Rules of Order of Convention.

1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine service.
2. When the President takes the chair, no member shall continue standing or shall afterwards stand up, unless to address the Chair.
3. When the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding day shall be read.
4. Immediately after the organization of the Convention, the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, viz.:
 - I. On Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials.
 - II. On Assessments.
 - III. On Christian Education.
 - IV. On Constitution and Canons.
 - V. On Finance.
 - VI. On Missionaries' Traveling Expenses.
 - VII. On Missions.
 - VIII. On Raising Funds for the Endowment of the Episcopate.
 - IX. On State of the Church.
 - X. On Sunday School Work.
 - XI. Unfinished Business.
5. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered.
6. All resolutions shall be reduced to writing, presented to the Secretary, and by him read; and a motion shall not be considered before the House until seconded.
7. When any member is about to speak, or deliver any matter to the House, he shall, with due respect, address himself to the President, confining himself strictly to the point in debate.
8. A member shall not absent himself from the services of the House, unless he have leave or be unable to attend.
9. A member, other than the Chairman of a committee whose report is under consideration, shall not speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than ten minutes at a time without leave of the House.
10. Any member of the house may call for a vote by Ayes or Nays.

11. When a question has once been determined, it shall stand as the judgment of the House, and shall not again be drawn into debate, except on motion for reconsideration, which must be made by a member who had previously voted in the majority, and all motions to reconsider must be made on the day the vote is taken, or on the next succeeding day.

12. When a question is under consideration, a motion shall not be received, except to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to postpone it indefinitely, to commit it, to divide it or amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay an amendment on the table be carried, the matter before the House shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay upon the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order.

13. Debate shall not be allowed upon a resolution to refer any motion to a Committee or to a motion to recommit any subject which has been before a Committee, but the member who offers such resolution or motion may speak for five minutes for the purpose of explaining its object.

14. All amendments may be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. An after-amendment to such second amendment shall not be in order; but when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute to the whole matter may be received. A proposition different from the one under consideration shall not be received under color of an amendment or substitute.

15. Every member who may be in the House when any question is put, shall, in a division, be counted, unless he be excused by the Convention.

16. All questions of order shall be decided in the first instance by the Chair, without debate; an appeal, however, may be made from his decision to the Convention by any member of the same.

17. The Secretary may employ one or more pages, not exceeding three, to act as messengers during the sessions of the Convention.

18. The reports of all Committees shall be in writing, and shall be received, of course, without motion for acceptance, unless recommitted by vote of the House. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the House shall be accompanied by a resolution for the action of the House therein.

19. The names of the movers of resolutions shall appear upon the minutes of the Convention.

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20. All motions and resolutions requiring reference shall be referred, as far as possible, to the Standing Committees.

21. In the case of an election by ballot requiring a concurrent majority of both Orders, the balloting shall be conducted in the following manner: The Tellers appointed to receive the vote of each Order shall take their stand near the platform at the same time, the Tellers for the Laity by the Secretary's table, the Tellers for the Clergy in a place apart from them. The roll of the Lay Delegates shall then be called by the Secretary, and they shall come forward at the calling of their names and deposit their ballots. At the same time, the Clergy shall deposit their ballots with the Teller appointed to receive them. The roll of the Clergy shall not be called, but shall be in the hands of the Teller, who shall be charged to see that no persons whose names do not appear thereon shall be allowed to vote. Whenever more than the canonical number to be elected of either Order are found to have received such majority of votes, the number required by Canon having the highest number of votes, shall be declared duly elected.

FIRST DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS.

Tuesday, May 26, 1914.

The Clergy and Lay Delegates to the Seventy-fifth Annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Missouri assembled at Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis, on May 26th, 1914, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese. The Rev. C. M. C. Mason read the Epistle, and the Rev. B. E. Reed read the Gospel.

Instead of a Convention Sermon, the Bishop read his Annual Address. (Appendix 1.)

After the service the Clergy and Lay Delegates assembled in the Convention Hall of the Schuyler Memorial House, with the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary called the roll of the Clergy of the Diocese. Thirty-three were present, thirty-two of whom were entitled to vote.

The Rev. Mr. Dooris, Chairman of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, presented his report. (See page 18.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary called the roll of Lay Delegates to the Convention.

Delegates from twenty-one parishes and missions, entitled to vote in the Convention, were present.

The Bishop announced a quorum, and declared the Convention duly convened.

On motion the Rev. C. E. Remick was unanimously elected Secretary of the Convention and Diocese.

On motion the Convention instructed the Treasurer of the Diocese to pay the traveling expenses of missionaries to this Convention.

The Bishop announced motions in order pertaining to the Bishop's address.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That that part of the Bishop's address referring to the death of Mr. Charles S. Freeborn be placed on a special page of the Convention Journal.

Resolution adopted by standing vote.

The Rev. Mr. Duckworth introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That that part of the Bishop's address relating to Church Union and Church Unity be referred to a committee of three to report to this Convention.

Resolution adopted.

The Bishop appointed the following named committee on the above resolution:

The Rev. Edmund Duckworth, the Rev. James Wise and Mr. Robert Burkham.

Mr. McMaster introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Convention meet each morning for Divine Worship at 9:30 o'clock in the Chapel, and for business in the Schuyler Memorial

House from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., when it will take a recess to 2:30 p.m., and continue to 5 p.m.

Resolution adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Jones gave notice of the following amendment to the Canons:

Resolved, That Canon XXVI., Section 1, be amended by striking out the words following the word "duty" at the end of line 7.

Referred to the Committee on Constitution and Canons.

Mr. Waterworth introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Rules of Order of the last Convention be adopted as the Rules of Order of this Convention.

Resolution adopted.

Mr. Ambler introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That visiting clergymen from other Dioceses, candidates for Holy Orders and lay readers be invited to seats upon the floor, and that they be requested to hand their cards to the Secretary.

Resolution adopted.

The card of Mr. J. D. Gallagher, Lay Reader, was presented to the Secretary.

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p.m.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p.m.

The Rev. W. H. Tomlins presented his card to the Secretary.

Bishop Knight, Vice-Chancellor of the University of the South, made an address.

The Chairman of the Committee on Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials reported William H. Richardson as a delegate from St. Mary's Mission, St. Louis, instead of S. A. M. Harrison.

The Bishop Coadjutor read his Annual Address to the Convention. (Appendix 2.)

Mr. Monell Sayre, secretary of the Church Pension Fund, made an address.

The Rev. Mr. Bate introduced the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Convention of the Diocese of Missouri approves of the legislation of the General Convention of October 22, 1913, to unify all of the agencies of the Church for clerical relief, and to establish an adequate system for assuring support to all of the aged and disabled clergy and to the families of all deceased clergymen upon a sound financial basis.

Resolved, That a committee of 5 members be appointed, to be entitled "The Committee on the Church Pension Fund," to take into consideration the relation that the Diocese of Missouri should bear to the Church Pension Fund, and to report to the next Convention.

On motion a communication from the Diocese of West Texas on the subject of Christian Education was referred to the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

On motion a communication from the Church Federation of St. Louis was referred to the Committee on Missions.

The Rev. Mr. Hogarth introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Diocese of Missouri gives its gracious thanks to Mr. Monell Sayre for the most helpful way in which he has brought before us the important matter of the Church Pension Fund.

Resolution adopted.

The Convention adjourned under the rules.

SECOND DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS.

Wednesday, May 27th, 1914.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Mary E. Bofinger Memorial Chapel at 7 a.m. by the Bishop Coadjutor.

Morning Prayer was read in the Chapel at 9:30 a.m. by the Rev. Messrs. Clopton and Hall.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 10 o'clock.

The Secretary read the names of the Delegates who did not respond to the roll call of the first day.

The Secretary read the minutes of the first day, which were approved.

On motion the delegate from Mexico was given a seat and vote in the Convention.

The Bishop read a telegram announcing the death of the Rt. Rev. Charles Scadding, D.D., Bishop of Oregon.

On motion it was ordered that a committee be appointed to send a telegram of sympathy to the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Oregon, and to the family of Bishop Scadding.

The Bishop appointed as above committee the Rev. Messrs. Bate and Mizner.

Mr. James M. Bull read his report as Treasurer of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund. (Appendix 5.)

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. James M. Bull read his report as Treasurer of the Theological Education Fund. (Appendix 6.)

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Secretary read the report of the Secretary of the Trustees of the Parochial Trust Fund of the Diocese. (Appendix 7.)

Report accepted.

The Secretary read the report of the Secretary of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. (Appendix 8.)

Report accepted.

The Bishop announced the election of the Standing Committee for the ensuing year in order.

The following named candidates were nominated:

The Rev. Charles F. Blaisdell, the Rev. C. M. Davis, the Rev. ZeB. T. Phillips, the Rev. J. C. Jones, Prof. Marshall S. Snow, Mr. James L. Ford and Mr. C. M. Jennings.

The votes of the Clergy and Lay Delegates were cast and given into the hand of the tellers.

The Rev. C. E. Remick presented his report as Registrar of the Diocese. (Appendix 9.)

Report accepted.

Mr. James M. Bull introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the balance of \$5.00, Diocesan Assessment against Redeemer Mission, Jackson, be remitted.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. Mr. Jones presented the following resolution from the special Committee appointed to consider that part of the Bishop Coadjutor's address referring to convocational expenses:

Resolved, That in the budget for the Diocesan Assessment for the current year, there be included a sum not to exceed \$300.00, for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the Hannibal and the Southern Conventions, which are provided for in Canon VII, Section 3, of the Canons of the Diocese.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Bishop appointed the following named committee on the Church Pension Fund:

Mr. James A. Waterworth, Mr. William Bagnell, Mr. Thomas K. Skinker, Mr. James L. Ford and Mr. W. C. Stith.

The tellers for the pending election reported, and the Bishop declared the following named candidates elected members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese:

The Rev. Mr. Wise introduced the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Convention accept the suggested apportionment of the General Board of Religious Education.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay to the Treasurer of the General Board of Religious Education the sum of \$308.00 for this Conventional year.

Both resolutions adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer read his report as Secretary of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, as follows:

The Diocesan Board of Religious Education begs leave to submit the following report:

The past year has been one of activity and progress in the work entrusted to the Board, that of promoting religious education in the Diocese of Missouri. That the work of the Board has been confined to the city of St. Louis is due to the fact that facilities for carrying on the work as planned could only be secured in the city, and because it was so largely experimental that the Board did not feel justified in branching out beyond its initial attempt.

This report would not be complete without stating a few facts about the beginnings of this special attempt at religious instruction.

Last June a number of the clergy met together voluntarily for the purpose of considering how a more effective Sunday School system of instruction could be secured. As a result of their deliberations it was decided by them to begin a course of religious instruction for the Sunday School teachers of the city, by inviting the teachers of all the parishes and missions of the city to participate, with the consent of their clergy, in a course of instruction suggested by the General Board of Religious Education.

To this end a call was made for an assembly of teachers at St. George's Chapel on September 18th. At that meeting more than a hundred teachers came together and organized the Church School of Religious Instruction.

The outgrowth of that meeting was a widening of the vision of those who had assumed the responsibility of the movement, to include not only Sunday School teachers in the courses of instruction, but to open the School to all the communicants of the Church. Circulars were accordingly prepared giving the Course of Instruction, and mailed to the Church people of the city. Instruction was offered in the following subjects:

Principal—The Rev. H. W. Mizner, Head of St. Stephen's House.

Apostolic Church—The Rev. Chas. F. Blaisdell, Rector St. Philip's.

Religious Pedagogy—The Rev. Jas. Wise, Rector of the Church of Holy Communion.

Gospels and the Life of Christ—The Rev. E. Duckworth, Rector Church of the Redeemer.

Missions and Social Service—Deaconess Newell, the Cathedral.

Prayer Book and Church Worship—The Rev. B. T. Kemerer, Vicar St. George's Chapel.

Old Testament—The Rev. ZeB. T. Phillips, Rector St. Peter's Church.

At this point the faculty thus selected submitted its plan to the Diocesan Board of Religious Instruction appointed by this Convention last year, and was officially recognized and appointed to carry on the work it had begun, under the auspices of the Diocesan Board. From this time the work of the School ceased to be an independent movement, and came in under the authority and control of the Diocesan Convention.

The enrollment of pupils was very encouraging, as the following summary will show: Religious Pedagogy, 50; Gospels and the Life of Christ, 15; Missions and Social Service, 10; Apostolic Church, 12; Prayer Book and Public Worship, 18; Old Testament, 63; Total, 168.

Text-books to the number of 196 have been sold and 56 loaned, totaling 252. These text-books were necessary for the preparation of the lessons assigned from week to week.

It was decided to have weekly meetings of the School at St. George's Chapel, the whole school assembling in the parish house for opening, and then each class going to its own room for recitation. This plan was followed throughout the year, the first meeting occurring Thursday, November 6th, and the last Thursday, April 30th. During Lent this program was varied to the extent of having lectures in the Chapel upon class night by the several instructors in turn, upon the subjects each one taught.

The attendance has been uniformly good, and the courses of instruction steadily pursued. The spirit of the school has been enthusiastic to a degree.

To accommodate those who could not attend the evening classes a second faculty was selected to duplicate the instruction given at night at an afternoon session. These were the Rev. J. Boyd Coxe, on Pedagogy; the Rev. W. L. Essex, Curate of St. Peter's, on Gospels and the Life of Christ; the Rev. George Norton, St. Michael and All Angels', on Missions and Social Service; the Rev. L. H. White, Apostolic Church; the Rev. G. F. Taylor, Holy Cross, on Prayer Book; and the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, Emmanuel, Old Orchard, on Old Testament.

Of these only three classes were organized, that in Old Testament, Missions and Social Service, and Prayer Book, and continued in session throughout the course.

The Board has financed itself. As will be seen, by the Treasurer's report the expense has been considerable, since the work became so heavy that the services of a paid secretary were necessary for a part of the time. The purchase of books for the lending library was also quite a large expense, it being the policy of the Board to furnish books free of charge to those who could not afford to purchase them.

A reference library has been begun, which will place additional facilities in the hands of those who desire to take up the study next year. One of the valuable contributions to this library was a complete set of Hastings' Bible Dictionary, given by the Rev. Mr. Phillips.

In closing, the secretary desires to call attention to the fact that this movement is unique in the Church, it being the first attempt at anything like a comprehensive course in religious instruction for Church people. It has attracted wide attention, and it is not saying too much, judging by the secretary's correspondence, to say that it has proved widely suggestive and helpful.

Report accepted.

Noon-day Devotions were led by the Rev. Mr. Weddell.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer read the report of the Treasurer of the Church School of Religious Instruction. (Appendix 10.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Kemerer introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay on

demand of the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education a sum not exceeding \$200.00 for the work of the Board during the ensuing year.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Fauntleroy introduced the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The distinguished divine of the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Samuel J. Niccolls, D.D., in his recent address before the Church Club of this city, declared that he would accept our Church's Grand Confession of Faith, The Thirty-nine Articles, as a true and sufficient statement of Christian Faith and Doctrine, and also the Book of Common Prayer as a proper form of Christian Worship and Practice, and,

WHEREAS, Such statements evince a sincere desire for Christian Unity on the part of the distinguished clergyman who made them, and,

WHEREAS, Unity of Faith, and Doctrine, and Worship is the goal of all those who believe in, and desire to follow, and obey our Divine Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, now therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Protestant Episcopal Church for the Diocese of Missouri, in annual Convention assembled, that a committee of three be appointed to confer with representatives of the Presbyterian Church with a view to secure organic unity and union of said two Churches, and report thereon to the next annual Diocesan Convention of this Church.

Resolution referred to the special Committee to consider that part of the Bishop's address referring to Church Union and Church Unity.

The Secretary read a report of the Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials:

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Lay Credentials, report as follows:

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p.m.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p.m.

Mr. E. H. Lycett read his report as Treasurer of the Laymen's Co-operating Missionary Society. (Appendix 11.)

Report accepted.

Mr. E. H. Lycett read his report as Treasurer of the Diocesan Missionary Board. (Appendix 12.)

Report accepted.

Mr. E. H. Lycett read his report as Treasurer of St. Stephen's Mission Fund. (Appendix 13.)

Report accepted.

Mr. F. J. McMaster read his report as Secretary of the Diocesan Missionary Board. (Appendix 14.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner read the Report of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. (Appendix 15.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Lever read his report as Hospital Missionary. (Appendix 16.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Edmund Duckworth and the Rev. Chas. F. Blaisdell withdrew their names as nominees for election as members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

On motion, the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. J. Courtney Jones as a member of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Bishop declared him elected.

The Rev. Mr. Mizner read the report of St. Stephen's House. (Appendix 17.)

Report accepted.

The Rev. Mr. Taylor read the report of the Treasurer of Holy Cross House. (Appendix 18.)

Report accepted.

Mr. C. L. Von Renthel read his reports as Secretary and Treasurer of the Diocesan League of Lay Readers. (Appendix 19.)

Reports accepted.

Mr. C. L. Von Renthel introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That each parish, church and mission in the Diocese be earnestly urged to have a lay reader, it being desirable that such lay reader connect and identify himself with the Diocesan League of Lay Readers.

Resolution adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Kemerer introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Assessments be instructed to apportion the sum of \$9,000.00 upon the parishes and missions of the Diocese for Diocesan missionary purposes for the ensuing year; and that an additional sum of \$800.00 be apportioned for work at Kirksville, making in all the sum of \$9,800.00.

The Rev. Mr. Phillips introduced the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The General Convention, at its session in New York in 1913, provided by Article VII of the Constitution, that Dioceses and Missionary Districts may be united into Provinces in such manner as shall be provided by Canon of the General Convention, and,

WHEREAS, By Canon 50 the General Convention constituted the Seventh Province out of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, (1) That this Diocese of Missouri hereby records its consent and desire to be included in the Seventh Province of the Church as constituted by the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention;

(2) That this Convention elect four clergymen and four laymen to represent the Diocese at the next meeting of the Provincial Synod to be held in San Antonio, Texas, in January, 1915; and be it further resolved,

(3) That this Convention hereby records its approval of the action of its delegates in participating in the proceedings of the Primary Provincial Synod held in January, 1914.

On motion the above resolution was made a special order for Thursday at 11 o'clock.

The hour for adjournment by resolution having arrived the session of the Convention was continued five minutes, on motion.

On motion the Rev. Mr. Kemerer's resolution referring to Kirksville, was made a special order for Thursday immediately after the special order previously appointed for 11 o'clock.

The Convention adjourned under the special rule.

THIRD DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, ST. LOUIS.

Thursday, May 28th, 1914.

Morning Prayer was read in the Chapel at 9:30 a.m. by the Rev. Mr. Bate.

The Bishop called the Convention to order at 10 o'clock.

The Secretary read the minutes of the second day which were approved.

The Bishop announced the election of the Missionary Board of the Diocese in order.

After nominations, the ballots were cast and given into the hands of the tellers.

The Rev. Mr. Sanford introduced the following resolution:

WHEREAS, At the Provincial Synod of the Southwest, held at Muskogee, Okla., last January, there was presented a report on the subject of Domestic Missions, in which report it is asserted "That the present system of allotment of cures, tenure of office and remuneration of our mission clergy, is far from satisfactory," and that our present system, or lack of system, which permits present conditions to exist, is not good business, and is not favorable to the work of the Church; and,

WHEREAS, The Provincial Secretary of the Southwest, Rev. E. H. Eckel, has endorsed said report; therefore, be it

Resolved, That a permanent committee of three persons (who shall be members of the Diocesan Board of Missions) be constituted by this Convention to be known as a Board of Strategy of this Diocese. That the work of said Board of Strategy shall be to confer with the Bishop, the Bishop Co-adjutor, and with the various mission stations of the Diocese and the dependent parishes, and to take such action as they may be able to take to devise ways and means to put into practice, so far as possible, what has been

recommended in said report, as set forth in the May number of the *Spirit of Missions*, and especially to put the missionary work of this Diocese on a sound business basis.

Referred to the Committee on Missions.

The Secretary read notices from the Secretary of the House of Deputies as follows:

THE GENERAL CONVENTION.

To the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Missouri:

In compliance with the requirement of Canon 48, Sec. I. [V.], I hereby give notice that the following alterations of the Constitution of the Church are proposed: to-wit, those comprised in the resolutions, printed herewith, said resolutions having been constitutionally adopted by a General Convention held in the city of New York, in October, A.D. 1913.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Strike out Section 3 of Article I. and insert in place thereof the following:

Section 3. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, the General Convention shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops having jurisdiction within the United States to be such Presiding Bishop, by a vote of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies. His term and tenure of office and duties shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention.

But if the Presiding Bishop shall resign his office as such, or if he shall resign his episcopal jurisdiction, or if by reason of infirmity he shall become disabled, the Bishop next in seniority by consecration, having jurisdiction within the United States, shall thereupon become the Presiding Bishop until the next meeting of the General Convention.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Strike out the words in the second line of Article I., Section 7, of the Constitution "on the first Wednesday in October" and insert in the place thereof the following, "on the Wednesday after the first Sunday in October," so that the section as amended shall read:

Section 7. The General Convention shall meet in every third year on the Wednesday after the first Sunday in October, unless a different day be appointed by the preceding Convention, and at the place designated by such Convention; but if there shall appear to the Presiding Bishop of the Church sufficient cause for changing the place so appointed, he may appoint another place for such meeting. Special meetings may be provided for by Canon.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Add to the second paragraph of Article IX. the words "*Provided, however,* that the General Convention may by Canon provide for a change of the place of trial," so that the paragraph as amended shall read as follows:

Presbyters and Deacons shall be tried by a Court instituted by the Convention of the Diocese, or by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Missionary District, in which they are canonically resident; *provided, however,* that the General Convention may by Canon provide for a change of the place of trial.

Resolved, That the following change be made in the Constitution, and that the proposed alteration be made known to the several Dioceses, in order that the same may be adopted at the next General Convention, in accordance with Article XI. of the Constitution, as follows:

Amend Article X. by inserting in line 17 of page 13 after the words "Table of Lessons" the words "and Table of Proper Psalms on Certain Days and Table of Selections of Psalms," so that the Proviso as amended shall read:

Provided, however, That the General Convention at any meeting shall have power to amend the Tables of Lessons and Table of Proper Psalms on Certain Days and Table of Selections of Psalms by a major-

ity of the whole number of Bishops, entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies voting by Orders.

The following Report of the "Joint Committee to report a plan for Uniform Registration of Communicants" is herewith transmitted in pursuance of the following resolution adopted at the last General Convention:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the House of Deputies have this Report printed as a circular within one year after the final adjournment of this Convention, and send it to the Secretary of each Diocese and Missionary District, with the request that it be communicated to the next annual Convention or Convocation thereof, as the decision of the General Convention with reference to the registration and enumeration of Communicants.

REPORT.

The Joint Committee appointed in 1907, and continued in 1910, "to report a plan for the uniform registration of Communicants," respectfully reports that it has given the matter careful consideration, and is of the opinion that the different aspects of the question are admirably covered by the report made in 1907 by a similar Committee of the House of Deputies, to which they beg leave to refer. It will be found on pages 231 to 233 of the Journal for that year. We agree with all that is there said defining a "Communicant" as one who has received Baptism and Confirmation, or has been formally admitted to the Holy Communion as being "ready and desirous to be confirmed." We reiterate that all such should be enrolled and kept upon the Parish Register until death, transfer or discipline removes the name.

Neglect of the privilege of receiving the Sacrament, long absence, or even departure without a letter is not sufficient reason for erasing a name, as the person may reappear or ask for transfer after many years. His *rights* as a potential Communicant should be scrupulously conserved. On the other hand, parochial reports should not be padded with misleading statistics. To *enumerate* all these non-effective members is to exaggerate the real strength of the Parish.

Communicants known to have neglected for three years the reception of the Holy Communion, in spite of due and sufficient opportunity therefor, should not be reported for statistical purposes. But, as above suggested, nothing but death, transfer or discipline should justify the removal of a name from the Register.

We recommend that this ruling be made known to Diocesan authorities in order to secure the requisite uniformity.

The tellers of the pending election reported and the Bishop declared the following named candidates elected members of the Missionary Board of the Diocese:

The Rev. B. T. Kemerer, the Rev. James Wise, Mr. F. C. Thompson, Mr. E. H. Lycett, Mr. F. J. MacMaster, and Mr. George A. Randolph. . .

On motion the order for 11 o'clock was postponed until the close of the election of the Missionary Board.

On motion the Secretary cast the unanimous ballot of the Convention for the Rev. Charles F. Blaisdell and Mr. C. C. Curtice as members of the Missionary Board and the Bishop declared them elected.

The resolutions of the Rev. Mr. Phillips concerning the Provincial Synod, introduced on the second day and made a special order for the third day at 11 o'clock, was called up by the Bishop.

Bishop Johnson introduced the following amendment to the preamble of above resolutions:

Amend the Preamble by striking out the words, "and whereas, by

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Canon 50, the General Convention constituted," from the beginning of the second paragraph of said Preamble, and inserting in lieu thereof the following words, "And whereas, by Canon 50, the General Convention did, subject to the consent of the Dioceses within the proposed area of the proposed Province, constitute," so that said second paragraph of said Preamble shall read as follows:

"And whereas, by Canon 50, the General Convention did, subject to the consent of the Dioceses within the proposed area of the proposed Province, constitute the Seventh Province out of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico."

Amendment adopted.

Noon-day devotions were led by the Rev. Mr. Hogarth.

On motion speeches on the pending resolutions were limited to five minutes.

The preamble to pending resolutions as amended by Bishop Johnson was adopted as follows:

"WHEREAS, The General Convention at its session in New York in 1913, provided by Article VII. of the Constitution that Dioceses and Missionary Districts may be united into provinces in such manner as shall be provided by Canon of the General Convention.

"AND WHEREAS, By Canon 50, the General Convention did, subject to the consent of the Dioceses within the proposed area of the proposed Province, constitute the Seventh Province out of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the States of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico."

A motion to lay the pending resolutions on the table was lost by a vote of eight ayes to forty-nine noes.

The first of the pending resolutions was adopted as follows:

"Now, therefore, be it *Resolved*, that this Diocese of Missouri hereby records its consent and desire to be included in the Seventh Province of the Church as constituted by the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention."

The second of the pending resolutions was adopted as follows:

"That this Convention elect four clergymen and four laymen to represent the Diocese at the next meeting of the Provincial Synod to be held in San Antonio, Texas, in January, 1915."

On motion the Bishop appointed the Rev. B. T. Kemerer and Mr. H. L. Chase as a committee to nominate to the Convention four clergymen and four laymen for election as delegates of the Diocese in the Provincial Synod.

On motion the hour of adjournment was postponed three minutes.

The third of the pending resolutions was adopted as follows:

"That this Convention hereby records its approval of the action of its delegates in participating in the proceedings of the Primary Provincial Synod held in January, 1914."

The Convention took a recess until 2:30 p.m.

The Convention reassembled at 2:30 p.m.

The Secretary read the report of Mr. Walker Hill, Treasurer of the Coadjutor Fund of the Diocese. (Appendix 20.)

Report accepted.

Mr. Waterworth offered the following resolutions as a substitute for Mr. Kemerer's resolution referring to Kirksville:

Resolved, First, That the sum of \$9,800.00 is hereby appropriated for mission purposes in the Diocese of Missouri for the present year, of which \$800.00 shall be used in the work of the Church at Kirksville; and that the Committee on Assessments is directed to apportion this amount of \$9,800.00 among the parishes and missions of the Diocese;

Second, That this Convention cordially adopts the plan of the Bishop Coadjutor for the rehabilitation and maintenance of the mission at Kirksville, and does hereby pledge the Diocese of Missouri to appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the work of the Church at Kirksville for each of the four years succeeding the present year.

Substitute accepted, and both resolutions therein adopted.

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The Rev. Mr. Jones read the report of the Committee on the CHURCH NEWS, as follows:

St. Louis, May 28, 1914.

To the Seventy-fifth Convention of the Diocese of Missouri:

Your Committee on the Church News begs to submit herewith its report covering the fiscal year from June, 1913, to May, 1914, inclusive, as follows:

The paper has been published regularly for the past twelve months.

Since November the paper has been edited by the Rev. J. Courtney Jones, who was duly appointed Editor by Bishop Tuttle to succeed the Rev. W. A. Masker, Jr., resigned.

The last Convention authorized the increase of the subscription price of the paper to \$1.00 per year. Owing to the fact that many subscriptions were paid up in advance at the previous price of 50 cents, the income of the paper has not been materially increased, as yet, as a result of this change, but this increase will be felt within a reasonable time.

In view of present conditions your committee offers the accompanying resolution.



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APPENDIX No. 1.

Annual Address of the Bishop of Missouri,
TO THE
Seventy-fifth Annual Convention.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

From homes and parishes we again come together. We are a Diocesan family. In our gathering there should be a home feeling. The words "Diocese" and "Parish" in the Greek tell the story of an evolvment from the home or a centering in the home. In a very real sense we come home to-day to tell the story of a year's sojourn, to give in account of a year's experiences and to make report of a year's doings.

Our Diocesan home is not a jealous rival of our particular homes. No, it welcomes these all and adopts them and takes them into its Diocesan embrace. It is a stay and a refuge when they break up and are not. We know, alas, too well how death knocks at the doors of our particular homes and enters and despoils them of our loved ones. The larger home he cannot break up; because though God may take away some workers He sustains and carries on the work.

Since our last home coming four Bishops have died.

Bishop Robinson, of Nevada, was one of our younger Bishops and was in the office for less than six years. By his courtesy and sympathy he won his way to the hearts and into the lives of the miners and pioneers of his frontier district. He was a scholar, and by his accomplishments as such and his nobility of character he commanded profound respect. The closing words of his last Report to the Board of Missions bespeak the hope and cheerfulness in which he was doing his work,—“The Nevada desert, bleak and forbidding as it seems, is of marvellous fertility wherever irrigation is practical. All this means a more stable and growing Church work. The future is full of hope.”

Bishop Scarborough was Bishop of New Jersey for thirty-nine years. Vigorous, cheery, practical, dutiful, godly throughout them all. Industrious devotion to his Diocese and wide and deep missionary zeal were his prominent characteristics. At his death he was the oldest in years, over eighty-two, of all in the House of Bishops.

Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire, died not long after Bishop Scarborough. He also at his death was the oldest of the Bishops in years, eighty-one. He was a scholar. For some years he was Professor of Latin in Trinity College, Hartford. The style of his written English was noted for its finish and beauty. He was Bishop for more than forty-three years. For eight of them he had the help of a faithful Coadjutor. For all of them he was wise for counsel, earnest for duty and unselfish in aim and work.

Bishop Penick was Bishop for thirty-seven years, but in active Episcopal duty for six years only, in Africa. He threw himself with enthusiasm into his foreign work; but after six years his health and strength failed him. He returned to America and for the last thirty-one years had done useful and successful duty as a parish minister in Virginia and Kentucky.

These four deaths leave one hundred and sixteen as the present number of Bishops. Of these four are my seniors in years,—Garrett of Dallas, Adams of Easton, Randolph of Southern Virginia, and Bishop Gray. God mercifully have us in His Holy keeping!

A brother known to us all and loved by us all has died in Pennsylvania in the Diocese of Bethlehem, the Rev. W. A. Hatch. A straight, clean, true, holy man he was. Out from him radiated gentleness, simplicity, godly sincerity, unselfish devotion, spiritual charity and peace, in ways very impressive to all who had to do with him.

Death has knocked at and beaten into not a few of our particular homes and taken away inmates. I cannot cite or recall all those taken. Some of them are,—Mrs. Evered of Montgomery, and Mrs. Beach of Canton, and Mr. Wells of Palmyra, and Mrs. Hawes and Mrs. Judson and Mr. Dozier of St. Peter's, St. Louis, and Fred J. Bross and Mrs. Phillips of Holy Communion, and Mr. Freeborn and Miss Bent of the Cathedral.

Losses all, grievous losses to the Church Militant; and gains all, glorious gains to the Church Expectant, and by and by to the Church Triumphant.

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I ask leave to put on record some words about Mr. C. S. Freeborn.

All through my life as Bishop of Missouri he was Senior Warden of Christ Church or of the Cathedral. He was the one to welcome Mrs. Tuttle and myself when we came in 1886. As chairman of the Trustees of the Episcopate Fund he was the caretaker of the Episcopal Residence, as it were, the housekeeper of our home for all these past years. And we loved him. Of Quaker blood, of stainless integrity, of New England reserve, of even temper, of unswerving loyalty and devotion to the Church and its Master, patient, considerate, and judicious, kindly, a guiding pilot in our Diocesan Conventions though untalking,—we miss him, we mourn him, we thank God for him, we hope to see him by and by.

Looking out over the Diocese, the missionary work thereof is largely under the care of the Bishop Coadjutor. All the mission stations and three of the parishes—Cape Girardeau, De Soto and Monroe—are in his jurisdiction. In his address this afternoon he will give instructive and helpful and expert information concerning them. For myself I ask leave to say warm thanks for the wise methods he has adopted and for the efficient success he has achieved in the work of his field. To him, for the kind help given, and to the Diocese, which brought him to my side to help, I want to renew and reiterate my thanks and love out of a life which has been wonderfully relieved and eased and cheered.

I may report that the two new Churches in St. Louis—St. Paul's and St. Michael and All Angels',—building when we met last year, are now built and occupied. St. James', Macon, has been destroyed by fire, but the Vestry and people undismayed and resolute, are already moving to rebuild promptly. Columbia has built a new rectory; and Ferguson has renovated and improved the house next to the church for its rectory. The Moberly people in a real and physical sense have lifted up their church and improved it at a cost of two or three thousand dollars. Largely the women did it. The cost is nearly paid. When it is paid they hope and plan to resume services under a chosen pastor.

Only four of the parishes are now vacant,—Affton, Clarksville, Moberly and St. Charles.

Christ, Affton, may have a future, situated as it is in St. Louis County. But its present is not robustly vigorous. The Warden, Mr. Bowles, is watchful and caretaking over the little church building that nestles among the trees of a grove.

Grace, Clarksville, has had a past, a loyal and churchly and not inglorious past. But it has suffered much from deaths and removals and its present is not vigorous. Mr. E. C. Dameron, living in the neighborhood, nurses and protects the strength that remains and patiently waits for a revival in the future, and Rev. Dr. Davis visits as a pastor.

Trinity, St. Charles, is one of the oldest parishes in the Diocese. It is having its time of waiting just now. Rev. Mr. Duckworth and Rev. Mr. Gowenlock have been kindly extending to it neighborly attention.

Columbia, Hannibal, Kirkwood and Palmyra, all unshepherded and unsettled a year ago, are rejoicing now in their own rectors and responding cheerily to their pastoral guidance.

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and we are thankful. Our Confirmations have been 563 (by Bishop Tuttle 393, by Bishop Johnson 170), against 559 of last year.

St. Luke's Hospital has outgrown its housing and has been compelled to append a large dormitory. The Orphans' Home is preparing an addition to its plant. Bishop Robertson Hall, the Convalescent Home, the Girls' Friendly, the Daughters of the King, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Church Club, the Churchwoman's Club, the St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses, and the Diocesan League of Lay Readers are evolving life and emitting light all the while. I am glad and I am proud. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew will hold its Annual Convention next October in Atlanta, Georgia. I trust our Missouri Brotherhood will send a goodly deputation. The annual meetings conserve strength and radiate enthusiasm. The Woman's Auxiliary with its Junior is a shining sun; sending forth this year for help \$10,415.32 in cash and \$2,093.23 in value of useful supplies, summing up a total of \$12,508.55.

I think that a wise plan which we followed last year, viz., to have no committee to secure the travelling expenses of the missionaries attending the Convention, but to authorize the Treasurer of the Diocese to pay them. If you think the same I shall be glad and grateful for the Convention to authorize such action this year.

A very efficient Commission with the Bishop of Massachusetts as Chairman is working upon the problem of the establishment of a General Church Pension Fund. No more important practical matter can be taken in hand by the Church. Bishop Lawrence, or the Secretary, Mr. Monell Sayre, is to favor us with an address upon the subject in open Convention at four o'clock this afternoon.

One of the finest sights for us to see is the Sunday School children gathered as a "Missionary Host" at the Odeon next Sunday afternoon. This "Host" give the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor over one thousand dollars every year for them to use in missionary work. Then, besides, the children give in their Lenten gifts for General Missions over two thousand dollars per year. We are proud of them. Come and see them next Sunday afternoon and note what good reason we have to be proud.

I am troubled over the payment of our apportionment for General Missions. We are apportioned \$13,000.00. We have paid about \$4,000.00. The Sunday Schools will give \$2,000.00 more. But that leaves us \$7,000.00 short. And the year closes August 31. Have I not cause to be troubled? I hope it may prove to be only the over anxiety of an old missionary bishop. But I do call aloud

for help, to all members of the Diocese and all friends of the Diocese.

The General Convention in New York last October! We entered into it not without apprehension and trepidation. We came out from it reassured and grateful. We met, counseled and parted as brethren. None came away with a bitter taste in the mouth or with hating thoughts in the heart. In no little of our counsels, explicitly or implicitly, Church Unity was in evidence. And for the six months since, speeches in our gatherings and articles in our papers, both in England and America, have had much to do with Church Unity. Indeed there is a loud outcry and a wide outreaching after Church Unity.

Now I make bold to affirm that we have already in possession no little of Church Unity; indeed much more of it than perhaps we think for.

I. Allowing the Church to be the one body of the baptized, the baptismal unity resultant is Church Unity extensively and almost immeasurably large.

II. The One Christian Faith, summed in the Apostles' Creed, sufficiently stated in the Nicene Creed, millions of Christians accept and hold to, however they may choose to name themselves by a shibboleth and sibboleth kind of discrimination. The old historic Church, the Greek, the Roman, the English and our own, are at one in acceptance of the Nicene Creed, even if the Greek find fault with the other three of us for unlawfully dropping two words out of it. The later modern Churches, thronging upon us here in America, would largely, I think almost universally, avouch their adhesion and loyal allegiance to one or the other or to both of the two old forms of the one primitive, Christian creed. If yes, there is Church Unity indeed in the one world-wide faith.

III. Isn't there a world-wideness of obedience also? The Ten Commandments, belonging to the ancient Jewish Church and adopted and continued in the Christian Church,—the first four enjoining reverent obedience to Almighty God and the last six urging righteousness and justice and helpfulness toward fellow men,—are they not heard and heeded by Christians of all names and kinds?

And the two added commandments of the new dispensation,—to be washed in the waters of Baptism and to eat a bit of bread and drink a sup of wine in a hallowed memorial sacrifice,—are these, save in a few exceptions like the Quakers and the Salvation Army, unheeded and disobeyed by Christians anywhere in all the world?

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And the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments revealing the word and will of God and declaring the duty and destiny of man, are they not received and read, revered and followed by all Christian disciples?

If these things be so, is there not a Church Unity of blessed obedience wherever shines the sun of Christendom, a light to lighten the earth and to drive away the mists and darkness of ignorance and error?

IV. Is there not,—at least may there not be,—a Church Unity of love? Love, without which all our doings are nothing worth. Love, which is the very bond of peace and of all virtues. Love, which is not at all content with abstainings from doing wrong and with negative restraints, and restrictions against evil, but which adopts positives and is filled to the full with the strengths and sweetness of doing good and lending help and radiating affection. This is the love which casts out hate. The love which has no use for envy and jealousy. The love which suffereth long in making allowances and is always kind. The love which seeth in a brother Christian's face Christ's face, and feels in a brother Christian's fellowship Christ's fellowship. Indeed in this love there is, or surely there may be, Church Unity.

Must we not admit that this is a good deal,—a great deal, of Church Unity, to welcome and to be thankful for, the Church Unity of Baptism and Faith and Obedience and Love?

Now let me turn thought to Church Union.

If I may dichotomize, I should say Church Unity is more the inner thing; Church Union is more the outer thing. Church Union has to do with external forms and visible organizations. Adopting such nomenclature we conclude that the crying aloud and outreaching of the day for Church Unity is not really for Church Unity, a great deal of which we already have, but for Church Union which largely we have not.

In the crying aloud and the reaching out for Union we need not be hopeless; and yet there are reasons why we may not be confidently hopeful.

I. We need not be hopeless. Indeed, not, with our Lord's high priestly prayer in our ears and hearts,—that they all may be one. Besides, the inner thing, the Church Unity of Faith and Obedience and Love, may grow strong and yet stronger to mould effectively after its own aspirations and desires the outer thing, Church Union. The moulding will not be the outburst of a rapid evolution. Impatience and undue haste will only mar the moulding. Much time for occupation of differing points of view and for mu-

tual understanding of facts and fixities must be allowed. If time be given, the things of Unity,—faith and hope and love,—shall work and in the working wax strong, and may wonderfully shape unto Union the outer things of form and facts and fixities. The Commission on a World Conference on Faith and Order understands this. It studiously avoids any proposition for the adoption of a formula, a platform, a concordat or an organized Union, and urges only information, explanation, deliberation, discussion and dispassionate and sympathetic efforts towards consentient interpretation and mutual understanding.

II. We may not be confidently hopeful.

In the first place, it is well known that the most numerous body of Christians in the world, the Roman Catholic, takes the fixed, unyielding, *non possumus* stand. It is idle to expect from the rest of the Christian world any Church Union with it in according submission to the supremacy and infallibility of its chosen head.

And the Greek Catholic Church is so crystalized in its own views of orthodoxy and so persistently minute in its claims of an unchanged and unchangeable historic continuity that indeed it would be no easy matter to work out or even to work towards organic Church Union with it.

In the second place, looking to the Christians who are not Roman nor Greek, the many millions in constituencies robust of life and vigorous in growth of the Protestant world round about is, I beg to call attention to one aspect. It is the money question, or the ownership question. Suppose they and we were moulded all into the one Church Union. That is, we and our church edifices and our parsonages and our schools and our colleges and our seminaries and our hospitals and our charity homes and our endowments and our real estate. The providing and parcelling out the care and management of them all would itself be a problem of complexity and perplexity. However, I dare say American capacity and expertness could successfully solve that. But in the intricacies of the problem the forces of human nature would have unintermittent play. In multitudinous cases the *meum* and *tuum* would be so inextricably mixed up as to preclude peaceable disentanglement. Cleavage and ruptures and fracturings would set in and right soon such Church Union might find itself standing over the *disjecta membra* of scattered congregations and warring members and dissonant voices and disturbed consciences and embittered hearts all round about.

And still further, other forces of human nature would find work to do. Who shall be the chiefs? Who shall mount the

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thrones? Who shall be leaders to guide? Ambition, envy, avarice, greed, selfishness would have a most fertile field to sow their seeds in, and their fruits resultant would be sorry nourishment to the peaceful growth of Church Union.

In the third place, another aspect may well be considered. And it tells of much that is good and true in human nature.

It is proposed to bring all Christian men and women into one organic Church Union. Yes, but those men and women have been boys and girls in homes. Songs and memories of those homes are in their hearts; and they sing there all day long and often into and through the silences of the night. And the memories call up the fathers and mothers. And love and reverence and filial obedience accompany the call. One well knows that in numberless instances the child is to grow up to follow the parents' religion. The sturdy foot tracks of the faithful father, the spiritual beckonings of the loved mother are going to decide the matter. The thoughts and memories and loyalties and loves are rooted deep in the heart. No logical system of Church Union and no ecclesiastical desirability of oneness in religion can eradicate them. Habits and habitudes, traditions and reverences, affections and fealties must be reckoned with, and one must not conclude that devotion to Church Union may or can rule dominant over these natural and praiseworthy forces of the human heart.

Church Unity! We have a great deal of it in the Christian world. We thank God that this is so. And we thank Him for the four square foundation on which it rests,—Baptism, Faith, Obedience, Love.

Church Union! If God sees it best for us and wills it He will give it to us in His own time and way. Meanwhile we work best for it and advance farthest towards it by cultivating patience and fairness and allowance making and love. If each one of us of the clergy in our own cure and with our own folk stands steady and rings true, we can help to deepen and strengthen and sweeten Church Unity; and we shall be really helping to compass Church Union in a far better way than by framing eirenicons or drafting agreements or multiplying united services.

May I close by reminding you how the whole American Church honored us last October by saying they will come to St. Louis for the General Convention in October, 1916.

From now on let us look proudly toward their coming. And in our pride let us suitably prepare. And, if we live, God will grant us mercy and give us joy in welcoming those who come.

Third Annual Address
of the Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri

*My Dear Elder Brother Bishop; and My Dear Brethren of the
Clergy and Laity:*

I give grateful thanks to the Bishop of Missouri, whose co-worker the Diocese called me here to be. Affection and kindness he has shown me through the year. His prayers have followed me, I know. His thoughts have often been with me and for me. Voluntarily, again and again, when I have been working at some piece of work I guessed he didn't know about, he has sent me a loving word of commendation and encouragement. It helps a lot when someone knows and cares!

Two years ago in this place, when I had been four months the Bishop Coadjutor, I said that I believed my foremost duty was to make every possible effort to stimulate those parts of our diocesan organism which were remote from the diocesan centre. Another year is gone, during which I have resolutely set my face to do all that I could towards strengthening my part of the rural field.

At the very outset of this address, I want to tell the Convention that only one clergyman, the Rev. F. H. Weichlein, has quit the rural mission field in the past twelve months. That is an item of good news. And I want you to know what a splendid corps of fine fibred, high minded clergy has been mustered in to help us in this rural work. Men for whom we have needed to make no apology; clean in personal life, strong in spiritual forcefulness, they have gone about their tasks as men who realized Whose they were and Whom they served. And the thing which might have been expected has come to pass. Out of weakness many places have begun to put on strength; and credit for it belongs to this staff of faithful workmen whose names I write down in the order in which I induced them to join me in the work: Tragitt, Weddell, Harvey, Hogarth, Hoover, Clopton. (White and Lever have also come and are working in the mission field in this big city; and their devoted con-

secration to the King's business is effecting the best kind of spiritual results.) But I am to speak now of the *rural missions*, as distinguished from the missions in St. Louis and its suburbs.

The Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt. He is at *Rolla*. The students in the School of Mines believe in him and like him. His own college days he has not forgotten; and that makes him sympathetic. The professors recognize in him a man whose influence doesn't stop with Sundays and is always in the right direction. In the homes of his people he is loved. His visits to the sick are not by telephone. He is full of practical and helpful kindnesses to them that are in any trouble. He's a friend of little children. The year has been a fruitful one in Christ Church, Rolla. The wholesome influence of the "power house" on the corner and the family in the rectory close by cannot be reckoned up. Every other Sunday afternoon Mr. Tragitt is with his little flock at *Cuba*; and back at night to Rolla for the worship there. Twice each month he ministers on week-day nights at Trinity, *St. James*, and gets about to see the people in their homes. Several times he has been to *Sullivan* and to *Salem*.

The Rev. F. M. Weddell. A year ago I said that I believed the Church ought to contrive to occasionally reach *Chaffee*, *Bloomfield* and *Illmo*, where we have practically never been. One Sunday night every month Mr. Weddell goes to Bloomfield; one week-day night every month to Chaffee. Several times in the year he ministers to the few at *Doniphan*. We have no organizations in any of these towns. Courteous brethren of other Protestant Churches are generous to provide us houses of worship. Once each month Mr. Weddell opens the chapel at *Fredericktown*. I was there alone a few days since, and everybody told me how much the people think of him. *Poplar Bluff* is Mr. Weddell's base. The city is going ahead rapidly with public improvements. The Church has never enjoyed a better spiritual year than this has been, I think. We ought to have a rectory at Poplar Bluff. The missionary stipend is bound to be small enough at best. The pastor ought not to have to gouge \$300 out of it every year to put a roof over himself and his family. The Guild at Poplar Bluff knows this and generously pays one-half the rent.

The Rev. J. H. Harvey. He was at Mexico, Mo., last year, which is not in my field. And he was going to leave. And two bishops in other dioceses were looking toward him as a possibility. But the Coadjutor asked him to come to St. Augustine's, in St. Louis, and he came; and we are glad of it. He is on the roll of workers in the rural missions by reason of being minister in charge

of *Fulton*. Part of the year he has been there fortnightly, in mid-week; part of the year monthly. It is a far cry to *Fulton* from *St. Louis*. But Mr. Harvey began to care for *Fulton* when he was nearer to it than he is now; and as he has been willing to continue and the people glad to have him, I have thus far asked him to continue. If pastors of the flock are changed every few months, they cannot call their own sheep by name. *Fulton* pays the round trip expenses (260 miles) every month, and makes such contributions as it thinks it can to missions.

Rev. R. M. Hogarth. A year ago, neither *Bonne Terre* nor *Crystal City* made any report to the Convention. Mr. Hogarth came from the curacy of *St. Paul's Church*, *Milwaukee*, and was appointed to these two rural missions (also *St. Timothy's*, *St. Louis*) in September. He gives each rural mission a Sunday night service every two weeks; also a celebration of the Holy Communion. Every two weeks each rural mission gets the best part of two days of his time in pastoral visiting. Since September, the financial report of *Bonne Terre* shows receipts from all sources of about \$750. There is a working guild of 25 active members. The guild hall has been put in excellent shape and a piano bought and paid for. The church has new carpeting. Sidewalks have been laid. A Sunday School was organized in December (there is no record of our ever having a Sunday School there before); and there are 30 pupils on the roll and three teachers. A Girls' Friendly has 40 members; a Boys' Club, 17 members. Confirmations during the year have been 9. To Miss Emily Conover is chiefly due the credit of keeping alive any little spark of Church life and Church love in *Bonne Terre* until Mr. Hogarth was found to take the work.

At *Crystal City*, spite of much industrial depression, a pledge system is now in operation which yields at the rate of \$250 per year. A small guild of faithful women meets twice each month. *St. Agnes Society*, having an enrollment of 40 girls, meets every Saturday afternoon for games and sewing. Confirmations have been 4; baptisms 6. I think you will agree with me that *Bonne Terre* and *Crystal City*, where there were serious signs of arrested development, have done wonderfully well the past year.

At *Herculaneum*, 30 miles down the *Mississippi* from *St. Louis*, is one of the biggest and best lead smelting plants in the United States. There is a population of about 1,200. The only worship, Protestant or Roman, in the town, is conducted by a Baptist lay missionary in a union chapel. Mr. Hogarth and I put our heads with the heads of some of the men and women whose hearts

are in the right place and whose eyes look forth for opportunities of service; and now we have a deaconess of the Church resident and daily ministering in Herculaneum. The deaconess aims to encourage the wives of the smelter workers to brighten up their hearts and homes; she teaches the little girls to sew; she leads the little children in happy games; (I have a photograph of an egg hunt in which 57 of them looked very happy Easter week;) she takes them on picnics now and then and shows them birds of air and wild flowers of the field. In sickness (and there is much of it down there) the deaconess occupies herself in helpful nursings and ministerings to all who will let her minister to them; and her services, of course, are always without charge. In all her works and ways, it is my expectation that she will, perhaps almost unconsciously to herself and to them, bring many people, little by little, to believe that there is a living Jesus, and that kindness and sympathy and gentleness are in the world because there is a living Jesus still, Whose visible body here in earth is the Church, her members strengthened and steadied and effectually moved to good works by His indwelling Holy Spirit. The time is now come, I think, for the beginnings of a Sunday School. And in it the catechism will be taught, of course; and taught, of course, just as the Church has framed it and officially set it forth for doctrine and for instruction in righteousness. Presently some little people are likely to be brought to baptism; and I shall hope that sponsors may be found who will regard seriously the responsibilities and opportunities of sponsorship. The Lead Company has absolutely no responsibility for the presence of a deaconess in the community. She is sent by the Church. But, as individuals and citizens, men in the company's offices have generously joined in backing our endeavors. Herculaneum pledges for the Lead Belt Deaconess Fund are now more than two-thirds of the entire amount required; and also the providing a place for the deaconess to live. There is a guild of a dozen women who clothe the needy with the garments which they make. Already the Herculaneum experiment seems to have passed the experimental stage, though it was started only in February. Friends of the Coadjutor in the East have helped in financing the scheme. A guild of girls in St. Jude's parish, Monroe City, has helped. The work is under the supervision of the Rev. R. M. Hogarth. Deaconess Gore is appointed to serve as deaconess until September 1. We do pray God to guide us in the output of all our wisest endeavors in this opportunity of serving the blessed Master in the service of His brethren and His children! Certified milk for Her-

culaneum babies through the summer is a plan that we would like to work out.

The Rev. H. L. Hoover. A year ago I told the Convention that St. Jude's, *Monroe City*, was in a pitiable case. It is a parish—not a mission. It properly belonged to Bishop Tuttle, and was his until some four months before our last Convention, when he asked me if he might transfer it to my care. I found the people most affectionate. They agreed with me absolutely that their pastor must be a man of true godliness, kind courtesy, and optimistic faith, and loyal to this Church. Nothing strange about that; for had not the Rev. F. B. Scheetz been their pastor at the start for 26 years! And had not the Rev. W. A. Hatch been their pastor for 16 years! Wholesome examples, these two, in conversation, in love, in faith, in chastity, in purity! On the recommendation of the Coadjutor the vestry called the Rev. H. L. Hoover, of Springfield, Ill., to be the rector. He began his duties on All Saints' Day last. I am saying what everybody in Monroe City knows when I say that Mr. Hoover has proved a veritable restorer of paths to dwell in. This Convention cannot be enough grateful to him and his people for what they have already done in bringing back this, which for half a century was one of the most honorable of all the parishes in the Diocese, to some degree of its former health. And the rectory, hard by the church, is, as it had been years ago, a home which puts sweet fragrance into the very atmosphere of the community. The vestry of Monroe and the Bishop Coadjutor have this last year asked the Missionary Board to assist to the amount of \$250; and the request has been granted. This Convention may wonder why the help of the Board has had to be called in. Perhaps the following statement from the official records of the Diocese may suggest a partial answer. I offer it for what it is worth: In the year 1902, there were two resignations of ministers of St. Jude's, Monroe. In the year 1904 there were two. In the years 1907-12, there were five. Pretty hard on a parish which had had two rectorships covering 42 years!

Mr. Hoover gives one Sunday in each month to Kirksville. He and they and I all understand that this is but a temporary arrangement. I shall speak of Kirksville in another place. In our present treatment of it, we neither trust in God nor do the right.

One week-day evening in each month, Mr. Hoover goes to *Shelbina*. This point has had nothing so much as a monthly service in some years.

The Rev. J. J. Clopton. A year ago, *Cape Girardeau* made no report to the Convention. Shortly after the Convention it was

transferred by Bishop Tuttle (being a parish, not a mission) to the care of the Coadjutor. I went down to see the people and the vestry and they were courteous and kind and asked my counsel in their matters. Acting on my recommendation, a call was given to the Rev. J. J. Clopton, of Maryland. Because the resources and energies of the parish were so low that only \$700 and the use of rectory could be pledged on rector's salary, the vestry agreed that the rector might arrange with me for appointment to serve in some parts of the big untouched field contiguous to Cape Girardeau. For the present, I have appointed him to serve at Illmo (a point which we are touching now for the first time) and Jackson, a mission of some years' standing. Cape Girardeau has services by the rector every Sunday forenoon. Most gratifying results already appear. There is renewed spiritual life and increased financial support. The guilds have raised \$300 in four months. They take care of the monthly payments on the rectory which is in a Building and Loan Association. The Sunday School has already paid more than two-thirds of the Apportionment for General Missions. The rector believes that all Diocesan assessments and apportionments are paid; but the books which were left behind at the resignation of the previous rector, January, 1913, were of a sort to make it difficult to figure out what were assets and what were liabilities. I know that the new rector found quite a discouraging array of arrears for Diocesan obligations, which he and his people immediately tackled. I know that \$130 has been raised in the last four months for General and Diocesan mission objects. I am grateful to everybody who has helped. But, putting first things first, I am especially grateful that the rector, by his own transparent goodness and the Holy Spirit's aid, has quickened the spiritual pulse-beats of the people and has made the Church respected in the city and in the splendid State Normal School.

Jackson is happy in having fortnightly Sunday night services again and the Holy Communion month by month. For many years, whether or not a pastor were nominally in charge of Jackson, Mrs. Linus Sanford has gathered a little company of children, sometimes at the church, sometimes at her own house, according to the weather, and has had with them on Sundays services from the Book of Common Prayer. At a recent visit I confirmed the only member not yet confirmed of a class of little girls whom Mrs. Sanford has kept interested in the Church's attractive and appealing and upbuilding ways for many years, until now they are young ladies. Such a thing as this might be done in many a hamlet in Missouri. Where there's a will, there's a way.

Illmo I spoke of last year as a place which I hoped the Church would give attention to. It is a new railway town. Mr. Clopton has entered there, and in the right way. I am hoping that a modest chapel may be possible before the Convention meets again; though my nine years of missionary bishoping have led me not to desire to hold the record for rapid building of church structures. It is right easy to have much going on and little going forward. It is quite as necessary that we should both perceive and know when and where chapels should be built, as that we should have the funds with which to build them.

Thayer. I have spoken of six men new in Missouri mission stations since I came. (One of these, Mr. Harvey, I took from Bishop Tuttle whose field he was leaving.) At Holy Trinity, Thayer, is the only man continuing in Missouri rural missions who was in Missouri rural missions when I came; the Rev. A. E. Woodward. When we had time to get acquainted, he didn't seem to care to leave. He knew I wanted him to stay. I knew the pastor liked his people and they him. So Mr. Woodward is at Thayer, and has been since September, 1911. In the last two years I have confirmed 13 persons in this little mission; and I am going down again next week. It takes as long to get there from St. Louis as to get to St. Paul. If Mr. Woodward travels on the train 123 miles, he can reach his neighbor, the Rev. Mr. Weddell, at Poplar Bluff on the east. If he travels by train 266 miles, he can reach his neighbor, the Rev. Mr. Tragitt, at Rolla on the north. There are no mission stations or clergy of the Diocese of Missouri nearer to Mr. Woodward than these two! Now you know what I mean when you sometimes hear me say that Mr. Woodward is plowing a furrow alone. And you know why I went down to see him and his people three times last year. And you know why I hope he'll never leave me. Having said all this, I am going to tell you a thing that makes me hang my head; a thing that makes me look to myself mighty little like a Christian. Mr. Woodward's total salary from all sources, per year, is \$920! And he pays rent for a cottage out of this! And he has a wife! I want you to know that, if a man should come to Thayer with a trowel and a mortar-board and work eight hours, six days in a week, to lay a foundation for a house for Mr. Woodward and his wife to live in, the average weekly wage of the man with the trowel and mortar-board (which trowel and mortar-board represent the entire investment the man has made to prepare himself for his calling) would be bigger than the weekly stipend of the man who is in that community teaching men to build all things on

the one foundation, Jesus Christ! In saying what I am saying, I am not scolding. I am not blaming Thayer. Thayer is doing splendidly. It is giving \$180 more now than a year ago. I am but calling attention to a situation which ought to be known in this Convention. The Convention can find the remedy; and I believe it will; namely, the voting of the entire amount which is asked for in the report of the Secretary of the Board of Missions when it comes before us, for the steadying and strengthening and extending of the missionary work in the Diocese for the coming year. Something better than \$9,500, I believe, Mr. McMaster is going to ask for. Let him have it, dear people! Let us take care of our agents in the field!

While I am speaking of Thayer, two other words I want to say. One is that the music is sweet and devotional. Mrs. Marsh looks out for that. The tunes are familiar; and the chants are simple. This is as it ought to be in little mission chapels. The purpose of the mission choir is not to "perform" before an "audience"; but to lead a congregation in the worship of our God.

The other word I want to say is this. The rectory has a lending library. It would be useful anywhere. It is indispensable when one realizes that there is no public library in Thayer. Mrs. Woodward started it with a little handful of her own books. Friends here and there have added to these. Pure water for the little people of our rural towns is not half so essential in the long run as pure reading. And youngsters will read something. They will read Timothy's Quest, and Uncle William, and Just So Stories, and Prince and Pauper, and The Story of the Other Wise Man, and Treasure Island, and When the King Came; they will read these, if they have the chance of getting them, just as eagerly as they will read slush and smut and trash. And appetite strengthens by what it feeds upon. We do well to remember what Coleridge tells us of the garden which was grown thick with weeds because not prejudiced in favor of strawberries.

De Soto, Ironton, and Fredericktown will be the cure of the Rev. V. O. Penley, who has promised to join us from Colorado in September. Until then, occasional services will be had by lay readers and others.

Canton has services every other Sunday afternoon by lay readers who come over the line from Iowa, under the direction of the Rev. John C. Sage, the busy rector of Keokuk. And Mr. Sage comes of a week-day now and again. The past year has been a good improvement on the year before it. The Sunday School, I am glad to say, meets every Sunday.

Once during the year, I have been to the chapel among the cedars at *Sherman*. Twice I have essayed to go but have been turned back by local conditions for which no individual was responsible.

Valley Park had ministrations of the Rev. J. W. Higson a few times in the early winter; and a few lay services have been had. I am quite sure no attempt has yet been made by us there of a sort which ought to be expected to succeed. We have a duty to really try, before we quit the field and say there's no chance there.

Twice I have made pastoral calls at *Montgomery*; once giving the Holy Communion to seven or eight persons in the home of Mrs. C. P. Evered, who shortly afterwards was gathered unto her fathers.

Sullivan I have visited once. I have not been to *Salem*; chiefly because letters of mine to those whom I had supposed were interested in the mission fail to get response. Thus far I take the practical view that the Diocese is paying me too big a salary to let me run about the map to places from which letters and telegrams get no reply; unless, of course, "there's a reason." The Rev. Mr. Tragitt has been to *Salem* twice.

Portland is greatly cheered and helped by the coming of Mr. Edwin Freegard, of the League of Lay Readers, one Sunday every month.

Bowling Green and *Nadine* have had each two services of the Coadjutor.

Bevier has had one service.

Kirksville. I should call myself a faithless steward if I didn't again tell you that, in my judgment, *Kirksville* requires the immediate attention of the Diocese. The Church there is a Diocesan responsibility and a Diocesan opportunity.

Official Diocesan reports show that the last resident pastor *Kirksville* had resigned July 1, 1910. (The Bishop Coadjutor came to *Missouri* January 1, 1912.) *Kirksville* is a city of about 7,000 population. It also has a Normal School of 800 students and an Osteopathic College of 700. The report of 1910-11 shows a record of 26 services on Sundays; three opportunities given to the people to receive the Holy Communion; one person confirmed. In 1911-12 there were 25 services on Sundays; four opportunities to receive the Holy Communion; two persons confirmed. In 1912-13 there were two services on Sundays by the Coadjutor (and quite a number by a local lay reader which failed of getting in the record); two opportunities of receiving the Holy Communion; one person con-

firmed. In 1913-14 just closed, there were 46 Sunday services (the Lay Readers' League going on 11 Sundays, the other services by volunteer clergy). There were 10 opportunities to receive the Holy Communion; no confirmations.

Compared with the three years that went before it, one can see that the past year has given better spiritual opportunities to Kirksville. This has been possible only because the following clergy kindly volunteered to go for Sunday duty, and went: Rev. Messrs. Masker, Norton, Mizner, Blaisdell (2), Jones, Essex, Phillips. To these brethren all, my very grateful thanks. I am sorry that one brother promised and defaulted. This meant that the promise which I had given to Kirksville for that month could not be kept; and broken promises are always unfortunate for the Church. Beginning with January, the Rev. Mr. Hoover, of Monroe, has been going one Sunday every month. I will confess I had a double purpose in asking clergy and lay readers to volunteer for Kirksville. In the first place, I wanted our people there to have spiritual food. In the second place, I wanted that there should be a considerable body of clergymen and laymen who might, if they thought good, tell their impressions of Kirksville.

What shall we do for this most important point? When I tried the experiment which has just been brought to a conclusion, it was not at all in my mind that it was a plan which ought to be made permanent. I am sure no one who entered into the scheme regrets it or considers that it was most good. But now we are back again to a place where all that is provided for Kirksville is a Sunday once a month by Mr. Hoover. The financial strength of the Diocese of Missouri is largely centered in St. Louis. This city of St. Louis was the first See City of the first Missionary Bishop ever sent out anywhere by the Church of which we are the officers and members. Is a peripatetic visit of an itinerant presbyter once a month the best thing that this Diocese wants to do for a city of 7,000 population and 1,500 students? The students are going back at the rate of near 1,000 every year into Missouri as teachers, to shape and mould the lives of the children in our schools according to whatever shapings and mouldings they have themselves received. Shall we of this city, who live in homes of considerable splendor; who pray, "Thy kingdom come"; who in beautiful churches are telling God every little while, as we told Him this morning in this Cathedral Church, "Here we offer and present unto Thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto Thee"—shall we send a man in holy orders to Kirksville once

a month, to say, "The Lord is in His holy temple", in a tumble-down, ramshakle old building which was beautiful once, but is now in such confusion that we are a by-word among the heathen, and that the people shake their heads at us?

In a Diocese which was carved out of the original Missionary District of Jackson Kemper, this Church's first Missionary Bishop, shall his successors in office and heirs of the spiritual blessings which he bought, any longer view with complacency the long-neglected potential missionary outpost yonder in Kirksville? Whether or not Kirksville has done what might have been done to merit the expenditure of a large annual grant of money at that point, I have no way of judging. And that is quite beside the mark, anyhow. Not because the Mississippi Valley had proved worthy to receive so great a gift, did the Church designate Jackson Kemper and send him out and support him in his adventure for God. She sent him out because at length the Church had learned to understand God's will. And if that will had earlier been interpreted by the Church eastward of the Alleghanies, say in 1800 instead of in 1835, the Church all through this Middle-West would be a very different thing to-day. As the Church in America sent a missionary to needy Missouri when Missouri couldn't have gotten him and supported him herself, so let the Church in Missouri send a missionary to needy Kirksville. And let us do it now! Let us find a man whose private character has borne the search-light day and night, and by the grace of God can bear it still. And let the Diocese somehow give assurances that the Missionary Board shall have at least \$800 every year for five years to administer on account of missionary's salary at Kirksville. "If we make a venture at Kirksville, we don't know how we shall come out," has been said to me and will be said again. But, knowing our Captain, we are better off than if we knew the rest. Our Captain never lost a battle yet. He hath broken the gates of brass, and smitten the bars of iron asunder. This very week we are commemorating the fact that He ascended up. And to-day again He calls His orders down, as when on earth He said, "All power is mine! Go ye!" Let us act as men ought to act who really believe their Captain is not buried in a tomb! Let us make the hazard! Let us play the man!

In this connection I have the right to say that I am officially informed that there probably is practically \$6,000 which could be made immediately available, if it should seem good, for building purposes in Kirksville. A building somewhat similar to that which a dear Churchwoman in this city gave us funds to build for St. Tim-

othy's a year ago appeals to me. If we had such a building—or any building—and a whole man in charge, we should get results. There is no better piece of property for such purposes in Kirksville than the piece we own. About \$730 of paving bills stand against the property, drawing interest at 8 per cent., and there are no funds.

Coming in from the rural field, if your kind patience will indulge me, we will speak of the missions in St. Louis and near by.

St. Timothy's. The Rev. R. M. Hogarth superintends the Sunday School and has two morning services each Sunday. (His Sunday nights are given alternately to Bonne Terre and Crystal City, as we have already said.) The report from September 1, when Mr. Hogarth took charge, shows more than \$1,500 raised by the people for all purposes. The Woman's Guild brought in more than \$550 of this. An increasing number of persons is week by week affected by wholesome influences which flow forth from St. Timothy's. It is all to the good if young people who otherwise would be dancing in a promiscuous crowd and amid degrading surroundings, can have a dancing evening now and then, within reasonable hours, with approved companions, under suitable supervision, in a parish hall. This in the winter is one of the features of St. Timothy's work. But it was understood at the outset that we would not consent to the putting on of dances to raise the funds to pay the pastor's salary. That is another matter, quite.

University City. The Rev. T. W. Jones moved from the Diocese in September. Some of our Church folk come to St. Louis occasionally for Sunday worship. Some months ago, the Rev. George E. Norton, rector of St. Michael and All Angels', agreed that he would help in our missionary work when the time came that he could. I am grateful to him for having promised now that he will take Sunday afternoon or evening duty at University City in the autumn. This is an arrangement wholly between the Rev. Mr. Norton and myself. The parish of St. Michael and All Angels' is not in any way committed to the project.

Overland Park. The Rev. Mr. Dooris is beloved by many among whom he has ministered for some years. There is much to show for the work which has been done here in the past. But if closer pastoral work and directing of affairs could now be given, the Church would be advantaged very greatly. The development of this near-by suburb is just now of a sort to challenge us to our best activities.

St. Mary's. It used to be said of Mark Hopkins, sometime President of Williams College, that the best law school in America was a log with a student at one end and Mark Hopkins at the other. And Phillips Brooks has said, "It isn't the place, but what is done in the place, that makes the place glorious." I think of these two sayings when I think of what has been done in the St. Mary's 'dobe chapel this last year. It is a record to be proud of. Committee and Guilds and Minister are busy all the time. I know they must get weary; but I know they never rest. St. Mary's, before anyone else had happened to think of such a thing, took up the idea of putting up some suitable church fabric to commemorate the Fiftieth Anniversary of Bishop Tuttle's episcopate; to be ready when the General Convention shall meet here in 1916; and as a centre of religious life and worship for that part of the St. Louis which is soon to be. Having learned that the thought of such a commemorative building was pleasing to Bishop Tuttle and to a great company of those who had long been his closest and most loving friends, I have told St. Mary's people and their pastor, the Rev. L. H. White, that I entirely approve the scheme. I hope it will succeed. I cannot do much; but I shall help in such ways as I can. Because Bishop Tuttle has long been the beloved Presiding Bishop of the Church, many friends at the East have written that they wish to co-operate; and it seems most fitting that they should. As to just the proper location for the new St. Mary's, I am sure that the first consideration should be a golden rule regard for the rights of contiguous parishes whose churches are already built; and the second should be a desire to place the plant where it can be made to touch to the best advantage the biggest area of that portion of the new St. Louis which is crowding to be born.

St. Augustine's. The methods and accomplishments of the year seem good to me. As now and then I go by the corner in Benton where our chapel is, I permit myself to hope that the time may not be far distant when a parish hall or a bungalow for the minister may be built. The affection of the congregation for the Rev. G. D. B. Miller, many years the loving pastor of this flock, has found visible expression in a beautiful pulpit, dedicated last May to his blessed memory.

St. Matthew's. The mission is having a hard struggle. Taking into consideration the fact that several helpful families have moved away during the year, the report is good. St. Matthew's led the whole Diocese in the matter of early paying and early forwarding its entire apportionment for General Missions.

Baden. Mission of the Christ Child. A Sunday School started within the year by the loving hands and heart of Sister Miriam of Bishop Robertson Hall, has already yielded several candidates for confirmation. You are in the neighborhood when you get off the Broadway car, going north, at the 7500 block. The equipment is rude, but the spirit is good. About 30 children are enrolled.

St. Thomas' Mission for the Deaf. I have been down to join these brethren in their social doings a couple of times in addition to my official visitation. What a happy lot they are! And how much they love the worship of the Church! The Gallaudet College at Washington, D. C., gave the Rev. Mr. Cloud the Doctor in Divinity degree the other day. This shows what the people in other places than St. Louis think of the faithful shepherd of the St. Thomas' flock.

St. Alban's is a mission of Christ Church Cathedral. *Epiphany* is a mission of St. Peter's parish. As I understand things, the Bishop Coadjutor has no voice in the doings of either of these missions. But the duty of visitations is with me; and visitations have given me opportunity to know that the work is excellently well done. St. Alban's people easily show how fond they are of their lay reader, Mr. Gallagher, and his wife; and there is much new enthusiasm in the mission. Epiphany is taking rapid strides and strong ones. It has its own pastor, the Rev. Mr. Essex; and constant, wise, pastoral care. That's the reason of its growth. Nothing constructive is accomplished without that. What's this I hear about a new church for Epiphany? I wish it might come soon; and I am thinking that it may.

Grace-Holy Cross. Its many departments of work will be visualized for you in the new Year Book when it comes. Reports are put in my hands every month. The annual report of the Treasurer of the Bishop's Committee, Mr. J. E. Williams, Jr., tells me that the year's receipts have been a bit over \$7,000, and a bigger balance at the end of the year than at the beginning. The goodly sum of a trifle over \$2,000 appears to have been produced directly by the alms and pledges and activities of the people who count Grace-Holy Cross their truly Church home. The large sum of \$5,000 (five-sevenths of the whole) stands to the credit of kind men and women all over the city, in all parishes and in no parishes, of all kinds of religious views and sympathies and temperaments and preferences and convictions; men and women who are glad to help sustain any enterprise which will give the people in that part of St. Louis the chance for a sweeter and purer and more wholesome

and more abundant life. My thanks to all those who assist in supporting this work which, without them, could not possibly be maintained. My prayers go up that friends will continue to supply our needs. My thanks to the Committee and to all the staff. To Dr. Hild especially my thanks. He has relieved much suffering and arrested much the progress of disease with the new Dispensary, this year; and he does not let us pay him.

St. Stephen's. The Bishop Coadjutor expects to visit all his missions every year. Often he goes more than once. He gets the information for his annual address largely from the reports which come quarterly or monthly from the missionaries at the various posts. No report from St. Stephen's has come in. I thought it might reach me, as many others have, through the printer's proofs of the mission reports for the coming Convention Journal, which are already in my hands. A mistake, no doubt, in the matter of St. Stephen's report. Or late in getting in, perhaps. I was at St. Stephen's in March, and confirmed a class of 18 and administered the Holy Communion. St. Stephen's is in a part of the city where humanity is packed in tight. The work of the mission seems to be going well. For details of it, you must study the report when you get the Journal.

I have long been working on a plan for opening *Jennings*. The time for putting the plan to work with fair prospect of success seems near.

Hospital Missions. When the Rev. J. Howard Lever reads you his report to-morrow, from All Saints' Day to the first of May, you will know why we asked him to come to us from near Providence, R. I., to be the responsible director of the Church's missionary work in the various public institutions of St. Louis. I beg you will come and hear the report; and I beg you will listen to it thoughtfully. The heads of the institutions tell me that the spiritual work which is done by our missionaries makes easier the task of management and control and discipline. That is high praise, and I write it down. The Holy Spirit does again to-day as in the former years, soften suffering; He does still subdue unholy affections and order unruly wills; He casts out demons still! The Missionary Board continues to keep Mrs. Holmes and Miss Hofman on the staff; and I am glad. When I see their constant, cheerful, self-sacrificing labors and the fruits, I thank my God upon every remembrance of them.

We have just entered into an open door which leads to opportunities almost measureless for having compassion on the ignorant

and them that are out of the way. Deaconess Brainerd, who has done such loving work for almost two years at Grace-Holy Cross, and done it so well, has resigned that post and has been appointed by the Coadjutor, beginning the first of next month, to special duty in the maternity ward and the children's ward in the City Hospital. She will co-operate with Mrs. Weiss, the social matron, and will be of Mr. Lever's staff. The Missionary Board has backed me with the necessary appropriation for her salary. Will not some good women who cannot do the work to which Deaconess Brainerd is pledging all her strength, but who would be most unhappy if they had to think that it was not being done by someone, furnish me the funds with which I may rent a cottage or an apartment in which Deaconess Brainerd may find the refreshment which she must get if she shall stand the strain of her work, and in which she and her mother may keep house and have the comforts of a simple home? I must get the money. I suppose the cost may be \$25 a month. I have \$5 a month promised me now. Who will help? Through the generous check of a parishioner of Emmanuel, Old Orchard, big enough to pay office rent for six months, Mr. Lever now has an office down town; an absolute necessity if the work is to be done at the highest pitch of power.

A year ago, were reported 182 confirmations by the Bishop Coadjutor. Ten of these, however, were in the field of Bishop Tuttle; leaving 172 in the field of the Coadjutor. The record for this year shows confirmations by the Bishop Coadjutor wholly within my own field, 171. A year ago I reported three infant baptisms. This year I have administered the sacrament of baptism to 19 infants and 9 adults. I have administered the sacrament of the Lord's Supper publicly 35 times; and in private, to the sick, twice. At one burial I have carried the Church's blessedly comforting assurances to them that mourned.

Woman's Auxiliary. Now and again an officer or a member writes to me to say, "God bless you in your work." And I know that many prayers are all the time crowded up to God from our dear women for this big Diocese's missionary work; else the results of this last year could not have been so good by half. And gifts have come to me, from the grown-up department and from the Junior department, too, amounting in all to \$170.75. Thank you all, my very dear and helpful friends, very much indeed. I must be a better man next year, with such good fellow-workers helping me

along. And by God's grace, I will be. And I thank Miss Triplett and Miss Scheetz very much indeed. I have followed in their train and I have known that they have given a new impetus to many a little nucleus of women workers out in what I sometimes call the sage-brush and cactus portions of my field.

League of Lay Readers. Its members have helped me in carrying services frequently to places which must otherwise have been deprived. Especially am I grateful for long-sustained assistance at Kirksville; the more appreciated by me because the mileage ate heavily into the funds of the League, and because the trip always had to break into the Saturday half-holiday of busy men and also deprived them of half the Sunday night's rest. In addition to duty at Kirksville, the League has ministered in my field at Overland Park, De Soto, Portland, Valley Park; and in St. Louis, at St. Timothy's and City Hospital. Through the League the Church has reached with her services an average of 325 persons every month during the year. That is a record of good deeds worthy to be remembered. There are 13 members. We give them cordial thanks.

It seems to me that the mission field loses what might be a useful engine when the Convocational meetings fail of being summoned regularly, as has been the case of late. The year just closed there was one meeting of the Northern Convocation with St. Jude's parish, Monroe City. By some inadvertence the officers did not give me notice until I had made engagements elsewhere which I felt that I must keep. I was able to arrive only just in time for the closing service, at which I was the preacher. Inasmuch as the Convocational meetings are distinctly provided for by Canon VII of the Diocese, I am wondering whether some business method of financing this creation of the Canon may not be discovered or invented and made operative so that the meetings may be had at the places where they are most needed; namely, at the points which are farthest away and which it costs the most to reach. For example, Thayer should have had the Convocation this spring, and earnestly wanted it. I think we ought to try to devise a method to make the Convocation system work. Getting together is good and helpful. "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man the countenance of his friend." We ought to arrange so that we can go where we can't go!

So far as yet reported to me, the following places in my field have met or overpaid the amount asked of them on the General Apportionment: Bonne Terre, Canton, Ironton, Jackson, Monroe City, Rolla, Thayer; and, in the city of St. Louis, Epiphany, St.

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Matthew's, Grace-Holy Cross, St. Thomas', St. Timothy's. I do not want my clergy to be puffed up, but I notice that, up to the first of May, twelve apportionments were met; and ten of them had been met by the congregations on our side of the line. I don't know what the rest of Missouri thinks; but it looks to me as though the hour had arrived for us to begin to give more particular attention to this one thing if we are to do our share to give the Church a chance to manifest her Lord abroad and here at home! So far, the amount required of us is two-fifths raised; and the year is two-thirds gone. And our people are getting away, a lot of them, and will not be back until the fiscal year is out.

Licenses for the following named lay readers expired May 1, 1914, and the Coadjutor has received no requests for their renewal. Messrs. H. P. Wyatt, St. Alban's; J. W. Taylor, H. W. Hershaw, Charles W. Alban, St. Matthew's; Henry O'Connor, George A. Randolph, Charles Bourscheidt, Harry Ladowsky, St. Stephen's.

The laity of all the places which I visit have been most generously hospitable and friendly and kind. The Lord do so to them, and more also! There are many households in which I feel as much at home as though I had been in Missouri a dozen years. I hope we realize how sacred friendships are such as are permitted between us ministers and you people; and I hope that we may use our opportunities and privileges of friendship always to God's greater glory.

I have been troubled to observe a tendency on the part of some congregations to dispense with the services of a pastor for an indefinite period in order that the money which would normally be used for the continuance of spiritual ministrations might be available for rebuilding or repairing the church fabric. I must do all I can to check this tendency whenever I see it in my field. To rebuild a church fabric with the money which is saved by discharging the pastor and dispensing with the customary opportunities for receiving means of grace, has nothing better to recommend it than to stop giving the daily meals to your child in order that you may have somewhat with which to buy new trimmings for his coat. Better a living child without a coat than a coat without a living child. A new church which represents the savings of an indefinite period of spiritual starvation of the congregation isn't worth having, so it seems to me. A congregation which gets the money for a new church building by depriving itself indefinitely of the Church's Word and Holy Sacraments, pays a mighty heavy price.

I have two or three times during the year raised my voice against methods of taking in money for Church purposes which do not seem good to me. To sell an article which has a real value to a person who thinks he sees real value in it, and for a price which may be agreed upon, and to put the proceeds of the sale into the Church's treasury, is just as dignified now as was the sale in the early days of lands and houses by those who brought the price of the things that were sold and laid them down at the Apostles' feet. But if Jesus were here among men, He would again overthrow the tables at which we sometimes sit to exchange money for His cause and in His name. To get \$100 for the Church's treasury by questionable methods out of a piece of fancy work or finery which might have been purchased by honest bargaining for \$10, is not to put the Church \$90 to the good. It is putting the Church to the bad, beyond all computation. The Church cannot afford to get those extra \$90 in her till!

Province of the Southwest. I do not favor Provinces of the Church. As I see things, level headed business men think that provincialism in business matters is not good. St. Louis has lately been having some sort of a Business Men's League train all down through Missouri and Arkansas and Oklahoma and Texas; what for? Why, because St. Louis wants to keep doing all it can do to escape any sort of suspicion that it is provincial or cares to be provincial. And the Church in this Southwest will do well not to become provincial. But a majority vote of the General Convention, last October, declared in favor of Provinces; and I bow to the will of the majority. I want to put myself on record, however, as believing that Missouri did not become a constituent part of the Province of the Southwest by any legislation which was had at the General Convention in New York, nor by any legislation which was had at Muskogee. As a bishop having jurisdiction in Missouri, I do not (until the Constitution of the Church has been altered or amended) acknowledge the right of any number of delegates to say that Missouri is a member of any Province, or of any body calling itself a Synod to *assume* that Missouri is a member, until the bishops, the clerical delegates, and the lay delegates of the *Diocese of Missouri*, assembled in Diocesan Convention, express the *consent of the Diocese of Missouri* and declare and affirm that Missouri is a member. If we vote ourselves in, we shall be in. Only let us pray that we may escape that provincialism (and I see no reason to expect that we shall escape without the Holy Spirit's mighty aid) which is defined by the lexicographers, "A certain

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narrowness or localism of thought or interest; lack of enlightenment." Let us pray to escape that provincialism of which Short-house writes in Countess Eve: "A society perfectly provincial, with no thought, no hope, beyond its narrow horizon."

Grant to us, Lord, we beseech Thee, the spirit to think and to do, in the coming year, better things for Christ and His Church than we have done before. The following parishes receiving aid from the Board are vacant—Affton, Moberly, St. Charles.

The following missions are vacant—Montgomery, Salem, Sullivan, University City, De Soto, and Ironton, the last two to be filled in September.

The Board will need the sum of \$10,400.00 for the purpose of maintaining the missionary work of the Diocese for the ensuing year. But, above the \$2,500.00 needed for a working surplus, the treasury of the Board has now in hand about \$1,400.00 by reason of vacancies. Therefore in the opinion of the Board the sum of \$9,000.00 should be apportioned for Diocesan Missions to the parishes and missions.

Of the missions, De Soto and Ironton are now vacant, but are to be in charge of the Rev. V. O. Penley, of the Diocese of Colorado, after September 1.

St. James, Sullivan and Salem, forming one group, are having pastoral care of Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, of Rolla, temporarily. It is hoped that they may be provided with their own minister in the autumn.

Montgomery has no services of any sort.

University City, now without services, will be in charge of a clergyman beginning October 1.

Valley Park is not wholly neglected, though the services there are very infrequent, and usually by lay readers.

Kirkville has no pastoral care, but Sunday services were provided each week from September 1 to January. Since January, Kirkville has been served by a clergyman every other Sunday.

Sherman has services only two or three times in a year.

The Board calls attention to the fact that the resignations are fewer than for many years, and that there has been a notable increase in the number of new places, as well as old ones, that have been supplied. The Board feels encouraged by the faithful and efficient work which is being done by the missionaries in the field.

I have the honor of presenting to you the 33rd annual report of the Missouri Branch Woman's Auxiliary. This has been a year of such unqualified success that we stand amazed at what under God's grace we have been able to do. A medical missionary to China from the Southwest Province stands first, as the gift of life must always do. One-half the salary of this missionary is paid by the Missouri Auxiliary and counts on the apportionment. Generous gifts beyond almost any we have ever made are reported this year. Alaska, Oklahoma, Wyoming, Hankow and Shanghai have all had large specials, while our regular pledges have all been met both for work in the Diocese and many outside. And with it all there is a deepening sense that it is but the expression of God's goodness to us that we in turn should carry His message to those who know Him not.

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APPENDIX No. 16.

Report of the Hospital Missionary.

Bishop Tuttle, Bishop Johnson, and Gentlemen of the Convention:

I have the honor to submit my report of the work done by the Hospital Missionary and his staff from November 1, 1913, to May 1, 1914, a period of six months, covering the tenure of the present Hospital Missionary.

First, will you bear with me while I present some general and perhaps dry though necessary statistics. The work of Hospital Missions of this Diocese in the city of St. Louis covers the Sanitarium or Insane Asylum, the Infirmary or Poor House, the City Hospital, Work House, Jail, Industrial School, Koch Tubercular Hospital, and our own Church Home for Convalescent Women, a total of eight institutions, representing approximately five thousand one hundred people. The total average attendance at one service at all the institutions is about eight hundred and fifty. Thus our services alone, to say nothing of the visiting, reach about seventeen per cent. of the total population of the institutions, in spite of the fact that an overwhelming proportion of that population is Roman Catholic and also in spite of the fact that many, especially in the Sanitarium and City Hospital, are physically unable to attend the services. Were that same ratio to prevail in our parish churches they would have to accommodate each Sunday at one service one hundred and thirty-six thousand persons. This, of course, does not include those who are visited during the week. Now, in the six months covered by this report your missionary has held 151 services, made 86 visits to institutions, had interviews or visits in his office and in all parts of the city to the number of 284, had 16 baptisms, 2 funerals, 7 confirmed and secured 7 paroles. In addition, his assistants have made 374 visits to institutions and individuals and the clergy and lay readers of various parishes have held 64 services. That is the bare outline of the work. But I take it that the reason why you ask for a report from your Hospital Missionary is because you want to know what he has been doing, and all the figures in the world will not show that. For that reason I am going to ask you to follow me through seven consecutive days, meeting the various experiences of the work.

We are due Sunday morning at nine o'clock at the Sanitarium, the Insane Asylum. There we face a congregation averaging about one hundred

and twenty-five men, women and children. Please notice that word "children" and try to understand its significance. The men and women there represent all types and degrees of insanity and imbecility and degeneracy, and in that crowd of imbeciles and degenerates, the only line of separation being that of sex, we put feeble-minded children, thus not only depriving them of all opportunity to learn manual work and agriculture, but actually contributing to their debasement. This mediæval ignorance and neglect of the problem of defective children is not, of course, peculiar to St. Louis, but it is not the less disgraceful. As for our services in the Insane Asylum, I know that striking as they do the note of calm, sure faith, they are of real help. We remember that our Lord had peculiar power over the insane and His Gospel has still its quickening power.

From the Sanitarium we hasten home for lunch and then we have barely time to reach the Work House at two. We average an attendance there of about one hundred and twenty-five, though on Sundays when we have a stereopticon lecture we have about three hundred. The average congregation is about twenty-five per cent. of the total population of the institution. At the close of the service here we must rush to the City Hospital for the service there, telling several men who want to see the missionary that they must wait till he comes down Wednesday noon.

At the City Hospital we have an average attendance of forty-two, most of the inmates there being unable to leave their beds.

Leaving the City Hospital, we have just time to reach the Industrial School. Here we find sometimes one hundred and fifty and sometimes two hundred and fifty boys and girls, the large number including the Roman Catholic children who are allowed to come when we have lantern slides. Wonderfully appealing and interesting those children are and until now strangely neglected by the city. The buildings have been repeatedly and publicly condemned as fire-traps, and little apparatus is provided for the children to learn trades. Then, too, delinquent children cannot be effectively separated from dependent children, whose only crime is that they are poor.

So ends the first day. We have been on the road from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. We have held four services and come in contact with about four hundred and fifty men, women and children.

Monday of this particular week we must be at the Infirmary, or Poor House, for the monthly celebration of the Holy Communion. We celebrate it in the chapel first and then we take it to six different wards. This occupies the whole forenoon and we reach the missionary's office, not in time for lunch, because the only time for that on this day is while we are talking with a woman and three men, all of whom need help. We then have a

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spare hour for letters and other details, before we take the train for Koch Tubercular Hospital, where we are to give a lecture, one of a series, on the Life of Our Lord. We reach home about eleven p.m.

Tuesday morning we must leave home by eight in order to be at the City Hospital at nine for the monthly Holy Communion. Here, too, as at the Infirmary, we celebrate first in the chapel and then go to four different wards. And again we reach the office for the regular office hour, and I find a man who has a wife and two children and he is out of work. Fortunately he doesn't yet need money, so he is given a letter of introduction to someone who may be able to help him. Next comes a girl in charge of one of the missionary's assistants. She has been brought from the hospital and must be provided with clothing and lodging. Next follows a volunteer helper who desires the advice of the missionary about a case of his own. And to cap the climax two worthless loafers appear, and they are gently but firmly propelled to the street. By this time it is time to go to the jail for the weekly service. We have there an average attendance of one hundred and thirty, ranging in age from eighteen to seventy. One old man there has been confined for forty-five years of his life. In the jail may be seen what may be called the "dumping system" at its worst, because there you find murderers, thieves, forgers, embezzlers, bigamists and other criminals mingling and in the same cells with eighteen year old boys and other men who are simply awaiting trial, men who may be innocent. There is there also a morally degenerate boy who has been sentenced to a few months. It will be an offense to the community if he is released; but, as the judge asked me, where can such a boy be sent? Shall he, a moral leper, be sent to the Industrial School to contaminate those children, or to the Insane Asylum, where he will be for years an expense to the city? Why cannot we have an Industrial Farm for such children? But all in all, the service at the jail is as inspiring as it is at the Work House, especially the singing. Our large churches pay large sums for singing which doesn't compare in volume with that at the jail and work house. Our day's work is done then, about seven-thirty.

Wednesday the City Hospital must be visited again to attend to some matters which couldn't be done Tuesday, and from there we go to the Workhouse, where in an hour at least twenty men must be seen, one wanting his hospital time counted on his sentence, another his jail time, another wants tobacco, another wants the Missionary to see some one outside for him, two young men who forged some checks want to talk over their case, and so it goes. In the evening there is a supper for the volunteer workers, followed by a service.

Thursday is occupied with a trip to Rolla, in the interests of a young girl who brings a serious charge against her brother, the girl having been in the City Hospital. We reach the city again at midnight.

Friday is occupied with a visit to the jail, various conferences with clients, and a service at the Convalescent Home, the day's work being done at nine p.m.

Saturday is filled with preparations for Sunday, which differs from the first Sunday only in the substitution of the Infirmary for the Workhouse.

Now that is one week's work. We have held ten services, visited five institutions, and interviewed an indefinite number of individuals. The Missionary has left home before eight every morning, and has returned not earlier than eight p.m., and sometimes midnight. Anyone who will analyze that week will agree that it was about as full as it could be. And there would be no harm in that if at the end of the week one could say that the work had been done, that there had been very little neglected. But that is not true of this work. I have given you an idea of what was done in one week by the Missionary. Now this is what was not done: the Sanitarium, the Industrial School, and Infirmary were not visited, the Holy Communion was not celebrated at the Sanitarium or Koch, though there were people there who earnestly desired it, no visiting of men who have been paroled through our efforts was done, two very necessary investigations were not made, no judges were interviewed, no books read, and no sermons were prepared. As a result, when the Missionary again visits the jail and workhouse he must disappoint all those who spoke to him the week before, and when he goes to see a judge, if the judge should ask him how A or B or C, paroled last week, is getting along, the Missionary has to say he doesn't know; and when he goes to the Sanitarium, for instance, on Sunday he is reproached by the inmates for not coming to see them. I tell you very frankly, this work is not being handled—we give little dabs here and there, and we run around in circles a good deal; but too little real constructive work is being done, and too much is being neglected.

Why? Why, because there are not enough workers. Mrs. Holmes is fully occupied at the City Hospital, and Miss Hofman visits the Infirmary, Koch, Sanitarium, and the women of the Workhouse. An opportunity has been offered us in the Maternity and Children's Wards of the City Hospital through the Social Service Department, and we have decided to use the money heretofore appropriated for a layman for the salary of a deaconess who will be stationed at the City Hospital for work in these particular wards. But of course that still leaves us short-handed. The deaconess will enlarge our work, but of course she will not be able to help us with the work which is now on our hands. In short, a layman assistant to the Missionary is absolutely necessary. We have lost one opportunity this last year simply for want of adequate assistance, and we shall continue to lose opportunities until we do get such assistance. We hear very often

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about the inefficiency and the weak sentimentalism of the social service work of the Christian Church, and such criticisms are often deserved, because the Church asks one man to do work which would tax the powers of two. And this work moreover cannot be neglected or postponed. It is often a matter of life and death, and in at least one instance a man went to the penitentiary who ought not to have gone, simply because your Missionary could not move quickly enough. A lay assistant has always been found necessary in the past, and with two new institutions, Koch and the Industrial School, to provide for, and with the work growing as it is bound to grow, such a lay assistant, a man who is young and who has some musical ability and who knows something of modern methods, or who is willing to learn such methods, is absolutely necessary.

The work he would be called upon to do would be essentially that which is now being left undone by the Missionary. This includes: (a) the making of investigations before securing paroles of men from the jail and workhouse, (b) looking after them for at least six months after their release, (c) investigation of those who come to us from the hospital or who are referred to us by individuals or societies, (d) the enrollment and training of volunteer singers for the different services, (e) visiting at the Industrial School, and (f) other details incident to the administration, such as the keeping of records, etc. His Sunday duty would probably include one service a month at the Sanitarium, one at the Industrial School, one at the Infirmary, one or two at Koch, and perhaps later one or two at the Workhouse, when we have weekly services there.

Our Church is the only one in the city doing this work, and therefore I long to make that work efficient, so that others may see that there is such a thing as sanctified common sense, and that the work may be definitely religious and spiritual, and at the same time be careful and scientific.

Now there are two conditions which I want to mention, conditions which at first sight may not seem to be related, but which seem to me to bear the relation of cause and effect. One condition is the prevailing ignorance of our Church which exists among the inmates and the heads of the various institutions. "What is your Church" and "where is it" are the common questions frequently asked. That is the effect. And the cause is to be found, it seems to me, in the prevailing ignorance of the social service work of our Church which exists among our Church people. I have actually heard of criticisms by our own Church people that our Church was not interested in such work; when this diocese has supported that work, for, lo, these many years. Our Church people simply do not know about this work, and therefore those among whom the work is

done do not know our Church. They never see anyone but the missionary, and how do they know whether he has behind him a church or not?

But how shall our people know about such work and become interested in it enough to support it with their personal efforts and their money unless they are told about it? Your Missionary has had the privilege of addressing four morning congregations, but the other parishes of the city and of the diocese still do not know where some of their diocesan apportionment, their own money, goes. I have also asked the clergy to co-operate with me my referring to me any whom they may wish visited in any of the city institutions. The Missionary goes to those institutions and to the parish churches not for his own sake, but for the sake of the Church of Christ and the Kingdom of God; and to do his work he must have the cooperation of the clergy and the lay-people of the diocese.

The needs, then, as I see them are as follows: first, a man assistant to the missionary; second, the cooperation of the clergy; third, volunteer workers from among the Church people, to give money, to give time, to give clothing and work to those who need them. The contingent fund of the Missionary ought to be at least one thousand dollars a year, for Christmas, for car fare, for temporary aid, etc. Volunteer singers are needed, not only soloists, but fairly good singers for chorus. And the Churchmen of this city ought to be willing to put men to work when I send them. You know, gentlemen, that an able-bodied man ought not to be compelled to go hat in hand begging for work. Something is radically wrong with a system where that humiliation exists. And then some day when the finances of the mission permit it is my purpose to have a doctor and a lawyer who for their expenses will be willing to co-operate with me, the doctor to handle drink and drug cases, and the lawyer to handle worthy legal cases, rescuing them from the clutches of the shysters who infest our courts. All these things your missionary needs.

But one matter concerning the Jail and Workhouse is important enough to mention separately and that is the matter of the Industrial Farm and the indeterminate sentence. How absurd it is for us to send a man in the grip of the drink or drug habit to the Workhouse for any definite period of time like thirty days or even six months. If you have dyspepsia the doctor doesn't tell you to be careful of your diet until July 1. He may give you some idea of the probable length of time required for a cure, but he doesn't guarantee that you will be cured at 9 a.m., July 1. How then can a judge say that a month or two in the Workhouse will be sufficient to cure an alcoholic or a drug-taker? Or perhaps the sentence of such a man to the Workhouse is meant as a punishment. But if you have dyspepsia do you want to be punished? You naturally think the dyspepsia is punishment

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enough. And the alcoholic or drug habit is not different. That, too, requires not punishment, but cure, and that cure requires an indefinite period of time. Therefore, I hope that the clergy and the laity of this Diocese will not lag behind the general public sentiment in this matter of the indeterminate sentence, which reads "not less than such a period and not more than such another period", and the industrial farm, which may be, we hope, more reformatory in its effects than the present rock-pile at 4200 South Broadway. Certainly when a man goes to the Workhouse forty-six separate times in three years, as one man has done, the rock-pile cannot be considered efficient either as a deterrent or as a cure.

As for finances of the Missions, I have month by month made a detailed report to Bishop Johnson, all of which reports are on file, so that it does not seem necessary to give an itemized report at this time.

The total receipts were \$499.97. Of this amount the sum of \$100 was given for office rent and the remainder was received for the Contingent Fund from the Cathedral Parish, Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, Church of the Ascension, All Saints' Church, and many individuals, all of whom so far as their addresses could be ascertained have been personally thanked.

The expenditures amounted to \$443.14, leaving a balance of \$56.83. But \$50 of this may be used only for office rent. Therefore, the true working balance May 1 was \$6.83. Now a balance like that is nothing short of absurd when on the one side we find only four parishes definitely contributing to the Contingent Fund, and when on the other we have such items as Christmas expenses (about \$200) and car fare for the missionary and his staff, which averages \$15 a month or \$180 a year, and temporary aid for men, women and children, which has averaged \$17 a month this winter, or about \$200 a year, and all the other items which amount probably to \$200 a year more, and when we remember that as the work grows the expenses will grow also. Beside an actual expense of fully \$800 a year exclusive of salaries, even on our present basis, that \$6.83 doesn't loom very large.

The office of the missionary on Chestnut Street, secured through the generosity of a friend, has proved its worth over and over again in the time it has saved and the greater number of people it has enabled the missionary to see. The telephone in the office, also given by a friend, has been much used and appreciated.

Finally, I want to express my deepest and warmest appreciation to all who have in any way helped me. The honor roll is too long for detailed thanks, and I have tried to thank people as I went along. But to the sympathy and practical assistance of the Bishop Coadjutor I owe more than I can express. Certainly he might very often have hesitated to give his un-

qualified approval, but his faith in me has helped me to have faith in myself. To Mrs. Holmes and Miss Hofman, who give their time and efforts practically without compensation, the thanks of the Convention are due. The clergy who though already overburdened have so unselfishly taken a little of the work from my shoulders may be sure of my thanks and my appreciation. The laymen, Mr. Pomeroy at the Infirmary, Mr. Jones in the colored ward of the Infirmary, Mr. Freegard at the City Hospital, Mr. Merrill at the Sanitarium, have shown the most Christian spirit of service. And those volunteers who from early Sunday morning to late Sunday evening have helped in the services, men and women most of them whose only day of rest is Sunday, I thank, but I cannot thank enough. And finally, the heads of all the institutions, the Judges, the Probation Officers, all have met your missionary with the deepest courtesy and the readiest help. I don't think the people of St. Louis appreciate the manliness and the honesty of the men who are in charge of the city's institutions. If they did I think they would give them better equipment to work with. I think all these officials realize that our desire is not to interfere or to be officious or meddling, but that we are moved by a sincere desire to be of constructive, progressive service.

And so, when people ask me if this work is not very depressing and very discouraging, and when I hear men say that the Church is facing a crisis and that she is losing power, I think of the men and women in all those institutions whom her services have strengthened; I think of the men from Jail and Workhouse who through her are living the life God put them here to live, I think of the officials who have been glad to trust her representatives, and I cannot be depressed, nor can I believe that her power is weakening. She is facing a crisis, yes, but let us thank God for it; let us be thankful that we for that reason dare not be lazy, dare not be dismayed, dare not be overconfident; and let us be sure that however it fares with the faith which is cheap, the faith which is ignorant, the faith which is prejudiced, whether such a faith is in our ranks or elsewhere, let us be sure that a Church whose faith is deep enough to be based on the essential goodness of humanity, and broad enough to reach out for all the sons and daughters of men, however far they may have wandered, and high enough to lead us all to the throne of God, let us be sure that such a Church, and our prayers and our efforts can make our Church a church like that, is as infinite and eternal as God Himself and that some day "the kings of the earth shall bring their glory and honor into her and the nations of the earth shall walk in her light".

No further comment is needed on the faithfulness of the pastoral work in Thayer.

15—Thayer, responding to repeated invitations from many of the people I gave a lantern talk on certain conditions with which I used to be pretty familiar in South Dakota. I was glad that the price of admission was made very small.

17—St. Louis, gave a party to the children of the Orphans' Home in a room of the Schuyler House kindly placed at my disposal by the Dean of the Cathedral.

21—Sunday, Fulton, Trinity Church, celebrated Holy Communion and preached. Also Evening Prayer and sermon.

24—St. Louis, Afternoon, took some picture slides and entertained the children of St. Louis Industrial Home for an hour or more. I was glad to do it. They seemed to enjoy it. When I started away and said, "Merry Christmas," two hundred voices responded, "Same to you." And I knew their wishes were genuine.

Christmas Eve, St. Louis, joined in the carol singing about the Christmas tree at St. Luke's Hospital.

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December 25—Christmas Day, Jennings, in the Union Chapel, baptized three babes and preached; celebrated the Holy Communion.

28—Sunday, Morning, Rolla, with Rev. H. Nelson Tragitt, assisted at Morning Prayer and preached. Afternoon, Cuba, preached, and, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Tragitt, administered the Holy Communion. Evening, Rolla, with Rev. Mr. Tragitt, preached and confirmed three. Have appointed Mr. Tragitt for the present to give fortnightly mid-week services at St. James. This gives him a big field and will keep him a busy man.

January 4—Sunday, Morning, St. Louis, St. Mary's, with Rev. Mr. White, celebrated Holy Communion and preached. Evening, Bonne Terre, with Rev. R. M. Hogarth, preached and confirmed five and addressed the candidates. The work at Bonne Terre is strengthening steadily and securely, thanks to the earnestness and kindness of Rev. Mr. Hogarth, who goes down from St. Louis two Sundays in each month; and thanks to the people who respond to his ministrations.

6—St. Louis, meeting Committee for Grace-Holy Cross.

11—Sunday Morning, Canton, Morning Prayer, Holy Communion and Sermon. Also met and talked with the Sunday School children. They told me that they had had a happy Christmas festival, with a Christmas tree right in the church. I was glad of that. I am glad that, as they grow up, they can look back upon children's happy Christmas festivities connected with the very fabric of the Church. I somehow am not able to think that Jesus, who took the little children in His arms and blessed them, and who ascended into heaven with "all things appertaining to the perfection of Man's nature," can care to have us build churches for His worship so choice that His little children may not "gather around the Christmas tree" in the churches that we build! Evening, Bowling Green. In an unused Methodist church, had a Prayer Book service and preached. There was not an unoccupied sitting. I think 200 persons were present. The service was most hearty and the people met me in a spirit of most cordial Christian fellowship. We have only three or four communicants in Bowling Green.

17—Chaffee, Evening, in Methodist church, read Evening Prayer and preached and baptized a babe and confirmed the father and mother of the babe.

18—Sunday, Morning, Chaffee, in the home of one of our people, administered the Holy Communion. (I am in Chaffee at this time be-

cause Rev. F. M. Weddell, who cares for the few people of our Church here, is shut in at St. Luke's Hospital.) Rev. J. J. Clopton takes charge of Jackson and Illmo to-day. Evening, left for Muskogee, Oklahoma, for the Annual Council of the Missionary Department of the Southwest.

Jan. 20—Muskogee, Oklahoma, preached the sermon at the opening of the Annual Missionary Council.

20-22—In attendance at the sessions of the Council and at services connected therewith.

25—Sunday, Ironton, St. Paul's, administered the sacrament of baptism to three children; and administered the sacrament of the Supper of the Lord.

28—St. Louis, addressed the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Philip's Church.

29—Bevier, in Congregational Church, Evening Prayer and sermon. Rev. H. B. Smith, of Macon, assisted me in the service.

February 1—Sunday, St. Louis, with Rev. J. Howard Lever, visited the Infirmary. Spoke in several of the wards, and had short services of prayer and song, assisted by a number of the hospital workers. Later, in the chapel, held services with Mr. Lever, and confirmed five.

2—Addressed the Monday Club of Webster Groves on a topic assigned me by the club, "Twentieth Century Trend in Religion."

4—Appointed A. S. Fuller, Raymond Lethem, A. W. Townsend on Committee for St. Augustine's Mission, St. Louis. Appointed Zeno E. Kinkead Treasurer for Holy Cross, Poplar Bluff.

March 1—Sunday, St. Louis, Morning, assisted Rev. B. T. Kemerer in the Holy Communion at St. George's, and by his invitation spoke to the people of the work in rural missions. Evening, Epiphany, with Rev. Mr. Phillips and Rev. Mr. Essex, Evening Prayer. Confirmed a class of sixteen and preached.

2—St. Louis, Afternoon, addressed the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's Church. I told something of the story of the rural work in Missouri.

3—St. Louis, Afternoon, at the home of Mrs. H. H. McIntyre, addressed the Woman's Auxiliary and the Juniors of St. Mary's.

4—St. Louis, Evening, business meeting of League of Lay Readers.

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March 8—Sunday, Morning, Cape Girardeau, assisted in Morning Prayer and confirmed eight presented by the Rev. J. J. Clopton. Evening, Jackson, with Rev. J. J. Clopton, held services and preached.

9—Jackson, with Rev. J. J. Clopton, celebrated the Holy Communion.

11—St. Louis, at the home of Mrs. Frank Wyman, addressed the Woman's Auxiliary of Ascension Parish. Afternoon, Ascension Church, with Rev. Mr. Hinks, made Lenten address.

12—St. Louis, St. Paul's Church, confirmed one presented by Rev. J. Howard Lever, of Hospital Missions. Noon, made Lenten address at Grace-Holy Cross. Night, meeting of Board of Diocesan Missions.

13—Licensed George Eschman Lay Reader for Grace-Holy Cross, St. Louis.

14—St. Louis, made calls on the sick at Infirmary and Sanitarium.

15—Portland, Morning, baptized three children, celebrated the Holy Communion and preached. Evening, held services and preached. Mr. Edwin Freegard has lay services here one Sunday in each month and the people are greatly profited by his ministrations.

18—St. Louis, met with the staff of Hospital Missions workers at their monthly supper. Schuyler Memorial House, gave a picture talk to the congregation of St. Thomas' Mission on the work among the Sioux of South Dakota.

20—St. Louis, Afternoon, parish house of Holy Communion parish, addressed the monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary on the Church's work among the Red Men.

22—St. Louis, Morning, St. Matthew's, addressed the Sunday School. Assisted Rev. Mr. Reed in Morning Prayer and confirmed two; preached the sermon. Evening, St. Alban's, with Rev. C. E. Remick, assisted in Evening Prayer, confirmed twelve and preached. Mr. Gallagher is serving with faithfulness and efficiency as lay reader and the work of the mission is going splendidly.

Will Title, "The General Clergy Relief Fund."

The general and official society for the Pension and Relief of Clergy Widows and Orphans, covering the whole Church. Canon 53. The General Convention recommends an annual offering from every Church, and that a percentage of the Communion Alms be given to this fund.

Remit to Rev. Alfred J. P. McClure, Treasurer, The Church House, Twelfth and Walnut Streets, Philadelphia.

Special Collections Enjoined by Canon XX.

SECTION 1. Offerings shall be made annually in every Church in this Diocese for the following purposes, namely:

First. For the increase of the Permanent Fund for the Support of the Episcopate, which shall be made on the Second Sunday in Lent, or on one of the Sundays nearest thereto.

Second. For the increase of the Aged and Infirm Clergy Fund of the Diocese, for relief of Clergymen disabled by age or disease, and of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, which shall be made on Christmas day or the Sunday nearest thereto.

Third. For the support of the theological students in the Diocese which shall be made on the Third Sunday in Advent.

SEC. 2. Offerings shall be made quarterly by all the congregations of this Diocese which do not contribute through the Laymen's Co-Operative Missionary Society, in behalf of Diocesan Missions. They shall be made during the months of February, May, August and November; but not that where services are held on less than two Sundays in each month, one offering for Diocesan Missions shall suffice.

SEC. 3. The offerings contemplated by this Canon shall be forwarded immediately to the Treasurers of the respective funds.
