Rules of Order of the Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.

2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the chair.

3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.

4. During the Convention the following named Committees shall be appointed by the Bishop:

I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.

II. On Constitution and Canons.

III. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.

IV. On Unfinished Business.

5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.

6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and read by him. A resolution that is not a part of a committee report may be introduced only at the time indicated in the Order of Business. All resolutions, except those forming a part of a committee report, shall be referred immediately after introduction without debate to a special or standing committee.

7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.

8. Any member shall not absent himself from the service of the House unless he have leave or be unable to attend.

9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time, without leave of the House.

10. Any member of the House may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

RULES OF ORDER

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall decide without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order. No motion shall be considered before it is seconded.

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d all en, or 13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a motion to refer any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recommit any motion or resolution to a committee, or upon a motion to recall any motion or resolution from a committee, or upon a motion to suspend the rules of order; but the member who offers an undebatable motion may speak five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put shall, in division, be counted unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by a vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House thereon.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear in the minutes of the Convention.

20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of

their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

Journal of the Ninety-first Convention

OF THE

Church in the Diocese of Missouri.

FIRST DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis, Tuesday, January 28, 1930.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Ninety-first Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on Tuesday, January 28, 1930, at 9:30 a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. W. W. S. Hohenschild, the Rev. Donald Veale, the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, LL.D., the Rev. David Coombs, and the Rev. R. M. Wilcox.

The Bishop read his annual address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled for the business session in the Dean Scuyler Auditorium of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial with the Bishop in the Chair.

The Secretary of the Diocese called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Of the thirty-seven who were entitled to vote, thirty-two were present.

The Secretary presented the report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials. (See Page 16.)

The Secretary called the roll of the forty-two Parishes and Missions of the Diocese which were entitled to representation in the Convention. Delegates from twenty-seven were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum and declared the Convention duly convened.

Mr. George M. Block introduced Resolution No. 1, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 1.

RESOLVED: That the Convention adopt the Rules of Order of the Diocesan Convention of 1929, with the following amendment, to wit:

(1) Whereas, the Bishop of the Diocese has heretofore made personally known to the clergy and to the laity, through the public press, his intention to give his consent at this Convention to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for this Diocese—

BE IT RESOLVED: That the said Rules of Order be amended to make "The Matter of the Election of a Bishop Coadjutor," the order of business to immediately follow the 4th order of business, namely, "Appointment of Committee on Dispatch of Business," as set forth in Rule 22 of the "Rules of Order" of the Convention of 1929.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 2, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 2.

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RESOLVED, That Rule 21 of the Rules of Order be stricken out, and that a new rule, to be known as Rule 21, be adopted as follows:

Rule 21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: the Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, and the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Clergy shall be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; the roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots; and no persons whose names do not appear on either roll shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected by either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected.

By request of the Bishop the remainder of his address was omitted excepting certain portions, which he read.

The Bishop gave his canonical consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for reasons set forth in his address. (Appendix 1.)

The Rev. C. E. Remick was elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent was appointed a Committee of One on the Dispatch of Business.

JOURNAL OF THE

Mr. George M. Block introduced Resolution No. 3, which was referred to the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, as follows:

Resolution No. 3.

RESOLVED, That it is for the best interests of this Diocese to have a Bishop Coadjutor, and that the question of providing a stipend for the Bishop Coadjutor be referred to the Department of Finance of the Diocesan Council; and

RESOLVED FURTHER, That on receipt of the report from the Department of Finance of the Diocesan Council, pursuant to the recommendation and consent of the Bishop, the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for this Diocese be made the first order of business, and this Convention shall, at once, proceed to such election.

It was ordered that that portion of the Bishop's address referring to the Rev. Edmund Duckworth, be referred to a Special Committee to report to this Convention.

Under the foregoing order the Bishop appointed the following named Committee:

The Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., and the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 4, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 4.

RESOLVED, That Section 7 of Canon 9 be amended by adding at the end of such Section 7 the following paragraph:

"The vice-chairman of each department of the Council shall have the privilege of the floor of the Diocesan Convention with a voice but no vote."

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 5, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 5.

RESOLVED, That the vice-chairman of each department of the Diocesan Council be given the privilege of the floor of the Convention with a voice but no vote.

The Rev. Mr. Bunting led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers.

It was ordered that visiting clergy be given the courtesy of the floor with the right to speak, but without a vote.

The Rev. R. Nelson Spencer of Kansas City addressed the Convention.

NINETY-FIRST CONVENTION

Mr. Gatch, Vice-Chairman of the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, presented the following-report:

The Finance Department, having considered the question of financing the stipend of a Bishop Coadjutor, is in a position to say that valid and unconditional assurances have been received, which with readjustments already approved, by the Department, will provide for the stipend, without increasing the assessments.

The foregoing report together with the entire question of the expenses connected with the office of a Bishop Coadjutor was referred back to the Committee.

The following named Nominating Committee was elected :

The Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 5.)

The Secretary presented the report of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate which was received and filed. (Appendix 6.)

The Bishop read a report on various funds of which he is Treasurer, which was received and filed. (Appendix 7.)

The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan Council, which was received and filed. (Appendix 8.)

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

Mr. Gatch, Vice-Chairman of the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, presented the following report:

The Finance Department having considered, under the terms of the resolution adopted, the stipends and expenses incident to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor,

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That the Bishop's salary be fixed at \$6,000.00 per annum;

That the Bishop Coadjutor's salary be fixed at \$6,000.00 per annum;

JOURNAL OF THE

That the general expenses as provided in the budget shall be adjusted between them without increase;

That the report earlier submitted was upon this basis.

Elias S. Gatch, Vice-Chairman.

The recommendations in the foregoing report were adopted by the Convention.

The Bishop announced the election of a Bishop Coadjutor in order.

The Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., nominated the Very Rev. William Scarlett.

The Rev. George Lloyd nominated the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D.

Mr. W. L. Henry nominated the Rev. E. S. White.

The Rev. Dr. Travers asked permission to withdraw his name from the nomination and earnestly protested against having any votes cast for him.

By request of the Bishop, the Rev. Dr. Jones led the Convention in prayer.

The ballots of the Convention, according to provisions of Article XIX of the Constitution of the Diocese, were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop announced the following vote for Bishop Coadjutor:

NINETY-FIRST CONVENTION

The Bishop reported that according to the foregoing ballot, the Very Rev. William Scarlett had received a majority of the concurrent votes of the Clergy and laity entitled to seats in the Convention, voting separately, under the provisions of Article XIX of the Constitution of the Diocese, and therefore was elected Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Travers the foregoing election of Dean Scarlett was made unanimous.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. Karl M. Block, D.D., Mr. George M. Block, Mr. F. T. Hodgdon, and the Rev. David Coombs, as a Committee to notify Dean Scarlett of his election.

Following the election, the Convention sang the Doxology.

The consideration of the recommendation of the Finance Department in the report of the Diocesan Council was continued.

The Convention adjourned until 9:30 Wednesday morning.

SECOND DAY

Christ Church Cathedral, Saint Louis,

Wednesday, January 29, 1930.

The Convention was opened with Morning Prayer at 9:00 o'clock, and was called to order at 9:30 by the Bishop.

The minutes of the First Day were read and approved after correction.

Mr. George M. Block introduced Resolution No. 6, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 6.

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WHEREAS, by adopting the report of the Finance Committee this Convention has fixed the stipend of the Bishop as being at the rate of \$6,000.00 per year,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the said stipend of \$6,000.00 per year shall not become effective until the day on which the Bishop Coadjutor shall be consecrated, to which date the present stipend of the Bishop, being \$7,500.00 per year, shall remain in full force and effect.

The Rev. Dr. Jones introduced Resolution No. 7, which was referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons, as follows:

Resolution No. 7.

RESOLVED, That Article III of the Constitution of the Diocese of Missouri be amended by striking out the words, "fourth Tuesday in January," in the second line, as it appears in the printed edition of 1926 of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "third Tuesday in February," so that said Article as amended shall read as follows:

ARTICLE III. Of the Annual Convention.

The Convention of the Church in this Diocese shall assemble annually on the third Tuesday in February, at such place as shall have been appointed by the preceding Annual Convention; but in the case of the prevalence of infectious or epidemic disease at the appointed time and place of meeting, or for other sufficient cause, the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese shall have power to change the time or place, or both, as the emergency may require; provided, however, that at least ten days' notice of such change shall be given to every Vestry, and to the Minister in charge of every Parish and Mission in the Diocese.

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The Rev. Dr. Block, for the Nominating Committee, presented a report as follows:

The Secretary called the roll of parishes and missions.

A quorum of the Convention was present, and the Bishop declared the election for two clerical members of the Diocesan Council in order.

By request of the Rev. Dr. Travers, his name as nominee for the Diocesan Council was withdrawn.

The ballots of the Convention were cast for two clerical members of the Diocesan Council and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Dr. Davis presented a report of the Trustees of the University of the South, which was received and filed. (Appendix 9.)

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins presented his report as Chairman of the Church Pension Fund Committee, which was received and filed. (Appendix 10.)

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop announced the following vote for two clerical members of the Diocesan Council:

It was ordered that the recommendations in the report of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund in relation to the enforcement of the provisions of Section 4, Article V, of the Constitution of the Diocese be adopted as the action of this Convention. (Appendix 10.)

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared no election, as no nominee had received a majority of both orders.

A motion to unanimously elect the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor failed to carry.

The ballots of the Convention for one clerical member of the Diocesan Council were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

Archdeacon Marsden presented his report which was received and filed. (Appendix 11.)

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared no election, as no nominee had received a majority of both orders.

NINETY-FIRST CONVENTION

The ballots of the Convention were cast and given into the hands of the tellers for one clerical member of the Diocesan Council.

The Rev. Mr. Coxe introduced Resolution No. 8, as an addition to the Report of the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council:

Resolution No. 8.

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RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this Convention that each Parish and Mission of the Diocese shall be requested to pledge a stated amount for the Church's Program both of the Diocese and the General Church; such pledge to be considered as an obligation against the Parish or Mission making it.

The foregoing resolution was laid on the table.

It was ordered that a consideration of the recommendations of the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, made in connection with the report of the Diocesan Council, be made an Order of the Day for immediately after luncheon.

The Rev. Dr. Travers, Chairman of a Special Committee, presented the following report:

WHEREAS, the Reverend Edmund Duckworth, Rector of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, has retired after thirty-five years of faithful service in the Diocese of Missouri, and particularly in the churches of St. James and the Redeemer;

AND WHEREAS, the Convention had noticed with sincere regret his absence from its session;

AND WHEREAS, the most tender mention of him has been made by the Bishop of Missouri in his address to the Convention;

BE IT RESOLVED, In the retirement of the Reverend Edmund Duckworth from the active ministry, the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri desires to record its keen appreciation of his devotion and faithfulness in the service of the Church, his readiness for service at every call, his zeal for the furtherness of the Kingdom of God amongst men, his able presentation of the Living Word and his influence on young men in directing them to the sacred ministry of the Church.

The Convention also desires to express its sympathy for him in his prolonged sickness, prays that he may be spared for many years, and that the blessing of Almighty God may be rich upon him.

The foregoing report was adopted by rising vote of the Convention, a copy of it to be sent to the Rev. Mr. Duckworth.

The tellers of the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared no election, as no nominee had received a majority of both orders.

By request of the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor he was permitted to withdraw his name as a nominee for the Diocesan Council.

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The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. R. M. Wilcox as a member of the Diocesan Council and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the following named nominees, and the Bishop declared them elected:

For Treasurer, Mr. Vincent L. Price; for Standing Committee, the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, D.D., the Rev. Edward S. Travers, D.D., the Rev. John S. Bunting, Judge Davis Biggs, Mr. George M. Block, and Mr. James M. Bull; for Trustees of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, Mr. Frank C. Thompson, Mr. Charles J. Miller and Mr. Judson S. Bemis; for Trustees of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund, the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Mr. S. G. Sutherland, and Mr. W. L. Henry; for Trustees of the Theological Education Fund, the Rev. F. J. F. Bloy, Mr. Willard Wright and Mr. George C. Mackay; for members of the Diocesan Council, Mr. Elias S. Gatch and Mr. C. C. Pangman; for delegates to the Provincial Synod, the Rev. David Coombs and Mr. C. D. Blake; for Trustees of the University of the South, the Rev. Carroll M. Davis, LL.D., Mr. John G. Lonsdale, and Mr. Ethan A. H. Shepley.

The Rev. Dr. Jones presented his report as Dean of the Southern Convocation which was received and filed. (Appendix 12.)

The Rev. David Coombs as Dean of the Northern Convocation, made an oral report.

The Rev. Mr. Nugent presented the report of the Church News which was received and filed. (Appendix 13.)

The Bishop announced that, under the provisions of Canon IXa (page 32, Journal of 1929), he had appointed the following named members of the Finance Committee of the Diocese for 1929:

Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. John R. Shepley and Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock.

It was ordered that the above named Committee be elected to succeed themselves as members of the Finance Committee of the Diocese.

The Rev. Dr. Davis led the Convention in Noon Day Prayers.

Delegates to the Provincial Synod were requested to report to the Diocesan Convention.

NINETY-FIRST CONVENTION

The delegates to the Provincial Synod were instructed to invite the Synod to meet in St. Louis in 1932.

Mrs. Rumsey presented her report as President of the Woman's Auxiliary which was received and filed. (Appendix 14.)

On nomination of the Bishop, Mr. George C. Hitchcock was elected Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Rev. Canon George presented his report as Superintendent of the Mission to the City Institutions. (Appendix 15.)

The Bishop appointed the following named members to the Diocesan Council:

The Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, the Rev. Frank Maples, the Very Rev. William Scarlett, LL.D., Mr. William D'Arcy, Mr. H. E. Mack and Mr. R. Lee Orcutt.

The Convention took a recess until 2 p.m.

Mr. Mack, for the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, introduced Resolution No. 9, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 9.

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RESOLVED, That the sum of \$23,917.00 be appropriated out of the fund raised from the Diocesan Assessments, to defray the General Expenses of the Diocese, for the year 1930.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the attached Schedule of Assessments for the General Expense Fund amounting to \$23,917.00, be adopted.

Mr. Mack, for the Committee on Finance, introduced Resolution No. 10, which was corrected and adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 10.

RESOLVED, That the sum of \$35,989.00 be appropriated out of the fund raised from the apportionments for the Church Program Budget within the Diocese, and that the sum of \$36,000.00 be appropriated out of the fund raised from the apportionments to pay on the Diocesan Quota of the National Church Program Budget.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That pledges and payments on the apportionments from the Parishes and Missions shall be divided by the Diocesan Council 50% on the Diocesan Quota of the National Council and 50% for the Church Program Budget within the Diocese of Missouri, and that the Diocesan Council shall make the necessary revisions, adjustments and allowances to conform thereto.

It was ordered that the Diocesan Council be authorized to raise generally in the Diocese through a Special Gifts Committee from selected lists of contributors, sufficient funds to pro-

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vide whatever difference there may be between the amount of money raised through apportionments for 1930 and the Church Program Budget of \$72,000.00.

Mr. Mack, for the Finance Department of the Diocesan Council, introduced Resolution No. 11, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 11.

RESOLVED, That the attached schedule of apportionments for the Church Program Fund, amounting to \$71,989.00 be adopted.

Mr. Bull presented the report of the Standing Committee which was received and filed. (Appendix 16.)

Mr. Bull presented the report of the Parochial Trust Fund, which was received and filed. (Appendix 17.)

The Rev. Dr. Jones presented the following report:

We, your Committee on Constitution and Canons to whom was referred Res. No. 4, relating to proposed amendment to Section 7 of Canon 9, have examined it, and respectfully recommend that it be adopted.

J. Courtney Jones, Chairman.

Res. No. 4 was adopted in accordance with the foregoing report.

The Rev. Dr. Jones presented the following report:

We, your Committee on Constitution and Canons to whom was referred Res. No. 7, relating to proposed amendment to Art. III of the Constitution, changing the date of the Diocesan Convention, have examined it, and respectfully recommend that it be not adopted, and ask to be discharged from further consideration of the matter.

J. Courtney Jones, Chairman.

The recommendation in the foregoing report was adopted, and the Committee was discharged.

The Rev. John S. Bunting addressed the Convention on Evangelism.

The Rev. Dr. Block introduced Resolution No. 12, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 12.

RESOLVED, That the Chairman be authorized to appoint a Diocesan Commission on Evangelism, consisting of four Presbyters and four Laymen, to set forward plans for meetings and conferences in as many parishes and missions as possible or in selected districts of the Diocese, with the sole purpose of awakening, encouraging, stimulating and strengthening the spiritual life of our people, and that such spiritual adventure be entirely dissociated from any specific financial canvasses that might be undertaken at or about the same time.

The Bishop announced that he would appoint a Committee under the foregoing resolution at a later time.

The Rev. Mr. Maples introduced Resolution No. 13, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 13.

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RESOLVED, That the Convention express its appreciation to the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church Cathedral and Board of Trustees of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial for their generous hospitality in housing the Convention, and to the Committee on Convention Hospitality for their excellent luncheons served to the Clergy and Delegates to the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Maples introduced Resolution No. 14, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 14.

RESOLVED, That the Diocesan Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Treasurer of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial the sum of \$25.00 towards extra maintenance expense.

The Report of the League of Lay Readers was received and filed. (Appendix 18.)

Permission was given to present the Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew to the Secretary after adjournment of the Convention for insertion in the Journal. (Appendix 19.)

The Rev. Mr. Bloy introduced Resolution No. 15, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 15.

RESOLVED, That the Ninety-first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri misses the presence of the Rev. Nelson Tragitt and that of Sister Miriam, both of whom are sick in St. Luke's Hospital and sends to them our expression of sympathy and love with the hope they may early be restored to full health.

The Rev. Dr. Davis was requested to present the affectionate greetings of the Convention to Mr. James A. Waterworth.

The Rev. Dr. Wilkins introduced Resolution No. 16, which was adopted as follows:

Resolution No. 16.

RESOLVED, That the Secretary be instructed to express to the Church Pension Fund, the Convention's regret that certain pension assessments have not been paid; that the Convention cannot assume liability for assessments against the parishes; that the parishes concerned are not in a position to pay these assessments; and that the Convention respectfully suggests that they no longer be carried on the records of the Church Pension Fund;

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Church Pension Fund be informed of the action of the Convention in ordering the enforcement of the provisions of Section 4, Article V, of the Constitution, relating to payment of Church Pension Fund assessments.

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It was ordered that the amount of money to be sent to the National Council for the Church Program for year 1930, be left to the decision of the Diocesan Council.

It was ordered that the next Convention be held in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, Saint Louis.

The report of the Episcopal Home for Children was received and filed. (Appendix 20.)

The Bishop was authorized to certify to the correctness of the Minutes of the Second Day of the Convention.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP

APPENDIX No. 1.

Bishop's Address to the Ninety-first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri.

Dear Brethren:

I bid you welcome to this Ninety-first Convention of the Diocese of Missouri. I hope that all of the Clergy and all of the Lay Delegates will, so far as possible, regard the business of the Convention as their primary concern until the motion to adjourn is adopted.

Since last we gathered here, these Bishops have entered into rest:

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Davis Sessums, at the age of 71 years, fourth Bishop of Louisiana since 1891.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Lucien Lee Kinsolving, at the age of 67 years, first Missionary Bishop of Southern Brazil since 1899.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Theodore Nevin Morrison, at the age of 79 years, third Bishop of Iowa since 1899.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Beverly Dandridge Tucker, at the age of 83 years, consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of Southern Virginia in 1906, second Bishop of Southern Virginia since 1918.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. John Gardner Murray, at the age of 72 years, consecrated Bishop Coadjutor of Maryland in 1909, seventh Bishop of Maryland since 1911. At the General Convention of 1925, Bishop Murray was elected Presiding Bishop, in which office he proved himself a man whose spiritual vision had wide and far horizons. The business experience of his earlier years was of enormous value to him as Presiding Bishop; and, through him, to the Church. But always, by written word and by public exhortation, he kept the things of the spirit in the forefront of his thinking and his working. He really believed, and he led many to believe it, that all other needful things would be added unto them who sought first to provide for the things of the Kingdom. He passed from the lower to the higher room of the Father's house while he was presiding at a meeting of the House of Bishops in Atlantic City. He walked with God. And he was not, for God took him.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Charles Henry Brent pioneered in the Philippine Islands as First Missionary Bishop for 18 years, and as a wise masterbuilder laid deep and strong foundations there. In 1918 he was elected Bishop of Western New York. I doubt if any religious leader of our time exercised a wider influence throughout the world in things that matter most than Bishop Brent. When he died, at the age of 67 years, all who knew him must have felt instinctively, His was a finished life. A well-completed life. A life perfect and entire, wanting nothing. His most distinguished service was in behalf of Christian Unity. He was not satisfied with simply writing about Unity, or talking about Unity, or preaching about Unity. Anyone can do that. But Bishop Brent lived always a life which manifested peace and love toward all them that love the Lord Jesus Christ.

A brother greatly beloved of us all was the Rev. Benjamin E. Reed. His ministry in Missouri began at the age of 28 years as Rector of Mount Calvary Parish in St. Louis. Twenty-two years he continued his happy and successful ministry there and developed Mount Calvary into one of the strongest and most influential parishes in St. Louis. From 1894 to 1902 he was Rector of Grace Church, Paducah, Kentucky. Returning in the latter year to St. Louis, he resumed his faithful and fruitful ministry here. In the morning of the 23rd of June he quietly fell on sleep, having been in Holy Orders 60 years. He gave himself, body, soul, and spirit, by word and good example, to the service of the Master whom he loved with deep devotion. He sought Christ's sheep dispersed abroad. He fed and provided for Christ's family.

Mr. John F. Shepley was a man of rare sweetness and splendor of character. He loved this Cathedral. He worked and worshipped here. And his religion was a rich personal experience. He carried it with him out from the temple into the town. In business, he was a fine example of how a man

"May see in life some nobler part Than striving after things of gain."

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He gave to the world the best that he had, and the best came back to him. During a long life of happiness and helpfulness, he loved mercy, dealt justly, walked humbly with his God. He was many years a member of the Cathedral Chapter. When the building of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial was contemplated, Mr. Shepley was made a member of the Executive Committee and of the Finance Committee. And he gave generously of his income and liberally of his time until the Memorial Fund was gathered and the Memorial Building completed.

"We know transplanted human worth Will bloom to profit, otherwhere."

But here we shall miss his winsome smile, his friendly greeting, his loving companionship, and his wise counsel, more than we dare to think.

Soon after I came to the Diocese, George Robinson had me out at Kirkwood to spend the night in his home. The house was swarming with boys from everywhere. He built and maintained a camp in Le Barque Hills chiefly as a place for lads to come and have a good time, himself their kind big brother. Many a man in business and professional life is happy and successful because George Robinson met him somewhere as a lad, helped him, guided him, encouraged him. A lover of youth, a lover of music, a lover of all things bright and beautiful he was. How joyous must have been the reunion on Canaan's happy shore with his dear daughter Virginia who crossed over only a few months before him!

Mr. Alfred S. Kirby, 81 years old, was probably the oldest living member of Grace Church, St. Louis. His membership dated from 1864. He served 40 years as sexton. I do not remember to have failed to see Mr. Kirby in the congregation at a single service during the eighteen years in which I have frequently visited Grace Church.

Mr. Wallace Delafield Simmons was closely identified with the social and business and religious life of St. Louis. Late years, he was

President of the Missouri Missionary Host, a lay organization which his father, Mr. E. C. Simmons, and Mr. Wallace Delafield were largely responsible for founding, more than half a century ago. At the time of his death, he was Senior Warden of the Church of the Redeemer, St. Louis, a generous supporter of all its activities and an affectionate friend and helper of the Rector. He not only loved the privilege of worshipping with the members of the Church of the Redeemer, but he loved the very stones and fabric of the building, his father having erected it in blessed memory of a sweet daughter whom the Master early called into His nearer presence.

I count among the precious privileges of my ministry the mornings and evenings that I stood in prayer by the bedside of Mrs. Anne Branch Cushing during her long illness in St. Luke's Hospital. Going in one early morning, I found her lying with eyes closed, and waited quietly until she opened them. Then with a sweet smile she said to me, "I thought the Captain would come last last night and give me orders to sail into port. But here I am, still weathering the storm." To which I made reply, "The beautiful thing about it is that it's all well with you whether the order is to sail the ocean or to make for port." And her reply was, "Do you really think so?" "Yes," I said. "I'm certain. No one who knows you has any doubt of that." Can any of us who were among the great company which filled Emmanuel Church in Webster Groves on the day of her burial ever forget how triumphant and victorious the whole quality of the service was! And can we think of her now in terms of anything else than joyous activity, increasing in the knowledge and the love of Christ and going on from strength to strength in the life of perfect service in His heavenly Kingdom!

In May, 1915, I induced Miss Sarah H. Sniffen, whom I had met in a Children's Home in Concord, New Hampshire, to come to our Diocese as a Woman Worker at Herculaneum. I set her apart as a Deaconess, November 21, 1916. She continued her devoted labors in Herculaneum and in St. Louis until ill health forced her to resign in the spring of 1926. In Herculaneum she prepared 54 persons for confirmation and brought 129 children and adults to baptism. Having in good measure recovered her health after a long period of rest, she took duty last summer in the Tennessee Mountains. I was greatly shocked by a telegram that told me of her death on the 4th of August. Deaconess Sniffen really did a remarkable work for the Diocese of Missouri amid conditions which were often discouraging and difficult.

At great personal sacrifice, Augustus P. Rein gave up a satisfactory business position and was by me ordained Deacon on May 14, 1916. I advanced him to the Priesthood the following year. He was the faithful and helpful Pastor of St. Timothy's, St. Louis, and St. Paul's, Overland, until, in 1925, for family reasons, he removed to the Diocese of New Hampshire. He returned to St. Louis in October 1927, and had duty which made him very happy in connection with the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Building and served also as Pastor of St. Timothy's Mission and St. Luke's Mission. The evening of March 16, he was out with friends at dinner. At midnight the Master came and called for him. And I make no doubt that he was ready.

The Rev. J. C. Ingham who died in Oregon was formerly a Clergyman of our Diocese. Mr. Charles W. Alban at the time of his death was Junior Warden and Superintendent of the Church School, St. John's, St. Louis. Mr. Fred Butler was many years Warden of

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Grace Church, Crystal City. Mrs. L. C. Dameron of Clarksville, after long years of invalidism, has finished her earthly course. Mrs. Daisy Brookmire Hebard, Miss Josephine C. Brooks and Mr. John F. Betts of the Cathedral; Mrs. Louise Whittemore Knapp and Joseph, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Goddard of St. Michael and St. George's; Allen Battle, son of Mr. and Mrs. John G. Lonsdale, of Grace Church, Kirkwood; Mrs. C. L. Farrar, wife of the Senior Warden of St. James' Macon; Mr. James Fletcher Leggett of Bloomfield; Mrs. O. M. Friend, wife of the Junior Warden of Trinity, Hannibal; Mr. A. T. Cotsworth of Mount Calvary, many years a Lay Reader in the Diocese; Mrs. Alex McDonald of Poplar Bluff; Mrs. Caroline Klein of Portland, 93 years old; Mr. James Ramsey Bettis, brother of Mrs. Thomas L. Small; Mrs. Sidney Calvert, a valuable helper in her home parish, Calvary, Columbia, and an officer of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary, —these and others of whom I have no record have passed on before us during the year that is gone.

> "Tis sweet as year by year we lose Friends out of sight, by faith to muse How grows in Paradise our store."

In Church News and in personal letters, I have tried to express Mrs. Johnson's thanks and mine to the kind friends who sent us over seas following my long illness in mid-summer. I really was away from telephones and typewriting machines and problems of all sorts for three whole months! And we both found rest and refreshment which we could not have found in any other way. We do not understand why we should have been treated so generously. But we thank God for such friendships, even though we do not understand.

Seventy-five years ago, Mr. Frederick B. Scheetz gathered two or three families into his home in Monroe City and led them in the worship of the Book of Common Prayer. Later, the group having increased considerably, they build a wooden chapel on a lot on Mr. Scheetz's farm. Mr. Scheetz was ordained Deacon and for a dozen years conducted worship in the little chapel, called St. Jude's. Funds were eventually secured to buy a lot in the center of the city on which the Rev. Mr. Scheetz and his congregation built a Gothic stone church, the most beautiful of its kind, I think, in Rural Missouri. It was a happy thought of the present Rector of St. Jude's, the Rev. Arthur E. Woodward, and the Vestry and people to arrange an Anniversary Service on the Feast of St. Simon and St. Jude, October 28th, and, in connection with the Anniversary Service, to present an Anniversary Endowment Fund. The Rev. Dr. Wilkins, who many years ago as a young business man in Hannibal acted as Lay Reader at St. Jude's, preached an Anniversary Sermon admirably fitted to the occasion. At last reports, the Endowment Fund amounted to something in excess of \$1,600.00 in cash and pledges. I hope that the Fund may still grow. There are men and women scattered all across this country, from California to Connecticut and from Michigan to Mississippi, who owe the best qualities that they possess, spiritually and morally, to the influences which came into their young lives through the agency of St. Jude's Church.

The Cathedral is completely transformed within. Unsightly plaster walls have been removed and the whole interior is lined with Gaustavino tile. This was made possible through a generous gift of \$50,000.00 by Miss Lillie Randell who now resides in London, but whose early years were lived in St. Louis and in old Christ Church Parish. The baptistry has been beautifully transformed by stained

glass windows of exquisite design and workmanship, the gift of Mrs. George L. Allen. And Mr. and Mrs. George F. Steedman have lined the vaulting above the reredos with Gaustavino tile, a memorial to Mrs. Steedman's mother, Mrs. Kate M. Howard.

The parish of St. Michael and St. George has recently completed a group of buildings—church and parish house—on such generous lines that they are an invitation and a challenge, "Whosoever will, let him come." Nearly \$350,000.00 was put into the new building project. The Rev. Dr. Block deserves the grateful thanks of the whole Diocese for coming when he came and for leading the people of his parish to such a splendid accomplishment in less than four years' time. And another fabric is quietly building in the parish without sound of axe or hammer or any tool of iron; "lively stones" built into a "spiritual temple."

St. Peter's church and parish house have been repaired and renovated, inside and outside. Openings in the church tower have been filled with stone tablets, suitably carved. And the church is newly carpeted.

Speaking of betterments in Church properties, a little group in Fredericktown have put a new roof on their attractive brick church; the Clarksville church has a new roof and a new furnace; and the rectory at Louisiana looks like a real home now in its new dress of paint, its new hardwood floors and enlarged by the addition of two commodious rooms.

I have been made happy to observe how loyally the people of St. Timothy's, St. Louis, and the people of St. Luke's, St. Louis, have stood by and held together and worked on during the sixteen months in which neither congregation has had the care of a resident Pastor. I should really like to know how St. Luke's managed to pay the \$500.00 which was due The American Church Building Fund on the first of January and report "a small balance on hand" in the treasury. It must have been by a strong pull and a pull all together! I am hoping that the right man may soon be found to take up these two very encouraging pieces of work.

The rectorship of St. Stephen's, Ferguson, had been long vacant when the Rev. O. H. Glyn Lloyd accepted the call of the Vestry and entered upon his duties as Rector, in February, 1929. Reports indicate successful activities during the past year in the various departments of the Church's work. I am unofficially informed that cash and pledges are in hand amounting to about \$15,000.00 toward a new Parish House; a much needed equipment if St. Stephen's is going to do the work that waits to be done in Ferguson.

In my search for a man to take charge of St. Paul's, Overland, after eight months, up near Detroit, I was lucky to find the Rev. Don Veale. He and his good wife came to Overland the last of May. He tells me that all the people out there need is someone to love them. Of course. St. Paul says that a man may have many kinds of equipment and many kinds of efficiency and lack the one thing needful if he lacks love. Yes; it's easy and natural for men and women to respond to the leading of a shepherd who loves his people. They follow him, for they know his voice! We are fortunate to have Don Veale in the Diocese and in Overland.

Mrs. Jean Barron Hurlbut, who was two years Matron of the Episcopal Orphans' Home in St. Louis, has been appointed a United

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Thank Offering Worker for Rural Missouri and entered upon her new duties last June. Mrs. Hurlbut has her base a few miles from the city of Fredericktown, and lives in a cabin in the woods. She travels over the hills and through the valleys and into and out of the woods on a saddle, the roads in many places being nothing but mountain trails. She carries food and clothing and medicine and love to many families, lovingly calling them "my people," whose loneliness and poverty are most distressing. "Lord, when saw we thee an hungered, and fed thee? Or thirsty, and gave thee drink? When saw we thee a stranger, and took thee in? Or naked, and clothed thee? Or when saw we thee sick, or in prison, and came unto thee? And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The Rev. John W. Higson, M.D., took Holy Orders under the influence of Bishop Tuttle in Salt Lake City, Utah. Nearly all his ministry has been spent in the two Dioceses which comprise the state of Missouri; the past sixteen years as Rector of the Church of the Holy Innocents, St. Louis. Having now retired from the active work of physician of the souls of men, we hope that he may find much satisfaction in continuing his other calling of physician to men's bodies.

Ten years the Rev. Edward S. White was Rector of the Church of the Holy Communion in St. Louis. He manifested always a fine spirit of co-operation in diocesan affairs and was kindly-affectioned toward us all as we all were toward him. It was a real loss to the Diocese of Missouri when, last June, he felt that he must accept the call which took him "back home" to the parish of his boyhood in the city of Chicago. The Rev. William W. S. Hohenschild, a native of St. Louis, succeeded the Rev. Mr. White as Rector of the Holy Communion the fifteenth of December, and we are glad to welcome him as he comes "back home" from the Diocese of Newark.

The Rev. Edmund Duckworth is in his thirty-fifth year of continuous residence in this Diocese. During all these years, he has been the much-loved Rector of the Church of the Redeemer and its predecessor, St. James' Parish, in this city. A faithful pastor, a wide reader, a deep thinker, a stimulating and strengthening preacher, he has exerted an influence which will continue to be effective in the coming years far beyond the bounds of his own parish. I am officially informed by the Vestry that the resignation of the Rev. Mr. Duckworth as Rector of the Church of the Redeemer has been accepted, effective when a new Rector has been secured. As delegate to the General Convention and in various important offices to which he has been elected here at home, he has served the Diocese with devotion and Shall we not send him a message of affectionate greeting fidelity. and tell him how sorry we are that we do not see him in his accustomed place?

Bequest. By his will the Rev. Augustus P. Rein left to me in trust, as Bishop of Missouri, his residuary estate, as the Cora E. Rein Memorial Fund. The net income is to be administered "for the general uses of the Diocese of Missouri of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and/or for the personal relief or aid of any missionary or missionaries of the above mentioned Diocese as may be deemed worthy of special relief or aid." It is probable that the residuary estate will amount to something over \$6,000. When I remember the great simplicity of his life, I am deeply touch-

ed that Mr. Rein should have left so large a sum to assist the Diocese in missions and charities and benevolences.

In a missionary address which I made last spring in Grace Parish House, Kirkwood, by kind invitation of the Rector and the women of the parish, I told of the difficulty of securing good men for our Missouri mission field. I also spoke of Overland, and said I had found a man who was ready to come, and that I had a sufficient amount for his salary but no house for him to live in. The telling of my story brought pledges for this and other necessary work which enabled me to secure the needed man. The total of pledges thus far paid is \$808.32; of which amount \$670.00 came from Grace Church, Kirkwood, and \$138.32 from other friends and groups of friends in St. Louis and its suburbs. I give my grateful thanks. The receipts and disbursements of this account are printed in the Journal under head of "Missouri Missionary Work."

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese will be held in this room, Thursday of this week. I am sure that the members of the Auxiliary would be greatly encouraged if the Clergy should attend. I assume that the report of the President will be given to this Convention. It will tell the story of a busy year and of many helpful ministries accomplished, both in the Missionary Work of the Diocese and in other Mission Fields.

I trust that some opportunity may be had for the hearing of a report from the President of the Orphan's Home. Last year was a year of adjustments from an older to a newer method of managing the Home. Mrs. Charlton Messick, the new President, has devoted a vast amount of time and thought to the working out of the plans; and the Board of Managers and the Executive Board have cordially co-operated. I feel that it is most desirable that there should be closer contacts between the Diocese and the Orphans' Home. The hearing of reports of plans and accomplishments will help to that end.

Members of the League of Lay Readers have rendered valuable assistance in many vacant Missions of the Diocese; and in City Jail, Work House, Infirmary, Sanitarium, City Hospital and Koch Hospital; these latter under the direction of the Rev. J. H. George, in charge of the Mission to the City Institutions. I give my grateful thanks.

February 5, 1929, acting under authority of Resolution No. 16 of the Diocesan Convention of 1929 (see page 32 of Journal, 1929), I appointed the following to constitute The Finance Committee of the Diocese: Mr. Elias S. Gatch, Mr. Guy N. Hitchcock, Mr. John R. Shepley.

I confirmed 375 persons in 1929. In view of the fact that my working year consisted of only six months, this number compares favorably with the number (551) confirmed the previous year. The Right Reverend Edward Thomas Demby, D.D., Suffragan Bishop of Arkansas, confirmed 23, acting at my request, in All Saints', St. Louis, making the total confirmations for the year 398.

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December 22, in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel, St.Louis, I advanced the Rev. Arthur O. Steidemann, Deacon, to the Priesthood. Mr. Steidemann is appointed Minister of St. Thomas' Mission to the Deaf, in the City of St. Louis.

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riestssion The Special Meeting of the House of Bishops to elect a Presiding Bishop to succeed Bishop Murray was held in the City of Washington the day after I landed in New York. I was physically unable to attend. I was entirely pleased with the choice that was made, and I wrote Bishop Anderson of Chicago to tell him so. I also told him my hope that our Diocese of Missouri would do all things possible to assist the Presiding Bishop and the National Council in their plans for building and extending the work of the Kingdom.

When I went away in the middle of August, expecting not to return until the first of December, several members of the Diocesan Council said to me or wrote to me, "Don't worry about anything. And don't worry about the Church's Program and the Every Member Canvass. We will take care of that." I am grateful to all who helped. I have attended only one meeting of the Diocesan Council since my return, the meeting held the evening of January 14. The "expectations" from the various Parishes and Missions which were laid before that meeting were not large enough in amount to carry the Missionary Work in Missouri and elsewhere very far in the year 1930. This, I am sure, is no fault of those (to whom I am deeply grateful) who did the preliminary work of getting before our people the story of the Church's great opportunity and the story of the Church's great need. The National Council is waiting to be told how much Missouri "expects to pay" in 1930 for the support and extension of the Church's missionary work throughout the world. And the Department of Missions of our Diocesan Council is waiting to be told how much Missouri "expects to pay" in 1930 for missionary work in our own Diocese. I assume that there will be some report from the Department of Finance of the Diocesan Council concerning the Church's Program, to be considered by this Convention.

In a letter written December 31, 1929, addressed to all the Clergy of the Diocese and, through them, to their Congregations, I called attention to the fact that I should request consideration of the question of the election of a Bishop Coadjutor at this Annual Convention. The letter was sent (though there was no requirement that it should be) in order that Clergy and Lay Delegates might have opportunity to consider the whole matter thoughtfully before the Convention should assemble. I desire now to address myself briefly to that question.

During the first five months of the year 1929, I was physically below par and consciously working under a heavy handicap. About the middle of May, I had a thorough physical examination in St. Luke's Hospital, St. Louis. The examination disclosed a condition which my physician called heart fatigue; and also another condition which necessitated a major operation early in June. I remained under treatment in the hospital for nine successive weeks. Although the operation was entirely successful, I find myself quite below my normal physical strength and powers of endurance.

In a letter dated January 4, 1930, my physician advised me that my present cause of infirmity is of such permanent nature that I "have no right to expect to discharge the duties of (my) office during the next few years with that degree of regularity and efficiency which has marked (my) work as Bishop of Missouri in former years." He also expressed the opinion that, if I should endeavor to do my appointed tasks as regularly in the future as in the past, my health "would almost certainly be very much further impaired." In view of this situation, I feel that I am physically unable fully to discharge

the duties of my office.

I should be most unhappy if the Diocese should suffer harm through any unavoidable neglect of mine "during the next few years." I therefore venture the opinion that it is for the best interests of this Diocese that the question of the election of a Bishop Coadjutor be favorably considered by this Convention. And I should like the Convention to know that, before arriving at this conclusion, I had a conference, at my own request, with the Standing Committee of the Diocese acting as a Council of Advice.

Accordingly, I do hereby, in compliance with Canon 13, Section II, (i), read this my written consent to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor by and for the Diocese of Missouri; and I also hereby state that the duties assigned to the said Bishop Coadjutor, when duly ordained and consecrated, shall be the care and direction of the following Parishes, to wit: Calvary, Columbia; Christ Church, Cape Girardeau; St. James', Macon. Also the care and direction of all the Mission stations of the Diocese, organized and unorganized, and parochial, with the single exception of the Mission to the City Institutions. Also all activities along the line of new work or Church Extension. Also, in consultation with the Bishop, the admission and superintendence of Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders. (In making the above assignment of duties, I call the attention of the duties assigned by the Bishop to the Bishop Coadjutor in any Diocese may be enlarged by mutual consent whenever the Bishop of the Diocese may desire to assign such additional duties to the Bishop Coadjutor.")

I am aware, of course, that an additional financial burden must fall upon the Diocese if the salary of a Bishop Coadjutor is to be provided. I shall be glad to share this burden with the Diocese by accepting a salary of \$5,000.00 in lieu of my present salary of \$7,500.00 per year.

I hereby also signify my intention, in the event of the election of a Bishop Coadjutor, to resign the office of Bishop of Missouri at a date not later than the Diocesan Convention of 1934.

May we by the Holy Spirit perceive and know what things we ought to do. And may this Diocese, in the years that lie before us, be an instrument in the Master's hands for hastening the coming of His Kingdom and promoting the welfare of mankind!

The Council submits certain recommendations embodied in a resolution which was adopted on January 14, 1930, as follows:

"Resolved:

"That the Diocesan Council express to the Convention its views as follows:

"First:

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.00 .00 .00 .00 .00 .00 .32 "The continuation of the custom of borrowing funds to meet deficits year after year is unsound in policy and should be discontinued.

"Second:

"That pledges and payments on the apportionments from the parishes and missions should be divided, 50% to the National Council for the general missionary work of the Church, and 50% for the missionary work within the Diocese of Missouri, and that the budgets should be revised by the Diocesan Council accordingly, with such adjustments and allowances, as will prevent deficit borrowing.

"Third:

"This shall not be understood to prevent obtaining loans for temporary needs in anticipation of assured income."

The Chancellor's report in response to certain inquiries relating to the Church Pension Fund is attached hereto and made a part of this report.

Report of the Department of Religious Education.

During the year 1929, the personnel of the Department was materially changed. First was the resignation of the Vice-Chairman, the Rev. Bradner J. Moore, whose place was filled by the present incumbent, Canon T. L. Small. The office of Secretary was changed through the removal of Mr. R. C. Beckett to Chicago. Rev. George S. Gresham was proposed for membership and approved by the Council.

Realizing the great need of training, the Department has been making an effort to have speakers of the first order come before teachers and workers particularly of the Church School. To that end, a monthly institute conducted at Bishop Tuttle Memorial was begun on Nov. 22, when Dr. Block spoke on "The Old Testament and How We can Make Use of It," and Dean Scarlett on "The New Testament and How to Teach It." The next pair of lectures was given Jan. 16, when Prof. A. G. Wehrli and the Rev. Frank Maples spoke, —the former on "The Background of the Bible," and the latter on "The Picturesque Gospel of St. Luke." Others will be announced later.

The work of the Church School was to have been expanded to include a Home Department and the Isolated. An effort was made to reach the isolated through the clergy outside of St. Louis and its environs, but with no success because no such situation seemed to exist.

A much needed Diocesan Clerical Library begun in 1928 under the direction of Dr. Block has been much advanced, and some fine "Books of the Month" have been added. By this means, the clergy may have access to the most recent thought without the expense of purchasing these books themselves.

The Department is encouraging parishes to have their young people give plays and put on pageants as an expression of the dramatic side of religious thought.

As a means of becoming better acquainted and of enjoying a real evening of fellowship, the Committee on Programs of the Department planned a dinner on Jan. 28, preceded by a reception for the delegates of the Diocesan Convention and members of the Church at large. After dinner, there was an address by the Rev. Robert Nelson Spencer of Kansas City, rector of Grace and Holy Trinity Church. Mr. Daniel Philippi was in charge of a musical program.

However, the major projects of the Department will be (I) an Institute to be held in February for two days in St. Louis, and one day each in Northern and Southern Missouri; (II) a Summer School.

For the Institute, the Rev. Maurice Clarke, Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio is to be the principal speaker, and in addition there will be speakers from our own diocese on other religious subjects and in charge of conferences.

The Summer School is to be held at Columbia. Further details have not been made. Suffice to say, both of these projects will be worthy of consideration, and it is hoped that both will be largely attended.

Report of the Department of Christian Social Service.

The Department of Christian Social Service was organized by electing the Rev. Carl Reed Taylor as Vice-Chairman and the Rev. C. E. Remick as Secretary.

The Department sent the Rev. J. H. George to San Francisco as representative of the Diocese to the Social Service Conference held there, Mr. George having been elected a member of the Department, as well as Mr. Geo. B. Jones and Miss Nadia Thomas.

On invitation of Dr. Lathrop, the Vice-Chairman attended a conference of the heads of the Social Service Departments of the dioceses of the Southwest at Topeka, in connection with the Provincial Synod in November. The expenses of that trip were paid by the Social Service Department of the General Church.

We have not attempted any extensive program because of lack of funds, and have made recommendation to the Finance Department for a larger appropriation for the coming year, so that certain social and industrial problems could be presented to the congregations of the diocese.

The labors and accomplishments of the Department of Finance, during the year 1929, may be summarized as follows:

As a result of diligent and painstaking efforts, we established the Bases of Apportionment and Assessment on a systematic basis fair to all, discarding the old hit and miss plan, and establishing ourselves on a sure foundation for future years.

We determined the various budgets, under above apportionments and assessments, with due regard for economies in the operation of the various departments.

During the year 1929, the Finance Committee made extraordinary efforts to stimulate more generous giving to the General Church's Program; first, by enlarging the Finance Committee to include the chairman of the Finance Committee of each Vestry in St. Louis, (from whom we get over ninety percent of our returns), to establish direct contact with, and come to a better understanding with each Parish.

We held numerous meetings of this enlarged committee.

We made numerous statements and appeals direct to each Parish, and to all Parishioners, through the Church News.

Early in December, we called together the Rectors and Treasurers of those Parishes largely in arrears, and asked them to try and collect and forward balance due before January first, 1930.

In spite of all our efforts towards raising funds for the General Church's Program, we found ourselves in debt, at the end of 1929, in the sum of Eighty-eight Hundred Dollars, as follows: Four Thousand Dollars borrowed from the Bank, Forty-eight Hundred Dollars borrowed from the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund.

We cannot close this report without thanking all the Parishes in the Diocese for the consideration shown the Finance Committee, in determining its problems, and we want to say to those parishes who registered complaints, that our failure to make adjustments was caused not by any lack of sympathy or consideration, but by our inability to make changes without destroying the entire fabric upon which the plans were based.

Re: Church Pension Fund.

The Diocesan Council, Diocese of Missouri, St. Louis, Missouri.

Gentlemen:

Under date of May 16th, 1929, I received a letter from the Recording Secretary of the Council in which he requested me to "render an opinion of the insurance laws of the State of New York and the State of Missouri concerning delinquent payment of premiums to the Church Pension Fund for individual clergymen, as affecting the status of the Diocese and the payment of benefits to other clergymen." In the same letter the Recording Secretary referred me to Dr. Wilkins, Chairman of the Church Pension Fund Committee, for any information I might desire on the subject.

As I did not fully understand the question submitted by the Recording Secretary I took the matter up with Dr. Wilkins who has restated the question, submitted to me for an opinion, as follows:

"Is the Diocese of Missouri liable for the pension assessments levied on the salaries of clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and not paid by the parishes which they serve or served; such clergymen having been duly reported to the Church Pension Fund as being entitled to pension protection on the basis of the salary named in such report?"

The word "diocese," as used in the question submitted, will be interpreted herein to mean "Diocesan Convention," as the word "diocese" does not describe an entity in respect of which any legal liability can attach. On the other hand, the Diocesan Convention is an instrumentality of the Church through which the diocese acts and is a body, in legal contemplation, which can incur liability for its acts.

In answer to the question, as restated by Dr. Wilkins and using the word "diocese" to mean "Diocesan Convention," I beg to say that I have examined the laws of New York, which created the Church Pension Fund as a charitable corporation under the laws of that State, the canons of the General Convention, and the canons of the Diocese of Missouri, and have reached the following conclusions in respect of the question above submitted, namely:

(1) The Diocese of Missouri is not liable for the pension assessments levied on the salaries of clergy resident in the diocese, and which is not paid by the **parishes** which they serve or served. The parishes alone are liable for such assessments for the reason that the levy of such assessments is made directly upon the parishes by the Church Pension Fund pursuant to the provisions of Section 3, Canon 59 of the General Convention, entitled "Of the Church Pension Fund."

The power of the Church Pension Fund to levy such assessments against parishes must be exercised "in accordance with the canons of the several dioceses." There is nothing in Diocesan Canon 22 which in any way limits or modifies the power granted to the Church Pension Fund to make assessments against the parishes in the Diocese of Missouri.

(2) In respect of assessments for premiums on the annuities of the Bishops of the diocese the situation is somewhat different. In such case paragraph "First" of Section 3 of Diocesan Canon 22 provides that "the Diocesan Convention shall include in its assessments on the parishes and missions for the support of the Diocese, the amount necessary to pay the premium on the annuities of its Bishops." The Diocese has fulfilled its obligations when it has made the assessments, as stated above. There is no obligation on the part of the Diocese to pay such assessments.

(3) The payment of premiums on the annuities for all clergymen receiving stipends from the (Missionary) Board are to be "apportioned" by the Diocesan Convention among the parishes and missions, according to paragraph "Second" Section 3 of Diocesan Canon 22, which reads as follows:

"SECOND. It shall be the duty of the Diocesan Council to include in its budget to the Convention the amount necessary to pay the premiums on the annuities for all clergymen receiving stipends from the Board to be apportioned among the parishes and missions in the same manner as the other items of the budget for the support of the Missionary Board."

Apparently the power to assess the amount of premiums on the annuities of clergymen employed by, or under the jurisdiction of the Missionary Board is not granted as the word "apportioned" is used, while the word "assessed" is omitted. The intention is that such premiums shall be paid by the "parishes and missions" as apportioned but no assessment is made. A moral as distinguished from a legal liability is imposed. At all events the Diocese is not liable for such payments.

(4) The Diocese is liable, under paragraph "Third," Section 3 of Diocesan Canon 22, for the premiums payable in respect of clergymen employed in the diocese other than (1) the Bishop of the Diocese, (2) clergymen employed by parishes, and (3) clergymen employed by the Missionary Board.

I have submitted my opinion in a somewhat abbreviated form as I take it that the Council is not particularly interested in the reasons therefor. However, I have made an analysis of the law and canons relating to the subject and I shall be glad to advise the Council more at length should it so request.

APPENDIX NO. 9.

Report on the University of the South.

The fiscal year of the University closed on August 31st, and the following financial facts are drawn from the report of the Treasurer:

The operating receipts for the year amounted to \$372,000, and the operating expenses to \$371,000. The permanent cash assets were increased from \$1,144,000. to \$1,651,000.

The Debt Fund and the Million Dollar Fund were completed during the year.

The Expansion Fund subscriptions increased from \$371,623.72 to \$536,111.79. The uncollected pledges on the Expansion Fund on August 31st amounted to \$179,047.90; of this amount approximately \$150,000. is not yet due.

The year has seen the completion of the Quintard Professorship Trust Fund; the completion of one new, Professor's house; of a new gymnasium for the University; and a new gymnasium and swimming pool at the Academy. On the whole, the year was marked by a splendid advance in almost every line.

The new year opened auspiciously with 291 students in the College, and 17 in the Theological School. The student body is of a distinctly high type. The curriculum has been strengthened in several places, particularly in the English Department which now has four full-time men of Professorial rank. We have made a beginning toward a Department of Music with an instructor, allowing one hour of credit per year toward degrees.

The year 1932 will mark the 75th anniversary of the meeting on Lookout Mountain July 4th, 1857, at which the University was founded. Committees of the Board of Trustees and the Faculty are already at work on plans for a great celebration of the event.

It is our hope to have our endowment up to one and a half million dollars by that time; to have two new living halls completed; to have the Library fire-proofed; a new class room and Library building for the Theological school; and the property all in first class condition.

As part of the celebration, we hope to have ready a short illustrated history of the University; the song book and the new alumni directory ready for use; to gather together a great company of distinguished people from all parts of the world to help us celebrate the completion of seventy-five years of noteworthy achievements in the educational world.

APPENDIX NO. 10.

Report of the Diocesan Pension Fund Committee.

Jan. 28, 1930.

Your Committee rejoices to report that the Church Pension Fund still registers a steady, constant progress and briefly to note some of the items of that progress.

The accumulated and safely invested reserves of the Fund, for the payment of present and future pensions, now amount to the great sum of Twenty-two million, five hundred thousand dollars; and since security is the main object of every true pension system, these reserves will be increased in the exact ratio that the pension liabilities increase. Thus the clergy of the Church will always be abundantly assured of the fulfillment of their pension promises.

The pension assessments number something like 20,000 different accounts, distributed to wherever flies the flag of this American Church. Yet confidence in the Fund is so general and great, and the service of diocesan and other Church authorities so effective in its behalf, that practically a 100% payment has been made by parishes, missions and other ecclesiastical organizations, since the Fund began to operate thirteen years ago. Such payment amounted during the year 1929 to the great sum of \$1,157,000.

Concerning the liquidation of the accrued liabilities—the most vexatious problem with which any pension system is faced—the Fund reports that the Trustees are succeeding beyond their highest expectation. Consequently, while on January 1, 1925, the Fund had 273 age allowances in force, none above six hundred dollars, 234 clergy now receive \$750. a year; 86 receive \$900. a year; 41 receive \$1,000. a year; and 3 receive \$1,200. a year. Of the widows, 298 receive \$400. a year; 58 receive \$450. a year; 52 receive \$500. a year; and 2 receive \$600. a year. That is to say, 95% of the clergy age allowances have been increased beyond the \$600. originally promised, and 64% of the widow's pensions have been increased in a like proportion. "The experience of the Church," says Vice-President Sayre, "in finding its pension benefits constantly growing so materially beyond the original promises, at so early a date, is unique in the history of pensions."

Thus the pension disbursements attained in the year 1929, the remarkable sum of \$811,418.94. Forty-eight thousand nine hundred and six dollars and ninety-one cents more than in 1928, and \$347,704.43 more than five years ago. Present pension disbursements are more than \$2,500. a day.

In these disbursements the Diocese of Missouri shares, under the eighteen grants now in force, as follows:

Pension assessments have been paid, in the main, as we have said, with practical unanimity and despatch, and truly so, with one single exception, within the Diocese of Missouri. That exception, a notable parish, is delinquent not only in the sum of \$28.82 for the year 1928, but also for the entire year of 1929, not having paid one single dollar on account from January 1, 1929, to Dec. 31 of the same year: making a total delinquency of \$271.51, whereby the pension status of the rector of this parish is seriously impaired.

There are, moreover, certain arrearages within the Diocese, dating back to the years 1919-1924, that were reported to the Convention of 1929, together with the statement of the pension office that "it would be very gratifying if your Convention would take some action that would clear these unpaid assessments off our records."

The only action taken by Convention, however, was to refer the question of diocesan liability for these assessments—a question that had been raised—to the Diocesan Council for determination. But the Council, instead of determining the issue, submitted it, we have been informed, to the Chancellor of the Diocese for his official opinion, in the form of the following question:

"Is the Diocese of Missouri liable for the pension assessments levied on the salaries of clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and not paid by the parishes which they serve or served; such clergymen having been duly reported to the Church Pension Fund as being entitled to pension protection on the basis of the salary named in such report?"

To this, the Chancellor, after the careful study and research which mark all his labors for the Diocese, replied, January 8th, 1930, in part, as follows:

"The Diocese of Missouri is not liable for the pension assessments levied on the salaries of clergy resident in the Diocese, and which is not paid by the parishes which they serve or served. The parishes alone are liable for such assessments for the reason that the levy of such assessments is made directly upon the parishes by the Church Pension Fund, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5, Canon 59 of the General Convention, entitled "Of the Church Pension Fund."

This decision, however, while strictly within the Law and worthy of all acceptance, seems not to have settled the question so far as this Convention is concerned. For the chairman of your Committee received, January 22nd, 1930, the following communication:

"This is to inform you that at the meeting of the Diocesan Council on January 14, 1930, a report of the Chancellor in regard to the Church Pension Fund-was referred to the next Diocesan Convention, without recommendation."

Thus this important question comes before Convention once again. And while the Chancellor's decision is deserving of all credence as a learned interpretation of Canon Law, yet there is a view of this problem which Convention might well consider. It is the view of the Church Pension Fund, as expressed by its Secretary, Mr. Bradford B. Locke. Writing under date of January 17th, 1930, he said in part:

".....it does not seem to me that the legal aspect of the situation is of paramount importance. The important thing, as I know you agree, is that the Diocese shall do all it possibly can to see that none of its clergy, or the widows of its clergy, suffer in their pension protection because of the failure of some of the churches within the Diocese to carry out the requirements of the Canon Law in regard to their pension obligations. It does not help much, so far as the public is concerned, to be able to say that the Diocese had no legal obligation, when there unfortunately occurs a case where a widow, for instance, is deprived of certain pension protection or some payment to which she would have been entitled if her husband's parish and Diocese had done their part during the time that he was serving the Church."

With this view of the problem this Committee heartily agrees; and recommends that, in order to protect our clergy in their pension rights and maintain the good name of the Diocese in its relation to the Church Pension Fund, Section 4, Article 5 of the Constitution of the Diocese of Missouri, hereafter be strictly enforced. This section reads in part as follows: "...no Lay Delegate shall take his seat until he shall have presented to the Secretary satisfactory evidence that his parish has paid in full all assessments of the Treasurer for the necessary expenses of the Diocese, and all assessments for dues to the Church Pension Fund."

Of the sixteen missions, Bloomfield, Illmo, and Chaffee are under the care of Rev. C. D. Lathrop; Rolla, Cuba, Salem, and St. James are under the charge of the Rev. H. N. Tragitt; Overland is happy to be in the care of a resident minister, Rev. Donald Veale, a man of great energy, enterprise, and resourcefulness. Mr. and Mrs. Kopplin and their excellent band of coworkers are achieving great things at Valley Park. Rev. Frank Maples is doing fine, progressive work at St. Augustine's. The missions at Ironton, Herculaneum, Fredericktown, and Bonne Terre are ministered to by Archdeacon Marsden. It is a matter for profound regret that Poplar Bluff, one of our most promising missions, has no resident minister in charge.

APPENDIX NO. 14.

Woman's Auxiliary.

To the Rt. Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, and Members of the Convention:

We bring you greetings from the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese. 1929 has been a busy year full of inviting and appealing opportunities for service, making us realize, as never before, how great a work we are a part of as members of the Protestant Episcopal Church of U. S. As we work in our five fields of service we feel that we are carrying out our Master's commission "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." Our Jerusalem is our Parish and Community; our Judea is our Diocese; our Samaria, (the nearby states), our Nation; the uttermost parts of the Earth, our World.

Through personal experience, the Auxiliary has learned, that service and gifts are stimulated by better understanding of the problems of the Church. For years it has helped to create public opinion for the Church's work. How do we stimulate this better understanding? Mainly through our programs and departments of work.

The speakers at our Quarterly meetings have given us inspiration and much information. Rev. R. M. Trelease, gave us a vivid picture of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan. A small tumble-down building in 1900 when Dr. Teusler took charge, now not only a healing ministry of Jesus Christ, but an international peace and friendship monument. As Mr. Trelease finished his speech a well known Auxiliary woman, Mrs. Wm. Burritt, rose and said, "I wish to give \$1,000.00 to St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo." Imagine our pleased surprise and gratitude for this generous gift! The Auxiliary women have contributed \$2,284.45 of the \$8,097.01 given by the Diocese toward St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, during 1929.

In May, Bishop Johnson gave us "Facts about our Diocese" which covers 32,500 square miles and in 16,000 of these square miles we have only one clergyman. The Diocese of Missouri needs more funds and workers. What can we do to help?

Rev. F. G. Deis followed with a talk on "The Missionary Program of the Church." He emphasized that service is the keynote of success in work for Christ and the Church.

On our October program were two speakers, Miss Dunkle of the Girls' Friendly, who gave a most interesting talk on the future connections of the Girls' Friendly with the Woman's Auxiliary.

Dr. W. M. Danner spoke on American Missions to Lepers in such a clear and interesting manner that, although no contribution was asked for, many wished to give. Mrs. Jas. George has been receiving voluntary contributions for lepers and sending them to Dr. Danner.

Mrs. B. A. Hickman's resignation as Religious Education Secretary was a loss to the Educational work. Mrs. Tittman, at the request of the Executive Board, consented to take over this work until our Annual meeting. She has evolved a policy for the Religious Educa-

tion Department and just completed plans for an Educational Institute in February conducted by Miss Margaret Marston of the National Auxiliary who will give an exposition of "The World's Mission," the book recommended by our National Council for this year's study.

Supply Secretary: No Department of the Auxiliary has done more splendid work than the Supply Department. Their 1929 boxes costing \$3,361.91 went to Alaska, to the Philippines to hospitals, to an Industrial School for Indians, to a Cathedral Home for Children, personal boxes to two Clergymen, 3 Christmas boxes to Women Missionaries

Our United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Herbert Edmunds, has received from 36 parishes and missions in 1929, \$5,582.93.

Church Periodical Club has a Secretary, Mrs. A. A. Boettler, who not only enthuses all her parish secretaries but also the boys of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew who help deliver magazines, about 1,000 a month to nine City Institutions, many current periodicals, 135 sent to clergymen, workers and invalids besides hundreds of cards, games and books.

Our Devotional Secretary, Mrs. Geo. Tittman, has held regular monthly meetings with 25 parish secretaries. The needs of various parishes are discussed followed by a period of meditation and prayer.

They have had two Quiet Days, one with Rev. H. W. Hobson conducting meditations, and another with Rev. John Bunting conducting meditations. Our two prayer partners, Meta Connell and Eunice Sen have retired from the mission field in China. Our new prayer partners are Deaconess Binns of St. Stephen's Mission, Nora, Va. and Miss Florence Clarkson of the Mission of St. Mary the Virgin, at Sagada in the Philippines.

Work of our Social Service Department, as reported by Mrs. C.C. Pangman, the secretary, consists of work carried on in soliciting pledges from various parishes to cover the budget submitted by Mr. George, the City Missionary; collecting the money and gifts so pledged and attending to their distribution to the City Institutions and Missions on their list; special Christmas and other gifts for nine institutions, valued at \$271.75. Work outlined for the Social Service Department was carried on successfully and nearly all Budget reguirements satisfied, \$1,302.01 collected, making a total of \$1,573.76.

Our three Representatives-at-large are each Chairmen of a Committee: Mrs. Wm. H. Burritt, Courtesy; Miss Martha Zimmerman, Dressings at St. Luke's Hospital; Mrs. E. F. Berkley Jones, Spirit of Missions and Publicity. Mrs. Charlton Messick, President of the Episcopal Home for Children, and Mrs. James Seddon, representative of Girls' Friendly Society, are members of our Executive Board.

Our Auxiliary Endowment Fund, without publicity or solicitation except at our quarterly meetings, amounts to \$1,773.62; \$510.42 received in 1929. Church of the Holy Communion gave \$100.00 in honor of Mrs. P. C. Maffit. The Auxiliary gave \$100.00 in honor of Mrs. E. C. Simmons, and another \$100.00 in honor of a former president of the Auxiliary, Mrs. Daniel S. Tuttle, and a third in honor of Mrs. E. F. Cushing, an outstanding auxiliary worker and church woman.

Three delegates from our Auxiliary were sent to the Provincial Synod at Topeka in November. It was helpful to share experiences and learn how other dioceses were meeting our common problems. Work in rural districts and among young people was stressed as **most important.** The Synod Pledge of the Auxiliary goes to a school for mountain girls at Winslow, Ark., the Helen Dunlop School, which is also used for summer conferences for young people.

During 1929 we have had the pleasure of holding all our regular meetings and many of our Executive Board meetings in the Bishop Tuttle Memorial. This perhaps explains our unusually large attendance. We are most appreciative of the luncheon plans worked out for us by Mrs. Shepley and her committee, providing a twenty-five cent luncheon for all who obtain tickets in advance. At one of our meetings over 400 availed themselves of this luncheon privilege.

I had always been very much concerned about the isolation of the out-of-town parishes. Their work is done without the inspiration of the large get-together meetings of the city, the Quarterlies, the Study Classes, Institutes and Quiet Days, all of which form a large part of the spiritual life of the Woman's Auxiliary. I sensed that districting the Diocese and having district meetings would in large measure furnish this inspiration. This has been accomplished under the very able leadership of Mrs. Katherine Mackey, Vice-President of the Northern Convocation. Mrs. Mackey sends this very splendid report of the two districts formed in the Northern Convocation, one the Hannibal District, the other the Columbia District. Hannibal District consists of Hannibal, Palmyra, Monroe, Canton, Louisiana, Clarksville, Prairieville. Columbia District consists of Columbia, Macon, Moberly, Kirksville, Mexico.

A very successful meeting was held at Hannibal in the spring of 1929. Rev. Francis J. Bloy was the much appreciated speaker and the parish house was crowded to hear him and the enthusiastic reports of Mrs. Mackey, Mrs. Head and three visitors from St. Louis, Mrs. Rumsey, Miss Cousland and Miss Lewis. In the fall, an equally successful gathering of the District was held at Palmyra. Mrs. Rogers outlined a very comprehensive program for the year, and throughout the entire district there was manifested a helpful spirit of cordial cooperation beautiful to see. Mr. Blair Ridington gave a lantern talk at the theatre on "India, the Holy."

Mrs. Dunlop, president of the Columbia District, has interested the women greatly, but the poor condition of the roads and other unfavorable circumstances have prevented a get-together meeting during 1929.

During the year the Superintendent has been away from his work a total of nearly three months as the result of a serious operation. This misfortune has also required a very perceptible slowing down of pastoral work since. But the rest of the staff has continued its excellent work, and friends of the Mission, clerical and lay, have made possible the Sunday program practically without interruption.

There has been one change in the personnel of the staff since my last report. Miss Helen Shipps, who so efficiently began the social service work for the Mission, left us the first of February, since which time she has been selected by Dr. Teusler to initiate the Social Service Department of St. Luke's, Tokio. Her successor, Miss Lois Phillips, was a district superintendent of the Provident Association, a member of St. Peter's Parish. In releasing her to us Mr. Steger, the Superintendent of the Provident Association said, "We are so much interested in the experiment you are making with the City Mission that we are gladly releasing her, though she is one of our best workers."

Mr. Gresham throughout the year has taken charge of most of the services and pastoral work at Koch Hospital. This has relieved the Superintendent of that field and made possible more frequent visitations of the City Hospital and other institutions.

The various members of the staff have continued their faithful work. Miss Cora Pearce visits Koch Hospital, the Sanitarium and the Infirmary. Miss Lorick goes to Hospital No.2 and the colored population of the Infirmary. The work of these two ladies consists in cooperation with the officiating clergyman, in preparing patients for Holy Communion, Baptism and Confirmation, and in offices of friendship and minor relief. Deaconess Brainerd's work is in the difficult field of the penal institutions and the St. Louis Training School for Feeble Minded. She holds services and Bible Classes as well as doing the work of an institutional visitor. During my illness Mr. David Kopplin supplied lay reader's services. The League of Lay Readers has continued its generous cooperation during the past year. Mr. Weddell has also kindly cooperated when called upon. Others to whom acknowledgement is especially due for aid in carrying the schedule of services are Mr. Allen D. Pomeroy, Mr. Richard Kopplin, and Canon Small.

The Woman's Auxiliary generously supplemented our budget and made possible carrying on activities which otherwise would have been discontinued. They provided parties at Koch Hospital and the Infirmary, and have furnished a committee for looking after the City Mission's supply closet. The Church Periodical Club and many other friends have kept the Mission supplied with magazines for the various institutions. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew attends the 3:30 service on Sunday aternoons at the City Hospital, distributes literature and brings patients to the service. The Needlework Guild in its three branches of St. Louis, Webster Groves and Kirkwood, have made very generous provision of warm clothing for patients at Koch Hospital and other institutions, using the City Mission to distribute its bounty. It would be impossible to mention all the organizations and individuals that have in one way or another helped our work this year.

The usual Christmas program was made possible by the generous response of our people to the Christmas appeal. The Christmas program included the distribution of 1800 pounds of candy, 3600 oranges, \$150.00 worth of tobacco, and special gifts for the children at Bellefontaine Farm, Detention House, School for the Feeble Minded and the women in the city penal institutions. A large number of Christmas postal cards were distributed to patients in the hospitals, stamped and ready for mailing. Thanks are due to a host of friends of the Mission for lending their cars and assisting in various ways at Christmas time and, indeed, throughout the year.

The Social Service Director has had a very busy year of it. Beside doing an enormous amount of City Mission case work which is indispendsible to any effective pastoral ministration in the jail and work house, she gave a great deal of time to cooperating with the Episcopal Orphans' Home. The Superintendent thought it was within the scope of the work of the Mission to loan her services to a Church Institution for a demonstration of case work and for advice in regard to policy. I believe this service, rendered without charge, has proved helpful. The City Mission has also loaned the services of its social service director during an emergency to the Missouri Prison Welfare League and to others. Our contacts with social agencies during the past year have been greatly broadened and have included practically every social agency in town.

Of course all this output of energy and material aid has been done in the name of Christ and His Church. But the question is ask-ed, "What does it all amount to?" I am sometimes challenged by those who know nothing or nearly nothing about our work as to what return there is. So far as the question is asked for information, it is of course impossible to answer in terms that would satisfy the man with a yard-stick. I believe there is no honest man who reads about so called "successful" work in a spiritual field but must have a twinge of the shivers. What is success in Christ's vineyard and who will appraise it? Nevertheless, we see apparently reasonable returns for our labour. During the last month or two, for example, two men whom we had followed through the jail and penitentiary have re-turned to apparently useful and happy lives. During all this time we have kept in touch with them and their families and ministered to their spiritual needs. But we are always humble about these things for we know we may be disappointed. But most of our work is not as extended and complete as these cases. We touch hundreds of men in jail and workhouse, sometimes intimately and sometimes

very casually. I know no way of measuring the value of this work except by rehearsing many little apparent triumphs. Deaconess Brainerd whose work is almost entirely confined to female and juvenile delinquents will tell you the same thing. We know enough to know it is work supremely worth while. Our many tragedies and disappointments warn us against overconfidence.

Of course the work in the hospitals and the Infirmary means just what it means in parochial work, plus the added advantage that the Church enjoys when working with those whose misfortunes have stripped life of its silly false standards.

In our work with homeless men we have developed an agreement with the Bureau for Homeless men so that we in no case conflict. We have also taken care of a number of family cases during the year at the request of the city clergy. It would be a great advantage if all the parishes of the city would allow the City Mission to administer its relief because we have the facilities to take care of such cases effectively. Suppliants for funds who are totally unknown to parish authorities, but who claim to be Church people, should be referred to us with the offer of such financial aid as the discretionary funds of the parish permit. Very often we can save your money and conscience, and when aid is really needed we can suggest the most helpful plan of relief.

I believe we have gone about as far as we can go with the resources at our command. Ever since I have taken charge of the City Mission I have been operating with a decreasing annual income. The margin for operating is always precariously small. We ought to have a reserve of five hundred dollars, but we generally are very near the zero line. It is a very uncomfortable matter, for if both ends do not meet I must find the money.

The question is now before us whether we wish to go forward in this city and do a work I, for one, am convinced no other organization is so well equipped to do. If we do, we must have a greater source of revenue than we have. Indeed, if we do not find a way out we will be obliged to curtail our present program. I have, in a recent article in the Church News, suggested a plan. It is, briefly, that we organize the work of the City Mission under the direction of a City Missions Society, that we eventually cut the aid from the Department of Missions to an appropriation of eight thousand dollars, that this Society be permitted to promote the work of the City Mission in the City of St. Louis, and that eventually it be incorporated and allowed to hold endowments for its work. What I have in mind at first would be to find one hundred Church people who would give one hundred dollars apiece a year. This would make an income of ten thousand dollars in addition to eight or nine thousand from other sources, and ought to give us a good start. I do not think it would affect the Church's General Program in an unfavorable way in the least. I believe that it would help the parochial programs of the city parishes. Of course, there is not much hope of success if the city clergy oppose the plan. It will succeed splendidly if they will promote it. A St. Louis' City Mission, after all, ought to be a St. Louis interest and responsibility. I have never known the Church people of St. Louis to fail us in any request. I hope they will not fail us now that after looking carefully over the ground, and with over four years expe-

rience back of me, I say it appears to be the time to organize this work on the same lines as the Church is organized in other great cities.

APPENDIX NO. 19.

Report of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

To the Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri, the Clergy and Lay Delegates of the Ninety-first Annual Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

The year 1929 showed marked increase in the activities of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, especially as regards the advance junior work.

For the first time in the history of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew a junior convention was held that was entirely separate from any other activity. Heretofore the junior convention was always held in conjunction with the senior convention. The junior convention held at Hobart College, Geneva, N.Y., marked a distinct advance in the annals of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew.

In the spring of 1929, a conference of leaders amongst juniors was held at Washington, D.C., lasting two days, the deliberations of which had considerable to do with the success of the junior convention in the Fall. The result of these activities has been the organization of a large number of advanced junior chapters and the revival of a large number of chapters that had heretofore been dormant.

We want to express our great appreciation to the church people of the diocese for their general response to our request for finances and help for both the Noonday Lenten services and other activities.

The Lenten program this year is as follows: Ash Wednesday, Rt. Rev. F. F. Johnson, D.D., Bishop of Missouri; March 10-14, Rev. Sidney E. Sweet, St. Paul's, Columbus, Ohio; March 17-21, Rev. Edwin J. Van Etten, Calvary Church, Pittsburgh; March 24-28, Rt. Rev. Eugene C. Seaman, D.D., Missionary Bishop North Texas. You will notice that the Brotherhood of St. Andrew has charge of the services for the first few weeks only, the reason being that the Metropolitan Church Federation is combining with the Cathedral and will provide the speakers for the balance of Lent, with the exception of Good Friday which will be taken by Dean Wm. Scarlett.

The different chapters of the Brotherhood have co-operated with the City Missioner, helping him conduct Sunday afternoon services at the City Hospital.

The Brotherhood reserves a private room at the St. Louis Lunch Room, 10th and Locust St., every Thursday and invites all church men to come.

APPENDIX NO. 20.

Report of the Episcopal Home for Children For the Year 1929.

In addition to the various normal activities of the home proper, and of Brittain Hall for the older boys, a number of important changes have been made or are under consideration, and reference to same will be made after outlining the usual activities.

The Board of Managers has held four regular meetings and four called meetings. The Executive Committee has held meetings weekly, and the four standing committees have met monthly.

During the year an average of sixty-four children have been cared for in the home proper, and from twelve to seventeen in Brittain Hall. There have been twenty-one children restored to their families, three placed in other institutions, one turned over to Deaconess Brainerd, two transferred from the home to Brittain Hall, two to the Children's Aid to be placed in homes, and one placed in a position.

Total income of the home for the year was 334,277.73; total expenses 333,412.43; gain for the year 860.34; and it is pertinent to say that the expenses include 100.00 per month, or 1,200.00 for the year, set aside as an emergency fund, and the paying off of 1,000.00 borrowed from bank. We now owe nothing at the bank.

Reports from the school children continue to be good, both in regard to their scholastic requirements and health conditions. Three girls graduated from high school. The Board gave a tea, to which Mr. Robert Kelso, of the Community Council, was invited to speak to the members on modern methods of Child Welfare.

A dinner was also given at the home, to which were invited Bishop and Mrs. Johnson, the Rectors and their wives, the Advisory Committee and their wives, the Medical Staff and their wives, and members of the Board and members of the Executive Committee and their husbands.

Rev. Geo. S. Gresham kindly conducted Sunday evening services at the Home.

The children of the Home are now attending Sunday School at Christ Church Cathedral.

Canon Small secured the services of Pat Dowd to supervise the older boy's play, taking them on hikes, teaching them to play ball and do some manual training work.

Mrs. Henry brought a group of girls from Trinity Church to teach the girls to sew and make flowers.

The City Mission sent Miss Lois Philips to the Home to help with the social service department, this being their donation to the good of the Home.

As it developed that the social service work at the Home required more time than it was possible for Miss Philips to devote thereto, a long-felt need was met by the securing of an efficient social service worker in the person of Miss Teddy Hodgden, who is devot-

ing all of her time to the Home and whose duties, primarily, are to keep the records of the children, investigate applications for admission to the home, follow up children placed in foster homes, or in their own family homes, etc., and gratifying results have already been obtained from her efforts.

A radio has been installed for the pleasure of the children.

Many organizations and all of the churches have been very generous in service, material help and pleasure outings.

Every child had at least two weeks in camp during the summer.

The Orphan Home Board became a member of the Community Council and the Woman's Auxiliary.

Brittain Hall, under the able management of Miss Julia Upshaw, continues to care for the older boys, as boys are not kept at the home proper after they reach the age of twelve years.

Two boys have entered Brittain Hall during the past year.

Rev. Leighton H. Nugent continues as chaplain, taking dinner each week with the boys, and guiding them in their spiritual life.

At this time there are twelve boys in the Hall, and one boy whose health is not good is being cared for by the Home, and some friends of the Home.

A radio has also been installed in Brittain Hall.

The different parishes have selected a month in which to give special care to the needs of Brittain Hall, and the Guild of St. John's meets there one day each week to mend, and so the good work continues with God's blessing.

Brittain Hall, our home for the older boys, is quite well equipped and suitable for the service but our Home proper has grown quite old and out-of-date, and is in many respects inconvenient and unsuited to our purposes. To add to these conditions, some months ago the St. Louis Fire Department made an investigation of our main building and reported that because of the inflammable construction and inadequate fire protection we would no longer be permitted to use the third floor for a dormitory for the younger children. This necessitated moving them to the lower floors, thus increasing the already crowded conditions. Furthermore, it was deemed inadvisable to use the infirmary, thus further reducing our available facilities.

Having in mind the deficiencies of the present home, our Board and Executive Committee have sought to dispose of same and to secure new and up-to-date quarters. In fact, their activities in this direction have reached the point where a prospective purchaser was found for the old property and negotiations were entered into for a new site in the suburbs on which to construct modern buildings. These transactions, however, were arrested by certain difficulties, particularly inability to give a clear title to our old property, but am pleased to say that our lawyers hold out hope that certain court action may be had which will enable us to give a clear title, and, if so, our aspirations for new quarters and improved facilities may be realized in the not far distant future. On the other hand, if this cannot be accomplished we have in mind and may consider it desirable to propose another alternative.

An important change which has been adopted in a measure, at least, is that of the policy with reference to the period of retention of the children in the Home. Instead of taking the children in for a more or less permanent stay, it is now the policy to endeavor, where investigation indicates it may safely be done, to place them in foster homes or to restore them to their own homes, paying board, or partial board, for their keep, where necessary, thus reuniting families, and to transfer other children to other suitable institutions.

In April Mrs. Hurlbut, former superintendent, presented her resignation as she felt she must give more personal care to her own children. The Home Staff then managed the Home through the summer, and in September were fortunate in being able to employ Deaconess Frances Affleck to manage the Home. Deaconess Affleck came to us with the highest recommendations and with splendid equipment in the way of experience in this class of work. Many improvements have already been accomplished under her administration.

In connection with the desire to dispose of the Home and acquire new quarters, to which reference has previously been made, it was found that our Charter too greatly restricted the amount of property which the corporation might hold, and arrangements were made to amend the Charter so that there might be no limitation in this respect, and in making this change and certain other modifications the Charter was further amended to change the name of our home to "The Episcopal Home for Children," and it should now be known under such name.
