Assembly co-operated with the Cathedral and the St. Louis Church Federation in handling the downtown noonday services during Lent.

We are planning for a fitting observance of the semi-centennial of the organization of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew which occurs this year, the Brotherhood having been organized in 1883 in the City of Chicago. This will likely take the form of a pilgrimage rather than a convention.

Bills payable the first of January are slightly in excess of the balance of \$240.67 given above.

During the past year the City Mission has been operating on continually dwindling resources. The income from the Diocese was cut to a figure below the sum of the salaries of the staff. In consequence, all other operating expenses had to be drawn from (1) the generous subsidy of the Department of Social Service of the Woman's Auxiliary, (2) a margin left over from the 1931 Christmas Fund, (3) a small legacy from one of our patients in a city institution, and (4) gifts from organizations and individuals.

By October it became very evident that a further reduction must be made in our staff expense. The Superintendent, after consultation with both Bishops, was obliged to make the unpleasant decision that one full time worker must be released and a cut made in the allotment to the colored field. Our Social Service Department was completely dispensed with and no attempt has been made to replace Miss Phillips. The City Mission, therefore, starts the new year with the loss of a professional worker in the Social Service field, the loss of Miss Cora Pearce, who has been on the staff for over fifteen years, and the crippling of our work in many directions.

I wish here to pay my tribute to the zeal and devotion of Miss Cora Pearce. She has given unstinted energy and the personal interest, which is the most essential ingredient of our work, to everything she has done during this time as a member of the staff. She has left a real sense of loss among the hundreds of people to whom she has ministered at Koch Hospital, the Infirmary, and the Sanitarium. In every doubtful choice of policy she has brought a shrewd common sense, backed by many years of experience in the work. She will be gratefully remembered for many years by the people to whom she was sent.

My associate, Dr. Snoddy, has had practically complete charge of our work at Koch Hospital during the past year. He has also found time from his activities as Rector of St. Paul's to meet emergencies in various parts of the City Mission field and to act in my place during the time of my operation and convalescence. He has proved a warm friend and a helpful adviser.

I wish to acknowledge also the co-operation of many of my clerical brethren and of many Lay Readers in the city, especially Dean Sweet, the Reverend Sumner Walters, the Reverend Mr. Wilson, the Reverend George Lloyd, Dr. Higson, Mr. A. D. Pomeroy, Mr. Hugo Vernon, Mr. Carver, and Mr. Graves. Deaconess Brainerd, in addition to her widespread work among children and delinquents, has given several office hours a week at City Mission headquarters. Mrs. Shaw, our new worker at City Hospital No. 1, has done a very remarkable piece of work in this institution. She has established fine relations with the authorities there and upon my visitation every Friday morning, has had a list of thirty patients for bedside communions and generally one or two for baptism. Miss Daisy M. Lorick, goes her quiet way, as she has for years, among the sick and infirm in Hospital No. 2 and the Infirmary, always faithful and beloved, bringing the Spirit of Jesus to those to whom it means the most. Mrs. O'Bannon is still with us. Her activity spans the whole history of the City Mission.

Among the recent events that have proved very heartening, has been the co-operation of Mrs. Hugh Weed who volunteered from St. Michael and St. George's Parish upon the suggestion of Dr. Block. She has found time, in addition to her visitations for the Provident Association, to help the City Mission by visiting in connection with our work in the Jail and the Workhouse. Such aid as this, freely given, is carrying us through these trying days with far less retreat than I expected. Another event during the past year has been the return to

the city of Mrs. C. U. Holmes, the wife of the founder of the City Mission, who takes an active interest in the City Hospital.

I am constantly reminded of the high esteem with which my fellow workers are regarded by the remarks of authorities with whom I come in contact. Mr. Walter H. Fath, of the Meramec Hills School for Girls, in his annual report to the Board of Children's Guardians, has three paragraphs of review of the religious work of Deaconess Brainerd in his institution. He said to me the other day, "I do not know what we would do without her." The Superintendent of the City Hospital and others in that institution have been warm in their praise of the prayerful and untiring work of Mrs. Shaw. And so I might go on with other members of the staff.

My acknowledgments are always due to the Social Service Department of the Woman's Auxiliary. Their aid during the past year at critical times has prevented a virtual disruption of our organization. It is impossible to name all our friends and co-workers. To do so would simply reveal that the work of the City Mission is the center of a movement and not a thing in itself.

It is gratifying to me to know that in spite of the impaired resources, our statistics make a good record. The attendance at City Mission services totals 500 more than last year. There were 34 more celebrations of the Holy Communion, 557 more communicants, 482 more bedside communions, and 43 more baptisms. I think this is a fine tribute to the energy and faithfulness of the staff.

We are going to give you just as good a City Mission as we can. But the service must, to a growing extent, be rendered by devoted people giving time and energy without cost to the City Mission. One of our friends is taking care of the visitations to the Infirmary, and there is good prospect that in like manner the Koch Hospital work can be maintained. But it seems very uncertain to me how long we can continue even on our present basis without more help.

You will remember that two years ago the City Mission was transferred to the Department of Social Service and our apportionment cut by over four thousand dollars. The expectation was that this amount would be more than taken over by a City Mission organization. But instead, the Department had to borrow money to pay salaries to the end of the year 1931. The expectation that this work might be put on a more independent basis in 1932 was more than justified by the fact that it was the special interest of Dr. Carroll M. Davis, who was ready to give his whole-hearted support to the enterprise. During the past year the City Mission lost this very able and dear friend. This loss and the continuation of the depression are enough to account for the fact that no such society is now functioning.

Now, I do not think that it is the purpose of this Diocese that the City Mission be reduced to impotence at a time when it is most needed. I am bold to remind you that it is no time to weaken such witness to the Christ to the under-privileged as the City Mission bears. I think that you all know, too, that I have always tried to be fair in presenting its claim upon your attention.

I beg, therefore, that this Convention will add at least one thousand dollars to the eight thousand that we received from the Diocese last year. It will be impossible to operate without losing further ground unless this request can be granted. I am taking for granted, even so, that the Woman's Auxiliary will still extend its generous aid and that other friends will continue to be as helpful as in the past.

APPENDIX No. 15.

Report of the Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Bishops of Missouri and the Members of the Ninety-fourth Diocesan Convention, we present the report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese for the year 1932.

While the year 1932 has been one of great anxiety and real suffering all over the world it has certainly been a testing time for both Church and State; and perhaps there has never been such an opportunity to prove to the world what the Christian Church can and should stand for.

The truths of life and of religion can only be demonstrated when experience itself with its relentless laws of action and reaction, brings home to us with peculiar emphasis the realization that the breaking of ethical and moral laws must inevitably bring about a state of confusion and chaos.

In spite of misfortune and misery there is always something thrilling about a challenge and it is only as individuals and organizations meet that challenge that they can measure up to the real values of life.

As an Auxiliary we have met our financial obligations up to the time when our people were able to make good the pledges they had made, and we hope and trust that it will be only a short while until all our checks will be once again more than "Scraps of Paper".

The outstanding feature of our Auxiliary this past year was the visit from our National Executive Secretary, Miss Grace Lindley. Her presence in our midst was an inspiration and stimulus to us all. She especially urged a willingness to adventure with Christ and that we be not afraid of new truths, new problems, and new endeavors. We were also privileged to have as our guests, at the Synod, the President of our Province, who is also a representative on the National Auxiliary Board—Mrs. Benjamin S. Brown from Kansas City—our Provincial Vice-President, Mrs. Gooch from Texas—and our Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Dwyer from Oklahoma. Also Miss Dorothy Fischer, the Executive Secretary of the Young People's Service League, in this Province, was here attending the Synod and is always a most welcome guest in this Diocese.

Our Diocese was honored by having Mrs. George selected as the Provincial Educational Secretary. While we appreciate this honor, we feel that the Province is greatly to be congratulated in having Mrs. George assume this added responsibility because she is still our Diocesan Educational Secretary.

She is also a member of the Interracial Committee of the Community Council.

Another most gratifying thing has happened to our Diocese in the appointment of Mrs. Harold S. Woodward as Vice-President of the Girls' Friendly for the Province and really means acting as President in the Province and as a member of the National Board.

Here again we feel that the Province is most fortunate.

The Synod was of value to the Auxiliary in this Diocese and we hope to every woman in the Province.

Women from almost every one of our city parishes under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Harold Woodward, assumed last Fall definite

responsibilities in connection with the sewing being done by the Red Cross for those in need in this community.

They have assisted in distributing clothes through the Clothing Bureau of the Citizens' Relief Committee, and have helped the Provident Association in their clerical work, motor corps service, and with the visiting.

The Social Service Department of the Auxiliary, under the direction of the Diocesan Social Service Secretary, Mrs. Sidney Maestre, has started an Employment Agency in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, for the benefit of those in our Churches who are suffering from the lack of employment.

This Department is also co-operating in a plan to secure groups of volunteers who will take over the work in specified relief organizations or assume charge of relief work done in certain districts under the Provident Association. These volunteers will receive instruction, from trained workers or teachers, before undertaking their responsibilities.

In connection with this plan for training volunteers it may be interesting to note that Mrs. Hugh Weed, the President of the Girls' Friendly Society, became so expert as a volunteer visitor that a number of Provident Association cases have been turned over to her and she is giving Canon George a half day each week to help him in his City Missions visiting. Owing to a reduced budget Canon George was obliged to give up his regular Social Service worker, so you can imagine what it means to him to have this capable and trained volunteer service.

So much for our Community work.

Members of the Auxiliary have taken part in Round Table discussions in regard to World Peace and our Devotional Secretary, Mrs. Rufus Putney, was in charge of the Episcopal group. Later she was put on a committee of four to make up the Findings from the State Round Table and these Findings were sent to the National Committee.

A member of the Board, Mrs. Irvin Mattick, represents the Auxiliary in the St. Louis Council for Promoting Peace, and the Auxiliary also takes an interest in questions relating to Universal Disarmament and International Relations.

The Auxiliary co-operates with the Woman's Missionary Federation by having representatives on their Board and we join them in celebrating the World's Day of Prayer. We also have representatives on the Y. W. C. A. Board. All this being an effort towards accomplishing spiritual unity, or at least a better understanding and sympathy between ourselves and other religious denominations.

In our Church work the Auxiliary has stood back of the Every Member Canvass, assisting when called upon to render active service.

Our Young People's groups and societies have been sponsored by older Auxiliary women and in fact in everything connected with both the parishes and the Diocese the Auxiliary has stood ready to lend a helping hand.

A group of our women went as delegates to a Conference in Kansas City last Spring which was called to discuss questions of leadership with, and to receive instruction from the National Executive Officers. Many new ideas and much benefit was derived from this Conference.

Realizing that our Parish Auxiliaries in the Diocese outside of St. Louis, could not attend in large numbers our Diocesan meetings,

it has been the policy of the Board to carry the Diocesan programs to these groups and from four to six Board members have taken part in meetings in Columbia, Hannibal, Cape Girardeau, Poplar Bluff, Rolla, and Jefferson City. The Board offered to go other places but arrangements could not always be made for such meetings.

For some time we have been thinking of the Mission of the Church as including more than just the Missions of the Church and all Auxiliary women are being urged to read the report of the Commission appointed by the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry to "study missions in the Far East and to make recommendations concerning their future."

This report is both courageous and far reaching. It will mean rethinking and replanning, in many instances, but surely the one thing we should long and labor for is to know the truth and in knowing the truth to be made free. Is it not because we have been afraid sometimes to face facts which if accepted might necessitate readjustment in the life of our Church, as well as in our own lives, that we have preferred to accept traditions as truths—thus preventing our reception of even larger truths?

Too much cannot be said concerning the splendid work being carried on by members of the Board in their various departments.

Time does not permit a detailed account and we refer you to the Diocesan Journal or the Auxiliary Year Book for the printed reports.

There will be no record however, of the practical and most helpful service rendered to St. Luke's Hospital by a group of women who meet at the hospital every Thursday and make surgical dressings, bandages etc. Mrs. Harold J. Littledale, one of our Board members, has charge of this work.

Nor will you find any mention of the fact that Mrs. Edward S. Sieber, our First Vice-President, and Mrs. Nelson B. Gatch, one of our Representatives on the Board, arranged for the hospitality both in homes and hotels for our guests to the Synod.

The Third Vice-President, who is also the President of the Northern Convocation, has completed her term of office and we are grateful to Mrs. Treat for what she has accomplished in the Hannibal District.

We have accepted, with great regret, the resignation of Mrs. J.W. Claiborne, our Fourth Vice-President and President of the Southern Convocation.

Mrs. Claiborne has left Cape Girardeau to make her home elsewhere.

Mrs. Walter Fischel, the Second Vice-President, has been one of the most valuable members on the Board, and has resigned much against the wishes of the other members.

Mrs. Peckham, one of our Board, has rendered us great service in the way she has represented us on the Board of the Woman's Missionary Federation.

To our retiring Corresponding Secretary we all owe a vote of thanks for her faithful and efficient work and I wish especially to add my thanks and appreciation for what she has done for and meant to me personally.

We are grateful to our Bishops and to our Clergy for their interest and co-operation in our work and also for their attendance at our meetings, and we wish to thank those members of the Press who have generously given us publicity.

Our Auxiliary has suffered a great loss in the death of Dean Davis. We shall always love and remember his fine, gentle spirit and can never forget the inspiration of his never failing interest and co-operation in all our work.

As we write of the few things accomplished we have the picture before us of many things left undone. May every Auxiliary woman go into the New Year with the spirit of adventure in her soul and the courage of faith in her heart and may we all realize that, as Mr. Miller has expressed it for us "The teaching Church is the Learning Church and the Learning Church has the opportunity of being the Leading Church in the whole realm of modern and social life", and was not Daniel Webster right when he said, "The greatest thought that can come into my mind is my individual responsibility to God"?

APPENDIX No. 15b.

Report of the Educational Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary.

Last January the Educational Secretaries unanimously decided to have a monthly meeting. Before the January meeting, six of the secretaries were asked to read Dr. Angus Dun's paper on Religious Thinking Today. One of the group was asked to give a resumé of the paper at the meeting and a discussion followed, led by those who had read the paper. At another meeting the subject of International Relations was treated in the same way. During the Fall months of 1932

Program making and methods of presentation were discussed and the subject of the American Indian was presented in book reviews, current articles and speeches.

The object of these meetings has been to stimulate interest in the subjects presented and to discuss ways of approach.

Another feature of these Conferences of the Educational Secretaries has been the development of a Diocesan Book-shelf or Library. Current copies of the "Spirit of Missions" and various Church papers have been on the tables, with such books as Bowie's "On Being Alive"; Sutor's "Open Doors in Religious Education"; Knox's "He Whom A Dream Hath Possessed"; Bishop Whipple's "Lights and Shadows of a Long Episcopate"; Gilkey's "Managing One's Self"; Dimnét's "What We Live By"; "Aggrey of Africa"; "The Life of Kagawa"; Washburn's "Men of Conviction"; "As It Looks to Young China"; "Sons and the Young Revolutionist" by Pearl Buck. These books have been in constant use.

A Bookshelf has been established in two parishes and one is about to be started in another parish.

Text books for the year are "Facing the Future in Indian Missions" and "Living Issues in China".

Last March I was one of eighteen from this Diocese to attend a Conference held in Kansas City for the women of the Southwest Province. Miss Lindley, Miss Marston, Miss Beardsley and Mrs. Wade each talked on their respective subjects and afterwards led discussions. The Conference being an experiment, the last round table discussion dealt with the advisability of holding future Conferences.

I have talked on Religious Education to the following groups: Ascension; St. Peter's (2); Emmanuel (2); Trinity Church, Hannibal; Christ Church, Cape Girardeau (2); St. Paul's, Overland; Calvary, Columbia (2); Redeemer; Trinity; Grace Church, Jefferson City; Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff; Holy Communion and St. Augustine's.

Many thanks are given to Mrs. Putney and Mrs. Roberts who carried on the Educational work for two months during an illness in my family.

I have talked to groups of young people and have been asked to conduct a course in Training for Leadership for a group of young people. The members of this group are to be chosen from the various parishes.

I have attended the monthly meetings of the Department of Religious Education and am deriving much help for my work from being a member of the Race Relations Committee of the Community Council.

Thanks are due to Mrs. Putney, Mrs. F. F. Johnson and Mrs. Roberts for their assistance in planning and conducting the Conference for Diocesan Educational Secretaries, held daily during the meeting of the Synod, October 18, 19 and 20. Copies of the Findings of these conferences were made and distributed.

Your Secretary was placed in charge of the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province of the Southwest.

The outstanding feature of the past year has been the increased interest and enthusiasm shown by the Educational Secretaries in carrying out the objective formulated at the Synod; namely "To lead all members of the groups to assume their responsibility as Christians for all people to grow in the knowledge of our Lord and of His teachings".

APPENDIX No. 16.

Report of the Episcopal Home for Children.

In the year 1932 a final decision was reached as to the plan of caring for the children in the Episcopal Home during the two-year period that the present building must be occupied. According to the Court decision, the present property cannot be disposed of for two years; so that it was necessary to decide how the building could be used to the best advantage with the least expense. Various methods of caring for the children were studied. Some suggested having a home in a suburban community where greater freedom and play space were available for the children; others suggested having cottages in various sections of the City with six to eight children in each cottage. After a great deal of discussion, and on the advice of several leaders in children's work, the following plan was adopted as an experiment during the next two years; the present Home is to be used as a temporary home for ten children, which is the number required by law to maintain a home of this character. Children will be brought here and remain until they can be studied and plans made for them. They will then be placed in carefully selected foster homes where they will be visited frequently and closely supervised. It is felt that the children need very much the affection and individual attention which they can receive in a private family but which is impossible to give in a home where there are a large number of youngsters.

During the summer the building was remodeled, all of it being closed off except one wing which is now very home-like, and comfortably accommodates ten children with the workers. In July, the services of Miss Coronal Thomas, who was formerly Director of the Home-Finding Department of the Children's Aid Society, were secured; and the placing of the children got into full swing. Miss Thomas' report will be included later. A number of activities besides the actual care of the children have been carried on in the Home during the year. Each month one Church in the Diocese holds a tea at the Home in order that the Churches may become better acquainted with our work with the children. They have been very pleasant and profitable occasions to those who have attended.

Last Spring the Committee on Institutions and Agencies, which is composed of representatives from the various social and charitable organizations of the city, held its monthly meeting at the Home; and during the Fall an open house was held to which the social workers in various children's organizations were invited. The latter meeting was held in order to acquaint the agencies of the city with the present plan as it is being carried out in the Home.

In February of 1932 the clericus luncheon was held at the Home. It was well attended and the clergy seemed very much interested in the plans being developed for the care of the children.

Since October we have had two students from St. Louis University working at the Home. They are taking a social work course in the University and are receiving their practical experience with us.

In order to keep the Churches in closer touch with our work a monthly news letter is sent out with the request that it be read in the adult organizations of each Church. The news letter was named by one of the children, and is called "Our Pilgrim's Progress".

During the past year we have sustained two serious losses in the death of Mrs. Wallace Delafield, who for so long was a member of our Board and deeply interested in our work; and Miss Julia Upshaw, for many years our Treasurer and devoted director and mother of our older boys in Brittain Hall. These faithful women, beloved and respected by all of us, gave themselves unstintedly to the welfare of our children; and their counsel and ministrations will be sorely missed, not only by the Board and staff of our Home but by all of our little ones.

In honor of Miss Upshaw we have established a Memorial Fund with an initial sum of Two Hundred Dollars, to which we hope other gifts or bequests will be added, the money to be fittingly used for the aid of our boys whose interests were so dear to her heart.

The report of Miss Thomas follows:

During 1932 applications were made for 24 children to be admitted to the Home. Only one was accepted. Four of them were from out of the State, and the remainder were referred to other agencies, or were cared for in other ways. During the year eight children who were in the Home were returned to relatives; and one older girl was transferred to another agency. We are now caring for 32 children. There are seven girls and two boys in the Home. We have ten boys and nine girls in foster homes where we pay board for them. Three of the older girls are in private families assisting with the housework while attending Junior or Senior High School. We assist them with their clothing. One of the older boys has a free home on a farm where he helps with the work in return for his room and board. Another boy in the City is working and contributes to his own support. In two instances financial assistance has been given to relatives for the care of the child when they were unable to manage without this help.

While it is too early to make any definite statement as to the real progress the children have made in their foster homes, there are several tendencies which we notice rather clearly. The physical condition of these children is excellent; in most instances their school work has improved remarkably; they are entering into community activities and making friends in the neighborhoods to an extent that they have never done before; and they are happy and contented as members of a family—just like other children in the community. They are beginning to get away from the feeling that they are orphans, and as such, are a bit queer or inferior to other youngsters.

As part of our program of foster home care, a definite educational program for foster mothers has been started. Monthly meetings are held during which the foster mothers raise questions about the care of the children whom they have in their homes. At each meeting a person who has made a special study of children's problems speaks on some subject which the foster mothers have requested. Books and pamphlets are distributed in order to give these mothers as much assistance as possible with the youngsters.

APPENDIX No. 17.

Report of Girls' Friendly Society.

Rather than give a formal report of members and figures: of how many scrap books the younger girls have made or how many dolls dressed; or of how Girls' Friendly girls serve their Parish on the Altar Guild or in the Sunday School; or of what their mission project for the year has been—may I informally touch on one or two of the chief emphases.

The great strength of the Girls' Friendly Society lies in the fact that it is first a National organization, then a Diocesan, and then a Parish. With such leaders as Miss Lukens, Miss Newbold, Miss Adelaide Case and Miss Sharpe the modern Girls' Friendly Society is alive to the modern girl and to the modern world.

It seems to me that the Girls' Friendly Society of today bases its work on the example of Christ as the way of living, coupled with the understanding of the psychology of the youth of today. Our girls here in Missouri may be active in social service work or may be learning to tool leather or to tap dance—but what the Girls' Friendly is interested in is not so much what the girls are doing as what their activities are doing to them. Are they growing; are they loving more because they are serving more; are they more unselfish because they work and play in their groups; are they tied more to their church; is their vision of life wider; and is their desire to live finer lives increasing?

When one sees them in their own service of worship conducted by their own chairman; or in their business meeting with programs worked out by themselves; or still better, when one sees them in corporate communion or at their annual vesper service, a hundred strong, one glimpses something of the growth within them. And when we tell you that there are two of the younger and more recent groups being led by two of the girls of the older groups, who because they have been Girls' Friendly want the younger girls to share their experiences—and that in a third case where Dr. Kevin is initiating work for girls in Valley Park and has called on Miss Ann Robinson to become an associate of the Girls' Friendly Society that she might carry the Girls' Friendly Society to the girls of Valley Park; that the Kirkwood branch is backing her in her efforts—you will see that the torch is being passed on.

And in conclusion may I say just this one thing about the Friendly and the Young People's Fellowship—we feel that like all other things one has to fit one's case to circumstances. If there can be a successful Fellowship in a parish it is of even more importance than a Girls' Friendly because it includes the boys, but often there can be and should be both, for there are girls who aren't ready to work with boys—there are other girls who like to be active both with the girls' group and with the joint group and we believe the Church's opportunity lies in offering all young people both play and work and worship within its portals.

On May 1, 1932, the former Chairman of the Department, Rev. Thomas L. Small, assumed his duties as rector of Oil City, Pa. Canon Small contributed a great deal to the reorganization of this Department in recent years. His special works were those of management of the Summer Conference for this Diocese, and a personal Survey of all of the Church Schools of the Diocese. His engaging and friendly personality endeared him to all of us.

Work among the isolated communicants has been carried on steadfastly by Mrs. George assisted by Mrs. H. G. Gerhard, following the program of the National Council.

The Missouri-West Missouri Summer Vacation Conference for Church Workers (including Young People, Adults and Clergy), with the Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild as Chairman and the Rev. Richard M. Trelease, Associate Chairman, was held at Stephen's College, Columbia, Missouri, from June 19 to 24. The plan of Worship, Study and Fellowship was followed. Faculty and Course are given below:

The final enrollment was 187, which was the highest since conferences in this Diocese were instituted. Average attendance was 176 persons, with occasional visitors, the total well over 180. The arrangement whereby the two Dioceses of the State combined efforts for this school has been a happy one.

Groups of Young People of fifteen parishes representing the St. Louis district and the Diocese compose the Federation of Young People at present, with prospects of more groups forming. Four principal meetings are held each year, with an attendance of one hundred and two persons at the last June Convention.

Mr. S. R. Irish is with us again, after a year's absence. He will continue his work on the Church School Survey. The Department's aim is to establish Church Schools where possible, and to raise the standard of excellence in those now existing.

Miss Mabel Lee Cooper, National Secretary for Teacher Training, conducted conferences from Oct. 10 to Oct. 18, six at Bishop Tuttle Memorial, six at the Church of the Ascension, and local meetings at the Church of the Holy Communion, St. John's, Church of St. Michael and St. George; Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves; and Christ Church, Hannibal,—and at other meetings in connection with the Synod of the Southwest. A total of 338 teachers and officers attended her conferences, which were of exceptionally high order.

The Diocesan Teacher Training School of 1932, which followed Miss Cooper's visit, was held at St. Michael and St. George's on the six Monday evenings from Oct. 31 to Dec. 5, inclusive. The faculty consisted of the following persons, with their respective subjects:

During the past year, there have been four Church Schools, namely those of St. Stephen's, St. Louis, the Prince of Peace, Church of the Holy Communion, and Redeemer, taking part in Summer Vacation Schools. These schools, lasting several weeks, carried on a program of several hours daily of religious instruction, handwork and recreational activities, chiefly for the benefit of the children in the neighborhood of the church.

The Committee on Church Schools reports an active year on the part of the Church School Service Program Council. It met once a month at six churches, with an average attendance of about sixty at each meeting, including approximately fourteen parishes. The Church School Service Program Council regularly hears reports of the Secretaries of the Lenten Offering, Christmas Box, Birthday Thank Offering and Little Helpers. As has been our custom in recent years, we have again included Community work at Thanksgiving and at Christmas. The Church School Service Program Council also enlists interest at its meetings in behalf of such activities as those of the Summer Conference and the Diocesan Teacher Training School.

Mr. F. G. Williamson is making plans for the enlargement and accessibility of the Diocesan Library.

On the third Sunday after Easter, the Lenten Mite Offering was presented at a gathering of children and older members of the churches at Grand Central Theatre; about 1500 were present. A Missionary Pageant, "Christ for the World", by Canon Small, with verses by the late Mrs. Small was presented under the direction of Mrs. Frank Maples.

APPENDIX No. 19.

Report of the Field Department.

The Field Department organized early in 1932, electing Dean Sweet chairman and Mr. H. E. Mack secretary. The Department continued the plan of having a representative from each parish and mission as a member of the Department.

We have to report that in the Spring, the amount of \$2,709.63 was raised in the Diocese towards the General Church deficit, which was collected on Whitsunday, and sent to New York. This offering was made through an appeal written by Bishop Scarlett and mailed, with an enclosed envelope, to all families in the diocese. Our quota was \$4,000.00 so we were short \$1,290.37.

Teams, composed of one clergyman and one layman, were organized and instructed, preparatory to the Every Member Canvass, and beginning November 27th, visited eighteen parishes and missions, speaking at parish and vestry meetings on the programs of the General Church and of the diocese.

On December 4th, a mass meeting was held in Christ Church Cathedral, with Bishop Scarlett and Doctor Block as the speakers. Vestrymen and canvassers of the city and county were in the processional. This meeting opened the Every Member Canvass, which continued all week.

A diocesan leaflet, prepared by Bishop Scarlett, was mailed, with the General Church leaflet, to every family in the diocese.

The amount pledged by the parishes and missions in 1932 was \$43,528.20. \$38,615.44 of which has been paid, resulting in a shortage of \$4,912.76.

The pledges for 1933 have not all been received, only 21 parishes and missions having sent in pledges, amounting to \$32,097.54.

For 1933, it is planned to have the Every Member Canvass at an earlier date, the last two weeks in October or as near November 1st as possible. Having it late in November and early in December has conflicted with other campaigns, and interfered with making up the budgets before the end of the year and trying to collect money on the old pledges. We are hoping the new date will be more satisfactory to both the diocese and parishes.

The Bishops agreed to turn over to the treasurer of the Department an amount sufficient to cover all stipends and allowances to missions and assisted parishes hitherto given from the funds of the Bishops so that the Department could send out checks for the entire stipends thus eliminating unnecessary handling of funds.

The recommendations of the Department of Religious Education with regard to the opening of Church Schools at Bonne Terre, De Soto, and Portland were approved and funds were promised for this purpose to be taken from the new Diocesan Extension Fund as soon as the proper personnel could be obtained.

Mr. Coombs notified the Department that his field would not require assistance from the Diocese for the year 1932 and the Department voted an expression of appreciation therefor.

The treasurer was ordered to apply the \$3,000 from the proceeds of the sale of St. Mary's property and the \$5,000 Maffitt bequest on the balance due toward payment of the St. Louis Hills property with a mortgage arrangement vesting the title of the property in the Parochial Trust Fund thus relieving the Diocese of taxes for the year 1932.

The treasurer was instructed not to apply the deduction of 10% to the items for student work in the Diocese and the Department voted to increase the stipend of the Rev. A. E. Woodward at the rate

of \$500 for the year, beginning March 1, 1932, and authorized an allowance of \$25.00 per month for automobile expenses to the Rev. David Coombs at Louisiana. The Rev. Mr. Heaton was placed in charge of Holy Innocents' Parish and Mt. Calvary Mission, the former contributing \$500 and the latter \$750 to his salary, the balance to come from the Diocesan Extension Fund. Dr. Kevin was given charge of St. Luke's Mission, Valley Park, with a stipend of \$300 per year from the Diocesan Extension Fund beginning April 15th.

The Chevrolet Car formerly used by the late Dr. Davis was turned over to the Rev. O. V. Jackson, Rolla, and an allowance of \$20.00 a month was allowed for its upkeep from the Diocesan Extension Fund.

Encouraging reports of conditions at Mt. Calvary Mission and the Church of the Holy Innocents were made by the Rev. Mr. Heaton and the Bishop similarly reported a wonderful response in attendance at Monroe City and Canton on the occasion of his visits. The Rev. J. Presley Pound was placed in charge of Macon with oversight of the Parish at Moberly. His stipend was set at \$2,400 per annum out of which Macon would assume responsibility for one-fourth.

At the July meeting the Department approved an appropriation of \$350 to Overland provided that they would raise a similar sum to reduce the indebtedness for Church furniture, etc.

The Department voted to accept with thanks the offer of the Young People's Federation to start and maintain a Church School in the St. Louis Hills district. All arrangements are to be in the hands of Bishop Scarlett.

Mr. Pound reported the opening of the Church at Kirksville and that thirty people and thirty students were in attendance at the services. Bishop Scarlett also reported that Holy Innocents' is now reduced to the state of a mission.

In the course of the latter months of the year 1932 grants were made to various Parishes to tide them over times of financial pressure.

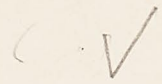
