

INTRODUCTION

What to Know About ICE & Your Congregation



- Churches are not required to enforce immigration law.
- ICE generally cannot enter private areas (offices, classrooms, residences) without a valid judicial warrant.
- ICE can be present in public areas without a warrant.
- A church's designation as a "sanctuary" does not provide legal immunity from federal enforcement.

St. Louis Based Support & Rapid Response Resources

St. Louis Rapid Response Coalition

- A community network that provides coordinated support if immigration enforcement activity is reported in the region.
- ICE/Immigration Activity Hotline: 314-370-7080 (report sightings or concerns).

Immigrant Service & Legal Support Hub

International Institute of St. Louis

- Provides general immigrant support services, including information, referrals, and community programming (not ICE legal defense).

Legal Assistance Organizations (St. Louis)

Churches can refer individuals or invite these partners to present a Know-Your-Rights workshop:

Community-Focused Legal Services

- MICA Project – nonprofit offering immigration legal services, removal defense, naturalization help, asylum support, and community education.
- Legal Services of Eastern Missouri – legal aid, including immigrant law assistance (visa petitions, citizenship, asylum).
- Monarch Immigrant Services – immigration legal services, including guidance and representation.

Private Immigration Attorneys (For Referrals)

These firms do not provide free legal services but may assist referred individuals:

MO Based Support & Rapid Response Resources

Statewide & Regional Immigration Legal Resources

- Legal Aid of Western Missouri – Immigration Law Services

Free or low-cost civil legal assistance including immigration help, USCIS filings, adjustment of status, family-based petitions, naturalization, T/U visas, and referrals. Serves clients across western Missouri (including Kansas City area).

- The Asylum Clinic Kansas City (ACKC)

Nonprofit focused on providing legal services and support to immigrants and refugees, including asylum support and community empowerment in the Kansas City region.

- Catholic Charities of Central & Northern Missouri – Family Immigration Services

Offers low-fee immigration legal services aimed at family reunification and other immigration benefits for individuals and families in central and northern Missouri (outside of the St. Louis metro).

- ImmigrationLawHelp.org – National Legal Aid Locator

An online tool where individuals can search by ZIP code to find low-cost and pro bono immigration legal services across Missouri and nationwide.

Local Immigration Support in Other Missouri Cities

Kansas City Area

- Legal Aid and pro bono immigration attorneys (found via local legal aid directories and Kansas City-area services).

Springfield Area

- Legal Services of Southern Missouri – offers civil legal assistance, including some immigration-related support in southwest Missouri.

(Note: Many regions outside St. Louis have networks of private immigration attorneys who may offer consultations or referrals.)

Missouri Refugee & Immigrant Program Support

- Missouri Office of Refugee Administration (MO-ORA)

Statewide coordinating organization focused on refugee resettlement and inclusion efforts throughout Missouri. Partners with local resettlement agencies and service providers to connect refugees and immigrants with resources statewide.

Other Community Support

While not ICE-specific, these local organizations can offer ongoing support and referrals:

- Catholic Charities – Immigration Services (legal aid, case management, support).
- International Institute of St. Louis – immigrant resource hub.

Suggested Church Action Steps

- Designate a team or point person in the congregation for sharing updates and resources.
- Partner with local legal nonprofits to offer workshops on rights and steps to take if enforcement agents arrive.
- Develop a communication plan for congregants and families who may be impacted.
- Keep emergency contacts (hotline, attorneys) readily accessible.


