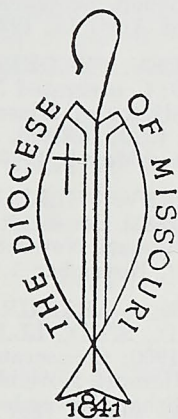

FIFTH BISHOP, THE RT. REV. WILLIAM SCARLETT, D.D., LL.D.  
Born October 3, 1883; Consecrated May 6, 1930;  
Bishop of Missouri, November 8, 1933;  
Retired, November 1, 1952.

SIXTH BISHOP, THE RT. REV. ARTHUR CARL LICHTENBERGER,  
D.D., S.T.D., LL.D.  
Born January 8, 1900; Consecrated April 5, 1951;  
Bishop of Missouri, November 1, 1952;  
Presiding Bishop, November 15, 1958;  
Resigned as Bishop of Missouri, May 15, 1959.  
Died September 3, 1968.

SEVENTH BISHOP, THE RT. REV. GEORGE LESLIE CADIGAN, D.D.  
Born April 12, 1910; Consecrated April 16, 1959;  
Bishop of Missouri, May 15, 1959.

## Rules of Order of the Convention

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1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
  - I. On Admissions of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - II. On Constitution and Canons.
  - III. On Dispatch of Business.
  - IV. On Resolutions.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate except on motion of reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.
12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment has been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.



13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order, but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions for order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called upon motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. Except in cases where majority vote is required by the Constitution, all elections provided for by Canon shall be by plurality of all votes cast. When more than one is to be elected for a particular office, the number required by Canon receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

22. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the votes of each Order shall take their stand at stations indicated by the Chairman, the Tellers for the Laity in one area, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. Those casting their ballot shall pass by the Tellers as they deposit their ballots in the proper receptacle they speak out their names to the Teller with the list of names of Delegates to Convention. No persons whose names do not appear in their role shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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## Minutes of the 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri

St. Charles, Missouri  
October 17, 1969

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred Thirtieth Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, Protestant Episcopal Church, assembled in the Ball Room of Three Flags Restaurant, St. Charles, at 2:00 P.M. on Friday, October 17, 1969.

The Holy Communion (Prayer Book rite) was concelebrated by the Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf, the Very Rev. Thom W. Blair, and the Rev. Richard H. Ash. Assisting Priests were: the Rev. Messrs. Joseph Carlo, Arthur Benzinger, Arthur England and E. John Langlitz. The offering which was designated for underwriting of the 1969 Diocesan Program with special intent for Missionary Salaries, amounted to \$226.65. During the Service newly-elected officers of the Episcopal Church Women were installed, and parish custodians presented the United Thank Offering of the women of their respective congregations.

At 2:45 P.M. Bishop Cadigan assumed the chair and convened the Convention.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the Roll of the Clergy. Of the 78 entitled to seats and votes 58 responded.

The Secretary called the Roll of Parishes and Missions. Of the 56 entitled to representation Lay Delegates from 52 responded.

A quorum being present in both Orders the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened and ready for business.

The Secretary of the Diocese introduced Resolution No. 1 which, following a second, was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Rules of Order of the 129th Convention of this Diocese be adopted for this Convention, and that Rule No. 23 which sets forth the Order of Business may be suspended by the Bishop at any time; and be it further

RESOLVED that all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders, all licensed Lay Readers and full-time and professional Lay Church Workers be admitted to seats without votes in this Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Order of Business shall be substantially as follows: (see page 26 of the Journal)

Bishop Cadigan, acting under authority given him by Canon 3, appointed the Venerable Charles F. Rehkopf to serve as Secretary of this Convention and of the Diocese.

The Bishop then appointed Archdeacon Rehkopf to serve as Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business.

Bishop Cadigan delivered his annual Address to the Diocese.  
(Appendix No. 1)



Mr. George T. Guernsey III offered Resolution No. 2, and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS the need for low and moderate income housing is one of the most urgent priorities of our time; and WHEREAS in the metropolitan area of St. Louis and elsewhere there are already in existence many community corporations whose greatest handicap is the lack of returnable initial seed capital to build new housing; and

WHEREAS the Bishop has with the counsel of the Standing Committee already made available \$100,000 for short-term, interest-free loans to eligible community corporations (Diocesan loans for this purpose are to be obtained by assigning a portion of the Thompson Bequest Fund income as collateral); and

WHEREAS the Bishop has, with the counsel of the Standing Committee, appointed a committee to establish procedures for the administration of the monies and to assure that professional and technical review be made of all proposals before the monies be made available; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that this Convention, following the leadership of its Bishop, authorize him to appoint, with the consent of the Standing Committee, a committee to explore with parishes and individuals throughout the Diocese ways in which an additional \$200,000 may be made available for similar purposes to eligible corporations anywhere in the Diocese.

Following a second the President of the Standing Committee, Dr. Richard S. Gordon, spoke of the issue in this matter: "some feel the Church should not do this; others would not limit the action to housing." Would this Convention wish to debate this in plenary session?

During the discussion a number of persons asked questions of the Bishop's ad hoc committee on housing that prepared the Resolution: The Rev. William Chapman, Mrs. Margaret Bush Wilson, Mr. Charles C. Allen, Jr., and Mr. Guernsey.

Dr. Gordon reminded the Convention that it is called on to approve a matter of policy rather than the specifics of a particular program. He asked whether the Convention would like to discuss this in small groups.

Mr. John Stewart moved the Convention arrange itself in small groups for this purpose. Following a second the motion was put to a vote, and was defeated.

Dr. Martin reminded the Convention of the Bishop's warning on minutiae and moved the previous question. Following a second the motion was put to a vote and passed.

Resolution No. 2 was then put to a vote and declared passed.

The Rev. Mr. Steidemann, reporting for the Committee on Lay Credentials and Admission of New Parishes, announced that no papers had been received from parishes seeking union with the Convention, and that since there is no Assessment system, other than for Church Pension Fund and hospital-medical insurance, all 56 parishes and missions are entitled to representation in this Convention. His report was received.

The Rev. Mr. Swift reported for the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The "Missouri Plan" was adopted at the 128th Convention, 1967, by Resolution No. 9 (p. 34 of the Journal) and Appendix No. 8, (p. 74 of the Journal). Among other things, the plan provides that: "Assignment or suggestion of quotas . . . will not occur;" and that "The system of assessments and apportionments will be discontinued." Further, ". . . that failure of parishes to meet their voluntary acceptances will not result in any penalty, including ineligibility to participate in the Diocesan Convention." The Standing Committee has requested that the Constitution and Canons be amended to comply with this resolution.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved Resolution No. 3:

RESOLVED that Article V, Sect. 4 of the Constitution be amended (first reading) by deleting from line 7 the following words: "in full all assessments to the Treasurer for the necessary expenses of the Diocese, and . . . ."

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved Resolution No. 4:

RESOLVED that Article V, Sect. 6 of the Constitution be amended (first reading) by deleting in line 7 the words: "in full all assessments to the Treasurer for the necessary expenses of the Diocese, and . . . ."

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved Resolution No. 5:

RESOLVED that Canon 20, Sect. 2 be amended by deleting in lines 2 and 3 the words: ". . . and pay its annual Diocesan Assessments as required by Canon 25 . . . ."

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved Resolution No. 6:

RESOLVED that Canon 20, Sect. 2, be amended by substituting in line 4 the words "Canon 14" for the words "Canon 15".

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift moved Resolution No. 7:

RESOLVED that Canon 20, Sect. 5 be amended by deleting in line 4 the words: "(2) that it has paid in full its Diocesan Assessment;" and by changing in line 5 (3) to (2).

Following a second the resolution was adopted.



The Rev. Mr. Swift moved Resolution No. 8:

RESOLVED that Canon 24 be deleted and the following substituted:

CANON 24 — Of the Support of the Diocese

Sec. 1. Except as provided for assessments to support the Church Pension Fund, the program and budget of the Diocese, including its obligation to the National Church, shall be funded in response to a program of askings and voluntary acceptances of parishes and missions. Acceptances so obtained shall be deemed obligatory commitments upon which the Diocese shall be entitled to rely.

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then noted that with the deletion of the former Canon 24 certain matter needs to be reenacted as a Canon and moved the adoption of Resolution No. 9:

RESOLVED that Canon 8 be amended by adding a new Section 3 as follows:

Sec. 3. The fiscal year of this Diocese shall be from the first day of January to the thirty-first day of December, inclusive; and all Diocesan reports and all Parochial and Financial reports of Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall conform thereto. All Parochial and Financial reports of Parishes and Missions to the Convention shall be filed with the Office of the Bishop not later than February 1 of each year.

Following a second the resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then introduced a matter of reference from the 129th Convention, that of a procedure for handling resolutions introduced in a Convention for its considerations. He said that the 129th Convention in 1968, had adopted a motion that a Canon be presented requiring "procedure on Resolutions to include notification of at least two weeks to members of the Convention of proposals to come before it, except that by unanimous consent of the Convention any proposed Resolution may be considered." He said further that Rule No. 4 of the Rules of Order of the Convention provides for a Committee on Resolutions along with other Committees. He proposed that these be designated as "Permanent Committees of the Convention," and that they be named in Canon 32.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then moved Resolution No. 10:

RESOLVED that Canon 32 be deleted and the following substituted:

CANON 32 — Of Permanent Committees of the Convention

Sec. 1. The Permanent Committees of the Convention shall be:

- I. On Lay Credentials and Admission of New Parishes
- II. On Constitution and Canons
- III. On Dispatch of Business
- IV. On Resolutions

Sec. 2. The members of all such Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop and shall serve until their successors are appointed. They shall have the right to adopt their own rules of procedure relating to notice and time of meetings, quorum, hearing and similar matters. They shall be empowered to sit during recess of the Convention, with instructions to report to the next Convention.

Sec. 3. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a report of a committee other than those herein named, and all proposed changes in the Constitution and Canons shall be submitted to the



Secretary at least thirty days prior to the opening date of the next Convention. The Secretary shall refer such proposals to the appropriate Permanent Committee who shall submit their recommendations to the members of the Convention at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Convention. Resolutions and changes in the Constitution and Canons not submitted according to the provisions of this Section may be considered by the Convention by consent of two-thirds of the Convention.

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then spoke of a provision on Article VIII of the Constitution allowing the Bishop to appoint a Presbyter to preside in his stead and that occasionally the Bishop would like a competent lay person to perform this duty. He moved Resolution No. 11:

RESOLVED that Article VIII, Sect. 1 of the Constitution be amended (first reading) be deleting in line 8 the word "Presbyter" and substituting the words, "member of the Convention."

Following a second the Resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Swift then introduced a proposed amendment to Canon 14 suggested by the Rev. Messrs. Blair, Hegg and Williamson. He said the Committee had found the proposal acceptable and moved Resolution No. 12:

RESOLVED that Canon 14, Sect. 4, be amended by the addition of a second paragraph which shall read as follows:  
"Except as provided in the Canons of the General Convention, the Rector may not resign the parish without the consent of the Vestry, nor may the Rector be removed from the Parish against his will, not in a dispute over the same may his compensation and allowances be diminished without his consent."

Following a second, discussion ensued and the resolution was adopted upon being put to a vote.

The Bishop announced that he had been handed a note to the effect that some persons questioned the chair's decision on the voice vote that determined the previous question in the debate on the resolution on housing (No. 2).

The Rev. Mr. Betts moved that Dr. Martin's motion on the previous question be reconsidered. Following a second the motion prevailed by a vote of 124 to 59.

Dr. Martin's motion on the previous question was then reconsidered and put to a standing vote. The motion prevailed by a vote to 153 to 23.

Mr. James Gimblett reported for the Committee on Clergy Stipends appointed in response to the 129th Convention. He presented the report which was thereupon approved. (Appendix No. 9)

The Rev. Mr. Benzinger presented in writing the report of the Committee appointed under authority of the 129th Convention to study the matter and position of "Aided" Parishes. The report was received and ordered printed in the Journal. (Appendix No. 10)

Mr. Lawrence J. Dorn, chairman of the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure, presented the following slate of nominations for various offices to be filled:

From the floor in accordance with constitutional procedure the following were nominated as Deputies to General Convention: The Rev. Messrs. William Ripley, Joseph W. Nicholson and Elsom Eldridge, and Mr. George Johnson.

Upon motion duly seconded the nominations were declared close and ballots ordered printed.

Upon motion by the Secretary, duly seconded, the following reports were received and ordered printed in the Journal: Treasurer, Registrar, Episcopal Church Women, Parochial Trust Fund and the Standing Committee.

The Chair called for introductions to be referred to the Committee on Resolutions. A number were received and so referred.

The Bishop nominated the following to serve as the Board of Examining Chaplains: the Rev. Messrs. Burton (chairman), McCowan, Pope, Schweizer, Paget, Tombaugh, Rehkopf, Funk and C. Butler. His nominations were approved and the Chaplains declared elected.

The Bishop announced that the committee appointed in response to Resolution No. 13 of the 129th Convention to counsel the trustees of the Diocesan Investment Fund is prepared to report should the Convention so desire. Upon motion duly seconded the report was so requested. Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley then presented the following report:



Your Committee met with the Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust and were given copies of their investment portfolio and their current recommendations for sales and re-investment.

A review of the investments with the Trustees made it quite apparent that they were using the same criteria that would be relied upon by the trustees of any fund created for the purpose of securing for the beneficiaries the best possible financial return, with a minimum of risk, and, of course, without involving the fund in questionable or immoral activities.

However, the Trustees are also aware of the concern of the Diocese for the position of the Negro American, and, for this reason, have avoided investments in corporations known to practice racially discriminatory policies. To their knowledge, and the knowledge of your Committee, there were no such investments in the funds, and, therefore, nothing on which to advise and consult.

In conclusion, your Committee feels that as long as the persons serving as Trustees are of the type and character now serving in said office, and are selected in the manner provided for in the Declaration of Trust of April 15, 1959, there is no need for a committee such as ours, and we ask to be discharged of further responsibility.

Mr. Shepley moved the report be received. Following a second a lengthy debate ensued.

The Rev. Dr. Nicholson moved the previous question. Following a second the motion prevailed.

Mr. Shepley's motion was then put to a vote and the motion carried.

A number of questions arose as to the personnel of the Trustees of the Diocesan Investment Trust, and how they are chosen.

The Rev. Dr. Nicholson moved that a new Committee to Counsel the Trustees of DIT be appointed with the counsel of the Standing Committee and that this Committee report to the Standing Committee. Debate ensued on this motion which was finally cut off by a vote on a motion for the previous question. The Nicholson motion was then put and carried.

The Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business moved Resolution No. 13:

RESOLVED that the Convention recess at this time for dinner, to reconvene at 8 A. M. on Saturday at which time the Holy Communion will be celebrated; that the Convention then reconvene in business session at 9:30 A. M. for the purpose of balloting for the offices to be filled; and be it further

RESOLVED that following the casting of the ballots the Convention divide itself into Convocational and Regional meeting groups for the space of 90 minutes for discussion of issues in the proposed Program for 1970; and that the Convention then reconvene in plenary session until adjournment.

Following a second the resolution was adopted. The Convention then recessed at 6:20 P. M. for dinner.



During the dinner Bishop Cadigan presented his annual awards to lay persons for their work and ministry in the Church and the World. These included: Mrs. Robert A. Black, Miss Catherine Weston, Dr. James F. Hood, Dr. George A. Benson, Malco Grissom, David Metcalfe, Jr., and Ellis Meyer. Upon request, Dr. Luther Mitchell, representing ACTION, spoke concerning the situation of the American Negro. The feature of the evening was an address by the Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, Presiding Bishop.

Following the dinner and program the Convention recessed until Saturday.

Saturday, October 18, 1969

At 8 A.M. the Liturgy of the Lord's Supper (Trial Liturgy) was celebrated by Bishop Hines, with the assistance of Bishop Cadigan, and the Rev. Messrs. Betts and Nicholson. The offering amounted to \$32.75 and was designated for the 1969 Program of the Diocese.

At 9:30 A.M. the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Ball Room of the Three Flags Restaurant, St. Charles.

Bishop Cadigan was in the chair. The opening prayers were read by the senior Priest of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. William W. S. Hohenschield, S.T.D.

Ballots were cast for the offices of Standing Committee, Deputies to General Convention, Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral and Trustees of the University of the South. Tellers were appointed, and retired to count the ballots.

Reading of the Minutes of the Friday session was dispensed with.

Mr. Charles C. Allen, Jr., newly-appointed Treasurer of the Diocese presented the Proposed Program for 1970, as discussed in Convocation/Regional meetings, prepared by the Office of the Bishop, and approved by the Standing Committee. It carried a total of \$457,661, including an amount to be raised by Parishes and Missions of \$382,661.

Dr. Gordon, President of the Standing Committee, spoke to the matter, pointing out that by the Special Order of Business adopted on Friday (Resolution No. 13) this Program is first to be discussed in Convocation/Regional groupings and asked whether there might be some sentiment to reconsider this decision.

Mr. Norman Hoffman moved reconsideration of the Special Order. Following a second discussion ensued.

The Previous Question was moved by the Rev. Mr. Denkinger. Following a second the motion was put and defeated.

Following further discussion the Rev. Mr. Park moved the Previous Question. Following a second the motion prevailed by a vote of 118 to 68.

The Rev. Mr. Kunz moved the Convention consider the 1970 Program in plenary session. Following a second discussion ensued.

The Rev. Mr. Morris moved to amend the Kunz motion as follows:

That the 1970 Proposed Program be considered in plenary session, but only after a period of no more than 45 minutes in which it shall be considered in groups of not more than 20 persons with diverse, convocational, groupings. The proposed amendment was seconded.



Upon request of the Rev. Mr. Maurer the Chancellor, Mr. W. R. Bascom, ruled that the amendment is a valid one, and that the original motion is capable of being so amended.

Upon being put to a vote the amendment was declared passed by a vote of 92 to 84. The motion as amended was passed by a voice vote.

The Rev. Mr. Ash announced the groups, and the Convention recessed its plenary session to spend the allotted time in these groupings, at 10:50 a. m.

At 11:45 A. M. the plenary session resumed its deliberations.

The Rev. Mr. Miller moved that this Convention approve the 1970 Proposed Program as a statement of intent with the provision that an adjourned session meet in January, 1970, to make final approval of a 1970 Budget. The motion was seconded, and discussion followed.

During the discussion the various discussion groups reported their own consensus. Joining in the discussion were: the Rev. Messrs. Eldridge, Moll, Schweizer, Park, Burton, England, Denkinger, Sanders, Paget, Vair, and Miller; Mrs. Beatty, Mrs. Booker, Mr. Erbe and Mr. Bascom.

The Rev. Mr. Eldridge moved the question be divided, upon assurance by the Chancellor that this is legal. Following a second the motion was put to a voice vote and pronounced defeated.

The Rev. Mr. Betts moved the Previous Question. Following a second the motion was declared passed by a voice vote. (Appendix No. 13)

Dr. Gordon asked which Lay Delegates would assemble in January. Mr. Bascom replied that since this would be an adjourned session of the 130th Convention the present Delegates or their Alternates would be expected to attend.

The Miller motion was put and passed by a voice vote.

The Rev. Dr. Hohenschield said the Committee to study a Diocesan Appeal for Social Mission had no report.

Dean Blair invited the Convention to meet in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, for its adjourned session in January. The invitation was accepted upon motion duly seconded and passed.

The Bishop appointed the following to serve as the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure for the 131st Convention: George T. Guernsey III (chairman), Charles Cason, Robert Peets, Mrs. Charles Garland, Kenneth Smitten, Lawrence J. Dorn.

The Convention recessed for lunch at 12:25 P. M.

The Convention reconvened at 1:16 P. M.

The Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure announced the election of the following persons:

The Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure, having completed its task, was discharged.

The time having arrived for consideration of Resolutions the Chairman of Dispatch of Business moved the adoption of Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED that during the debate on Resolutions as presented by the Committee on Resolutions the following special Rule of Order shall be in force: during the debate no member of the Convention may speak more than once to any matter, and then for not more than four minutes. Following a second the special Rule was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger, speaking for the Committee on Resolutions, presented Resolution No. 15, as offered by the Rev. Mr. Armistead, with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass:"

WHEREAS Article I of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church fails to provide for the Perpetual Deacon to serve as a Deputy to General Convention for the Church, if duly chosen; and

WHEREAS Canons 34 and 47 of the Canons of the Episcopal Church provide for the translation of a Perpetual Deacon to another Diocese only upon the written request of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the same, and this constitutes an unnecessarily cumbersome process, accomplishing nothing more than is inherent in the simple sending of a letter dimissory, the standard procedure for transferring other clergy; and

WHEREAS Canon 47 requires the Perpetual Deacon, before serving in any Diocese other than the one in which he canonically resides, to obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of both Dioceses, an impediment not placed in the path of other clergy, who need only obtain the consent of the rector (or, in his absence, the Senior Warden) of the Parish of the other Diocese, a wholly adequate safeguard; and

WHEREAS the Perpetual Deacon is required to be a man of mature years, "devout character and proved fitness,"; now be it therefore

RESOLVED that the 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri memorialize the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, meeting in Houston, Texas in 1970, to:

I. Alter the wording of Article I of the Constitution to permit



Perpetual Deacons to serve as Clerical Deputies to General Convention.

- II. Delete from Canons 34 and 47 all limitations to the freedom of transfer of a Perpetual Deacon from one diocese to another.
- III. Delete from Canon 47 all limitations to the ability of a Perpetual Deacon to accept appointments for work outside the Diocese to which he canonically belongs.

The Rev. Messrs. Armistead and Vair spoke to the matter, saying they hoped the Convention would overrule the Committee and would adopt the Resolution. The Chair ruled that if the Convention upholds the Committee the Resolution would be defeated. He was supported in this by the Chancellor.

Mr. Jack Allen appealed the ruling of the Chair. The Chair was sustained by a vote of 97 to 55.

The recommendation of the Committee that the Resolution not pass was put to a vote and was lost.

The Rev. Mr. Stickney moved that Resolution No. 15 be adopted. Following a second the motion was carried and the Resolution adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 16 as presented by Mr. Jack Allen, with the recommendation of "not pass":

WHEREAS in the early days of Christianity the Gospel was spread by the traveling Apostles, who did not preach in only one location; and

WHEREAS the Church of Jesus Christ may never have been established as successfully as it has been if, for example, St. Paul had remained in Jerusalem; and

WHEREAS in contemporary times the evangelistic branches of the Church of Jesus Christ have shown a greater than average growth, due in no small part to their traditions of utilizing the services of traveling "evangelists" who more often than not are only clergymen from out of town; and

WHEREAS the Diocese of Missouri is sufficiently compact in geography so that it would not be an undue hardship for the clergyman to travel among the parishes and missions of the Diocese, and thereby continue the traditions referred to above; now therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Executive Secretary of the Diocese be, and hereby is, authorized and directed to establish a schedule of pulpit exchanges and visitations between and among the various clergymen in the Diocese, in order that each clergyman preach and visit in a parish or mission other than his own at least six times during each calendar year; and be it further

RESOLVED that every clergyman in the Diocese is hereby urged to conform with the schedule as established by the Executive Secretary.

The Committee's recommendation of "not pass" was sustained by a voice vote.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger then introduced Resolution No. 17 as presented by Mr. Michael King, with the recommendation that it "do pass".

WHEREAS the Episcopal Church in the United States has generally been unable to make its institutional presence felt in



communities or areas thereof whose inhabitants are, on the whole, of the lower-middle and lower economic strata; and

WHEREAS the cities of this nation are quickly becoming black and white ghettos, seething with political, cultural and economic frustrations; and

WHEREAS the training of seminarians, although adequate for a life of service in a white, middle class parish, has proven, on the whole, inadequate for a ghetto urban ministry; and

WHEREAS the reform of seminary curricula, while admirable and of good intention, cannot deal with localized urban problems; and

WHEREAS the Church must constantly go forth into the whole world, delivering its message in many tongues; be it

RESOLVED that the Committee on Race Relations, or, in the absence of said Committee, a committee constituted by a vote of the One Hundred Thirtieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri be charged with the creation of a pilot study plan, designed to create an order of urban ministers; and be it further

RESOLVED that this study, the length of which shall not exceed four (4) months, shall seek the advice of black and white Inner City residents, Diocesan clergy, the students and administration of Eden Seminary, social scientists, and any whose advice shall be deemed necessary; and be it further

RESOLVED that one area of study shall be devoted to the consideration of substitution of service in the Inner City or further training consonant with service in the Inner City in lieu of a portion of, but not the whole of, seminary training; and be it further

RESOLVED that the finished plan shall be presented to the Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri who shall be encouraged to take positive action on the recommendations contained therein; and be it further

RESOLVED that the finished plan shall be reproduced by the Diocese of Missouri, reported back to the 131st Convention of the Diocese, printed in the Convention Journal, and distributed to any and all parties expressing an interest in its contents.

Following a second the motion was passed to sustain the Committee and adopt the Resolution.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 18 as prepared by Mr. Michael King with the Committee's recommendation of "do pass".

WHEREAS the actions of the Veiled Prophet Society are such as to be a source of constant irritation to the Black Communities in the Diocese of Missouri; and

WHEREAS a significant proportion of the membership of the Veiled Prophet Society is comprised of communicants of the various parishes and missions in the Diocese of Missouri; be it

RESOLVED that the Committee on Race Relations be charged with the establishment of a program, educational in nature, for the purpose of informing, on a parish and individual level, communicants of the Diocese of Missouri of the image of the Veiled Prophet Society and the reaction thereto in the Black Communities in the Diocese of Missouri.

Following a second the Committee was sustained and the Resolution adopted by a vote of 97 to 55



The Rev. Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 19, as prepared by Mr. Michael King, with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass":

WHEREAS the 1969 Interim Convention meeting at South Bend, Indiana, was attended by special representatives of the youth of the Diocese, ethnic communities within the Diocese, and women of the Diocese, and

WHEREAS the Diocese of Missouri is recognized and applauded for having named these special delegates, and

WHEREAS the practice of naming special delegates is a desirable practice which should be continued on both Diocesan and National levels; and

WHEREAS the delegates named should represent the broadest possible spectrum of the communicants of the Diocese of Missouri; be it

RESOLVED that such delegates be named to the Diocesan convention, and that they shall be equal in number to the parish with the largest representation, and said delegates shall be seated and have voice at all forthcoming Diocesan conventions, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the naming of said youth and ethnic delegates shall become a function of the Committee on Race Relations.

Following some discussion the Committee was sustained by a vote of 122 to 49 and the Resolution was not adopted. During the debate Dr. Gordon and the Rev. Dr. Tombaugh urged members of the Convention to consider the substance of the proposal.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger presented Resolution No. 20, also prepared by Mr. King, with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass":

WHEREAS the Committee on Race Relations of the Diocese of Missouri was established in response to the Executive Council's statement "The Negro American and MRI," to support the struggle for "equality and justice for black Americans"; and

WHEREAS racial prejudice, an affront to the image of God in mankind, is an evil of which all sources and manifestations needs be eliminated as quickly as possible from the religious and lay life in the Diocese of Missouri; and

WHEREAS as presently structured and ordered, the Committee on Race Relations cannot adequately effect its charges, the implementation of which requires a strength consonant with a Committee of the Convention and a membership drawn from groups which by structure, function, or position have, in themselves, an unabiding interest in the forthwith demise of racial prejudice, its sources and manifestations; and

WHEREAS to support resolution No. 4 of the One Hundred Twenty-Ninth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri; be it

RESOLVED the Committee on Race Relations be made a Standing Committee of the Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED the composition of said Committee be drawn from members appointed by self-determined agencies of the following groups:

- The Diocese of Missouri, elected by the Convention
- The Council of Inner City Ministries
- The Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity
- Those parishes and missions in the Diocese of Missouri with more than one-third non-white communicants

and be it further



## MINUTES OF CONVENTION

RESOLVED each of the aforementioned four (4) groups shall be entitled to name no more than three (3) members to the said Committee on Race Relations; and be it further

RESOLVED in consultation with each other the groups shall appoint no more than three (3) additional members to represent, in their persons, the youth of the Diocese of Missouri.

The Committee's recommendation was sustained and the Resolution was not adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 21, likewise submitted by Mr. King with the Committee's recommendation "not pass";

WHEREAS delegates and visitors to the One Hundred Thirtieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri will eat a \$4.75 a plate meal at the Convention banquet while children and adults in the Diocese of Missouri are going hungry; be it

RESOLVED the banquet of the One Hundred Thirty-First Convention of the Diocese of Missouri (1970) consist of welfare fare. The same \$4.75 per person charge shall be assessed and collected and redistributed to the poor of the Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger added that the Committee felt sympathetic to the issue implied here.

The Rev. Mr. Stickney moved a substitute Resolution, which following a second, was adopted:

WHEREAS delegates and visitors to the One Hundred Thirtieth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri have eaten a \$4.75 a plate meal at the Convention banquet while children and adults in the Diocese of Missouri are going hungry, and many Episcopalians cannot attend the Banquet because of the cost; be it

RESOLVED that the banquet of the One Hundred Thirty-First Convention of the Diocese of Missouri in 1970, consist of modest fare.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger presented Resolution No. 22, as submitted by the Committee on Race Relations, with the Committee's recommendation of "not pass":

WHEREAS the Veiled Prophet Ball and Parade to many St. Louisans is a carry-over of the ante-Bellum attitudes of the "Plantation South"; and

WHEREAS the Veiled Prophet Organization and activities for many constitute one of the foremost symbols of human prejudice both Racist and Religious about us to-day; and

WHEREAS the Veiled Prophet Organization does more to divide and undermine good will and the brotherhood of man than it does to create this ideal; and

WHEREAS one of the foremost priorities of our community is to heal the festering sores in the body social; be it therefore

RESOLVED that this 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri urge all Episcopalians to take a new look at the Veiled Prophet Organization.

By a voice vote the Committee's recommendation was sustained and the Resolution was not adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger introduced Resolution No. 23, as submitted by the Committee on Race Relations, with the recommendation of "do pass":

WHEREAS the Committee on Race Relations as it is now constituted was called into being to implement the resolution



of the 128th Convention of the Diocese on The Negro American and M.R.I.; and

WHEREAS the aforesaid Committee, by virtue of its appointment as an advisory committee to an officer of the Bishop's staff, cannot speak for the Diocese as a whole, nor under the name of the Diocese of Missouri; and

WHEREAS the Diocese is able to speak officially through representatives of the whole body only on the occasion of a Diocesan Convention which seldom meets more than one 24 hour period a year; and

WHEREAS our times demand a constant exercise of concern for the problems of Race Relations in rapidly changing situations; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this Convention appoint a permanent Committee on Race Relations which shall be appointed by the Bishop with concurrence of the Standing Committee of the Diocese; and be it further

RESOLVED that this Committee be responsible to the Convention for its work and activities, subject to the direction of the Standing Committee between Conventions.

The Resolution was seconded by the Rev. Mr. Eldridge who reminded the Convention of the gentle firm statement by Dr. Mitchell during the Friday night dinner.

During the discussion two additional paragraphs were added by amendment, the first by the Rev. Mr. Blair:

RESOLVED that this Committee advise the Bishop and Standing Committee on action it might take in this field, and represent the Bishop and Standing Committee when requested to do so.

and the second upon motion by Mr. John Stewart:

RESOLVED that the membership of the Committee so far as possible be comprised of representatives of all factions in the Diocese with interest in the field of race relations.

Resolution No. 23, as amended was adopted by a voice vote.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 24; which was adopted:

WHEREAS the Rt. Rev. William Scarlett gave so much to this Diocese during his Episcopate and is held dear in our memory; be it

RESOLVED that this 130th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri does send warmest greetings to Bishop Scarlett and asks that we may continue in his prayers as he does in ours.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 25 which was adopted:

WHEREAS the Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, Presiding Bishop of our Church, has honored us with his presence at our Convention and inspirational speech at our Convention dinner: and

WHEREAS we hold him in honor, respect and affection for the magnificent and sensitive job he is doing in the leadership of our national Church in these trying times; be it

RESOLVED that this 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri sincerely thanks Bishop Hines for being with us and does earnestly pray that Almighty God will continue to prosper him personally and the work of our Church worldwide.



The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 26, which was adopted:  
 WHEREAS at the 129th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri the Rt. Rev. T. G. V. Inman, Bishop of Natal, was present; and  
 WHEREAS this Diocese has entered a companion relationship with the Diocese of Natal; be it  
 RESOLVED that this 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri send to Bishop Inman our warmest greetings, and through him, our best wishes to and prayers for all of our friends in Natal.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 27, which was adopted:  
 WHEREAS the Rector and People of Trinity Church, St. Charles, were good enough to invite this 130th Convention to meet here; and  
 WHEREAS we have been most graciously received and hospitably accommodated; and  
 WHEREAS these facilities have been most comfortable and the arrangements have been most satisfactory; be it  
 RESOLVED that this 130th Convention does hereby express its appreciation and gratitude to the Rector and the People of Trinity Church, St. Charles, for their hospitality.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 28, which was adopted:  
 WHEREAS Mr. George A. Newton has faithfully served this Diocese for many years in the exacting, difficult and often exasperating office of Treasurer; and  
 WHEREAS Mr. Newton has now retired from this post; be it  
 RESOLVED that this 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri herewith express our gratitude to Mr. Newton and our continuing best wishes to him.

The Rev. Mr. Denkinger moved Resolution No. 29, which was adopted by a rising vote and great applause:

WHEREAS April 16 of this year marks the 10th anniversary of the consecration of our beloved Bishop, the Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan; and

WHEREAS his Episcopate, in these most trying times, has been marked by sensitivity to the needs of all people, a willingness to let people determine their own lives, and an unparalleled degree of warmth and affection for all his people, clergy and lay, no matter how difficult they have been; therefore be it

RESOLVED that this Convention express to our Bishop our love, esteem and respect, and the prayer that the next ten years may be as great as the past ten.

The Committee on Resolutions, having nothing further to report, was discharged.

Bishop Cadigan expressed his gratitude by introducing his secretary, Mrs. Elsom Eldridge, and his staff, the Rev. Mr. Ash and Archdeacon Rehkopf. All were greeted with applause.

Archdeacon Rehkopf expressed the gratitude of the Rev. Mr. Ash and himself for the work of the two secretaries in the Diocesan Office, Mrs. William Whittaker and Mrs. Leroy Howard.

Upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Steidemann gratitude was expressed to the Design Committee chosen by the Rev. Mr. Ash to develop the design whereby this Convention has dealt with issues placed before it.



Upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Burton, the adjourned session of the 130th Convention is to be charged to approve a Budget for 1970, following immediately after Convocation/Regional meetings.

Miss Kerstetter introduced Resolution No. 30:

WHEREAS in 1969 the churches, as other institutions in the nation, are faced with a heightened awareness of a serious difference in values between younger and older members; and

WHEREAS the younger members of the Episcopal Church have in effect no adequate method of presenting group values or programs and no adequate method of countering views presented by a substantially older group except by withdrawal or "dropping out" (example — the number of under-35 delegates present); and

WHEREAS the future of the Church depends upon the active involvement of the young in the processes of the Church; be it

RESOLVED that special "at large" youth delegates, equal in number to the largest represented parish, be named, seated, and given voice at all forthcoming Diocesan Conventions.

The question being raised of admissability at this hour of any Resolution, upon motion by the Rev. Mr. Denkinger, duly seconded, the Convention agreed to consider the Resolution. During the discussion some confusion was evident as to the Resolved paragraph and action was suspended until the confusion could be resolved by proponents.

The Rev. Barney E. Maclean, Executive Director of the Episcopal-Presbyterian Foundation for the Aging, was introduced.

Archdeacon Rehkopf introduced the Rev. B. Bruce Whittemore, new Executive Director of the Inter Church Association of Greater St. Louis, formerly the Metropolitan Church Federation. The Rev. Mr. Whittemore spoke of the Association and its rationale, as well as the need for an ecumenical agency with ability to respond to crises and to long range needs as well.

(Appendix No. 13)

Upon motion by Archdeacon Rehkopf, duly seconded, the Convention endorsed the Inter Church Association, and made the Diocese of Missouri a member thereof.

The Rev. Mr. Park spoke with firm conviction of the defeatism evident in the Convention in the matter of the 1970 Proposed Program and urged the members to act in support of the Program. He urged that we "go all the way" and compared this Diocese to the New York Mets baseball team which recently won the World's Series.

The Rev. Dr. Nicholson presented the report of the Committee on Theology and practice of Confirmation.

(Appendix No. 11)

Miss Kerstetter withdrew Resolution No. 30, and said that before the January adjourned session of the Convention it would be refined and re-introduced.

The Rev. Mr. Paget suggested each Parish and Mission invite one youth delegate to attend the January meeting. He so moved. Following a second his motion was adopted.

Mr. Van Nice spoke to the matter of public relations, particularly to stories on this Convention and other church matters appearing recently in the St. Louis GLOBE-DEMOCRAT. He moved an attempt be made to



correct these when we discover errors in them. Following a second his motion prevailed.

Upon motion by Mr. Shepley, duly second, the Convention adjourned to a date and time after January 1 to be set by the Bishop.

The Convention adjourned at 3:38 P.M. following benediction by Bishop Cadigan.

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## Appendix No. 1

## THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

After the wilderness experience in which He was sorely tempted, our Lord returned to Nazareth and in the synagogue there read from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath annointed me to preach the Gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the broken-hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

Here at our Annual Diocesan Convention, twenty centuries later, the same clear certainties provide an outline of the work we are called upon to do. The Church in our time is threatened on every side. She survived the fracturing experience in the American Revolution and the war between the states. She survived and later grew stronger because God is God. The Church in the Diocese of Missouri is wounded and hurting. We clergy grow anxious, ponder our vocation, wrestle with our faith; and laity grow confused and perplexed and angry, and believe, erroneously, that a change of leadership will save a tottering parochial life. But our greatest danger is that Bishop, clergy and laity — the people of God — will concentrate on lesser things, when the real issue is to fulfill a ministry of preaching, healing and setting at liberty.

Each of us is anguishingly aware that we are divided in our opinions concerning the world and the Church to which we seek to be faithful. This tension is an inevitable reality. The Church — which is ourselves — can never be the partisan champion of any particular recommendation for the resolution of the problems of humanity. But there is one thing that the Church, and particularly the Church in Missouri, can do. It is to preach, to heal and to set at liberty them that are bruised, and against this text must be measured all that we do.

We are called to **preach**: "to preach the Gospel to the poor . . . to preach deliverance to the captives . . . to preach recovering of sight to the blind . . . to preach the acceptable year of the Lord." Under this judgment of Scripture it should not be difficult to appreciate the mood of those clergy who are frustrated with the saying of words which have made no difference to those who are materially and spiritually poor. The vast chasm which separates words and deeds undermines the self-respect of any ordained minister of God. One of our devoted laymen has well written in INTERIM: ". . . the engine is unhooked from the train." With so many Christians passing by on the other side, while the poor grow poorer, the tension for many clergy becomes so intolerable that they act on the injunctions which they preach and which too few seem to hear.

In this action the clergy have usurped the legitimate ministry of the laity and understandable resentment is born on either side. Until the laity are willing to grasp the nettle of the social ministry and to work out the hard solutions in terms of Christian concern and love, the clergy, as I understand them, and generally speaking, will be unwilling and unable to preach a Gospel which is not listened to and shows little impact on the major issues of our time. If we need and expect a ministry which is pastoral in its orientation, then our laity must find new and significant ways to minister to the secular dimensions of society. Speaking of her clergyman, a lady in my office last week said, "He taught me of the faith and he taught me to be responsible for its implementation." Some of you



know Harold Gibbons, President of the local Union of Teamsters. During the past weeks it has been my privilege to work with him in modest ways as he brings the rent strike to a creative conclusion. He is tough, aggressive, extremely intelligent, honest and compassionate. Here is a layman somewhat disenchanted with the Church, but bringing all his gifts together to lend assistance to a poor people and to this community at large. I believe that you who are the laity, many of whom I know so well, will act in your respective jobs to change hearts and resolve problems, knowing that "inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

We are called to a ministry of **healing** — a healing needed so much throughout the world, in this country and among ourselves. We are divided. Rich and poor, black and white, young and old — all are polarized, and to the disintegration of our common life. The Church, the people of God in Missouri, must see beyond the external conditions of existence to the basic core of our God-given existence, and minister in reconciliation. Underlying every human issue — whether it be race or poverty or war or disease — there is always the possibility of resolution in love. This is our mission. If we love, we will find ourselves in meeting with those from whom we are separated. I do not do enough of this and I do not do it easily, but, when I do, it becomes a thing of grace. In a Pastoral Letter of last Spring, I wrote that unless the poor can turn to Christian folk, wherein is their hope? This means learning to trust those whom we distrust — it sometimes means sacrificing lesser principles for greater ones. It may mean the loss of pride and an adventure with humility. We are called to love one another.

And we are called to **set at liberty** them that are bruised. The bruised are the black, the Indians, the Esquimaux, the white and the rich and the poor, the young and the old. But at this particular moment in history large segments of our society are demonstrating bruises of spirit and body which are of long duration and of dreadful consequence for themselves and for the rest of society as well. Liberty, for the victims of our social system and our years of deafness and blindness, means for these people exactly what it means for you and me. It means the opportunity and the means to make that opportunity count. Our calling as the people of God is to set these persons at liberty by whatever means we have at our disposal.

You and I have been able to dine quietly at night only because the poor have been quiet. But they are not so quiet any more. If all the anguish of Pruitt-Igoe were joined together in one mighty cry, the glass in our dining rooms would be shattered. If the cries of the poor throughout America were joined together, this very building in which we meet would be laid level.

Now here in a practical manner, I want to outline what I hope will be the immediate actions of the Diocese of Missouri to effect further these standards of ministry for ourselves.

Firstly, it may be said that the strength of the Christian Church can be no stronger than the strength of the individual members of the Body. This is why we have parishes and a local ministry, ordained to preach and heal and to set others at liberty. The Diocese can be no stronger than its parishes. I beseech every parish, small or large, to measure its life again by the standards reflected in the text. Every clergyman, every layman — needs to ask if it is not possible to live more faithfully according to this light.

A proposal made by the Christian Education Committee has been



somewhat misunderstood. As I understand it now, this request reflects a need in many parishes for broad and general assistance in planning and renewing parish life and not simply the need for a Christian Education expert only. As I move about the Diocese, weekend after weekend; as I observe and hear and feel, I am made increasingly sensitive to this urgent need. When you consider in these next hours the proposed program for 1970, and if you find it as difficult — as Cabinet and Standing Committee — to envision the additional funds for such a post, then it will be my first priority to re-organize the present staff, that the greatest possible help may emanate from the Office of the Bishop.

Secondly, I ask the Diocese to give a full measure of support to the new process we are now developing for the purpose of giving every man a voice in the final determination of our common life. We have, consistent with the limitations of time and energy, engaged as many as possible to plan for the 1970 Diocesan Program. We have profited greatly by our limited success and we have learned much by our mistakes. I ask each clergyman and layman to respond in the fullest measure to this form of decision, making an honest weighing of alternatives, and the final determination of our work for the coming year. In most cases, this will mean returning to your several parishes and engaging in the hard and costly work of translating what you have learned into preaching and healing and setting at liberty those who do not understand what we are seeking to achieve. Not always observable, but in modest ways, we have sought to make our contribution to the urban crisis. The 1970 Program Budget asks for \$89,000 to assist the ministry of four inner city parishes. The ministry to Juvenile Court, Missouri and Meramec Hills, the Educational Assistance programs, the admirable work at Grace Hill House and the free outpatient care at St. Luke's Hospital are all indications of our good will. But because we must ever seek deeper involvement, I propose finally that this Diocese take further and significant action as a symbol to the metropolitan area, and, indeed, the whole state, that we mean to fulfill our ministry in response to the most insistent and desperate need of our society in these times. You are aware, I trust, through your Vicar or Rector, of the Resolution in regard to the low-cost housing which will be presented to the Convention on this very afternoon.

I stress most emphatically that this housing proposal in no way is to be considered as reparations. That concept is inappropriate and unjust to all concerned. But there is an echo in it, surely, of profound Christian significance and to the Jewish community, also. Whether one wants to quote John Donne or Lincoln's Second Inaugural, or whatever, the fact is that injustice and cruelty entail a cost on all who come afterward. It is ridiculous to measure this in terms of "\$15.00 a nigger," as Mr. Forman put it, and I'm sure he would not argue, even though he is currently out of the picture. But the facts of injustice, of the hurt this has inflicted, and continues to inflict on men and women, and the lethargy of the response of this nation, including its Christian citizens, to the situation, are facts of very great significance, and should be affirmed.

No forgetting or neglecting other opportunities, it is important that the Diocese in this year do one thing well. Housing is concrete and tangible. We can see housing rise before our eyes and very humbly acknowledge that this is our Church at work.

Every authority tells us that it is desperately needed. New Orleans is the only major city in the entire country whose housing is remarked as being poorer than that of St. Louis. But this need not be limited to this metropolitan area. Applications for assistance may be made to my appointed committee from northern or western or southern areas of the Diocese.



The cost of this housing is within our range. The Standing Committee has already endorsed my proposal. Using the Thompson Trust Fund as collateral, and about \$9,000 of annual income from the fund itself, I am prepared to loan, within a near time, to that housing agency which meets our criteria the sum of \$100,000. One hundred thousand dollars will produce about two million dollars' worth of housing

It is my earnest hope that more than a few parishes in Missouri, using their own endowments as collateral, will be prepared to loan together another \$100,000, and underwrite the interest of \$9,000. Further, I hope that members of the Diocese, on invitation, will be prepared to subscribe about \$9,000 to free yet another \$100,000. Here again, the Thompson Trust may be able to offer the collateral for this third piece of the Revolving Fund we mean to establish: \$9,000 each from Bishop's funds, parish endowments, and individual gifts — \$27,000 a year to loan \$300,000 to build six million dollars' worth of housing. Turn that over twice in one year and you will have shared in twelve million dollars' worth of housing. This is just one small thing that one small Church can do now to bring hope to those who are without hope.

Again, I would trust that this modest gesture would stimulate other denominations in Missouri to offer assistance in comparable ways. I would hope that business and industry might be similarly stimulated and I will invite them so to do. There is absolutely no reason why millions of dollars cannot be made available now. And if we are deaf to the cries of anguish, we will hear all too loudly the cries of dissonance.

It is not my intention now to spell out all the details or the answers to the practical questions you are already asking. In a very few moments, a resolution will be presented to you for debate, which I wish you to consider in the plenary session or in small groups.

When I have to make decisions, or take stands, on public issues which are unpopular with many of my friends in the Diocese, I adopt a very simple procedure. I try to understand all the aspects of the problem. Then I discuss it with advisors. Then I pray about it and try to hear what God is telling me to do. Then I act.

This housing proposal is over to you. I want you to think about it, talk about it, and, in your own way, pray about it. I don't want you to do what your Bishop wants you to do. I want you to do what you must do — for Christ's Sake. One word of counsel: I beg of you not to lose the substance over the minutiae. We have a very responsible Housing Committee. We have a very responsible Standing Committee. They may be trusted to work out the details.

Our society is at a peak of tension such as I have never known; and we need not more of it — but the chance to work together to meet the real issues of our time. But the secret of the dignity and tranquillity of free people in a society meant to be free is responsibility . . . the evidence we give of being able to confront real issues, to hear real protest, to face real anguish and to act responsibly as becomes people to whom so much has been given.\*

I say it in Christian terms because, however inadequately, I try at being Christian. St. Paul wrote, "Let a man so account of us as of the ministers of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God." This does not sound like false pride. This does not sound like fear or fury. This does not sound like people howling that some *deus ex machina* would make our tensions disappear. It does not sound like frightened people trying to buy an advantage with dollars.



It does sound like compassionate, responsible, free people — black, white, or anything else, who believe in the promise of America, who pray for the unity of mankind, who are committed in obedience to a law higher than any human ordinances, and who mean to be faithful to their convictions.\*

This old Diocese, which I have come to love, in the great traditions set by Bishops Tuttle, Scarlett and Lichtenberger, has as her chief mission to produce Christians like that. The decisions will be yours to make . . . indeed, they are yours to make. But make them in prayer and make them in love. Then, however you decide, there will be nothing to fear.

## Appendix No. 4

## THE STANDING COMMITTEE

There are three areas which this report will cover:

1. Specific issues raised by Diocesan Program which we commend for your adoption.
2. Some broader issues attendant to the conduct of diocesan affairs.
3. Brief summary of Standing Committee activities for 1968.

## A. The 1970 Diocesan Program and Asking

In the absence of a firm estimate of diocesan income for 1970, or any quantification of what the policy on salary increases for clergy might mean, Standing Committee reviewed the results of convocational deliberations. After some debate, Standing Committee agreed to forward to Convention a proposed program for 1970, estimated cost \$457,661. This is an increase of \$49,415 or 12% over the estimate of actual expenditures for 1969. However, this would require an increase of \$71,915, or about 23%, in the giving of missions and parishes. Standing Committee took this action for two reasons:

1. Standing Committee believes that diocese as a whole should consider the entire program as developed by convocations, SCAT groups and committees of concern.
2. Convention should either agree to support this program or specifically direct that it wants to set a different target. If it adopts the former course, it is likely a second round of convocational meetings will be required. If it adopts the latter course, it will have to debate priorities at this meeting.

At any rate, in our communion at least, budgets and programs are used as a focus of issues confronting us. Therefore, in that spirit, follows a record of Standing Committee action covering each major program area.

## 1. Office of the Bishop — \$83,507

While convocation recommendations ranged from \$80,000 to \$107,604, Standing Committee accepted Cabinet recommendation that \$22,000+ at this time not be added to the Office of the Bishop for a parish consultant. However, it is clear to many persons that the process which we have begun at diocesan level would also be useful to parishes and missions. These same persons also feel that, after support of the Bishop and clergy, the main priority of the diocese must be to strengthen the worshipping congregations. Then, and only then, as these congregations articulate their understanding of the nature of "mission" should non-parochial based mission and program receive any priority. This issue becomes sharpened when the Convention decides where to place its priorities if less funds than those requested are raised. In 1969, for example, this diocese cut back its pledge to the Executive Council in order not to reduce local work.

The Standing Committee did, on its own initiative, recommend to Convention that Bishop and the two full-time members of his cabinet (The Rev. Messrs. Ash and Rehkopf) each receive a \$600 per year increase in salary to offset the cost of living and inflation. The Standing Committee felt that it could hardly ask others in the diocese to consider favorably the report of the Committee on Clergy Stipends if it did not take this action.



## II. Administration and Institutions — \$68,200

## III. Aided Parishes and Missions — \$53,080

After considering the reports from the convocations, Standing Committee adopted the recommended expenditure as one package with the following provisos:

- (a) That \$53,080 be seen as the upper limit even if upward adjustment in individual line items are required in order to bring diocesan supported clergy up to the minimum salary guidelines.
- (b) That if salary adjustments create such a financial strain on the parish or mission so as to require a change in mode of operation of an individual congregation, then the convocations involved should work out a shared, ecumenical, non-stipendary, or any other mode of ministry that seems reasonable to meet the congregational need.
- (c) That continuance of diocesan supported operations in the city required the formation of CICM, so the equivalent for parishes and missions in this category should also be developed.
- (d) Until such a CICM equivalent process is started and a new style of ministry described (if required), current vacancies in diocesan supported aided parishes and missions in this category should not be filled.

## IV. Aided Ministries — \$127,204

Standing Committee concurred in the near unanimous support by the convocations for the work of MDEM (Missouri Delta Ecumenical Ministry) and the City Ministries (now under the auspices of the Council for the Inner City Ministries — CICM). Standing Committee was less happy with the college work program, as reflected by the apparent different views held by the different convocations, as well as with the report of the College Work Committee and SCAT group itself. Standing Committee perceives that there is a general question involved here which probably should be debated at some subsequent series of convocational meetings. This concerns diocesan responsibilities to a congregation which discovers a ministry which falls within its boundaries, in contradistinction to the case when a special ministry (not specifically parochially based) is established after study and recommendations. As far as college work is concerned, only two, the ecumenical ministry at Columbia, and the Ecumenical Campus Ministry in St. Louis fall in the latter case. As far as the Standing Committee can see, other monies proposed in the program are to defray extra congregational expense in dealing with a large college population. A majority view is the latter ought to be seen as ordinary parish expense, and college work budget should not be seen as a device to help bring a minister's salary up to diocesan minimums.

Standing Committee hopes that those concerned with college work will rework their report between now and the time budget is set so that special ministries being developed which might require major programmatic effort (and even possibly funding) are clearly spelled out. In short, barring more explicit instructions from Convention, left to its own devices, Standing Committee would rate programs which support parish college activity as relatively low priority for diocesan funding since the small sums involved should be raised by students and faculty concerned. Finally, Standing Committee concurs with the transfer of Trinity, Kirksville, from College Work to III Aided Ministries. Standing Committee believes that this congregation merits diocesan support with college work its special area of concern and focus; Trinity, Kirksville, should not be seen as a special ministry organized around college work.



#### V. Program and Service Divisions — \$14,500

The lack of understanding of the Christian Education Committee and related SCAT group reports is reflected in convocational budgetary proposals ranging from \$5,400 to \$36,250. Having dealt with the matter of a parish consultant under I above, Standing Committee felt that the modest increase proposed for training and youth programs was as much a mark of respect and thanks for the work of the Christian Education committee as a token that these two programs are of high priority (even though they are mostly staffed by volunteers and *ad hoc* groups). Standing Committee interprets the continuing cry of the laity for more support at the worshipping congregation level as a major priority. Standing Committee plans, as soon as after Convention as possible, to review with the Bishop and Cabinet plans for making as much of the present programmatic and planning load *ad hoc* or voluntary (using concerned clergy and lay person). The objective is to free up as much staff time as possible to spend with local congregations as they require in discovering their own purposes and priority.

#### VI. Mission of the Church in Nation and the World — \$111,170

Even the sum recommended falls short of our assessment from the Executive Council of \$114,420. Standing Committee felt, as painful as it is to some, that monies proposed for the companion relationship with Natal should be earmarked for the national church.

#### Over-All

Running through the six programmatic elements are certain specific issues which Standing Committee and Cabinet feel ought to be highlighted in convocational discussions at Convention.

1. Do we wish to support a challenging program to the parishes and missions which will require them to increase their pledge some 23% or does the Convention want to make its own estimate of income and alter the proposed program expense accordingly?
2. What continuing action can Convention take which will keep clergy salaries in line with experience, training and inflation?
3. Can we establish regional processes similar to what has begun with CICM so that Convention first, the convocations generally, and the laity above all, face up to what it really costs to operate meaningful programs in a region or place where there are not many people involved, or where there is not much resource? Can this be seen as a constructive task that requires not the threat of closing down a marginal operation, but as occurred notably in the case of the Bootheel ministries, how common cause can be made with others of similar concern and means?
4. What ought to be done voluntarily and what should be paid for by the Diocese? All are clear that each congregation ought to have as a prime task the motivation of the lay person to act in freedom out of his understanding of Christian concern. Yet methods of aggregating these concerns at congregational, diocesan, and even national levels for maximum impact are always shifting. How can an embodiment or institutionalization of common concern be kept flexible so that it does not become entrenched and divorced from the concerns of the people or the changing priority of the world.
5. The summary of convocational meetings list many of the "bugs" in the system or process we are using. Standing Committee would hope that the delegates would record their views as to what needs



to be done to stimulate greater participation by all in the work of the church. Particularly, Standing Committee is concerned how to overcome apathy and get people involved in the early planning or decision-making process. Such views should form part of the agenda for the next round of convocational meetings.

6. While the authors of the reorganization did not foresee the Missouri Plan, the canons enabling the Standing Committee to set budgets and review program after due process, are somewhat murky. In particular, given the fact of voluntary giving, we build our budget and programs from scratch each year. To date, we have recycled the process twice. The resolution the treasurer will introduce covering adoption of program and authority to set budget should be passed if convention delegates are willing to delegate in trust. On our longer term agenda is the clarification of Standing Committee role in a few crucial areas, of which this is one, though this Standing Committee is less concerned by writing its own charter than by acting to see that goals and programs of Convention are in fact executed.

B. Broader Issues, as Occasioned by the Work of Standing Committee Since Meeting of Last Convention

1. Standing Committee remains fearful of creating an elaborate committee structure merely to ensure consensus. Other denominations have created such elaborate infra-structures that often a meeting is seen as "action." The spirit of the reorganization was that *ad hoc* interest groups should be organized, yet it will be a rare group that will not propose "more" for its own concerns. We have to be careful in pressing the legislative-executive analogy too far in forming investigative groups of delegates (SCAT) and proposers and propounders of action (CICM, college work, Committee for Christian Education, and the like). If we can avoid multiplicity of roles, that is limit one man to one job rather than seeing one person in several different positions, not only would the basis of participation be broader, but conflict of interest might be minimized. Such an aim might be optimistic until the new concerns of the young are better represented.  
Standing Committee would like to have convocations wrestle with more than budgetary questions. Convocations might become reflection groups, sorting out various problem areas, such as nature of aided parishes, what are the new institutions the diocese needs to organize, are we clear what role continuing committees of convention ought to play, etc.
2. **Evangelism.** Virtually all lay people see the need to drive for, not just merely welcome, new members. While the record of increase in giving per communicant is outstanding over the last few years, the increase in Episcopal membership is not. This goal seems to be in conflict with a diocesan policy which states that no new work will be started by the Episcopal Church by itself. One result: no new work of any importance has been started since that policy was first enunciated.
3. What are the tests of new mission? The Potosi conferences and Standing Committee consultations with cabinet have taken only a small step in defining this path.
4. More general recognition that the Episcopal Church in the United States is by its polity a congregational organization. That is, while our imagery is episcopal and authority is symbolized by the person of the Bishop, in actual fact his authority to act is severely

circumscribed by canons, many of which date back to a time when the revolutionists of the 18th Century found the Established Church, with central authority, symbolic of what they had been striving to overthrow. Real authority in our communion is vested only in Convention and most bishops feel the pressure of the conflict between being an executive carrying out the wishes (and anticipating the same) of a diffuse constituency and that of a shepherd of a flock. Standing Committee perceives the thrust of the reorganization and the Missouri Plan and makes it mandatory that this diocese, at any rate, behave in congregational style. As a result, nourishing our constituency becomes not a casual matter, but rather a condition for survival. If we can live through these years of accommodating the need to gain greater individual understanding of our faith with the need to discover and build new mission to an ever-changing world, as a people gathered, others can as well. As a diocese, we might show others one way to overcome some of the polarizing forces at work in our time.

## THE REGISTRAR

The Registrar of a Diocese is required to record official acts (ordinations, receptions, admissions and dismissions of clergy, consecrations of churches, etc.) and to receive and protect books, documents and archives belonging to the Diocese and to some of the parishes and missions. Our collection includes the parochial registers of some 27 parishes, missions and institutions, most of them no longer in existence. Here are also the hand-written records of the first three diocesan conventions; the private registers of Bishops Robertson, Tuttle, and Johnson; confirmation records of the bishops since the beginning, and minutes of the Standing Committee and the Council. The collection includes also audiovisual records, motion pictures, slides, microfilms and tapes. If finances permitted many of the archives should be microfilmed; for old registers, some of them more than a century old, grow brittle and faint.

The Diocesan Archives maintains membership in the Society of American Archivists, a membership which gives the Registrar some status as an archivist! More importantly, it places the Diocese of Missouri among a select number of agencies known world-wide to have important materials.

We continue to provide resource material for persons interested in parish and diocesan history. Other groups use our files from time to time and our correspondence, while not voluminous, is interesting.

The importance of maintaining Church records becomes very evident when one observes the requests for records of baptisms before 1910. Persons nearing 65 finding themselves without birth certificates look to the Church for certification of age. Our collection of parochial registers is often in use and these requests come to us, as well as to the local parish which is still in operation.

We urge every local congregation to safeguard its records, especially its parochial Registers.

## Appendix No. 9

## Report of the Committee on Clergy Stipends

To the 130th Convention of the  
DIOCESE OF MISSOURI

The Committee on Clergy Stipends begs to report to the 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri that it has met more or less regularly since May, 1968, that it understands clergy stipends must be based on merit, performance and experience rather than need, and it wishes to recommend to the Convention the following:

1. The rationale by which the Committee has worked recommends that the 1969 financial priorities No. 1 and 2 be accepted for 1970 and succeeding years.

2. The minimum stipend shall be increased or decreased by the Bureau of Labor Statistics cost of living index change during the twelve-month period ending August 31 of the preceding year.

3. On the occasion of the first annual budget preparation after ten months of employment and annually thereafter for five years, the cash salary of each clergyman employed by the Diocese (bishop, vicar, staff, chaplains, etc.) shall be reviewed by the Executive Committee or other responsible authority. If his performance is satisfactory and adequate he shall be given a salary increase. The minimum increase shall be \$50 per month, a figure not to be construed as maximum or standard. If no salary increase is granted because of performance the reasons shall be communicated to the Bishop and to the man himself in writing. The final authority respecting the salary increase is the Bishop who shall respect the \$50 figure. If no increase has taken place in a three-year period, the matter shall be considered by the Standing Committee. There shall be no reduction in 1970 from the 1969 salary scale. Recognizing that after the first five years annual salary increases may not be as appropriate, nevertheless, the cash salary of each clergyman employed by the Diocese shall be reviewed by the authority at least annually and at any time the responsible authority feels it to be appropriate. The increase shall be at least \$50 per month, and based on evaluation of the clergyman's performance. If he is granted no salary increase during the second five-year period, his case shall be reviewed by the Standing Committee.

4. The Convention should take action to urge strongly that parishes follow the same procedure with their clergy.

5. The Committee recommends that by the proper amendments of the Canons there be created a permanent Committee on Clergy Stipends to consist of three clergy selected by the clerical members of the Standing Committee and three lay members selected by the lay members of the Standing Committee, and that the Office of the Bishop be directed to provide facilities, information and all other resources needed by this Committee.

## Appendix No. 10

## Report of the Ad Hoc Committee to Study the Matter and Position of "Aided Parishes"

Recognizing the ambiguity in the term "aided parish" which has no canonical status, the committee noted that aid is given and received for varying reasons. In some cases, the aid is used to meet the basic cost of parochial operation; in other situations, diocesan aid is granted to enable a parish to perform a program function in the name of the Diocese.

Last Spring, in order to test the mood and the will of the Diocese, the committee sent out a trial form of Canonical change for the study of Vestries and Bishop's Committees, asking for a response from these bodies. Twenty-one responses were received.

From these responses we noted the following: That there is a growing sentiment in the Diocese to eliminate distinctions between congregations as reflected by the terms "parish" and "mission". At the same time, it has been called to our attention that some form of supervision of Diocesan funds granted to parishes is a corollary of good stewardship. Finally, it has also been suggested that any attempt to change the status of a canonically defined parish to mission status is felt to be a punitive measure.

Because the issues are most complex, involving many canonical provisions which reflect the history and traditions of the church, and recommendations must deal with a number of theological and practical considerations which this committee has not been able to reconcile, therefore, it was the decision of this committee not to recommend any canonical action at this Convention.

The committee does recommend that it be continued for further study, that the office of the Bishop place this on the Agenda for Convocation meetings and that it be directed to report to the one hundred and thirty-first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

## Appendix No. 11

## Ad Hoc Committee on Theology of Confirmation

Diocese of Missouri — October 17, 1969

To: The Right Reverend G. L. Cadigan, Bishop of the Diocese of Missouri

**SUBJECT:** This is a tentative report. Its purpose is to show progress. It reflects the conversations held in the meetings of the Ad Hoc Committee on the relation of the theology of Confirmation to the theology of Baptism and the theology of the Holy Eucharist.

The responsibility of this report rests upon the chairman.

The committee has experienced several changes in personnel.

About eight meetings have been held since September 1968.

### The Action of the Church

It has been said that the task of the Church is letting persons know where in the realities of this earth environment the bread of creative life-giving self fulfillment beyond mere survival may be found.



### The Practical Situation

Contemporary ominous and benign realities include:

- large segments of poverty in the population of the nation where the high GNP suggests an affluent society;
- war with its losses in manpower, material, and prestige;
- wage-price problems and inflation and unemployment;
- pollutions of air, water, and soil;
- subsidies and the growing role of Federal and state governments;
- marvelous explorations of outer-space;
- transplants of vital organs;
- discovery of potent drugs;
- new insights which still place high value on the human element in an age of cybernetics;
- the development of sensitive instruments and techniques for the study of the earth environment through the field of ecology;
- and, many others.

### The Theory Upon Which Action Is Based

Reality is what an individual believes to be true. It may be true to him although no one else supports his view. Discerning or assessing reality is difficult because persons tend to over-simplify situations. Impediments come from varied sources. Reality is clouded by personal ideas of beauty, opinions, stereotypes, prejudices, hidden agenda, myths, and personal irrationalities and impotences. Persons are often victims of rumors and hear-say. Persons, therefore, appear to need considerable help in determining reality. Reality is significant because it arouses a person's mind and emotions. The mind-emotional behavior may be:

- 1) Life destroying. It may bring ill-health in the forms of hate, anger and fear because these emotions alienate behavior from reality and the personality is disintegrated.
- 2) Life-giving. It may bring health or wholeness by integrating the personality through love, faith, and hope.

When the mind-emotional behavior is integrated consistently through the creative life-giving love of God (agape — the love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ) the person interacts with reality in great hopefulness.

Baptism is an initiatory rite which acknowledges the capacity of the healthful person to interact with reality in a creative life-giving way.

Confirmation is a rite in which the person deliberately (the opposite of perfunctorily) commits himself to the creative life-giving love of God. It strengthens the baptismal covenant between and among persons and God.

Worship in the Holy Eucharist, which brings the person face-to-face with God in thanksgiving, is also a continuous renewal of the essence of Confirmation. While it offers corporate benefits such as clarification of intention, new insights, and the support of the fellowship, it also is where corporate life is climaxed — where God becomes the living presence among persons. The Church becomes therefore the people in loving action in which the individual is fulfilled because he is helping others and possibly the whole of society to be fulfilled.

## Report of the Episcopal Churchwomen — 1968 - 1969

How does one separate five years of one's life from a report which should be impersonal but cannot be because everything involved has had a personal connection.

The E.C.W. has been my main activity, concern and interest for so long that I almost feel as if I had lost my best friend.

It is such a comfort to know, in giving up the reins, that there are so many dedicated and capable women to carry on.

As always, the affairs of the women have been varied, the vice-president have been a constant source of strength making the many obligations somewhat lighter for the president. The first vice-president served as a member of the Fall Conference, Finance, sub-nominating committees and as chairman of Public Relations. She also served as a member of the Mayor's Committee for Youth Opportunity. The second vice-president served as the Fall Conference chairman, a conference for the women of the Missouri Diocese held annually in mid-October at Trout Lodge near Potosi, Missouri.

The Conference theme was the "Apple and the Silver Cord" which created a provocative atmosphere. The attendance was the largest in the four years the conferences have been held. The second vice-president also served on the sub-nominating committee and as chairman of the Annual Meeting in St. Louis last April.

The secretaries have functioned as usual with the promptness and accuracy necessary. The corresponding secretary served as Chairman of the Mimeographing and Printing, and the sub-nominating committees and on the Year Book committee. The recording secretary served on the Finance and Year Book committees, as well as representing the E.C.W. at the Missouri Council of Churches meeting in Kansas City last October.

The treasurer's job is one which requires great accuracy and a knowledge of figures. As chairman of the Finance Committee the treasurer is responsible for preparing the budget with the help of her committee. The budget is presented at the Annual Meeting for the approval of the women of the Diocese. It was unanimously approved. The funds are received from a majority of the parish guilds on a voluntary basis. The funds are distributed to our less fortunate fellow men around the world. Approximately \$15,000.00 in Special Gifts went through the E.C.W. books, beside the \$5,750.00 budget.

The altar guild directress is available for programs, and as a resource person for those who need information as to where supplies can be obtained, such as Altar Bread, silks, cottas, choir caps and fair linens, etc. The Loan Chest is maintained by her.

The Christian Education and Christian Ministries department recommended continued support of the summer programs at Ascension, St. Stephens and Trinity. Scholarship assistance was given to a student nurse at St. Luke's Hospital School of Nursing, and to the Mayor's Committee for Youth Opportunity Program, for inner city youth study in the county, called Stay in School. A teletype telephone machine was purchased and given to the Reverend Silas J. Hirte of St. Thomas Mission for the Deaf. This machine enables a deaf and dumb person to receive and send phone



calls. Assistance was also given to Delmo Homes. The chairman attended several outside meetings, such as the City Summer Youth Program.

This year the emphasis has been on the urban St. Louis community. In its efforts to obtain more volunteers, Grace Hill House asked the aid of the Christian Social Relations Chairman. A letter stressing this urgent need was enclosed with the brochure of job descriptions sent to all parish Christian Social Relations chairmen in the St. Louis area.

At the same time a request was made for trading stamps of all denominations to be redeemed for toys and clothes for the Grace Hill Christmas Bureau and for household articles for the Family Management homes. The response was quite satisfactory. There was also an appeal for Betty Crocker coupons from Malcolm Bliss Hospital. These coupons will be used toward the purchase of a Volkswagen bus to transport mentally disturbed children to clinics, recreation, etc. Several parishes and individuals have contributed quite generously to this.

The Chairman has also answered several informal inquiries about the various social agencies in the city. It is hoped that next year the scope will be broadened to include the whole diocese — and also national and world-wide needs.

The Church Periodical Club serves the church's program through the ministry of the printed word. It supplies reading, study, reference and teaching material, free of charge, to many who have not the means to obtain it. Wherever the church is at work — abroad or in our own country — CPC is also at work.

During the past year the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of Missouri participated in this work by giving complete sets of the **Interpreter's Bible** and **Interpreter's Bible Dictionary** to the two seminarians who are sponsored by the diocese and who are in their middle year. Since there were only two, we also gave two Textbook Scholarships of seventy-five dollars each for needy seminarians, not necessarily ours. In addition we sent four hundred dollars to the National Books Fund (CPC). Some of this went to St. Stephen's Library in Manila, Philippines, some to the Club's American Indian Fund for church school and library resource material, some for medical journals to stations served by the Hospital ship "Hope".

As a special diocesan project, we replaced dilapidated **Books of Common Prayer** used in the Chapel of St. Luke's Hospital with fifty new ones. In his letter of appreciation, Chaplain Swift wrote, "Now we shall not be embarrassed during our service by worn and battered books and we can point with pride to the church's concern for the hospital."

There are some parishes in which the Episcopal Churchwomen carry on CPC work on a local level by collecting, sorting and taking the best of current magazines to the sick, the shut-ins, the friendless and to community and school libraries. Some pack and send paperbacks to our men in service. Some buy new Hymnals and Prayer Books for their own parishes.

The Diocesan Director keeps in touch with Parish Chairmen by means of letters, reports and informative material. She attends Convocation Meetings, the Annual Meeting and the Fall Conference. At times she is one of a panel from the Executive Board presenting a program on the work of the women at a parish meeting. She acknowledges all contributions with a note of appreciation. The relationship is informal and pleasant.

The Church Periodical Club cannot possibly grant all the requests it receives but it grants as many as available funds permit. These funds come



from voluntary donations. Participating in this work is one of the most effective ways of carrying out Christ's command, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations —"

The Devotions Chairman continues to lead us in spiritual matters. The book of "Favorite Prayers" is still in demand and is available.

The Diocesan United Thank Offering Treasurer is a very important position, for it is through that all the women in our diocese receive information about the offering, and it is from the women she receives information about what is happening in the parishes and missions throughout the church. An active, interested treasurer not only disseminates information, but interprets the United Thank Offering and helps correct misinformation.

First of all, the United Thank Offering is **not** being phased out. Just as early contributors gave in thankfulness to the need of their time so the United Thank Offering is responding to the demands of the world today.

The 1968 spring in-gathering amounted to \$5,634.59 including \$18.98 interest. Thirty-five parishes and missions participated. The fall in-gathering had thirty-seven parishes and missions giving a total of \$5,796.62 including \$14.33 interest. The 1968 ingatherings were not as successful as in the past. Perhaps we are not as responsive to the needs of ours as we have been in previous years. Let us pray for a generous heart to give that we may share our diversity of gifts with others, thirty-six in number, allocated by the Executive Council's Committee for Women in September 1968 was \$1,352,714.06 — the total offering from October 1967 to September 1968. This procedure is in accordance with a resolution passed at the Triennial meeting in September 1967, to be distributed on an annual basis.

Two filmstrips were available, one "This Channel of Love" interpreting the United Thank Offering and the second "This Thy Child" showing how the U.T.O. affects the lives of many children. The filmstrips may be obtained from the U.T.O. treasurer or a convocation chairman.

There are two representatives-at-large to the ECW Executive Board. The Yearbook chairman is responsible for the annual edition of the Yearbook, which contains information to assist the women of the diocese in their various activities. It is particularly valuable to officers and department chairmen in planning their work. It contains the list of the members of the Executive Board, a master list of parish officers, the current list of clergy, and a calendar of events for the churchwomen, as well as, other reports.

Two copies are given to each parish and mission, one for the Rector and one for the President of the women's guild. Other copies may be purchased.

The other representative-at-large represents the ECW at all Churchwomen United affairs, such as General Board Meetings, World Community Day, World Day of Prayer, the Annual Meeting, monthly planning sessions for District 15. The usual soliciting and delivering of cookies, candies and blankets went on as always.

There are four convocation chairmen who are a very important part of the ECW. It is not easy for the President to be in all places in the Diocese too often. Strong, dependable convocation chairmen are the main liaison between the Executive Board and the women of the Diocese. The convocation meetings this year were held at Palmyra, April 9th in the North Convocation; Jefferson City, April 21st in the West Convocation; Cape Girardeau, April 30th in the South Convocation, and on November 18th and May 8th in St. Louis in the East Convocation.



In Seattle, in September, 1967, Presiding Bishop John E. Hines called on the Episcopal Church to "take its place humbly and boldly alongside of, and in support of, the dispossessed and oppressed peoples of the country for the healing of our national life". In response to his leadership the 62nd General Convention set up the Special Program, giving it top priority for our Church's use of personnel, time and money for the years 1968-1970. In November, 1967, following General Convention, the Presiding Bishop, in consultation with the elected members of the Executive Council, appointed a staff, now Section Four of the Executive Council, to carry out the program.

#### Goals of the General Convention Special Program

In order to implement the vision and mandate of the General Convention, three goals were established.

1) To help the poor and disenfranchised, particularly the black and brown communities, gain social, political and economic power in order to have an effective voice and visible presence in the decisions which affect their own lives.

2) To provide initiative and support for the development of church and community organizations which are attempting to eliminate racist practices within the Church and other organizations.

3) To assist in the use of the Church's influence and economic power, separately and in coalition, in order to support justice and self-determination for the poor and powerless.

It is important to measure the progress of the program against these goals.

The continuation of the 1967 General Convention will be held August 31st to September 5th. This meeting will be held in South Bend, Indiana at Notre Dame University. In addition to the elected deputies, a non-voting body has been invited to attend and participate in the discussion groups. Each Diocese was asked to select three persons, a woman, a youth and a non-white. Mrs. Walter Swearngen will represent the women.

The members of the ECW Executive Board, the chairmen of the various departments in the parishes, all the women of the Diocese express their deep gratitude and appreciation for the concern for the work of the women expressed by the clergy in our diocese, and for the gracious understanding of Bishop Cadigan.

It has been a rare privilege to serve my God, my Church and my friends. The remembrance of many stimulating, pleasant and some unpleasant moments will always be in my heart. I thank you for giving me this opportunity.

## Appendix No. 14

# Articles of Agreement for The Inter-Church Association of Metropolitan St. Louis

(Hereafter referred to as the Association)

## Article I. NAME

The name of the Corporation shall be The INTER-CHURCH ASSOCIATION OF METROPOLITAN ST. LOUIS.

## Article II. PURPOSE

The mission of the Association shall be to enable church judicatories of Metropolitan St. Louis in both Illinois and Missouri, better to fulfill the proclamation of the Christian Gospel in both word and action and thereby enable the renewal of Man's life in society.

## Article III. DURATION

The Corporation shall have perpetual duration.

## Article IV. REGISTERED AGENT

The address of the Registered Agent of the Corporation is Room 400, 1528 Locust St., St. Louis, Missouri; and the name of the Corporation's Agent at the said office address is B. Bruce Whittemore.

## Article V. DISPOSITION OF ASSETS

In the event of dissolution of this Corporation, or if for any reason the purposes of this Corporation should become impossible of performance, all assets remaining after all liabilities and obligations of the Corporation have been paid, satisfied and discharged, or adequate provision made therefor, shall be distributed to one or more organizations organized and operated for similar exempt purposes or for other purposes within the purview of section 501 (c) (3) and which have exemptions from Federal Income Tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the 1954 Internal Revenue Code or such section as it may be amended or a corresponding provision of a prior law, or to the Federal, State or Local government, for a public purpose.

## Article VI. LIST OF DIRECTORS

- A. In order to fulfill its mission, the objectives of the INTER-CHURCH ASSOCIATION OF METROPOLITAN ST. LOUIS shall be:
1. To perform a ministry in the Metropolitan Area on behalf of the member denominational judicatories in the establishment of mission priorities.
  2. To enable ecumenical groups to plan for and execute a United Witness.
  3. To provide planning and research services to denominations and ecumenical groups.



4. To develop communication among and within the churches and interpret mission within the metropolitan community.

#### BY-LAW II. AREA

The Association shall serve the St. Louis Standard Metropolitan Statistical area and Monroe County. This includes in Missouri, Franklin, Jefferson, St. Charles, St. Louis Counties, and St. Louis City; in Illinois, Madison, St. Clair, and Monroe Counties.

#### BY-LAW III. MEMBERSHIP

- A. Procedure—The members of the Association shall be denominational judicatories responsible for program in the above geographical area which
  1. Take official action to join the Association,
  2. Accept the mission and objectives stated above in Article II and By-Law 1.
  3. Designate representatives to the Administrative Board as set forth below, and,
  4. Provide financial support for the program and operation of the Association.
- B. Definition—For purposes of determining membership in the Association, a denominational judicatory shall be considered as any group of Christian congregations in the area which have a common confession, common tradition or common policy, and which are so related to each other that they can engage as a group in common witness and mission, and act to fulfill the criteria in A. above.
- C. Voting Power—All powers of the Corporation shall be vested in an Administrative Board except the power to amend the Articles of Agreement.
- D. Disclaimer—Any member judicatory may disassociate itself from any specific action of the Association. However, the Association shall not be prevented from implementing its decision thereby.

#### BY-LAW IV. ORGANIZATION

- A. Board—An Administrative Board shall manage the affairs of the Association.
- B. Composition—
  1. The Administrative Board shall consist of:
    - a. The chief executive officer of each judicatory. In the event there is no resident executive, a representative named by him or by the judicatory may serve.
    - b. Each member judicatory with more than six congregations in the area shall be entitled to name one additional representative. These members shall be chosen by the judicatory according to its own practice and for such term as the judicatory may determine.
    - c. The chairman of each operating unit (see V,B.) and Auxiliary (VI).
  2. The judicatory shall certify annually before January 1 the names of its representatives.



3. Vacancies in B, 1 (a) and (b) above shall be filled by the member judicatory and in (c) by the operating unit.
- C. Quorum—A quorum of the Administrative Board shall be a majority of the members of that Board in categories B, 1 (a), (b), and (c).
- D. Meetings—
1. The Administrative Board shall meet at least quarterly at a schedule to be determined by itself.
  2. Special meetings may be called by the president and shall be called if requested by five board members.
  3. The first meeting held in each new year shall be the Annual Meeting.
- E. Officers—The Administrative Board shall elect its own officers: a President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.
- F. Nominations—A Nominating Committee of five (5) members from five (5) denominations shall be nominated by the President at the last meeting of the year and confirmed by the Administrative Board.
- G. Records—The Administrative Board shall provide for accurate records of its proceedings and financial transactions.
- H. Powers—
1. The Administrative Board shall establish the general policies of the Association and its operating units, approve budgets and review the work of the operating units.
  2. The Administrative Board shall be responsible for securing necessary funds to underwrite approved budgets.
  3. The Administrative Board shall establish necessary staff positions and provide for securing personnel, except otherwise provided in V,A, (5) (b).
  4. The Administrative Board shall define the operating units of the Association and provide for their support. An accurate listing of these units and their task descriptions shall be kept with these by-laws.
- I. Executive Committee—
1. The five (5) officers plus an equal number plus one (6) elected by the Board shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Board.
  2. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to act for the Administrative Board when it is not possible for the Board itself to act, and shall have such other powers as the Board assigns to it.
  3. Every action of the Executive Committee shall be reviewed by the Administrative Board
- J. Assembly—The Administrative Board shall convene an assembly at least once a year for the purpose of communication with constituency. It shall be composed of at least (9) representatives of each judicatory, and three (3) from each ecumenical group. Its powers shall be advisory and consultative only.

#### BY-LAW V. OPERATING UNITS

- A. The Association shall operate through Commissions, Committees, and Task Forces on particular issues.
1. Membership—Operating Units shall be composed of a) staff and unit chairmen of member denominations responsible in each designated field, and b) such other persons elected into membership as



they deem appropriate. Membership shall be reported to the Administrative Board at its first meeting following January 1st.

2. **Quorum**—A majority of the members of an operating unit shall constitute a quorum.
3. **Meetings**—Regular meetings shall be determined by the unit itself. Ordinarily they shall meet at least bi-monthly. Special meetings shall be called at the request of 25% of its members or by the Administrative Board.
4. **Organization**—Each unit shall elect its own officers and determine its own procedure within the general policies established by The Administrative Board. It shall provide for accurate records of its proceedings and financial transactions.
5. **Powers**—Each unit shall:
  - a. Identify opportunities and priorities for the Ministry of the Church in its particular field beginning with priorities established by the Administrative Board.
  - b. Establish and execute programs appropriate to its specific responsibilities and hire necessary staff with the exception of the Director who shall be mutually agreed upon by the Administrative Board and the Board of the operating unit.
  - c. Report its priorities, program, budget and recommendations to the Administrative Board. Funds from outside sources may be sought with permission of the Administrative Board.
  - d. Recommend to the Administrative Board, the denominations and other ecumenical groups appropriate action with respect to issues, priorities and program development.
  - e. Coordinate its work with other units of the Association, the denominations and other operations through the Staff Systems Planning Unit.
  - f. Units may, within the general policies of the Association, contract with other bodies for work appropriate to their own fields. Such contracts shall be reported to the Administrative Board for approval.

B. The Operating Units and their tasks shall be:

1. **Commissions**
  - a. **Communications**—will provide for ministry to individuals in the community through the mass media and develop the necessary agency for communication among the churches and denominations in order to enable more effective accomplishment of ministry.
  - b. **Ecumenical Group Development**—will encourage and support the development of grass roots ecumenism in geographical sections of the metropolis and work with ecumenical groups developed on other bases (e.g. vocational or issue oriented groups).
  - c. **Institutional Ministries**—will initiate, develop, service, coordinate, support, and extend chaplaincies and other ministries aimed at serving people confined to public and private institutions of all kinds (Hospitals, jails, homes . . .).
  - d. **Urban Affairs, Inter-religious Center for**—will stimulate and develop programs of research, planning, training and action with respect to urban problems to enable the religious community to respond to the metropolis and its needs.
  - e. **Planning and Research**—will provide an arena for decision making in the cooperative churching of the metropolitan area, develop contacts with governmental and private sources of research data so as to make appropriate information available to the Association and the denominations.



2. **Board Committee (s)**  
**Finance**—will institute fund raising procedures, prepare income estimates for the Administrative Board and oversee the internal fiscal operations of the Association.
3. **Task Forces** may be authorized by the Administrative Board upon recommendation of a Commission to provide visibility for, and initial strategizing on behalf of, particular issues. They shall be established for specific periods of time and be subject to continuation only if, in the judgement of the Board, conditions warrant.
4. **Staff Systems Planning Unit**—will coordinate the work of all operating units of the Association, channel all necessary data to the Administrative Board, and maintain the effective working processes of the Association.

#### BY-LAW VI. AUXILIARIES

- A. Auxiliaries to the Association may be formed upon approval of the Administrative Board. (Initially these shall be Church Women United, the Association of Christian Education Workers and United Church Men).
- B. The Auxiliaries shall elect their own officers and determine their own organization, structure, program and budget.
- C. Auxiliaries shall be permitted to solicit funds from churches only with consent of the Board.

#### BY-LAW VII. AMENDMENT

These by-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members of the Administrative Board at any regular or special meeting called for the purpose provided 30 days written notice is given and includes the exact wording of the proposed change.

# Minutes of the 130th Convention

## Adjourned Session

### February 6 - 7, 1970

Christ Church Cathedral  
St. Louis

Friday, February 6, 1970

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the 130th Convention of the Diocese of Missouri assembled in the Adjourned Session in the Nave of Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, at 4:10 P. M., on Friday, February 6, 1970.

Bishop Cadigan was in the chair and called upon the Rev. Roy Welke to open the meeting with prayer.

The presence of a constitutional quorum was determined by the Secretary. (Appendix No. 1)

The Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business, Archdeacon Rehkopf, introduced Resolution No. 1; which following a second was adopted:

RESOLVED that the matter of a Budget and Program for the Diocese of Missouri for 1970 shall be the first priority in this session of the Convention and that no other business, other than the election of one Clerical member of the Standing Committee, shall be considered until that matter has been accomplished; and be it further

RESOLVED that the following Order of Business shall be substantially followed in this Adjourned Session:

Report of the Committee on Nominations

Ballots to be cast as the members of the Convention leave the hall.

The Bishop's Address

Division of Clergy and Lay Delegates into Convocation groupings for consideration of the 1970 Program.

Recess not later than 9:00 P. M. until Saturday morning. Following the adjournment one person from each Convocation group will meet with the Standing Committee and the staff of the Office of the Bishop to prepare one Budget for submission to the morning session.

Saturday, February 7, 9:00 A. M.

Convention reassembles in the Nave

Presentation of the Proposed Budget by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

Discussion of this in small diverse groups for one hour.

Plenary session for further consideration and action.

Other business if time permits

Holy Communion in the Cathedral



Adjournment *sine die*, not later than 1:00 P. M.

Mr. George T. Guernsey III, chairman of the Committee on Nominations and Election Procedure placed the following names in nomination for the Standing Committee (clerical order, to 1972):

The Rev. Frank N. Butler  
The Rev. Harry E. Maurer  
The Rev. Charles H. Morris  
The Rev. James S. Paget

There being no further nominations the list was declared closed and ballots distributed for collection as the members of the Convention left the hall.

The Bishop read his Address to the Convention. (Appendix No. 2)

Dr. Richard S. Gordon presented the following tasks to the seven regional or convocational groupings:

The task to be performed by 9:30 P. M. is as follows:

1. Deal with these issues in this order:
  - I. Set up an operating Budget for 1970 based on an expected income, determining which items are to be reduced or eliminated.
  - II. Respond to the question "Do we want to accept these cuts, or do you want to raise more money?"
  - III. If we choose to raise more money:
    - a. How much?
    - b. What method of fund raising to recommend to Convention?
    - c. By what date should the fund raising be completed?
    - d. What items are to be restored to the budget, and in what order of priority?
2. Elect one Convocation representative to take our responses to these questions to the negotiation session with Standing Committee and Cabinet. The negotiation session will begin at 9:30 P. M. in room 109. Results of this work will be presented to Convention Saturday morning for debate and action.

The Convention recessed at 5:45 P. M. in order that its members might take part in the group discussions. Supper was served in the form of a box lunch during the evening.

Saturday, February 7, 1970

The Convention reconvened at 9:10 A. M. in the Nave of the Cathedral, the Bishop in the chair. Dr. James Hood opened the meeting with prayer.

The Chairman of the Committee on Dispatch of Business moved the adoption of Resolution No. 3; which following a second, was adopted:

RESOLVED that as a Special Order of Business this Convention hear at this time from the President of the Standing Committee a report from the discussion groups and Negotiation Session on Friday; and be it further

RESOLVED that following his report the Convention resolve itself into small, diverse, groups, to discuss for forty minutes the Report; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Convention then reconvene in plenary session for the consideration and adoption of the Budget for 1970



and such other business as may be before it, adjourning not later than noon with the Holy Communion.

The President of the Standing Committee, Dr. Richard S. Gordon, then reported substantially as follows:

1. All seven groups accomplished their task of establishing a budget within the expected income of \$325,000, with some minor differences in various items. All indicated dissatisfaction with it.
2. There was no unanimity that we should raise more money, but consensus favored this.
3. As to method, it is clear that the Convention must request a campaign, but cooperation of total team is required (clergy, diocese, vestries, people.)
4. Resolution No. 3, to be introduced later, was presented as a method.
5. The groups dealt with the matter of priorities should additional funds be raised.

The Rev. Mr. Ash then outlined the procedure for the small group discussions to follow:

The Convention recessed into fourteen small groups at 9:30 A. M.

The Convention reconvened at 10:30 A. M.

Mr. Guernsey, chairman of the Committee on Election procedure, reported that the Rev. Frank N. Butler, DD, had been elected to the Standing Committee by a large majority. The announcement was greeted with applause.

Mr. Charles C. Allen, Jr., treasurer of the Diocese moved that the proposed Budget in the amount of \$324,392, based on expected income of \$325,000, be the operating budget of the Diocese for 1970. The motion was seconded.

The Rev. Dr. Nicholson moved an amendment asking each congregation to increase its giving by 15%. There was no second.

Mr. Arthur Ferguson moved an amendment: that \$10,000 be restored to the Division of Program and Planning, and a like amount be removed in this way: \$2,500 from CICM, \$2,500 from Aided Congregations and \$5,000 from the Executive Council; and that these amounts replace Program and Planning in the priority list. The motion received a second.

Upon request the Bishop repeated the portion of his Address in which he referred to the role of the Division of Program and Planning in the matter of renewal of parish life.

The Rev. Mr. Burton moved as a substitute: That the motion of Mr. Allen be accepted with the following exceptions:

1. That the \$10,000 for the Office of Program and Planning be returned to the proposed budget;
2. That the above \$10,000 be removed from the amount pledged to the Executive Council;
3. That the above \$10,000 be placed at the lowest point in the order of restoration as offered by the negotiators.

The motion received a second and upon being put was declared defeated.

Mr. Ferguson's motion was put to a vote and declared defeated.

Mr. Allen's motion was then put and adopted.



Dr. Gordon thereupon moved the adoption of Resolution No. 3:

RESOLVED that a Committee be appointed by the Bishop and Standing Committee for the purpose of raising additional funds for the operation of the Diocese in 1970; and be it further

RESOLVED that this Committee be directed in planning strategy to cooperate with vestries in approaching parishes and missions; and be it further

RESOLVED that the sum of money raised or pledged be reported to the Standing Committee no later than May 1, 1970.

The resolution received a second.

Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley moved Resolution No. 3 be amended by deleting paragraph No. 2 and substituting the following:

RESOLVED that this Committee be directed to coordinate their plans with vestries and clergy and that vestries and clergy be urged to give full support to this special fund-raising effort; and be it further

The amendment received a second. Following discussion it was adopted.

Following added discussion the resolution as amended was put and adopted.

The Bishop addressed the Convention in gratitude for its action, and said he would like to see every communicant given an opportunity to express his concern.

Dr. Gordon moved that the priority list be approved. The motion was seconded. (Appendix No. 4)

The Rev. Mr. Miller moved as an amendment that the priority list be readjusted, moving ECM to No. 4, thus making No. 6 \$29,645, and eliminating No. 8. Following a second the motion was put to a vote and declared lost by 76-71.

The Rev. Dr. Nicholson urged that decisions such as these be based on theological foundations. He asked again for discussion of asking for increased giving on the part of parishes.

The Rev. Mr. Miller moved the previous question. Following a second the motion was passed.

Dr. Gordon's motion to approve the list of priorities was put to a vote and adopted.

Mr. William F. Orr introduced Resolution No. 4 and moved its adoption. Following a second the resolution was adopted.

WHEREAS pledges of parishes and missions for support of diocesan programs in 1970 were reduced \$80,000 from that paid in 1969, and \$90,000 from 1968; and

WHEREAS this would have resulted in drastic reductions in diocesan programs and in giving to support of the national Church; and

WHEREAS the reconvened 130th Convention of the Diocese has voted to support additional efforts to fund certain diocesan programs in an order of priorities established by it - sharing such additional funds as are raised with the national Church - therefore be it

RESOLVED that the reconvened 130th Convention assembled

recommends to the Bishop, Cabinet and Standing Committee that a thoroughboing reassessment of Diocesan programs be made in 1970 with a view toward proposing and communicating 1971 programs which will enlist the willing support necessary to fund them; and be it further

RESOLVED that such reassessment place a high priority on programs to rebuild the parish and mission vitality and confidence in the Diocesan Mission to preach the Gospel to people, both within and outside the Church.

The Rev. Mr. Schweizer moved Resolution No. 5, which following a second was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Bishop be advised to change the date of the 131st Convention of this Diocese to a day after the first day of January 1971.

The hour of noon having arrived at which time adjournment was to take place, the Rev. Mr. Kunz moved that the rule be suspended for ten minutes to allow him to place a matter before the Convention. Following a second motion was adopted and Mr. Kunz allowed to speak.

The Rev. Mr. Kunz moved that a process of goal setting and evaluation be developed and completed by November 1 and communicated to the members of the Convention. Following a second the motion was adopted.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Bishop was given authority to certify to the correctness of the minutes of this Adjourned Session of the 130th Convention.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the Convention adjourned *sine die* at 12:15 P. M.

Following adjournment the Bishop, assisted by the Very Rev. Thom W. Blair, the Ven. Charles F. Rehkopf and the Rev. Richard Ash celebrated the Holy Communion in the Cathedral. The Epistle was read by the Chancellor of the Diocese, the Hon. William R. Bascom. The Intercession was read by Mr. William Van Cleve. The offering, in the amount of \$70.00 was added to the Bishop's Friends Fund.

## Appendix No. 2

ADDRESS BY BISHOP GEORGE L. CADIGAN TO  
ADJOURNED SESSION OF 130th CONVENTION OF  
THE DIOCESE OF MISSOURI, FEBRUARY 6, 1970

This Convention address begins with a story. One of the greatest figures in literature, the Russian novelist, Tolstoy, at a certain period in his life, summed up his condition by the telling of an old Eastern fable about a traveler who was attacked in a desolate wood by a fierce, wild beast. With the animal in pursuit, the traveler ran until he was at the point of exhaustion. Fortunately, he came across an empty well into which he hastily lowered himself. A root protruded from the mouth of the pit, and to that he clung for his security. At the mouth of the well he could see all too clearly the menacing animal. He turned to descend lower, but saw in the bottom of it a huge dragon waiting him with gaping jaws. Therefore, he was immobilized. He could not go lower and he could not climb out. His temporary security lay in his ability to hang onto the slender root. But his strength began to fail and he knew he could not hold on much longer. Suddenly he saw two mice, one black and one black, each gnawing through the root to which he clung. He looked around. Finding some bees' honey on the leaves of a plant, he stretched out his tongue and licked at the sweet stuff while awaiting his doom.

Tolstoy made his own application of the fable, but, without pressing it too far, there is perhaps some resemblance to our own predicament. We are gathered in this second session of Missouri's 130th Convention. It is our assignment to consider a budget which reflects a radical financial loss. Why is this so? Are we disintegrating as a Diocese? Is the institutional Church which has mothered us all at an end. Does the mission of this Church have meaning for our existence? Are we entering a post-Christian civilization? How can we make any sense of these torturous times? How can we live without fear? These and other questions are on the minds of many of us and it is small comfort to know that our money problems are comparable to those of most other dioceses and most other denominations, as well.

We are well acquainted with the obvious causes for dollar deficits. The Church's participation in public issues; in the confrontations in the Diocese; at South Bend; and the reaction to the same; the funding of community organizations by the National Church; and your Bishop's identification with certain issues such as the rent strike, the Legal Aid Society, and his pushing for involvement in public housing.

However, more basic than the current hostility toward the Church is the anxiety of many folk toward change itself. That revolution, which touches our lives on every hand, is a threatening thing and the Church is the easy mark at which to aim hostility. In T. S. Eliot's "Murder in the Cathedral", you will remember that the Archbishop had been forced into exile for seven years. Suddenly word comes that he is returning to his native land. Some people are so happy that they pull the hairs from the tail of his horse for souvenirs. But many others are not happy. The poet makes them say,

"We do not wish anything to happen.  
Seven years we have lived quietly,



Succeeded in avoiding notice,  
 Living and partly living.  
 There have been oppression and luxury,  
 There have been poverty and license,  
 There have been minor injustice.  
 Yet we have gone on living,  
 Living and partly living . . ."

The lines go on in in this vein and then suddenly Eliot has the people say:  
 "O Thomas our Lord, leave us and leave us be . . ."

The people want the Archbishop to leave England and return to France. But if the Archbishop is synonymous with change, and I believe he is - it is partly the responsibility of the Church to help people embrace change.

We are also in crisis because the Church is not serving people in their simple elemental needs. Many people all over the world are simply turning away from the Church because it no longer brings meaning to their lives. Boredom and disinterestedness with things religious is a prevalent mood.

It is for all these reasons and many more, too, that my first priority for this year, and the year after, too, is the strengthening of parish life. The Office of Program and Planning will be freed to give full time to sustain, to create and to enthuse new power into every level of the parish. A committee has been appointed to concern itself with ways and means that this Diocese may assist in renewal of liturgy, education, youth work, stewardship and pastoral ministry. The Reverend Richard Ash is a warm personal friend, but I am not here protecting a fair-haired boy. I believe that, at this point in history, his gifts are essential to the health and resuscitation of the Church in Missouri.

Your Standing Committee presented to you at the Convention in St. Charles a program budget of \$457,661. Such a budget was dependent upon pledges from the missions and parishes of the Diocese, amounting to \$382,661. As of this date, the pledges received amount to only \$230,300. With endowment income gifts from the Thompson Fund, and the Bishop's Friends Fund, such will support a budget of \$305,300, which is far below subsistence level. While there has been marked falling-off in the giving of a few parishes, and I am understanding of this, great credit must be given to many parishes who have not only held the line, but in some cases have

increased and even doubled their giving. To pay the salaries of our own clergy in the field, to offer a greatly reduced amount to the Executive Council, and to sustain only a minimum of operation, the budget needs an additional \$71,000 for a total of \$396,282.

This Convention, therefore, must respond to three major issues:

The first issue is how to budget the money we have reason to count on for 1970. Which items are you willing to fund and which are you willing to see reduced or eliminated? Whatever other decisions are made, we must have an operating budget based on income by the time this Convention finishes its work tomorrow.

The second issue is whether or not we should seek to raise more money. The Standing Committee recommendations include this possibility. If the response of the Convention to the raising of additional funds is negative, the matter rests at that point.

On the otherhand, should the Convention determine its willingness to fund a larger budget, then it will become your responsibility to recommend



the means by which further money is to be obtained. Would you propose a special fund raising committee? Would you approve an appeal from the Bishop to the whole Diocese? What, if any role, would you assign to your Bishop in this? And what deadline for the completion of such a venture would you approve?

The third issue is conditional upon the answer you give to the second. If your decision is to raise more money, then it will be necessary to determine which of those items we have reduced or eliminated from our budget are to be returned, and in what order of priority. The Standing Committee suggestions may serve as a guide, but the Convention must decide whether to accept this set of priorities or to establish a priority list of its own.

This is the difficult task which lies before us in these next hours. My chief concern at this moment and hopefully your chief concern is the joyous and enthusiastic awareness that we are not fifty-six independent congregations, but that we are one Church, all mutually joined and interdependent one upon the other. The issues are in your hands and may the Holy Spirit be with us all.

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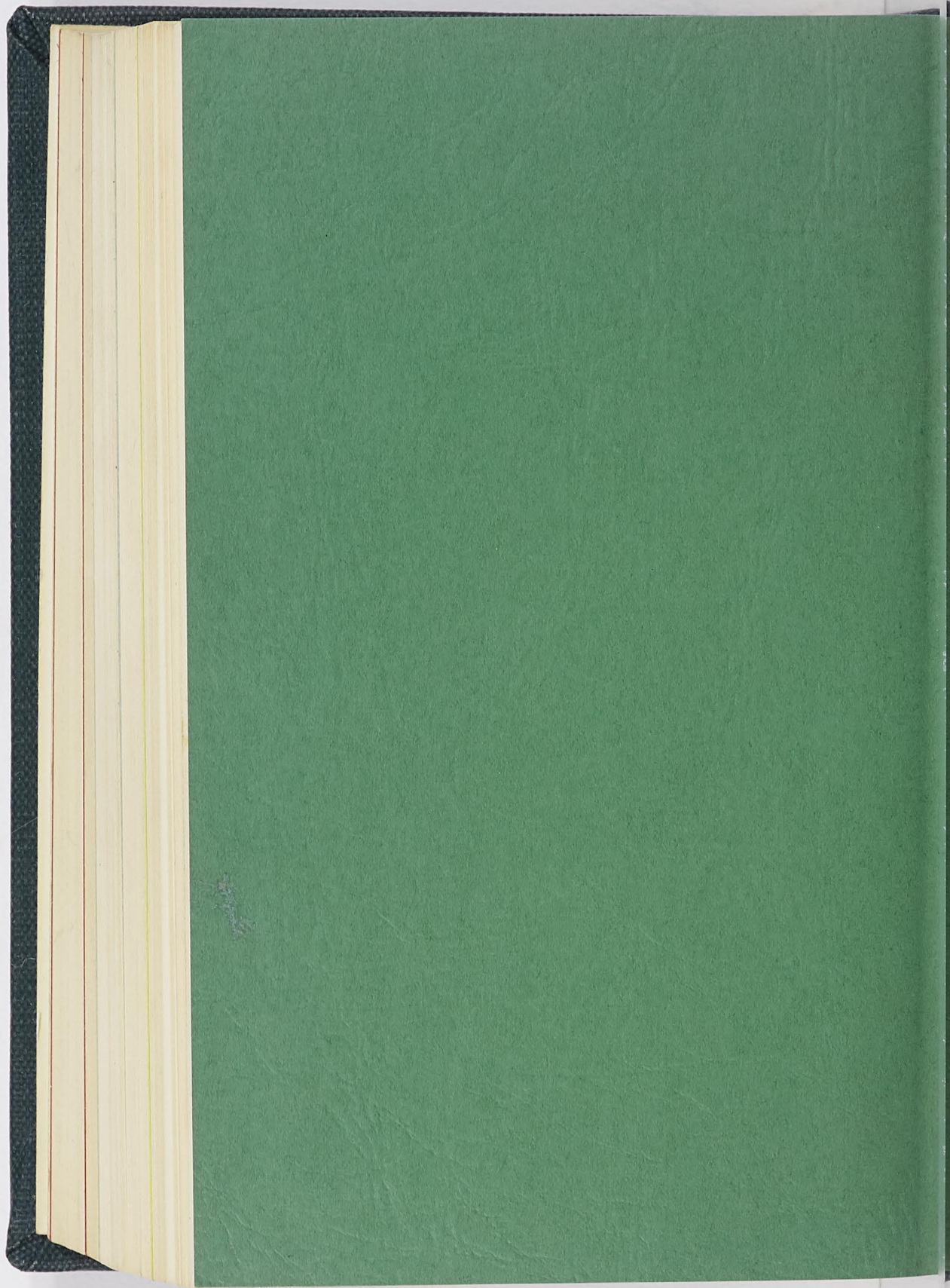
