## Rules of Order of the Convention.

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1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:
  - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
  - II. On Constitution and Canons.
  - III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
  - IV. On Dispatch of Business.
  - V. On the State of the Church.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.
11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon. All annual reports shall be received and filed by the Secretary as presented before or during the Convention, and may be called up on motion to be read and considered at any time during the Convention.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates

shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

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**MINUTES**

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Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis,  
Tuesday, January 30, 1940.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the One Hundred - First Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri assembled in the Dean Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial on Tuesday, January 30, 1940, at 4 P.M., with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-nine who were entitled to vote, twenty-four were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 13).

The Secretary called the roll of the thirty-nine Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-seven were present.

A quorum being present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly convened.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted for this Convention, with the insertion of the item, "Deputies and Provisional Deputies to the General Convention," in Paragraph 17 of the Order of Business.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 2, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

RESOLVED, That at the close of this afternoon's session this Convention shall adjourn to meet this evening after dinner, and at the close of this evening's session shall adjourn to meet tomorrow forenoon at nine o'clock.

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. L. H. Nugent was appointed a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

By authority of the Convention, the Bishop appointed the following named Nominating Committee:

The Rev. Early W. Poindexter, Jr., the Rev. Dr. H. A. Woolfall, Mr. S. B. Sheldon, and Mr. B. P. Williams.

The Secretary announced that the following named reports had been received and filed:

Dean Sweet made a report for the Finance Department.

Dean Sweet introduced Resolutions Nos. 3, 4, and 5, which were adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri is directed to take out Retirement Contracts with the Church Life Insurance Corporation on behalf of all its lay employes, the premium on which contracts shall be 6% of the salary paid to the respective employe, 3% payable by the Diocese of Missouri and 3% payable by the employe, and that the budgets are hereby increased as necessary to accomplish this payment. And be it further

RESOLVED, That the establishment of Retirement Contracts for lay employes is commended to all parishes, missions, and other organizations of this Diocese, whose lay employes are deprived by law of the benefits of the Social Security Act; and that all such parishes, missions, and other organizations as decide to undertake this plan shall consider the Social Security Act rates as the minimum premium to be adopted, at this time 1% payable by employer and 1% payable by employe; but that a larger premium, up to 3% payable by employer and 3% payable by employe, shall be preferable.

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Assessments for the Diocesan Fund as recommended by the Diocesan Council for 1940 be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Expense Budget for 1940, amounting to \$16,372.90. (Appendix 10A.)

Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That the schedule of Apportionments for the Church Program Fund as recommended by the Diocesan Council for 1940 be adopted; and that the proceeds therefrom, together with all additional money received for this Fund by the Treasurer, be appropriated to pay the Diocesan Church Program Budget for 1940, amounting to \$26,901.68 (Appendix 10B), and the Expectancy of \$12,000.00 for 1940 to the Treasurer of the National Council.

The Convention authorized the Treasurer to send a contribution of \$500.00 to the National Council for the Church Program in addition to the Diocesan Expectancy of \$12,000.00.

The Rev. Mr. Heim presented his report as Chairman of the Department of Religious Education, supplemented by addresses by Mr. Richard Wheatcroft and the Rev. Mr. Poindexter, which was received and filed.

Miss Betty Campbell presented the report of the Diocesan Girls' Friendly Society for Mrs. Harold E. Woodward, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Kirk made an oral report for the Department of Christian Social Relations.

The Rev. Mr. Poindexter presented his report as Chairman of the Field Department, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Dr. Kevin presented a report for the Department of Publicity, which was received and filed.

Mrs. Lasar presented her report as president of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Dr. Woolfall presented his report as Chairman of the Department of Missions, which was received and filed.

Mrs. Fischel presented her report as President of the Board of Managers of the Episcopal Home for Children, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Wilson presented a report for the Pension Fund Committee, which was received and filed.

Dean Sweet introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 6.

RESOLVED, That this Convention goes on record as approving the resolutions adopted by the National Council, Wednesday, December 6, 1939, on the Relationship of Lay Employees of the Church to the Social Security Act, as follows:

RESOLVED, That the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church expresses its opinion that all the lay employes of the Protestant Episcopal Church, whether employed in churches, missions, institutions, or agencies, be brought within the coverage of the pension provisions of the Federal Old Age and Survivors' Insurance Benefits of the Social Security Act, (Title II).

RESOLVED, That the National Council expresses the further opinion that if the Congress of the United States should fail to enact the necessary amendments to the present Act dealing specifically with employes of religious institutions and other non-profit agencies, some pension provision, whether in the form of retirement compensation, annuities or outright grants, be made for all lay persons retiring at the age of sixty-five from the services of the Church after the completion of five or more years of service in such churches, missions, institutions or agencies.

RESOLVED, That in any amendments to the Social Security Act by the Congress of the United States dealing specifically with the employes of religious institutions and other non-profit agencies, the essential integrity of the Church Pension Fund should be safeguarded by the exclusion of the clergy from the coverage of the Act by reason of their chosen vocation.

Canon George presented his report as Missionary to the City Institutions, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Philip Van Zandt addressed the Convention on the subject of Chinese Relief.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 7, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That Canon 21, Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, as adopted by the Diocesan Convention of 1934, be and is hereby repealed, and that a new Canon in lieu thereof be adopted, to be known as "Canon 21, Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund," as follows:

CANON 21.

Of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

SECTION 1. All properties now held, or hereafter acquired, for the Fund for the relief of clergymen canonically resident in the Diocese of Missouri disabled by age, disease, or otherwise, and of the widows and orphans of clergymen, shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees composed of the Bishop of the Diocese and the members of the Diocesan Council. The officers of the Diocesan Council shall be officers of said Board, and a quorum of the Diocesan Council shall be a quorum of said Board.

SECTION 2. Said Board shall administer said Fund under the direction of the Diocesan Convention, and all investments of said Fund shall be made subject to the approval of the Finance Committee of the Diocese. Said Board shall receive and consider applications for relief under this Canon, may grant or refuse such applications, and may make appropriations from the income of said Fund for the payment of Church Pension Fund premiums on stipends of Missionaries in this Diocese. A report of the operations and condition of said Fund shall be made to each Diocesan Convention.

The above resolution was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 8, as follows:

Resolution No. 8.

RESOLVED, That Section 1 of Canon 23, Of the Fund for Theological Education, be and is hereby repealed, and that in lieu thereof a new section be adopted, to be known as Section 1 (of Canon 23) as follows:

SECTION 1. All money or other property now held or hereafter acquired for the fund for theological education shall be entrusted to a Board of Trustees composed of the Bishop and the members of the Diocesan Council; and the officers of the Diocesan Council shall be the officers of said Board of Trustees. A quorum of the Diocesan Council shall be a quorum of said Board.

The above resolution was referred to the Committee on Constitutions and Canons.

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

At the session of the Convention Tuesday evening no business was transacted.

Addresses were delivered by the Right Reverend Peter Trimble Rowe, D.D., Missionary Bishop of Alaska, and the Right Reverend Robert N. Spencer, D.D., Bishop of West Missouri.

After the addresses the Convention adjourned under the rules.

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## SECOND DAY

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Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Wednesday, January 31, 1940.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 A. M. by the Bishop assisted by Cathedral Clergy.

The Convention was called to order at 9 A.M., in the Schuyler Memorial Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

The Minutes of the First Day were read and approved.

The Bishop delivered his annual address to the Convention. (Appendix 1.)

The report of the Committee on the State of Church presented by Dean Sweet, Mr. D'Arcy, the Rev. Dr. Kevin, the Rev. Mr. Fay, and the Rev. Mr. Cobb, was received and filed. Resolutions No. 9, 10, 11 and 12 contained in the above report were adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

RESOLVED, That we memorialize the General Convention to enact a canon that will permit the translation of Diocesans.

## Resolution No. 10.

WHEREAS, the Diocese of Missouri at its 100th Convention approved the proposed steps looking toward organic union between the Protestant Episcopal and the Presbyterian Churches,

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in this Convention assembled memorializes the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church to adopt the Concordat as proposed and revised by the Joint Commission on Approaches to Unity.

## Resolution No. 11.

WHEREAS, education in Religion is an indispensable element in the character development of our children and young people; therefore be it hereby

RESOLVED, That we, the members of the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled, do record our hearty approval of the plan for weekday religious instruction now in partial operation for the pupils in the Public Schools of the City of St. Louis, and record our eagerness to assume our full share in all the responsibilities involved in this splendid undertaking, and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the speedy extension of this plan to include the entire area of the City of St. Louis, the Public Schools of St. Louis County, and into every public school community in the Diocese of Missouri.

## Resolution No. 12.

WHEREAS, a moral obligation devolves upon the Clergy of this Church to ascertain surely that persons whose marriages they perform are free from any venereal diseases, and,

WHEREAS, no general discharge of this obligation is possible where the State laws do not demand such examination, and,

WHEREAS, the General Convention of 1937 has recommended that the Conventions of the several Dioceses shall urge the Legislatures of their respective States to pass laws requiring that before a marriage license can be issued, both the man and the woman applying shall have presented to the proper civil authority, duly certified negative reports for syphilis and gonorrhoea from such microscopic and blood tests as shall be at that time approved by the recognized public health authorities, and,

WHEREAS, measures will be introduced in the State Legislature of Missouri embodying provisions providing for pre-marital examination for venereal disease;

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri, in Convention assembled, urges upon the Legislature the passage of a marriage health bill requiring pre-marital examination for venereal disease.

## Resolution No. 13.

RESOLVED, That the expenses of clerical and lay deputies to the Diocesan Convention from parishes and missions outside of Saint Louis and Saint Louis County be paid out of the Diocesan Expense Budget and that Assessments for the year 1941 be increased accordingly.

## Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That the Diocese of Missouri in Convention assembled goes on record in favor of the continuance of the three Religious Groups, Protestants, Catholics, and Jews, in the Saint Louis Branch of the Round Table of Christians and Jews, and urges it to do all in its power to overcome religious prejudices and to develop good will between religious groups in the City of Saint Louis and the State of Missouri; it being understood that we believe the success of this Round Table depends upon the freedom of all members of every religious group to hold their own convictions and to express them in frankness and good will.

The Rev. Mr. Poindexter, Chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the following report:

The nominees named in the foregoing report of the Nominating Committee were unanimously elected by both Orders of the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Poindexter, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, introduced Resolution No. 15, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 15.

RESOLVED, That Section 1 of Article XIII of the Constitution of the Diocese of Missouri be and is hereby repealed, and that a new section in lieu thereof be adopted, to be known as Section 1, as follows:

SECTION 1. The Convention shall elect, by the concurrent ballot of both Orders, a Standing Committee, to consist of three Presbyters and three Laymen, in manner and form following:

At the regular session of the Convention in the year 1941 one clerical and one lay member of the Standing Committee shall be elected for a term of one year, one clerical and one lay member for a term of two years, and one clerical and one lay member for a term of three years; and thereafter at each regular session of the Convention each vacancy in the membership of the Standing Committee, caused by the expiration of a member's term of office, shall be filled by election for a term of three years. A member whose term has expired shall not be eligible for re-election until after the lapse of one year.

The Committee on Constitution and Canons presented a report recommending the adoption of Resolutions Nos. 7 and 8, which had been introduced on the first day of the Convention.

Resolution No. 7 in the above mentioned report, amending Canon 21, was adopted by the unanimous vote of both Orders of the Convention, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Diocese.

Resolution No. 8 in the above mentioned report, amending Canon 23, was adopted by the unanimous vote of both Orders of the Convention, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Diocese.

The Bishop announced that the election for Deputies to the General Convention was in order.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for Deputies to the General Convention and given into the hand of the tellers.

Miss Lois Phillips presented a report for the Social Service Department of the City Mission Society, which was received and filed. The Convention ordered that this report be printed for distribution.

Mrs. John F. Shepley presented her report as President of the City Mission Society, which was received and filed.

Canon Putney presented his report as Superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital, which was received and filed. The Convention congratulated Canon Putney on the splendid work of St. Luke's Hospital during the past year.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Very Rev. Sidney E. Sweet and the Rev. Wilbur D. Ruggles, elected clerical deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for two clerical deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Lichliter introduced Resolution No. 16, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 16.

WHEREAS, it is the Christian Faith that all men are created by God and share alike in his love

WHEREAS, the Christian principle of the sacredness of personality involves the duty on the part of Christians to secure as much as possible the equality of opportunity for all men, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the delegates and Clergy of the Diocese of Missouri in convention assembled go on record as favoring action to open State of Missouri University and Professional Schools to all persons regardless of color, class or creed.

The Rev. Mr. Lichliter introduced a resolution on the subject of war.

As a substitute for this resolution, the Rev. Dr. Kevin introduced Resolution No. 17, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 17:

RESOLVED, That that part of the Bishop's address relating to war be adopted as the mind of this Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley and Mr. C. L. Brewer elected lay deputies to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for two lay deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Betts introduced Resolution No. 18, which was laid on the table.

The Rev. Mr. Sant presented a report for the Committee on Family Relations, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Sant presented a report for the Committee on the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Diocese, which was approved by the Convention and filed.

Mr. Goodbar, Chancellor of the Diocese, presented the report of the Episcopal Bishop's Residence Company, which was received and filed.

It was ordered that the Bishop's address to the Convention be printed for distribution.

The Secretary read the report of Mr. Manson M. Brien, Historiographer, which was received and filed.

The Rev. Mr. Betts introduced Resolution No. 19, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 19.

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this Convention that, before a motion to table a resolution is received, sufficient debate shall be allowed.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Rev. Dr. Hulbert A. Woolfall, elected a clerical deputy to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one clerical deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared Mr. E. G. Riek elected a lay deputy to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for one lay deputy to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Bishop made the following announcement:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Canon 17, as amended by the Diocesan Convention of 1932, I have changed Trinity Parish, St. Charles, to the status of a Mission, for the reason that said Parish has failed to elect a Vestry for more than two successive years, and I request this Convention to approve this change of status.

The Secretary introduced Resolution No. 20, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 20.

RESOLVED, That this Convention approves the action of the Bishop in changing Trinity Parish, St. Charles, to the status of a Mission, under the provisions of Section 2 of Canon 17; and that this Convention hereby authorizes and directs the corporation, person, persons, trustee, or trustees holding title to any real estate or personal property for the use and benefit of such Parish, to convey, forthwith, all such real estate and personal property to the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund of this Diocese, to be held and disposed of for the use and benefit of such Mission under the direction of the Diocesan Council.

The Rev. Mr. Maxwell introduced Resolution No. 21, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 21.

RESOLVED, That the Church shall not be counted upon again to march in the van of the war movement, and plead the case for war in the name of God, the All-merciful, the Father of all mankind, Who Himself is a persuasive, not a coercive agency, so all-inclusive in His good will that He makes His sun to shine on the evil and on the good and sends His rain on the just and on the unjust.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared Dr. Paul E. Rutledge elected a lay deputy to the General Convention.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for four provisional lay deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

It was ordered that the next Convention be held at Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis.

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the Minutes of this day's session.

The vote by which Resolution No. 18, introduced by the Rev. Mr. Betts was laid on the table, was reconsidered, and the resolution was adopted by the Convention, as follows:

Resolution No. 18.

WHEREAS, a majority of the clergy of the Diocese of Missouri in their Clericus have resolved to subscribe to the principle of solemnizing no marriage without the presentation of a certificate from a recognized medical authority, indicating the freedom from a contagious stage of venereal disease on the part of those desiring to be married;

RESOLVED, That this Convention record its approval of this act, and that each parish be officially informed of the stand that has been taken.

The tellers of the pending election for provisional lay deputies to the General Convention reported and the Bishop declared Mr. S. B. Sheldon, Mr. C. D. Blake, Mr. C. C. Pangman and Mr. J. K. Stribling elected.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for three provisional clerical deputies to the General Convention and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election for one clerical deputy to the General Convention reported and the Bishop declared the Rev. Robert O. Kevin elected.

The Rev. J. Manly Cobb was elected first provisional clerical deputy to the General Convention by the unanimous vote of both Orders of the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Betts introduced Resolution No. 22, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 22.

RESOLVED, That this Convention congratulates the Rev. John S. Bunting on his service of twenty-five years as Rector of the Church of the Ascension, and as a Clergyman in the Diocese of Missouri.

The Rev. Mr. Cobb introduced Resolution No. 23, which was adopted, as follows:

Resolution No. 23.

RESOLVED, That the members of this Convention express to Mrs. C. C. Peirce and Miss Jessie B. Kelley a deep appreciation of their twenty years of devoted and efficient services.

The Bishop was requested to send to Bishop and Mrs. Johnson the affectionate greetings of the members of the Convention.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the Rev. E. W. Poindexter, Jr., the Rev. J. F. Sant, and the Rev. R. W. Fay, elected provisional clerical deputies to the General Convention.

The Bishop filed with the Secretary the following appointments:

## APPENDIX No. 1

**Address of the Bishop to the Convention.**

To the Delegates of this Diocesan Convention:

It is a very happy privilege to welcome you to this One Hundred and First Convention of the Diocese of Missouri, which marks the completion of a century of service.

At this time, let us pause for a moment to remember those who, during the past year, have left our company here on earth (and our losses this year are heavy indeed): we shall not only remember them, but also that multitude of people of this Diocese who, during the past one hundred years, under the inspiration of the Spirit of Christ, have played their part bravely and truly in the life of their times, and helped to build the spiritual foundation of this Commonwealth, without which there is no enduring city. (Let us pray.)

“O Thou Who art the source of all that is Good and Beautiful and True, Whose Spirit nourishes the souls of those who stay their minds on Thee, and inspires and strengthens their dreams of a better world: we yield Thee high praise for the lives of those who in their generations have been lights of the world; by whose wisdom, tolerance, understanding, and love our human world is held together and lifted nearer to Thy Will for our world. May the Spirit which enlightened their lives and made them deep channels of Thy pity and Thy love, kindle in us the will to turn this world into the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.”

It is a pleasure to record that in the ranks of the clergy of the Diocese during the past year there have been no losses, only gains. And three young men have come to Missouri to cast in their lots with us: the Reverend Richard E. Benson from the Diocese of New York, who succeeds the Reverend Stephen F. Bayne as the Rector of Trinity Church, St. Louis; the Reverend C. Horace Kehl, Jr., who is transferred from the Diocese of Texas to be a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral; and the Reverend George F. Tittmann, one of our own St. Louis boys who, after completing his training at Harvard and the Theological Seminary in Virginia, is now Assistant Minister in the Church of St. Michael and St. George. I know the Convention will wish to join in extending to them a very warm welcome.

And may I at this point, in the bosom of the family, say that it must be a matter of high pride in the Diocese as a whole to feel the impact which our clergy are making on the communities in which they live. To mention one would on the whole require me to mention all. But as a symbol of what our men are doing, let me recite this fact: Jefferson City this year initiated a civic custom of making an award to the citizen who, during the year just past, has given the most distinguished service to the community. And this first award for outstanding service was made the other evening to the Rector of Grace Church, the Reverend Wilbur D. Ruggles.

We are happy to report that due to the loyalty and generosity of our people and clergy we have come through the past year exceedingly well. Of the Assessments, 99.26+ percent has been paid; of the Apportionments, 99.02+ percent. This is a remarkably good record, for which we thank you. And the prospects for this present year are excellent. For long it has been the diocesan policy to offer financial aid to

parishes and missions which have not achieved full self-support, where we have felt such aid was justified as a means of enabling the parish to reach that level. This grant is never intended as a permanent subsidy and the expectation is that year by year it will be reduced. It is encouraging to notice that for the year 1940 nine assisted parishes and missions have absorbed into their own budgets from five to twenty-five percent of the diocesan grant, thus releasing funds for advance work. Other parishes have voluntarily increased their Apportionments. I wish there were time to tell the story of the great strides made this year in many of the parishes of the Diocese.

As a result we shall have money released not only for new work within the Diocese, but we shall be able also to increase substantially our contribution to the general missionary work of the whole Church.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese has undertaken, for a two year period, to assist us in placing a full time clergyman at Holy Cross Church, Poplar Bluff. For many years the Rector of Christ Church, Cape Girardeau, has held occasional evening services in Poplar Bluff; but one cannot build a Church in a community on such a basis. The Reverend Gregory J. Lock, formerly Canon of Christ Church Cathedral, was elected Rector of Holy Cross Church, has entered upon his work, and we have high hopes of a fine development there. I should like to express our gratitude to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese for their never-flagging interest and devotion to the work of the Church.

Also I should like to call attention to a new and promising undertaking. We know, in these terrible days, that what we need, what our nation needs, what our world needs, is a spiritual awakening. We have gotten terribly off the path of the Will of God for our world, and as a result major disaster has once more overtaken us. We shall have to endeavor to come much closer to God than we have been, to place Him at the very center of our thinking and to see life steadily and to see it whole, and to think out the life of our times in the light of the eternal principles which flow from His Will. And we know that the best place in which to start is with our youth. And the Board of Trustees of the Episcopal Home for Children has made it possible for us to invite Dr. Adelaide Case, head of the Department of Religious Education in Teachers' College, Columbia University, to come to the Diocese, survey our field of religious education, make clear to us where we are failing, and to map out a comprehensive plan of religious education for the Diocese. When the plan is completed we shall have a concrete goal at which to aim, and know the steps which should be taken. It would be a great thing if in this Diocese we could do a fine piece of pioneering work and set up a pattern of what should be accomplished.

Twenty years ago, just after we had emerged from the irreparable disaster of the War which had torn our human world to pieces, the Bishops of the Anglican Communion meeting in Conference at Lambeth, made a noble plea to all Christian people for Unity of the Church of Christ. "We believe that the Holy Spirit has called us in a very solemn and special manner to associate ourselves in penitence and prayer with all those who deplore the divisions of Christian people, and are inspired by the vision and hope of a visible unity of the whole Church. We believe that God wills fellowship, . . . . that it is God's purpose to manifest this fellowship . . . in an outward, visible and united society, holding one Faith . . . and inspiring all its members to the world-wide service of the Kingdom of God. . . . The times call us to a new outlook and new measures. . . . The time has come, we believe, for all the separated groups of Christians to agree in forgetting the things which are behind, and reaching out towards the goal of a reunited

Catholic Church. . . . . The vision which rises before us is that of a Church genuinely Catholic, loyal to all Truth, and gathering into its fellowship all "who profess and call themselves Christians," within whose visible unity all the treasures of faith and order, bequeathed as an heritage by the past to the present, shall be possessed in common and made serviceable to the whole body of Christ. . . . . To this adventure we are convinced that God is now calling all the members of His Church. . . . . We place this ideal first and foremost before ourselves and our own people. We call upon them to make the effort to meet the demands of a new age with a new outlook."

At the Lambeth Conference ten years later the Bishops adopted the South India Plan. Before the Convention met the opinion was widely voiced that the acceptance of this plan would split the Church. But after long debate following the plea in the name of Christ and in the interests of the greater Good to take some bold step towards the ideal of the wider unity which all professed, the opposition threw its weight on the side of the proposal, and, if my memory serves me correctly, it was passed without a dissenting vote. I shall never forget one Anglican Bishop who had been a stalwart opponent of the plan, at the last lifting his hand high in affirmative vote while tears ran down his face. He was voting against long-held opinions as an adventurer for Christ.

So also, two and a half years ago, the General Convention of our Church and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, each expressed their solemn intention to seek the organic union of the two Churches. Since then a Concordat, marking out the first step to be taken towards that Union has been formulated. It has been widely discussed and to some extent altered to meet objections. For example, the question of ordination has been clarified. "Finally, both Churches believe that all practice in regard to the Ministry should look forward to one which may have universal acceptance; both recognize that a truly reunited Church would be something greater than either and inclusive of both; and, each Church recognizes the Ministry of the other as a real Ministry of the word and sacraments within its own sphere. In view of the expressed purpose to achieve organic unity and recognizing that in a divided Church no Ministry possesses such universal recognition of its validity as is essential for organic unity, it is proposed that provision shall be made for such a mutual extension of ordination as shall make it possible, where locally desirable, for presbyters of either Church to minister the word and sacraments to members of the other Church. This provision shall not be regarded as a reordination, but as a recognition of an ordination valid in the body conferring it and adding thereto a supplemental ordination as required for a ministry in the other Church." In other words, the ministry of each is recognized by the other as valid in its own Church, and it is now proposed to extend that ordination to include ministry in the other Church. This is quite in accord with action already taken by our Church. Canon 11 directs that clergy with non-episcopal ordination shall receive the laying on of hands by a Bishop, but it implies neither that this is a re-ordination nor an ordination for the first time.\* "On the contrary, at the time of such a supplemental ordination, the Bishop is permitted to read the following preface to the Service: 'A.B. who has already been ordained a minister of Christ, desiring to be a Deacon or Priest in this Church, has satisfied the Ecclesiastical Authority of this Diocese that he accepts the Doctrine, Discipline and Worship of this Church, we are about to confer upon him authority to minister in this Church.' Furthermore, the letters of ordination in such cases may con-

tain the words: 'Recognizing the ministry which he has already received and hereby adding to that commission the grace and authority of Holy Orders as required for the exercise of the ministry of this Church.'

The proposal is under heavy fire today and the plea is made by a leader of the opposition that the Concordat be withdrawn in the interests of peace within our own communion, since its advocacy "is bringing apprehension and dismay" to great numbers of our people. But this plea overlooks the fact that convictions and feelings are not unilateral, not the property of one side alone: it will also be an enormous shock to multitudes within our Church if having advanced this proposal to the Presbyterian Church we should now repudiate it. And furthermore, the threat of schism is not a valid argument. It is always made. The adoption of the South India Scheme, it was said, would split the Church: it did not. The adoption by Lambeth of a resolution favoring birth control, many affirmed, would split the Church: it did not. The threat has been made again and again. But the Unity of the Church always has been vastly stronger than any divisive forces. So it will be again.

The plea is also made to shelve the proposal, and "to let time and the Grace of God" do for us what we will not now do for ourselves. But it seemed to us that the Grace of God was moving mightily in last General Convention when the original resolution was adopted (again in the House of Bishops by an unanimous vote). And if we wait for time to heal our divisions we are more apt to discover that the time will come when this also is "too late," and we are left to ponder the untoward consequences of missed opportunities. For the attitude of the Presbyterian Church, it seems to us, may be this: 'The Episcopal Church talks a great deal about Unity, but she is not so consistent in action. Let us see if this is to be true in this instance also: we will follow her lead, but she must *lead*. She must be the first to *act*.' To postpone this issue therefore until tomorrow, to toss our ideals into the future — always a comfortable place, as Anatole France said — will be to discourage our Presbyterian brethren and cause them to discount our sincerity in this matter. And it would be tragic in these days, when once more war has torn our human world to pieces, if the Church which seeks to heal the dissensions of mankind, revealed her spiritual impoverishment by inability to heal her own divisions.

I cannot close without a brief word regarding the terrible impasse in which our world finds itself today. For the war which no people under the sun wants, the war they all loathe, is come to pass, and what the end is to be, no one can foresee. Like Goethe's sorcerer who complained, "The ghosts I call up I cannot make to disappear!" so forces are being unleashed in this unfolding conflict which will be difficult in the future to direct or control. We have our strong convictions as to the immediate origin of this war. To keep our perspective clear we need also to have in mind the historical roots of this conflict, roots penetrating deep into the past and nourished also by the failures of the past twenty years. So that in the guilt for this war we all share.

But discussion as to the origin of the war is futile: the main concern is with the outcome of the war. That the war is here is a hard fact. We deal with a condition, not with a theory. What is done is done, and what is done cannot be undone. And yet while the fact that war is here cannot be changed, we must seek now to extract from it as much good as is possible. You will not think I infer that the good which can be had from this war can begin to match the evil of it. Nothing ever can make up for this terrible sacrifice of human life; nothing can replace the destruction of the world's wealth; nothing can equate the

undermining of values which this war entails. And yet, now that war is present in the world, the incalculable power of the United States will have to be exerted on behalf of a constructive peace, one which will offer stability to the world. That the outcome of this war enormously concerns the United States, that it will make a vast difference to us which side wins, that it will be much less difficult to seek a peaceful reconstruction of the world if victory rests with those nations in which freedom and justice and a strong democratic tradition still remain, is hardly to be questioned.

How this conviction is to be registered will be a matter of increasingly intense debate in America during the months ahead.

But some day the opportunity of a Better Day will inevitably come. For in history, hope is never doomed: never. When the conflict is over there will be the same soil under our feet, the same earth stored with its abundant wealth for the children of men, the same stars over our heads and the manifold splendor and beauty of it all, and the same people who overwhelmingly want to do the right thing and live peaceful, useful lives, longing again with all their hearts for a new day and for an end of senseless slaughter, and for brotherhood. We cannot afford again to let such an opportunity go. That the world is a unity, and that mankind is one, religion asserts: but that the world is united — that is the problem of the future, in the solution of which the enormous power of the United States must be brought to bear in full force. If we are members one of another, as Religion affirms, then it cannot be true that each nation must retain complete sovereignty, remain absolute judge in its own disputes, responsible to no moral law beyond its own will, free to construct armaments, make war, establish tariff barriers as it will in disregard of the welfare of others. If the principle of the unity of mankind in God is basic in Christianity, then indeed we must labor for a world so organized in its political framework as to give some concrete expression to this principle of the unity of mankind in God.

But we in the United States shall have to prepare ourselves spiritually to play our part bravely and truly: and the opportunity, in any event, will call for sacrifices of a high order. If I may quote from a recent statement which I had the privilege of signing:

"The best elements in all belligerent nations are hoping and praying for a new international order. That order must promise to every people, aggressors no less than victims of aggression, justice, opportunity and the realization of legitimate aspirations. No lesson from recent history is clearer than that such an order is impossible unless every nation is ready to accept some limitation upon unqualified national action in the interests of the welfare of all peoples. We believe that it is the business of the Christian Church in neutral as well as in warring nations to prepare their people for the necessary sacrifices and responsibilities. For this sacrifice of a measure of national self-interest to the higher ideal of the community of nations, the American people must be prepared. Here is the special task and obligation of Christian leadership at the present time.

"These obligations spring from the very heart of Christian faith. That faith commits us to the ideal of a community of nations, designed to arrest the anarchy of nations and to raise the life of all peoples to a new level of security, and to recognition of the claims of humanity as superior to all particular national loyalties."

And secondly, here in the United States, free by reason of geography from the curse of war, while we yet have time, let us labor to set our own house in order, and to build here in the United States

a true democracy which will be a light to the world, and which will evoke the enthusiastic loyalty of all our citizens. That is not true at the present moment: not while there are eight and a half million people in the United States who cannot find work: who are denied that basic right. But surely there is enough intelligence here, enough mutual concern, certainly enough men of all ranks who want the same general objectives, that putting aside partisanship we may work together successfully to conquer this our major problem. There was a saying in Athens, when she was at the height of her power as a Democracy, which has a meaning for us. They too loved their Democracy, but they also knew that there were certain injustices in the City which if not corrected in time would undermine and destroy the Democracy. And they had this saying of Athens: "Fix your eyes on what she might be, and make yourselves her lovers." We might say the same of our own land. "Fix your eyes on what the United States with her vast wealth, her deeply rooted democratic traditions, her abundant good will, *might be*, by the Grace of God, and make yourselves her lovers."

And finally, let us keep in mind during these days that this is God's world: He is in it: He is here: that through this human process there is a mighty, loving Will working out a great purpose for man's good, for the good of all men; that this Will works through us and summons us to enlist all that we are in its service; that it works through us, but also let us remember that it works in spite of us, that in spite of the tragedies which befall us because of our human follies, still this Will works on toward the Kingdom of God, that ever wider fellowship of ever richer personalities. So that if we but do our part, if we are faithful to the best that we know and seek to achieve it, then the last word in this world is not with the saber rattlers; the last word is not with the cult of brutality; the last word is not with the exponents of the hatreds of race and nation and class: the last word is with God, and with the dignity of human personality, and with human freedom, and with human brotherhood.
